E ARE glad that we live in America, and we trust that for a long time to come, by the grace of God, there shall be spiritual freedom in our land. We ought to be very grateful for the freedom we have. and for the privileges that were afforded us through the efforts of our forefathers.

We are gathered here in the presence of the Lord to express our loyalty to our God and to our country. First of all we belong to the Lord. We are citizens of heaven. Have you gotten your citizenship papers? You should have them.

Now the adoption of a flag or some type of banner to which a group of people will rally is a custom probably almost as old as humanity. Each flag of course has had its traditional background. I was talking to a Japanese one day, and he told me their flag had been made by the angels, that actually it had been designed by supernatural powers and set down in Japan. Then a few months later, I was talking to a Danish girl, and she said, "Did you know that the flag of Denmark fluttered right down out of heaven into Denmark?"

In Philadelphia is a little house on Arch Street called the Betsy Ross House, and thousands of tourists pass through its doors every year. You go down to the basement and you see in a frame on the wall some bits of cloth purported to be scraps that belonged to Betsy Ross, the Quaker rebel who is supposed to have formed the first flag, at the definite command of the Honorable George Washington, the great leader of that day. Then you come up to the little sitting room where she is supposed to have sat in a rocker and with painstaking care stitched over and over that design. And then they have flags with a circle of 13 stars in them, fashioned after that original flag, representing the 13 original colonies of the United States.

I have had missionaries tell me that when they came from foreign countries and saw the banner of the United States waving on a ship or somewhere else, their hearts were just thrilled. They simply did not know how to contain themselves. They said, "Brother Steelberg, you know when you are in your own land you do not seem to appreciate it, but I cried when I looked at the banner of the U.S.A. floating over a

consular office in the Orient. You have no idea what a thrill it gives you to see Old Glory float-

ing over there.'

God gave ensigns to His people. Perhaps the first ensign Israel had was the supernatural ensign of the pillar of fire by night and the cloud by day. I do not doubt but what the nations round about them saw their ensign and said, "That's a remarkable thing. What is that queer light over there in the sky? that strong fluorescent aura of light? Those Israelites that came out of Egypt claim that it is the supernatural power of God that hovers over them.'

I love to think that God's Spirit, His presence and His glory, can hover over us today

just as it hovered over Israel in the days gone by. We are entitled to expect the presence ond glory of God in our services, in our times of worship, in our fellowship circles, just as Israel had it in the days of

Later on, in Numbers 2:2, we find that the Israelites were commanded, "Every man of the children of Israel shall pitch by his own standard, with the ensign of their father's house." Every man was to adhere to his own standard, and round about the tabernacle were their standards. Here were the various families, and they were to seek out their own standard. Everyone was to remain loyal to that. It was God's explicit command that they were to abide by their own standard.

Now as Americans we are proud of our flag. We salute it, and we pledge allegiance to it. We raise it as an ensign of liberty, and we rejoice in what it represents. We speak of its colors and say that the red represents the blood that was shed in the great struggle for freedom, the white represents the purity for which we stand, and the blue stands for loyalty; and in it we embody the thirteen stripes for the thirteen original colonies that were founded. And each time a State has been brought into the Union of this great united group of States.

a star has been put into the field of blue. And we go on to tell you all kinds of things

As the nations of the earth are becoming more and more dominated by totalitarianism and by dictatorships, we hold more precious and valuable our liberty and freedom. Not long ago, in one of our eastern colleges. there was a "Dictator Day." They wanted the students in that college to know what it would be like to be under a dictatorship. And so they set up an elaborate Gestapo, or secret police, and they made observations of students and reported them, the students were haled before magistrates and penalties were imposed. It was all in fun, of course, but it gave those students a definite idea of what they might have been subjected to if they had been in another land.

But we must not forget that we have a responsibility to be more than Americans. We are called to be Christian Americans. I want you to notice the first letters of these two words, Christian Americans-C. A.'s, Christ's Ambassadors. God has called you to loyalty to Him. As natural Israel had for its first ensign a supernatural standard, the cloud and the pillar of fire, so we today have a supernatural ensign, and it is the Stars and Stripes of Calvary.

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Those Strange People—the Jews!

ND thou shalt become an astonishment, a proverb, and a byword, among all nations whither the Lord shall lead thee. Deut. 28:37

Fear not; for thou shalt not be ashamed: neither be thou confounded; for thou shalt not be put to shame: for thou shalt forget the shame of thy youth, and shalt not remember the reproach of thy widowhood any more. Isa. 54:4.

It is a well-known fact that the Jewish people constitute a problem in many countries today. Why? Even the Jews themselves are not agreed on the answer. One finds them even debating the subject, "What is a Jew?"

Jews Are Different

We believe that the title of an article by the Jewish writer, Waldo Frank, gives the correct answer, "Jews Are Different." The man in the street feels that there is something that sets him apart from others. Let there be no misunderstanding, however. The Jew is usually a loyal patriot, a good citizen. He is not better than other people, not worse-just different.

Why is the Jew different? Anti-Jewish propagandists recognize this difference but give erroneous reasons for it, and this makes

their propaganda vicious.

When the great plague swept over Europe during the Middle Ages, it was observed that the Jews enjoyed a comparative im-This was due to the fact that faithful observance of the Mosaic health laws had created a strong physical resistance to disease. But some people in ignorance of the fact raised the cry, "The Jews have poisoned the wells!"—and another story of bloodshed and plunder was added to the history of the wandering Jew.

No one believes this story today, but it was believed then, and the Jews suffered. Some explanations advanced by the modern Anti-Semite are as fantastic as this story.

The Marks of the Covenant

We as Christians must look to the Scriptures for the true solution to the Jewish problem. Scripturally, their destiny has been molded by their experience with two persons—Moses and Jesus.

What separated the Jews from other peoples? Let Moses answer. Not power and wealth (Deut. 8:17), not greatness of number (Deut. 7:1, 7), not righteousness (Deut. 9:6)—but the fact that God has graciously chosen them to be the custodians of His law, and His witnesses to the nations. They were the Chosen People, not because they were better than others, but in order to serve others. And when Israel accepted the covenant at Sinai they bound themselves and their descendants to the following proposition (or covenant): "Your national attitude toward the law will either make or break you. Keep it and you shall be honored by the nations; break it and you shall be a proverb and a byword among the nations." Such is the substance of Moses' words found in the 28th chapter of Deuteronomy.

The deep-seated peculiarities of the Jew are due to the mark which the Torah has

left upon his soul and mind. And even when he abandons his ancestral faith for atheism or agnosticism he does not thereby escape the covenant marks branded upon the national soul at Sinai.

And what of the Jew who sincerely accepts the gospel? His act cannot be called apostasy for he finds in Christ the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets; and also the power to translate the Law into personality and

During the time of the Babylonian Captivity when numbers of Jews planned to get rid of their distinctiveness and become one hundred per cent Babylonian citizens, this prophetic word came through Ezekiel: "And that which cometh into your mind shall not be at all, that ye say, We will be as the heathen, as the families of the countries, to serve wood and stone. saith the Lord God, surely with a mighty hand, and with a stretched out arm, and with fury poured out, will I rule over you: and I will bring you out from the people, and will gather you out of the countries wherein ye are scattered." Ezek. 20:32-34.

