Israel's Future

The new nation of Israel is about to celebrate its Independence Day. From May 9 to May 13 the land of Israel will be filled with festivities as the people celebrate the third anniversary of the re-creation of their ancient Jewish State.

It is just three short years since the British gave up their Palestine mandate and the Jews seized the opportunity to set up their own government. But much has happened since that time. New industries have been introduced. New agricultural settlements have been established. Jews from many nations have been gathered back to their Promised Land, so that the population has doubled. Three years ago it was 650,-000; today it is 1,300,000 and over a million of these are Jews.

Visitors who expect to find the land of Israel literally blossoming as the rose are sure to be disillusioned. Frank W. Smith, an Assemblies of God army chaplain stationed in Europe, visited Israel last November and was greatly disappointed with what he saw. He states that Israel, for the most part, "is the most desolate, dry, sandy, and rocky country I have ever seen. With the exception of a few collective farms the country looks as I imagine it must have looked for centuries. The Jews are trying to plant trees among the rocks; if they grow, in ten or fifteen years the country will look better." But those who were in Palestine fifteen or twenty years ago and who now return for a visit are amazed at the modern cities and the great advances that have been made in reclaiming the desert.

The chaplain found that "the recent wars have done a lot to undo some of the work that the Jews have done. The orange groves are dying of neglect and the whole country is an armed camp. The country is teeming with refugees, many of them dissatisfied. All goods and food are rationed. The modern Jew does not like the Sabbath laws, but the Orthodox Jews are in control. . . . If America and England withdraw their support from Israel the country will go bankrupt. My conclusion is that unless the country industrializes as Switzerland has done, it will never succeed as a nation, unless of course God is instrumental in this gathering.'

Is God instrumental in this gathering? We believe He is. Just as He worked behind the political scenes in Zerubbabel's day to restore the Jews to their homeland, and just as He worked behind the scenes in Esther's day to preserve the Jews from their enemies, so He has been working in the earth in recent years to bring His ancient people back to their land as He promised to do. His purposes for the Jews have not yet been accomplished, and He is gathering them that He might again deal with them as a nation. The times of the Gentiles are drawing to an end.

Some are saying that the present restoration of Israel cannot be the final restoration of which the prophets wrote. They point out that the Jews are returning in unbelief; that the rehabilitation of the land is being financed and carried out by liberal Judaism; that the Jews seized the land by terrorism and are holding it by armed might; and that many Arabs have been wrongfully dispossessed of their property. Though these things may be true, yet there is one sin of which the Jews are guilty that is greater than any other sin they might commit, and that is the rejection of God's Son whom He sent to save them from their sins. And yet, in spite of this greatest of all sins. He still has a fixed purpose for Israel. Grace and blessing are still stored up for them. This is made very clear in Romans 11, where Paul declares that the nation of Israel shall yet turn to God and be saved from every sin.

Our concern, like that of the apostle, should be to preach Jesus to the Jews and pray that they will accept Him as their Saviour and Lord. That is the only way either Jews or Gentiles may be saved. Glorious things are reserved for the nation in the future, but nothing more glorious than being washed in the Blood and being born of the Spirit to become a member of the Church; and any Jew who dies without Christ goes out into an eternity as dark and as hopeless as that of any Gentile who dies without Christ. No wonder Paul had great heaviness of heart for his kinsmen and could wish himself accursed for their sake if only they might be saved.

The present restoration of Israel to their homeland may not be the final restoration, but we believe it is a necessary and preliminary stage for the fulfilment of the prophecies. The establishment of Israel as a free nation on May 14, 1948, was the most significant event in the century. With it the prophecy of Christ concerning this people began to take final shape. Likening Israel to a fig tree, He said:

"Learn a parable of the fig tree; when his branch is yet tender, and putteth forth leaves, ye know that summer is nigh: so likewise ye, when ye shall see all these things, know that it is near, even at the doors." Matthew 24:32, 33.

