God's Garden



JESUS saith unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? Whom seekest thou? She, supposing him to be the gardener, saith unto him, Sir, if thou hast borne him hence, tell me where thou hast laid him, and I will take him away." John 20:15.

The supposed gardener was a gardener indeed! Mary Magdalene was right partly, wrong partly. She had supposed that this Man she beheld through her teardimmed eyes was the local gardener; but who He really was she would learn anon. She would weep and seek no longer. Hearing her name spoken as only One could speak it, there was instantly a resurrection of her faith which had been shrouded with the graveclothes of doubt and laid away in the clammy tomb of fear for about three days. She burst in upon those who were huddled together for fear of the future, her old self, beaming with the sunshine of divine assurance. She struck the dramatic note for the first time: "He is risen! He is risen!" She explained breathlessly that He had just talked with her in the garden of His burial. But they wouldn't find Him there. He would move majestically on toward another of His gardens. Consider five:

THE FIRST GARDEN: A PLAN LAID

"The Lord planted a garden eastward in Eden," Moses tells us in Gen. 2:8. So the great Gardener's work began. It was perfect. The flowers and trees were both beautiful and fruitful. A river



streamed gently through the valley. As a crowning act, He formed man, breathed life into him and made of him a partner. He desired fellowship with His creation and came often seeking it: until the serpent entered and man betrayed his Creator's trust. So when the Lord God returned to walk in the garden in the cool of the day, He found the wicked deed accomplished, man fallen, and a need for immediate action. He was compelled to thrust man out, close the garden, and set about to conquer this archenemy who would, if possible, frustrate His every plan.

THE SECOND GARDEN: A PRAYER

PRAYED

Gethsemane: A final mustering of every faculty of the Son of God to carry through this mission. Man must be reclaimed! Satan must be met at close range on his own ground and defeated! He sees it clearly: the cup is bitter. Already the mountainous burden of man's sin is weighting Him; already He is sweating great drops of blood. He rises up with courage and determination and cries out a final, "Thy will be done," to the heavenly Father. He arises, surrenders to the mad mob and bravely starts on the death march to Golgotha.

THE THIRD GARDEN: A PRICE PAID

Joseph of Arimathea boldy risked his reputation and safety to beg the body of

Jesus for burial. "Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden; and in the garden a new sepulchre, wherein was never man yet laid. There laid they Jesus." Descending alone to the fray, a Greater than Samson reached for the undergirdings of Satan's kingdom in the darkness of the supreme crisis hour. He laid hold, He fought, He won! When on the third day He re-entered His body, dusted off mortality and stepped majestically forth into the garden He could declare, "I am he that liveth, and was dead; and behold, I am alive forevermore, Amen, and have the keys of hell and of death." It was Easter! Man would live and live afull!

THE FOURTH GARDEN: A PURPOSE PORTRAYED

If Easter is triumph, resurrection and the resumption of communion and fellowship between God and man, then Easter is not only a day of history to be celebrated, but also an experience to be enjoyed. "A garden enclosed is my sister, my spouse: a spring shut up, a fountain sealed. 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The Resurrection Message to Peter

ASTER, beautiful season of the year! All nature seems arrayed in resurrection dress. But Easter many years ago found one very unhappy heart. It was the heart of Peter. And there are many now who share sadness of soul. These we should like to remember this cheerful season, and to these we should like to speak.

We are all familiar with Peter yet our thoughts about him may greatly differ. Jesus made no mistake in calling him to become one of His leading disciples, yet how utterly, in the night of the betrayal, he failed. Failures are always most humiliating, but often from them comes much good. The bold, but broken, Peter of Pentecost might never have been had he not suffered the deep sorrow of denying his Lord.

He failed, but with his failure his heart ever longed for Jesus, and bitterly did he weep over his denial as repentance and remorse burned with lightning rays through mind and heart. He was the victim of weakness, a weakness which, until it was proved, he could not believe he possessed.

Forces far greater than mere maids and servants of the high priests were involved in the denial made by Peter.

It was "the hour of darkness" and such an hour as had never come to him before, perhaps never came again. The prince of this world came and found nothing in Jesus, but this could not be said of Peter. He was entirely unprepared, and when it came it entirely overcame him. This Jesus had known would be, though Peter knew it not.

Yet deeper than his denial was a love which, though temporarily engulfed in the black billows of that awful night, was yet a fire which even his sin could not put out. His sin was but for the moment, the love of his heart an eternal flame. This is proved by the whole of his later life.

We do not know much about the happenings in the life of Jesus during the days when His body lay in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, but it is evident that His tender eye rested upon the little flock which had believed on Him. He had knowledge of them as, when like frightened sheep, they had been scattered. But they were to be gathered again by a sacred instinct born out of fellowship with their Lord and from walking together in His cause.


Peter's tears of repentant remorse were also taken knowledge of, though the Savior's body lay quietly in the grave. Weak, wretched, longing Peter was fully known by Christ and beneath his seeming hopelessness there was yet a spark of hope, God given, and soon to be fanned into a burning flame.

Among the earlier words of Jesus on the resurrection morning was a call for the regathering of His own about Him, and among these He would not forget him who had so zealously served Him, even though in a moment of weakness he had failed in a crisis. "Go tell my disciples and Peter."

Peter was not then following his Lord. He would mingle among the disciples, for he could not forget the blessings of the past and his heart yearned for the fellowship he had once enjoyed, but his heart was bowed in confusion, grief, and humiliation. He had lost his vision. But though he had lost his way, he was not lost to his

loving Lord. Towering above the terrible fall, Jesus remembered the many lofty aspirations and inspirations of Peter's zealous heart. Peter could not think that Jesus would care for him, for had he not cruelly denied Him in the night when, above all other times He needed one to stand with Him? Peter might not understand Jesus, but Jesus fully understood Peter. We at times do not understand even ourselves. How good it is that Jesus understands us fully. Could we but comprehend the love of Christ, how unchangeable it ever is, we would surely appreciate and trust Him more.

