
When I wholly yielded my life to Him in my late teens, my heart was changed; all desire to be or look like the world was gone. Thank God, I could sing, and still do:

ONATHAN said to David: "Tomorrow is the new moon: and thou shalt be missed, because thy seat will be empty." 1 Sam. 20:18.



David's way to the throne lay through rejection, suffering, trial, and hardship, which is also true of Jesus, who is God's Christ. The first time He came, He suffered and died; but not-

In the early days of Dr. Wilbur Chapman's ministry he was asked to visit a young man who was dying, and the friend who invited him to call made the request that he should not speak to him about dying or becoming a Christian, suggesting that he should first of all win his confidence, and then on the following day, perhaps, introduce the subject of religion.

"I made my way to the room," says the distinguished evangelist, "and sat down for half an hour talking to the young man of the music and the politics of the city. Then I rose to say good-bye, taking his cold, white hand in mine, without a word concerning his future. Just as I reached the door I turned my face back, and his great eyes seemed to burn me through and through. To this day I have not forgotten the look of them.

"I went back to my home, and could not sleep. Early the next morning I went back to the house and touched the doorbell. The door quickly swung open, and I was making my way to the room, when the maid of the house called me back and said, 'Do you not know, sir, that he died half an hour after you were here yesterday afternoon?' I do not know what any other man would say about it, but I have always felt that when I stand at the Judgment of Christ I shall be expected to answer a question as to why I let that man slip into eternity without a warning."

The Lamb's Conquest

THE apostle John tells us of the evil one that is coming, whom the Holy Spirit designates as a "beast"—a wild beast. He says in Rev. 13:1, "I stood upon the sand of the sea, and saw a beast rise up out of the sea, having seven heads and ten horns, and upon his horns ten crowns." The beast is coming out of the sea—the people; the Holy Spirit has likened the wicked to a troubled sea. To the men on the earth the beast will be an object of wonder and worship. But the saints have been fully warned of him and know his doom.

John tells us further: "And the dragon gave him his power, and his seat, and great authority." Satan makes this beast his vice regent. He is the executive of hell, but he is no match for the executive of heaven, the Holy Spirit. The Dove, the weak Dove, is going to conquer the beast. Though he has heads and horns multiplied so many times, it matters not. The exalted horns have to go down.

The seer of Patmos gives us a further picture: "I saw heaven opened, and behold a white horse: and He that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness He doth judge and make war." Rev. 19:11. He that rides upon the white horse will meet and overcome the foe. Calvary may have seemed a failure, it was a staggering blow, but Christ rallied. It was not possible that He could be holden of death. Vengeance belongeth unto God, and He is going to give the vengeance to His Son. At Calvary Christ opened not His mouth. He awaited God's time. But the day will come when all His enemies will be His footstool.

We further read of Christ, "On His head were many crowns . . . and He was clothed with a vesture dipped in blood. . . . And the armies which were in heaven followed Him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean." Rev. 19:12-14. The saints willingly gave their crowns up to Him in advance. He received a victor's crown before the victory was won. He had on Him a diadem of victory when He went into the fight. And He does not go alone. The saints honor Him, but He wants to honor them. He does not go into battle until the army is completed. He could not go without you and me.

Only one garment was dipped in blood, the others were white. Everyone in that army sees the blood-dipped vesture, and they know that because of that they are there, and because of that vesture being red, theirs is white. That vesture dipped in blood is the glory of heaven, but the shame of earth. The sight of it will be too much for the enemy, and the sharp sword of the mouth of the Lord will finish the work. The enemies of Christ have to see the blood-stained vesture, and they have to feel the sword. To the one host in that battle the blood-stained garment means redemption; to the other it means doom, it means rejection, it means eternal fire. And the blood of Christ draws the same line of distinction on the earth today. Men are ranging themselves on opposite sides now.

The beast will come out of the waters—the many nations. He wants his followers ready before he comes. And they will be ready when he comes. They are preparing themselves. The best preparation he can make for them is to set at naught the Word of God. Set that aside and his task is easy.

God is also active and He is pouring out a greater measure of His Spirit. He can outwit Satan every time. He is tolerating the enemy for the time being, that the Son may overthrow him completely later on. When the full number of His host is completed, the signal will be given, and the Son will lead them forth to victory. As the Captain of the Lord's hosts He led Joshua and his army, and He gained a complete victory over the enemy. And if He gained victory for His people Israel, He can and will do it again, but this time over a greater foe. It will be the battle of the eternities.

