To My Child

"You are so young, And I, who love you so, Am held responsible That you may know God's love!

And sitting down they watched Him there. Matt. 27:36.

THE cross on which Christ died was planted in a public place, on mount Calvary, just outside the wall of Jerusalem, near the main thoroughfare. The position of the cross was so public that it met the full gaze of all classes-the friends and also the enemies of Jesus. The cross could not be ignored that day. And the fact of the cross cannot be ignored today. Either we accept the cross of Christ and the salvation of Christ provided thereon, or we despise and reject so great a salvation and so great a Saviour.


THE CENTRAL CROSS

There were three crosses on Calvary's hill. In the center was the sinless Son of God. On the right hand and on the left were deep-dyed sinners. At first these two sinners mocked Jesus. But the Spirit of God was there, and He convicted of sin. But only one of those sinners yielded to the conviction. This one confessed his sin and looked to the bleeding Lamb of God who at that very moment was bearing his sins. That look of faith on the part of the dying thief brought him an abundant entrance into the kingdom of God, for Christ said to him: "Today shalt thou be with Me in paradise." Luke 23:43.

As Myer Pearlman put it, you see on those three crosses: one thief dying in sin, the One on the central cross dying for sin, and the pardoned criminal on the third cross dying to sin. Our attitude toward the One who died on that central cross will determine our eternal destiny.

Peter, looking back to that central cross, and the Lamb of God who died upon it, declared: "Christ also suffered for us . . . who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness." 1 Peter 2:21, 24. At that cross we leave our sins and receive His righteousness.

And since Christ yielded His body up for us at Calvary, is it not a reasonable service for us to present our bodies to Him, and to yield them so fully to Him, that from henceforth we shall not be conformed to this present evil world and its evil ways, but transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we shall al-

ways know and always do the good and acceptable and perfect will of God?

THE REALITY OF THE CROSS

We cannot avoid the reality of the cross. It was no bed of roses on which the Lord of glory gave up His life. The thorns that pierced His bleeding head were real. The nails that separated the tendons and bones of His hands and feet were real. The broken body and the shed blood were real. And those who will follow the Christ of the cross will know the reality of the cross in their own personal lives.

There was nothing aesthetic about the Roman arena in which the followers of the Crucified were torn to pieces by the lions. Their cross was *real*. There was nothing very ornate about the stakes to which the condemned followers of the Crucified were chained and burned alive. Their cross was *real*.

There was nothing aesthetic about the thumbscrews and the racks which thousands of Christians endured during the Dark Ages as they carried their cross for Jesus. Their cross was *real*.

It was a *real* cross that the thousands of Christians suffered in concentration camps because they dared, in the name of Christ, to oppose the neo-paganism of Hitler.

It has been a *real* cross to the thousands of saints in Russia who have endured unspeakable persecution, many of them meeting untimely deaths, because they were true to their crucified Lord.

And today, in America, there are many brave saints who are carrying a cross that is just as real to them as the cross that Simon was compelled to carry for his Lord

But, God forgive us, most of us are

seeking to avoid the way of the sacrificial cross, living in comfortable homes, riding in comfortable cars, coming once on Sunday to sit in comfortable churches, singing soul-pleasing emotional songs, listening to ear-tickling sermons that do not stir us to life like that of our suffering Saviour. But His call to all is, "If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself (that is, deny himself a life of selfpampering, and denying self on every line) and take up his cross daily, and follow Me." Luke 9:23. It is a call to lose our lives, to hand them over to Him to be planted in the likeness of His death. For did He not say, "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it

die, it bringeth forth much fruit"? John 12:14.

OUR CHOICE

We cannot ignore the cross of Christ. We must do one of three things.

First, we can trample it under our feet; we can tread underfoot the Son of God, and count the blood He shed on Calvary as of no value. But if we take this attitude, God will deal with us in wrath and vengeance, for someday He will judge us, and we will find it a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

Secondly, we can walk by it and try to escape it. We can live a life of self-indulgence, self-pleasing, and self-gratification, only to receive the "woe" of the One who has called us to a life of self-denial, to a life of daily taking up our cross and following in His footsteps.

Thirdly, we can say to our Lord, "Yes, I will gladly obey Thee, and by Thy grace deny myself daily; and by Thy grace every day I will take up my cross. I will yield to the many crucifixions that daily await me that I too may be a crucified one, following Thee all the way. Grant that I may always be able to say, 'I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me'; no longer I but Christ speaking through my lips, laboring through my hands, loving through my heart, and working in me each day His own good will and pleasure."

For me, the cross is a revelation of the love of God. The enemies of Christ thought it was the nails that held the Lord Jesus to the cross. But no, it was not the nails; it was love for you and me and it was love for the world that nailed my lovely Jesus to the cross. And it is His will that we should know that love

She looked into the faces of all of her children and then said softly and with a blessed assurance:


our ashes? Was not His mission to impart sunshine for our shadow?

I am sure in my heart that many of the saints of God are missing some of the richest graces of heaven because they have not discerned the truth of the Lamb for the household.

Does this mean that because a mother is saved that every member of the family is of necessity saved as well? No! Ten thousand times No! Does it mean that if the father confesses Christ as his Saviour that on the virtue of that confession alone all of the children are covered with the blood? It certainly does not mean that. I feel I cannot too strongly emphasize the great Scriptural truth I am about to declare.