Waldo Frank wrote: "They are not a bit worse than their Yankee, British or French competitors. But I felt they ought to be better. Perhaps this unconscious claim of a high standard for the Jew is a clue, as we shall see, to the real meaning of the mys-

Paul the apostle took this view when he wrote, "Thou that makest thy boast of the law, through breaking the law dishonorest thou God? For the name of God is blasphemed among the Gentiles through you, as it is written. For he is not a Jew, which is one outwardly; neither is that circumcision, which is outward in the flesh: but he is a Jew, which is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the spirit, and not in the letter; whose praise is not of men, but of God." Rom. 2:23, 24, 28,

Their Attitude Toward Jesus

The cause of the present condition of the Jewish people may not only be traced back to their experience at Sinai but also to their attitude toward Jesus. The New Testament teaches that the present dispersion of the Jews is related to their rejection of the Messiahship of Jesus. "They shall fall by the edge of the sword, and shall be led away captive into all nations: and Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles,



until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled." Luke 21:24.

The modern Jew is very sensitive on this point and resents the thought that his nation was responsible for the death of Jesus. Nevertheless, it is a matter of history that the leadership of Israel rejected Him as the Messiah, and their decision has affected the attitude of their descendants ever since. It is true that in recent years some rabbis have uttered glowing tributes about Jesus, and one Jewish author has written a touching story of His life ("The Nazarene," by Sholem Asch); but the point at issue is not whether Jesus was a good and great man but whether He was the Christ.

Calvary has left a deep scar upon the Jewish soul, for it so happens that Jesus was the Messiah. History unites with prophecy in attesting the fact. After Christ the Jewish people had no prophets, no sacrifices, and their national life was broken up.

To sum up: the Jew's present position is due to the fact that he cannot escape the consequences of the Old Covenant and he will not accept the blessings of the New. According to the Scriptures, this spiritual dislocation is the source of those painful irritations which constitute the Jewish problem. When a great English statesman was asked concerning his religion he replied, "I am the blank page between the Old and the New Testaments." These words state the spiritual position of many an Israelite.

The Church and the Jew

Reproach lies heavy upon Israel; in certain European countries it is open and manifest, and in some parts of this land it exists as an undercurrent. What can the followers of Jesus do to lead Israel from reproach to glory?

First, the church must take the right attitude toward the Jews. We must remember that they were the "congregation" (or "church") of Jehovah in the days when there was no Christian church, and they have run the whole scale of experiences that can come to any church. Did Israel fail? It is not for the church to rejoice but to take warning. "And if some of the branches be broken off, and thou, being a wild olive tree, wert graffed in among them, and with them partakest of the root and fatness of the olive tree; boast not against the branches. But if thou boast, thou bearest not the root, but the root thee. Thou wilt say then, The branches were broken off, that I might be graffed in. Well; because of unbelief they were broken off, and thou standest by faith. Be not highminded, but fear: for if God spared not the natural branches, take heed lest He also spare not thee." Rom. 11:17-21.

Some would reason thus: "Since the Jews have rejected Christ they have no claim to any special consideration." But read the prophecy of Obadiah. At the very time God was punishing Judah for her apostasy, He pronounced the sentence of everlasting destruction upon the Edomites for joining in the razing of Jerusalem. Why? "For thy violence against thy brother Jacob shame shall cover thee." There existed a relationship that forbade Edom's participation in Nebuchadnezzar's campaign. For a similar reason Christians cannot participate in anti-Jewish propaganda which in recent years has produced its gruesome harvest of suffering.

Many a person, without rancor or bitterness, has said frankly, "It isn't easy to love the Jews."

Moses would have agreed. More than once he cried, "Ye are a stiffnecked people!" He was driven frantic by their murmurings and backslidings, and finally was provoked to an outburst of temper which led to his exclusion from the Promised Land. when Jehovah suggested a quick and easy solution of the Jewish problem in the form of national extermination, Moses cried, "Yet now, if Thou wilt forgive their sin—; and if not, blot me, I pray Thee, out of Thy book which Thou hast written." Ex. 32:32.

Hard to love the Jews? Paul the apostle would have agreed. Many a beating and stoning he received at their hands; many a time his very life was endangered. But did he ever desire their destruction? He once wrote: "I say the truth in Christ, I lie not, my conscience also bearing me witness in the Holy Ghost, that I have great heaviness and continual sorrow in my heart. For I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh." Rom. 9:1-3.

There are some who become impatient when the following verse is quoted: "I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee." Gen. 12:3. "Racial considerations do not count with God," they contended. "The Jews are no better than any other nation." That is true, as far as spiritual salvation is concerned; mere membership in the Jewish nation guarantees no special grace. But nationally the Jews have a destiny different from that of other peoples. God has so decreed it-and we cannot quarrel with Him whose judgments are unsearchable and whose ways are past finding out.

Someone may ask: "Why do some scriptures hurl the most scathing denunciations against the Jews while others threaten judgment upon those nations which mistreat them?" This is explained by the fact that in God's dealings with His people there is a mingling of judgment and mercy. Paul states it thus: "As concerning the gospel, they are enemies for your sakes: but as touching the election, they are beloved for the fathers' sakes." Rom. 11:28. Enemies—yet beloved!—that is one key to the divine dealings with Israel in this age. God is not yet through with them. Many Old and New Testament Scriptures predict the restoration of Israel to kingdom privileges, and these prophecies are bound up with those relating to Christ's second coming. "And so all Israel shall be saved (restored nationally): as it is written, There shall come out of Sion the Deliverer, and shall turn away ungodliness from Jacob." Rom. 11:26.

Second, Christians can remind the Jews that the first church was cradled in their nation. In imagination they can take the Jew back nineteen hundred years in time to the city of Jerusalem and show him the mother church of all Christians, a church where every Christian was a Jew. The fact



cannot be overemphasized that in the early days of Christianity thousands of Jews accepted Jesus as their Messiah and Deliverer. This fact should correct the common Jewish belief that Christianity is completely alien to Jewish thought.

Third, Christians can appeal to the Jews to identify themselves with Christ. Indeed, He has identified Himself with them. "For verily He took not on Him the nature of angels; but He took on Him the seed of Abraham." Heb. 2:16. That is, He was born a Jew; in a very special sense He belongs to the Jews because He was their legal king. Therefore the persecutor of the Jews is striking at Christ. "To persecute the house of Israel is to persecute Christ, not in His mystical body as when the church is persecuted, but in His fleshly lineage, and in His forgetful people whom He ceaselessly loves and calls.'

The French philosopher Jaques Maritain contends that Hitler's persecution of the Jewish people is really rooted in his antagonism toward Christ, whose religion he considers unsuited to the "Aryan" character. But since Christianity is so deeply ingrained in large numbers of his people and in other countries, he dare not say so openly but strikes at the nation that gave Him to the world. This view is worthy of serious thought and should be considered in the light of the Scripture. "And when the dragon saw that he was cast unto the earth, he persecuted the woman (Israel) which brought forth the man child (Christ)." Rev. 12:13. (This interpretation is that of Scofield and many other accepted scholars.)

This, then, is our appeal to the Jewish people: You are indeed a People of Sorrows, but you are not suffering for the sake of the Word of God or the Kingdom of God. Link your destinies to the Man of sorrows, who in this war-torn world is walking again the thorny way of the cross. Identified with Him you become indeed and in truth the Suffering servants of Jehovah. "If we suffer, we shall also reign with Him." 2 Tim.

The church should not cease to preach that the gospel of Christ is "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." Rom. 1:16. And remembering that centuries of misunderstanding and prejudice are not overcome easily, she should place supreme reliance upon that divine power to which Jesus referred when He said to Peter, "Flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but My Father which is in heaven." Matt. 16:17.