It is true that many dire prophecies concerning the Jews have yet to be fulfilled before they will see the Lord coming in the clouds of glory. But these prophecies cannot be fulfilled until after the Lord has caught away His Church. Not until the Church is gone can the Antichrist be revealed, according to 2 Thessalonians 2:7; and only then can begin the awful judgments of the Great Tribulation which shall be climaxed with the revelation of Jesus Christ in the clouds of glory and His acceptance as Redeemer and King by the Jews.

The developments which we are seeing today in the land of Israel are actually setting the stage for the events of the Great Tribulation, which is forecast to transpire in the seventieth week of Daniel's prophecy. See Dan. 9:27; 12:1. They are signs which shout to us that the coming of our Lord must be very near. Are you looking for Him? The Bible says, "When these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh." Luke 21:28.

There are no disappointments to those whose wills are buried in the will of God.—Faber.

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How Shall We Celebrate Pentecost?

THE ANNIVERSARY of the Day of Pentecost is at hand, and the Christian world is planning to give it proper recognition. Some will think to honor it in a cold, formal way. Others will seek to remind us of the importance of the Holy Spirit in active Christian life and service. A smaller number will seek by prayer that the Spirit might be poured out afresh. May we be numbered among this last group.

Pentecost, next to the atonement of the Cross, was the greatest event in history. It marked the beginning of the outpouring of the Spirit of God. One writer has said, "Pentecost came only once and will never be repeated." The same writer has said, "For one to claim to have received 'the Baptism with the Holy Ghost,' 'his Pentecost,' or 'the Latter Rain' outpouring of the Spirit, is entirely error. . . . The Baptism came at Pentecost and will never be repeated. The Latter Rain is reserved for the Jews in a time yet future." We would not contend for terms of expressing what one enjoys when filled with the Spirit, though we wish it were possible to use terms acceptable to all. But simple Christians are very likely to use such terms as are found in the Bible to express what they believe to be a Biblical experience. It is not therefore to be held against their credit if, after having a gracious infilling of the Spirit, they should call it by some such title as the Bible gives.

But whether or not the terms adopted express in the best possible way the experience which they enjoy (though we cannot see where they could adopt better terms than those employed in the Scriptures), the fact remains that there are those who are enjoying a gracious infilling of the Holy Ghost. They have felt the quickening. They have spoken in other tongues. They love Jesus and seek to walk unspotted from the world. To them it is "a personal Pentecost," because it bears certain characteristics that accompanied the outpouring of the Spirit in the beginning. They are "bap-tized with the Holy Ghost" because they have felt their entire being enveloped in the sacred presence of the

Next Sunday, May 13, will be celebrated throughout the Christian world as Pentecost Sunday. Will it be an empty celebration, or will it be a time when waiting disciples receive the "Promise of the Father" as at the beginning?

Spirit of God. They enjoy the "Latter Rain" which is described in James 5:7. Surely all of this is New Testament experience.

The outpouring of the Spirit at Pentecost was not a finished work; it did not begin and end in the baptism of only those who were gathered in the upper room. Pentecost was the beginning of a dispensation of grace which was to continue until the close of the age, and was to be marked by the supernatural power of the Holy Ghost. Mark 16:15-20. Pentecost was the releasing of the Holy Spirit to be poured out upon all flesh. It was not to be confined, as in Old Testament times, to Israel and to special occasions such as anointing prophets for utterance and deliverers for war. Pentecost was the beginning of an era which was to impart to repentant men the blessings which had been purchased by the Cross of Christ-hence the Cross and Pentecost go hand in hand. The deeper the sense and the fuller the grasp one has of Calvary, the fuller will be the effusion of the Holy Spirit.

May we look at a few of the promises of the Holy Spirit? "In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto Me, and drink. He that believeth on Me, as the scripture



and listening to the inspiring sermon of Peter on that occasion, we receive the age-abiding promise of the same Spirit as was poured out upon the waiting church in the beginning. "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." It this not the promise of the same Spirit that came at Pentecost? And if it is, ought one to be criticized who has sought and obtained its fulfillment in the same way? And is one far astray because, in trying to describe what God has done for his soul, he says, "I have received my Pentecost"?