Soon the ejaculation was passed around, "The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared unto Simon!" Just a little word of encouragement meant so much to Peter in that dismal hour. It quickened hope, and pent up love began again to flow. What a change was



made in Peter! Never again do we find him failing his Lord. A great fall, followed by great sorrow, to be met by great love, was to be forever greatly appreciated.

It would be folly to encourage any to think a person must fall in order to become a better Chrisian. Remember Peter fell but once. Usually the more frequently a person backslides the weaker his spiritual determination becomes. The reason for this is that such a one does not properly feel the weight of his departure from God. Shallow opinions of sin bring shallow repentance and shallow experience.

It is blessed, however, to know that, although one has gotten out of the way, one may be happily restored to one's Savior and Lord. How many, because they have been overtaken in a fault, have felt their unworthiness so greatly that they could not believe their acceptance with God again possible. Such is not so. The awful night of

Such is not so. The awful night of crisis is passed, the cross tells us of His love, the empty tomb banishes the pall of sin and death. Ascended up on high Jesus is just the same Savior as when here among men. He knows human weakness, He sees us just as we are and as no one else can see us. He is looking for His despondent Peters, His doubting Thomases, the mourning women; for all those who have followed Him. To us He comes with a message of peace, and our weary hearts may find rest on His bosom. "All hail!" What a joyful sound! It comes to us who live today. "The Lord is risen indeed."

Risen With Christ

THE risen Christ came into the upper room and showed the disciples His hands and His feet. He showed His wounds. And He showed His love in His wounds. They were wounds, empty of blood, but eloquent of love. He said, "Behold My hands and My feet that it is I Myself: handle Me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye see Me have." Luke 24:39.

Before His death Christ had spoken to His disciples in the upper room, and said to them: "I go to prepare a place for you. And . . . I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." John 14:2, 3. It is His purpose to have His disciples where He is.

God raised Christ from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in the heavenly places. And the inspired apostle, writing to the saints, said. "You hath He quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins. . . . But God, who is rich in mercy for His great love wherewith He loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ (by grace ye are saved;) and hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus." Eph 2:1-6.

Do you believe that statement, "Hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus"? Christ is risen, and God "hath raised us up together" with Him. Only the feet of the upright man, the ascended man, touch the earth. But the feet do not belong to the earth.

God raised Christ from the dead, and quickened Him. It required God to do it. And the same power has raised us up together with Him. God's power did it. And it requires God's power to make us believe. The fact is so great, so mighty. God, who exercised His great power, gives us the faith to believe the fact, for it it written, "By grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." Eph. 2:8.

Study God's Word where it tells us we are pilgrims and strangers. Our citizenship is in heaven. As children of God we are not of the earth. We are looking for a city, whose builder and maker is God.

The angel at the tomb declared, "He is not here." Luke 24:6. Can the Spirit say that of you, "He is not here, but is risen"? How do you realize this? By believing what He says. "You hath He quickened. . . And hath raised us up together." Eph. 2:1-6. God spake, and it was done.

The creation of the world was an easy matter compared with the raising of Christ from the dead, and giving Him the domination over the principalities and powers and wicked spirits in the heavenly places. For He raised not only Christ, but countless hosts that no man can number God raised with Him. The creation was made without opposition, but when the Son of God was raised there was the opposition of all the powers of darkness. But He triumphed over them openly. The way to heaven was opened by that triumph.

God stretched out His arm and rescued Israel, and with His mighty hand He brought them out of the land of Pharaoh. To reach Israel He had to stretch out His arm, and that arm chastened Pharaoh. God said to Pharaoh, "Let My people go!" "Who is the Lord, that I should obey His voice and let Israel go?" questioned Pharaoh. Ex. 5:1,2. Pharaoh did not know the Lord, nor His power. But the grip of



God's mighty hand grew tighter and tighter. Pharaoh had to let God's people go. And that same arm, in its might and its strength, is available for the saints today. God says, "Let My people go." And when your Pharaoh says, "Who is God?" let God use His arm, and He will increase the pressure so that the enemy will cry, "I will let them go."

arm brought salvation. He says, "I looked, and there was none to help; and I wondered that there was none to uphold: therefore Mine own arm brought salvation unto Me; and My fury, it upheld me." Isa. 63:5.

Isaiah asked, "Who is this that cometh from Edom, with dyed garments from Bozrah?" And the Lord replied, "I that speak in righteousness, mighty to save." Isa. 63:1. Behold, a mightier than Moses is here! And this same Jesus, who took them out of the land of Pharaoh, will bring you into a land that is flowing with milk and honey.

Christ arose, and God, who is rich in mercy, has quickened us together with Christ, and has raised us up together with Him. What Christ went through was for you, in place of you, but everything subsequent to Calvary He shares with you. He took what you should have had—the wages of sin, and He shared with you what you have no right to.

He said, "The glory which Thou (the Father) gavest Me I have given them." John 17:22. What we deserved was to be forsaken of God, but Christ received that, and He declares, "I restored that which I took not away." Psalm 69:4. The last Adam restored that which was lost by the first Adam—restored that which He took not away.

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The Clothes in the Jomb

Eight resurrections are recorded in Scripture. Jesus rose on the first or eighth day. The risen lost are classed in eight divisions. Rev. 21:8. And the name "Jesus" makes 888—"I am the resurrection, and the life." John 11:25.

The Garden Tomb - the only such tomb, except another several miles from Jerusalem, discovered in the vicinity of the city—is rock-hewn, two-chambered, with a window aloft in the inner chamber, and a low entrance to the outer. Therefore when Peter and John ran to the sepulcher, John, "stooping and looking in" (John 20:5), could see all within. While his body would block the entrance, the skylight in the inner chamber kept the grave light. And John (so the Greek of the passage implies) stooped sideways-he crouched at the entrance, half turned to the right, where the inner chamber lay alongside.