A Call to All

"And the sons of Job went and held a feast in the house of each one upon his day . . . And it was so . . . that Job sent and sanctified them and rose up early in the morning and offered burnt offerings...For Job said, It may be that my sons have sinned." Job 1:4, 5.

Here you have the ideal of a pious, God-

fearing father. It is not enough for him to shun evil himself; he fears greatly that his children may perhaps sin against God. As the head of the household he sends and summons them to himself in order to sanctify them: he rises up early in the morning to offer burnt offerings for them. Splendid example of a pious father, and of the piety which does not serve God for itself alone, but also cares for the children.

Father! How do matters stand in your household-are you faithful in taking your children to meet every morning around God's Word and in going with them to God in prayer? Oh, be sure to do it. Evening prayers are not enough. In the morning all is fresh; the morning is the beginning of the day, and influences the whole day. To prevent evil is better than to confess it when done. Let the whole household every morning begin the day with God, and receive God's blessing for the

Christian! If you wish to live each day and all the day as a child of God, be sure not to forget the solitary communion with God in the early morning. If you wish to have God's blessing in your house, do not forget morning prayers with your household.—Andrew Murray.

A Shelter in Tribulation Days

T IS written, "He giveth . . . to the young ravens which cry." Psalm 147:9. Lord heard the cry of the raven that Noah sent out from the ark and He supplied its need. He gave so much to the ravens in a day when famine was in the land, that they were able to share their bread and meat with one of His prophets whom He had hidden by the brook Cherith. 1 Kings 17:6.

And if God gives so abundantly to His ravens, who are counted in the law unclean (Lev. 11:15), how much more will He give to His doves? In the Song of Solomon the beloved of the Lord is likened to the dove. The heavenly Bridegroom calls His bride, "My dove, My undefiled." S. S. 6:9.

The Lord is good to all, to the ravens and to the doves. He sends the sunshine and the rain to both the just and the unjust. And He desires that those who are His own should likewise be bountiful and kind and tender and generous with the sinners as well as the saints.

But those who are Christ's receive a special benediction. The dove that was sent out of the ark felt perfectly at home in coming back to the ark. She felt it was a suitable dwelling place until the floods abated. In the world today there are storm and tribulation, wars and rumors of wars, but there is a quiet resting place, a peaceful habitation, a sure dwelling, that the heavenly Noah has for His heavenly doves. They can come flying home to the secret place of the Most High to abide under the shadow of the Almighty, to nestle under His feathers until the storm clouds and the floods have all passed away.

The dove went forth again from the ark to dwell in a judgment-cleansed world. And the Lord who preserves His own, will let them come back to dwell here. When the tribulation waters cover the earth, they will be sheltered in the heavenly ark. He will have taken them up before that final flood of wrath comes upon the earth. He who made everything good in His time delighted in the voice of the turtledove when it was heard in the land; and the praise and worship and adoration of His doves today is very acceptable to the heav-enly Bridegroom. There is a singing in the Spirit, a praise in the Spirit that is the outflow of the melody in the heart of His Spirit-filled ones; and it is very delightful to His ear. And as His heavenly doves, through the grace He gives, offer the sacrifice of praise continually to the heavenly Bridegroom, it brings Him great pleasure. —S. H. F.

The stars on our flag represent unity—the union of States-and they have been chosen as an emblem of the heavens. 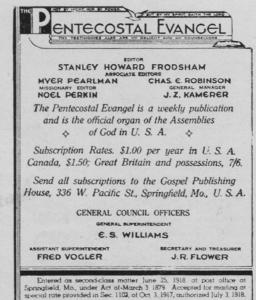

The stars represent union. As we gaze upon the bright and morning Star in the person of our precious Saviour, we are glad to lose all our present identity, and to be swallowed up in union with the body of Jesus Christ. We are all workers together with Him. As we gaze upon Him, we lose all personal ambitions in desiring to please Him, and we say, my precious Jesus, I am glad to do anything for You." And as we become one with Him we become one with all who belong to Him. The Star gives us of His glory and makes us one. And then we are to earnestly endeavor to maintain this unity of the Spirit.

Our precious Saviour left His glory, His might and power, and came to us in humility. was laid in Bethlehem's manger. The star that led the wise men to Bethlehem has spoken of His glory, and the stripes He later bore at Calvary speaks of His humilia-

From glory He came to humble Himself and to be brought to death on Calvary. We remember that scripture in Isaiah: "Surely He hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem Him stricken. smitten of God, and afflicted. But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and with His stripes we are healed."

We read, "Then Pilate therefore took Jesus and scourged Him." They laid the lash on His lovely back, they beat Him with rods, and plucked out His beard; they pressed the crown of thorns upon His head, and He stood there a bleeding spectacle in the presence of those who had no heart, no pity. Nothing but cruelty ruled their morbid nature. But He was wounded for our transgressions. Your transgressions and my transgressions put the stripes on Jesus. Oh, if we could only realize that Calvary's sacrifice is for us today. The Sacrifice on Calvary is as great as it ever was. It represents the same effectual redemptive virtues as it ever has represented. The despised Jesus bore our iniquity.



Jesus bore the indignities, humiliation and shame for us. He bore the cruelty of the lashes and all the indignities heaped upon Him without a complaint, for your sake and for mine, that we might have an emblem that has never been disgraced, never been dragged in the dirt, and will never come down. I want to be loyal to Jesus Christ my Saviour. He is my ensign.

You say, "Brother Steelberg, a human being cannot be an ensign: "Well, if God could have a supernatural ensign for Israel, He can have a supernatural banner for us, and I believe our ensign is Christ Himself. I will prove it to you by the scripture found in Isaiah 11:10, "And in that day there shall be a root of Jesse, which shall stand for an ensign of the people; to it shall the Gentiles seek: and His rest shall be glorious." The Gentiles shall seek Him-that is you and I, isn't it? Praise the Lord!

We are dwelling around the standard of the Cross, and from the Cross our great banner flies. Who is it? Our Christ Himself, our beautiful Saviour! Oh, He is not only Christ our peace, and Christ our hope, and Christ our joy, but He is Christ our banner to all the multitudes of the earth. Praise the Lord! Yoano has the distinction of being called one of our native pastors. He can lay more claim to sincerity than brilliance and is certainly more eloquent in the prayer closet than on the platform. And being a true-to-type Kisale fisherman he is apt to run more on the battery than the dynamo, so that his ministry for God is well punctuated with stops and starts. He is to be excused somewhat as he is a bit of a round peg in a square hole, a duck among hens, for he is a full-blooded born and bred fisherman, who is living and working for God in an island village.

Things in his church and village got so quiet spiritually that even Yoano himself became quite alarmed. He gave himself the usual kick in the pants by putting a little more ginger and spice into his ministry, visiting and personal work, but this only served to show up how dead the work really was and how hopeless and helpless he had become as God's Gospel Messenger.

Realizing this Yoano did the correct and best thing by closing his Church, and shutting himself up in an empty room, alone with God, determined not to come out until he was right with God and through to victory. Refusing bench, chair or even grass mat, he lay on the bare earth and sobbed his heart out in prayer and supplication to God. The ground was literally wet with his tears as he wrestled, prayed and fasted for three whole days, until he felt he had Heaven's answer and his Lord's assurance of victory in his own soul and revival in the church.