The promise of the Holy Spirit to consecrated, yielded believers is for the entire age. What then should be expected when the Spirit does come? Should it just be taken for granted that one has the Spirit because he is living in this Holy Ghost dispensation? Or should some of the evidences promised and received with this blessing be encouraged and welcomed? Jesus promised "rivers of living water." If ever such rivers were needed, they are needed today by barren professors and by a stagnant church.

The disciples were promised "power from on high" when the Spirit came. How much Holy Ghost power do we find in most places of religious gathering these days? Reader, I leave this for you to answer. Is there not a marked contrast between the services of the saints today and that of the saints when the Spirit was poured out in the beginning, when "with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all"? When the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all filled with the Holy Ghost. Do we not see among the followers

of Christ at the present time a lack of such infilling?

As to the Latter Rain, it is true that a "latter rain" is promised to Israel. There is no doubt that a great effusion of the Spirit from on high will be visited upon them in the time of their restoration. But does not James also see such a restoration coming to the church shortly before Christ returns for His own? We think he does. In the fifth chapter of his Epistle he takes up latterday events. He first warns the opulent rich against the day of their destruction. He next exhorts the faithful to patience. encouraging them to look for the coming of the Lord. He then reminds them that God is long patient, and is waiting for the precious fruit of the earth, until He receives the early and the latter rain. God's fruit is His people, and the Latter Rain is an outpouring of the Holy Spirit to prepare them for harvest.

In closing we would remind those who feel the church has no claim to any of Israel's spiritual promises, that in this dispensation of grace "the Gentiles should be fellow-heirs, and of the same body, and partakers of His promise in Christ, by the gospel." Eph. 3:6. It seems therefore clear that those blessings promised to Israel were to overflow through Christ to the Gentiles also, "that the blessing of Abraham might come on the Gentiles through Jesus Christ; that we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith." Paul has said that "the Gentiles have been made partakers of their spiritual things." Romans 15:27.

We have no conscious desire to build up a doctrine around ourselves. searching the Scriptures to learn what was characteristic when the Holy Spirit came to believers in apostolic times, we find that in all cases on record the one outstanding manifestation of Pentecost was repeated. They all spoke with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance. Multitudes in all lands have come to enjoy a similar experience. But we are not seeking to influence your opinion as to this, further than to point out to you this outstanding fact. Your own soul must be satisfied with your experience. What we would urgently exhort is that each follower of Christ earnestly seek an outpouring of the Spirit which will satisfy his heart that his experience measures up to that which the Bible has promised in the Baptism with the Holy Ghost. You will make no mistake if you seek and obtain that which is clearly set forth in the Scriptures.

EVANGELISM IS OUR SUPREME TASK!

TO DEFINE the supreme task of the Church is admittedly difficult. Hundreds of activities, all claiming some remote relationship with the Christian Church, have honeycombed the world with their ramifications and offshoots.

Our purpose is to probe beneath this complex mass of strenuous activity, and without passing comment on either the legitimacy or expediency of its activities to discover the *supreme* task of the Church.

William Booth, lion-hearted preacher of Blood and Fire, likened the civilized world to the immense equatorial forest belt, through which Stanley the explorer had to hew his way for one hundred and sixty days. "And when night comes, with its thick palpable darkness, and we lie huddled in our little damp huts, and hear the tempest overhead, and the howling of the wild winds, the grinding and the groaning of the storm-tossed trees, and the dread sounds of the falling giants and the shock of the trembling earth, which sends our hearts into our throats, and the roaring and the rushing as of a mad overwhelming sea-oh, then is the horror intensified. Must we stagger in this cheerless gloom, until we fall and rot among the toads?" So wrote Stanley of the horrors of the tropical forest.

"The stony streets of our great cities, if they could but speak, would tell of tragedies as awful, of ruin as complete, of ravishment as horrible, as if we were in Central Africa. Often have I seen the young and the poor and the helpless, go down before my eyes into the morass, trampled underfoot by beasts of prey in human shape, that haunt these regions." In these words we have an insight into the heart of that tireless and passionate founder of the Salvation Army, General Booth.