In God's great plan of redemption it is absolutely necessary and imperative for every individual soul to accept the blood that was shed on Calvary as an atonement for sin. Men and women cannot be saved by proxy. They must decide the question of their soul's salvation for themselves. Moreover, it is my firm belief that there are many Spirit-filled and bloodwashed Christians whose children have died in sin and who will never see the inside of the gates of pearl. How sorrowful indeed it is to contemplate the truth that multitudes have rejected Christ even though they have been cradled in homes that loved Him. If these things then be true, what becomes of the doctrine of the Lamb for the house?

EMPOWERED FROM ON HIGH

DAVID declared, "Blessed be the Lord my strength, which teacheth my hands to war, and my fingers to fight." Psalm 144:1. The same Lord who equipped David will likewise empower us.

In the days when Israel was being oppressed by warlike enemies, the Philistines. God had to interfere, and He chose a man-a weak thing. And the man, Samson, chose a contemptible thing-the jawbone of an ass. The man in God's hand, and the ass's jawbone in the man's hand! And the enemies of God were slain by the jawbone of an ass! God is ever choosing the weak things, the contemptible things, the despised things, to bring to naught things that are. Our warfare is not against flesh and blood; it is against the principalities and powers of darkness, against wicked spirits; but God is today taking out weak women and ignorant men to defeat these enemies of God and enemies of God's people. But the secret of their strength is that which was the secret of Samson's-a mighty enduement from on high.

The Spirit of the Lord came upon Samson and he did exploits. God wants His Samsons today, on whom the Spirit of God can come in a similar way. The Spirit of God is mighty. If He can only find vent in a yielded instrument there will be no difficulty in overthrowing all the forces of the enemy. God must have His Samsons today because the enemy is encroaching; he is encroaching all around.

The man chosen by God is also a mark for the enemy, a special mark, because he is destroying the enemy's kingdom. The enemy sends a messenger most likely to trap. In Samson's case it was Delilah. She did not succeed at first, but the fourth time she did. The three warnings previous should have been sufficient. Samson paid a painful price for his faithlessness. But God did not utterly forsake him. In the prison he had opportunity to repent and call upon God. His hair grew again and his spiritual life was restored. God's Spirit once more came upon him. The enemies made sport of the man of God who was blind and helpless, but they forgot God.

The lords of the Philistines gathered together to offer a great sacrifice to Dagon their god. They rejoiced, saying: "Our god hath delivered Samson our enemy into our hands." All the great lords of the nation's government came together for the occasion. Thus Samson came in contact with the rulers and leaders in a way that he never could have done by going up and down the country. They made sport

of Samson, but he kept quiet, making no reply. He was waiting on God, and God heard his request. Better for the enemies had they never made him captive; his capture was their overthrow.

Samson cried to God, and the mighty Spirit of God came upon him. And he overthrew the temple. Thousands were slain, the heads of the nation were wiped out, and the Spirit of God and the people of God were vindicated. Samson himself died. Although the instrument of victory must die, the Spirit of God was not bound or destroyed. The Spirit returned to God who sent Him.

Oh, how the enemy exulted when Christ was bound by the high priest! The powers of darkness would say, "We have Him now." They made sport of Him and did whatsoever they wished unto Him.

They crucified Him, and they said, "It is finished." But with a louder cry, the Son of God cried, "It is finished!" Finished! God's purpose for the past, present and future, for the salvation of the race, had been consummated by that cry, "It is finished!" And He slew more in His death than in His life. He brought to naught at His death all the heads, rulers and governors of the enemies of God's people and of God Himself. Better for them had they never bound Him or led Him away from the garden.

Samson's work ended at his death. Christ's mightier work commenced after His death. For after His resurrection He received the promise of the Father, and on the day of Pentecost He poured

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forth the Spirit upon the waiting one hundred and twenty; and in that sermon of Peter's, at the voice of a man—a man who had been frightened of a maid—three thousand persons trembled, and were snatched from the kingdom of the enemy.

Jesus died and rose again, and received the promise to undo the kingdom of Satan and build up the kingdom of God. Today He is enthroned on high, for God has said unto Him, "Sit Thou at My right hand, until I make Thine enemies Thy footstool." Psalm 110:1. From that place of power He is pouring forth His Spirit, and the same blessed Holy Spirit who was given at Pentecost is at the disposal of the saints today. But let us mind the leakages, and let us beware of Delilahs.

In the exploits of Samson we see the divine strength manifest and overflowing. We see excess. And the inspired apostle says to us in substance, "Do not have an excess of wine and do strange antics; but be filled with an excess of the Spirit and do strange deeds." On the day of Pentecost the mockers said that the one hundred and twenty were drunk. God wants a people similarly filled with an excess of the Spirit these days—Pentecostal drunks! A drunken man has more natural strength than others, and it takes a number of men to hold him down. And a man filled with the Spirit of God has supernatural strength. The God of Samson, the God of Peter, is the God of the saint today. It is written, "They . . . limited the Holy One of Israel." Psalm 78:41. It might also be written, "They limited the Holy One of Pentecost." They would not do the former, but they would do the

God wants His Davids who are anxious to fight the giant. David was a stripling, a shepherd boy; and the trained soldiers, his brothers, sneered at him. The king would put upon him his armor and give him his carnal weapon. But the boy, the man of God, wants to be free, to have liberty so that he can throw stones. And that stripling not only felled he giant, but the armies of the alien were put to flight. God is using His Davids today, striplings, and the trained men He is setting aside. Oh, yes, they were brothers. David recognized them as brothers, but they did not recognize him as a brother. He was just "the keeper of a few sheep!"
They declared, "We have a fine company—well trained." But the training did not fell the giant. It was the Spirit of God and faith in God. Will you be one of God's Davids?

