■give thanks unio the Lord; for He is good: for His mercy endureth for ezer. Psalm 136:1.
For eighteen years I have proved the goodness of God in Africa. When I first sailed for the field, my mother was very much concerned about the things I should have to eat. She bought a notebook and got the different members of the church to write their favorite receipts. She began to test these various receipts and marked those she approved as "good." She then sent this book to me.
Years later, after my mother's death, I received the Bible she had used for years. Many of the verses were underlined and on the margin I found these words, "Proved, tested, found true." I prize Mother's Bible. and I prize my Heavenly Father's promises. They are good. I have proved them to be good. Against so many of His promises we can write our own, "Proved, tested, found truc."
It will soon be five years since the great ropes of the liner Bremen were cast off and the ship moved out of New York harbor. Behind us we left our son and daughter who had been born in Africa. We have been called on to enter new territory in the realm of consecration again and again, but never before were we called upon to make a sacrifice like that which we made when we left our children behind and sailed for Africa.

When we were three days at sea, the ship's newspaper carried an item about a man and four children being killed in an auto accident in Philadelphia. That was where we had left our children. The devil whispered. "Yes, you had every-

term. We were very tired, and a vacation had failed to bring us back to our usual vitality. The conviction we had grew with the passing months.

Before leaving the interior, some of the government officials laughed when we told them that we intended to fiy home. They told us of some of their officers who had waited a whole month for a plane without success, and finally went to South Africa by ship. They told us of several business men, well-placed financially, who had been waiting a long time for an opportunity to get seats. Not a soul gave us any encouragement. All were quite sure that we would have a very long wait.
We obtained permission to enter a certain military area to see the commanding officer of the Bomber Ferry Command of the United States Air Corps. It is he who must give the priority rating to all passengers. We had met him some months pre-
thing on the altar! Two of those children are yours, and two are your brother-inlaw's." When we docked, we immediately sent a cable from England telling of our safe arrival and asking how the children were. We didn't mention our fears, but both of us had been praying. The answer came back that all was well. Had it been otherwise, God would have given the necessary grace to bear the trial for His name's sake, but we thank Him because He took care of the children while we were in Africa.

A few months ago we felt a deep conviction in our souls that it was time to prepare to come home to America. We didn't mention it to one another at first, but gradually each of us learned of the conviction that was in the other's heart. The war had been going on nearly three years. Our term had been a strenuous one. We had already stayed long beyond the normal viously and found him to be a friendly elderly man and a Presbyterian. At that time he had told us that if we wanted to return to the United States by plane we should come to the Coast all prepared to go and he would try to arrange seats for us if and when they were available.
After greetings had been exchanged I said, "Major-. we are prepared to return to the United States at any time you may have opportunity." He replied, "Now it is too bad that you were not here yesterday for two planes left both of which had room for you. But wait a minute-" He phoned the operations room and talked quite awhile. then turning to us he said, "You are (Cont'd on Page 7)

# The World's Greatest Blackout

NOW from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour."
And, behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom ; and the earth did quake, and the rocks rent." Mathew $27: 45,51$.
Blackouts seem to be the order of the day. They are very common in Europe, and are becoming so in the Orient and in Australia, and the people of the United States and Canada are beginning to know something about them on the Pacific and Atlantic coasts. These blackouts seem to be typical of the spiritual darkness that has settled down on the entire earth because of the apostasy, the falling away.

There was once a great blackout in Egypt. When Pharaoh refused to let the children of Israel go, one of the plagues which God sent was a thick darkness which lasted for three days. The Scriptures say it was so dark that the Egyptians did not see one another for three days.
But the world's greatest blackout occurred at Calvary. When Jesus was born the night turned to day, but when He was crucified the day turned into darkest night! There was darkness over all the earth for three hours-from the sixth hour to the ninth hour.

God loved Abraham so much that He spared Abraham's son on Mount Moriah, but God loved you and me so much that He refused to spare His own Son on Mount Calvary.

Sometimes men on the way to the scaffold have been rescued by the mol, but it was not so at Calvary. All were against Him. Even God forsook Him, and He cried, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" Why? He was made sin, and a

holy God could have no fellowship with $\sin$. He tasted death in its fullest sense in that hour of absolute separation from His Father. But He gave us later the promise, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee."
If you do not avail yourself of the provision made for your salvation in the world's greatest blackout, you will have to spend eternity in outer darkness where there shall be weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth. But if you believe in what Jesus did there in the darkness of Calvary and accept Him as your Saviour you will go to the land where there is no night.

In the world's greatest blackout the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom. We read in the old Testament that first there was the tabernacle proper, then the heavy veil, and beyond it was the Holiest of All. The veil was so strongly woven that Josephus says it would have taken twenty yoke of oxen to tear it in two. The people were never permitted to go beyond it into the Holy of Holies. Only the High Priest could go beyond, and he only once a year and then with an offering of blood.

Can you picture the high priest performing his sacred duty? It comes time for him to go within the veil, and he steps forward, holding a basin of blood with one hand and drawing back the veil with the other. He goes in trembling lest the offering be refused and he be smitten dead, for he knows something of the wrath and fury of Godnot at the sinner, but at $\sin$.

Meanwhile the people had been waiting outside in suspense, wondering whether the high priest would return. This continued until Jesus provided the perfect Sacrifice with His own blood at Calvary. He became our High Priest and cried, "It is finished." When He died the veil that barred men from the Holiest was rent from top to bottom, signifying that God did it. Part of the veil went one way, and part went the other way, and the way was opened for all believers to enter right into the Holiest of all. And now all who trust Christ's atoning blood may come; not only the High Priest. "Whosoever will" accept His mercy may come into the very presence of God-great and small, rich and poor, white and colored, learned and illiterate. And they may come not just once a year, but in every time of need, at any time of the day or night. The way is always open, for the veil that barred our entrance was removed at the time of the world's greatest blackout.

In Matt. 27:20 we read of one of the classes represented at Calvary - "the chief priests and elders." They were guilty of two terrible things. First, they sought to destroy the life of Jesus. They persuaded the multitude that they should ask Barabbas, and destroy Jesus. That did not satisfy them, however. Later, they stood at the foot of the cross and mocked Jesus, saying, "He saved others; Himself He cannot save. If He be the King of Israel, let Him now come down from the cross, and we will
believe Him. He trusted in God; let Him deliver Him now, if He will have Him: for He said, I am the Son of God."

The people who cry "if" are not all dead yet. There are more in the world today than ever. Modernists are still trying to instill that doubt in the minds of the people. "If He be the Son of God." "If he be the King of Israel." Praise God, there is no "if" about it. He is the Son of God. He is the King of Israel. Those who will not admit it now will have to admit it one day, though then it will be too late. At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, "and every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Phil. 2:10, 11.

I am glad we belong to a company millions strong throughout the earth who still know that He is, and was, and always will be the Son of God. We still believe the Bible to be the inspired Word of God.
Some time ago in one of the large universities in the Eastern States they took a vote among the students of a certain class to determine who, among the great people of the past, was their favorite character. The votes were as follows: Napoleon 181; Cleopatra 7; Joan of Arc 7; Socrates 7; Jesus Christ 4. Napoleon had 181 votes, Jesus Christ had only 4! What is the matter with those students that they should vote that way? Better ask what is the matter with the professors who teach those students, and what is the matter with the ministers who preach to them on Sunday!

Talk about a robber who thrusts a gun in your side and robs you of your watch and money! He is not half as bad a criminal in God's sight as the modernist who robs men of their faith in Jesus Christ ! If it is going to be hotter in hell for some than for others, it is going to be hotter for these modernists. I would sooner take a highway robber's chances of getting into heaven than to take a modernist preacher's chances -the chances of one who destroys the faith of young people in the Word of God. Jesus said, "Whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea." Matt. 18:6.

Most adults will remember when Loeb and Leopold were tried for the murder of Bobby Franks. The parents of Loeb and Leopold called in the greatest criminal lawyer in America, Clarence Darrow, who used all his skill to save their lives. Although he was looked upon as an evolutionist and an agnostic, Darrow argued that Loeb and Leopold were not responsible for their awful deed since it was the direct result of what they had been taught by the professors. They had been taught that men were no better than animals, and so without realizing the seriousness of their crime they brutally murdered little Bobby Franks just for the thrill of it. If you teach that men are like beasts they will act as beasts.

The merry-making crowd also was at Calvary. "And when they had platted a crown of thorns, they put it upon His head, and a reed in His right hand: and they bowed the knee before Him, and mocked Him, saying, Hail, King of the Jews! And they spit upon Him, and took the reed, and smote Him on the head." Verses 29, 30. They were making merry! Instead of loving Jesus and worshiping Him, all they
thought about was having a little sport. They crowned Him and bowed before Him, but it was in mockery and not in worship. The crown was made of thorns, and when they put it on His head and smote Him they drove those thorns deeper into His precious head. What a place for frivolity!
"Don't you believe God wants us to have a good time?" someone asks. Yes, and the happiest people in the world are those who are saved. But I believe the Lord wants us to sympathize with others when they suffer, and I believe He wants our hearts to be moved at the remembrance of Calvary. What would you think if you went into a hospital where someone was struggling for life, and someone who was there started mocking and laughing? Only a person with a heart of stone could do that. And yet, when Jesus was suffering as no other has ever suffered, because in addition to plysical pain He was carrying the sins of the world, these merrymakers were joking and laughing and carrying on. The suffering of Jesus meant nothing to them.

