HRISTIANITY is a historical religion based upon certain definite events that occurred in Palestine about nineteen hundred years ago. It is not built upon the faulty foundation of myths, man-made creeds, mistaken emotions, nor upon clever reasonings; but upon the impregnable rock of historical events that can be verified. Hence the only way for the unbeliever to destroy Christianity is to get rid of the facts-if he can. But he cannot, for, as Napoleon said, "Facts are stubborn things."

In 1 Corinthians 15 the inspired apostle states the fundamental facts of Christianity. (1) The atoning death of Christ. "Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures." But how do we know that this was an atoning death and that Jesus was really the Son of God? Because: (2) He rose from the dead on the third day.

But how do we know that He rose from the dead? (3) He was seen alive by hundreds of reliable, competent, honest, and sincere witnesses, many of whom were alive in Paul's day. From these facts flow all the doctrines and power of Christianity, and by believing them men are saved, sanctified, and kept.

What is the lesson to us? The foundation for our experience is not feelings alone, for they are so variable; nor appearances, for they are often deceptive; but unchangeable historical events concerning a divine Person.

How firm a foundation, Ye saints of the Lord, Is laid, for your faith, in His excellent Word!

Victory and blessing come by believing and acting upon these facts, no matter what our feelings or circumstances may be.

THE SUPREME MIRACLE

Among orthodox Jews it is the

Some time ago, a Jewish rabbi, in order to show that he held no prejudice against Iesus, prayed for Him when he was interceding for the departed. His wellmeant service was absolutely unnecessary, for three days after the crucifixion there was an empty tomb, that all the reasonings of the unbelieving have never been able to fill. On the tombstones of the dead for whom the rabbi prayed there would probably be inscribed the words: "Here lies So-and-so, etc.," showing that a deceased person was occupying the grave. But if the sepulchre of the Lord Jesus had been preserved to the present time, the only suitable epitaph would have been, "HE IS RISEN; HE IS NOT HERE." Mark 16:6.

The miracle implied by the empty tomb is the indispensable miracle of Christianity, because if the Lord had not risen


(2) The resurrection is the evidence for the atoning nature of Christ's death. How do we know that His death was different from that of any other death—that it was really a divinely appointed sacrifice for sin? Because it was followed by the resurrection.

(3) The resurrection is the power of the atoning death. A dead Christ could never be a present Savior of men. It is not enough that He died for men; He must live for them.

#### A PLEDGE OF IMMORTALITY

The testimony of all ages and all races is to the fact that in the heart of man there is a craving for life after death. The persist-

from the dead, ten thousand miracles would not have availed to establish His claims to divine nature and authority. He is "declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead." Romans 1:4. Spinoza, a Jewish philosopher of the seventeenth century, said that if he could be convinced of the truth of the resurrection of Lazarus he would accept the entire Christian system. But we affirm that once convinced that Jesus rose from the dead the acceptance of the incident of the raising of Lazarus, and of every other incident in the Bible, becomes a simple matter. The Lord Jesus Himself pointed to His resurrection as the final and full evidence of His divine character and heavenly mission. See John 2:8-22; Matt. 27:63, 64; Matt. 12:38-40. The empty tomb is essential to a full Christ, a full gospel, and a full salvation.

#### THE BRIGHT SIDE OF CALVARY

Is the resurrection of Christ more important than His death on the cross? The answer is that the resurrection is really part of the atonement.

(1) It is the completion of the death of Christ. At Calvary Christ died for us; by His resurrection He lives for us. On the cross His life was laid down in shame; at the resurrection it was raised in honor. The cross seemed to spell the defeat of Christ's cause; the resurrection was a proclamation of its victory. The

## Christ, Our Passover


THE Book of Exodus is the most wonderful book of types and shadows. The word Exodus is a Greek word, "Ek (ex)" means "out of," and Odus is the Greek word for a "way." So Exodus is "God's way out of bondage." The Book begins with groans, and end with glory. It shows the children of Israel in bondage, and concludes with them redeemed and God's tabernacle in the midst. What happened to change them? It was the mighty twelfth chapter which shows that through the shedding of blood there was a way out of bondage; and thank God, we have a way out today!