It is very certain we shall do nothing to SAVE the people until we first see them Lost. We must see the human race oppressed with a relentless severity under the iron hand of Satan. We must see it scarred and hacked by the ceaseless sword-thrusts of sin: we must see it in the giant grasp of destitution, ignor-

ance, despair, prostitution, poverty, disease, hatred, greed and crime, but above all we must see that God has entrusted us with the only permanent panacea for its wounds, the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

What can human ingenuity devise to lift men and women from this morass in which flourish every sin in the De-What machinery will the philosopher or psychologist invent to expel the sins so deeply entrenched in the human race for six thousand years? What plan will men formulate to deliver from the iron grip of vice? What effective panacea can be prescribed for the suffering of those led captive of the devil at his will? In the face of discontent, lawbreaking, swindling and cheating, unaided man stands impotent and aghast. Not so the Church. With God all things are possible.

Here then is the task transcending all else to which every other activity must be subordinated, the rescue of the lost. Knowing the terror of the Lord we must persuade men to turn to God and flee from the wrath to come. In season and out of season, we must by all and every means drag them back from the brink of the chasm on which they stand; or, to employ the vivid metaphor of Jude 23, we must PULL THEM OUT OF THE FIRE.

Evangelism is a work of rescue. Jude's metaphor is powerful, energetic, stirring, and brilliant. The Church is to be neither static nor ornamental. No room can be found in Jude's pungent phrase for decorative, ecclesiastical effects in buildings of fabulous cost and for the gorgeous apparel of priests. No, these men tackle the job of "pulling them out of the fire." These men are smoke-begrimed and desperate; their movements are swift and decisive. Hatchets gleam in the firelight; work is hard and dangerous; perspiration courses freely down their faces. Here is grim resolution, fine courage and co-

operative endcavor for the purpose of saving lives. They are inflamed and invigorated by the deadly peril of their fellow men and the knowledge that to them is allotted the task of rescue. "Let him know that he who converteth a sinner from the error of his ways, shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins." Men die in the hot flames of sin. Forward to the rescue!

To change the metaphor, we are not only called to pull them out of the fire, but to PULL THEM OUT OF THE SEA. "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." "From henceforth thou shalt catch men." The thought used here by the Master is not intended to convey the idea of an elderly gentleman complete with rod and line, seated by a blue and placid lake indolently angling for the stubborn perch or pike. Jesus was speaking of deep-sea fishing. In this there are frightful hazards, and, we imagine, all the hurly-burly of the storm, the flying spray and tearing wind. Into the very teeth of this storm we must launch the gospel lifeboat, for those whom we seek are in the raging seas of this devilish power, buffeted and hurled by violent temptations and hurried hourly nearer to the whirlpool of death. Shall they be abandoned to their fate with no effort made to save them?

The task of rescue is exclusively ours. God has committed unto us the ministry of reconciliation (2 Cor. 5:18). The Scriptures record many duties performed by angels, but preaching the gospel is not one of them. Angels may warn Lot and then execute a terrible judgment on the cities of the

plains; they may hasten with food and drink to the despondent prophet Elijah; they may announce the coming birth of Christ to Mary His mother, and open the prison for Peter, and minister to us, the heirs of salvation; they may bear the spirits of the departed to paradise and perhaps bear the still slumbering infant souls from heaven to earth, both ascending and descending. In heaven they may behold His glory, blow the trumpets, pour out the seven vials and even chain the Devil; but—THEY NEVER PREACH THE GOSPEL.

An interesting case in point is in Acts 8. A devout Ethiopian is returning from Jerusalem. His long desert journey, however has brought but a meager reward. The gorgeous ceremonial worship of the temple had brought neither relief to his aching heart, nor enlightenment to his troubled mind. Here is an honest and sincere seeker after truth. An angel is immediately dispatched to deal with the matter, but he does not alight by the chariot of the eunuch, and proclaim the glad evangel. He goes instead to Philip the evangelist with the urgent command to hasten to the desert of Gaza, there to instruct the Treasurer of Queen Candace in the Scriptures that would make him wise unto salvation.


