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Keeping the Heavenly Vision


APOLEON once said to his drummer-boy, "Beat me a retreat." The lad answered, "Sire, I know not how. Desaix never taught me that." And our Master has not taught us that in the realm of world evangelism.

In the Boxer riots that took place in China in the early days of this century, many missionaries were martyred. From the membership of the China Inland Mission alone no less than fifty-eight laid down their lives. When the news reached Shanghai, where the members of the China Council were gathered for a quarterly meeting, for two days they did nothing but pray. Then they conferred together. There was no thought of turning back. On the contrary, there was a full determination to go forward, whatever the cost.

After the Boxer uprising was quelled,

the Chinese Government offered to give the China Inland Mission reparations for all the mission stations that had been destroyed. But the directors stated that no compensation was asked for or would be accepted.

On the anniversary of the day when more than fifty of the missionaries and their children had been martyred, an impressive memorial service was held in Taiyuan, cap-(Continued on Page Three)

# Looking Unto Jesus

OOKING unto Jesus! Hebrews 12:2. There is such a person as Jesus. That is the fact that must grip us-a glorious God-man, living as real as when He walked in old Judea long ago. The eye of faith can see Him, the hand of faith can touch Him, the opened, awakened heart can love Him. We are not exhorted to look at something that is not, or something that is a mere theological theory. Looking unto Jesus is a real experience. I can do it, you can do it. He is the same Jesus, yesterday, today and forever. Every time we read the Word of God we may see Jesus.

A beautiful story is told of a soldier in the late world war. A supper was given in London, by the officers of a certain regiment, in honor of a soldier who had been all through the war, and had done many brave deeds, but had received no reward for them. After the supper was over, one of the officers said to him, "You have been all through this war but have not told us a single incident in it. Now tell us what you consider the most wonderful thing you have seen in it."

The soldier waited a moment, then stood up and said, "I was walking near my trench one day, when I saw a young soldier lying on the ground intently reading a book. I went up to him and said, 'What book is that you are reading?'

"'My Bible,' he answered. 'Oh!' I said, 'I read my Bible for years, and it never did me any good; give it up, man, give it up!' He answered, 'Listen to what I am reading about Jesus and what He told us,' and he read the 14th chapter of John to me. 'Oh !' I said, 'I have read that chapter many a time, and it never did me any good; give it up, man.' He looked at me and said, 'If you knew what the Bible is to me, what I see in the Bible, you would never ask me to give it up,' and as he spoke, the light on his face was so bright I could not look at it. I never saw anything like it. I turned and walked away.

Soon after a bomb fell near the place where we had been, and when the dust was cleared away I thought I would go and see if that young soldier was safe. I found he had been killed, but his Bible was sticking out of his breast pocket, and here it is," he said, holding it up. "I say the most wonderful thing I have seen during the war was the light on that young soldier's face, and, more than that, I can now say that his Saviour is my Saviour." He was looking unto Him, he could see Him in the Book.

Ah! Friends, Jesus is real, we can look unto Him. The tenth chapter of Hebrews ends with a strong exhortation to cast not away our confidence, but to continue in faith. The eleventh chapter follows with its record of faith heroes, of the wonderful things accomplished through faith; and therein do we find the clear assertion that should grip our hearts, that without faith it is impossible to please God.

Then follows the twelfth chapter, opening with the appeal to all of us to strip ourselves of every hindering thing and run with

patience the race set before us, looking unto Jesus. Only by so doing will we have the patience to continue in the race. "Let us implying advancement toward the run.' goal. Not loiter along, or casually walk, but run, "let us run," putting every energy of our soul into it. We cannot run well unless we keep looking unto Jesus. This is one of the clearest and most direct statements to believers.

What do we see when we look? Is it all a myth, a theory? Christian, have you ever seen anything? Can you speak with assurance to the sinner, to the man or woman of the world, and tell that one that you have seen Jesus?

Let us note the contents of the whole text, "Looking unto Jesus the Author and Finisher of our faith; who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down on the right hand of the throne of God." See here two things He is, and two things He has done.

1. He is the Author of our faith. He is the Prince Leader, the Beginner of our faith. He leads in the way of faith; He walked in it Himself; He opened it for us; He draws us into it. He is the Beginner of that saving faith within us. That faith is fastened on Him. If any one has saving faith today, Jesus is truly the Author of it, and as surely as He began it He will— 2. Finish it. For He is the Finisher of

our faith. He will teach us, lead us, guard us and hold us in this faith until it is finished in glorious sight, face to face with Him. Our faith is precious to Him. He is not satisfied to have had us begin the life of faith; he wants that faith developed and finished. That was the joy set before Him, to have the finished product of faith to present in glory. Let us not get weary of the way of faith; Jesus will see us safely to the goal if we keep looking unto Him, for He is the Finisher of our faith. Now, note the two things He has done;

finished action:

1. He endured the cross.

2. He sat down at the right hand of God. These things the Spirit of God through the Word holds before us continually-the crucifixion of the Son of God, and His resurrection and ascension. He endured the cross! Let us bow our hearts and worship! Let us bless His holy name! He endured the cross for us-the curse, suffering and shame. He actually did endure it, suffering, the just for the unjust; bearing

our sin; taking our curse, that He might bring us to God. See 1 Peter 3:18. The joy that was set before Him of seeing the multitudes around His Father's throne, the gathered harvest, made Him willing to thus suffer, die, become the Author of our faith, looking forward to the great finish, when He shall stand in the midst of the great company -the Finisher of our faith. We sing, ' 'At the cross, at the cross, where I first saw the light." Never let us sing it lightly. Our faith for eternal life began when at the cross we saw the light. Looking unto Jesus then we saw our deliverance from sin.

Can you see past that Cross on Calvary? Can you see that it is empty; can you see that tomb where His dead body lay is also empty? Looking unto Jesus, seated at the right hand of God, the place of power and authority, you see His offering for us was accepted. The blood of the everlasting covenant was accepted, and God says, "No more offering for sin is required; their sins and their iniquities will I remember no more." Looking unto Jesus! He is there. His atoning work finished, His place of power and authority is sure. Looking unto Him means to count on Him. Get all you can from Jesus as you run the race; take all the Word reveals is ours in Jesus. The Spirit takes the things of Jesus and shows them unto us.

What do you then see, looking unto Jesus? Let us be very clear and definite.