I often wonder how so many, especially young people, can turn their back on the crucified Christ and go down the pathway of $\sin$-the great white way, the dance halls, the theaters, the taverns. They are set upon having a good time. I wonder if they are not as guilty as those merrymakers who placed the crown of thorns upon Jesus. Judlas sold his Lord for thirty pieces of silver. I hope none of you will sell Jesus for any of the cheap pleasures of this world.
There was also an indifferent crowd at the Cross. "They that passed by reviled Him, wagging their heads." Verse 39. This is a very common class today. Ask some people whether they are saved, and they answer, "No." Ask them if they are sinners, and they answer, "No." They are simply indifferent. They won't take their stand on either side. But actually, everyone is on one side or the other. Jesus said, "He that is not with Me is against Me ; and he that gathereth not with Me scattereth abroad." Matt. 12:30.

All you have to do to be lost is to do nothing. The current is carrying you on the downward way and if you allow it to continue you will be lost.

A young man is in a row boat on the river above Niagara Falls. He is drifting nearer and nearer to the falls, though he hasn't noticed it. Does he have to pull on the oars to be lost? No, all he has to do is to sit there in the boat and do nothing. The current is swift enough-it is growing swifter -and it will carry him over the falls to death. If you are one of the indifferent ones, God help you. The indifferent will be lost. "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?"

Friends on shore might see his plight and shout, "Pull for the shore. We will speed down the shore and throw you a rope at the last rock." If he were wise he would pull on those oars for all he was worth in the direction of that last rock. Friends would be there with a lifeline, and as it falls across his boat he would be wise to hold on with all his might and let the friends pull him to safety.

Perhaps you are one who has been indifferent, who has been drifting with the current so long that you are doomed to go over the falls into eternity without Christ.

We are your friends, standing on the last rock-the Rock of Ages - the only rock that can save you. We are trying to throw a lifeline to you. Before your frail craft goes too close to the falls, grab hold of the lifeline. Hold on, and we will pull you in as best we can, before it is too late.

There was another group present at the time of the world's greatest blackout. . They were the true friends of Jesus. "And many women were there beholding afar off, which followed Jesus from Galilee, ministering unto Him." Verse 55. These women were His friends. They had followed Him, ministering unto Him, because they loved Him. There wasn't much they could do, since His enemies were so numerous, but they did

what they could. They followed Him and let their love and sympathy flow out.

Sometimes today it seems the true friends of Jesus are not very strong in numbers in comparison to His enemies, but let us follow Jesus anyway.

Years ago out west a great prairie fire was raging, driven by tremendous winds. It was destroying barns, cattle, human lives, and anything in its path. The news was carried down the line to an isolated area where a farmer lived with his sons. When he got the news he called his boys and told them to burn all the dry grass around. They burned a great area surrounding their barns and buildings. Then the fire came, but it did not touch this farmer. Because the fire had passed over once already, he stood there and was safe. Others in the path of the fire had fled, some to the left and some to the right, but he stood where the fire had already burned and he was safe. That is what Calvary will mean to us in the future. The fire of God's wrath has already fallen upon His Son at Calvary. Will you take your stand there. and beljeve that Jesus bore the judgment due topyou that God poured out at Calvary? If you will, then in the day of judgment. when God's anger is being poured out on an ungodly world, it will not touch vou for you will be on ground where the fire has already burned.

Some years ago in the city of Chicago two young men happened to meet one night in a place of blackest $\sin$. One mentioned that he was a runaway. He had lived with his Christian parents in a little town, and had grown tired of their religion, and had decided to leave the dull little town and see the world. When the other boy heard that, he said he was there under identical circircumstances. His people too were religious; they prayed daily, read the Bible daily, and he had grown tired of it all and had determined to go away and see the world. So the two shook hands and agreed to be pals.

For two or three weeks longer they made the round of the places of $\sin$ in the underworld. Then they left Chicago traveling south. In every city they entered into places of vice. Finally they went to Texas and passed over into Mexico. In a gambling den in Mexico they were sitting at the table with some Mexican gamblers, when suddenly one of them thought the Mexican was trying to cheat and get the best of him. He arose, and swore. The Mexican whipped out a revolver and wounded him. "Pal, he got me," he said to his friend; "get me out of here. I'm afraid I'm dying. Not for the world would I want my Christian parents to know I died in a gambling den like this." So his chum picked him up and stumbled out into the open. He found a green spot and stretched him on the grass. He tried to make him comfortable but he was losing blood and his life was rapidly draining away.

In his last moments his thoughts were turning back to the Christian parents whom he had laughed at. "Pal, I wish my mother

## Southern Brazil Work Prospers

Beholding the vast unfinished task of the great harvest field, and realizing that laborers cannot be sent from the homeland, we have been concentrating our efforts of late on the better training of native workers. With the able assistance of our missionaries, O. S. Boyer and Virgil Smith, we conducted a Bible conference in our home the last two weeks in September. Eighteen students enrolled. comprising most of the native workers in the State of Santa Catarina. The course included a systematic study of Bible doctrine, synthesis, prophecy, dispensation, personal evangelism, homiletics and sight singing, in addition to several classes in Sunday School and young people's work. These studies are to be continued by correspondence course, supplemented with periodical Bible conferences. We feel that these efforts not only will make the workers better soul winners but also will promote indigenous development of the work so that it may go and prosper should we have to leave the field.

We are praising God that He is prospering the work in our state. During August we were called to visit Joinville to counsel with Brother Smith and assist in other ways in the new church building. When finished, this will be the largest evangelical church in the state and a spiritual center not only for that city but for the entire northern part of the state. Although the problems and difficulties are many because of the tremendous increase in prices, yet God is undertaking and blessing the sacrifices of the Brazilians here as well as of friends in the homeland.

We were called also to Blumenau where the number of saints is increasing and there is urgent need of a larger and better building. We were able to launch a special campaign for funds, trusting God to supply the means for the building.

While in Blumenau we met a number of new converts who impressed us by their happand fervent spirit. On inquiry we learned that they were from Tatutiva, a new outstation. Their story is quite interesting. A deacon from Blumenau visited these friends, testifying to them of Christ, as a result of which one family was saved. This family owned an ox which they, as well as their neighbors and relatives, used in plowing their little farms. Soon after the conversion of this family the ox became very sick. The new convert who had learned that God answerprayer knelt with his family around the sick ox in the presence of his neighbors, and, behold, the ox got up and was well. It made such an impression upon the neighbors and relatives that already about twenty of them have accepted the Lord.
Twenty-four more converts have followed the Lord in baptism, twelve at our outstation in Itajai on Sunday, September 20, and twelve here in Florianopolis the following Sundav

Thus the work is progressing in all sections, not without difficulties, but God enables us to surmount them. The gas rationing and recent continued blackouts made it necessary to conduct our main service in Florianopolis on Sunday afternoon.
To assist in transportation and enable us to get our preaching points, we bought a small sail boat which accommodates around sixty people; it is a great help and blessing in the work. Pray that God will enable us to use every avilable means to spread the gospel while yet there is time.

## Latest News From Mossiland

What a grand and glorious feeling it is to be back in a free country where one can write to friends, and best of all get an answer. We have been cut off from the rest of the world for so long that I am very happy indeed for this opportunity of fellowship with the great and blessed Pentecostal family through our faith-inspiring EVANGEL. For over two years we were deprived of the privilege of reading the EVANGEL, and I can truly say that deprivation makes for beter appreciation of the many blessings God has bestowed upon us.
First of all we want to thank the Lord for a safe journey home. We have taken eight ocean voyages, but this was the most pleasant of them all. As we embarked, the Lord gave
me the scripture, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee." There were many things to distract, but as I asked the Lord to help me keep my mind stayed on Him, He impressed me to give diligence to His Word. So, while others were busy following various pastimes, I set myself to the reading of the Bible, and in three weeks' time read it from cover to cover. Each day we met with the other missionary passengers for worship, while on Sundays some of the crew were allowed to gather with us for a little service.
We know of seven different times that the Lord delivered us from the "terror by night,"
as the submarine has come to be known. It would be interesting to know how many other times we were delivered from unknown dangers. In the convoy that we should have joined, three ships were sunk. The ship that followed us, on which we very nearly took passage, went down. God timed our arrival at a certain port, for the following day three ships were sunk in the waters through which we had come. Who can say that God was not in all this, answering the prayers of His saints, leading us by His own hand through the submarine net that was drawn so closely around us? God's wonderful protection and His marvelous goodness have humbled us, as with weeping before Him we confess our unworthiness. May God help us that we may not $\sin$ against Him, or against His servants, by failing to pray for them when they too are in need.

## What Has Been the Effect of the War on the Missionary Program?

In answering that question, which no doubt is in the minds of many of our people, we want to look first of all at the economical situation. Some colonies in Africa are rich in natural resources and agricultural products which are in sufficient abundance for export trade, but that is not the case with the Upper Ivory Coast, the home of the Mossi people. Recurring crop failures because of frequent droughts, attacks of locusts, too much rain and rain at the wrong time, general poverty of the soil-all tend to make poverty and famine conditions the normal state of things in Mossi land. Add to that the high cost of transportation (our closest port is 850 miles away), very low wages, forced labor without pay, and you will see that these combine to make for an extremely low scale of living. This year the most severe famine conditions that we have witnessed in our sixteen years of missionary work prevail; and
this is true, not only in Mossi land, but is general throughout West Africa.

## No Foreign Products

From the beginning of the war most commodities were rationed, but the supply long ago became exhausted, so that today practically no foreign products are to be found in the colonies. For over two years we have had no gasoline. Even the merchants are allowed only enough to get their engines started, as they all have to use the "gasogene," which is an installation for making gas from charcoal. A white woman is rationed six yards of material a year to dress herself, but actually there is no material available except a little muslin. No cooking oil is to be had apart from peanut oil which is very hard to digest. Babies, young children, and those who have to pay particular attention to their diet are especially affected. To make things still worse, there are thousands of refugees coming into this famine-stricken country from France.
Another difficulty faced by both the natives and Europeans is the money situation. For several years there has been a shortage of small coins to make change, and the condition has grown steadily worse until now a fivefranc bill is worth only one franc, or perhaps one and a half if it is a new bill. The govtion.