In this state of blessing and assurance he asked God for a sign miracle for the next day, Sunday, and like Gideon of old he chose his own sign, which was that God would send to the Church an anxious soul from a hard and wicked village some 12 miles away where he had often preached and pleaded for souls without success.

Full of confidence, Yoano re-opened his Church and beat the drum calling the people together for a Gospel service. had not long to wait for a crowd of people bigger than usual. They had gathered around and were following in excitement an



old woman, who was almost naked and carrying on her head a basket full of charms. As she went along she broadcast to one and all that she was going to the Mission Church to get right with God and then die in peace with Jesus Christ. She was coming to accept the message that she had so often spurned. She had come 12 miles from the very village that Yoano had named in prayer before God, so he knew that, this

was his sign miracle.

Before the assembled crowd outside the church door the old woman put down her basket of charms and told her whole story of woe. She said that she was abandoned, sick, going mad and dying, and told how she had paid one witch doctor her only remaining 60 links of beads and a second one her life's savings of 100 francs and her three big gardens, after which instead of curing her they had made her worse and had now left her to die. In her extremity she was urged beyond resistance to pack up and go to the Gospel evangelist whom she had so often ridiculed and he would help her to get right with God. Then she said, she would be happy to die. Everybody declared that she was not going-but had already gone-mad. Yoano quieted them all by announcing that the old woman would be both converted and healed that morning. Gently and patiently he led the distressed and distracted soul into salvation and peace with God. Then he prayed one of the simplest and most confident prayers of his life, as he asked God to heal the old woman's body as graciously and wholly as He had restored her soul. The old body passed out of death into life as surely as she had passed out of darkness into light. was and is perfectly healed and whole. Now, one year later, she is still well and a happy baptized believer in Jesus Christ, living as a widow indeed among the local Christians.

It was indeed a sign miracle that marked the beginning of a revival in that inland village, for many were saved, restored and blessed and the monument once more became a movement for God.-Redemption

God Runs My Business

A BOOK REVIEW BY CHARLES ELMO ROBINSON

This is the strange title of the biography, just out, of the man whose Christian experience has attracted and is attracting more notice and amazed comment than that of any other man, I think, at least since the days of Wesley. His name is Robert G. LeTourneau, maker of heavy road-working machinery. Every week end he is flying here and there, carrying a choice company of efficient helpers to tell the story of Jesus. He goes in his own plane, at his own expense and wholly without charge. Thus he is absent from his business many days out of every month.

Still his financial prosperity, since he took God for his partner, himself taking the one tenth and giving to God's work the nine tenths, has been so vast as to stagger the imagination. Here are the figures for three years:

Year	Sales	Net profits
1932	\$207,236.81	\$ 52,055.61
1933	379,106.53	113,092.27
1934	929,860.67	340,275.49

Those are sample years. He is now going forward in a business way like a cyclone. He has had to create a corporation to care for and administer the Lord's vast part of the profits.

When his business was starting much of the work was done by hand. "A piece of work of considerable importance was in the shop and had to be completed on the following day. One vital part of this machine had not yet been designed. It was not until the end of the day that Robert realized that his men would have to start on the making of that important part the first thing on the following morning in order to complete the work the next day. Unless the design was laid out and ready for them when they came to work, it would be impossible for them to begin the building of the part. Up to that moment he had not the slightest idea what the designing of the part involved or how long it would take him to work it out. There was nothing else for him to do but spend the evening over his draiting board with slide rule and pencil.

"Suddenly he realized that he had another engagement for that evening. It was the evening on which a group of young people of the church took charge of the meeting in a certain gospel mission of the town, and he had promised his Lord to accompany them and do his part in the service of song and testimony. He said, 'Lord, I can't go to the mission tonight. I've got to figure this thing out.' The still small voice he knew so well said to him, 'Did you mean it when you promised to serve Me no matter what it cost?'

"Moreover, the temptation to skip the meeting was intensified by the reflection that he was not on the program for any special part in the service and that the young people would be able to get along very well without him. The struggle was a hard one, although, as he said later, it should not have been. At length, he said, 'All right, Lord: I'll go. I don't know

what I'll do tomorrow, but I'll go. I promised I would, and I will.'

"He went to the mission meeting and returned home about ten o'clock. His home was not far from the plant. Thinking of the part which had to be designed, he began to wonder what he ought to do. The thought of trying to design anything that night didn't appeal to him because he felt his mind ought to be fresh and alert to work out the thing which he wanted to be an original and effective part of the machine. Such things are not done, he felt, when the mind is half awake. The more he thought of it the more hopeless it seemed.

"Becoming more and more concerned he went to the plant and sat down at the drafting board. He hadn't been there ten minutes before the entire design flashed before his mind's eye, complete and perfect. He made his calculations, put them on paper, and left his instructions for the men to start the work in the morning then he went to bed.

"The design which Robert LeTourneau worked out in about ten minutes that night after he returned from the mission is the vital part of the main control unit with which all machines made by the company are equipped from that day to the present." It is the one thing that has enabled him to forge ahead of all competitors, none of whom have anything that can take the place of this God-designed control unit.

"Although I was saved when twelve years old and brought up in a Christian home, the devil had me convinced that I couldn't talk to anybody about his or her soul's salvation. I didn't know what to say or how to start. I argued that I was doing my part by bringing them there and taking them to church twice a day. I shouldn't have been worrying about it, but I didn't have any peace in my heart. Saturday night came, and not one of them had shown the least sign of wanting to be a Christian.

sign of wanting to be a Christian. The conference was closing on Sunday and I wanted to see them accept the Lord as their Saviour before we went home, but I didn't see how I could do anything about it. Isn't it too bad we have to come to the end of our rope and get desperate before we will let the Lord work through us? That night as I walked down the trail leading to our cabin, I was praying. Before I reached the cabin I promised the Lord that I would speak to the first boy I saw when I got home if He would give me the strength and words to say. I was so frightened I could hardly climb the stirs, but I went ahead. As I stepped on the porch two of the boys came around the cabin, I stopped them but I was so frightened, I can't remember what I said to them. One of them said to me, 'I've been wishing you would say something to me all week. I've been wanting to talk to you, but I didn't know how to start.' Just then two more boys came around the corner. The five of us sat on the porch and talked until late about the Lord. When I was alone in my room that night, I marveled at the freedom I had had in talking to those boys and how easy it was to tell them the plan of salvation. Satan had made it seem so hard, but when the first word was spoken, it

wasn't hard at all.

"The next morning at the breakfast table six of the boys accepted the Lord as their Saviour. What a day of rejoicing that was!"

"By These Things Men Grow"

A Report of the 1942 East Bengal Convention,

by Maynard Ketcham

The above statement was made by King David when referring to his various obstacles and difficulties. Perhaps it is the working of this principle which has been responsible for the development of the East Bengal work from its modest beginnings to the present encouraging position. From a natural point of view it would be hard to find a more imposing array of obstacles than must be surmounted in spreading the Pentecostal message throughout this country.

Living Conditions-Indescribable

Situated astride the combined deltas of the Ganges and Brahmaputra Rivers, the area during high water is largely inundated. During low water, it is a vast quagmire interspersed with rivers which slowly bear the filthy (yet sacred) waters of the Ganges to the sea. That people should attempt to live under such impossible conditions is remarkable-yet India's ever-increasing millions leave untouched no spot of land which might possibly support human life. Consequently this vast expanse of mud is teeming with human beings who wage constant struggle with flood and disease. Mounds of mud have been thrown up from the morass, on which are built the flimsy houses where the people live. These little islands average perhaps fifty feet square, and yet their 'table of contents" reads like an inventory of the ark: twenty or more people, a dozen cows, several cats, a family of dogs, a few chickens, and without fail a spot of land to raise the tobacco. During most of the indispensable year these little islands must exist as selfcontained, detached units, for the swirling waters completely surrounding them make travel impossible apart from boats. It is very common to meet people, especially women, who have never been more than a couple of "islands" away from their place of birth.