Alone of seven thousand sepulchers found in the vicinity of Jerusalem, the Garden Tomb exactly fits the facts. G. E. Franklin has written: "General Gordon, when satisfied with the site of Calvary, conjectured that there must be a tomb near, for 'in the place where He was crucified there was a garden; and in the garden a new tomb wherein was man never yet laid.' General Gordon came to the conclusion that in the garden adjoining Golgotha a tomb might possibly be found. On digging about five feet below the surface he was delighted to find the entrace to the tomb which fulfils all the conditions of the Gospel narrative, and renders intelligible the circumstances of our Lord's burial."

A rock-hewn seat at the head, and another at the foot, of the grooved corpse-



bed—seats where the angels sat (John 20:12)—startlingly confirm the sepulcher's identity, which would have to be large enough, as this one is, for a group of women, together with two angels (Luke 23:55), to be able to stand naturally within it. No mortal remains have ever been found in this tomb, which has thus never seen corruption.

Now one master fact dominated the situation. Both John and Peter enter the tomb quite skeptical, "for as yet they knew not the scripture that He must rise again from the dead." Yet something which they looked at instantly proved to John a miraculous resurrection. "He saw and believed." Immense stress is laid in the passage on what the two Apostles stared at in utter amazement, and what startled John into instant Christian faith. Facts, as someone has said, are the pointing fingers of God. What was it that they saw?

What they saw, and all they saw, is recorded in John 20:6, 7. John "beholdeth the linen clothes lying, and the napkin, that was upon His head, not lying with the linen clothes, but rolled up in a place by itself"—rather separate and fallen inward. Thus they saw the grave-clothes, stiffened by frequent swathes, and encrusted with the gummy spices in their folds, lying empty upon the rock—whether fallen quite flat, or still inflated and supported by their own thickness, the Scripture does not say.

The napkin for the head was "folded inward"—the Greek word does not mean a folding for neatness' sake—that is, fallen flat, but still folded and lying separately where the head had lain. So the clothes, lying empty, showed exactly the erstwhile position of the missing corpse. The napkin was "folded inward" as is the case when we put a handkerchief over the head and tie it under the chin. It was folded separately and yet so as to preserve the united appearance of the graveclothes. The appearance which the clothes had at first, when they encompassed the corpse, was there still. But the body was not there. And this is all that they saw.

Nicodemus had brought a hundredweight of myrrh and aloes, a gift not only of great cost, but of large bulk. These spices, probably in the form of a coarse powder, would be sprinkled freely through the garments. No spices had been liberated by the disrobing of the



body. Nothing was visible in the tomb but the clothes.

Therefore the revelation of what had happened at once burst upon John. For nothing else could explain the simple facts. The knots and the bandages were exactly as Joseph and Nicodemus had left them: only the body was gone. What did this prove? That the body had not slipped out of the clothes laying them on one side as it did so. Neither had it been disrobed, by men nor angels, and removed. Nor had it been taken out of the tomb clothed. We assume the possibility of removal only to clinch its impossibility for the armed guard blocked any theft by friend or foe, and the authority of Imperial Rome, which locked the grave, yielded only to angels from another world.

In a flash John's astounded gaze saw that the body had passed up through the clothes leaving them absolutely intact. So therefore also no spice was visible. If the body had been disrobed, either by men, angels, friend or foe, or if Christ Himself had stood erect, discarding the wraps (the "death" being a swoon only, or the resurrection a "resuscitation" only) the masses of spice, shaken loose, would have fallen to the floor and littered it. But if the Lord had passed up through the undisturbed folds the spice would remain concealed in the bound and knotted graveclothes, and in the holy quiet of the sacred grave all that would be missing would by the body. This was exactly what they saw. In apocryphal writings immediately succeeding the time of the Apostles it is said that enormous multitudes streamed out of Jerusalem to gaze at the clothes lying in their miraculous

Lazarus was temporarily raised, only to die again; and therefore the Savior gives the command, "Loose him"—that is, unfold the wrappings—"and let him go." John 11:44. For four thousand years man had had no resurrection like

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The Great Miracle of the Ages

A LMOST twenty centuries ago, as the light of early morning was breaking around the gray walls of Jerusalem, armed men with shining spears and grim, determined faces were guarding a grave, a sepulchre, in a small garden near the walls of the city. The man in the sepulchre was dead. There was no doubt about that. But He had said something about rising on the third day, and this guard was going to see to it that He stayed in that sepulchre. The Roman government had put its mighty seal on the tomb; a great stone had been placed over the entrance so that he could not be stolen away.

The third morning since this man had died was dawning. A few women were silently and sadly wending their way to this tomb, bent on getting near the precious dead body that they might lay thereon sweet spices. As they walked they expressed to each other their great perplexity, "Who will roll away the stone from the sepulchre?" God was watching. Angels were watching and bending low over the battlements of heaven; the miracle of the ages was about to take place. One of their number, the angel of the Lord, was descending to earth.

Suddenly there was an earthquake—the angel reached the tomb, rolled away the stone and sat upon it. There was much light, but the guards could not see; they shook with fear and fell to the earth as dead men. The Roman seal and authority were broken—Jesus the Christ arose! Death could not hold its prey. Easter morning bids us rejoice and shout our Hallelujahs, for this is the day that confident praise begins.

Let us remember that throughout the New Testament Scriptures the two great facts of our glorious gospel are continually taught and that they are inseparable—Jesus died! He arose! He did not die in a corner unobserved; He had been condemned to death by the highest religious powers and by the highest governmental powers. It was no secret, for the crowd saw Him die. There is no question, no dispute about it, Jesus died. The earth rocked, the sun was darkened, the veil in the temple was divinely rent from top to bottom.

Jesus had said, "It is finished." What is finished? The atoning work for sinful man, the vicarious sufferings of our great Substitute, all finished. Did God answer, did He accept that offering on the cross? Was it merely a great object lesson of deepest love and sacrifice to teach us to love and to sacrifice? Nay! It was far more; it was redemption for humanity. It was God's great remedy for poor, lost men. And let us know that God answered the last cry of His suffering Son when He cried on the cross, "It is finished." God put His great, eternal "Amen" to those words when He raised Jesus from the dead. Jesus had yielded Himself unto death, dying in weakness amid the ridicule and scorn of men, who threw in His dying face their hateful words, "If thou be the Son of God come down from the cross." He did not come down. He died, but He was declared to be the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead. Rom. 1:4. There is no longer an "if" that can be hurled at Him.

