GOD'S SURE PROMISE

"The Lord hath done great things for thee! All through the fleeted days Jehovah hath dealt wondrously. Lift up thy heart and praise! "For greater things thine eyes shall see, Child of His loving choice!

The Lord will do great things for thee: Fear not, be glad, rejoice!" • IT IS NOT my purpose in this message to argue as to the time of redemption, but to stir our hearts relative to the nearness of the coming of Jesus. Of one thing we are sure: He is coming soon! Notice that the context of our Scripture reading speaks of the manner of His coming, which has always thrilled my heart as I contemplated it. Clouds clouds of glory—supernatural clouds. "Then shall they see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven, with power and great glory."

When Jesus had spoken His final words to His disciples and while He blessed them, "He was taken up; and a cloud received Him out of their sight." Acts 1:4. "And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as He went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel, which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into heaven." Acts 1:10-11.

Paul declares that at His coming "the dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." 1 Thess. 4:16-17. He went away in "clouds." He is coming back just as He went away- in "clouds." We are going to be wrapped up in "clouds" and meet Him in the air. We are told to "comfort one another with these words." How does the message of the coming of the Lord affect you? Do you draw back with fear lest He come today; or does your heart with a leap shout, "Even so come quickly, Lord Jesus"? Your personal reactions to this message can be a good indication as to your spiritual well-being.

Prophecies that we have talked about for years are unfolding before our eyes today, making us among the most blessed people of all time. Let us not remain silent while these momentous fulfillments parade by us, but let us take notice and know that our redemption draweth nigh. What are some of these signs of His coming which we see so clearly today?

1. A NEW NATION—Israel. Luke 21:23-28.

According to the Word of the Lord, and because of perpetual rejection of God's commandments, Israel fell from her former glory and became a vassal to Gentile powers, beginning with Nebuchadnezzar. This subservience lasted until our very day. When Jesus wept in the gates of the temple and said, "Behold your house is left unto you desolate—ye shall not see Me henceforth . . . ," He departed from the temple for the last

time. It was then the disciples came to Him to show Him the buildings of the temple, but Jesus said there would not be one stone upon another, that would not be thrown down. He stated furthermore, that great distress would be on the land, and wrath upon the people. "And they shall fall by the edge of the sword, and shall be led away captive into all nations: and Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled."

We all know the plight of Jerusalem and the land. In the year 70 A.D. Titus razed the temple, tearing every stone apart. A million Jews were slaughtered and the remnant was scattered among all nations. Their distress has been great. During the regime of the late Hitler, better than six million of them were slain. They have wandered, footsore, over the earth, fearful of their very lives, according to the Word of the Lord. See Deut. 28:63-68. It is estimated that there were some eighteen million Jews in the earth at that time. Since the Word declares (Zech. 13:8) that two parts shall be cut off and die, it is apparent that Israel's troubles are not ended. But something glorious has happened to Israel of late. Britain has withdrawn her troops -the last Gentile power in Palestine. That power was glad to rid itself of the burdensome stone. The declaration, "This nation shall be called-ISRAEL!" electrified the world. A nation was born. That young nation has already fought for and won desired lands and will continually wage successful gains until God's original promise is fulfilled completely. Up to this time, thirty Gentile nations have given her recognition. The times of the Gentiles is about fulfilled! What does it mean? It can only mean one thing. The coming of Jesus is upon us. "Then shall they see the Son of man coming in a cloud with power and great glory."

A NEW ERA—The Atomic Bomb.
Peter 3:11.

At the explosion of the first atomic bomb at Alamogordo, New Mexico, the tower made of ten-inch steel rails weighing ninety pounds per foot, was completely vaporized, and in its place appeared a hole six feet deep and 5,000 feet across. The earth for 18,000 feet in every direction was fused and melted into glass. On August 6, 1945, Japanese soldiers spied a lone plane flying about 18,000 feet high. Their guns were trained upon it. Something was released from that plane that exploded at about 1,800 feet above the earth, creating a wind velocity up to 1000 miles per hour, killing and wounding 140,000 people which included 260 of the 300 doctors, 18,000 of the 24,000 nurses, orderlies, etc., seventyfive per cent of all the firemen. Twentysix of the thirty-three fire stations were destroyed and all of the hospitals were casualties.

The underwater explosion at Bikini created a temperature at the core of fifty million degrees. It shot ten million tons of water skyward and sank great ships. Ships that did not sink were made so radio-active, they would remain dangerous forever if they were kept that long. Those bombs are now obsolete. Bombs have now been made at least a thousand times as powerful as the ones exploded at Bikini. We have bombs so powerful that if seven of them were dropped on strategic spots, they would destroy our nation. In this connection it would be interesting to read Rev. 9:13-21.

So horrible are the destructive potentialities of atomic bombs, cosmic rays, and other lethal discoveries, that many of the scientists connected with those discoveries are said to be giving up their positions and are going out to warn the people of impending doom. Ex-governor Earle of Pennsylvania in a speech not long ago said, "The world stands on the brink of total destruction. At least 90 per cent of all Americans now living will be killed by atomic bombs within five years."

The Truman committee in its report entitled "Survival In Air Age" stated, "Atomic war will start on, before, or at least by January 1953."

General Eisenhower said, "Without moral regeneration throughout the world there is no hope for us, as we are going to disappear one day in the dust of an atomic explosion."

Read the words of General L. R. Groves, head of the first atomic experiment: "Impending doom cloaks our world today. Yet those from whom a warning should come remain silent." He meant, of course, the Church. O Church, let us awake from our sleep, for the time is at hand!