Fertility

The swamps surrounding these raised islands are enriched by the deposits of dirt brought down from the upper reaches of the Ganges and, under favorable circumstances, comprise the best rice fields to be found in India. Ordinarily the rice is planted from boats when the water is high. The seed sinks to the bottom, germinates, takes root and raises its head through several feet of water. Very frequently the waters do not recede enough to expose the land, so that the rice must be harvested either from boats or by men who have to work in three or four feet of water. The vast quag-mires of stagnant water which remain behind when the waters do recede provide breeding places for armies of mosquitoes and for a motly assortment of diseases. Very, very few of the people of this country are free from malaria, while other fevers are present in similar measure.

Modes of Travel

Transportation through this country is varied, but always difficult. There are a few steamer lines plying the main rivers, but after one leaves these lines, organized transport is not to be found. Little roly-poly country boats must be engaged which during high water will take you nearly everywhere, at one mile per hour! When the water is lower, these boats can navigate only through the canals, and the traveler frequently must walk miles to reach his destination, through water, mud and slime.

Distance, which is measured by "bends" in

the river, becomes an unknown quantity, for the river twists and turns without ryme or reason. After traveling for a dozen "bends" and covering that many miles, a person may find himself only a mile or so from his starting point. Just imagine how irksome travel in this manner must be to an active American, full of go, and zealous to be at the job!

Only God

Under such conditions we feel that only the blessing of God has made possible the development of the Pentecostal work to its present proportions in the Delta area. During the seven years since our Pentecostal workers entered this territory, ten churches have been established, with a membership of several hundred. On several occasions there have been marked revivals of healing power. God has used the workers in the healing of all manner of diseases, including leprosy, tuberculosis, and demon possession.

The Highlight of the Year

in East Bengal is always the annual convention when church members and workers gather for a time of spiritual refreshing.

This year's convention was held at Pithabari, a most out-of-the-way place which is separated from the canal by several "sloughs of despond." Our local church at Pithabari is small, nevertheless the members worked with a will in making preparations to accommodate the convention. As there was no adequate building available in the locality, our Indian brethren used their ingenuity in constructing a very serviceable tabernacle from the simple materials at hand. Straw was piled on bamboo framework for the sides; straw and reed matting were used for the floor, and small boat sails were fastened together to form the room. In this simple setting, God Himself was pleased to meet with us.

Great grace was given to the various ones who ministered the Word. Many found the desire of their hearts in salvation and spiritual empowerment. At the end of the convention a precious baptismal service was held and several members were received into the local church. Special emphasis was laid on intensive teaching for the workers, as in the final analysis it is these men who hold the success of the work in their hands.

Meetings for the women held daily by one of our precious Indian lady workers were a source of great blessing. Indian womanhood, kept under a cloud at best, faces the height of repression here in East Bengal. When the women do appear in public they wrap their "saries" tightly around their faces—a group of them looking for all the world like so many ghosts out for an airing. The Christian women, while much enlightened, are still pretty well enmeshed in superstitions, fears and complexes which have grown upon them as generation after generation has lived within the close limits of their little islands.

Right in the midst of the convention, when his help was most needed, the pastor of the local church was struck down with a very bad form of malaria. But in answer to prayer he was instantly raised up and within a few minutes was hard at work once more.

Indians Accept Responsibility

Following the convention we had the annual business session of the Bengal Pentecostal Union Committee, a group which represents the Indian Assemblies of God organization in this area, having full responsibility for the care and development of the Pentecostal testimony. The forming of this union has proved a real forward step, for the Indian brethren have risen nobly to the occasion since the control of the work has been in their own hands. Of course, there have been mistakes, and we missionaries have had to reach out a hand to steady the boat—but how much better is a mistaken attempt made from a sincere heart than no attempt at all. We hope that the missionaries will not be compelled to leave this country and the work here, but it is encouraging to feel that when and if we do have to leave, the work will abide.

A DEFINITE FORWARD MOVE Grace Walther, Bihar, India

We have much to thank God for in these days of stress and strain. We are proving His promise that He keeps us in perfect peace, though it means living but one day at a time, trusting that whatever the future holds He will see us through. There is also a definite moving forward in the spiritual lives of our people, which gives us great joy. Those who have not as yet received the Baptism are searching their hearts and seeking the Lord for His fullness. A group from the church go out each week to the surrounding villages for open-air meetings-a ministry which we believe the Lord will use to His glory and the salvation of souls. Our lay members are taking a more active part in the work, realizing the responsibility and privilege which is theirs to serve the Lord in this way. The schoolgirls are spending much time in prayer, and as the others go out to witness there is a volume of prayer ascending to the throne. Each evening when the day's work is done groups will gather together to wait upon the Lord.

We have been holding monthly prayer meetings with our English missionary neighbors who are openly seeking the Lord. There is a unity and oneness among us as we work together for souls in this district, and in unity there is

strength, praise God!

So with hearts filled with praise we encourage ourselves in the Lord, knowing that however dark the clouds around us, the glorious light of His presence shines overhead.

NOBE NEWS J. W. Tucker, Congo



During recent months it has been impossible to travel in the bush since we have had so much work to do on the station with the building of our new church (which now is nearing completion). However, we have tried to make as many visits as possible to near-by villages and have reached a number of people in spite of its being the dry season when most of them spend practically all their time fishing at Lake Obe.

There are many lepers in this section—what pitiful sights one sometimes sees! We visit a number of them quite often and

Nelengandra, first baptized Christian in the Mangbetu tribe, starting off to Gombari for the week's mail. Formerly a runner, he is now Mrs. Tucker's table boy. old lady—one of the oldest persons we have seen in Congo—who now is very near death's

door. We have talked to her many times, telling her the sweet story of Jesus. She says she believes and we trust has really accepted Christ as her Saviour. It is hard for the old people to comprehend the gospel message after having been steeped in witchcraft and in the worship of their pagan gods; but we know that "the entrance of His words giveth light."

Need Among Girls

While much concerned about the need of the girls and women of this section, we have never actually started a girls' work at Nobe, hesitating to undertake the added responsibility with our limited personnel.

One morning about four weeks ago a little girl from the village came to school. At dismissal time her older brother (who is her guardian) came to look for her, saying that she had ran away from some work he had given her to do-but the little girl was nowhere to be found. After the brother had left, some of the natives told us his real purpose in searching for the child was that he wanted to send her away to become the wife of a man in a distant village whom she had never seen. Knowing this, the little girl had run away, and later that morning we found her hiding here on the mission.

We sent word for the brother to come to the station and talk with us. Almost a week passed before he made his appearance; then he lied to us again, changing his story each time he told it. He insisted at first that his sister could not stay, but made no attempt to take her away. Later, when we saw him at the village, he said she could remain until it was time to watch the rice. We feel that he fears being turned over to the government officials since it would be a punishable offense to sell the girl who is yet too young. So this sweet little black girl, Adiapa, has been with us now more than four weeks.