WHAT THE CENTURION SAW

THERE were marvellous happenings in connection with the death of our Lord Jesus Christ. There were mighty phenomena which caused the centurion, and they that were with him looking on the Crucifixion, to fear greatly, and to exclaim, "Truly this was the Son of God." What were these strange happenings? We find them described in Matt. 27:45-54.

The first was the great darkness over all the earth, from the sixth to the ninth hour.

MID-DAY WAS TURNED TO MIDNIGHT when the Lord Jesus Christ suffered. You recollect the scenes around the crossthe callous soldiers gambling over the clothes of Jesus; the mocking scribes. For three hours the body of the Son of God was exposed; but suddenly God began to move. His hand altered the course of nature, because something was happening which was to shake hell, something which was to effect the redemption of the world, something that was to have a far-reaching effect. I believe the blackness was God hiding the sun. When Jehovah laid upon Him the iniquity of us all, God hid the disfigured countenance of His Son from the gaze of a mocking world.

There was a blackness over the land for three hours. Christ's enemies had done their worst on Him; no one could recognize that Jesus once had a human face, so says the prophecy of Isaiah. They had disfigured His face, so that it did not look like the face of a man; they had beaten it out of shape, and had lacerated His back, making great welts on it, but God drew a curtain of darkness over the spectacle. When Jesus was born, the darkness of night was lit up with the radiance of the angels singing upon the plain, and I believe that when Jesus died, the darkness of the accumulated sin of the world was on His head. Sin must be rightly dealt with, for God is righteous, and when Christ died in our stead, He charged Him with our sins.

"And the temple veil was rent from the top to the bottom." The moment Jesus expired and said, "It is finished!" the temple veil was rent from top to bottom. You will remember the veil of the temple was purposely set to divide the two compartments, the Holy Place and the Holy of Holies. It was a massive curtain, blue, purple and scarlet in color, made of finetwined linen. There was no green in the tabernacle, because green is nature's color; but blue is the color of God's love to us, the color of heaven; and purple is the royal color; scarlet is the color of sin,

and the Blood which cleanses it. The Scripture tells us that

THE VEIL IS A TYPE

of the body of the Lord Jesus Christ. And what was the veil for? It acted as a barrier. However beautiful the veil looked, it barred the entrance into the Holiest of all; it shut out the Shekinah glory. And behind that veil, if you could have lifted the curtain, you would have seen the Mercy Seat, but all veiled. The Lord Jesus was lovely; altogether lovely; no one could find any fault in Him. But the beautiful life of the Son of God could never bring you and me to God; it is His death that saves us. The identical moment when Christ died on the cross, the priests who were ministering in this particular place in the temple were stricken with terror when the massive veil was torn from top to bottom. It tells us in the Acts that many priests were obedient to the faith. Why? Because they doubtless knew what happened on that day. If the priests could have disguised the fact that the veil had been rent, they would have done so, but they couldn't; it was indisputable. What did it mean? It meant that God had made bare the Mercy Seat. The rending veil opened a way into the Holiest. Do you know what the Shekinah glory typifies? It typifies the blessings of the Holy Ghost; we should never have the wonderful blessing of a life in the Holy Ghost, if it were not for the rent veil. Before we could live in the glory of the presence of God, the veil had to be

BUT THE CROSS STOOD,

rugged, triumphant, rearing its victorious head over all the turmoil below. When God gave the law on Sinai, it says, "Moses exceedingly feared and quaked" at the terrible blasts of thunder, and the cracking rocks. Sinai was a barrier, but Calvary is the answer to every claim of a broken law. Blessed be the name of the Lord!

Why Jesus Was Tempted



IN Matthew 4 we learn of the temptation of Jesus. Going from Jordan, Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, there to be tempted of the devil. Why and how was Jesus tempted?

Temptation had come to the first man, Adam, and Adam had fallen. Jesus came as the second Adam, the representative of fallen humanity, and before He could be judged worthy to redeem men He must prove Himself able to overcome the temptations before which all before Him had succumbed. Because of this, before He could begin His public ministry the quality of His character must be proved.

The first Adam had fallen when tested in surroundings of every creature comfort. Jesus was tested in the sterile wilds of the wilderness of Judea. The avenues of temptation were similar in both instances, the means alone being different. Adam saw beautiful fruit, pleasant to the eye, sweet to the taste, and above all, such as promised him insight that would make him equal to God in knowledge of good and evil. Jesus was tempted with dire hunger for needed food, then shown the glories of the world in which we live and promised the same. and, to test His deity, was invited to leap from the pinnacle of the temple and thus prove Himself to be the Son of God. Thank God, He triumphed. Had Jesus yielded to temptation, there would be none sinless in character, able to overcome the devil,

to take our place as Substitute for us poor mortals who have all sinned and come short of the glory of God.

The temptations of Jesus were real. They tested every phase of His character. "He was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin." And, "having suffered being tempted. He is able to succor (comfort and help) them that are tempted."

"Tempted and tried I need a great Savior, One who can help my burdens to bear If I but trust Him, He will deliver, He all my cares and sorrows will share."

What help it brings when we can go to a friend and un' urden our hearts, telling him all the distresses of the soul. feeling that he understands all about us. No one understands us as Jesus does. The Piercing of the Heart of Christ

THE message of the cross must first affect the one who delivers it; otherwise it may simply become a "pathetic storytelling." The service we render Christ must ever be subordinate to the gratitude we feel for His salvation.