In the Passover there were two main scenes, the outside scene and the inside scene. First, let us take

#### THE OUTSIDE SCENE

The children of Israel were in bondage; the taskmasters were hard and cruel. Their lives were bitter with hard bondage; they were bound by an awful tyrant power, just as men are in bondage today. But God declared that He would get them out, and instructed Moses to tell the people to take a lamb without blemish, to be slain at a specific date. All this is true of Christ who is our passover. He was spotless; He was slain on the very month of the very day and the very hour of the day of the month that the paschal lamb died. Jesus Christ Himself was slain. The blood was to be disposed of in a special way. With a bunch of hyssop each door was to be sprinkled. The inmates of the blood-sprinkled house were sheltered, safe, secure, behind their bloodsprinkled portals.

This is God's picture of justification. We are saved from wrath through the death of God's Lamb, and by believing our hearts are sprinkled. The stroke fell on the lamb and those in the bloodsprinkled house were saved. In one single night God broke the bondage of centuries. This was Israel's beginning, beginning of

months, the birth of the nation. They dated their history, as a nation, from the very time they sprinkled the blood. This is true with believers today. Our spiritual

birth begins when the blood is applied. In verse 22 they were instructed to abide under the blood until the morning. Let us remain under the precious blood until the morning of His coming.

#### THE INSIDE SCENE

We have preached the passover and emphasized the outside scene, but it seems to me that we seldom have noticed the inside scene. Here we have the disposal of the flesh of the lamb. A feast was to be held within each blood-sprinkled house. Notice the amount of detail that is given with regard to the lamb—first, it must be roast with fire, not sodden or eaten raw, but roast. Undoubtedly this sets forth the fierce sufferings through which the Lamb of God passed in order to bring salvation to us.

Again, notice verse four; if the household be too little for the lamb, they were to get the neighbor in to help eat the lamb. This is glorious! It never for a moment suggested that the lamb was too little for the house. It says there is so much lamb that we need others to help us to eat. I am afraid of those people who shut themselves up in a corner and forget the lost and needy. If we have such a great Savior, let us do some soul winning and get others in to help us enjoy the Savior.

Eating the lamb is typical of communion. The blood of the lamb saves us from wrath; the flesh of the lamb sustains us, gives us strength to tread the pilgrim way. So our Savior is our life as well as our salvation.

Notice again, in verses 9 and 10, that all the lamb was to be eaten. The head, the legs, and the inwards. We can feed upon a whole Savior, and we shall need a whole Savior as we tread this pilgrim (Continued on Page Fourteen)

#### A RISEN TESTATOR

R OBBIE Flockhart constantly used to preach in the streets of Edinburgh, and he told this story:

"I had a friend in the army, and he committed some offense in war time, for which he was condemned to be shot. So he said, 'Robbie, I have to die tomorrow, and as I have a little money, I have made my will and left it to you.' 'Thank you,' I said.

"The next morning, instead of being taken out to be shot, the soldier received a free pardon; so he got his life and I lost my legacy, for a testament is not of force while the testator liveth; he must die to give effect to his will.

"And," said Robbie, "our great Testator is dead; we know that He died—they nailed Him to the cross; therefore, His will stands good. Let us go and take the legacy He has bequeathed to us.

"But," added Robbie, "that story is not enough to set forth Christ's work for us. Some time after, another friend left me a legacy, and he did die. Some lawyers got hold of the money, and I never received a penny of the legacy. TEN men—perhaps others with them -are assembled on a certain night in an upper room in Jerusalem. Its doors are shut that night, for enemies are about. The doors open once to admit two brethren, who come to them with cheering news from Emmaus. Still they feel sad and lonesome; some are utterly cast down by unbelief. Did the door open again? Or was it through the closed doors by a miracle that the long-looked-for Guest enters among them? No matter in which way He comes, He is here! In actual flesh and blood, for He challenges them to "handle" His scarred form, that they might be sure that He is not a mere apparition! It is too good to be

They break out into such delight that it quite upsets their faith, for Luke tells us that "they believed not for joy, and wondered." But He sits down among them, and eats of their fish and honeycomb in the old familiar manner. He pronounces upon them His benediction. He breathes upon them fresh spiritual power, after their late demoralizing panic and desertion. "Then were the disciples GLAD when they saw the Lord." His predictions are verified. They are no longer bereaved. Jesus is among them, the same divine Friend, Teacher, Comforter and Redeemer.

I love to study this scene. Through it, as through a window, shines in the inspiring truth that Jesus is a JOY-BRINGER. There is no greater mistake than to present Christ our Elder Brother to man-

kind mainly as the righteous condemner of sin. Rather we should present Him as both loathing sin and loving the sinner.