## Missionaries Carry On, But at Great Sacrifice

What has been the effect of these conditions, and what are they likely to have on the spiritual end of things? That to us is the important question. It must be apparent to everyone who gives serious thought to the situation that our missionarics are able to carry on only at great sacrifice, and on a greatly reduced scale. One big problem is the restriction of travel. Some of our larger works are in outlying districts, a considerable distance from the main mission stations. These works were established and have been cared for by frequent visits from the missionaries with the aid of automobiles. In addition, four of the main stations now are vacant and must be taken care of by the remaining missionaries.
Most of those now on the field are due for furlough-tired in body, their health undermined through lack of proper foods. Unable to obtain gasoline, they must make these long trips by bicycle under a tropical sun. Consider these things, and you will understand something of the difficulties. The majority have small children who are likely to suffer first from a lack in the diet.

## "Occupy

When the war first started, we were still awaiting an answer to our request for a concession on which to start our Bible School. As soon as the necessary permission was granted, we commenced building. Some were in favor of halting operations for the duration of the war, but the Lord held before us the words of Jesus, "Occupy until I come." How glad we are today that we went right ahead with the building. To do this in such troublous times seemed almost an impossible task, and it practically drained every ounce of our strength; but God was with us to help and strengthen, making the impossible possible through believing prayer and perseverance. If you could
have seen the happy but road-weary students gathering in from all the different stations, many bringing wives and small children and as much of their earthly possessions as they could carry distances ranging from a few to two hundred miles-yes, if you could sit in a class or two and see how hungrily they drink in the Word and how eager they are to learn, you would say that no better investment could be made of money, time or energy-and you would pray more, and give more, and rejoice more.
The Bible School has been made possible only through the work that previously has been done in translating Scriptures, Sunday School lessons, Bible studies and other material, and in teaching the Christians to read. Right now a serious handicap is being faced in the shortage of Scripture portions and other printed material. We are at present proofreading the four revised Gospels before they are printed by the American Bible Society and are praying that the Lord will open some way for us to get them to the field.
The Lord continues to bless the station and outstation work, and reports of souls saved and believers baptized in the Holy Spirit are frequent. How thankful we are that from the beginning we have sought to establish the church in such a way that the Mossi Christians could carry right on if the missionaries should have to leave.

## "But Moses' Hands Were Heavy"

Surely the hands of the missionaries are heavy, not only in Mossi land, but all over the world. Some are in concentration camps, some perhaps in prison, some weary to the point of breaking, some lacking proper food and clothing - but all willing to sacrifice to the last that the gospel might continue to go forth. "And they took a stone and put it under him and he sat thereon, and Aaron and Hur stayed up his hands, the one on the one side and the other on the other side: and his hands were steady." Thank God for the ROCK Christ Jesus on which we can rest in perfect confidence. And thank God for the Aarons and the Hurs on the one side and on the other side holding up the hands of the missionaries that their hands may be steady. If the missionaries ever needed to be upheld it is now! Now! NOW! If with all the blessings and privileges we have in America (and I am afraid they are more than some fully appreciate), we sometimes feel discouraged and need help and prayer, how much more the missionaries. Let us not allow the rush and the press of other things to dim our missionary vision. NOW is the time we need to pray more than ever before. NOW is the time we need to give more than ever before. Costs of living have increased some in America, but what about the rest of the world? In most countries the barest necessities of life are almost out of reach of the common people. On our field, labor has increased 200 per cent and still one cannot get sufficient. All prices, and most of the time foreign products are not to be had at any price. Cost of transportation has increased 100 per cent, in some cases even more than that. Never before has there been such a drain on the Missions Department.
We need to pray and to give that the present needs may be met. We need to pray NOW and to give NOW, while we can, that FUTURE needs may be taken care of. Should the Lord tarry, I expect to see a mighty army of missionaries going forth to their old fields, and many to new fields, after this war is over. I believe a big revival of missions is ahead of us. We need to be prepared for it, and the way to be prepared for it, and the way to be prepared is to pray and give NOW. In the supreme effort to create materials, let us not lose sight of SPIRITUAL VALUES.

## The Shadow of the Cross

An artist once drew a picture of Christ as a little child, with His arms outstreached, running to His mother, and behind Him was the shadow of a cross. In a real sense the shadow of the cross was over His earthly life from the beginning to the end. The knowledge of the fact that He was to be crucified did not come to Him as a surprise near the end of His life, but it was known to Him from the beginning. He was "the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." He knew why He came into this world.

The knowledge of His crucifixion was seen in His messages continually. It was seen in some of His parables. In the parable of the Good Shepherd He said, "The Good Shepherd giveth His life for the sheep." "I lay down My life for the sheep." In the parable of the wheat grain He said, "Except a corn (grain) of wheat fall into the ground and die it abideth alone, but if it die it bringeth forth much fruit." He was referring to Himself. In the parable of the wicked husbandmen, "Last of all He sent unto them His Son, saying. They will reverence My Son. But the husbandmen said, This is the heir. Come. let us kill Him. . . . And they caught Him. and cast Him out of the vineyard and slew Him."

The knowledge of His crucifixion was seen in His discourses. He spoke of being lifted up. "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up." "When ye have lifted up the Son of man then ye shall know that I am He." "And I, if I be lifterl up from the earth, will draw all men unto Me." This He said signifying what death He should die.
Prophecies concerning His cruifixion were made by others. Simeon to Mary, "A sword shall pierce through thy own soul" -no doubt referring to the crucifixion which she witnessed. Caiaphas, being High Priest that same year, said unto them. "Ye know nothing at all, nor consider, that it is expedient for us that one man should die for the people, and that the whole nation perish not. And this spake he, not of himself, but being High Priest that year he prophesied that Jesus should die for that nation."

Jesus. Himself, prophesied of events connected with His crucifixion. He predicted that Judas would betray Him. "Jesus knew from the beginning . . . who should betray Him." "Have not I chosen you twelve and one of you is a devil?" He spoke of Judas Iscariot, for it was he who should betray Him. "And as they did eat, He said, One of you shall betray Me." "He that dippeth his hand with Me in the dish the same shall betray Me." Then Judas said, "Master, is it I?" He said unto him, "Thou hast said" Jesus predicted that He would be forsaken by His disciples. "Ye shall be scattered, every one to his own, and shall leave

Me alone." "All ye shall be offended because of Me this night, for it is written, I will smite the Shepherd, and the sheep shall be scattered."
He predicted His crucifixion. "From that time forth Jesus began to show unto His disciples that He must go unto Jerusalem, and suffer many things of the elders, and chief priests, and scribes, and be killed, and be raised again the third day." "And while they abode in Galilee, Jesus said unto them, The Son of man shall be betrayed into the hands of men, and they shall kill Him, and the third day He shall be raised up." "Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and the Son of man shall be betrayed unto the chief priests and unto the scribes, and they shall condemn Him to death, and shall deliver Him to the Gentiles to mock and to scourge and to crucify Him, and the third day He shall be raised again." "Ye know that after two days is the Feast of the Passover, and the Son of man is betrayed to be crucified." These references are all from Matthew's, Gospel, and show the frequency with which Jesus spoke of this event. He predicted also that He should be numbered with the transgressors. "For I say unto you that this that is written must yet be accomplished in Me , And He was reckoned among the trangressors."
His knowledge of His crucifixion was seen in His words on every occasion. When He cleansed the Temple, no doubt He pointed to His body as He said, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." He spoke of the temple of His body. James and John had a great and selfish ambition to be on Christ's right hand and left hand in His new kingdom. Jesus said, "Whoever will be chief among you let him be your servant, even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many." When He was transfigured "there talked with Him two

men, which were Moses and Elijah, . . . and spake of His decease which He should accomplish at Jerusalem." As they came down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, saying, "Tell the vision to no man until the Son of man be risen from the dead." When Jesus was anointed in Bethany some complained of the waste of the costly ointment. Jesus said, "In that she hath poured this ointment on My body she did it for My burial."

His knowledge of His crucifixion was seen in His steadfast purpose to fulfill His mission. When He was a boy of twelve He said to Mary, "Wist ye not that I must be about My Father's business?" As an adult His fearlessness and determination were impressive. He had been in seclusion for awhile east of the Jordan. He said to His disciples, "Let us go into, Judea again." His disciples said unto Him, "Master, the Jews of late sought to stone Thee, and goest Thou thither again?" Then He said to the twelve, "Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and all things that are written by the prophets concerning the Son of man shall be accomplished." "And as they were in the way going up to Jerusalem, Jesus went before them and they were amazed." Why ? Because of His majestic bearing, and His fearlessness in going up to Jerusalem when He knew that it meant being put to death by His enemies. He did not shun the cross. While in Gethsemane He said to His disciples, "Thinkest thou that I cannot now pray to My Father, and He shall presently give Me more than twelve legions of angels? But how then shall the Scriptures be fulfilled that thus it must be?
Jesus was tempted several times to escape the cross. The first temptation was by Satan in the wilderness. "The devil showed Him all the kingdoms of the world, and the glory of them, and saith unto Hin;, All these things will I give Thee if Thou wilt fall down and worship me." Jesus refused to take any short cut to the kingdom, but determined to go by the way of the cross. Another temptation came from Peter. When Jesus made His first prediction that He would be delivered up to be crucified, Peter took Him, and began to rebuke Him, saying, "Be it far from Thee, Lord. This shall not be unto Thee." Jesus said to Peter, "Get thee behind Me. Satan." He was not concerned with who was speaking, but what was spoken, and this was the voice of Satan tempting Him to escape the cross.
Now let us consider Christ's enemies. They were of various groups. The evil authorities were against Him. They were Herod the Great, during Christ's infancy. Herod the king, during His ministry, and Pilate the Governor. The religious leaders, the scribes, Pharisees and Sadducees, were against Him. Some of His supposed friends were against Him. "And when His friends heard of it they went out to lay hands on Him, for they said, He is beside Himself." His ozen brethren did not believe on Him. Two of His disciples did the work of enemies, Peter telling Christ to escape the cross, and denying Him, and Judas who betrayed Christ into the hands of those who sought His life.