A Roman spear rends the heart of Christ. This is man's final thrust at the body of the Son of God. The sword at His birth, the brow of the hill at Nazareth, the stones raised in the temple, the lash, the reed, the thorns in the judgment hall, the cross on the hillside, and now the piercing of the heart of the One who loved to the last!

"The heart of man is . . . desperately wicked." The heart of Christ is divinely pure. The Roman spear pierced it, to spill, as it were, the love of heaven onto a cursed earth; to open the fount from whence would flow the cleansing stream; to prove to men the measureless mercy of God.

What does the broken heart of Christ excite in us? After such a vision, can we live the old self-centered life we used to know before conversion? If we do, the heart of Christ has been broken in vain. Never! We must consecrate ourselves to Him who died for us. Our hearts must be full of love to Him, love shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost. Our lips must be filled with psalms of His praise. Our eyes kept on the blessed focus of His face until His rising glory needs a veil to fall between. We love Him—because He first loved us.

But even service for the Lord can become self-centered if we do not watch and pray. The pure delight we find in the Lord Himself and in His salvation can be supplanted by a love of service for Him. The work itself can become the passion of life, instead of the Christ. We must serve Christ, but we are

not saved primarily to serve. We are saved to worship God in spirit and in truth. The Father seeketh such, We will naturally serve if we are saved, but worship must ever come before service.

When service for Christ exceeds our love for Him, then the story of the cross becomes a message rather than an experience. We shall be repeating its pathos without experiencing its pain. The story of the suffering Saviour may make our hearers weep, and their weeping may give us a secret pleasure—rather than a similar sorrow—because we have told the story well! The Lord forbid! We are not called to tell stories, even spiritual ones, for the interest of the curious. We

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

The Suffering Saviour

HEAR the command—I, miles, expedication crucem—"Go, soldier, get ready the cross." It must have been in some such words that Pilate gave his final order. The cross was a rough structure. They would waste no trouble on such an instrument of shame and torture. But it must be strong enough for its duty, and so the crossbeam is quite heavy. This cross-beam is laid on Jesus; He sinks beneath it. What wonder?

Jesus has been scourged already. Scourging itself was a terrific punishment; the long leather thongs, armed with bits of bone or iron, brought down with pitiless blows upon the bared back, bit to the quick and spat forth blood.

Only the night before, Jesus had been swept through with plunging tides of the deepest and tenderest emotion as He had said the farewell words to His disciples in the upper chamber. After that, there had been the midnight spiritual agony of Gethsemane. There had followed the arrest, the various trials, the journey from the Sanhedrin to Pilate's house, from Pilate's house to Herod's palace, from Herod's palace back to Pilate's house, and the multiplied and various buffetings and derisions. And through all that tumultuous, torturing night, no sleep had laid its rest on Jesus for an instant.

Our Lord is stripped of His robe. The back, lacerated by the scourging, is laid upon the uneven wood; the arms are stretched along the cross-beams; at the center of the open palm, where the nerves tangle, a blunt nail is sent crashing through into the wood by blows of a mallet; also the feet are nailed, and, perhaps helped slightly by a projection, affording the body a little support, the body hangs there on the cross from four great wounds.

What physical agonies must have centered in that Sufferer! What dizziness, cramps, thirst. starvation, sleeplessness. fever, mortification of untended wounds. the constrained position of the body, the back cut by the scourgings pressed against the hard wood, torture shooting from hands and feet where the nerves and sinews so thickly interlace, broken and damaged by the nails, the circulation checked by the tension of such posture of body, the oppression of the heart as it vainly tries to drive the blood, the Sufferer denied even

the relief which would come from the free bleeding of the wounds—for such wounds could bleed but slightly—the blows of pains which smite the head surcharged as the brain must be with blood, the difficulty of breathing, the noonday sun shooting its glare and heat, the hot wind drying up the moisture of the body.

Consider the *spiritual* agonies pressing upon that Sufferer. There is that cry which discloses them and yet veils them—"My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" and at last, as Froude tells us in his *Physical Cause of the Death of Christ*, there was literally the heart broken under the spiritual agony of bearing our sins.

I am sure it is not well, usually, to dwell on the sufferings of this awful scene in detailed description. But I am sure it is well sometimes to gather into focus the statements of the Scripture concerning the Crucifixion, that we may gain some faint conception of what that atoning Crucifixion, by which we are forgiven and saved, cost the Son of God.—The Dawn.

Religiosity — Without Salvation

WE are most impressed by the religiosity VV of the people in Brazil. It is hard for you in the United States to realize what it means to have a religion dominate not only the church but also the home and state. How would you feel if you were awakened every morning at six o'clock by someone in the local Catholic church singing "Ave Maria" over the public address system? This is repeated every evening at six. How would you feel if, traveling from town to town, the first thing you would see as you entered a city would be a huge Catholic church occupying the most prominent place, usually upon a hill-symbolic of the domination of the priests over the laity? In spite of all this religiosity, the people are still "dead in trespasses and sins," crooked in business, false to their neighbor, and indulgent in the deepest of immorality.

Only a few rich possess what we Americans call "necessities" of life. Illiteracy is widespread. Many people know nothing of what takes place beyond the four corners of their homes. Indeed, every house is surrounded by walls, which represents the fear and distrust men have for one another. Filth and disease are commonplace. And the many dogs that yap far into the night give one a lonely, weird feeling, making him realize at once that he is far away from home and loved ones.