These glorious "sons of light" may bend with pitying eye over the groaning captives; they may peer within the sinner's gloomy dungeon and behold his fetters and misery; but to unlock the door, display the King's pardon and proclaim him free—that they cannot do. This glorious prerogative (and responsi-

bility) is exclusively ours. "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us." 2 Cor. 5:20.

OUR EVANGELISM MUST BE GOD-DIRECTED. We all accept the general principles of Divine guidance. There are many Scriptural promises concerning this, all full of consolation for the child of God. Israel's pillar of cloud by day and pillar of fire by night, directing their pathway through the trackless wilderness, becomes for us a symbolic lesson of inestimable importance. "And when the cloud was taken up from the Tabernacle, then after that the children of Israel journeyed; and in the place where the cloud abode there the children of Israel pitched their tents." Numbers 9:17.

Like David it is our privilege to enquire of the Lord whether we are to go up or not. David did not engage in a military engagement of vital importance without first enquiring of the Lord. When enquired of, God gave to His servant detailed instructions both as to place, time and manner of attack. "Come against them over by the mulberry trees!" David is wise enough to co-operate with the plan of divine strategy and goes to the appointed rendezvous. Crouching there with his army beneath the trees he awaits the signal which will indicate the appointed TIME. "When thou hearest a sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees bestir thyself." 1 Chron. 14:10. Place and time were opportune, and the enemy decisively defeated.

Without God's hands upon ours to



direct the flight of the arrow (2 Kings 13:15) we shall shoot wildly and ineffectively. How much of our failure in soul-winning may be directly attributable to this? The disciples once fished all night and caught nothing. This despite the fact that they were only a few yards away from a teeming shoal. They were fishing on the wrong side of the boat! From the same boat, the same men, with the same net, in almost the same place, fished on divine instructions and immediately enclosed an enormous catch of great fish. John 21.

How vividly does this set forth the paramount need of being God-directed

in our service.

The command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," must be considered in the light of subsequent events recorded in the Book of Acts, especially chapter 16. Here indeed is God-directed evangelism, the Holy Spirit choosing both the men and the sphere of their labor.

In this matter of establishing churches we cannot act like the shareholders of some multiple firm who plan a new chain of stores in a certain area. We must know the mind of the Spirit. How pregnant is the statement used in Acts 13:2 "And the Holy Ghost said..." or again in Acts 13:4—"Sent forth by the Holy Ghost"; and again in Acts 16:6—"Forbidden by the Holy Ghost"; and once more in Acts 16:7—"The Spirit suffered them not."

Had Barnabas, with his gift for teaching and prophecy, conferred with flesh and blood he might have stayed at Antioch: undoubtedly he was of great value to the church there. Some stay in Antioch when called and equipped for more noble ministry; and others leave Antioch without divine sanction and make shipwreck of a task to which they are not called. Any handyman can erect a shanty, but it takes a wise master-builder to lay the foundation of a great house. There is a solemn obligation upon us all to know our respective callings and to wait upon the Holy Spirit as to both the sphere and manner of our ministry.

Await God's time. How much may be lost by a premature action is shown in the case of Moses whose impulsive act cost him forty years in the desert solitudes awaiting the divinely appointed moment. Who would be foolish enough to pluck unripe fruit or garner in the corn when still green in the ear? How deplorable to waste valuable time, talent, and effort in impotent hammerings upon closed doors.

Many unnecessary heartaches and tears are occasioned by reason of our wilful ploughing and seed-sowing on the forbidden soil of barren Asia and Bithynia!

John Fletcher's Faith

ONE DAY a company of French people were asked why they went to hear Fletcher preach when they could not understand a word he spoke. They answered, "We go to look upon his face, for heaven seems to beam from his countenance." His words were living sparks rushing from the furnace of divine love that glowed in his heart.

"Fletcher was a saint, as unearthly a being as could tread the earth," said Isaac Taylor, one of his contemporaries. "I conceive Fletcher to be the most holy man who has been upon the earth since the apostolic age," declared one of the great Methodist preachers of Fletcher's day. John Wesley considered Fletcher the most unblamable man he had found in his lifetime.