We see the Lamb of God who has borne away our sin. John 1:29; 1 Peter 2:24. He is our complete Saviour. We see Him as our perfect righteousness. He was righteousness, spotless in His life, but He is more than an example to us. His righteousness is imputed and imparted to us if we will but accept it. The awakened heart, the but accept it. heart that loves God, prays and communes with God, wants to be righteous. That one is not living carelessly or indifferently; he grieves over his failures and would be cast down and despondent in the race if he did not keep looking to Jesus and reckoning on His righteousness as being counted his. See 1 Cor. 1:30; Phil. 3:9.

Again, looking unto Jesus, our great, tender, understanding High Priest, in God's presence for us. His name prevails at the throne. In the type, the high priest of the old dispensation bore the names of the tribes of Israel upon his shoulders and upon his breast. Jesus our great High Priest is holding us in the place of love and strength. He is our High Priest, holding us, praying for us that our faith fail not.

Let us look unto Him and see Him as our Enabler, our Strength, our Life, our Victory, our Healer. Paul had his vision so fixed on Jesus he counted on Him for everything and he said, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." Conditions are too hard for us to handle; there is sickness, pressure, needs of all kinds. Is there any help for us in the race? May the Spirit of God awaken us to the fact that our Jesus is Lord. He has gone into heaven, and is on the right hand of God, angels and authorities and powers being subject unto Him. He can handle our affairs. He can and does put the enemy to flight when we lay hold upon Him as truly Lord. Let every sick one look steadfastly to Him as Lord for the body. Everything must now bow to His name.

In the pressure and uncertainty of these days let not the Christian lose his joy, for

we may look unto Jesus as our coming Bridegroom. Let us look with holy expectation, love and readiness for He will surely come. Looking unto Jesus we get vision of the great day ahead, of the triumph of Jesus in this world, when He shall reign as King of kings and Lord of lords.

My father, an ardent lover of the Lord and preacher of the gospel for many years, had his vision of God's program blurred because he saw Jesus for years through denominational eyes. He saw what his beloved church taught. Then, through the healing of my mother, after years of illness, my parents' eyes were opened, and they got a clear vision of Jesus. They saw Him as the Healer of the body today. The vision of Him and of His program became so clear that their whole outlook on life was changed. Now, the Holy Spirit shows us the things of Christ if we'll look at Him without anything between-church doctrines, man's opinion, friends, fear of man, preconceived ideas must all be put away before we can see clearly what He is to us, and what it means to keep looking unto Him.

Looking to Jesus with the look of faith, because our salvation is in Him alone; with the look of love because He alone can satisfy the heart; with the look of strong desire, longing to know Him better ; with the look of devotion, willing to do His will; with the look of gladness because we know He loves us; with worship and praise because He is so great, so wonderful and He has done so much for us. See Him clearly through the smoke and mist of these days. He will fill the sky of our lives.

ital of the Shansi Province. This service was arranged by the highest Chinese authorities, who were amazed that no reprisals were asked for all the loss of life and property. To show his appreciation of this other-worldly spirit, the new Governor of Shansi sent out a proclamation which was posted in every part of the province. After mentioning in particular fifteen cities in which the China Inland Mission had suffered loss of property, the Governor wrote:

"In rebuilding these churches with its own funds, the Mission aims to fulfill the command of the SAVIOUR OF THE WORLD, that all men should love their neighbors as themselves. . . . Contrasting the way in which we are treated by the missionaries with our treatment of them, how can anyone who has the least regard for right and reason not feel ashamed of this behaviour? . . . JESUS, in His in-

structions, inculcates forbearance and forgiveness, and all desire for revenge is dis-couraged. . . From this time forward, I charge you all, gentry, scholars, army, and people, those of you who are fathers to ex-hort your sons, and those who are elder sons exhort your younger brothers, to bear in mind the example of Pastor Hoste (Chairman of the Shanghai C. I. M. Council), who is able to forbear and to forgive, as taught by JESUS.

This proclamation did more for the gospel work than years of preaching. There followed days of blessing. Dr. and Mrs. Howard Taylor in their remarkable book, By Faith,\* state: "It was no little comfort that the years that followed brought such rich returns in the ingathering of precious souls. Up to 1900, the Mission had received by baptism a total of 13,000 converts. within a period of thirty-five years. But after 1900, more than 17,000 were received within the first eight years, and the increase continued."

There have been three great crises in the work of the evangelization of China: that of the Boxer uprising in 1900; the Chinese revolution in 1911, followed by the European war; and later, the Communist uprisings in 1927. Dr. and Mrs. Taylor report that after each of these setbacks there came a season of wonderful advance in the evangelization of China. What was the secret? "Prayer, much prayer, worldwide prayer was called forth by these emergencies. God was able to work as never before, in answer to the volume of prayer that was going up to Him for China.

Writing of today's outlook they ask, "Is it not also true that the present unparalleled crisis is calling forth more prayer than all the former crises put together? All. round the world and from countless hearts in China, prayer is going up day and night.'

In 1929 when the missionaries of the China Inland Mission were assembled on the coast, they asked the Lord to give them 200 new workers. The Lord answered their request, and the 200 were given, equipped, and sent to the field in two years. God gave them more than they asked for-500 in five years. And yet these were years of unprecedented depression. Most of these missionaries are today working in free China, where the people are more open to the gospel than at any time in the history of their work.

When Generalissimo Chiang-Kai-shek opened the military hospitals to the visits of missionaries, he sent a message to the group who were undertaking this work. "He asked you to remember," said Madam Chiang-Kai-shek, "that these men are suf-fering, many of them are dying, and what they need to hear about is the suffering, dying Saviour."

We may find a tendency to become discouraged about missionary effort, but this must not be. We must look to the Lord to keep the heavenly vision clear before us and to keep us filled with courage. The task of world evangelism still lies before us. God forbid that we should become like the children of Ephraim, who, though fully armed, and carrying bows, turned back in the day of battle. Psalm 78:9. Sister E. J. Dabney, of 629 North 56th Street, Philadelphia, Pa., who like Anna of old is giving her life to fasting and prayer. She writes: "There will be greater distress, unless we seek the Lord more wholeheartedly for forgiveness and mercy. At my church we are praying day and night, through the twenty-four hours. On April 10 we shall again enter a ninety days' fast. Many of us denying ourselves food and water for three days and three nights each week. We invite others to join with us. Some may not be able to fast all this time, but can go without some meals. Let all the saints open family altars in their homes. Pray while you work. Ask the Lord to bind the forces of evil, deliver His people out of bondage, and overthrow the program of the devil. Let us all repent of our shortcomings and sins, and forgive each other as God has forgiven us. The worst is yet to come unless we turn the battle through prayer. We must consecrate ourselves to prayer. God will hear the cry of the righteous."