If this were all of which missionary life consisted, we would take the first steamer home. But we have been sent forth by the great King, the Giver of Life. He has given us a gospel of power to hold forth, "for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth." That power has transformed many lives in Brazil and has made them new creatures in Christ Jesus. Old things (images and rosaries) are passed away, behold, all things are become new.

Pray for us, please, that God will grant strength and health, and help us in our language study. We are glad that the Lord of the harvest has sent us to this part of His harvest field to reap. May all of us remain faithful harvesters, in our respective fields, until He comes for us.

Elaine Daniels, Ica, Peru.—On Saturday nights we have a street meeting down by the river. We always have a good crowd there, and many buy literature afterwards. At the close of the "aire libre" we go to the hall across the river for another meeting.

People here read a great deal, especially the young. Saturday night a young man bought a Bible on the street. At the hall another young man bought a Bible. Both men returned for Sunday School and the first man came back Sunday night. He was very sincere, and when the altar call was given, he spoke right out saying he wished to accept the Lord. It must have been the first time he had heard the gospel, for Monday morning he asked us what we called what he had done Sunday night!

A sign above the entrance, with the name "Templo Evangelico"—Gospel Temple—and the Spanish word for welcome painted just below, stands out as a bright testimony of His saving grace and never dying love for all men.

God has added His blessing and proven His faithfulness in every service since the opening on October 27. Because of the unusually strong Catholic bondage for the past four hundred years, Bolivia is not a land of multitudes flocking to hear our message, but the twenty to forty dear people who have entered the mission at each service have been really hungry for the gospel.

One Sunday morning, twenty-one little children crowded around our classroom table—the missionary was the only teacher, so we could not divide the class. Felipe, our carpenter, is a young Indian lad of some twenty years. Having been born and reared in poverty, he learned early in life to work with his hands—that is, when he felt like it. When he came to work for us, the only Christ that he had ever heard of was the "dead one" spoken of by the "awful men in black" who held this religion of bondage and fear over Felipe's people. No one had ever come to tell his people a different story, so what could they do but believe these fearful things.

The light began breaking through Felipe's darkness for the first time as he learned of the Savior's love while he made Sunday School benches and tables, and helped the new missionary prepare a "house for God." Each day the light of the gospel broke a little more on Felipe's poor darkened soul until, at the close of the third service in the new mission hall, this young Indian lad made his way to the altar bench that his own hands had helped to make. That night his soul was born anew, and Felipe began to walk with his new-found Friend and Savior. He is always in the services and in the instruction meetings each week in our home. 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Peruvian Persecution

THE present Peruvian government is quite liberal and democratic. The Apra party, which is the left-wing party in power, has an intensive program of propaganda and culture, with teaching centers in almost every town of importance. They believe that change by violence is a mistake, and that the people must be taught the basic principles of revolution. One of the results of their intensive propaganda effort has been a more tolerant spirit among the people.

A month ago (November) the Roman Catholic hierarchy put pressure upon the government and made them enforce a decree passed by the former government, forbidding open-air meetings and propaganda by the Protestants. At the same time, the brethren from one of our churches in Lima went out on Sunday morning to preach in the open air as they were accustomed to do. They were nicely started when the police came and ordered them to stop. In the

meantime a crowd had gathered, demanding that the police leave the workers alone and allow them to go on with their meeting.

The same thing happened in many places. Our native pastor in Huancayo had to spend one night in jail. But the next day the local paper came out with an editorial condemning the unjust and intolerant action of the authorities. This from an editor who was not an evangelical!

Since I travel so much, I always give out tracts and booklets in the buses. One day I gave a booklet to a policeman. About a week later I met him again on the same bus, and he asked if he could buy a few dozen copies of the booklet which I had given him. I found that he was an evangelical, trying to do a work among the prisoners under his charge. He said that many of them were interested and would read the literature given to them.

The annual conventions in Huancayo and Huaraz were especially good this year. More and more we are establishing regional conventions all over Peru and they are proving a blessing. In fact, there are good reports from our work in nearly all parts of Peru. People come from long distances to attend the conventions. And in the case of the Huaraz convention, all arrangements such as providing food and shelter, etc., were entirely handled by the Indian brethren.

A continuous revival has been going on in Garaz for several months now. More than twenty have received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. After receiving the Holy Spirit, some have had a burden of intercession for the lost come upon them. We believe this is going to have a real influence in the work.

THE HOUSING SHORTAGE

Americans "wasted enough money for alcoholic beverages last year to pay for a million new homes critically needed for veterans," according to Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin, National WCTU President.

Marian Anderson, noted Negro contralto, speaking recently upon the religious character of her race in America, remarked that the racial problem is "at bottom a religious problem, and that the religious solution must be made before any solution (political, social or economic) can be effective." MISSIONARIES TO JAPAN

According to the Foreign Missions Conference, the Protestant denominations of America plan to send 500 missionaries to Japan within the next three years. These will supplement the 65 Protestant workers already in Japan. The number, however, will include doctors, scientists, agricultural specialists, and modernistic preachers, as well as true missionaries of the Cross.

EUROPE'S ORPHANS

A recent survey shows that there are 11,000,000 orphans in Europe, while 13,000,000 hungry children are in a pitiable state of malnutrition. Their social and economic needs are great, but their spiritual needs are even greater. Pray for Europe's children.

HISTORY OF A SOUL

A colporteur gave a New Testament to a soldier. Years later he died, and the Testament fell into the hands of a Christian worker. He found the first few pages torn out, but written on the inside of the cover were these words: "Received at Toulon. Despised. Neglected. Read. Believed. Found salvation." Just one more fulfillment of God's promise concerning His precious Word: "It shall not return unto Me void." Isa. 55:11.

