SPIRITUAL GIFTS

A Series of Studies by Frank M. Boyd*

Are Pentecostal people becoming too "giftconscious"?

Do the "spiritual gifts" reside in the individual believer or in the church (which is the body of Christ)?

Are there more than nine "gifts" of the Spirit?

How are the "gifts" bestowed?

In this series of studies Frank M. Boyd will deal with such questions as these. Brother Boyd has given his life to the study and teaching of the Word of God. He has ministered in Pentecostal Bible Schools since 1917. At present he is Director of our Correspondence School and an Instructor at Central Bible Institute and Seminary.

PART ONE

• PENTECOSTAL PEOPLE (that group of God's people who believe in and who have received the baptism in the Holy Spirit, with the accompanying sign of the speaking with tongues) are becoming increasingly spiritual-gift conscious. This is not an unhealthy development and doubtless springs from a sense of the need of the church in this hour of world-chaos, international tension, rampant evil, and religious confusion; and from an increasing sense of the nearness of the end of the age.

The feeling is current among us that the church militant needs and should possess that full panoply of spiritual equipment, which the Lord has provided for her in her conflict with the world, the flesh, and the devil. This very urge, which is seizing many of God's dear Pentecostal people, constitutes a challenge to the enemy, who is quick to throw down the gauntlet when the church makes any aggressive move forward.

This consciousness of the need for the exercise of spiritual "gifts" seems to center about what we have been accustomed to call the "nine gifts of the Spirit." concerning which Paul wrote in the familiar twelfth, thirteenth, and fourteenth chapters of 1 Corinthians. As a consequence numcrous questions are arising—Is this list of the so-called nine gifts the complete one? How may they be classified and defined? Who are eligible to receive spiritual gifts? How are they bestowed? We do well to examine our foundations with the plumb line of God's Word to determine if they are solid, and if not, to find wherein the weaknesses consist, before we proceed with further building, lest schism rend our walls and our spiritual structure totter and fall. There is one pre-eminent virtue of the Christian life that God longs to see in His people— LOVE; and there is an "endeavor" which He desires us all to be vigorously engaged in—the endeavor "to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

Therefore, the Lord may have to put us all into His tumbling barrel. A tumbling barrel is a revolving cask or barrel, used in iron foundries, in which small metal parts are polished by mutual contact and attrition or by sand friction; or in which *small* castings are put to break out their rough cores. [Lord, make us "small" so we can go into the barrel.] It may be necessary that we go through a vigorous shaking up personally and doctrinally that the rough spots and protuberances, spiritually speaking, may be ground off. But if, as a result, we come through speaking "the same thing," "walking in love" and in the "unity of faith," the tumbling-barrel experience will not have been in vain.

To that end we present a series of studies on the "gifts of the Spirit" which we trust will be stimulating to thought, informative, and which may help lead us ultimately to a crystallization of conclusions, and to glorious victory for the church in these last days. In the Canticles the Bride is revealed as "looking forth, fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners." S. of S. 6:10.

[Note that throughout this series we have placed the words "gift" and "gifts" consistently in quotation marks, as an accommodation to our modes of thought and expression concerning these divine enablements, and not as representing the exact sense of "charismata." Were it not too bulky an expression, we would prefer throughout to give the word "charismata" its true significance;


that is, "endowments or enablements originating from the divine grace, upon or to His church militant."]

Observations from the Book of Acts

At the outset may we throw out this suggestion. Let us suppose that we did not have the First Epistle to the Corinthians (which is largely a corrective one) and we were to look into the Acts of the Apostles (or, as it should be called, the "Acts of the Holy Ghost" in the apostolic church), what would we discover about "gifts of the Spirit"? When the early church was "filled with the Holy Spirit," they also received the "power" of the Spirit, and the potentialities resident in Him were displayed as "they went forth and preached everywhere," and the Lord worked "with them confirming the word with signs following." We wonder if even the apostles were gift-conscious at all. (We shall be looking into the whole subject suggested by the word "gifts" later.) They did know, by Christ's own revelation to them, what they could expect, at least in measure. Mark 16:17, 18. It would seem that as the emergencies arose, the Holy Spirit guided and in-spired them and displayed His power through them to meet the existent need. So, when Peter and John encountered the lame man at the Beautiful Gate, the Spirit first inspired their faith and then displayed His power through them to heal the lame man. When the church was threatened as to its internal purity, Peter was given discernment to expose the duplicity of Ananias and Sapphira. Acts 5.


As the church grew, one of the deacons named Stephen, "full of faith [literally 'grace,' the root word from which the word 'charismata,' translated 'gifts' in 1 Corinthians 12:9 ('gifts of healing') comes] and power (dunamis) did great wonders and signs among the people." The Lord confirmed the word "with signs following," by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Philip, another deacon, cast out demons, healed the sick, and restored the lame. When he encountered the perfidious Elymas (or Bar-jesus), "Paul, filled with the Holy Ghost, set his eyes on him," discerned his spiritual state, exposed him,



Paul's case from the bite of the viper (Acts 28:1-5), he had the power, resident in the Spirit within him, to shake off the serpent with no ill effects, according to Mark 16:18.

One might question whether in all this record of the Acts there was any consciousness then of specific "gifts" in a rigid category of *nine* or any other num-

ber. The fact is, as we hope to demonstrate later, there are more than nine, and some of them very humble ones, with no apparent glamour at all, but none the less gifts ("charismata") of the Spirit.

Paul's Message to the Corinthians

It is obvious that Paul's first letter to

John 17.17

the Corinthians is, in nature, largely corrective of misconceptions, abuses, wrong doctrinal conceptions, etc., present among them. One abuse lay in the exercise of the "gift of tongues" and prophecy. This church was "enriched in all utterance" and came "behind in no gift ('charisma')." 1 Cor. 1:5, 7. Their main difficulty seemed to be with the utterance-gifts (tongues, interpretation of tongues, and prophecy) which were more spectacular, as far as

the assembly life was concerned. Paul wrote, not only to correct abuses involving these "gifts," but to make clear that there were others with which God had graced His church, for he does not stop with the apparent nine in 1 Corinthians 12, but in writing to the Romans he listed still others. Rom. 12:4-8.