The Lord loves His people. He wants them; He longs for them. Nothing else

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will satisfy Him. Though He is looking forward to the overthrow of the enemy, His heart is not there. His desire is towards His beloved. Conquest and victory are grand, but loving and being loved is grander. They follow Him, they could not do anything else, and He wants them very near.

The love of Christ passeth knowledge. Eternity will not exhaust its fulness. With our limited capacities we cannot comprehend the length and the breadth, and the depth and the height, and fully know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge. Throughout the eternities we shall revel in His love. John tells us that there shall be "no more sea." Love will take its place. The sea is the biggest thing we know of in the world, but love is mightier and greater than the oceans. Many waters cannot quench love, but much love will quench the sea.

In the meantime, look at Calvary. That is the evidence of His love. It is the evidence of the endless, unchanging, abiding love of God in Christ Jesus. The angels delight in His love, but they are in the outward circle; but it is the inner circle of the redeemed who can sing the sweetest, the longest, and the loudest of love. "Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, ... to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever!" The outer and the inner circles will be singing of love, but the song of the inner circle will go over and beyond, and overflow the others in the distant vistas of eternity. They will sing it best because they are nearest His heart, and it is a heart-song. You can learn the song now. The Father is well pleased with the love, the adoration, and the praise given to His Son.

The day of the Lamb's victory is coming and is assured. Does the Spirit bear witness with your spirit that you are a child of God? Is it true, "Now are we the sons of God"? If not, make sure. Do not deceive yourself, do not be deceived. There is abundance of grace still in the heart of Jesus for every one who will come unto Him, and He invites you now to come.

I never remember, in all my Christian course, a period now of sixty-nine years and four months, that I ever sincerely and patiently sought to know the will of God by the teaching of the Holy Ghost, through the instrumentality of the Word of God, but I have been always directed rightly. But if honesty of heart and uprightness before God were lacking, or if I did not patiently wait upon God for instruction, or if I preferred the counsel of my fellow men to the declarations of the Word of the living God, I made great mistakes.—George Muller

Behold, a Leper

JESUS had taught wonderful truths in His sermon on the mount. Read these in Matthew, chapters 5, 6, and 7. "And when He was come down from the mountain, great multitudes followed Him." He had been teaching; now He began to demonstrate. "And, behold, there came a leper and worshiped Him, saying, Lord, if Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean. And Jesus put forth His hand, and touched him, saying, I will; be thou clean. And immediately his leprosy was cleansed."

This man's leprosy was physical, but it well illustrates the leprosy of the soul. Leprosy and sin are closely united in different places in the Bible. When Gehazi sought to swindle Naaman, the Lord smote him with leprosy. When King Uzziah took upon himself to assume duties which belonged only to the priesthood, the leprosy "rose up in his forehead. . . . and Uzziah the king was a leper unto the day of his death, and dwelt in a separate house, being a leper." Both Gehazi and Uzziah sinned by rebelling against the will of God, and sin brings the curse upon men. Leprosy is no ordinary sickness. Jesus healed many that were sick, but He had to cleanse the leper. There is only one cure for a sin-laden soul, and that is to be cleansed. And there is only One who can cleanse the soul—our Lord Jesus.


When Jesus came down from the mountain, multitudes followed Him, but it was the leper who received His cleansing touch. It is not enough to be in the company of those who follow Christ. We must know His cleansing virtue. "The blood of Jesus Christ His son cleanseth us from all sin." The cleansing of the leper brings to us the fact that Christ is a personal Saviour. The leper was a person, conscious of his need and willing to pray for mercy. Jesus laid His hand on him, giving him the personal, cleansing touch.

In the face of the multitude the leper cried, "Lord, if Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean." He believed that Jesus had the power, but he seemed not so sure that He would be willing. Jesus in healing him showed that He was not only able, but also willing. See how Jesus identified Himself with the leper. A leper was an untouchable, but Jesus "put forth His hand and touched him," and when He touched him the leper was made whole.

It is this identification of Christ with sinful men that brings to us salvation, for we read: God "hath made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him." Merely telling us what we ought to do would not save us. God knows it takes supernatural power to save a sinner. It takes the personal touch of Christ. However much we may enjoy being in the crowd that admires Him, we have missed the purpose of Christ if we are not cleansed from our sins. If you are not cleansed from your unrighteousness, if God is not pleased with your life, call upon Christ, as the leper did. "If Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean." Christ is both able and willing to cleanse you of every sin and make you fit for heaven.