Today's war will not last forever. Before long the nations will be exhausted. We believe that then there will come an opportunity unprecedented in the world's history for preaching the gospel to the many poor and needy and destitute of earth. Let us prayerfully prepare for these days.

Dr. Samuel M. Zwemer tells of the Abyssinian representative at the Treaty of Versailles. He was thinking of the future of the world and of how peace could only be through the sacrifices of Christ. "His Abyssinian mind conceived the idea of representing this in symbolism. He sought out a Paris artist and gave him his ideas. The result is the famous painting of the Crucifixion so weird in its conception, so real in its symbolical significance, strangely attractive and compelling in its message. The Saviour is hanging on a cross which rests between two globes of the Eastern and Western hemispheres against a cloudy and lurid sky. A halo of coming victory already rests above the thorn-crowned head of the Sufferer, who looks down upon two worlds for which He died. Blooddrops from His pierced hands color every continent and island red. It is a vision of the whole world redeemed by the blood of Christ. Underneath the painting one can read in three languages: For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." -S. H. F.

## "Striving According to His Working"

WAS a Methodist minister. God had been blessing my ministry in a signal manner. My wife, through the prayers of some saints connected with the Christian and Missionary Alliance, coupled with the prayers of some of the Pentecostal saints, had been wonderfully healed. One of our ministers said to my wife one day, "It is too bad that the Lord has healed you!" And she looked at him and wanted to know what he meant. He replied that he did not mean it was too bad that she had been healed, but that it was too bad that the Lord had done it in the way in which it had been done. "You know," he said, "we do not be-lieve in this so-called faith healing, and you will now have trouble wherever you go." He did not question that a real work had been done: he was glad she was not such a sufferer as she had been; but he wished she might have been cured in the orthodox way, namely, by means of doctors and medicine.

I had received the Baptism in the Spirit, but was remaining in the church with which I had been affiliated since beginning my ministry. I had found that some of the activities of the church were not conducive to the development of spirituality in the members, and I had become convinced that the Lord did not want me to continue to be a partaker of them. Many of the churches raised much of the money that was needed to pay the pastor's salary and meet the other obligations of the church by means of church fairs, ice-cream socials, oyster suppers, strawberry festivals, etc. I was thorough-ly convinced that God has His own financial plan, and that whenever and wherever people of God fall into line with God's plan the discovery is made that the plan works.

I had just been appointed to the pastorate of a church that had not witnessed a revival for many years, and in which nobody had been converted since the new stone structure had been erected. My mind was fully made up. The people did not know me as I had never served a church in that section of the country before. I made the matter a subject of earnest prayer; my wife and I talked it over; it was decided between us that on the first Sunday morning of my pastorate I would make a frank statement, letting the congregation know what our convictions were, and the reason why we had them, and that, while we were not going to take the position that the people were forbidden by the pastor to indulge in these questionable activities, it must be distinctly understood from the very beginning that neither my wife nor I could have any part in them, as we had conscientious scruples concerning the matter.

The first Sunday came. It was a beautiful day. The people were all out to hear the new preacher. I had carefully thought out just what I should say, and I fully purposed to say it. The pastor's study was connected with the church auditorium; a door led from the study right into the pulpit. Just

about three minutes before I was to step out of the study and begin the service there was a rap at the study door, a back door from which the study could be entered from out-of-doors. I opened the door; somebody placed an announcement in my hand, and was gone. I opened the bit of paper, and read the announcement. The ladies had planned for an affair on Friday evening in the basement of the church. Some things were needed in the parsonage, and the ladies wanted to raise the funds with which to make the necessary purchases. It was to be a basket social. The ladies were to bring the baskets. Each man was to pick out a basket, not knowing what lady had prepared it; the lady's name would be found on a slip in the basket; scales would be provided and the lady would be weighed; the gentleman would pay for her at the rate of one-half cent per pound. If she weighed a hundred pounds only he and his lady would get their supper for fifty cents, but if she should weigh 250 pounds it would cost him \$1.25.


What was I to do? I had never been in such a predicament before. "These people," I reasoned, as I walked back and forth across the study floor, "do not know me; they never saw me before; if I proceed with the program I have decided upon this morning these people will be placed permanently beyond my reach; my ministry here will be an end before it begins; I might just as well pack up and go tomorrow. What shall I do?"

I picked up the "Methodist Hymnal." It had been lying on my study table. How I came to pick it up at that particular time and open it at random I have never known; but that is what I did. And the first lines my eyes lighted upon were these:

### "Shall I for fear of mortal man

The Spirit's course in me restrain?"

I read no further. I closed the book. I said, "No, Lord, I will not!" The matter



was settled. I would do my duty. I would follow the course that had been decided upon and leave the results with God.

It was time, and a little past time, for the service to begin. I went into the pulpit, and announced the opening hymn. The people sang lustily. The choir was out in full force. All was going well. It was time to make the announcements. Before making them I told the people I had a statement concerning some of my policies I felt the Lord would have me make. I proceeded to tell them that the Lord had been doing great things for my wife and for me, and that we were desiring God's best for ourselves and for the people among whom we had been appointed to minister. I told them that God has a plan and that when people follow the plan of God the result is always blessing. I had been informed that they had been having some difficulties in raising the necessary finances to carry on the work of the church, and I expressed the conviction that if the financial plan of God were followed the neccessary funds would come in, other things being equal, and suggested that it was at least worth trying. I then told them that I was not forbidding their continuing to raise funds in the way in which they had raised them in the past, but that I was sure it was not God's plan, and that if they continued to raise money in that way they must excuse their pastor and his wife from attending any of these affairs; we would remain home and pray for them. Then I read the notice that had been placed in my hand. The people looked at one another. There were a few smiles. A man in the chair who was not a member of the church could hardly contain himself. But the most of the people looked very serious. I could readily see that no person appeared to be offended.

Then I preached. I well remember my text: "Until the Spirit be poured upon us from on high, and the wilderness become a fruitful field, and the fruitful field be esteemed as a forest." The Lord helped me. After the service I went down to the door of the church to shake hands with the people. They greeted me cordially. The President of the Ladies' Aid Society said to me, "We are so sorry we arranged to have that affair. We had no idea you would object to it; we have never had a pastor who had any objection to such things; we did not know any of our pastors object; we hope you are right and that the money can be raised without such things; if we had not announced this affair through the paper last week we would recall it now, but we hardly see how we can recall it, for some of the people who will come are not here and we do not know how we can reach them." Not a single person had taken offense!