The apostle Peter said that the heavens would pass away with a great noise, that the elements would melt with fervent heat, and that the earth and all its works would be burned. "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved..." Perhaps Peter knew nothing of atoms —of protons, neutrons, etc. But he by the Spirit spoke a scientific fact. The word "dissolved" means to "loose" or "release." It is the secret of how to "dissolve" or "release" the energy of the atom, that man has discovered in our day.

Jesus said, "And except those days be shortened, there should no flesh be saved: But for the elect's sake those days shall be shortened." Matt. 24:22. Man says the human race will be destroyed by 1953, or not later than ten years. Jesus declares that these days will be shortened, lest there should be no flesh saved. They will be shortened for the elect's sake. How? How else could it be except by Divine intervention—the coming of Jesus? This becomes another sure sign that Jesus must come soon.

3. A NEW WORLD SYSTEM— Communism. Ezek. 38:8, 14-16; 39:1-7.

Everyone fears the spread of Communism. It has pushed out its tentacles to ensnare most of Europe. China has fallen its victim. It is at work throughout the world. This system, centered in Russia, is interested in Palestine, and will eventually come upon the mountains of Israel to take a prey. Russia's 1950-1960 planning points to Palestine after she first exerts herself against Persia and Turkey. God's Word declares that He is against this system and that her armies will suffer defeat on the mountains of Israel. We don't know when it will happen, but man's predictions place it within eleven years. How soon must the coming of Jesus be!

4. A NEW REVIVAL—Gen. 7:4; Rom. 9:28.


As it was in the days of Noah-and in the days of Lot-so shall it be at the coming of Jesus. So black have the sins of our day become that it has been said the atrocities of Sodom are being overdone every day almost before our eves. These are dark days. But where sin did abound, grace did much more abound. God's grace is surely abounding today. We are witnessing mighty outpourings of His Spirit. There has been a revival of Divine Healing. As a result many hundreds are being saved, and scores are being filled with the Spirit. This is not something novel. It is the work of the Lord being intensified in the earth just prior to the coming of Jesus.

"God is moving by His Spirit,

Moving in all the earth;

Signs and wonders when God moveth---Move, O Lord in me."

Noah had been preaching and preparing for about 120 years. Every day the hearts of the people went farther from God. Finally God spoke to Noah and told him there were but seven short days left. Seven feverish, intensified days of warning and pleading. Then it came. God's judgment struck, but Noah was saved by His wonderful provision, the Ark. For almost two thousand years the Church has been here. Men have heard the message in one manner or another. But things cannot continue as they are forever. Every day the hearts of the sons



of men are becoming harder. God in His mercy will shorten the days; i.e., hasten the end. He has promised to finish the work and cut it short (not in judgment, but in righteousness). The judgments will follow. "A short work will the Lord make upon the earth."

There is now a ripening of the harvest; the bride of Christ is being made ready; man is being left without excuse. Jesus is coming. The Church which had its inception in the flames of Pentecost, will not leave this world in defeat, but will in the end leave in a blaze of Pentecostal glory! The time is at hand. There have been more evidences of His coming in the headlines of our newspapers than we hear from most of the pulpits today. Are you looking for Him? Does the truth of His coming live in your heart? Unto them who look for Him shall He appear, without sin, unto salvation. Let us be alert. May God make us heralds of His coming. Let us at this midnight hour sound the cry, "Behold, the Bridegroom cometh !"

URGENCY

I remember a few years ago, when I had not so much experience as I have now, and when my enthusiasm perhaps was not as well balanced as it is now, I had been invited to preach in the summer for one of the leading churches in one of our great cities. I went into that pulpit on Sunday morning, conscious that God was with us in a very peculiar sense, and when I finished my sermon the one thing on my mind was salvation. I did not know whether they had ever had an invitation given there for the confession of Christ, but I did not stop to ask. I stepped down on a little subplatform and extended the invitation for any who would accept Jesus Christ then and there to come to the front. Immediately a strong, able-bodied man got up, and with tears streaming down his face came to the front and took me by the hand; then another man came. Fourteen grown people confessed Christ that morning. As we went out of the church, the wife of one of the officers of the church, who was also a Sunday school teacher, spoke to an officer of the church, and said: "I greatly enjoyed the sermon until the last, but I do not think that a man should disarrange the order of the service of the church for the sake of having a few people come to the front, as he did this morning.' The first man who came forward was a railroad engineer who was killed in a wreck that Sunday night.

If we would admit our mistakes, rather than excuse them, we would profit by them.

Judgment to Come

• WHEN PAUL was before Felix he gave testimony to his faith in Christ; and as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come, Felix trembled.

Paul was no timeserver. He was a prisoner, but he did not say smooth things in order to curry favor with the governor. He preached of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come. His hands were chained, but not his tongue. Many a modern preacher has his tongue chained, though his hands may be free.

Wealth and position never influenced Paul. When Paul was before the governor, the governor trembled, not Paul. "The righteous are as bold as a lion." Prov. 28:1. If you are not bold, examine your righteousness. Christ, the righteous One, was ever bold. He said, "Go tell that fox." Herod, the king, He called a fox, the essence of cunning! If Christ is your righteousness, you should have the boldness of Christ, the boldness of the righteous.

Felix dismissed Paul, but he never dismissed his sermon. It was recorded in his mind. It is recorded in the Word of God, and the record will doubtless be read in his presence. Paul's skirt was free from the blood of that man. Many men's skirts are not free. The skirts of many are soddened with the blood of those they should have warned. It will drag them down. "Their blood will I require at thy hand." Woe to the shepherds that do not warn the flock. Woe to the prophets that prophesy smooth things.