Exegesis of Words Used Concerning "Gifts"

Paul introduces the whole subject of "spiritual gifts," as we are accustomed to call them, in 1 Cor. 12:1 with these words: "Now concerning spiritual gifts. brethren, I would not have you ignorant." "Surely we shall not choose to be ignorant of them and of their significance today! Note that in this verse the word "gifts" is in italics and is not in the original Greek text. The substantive (noun) Paul uses is the Greek neuter plural ("pneumatika"—used also in 14: 1) of an adjective which means "of or pertaining to spirit," "emanating from the divine Spirit or exhibiting the effects of that Spirit." It may well be translated "spirituals," and defined as manifestations in the realm of the Spirit, "matters of or from the Holy Spirit." This word gives the key to 1 Corinthians chapters 12, 13, 14. The word "gift" or "gifts" is apt to convey a different thought to our minds than is intended. When one thinks of a gift, the mind naturally comprehends something tangible, something that is given to be retained and to be enjoyed or used by the recipient. There are five words in the original Scriptures which do convey the above idea: doma, dosis, doron, dorema and dorea.

Joseph H. Thayer in his Greek-English Lexicon distinguishes these synonymous words: "Doron is specifically a present, vet not always gratuitous or wholly unsuggestive of recompense; but dorea differs from doron in denoting a gift which is also a gratuity without recompense, hence of the benefactions of a sovereign; a dosis of God is what God confers as possessor of all things; a dorea of God is an expression of His favor; a doron of God is something which becomes the recipient's abiding possession. Dorema is a gift, a bounty, a benefaction, as is doma.

> Salvation is referred to as the "gift (doron) of God." Eph. 2:8. Paul speaks of the "gift" (dorea) of the grace of God bestowed upon him. Eph. 3:7. Any material substance bestowed upon another is refer-red to as a "gift," and *doron* or *doma* are usually used to express this thought throughout the New Testament. See Matt. 2:11 (dora, plural); Matt. 7:11 (domata, plural); Luke 21:1 (dora, plural); and Rev. 11:10 (dora, plural).

The average person who believes he has received the gift of tongues, or the gift of interpretation, or the gift of healing, has this conception, that he has something tangible, something given to be retained (Continued on page six)

"Clouds Without Water"

• The Book of Jude uses more extraordinary, original, and unique figures of speech than perhaps any other book in the Bible. It speaks of "raging waves of the sea," "wandering stars," "trees whose fruit withereth," and "clouds without water, carried about of winds." Jude 12. In these he makes reference to the apostates of his day; they are good figures of speech concerning the apostates of any day. Those men who deny the things which are revealed in the Holy Scriptures are clouds without water. Clouds without water leave nothing. So ministers without the gospel make a desert where faith should blossom like a rose.

1. Men who exalt human reason above divine revelation are "clouds without water."

It is not what man reasons, it is what God reveals. It is not what man thinks, it is what God says. The mind of man can never discover the heart of God. By wisdom this world has never come to know God. God's wisdom is foolishness to men, and man's wisdom is foolishness to God. We are not left to reason, we have a revelation. There are no dark secrets in the gospel. He who runs may read. Christianity differs from world religions in that they seek after God while Christianity is God seeking man.

2. Men who exalt human attainment above divine atonement are "clouds without water."

Attainment is possible to man. Atonement is possible only with God. Attainment is what man can do. Atonement is something that God alone can do. Attainment is within man's power. Atonement is in the power of God only. Attainment makes man appear better before man, but atonement is the means by which man may appear before God without guilt or sin. Attainment has for its big word "character." Atonement has for its big word "cross." Attainment makes for education. Atonement makes for salvation. Attainment is for the mind. Atonement is for the soul. Be not a cloud without water!

3. Men who exalt human philosophy above divine prophecy are "clouds without water."

Philosophy is what man thinks he knows. Prophecy is what God fore-knows. Philosophy is man's little candle which a gust of wind can blow out. Prophecy is God's lamp, which shines in a dark place until the day dawn. Philosophy is a maze from which man never emerges, while prophecy is light upon every step of the believer's pathway. Philosophy knows a little about the here and now, while prophecy knows about the hereafter.

4. Men who exalt human advance above divine advents are "clouds without water?

The world does not advance without Christ. In His absence it takes the down grade, not the up grade. With Christ out of the world there can be nothing permanently better in the world. It is not human advance, but the divine advents that have brought into the world help and holiness for man. Be not a cloud without water. Let God's thoughts be sufficient for you. Think God's thoughts after Him.

The Bible seldom speaks, and certainly never its deepest, sweetest words, to those who always read in a hurry. Nature can only tell her secrets to such as will sit still in her sacred temple, till their eyes lose their glare of earthly glory, and their ears are attuned to her voice. And shall revelation do what nature cannot? Never. The man who shall win the blessedness of hearing the voice of divine wisdom must watch daily at her gates, and wait at the posts of her doors."-F. B. Meyer.

• IT WAS DURING a hillside vesper service, on a Saturday evening, this past summer, that we heard a wonderful story. He said not, "Thou shalt not be tempested; thou shalt not be travailed; thou shalt not be afflicted:" but He said, "Thou shalt not be overcome!"


The story told in the particular service to which I refer was that of a widowed mother with five small children. Suddenly the head of the home had been summoned into His presence, and there was that aloneness that can be felt only by those who have passed through similar experiences. Winter was coming on, and there was no money with which to pur-drought of summer had ruined their small wheat crop, corn fields had withered up in the fierce heat. For lack of water several valuable animals had perished. The future looked dark indeed! It was just as if a deep, black cloud had settled down over that little home and they were enveloped within its fold.