Well, the affair came off on schedule time Friday evening, but hardly any of the people who had heard what I said attended. The crowd was astonishingly small. My wife and I were in the parsonage just a stone's throw from the church. We pulled down the blinds and gave ourselves to prayer.

I was pastor of that church for four There was not another gathering years. of the kind during all those years. Not a single penny was made for the church through activities of that character. God blessed the people spiritually. We had a revival that latsed three months. Many of the members of the church who had never been saved got an experimental knowledge of God. Before my pastorate began, there was no prayer meeting; the people would not attend; several pastors had tried to have a prayer meeting, but each had given up in despair. It was not long until we had two prayer meetings every week, and they were both well attended. My predecessor's back salary was paid in full; the janitor whose salary was away in arrears was paid in full; the people gave more money to missions than they had ever given before in the history of the church: every bill was paid on schedule time: and the last year of my pastorate, in addition to taking care of all the regular finances of the church, the people pledged more than seven thousand dollars for the great program that the Methodist Church was putting on at that time for educational and benevolent enterprises in America and beyond the seas.

God still lives. God has a plan, and God's plan always works. I have heard it said that workers should be willing to fail for God. I have asked myself, "Does God want any of us to fail?" I have a conviction that when we fail it is because we have failed to find out just what the plan of God is, and then order our conduct accordingly.

Maybe one of the reasons why in many places there is a dearth of spiritual power is because there is a failure to follow divine directions. These directions should be followed in detail. Failure in one detail is likely to result in a lack of spiritual energy, and failure in many details is likely to result in catastrophe.

We are a Pentecostal people. In the days of the early church the power of the Spirit was in evidence in all the activities of the saints. That there was labor on the part of the laborers, and that there was much striving among the saints, is doubtless true, but mark the words of Paul—"Whereunto I also labor, striving according to His working, which worketh in me mightily." Col. 1:29.

If we will strive according to His working—and that is what I plead for—He will work in us "mightily."

### In the Nick of Time . . .

I am never tired of pointing out that the Greek phrase translated, "in time of need," is a colloquialism, of which the "nick of time" is the exact equivalent. "That we may have grace to help in the 'nick of time.'" Grace just when and where I need it. You are attacked by temptation, and at the moment of assault you look to Him, and the grace is there to help in "the nick of time."

No postponement of your petition until the evening hour of prayer; but there, man, there in the city street with the flaming temptation in front of you, turn to Christ with a crv for help, and the grace will be chere in "the nick of time."—G. Campbell Morgan.

## The Irish Sheriff's Confession

### A True Story by George Williams

More than sixty years ago, mainly through the preaching of Thomas Weldon Trench, a remarkable religious movement begau among the gentry of the south and west of Ireland, and many were brought from darkness into the light of a personal experience of the saving power of Him who came into the world to save sinners.

Among these was Edward Singleton, the High Sheriff of Limerick. He was the head of a leading County family, and remarkable for his tall and aristocratic figure. He was one of the stateliest men I ever met. But he was resolved that he would keep the matter of his conversion entirely to himself, and let no one know that he had found in Christ a conscious salvation and the life that is eternal. He shrank from the shame which a public confession of Christ entails, forgetting that the Master says that no one can be His disciple who refuses to bear the cross of social ignominy and death to self and to the world. John 17:14.

However, on learning that Trench was to preach on a certain evening in the theater at Limerick, he invited him to spend the night at his house, but said he would not accompany him to the meeting. Trench, knowing that he was a "Nicodemus" disciple (John 3:2), accepted the invitation, and, dinner being ended and the carriage announced, Trench said to him: "I know you don't wish to come to the meeting, but you might come with me as far as the 'green room' at the back of the stage." Singleton unwillingly consented, and an hour later they reached the theater and sat down in the little room.

After a few moments Trench said: "Open the door a little and peep out, and see if any people are coming." Singleton did so, and exclaimed: "Why, the house is full!" "That's splendid!" said Trench. A further few moments passed, and Trench said: "Peep out again and see if any more people

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have come." Singleton did so, and said: "The place is packed as full as it can hold." "Let me see," said Trench, and quickly

"Let me see," said Trench, and quickly stepping behind him, and taking the handle of the door in his left hand, and resting his right on the back of the sheriff's neck, he peeped out and said: "That's a wonderful sight! Why, the whole of Limerick society is there! I say, Singleton, I suppose you know most of these people?" "Yes." "Are they all saved?" "No." "Then out, man, and tell them how to be!" cried Trench, and at the same moment with his left hand pulling open the door, with his right he shot Singleton across the stage and right before the footlights!

The aristocratic audience was amazed. What an extraordinary thing for the High Sheriff to do! It was a terrible moment for Edward Singleton. The alternative was: "He that denieth Me before men, him will I deny before the angels who are in heaven," and "he that confesseth Me, him will I also confess before My Father who is in heaven." He was given the victory. He boldly confessed Christ. He told that great company that he had learned that he was a sinner, lost and guilty, and that he had fled for refuge to Jesus, who delivers from the wrath to come (1 Thess. 1:10, R. V.), and that he was consequently saved.

From that hour, with unfaltering step, he, through a long life, walked with the Lord in the light of His Word; and now he is with that one whom he so bravely confessed as his God and Saviour that night at the theater in the ancient city of Limerick.

At the Parliament of Religions held in Chicago in 1893, among the speakers Dr. Hale appeared for Unitarianism, Swami Viva Kananda for Hinduism, and Dr. Joseph Cook for the Christian Faith. Then, walking to the edge of the platform Dr. Cook threw up his arms and cried: "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth from all sin"!

## A Harvest—Lost for Lack of Reapers?

### Melvin L. Hodges

We invite you to look with us on the fields of Nicaragua, for they are white unto harvest. Let us consider first the

### Untouched Fields.

There are numerous small towns, ranging in population from a few hundred to one or two thousand, which we have been unable to touch. Many of these, as far as we have learned, have not heard one gospel sermon, nor is there one native Christian living there as a witness for the Lord. Spiritual darkness reigns supreme.

Another group of towns and villages we might term the

### Unoccupied Fields.

These are places where we have preached, or where some of our workers have ministered for a time but were forced to leave because of an even more pressing need in some other section.