Paul set forth the whole gospel—righteousness, temperance and judgment to come. Some set forth morality and act, by their silence, as if there was no judgment. Every minister is responsible to God first, and will have to give account of his stewardship. They are called to warn, testify and exhort, but they prefer to generalize, theorize and mystify.

John the Baptist came preaching, "Repent ye." Christ came saying, "Repent ye, and believe the gospel." When men asked Peter, "What shall we do?" he said to them, "Repent." Paul preached that God had commanded men everywhere to repent. Four great preachers, and the burden of their message was repentance.

Preachers have a model. They do well to follow the model. Never man spake like Him who warned, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Repentance is out of the vocabulary of many preachers today, and they themselves will want to repent when repentance will be useless. Shun not to declare the whole counsel of God.

Paul could have compromised and gotten free—free from the Roman power, but not free from God. His condemnation would have been from God, though he escaped the Roman power.

Pray for grace to preach with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven. You'll be thoroughly orthodox; you'li preach heavenly sermons; and people will be fitted thereby for heaven.

LEARN TO BE QUIET

"In quietness and in confidence shall be your strength." Isa. 30:15.

We all know that to do things is easier for most people than to be still. Our lives are like the ocean in their restlessness. This is one of the proofs of our immortality. We are too great to be quiet. A stone has no trouble in keeping still. A clam never gets nervous. The human soul was made for God, and its very grandeur renders its repose and quiet amid the things of earth the most difficult of all attainments. Yet quietness is a lesson that is set for us with great frequency in the Bible. We are told that the effect of righteousness is quietness. The Shepherd leads His sheep by the still waters. Restlessness is not spiritually beautiful.

Peace is a high attainment. Soldiers say that in war it is much harder to stand still under fire than to rush into the battle. Waiting is harder than working. It is only the great engine that runs noiselessly; the little machine fusses and sputters.

Quietness in a man or a woman is a mark of strength. Noise is not eloquence.

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Weighed in God's Scales

All the ways of a man are clean in his own eyes; but the Lord weighth the spirits. Proverbs 16:2.

• THIS VERSE struck me in my devotional reading one day. I began to meditate upon it. I thought, "How true—the Lord weigheth the spirits. Man cannot weigh spirits. He cannot put them in test tubes and analyze them. They are not material. But God can weigh spirits, for He is a Spirit."

I'm glad the Lord weighs spirits, for that shows He puts a value on human spirits. God, no doubt, has been dealing with souls throughout the years in this manner. While some people have been scorning the man who preached, the Lord has been weighing that man's spirit, and the Lord has been weighing the spirits of those people who scorned him. And while some people have been applauding some preacher, saying how wonderful he is, the Lord has been weighing that popular preacher's spirit, and He has been weighing the people who have been applauding him.

While meditating on this scripture, I was thinking about some examples in the Bible. When the Lord puts a person in the scales He brings circumstances to bear upon that life that the test may be made properly. The Lord brought Pharaoh to the scales. Pharaoh didn't realize it; I suppose he would have disdained the idea: but it was a fact that when those ten plagues were brought upon Egypt, and when that humble man, Moses, stood before him, bringing God's message, "Let my people go," God was busy weighing the spirit of Pharaoh. The result was that God had to write down in His book, "Light weight-too much stubbornness, a stubborn spirit." Any man who allows stubbornness to control his life is "light weight" in God's balances.


Jesus was a yielded person. He was not weak, but He was yielded. He was strong, but He was easy to be entreated. I believe that God wants us to have a spirit that is not stubborn. Perhaps you don't have as much trouble with that as I do, but it seems that all my life I have had a hard time giving way to others. It's nice to have your own way, and just do what you please, but God is looking for men or women who are willing to say, "Lord, Thy will be done, not mine."

Belshazzar was weighed. The Lord said of him, "Thou art weighed in the balances, and found wanting." Belshaz-

zar's name goes down under Pharaoh's. The Lord found his spirit too light. Why? Because Belshazzar had a sacrilegious spirit. He didn't count anything sacred. He didn't reverence God. He was wise in his own conceit. He was self-satisfied. His success had gone to his head, and he forgot that God was on the throne. It's terrible to have such a thing happen, but I believe it's happening today. There is a grave danger in the present day of considering sacred things as funny, light, or unimportant. I think we have to fight that. In handling the things of God, let's remember that they are sacred and precious. If you play with a sword instead of using it, you may cut yourself.

Not only were Pharaoh and Belshazzar weighed, but you will remember the story of Philip in the New Testament. A great crowd gathered to hear the Lord Jesus, and they listened with such rapt attention that they forgot to eat. Wasn't that remarkable? When folk forget to eat because of the Lord, I think that's a time when His Word is striking deepest. Jesus spoke to Philip about feeding the multitude. Philip didn't know that he was stepping into the Lord's scales, but he was. The Lord was weighing Philip, and right away Philip fell short.

He said, "Lord, even if we bought two hundred pennyworth of bread, it wouldn't begin to meet the need of this multitude. Why, Lord, it is almost madness to expect us to feed this multitude. Why, it's impossible, utterly impossible, Lord." Philip did not have enough faith. It says the Lord asked him that question to prove him, for He Himself knew what He would do. He knew He was going to feed that multitude. He knew there were five loaves and two fishes which He was going to turn into a wonderful banquet for all the crowd. The Lord, rather sadly, had to write down Philip's



name, and beside it this little statement, "short weight-short of faith."