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But it was a *Christian* home, where the little ones were gathered daily around a family altar and taught to listen quietly to the reading of God's holy Word. It was the mother's habit always to kneel and pray, committing herself and her little ones to *His* loving care. But now, through the extreme pressure, her faith was fast failing, and tears often fell like rain upon the open Book as she would attempt to read the promises. Discouraged and disheartened, wondering if God would forget to be gracious, the song of faith died out in her heart!

When a Christian loses *heart*, he loses everything! To keep one's heart in the midst of life's stream, and to maintain a front that knows no defeat in the face of its difficulties, is not an achievement that springs from anything that a laboratory



can demonstrate, or that logic can affirm. It is an achievement of faith! If you lose your sky you will soon lose your earth!

In the midst of her hopelessness and darkness an evangelist came to a nearby village to conduct a series of services, and one evening the two oldest children wended their way down the country lane to the village church. The small congregation was singing heartily a new chorus. The children tried to remember the words and to join in the singing. Suddenly they left the church, even before the service closed, and hurrying home, rushed into the room, where they found their mother holding in her arms her youngest child, rocking it to sleep. They cried out: "Mother! We have been to church, and we have found out something wonderful-just what you

need! There was a man with a shining face singing, 'Put it down! Put it down; Take your burden to the Lord and put it down!'"

After the service the evangelist inquired about these two children who had sat on the back row in the evening service, saying, "I must find them!" He walked out of the village and down the country lane and coming to the little cottage, knocked at the door of the widow's home. At once he sensed the true condition of that little family—as once he too had passed through a similar time of deep depression, when he felt that God had forsaken him, but God gave him a comforter!

In this home so bare of the necessities of life, he drew from his pocket a copy of God's Word and read from the promises: "Let their widows trust in me." "I have not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread." "In time of famine thou shalt be satisfied." "Bread shalt be given, and water shall be sure." "Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? Are ye not of more value than many sparrows?" "The Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want!" "I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the Lord; thoughts of peace, and not of evil." And then he sang, "Take your burden to the Lord and leave it there!" The children's voices were now heard, "Mother! that is the song, 'Put it down! Put it down! Take your burden to the Lord and put it down!" The little mother did put it down, and then and there laid all of her burdens at His pierced feet! And God put within her heart a new song, that carried her through the future-testing days, and she found that, He lives! He loves! He cares!

Beloved, we are not blind to present world conditions; and were it not for God's sustaining grace, assuring love, and constant upholding, *many* of His dear children would at this time be pressed out of measure and despair of life. Letters are even now lying upon our desk from those who are so fearing the future that they are seeking to drown their worries by drinking, and some are tempted to commit suicide!

out! His plans were not made for only that day. He was always in advance of time! When the disciples came back from fishing, Jesus was on the seashore with a fire of coals and fish laid thereon. After the resurrection the disciples were bewildered and the way looked black! But the angel said, "Behold, He goeth before you into Galilee;" He is always thinking ahead! preparing ahead! Take this text with you into the future. Take it into today's experience: "Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." "I go to prepare a place for you!"

"He is out in the world doing it! He will be there before you! He will bring you to your appointed place, and you will find your appointed resources! You will discover His insight, His oversight and His foresight! You may not always see Him, but you can walk by faith in the dark if you know that He sees you; and can sing as you journey, even through the night!"

AN EVANGELIST'S TESTIMONY

"I shall never forget that hour. There was no joyous exaltation or deep inrush of emotion but a great calm. I kept on trusting; then the signs and wonders of my longings, hopes, and prayers began to come. Within twenty months I saw 1,800 souls led to Christ, and since then those numbers have reached nearly 90,000 men, women and children."

THE RIVER FROM THE ROCK

on National Radio Hour, "Sermons in Song"

• IN EXODUS 17:6 we find these words: "Behold, I will stand before thee there upon the rock in Horeb; and thou shalt smite the rock and there shall come water out of it, that the people may drink; and Moses did so in the sight of the elders of Israel."

The history of the Children of Israel is constantly referred to, in both the Old and the New Testaments, as a type of God's dealings with His people in later dispensations. In 1 Corinthians 10:11 the apostle Paul clearly states that "all these things happened unto them by way of example, and they were written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the ages are come." The passage before us—Moses' smiting of the rock in Horeb and the gushing forth of the life-giving water—gives to us a most helpful object lesson of the atonement for sin and the consequent gift of the Holy Spirit.

We learn from 1 Corinthians 10:4 (and please note this carefully) that it was not only on the *one* occasion that the Israelites drank of the river from the rock, but it followed them, flowing along the pathway of their march all through those forty years of wander-

ing, as long as they kept in the path where the Lord led them; for "they drank of that spiritual rock that followed them; and that rock was Christ."

It would appear, from what is written in Numbers 20:2, that they wandered out of the will of God and so lost the supply of water; but the rock was still there, and Moses was told only to speak to it (not to smite it again) that the streams might once more flow forth for the people's need. God here teaches us a lesson of the all-prevailing, eternal efficacy of the atonement of Jesus. He is the Rock of Ages, smitten once for all on Calvary's cross, a sacrifice for sin never to be repeated.

But from the smitten rock flowed the life-giving river of the Holy Spirit's fulness. The chief point in this picture, as to its spiritual lesson for us, is the connection between Calvary and Pentecost. Until the great sacrifice was offered for sin, the Holy Spirit could not be given in Pentecostal power: but when our great High Priest entered for us into the heavens with His own blood, telling of a finished atonement, then "having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost," He poured Him forth upon the waiting disciples on the day of Pentcost. From that day to this, the river of the water of life has been the heritage of every true child of God who will walk

in the pathway He leads; and it is *your* bloodbought heritage if *you* are a child of God, for "the promise is unto you" on the basis of the atonement on Calvary's Cross.



and enjoyed or used by him. None of these words is used in the "gift" chapters in 1 Corinthians; neither is the word "charismata," translated "gifts" (1 Cor. 12:4, 9, 30), used anywhere to express the meaning of a bestowment of something or of someone gratuitously, to be the possession of the recipient. As used in Romans, "charisma" carries the thought of a free gift bestowed by God's grace.