About ten days later another little girl came to stay at the mission. Two more say they will join us as soon as they have helped plant the year's crop of peanuts, and no doubt many others would be only too happy to do the same if their parents would permit. We are praying that if it is God's will for us to start a work of this kind at Nobe, He will send the girls to us, making the parents willing to let them come.

WHAT'S NEWS IN THE MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

Friends of Lula Bell Hough will be happy to know that a further advice just received from Washington includes her name in the list of Americans leaving Hong Kong to be returned to the United States. Miss Hough's name was omitted in the first list sent to us, but we are thankful for this assurance that she is returning with our other missionaries.

This week we have two names to add to our missionary cradle roll: Samuel Austin Olson, who arrived on May 25 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. Yngve Olson, of Venezuela, South America

and Harold Leland Taylor, whose arrival on May 29 brought joy into the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Taylor, missionaries on furlough from Southwest China.

Mr. and Mrs. P. Henry Hall, returning on furlough from Peru, sailed May 26 from Callao on the Chilean boat "Aconcagua." They expected to stop over a few days in Cuba, thence to travel by plane to Miami, and on to California by train. Their home address will be 265 Fifth Avenue, Chula Vista, California.

Florence Christie, who has been assisting Lillian Trasher in the orphanage at Assiout, Egypt, is now on her way home for furlough. those who have been contributing toward Miss Christie's support would be willing to make a special effort in helping with the expense of her return fare, this would be very much appreciated, particularly in view of the present high cost of transportation.

PRAY FOR INDIA'S WOMEN

"The warm weather has begun," writes Martha McLean, from Hardoi, North India, "which brings quite a change in our schedule, both in the school and the outside work. Our outside work is encouraging. The women are very attentive, a number showing keen interest in what we have to tell them. We also contact some of the husbands, and one man especially appears greatly interested. Instead of arguing, as many do, he has been asking sensible questions, trying to reason things out.

"We feel that some of the women really believe in their hearts, but it would be difficult for them to take an outward step for Christ unless the husband were willing. We do have their confessions that they receive no help from their beliefs, and that is some admission. War conditions are causing many to think seriously, particularly those of the educated class

"Our Bible women are real workers-we marvel at their vision and burden for their own people. Though there is so little accomplished from the outward standpoint, these faithful women admit no discouragement but believe that as they are now sowing the seed with tears, later they will reap with joy. Praise God for such loyal service.'

Funds Cabled Though Mails Cut Off

Mail service to so many of our fields is uncertain and delayed-and in an increasing number of cases cut off altogether-but in almost every instance we are still able to get funds to our missionaries by cable. Again and again they write to us, expressing gratitude for this provision and voice deep appreciation for the loyal support of their contributors who are standing back of them at this time when the help is needed as never before.

"Sticking to Our Post"

"India is hemmed in at the present time," writes Maynard Ketcham, from Calcutta, "and just about cut off from mail contact with home. You certainly will not hear from us regularly and you may not receive word at all over long periods of time. As your designation slips are not reaching us, it is impossible to know who is contributing toward our work, so that we cannot write to thank donors. But we do want to emphasize that as our support is now being cabled to us from headquarters, we are receiving every bit that you send, and you need have no fear that your consecrated money is going astray. It is reassuring to know that all our friends are so deeply interested in us and in the Bengali work that they will continue their support toward orphanage, workers, schools, mission halls and evangelistic efforts-letters, or no letters! There is much talk of evacuation of Americans from India-but you can count on our sticking to the post which He has given into our trust."

"In Such a Time as This ... "

From Assiout, Egypt, Lillian Trasher sends word to friends and contributors: "Thank you for your kindness in helping to support our orphan children. It takes sometimes months for you to get our letters of thanks, if they reach you at all; but you can be sure that all the money sent through the Foreign Missions Department at Springfield comes to us regularly by cable the first week of each month, and at a good rate of exchange since American money is very valuable here since the war. Prices, of course, are much higher, so that we appreciate your extra help.

"Thank God we are able to carry on just the same in every way. In such a time as this it is a comfort to know that He is caring for us and that nothing can ever touch us which He has not allowed. This knowledge dispels any feeling of terror and brings the quiet, peaceful confidence which we all need."

"It Means Life to Us"

In an air mail letter just received from H. C. Osgood, of Southwest China, he expresses appreciation of the manner in which our office has been cabling funds to the missionaries in that area. While for some time it has been difficult to get correspondence through, we have been able to cable funds regularly. Realizing that living expenses have multiplied tremendously, we added extra funds to our remittance, and Brother Osgood in his acknowledgment writes, "Surely God is hearing prayer. We greatly appreciate all that is being done for us in the homeland. I do not know where the extra funds come from, but I do know they mean life to us here."

There are many instances of a similar nature where we have had to add to the normal amounts given our missionaries on the foreign field in order that they might get the necessary articles of food. We are happy that it has been possible to do this through the co-operation of those at home who have been so faithful in keeping up their missinary offerings. We trust you will continue to stand with us during this emergency time so that we may not fail our missionaries in any respect.

MEDYING WORLD AND LIVING WORD

ON THE RUSSIAN BORDER

Between 1938 and 1942 two and a quarter million copies of the Scriptures were distributed in the European countries bordering Russia, by the Scripture Gift Mission (London) alone.

LONDON CHURCH ATTENDANCE

The war is not moving the masses to repentance, either in America or in Great Britain. An English preacher says: "After two and a half years of war, only five per cent of London's population attend a place of worship."

"KEEP THEM PRAYING"

Many slogans have been developed during the recent months of war: "Remember Pearl Harbor," "Keep 'em rolling," "Keep 'em flying," etc. But Brigadier General W. R. Arnold, army chief of chaplains, has coined a better one. "Keep them praying" is his new watchword. "Keep them praying, and we shall win the war and a just peace," says General Arnold to the army chaplains.

NO RED CROSS BEER

In the daily press a report recently appeared to the effect that beer was to be sold in Red Cross Service Clubs. The national president of the Anti-Saloon League immediately wired the American Red Cross for a confirmation, and received the following telegram: "Replying to your wire, please be assured that the American Red Cross is not dispensing or planning to dispense beer to the armed forces."

JEWS AND CHRISTIANITY

"The Jews are now more inclined to Christianity than ever before," said a New York journalist last fall. He is not a Christian. He is a Jew, and the statement was made on the editorial page of one of the largest Yiddish newspapers in the world. The journalist was reviewing the gospel campaign that was held by George T. B. Davis at Atlantic City last summer, during which so many Jews were won to Christ.

BOOKS FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIES

"You would probably be amazed," says Moody Monthly "if you took the time to look through the catalogue of your public library in your community, to see how few really Christian books are made available to the reading public. Under the head 'Religion' you will no doubt find all kinds of confused philosophies and a chunk of modernism.

"Why not do something in your community about the right kinds of books? You are a taxpaper. You have a right to express yourself. Speak up. Demand better books: not only orthodox books along doctrinal and Bible study lines, but Christian fiction should be recommended or, if necessary, purchased and presented to the library."

SOVIET BLOODGUILTINESS

The number of lives that have been lost through Nazi blood purges, hostage killings, anti-Semitic riots, etc. is notorious, but let us remember that Soviet bloodguiltiness has been even greater. From the time the Soviet regime came into power until 1935, the number of Russians executed was 28 bishops and higher clergy, 6,778 priests, 6,585 school-teachers, 8,800 doctors, 51,850 army officers, 200,850 policemen and other officials, and 11,488,520 peasants and artisans. These make the staggering total of 11,726,746 people put to death in Russia up to 1935—nearly two million more dead than the total killed in the World War! These figures were reported by Henri Bero, French socialist.