Turn to Isaiah 61, and read the passage which He expounded Himself in Nazareth's synagogue, as the inspired description of His own character and mission. To preach good tidings to the meek and liberty to the captive, to bind up the brokenhearted, to comfort all that mourn, and to give the oil of joy for sorrow—this was His errand from the skies. He came into the world not to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. The Cross brought agony to Jesus, but joy to the universe.

In how many ways is our Savior a bringer of gladness! Every sinner as soon as he feels the sting of his guilt becomes miserable. That sting he cannot extract with his own hand,

and while it remains it rankles. Nothing cuts and kills like sin. No wretchedness is so wretched as that of a soul convicted by God's Spirit. There is a story of a rich eastern master, whose most skilful artisan began to fall off in his work. The master spoke to his steward about it. The steward replied: "It is no wonder that the poor fellow cannot turn out good work. His hands tremble so that he cannot handle his tools; his eyes are so full of tears that he cannot see what he is about. A heavy debt is pressing him, so that he even drinks to drown his sorrow. While that debt remains you need not expect him to produce any more good work." "Then," replied the generous master, "go and tell him that his debt is paid." From that hour the artisan was a changed man. His tears were dried; he plied his tools with a happy heart; his work was done better than ever before.

JESUS had just been teaching the spirit of forgiveness, the sacredness of marriage and God's prohibition of divorce, and the blessing of the time when the Son of man shall sit in the throne of His glory, the redeemed sharing His reign with Him. Jesus gave them no promise of high position. Instead, He asked, "Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, and to be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" Poor sons of Zebedee! They answered, "We are able." How little they knew the meaning of their words, the price they would have to pay if they followed the suffering Savior. They saw a kingdom, Jesus saw a cross.

Without the cross there could be no kingdom, and without the cross in our lives there can be no triumphant Christianity. The cross cuts across many of our natural desires. It calls for crucifixion when carnal self would have its way. Unless we are willing to to take up our cross and follow Jesus, seeking to manifest His Spirit and loyalty, we will know little of the joys that come through being an overcoming Christian.



They are the words of the Master Himself. Were there ever such words spoken by any man? The agony of Gethsemane and the death of the cross is before Him. Yet he speaks as though He were going on a short journey; "I will see you again." John 16:22.

There is no fear in the tone. He gives no indication of a prehensive dread. He speaks with utter confidence and calm assurance. He knew whence He was, and whither He was going. He is from heaven, and is about to go back to the Father's house; howbeit He must go by the cross of death. But there is no thought that death might triumph and hold Him forever in its grasp. He will see His beloved disciples again—in a very little while. He was as sure of that walk to Emmaus after the hours of death as He was of His pathway over the waters of Tiberias on that memorable night.

"I'll see you again." What near and dear companionship is found couched in those words. I have been with you, walked with you, taught you, dwelt with you, dined and supped with you; and now I go away. But not for long, I will see you again—

in a very little while. I must go alone. I will meet the enemy alone and conquer him. I will come again from the dead; and bring with Me life. I will live again. And because I live ye shall live also. Farewell; I will see you again.

He speaks as one friend would speak to another on parting from him for a time. Have you not said the same thing yourself? Have you not had the same thing said to you? ence of this hunger for immortality is an evidence that there must be a future life to satisfy it, for God has not implanted within us persistent and recurring desires for which no satisfaction exists. Thinkers have sought the evidence of science and philosophy to supplement man's instinctive feeling of the existence of a future life. But Science has replied, "We do not know whether there is a life beyond the grave"; and the best answer that philosophy has given is, "There ought to be a future life."

After all the books that have been written on the subject, there has always come this objection, "But no one has ever returned from the grave and from the other world to assure us of life eternal." But Someone has returned to tell us-Jesus Christ, who rose from the dead and said to His disciples, "Because I live, ye shall live also." "The resurrection of Christ," writes Dr. Maclaren, "teaches us that life persists apart from the body. It teaches us that a man may pass from death and be unaltered in the substance of his being; and it teaches us that the earthly house of our tabernacle may be fashioned like unto the glorious house in which He dwells now at the right hand of God. There is no other absolute proof of immortality than the resurrection of Jesus Christ."

#### A PLEDGE OF BODILY RESURRECTION

The raising of Christ's body from the


dead is a pledge and a prophecy that all belonging to Him shall rise. He is the "firstfruits from the dead." Before reaping any of the newly ripe grain, the Jews in the time of Christ would reap one sheaf and offer it to the Lord; this was called the firstfruits. The consecration of part of the field meant the consecration of the whole; the reaping of one sheaf was a pledge that the Lord of the harvest would permit the reaping of the rest of the sheaves. Christ was the first One to be reaped from the field of the dead; this is a pledge that those who sleep in Him shall also be reaped in due time. "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him." 1 Thess. 4:14.