We have not said the whole truth about pardon when we have said, "We have redemption through His blood." Neither have we said the whole truth when we say, "In whom we have redemption." Both clauses are united. "In Him" is the personal source and fountain. "Through His blood" the channel, or means. We have not redemption through His work without His person, nor in His person without His work.—A. McL.

Jochabed, the Mother of Moses

A MONG the millions of mothers who have lived, here and there are those who are conspicuous in the annals of history. One of these is Jochabed, the mother of Moses. As we read the record in the second chapter of Exodus and the comment of Hebrews 11:23, it is evident that her activities and influence had their part in molding the life of her famous son and making him such a mighty man of God.

Jochabed lived in a dark time. The Israelites were in bondage under the crushing heel of Pharaoh. Relief seemed impossible and circumstances inescapable, but Jochabed found a way out. This woman, who was born a slave in Egypt, so feared God that she was able to defeat the cruel plans of Pharaoh, and finally emerge as one whose portrait appears in the "hall of faith."

Born to Levi in Goshen, she must have received thorough instruction in the faith of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. As a child playing about, she probably heard her aged father recite the story of the journey from Canaan during the famine, and of God's gracious provision. She would know all about the death of Joseph and his confidence that they would eventually return to the land of promise. She was married to godly Amram, and God had blessed their home with two children, Miriam and Aaron, when out from the palace had come a royal edict. Pharaoh had given command that all baby boys must be thrown into the Nile and thus destroyed.

One day another son was born. A beautiful child he was, for "proper" in the original indicated that he was very attractive; and Josephus also in his history eulogizes the physical and spiritual attractiveness of Moses. What should they do? Parental love, together with the charm of the loveliness of the child and a sense that there was a divine destiny for him, restrained them from obeying the king's commandment. For three months he was carefully hidden, and all his cries were quickly smothered that no hint of his presence might be given. However, as the days passed his cries became too lusty, and he was too active to be concealed any longer. Something must be done! Jochabed became desperate.

Here the true character of the woman begins to be revealed, and we see her as

one who is tearless, full of faith, and resourceful. We all are acquainted with the story of Moses and his little ark, and his rescue by the daughter of Pharaoh. As we analyze the incident, Jochabed's remarkable faith in God is revealed. Every detail in her plan was timed to an exactness in the will of God. She must have been divinely inspired to have acted as she did and to have succeeded so well in her little scheme. One cannot but marvel at the fortitude and strength of spirit that enabled her to carry the little boat with its precious cargo to the Nile, and leave it among the reeds with only eleven-year-old Miriam on guard, while she herself went back to her slave duties. The actions of Miriam indicate that her mother had

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trained her well, for the young lady never once slipped in her part.

Jochabed furnishes inspiration and example for the mothers of today. Today, too, is a time of peril and uncertainty, a time when the "ruler of this world" makes an ever stronger bid for the children, and reaches out with ever greedier clutches for their souls. Yet God's Spirit once again whispers, "Be strong and of good courage. Faith found a way once, it will again." God will give wisdom and resourcefulness in the hour of need. Godly mothers, who find themselves compelled to launch a life upon the current of perilous times in an evil world, sending a boy to the armed forces, a daughter to the work-a-day world, or children to school, can take heart. God found a way for Jochabed. Hallelujah!

Miriam gave evidence of a thorough discipline, and do not forget that in those years after Jochabed received Moses back into her arms until the time she was called to take him to the palace, there was instilled in his heart and mind a faith in Jehovah. He was given the conviction of a divine plan for his life, which many years in the luxury of Pharaoh's palace and all the learning of the Egyptians could not destroy, nor forty years of sheep herding on the dusty desert obliterate.

No doubt Jochabed, just like many today, was often tempted to be discouraged. and at least three times her faith was severely tested. The first was when, early one morning, she took a basketlike affair made of reeds and carefully waterproofed down to the river bank, and within it left a sleeping child to the mercies of God. Again, a few years later, she must take a lovely boy across the dusty fields of Goshen, through the city gates and along streets and avenues until they reach the palace of the king. There she must leave her son-leave him in heathen surroundings, in all kinds of temptations which so infest royal courts, and in the midst of danger from plots and intrigues.