We have read concerning the opening of the old tombs of ancient kings in

Luxor, Egypt, and of the treasures brought therefrom. But let us discern and lay hold of the far greater treasures that are ours from the empty tomb of our resurrected Savior. What does that empty tomb say to us through the centuries? First of all, let us know that it gives us Assurance. We may confidently rest assured that all the claims made by Jesus of Nazareth are true; they were proved true by His resurrection from the dead. Therefore, we know that we have a Savior from sin; we have a sure way to God; Jesus is the Light of the world; He is the Bread of life; He is the Good Shepherd who gave His life for the sheep. He is all He said He was, and will do all He said He would do. God hath given assurance unto all men that He hath raised Him (Jesus) from the dead. Acts 17:31. Let us remember that those who confess with their mouths the Lord Jesus, and believe in the heart that God raised Him from the dead shall be saved. Rom. 10:9. What comforting assurance!

Again let us note that the empty tomb speaks victory! Victory over death, victory over him that had the power of death, that is the devil. Jesus wrenched from him the keys of death and of Hades. Jesus' salutation to those women, early on that resurrection morn, bears a deeper meaning than a mere salutation, "All Hail!" "Oh Joy!" It said, "The victory is won," the great victory of redemption. Jesus stands forth as the great Conqueror of the ages, and He stands not alone—for, because He triumphed, because He lives, we too may live and triumph in Him.

The utter powerlessness of the Roman government, of the armed guard and the great stone before the tomb, to keep Jesus in the tomb, are symbols of the powerlessness of every contrary power to keep us bound and down if we will but accept the living Christ, our Conqueror in every experience of life. Count on Him, for He is our victory now, yes, now, in life, and our final victory over the grave. Resurrection morning is the time for us all to believingly, rejoicingly say, "Hallelujah!"

But look again at that empty tomb. It speaks *life*, life out of death. The One who was laid dead therein arose,

From Outcast to Bishop

BISHOP ELPHICK is one of the in South America. Although he is now approaching his seventieth anniversary, he has retained a youthful vigor and agility. He has preached for over forty years and yet maintains an evangelistic fervor in his ministry which is inspiring. He has traveled widely, and has been chosen as a special delegate to important world conferences in Jerusalem and the United States to represent the work of God in Chile. As my interpreter at the Ministerial Alliance meetings and in the churches, he conveyed my thoughts both rapidly and powerfully. One day after interpreting a sermon, he caught me by the arm and said, "Mr. Sumrall, remain for a few minutes and permit me to tell you how God saved me." I assured him this would be a great pleasure, and we sat down for a chat.

THE MAKING OF A PRODIGAL

Roberto Elphick was the son of an English engineer domiciling in Chile, and his mother was a Chilean. (Over 90 per cent of the Chileans have northern European blood and ancestry; therefore they are not Latin in type.) Roberto's mother was a fanatical Catholic. His father was a man not interested in religion; he was a man of the world, who indulged deeply in sin. However, his anticlerical attitude demanded that his son be sent to a Protestant school, which, no doubt, caused Roberto to hear the gospel of Christ. He was sent to the mission school in Santiago.

Bishop Elphick remembers that his being guided to Christ in later years hinges upon a New Testament given him by Miss Fawcett, one of his teachers in the Protestant school. This small gift was not immediately a means of leading Roberto to the Lord, as he did not read it. However, in his admiration for his tutoress, he laid the book away in his trunk.

For six years Roberto was a student in the mission school, and when he left he was still unconverted. He was taken from the school by his father, who had left engineering and established a distillery, manufacturing liquors, beers and wines. Senor Elphick foolishly put his young son to work sampling liquors. Naturally, tasting liquor all day, the young man developed a strong passion for alcohol, which was the beginning of

the road to ruin for Roberto. The alcoholic demon soon possessed and enslaved him; week by week his young life became shackled and bound by the chains of alcohol. At this period of life Roberto had an intimate companion in evil, a cousin; together they spent their lives in gross sin. The bishop, permitting his eyes to span a half century, declared that he had lost all decency and social refinement. He had become a drunken vagabond. A young man not yet twenty years of age had been wrecked, and his father was to blame.

ROBERTO AN OUTCAST

The son had become so wicked in his personal life and so unreliable in business that in a fit of rage the father expelled him from the family, demanding that he leave home immediately and never return. Roberto found himself an outcast of society, with no friends, no position and no money. As a prodigal he was obliged to live in a miserable brokendown shanty outside the city. From a gay party life and a home of plenty, he was suddenly reduced to poverty and isolation. He was now an outcast without one friend.

Bishop Elphick now says that he was a perfect example of a prodigal son living in a veritable pigpen. While suffering deep mortification he thought of the New Testament given him a few years before by his Christian schoolteacher. Searching in his trunk, he found the book which he had never used, and began to read it desperately. He needed mental, spiritual and moral assistance at this crisis in his life, and he hoped that this Book could help him. In his reading he came to the tenth chapter of the Gospel of John, and

as he read the ninth verse, "I am the Door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture," something happened. These words were like a blazing fire to his soul. He read them again and again, saying to himself: "Christ is the Door—the Door to salvation, the Door to happiness, the Door to heaven, the Door to everything good. I wish I could go in at that Door." But Roberto, like the Ethiopian eunuch, needed a Philip to interpret the Scriptures and tell him what to do.