Then you remember the story of James and John. They and the other disciples were bound for Jerusalem, in company with the Lord Jesus. When they came to a village of the Samaritans, the people would not receive the Lord Jesus, because He was determined to go to Jerusalem. That really "burned up" James and John. They just couldn't stand it. The very idea, that anyone should insult their Master by refusing to have anything to do with Him! They thought the Samaritans ought to be dealt with. They said, "Lord, wilt Thou that we command fire to come down from heaven, and consume them?" Have you ever felt like that? I suppose we all have, at some time or other. "Righteous indignation," we like to call it. But the Lord looked at James and John so lovingly. I'm sure He spoke to them gently, and not in anger, as He replied, "Ye know not what manner of spirit ye are of. For the Son of man is not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them."

James and John, by the force of those circumstances, were placed in God's scales, and their spirits turned a light weight. Why? Because they were impatient, angry, wrathful, revengeful. They wanted to destroy those Samaritans. They felt they were not fit to be on the earth any more. Brothers and sisters, if the Lord Jesus had destroyed us when we neglected Him, when we insulted Him, when we failed Him, there wouldn't be any of us left. But He is merciful, long suffering, not willing that any should perish. Because James and John showed a different spirit to His, He had to put their names down and write, "Weighed in the scales, and found lacking.'

We like to hear these Bible stories, and how God weighed these men in days gone by; but how would we like to bring it down to us today? I believe that every one of us is being tested by the Lord. I believe God is wanting to find out what sort of spirit we are of—whether we will show the spirit of Jesus, the spirit of love, mercy, and peace, or whether we are going to manifest an un-Christlike spirit, which is a damaging spirit, a troublesome spirit, a spirit which will hinder the work of God and His kingdom.

Our spirit is of utmost importance. If our people of the Assemblies of God have the spirit of Jesus manifested in every department of their lives, I can say without fear that this movement is going forward. There is going to be revival wherever they go. God is going to save souls. God is going to fill people with the Holy Spirit. God is going to heal the sick. God is going to move in power. But oh, let us take warning from these

All creation is tied in with man. Through the fall of man, all creation fell. Through the restoration of man, all creation will be redeemed.



Daily Victory Through the Cross

• ALTHOUGH a person may be wonderfully saved from sin, he may yet need to be saved from himself and his sinful nature. The blessedness of his salvation may seem to "wear off" after a few weeks or months. To his dismay, he may find movements in his heart which he recognizes all too well as manifestations of his old life; and the discovery is a great shock to one who had been so exhilarated with the joy of newfound salvation. He had thought that for his remaining years on earth he would glide through the realm of time on wings of blissful peace and joy!

In surprise and perplexity he begins to look around for a way out of this awful state. Usually his first recourse is introspection. Assisted by Satan's magnifying glass, he criticizes and condemns the minute details of his life, and then he weeps before his pitying Lord. In answer to his cry, the Lord blesses his heart, and joy springs up once more. For a time he seems to have perfect victory, but when the joy dies down the victory goes with it.

The same process is repeated again and again until he has tried several of the known methods and experiences that are promulgated through Christian circles today. Then he comes

to the conclusion that there is no help for him, and that the only thing one can do is to keep the undesirable elements in his nature in subjection as best he can, and cultivate the good ones to the best advantage.

What has been the cause of all this trouble? Why all this failure and defeat? We have the solution, I believe, in the words of Jesus, given in Matt. 22:29-"Ye do err, not knowing the scriptures, nor the power of God." We have gone to the arm of flesh for help, instead of going directly to God and His Word. Is it reasonable to suppose God has started us on a new life to leave us to muddle through the best way we know how? No! A thousand times, No! "He who hath begun a good work within you will go on to perfect it in preparation for the day of Jesus Christ." Phil. 1:6 (Weymouth). But we are like the "foolish Galatians"-we have begun in the Spirit but seek to be made perfect in the flesh.

Let us go back to the foundation of our faith. How did we start on this life? At the cross of Christ, where He suffered and died for us. There our sins were judged in His body; the law was fully satisfied, and the wrath of an insulted God appeased. We, who were guilty sinners on our road to destruction, were set free, and

fully forgiven. But was that all that happened? No, that was only a part of God's thought for us. Not only were our sins forgiven, but we were made new creatures. A new life was planted in our being, and we were born of the Spirit; born into a new family—the family of God.

Now comes the question, "What became of my old nature? Where has that gone?" This brings me to the vital point of my subject: "Our old man (or nature), is crucified with Him (Christ)" on the cross. Rom. 6:6. The old nature, with its good deeds and bad ones, God has nailed to the cross of Christ, and only asks us to leave it there. Then we hear these solemn words of the Holy Spirit ringing out through Paul with encouragement and advice, "Reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed." Dead indeed? Yes, "Dead indeed." As Weymouth puts it, "Regard yourselves as dead."

Today the old nature with all its propensities both good and bad, the nature that you have been trying to fix up to please God, the nature that you have been trying so hard to conform to the likeness of Christ, that nature God discarded entirely and crucified with Christ. Let us draw an imaginary picture from the sixth chapter of Romans. Here we see Christ crucified on the cross, and we are buried with Him by baptism; then He is raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, and we are also raised in Him to walk in newness of life. Now today we stand free with the grave (water baptism) and the cross of Christ between us and our old nature.