Finally, many years later, after believing and trusting that God had raised up her boy for a divine purpose, the now aged woman saw all her hopes in seeming ruins as Moses, a fugitive, flees eastward to pass years in hiding from an angry Pharaoh. Blow on blow, were they not? But at last, in God's time, the mother's faith triumphed, and whether she lived to see the answer to her prayers or not, the glorious arm of Jehovah was revealed. Praise God!

The name Jochabed means, "Jehovah is glorious." Mothers of today, take it as a motto. The God who cared for Moses in answer to his mother's prayer, can also take the oversight of your child. Dis-

couragements and tests may come, but remember Jochabed and do your part in training and keeping faith. Fear not the efforts of the prince of darkness, but look rather for wisdom and guidance sure. Jehovah will be glorious in your behalf. Hallelujah!

Annual Cuban Convention Held

The Eighth Annual Convention of the Assemblies of God in Cuba, held at Havana, January 27 to 31, was without doubt the greatest convention in the history of the Pentecostal work in the Island. The "Palacio de los Yesistas" (Palace of the Plaster Workers) which was rented for the occasion and which has a seating capacity of some 400 was well filled from the first night. The great majority of these were Pentecostal brethren from our own churches. There were delegates and visitors in attendance from all of the six Provinces of the Island.

We were fortunate in having with us for the convention Mr. and Mrs. Watson Argue, of Winnipeg, Canada. Watson Argue was our main speaker and his timely messages to the workers in the morning services as well as the evangelistic sermons at night were greatly appreciated by all. Quite a number of souls sought the Lord for salvation the very first night. Many were prayed for at the healing services and some were definitely healed, among them being a girl who was demon possessed. Two were filled with the Holy Spirit.

A splendid spirit of harmony and brotherly

love prevailed in all the business sessions. All the officials of the District were re-elected with the exception of the Treasurer. Ruth Melching was elected to fill this post which was left vacant by Victoria Schott's transfer to the Dominican Republic.

Reports from the different fields were very encouraging. A number of outstanding healings and conversions were reported. During the year 1946 we began ministering in nineteen new works and preaching points. We have also begun a new radio program on the Blue Network, which is heard throughout the Island. This program at 8:45 a.m EST, Sunday mornings, is sponsored by the Richey Evangelistic Association of Houston, Texas.

At the ordination service one received full ordination, six received license to preach, and two were granted Christian Workers' papers. It was decided that all candidates for baptism in any local church must be previously examined by an Examining Committee appointed by the Presbyter of the District.

We are experiencing a spirit of revival in our work here in Cuba, and we are looking forward to the future greatly encouraged to believe that God is going to do great things.

Funds do not permit launching out on a building program; but when I saw the vision of the brethren and how they felt God would supply every need, we secured land for the erection of a church in each of the larger towns where we now have groups of Ibo Christians. I'm certain that God will meet every need. The brethren have made building

pledges that are enormous, considering their incomes. We are confident that the Lord is leading.

My language and pen are too feeble to express what is on my heart. I so want to impress on those who are qualified the great need for educational institutions here. We honor their ambitions and recognize their need, but we cannot do anything to aid them. One of our most outstanding boys was able to get into a C. M. S. High School but he has to sign a bond to work for them for five years.

We must have a teacher training school and a high school in the very near future. The people in one village near where I formerly lived said that they would put up the buildings, furnishing the material and everything required, if we only would agree to give them a high school. The government traveling teacher is the treasurer for the town and he has talked to me. It seems a shame to let such opportunities pass when we need the school but can't go ahead and plan simply because there is no staff.

Baptismal Service in Ceylon

On December 15 it was my joy to baptize five men by immersion. Two of these were converts from Hinduism who gave a clear testimony of a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. They bore Hindu names so at baptism we gave them non-pagan names. One other was a convert from Romanism and the remaining two had been nominal Christians. As they all spoke Tamil, we held the baptismal service at 8 a. m., the time of the Tamil service.

We had three Christmas Sunday School programs during the Christmas season. The first was at Thimbrigasaya, which is one of the suburbs of Colombo where we hold cottage meetings. About 100 people were present at this English-speaking work. Two nights later we held the Tabernacle Sunday School program with about 150 people present. One part of the program was given in Sinhalese and the remainder was in English.