In studying the attitude of His enemies we see nothing but the bitterest opposition. They accused Him of being a blasphemer because He said that He could forgive sins. When the man sick of the palsy was brought to Jesus, He said, "Son, be of good cheer Thy sins be forgiven thee." Certain of the scribes said within themselves, "This man blasphemeth. Who can forgive sins but God only?" They accused Him of blasphemy because He said that He was the Son of God. "The High Priest said unto Jesus, I adjure Thee by the living God that Thou tell us whether Thou be the Christ, the Son of God. Jesus answered, Thou hast said. The High Priest rent his clothes, saying He hath spoken blasphemy. What further need have we of witness? Behold now ye have heard His blasphemy.'

They accused Him of being a Sabbath breaker. Five miracles of healing occurred on the Sabbath day-the man with the withered hand, the woman bowed together, the man with dropsy, the man at the pool of Bethesda, and the man born blind. In connection with these healings we find such statements as, "They watched Him whether He would heal on the Sabbath day, that they might accuse Him." "Therefore did the Jews persecute Jesus, and sought to slay Him, because He had done these things on the Sabbath day."

They accused Him of being in league with Satan. "This fellow doth not cast out devils but by Beelzebub the prince of the devils." They accused Him of being false, but they themselves made false reports concerning Him. They said, "He deceives the people." "He stires up the people." "He perverts the nation." "He forbids to give tribute to Caesar." "We heard Him say I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and within three days I will build another made without hands."
They characterized Him as a demonpossessed man. "Thou hast a devil, who goeth about to kill Thee?" "Say we not well that Thou art a Samaritan, and hast a devil?" "Now we know that Thou hast a devil." They characterized Him as insane. "He is beside Himself." "He hath a devil and is mad." They characterizel Him as a sinner. "We know that this man is a sinner." They characterized Him as a malefactor. "The Jews said to Pilate, If this man were not a malefactor we would not have delivered Him up to thee."

Their attitude of mind toward Jesus was one of continual hatred. "They hated Me without a cause." But if we could assign a cause for their hatred we should say it was His fearless preaching. "And all they in the synagogue, when they heard these things, were filled with wrath." "An! the Pharisees, which were covetous, heard all these things, and they derided Him." "And the chief priests and scribes souglt to lay hold on Him, . . . for they perceived that He had spoken this of them."

His fearless condemnation of $\sin$ caused hatred. Jesus was no respecter of persons. He cared not where He was or who was before Him. He condemnend $\sin$ wherever He found it. That fearful condemnation, eight times repeated, "Woe unto you scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites" and mixed in were such expressions as, "Ye fools and
blind," "Ye serpents, ye generation of vipers," "Ye whited sepulchres," were uttered at the table of a Pharisee who had invited Him to dinner. He said also, "'This world hates Me because I testify of it that its works are evil." On their part the hatred was due to envy. "Pilate knew that for envy the Jews had delivered Him up."

This attitude of mind, the fault finding. accusing Him of various things, characterizing Him as an evil man, trying to ensnare Him in His talk, and hatred, could have but one ending and that was His death When He was in Gethsemane Judas betrayed Him to the multitude. They arrested Him, and led Him away to Caiaphas, the High Priest, where the scribes and elders were assembled. Then followed the trial before Pilate, which was the greatest mock trial this world has ever known. A judge, who spent much time investigating the trial from a legal standpoint, said there was not a single point of Jewish law or Roman law that was observed in the trial. Following this came the mockery, putting on Him the purple robe, the sign of royalty; giving Him a reed, as a scepter, and giving Him a crown of thorns, for a King has a crown. They heaped indignity on Him. blindfolding Him, and buffeting Him with their fists, spitting in His face, and plucking out His beard. While this letter is not recorded in the Gospels, it was prophesied of Him, and Jesus said, "All things written concerning Me have fulfillment." Thers, after the scourging, they led Him out to crucify Him. This crucifixion was what He came in the world for, "Who, His own self, bare our sins in His body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness." Thank God for the sacrifice of Christ on the cross, and for the salvation which it purchased for us.

## How We Flew Home From Africa (Continued From Page One)

flying tomorrow morning at $4: 55$." We had not expected anything like this and we were left speechless for awhile. We thanked him as graciously as possible. He saw us out of the Administration building and the last word he said was, "Mrs. Shirer, you know that this is the providence of God."
It was nearly noon when we left the airport and we had many things to attend to before evening. In Africa a person cannot go or come as he pleases. There are several permits to obtain: a permit to leave the country, another one which permits you to return, still another to enter the airport on the day of take-off ; permits to cover any financial transactions and a final checkup by the police. One's passport must be certified by the American Consul as belonging to the holder. Baggage had to be weighed; and we had been warned not to have any overweight, for if we did it would cost us $\$ 15.75$ per pound. We had none; I assure you.

When I arrived at our host's house I asked him when the bank closed. He looked at his watch and said, "Very soon, and it will not open again until tomorrow morning." I asked for the loan of his car and driver and hurried to the bank. The doors were closed just as I entered. The tellers were all making up their accounts
and their windows were closed. I went to the Manager who took care of all my business. I was just in time. Another minute of delay would have meant that we should not have been able to get the next day's plane.
At the airport the officials told us that we would have to present a yellow fever inoculation certificate. It happened-and yet it was not chance, but it was the Lord's arrangement-that we had been inoculated some months before by the military doctor. But being civilians we were not given a certificate. We tried to telephone to the doctor, but the lines were down. Then we sent a priority telegram to a civilian doctor friend of ours who saw the military doctor who confirmed the fact that we had been innoculated. This information was then wired back to a doctor friend who issued the necessary certificate to us just a few hours before we were to leave.
Late that evening we had done everything necessary. We went to bed-but not to sleep. A friend let me have his alarm clock but it was not needed. Some folks have asked us if we were not afraid. No, we were not afraid but I must admit that we did have a lot of suppressed excitement. Breakfast was served us at three A. M. for we had to be at the airport by four. When we arrived, two great twin-engined army transports were being made ready for the journey. After climbing up into the plane the steps were wheeled away, the door was closed; we had crossed our Rubicon. We took our seats, strapped ourselves in for the take-off and then took time to look around. The pme was stripped of all nonessentials. There were metal benches hinged to each side of the cabin, each accommodating fourteen passengers. There were no backs or upholstering to these seats. In a separate compartment forward were the crew, the pilot, co-pilot and navigator who also was the radio operator. Our fellow-passengers were all military men or pilots returning from delivering their precious planes to the fighting fronts of Egypt, Russia and elsewhere. My wife was the only woman. We sat shoulder to shoulder facing those on the opposite side of the plane. The great motors roared as we sped for the take-off and soon we were circling over the town. Far below us the fires of compounds could be seen. The women were stirring and getting the breakfasts ready.

Out over the Atlantic we flew so as not to fly over the Vichy French colonies which in these days are little less than hostile territory. At ten thousand feet we were surprised to find it so cold. In the tropics I thought it should have been warmer but it was so cold that we could see our breath as in winter time here at home. Another surprise we had was the smoothness with which the plane traveled through the air. I had expected to be tossed about. As soon as we were well up I noticed the other passengers unbuckling the straps which held them to their seats. We followed suit. We were able to walk about and look out the various windows. Far, far away was the African coast while directly below us was the tossing Atlantic.

About eleven o'clock the pilot came back and asked everyone to replace the straps as we were entering a storm area. At the
same time he passed out the lunches which were done up in individual boxes. Each article in the lunch was wrapped in celophane. I took a bite of a most delicious looking turkey sandwich. At that moment the plane reached the storm and it was like a feather in the air being tossed about. Sometimes it would drop suddenly like an express elevator and then dart upwards again. My bite of turkey sandwich got as far as my Adam's apple where it met my three o'clock breakfast coming up. I had to unbuckle myself in a hurry and get to the little room at the rear. You imagine the rest!

We came down in a certain place and took on a ton and a half of rubber and then went on to another base which was just being built. On the plane with us were men who were going to survey and put a road through the swamp from this land base to the clipper base two miles away. It was raining when we landed and the field was covered with water. A surveyor led the way for us through the swamp and we tramped through the water after him. By the time we reached the camp the rain from above and the swamp water had succeeded in thoroughly soaking us.

This camp is still in the process of construction. We had lunch in our wet clothes and were then shown the room we were to occupy while waiting for the clipper. Carpenters, electricians, plumbers and painters were still working in the building. A room had been cleared for us and two beds set up. Since our suitcases had not yet come we took off our wet clothing and got in between the blankets. Late in the afternoon when the rain had slackened, carriers brought our suitcases so we were able to get into dry clothing.

Right here I would like to pay tribute to the groups of Americans-engineers, surveyors, builders and others, we met in various parts of Africa. Many of them are working eighty hours a week erecting the many buildings needed at these places. Everywhere we found that they were doing their jobs well. Some Pentecostal men from Texas were at one of the bases. May God bless every boy that is far from his mother's home, as he labors in these faroff places. They need prayer. They have no spiritual help. The temptations are almost too great to bear. We need to back up the Gospel Publishing House in their work of distributing Reveille. All the men and troops to whom I gave Reveille in Africa were most grateful. They are far from the influences of Christian civilization that protect and help.