The Use of "Charisma" (singular) and "Charismata" (plural form)

The word "charisma" is used in the Epistles only. It does not occur in the Gospels nor in Acts. It occurs five times in Romans and eight times in First and Second Corinthians. It is particularly significant in its use in 1 Tim. 4:14 and 2 Tim. 1:6 where it refers to that bestowment of the divine grace by the laying on of the hands of the elders and by Paul himself. (Who can gainsay that this happened when Timothy was ordained or set apart to his specific ministry?) Thayer comments on "charisma" as used in these verses, as follows: "The sum of those powers requisite for the

discharge of the office of an evangelist." There is nothing here to indicate that this was a bestowment necessarily of some individual socalled "spiritual gift" from among the nine of 1 Corinthians 12.

The word "charisma" is used in Rom. 1:11, where we are informed that Paul longed to see the church at Rome with the intent that he might bestow some "gift of grace" to the end that they might be established. This desire here is toward the whole church rather than toward the individuals in the church.

Specific Use of "Charisma"

This word is used freely in the so-called gift chapters (1 Corinthians 12, 13, and 14) but does not occur as often in the original Greek text as it occurs in our Authorized Version. Note that the word "gift" is in italics in the following passages: 1 Cor. 12:1; 13:2; 14:1; 14:12. The word "charisma" does not occur in the Greek in connection with faith in either 1 Cor. 12:9 or 1 Cor. 13:2, neither does it appear in connection with prophecy anywhere in the three chapters. It does occur in connection with a list of divine bestowments, which includes prophecy, in Rom. 12:6-8. In this latter passage the so-called "nine gifts" are greatly extended to include ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, administration, and showing mercy, as well as prophecy. It has been a little difficult to adjust our theology in the "gifts of the Spirit" to include the seven mentioned in Romans, and therefore most teachers on this subject utterly ignore them. But they are definitely classified under the heading of "charismata" (the Greek word is used in Rom. 12:6) and should be positively recognized and included

in the full complement of those divine bestowments of grace which panoply the church for her conflict and work in this evil world.

Let us note also that the word "charisma" is not linked directly with any of the "spirituals," with the exception of healing (1 Cor. 12:9) and of prophecy. (In this latter case as introducing the list of Rom. 12:6-8.) It occurs three times in connection with healing and in these three instances both "charisma" and "iama" (healing) are in the plural-"gifts (or be-stowments) of healings." Is it not significant that the word "gift" is absent from the other eight "spirituals" in 1 Corinthians 12 and yet is attached to the word "healings," and then is in the plural in every instance where healing is referred to? This fact would seem to explode the idea that any man can claim a "gift of healing," teaching rather that the Spirit may use some individual in this particular ministry and may grant him gracious bestowments of "healings" for those for whom he prays, as the occasion would glorify God.

There is no such expression found anywhere as the "gift of wisdom," "the gift of knowledge," or even the "gift of tongues" or "the gift of the interpretation of tongues." These are all phrases which we have invented for convenience of expression and have grown, partly at least, out of some of our misconceptions. The only place, other than "healings," where the word "gift" (charisma) is directly connected with any other spiritual enablement, is to introduce the list of such in Rom. 12:6, and here again it is in the plural.

However, the full complement of the "spirituals" is designated as "charismata"—gracious enablements or bestowments of the grace and favor of God—in 1 Cor. 12:31, where Paul exhorts the church at Corinth: "But covet (be zealous for) the best (greatest) gifts ('charismata') and yet show I unto you a more excellent way." In this same broad sense "charisma" is used in 1 Cor. 1:7: "That in everything ye are enriched by him, in all utterance, and in all knowledge . . . so that ye come behind in no gift ('charisma')"; and also in 1 Cor. 12:4, which reads: "There are diversities of gifts ('charismata'), but the same Spirit."

To sum up the whole teaching on the concept of "gifts" it is vital to note the utter absence of any word which carries the meaning of something given by someone to another to be his own possession and to be used by him as he desires. This thought is further amplified by reference to the divine sovereignty in the bestowment, in the service rendered, and in the divine power or energy displayed. This truth is brought out clearly in the following translation of 1 Cor. 12:4-6, which is closer to the original than our A.V .- "Endowments vary, but the Spirit is the same; and forms of service [ministrations] vary, but it is the same Lord who is served, and activities [effects or displays of energy] vary, but God who produces them all, in us all, is the same.'

Further, by way of summary, we note that all these "spirituals," including gracious enablements, ministries, administration, and spiritual effects or workings, are presented as "the manifestation of the Spirit," which is given for the profit or edification of all. 1 Cor. 12:7. A. S. Way's rendering clarifies this: "Now, mark, it is for the benefit of the church that the manifestation of the Spirit is bestowed on this or that person."

We come to the conclusion, then, that these "spirituals" (*pneumatika*—1 Cor. 12:1 and 14:1) bestowed upon the church out of the divine grace (*charismata*—1 Cor. 12:31; 1 Cor. 1:7; Rom. 12:6-8) include:

1. Spiritual power to accomplish healings, miracles, etc.

2. Spiritual revelations, such as the word of wisdom, the word of knowledge, discerning of spirits, etc.

3. Inspired utterance, as prophecy, speaking in tongues, interpretation of tongues, exhortation, teaching under the anointing of the Spirit, etc.