The Christian's salvation will not be complete until his perishable, earthly body is transformed into a deathless, glorified body; for full salvation includes the redemption of the body. When Christ returns He "shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto His glorious body." Phil. 3:21. No doubt the apostle refers to this glorious future event when he writes, "Now is our salvation nearer than when we believed." Rom. 13:11. Indeed, Christ's victory will not be complete until the body of every departed saint is raised from the dead-until this corruptible puts on incorruption, or this mortal puts on immortality-for death is Satan's victory. See Heb. 2:14; 1 Cor. 15:54.

Benjamin Franklin (although not an orthodox Christian) must have been meditating on this truth when he suggested the following epitaph for his tomb: "The body of Benjamin Franklin, Printer (like the cover of an old book, its contents torn out and stript of its lettering and gilding), lies here, food for worms; but the work shall not be lost, for it will (as he believed) appear once more in a new and more elegant edition revised and corrected by the Author."

#### A PLEDGE OF COMPLETE TRIUMPH

The resurrection of Christ is a perpetual guarantee of the revival of the



church in all ages. Time and again, persecutors of Christianity by word and by pen, after their efforts, have read the funeral oration over Christianity and the Bible, and have complacently invited the world to "view the remains." But hardly have they finished their boasting discourses, when, lo, a mighty revival has quickened the church, and it has stood upright in new spiritual power. How explain this? The church has a living Head, who has said, "The gates of hades (the world and powers of the dead) shall not prevail against it." The world that crucified Christ may also crucify the Church; but like its Leader, the Church will rise again.

It is written, "For He must reign, till He hath put all enemies under His feet." 1 Cor. 15:25. His resurrection is the pledge that He will reign—that He will triumph completely over all His enemies, and the enemies of mankind; a prophecy that:

Jesus shall reign where'er the sun Doth its successive journeys run; His kingdom spread from shore to shore, Till moon shall wax and wane no more.

## "Go . . . Jell"

RECENTLY DISCHARGED CHAPLAIN, U. S. ARMY

THE life of Jesus was poured out for others. From early childhood in the Temple to the last moment of Calvary He was busy about His Father's business, telling others the plan of salvation. He told the highly educated doctors and the unlearned stranger along the road, the rich and the poor, the religious and the sinners, the loveable and the unloveableall were told of their need of a Savior. Jesus never ceased to be concerned about others. Although He was suffering untold agony on Calvary He was eager to know of the welfare of others. He pointed the repentant thief to the celestial abode of paradise. He committed His earthly mother, Mary, to the care of John, and to John He declared, "Son, behold thy mother."

On resurrection morning His thoughts were still of others. "Go tell My disciples . . . and Peter, that I am risen." Could Easter be complete without His concern for others? What a wonderful Easter lesson.

This lesson was made unforgettable to me

on the Easter Sunday of 1945. I was with the First U. S. Infantry Division as we advanced through Germany. We had arranged to have a very impressive Easter service in a Protestant church. We had been in this village two days and the situation called for us to remain there at least three more days. The Easter service was carefully prepared. The organist had practiced on the huge organ, the

special musical selections were ready, the sermon was homiletically arranged. What a great day Easter would be, even in Germany in 1945. It all seemed too good to be true. The service was announced and a great crowd was expected.

Everything went according to schedule—that is, army schedule. Without any former warning we were suddenly alerted and ordered to move in two hours. This notice came through at midnight on Saturday. Even the chaplain's morale hit rock bottom!

We pulled out very early Sunday morning. This was not the first time we had waited several days and then moved on Sunday, but such is army life. After traveling all day we reached our position late that night. It was impossible to have any Easter service with the troops because of the long and steady advance. We never used the main highways or best roads when we moved up; we left these roads for those who followed our advance. This journey was very tiresome, with very little time for the few "breaks" we were given during the day. The dust and dirt stirred up by the long convoys of tanks and vehicles made the air at times unbearable.

My chaplain's jeep was following the medical

jeep in our column of the convoy. We had several tanks and tank destroyers leading our convoy. A squad of riflemen, about fifteen soldiers, rode on the outside of each tank. We were crossing some rough terrain of steep hills and dangerous curves when suddenly the word was rushed back to us, "Medics wanted up at the head of the column immediately; Chappie also." We knew something had happened in our convoy although we had not run into any enemy resistance.