SUPER-ATOMIC POWER

A leading seismologist says that the subsea earthquake which shook Japan and produced a disastrous tidal wave, late in December, had a force one hundred thousand times greater than the atomic bomb that fell on Hiroshima. Men tremble at the thought of atomic bombardment—but what will it be when God's declaration is fulfilled, "Yet once more I shake not the earth only, but also heaven"? Hebrews 12:26. None shall escape except those that take refuge in Christ.

REVERSING THE TREND

It is reported by Brig. A. G. Kenchington, British Military Government expert for displaced persons, that 5,000 German Jews in Palestine have filed petitions for entry into Germany. "Conditions apparently are not so rosy in Palestine as many had anticipated," he said, giving bad housing conditions as the cause of the dissatisfaction. Is the Zionist cause failing? Zionism has been described as the effort of unregenerate Jews to accomplish by human efforts that which God has planned to accomplish in His own way.

THE POWER OF THE BLOOD

One of New York's wealthiest churches, which conducts a large social settlement in a needy part of the city, issued its annual report. It was extremely pessimistic. A vast expenditure of effort and money had been made, and not a single conversion. Referring to this fact, an editor made this significant statement: "The modern scheme for raising the masses by education and improved environment has failed. Not a soul has been saved by the great outlay of money and effort furnished by this wealthy church. But in the same locality there is a strange band of men and women who parade the streets each night with drum and tambourine to collect fallen men and women to hear them preach; and though they preach but one thing, salvation through the blood of Christ, there is not a single night that souls are not saved. Say what you will, that old despised doctrine of blood is the only power that can lift the masses."

A Personal Interview

MYER PEARLMAN

"I felt my heart strangely warmed," said John Wesley in describing his first living contact with Christ. And that is the way Andrew, the brother of Peter, would have described the result of his interview with Jesus. Elated by a soul-stirring discovery, he rushed up to his brother Peter and made an announcement calculated to quicken the pulse of any good Israelite: "We have found the Messiah!"

"And when Jesus beheld him," continues the narrative, "He said, Thou art Simon the son of Jona, thou shalt be called Cephas (Peter), which is by interpretation, a stone."

What did Jesus mean? In the Bible a change of name implies a change in nature, position or experience. For example, when Jacob the cheat became an overcomer, his name was changed to Israel.

A well-known missionary tells us that such is the understanding among certain African tribes. The birth-name, so argues the native, was given without his permission and it therefore has no significance. Should not a name be an appropriate picture or photograph of his character? he asks. And on the basis of this reasoning he selects-and even buys-a new name that shall be descriptive of what he is and of what he does. "No wonder," said this missionary, "when you tell an African that in heaven we shall have a new nature, the rejoiner is, 'Then we must get a new name.' '

A new nature calls for a new name. In Peter's case the change of name marked a turning point in his life-the time of what we may loosely describe as his conversion.

The change of name was also a promise of transforming power. When Peter stood before the Master he must have reasoned thus: "How shall I, a man of weak, unsteady character, be worthy to enter Messiah's kingdom?" Reading



his unspoken fears the Lord as much as said, "I know that the man known as Simon has a reputation for impulsiveness, and rashness and instability. But be of good cheer! As I know what you are so I know what you shall be. Come to Me just as you are, and I will make you an immovable stone in My kingdom. As a pledge of this your name shall be Peter."

The Christ is just the same today. He receives us in our sins because He knows He can cleanse us. He receives us in our darkness because He knows He can illumine us. He receives us in our weakness because He knows He can make us strong.

The Ouilavute Indian Reservation has just witnessed its first water baptismal service, when thirty-one Indian converts were immersed. Pastor and Mrs. George Effman, who have labored diligently among the Indians for the last four years in the little town of La Push, Washington, are beginning to see the fruits of their faithful labor. God has wonderfully visited the reservation in a great wave of salvation. They report that fifty Indians knelt at the altar and acceped Christ during the special meetings, and as a result they have established a temporary church roster with about forty names.

"Best Revival Meetings"

Brother and Sister Ralph Buchanan, missionaries to the Indians on the Fort Hall, Idaho, Reservation report as follows: "We have just concluded one of the best revival meetings that we have ever had. The weather was very cold, and there was much snow, but night after night the Indians came, some walking several miles each way. It is now an everyday occurrence to be called to an Indian home to pray for the sick and see God raise them up, and we are thrilled over and over again

Why We Joined the N. a. E.

J. R. FLOWER

The decision to join the National Association of Evangelicals was made at the 1943 General Council. The decision was reached after representatives of the Executive Presbytery had visited the preliminary meeting of evangelicals in St. Louis and had studied the issues involved. The reasons for joining the Association were then presented on the General Council floor and action was taken to associate the Assemblies of God with the N. A. E.

There is a most definite reason for a united Protestant voice on all moral and religious questions. The voice of a minority denomination has little or no weight. The U. S. Government has recognized the Catholic Church because of its unity of purpose, and because this church has known what it wants and does not hesitate to go after it. The Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America has attempted to represent all Protestantism, and the denominations in the membership of the F.C.C.A. can be articulate through that association.

But the Assemblies of God, along with many other evangelical groups and individual churches, cannot join the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, because of its purpose to control Protestantism, and because of its modernist approach to all religious problems. Many reasons can be given why we cannot permit the Federal Council to speak for the Assemblies of God, but we shall refrain from listing them in this article.