4. Spirit-guided administration of the affairs of the church, government, various kinds of service, etc.

[Note that the word "administrations" (1 Cor. 12:5) and "ministry" (Rom. 12:7) are from the Greek word "diakonia," from which in turn we derive our word "deacon," and includes various types of service.]

Stephen was a "deacon" and served humbly with the others chosen with him in the temporal affairs of the early church (Acts 6:1-5); and in addition, being "full of grace [literal] and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people." 5. Spiritually energized giving; ability to show mercy with a cheerful heart.

The Inherent Meaning of "Charisma"

We have noted that the root of the word is "charis," translated grace. Through its derived word "charisma" (or "charismata") it implies those bestowments or enablements which have their origin in the grace of God, upon His church to equip His people for the conflict with the adversary, to extend the kingdom of God, and to edify the church as His body.

God has displayed His *grace* toward us in saving us when we were unworthy, lost, undone, through the marvelous atoning work of His Son. Eph. 2:8-13. He is manifesting His *grace* in sanctifying and transforming us, providing victory in our Christian lives by the power of the Holy Spirit. Rom. 8:2-4.

Spiritual "charisma" is grace in manifestation or display. He is revealing His grace through His church by the operation of that same Spirit, and has panoplied His people with all the necessary power and enablement to wage her warfare against the world, the flesh, and the devil—to speak inspirationally, to rule diligently, to render loving service of all kinds (*diakonia*), to perform miracles, to give liberally, and to show mercy.

This conception of the operations of the Spirit will preclude spiritual pride over possession of any "spiritual gift." The believer has been brought into the body of Christ and is now, by the baptism in the Holy Spirit, introduced into the realm of the Spirit's operations. With the recognition of the sovereignty of the Spirit (1 Cor. 12:4-6) in the midst of the assembly, the door is opened for every form of gracious manifestation (*charisma*) of the Spirit.

(In PART TWO of this series, Brother Boyd will deal with the "gifts" of revelation— the word of wisdom, the word of knowledge, and discerning of spirits.)

• YEARS AGO, in the home of my friend Canon Wilberforce, I met a number of earnest men, clergymen and others, and we spent a whole day of fellowship with God.

It was an autumn evening and lights were asked for, but it was urged by those present that they would like to converse in the gloaming. It is easier to talk about the deep things of God when the shadows of twilight are in the room. After one or two had given their experiences, a venerable clergyman from the south of London said: "You have been talking much about giving up for Christ, about surrender to Christ. But my life has been an intaking from Christ."

Canon Wilberforce asked him to explain what he meant. He said: "Some time ago on a summer afternoon I was dealing with a number of

Thus Jesus Christ becomes the Complement or Completement of a circle. Whatever has been my need, I have taken it as an opportunity of claiming the opposite from Jesus Christ. In a moment of irritation, "Thy sweetness, Lord." In moments of weakness, "Thy strength, Lord." Always considering that one's need is always God's opportunity of supply."

I remember very well going down to the breakfast room next morning. I was there first. Wilberforce came in and he said, "What did you make of that last night, Meyer?" I replied, "It is going to mean a revolution to me." "To me, too," he answered. I do not think we ever met after that without going back on that episode.

Thus, by faith we not only pray to our Lord. but we reckon upon Him. One of the deepest secrets in the Christian life is not to go through life praying for this and that and the other, but to offer a distinct prayer based upon a promise, and then to claim and reckon upon Him.—F. B. Meyer.

Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade Is Given Warm Reception

• THE BOYS AND GIRLS Missionary Crusade is meeting with hearty approval on every hand—from the children themselves, teachers, Sunday School officers, pastors, and missionaries. According to those in charge of the detailed operations of the new project everyone who has written in concerning BGMC has been loud in praise of the project. The following comments are typical:

"We received the barrel banks last week, and have distributed them. We believe that they will stimulate interest in missionary giving among the younger folk. May I say we are well pleased with the idea? It is going over here."—Sunday School Secretary

"I am much interested in the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade, as described in *The Missionary CHALLENGE*. For some time I have been in charge of the Children's Church in our assembly. Each Sunday some of the children have brought a few cents for the missionary offering. Since they often forget or for other reasons neglect their offerings, I would like to have the missionary barrels. I believe the children would save more of their spending money if the barrels were handy to remind them."—Children's Church Director

"Will you please send me ten more Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade barrels? My, how our boys and girls have fallen for them! They all want a barrel."—Pastor

"Our Sunday School wishes to have a part in the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade, and would like a poster and twelve missionary barrels. Thank you, and God bless this venture. We believe it will be a blessing to the children of our Sunday School."—Teacher

"We will need eighty BGMC barrels. I wish

to thank you for sponsoring what I believe will be a great help to us in our missionary effort." —Department Superintendent

"Have discussed the BGMC with the respective teachers and superintendents. They feel that it is a real crusade. I believe about eighty barrels would start us."—Sunday School Superintendent

"Our boys and girls would like to become members of the Crusade. I have been praying that you would have a part for the children in your missionary program. Please send all information. We have one hundred children enrolled."—Beginner-Primary Department Superintendent

"We have become a member of your BGMC and wish to report that it looks as though it will be a great success. The children are enthusiastic as well as their parents and the Sunday School teachers. We asked for one hundred barrels and you shipped them to us,but we do not have any left for the new boys and girls who will be coming into our Sunday school. We would like for you to send us fifty more. We are appointing a Crusade secretary."—Educational Director

"We are using the barrels for a new work. We feel that this is a wonderful plan to teach boys and girls to save for missions and we will be diligent in caring for the little barrels and sending in the money brought in each month. We want our church to be missionaryminded from the very beginning. We believe the Lord prospers a church like that."—Pastor

WHAT IS BGMC?