Accounts of Fletcher's conversion to Christ are gleaned from his letters and diary. Through a vivid dream concerning the final judgment, Fletcher was first aroused to see the condition of his heart. For some days after having this dream he was so harassed in his mind he could not apply himself to the things of this life. About this time he was told about the "Methodists," a people who did "nothing but pray," and that they were "praying all day and all night."

Fletcher set out to find the Methodists. After hearing them he became convinced that some inward change was necessary to make him happy.

God opened his eyes to his sinfulness. Still he went on sinning and repenting, and sinning and repenting again.

"I began to write a confession of my sins, misery, helplessness, together with a resolution to seek Christ, even unto death." Thus he began to fast and pray, but as he sought the Lord he was sorely tempted and almost gave up in despair. However, he persevered and in a night of prayer opened his Bible to these words, "cast thy burden on the Lord, and He shall sustain thee. He will not suffer the righteous to be moved." Filled with joy, he fell on his knees and asked the Lord that he might always cast his burden on Him.

Taking his Bible again, Fletcher's eyes fell on these words, "I will be with thee: fear not, neither be dismayed." These promises greatly increased his hope. Before the morning dawned after that night of seeking God, his eyes were again drawn to still another promise in the Word, "Whatsoever ye shall ask in My name, I will do it." Thereupon he asked for perseverance and grace to serve God till death.

His widow after his death wrote: "I have heard him speak concerning this time. He still pleaded with the Lord to take fuller possession of his heart and to give a fuller manifestation of His love." Thus his soul was freed. He began to breathe the air of heaven. Sin was beneath his feet. From that time on he walked in the paths of God, making it a rule of his life to sit up two whole nights a week for reading the Bible, prayer and meditation.

Fletcher taught that the day of Pentecost was the opening of the dispensation of the Spirit, and he insisted that believers now are called upon to prove the

same baptismal fire.

It is recorded that at one time in the midst of singing a hymn he stopped and cried, "O to be filled with the Holy Ghost! I want to be filled! O, my friends, let us wrestle for a more abundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit! . . . Jesus is my Prophet, Priest and King -my indwelling holiness-my all in all. I wait for the fulfillment of our Lord's prayer, 'That they all may be one, as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in us.' O for that baptismal flame! O for the fullness of the dispensation of the Holy Ghost! Pray for this. Pray for the gift of utterance to confess your royal Master.

"Come! Jesus is offered to thee as a perfect Saviour. Take Him, and He will make thee a perfect saint. O ye half-believer, which of these will you hide in your bosom? Shall it be anger, pride, self-will, or accursed unbelief? O be no longer befooled! Bring these enemies to thy Lord, and let Him slay them."

Fletcher was famous for his gentleness. Yet he was so passionate by nature that he often pleaded and prayed the whole night to get victory over his temper, and sometimes lay prone upon the floor in an agony of grief as he pleaded with God for victory. Wesley writes of him, "For twenty years and upwards before his death, no one ever saw him out of temper, or heard him utter a rash expression on any provocation whatever."

Commenting on the Lord's promise in Joel to pour out His Spirit upon all flesh, John Fletcher said: "A blessed promise this, of which our Lord gave an earnest on the day of Pentecost, when He sent a glorious shower on His little vineyard, a pledge of the mighty rivers of righteousness which will bye and bye cover the earth as the waters cover the sea."

PASSING and PERMANENT

NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

Israel's New Capital

An area of almost 500 acres in western Jerusalem is being developed as Israel's permanent capital site. Known as Hakirya, it will contain the Knesset (Parliament) building, the President's home, offices of the Ministries of the Government, a convention center, and an amphitheater. It is designed to meet the needs of a population of 2,500,000 in Israel, but there is room for expansion if necessary.

Compulsory Service in Israel

The Compulsory Service Law in Israel provides that women, as well as men, shall be drafted for national service. However, it provides that women may be excused from military service if they swear that they are opposed on religious grounds. Thirty per cent of the eligible women (ages eighteen to twenty-five) have claimed this exemption. The Government now proposes to amend the law so that these conscientious objectors may be drafted for non-military service.