Attempts have been made in the past to organize Evangelicals, but most of these attempts have been exclusive, recognition being given chiefly to those of Calvinist and pre-millennial persuasion. When the American Council of Christian Churches was formed it adopted the same policy of exclusivism as its predecessors. The Assemblies of God were not welcomed by the American Council; in fact, we have been attacked openly by that Association. Unfortunately, this attitude has not been clearly understood by many of our ministers.

When plans were formulated for the organization of the National Association of Evangelicals, a simple doctrinal statement was adopted which would permit any group of Evangelical faith to join upon subscribing to the Doctrinal Statement. This made possible the co-operation of the most extreme Calvinists with Arminians, groups of Christians which formerly had little or nothing in common. The Holiness groups had always been excluded from Fundamentalist circles in the past. In the N. A. E. the Free Methodist, the Wesleyan Methodist, the Pilgrim Holiness, the Nazarene churches can meet with the Assemblies of God, the Church of God of Cleveland, Tenn., the Pentecostal Holiness Church, the Open Bible Standard Churches and a host of other churches such a Bap-tist, Presbyterian, Christian Reformed, etc. The barriers of prejudice which had existed between God-fearing, Bible-believing Christians are being broken down. And this is taking place without the necessity of compromise on any point of distinction which sets these denominations apart one from another.

And what are the benefits being derived from this association? Apart from the difficulties of co-operating in local evangelical efforts, which we recognize, there are some very definite benefits. Among them are the following:

The setting up of a new Evangelical Foreign Missions Association with offices in Washington, D. C., and New York City. This E. F. M. A. is rendering free service to any Evangelical body and has been successful in securing passports for missionaries at times when passports were almost unobtainable.

The organization of a National Sunday School Association which is sponsoring a new series of Uniform Sunday School Lessons. Representatives of the Gospel Publishing House are having a profound influence upon the selection of lessons in this series, which will be soon offered to the Christian world in competition with the International Sunday School lessons, which are dominated by modernism, and which emphasize a social gospel instead of the gospel of Christ.

Possibly one of the greatest services resulting from the N. A. E. influence was the setting up of an Evangelical War Relief service, which has been sending both food and clothing to Europe for distribution through Protestant channels in large quantities. The Assemblies of God have been using this service and much of the relief has been dis-

tributed through Pentecostal channels in Holland, Belgium and France.

The N. A. E. is primarily a service organization, which has made its services available to the Pentecostal people. That is one reason why we became a member.

The N. A. E. is publishing a news-magazine twice a month, which is packed with news items of interest to all Evangelicals. The price is \$1.00 per year. At the present time, four three-month subscriptions are being offered for one dollar in order to introduce it to the public. ning all through the Scripture is a truth that thousands of Christians have failed to grasp. It is this: The child of God is an hetr of promise. If in all sincerity and faith in Jesus we commit our loved ones to His care and keeping the day will come when they will surrender their hearts to Jesus. It may be after mother has gone to glory, but they will come home just the same. Perhaps it will be after father has been laid away—but it will not alter or change the promise of our Lord. If in faith and trust we believe God for the salvation of our children I believe that Jesus simply has to make good His promises and bring them all safely into the fold.

Our trouble is that we destroy our faith and our confidence by our doubts and our fears. We let anxiety rob us of that sweet and blessed peace which the pilot of Galilee can speak to the troubled waters of the soul. If only we could learn the lesson of committing our loved ones to the Lord as we commit our burdens and our cares-what sunshine would begin to steal through the dark chambers of the heart! To put it in perfectly plain language, it is my belief that if you can commit your loved ones to Jesus and in faith and in confidence trust Him to fulfill His promise, the day will come when the convicting power of the Holy Spirit will be so great they will not be able to resist. While I do not believe they can be saved on the basis of your salvation alone, I believe there is Scriptural foundation through your salvation for you to claim their souls before God.


In Egypt Land

untold. The hyssop was a type. The basin was a type. The angel of death was a type. The house was a type. Pharaoh was a type. The Egyptians were a type. The lintel was a type. The blood was a type. In fact, the whole transaction offers the most beautiful and complete story of typical salvation that the Scripture affords.

Is it possible that there is one important part of this whole proceeding that was not typical? I cannot believe it. To me it pulsates with the glory of God. It breathes of heaven—it speaks of my salvation and the redemption of those I love. I believe in the Lamb for the house. Let me ask a question here. If the eldest son of that family had refused to go into the house what would have happened? The answer is obvious. The covering of the blood had to be over him.

Back of the blood on the lintel and the doorpost was the promise of God. Nothing in heaven or in earth could ever break that promise. All of the powers of hell could not violate the truth of the Word of God. That is the basis for the doctrine I am preaching. That is why I want to bring encouragement to all of you dear people who have sons and daughters out of the ark of safety. You have the promise of God back of you. Trust Him for the salvation of your sons and daughters, and all of those whom you love. Why not begin to believe Him instead of allowing doubts and fears to destroy your peace of mind?

Do not relax in your vigilance in talking to them about Jesus. Do not forget the necessity of prayer, for the fires of faith burn only when the oil of prayer is poured upon the altars of consecration. The lamp of faith grows dim when prayer ceases in the temple of the Lord. But oh, how great the joy and how wonderful the peace that comes when we hold our children up before the Lord and claim for them the Father's promise!