For those not acquainted with the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade, adopted just this year, this brief explanation:

The Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade is the assignment given to boys and girls under Christ's Ambassador age of reaching unevangelized people of the world for Christ with gospel literature. Adults of the fellowship have been supporting missionaries; and Christ's Ambassadors have been supporting a "Speed-the-Light" program, sending planes, cars, jeeps, trucks, bicycles, motorcycles, radio equipment, etc., where needed; but up until the time the BGMC was launched-during General Council at Seattle in September-children under C.A. age did not have a definite part in reaching needy people of the world for Christ. It was recognized that there is a great need for Christian literature in the foreign countries. The people eagerly accept any reading material offered them. It was felt that the failure of our fellowship to provide full gospel literature to foreign fields was a weak link in the fellowship's missionary program; therefore, the boys and girls, through the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade, were assigned the financing of a literature program.

Individual wooden barrels are provided for the boys and girls through the Sunday school, Once a month the pupils return their barrels to Sunday school where they are emptied. The total offering from the barrels is sent each month to the Foreign Missions Department, 434 West Pacific Street, Springfield 1, Missouri (with the regular church missionary offering), designated for the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade.

It is hoped that every Sunday school in the Assemblies of God fellowship will cooperate in the great literature program of the BGMC. In the two months since the program was launched 12,144 barrels have been supplied by the Sunday School Department.

Sunday schools wishing to become a part of this great program should write the Sunday School Department, 434 West Pacific Street, Springfield 1, Missouri, indicating the number of barrels needed. The barrels will be sent without charge; also, an attractive membership poster will be furnished the Sunday school.

Several have written requesting that the "big barrel" be sent, too. No big barrel is furnished—just the little individual barrels.

THE NEED FOR THE BGMC PROGRAM

Letters from missionaries substantiate the fact that there is a great need for gospel literature throughout the various mission fields. Gustave Kinderman, Field Secretary for Europe, reports concerning Europe:

"The war has depleted former stocks of religious literature in Europe through bombing and fires; then in most European countries the printing of religious publications was stopped when war began, and even today the output of such publications is restricted because foreign exchange regulations prohibit the importation of paper for religious purposes.

"Sunday school literature is greatly needed here. In some countries of Europe during the war young folk up to the age of eighteen were prohibited from attending any kind of religious services. In Germany and the German satellite countries the youth were drawn into national youth movements. They have never had access to gospel literature. Besides Sunday school literature, tracts and monthly periodicals are also desired for both young and old. Europeans, in general, are hungry for reading matter."

Merlin I. Lund, one of our missionaries to

the Union of South Africa, gives us a glimpse of the need for gospel literature on the African field, and also expresses his appreciation for the new BGMC:

"We were much impressed with the announcement in the current Missionary CHAL-LENGE of the new missionary literature campaign, known as the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade, sponsored by the Sunday School Department. Thank God for such a vision as this that undoubtedly will bring untold blessings everywhere!

"What a challenge there is before us with the people hungry to read, and also with the increasing numbers learning to read! Here on this continent alone several hundred languages and dialects are spoken. Literature should be furnished in each major language and dialect at least.

"We are trying here in South Africa not only to reach the Union of South Africa with the printed page, but also Mozambique and the Rhodesias. In the Rhodesias alone there are sixty languages. We are seeking for translations of tracts in order to reach as far as we can.

"We know that the Lord will prosper and bless every Sunday school that participates in the great missionary literature campaign to get the gospel to every creature."

Finally we want to quote from a folder put out by Andrew Hargrave, missionary-printer in the Assemblies of God Publishing House in Brazil: "As to our work in the shop, I can say it is advancing. We cannot keep up with it. Up to the first of September, which means the first eight months of this year, we had printed the following: tracts, 1,203,000; Sunday School Quarterlies, 134,090; books, 10,000; papers, 542,385. Our tracts are all used up. We will have to put the forms back on the press and reprint. I might say that our money for this work is also used up, but we feel we ought to continue in faith, believing that others will sense the need and help us in this work. Paper is so high here." (The Publishing House in Brazil is engaged in printing literature for the Portuguese-speaking people of Brazil and Portugal. Literature for Spanish-speaking countries is prepared and published in Springfield by the Spanish division of the Foreign Missions Department. The Spanish literature also has been well-received, and has been the means of attracting many to Christ; however, production has been hampered somewhat through lack of finances.)

What is true of the mission fields mentioned is true throughout all the fields-there is a growing and pressing demand and need for gospel literature throughout the world. A large percentage of the world's population has never heard the gospel message. Then there are those to whom the message should be driven home. These people should be reached immediately. Thousands are slipping into eternity each day without Christ. The gospe! by the printed page could turn some to Christ while missionaries and trained workers are trying to reach them, and could turn some to Christ the missionaries and trained workers would never reach.

Mr. Hargrave tells of a well-known soft drink bottling company's inauguration of a world-wide program for getting its beverage to the people of the world. The company has opened scores of units outside the United States and expects to increase the number within the next few years. In a convention one of the

executive vice-presidents of the bottling company is said to have expressed himself thus: 'May providence give us the faith to serve those two billion customers who are only waiting for us to bring our product to them." Mr. Hargrave adds: "May God give us the faith to serve the millions of people dying without Christ not just merely a drink, but living water.'

We do thank God for the Boys and Girls Missionary Crusade which will attempt to send the message of eternal life. We trust that pastors, superintendents, sponsors, teachers, and parents will stand behind the children, and encourage them in consistent giving each month. The success of the program will depend to a great extent upon the encouragement given the children.

THE PASSING THE PERMANENT

NON-JEWS IN ISRAEL

Israel's Ministry of Religion has announced that there are 62,000 Moslems in Israel, 14,000 Druzes and 31,000 Christians. The Christian population reportedly has doubled during the past few months.