During the afternoon some clippers came in. The following day we were able to see a lot of the work that was going on, and our admiration for our Americans abroad increased. In the evening we left on the last clipper. About four in the morning the Captain came down to have a cup of coffee. I joined him and for a long time we talked about African problems and the white man's obligations. We discussed the orection of whether the white man's penetration of Africa has been good or not. Finally he asked if I should like to look over the plane and see the sun rise over the Atlantic. I told him that I should be delighted. We climbed the stairs to the operational deck.

In a room near the rear was a metal ladder which led up into a large blister in the top of the ship. In this blister you are head and shoulders above the top part of the plane. As I looked out I could see the horizon on all sides. There were fleecy clouds above and below. In the far east the sky changed from dark gray to light gray, shafts of light shot up into the clouds which turned golden. Finally the sun appeared. What a sight it was! Clouds above, clouds below and through breaks in the clouds the broad Atlantic, while in the east the sun was appearing. It all thrilled my soul. I thought of the words of the Psalmist, "The neavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament showeth His handiwork." Some day, when Jesus returns, I shall ascend higher than I was that day and shall see greater glories! What a joy it will be when we join our Lord in the air and see the glories of heaven!

We came down at a point where we waited another day and a half before taking off in another large transport plane. We made a short trip of six or eight hundred miles that afternoon and spent the night at another base. The following morning we took off at five o'clock and flew all day until eleven at night when we landed in the good old United States. Naturally we were tired after sitting in those hard, backless seats all day. We planned to remain at this town over night and land at Philadelphia rested. We went to the desk to see if we could get seats the following day. The man at the desk laughed and said that all seats in day planes were booked for some time ahead, "But," he said, "there are two seats in a plane leaving in an hour's time." "We will take them," we both said in one voice without consulting one another.

During the hour we had at this place we were able to clean up and change our clothing. We also sent a telegram to my wife's sister advising her that we should be arriving in Philadelphia at $7: 40$ a. m . Our children learned we were in the United States just one hour and a half before they met us at the airport. Our reunion with our children was a sacred time to us ail-too sacred to try and describe. None of us could talk then and I don't care to talk about it now. The policeman standing on guard near by witnessed our meeting. He grinned from ear to ear and at the same time tears were flowing over his cheeks. The next day our children took us through the streets of the little town where they have lived the past five years so that we could meet their boy and girl friends, and to show these friends that they really had a daddy and mamma.

We left our field of labor on a Wednesday morning and we were in Philadelphia on the following Monday morning. Seven thousand five hundred miles had been covered during this time, but the actual flying time was only fifty hours.

We left our district work in charge of a fine African who speaks four languages. At a testimony service at our farewell he said, "When I was saved some things troubled me. I read where Paul wrote to his son Timothy and again to his son Titus. I couldn't understand this, as I knew Paul was not married. I prayed and the Lord showed me that Paul was their spiritual father. I
praise the Lord for revealing this little truth to me." Then turning to us he said, "Brother and Sister Shirer, we know you have a son and a daughter in America, and we don't begrudge you your furlough so that you may see them; but you have many sons and daughters, spiritual ones, in Africa and you must come back to us again."

We are full of grateful thanks to God for His mercy. The Official Board of our home church, Highway Mission Tabernacle, was afraid to tell us to come home by steamer, lest we be torpedoed. They were afraid to tell us to come home by plane for it might be shot down. They put the responsibility of the choice upon us, and God led. Praise His name!

While we were grounded at one African airport I took shelter in a grass building which was filled with air express for places all over the world. Pilots were seated in this shelter and discussing various matters. Some bombers being ferried to the fighting fronts were due in. One was circling overhead but could not find his way in, due to the storm and poor visibility. The pilots were greatly concerned. More than one said, "He can't stay up there forever; his gas will run out." There was anxiety written on their faces. I could sense that the whole atmosphere in that shelter was tense. Suddenly through a break in the clouds the great plane swooped down to a perfect landing. "Boy, he must be glad to be down!" the pilots exclaimed. But I could see that they, too, were glad that he was down safely. It was much the same with us. We were glad and thankful to land safely. "O give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good, and His mercy endureth for ever."

Editor's Note-Brother and Sister Shirer sent their trunk home by steamer. Notice has come to them from the steamship company that the boat and its cargo are a total loss. Had they traveled by this boat instead of by plane, we might have had to print an obituary notice instead of this testimony.

were here to pray and read the Bible to me," he said. "I'm afraid I'm dying. Everything is so dark. I am afraid. If Mother were here she could tell me one of those verses in the Bible that she used to read to me when I was alone. You have said your mother used to read the Bible to you, too. Can you help me, Pal? Can you remember one verse that your mother used to say ?"

His chum wasn't a Christian but he remembered his mother's favorite text. It was John $3: 16$. He leaned over and started quoting it. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." The dying boy drank in every word as water to one dying of thirst, and he said, "I remember that. My mother used to tell me the same words. O God, I believe it. I believe it, and I receive it. I believe that Jesus died on the Cross for even me. Pal, if Mother
were only here she could sing one of those old songs again. Oh, if only she were here! But maybe you can remember one of your mother's favorite songs."

The other boy wasn't much of a singer, but he remembered his mother's favorite hymn, and leaning over he began to sing, softly :

Rock of Ages, cleft for me,
Let me hide myself in Thee;
Let the water and the blood
From Thy wounded side which flowed,
Be of $\sin$ the double cure:
Save me from its guilt and power.
Just as he finished, the dying boy made an effort to look up. He opened his eyes wide and said, "Pal, I've got it! At last I've got it. I've got it at last. I've got a hold on Mother's Cross." And with those words his lips were sealed, his eyes were closed, and he fell back. He was gone. Just in time he found the way of the Cross, that leads home to God.

Remember that Jesus suffered for you during the world's greatest blackout, when darkness was over the land for three hours. He died on the Cross in punishment for your sins. He carried our sins down to the grave. But He is risen, and having purged our sins, He is seated at the right hand of God. We can now have boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus. Then let us draw near with a true heart, in full assurance of faith. There in the presence of God there will be no more blackout, no more night, no need of candle, for the whole eternal city to which He bids us come is full of the radiance of the glory of God, and "the Lamb is the light thereof."

## Good Counsel to Preachers

As a man, you will learn obedience by the things that you may suffer for Christ's sake. Sometimes you will be tempted to wonder, "Are preachers people?" Insist that your people respect you as a man by being a man that they can respect. You will receive many rebuffs that might cut a more sensitive soul than you have any right to be. You will be tempted as no other living man is tempted. Trials may embitter you and render you useless and ineffective when God only meant them to refine and mellow. Discouragement will be your chief temptation, and rather than yield to it, you may over-compensate by holding on when comnon sense indicates a revision.

Watch against flattery and self-pity, and cultivate the saving virture of a sense of humor that will keep you from taking yourself too seriously. Covetousness is not uncommon among us. Remember, your bread and your water are sure, and your cloak and your parchments are your only wealth. As a man of God, congregations and communities ask much of you. You should be prepared to meet all expectations and "Show the courage of a lion, the meekness of a lamb, the industry of an ant, the patience of Job, the humility of a worm, the thick skin of an elephant, and the appetite of a canary."-R. D. Kilgour in Alliance Weekly.

## Our Servicemen

We are receiving many encouraging letters from those who are working among the service men. A post chaplain writes from Massachusetts: "The copies of Reveille are arriving at the post regularly , thanks to your company, and are being distributed. Soldiers are actually hungering for the real gospel. I find they flock to the services which I hold on the post, filling all seats. Have seen whole audiences in tears as the Spirit of God worked in their midst; have had men come Sunday after Sunday to my office after the service, to kneel and confess their sins and their faith in Christ as their Saviour."
W. A. McCann, pastor at the assembly at Abilene, Texas, writes of the work they are doing among the soldiers stationed at Camp Barkeley: "We have numbers of soldiers that attend the services here regularly. It is not uncommon to have from 140 to 150 as a total count for the four services on Sunday. To create an added incentive for them to come, we have not only organized a soldiers' class but have equipped the church with a writing room, furnishing stationery and all needed materials. We also have a well-rounded-out library with a good line of Christian books, which is open day and night for their convenience. We have been enabled to reach numbers that otherwise would not have gone to any church. The joy comes when we see them kneeling and accepting Christ as their Saviour."
Pastor J. B. Woolums of Johnson City, Tenn., in sending an order for 1,000 Reveilles, says: "We have a great opportunity here for getting the gospel out. There are several trains that stop in Johnson City daily with many soldiers aboard. I boarded one yesterday evening and gave out all the Reveilles that I had on hand. These were received with gladness.
"We accepted the pastorate here seventeen weeks ago, and since that time we have distributed an estimated 14,000 tracts, Evangels, Reveilles, etc. I was greatly touched by the article on the front page of our October 17th issue of the Evangel, entitled 'A Challenge.' Our church is small and our young people are few, but we have set a goal to supply at least 100 New Testaments for the Merchant Marines.
"I have a suggestion. It is that every ordained minister of our organization who is able, should contribute one dollar toward the need of supplying men in the Armed Forces with New Testaments. I am acting on this suggestion today and enclosing an offering of $\$ 1.00$."

A chaplain writes from Maine: "Your paper, Reveille, is the finest of the wheat, the best

that I have seen and read. I do not know how many we can use here, but I know of a certainty that 500 can be used easily as a beginning. It may be that we shall find that this number is not nearly sufficient. Remember the chaplains in their great and difficult ministry. I solicit your prayerful intercession."
We have recently completed printing 600,000 copies of the fifth issue of Reveille. We have been mailing these out free to a large number of chaplains, some of whom ask for 5,000 copies and others as many as 10,000 copies. They are being sent free to chaplains in every part of the world where U. S. forces are located. We have also printed an extra edition of 15,000 copies with the British flag on for distribution among the British forces in Canada and other parts of the world.