The "Doc" pulled out of his position in the column and I followed in my jeep. As we reached the bottom of the hill, halfway around a sharp curve, we saw the gruesome scene. One of the tanks, blinded by the dust, had gone off the road on the curve and had turned over several times. The doughboys riding outside were thrown off and crushed beneath the rolling tank. The crew inside were not injured. The tank finally had stopped at the bottom of the hill in an upright position. Several of the men outside the tank were crushed to death. The other men were in


critical condition, and after receiving first-aid treatment were rushed back to the nearest hospital.

There was one man still pinned under the tank. He was alive and conscious and kept telling us how to dig toward him so that he could be freed. His legs were pinned under the track of the tank, his feet hanging outside, but his body under the belly of the tank. It was impossible to dig him out

because the ground was soft and the more we endeavored to dig the more the heavy tank settled. The tank had to be lifted, and this required another tank with heavy cable and chains. It would take at least another hour, because it was difficult for any other tank to reach this scene. Immediately we dug enough dirt from below the belly of the tank so that I could crawl up to the trapped man and talk to him. While others were working frantically to lift the tank from his legs I was able to encourage this soldier not to give up.

As we both lay there under that heavy tank I had my only Easter Sunday service. I quoted a few scripture verses and offered a short prayer. We then talked about spiritual things and this cheered his heart.

The scene will never be forgotten. This man trapped beneath the tank had been given morphine but his suffering was still beyond description. Several times he said to me, "Chappie, how much longer? I never knew anyone could suffer so much and still be conscious." He was a Christian, and he said to me, "I couldn't stand it if the Lord wasn't with me." With such terrible pressure on his legs, slowly crushing his body in agonizing pain, he still held his faith firm in Christ Jesus. He asked me many questions while we hopefully waited for the



signal telling us they were ready to raise the tank.

Some of these questions will ever ring in my heart and mind. He did not ask questions concerning himself or how he would make out, but time and time again he questioned, "Chappie, how about the other fellows? How are my buddies? They were my boys, boys in my squad." This sergeant was the squad leader, and he was responsible for all in his squad. His question was hard to answer, knowing that several were killed instantly. I told him what I thought best, withholding the worst. I don't really remember how I answered him, but I shall never forget his heart-felt concern that was so expressive in his question, "How about the other fellows?"

What a heart-searching Easter message to me. I pass it on to you. Easter is the triumphant message of the risen Christ, yet this message is not complete unless we are willing to go the limit in our concern to reach others. Our responsibility is to "Go . . . tell."

The trapped sergeant was finally released as the tank was raised from his body. He was given immediate medical attention and hurriedly sent back to the rear to the nearest hospital. The last information I received concerning him stated that he would lose his two limbs from the waist down, but he had an even chance to live. Can I ever forget this Easter Sunday in Germany? My only service was to a congregation of one, not in a beautiful church, but under a wrecked tank. Thank God for the opportunity of ministering for Him where the need is greatest.

"How about the other fellow?" has stirred my heart afresh. "Go . . . tell" are the words of our risen Redeemer. What greater challenge can Easter present? May God keep the triumphant life of Christ pulsating through every fiber of our being so that we may be enabled to recognize the need of others who travel life's rugged road with us. As we see them, God will empower us to "go—tell" them of the One who is alive to do untold wonders.

## The Passing and the Permanent

#### THE ONLY SOLUTION

"There is no problem on this earth tough enough to withstand the flame of a genuine renewal of religious faith," said President Truman recently.

#### "THERE SHALL BE WARS"

In the March 22 issue of *United States News* David Lawrence predicts: "Unless trends now appearing are reversed, war is to be a definite possibility within 10 or 15 years. War is becoming probable within 15 or 20 years."

#### READY FOR ANY EVENTUALITY

Instead of scrapping surplus warships, the Navy is putting them "in pickle," painting all metal parts with a special rust-preventing protective covering. Vessels so treated could be made ready for action within a month.

#### DIVORCE IN BRITAIN

The Archbishop of York predicts that soon all marriages in Britain will be performed by civil authorities. Marriage, he said, is no longer regarded by the nation as a whole either as a sacrament or as a holy estate, but as a contract which can be broken fairly easily by mutual consent.

#### THE GREATEST LIVING MAN

A teacher asked his scholars for their opinions as to who was the "world's greatest living man." Many gave the names of statesmen, scientists, and inventors, but one thoughtful boy answered, "Jesus Christ." The teacher protested, "I asked for the greatest living man, Billy." And Billy replied, "Well, sir, doesn't Jesus live? Mother says He is alive today!"