In their mad lust for power, neither Nazi nor Soviet leaders have hesitated to shed the blood of those who stood in their way. They have disregarded the teaching of the Bible on the sanctity of human life. God has said, "Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed: for in the image of God made He man." Genesis 9:6.

GOOD NEWS FROM THE INDIES

There has been plenty of news from the East Indies battle front, but most of it has been depressing. However, here is a report given in Sunday School Times that is of a much happier nature:

"W. R. Williams, writing from West Borneo, says: 'Last week an entire village of 200 turned to Christ as the result of a miraculous healing. Our chief difficulty is to answer the calls from distant villages to give them the wonderful words of life. One village has threatened to move wholesale to another village where there are some 500 believers already, so that they may have teaching from the native evangelist there.'"

Missionary work is still continuing in most of the lands that Japan has taken. Let us continue to pray for the same.

JEWS SUFFER MOST

Said Dr. Chaim Weizmann, speaking at the New York Zionist Conference in May, "On us (Jews) war has been declared since 1933. The others have become victims of the attack several years later. The number of passive casualties through torment, starvation and enslavement, over-exploitation, and simple brutal killing, the number of such casualties among the Jews, apart from active casualties, losses in the war by Jewish soldiers, sailors and airmen, is today in a proportion exceeding the casualties of any other nation. A cold, statistical calculation reveals the cruel fact that probably about 25 per cent of the Jews of Eastern and Southeastern Europe will be, to use the modern term, 'liquidated.' Twenty-five per cent! And possibly their lot, the lot of those who will go and are going, is more merciful than that of the 75 per cent who have still to face the tragedy until the evil forces have been conquered."

ANTI-SEMITISM IN AMERICA

Conrad Hoffmann, Jr. said: "There are evidences of growing anti-Jewish feeling in America. One third of all the Jews in the world live in this country. One eighth of all the Jews in the world are in New York City. There are numerous small groups that are openly agitating against the Jews. It is here that a real challenge comes to the Church of America. The Church must be aggressive in the present situation lest through indifference or tolerance it become guilty, like the German Church, of actually fostering anti-Jewish feeling.

"Anti-Semitism, if carried to its logical conclusion, must sooner or later become a menace to the continued existence of the Christian faith itself, for if one would rid the Christian faith of all Jewish influence one must do away with Moses, the Ten Commandments, the Psalms, and the Prophets."

A STORY OF H. M. S. REPULSE

Robert Munroe, who has a mission in Halifax, writes in the *Presbyterian Guardian*:

"About the middle of July I was sitting in my office when a Commander walked in and said, 'Are you Bob Munroe?' 'Yes, sir,' I said. 'Well, Bob, I've heard my men speak so much of you I thought I'd come and see you. I am a Christian. I believe in Jesus Christ as my Saviour. I am Commander Williamson of the Repulse.' The talk went on, and finally we parted, the Commander apologizing for not inviting me to the battleship, as it was against orders, but promising to come Sunday night with some of his men. When Sunday night came the mission was packed with sailors. One after another stood up and told of his faith in Jesus Christ. Finally the Commander himself stood and outlined his personal trust in Jesus Christ. Then an invitation was given and three fine men came forward and professed Christ, one being the chief petty officer of the Repulse.

"In a few days that mighty ship steamed out of port, never to return."

MODERN WAR PROPHESIED

The Minor Prophets are coming to light as never before. Joel 2:3 might be a quotation from a modern newspaper: "A fire devoureth before them; and behind them a flame burneth: the land is as the garden of Eden before them, and behind them a desolate wilderness." What a picture of the scorched-earth policy! The rattle of machineguns, the thunder of heavy cannon, the crashing roar of planes, the earth-shaking explosions of bombs, might be described in Joel 2:10: "The earth shall quake before them; the heavens shall tremble." As a scientist said, "What is to be compared to the infernal, earth-shaking cacophony of a modern battle?"

A NAZI HYMNAL

The Nazis have just produced a "National Church Hymnal" which deletes all references to Jerusalem, Zion and anything else that might be considered Jewish, reports *Time*. It omits such favorites as Martin Luther's Communion and Easter hymns and adds many new hymns glorifying Nazi blood and soil doctrines. A new baptismal hymn, "Tender Child of German Blood," runs: "We baptize thee that thou may be consecrated to the service of our people in loyalty to the New Era."

The religious instinct of the German people is too strong to be stamped out; therefore it is being perverted by the Nazis to the worship of nationalism.

OVERCROWDED PRISONS

The prison population has so increased in recent years that there has been an overcrowding of the Federal prisons, according to the annual report of James V. Bennett, director of the Bureau of Prisons. The daily average of increase in the prison population outran the expansion of institutional facilities by about ten per cent. The prison population is now 57.3 per cent higher than in 1930, and the constantly mounting number sent up for long terms offers little hope of relief.

It will be remembered that Herbert Hoover,

It will be remembered that Herbert Hoover, in reply to an inquiry as to the cause of the wave of lawlessness sweeping America, answered: "It is not a crime wave; it is a subsidence of the moral foundations of the nation." How can our moral foundations be strengthened? Only by reading the Bible and following its teachings.

Report has come to us of the home going of Brother John S. Finley, age 62, who passed away on June 3 and was buried June 5 at Covington, Tenn. He was an ordained minister of the Assemblies of God. Brother J. D. Bartlett of Ripley, Tenn., was in charge of the funeral service. We extend our heartfelt sympathy to loved ones left behind.

ESUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Micaiah, the Courageous Prophet Lesson for July 12. Lesson Text: 1 Kings 22.

The greatest men in the world in every field, whether politics, religion, business, or science, have been men who had the courage to stand alone in spite of opposition, ridicule, the tide of public sentiment, and persecution. Such a man was this obscure prophet whose praises are seldom sung. Elijah is often lauded for his stand against four hundred prophets of Baal; but Micaiah, subject of our lesson today, is seldom heard of, though he stood alone against four hundred false prophets of God. And in our opinion, his stand called for even more courage than that taken by Elijah!

Verses 1-4. King Ahab was threatened by Syria and needed help. He therefore sought aid from Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, who had a strong army. In the time of crisis bad men often seek help from the godly.

And Jehoshaphat said ... I am as thou art ...

my horses as thy horses. Strange that this godly king could so speak to ungodly Ahab! It showed definite weakness in Jehoshaphat's otherwise godly character. Jehoshaphat is an outstanding example of those who become unequally yoked together. 2 Cor. 6:14-16. Those who would follow God all the way need to guard against unscriptural entanglements in the fields of marriage, politics, religion, and business. Much could be said on these points!

Verse 5. And Jehoshaphat said... Enquire, I pray thee, at the word of the Lord today. Ahab was content to proceed at the advice of his statesmen; Jehoshaphat would inquire of the Lord. Wise Christians seek God's counsel in all matters great and small. They take God with them into everything. If they cannot take Him with them they do not go!

Verses 6-7. In response to Jehoshaphat's request, Ahab summoned four hundred prophets who with one accord encouraged him to go against Syria. These men were not prophets of Baal, but were supposedly prophets of God, and therefore deserving of greater condemnation because of their lying counsel. Here is proof that unity and majority rule do not always indicate the truth or rightness of a proposed course of action. Christians and ministers in particular need to remember this lest, for the sake of peace they make compromises which are not at all the will of God.