Atheist's Plea Rejected

The U. S. Government has rejected the plea of Frank C. Hughes, an atheist, that criminal action be started against the University of Minnesota. Hughes charged that the University is violating the separation of Church and State by permitting religious organizations to have meetings in University buildings.

It is "the view of the Department of Justice that action in the matter would not be desirable, and none is contemplated," said C. U. Landrum, U. S. District Attorney in St. Paul.

Bible Shut Out

The Gideons are doing a noble work in distributing New Testaments to school children. Recently, however, they were denied the privilege of handing out the Scriptures at the High School in Passaic, N. J.

Now pornographic literature is swamping the school, and the Board of Education is alarmed over the way the students are grasping after the obscene books which so thoroughly demoralize the lives of any young readers.

The Board of Education made a grave mistake when they shut out the Book that would have remedied this very situation. The Psalmist said, "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to Thy Word."

The Blind Shall See

Since the new State of Israel came into being, eye infections among the Arabs there have been reduced by seventy per cent. This is one of many benefits that have come to the Arabs since the Jews returned—but it is as nothing compared with the blessing that will come when the King of Israel returns and sets His hand to restore sight to the blind, as pictured in Isaiah 35:5.

Universal Military Training

Spokesmen for many religious bodies appeared at hearings conducted by the House Armed Services Committee at Washington, D. C., and urged that universal military training should not be established as a permanent institution. The Methodists particularly, by action of thirteen district superintendents, asked for a definite terminal date on the UMT bill now before Congress. They pointed out that "such a fundamental change in proven American policy should be reviewed by Congress periodically."

World Famine

Short of the second coming of Christ, famine awaits the world, points out *The Advent Witness*. Dr. Fairfield Osborn, President of the New York Zoological Society, recently declared that within the last 300 years the population of the world has increased from 400 millions to more than two billions; and that by the end of the present century it will have increased to three billions or more. In his view the world is in danger of being overcrowded, resulting in famine. This problem will be solved only by Him who fed 5,000 with five loaves and two fishes.

To Evangelize Formosa

It is to be hoped that the United Nations will not give serious consideration to the British demand that Formosa be given to the Chinese Communists. The tides of salvation which seem to be sweeping over Formosa would soon be stemmed if the Reds came into power.

Richard Hillis claims that ten thousand people on Formosa, including many Nationalist soldiers came to Christ in the last ninety days of 1950. Hillis returned to Formosa last month to direct Youth for Christ International's "Operation Unlimited" crusade.

"A revival already is on among the island's former head-hunters," he said

in leaving America. "We are asking God to evangelize Formosa completely in 1951."

Mme. Chiang Kai-shek and Formosa's Christian Governor K. C. Wu have given official endorsement to the crusade. Twelve evangelical groups from America, including Foursquare workers, will take part in the effort. You can imagine what would happen to the crusade if the Communists gained control of the island!

Diverted from Communism to Christ

When the gospel radio station, HCJB, in Quito, South America, decided to advance its power to 100,000 watts, it faced the problem of finding the necessary equipment. Its technical men found what they wanted in a warehouse in Kentucky. There were three modulation transformers and reactors, weighing over six tons, stored in huge boxes on which was stenciled the address of their original destination: "N.K.V.T. Order L-21, 8045231, U.S.S.R."

The radio station's magazine Call of the Andes says of the incident: "Originally constructed by a leading radio manufacturer in the United States for broadcasting communist propaganda, they have been reserved, in the goodness of God, for heralding Christ Jesus' blessings. Destined for Russia but captured for Christ! We join with David—'The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad.'"

Scriptures in 1125 Languages

The Scriptures have been published in 1125 languages, as of Jan. 1, 1951, according to the American Bible Society. The whole Bible is available in 191 languages; a complete New Testament in 246 additional languages; at least a Gospel or other whole Book has been published in 597 other tongues; and there are 91 more languages in which Scripture selections have been printed but not any one complete book of the Bible.

During the past year, translations have appeared for the first time in eight new languages for use in Turkestan, Congo, Sudan, French East Africa, Burma, Central India, Annam, and Borneo.

"Let's NOT Drink!"