#### AT THE UNO MEETINGS

Says Dave Boone, the noted newspaper columnist: "No organization on earth would seem to need it more, yet those UNO meetings in the Bronx are opened without any prayer. . . . If the nations of the earth can't get together peacefully on a prayer, with mankind needing it as never before, what chance have they of getting together on anything else really important?"

#### MacARTHUR'S ORDERS

General MacArthur has issued an order severing diplomatic relations between Japan and the Vatican. This is a praiseworthy act, something President Truman so far has not done in American relations with the Vatican, though great pressure has been brought to bear on this point.

Another order by General MacArthur is less praiseworthy, however. He has ordered that kissing be introduced to Japanese movie films, something that never has been done on the screen before. Japan's leading movie actress declared she never had been kissed by a man before!

#### TESTAMENTS FOR YOUTH

The Gideons have found that 76 per cent of America's young people under eighteen years of age have no church connections whatsoever. There are 46,000,000 in this age group. This means that only 11,000,000 ever attended a Protestant church or Sunday school, a Catholic church, or a synagogue; while 35,000,000 have no contact whatever with religion. To meet this challenging situation the Gideons have issued a youth edition of the New Testament which will be given to each student in our schools who will promise to read it. Already 5,000,000 copies have been ordered and the gigantic work has begun. Let us pray that God will bless and prosper it.

#### A FETISH FOR SERVICEMEN

According to United Evangelical Action a Roman Catholic scapular has been widely distributed among servicemen. Issued by the Carmelite National Shrine of Our Lady of the Scapular, it is composed of two brown patches of cloth containing pictures of the Virgin, and it is worn about the neck on a string. "Whosoever dies clothed in this scapular shall not suffer eternal fire," the wrapper says. The name of Jesus Christ is not mentioned, and yet the Douay Version of the Bible says: 'Neither is there salvation in any other. For there is no other name under heaven given to men, whereby we must be saved." How empty are the hopes of those deluded souls who put their trust in the Virgin or in heathen letishes like this scapular!

#### TO PREVENT WAR

P. A. Sorokin, Harvard professor who forecast World War II back in the 1920's, predicts that a third global war is in the making unless "mankind begins to practice the Golden Rule" and live "in the spirit of the Sermon on the Mount."

"Neither UNO nor world government alone can prevent war," he asserts. "Since 500 B. C. there were 967 international wars and 1,623 civil wars as bad as international wars. Mere world government would only substitute increased civil wars for international wars."

He predicts that the next war will be atomic and will see bacteriological warfare. "The world is in a race for the most destructive weapons and spends billions for that purpose but does not have any single research institute for a study of what makes human beings good and how to make them practice the noble things they preach."

The learned sociologist, known as the most able of Harvard professors, is trying to establish such a research institute. May we suggest that such an institute has been in existence for nineteen centuries? It is the true Church of the Lord Jesus Christ, energized by the Holy Spirit who is the only power that can "make human beings good" and "make them practice the noble things they preach."

#### MILES OF DIMES

"We give miles of dimes to fight infantile paralysis," says an exchange, "but there are twice as many people dying from alcoholism as from infantile paralysis."

#### WE BUY THE BEER!

According to National Voice, the Army and Navy paid \$28,408,320 of the taxpayers' money to five brewing companies for beer which the servicemen drank at American military bases. This is only part of the bill; it covers only five of the breweries!

#### NOT SO EASY!

Talleyrand, Bishop of Autun during the French Revolution, was a most astute man. Someone said to him, "The Christian religion—what is it? It would be easy to start a religion like that." "Oh, yes," replied Talleyrand. "One would only have to get crucified and rise again the third day!"

#### THE ORIGIN OF EASTER

It is claimed that Easter is a pagan word used to describe a pagan festival, in which Ostara, the goddess of Spring, was worshipped by the Saxons. Believers turned the pagan festival into a Christian celebration, in which the Resurrection is joyously remembered. Is this peculiar transition from worship of a pagan goddess to worship of Christ not prophetic of the time when all paganism shall be destroyed and Christ shall be exalted as King of kings and Lord of Lords?

#### ANCIENT REMEDIES

Men boast about their modern medical discoveries: for instance, penicillin, the "wonder drug," made from a certain mold. But someone reminds us that in pre-Columbus times the Mayas, an American Indian race known to have had a high state of civilization in the first century A. D. and onward, cured many infectious diseases with "cuxum." This was nothing but a mold taken from damp wood or food made from plants. With it they cured leprosy and tuberculosis, as well as many kinds of infection. It is known that these Indians roasted green corn and let it stand until a red mold appeared, and then used it with great success in healing. Adam and Eve knew a lot of things modern scientists haven't yet caught up with!