JEWS TO HELP SAMARITANS

Once it was a Samaritan who helped a poor, wounded Jew. Luke 10:30-37. Now it is the Jews' turn to help the destitute Samaritans. There are only about 206 Samaritans left and these are faced with starvation and possible extinction as an aftermath of the recent Palestine conflict. These Samaritans, who live in Nablus, Palestine, will not be neglected by the Jews. They will receive emergency aid from the Joint Distribution Committee, reports Jewish Telegraph Agency.

THE NEGEV AUTHORITY

Although some nations are still contesting its right to certain parts of it, the Israeli Government is proceeding to develop that vast desert area in southern Palestine known as the Negev. The Prime Minister has appointed a Negev Authority to supervise the work of irrigating the Negev.

The same Commission will also submit plans for developing communications systems, agriculture, and fisheries on the Akaba coast in the southeast. This region was highly developed in the days of Solomon.

JERUSALEM ENLARGED

"Greater Jerusalem" came into existence a few weeks ago when the city administration formally increased its size, adding some 10 communities with a population of 4,800 to its jurisdiction. These communities will now be provided with municipal services such as new roads, bus lines and schools.

According to *Israel Speaks*, Jerusalem's budget for 1949-50 will be nearly five times the current budget of \$1,250,000. The city will spend \$2,160,000 for public works, \$730,000 for education and cultural activities, \$600,000 for social welfare, \$550,000 for public health, and two million dollars on other items.

JEWS BEHIND THE "IRON CURTAIN"

Soviet Russia does not favor Zionism. Soviet Jews find it exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to get permission to migrate to Israel.

Rumania and Hungary likewise refuse to let the Jews go. There are 380,000 Jews in Rumania and 150,000 in Hungary.

Poland has been restricting emigration to 200 Jews a month. However, a new program is scheduled to begin soon. For one year the Government is going to permit any Jew to leave for Israel without hindrance provided he will renounce his Polish citizenship.

By the end of the twelve months the Polish Government hopes its Jewish minority problem will be settled for all time. Doubtless every Government will find, in the end, that emigration to Israel is the only way its Jewish problem can be solved.

IN RED CHINA

Communist authorities have banned the teaching of the Bible in China's secondary schools. A civics course in the principles of the "New Democracy" is now a required subject.

D. P. CAMPS LIQUIDATED

Of the 170,000 Jews who immigrated to Israel in the first year of the new state, approximately one-half (83,000) were D. P.'s from Germany, Austria, and Italy. As a result of their migration some 20 D. P. camps in Europe have been liquidated.

NO DOUBLE STANDARD WITH GOD

According to Justice I. Montefiore Levy, of the Domestic Court of New York, a husband has the right to expect his wife to be pure when he marries her; but in regard to the man the Justice declared, "It is taken for granted that at marriage the major number of men are incontinent." The occasion was a suit instituted by a wife on the basis of the unchastity of the husband.

This edict recognized the so-called "double standard" in modern society. Let us remember, however, that the law of God never conforms to society. Instead, society must conform to the law of God or suffer the consequences. God demands the same standard of holy living of both men and women. "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." Hebrews 12:14.

TODAY'S "WORST WEAPON"

"There is something under the sun that may be more terrible than the atomic bomb," some scientists are saying. "It is germ warfare."

"And that," says one commentator, "is not just the old horror story pumped up by the yellow supplements, either. It's official from the War Department. In fact, the United States was all set to shoot with biological weapons if the enemy had started that terror in World War II. Now it can be told that the Allied High Command was even more worried about a germ attack than an atomic raid.

"Germ warfare is the worst conceivable for many reasons. It can spread death even more widely than the atom bomb. It is a more potent terror weapon because the raid is not sudden and soon over. It is an unseen, silent enemy that stalks every home and whose dread effects spread with time—disease and plague going on and on."

Whereas the manufacture of atomic bombs is at present very expensive, "the Merck War Department report points out that preparations for germ warfare can be carried out in small laboratories with relatively little expense and under the screen of legitimate medical research."

Shall it be given to men themselves to fill the vials of the wrath of God which shall be poured out upon the earth, as pictured in Revelation 16? Perhaps so. God often uses instruments of man's own making to punish him for his sins, and germ warfare may be one of these.

WORLDLY FAME SOON FADES

President Truman said, not long ago: "Most of us who are now responsible for the operation of our Government will be out of business and unheard of ten years from now." Worldly fame soon fades—why lust for it? Better to find God's will for your life and follow it. For "the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever." 1 John 2:17.

MARTYRS IN BOLIVIA

According to United Evangelical Action (Nov. 1, 1949) more lives have been thrown into the flames of religious intolerance recently. "Not content with stirring up hatred against Protestants (in Bolivia, South America) as 'messengers of the devil,' some of the priests worked out an audacious attack. They rounded up some 300 Indians, passed out liquor to them, and on Monday, August 8, directed the drunken mob to a home where Norman Dabbs, a worker for the Canadian Baptist Mission, was conducting a Bible class. As stones began to crash against the house, Dabbs and the converts attempted to escape in a truck. The Indians cut across a dry river bed, and upon intercepting the truck began to beat and stone the passengers. When the violence finally subsided, Norman Dabbs, a faithful evangelist, and nine Bolivian Christians lay dead."

Let us pray for the missionaries and believers in dangerous areas, that they may be preserved (except it please the Lord to make them more fruitful in death than in life). And let us pray for the evil-doers who despitefully use God's people and persecute them; pray that they may be delivered from Satan's snares and saved by the grace of God.

THE ANSWER TO COMMUNISM

Pastor Joseph Smith of Belfast, Ireland, recently wrote an excellent letter to the editor of one of the daily papers in the North of Ireland. It is on the subject, "Communism and the Vatican." Brother Smith (who recently was elected General Chairman of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance) wrote:

"Sir,—We have listened to, and read, during the past few days, the strong words of denunciation which have been issued from the Vatican against Communism, and especially against the members of the Roman Catholic Church who have anything to do with Communism.