ROBERTO'S MOTHER PLEADS HIS CAUSE

Back home, Roberto's tenderhearted mother was exceedingly saddened by the plight of her young son who was now an outcast. Mrs. Elphick was constantly pleading with her husband to be lenient with their son and give him one more opportunity before finally casting him away and disinheriting him. The father's heart was ultimately touched, and he decided to give Roberto a chance to reform his wayward life and to become a respectable man; so his brother was commanded by his father to take a horse and cart and bring him home. No persuasion was necessary to cause him to leave his miserable abode. When Roberto came within view of his home he saw one of the most thrilling sights of his entire life—his mother was looking in his direction waiting for her prodigal son to return. What an inexpressible joy it was to see someone waiting to meet him! With tears in her eyes she embraced her wayward boy and assured him of her love. It melted Roberto's heart to know that he was still loved by someone. Then his mother told him to go into the parlor and beg the forgiveness of his father for all his wrongdoings and promise to obey the rules of the household. Roberto ran into the parlor and fell down at his father's feet, pleading to be forgiven for bringing disgrace upon the family, and faithfully vowed to live a changed life. The father received him kindly and invited him to dine that night as a member of the family. Roberto was given his same room again, and his same place at the table. He was home again and glad to

The former prodigal was true to his promise. Instead of seeing his old companions, he looked for a church in which to worship. Near his home he found a small Protestant church where about a dozen people worshiped. The pastor, Senor Moises Berkwitz, was a converted Jew. From the first meeting Roberto admired him, absorbing his interesting sermons. As he went to church several times a week and heard the gospel, he slowly

realized what a real Christian ought to be, and how one could become a Christian. One night the congregation sang a hymn which contained the words, Father, forgive my sins!" On his way home and as he lay down to sleep, the words came to him again and again, "O Father, forgive my sins!" He decided to ask God to forgive his sins and see what would happen in his life. He arose from the bed and lay down on the floor, to assure God that he was really humble and greatly desired something which would change his heart. He knew naught but to cry the words of the hymn, "O Father, forgive my sins!" As these words poured forth from his soul time after time, his heart was melted, and his being was suddenly flooded with unspeakable joy. He did not know what to expect when asking for forgiveness of sins, but was quite satisfied with what God gave him. His entire life was changed. A new life was apparent thereafter.

Roberto found life to be full of conundrums. His father had taught him to drink liquor and then compelled him to leave home because of his drinking. He was asked to become a good man, and now that he had become a Christian, his family did not appreciate the fact. His mother was very indignant because he had become a Protestant and tried her utmost to persuade him to go to the priest, confess his sins and join the mother church. However, Roberto had a strong mind. He knew where he had heard the gospel and how he had obtained a change of heart, and he was determined to oppose everything which tried to halt his new religion.

From the day of his conversion the Jewish pastor took a great interest in him, making him a spiritual son to be loved and tutored. Bishop Elphick says that the pastor privately taught him the five books of Moses, chapter by chapter, giving him the Jewish and Christian viewpoints. He also was a strong-minded gentleman. If he wanted Roberto to do something, he never asked him if he wished to do it, but merely told him what to do. Without one word of previous warning, the pastor announced that Roberto Elphick was his assistant pastor. As coworker with Moises Berkwitz, he began to feel the burden of the work of the Lord. He was now sure that the Lord desired him to be a preacher of the gospel, and upon this vocation he set his heart.

One Sunday night a remarkable thing took place. The pastor called him to the platform and, before the congregation, without one word having previously passed between the two regarding it, announced an ordination service. He laid

his hands upon the head of Roberto and charged him to be a faithful minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, and a faithful shepherd of the flock of God. Roberto was so excited he hardly knew what was taking place, yet he felt and knew that God, too, was separating him' for Christian service, and that now he must give his entire life to the ministry. Without further ceremony, the pastor announced to the congregation and to the newly ordained pastor that he was leaving immediately and that the young man was the pastor of the church! Besides the church, there was a children's day school which Moises Berkwitz had established, and he must now care for both. Roberto felt he could not fail his beloved pastor, nor could he fail the flock, which was continually increasing.

As he was to give his life to the ministry, he felt the need of more training, so he went to a seminary in Santiago to study the Bible. While there he frequented the Methodist church and observed that they were outspoken against worldly amusements and preached against the prevalent sins of Chile. His admiration of their zeal caused him to join with them, after having preached for seven years. The Methodist Board first sent him to small appointments to see how he prospered. They found that wherever he took charge, the chuch grew immediately. Eventually he was chosen as bishop of Chile, which office he retained until superannuated. The outcast had become a bishop! The once despised prodigal was now highly respected and venerated!

Bishop Elphick was the first of his family to accept evangelical Christianity. The day he was converted he felt that his family must also enjoy the manna from God's storehouse, but their conversion was not easy to accomplish. However, God heard and answered his prayers. He was instrumental in winning his father, his mother and his brothers to the Lord. His mother was prevailed upon

to attend some meetings conducted by Dr. Hoover, and there she was convinced of the gospel truth and became a believer. The father was more difficult. Roberto prayed for him hundreds of times, but it seemed a slow process. He finally gave up the distillery and went back to engineering, which was a step toward victory. Then twenty years after Roberto's conversion, when an old man, he accepted Christ as Lord and Savior. Twenty years of praying had at last availed! Eishop Elphick says that one day he walked into his father's bedroom and found him kneeling in prayer, alone, speaking to God with a broken heart, his face streaked with tears and a soft glow of heavenly light visible on his countenance. Our Boys Abroad

DURING the past week we have had several interesting letters from servicemen.

This letter comes from Italy: "I give thanks to the Lord Jesus Christ continually for pouring out His Spirit upon us in these last days. I have received this blessed gift, all praise and thanksgiving to our Lord, since I arrived in Italy. Praise His holy name! I was led by the Spirit to a civilian brother in Christ while in Rome, and he asked me to write to the Pentecostal churches in America to request prayer on behalf of the saints in Italy.

"This brother's name is Joseph Costa. He has a large burden on his heart for Italy and covets the prayers of all the saints for these specific goals: (1) A united Protestant front in Italy to withstand the persecutions of the Roman Catholic. (2) For liberty in Italy—liberty to speak and worship. He tells me there are more Pentecostal Christians than any other Protestant denomination, several hundred in and near Rome; but they are poor in money,

and at present meet from house to house or use a small hall on Methodist property.