#### FOR EUROPEAN BELIEVERS

According to Frank D. Lombar, executive director of the War Relief Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals, 5 shipments of clothing, worth \$95,040, have been made to Belgium; 2 to Holland, worth \$63,260; 2 to England, worth \$24,652; 2 to France, worth \$60,000; 2 to Norway, worth \$61,668; and 1 to Czechoslovakia, worth \$25,500. Gifts in cash have totaled \$69,245. Literally thousands of dollars worth of volunteer service has been donated by Christian men and women in the processing plant in New York City. The Salvation Army has provided warehouse space worth other thousands. The Assemblies of God are co-operating in this work. While this record is amazing in some respects, it falls far short of the great need among the evangelicals of war-torn Europe.

## Easter in Paraguay

I T was a treat to have Brother G. Kinderman, Secretary of the European Advisory Board, with us for the Easter service at Encarnacion, Paraguay. Our place in Encarnacion is not very large and cannot compare with churches in the States. We haven't pews, but handmade, backless benches; and a table serves as pulpit. There was no fashion parade with all its finery, but the simple story of the Resurrection became more real to our hearts. The Roman church goes through a lot of ceremony Easter week. On Good Friday they re-enact the Crucifixion on the street, but to many, Christ is dead. However, we can say with Job, "We know that our Redeemer liveth!" Allelujah!

After Brother Kinderman had visited some other European colonies, he met with us in Buenos Aires, Argentina, for the Bible Conference which started May 21. There were three meetings a day. Brethren Kinderman, Jeffrey, Sorenson, Leonard, and I took part in the Bible teaching. The Conference lasted through the twenty-fifth of May, which is a special day of fiesta in Argentina. Then Brethren Kinderman, Jeffrey, a native worker and I returned to Encarnacion for another Bible Conference.

On the first day of our Conference in Paraguay, it did us good to see all the workers on hand with their tablets of paper and pencil, ready to mark down what was necessary to remember. Distance doesn't mean anything to these people. Some walk to church; others ride in the springless wagon. When it comes to service and fellowship, God comes first.

Our evening services were somewhat special, for besides the messages—which were brought forth under the anointing of the Holy Spirit—

we had old-fashioned testimony meetings. Many wept as they testified; for in all their years of knowing the Lord, they had never been given the opportunity to witness for Him in the meetings. One person remarked, "In sixteen years of my Christian life, I haven't experienced such a blessing." Others said, "We haven't been in such meetings since we left Europe."

After the Conference, Brother Jeffrey and I, with some other brethren,

boarded the train for Carmen—while Brother Kinderman remained in Encarnacion. From Carmen we were taken in a springless wagon to the colony Fram, where we were to hold a couple of meetings.

The little wooden church, built by the believers from hand-sawed boards, was filled to capacity and many stood outside. These people don't fear the darkness of the night, the dread of the woods, nor jungle wilds. Their eyes are upon the Author and Finisher of their faith. Their songs are in a minor key, but contain a real message; and the people love to sing. The Spirit of God was outpoured and the Word went forth in power and authority.

When we returned to Carmen we found that we had missed our train (this train has no schedule). The next day we still couldn't get a train; so we hired a springless wagon to take us back to Encarnacion. If one is not accustomed to such mode of travel, he can become very sick as he feels every stump and

bump. Many times during the trip we thought the wagon would upset. Other times we had to hide under the seat because the forest was so dense and the branches were so low. We certainly thanked God when we arrived home again.

Soon our brethren had to leave us. We regretted that their visit had to end, but other places need the gospel too. So we continue to pray that God may use our brethren. Until we meet again we say . . . Adios!

Of this, their first contact with the mission field, they write: "Our missionaries have a fine compound in Lima, which houses the Bible School and printing offices as well as the homes of a number of the missionaries. We enjoyed our first contact with South American life and people, but the need for missionaries is at once impressed strongly upon you. I asked a Peruvian army man if he had ever read the Bible. When he replied, "No," I gave him a copy of John's Gospel. He literally grabbed it and wouldn't talk to me until he had read nearly the first chapter. This man was over forty years old."

Continuing their journey by boat, the Nicodemuses and Hales arrived at Antofagasta, Chile, on January 10. At this port they changed to a narrow-gauge train which would take them across Chile to Bolivia. "There being but one train a week from Antofagasta to Cochabamba, Bolivia," they add, "we had to remain in a hotel until our equipment had passed through customs and was safely on the train.