Thus Saith the Lord

You have often read Proverbs 22:6. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it." The wise teacher in this clear and concise statement was emphasizing the same truth I am endeavoring to give you now. He was, of course, bringing into it the law of the harvest that merely adds to the sum total of faith regarding the bringing of the lost ones into the fold. "Plant the seeds in childhood, and," he says, "some day the harvest will be reaped." It may not be in youth, or in young manhood. We may have to wait until old age comes and the hand that sowed the seed is no more, yet the harvest home will be gathered in the fertile soil of the heart of the one in which the seed was sown. We cannot get away from that statement. It is a promise of God to you. Bring up. your children in the way of the Lord and when they are old they will not depart from it.

Then again, what are we going to do with the countless promises of the inspired Word relative to the result of believing faith? Are we not told that when we pray, if we believe we receive, we shall have? Are we not instructed to cast all of our burdens upon the Lord? And for what purpose? Merely that we might be relieved of them? No, I say. That cannot be the answer. There is something far deeper than that in the gracious invitation of Jesus. He will do with them what we ourselves could never accomplish. He will bear them and work out in them and through them those things.

that are for His glory and our eternal happiness and joy.

Do you remember what Paul said to the jailer the night he was delivered by the power of the Lord from the prison at Philippi? "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved and thy house." The condition was "believe." The requisite was faith. The foundation was confidence in God. Here was a living example of the fact that Jesus never lets His servants down. He always does what is best for them.

The condition behind the promise of Paul to the jailer was that they should believe Jesus. If you will believe Him—then He will answer your prayer. It is my firm conviction that the blood-washed child of God has fallen heir to a rich and gracious inheritance.

The Story of Sam Jones

One of the most remarkable illustrations of this truth is the conversion of Sam Jones. His old father was dying in Georgia. The village was Sam's own home town, Cartersville. Sam Jones had gone deep into sin and had become a drunkard. He had lost his law practice and had seen what money he possessed slip through his fingers as he walked the broad highway of self-indulgence and sin. When the doctor told his dear old father there was no hope, he called his wife to his side and said:

"My dear, I want you to go down town after Sam."

She put on her quaint old Southern shawl and went down to the place where she knew she could find her wandering boy. In a little while he was by the dying bed of his father. There was no lack of faith in the old man's plea. There was confidence in Jesus. He told his boy how years before the Lord had given him the promise that some day he would be brought into the fold. He told his son that it would only add to his cup of happiness if he

could see with his own eyes that glorious event consummated before the angels sang his welcome home. Sam Jones broke. Kneeling by his father's bedside the promise of the years was made good. He found Christ as His Saviour. Then, perhaps like old Simeon, the father raised his hands and said: "Let now Thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation."

Jesus never fails! How mightily did the Spirit of the Lord rest upon that new convert as he went forth to preach the gospel! Some of the greatest cities in America were shaken by the convicting power of the Holy Ghost and thousands found Christ as a personal Saviour through his ministry. And somewhere in the glory an old father is telling the angels that Jesus never fails and is just as good as His promise.

Claim Your Children for Jesus

Mother, you have a right to claim your children for Jesus. Father, it is your inheritance that you plead the Lamb for the household. I am not saying that your loved ones cannot be lost, but I am saying that they can be saved. I know that in the eternal Word we have ample foundation upon which to build a life of confidence and assurance toward God. Some day all of the children will be gathered in.

Many years ago two Jewish parents accepted Christ as their personal Saviour. There were five children in that home. Today every one of them is saved and some of them are in lifetime service for the Messiah who has the nailprints in His hands. After one glorious service those Jewish parents followed the custom of old Russia-from which they had come-and surprised me by leaning forward and kissing my hand. They were so grateful for the help I had been able to give them during the campaign. When later the mother told me of the conversion of those five boys I told her it was one of the most wonderful things I had ever heard. Ordinarily when a Jew is saved he is cut away from the rest of the family. So deep are the religious ties that children have been known to turn against their parents and parents against their children. When I asked her how it had all been brought about she said:

"I just claimed them under the promise of Jesus. I remembered the story of the Passover night. I wanted all of my children saved. So I believed the Lord and here they are—cleansed in the blood of Calvary."

Saint of God—forget not that every promise in the Book is yours. I do not think you will have to search very far before you will find one that will cover your children. Do not let fear destroy your faith. When Jesus died on Calvary and shed His precious blood for the remission of our sins He was the antitype of the Lamb that was slain on the Passover night. Between the dark night of Egypt and the tragedy of Calvary there was an unbroken line of the fulfillment of a divine plan. It was a lamb for the household in Egypt. Then why should we not claim the Lamb for the household at Calvary? They believed God then.

Remember that faith is just as powerful in bringing salvation to others as is intercession. We have asked the Lord to save our children. Now let us begin to believe that He will do it.

With the eye of my soul I can see distant Egypt. The palaces of the Egyptians are filled

with moans and groans while cries of anguish rend the air. But yonder are the huts of the slaves of Israel. They are softly chanting a hymn of praise. Their eyes are lifted upward looking in fancy across the wilderness to the glory and beauty of the promised land. Death has passed by them this night. With joy in their hearts they wait for the breaking of the day which shall start them on the journey toward the country of fulfilled promises. They are saved. Death did not come their way. They were redeemed substitutionally. They had found salvation through the death of one who shed His blood. They were saved because on the doorpost and upon the lintel of the little hut there was blood-blood-blood. It breathed the gospel of atonement. It preached the doctrine of substitution. It proclaimed a message of deliverance and salvation. The morning sun smiled upon Egypt and a liberated people. In the strength of that Lamb they started their exodus, having found deliverance and salvation through the shed blood. They believed the Lord when He said:

"The Lamb for the household."

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