We preached in one such place for four days. The interest was splendid. I planned to go back within a few months; but five years have passed, and although the town is only thirty-five miles from our home, we have been unable to return or to send any worker. One believer lives there and testifies to the people. A few weeks ago a couple from that town accepted the Lord in Matagalpa—the fruit of that Christian's testimony.

We become impatient with our inability to cover more of the field, but the distance between towns is great, the difficulties in travel are many, and physical endurance has its limits. In the meantime the precious harvest is being LOST FOR THE LACK OF REAPERS.

We have not sufficient missionaries adequately to occupy Nicaragua. The established churches need instruction, workers need training, and church problems must be handled. The work is widely scattered and a great part of the territory is reached only on horseback. Thus we often find our time so completely occupied that there is little opportunity for visiting new towns.

Greater, however, than the need for missionary reinforcements is that for

### Native Workers.

The real hope of evangelization rests with the natives themselves. It would be impossible to expect a missionary personnel sufficient to occupy every town—nor do we believe this to be God's plan. We know that the natives are better able to reach their own people than is the missionary. This thought is expressed in one of their own proverbs, "The wedge that splits a log should be taken from the same tree." We are trusting God to give us enough "wedges" in the form of native ministers to make an opening for the gospel in every unevangelized town of Nicaragua. But if this is to be accomplished, the workers must be called of God and prepared for the ministry. This is where

### You Can Have a Part

with us in the work. You can PRAY that the Lord of the harvest will send forth laborers into His harvest. Every day, and several times a day, you can pray, "Lord, the fields are white. Call men to Thy work, prepare them, and thrust them forth into the unevangelized sections of Nicaragua." We know that God answers prayer. A factor of great importance in the preparation of these workers is our

### Bible Institute.

Here for three months of each year we gather in those brethren who feel a special call to the ministry and give them intensive Bible studies. A large number of the preachers now on the field have been prepared in this manner and we have seen very gratifying results from this effort. Students are expected to assume part of the financial burden, but it is difficult for them to meet all the expenses connected with the school for the three-month period.

The institute will be held in Leon instead of Matagalpa this year, since Leon is more accessible from all parts of Nicaragua. The change will involve added expense, and the sharp increase in living cost will necessitate larger expenditures for the maintenance of the school. We appreciate, therefore, any extra assistance that friends are able to give. Offerings for this purpose should be sent to Noel Perkin, 336 West Pacific Street, Springfield, Missouri, designated for Bible School work in Nicaragua.

Brethren, the time is short. We trust that at the coming of the Lord He will not find us with an

So far Assiout has been very quiet, but we have a number of refugees from Alexandria with us, most of them our old girls who were married and living in Alexandria, who of course came home as soon as the bombing started there. As Assiout is quite a distance from the sea, we are hoping that things will remain quiet here. Pray that God may take care of us, especially our poor little babies, that they may not have to suffer innocently as the little ones in Europe are now suffering.

### An Evangelistic Trip in South India

Recently I had the privilege of assisting Constance Eady with special meetings in Tamil country, South India.

At Bangalore, during four days of services, we had the joy of seeing people at the altar every night for salvation, restoration or healing. A number of children also were dedicated to the Lord. Although Miss Eady opened this work comparatively recently, the Lord has blessed her efforts and she already has a thriving little congregation. The prospects look very encouraging.

Following these services, we took a trip of fifty-seven miles to Krishnagiri, the headquarters of the Tamil village work which is under Miss Eady's care. Her head worker, Brother Lamech, preaches in Krishnagiri besides supervising the other churches in the district. We had a small conference of workers there, when several practical questions were discussed and satisfactorily dealt with, after which we had the joy of opening the little clay tills from the various churches and counting the money which had been saved up through the offerings of the preceding year. It was unanimously decided that the money should be used to pay off the indebtedness on a new little church building in the district which was about to be dedicated. Later, I learned that when the funds for construction of this church ran short, the workers themselves got together and finished the building-an example of real teamwork.

### "The Poor Have the Gospel Preached . . . "

That evening we visited the first church raised up in that district which is among some of the lowest caste people. The place was packed and the crowd rather noisy, but we were happy to be able to speak to these precious souls for whom Christ died. Were it not for the effort being put forth by Miss Eady and her workers, these poor people might never have had a chance to hear the gospel.

The same night we went a few miles farther, wading through water, to a place called Devasamudram. Here we were met by a procession of children from the church together with their pastor. The children were gaily skipping along, singing and each keeping time with two sticks which he beat against the two sticks of his partner. At the service in this village we were able to get better attention from the people and felt that the Word was really reaching them. The surroundings and the people may be of a very simple, humble order, but the souls of men are the same everywhere.

### A Day Well Spent

Sunday morning there was a precious gathering in Krishnagiri, followed with the com-

munion service. Then we journeyed some distance to hold a service in the Dorothy Ganz Memorial church. The attendance here is always good since the church is located right beside the main road.

I might mention that on the end of each of these little churches a room has been built as living quarters for the worker and family.

From this service we went to Kannakamutal

to open and dedicate a new church. Our group marched around the village with a lamp held high, singing to the accompaniment of my cornet. You may be sure that most of the people in the village came to witness the opening of this new, though simple, place of worship. Even the headman of the village was present, seated close to the speaker. After hearing what we had to say, he remarked, "This is the thing we need in this village." That night we went to bed, feeling our day had been well spent.

### "The Entrance of Thy Word Giveth Light"

Monday morning we set out to vist two churches in order to witness a simple day school in progress. At the first place, however, instead of the regular school we found a group of people waiting for a service. In most, if not all of these churches, both a day and a night school are conducted, the purpose being to give these poor, illiterate people enough teaching so that they can read the Bible-a very necessary step for their spiritual growth. It is touching to see grown men as well as children reading industriously from the primer and writing Tamil words from dictation on their slates. When we consider that this work has been in progress only a very short time, we feel that the Lord has marvelously helped our workers who are doing such a service for these low-caste people. Reading will open a whole new life to them, and the gospel message will fill their hearts and guide them in that new life. May God bless the missionary and workers who have been laboring faithfully in this dark but fruitful portion of the Lord's harvest field.

### Progress Despite Opposition

During this trip it was my privilege to preach in Palghat and Olavakkott, the two places opened by Brother and Sister Davis and later cared for by Ellen Esler and Lydia Graner. Having known something of the tremendous opposition this new work has faced, I was agreeably surprised to find a goodly crowd of attentive people in both places. I am sure that if the Lord tarries there will be a harvest in that area.