Christmas Eve we drove out into the country about twenty-five miles to attend another Christmas program. This is a Sinhalese-speaking work, but the Sunday School children gave two parts in English and the rest in Sinhalese. The children sang a welcome song for our family. There is no church building here, so the program was given on the veranda of a member's home. It rained both going to and coming from the program, but there was a large attendance in spite of the rain.

Honduras Responds to the Gospel

On September 24, 1946 we arrived on the soil of British Honduras, the only dependency of the British crown in Central America. It is situated six hundred miles west of Jamaica and about nine hundred miles south of New Orleans. Shortly after our arrival in the colony we started open air services. People flocked to these meetings. A week of meetings was held in one of the dance halls in the city and there God met the need of many hungry souls.

After we conducted a prayer meeting in one of the homes we visited, the lady kindly consented to open her drawing room for regular meetings. We began meetings here on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday nights and on Sundays. Children's services and Sunday School were held there also. On Friday nights we hold an open air meeting in the center of the town. This has been well attended. Sick people come asking us to pray for them; we deal with them about their souls and ask God to touch their bodies. Many have testified that they have received healing in their bodies at these meetings.

Money is hard to change here in Canton. All the money exchangers have been closed by the government which is allowing only the banks to handle money exchange. There has been much black marketing going on, and Chiang Kai-shek is getting strict. Any exchangers that do business are arrested. But you don't get as good exchange at the bank as you do from the exchangers.

I have gone to Pak Nai with Tsz Nai, our Bible woman. We gave forth the Word in the old market town again. One glimpse of it would make your heart ache. The Japanese bombed it flat. Since the war, they have built a few small villages. The Christians have managed to rent one so they have a little place to gather in. They are now in the process of buying a lot and hope in the near future to be able to build.

British Honduras is predominated by Roman Catholicism. The natives are called Creoles. There are Spaniards, Caribs, and Maya Indians, and other foreigners that help to swell the population to about 60,000. Will you pray for these, many of whom have not yet heard the gospel of Jesus Christ.

On January 10, Brothers Butterfield, Carlson, and John Franklin visited us. Many souls were saved and healed of divers diseases. One young man, a soldier in the Army, came to the meeting with a broken hand. He had suffered for months. God met his needs, healed him, and he was able that night to raise his hand and praise God for healing. Now he is back to work. Pray that he will be a good soldier in God's army.

The three nights' meetings were a success; hundreds came to hear the gospel. The last night at Liberty Hall the government gave the use of their public address system. The meetings were also announced over the local radio station. Over one hundred people came forward to accept salvation.

The Passing and the Permanent

GOSPEL BILLBOARDS

A new organization known as Bible Signs, Inc., has undertaken to rent six of Chicago's largest and best-located billboards in order to put gospel texts before the eyes of millions bustling to and fro. The project will cost \$7,000 a year.

"CHRISTIAN COMMANDOS"

Some 3,000 "Christian Commandos" of various denominations in England organized themselves into evangelistic teams and conducted a tenday "invasion" of London clubs, saloons, prisons, and movie houses last month, to bring the Word of God to those who need it most.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS

Attorney General Tom C. Clark declares that over half of all criminals in the U. S. (51%) are twenty-one years of age and under. "It is up to the American people to correct, teach and stop these youngsters from following in the footsteps of other criminals," he says. "Unless the 'three respects'—the respect of God, and of home, and of law—are learned and carried out, our country as a great democracy will fail. Apparently we have lost touch with religion!"

MENNONITES MIGRATE

Ten thousand Mennonites escaped from Russia recently and reached the American zone of Germany. They had been deported to Siberia during the war for refusing to bear arms, but they managed to flee to the American zone of Berlin, and General McNarney with great difficulty managed to move 2,100 of them through the Russian sector to Bremerhaven. From there they sailed to Paraguay, South America, where they will colonize.

JEWISH STEAMSHIP LINE

The first Palestine steamship line to be established has been formed in England under the name, "Kedem Palestine Line." The company has a million-dollar capital. For the first fifteen years, a London shipping firm will have control, after which the management will pass to the Zion Palestine Navigation Company.

JEWS IN ENGLAND

Great Britain enjoys the distinction of leading the largest number of Jews to Christ. When it was proposed recently that 2,000 Jewish children be removed from Poland to England, the Zionists protested, and they were sent instead to France—where there is much less likelihood they will become Christians.