"He feels that the Pentecostal church would have a much better chance to overcome if they could meet in one assembly. These members of Christ's body have suffered many persecutions at the hands of the Fascists and Romanists, and the end is not yet, nor indeed will it be until He comes for His own. May it be soon, O Lord! Now they have a semblance of liberty, but what will happen when the restraining influence of the Allied Military Government is removed?

"I have read your Evangels, Reveilles, and C. A. Heralds for almost a year now, and received from them much food for my soul, for which I thank God and you."—Sgt. Rich-

ard M. Ball.


From Paris, France: "A few weeks ago I was transferred out of the 62d General Hospital to Headquarters in Paris, where I am at the present time. It was a little strange at first, having to leave all the old friends that I had made in the course of over a year, especially a few Christian companions, but I have met several new ones here in town, and can still see the old ones from time to time. I try to get back to the hospital every Thursday evening whenever possible, to attend the Bible Study conducted by one of the medical officers, a fine Christian man, well educated and with an interesting background of experience, having been for several years a country doctor in the South. His name is Captain John Glasser. For the past few months we have been studying the Gospel of John.

"Last Wednesday evening I attended a Bible Study conducted by one of the chaplains at the school where we are billeted. His type of study is more along the lines of a discussion group. He has a blackboard on which he writes certain questions, which are then dis-

cussed by the group. I was happy to find this chaplain a firm believer in the old truths of the gospel.

"A friend of mine, from a small church near Philadelphia, who is with an advance hospital unit near the front, wrote me sometime ago, telling me of a Christian boy friend of his who is stationed in a hospital here in town. He also wrote this boy, Bill Ehlers, telling him about me. Some weeks ago, I went to look him up, and we have become fast friends. He is the chaplain's assistant at this hospital, and is doing much for the Lord. The chaplain for whom he works is also a true preacher of the Word. I received a large package of French tracts sometime ago, and Bill has very willingly helped me to distribute most of them. The gospel is not being spread very much in this country. There is a real need.

"For a long time I had been trying to locate the Paris Pentecostal assembly, without success, although I had looked in the Paris direc-

tory and inquired through the Red Cross. One day, sometime ago, when I had gone out to the 62d as usual to attend one of the Bible studies, I missed the last train back into town, and had to stay there overnight. I went back into town the next morning on one of the cars, and sat on the back seat with a Frenchman. Upon handing him one of my French tracts, I was delighted to learn that he was a Pentecostal believer. He gave me the address of the Paris assembly, which I visited about a week later. I met the pastor after the service and he invited me to come back next week, at which time, he said, two other Pentecostal American soldiers would be present.

"While I was in England, I happened to run across a fine group of Christian officers and enlisted men who had banded together into a Fishermen's Club. They held services in different churches and assisted in some open-air meetings. There ware a number of excellent singers and speakers in the group, which made them welcome wherever they went. They welcomed me into their midst and we had sweet fellowship together. Then came D-day, and gradually some of us moved into France. I

was very happy recently to meet two of these boys here in Paris, where they are working. Christian friendship means a lot when you are in the Army and far away from home."— Ernest Kalapathy.

The following comes from C. Ingle, who is at the head of the Assemblies of God Soldiers' Institute, 70, Grosvenor Road, Aldershot, Hants., England: "Your publication Reveille is very useful and more readily accepted and read than many other evangelical publications.

"We can praise God for His blessing on the work here. Many have testified in our meetings that through the services of the Institute God has ministered to them, enabling them to continue in the way of life. Others have found the way of life. Some have been brought back to the fold; others have advanced in Christian experience, being baptized in water, and others baptized in the Holy Ghost."

In Germany: Some months ago we printed a card received from a soldier in a prison camp in Germany. He had written to Switzerland trying to get some *Pentecostal Evangels* and had been sent a whole year's supply. Last June we sent this brother five books, and he received them in November. He writes: "So very glad to receive your postcard, and

greatly appreciate the five books which I received today. I shall have happy reading for days to come. Realizing that the only joy in life is to serve the Lord Jesus, I'll go where He wants me to go. Please pray for me, that I may always be in His service."—Leslie Rowsell.

From "Somewhere in the Pacific" comes a letter from James K. Mc-Conchie, one of our Assemblies of God chapalins: "The joy of leading souls to Christ is of more exceeding glory and value than anything else that this life has to offer. In checking back, I believe I am correct in saying that in my work here I have seen an average of one soul a day brought to the Lord. That may not sound large, but when a fellow is continually working with the same

men day in and day out, the numbers are not so spectacular as when he is covering a large territory. After all, we may sin like the kings of old if we are given to too much 'numbering the people.' For His blessing and faithfulness I am thankful, and for the prayers of the Servicemen's Department and all the Assemblies in the homeland."

Let us not fail to pray continually for our men in the service and for the chaplains who serve them.

The Clothes in the Tomb

Christ's. If anyone had been raised it had been by a call from outside the tomb. Each, if buried, had had to be unclothed of the death-wrappings, and none had come forth clothed in eternal flesh. All who were raised died again. But in the Lord's tomb was something absolutely unique. It was the *same* body for it bore every wound that had been inflicted on the cross—a fact that makes any substi-

tution of a fresh body or the survival of Christ's spirit alone wholly impossible. Yet it was a *changed* body for it passed through locked doors (John 20:19) and ascended exactly as it was through the stratosphere into the heaven of heavens.

This change in the body the clothes proved. It was exactly such a body as Paul defines a true ressurrection body to be, "It is sown a natural body"—that is, it dies a body limited sharply by natural laws-"it is raised a spiritual body"equally a body, but a body now fitted for another world. "There are celestial bodies"-bodies built for heaven-"and bodies terrestrial"-physical frames suited for an earthly environment. 1 Cor. 15:40. Both are bodies of flesh, but the spiritual body is something we have never seen or known. The one resurrection, as distinct from resuscitation, throughout all human history lay disclosed in the undisturbed wrappings lying on the slab of rock.