My labors in South India concluded with three days in Mavelikara, assisting Brother Burgess in special services. I was greatly delayed in reaching this point since the area through which our train passed was struck by a cyclone and our engine was derailed because of damage to the railway line. This necessitated going back some distance and taking an extra journey of three hundred miles to reach our destination. However, the Lord was with us, and we felt His blessing in the services those three short days. It was a joy to meet many of the workers whom we have known for a number of years. In spite of increased prices and difficulties of war conditions, they seem to be pressing on loyally for God.

Build up your faith, courage, and strength."

### PRODUCTS FROM THE DEAD SEA

Jewish scientists, chased from Germany, are producing from the Dead Sea in Palestine magnesium salts, bromide, and potash in large quantities for war purposes. According to World Dominion, they have perfected a new process for the extraction of pure aluminum, and from surplus citrus fruits are making medicinal oils, industrial alcohol, materials for high explosives, and a nutritious bread. Thus is the Promised Land moving on toward its strategic part in the drama of end-time events, as prophesied in God's Word.

### WATCHMEN

Ministers "of all denominations" in the northern neck of Virginia are said to be acting on observation posts of the Aircraft Warning Service. Important though such duties are, God calls His servants to duties of much greater importance. To each one He says, "Son of man, I have made thee a watchman . . . therefore hear the word at my mouth, and give them warning from me." Ezek. 3:17. Are we faithful watchmen, or will the blood of the wicked be required at our hands because we are failing to warn the wicked from his wicked way?

### MISSIONARIES-TO-BE

The schools of Germany have been "streamto prepare a young generation for its lined" "high calling" to colonize and control the entire earth, reports a Stockholm news agency. Boys and girls, from the age of six upward, are being taught to speak the English and Spanish lan-They are being familiarized with hisguages. torical, geographical, economic, and social conditions in North and South America. The goal of the Nazi educational system is to prepare an army of propagandists who will carry the Nazi "culture" to the ends of the earth, establishing its universal sway over the life and future of mankind.

Is the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ pursuing its task with similar thoroughness? Our task is to train boys and girls, young men and women, in our Sunday Schools, churches, and Bible Schools so that they can carry the gospel of Christ to the ends of the earth. We should not lessen our efforts on account of the war, but rather intensify them. "Occupy till I come," the Master said. Missionaries of the Cross will be this world's greatest need after this war is won.

#### FAMINE

Roland Elliott of the National Student Y. M. C. A. returned recently from a two months' trip in Europe. He says: "After ten days in France, having money that was absolutely useless to buy meat or eggs or milk because the shops had none, I began to know what was meant by the saying, 'Food is the capital question.' To be hungry and cold, without the possibility of a satisfying meal or a fire, was a new experience for me. . . A ten-cent American hamburger has as much bread as the French get in a day, more meat than they get in a week, and more butter than many get in a year. As the war continues the toll in health will mount and its effects will be felt for three generations or more."

In France and in many other famine-ridden countries there are many born-again Christians suffering with the rest. Undoubtedly their cry is, "Come quickly, Lord Jesus, and relieve this awful suffering." The cry may not go unanswered for very long.

### THE GOSPEL IN CHINA

In spite of war, or perhaps as a result of war, gospel work is advancing in China as never before. Revelation tells of reports to this effect, received from China before the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. The China Inland Mission, for example, had more baptisms of new converts (more than 10,000 last year) that at any time in the history of the mission. Large Bible classes are conducted among the Chinese armies by Christians who are in the army. Some of the leading generals are Christians and have classes for officers in their headquarters. In the occupied portions of China, of course, there are many obstacles to the preaching of the Word. Even before the new phase of the war the missionary hospitals were closed. Worst difficulty of all is the tremendous effort of the Japanese to enslave the Chinese through opium. In Nanking there are thirty opium shops established, and it is estimated that one fourth of the half million population have become addicts. Besides weakening the Chinese powers of resistance, the Japanese government makes a profit of three million dollars a month by this traffic.

### PESTILENCE

Dr. R. Pollitzer, former League of Nations epidemologist, has been investigating recent masses of bubonic plague in Changteh, old Hunan Province town in China. In making a report according to New York Times, he drew this picture: On Nov. 4, 1941, a Japanese plane skimming over Changteh's gateways, dropped no bombs. Puzzled police picked up scattered rice grains mixed with cotton rags in the area under the plane's flight. Samples were found to contain plague bacilli. Less than a week later six cases of infection were reported; all died within thirty-six hours. It was assumed that rats had eaten the infected rice, and that fleas had transmitted the disease from the rodents to humans.

Bacterial warfare, which is expected by many to be more widely used before the present conflict is terminated, may well fulfill the words of Christ which were spoken nineteen hundred years ago. He said, speaking of the time immediately preceding His second coming, "There shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows." Matt. 24:7, 8.

### "THEY'VE GOT GOD"

The Watchman-Examiner published an interview with Miss Homer, a representative of the Church Committee for China Relief, in which she told of a curious incident which happened in Chungking in May, 1939. In an air raid on Chungking, the cliffs, going down into rivers on three sides of the city, became a veritable death trap to thousands. Five thousand were burned alive and many more thousand were wounded. "Finally, towards dawn, when the fires had burned down a bit, what used to be streets were jammed with screaming hysterical people. . . . Suddenly there came a yell from the crowd: 'Look! Look over there! That's the Generalissimo and Madame Everybody looked, and sure enough, Chiang !' there they were, those two, just wandering down the street hand in hand, clothes torn, faces dirty, stopping now and then to adjust a bandage or comfort someone, so stricken and near to tears they could hardly speak. Then the crowd began to mutter and then to roar: 'They haven't a bodyguard! Where are their soldiers?' For just a moment there was a panic, and then suddenly a little collie on the edge of the crowd yelled out, 'Oh, that's all right; they've got God !' And they say that a curious quiet settled down over that crowd. And they stood therescreaming stopped-perfectly silent, just watching while those two wandered off into the snow and disappeared."

### NEWS FROM CHINA

According to *Elim Evangel*, news has been received in Britain through the Red Cross, via Peking and New York, that missionaries and associate missionaries in North China are "well treated in their homes." Apparently they are no longer able to carry on their missionary activities but are detained in their homes by the Japanese.

Further news affecting missionaries in the Far East indicates that British and American subjects in Tientsin are not confined to their homes but that their movements are restricted, and that those in Thailand are detained at Bangkok.