ARAMCO'S NEW PIPELINE

The Arabian-American Oil Company plans to lay a great 30-inch pipe line in the Near East next year. It will carry 370,000 barrels of crude oil a day from the oil fields of Saudi Arabia to a port on the Mediterranean, a distance of 1,000 miles, and it is hoped that a Palestine port may be chosen as the terminal. Jewish terrorism makes the terminal site uncertain; but geographically, Palestine is the logical terminus for such a pipe line, and the project is one more factor in the growing importance of the Holy Land as the end draws near.

NEW YORK'S RECORD

Consumption of alcoholic beverages and smoking of cigarettes in New York State during 1946 exceeded all previous records, according to the State Tax Department. The amount of beer, liquor and wine drunk was 28 gallons per capita, and the smoking average for the year was 1221/2 packages of cigarettes per capita. Sales were 31% higher than in 1945. It is a significant fact that lawlessness is likewise on the increase in the Empire State. Sex crimes, robberies, and acts of violence are more numerous than ever before. New York City has so many murders that only the more sensational of them are publicly reported. Evil deeds grow from evil appetites, and these spring from evil hearts which have not known the transforming power of the gospel.

THE "ROCKWOOD CASE"

Ecclesiastical circles in Canada have been stirred recently over the "Rockwood Case." Perry F. Rockwood is a young Presbyterian pastor in Truro, Nova Scotia. He preached a startling series of sermons in which he charged that the church today is neither preaching nor practicing New Testament Christianity. He attacked modernism, ecclesiasticism, formalism and worldliness. Then he began establishing prayer meetings, developing an evangelistic program, and supporting only missionaries which are true to the evangelical faith. For this he was rebuked by his ecclesiastical "superiors," who demanded that he repent or be unfrocked. But young Rockwood replied that he must obey God rather than men-and his church attendance jumped from seventy to overflow crowds. He has been invited to Toronto and other centers in the Dominion to tell his story, and there are indications that an evangelical movement has begun which will have wide repercussions.

THE BARRIER OF NATIONALITY

Dr. Harlow Shapely, one of the world's greatest astronomers and scientists, says that civilization's chief enemy is not the atomic bomb, or biological warfare, or any other weapon of wholesale destruction, but intense nationalization. A narrow national pride, he says, is the underlying cause of which the world's major problems are the symptoms, and unless some effective remedies are found, civilization will be wiped out by a "combination of lunacy and war techniques." Dr. Shapely expressed these views recently before the American Association for the Advancement of Science, meeting at Harvard University.

Nationality is indeed a formidable barrier to peace, but can it be overcome? Did not God "make of one blood all nations"? Yes, but the same Bible verse (Acts 17:26) says also that He has "set the bounds of their habitation." Says Donald Grey Barnhouse: "Nationality was created by God as a judgment on the people of the world, and man will not be able to put together that which God has scattered." Not until Christ returns to earth will the barrier of nationality be removed, so that there may be a peaceful "one world."

PRAY FOR THE PRESIDENT

Again and again President Truman has expressed his dependence on God and has asked for prayer. "Without divine guidance and a renewal of our reliance on the everlasting reality of religion," he says, "we shall labor in vain to make the world a better and a happier place in which all men may dwell together in peace." God's Word commands us to pray for those in authority. Are you praying for the President?

COMMUNISM IN INDIA

Communists eagerly await the day when Britain shall have pulled out of Palestine, Egypt, and India. A news item which was practically lost on the American press is reported by *Revelation*. It told of a Communist uprising in Madras Secretariat in India, where five hundred Red leaders were arrested after a reign of terror. Communists seized lands, looted crops, attacked government buildings, murdered landlords and servants, and burned rice trains. Only with difficulty was the revolt put down. When Britain has loosed her grip, will such uprisings be quelled?

HEADING FOR FAMILY BREAKUP

Dr. C. C. Zimmerman, an Associate Professor of Sociology at Harvard University, warns that we face before the end of the century a "violent, temporary breaking up of the whole family system." He refers to the present as the third such family break-up in history; the first occurred in ancient Greece and the second in ancient Rome. To avert this backward and disastrous trend, Dr. Zimmerman advocates mass moral education through billboards, car cards, match boxes, newspapers, and radio. Comments *Prophetic Word*: "We would advocate a nation-wide revival and return to God's Word."