Now the question will arise, "If the old man (or creation) is crucified with Christ, why are there so many manifestations of it after we are saved, and even filled with the Spirit?" I think this could well be explained by an illustration taken from farm life. There is a method of killing a tree, quite popular in this country, called girdling. In this method a sharp knife or axe is used to cut a deep circle in the bark around the base of the tree. The moment this is done the tree is doomed and as good as dead. But does the tree fall down, or wither away immediately? No! To all appearances it looks just the same. If it is a fruit tree, the fruit may hang on for weeks and even show signs of improvement. The leaves may be green and the heavily laden branches may wave merrily in the breeze, but nevertheless that tree is doomed. You may care for it and use the best fertilizer; but you will never convince the gardener who girdled it that it is anything else but a doomed tree. The death blow has been struck, and time is all that is necessary to prove that the blow has been fatal. It is even so with our lives. God struck the death blow to the old creation when Christ was crucified on the cross. He knows what has been accomplished and only asks us to believe it. But because we see the green leaves and the fruit (the manifestations of the old creation) we would rather believe these things that appeal to our senses than believe God, who says, "For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God." Col. 3:3.

Now, once this truth has dawned on a soul he naturally concludes that all he has to do is to believe it and his troubles will end. But experience shows that is not so. Instead, one seems to develop a double portion of the old creation, and the trials and temptations seem to multiply on his hands. But the solution can be found in the fact that we are dealing, by faith, the death blow to Satan's territory, which is the old creation. He will raise up every imagination and feeling to the reverse of believing what God says is true, that we are "dead indeed." It is at this point the cross becomes effectual in daily life. As we take our place in the new creation life, and reckon our old creation, with its desires and habits, to be "dead indeed," God begins to manifest the reality of it and gives us glorious


victory. He does not ask us to fight our old nature; we are not expected to fight a dead foe. Instead, He says, "Man of God, flee these things." Turn your back on them, and "follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness. Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called." 1 Tim. 6:11, 12.

My emphasis has been on the death side, but I must not close without giving some space to the resurrection side; for, after all, the dying is only a means to an end-and that end is resurrection. In the latter part of Rom. 6:11 we are told to reckon ourselves alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord. We have been crucified with Christ and buried with Christ, and now we are alive unto God through Christ and are seated together with Him in heavenly places. Instead of being occupied with our old life and nature, we are occupied with Jesus, allowing the Holy Spirit to teach us how to live in the new creation; that is, to live in the Spirit. This is truly a life of privilege, a life of rest, a life of joy and peace. a life of fruitful service. It is the only life that is pleasing to God-a life that is hid with Christ in God.

I do not know of any place in our Christian experience where we shall be free from tests and trials, but there is a place where we can triumphantly say, with Paul, "None of these things move me." Acts 20:24. And that place is only reached when we are able to say from the depths of our hearts, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me." Gal. 2:20.

Now, instead of asking God to give me victory over the individual things in my nature, I ask Him to teach me how to walk in the Spirit so that I shall not fulfill the lusts of the flesh.

• OF ALL THE BEST LOVED words in China, the one that comes first in the heart of every person in the land is "ho-ping" (peace). After ten years of war and unrest, there is hardly a principle, a possession, or a position that most persons would not gladly sacrifice on the altar of peace.

But there is no peace. Even as the peacetalks take place in old Peking, the news of constant battle keep dinning in our ears. Ever nearer to the heart of China advance the Communist hordes. Just now they are only a hundred miles up the railroad line from Hankow, the city which we had to leave a few days after Christmas last.

In almost every province banditry is rife. Only the larger cities seem safe.

Mrs. Osgood and I are now living in Canton, away down in China's southland. Here in Happy Village, a few miles out of the city proper, a group of our missionaries from Canada and the States, together with a few consecrated Chinese teachers, are conducting a Bible School. Soft breezes, bird songs, brilliant flowers, and the sound of glad-gospel singing all combine to make one disbelieve that war is raging, that a great democratic government seems about to topple, that 500,000,000 people may be entering even now a midnight of slavery to Communistic domination from which they may never return. Another word the Chinese love is "fahts'ai" (wealth), but how can one have peace and wealth at the same time? The desire for riches makes the poor man covetous, the middle class dishonest, the upper class selfish. In the mad scramble for gain, there is thievery in every form from the silent, unarmed shadow that creeps over the window sill at night to the brazen-faced speculator who unashamedly works for the collapse of the national currency so that he may profit by its fall.

A zeal for gambling seems to possess almost everyone. Fortunes made by Chinese in America are lost returning home on the boat. At tables in the rear courts and upstair dens carpenters, clerks, peddlers, and politicians all take their turn at the games of chance, but the gambling demons only mock at the mad folly.

There is also the reckless demanding of huge percentages of interest on loans. The borrowers are just as reckless in promising to pay. One may borrow \$1000 easily today, but the terms are that it must be returned within a month plus \$1000 interest. The rate is very little less even when one borrows actual silver or gold.

How our hearts ache for the land! God's judgment has fallen and there are few who can escape. Disease, famine, war, and death: the old familiar picture from the Old Testament prophets to Revelation comes clearly before the eye. there are in all South America and Africa combined. So the work to be done is overwhelming, and the laborers *fewer*.

Occupy! Out in Southwest China a fine Bible School is prospering under the blessings of God. With more than twenty students in this its first year there are excellent prospects. A fine site for the school has been purchased. The present quarters in the city are crowded almost beyond endurance. Temporary buildings should be erected at once. Will you help us to occupy?

Occupy! In South China another Bible School has some forty students enrolled. There is a rising tide of revival among them, but not another student can be added although many are asking to enter. The rented buildings the school is using are entirely inadequate. The answer to the problem is to buy and build even if the structures are but temporary. We will do it if you will get behind us.