As we remember our missionaries in prayer, let us not forget the work which is dear to their hearts and from which they are now separated.

### SCORCHED EARTH

The war policy of Russia, the Dutch in the East Indies, and other nations is to destroy everything that must be abandoned and that might be of use to the enemy. Great dams and oil refineries, costing hundreds of millions of dollars, have been deliberately destroyed. Great industrial centers have been leveled, not only by advancing armies, but by retreating armies as well. Due to the "scorched earth" policy, this war is proving to be by far the most destructive in history.

Terrible as this is, the most dreadful scorching of the earth is yet to come. When the seventh seal is opened, during the tribulation judgments, there will fall to earth hail and fire mingled with blood. The third part of all trees shall be burnt up, and all green grass. Rev. 8:7. Worse still, we read that as God continues to pour out His wrath upon the wickedness of the earth, men themselves will be scorched with fire. The sun will be given great heat with which to scorch men, and they will blaspheme God in their torments, yet they will not repent of their wickedness. Rev. 16:8, 9. Finally, God's "scorched earth" policy will envelop the whole earth, and the skies as well. We read that in "the day of the Lord"—the day of the Lord's judgment—"the earth also and the works that are therein shall be 2 Peter 3:10. We should thank burned up." God that this is still the age of grace-that it is still possible to "flee from the wrath to come" and find refuge in Christ from these terrible judgments.

### PLANNING FOR UTOPIA

According to *Time*, 375 appointed representatives of more than thirty denominations met in March under the auspices of the Federal Council of Churches for a very important conference. They talked about the kind of world they want to build after the war ends. They discussed isolationism, immigration, tariffs, banking, and similar problems which are the direct concern of our Government. They talked much of the social gospel but little of the soul-saving gospel. Finally they decided upon the following ultimate goal:

"A duly constituted world government of delegated powers: an international legislative body, an international court with adequate jurisdiction, international administrative bodies with necessary powers, and adequate international police forces and provision for enforcing its world-wide economic authority."

When one turns to the Book of Acts and reads how the first disciples spent those days in the upper room, one feels that most of Protestantism's leaders have drifted far from the pattern. Those first Christians spent the days waiting on God in prayer and praise. They did not plan on a reconstructed Roman Empire, and yet the Roman Empire was revolutionized as a result of their praying and their preaching of the simple, soulsaving gospel of Christ. Surely such meetings will accomplish far more than conferences of the kind mentioned above. The need of the world is not a social program but a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The evils of the world cannot be removed until sin is taken out of human hearts. The concept of this conference is a Utopian dream indulged in by men who have no spiritual concertion of the plans of God.

# 🕮 SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### The Lord for the Body Lesson for April 26. Lesson Text: Matthew 8:1-17.

"The Lord for the body"-a wonderful phrase, a true phrase, and a *Scriptural* phrase (1 Cor. 6:13)! A short time ago, when attending a chapel service at the Eastern Bible Institute, the writer was deeply impressed by a message in tongues with interpretation which began as follows-"God is enough !" And is it not true that He who created these bodies of ours is absolutely able in Himself to heal them when they are in need of repair? The four miracles of our lesson text reveal that the answer is an unqualified yes! I. THE HEALING OF THE LEPER. 8:1-4.

1. The leper was convinced of Christ's ability to heal but questioned His willingness. Why is it

that we too, are so inclined to make this same mistake? How must it make Christ feel? Surely all of us would rather have one of our friends say, know you would help me if you could," than, "I know you can help me but I am inclined to doubt your willingness." Faith in Christ's ability to heal means very little-even the devil believes that! It is faith in Christ's willingness to heal that defeats Satan's power and brings healing!

2. Jesus set the leper straight on the point of His willingness. "I will" was the prompt answer of the Master. And He would have us also be con-vinced of His willingness to heal. In regard to this matter, consider the fol-lowing questions—(1) Can one have real faith when one is uncertain that the thing prayed for is God's will? (2) Since, as Isa. 53:4 and Matt. 8:17 clearly teach, healing is in the atonement, and, since the atonement is for all, then is not healing for all? (3) If healing is not for all, would not the Lord then, be guilty of partiality which He Himself taught us was sin?

3. The leper was told to show himself to the priest in order to receive a clean bill of health as a testimony. In like manner, when we have been healed the Lord expects us to testify to the fact-and often to those before whom it may naturally be hard to witness.

II. THE HEALING OF THE CEN-TURION'S SERVANT. 8:5-13.

Several valuable lessons may be learned from


the centurion. Observe: 1. His humility. "Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldst come under my roof." For a Gentile Roman officer to manifest such humility was unusual. This man was used to receiving honor himself; yet in Christ he recognized One who was deserving of far greater honor than any other man. If we would receive healing we too must manifest true humility. "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble." James 4:6.

His faith. (1) The centurion recognized that Christ had absolute control over the forces of the universe. In verse 9 the centurion said, in effect, "Just as I have authority over the soldiers under me and receive from them instantaneous obedience, so you have authority over the unseen spiritual forces of the universe and may command them to do your bidding." Jesus said, "All power is given to Me in heaven and in earth." Do we fully realize and profit by His authority? (2) The centurion's faith was respoken word of Jesus. "Speak the word only and my servant shall be healed." We are prone to rest more on feeling than on the Word itself. Feeling may accompany Divine Healing, but then again it may not. It is not ours to try to pump

up faith, to seek to feel the answer, to work ourselves up to a certain pitch by praying long-drawnout prayers; it is ours to believe with all our hearts in the naked Word itself.

3. His commendation. This man, who undoubtedly had received little knowledge of Christ's teaching and mission, exercised more faith than did the Jews who were taught in all the Word. In verses 11 and 12, Jesus goes on to say that while many Gentiles would manifest sufficient faith to enable them to enter the kingdom and enjoy its blessings, many Jews (the children of the kingdom) because of refusal to accept the light would miss heaven and its blessings. What a lesson for us who enjoy the light of the full gospel!

III. THE HEALING OF PETER'S MOTHER-IN-LAW. 8:14-15.



1. She was the victim of Satanic oppression. Here was a case of ordinary sickness, yet Christ recognized that it was caused by evil forces; for He "rebuked the fever," (see Luke 4:39); and Jesus would not have rebuked what was merely the working of a natural law. Let us remember that back of most sickness there is demon power and deal with that power as such.

2. She took hold of the healing power of Christ. Jesus extended the hand of power. She took hold of the hand and arose. In His dealings with us God requires co-operation. He speaks; it is ours to act.