"Our train first crossed the barren desert land of north Chile, then began the steep ascent of the great Andes mountains, which took us to an elevation of nearly 14,000 feet. On January 18, we entered our adopted land, Bolivia, and our hearts breathed a silent thank offering to God for the privilege of bringing the gospel to this land.

"As we journeyed across the mountains of Bolivia toward Cochabamba, our hearts went

Pacific St., Springfield, Missouri. out to the thousands of Indians living in primitive adobe huts, taking care of a few sheep or llamas, raising a few vegetables, and dying—probably without knowing of Christ, the Savior. 'Has anyone ever taken the gospel to these people?' we wondered.

"Arriving in Cochabamba, altitude 8,000 feet, we found a hustling city of 70,000 people with only two Protestant churches! We are thankful we can raise our voices to declare the true gospel of Christ and let our light shine out in the spiritual darkness here. But more than ever we must pray together the prayer Jesus taught us in Luke 10:2, 'Pray . . . that He will send forth laborers into His harvest."

## Pioneering in Honduras Mrs. Wendell Cole

W E have made quite a number of trips by muleback out into the mountains to the country churches. Our little girl Sharon has fallen off only once, but still "hollers" if we have to ford a river (there aren't any bridges over these mountain streams). As for me, after eight or ten hours in the saddle there is just one thing this "tenderfoot" longs for, a nice soft bed! But no, you get there at eight o'clock at night, the service commences at about ten, and maybe you will get to hang your hammock to the rafters of the church by midnight. By that time the old hammock feels like a real innerspring mattress, and even the ticks and fleas can't keep you awake.

At the break of day you awaken to the methodical thump, thump, thump, as the women start grinding their corn between two stones to prepare it for tortillas. The people here are real experts at eating their food without spoons or forks. So when we sat down to eat soft fried eggs, beans, etc., without anything but a tortilla to eat it with, I'll admit I was slightly embarrassed. Of course I tried not to let them know, and went ahead eating, but it would slip between my fingers! The worst of it was, they were all watching me—an American woman is something many had never seen before, especially at close range. The result was that the

next morning we had three large spoons to eat with! I know someone must have traveled miles in order to locate them. But I surely felt relieved!

We have been so thankful for the hungryhearts we have found here in Honduras. About fifteen have received the Holy Spirit in one of the country churches since we last wrote. Before this, they had never even seen anyone receive the Holy Spirit, but their hearts werehungry and God answered when they waited before Him. Our own little girl, though only seven years old, was filled with the Spirit when we went out there to visit them.

Keep on praying for us, friends, as at times the burden is so heavy we can hardly stand it. There are as many as a hundred unsaved men at one time in the services. Only God can put the hunger in their hearts to get saved and leave the things of the world behind.

In the Lima area where there are close totwenty Assembly of God churches and groups meeting regularly, there are at least that number of open-air meetings held weekly. The changed attitude of the people as they listen to the gospel message is also cause for thankfulness to God. Where before there was fear, suspicion, hatred, now there is interest, sympathy, acceptance.

way. Nothing of the lamb was to be left
—if not eaten it should be burned with
fire. Why? It must not corrupt. It is written in Acts 2 that God would not suffer
His Holy One to see corruption; and the
flesh of the lamb must not putrefy.

Again, verse 8 tells us it was to be eaten with unleavened bread. Leaven always is a type of sin. The Israelite must search his house for leaven. It is not enough that the blood be upon the doorposts; if he is to eat the lamb, he must clean all leaven out of the house. 1 Cor. 5:7, 8 says, "Let us keep the passover, not with the old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth." You can't eat the Lamb with leavened bread, and neither can you commune with Christ if engaged in sinful things. What must we do? Put out the leaven, get rid of everything that is sinful. Do what the Jews do; have a leaven hunting expedition, but not in somebody else's house-in your own house! We need to take a candle and search our own hearts for leaven. "Let him that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity."

Finally, verse 11 tells us that the passover must be eaten with girded loins and staff in hand. This is to teach us that all who eat the Lamb must account themselves pilgrims and strangers in this evil age, awaiting the summons higher. Girded loins speak of readiness and detachment from earth. The staff in the hand is support for the journey. The shoes upon the feet signify that God provides our feet for the roughness of the way, for those shoes lasted forty years. What a salvation! Under the blood, leaven cleaned out, and feasting on the Lamb till we see His blessed face.