Occupy! In Northwest China our missionaries are experiencing real difficulties in obtaining funds. Banking facilities are poor. Even so, the missionaries are determined to stay. In far-off Kansu another Bible School is opening this spring. Even in occupied Peiping fifteen determined students are continuing their studies in Truth Bible Institute although both they and their instructors are practically starving. We have no way to get funds to them.

By God's help and your support and prayers we do not mean to quit. Not yet! Just over in Kwangsi province we hear of the blessings of God on the great tent campaigns being conducted by Glenn Dunn and his Chinese coworkers. Evangelist Timothy Chong, who has just come from there for a short visit with his family, tells of hundreds coming to the Lord. One of the workers in Hankow writes me of remarkable healings in answer to praver in that city. The Hogans and Benintendis have more converts than they can properly instruct in our newly opened field of Formosa. They are trying to learn a new dialect and conduct a revival at the same time. Irene Kallstrom and Doris V. Carlson write from Szechwan to tell of scores being baptized in the Spirit in the new works in and near Chengtu.

Matthew Lee and I are racing against time trying to complete our new all-China hymnal, *Salvation Songs*. The work of entirely rewriting three hundred hymns and songs has been far greater than we anticipated, but now that we can see the beginning of the end we are working even more prayerfully and eagerly. We know how anxiously the churches are waiting for it. The new songs are delightful. They are set in simple but poetical language, and rhythms which really fit the melodies. We hope to get the word edition and the note edition printed by midsummer at the latest, and are looking to God to supply the funds. Almost five thousand copies of the first booklet of fifty-one songs have been sold. That has been in only a short time, and without any advertising.

So we intend to occupy, by God's grace, and this is the prayer we are praying: "Dear Father, grant that in spite of all the threatenings of the enemy, the people of China may be granted the right to believe Christ; to gather to worship Christ; and to publicly witness for Christ. O Lord of the Harvest, keep the harvest fields open so that your laborers can work. In Jesus' name. Amen." Will you pray it with us?

NEWS BRIEFS FROM ABROAD

NETHERLANDS

(George C. Slager, Nieuw-Buinen, Netherlands)

George C. Slager, for a number of years a missionary to North China, has for the past ten months been stationed in the Netherlands. He is quite busy there, going from place to place with the gospel message. From Nieuw-Buinen, Neitherlands Mr. Slager writes:

"The Lord's presence is very real to us these days as we endeavor to carry the message of salvation.

"At our main assembly at Stads Kanaal, where a building was purchased and dedicated last October, the number of believers is growing. Souls have been saved and baptized in the Holy Spirit right along. Already the building is too small, having a seating capacity of only two hundred. We must enlarge the building soon.

"There are three of us giving full time to gospel work. We work in three provinces: Groningen, Drente, and Overyssel, and endeavor to answer as many calls as we can for meetings in the outlying districts. All over these provinces there are cities and towns without Pentecostal assemblies. We need workers for those places; also, funds are needed to carry on until the works are established. Generally speaking the people are very poor."

NETHERLANDS EAST INDIES

(Mr. and Mrs. Leonard E. Lanphear, Batavia, Java)

Mr. and Mrs. Leonard E. Lanphear, newly appointed missionaries to the Netherlands East Indies, have given us a brief account of their voyage to the field:

"We arrived in Batavia on March 18 after

slightly more than six weeks of travel, having sailed from Seattle on the morning of February 3. It was our privilege to be on a freighter which carried only ten passengers, all missionaries, so we were permitted to have services any time we wished. We had a pleasant voyage.

"Our first stop was at Yokohama, Japan. Much to our surprise Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Clement were at the dock to greet us. With them were Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Ahlberg. We had one day in port, so the Clements and Ahlbergs took us on a tour of Tokyo and Yokohama.

"Other stops en route were: Nagoya and Kobe, Japan; Hong Kong, China; Manila, and three other Philippine ports. We wanted to see the Far East Broadcasting Station at Manila, but our time was too limited; however, we did get to talk to John C. Broger by telephone."

SWITZERLAND

(Mr. and Mrs. John A. Lindvall, Corseaux, Switzerland)

From Switzerland comes a report from the Lindvalls. Mr. Lindvall served as a chaplain in Europe during World War II.

"It has been more than a year since we returned to Europe to help in this great harvest field. The year has been all too brief.

"We find the need for the gospel, here on the continent, appalling. America is sending much relief and material help to Europe, and it has been well. It has saved the lives of many, but the great need of Europe is the gospel. Many of Europe's approximately half a billion souls have never yet heard the simple gospel message. Please pray that God will raise up workers for Europe. "Some of the pastors are quite busy preparing for the Pentecostal World Conference to be held at Paris, France, May 21 to May 29."

BRAZIL

(Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Boyer, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil)

"Gospel literature in Brazil is so scarce new converts often have to wait many months before they can obtain even a songbook. We are not pastoring any work, but are dedicating our time solely to the literature problem.

"The new print shop is well in hand; however, all of our equipment is required to put out our papers and quarterlies. We need additional equipment to take care of other jobs.

"The work in the different assemblies of this district is going forward. Scores have been saved and received the Baptism in recent months."

NETHERLANDS EAST INDIES

(Mr. and Mrs. Harold R. Carlblom, Bandjermasin, Borneo)

"For the past month or so we have not been allowed to go inland because of unsettled political conditions, but we are expecting to get to go soon. Our boat is being outfitted for the work. We were able to secure a good motor boat at a fairly reasonable price, and we have a new motor for it. We had another boat, but when the motor reached us it was too big for our boat. There was nothing to do but to get a boat to fit our motor.