Thus the whole Christian taith starts from, and is founded upon, a fact, and will forever rest here. And the fact, in this case, is supremely significant. If sin had been in Christ He could not have risen. And, had it not been on Christ He would not have died. But sinless, He was free to bear the death penalty for others. And pronounced still sinless by the resurrection, the sin He bore has been purged. The God of inflexible justice and awful holiness loosed the pangs that were ours and accepted our Sacrifice by exalting it, for if my sins were not consumed He would not be where He is. "When He had by Himself purged our sins, (He) sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high." Heb. 1:3. "Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted . . . God hath made that same Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ." The clothes, lying in their perfect stillness, are the silent witness of a world sacrifice and a world redeemed.

The skeptical thinker imagines that the intellect stifles the heart, whereas it is the heart that stifles the intellect. "Ye will not to come," our Lord Himself says. John 5:40. "Matthew Arnold," says Dr. Herbert Simpson, "was seated next an old friend of mine, who told me of the incident, on one occasion on the platform in London where D. L. Moody was preaching. On my friend's other side sat Gladstone, deeply moved, to whom, after the great evangelist had finished his address, Matthew Arnold leaned across, and said, 'I would give everything I possess to believe that.'" What the unbeliever rejects is not creed but fact! And the only saving faith in the world necessarily disappears with the fact. "If Christ hath not been raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." 1 Cor. 15:17.

MORE PHILIPPINE NEWS

We Are Free Again!

"This is such a momentous occasion for us, to be able to write a letter home and KNOW that it will actually get there!" writes Robert B. Tangen who, with other of our missionaries, has just been released from internment in the Philippines. "It is so hard to believe that we are at last free under the Stars and Stripes, but our full stomachs testify to the reality of the last few days. Bobby was sick to his stomach after his first real meal of oatmeal, ham and eggs, cocoa, milk, crackers and candy! He has grown up on Japanese food—without a vitamine in a carload!

"We are still under great emotional and nervous tension. The Japanese moved us down to Bilibid Prison from Baguio on the 29th of December. Bilibid, with its millions of flies and bedbugs, poorest sanitation imaginable, heaps and piles of filth, blackouts—and 600 calories per day!

"We were overjoyed to see real American soldiers—and what huge men they are! Perhaps our men-folk are just thin and pale. When the Japs set Manila on fire, the American armed forces evacuated the military prisoners and us to their headquarters in the north of the city. The fire was just one block from our prison when they took us away so quietly and efficiently!

"I can't describe the joyous welcome our soldier boys gave us. They have all, hardly without exception, been away from home for three years also, and they are so anxious to see other men and some white women and children! They love the children, and the children in turn almost worship the soldiers, because they brought them milk and real food to eat. I have never seen such kind, polite, gentle, helpful men in all my life. Nothing seems too small to bother with.

"We have gradually been reduced from many possessions to one suitcase, two blankets, and a mosquito netting. But we are supremely happy, and are all three in exceptionally good health, comparatively. We have been singularly aware of God's protecting hand and of the prayers on our behalf. The Red Cross and the Army will get us home, they say, as quickly as they can. So expect us home, without baggage, but oh so anxious!"

From Rena Baldwin

We are glad to share with our "Evangel" readers a letter received by Helen Johnson, sister of Rena Baldwin, who was recently released from internment in the Philippine Islands. She writes:

"At last we have an opportunity to write, but there is so much to say that I hardly know what to mention. So this letter will have to be only a sort of "Hello—good-by" affair but how we praise the Lord that it is a "hello"! . . .

"But please don't be alarmed. All I need is to get built up with lots of protein food. . . . Shall be coming home before long, the Lord willing.

"Blanche and I have had some opportunities during the occupation to encourage and help the Filipinos, and the work has been growing and prospering in spite of conditions. I have also had opportunities to write music and have quite a bit ready for publication. Some numbers especially have been made a blessing in camp

"Now I must get this mailed. Shall be seeing you soon, D. V., and shall have so much to say! We have been so hungry to hear from you, but no doubt your letters went to the wrong place. Neither of us has received one word from anyone all this time. But we have been happy in the Lord, and are anticipating a grand reunion one of these days. Much love. Rena."

European Relief

Reports reaching us indicate a very pitiful situation prevailing in Europe, and as time goes on, this condition will no doubt become steadily worse. It has been estimated by those who are in a position to determine such matters, that at the close of the war there

will be an immediate need of help of all kinds, both in clothing, food, and in medical supplies for around 140,000,000 people who will have been left practically destitute in the various European countries. In spite of all the help that may be sent at that time, it is further estimated that at least 30,000,000 will perish before assistance can reach them.

It is the purpose of our Assemblies of God organization to prepare help to send to Europe in cooperation with other evangelical agencies, and we are already negotiating with those who are in touch with the situation so that supplies may be sent out just as soon as it is practical to do so. Our purpose is to send with the clothing a message of the gospel, so that each garment will have attached to it a tract giving a gospel message. In this way, we will not not only be giving out material relief, but spiritual help also. It will take some little time to get everything in readiness; so we suggest local assemblies that are already collecting clothing, hold the same until further notice is given through the "Evangel" as to where such shipments should be made. For the moment, it is practically impossible to get anything through into the Balkan area where the need is going to be very great and where our work has in the past developed very encouragingly.