"While I have no time for Communism, I do not believe this is the best way to deal with it. We cannot close our eyes to the fact that Communism arose in a country where the Greek Church predominated, and is now spreading fast in countries where the Roman Catholic Church predominates. Why is this?

"I believe that the best way to deal with Communism is not by negative means, but by positive means. Give the people the Bread of Life and they will not want to glean in the garbage bins of Communism. Jesus said, 'I am the Bread of Life: he that cometh to Me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on Me shall never thirst.' John 6:35. Christ, and Christ alone can and does satisfy the deepest needs of the human heart.

The Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, three times Prime Minister of Britain, declared: 'If I am asked what is the remedy for the deeper sorrows of the human heart, what a man should chiefly look to in progress through life as the

power that is to sustain him under trials and enable him manfully to confront his afflictions, I must point to something which in a wellknown hymn is called 'The Old, Old Story,' told in an old, old Book, and taught with an old, old teaching which is the greatest and best gift ever given to mankind. . . . Talk about questions of the day there is but one question, and that is the Gospel. It can and will correct everything that needs correction. My only hope for the world is in bringing the human mind into contact with divine revelation.'

"Paul said: 'For I am determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and Him crucified.' Peter said of Christ: 'Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.'

"Let the Church of Rome get back to the faith of the apostles, and preach Christ in all His fullness, and they will very soon find that when light comes in darkness goes out; when truth comes in error goes out; and when Christ comes in Satan goes out. When Christ comes in righteousness, peace, love, grace, goodness, truth, mercy, justice, and all the other virtues come in as well, for they are all found in Him, and he who enjoys such a life has no time for Communism.

"I would say in closing that Protestant leaders as well as Roman Catholic would do well to consider what kind of spiritual food they are giving to their people. Will it, does it meet their deepest need? There is much Gospel in that little verse of a hymn:

"Now none but Christ can satisfy, None other name for me. There's love and life and lasting joy, Lord Jesus, found in Thee."

First they built a garage which served temporarily as home for the pastors and their small son. A loan of \$1,000 was obtained from the General Council's Church Extension Fund, and one family mortgaged their own home to secure a loan for the new building.

Just eleven months from the time Brother and Sister Yaws arrived to go to work, the people gathered for the dedication of their fine little church building, which provides an auditor-

Satan Has Launched One Last Bold Offensive!

BEWARE OF THE TACTICS USED IN THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE

• THERE CAN BE NO question in the minds of God's people as to whether or not we are living in the closing days of this age. It is a fact. Our archenemy, Satan, knows that he has but a short time in which to work havoc, and do all the damage possible, before he is to be bound by our Lord Jesus and cast into the bottomless pit.

In the last war there was a period of several months before V-E Day during which everyone knew that victory was assured. Even the Nazi high command knew that they were fighting for a lost cause. Nevertheless, they made a last desperate effort which developed into a powerful attack known as the Battle of the Bulge which drove our forces *backwards* deep into Belgium. The tactics used by the enemy were the most cruel, diabolically cunning methods imaginable. It would seem that Satan today has launched a similar last desperate counter attack against the church in what may well be his final effort before our Lord returns.

Postwar investigation has revealed a great deal of how the enemy accomplished so much at such a late date. In the late summer of 1944 Hitler began to assemble more than 2000 English-speaking German soldiers under a certain S. S. Lieutenant-Colonel named Skorzeny. These men were given an intense traning course in special methods of sabotage. They were given special training in the use of modern American slang expressions. They were taught something about the fraternal customs that existed between American soldiers and their officers, as contrasted with their own "heel-clicking" discipline. They were supplied with American money and with letters and photographs from America taken from captured prisoners of war. They were given American identification cards. And finally, just before they were ready to strike, they were given American uniforms.

When the Battle of the Bulge began, these specially trained agents were sent ahead into American lines riding in captured American jeeps, trucks, and even tanks. Equipped with radio, they penetrated our lines and messaged back to the enemy the positions of our air strips and supply dumps.

Enemy soldiers actually stood at crossroads, wearing captured American MP uniforms, and directed American reinforcements into wrong positions! Warning signs at mine fields were removed by these fake "Americans" and our own tanks and trucks were destroyed by our mines intended for the enemy.

The battle raged from December 16, 1944, for three full days before our officers became fully aware of the presence of enemy troops among our ranks. Passwords became of no value because they were also used by the enemy.

Desperate and determined military police and counter intelligence officers arrested hundreds of "Americans" in jeeps and trucks, and asked them trick questions that no man could possibly answer without having lived in America, even though he spoke English fluently. Gradually the imposters were discovered, order was restored, confidence in each other was re-established, and the Battle of the Bulge was won, not by the enemy who began it but by the forces of right.

If the apostle Paul had to contend with false apostles and deceitful workers in his day, how much more in the closing days of this age do we need to be watchful. If Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light we may well expect that his messengers will also transform themselves into ministers of righteousness. Paul warned the Ephesian brethren (in Acts, chapter 20) that grievous wolves would come, not sparing the flock, and that men would arise speaking perverse (wilfully wrong) things to draw away disciples after themselves.

We need not be surprised if enemy agents speak our language, and even don our uniforms, and sometimes go about quite freely before being discovered. Their presence is liable to leave suspicion and mistrust in our own ranks if we are not watchful. Let us remember that we are NOT grieving the Spirit when we adopt an attitude of caution. We are to try the spirits. It is not wrong to exercise care, but rather the men of Berea were commended by the Holy Spirit because they searched the Scriptures daily to see if the new teaching they had heard was true.

Beloved, our "Battle of the Bulge" is on. Let us join hearts and hands in a new loyal cooperation against Satan's forces. Although he is a ruthless foe, and resorts to every foul trick, yet he is a defeated foe. The final outcome was settled on Calvary. If God be for us, who can be against us? Victory is niga! 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

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