"We will be going deep into Borneo where there is a crying need for the Bread of Life.

"Our work in Bandjermasin also must be carried forward. Right now our missionary force in Borneo is almost depleted. We will have to carry on as best we can. We know that you will stand behind us in prayer. We are in the midst of Confucianism, Buddhism, Mohammedanism, and just plain paganism, and we do need your prayer."

Additional reports, and further processing of our records reveal that the First Assembly, Hilliard G. Griffin, pastor, Granite City, Illinois, should have ninth place on the list with an offering of \$368.38; and the Full Gospel Assembly, B. E. Mahan, pastor, Washington, D. C., should have eleventh place on the list with an offering of \$232.45.

SIMPLIFIED A-BOMB

According to Charles A. Wells, atom bombs are now being produced as "field weapons" to be handled by troops in combat, whereas the earlier models, such as those used against Hiroshima, could only be handled by scientists under laboratory conditions.

JERUSALEM ON THE AIR

A new radio station, Kol Yerushalayim, will start broadcasting soon from Jerusalem. Its newscasts will be heard by thousands throughout the Near East. Will it one day electrify the world with the announcement that Jesus of Nazareth has suddenly re-appeared and been welcomed by the Jews as their long-awaited Messiah?

DRINKING LESS BEER

Americans drank nearly a billion less glasses of beer in 1948 than during the previous year, the American Business Men's Research Foundation reports. There was a drop of 70,237,661 gallons in beer consumption. It also reports a market statement that "beer consumption over the bar has dropped 40% to 60% in the last three months," despite a record-breaking \$60,000,000 of beer advertising for the year.

FOREIGN AID FIGURES

The American people have contributed \$39, 135,000,000 for the aid of people in other countries since the end of World War II. This sum, *The Reader's Digest* points out, is the equivalent of \$1,151 for each of America's 34,000,000 families.

How many families have contributed \$1,151 to missions for the *spiritual* aid of people in other countries?

THE ARAB REFUGEES

Many have sympathized with the Arab refugees in Palestine, who have suffered greatly since they fled from their homes before the advance of the Jewish troops. But the *Hebrew Christian Alliance Quarterly* quotes "the conservative *Economist* of London" to the effect that "it was the Jews of Palestine who implored the Arabs to stay in the Jewish State of Partitioned Palestine, and guaranteed them safe keeping and safe lodging, as is now experienced by the 80,000 who remained in Israel."

THE SHADOW OF THE ALMIGHTY

The B-50 Superfort "Lucky Lady II" recently completed the first non-stop, round-the-world flight, in 94 hours. The bomber was refueled in flight at the Azores, Dhahran, the Philippines, and Hawaii. Said Air Secretary Symington, "The feat of Lucky Lady II proves the shadow of American air power can be cast over any area in the world!"

Many nations feel secure beneath that shadow. They trust in the shadow of the mighty American bombers for protection. But those who know the Lord can trust in a better hiding place, for it is written, "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." Psalm 91:1.

TOLERANCE IN ISRAEL

For the first time since its opening in 1925, the Hebrew University in Jerusalem has awarded Ph.D. degrees to two non-Jews. According to *Religious News Service*, one of these is an American theology graduate and the other is a Carmelite monk.

COMMUNISTS AND CATHOLICS

The Converted Catholic states that Italy, claimed to be 99.6% Roman Catholic, has "over 2,000,000" registered Communist Party members (according to an official NCWC Rome feature article in the Broklyn Tablet). "How's that for the Pope's own country? In the 'godless United States,' with a population of 140,000,000, the Communists can only muster about 40,000 votes at a Presidential election."

CATHOLICS AND THEIR BIBLES

The English novelist, E. Waugh, recently spoke in Baltimore's Loyola College and said that fifty years from now only Catholics would be readers of the Bible. Comments Edwin Fesche, in *Help and Food*:

"This remark will infuriate those who have tried to converse with Catholics on the Bible. We have found that Catholics generally have no interest in the Bible and are unaware of the new translations recently published by their church." If Catholics would only read their Catholic Bibles they would understand the plan of salvation through Christ alone and be made to rejoice in the grace of God.

THUNDER AND LIGHTNING

An aged preacher says: "When I was young, I used to think it was the thunder that killed the people: but when I grew older, I learned it was the lightning. When I first began to preach, I thought the finest sermon would have the best effect, but I found the simple, plain, and pointed statements did more. So I determined, through God's help to have less thunder and more lightning in my preaching." What is true of preaching is true also of every other kind of work we might seek to do for the Lord. It is through the Holy Spirit, and not merely the human spirit, that worthwhile work is done for God.

THE "SQUARE" STAR

(A Correction)

Not long ago, we published a report of a sermon by Howard Rusthoi, entitled, "A Magnificent Obsession." In his sermon Brother Rusthoi told how he had talked with an astronomer at the Mount Wilson and Palomar Observatories, and had been given to understand that in looking through the big new telescope at Palomar the astronomers had seen a new star that appeared square in shape.

Many readers, upon seeing this in the Evangel, wrote to the Observatories asking for more information; whereupon the Observatories denied that any "square star" had been seen.

Brother Rusthoi was anxious to know how he had received a wrong impression from the astronomer with whom he had talked, so he went back to the office of the Observatories. He explained the whole matter to Mr. Humason, the Secretary of the Observatories. After hearing Brother Rusthoi's explanation, Mr. Humason said that he could easily have gotten the impression he did.