The cost of printing and mailing this edition of Reveille is approximately $\$ 4,500.00$. Our Home Missions Department would greatly appreciate receiving offerings to defray this expense, for funds have not been coming in well of late for this ministry. But we are sure that the Lord wants us to continue it, and we are already beginning to prepare copy and cuts for Reveille No. 6.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

## Whole Bible Sunday School Course

## Eternal Punishment

Lesson for December 13. Lesson Text: Revelation 20.
Why have a Sunday school lesson on such an unpleasant subject as Eternal Punishment? Perhaps the following story will answer the question :
Brother W. F. P. Burton, pioneer English Pentecostal missionary to Congo, relates that one night while asleep in his tent in a native village, he was awakened by the howling of many dogs outside the tent. He arose, went out into the night and tried in vain to chase the dogs away and silence them. Returning to his bed in the tent he lay for hours listening to the barking of the dogs. Next morning he asked the natives the reason for the disturbance. "Lions," they replied, pointing to great paw marks in the dust. Our dogs always warn us when lions are about. Look! Two of them stood just outside your tent." Writes Brother Burton, "Thr dogs had done their best to warn us, and like a fool I had tried to stop their howls."
Jesus preached "love and grace but He also preached "hell." Se Matt. $10: 28 ; 25: 41,46 ; 23: 33$; Mark $2: 29 ; 9: 44$. Shall we do less?
If men are even now suffering the agonies of eternal damnation ought we not to warn living me: of the fact?
But someone will say, "I do not believe in attempting to scare people into accepting the gospel." How utterly ridiculous! If you found that the only way you could prevent you child from playing on the edge of precipice would be to instill in hi heart a fear of that precipice, wout you not do so?
Ask any ordinary congregation o people how many of them sought salvation, at least to some extent because of fear of eternal punish. ment, and you will find that about ninety per cent of them will raise their hands (if they are honest with themselves)! If there are people who will not come to Christ unless the are scared into coming, then for His sake, let us scare them!

A deacon of a certain denom-
inational church remarked to a visiting minister after he had preached on the subject of hell, "It is the first time we have had a sermon like that for eleven years. We don't preach hell today. Nobody believes in it." The minister asked how long it had been since souls had been saved in that church. "Eleven years," was the reply. Said the minister, "That is why your denomination has lost 30,000 members. That's the reason your churches are empty and your prisons and hospitals full, why your sons and daughters prefer the dance hall and card table to the prayer meeting, and the lewd novel to the Word of God."
Paul said, "By the space of three years I ceased not to warn everyone night and day with tears." Can we say this?
Again we quote Brother Burton, "Men may be as big fools as I was when I tried to silence the dogs that were warning us, but when they have been saved from the awful doom, they will be overwhelmed with gratitude. Never stop the warning voices. Let them howl."

The principal subject of the lesson text is

the Great White Throne Judgment and the consignment of the wicked to eternal punishment.

## I. THE TIME OF JUDGMENT.

The order of events preceding the judgment as recorded in Revelation 19 and 20 is as follows:

1. The marriage supper of the Lamb. Rev. 19:1-10.
2. Jesus returns to earth with His saints. 19:11-16.
3. Another supper-the fowls of the air invited to feed upon the carcasses of the armies of Antichrist who are destroyed by Christ at His return. 19:17, 18, 21.
4. Antichrist and False Prophet cast into
has run its course and Satan is again loosed for a season, vast hordes of people will follow him. Thus, the absolute depravity of human kind will be clearly seen.
5. Satan's last effort against God. Rev. 20:710. He musters a numberless army of people, wages war against Jerusalem, is cast into the lake of fire, and his followers are killed. Then follows the final Judgment.

## II. THE DISPENSER OF JUDGMENT.

"And I saw a great white throne, and Him that sat upon it, from whose face the earth and heaven fled away." Bad enough to stand before an earthly Judge. But consider who this Judge is! The Creator of the Universe, perfect in holiness, justice, and power, and having perfect knowledge of the thoughts and deeds of every man!

## III. THE SUBJECTS OF JUDGMENT.

And I saw the dead small and great stand betore God... and the sea gave up the dead which were in it $\ldots$ and death (the grave)
and hell (hades, which possessed the spirits of the wicked dead) delivered up the dead which were in them." Who are these dead? The unsaved of all time, from Adam's day onward, the rich and the poor, the highly educated and illiterate, the moral man and the degenerate, the child who has reached the age of accountability and the aged, the black man and the white man, the scientist and gambler, the statesman and the convict, the man of great achievement and the hobo who contributed nothing to the world-ALL THE UNSAVED shall stand before Him who is without respect for persons.

## III. THE BASIS OF JUDGMENT.

"And the books were opened: and another book was opened which is
the book of life." Here we have
a distinction. The guilt of those judged is revealed in two ways: (1) By "the books" which contain a record of every man's deeds. At a busy airport a dozen planes wish to land at once. Obviously this would mean disaster. An air-control operator is employed whose work is to space these planes a thousand feet apart in the air and then give directions to the radio operator, so that planes may be safely landed one by one. Directions must be specific. The operator cannot give them according to his moods. So particular is the government about these orders, that
5. Satan bound and cast into the bottomless pit for 1,000 years. $20: 1-3$.
6. The last part of the first resurrection which includes saints and martyrs of the Great Tribulation. 20:4. See also Dan. 12:3; Rev. $6: 9,10$.
7. The millennial reign of Christ. Christ established his kingdom upon earth. His saints rule with Him. Earthly Israel shall be restored as leading nation. Remember that this period which lasts for 1,000 years is not the perfect age. Men will die. Children will be born. And though all men and nations will yield outward obedience to Christ, evil will still be present in many hearts for, time after time, in the book of Psalms, we read that because of the "greatness of His power," His enemies shall yield "feigned obedience" unto Him. The millennium will be that last probational period of man. Men claim today they are seeking to establish a "perfect form of government." They claim that man is inherently good but a victim of circumstances, etc. The millennium will prove the falsity of such claims. For, in spite of ideal conditions on earth, in spite of the fact that Satan will be bound and unable to influence man, when the millennial period
every one is recorded on a dictograph. If trouble comes the blame must be fixed. Either the control director, the radio operator, or the pilot is at fault. Replaying the dictograph record definitely fixes the blame.
The words, motives, and actions of men are all being recorded in heaven. All will be exposed on the Judgment day. And all men will be judged "according to their works." How can we reconcile the last statement with the teaching that salvation is by faith and that final condemnation is on the grounds of rejection of divine grace? "Works" are the fruit of faith. The tree is judged by its fruit. The fact that men have a record in "the books" is proof of the fact that they had not accepted the atoning Blood of Christ which blots out the sinful record. See Col. 2: 13, 14.
(2) By "the book of life." This is the book which contains the names of those who are saved by grace through faith. "And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire." Thus. God "double checks" on the subjects of judgment. Their sinful record proves them as unregenerate; the absence of their names from
the book of life which is the book of grace proves them as having rejected the grace of Christ.

## IV. THE OUTCOME OF JUGDMENT.

"And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire."

Torment, eternal and unremediable, and everlasting separation from God is the portion of the unsaved. God grant us a new revelation of its awfulness and send us forth with a new fear and hatred of $\sin$ and a new passion to warn the lost and save them from its unimaginable agonies!-J. Bashford Bishop.

## GIVING GOD THE GLORY

A British destroyer arrived at Malta recently after passing through some very grim experiences. As soon as the destroyer docked, the lower deck sent a message up to the captain, asking for the provision of a chaplain to conduct a service of thanksgiving and intercession. The captain sent word back to the effect that a chaplain would be available for the usual service on the following Sunday, but received a reply asking that the service should take place immediately rather than be postponed until the following Sunday. Their request was complied with. (This incident is vouched for by an officer on a British destroyer.)

Need cause my heart one pang of woe.
The Lord of hosts encircles me
And He is Lord of earth and sea."

## "BE YE THANKFUL"

When W. Averill Harriman, representing the United States government, went to Russia, he saw millions of people there who had bread to eat, and bread alone, for a month. When an American steamer brought lard which they might spread on their bread, he saw grateful Russians fall to their knees in gratitude to America. How little do we know how we are blessed!

## OCCUPATION OF MADAGASCAR

The occupation of the French Island of Madagascar by the British was completed only a few hours before the American occupation of French North Africa began. It was Major-General Sturges who effected a landing upon Madagascar. Of this operation one of his senior staff officers said: "Every detail of its planning and execution was prayed over."

## RECIPE FOR A TRAGEDY

A prize essay by a Georgia school girl contained this telling statement: "Take one regular, natural-born fool, add two or three drinks of bootleg liquor (any other kind may be substituted), and mix the two in a high-powered motor car. After the fool is thoroughly soaked,

## THE RUSSIAN ORTHODOX CHURCH

Dr. J. H. Rushbrooke, president of the Baptist World Alliance, bids us remember, when we think of Russia's anti-God tendencies, that "the old State Church was closely bound up with the Czarist regime. It stood as a foe of democratic claims. It was drenched in superstitious ideas which antagonized the thoughtful. Its relics and its incredible legends of saints have furnished superabundant material for numerous 'anti-God' museums and lectures. Only slowly can it be understood that the exposure of superstitution and of the reactionary attitude of Churchmen is not a refutation of religion but a valuable service to intelligent faith."

The overthrow of the State Church did not mean the overthrow of the faith of many true Christians. This is shown by the fact that there are four millions in Russia who are members of Baptist churches today, besides believers of other denominations.