FELT ACROSS THE PACIFIC

According to Prof. Edward Teller of the University of Chicago, the radioactivity produced by the Bikini bombs was detected in about a week in the U. S. A. By the time the winds had carried the radioactive air across the Pacific to California it was weak and harmless, but still detectable. "The same activity, if present even in many thousand times as great amount, would not impair living organisms," he said. "If the activity liberated at Bikini were multiplied by a factor of a hundred thousand or a million, and if it were released off our Pacific Coast, the whole of the U. S. would be endangered."

Is it possible to multiply the power of the atomic bomb a millionfold? Presumably so. At least the scientists tell us that already they have learned how to make an atomic bomb a thousand times as powerful as those that fell on Japan in August, 1945. If they went on increasing the power of the bombs a thousandfold every two years, it would be only four or six years until the power is a million times as great as the Bikini bombs. Should such a bomb be exploded off the coast by accident, or by an enemy, the whole country would be endangered! Is it any wonder the scientists are worried as to what may happen through their inventions? It is written of Israel, "They provoked Him to anger with their inventions: and the plague brake in upon them." Psalm 106:29. Is God pleased with the invention of destructive weapons? Will He punish the nation with a plague?

A Bird's-Eye View of the C.A. Work

Presidents and representatives from thirtyone District C. A. organizations recently met at
Kansas City with members of the staff of the
National C. A. Office for a period of deliberation concerning the future program of the
Christ's Ambassadors. Several days were spent
in concentration upon the multivaried activities
of the C. A.'s. Feeling that the entire Movement
is interested in the plans of its youth, we are
giving you a brief insight into the decisions
which were made at the District C. A. Presidents' Conference.

National and District Relations. (1) After observing the blessings which came from the observance of the first National C.A. Day on March 9, the Conference decided to recommend that this be an annual event. (2) A national standard for rating local C. A. groups will be developed. The points covered in this standard will be simple in nature, but every phase of the C. A.'s life and activities will be included. (3) It was decided that District and local C. A. organizations should be encouraged to give one offering each year for the support of the National Office. (4) Two series of rallies will be conducted in the districts each year, to push the C. A. Herald and the Speed-the-Light Campaign respectively.

Vocational Volunteers. This plan to locate consecrated young laymen in needy home mission fields where they will assist full-time workers by their moral, financial, and active support, was heartily and enthusiastically endorsed by the District leaders. There was also strong sentiment that if at all possible we should launch the foreign phase of this plan in the immediate future.

Publications. Certain suggestions were made which will enhance even further the value of the C. A. Herald. There will be a special section to feature the various districts, another beamed to reach the teen-agers, and a section where readers may voice their views. The staff was asked to work toward having a "Cartoon of the Month," and the conference of presidents determined to work toward a circulation of 30,000 by the end of the year.

Speed-the-Light Campaign. This endeavor to speed up the progress of the gospel by utilizing every modern means available still holds its appeal. With enthusiasm the delegates set a goal of \$100,000 for 1947. Also, the radio phase of the campaign will be stressed, as the C. A.'s buy vital equipment for the Manila Station of the Far East Broadcasting Company. Along with this, equipment is being purchased with which to make recordings for use on this sta-

tion and elsewhere, and also for use with phonographs in the hands of missionaries. The Manila station affords great opportunity for speeding the gospel. From this station, it is estimated, more than one-half the world's population can be reached.

Teen-Age Program. It was decided to eliminate the military designations of the Hi-C.A. Brigade since they had become out-moded with the close of the war. The Bible Study material for the Hi-C.A.'s will have slight revisions. Material will also be provided for the forming of Hi-C.A. departments of the Christ's Ambassadors in the larger assemblies.

Servicemen's Division. The ministry of C. A.'s to the men in the hospitals was warmly endorsed. In this effort a pocket-size magazine, "CHAT, the Pocket Chaplain," will be published. Plans are also going forward to utilize the services of an ex-chaplain in full-time ministry to the "Forgotten Men" of World War II.

College Fellowship. Realizing that an increasing number of Assemblies of God youth are attending institutions of higher learning, it was decided to follow the suggestion of J. Robert Ashcroft to establish a C. A. fellowship for college students.

It has been impossible to go into detail concerning any one of these decisions, but each project has untold possibilities for the spiritual advancement of our Christ's Ambassadors. The momentous days in which we live demand that all possible assistance be given to our precious young people to enable them not only to remain true to the faith once delivered to the saints, but also to function as a great evangelical youth movement, bringing Christ to the young people of this generation.