Mr. Humason said that, while no official photos of specific heavenly bodies had been taken with the new telescope as yet, many test photos had been taken for the purpose of adjusting the huge mirror. Then he drew a sketch of the mirror, showing how the test photos were made, and explained how they came out "square" in shape.

Evidently Brother Rusthoi, on his first visit, had misunderstood the astronomer to indicate that these test photos were actual photos of a "square" star. Mr. Humason asserted, however, that no "square" star has ever been seen. We hope this explanation will correct any

We hope this explanation will correct any wrong impression that was given, as Brother Rusthoi desires to have this matter cleared up.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS

The year 1948 was one of history's worst in infantile paralysis, states Hygeia. The first and worst epidemic was in 1916, when 27,263 cases were reported in the U.S.A. Last year 26,216 cases were reported for the first eleven months.

Polio is a tragic disease, yet there is another paralysis that is doing more damage today than infantile paralysis. It is a deadly spiritual paralysis which slowly but surely is creeping over many Christian believers, causing them to slacken their effors to win souls and eventually to slump down upon a bed of spiritual sickness. To every poor paralytic the voice of Jesus still commands, "Arise, and take up thy bed." Mark 2:9. He can heal paralysis, be it physical or spiritual.



In 1926 I was operated on for tumors, and four months later I was stricken with polio. At that time the doctors where I was knew no way of helping or curing polio and they said they could do nothing for me.

I was not saved, but I had read in the Bible how Jesus healed people; so I just prayed, and gradually I got better so that I could walk and do my work. However, I was always in pain and there always seemed to be some

health. I was saved in 1934 but still I did not know how to trust God for complete healing.



GOING WITH THE GOSPEL

By W. C. Peirce and L. C. Honderick Available in either cloth or paper binding. 230 pages. Price, \$2.25 in cloth, \$1.25 in paper. Gospel Publishing House, Springfield 1, Missouri

"Going With the Gospel" is a manual on Sunday School evangelism. Willard C. Peirce, an Instructor at Glad Tidings Bible Institute in San Francisco, is the author of the first part of the book, which deals with the "Spiritual Dynamics" of personal evangelism.

Brother Peirce shows that our mission is to witness; our message is Christ; and our motive power is the Holy Spirit. He says that the task of evangelizing the world is not for a select few but is the responsibility of every Christian. Some of the chapter headings are: God's New Testament Program; Working the Program Today; Heart Preparation of the Worker; The Prayer of Intercession; Tact and Contact.

There is a chapter on Popular Excuses and Scriptures for Use of Personal Workers. He shows how "going with the gospel" will not only save the lost, but will revive the church.

This manual is very readable, being filled with illustrations from actual experiences in soul winning. At the same time, it is designed for use in training classes; there is a list of study questions at the end of each chapter.

Loine C. Honderick, National Sunday School Representative of the Assemblies of God, is the author of the second part of the book, which deals with the very practical matter of methods, or mechanics, in "going with the gospel." He shows which part each person in the Sunday School can play in the enlargement campaign—from the pastor and superintendent right down to the most inexperienced member. He also shows how the keeping of proper records and the use of printed supplies

Another Constitution is given, suitable for a departmentalized School. The section written by Brother Honderick represents not only his personal views but those of many of the most successful pastors, evangelists, and Sunday School workers in our Movement. He has gathered his ideas from every available source and worked in close co-operation with his brethren at Springfield and throughout the U. S. and Canada in compiling his material.

Brother Peirce and Brother Honderick have done the Fellowship a great service in preparing this valuable book. It will be of inestimable help to all those who, through prayer and the power of the Holy Ghost, are seeking to win children and adults to Christ through the Sunday School.—R. C. C.

THE BUD AND THE FLOWER (Judaism and Christianity)

by Ruth Specter MEZUZAH

The name "Mezuzah" is the Hebrew word for doorpost, to which place the ceremonial object is fastened. This symbol of the Jewish profession of faith is a small wooden, glass, or metal case or tube of from two to six inches in length, containing a rolled rectangular piece of parchment inscribed with passages from Deut. 6:4-9 and Deut. 11:13-21.

The Mezuzah is affixed to the doorpost in obedience to the command in Deut. 6:9, "Thou shalt write them (the words of the law) upon the doorposts of thy house and upon thy gates." Pious Jews kiss their fingers after they touch the Mezuzah, reciting, "May God keep my going out and my coming in from now and forevermore."

This symbol of Judaism is undoubtedly an amulet, and forcibly recalls the protecting charm possessed by the doorposts of the ancient Israelites in Egypt who, in obedience to the command of God, struck the blood of the lamb on the lintels and two side posts of the doors of their dwellings. Exodus 12:22, 23.

Christian, there is a Mezuzah affixed to your soul; but it is not a metal case, nor is the law of God written upon parchment within. Are you not thankful unto your Messiah that He has made it possible for His statutes to be written upon the doorpost of your heart, which is much better?

O Israel, there is a new and a living way provided for you, made possible through the Great Sacrifice. And the blood on the doorposts of your forefathers was God's protection from the enemy Pharaoh and from death, just so the Mezuzah God has for you today will keep you from Satan, the enemy of your soul, and the second death!

"There is a fountain filled with blood, Drawn from Immanuel's veins, And sinners plunged beneath that flood, Lose all their guilty stains."

The blood of the Lamb of God, your Messiah -applied to the door of your hearts in faithcleanseth from all sin; and it is your protection. It is your assurance of eternal life, and your peace in a troubled world. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."