## FALSE TEACHERS IN BRITAIN

An advertisement in the London Daily Telegraph says: "The sealing in their foreheads of 144,000 persons, preceding the coming of the Lord into His Kingdom, is now in progress" -and it states that this is being achieved solely by a 'baptism' which is confined to the Panacea Society of Bedford, the sucessors of Joanna Southcott.
"Already we hear that Elijah has arrived and is resident in the British Isles, backed by an organization of considerable ability and resources, but," say Dazen, "as the information is confidential, we cannot reveal his British name-a name by no means unknown." This apparently is based on the assumption that Elijah is one of the two witnesses of Revelation 11.

## MISSIONS IN BURMA

A representative of the British Bible Churchmen's Missionary Society recently reported that there is not a missionary or a mission station left in Burma today. All the missionaries are in exile in India, and most of them have lost every worldly possession. The treasure they have laid up in heaven, however, is beyond the greedy reach of any invader.

## A NEW MORALITY

The Berlin correspondent of the Stockholm Svenska Dagbladet (August 13) reveals the new morality that the Nazis are promoting. The Government has decreed that special care must be taken of illegitimate children of German soldiers and Dutch and Norwegian girls. The German state will pay hospital fees both before and after confinement, as well as other expenses. The state smiles upon that which God forbids, but God says, "Woe unto them that call evil good, and good evil!" Isa. 5:20.

## TANK CAR CARRIES WINE

The Minneapolis Daily Times recently stated: Three boys, twelve to fifteen years, crawled inside a railroad tank car in northeast Minneapolis the other day and got ingloriously drunk on wine. The boys had not taken bottles of wine into the tank car with them. They were drinking the wine out of the bottom of the tank car itself.
"It was a steel tank car. It was a car that could have been used to transport fuel oil. We reed cars to carry oil so desperately that thirty States are on rations-rations dictating a temperature of not more than 65 degrees this winter in homes heated by oil burners. And this tank car was being used to haul, not fuel oil, but wine! How many other tank cars are running loose around the country, being misused in this fashion?

## AN OPPORTUNITY FOR CHILD

## EVANGELISM

With so many women entering employment in the war work, there is need for many day nurseries and receiving homes for children. In Kansas City alone there are an estimatel 1,500 cases where children are being left to care for themselves while mothers are out working. During school hours the older chil dren are cared for, but from the time scliool is dismissed until the time the mother gets off work these children run loose. Is this not a challenge to Christian workers? Could not consecrated, motherly women volunteer to organize homes and nurseries where these children might stay during working hours? What an opportunity to teach these children to love God and believe His Word! Many of them, no doubt, are outside the Sunday Schools.

## ANTICHRISTIAN "WAYS"

The Watchman-Examiner calls attention to the meaning of three words by which the military caste of Japan is dominated. These words are shinto, kodo, and bushido.
Shinto means "the way of the gods," and is associated with racial divinity and sexual fertility. To some, this belief explains why the Japanese population is increasing at the rate of a million a year.
Kodo means "the way of the emperor," through whom all Japanere subjects are expected to integrate all their activities, social, political, economic, and cultural. In spite of the fact that many Japanese regard the national creed that the emperor is incarnate deity as sheer nonsense, they are helpless because the ruling military caste acts as though it were true.
Bushido means "the way of the warrior" and glorifies war and war lords. "Let us not forget," says this writer, "that men do fight for words that expess ideas," and quotes in proof the slogans of our own history: "No taxation without representation," "liberty or death," etc., which have shaped the course of American history. "The forces of Antichrist are on the march," he adds.

# The Heart of a Child

Notwithstanding the fact that child evangelism is the most fruitful ministry in which a Christian worker can engage, there is still a great dearth of workers. Perhaps a better understanding of the necessary qualifications for a successful children's worker, and a few pointers concerning methods which have proved effective may encourage more workers to become interested in this glorious ministry.
Qualifications of the Worker

1. A heart knowledge of God is the first, for who can introduce God to a child unless she herself first knows God in a real way? Every child must be born again, and no one can explain the new birth unless she has been born again.
2. She must live a consistent Christian life. She cannot "preach one thing and practice anoth-
er," for children are keen to detect insincerity or inconsistency in the lives of adults. She must be yielded and obedient to the leading of the Holy Spirit in her life and ministry.
3. She must have a good general knowledge of the Bible (or at least must be studying toward that end), and must know what stories and lessons are suitable for the ages with which she is to deal.
4. She must understand children-must know the characteristics and needs of the various age groups, so that she will be able to present Christ in terms of the child's understanding.
5. She must have a real love for children, not a mere desire to deal with them because she looks upon such work as a pleasant pastime or a ladylike occupation. That love must be deep enough

6. She must realize the tremendous responsibility that is hers as she stands before a group. of children to offer them the "Living Water" which means eternal life to all who accept. She must realize that among them are some who, if not won in her meetings, probably never will be won! She must realize that she is not an enter tainer, but a soul-winner.
7. She must be a faithful prayer warrior, willing to spend much time each day talking to God about the children. She must be prepared to meet with opposition-must meet it largely through prayer. Much of it will come from adults who fail to realize the necessity of winning the children. How Satan abhors seeing children taught God's Word and won to Christ! You can be sure that he will place obstacles in your way, but remember that "greater is He that is in you, than he that is in the zoorld." God is infinitely more concerned about the salvation of those children than you are or can be, and He will abundantly reward your efforts to win them
8. Lastly, perhaps chicfly, she must have a real, spiritual burden for the souls of boys and girls of all ages. Without it, no matter what abilities and natural talents she may have, her ministry will not produce important spiritual results.

The Work
Assuming that you have, or will apply yourself and ask God to give you the necessary qualifications, let us think about the methods to be used in winning children and older boys and girls to Christ. Methods differ with the age groups.

In dealing with very young children, great care must be exercised to avoid rushing them into a confession of Christ thinking thereby to please the worker, without their having really accepted Him. Heed the danger signs and you will be able to lead them into a real experience. Of course they will not be able to answer doctrinal questions, but many adult Christians of today were saved at four, five and six years of age. Any normal child of Junior age can understand his need of forgiveness and can know Christ as his Saviour.

By all means present Christ to them and invite them to accept Him, but guard against human persuasion. It must be the tender dealings of the Spirit of God and not the persuasive ability of the worker that causes them to desire Jesus. Your appeal must be simple, direct, sincere and free from mere emotionalism. It is sinful to play upon a child's emotions and thus likely deceive him into thinking he has Jesus in his heart when he has had no consciousness of his sins or any deep desire to have Christ in his heart. The heart of a child is a tender, exceedingly precious treasure to be won for Christ. Do not be guilty of playing with it! The little child is trustful, quick to respond to any suggestions made by one in whom he has confidence. Don't take advantage of his trustful nature.

One of the most commonly voiced criticisms of children's work is that their experiences are not real. The reality of their experiences depends to a large extent upon the methods used by the worker and by the prayer behind her ministry. The younger the child, the more easily he may be emotionally influenced. Tell the details of Christ's crucifixion, stressing the physical suffering of the cross, and you will have a group of weeping children, but they will be weeping through sympathy for One who suffered wrong, and not through conviction for $\sin$ or a desire to have Jesus as their own. Such methods do not lead to a spiritual transformation in their hearts.

By all means tell them that Christ died for each of them, but stress the reason for His death, rather than the details. They must realize their personal sinfulness before they can see their need of forgiveness. They must desire to belong to Jesus and to have Him for their own. Then present Christ the loving Friend as the One who is best to reserve warning of hell for dealing with those of twelve years and older.

A mother saw from her window her little daughter walking along the edge of the cliff at their summer cabin. Frightened though she was, the woman knew that to call out a warning might cause the child to lose her balance and tumble over the edge. Instead, she hastened outside and calmly approached the child. "Come, Virginia," she said, holding out her arms and smiling; "Mother has something nice to tell you."
"What is it, Mother?" little Virginia asked, running toward her mother.
How would the mother have dealt with her twelve year old Thelma had she been in the same danger? She would have called out a warning-"Thelma! Don't go any farther! The cliff is steep and the edge is dangerous!" For she would know it would not be enough to tell Thelma she had "something nice" to tell her; she must be warned of danger. And the warning would not cause her to lose her balance, but the opposite.
Does not the same principle apply in dealing with children? The little child should be told the "something nice"-the lovely things about Christ, and the heaven He is preparing. Jesus should be presented as the One who loves him so much that He took the punishment for his sins. Invite him to get saved so he can become one of Jesus' helpers, telling other children about Jesus.
"How old must a child be before he can be saved?" one is often asked. "As young as he wants to be saved," is the best answer. If a child desires to enter the kindom of heaven, who are we to close the door in his face? Jesus said, "Whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in Me , it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea."
In a children's meeting attended mostly by older boys and girls a seven-year-old boy who had attended regularly held up his hand to indicate that he wanted to be saved. Hesitant, least the boy did not understand, the worker ignored him and continued talking to the older ones. When the altar call was given the boy's hand was again raised, and again ignored. The worker prayed silently for wisdom. A few moments later she found his face turned toward her with such a pleading look that she stopped at his side. Before she could speak he said, "I want to get saved."
"Why?" she asked to test him.
"So I can have Jesus in my heart," he said earnestly.
"Then just tell Jesus you want Him," the worker said, kneeling beside him.
"I'd wanted to get saved for a long time, but nobody'd let me," he said afterwards. Some months later he was still happy that Jesus lived in his heart, and he gave every evidence of Jesus' being real to him.