3. She used her new strength in serving Christ and others. So it ought always to be. We are not healed in order to serve our own lusts, but We are in order that we may more efficiently glorify God in our bodies.

### IV. THE HEALING OF THE MULTITUDES. 8:16-17.

1. The people waited until the Sabbath had ended before seeking healing. Why did they do this? Compare Mark 1:21, 29, 32. Because they considered the physical body and its care as a purely secular matter. Is not this the mis-take made by many today? To them physical healing is a matter of doctors, study of the

human body, and its remedies, but in no sense a sacred and divine matter. Yet the Word clearly teaches that the human body is sacred, and that physical and spiritual health are inseparable. See 1 Cor. 6:15-20; Col. 3:17, 23; 3 John 2.

2. Here we see the universality of healing. Jesus "healed all that were sick." See Matt. 4:23-25; 9:35 to 10:11; 12:15; 14:14, 34-36; Luke 6:17-19.

3. Finally we see the greatest truth of allthe reason why Jesus healed all that were sick. "That it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Isaiah, saying, Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses." Here we see clearly that healing is provided in the atonement, and that it is through the atonement that we may have healing. Here too, we see that Jesus healed the sick in order to fulfill Isaiah's presentation of His character. It was the very nature of Jesus to heal! He came to "destroy the works of the devil." 1 John 3:8. He was "moved with compassion" when He beheld any sickness of mind or body. He healed "all that were sick." And, thank God, He has not changed! "Jesus Christ, the same

yesterday, and today, and forever." Heb 13:8. He will still heal all who come to Him!—J. Bashford Bishop.

On the train to Atlanta, Georgia, I was talking with the colored porter, who was a Christian and who loved to read his Bible. Away on the mountains wild and bare, Away from the tender Shepherd's care.

It was not the words of the hymn that impressed me first, but the singer's voice. It was sweet, rich, and appealing, and I began to appraise her value as a professional singer on the stage. Then I paid heed to the words she sang, and my heart was strangely melted.

I do not think I ever attended a church service again from that day till the day of my conversion. I began to drink heavily to forget the prickings of conscience and the striving of God's Holy Spirit. Then, one night, in a city concert hall, as I passed to my dressing room I saw some fellow artists, all well known to me save one, a young lady. Yet her face was familiar. I tried to recall her name, but I was baffled. Before my turn to go on the stage arrived, I suddenly remembered where I had seen the face. She was the girl I heard singing in the little Methodist Church choir. She had entered the profession as a ballad vocalist. My heart smote me and I felt sad. Why did she not stay in the church choir? She made a shipwreck of her life, and died brokenhearted, early in life, and later on, when God saved me, I joined the little Methodist church where I heard her sing first, and filled the place in the choir that poor little singer vacated.

It was in the month of August, 1896, in the city of Glasgow, after listening to an earnest gospel address by James Lyall, that I gave my heart and life to Jesus. At once I bore witness to all my old companions. For more than thirty years I have preached the gospel in many parts of the world, to hundreds of thousands of people, and thousands have been blessed and saved. I have told this old, old story of Jesus and His love to the sailors on the battle ships and mine sweepers, to the soldiers in the barracks, the camp, and on the battlefield; to the merchantmen and the working men; to the wealthy aristocrats and the poorest of democrats; to the pure and the prostitute, the innocent and the guilty, the living and the dying; and always I have found it to be the panacea for all human sins, sorrows, and sufferings.

### WHERE ARE THE PARENTS? That is the question so many jurists are asking as each year brings an

increasing army of juvenile delinquents into court. But now some of the more thoughtful are indicting parents who absent themselves from the Sunday School for the failure of the children to attend church. Hon. Timothy J. Campbell, a lawyer in Newton, Iowa, has some convictions about adults going to Sunday School, and he is right. Here are some extracts of his address at a Sunday School convention.

"Statistics prove conclusively that a thriving, growing Sunday School makes a great church. A large church with a small Sunday School is in a dying condition. A small church with a large Sunday School has the very best prospects for growth.

"What is perhaps the greatest cause of the large exodus of adolescent pupils in the early teens? It is plainly the failure of the adult members of the congregation to regularly attend Sunday School. Children are being trained to go to Sunday School and then return home without staying for Church. They have been trained by the example of their parents that it is not appropriate for adults to attend Sunday School. "I feel so strongly about this that I have even thought of proposing

a rule that any member of the church who can but does not attend Sunday School should not be regarded as a member of the church in full standing. He should be made merely an associate member and should not have the right to vote in congregational meetings."

Perhaps all would not be in favor of such drastic discipline; but all must agree that Mr. Campbell has put his finger on one very good reason not only why adolescents drop out of the Sunday School in such alarming numbers, but why they fail to attend the church services. When the parents once get into the Sunday School we can expect the children to get into the church.

just as we are into the other world. But, thank God, there is a death that will deliver us from the penalty of violated commandments. Listen to Paul the apostle: "Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ." Rom. 7:4. In other words: by believing that Christ died for our sins, and by accepting Him as our Deliverer and Guide, we can die to the old life, so that our sins will not meet us at the Judgment. Then we can live a new life under Christ's law; under that law we shall love to do what we ought to do because the heart is changed. And as for those ugly sins of the pastwell, the law has no power over a dead man.

Someone will ask: "How do you go about this business of 'dying'?" Once you realize the degradation of your sins, the power they have over you, and the dreadful penalty if you die in your sins; and with sincere repentance (turning from sin to God) you take the Lord Jesus Christ as your Saviour and Master, trusting in His atoning work; then the following work of grace takes place: you are cleansed from your sins, freed from their power, clothed in the character of Christ, given hope, assurance, peace and a new purpose in life; you are given strength We do! The man is dead, and though he has committed crime he is beyond the reach of the law. You can't get him!

In the sight of man's law only a limited number are under arrest; but in the sight of God, "all have sinned." Every one of us is charged with the violation of the Divine law in thought, word and deed. That conscience of ours may be ignored, beaten down, tampered with, but it cannot be permanently downed. The wrong we do is recorded in conscience and becomes guilt. In fact, as Dr. Carrell, world renowned scientist and surgeon, tells us, the record of man's character is not only in his memory, but in his blood stream, nervous system, and physical tissues. Judgment Day will simply be the exposure of what we really are. In a certain sense, every day is Judgment Day.

Now if we could die, we could go beyond the law. But physical death will not bring deliverance, because it simply ushers us

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