A PLEA FOR SIMPLICITY

An article in the Episcopalian magazine *The Chronicle* pleads for less empty ritual and more true worship in church services. The author, Oscar F. Green, takes issue with the Federal Council for their emphasis on beautiful architecture and elaborate ceremony.

"This false emphasis on beauty," continues this Episcopal clergyman, "causes us to spend money foolishly. In many parishes the budget for music is larger than the one for missions. I wonder if anyone was ever saved by listening to an anthem. With an angelic choir at his command, God is probably not greatly impressed even by the music at St. Thomas's.

"The aesthetic approach to men is a snare and a delusion. Christ never used it, and presumably He was an authority on matters religious. The way to reach men is to reveal to them their need of God, to confront them with their sin and helplessness, to show them the validity of the gospel, and to appeal to their wills. We exalt God by doing His will, not by having a procession in His honor."

TEN DEGREES

"Pardon me! Never has there been an age when clergymen needed to be better trained for their work," writes P. S. Jones in *The Pentecostal Testimony*, but "unfortunately some depend on intellectual degrees rather than on spiritual degrees. Said one man, after hearing an imposing liberal with a long list of degrees, 'He's got degrees all right—ten below zero!"

AT THE SCENE OF DISASTER

When news of the disaster at Texas City, Texas, flashed around the world, our thoughts at once were concerning the saints there, and our hearts went out in sympathy as we prayed for them. There are two Assembly of God churches in that city; the name of one is Trinity Tabernacle, and the other is the Mexican Assembly of God. A letter has come from Pastor W. W. Cothran of Trinity Tabernacle, saying:

"It is with gratitude in my heart toward God that I sit this afternoon in what was a nice parsonage, but now a wrecked building, and write to you.

"On April 16, at 9:12 a.m., this little city of 18,000 inhabitants began to undergo one of the worst disasters ever to be suffered in these United States. The French liner *Grand Camp* blew up in the harbor here and this was followed immediately by the explosion of the Monsanto Chemical Plant. Lives lost may reach 1,000. Many that have been found are beyond identity, even by experts. The injured are over 3,000. The property loss is great.

"Both church buildings here (Trinity Tabernacle and the Mexican Assembly) have been condemned, having been damaged extensively. The Mexican church will have to be built again from the foundation, and perhaps Trinity Tabernacle also. Trinity Tabernacle was partially covered by insurance but not nearly enough to pay for the damage. The Mexican church had no insurance.

"Words cannot express the indescribable horror of screaming, suffering agony; the anxiety, devastion, and death.

"We have greatly appreciated the visitations, letters, cards, telegrams, and inquiries of the brothers and sisters of our Assemblies of God fellowship."

There was an unpaid balance of \$440.98 on a loan which the Mexican Assembly in Texas City had received from the General Council. Brother Cothran says, "As pastor of Trinity Tabernacle, I would like to request of the General Council that the indebtedness on the Mexican Church here be cancelled out." He does not ask for any financial assistance for his own church, but we know it is in need also.

If friends care to send contributions to J. R. Flower, General Treasurer, 336 W. Pacific St., Springfield, Missouri, they will be forwarded to the pastors in Texas City, and any surplus that is received will be used to give similar help in future disasters.

BRITAIN'S YOUTH

The young people of England are as ignorant of spiritual things as are young Americans. According to the Baptist Times (London) a survey has been made of eighteen- and nineteenyear-olds now joining the British Navy. Only 23% could repeat the Lord's Prayer correctly; 40% could repeat only the opening words. Although 70% knew who Christ is, only 20% could say where He was born, and 17% did not know why Christmas day is celebrated. Only 65% understood the significance of Good Friday, while 75% did not know the meaning of Pentecost. There is no valid reason why the rudiments of religion cannot be taught in public schools so as to prevent such appalling ignorance of spiritual things.



At the recent National Religious Broadcasters Convention in Omaha, Nebraska, the Assemblies of God Radio Hour, SERMONS IN SONG, in competition with fifteen other religious programs—a number of which are outstanding national broadcasts—was recognized as the best all-round religious broadcast of the year. This distinction outranks that of 1946 when our program was awarded the Churchill Trophy for producing programs of novel technique and not of a stereotyped pattern. Surely the hand of God is upon this project for spreading the gospel, and we urge our friends to pray for His continued blessing upon this great evangelistic ministry.


February 9, Anna B. Lock of Galva, Ill., came



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