Evidently Jehoshaphat questioned the veracity of these so-called prophets, for he asked for others. Though he evidently had already made up his mind to help Ahab, yet God did not leave him without attempting to check him. How wonderful it is that we may be guided of God; and how carefully we should follow that guidance! Those who sincerely want God's will and then definitely seek God's will, will not be deceived!

Verses 8-11. And the king of Israel said...
There is yet one man. What a tribute to this one prophet was the fact that Ahab did not class him with the false prophets! His name was Micaiah which meant, "Who is like Jehovah?" But I hate him; for he doth not prophesy good concerning me, but evil. Behold the perversity of the human heart! Quite often the reason for a dislike of another person is that that person has exposed some sin or touched a sore spot in our spiritual lives. We may count as enemies those who tell us the truth when, in reality, they are our friends.

And Zedekiah made horns of iron and said, Thus saith the Lord. Zedekiah and Micaiah—what a contrast! Not content to prophesy falsely by word

of mouth, Zedekiah does so by symbolic act as if to specially impress Ahab that his prophecy was of God.

Verses 12-14. Micaiah was sent for, was told of the predictions of the other prophets and advised to agree with them. Tradition tells us that Micaiah was in prison at this time because of his truthfulness and faithfulness to speak God's word on previous occasions. This tradition seems to be confirmed by the command to "carry him back" in verses 26, 27. Micaiah may have been bound, but God's Word was not. Persecution for righteousness' sake had not chilled his spiritual fervor nor abated his courage. "What the Lord saith unto me, that will I speak." Is this our attitude no matter how we may be tested?

Verses 15-16. How are we to interpret Micaiah's first answer to Ahab? Did he at first lose his courage and decide to give a false message? Never! He spoke in derision, irony, and sarcasm, which the king evidently recognized for he was not satisfied with the answer but urged Micaiah to tell the truth.

For the time will come when they will not endure the sound doctrine; but, having itching ears, will heap to themselves teachers after their own lusts; and will turn away their ears from the truth, and turn aside unto fables.

2 Tim. 4:3, 4, R. V.

Fine! A perfect likeness!

Verses 17-23. Urged by the king, Micaiah tells him what God had actually revealed. Again we face peculiar words. Are we to infer that God is ever the author of lies? Not at all. Micaiah simply sees behind the scene. Satan and his hosts do have access into God's presence. Compare Job 1:6-12; 2:1-7. Why is this? We do not know. Nor do we need to. Let us concern ourselves with what we may know. God permits Satanic imps to deceive Ahab. This is a glorious lesson for us. Even Satan and his emissaries cannot lift a finger apart from God's permission. God is absolute sovereign of the Universe. The rise and fall of nations is in His hands. (See Daniel 2:21; 4:35; Psalm 33:12, 16.) And "all things" do work together for good to them that love Him! Rom. 8:28.

Verses 24-28. For predicting the truth, Micaiah was insulted by Zedekiah and consigned again to prison by Ahab. But he would not recant. Instead, he stated that the fulfillment of his prophecy would prove its divine origin. Micaiah's conduct teaches us some practical lessons: (1) Be truthful! Col.

3:9. Be truthful when it means standing against the crowd. Be truthful in business relations, in social relations, in school, at play, in church, in all the spheres of life. It may cost us something as it did Micaiah, Jeremiah, John the Baptist, and Jesus! But it will pay eternal dividends! (2)

Don't follow the crowd! Micaiah refused to compromise his convictions though he was one against four hundred. Young people, today especially, are tempted to disregard the voice of conscience because "everybody else is doing it." Let us remember Christ's words to Peter when that disciple was concerned about the other fellow— "What is that to thee? follow thou Me." (3) "Preach the Word!" Here is a special admonition to preachers. Not only the unwise things or false things a preacher says will condemn him in the day of judgment but the truth of God that he did not speak!

Verses 29-38. It was strange that Jehoshaphat, after seeking Micaiah's counsel should still proceed with Ahab; it was stranger still—and nothing less than the overruling grace of God—that he did not share Ahab's fate!

The two kings advanced against the Syrian army. Ahab, subtly scheming to secure himself, disguised himself in the garb of a common soldier

and dressed Jehoshaphat in his own kingly apparel. We marvel at Jehoshaphat's stupidity in consenting to such an arrangement! Nevertheless God was not to be mocked. An arrow shot at random found the heart of Ahab. He reaped judgment for what he had sown and Micaiah was vindicated as a truthful and faithful prophet of the Lord!—J. Bashford Bishop.

SENSE OF SIN LACKING

"Some years ago," a minister reported, "I went around with an illustrated lecture on John Bunyan's great book, The Pilgrim's Progress. One day it occurred to me to look closer at the pack upon the pilgrim's back, when to my surprise I found it to be a nonetoo-large, red-colored sofa pillow. I compared that in my mind with the oldfashioned woodcuts in Pilgrim's Progress in the home of my boyhood days. There the pilgrim was portrayed as staggering beneath the load of a great and heavy burden; but on the modern slide that burden had dwindled down to a convenient sofa pillow. said to myself, Here is a good illustration of how the present-day generation has lost its conception of sin. The average man today is not bothered much with a sense of his sinfulness."-Jan Karel Van Baalen, in The Journey of Man.

THE WORD MADE FLESH

I want to tell you of something that happened last Friday afternoon. The Christian women came to my house that day for half an hour. They held out imploring hands to Christ, saying, "Make our black bodies shine for thee, Jesus our Chief. We are only black women. Thou art the great Chief of the white men, yet we too can love thee."

I tried to tell them that he was a brown baby,—not white like us or black like them; and that he was a helpless baby needing a mother's love and care; that thus he came to us, the great Chief.

One woman took her baby off her back, held him toward me, and said, "Small and weak like this? Did a woman bear him and feed him?" "Yes," I said. They clapped their hands and shouted their equivalent to "All hail, Baby Chief!" They had never realized all this before. "We thought he was a white woman's baby," said one, which simply meant that he was ours, not theirs.—A. H. Small in The Kingdom and the King.

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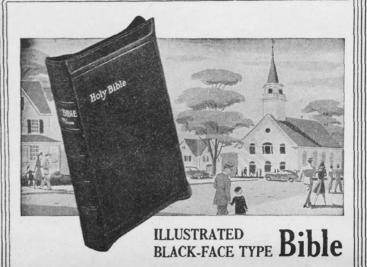
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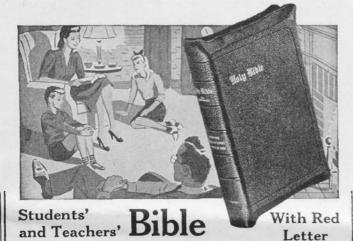
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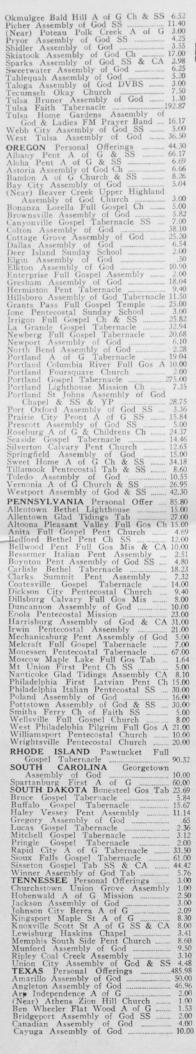
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