Would Jesus have said, "Except ye . . . become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven," if children cannot enter?
Let us guard against mere emotionalism, yes, but let us also guard as faithfully against interfering with the work of the Holy Spirit!
The twelve year old boy or girl can understand eternal punishment for $\sin$, and should be warned of the consequences of unrepented $\sin$. Show them that while $\sin$ is not immediately punished, punishment is sure and unavoidable unless forgiveness is sought of God.
The adolescent is a realist. Make heaven and hell real to him. He wants to know about them. Tell him that the only way of escape from hell is to be born again. Make the way of salvation plain.
A woman reproved a children's worker for giving a pointed lesson on the "wrong road," that "seemeth right" but leads to hell. "It isn't fair to tell them about hell," she said. "It might frighten them."
"If you saw a boy or girl of that age running down a road which you knew would lead to a great precipice just around the corner, what would you do?" the worker asked.

"I'd try to get him to turn off that road," the woman said.
"That's exactly what I'm trying to get those boys and girls to do," the worker said. "I know the danger they do not see. My love for them urges me forward to cry out a warning. If some are frightened, their fear will disappear as I show them the way off the dangerous road into the road of safety."

In that meeting that day more than a dozen boys and girls of twelve to fifteen were definitely born again.

The adolescent realizes that he needs a power from outside himself to guide him.
"We like to act as if we knew it all and
don't need any advice or help," a teen age girl said recently. "But," she added after a thoughtful pause, "down in our hearts, we know better."

The average teen age boy or girl is openhearted and responsive to the gospel. Present Christ as the Friend, Companion and Counselor who will be his Helper in every time of need.
The teen age seeks a reason. He is not a skeptic, but is often troubled by doubts. It is your duty to meet those doubts by giving him facts. You must be able to "give a reason for the hope."

The teen age is still an age of hero worship, but his type of hero has changed from the physical to the ethical or spiritual, therefore he
is interested in spiritual values as touching his own life. So present Christ as the great Ideal to follow-as the One for them to worship.
The teen age is a time of restlessness, often caused by spiritual hunger that is unrecognized and ignored by adults. He is trying to "find himself." Help Him to find Christ, and he will find where he belongs.

After you have won a group of children to Christ, do not expect too much of them. Getting saved does not make adults of them. They must be patiently, carefully taught how to live for Christmust be taught "precept upon precept ; line upon line, line upon line; hear a little and there a little." When they fall victim to temptation, help them. Encourage, advise, admonish ("considering thyself lest thou also be tempted"), and you will find them responsive and eager to serve Christ Keep them busy for Jesus.

It is said by those in position to know that the great majority of people of middle age or over who respond to the gospel call are those who have had a spiritual rebirth as children, but who fell beside the way. Thus even if a number of your child converts backslide, (It is said that at least 70 per cent of adult converts do so.) your efforts have by no means been in vain. There is a far greater probability that a child who has accepted Christ, even though he wanders far from the fold, will come back to the Lord in adulthood than that an adult who has never previously known Christ will accept Him.

Charles Spurgeon said that if he had to choose between a church membership composed of people saved after reaching adulthood or one made up of those who were converted as children, he would choose the latter as being the more faithful in serving God.

Rightly taught and encouraged along the way fewer child converts backslide than do adults Children's worker, it is your duty to see that your evangelistic efforts are followed by teaching the Word that they may be "rooted and built up in Him and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught

## Khaki <br> Christmas

"Coming over Christmas Mountain now," shouted the pilot as we left behind us the shores of white-capped Bering Sea. Nome, Alaska, lay sevcral air minutes toward Siberia to the west; Fairbanks, in the Northland's interior, near the Yukon, a few flying hours due east.

There will be bombs instead of sleigh bells this Christmas. Rumbling tanks, not prancing reindeer. The sinister figure of Mars stalking the earth!
I have just returned from our boys in Alaska, and I know the only Christmas they will enjoy is the Christmas you create for them on the home front. Let this be known at the outset, that I am making a plea for these men that they cannot make, but would if they could.

Having interviewed hundreds of them, I believe I know what they most need and desire. I have no reference to the regular routine giving of seasonal knickknacks. Such undoubtedly arc being provided in sufficient quantities by sociallyminded groups. These gifts are important, but of still greater importance are those spiritual letters you will send, directed to the heart cry of the boys, the religious books and publications which will satisfy their new hunger for things of spiritual value, including that greatest of all books -the Bible.

have seen the expressions on the faces of the men who had their names called out, and on the other hand the disappointment registered on the faces of those who walked away slowly with there heads down, you would understand the foregoing statement.

Christian mothers, fathers and loved ones, don't make your writing aimless. Those men are now in a position that causes them to think, something our youth never had time for until now. Just because you couldn't speak to "Jim" or "Bill" when he was home about the things in life that really matter, know now that you can and that they will be disappointed if you don't. Write to them the things of eternal values, things you would say to them if you could steal to them where they are, perhaps strolling along the river or in the timber, where they have gone to seek seclusion and get away from the camp routine.
Our soldiers are in lands of censorship, becoming more so as the war continues. What they could have written you last time they cannot now. Before them or in their minds are the mimeographed sheets telling them the many things they must avoid saying, all necessary for the prosecution of the war. Inspiration is naturally lost when they cannot write about the country in which they are located, about the routine life they are living. Soldiers cannot share their joys and varied experiences with the folks back home because they are all a part of the intricate machinery of war, veiled in military secrecy. They say, "Oh, what's the use? The folks are in a world so different from ours; they cannot understand." Each day they are going to write, but days fade into weeks and weeks into months and oftentimes no word comes from the men in khaki.

Aren't they interested in back home any more? Are they too busy or are they sick? No. Never could that be, for the war front stands on the morale of the home front. Know that in those days of silence that are needing you most. Because their letters are often short and terse, try to understand. If I could be the voice of those men in the wilderness up there and in Arctic Alaska I would say. "Folks, when the letters get shorter and shorter, make yours all the longer. When they fail to write you so often, write them more often. Three letters to one I should advise. They need you."
Christmas this year is coming to a world euveloped by a global war. Why not make this a Waki-Christmas. Coming down by Pan American plane, I stopped at a certain Airport somewhere in the Alaskan Highway and there a Lieutenant met me, one I had become acquainted with en route up the Highway in a jeep. In those few minutes between our set down and take off, I asked him, if there was not something I could do for him when I got back to the States. He did not answer me in words but I caught the answer in his eyes and facial expression. I have tried to interpret that haunting look in my plea. I have tried to keep faith with these comrades in arms.
It must be a khaki Christmas, for kahki-covered Testaments and Bibles will make it so.
Will you keep faith ?

Thirty-nine years ago the Lord healed me of a very serious internal trouble. I was ill off and on for three years before I realized that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever. I becamverv. very weak and lost much flesh; but thr awfyl nain was gone, and I rested in the ever lasting arms until God healed me and now my friends are astonished at how well I look.

But the testing was not over In July 1941, as I was alone in my home, my legs gave way and I fell. What horror went through me as I realized I was paralyzed. No sweet voice whispered that this was a trial of my faith; but the Holy Spirit brought Isa. 59:19 to mind and I knew the Lord would lift up a standard against the foe. In half an hour I got up and walked to my room praising God. When my dear ones came in they thought it impossible that I should have had a stroke and then recovered so anickly; but I said, "With Grod all things are possible."
God determined to prove to them once again His power, allowing my right side to become paralyzed ahout eight o'clock that evening. I could not lift my little finger. My dear ones wanted to remain with me through the night: but I told them. No, thot I was not going to fret but trust the same One who had healed me before.
Very early the next morning two pairs of eyes lonked at me with the question from their lins, "How is it. Mother?" Praise God. I was able to show them how I could snap my fingers, and then I got up and about as usual. I shall be eighty next year. God has certainly worked a miracle in my body as all can testify. & \text { THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC }

following letter from the Pacific war zone:
"Recently while visiting one or two distant hospitals I had opportunity to meet the principal chief of the natives here. The head of the Protestant missionary work in this part of the Southwest Pacific took me to the chief's home. It was quite an experience. The house is really imposing. Decorations on the exterior feature sea-shells. colored vottles and totem-poles or tabus.
"In the course of the visit with the mis. sionary I met manv of his native pastors and paid several official calls. The countryside is beautiful with lovely, fragrant flowers and many trees in blossom. Rut I was even more impressed by the beautiful characters and genuinc ability and worth of the native Christians. Certainly gifts to foreign missions have paid big dividends in this corner of the world When the folk back home realize how much the friendly understanding of the native peoples has meant to our American soldiers in comfort, safety and eeneral well-being, morally and spiritually, I don't think there will be any lack of support for foreign missionary work.
"Incidentally, our work is going ahead most satisfactorily. Our regular Sunday schedule for my own battalion includes a moraing service of
worship, a Bible Class (somewhat disguised under the title, 'People Jesus Knew,' a study of John's Gospel) and a Christian Endeavor forum which is run by the men themselves During the week we have sessions as permitted by military necessities.
"The men are all in fine fettle and excellent spirits. We appreciate mail more than anything else, I suppose. Writing supplies and Air Mail stamps are always in great demand, as are also copies of magazines, home town newspapers, and various religious literature (including Reveille). I operate a circulating library system to provide the maximum benefits from the books and magazines which we have. You would be amazed to know how many readings can be gotten out of a wellbound U. S. publication!"
In his letter, this chaplain sends his thanks for the last package of Reveilles which we sent to him, and says he would be happy to receive fifteen copies of the Christ's Ambassadors Herald each month for his men to read. We are able to provide the chaplains with free subscriptions to the C. A. Herald because our Home Missions Department, under Brother Fred Vogler, is footing the bill. At present about 1,000 copies of the C. A. Herald are going to the chaplains every month, to be placed in Army or Navy Readjeng Rooms or circulated among the men as above, and the Home Missions Department is paying for these.