We are happy to report that we have been able to send considerable sums of money, even in war time, which no doubt have brought great relief to the pastors of Eastern Europe. We cannot do this regularly but just as our Government gives us a license to make remittances. A Call to Prayer

Brother Alva I. Walker now in his twenty-first year of missonary service writes from Peru:

"We praise the Lord for the privilege of coming to Peru, 'the land of the Christless cross,' with its cross-crowned hills where the false and the true are so often confused and where the gold is so mixed with the dross. A land that for over 400 years has been under the blighting power of the Roman Catholic church. Full of religious rites, symbols, and ceremonies, the people show very little evidence of the salvation that Jesus gives. To be subject to sin and yet profess Christianity is accepted as correct. We ask you to pray definitely with us for a Holy Ghost revival in this land. It has never had a real outpouring such as so many other countries have had. Out of a population of 7,000,000 there are some 70,000 members of evangelical churches (nearly half of these being Seventh Day Adventists), with a scant 150 evangelical missionaries, apart from Adventists. The possibilities and opportunities here are wonderful. We praise God for the ministry both of the Bible Institute and of the Gospel Publishing House here in getting the message of salvation to the people.

"While we were getting this news letter ready a new decree has just been signed by the President of this country absolutely forbidding any non-Roman Catholic open-air meetings or other religious activities outside of the churches. The Roman Catholic religion is the state religion here. Do pray for this country; darkness reigns here supreme. However, God is able to deliver, if we will pray."

HOW LONG, O LORD?

Growing casualty lists and the call for ten thousand nurses for the armed forces emphasize, as nothing else could do, the costliness of war and the enormous suffering it involves. In more and more hearts there is growing a deep yearning for deliverance from the awful scourge of war. It is a cry that only God can answer. It is time to humble ourselves, and pray, and seek His face, and turn from our wicked ways, and ask Him to heal our bleeding land.

A COLOSSAL BLUNDER

The initial crossing of the Rhine was made possible by what the Germans admitted was a colossal blunder. They had planned to blow up the 1,200-foot steel road and rail bridge at Remagen at 4 p. m. American armored forces, however, suddenly appeared at 3:50 p. m. disconnected the charge of explosives in the nick of time, and poured across the Rhine in force to open the battle for inner Germany. Thus the crossing was made without the great loss of life that had been expected. Surely it was an answer to the prayers of thousands of people who are praying daily for our servicemen. God answers prayer. Let's keep praying.

MONKS AND THE GREAT COMMISSION

Jesus commissioned His disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, but many monks instead have shut themselves up in monasteries and actually have taken a vow of perpetual silence. The Trappist Monks, a religious order in the Roman Catholic Church, live in a cloister and each day they walk around an open grave, wondering which of them will be the next to die! Another group of monks living near Rome, according to a recent newspaper report, carry out their vow of silence and at the same time run a distillery! What a strange interpretation of Christ's "great commission"!

JEWISH FISHERMEN

Jews are going back to their ancient trade of fishing. Over four million pounds of fish were caught in Palestine in 1940-41, the record year to date, and Jews caught about 40 per cent of this amount.

THE IEWISH REMNANT

Only twenty-five percent of European Jewry have survived the Hitler holocaust, it is estimated. In Tremblinka alone—a German death camp in Poland—more than three million Jews were executed in huge gas chambers, according to the estimate of a prisoner who escaped after a year in captivity.

JUSTICE TOWARD THE JEWS

The Jews must be allowed to enter Palestine at the rate of 100,000 persons a year, and their rehabilitation in their ancient homeland must be undertaken by the United Nations as a measure of historic justice, declared Dr. Chaim Weizmann, World Zionist Chairman, on the eye of his seventieth birthday.

A BILLION FOR JEWELRY

According to data on Federal luxury taxes furnished by the Tax Institute, the American public is buying \$1,000,000,000 worth of jewelry a year. For cosmetics Americans in 1944 paid \$45,000,000 in taxes alone. Tobacco taxes in the same period amounted to nearly a billion (\$988,000,000), and liquor taxes were still larger (\$1,618,000,000).

REACHING HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Horace F. Dean, chairman of the "Christ for America" campaign, puts his finger on the cause of juvenile delinquency: "godless education, combined with Christless home life." Millions of high school girls and boys never have heard a real gospel message. When they do hear, they respond and many believe. In a recent series of "Christ for American Youth" programs the workers have taken the gospel right into school assembly halls, where thousands have listened and hundreds have decided for Christ.

A CRUCIFIXION IN CHICAGO

Chicago was stirred when, on March 9, police found a man tied to a cross beneath the elevated tracks. Nails were driven through his hands. He had a crown of rose thorns on his head, and a minor knife wound in his side. A placard above his head called him "The Brother of Jesus Christ."

The man soon recovered from his wounds and the police began investigating. They decided he had submitted to the ordeal in order to arouse sympathy for his pro-Fascist economic theories.

If a city can be stirred by a publicity stunt such as this, how much more ought people to be stirred by the story of Calvary. And if a believer in an economic theory is willing to endure physical suffering in order to win followers, how much more ought Christian believers to be willing to endure hardness in order to win others to Christ!

BIBLES FOR RUSSIA

The American Bible Society has printed more than 400,000 Gospels in Russian and two editions of New Testaments, the most recent in the new Russian orthography. A supply of Bibles is being printed in Sweden and a reference Bible in a new format is being set in type in the U. S. A. The Society, through its Geneva office, has supplied Scriptures to Russian prisoners of war held by Germany and is supplying them to American chaplains whenever needed. So far, however, the Russian Government has not permitted any copies of the Scriptures to enter the Soviet Union. Let us pray that God will open that door soon.

MARKED BY THE NAZIS

Jews escaping from the Nazis tell a story that reminds us of the "Mark of the Beast" drawing ever nearer. In Upper Silesia, in a concentration camp where 1,715,000 Jews are said to have been exterminated, the refugees were sorted into batches of 100 or so and taken to "bathing" sheds, where, after having been stripped and completely shaved, they were "deloused" with strong disinfectant and carbolic acid that burnt their skins off. Then they were tatooed with a serial number "under the most primitive and inhumane conditions, which often led to fatal blood poisoning.' Two fugitives from the Slovak extermination campaign who escaped to neutral soil bear physical confirmation of this tatooing operation one with a five-figure numeral on his left leg and the other with a six-numeral figure considerably above the 200,000 mark on his. Does "the number of his name," in Rev. 13: 17, refer to a serial number?

WHILE CHINA BLEEDS