"The Capital social slogan is, 'Let's have a drink,' said Senator Kerr (D., Okla.) in a news letter to the folks back home. "I just don't see why every kind of business (monkey or serious) has to be mixed with a drink," he said. "But that's about the case when two or more people get together at anything less formal than a session of Congress or a White House ceremony."

"YOU HAVE WHAT WE NEED"

I STOOD before the chief of police in the local precinct in Paris waiting for him to legalize some official papers. I was answering his routine questions.

"Why are you living in Paris, Mr. Metz?" he inquired.

"I am studying French in preparation for missionary work in French West Africa."

"But why would a young man like you, after learning to speak our language, leave us to work in Africa when we need young people like you. YOU HAVE WHAT WE NEED. Don't you know, Mr. Metz," he continued, "that we bring young people your age in here daily for minor offences just because they have nothing substantial to cling to?"

His plea gripped my heart. I looked about me each day as I met the French people on the streets—people revealing in their ex-



pressions the lack of hope in the future. Boys and girls by the scores have never seen a Bible, do not know of Jesus Christ nor of heaven. They have not learned the stories of the Bible in Sunday School, because there are no Sunday Schools in France as we know them.

France is not 99% Catholic as many think, but only one out of seven is Catholic. Of the rest only 2% are Protestant. Over 35,000,000 persons in France are untouched, neglected and forgotten, while we have what they need—salvation through the Lord Jesus Christ.

At the close of World War II, statistics revealed that France was less than 2% Communist, but today she is more than 30%. We have sent her food, clothing, military aid and American dollars. We have sent top military advisors to help her rearm for the future. Yet we have neglected to send that which will give her people a firm hope in the future—the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We have lifted our eyes to the whitened harvest fields and have sent many workers to far corners of the earth. We need to look also at our closer neighbors. We know what they need and are able to give it to them, but what are we going to do about it?

Chapel Opened at Homatin New Village

A NEW CHAPEL was opened on January 22 at Homatin New Village, a large refugee center, as a project of the Hong Kong Assemblies of God Gospel Tabernacle.

Upon investigation it was found that 20,000 persons were located in Homatin New Village without any gospel work of any kind. The church committee realizing the opportunity decided to rent a place there where gospel services could be held.

After searching for a location to rent, it seemed none was available, but as authorities were planning to erect a block of new

buildings we registered for one of them. This we did in faith.

When the people of the church heard about the new project they began to give toward the expenses. By the time the building had been erected the amount had neafly been raised. Before the chapel could be opened, furniture, benches, platform, etc., had to be bought. We estimated the building and fixtures cost about \$1,200. All this has been met except a small account for installing electricity which will be cared for soon.

A Pathan Gives His Testimony

WHILE I was at the Lucknow convention recently, three young men came up and told me this most remarkable story:

"We were active members of the R. S. S. (the militant, reactionary India for the Hindus organization which was accused of murdering Mahatma Ghandi because he was too friendly with the Mohammedans). During the post-partition riots, when the Hindus and Mohammedans were killing each other by the thousands, we were in the thick of the fray, and accounted for our share of Mohammedans.

"One day the tables turned; we were beaten up by a group of Mohammedans, and were thrown into an alley. It was while we were in this condition that a young man, evidently a Mohammedan by his appearance, came along. He carried us one by one to a house near by where he gave us first aid, fed us, and nursed us back to life.

"On the day of our departure our benefactor told us his story. He was a Pathan (one of the fierce, proud, war-like Mohammedans from the northwest frontier province) and naturally looked on every Hindu as a 'son of a pig.' But a couple of years before this he had become a Christian and now loved all men, even Hindus. So as he had opportunity, he had succored us, and had sent us away with clean clothing, his personal testimony, and a Bible. Such a message from such a man was compelling. We read the Bible, were saved, baptized and are now active Christians giving our testimony everywhere."

The ex-Mohammedan young man was none other than our own Bashir Anjam, who was saved and baptized at Purulia when Mrs. Ketcham and I were there during the first part of our present term. Occurrences like this more than compensate for all the heartaches and disappointments that accompany missionary work.

Back in Borneo

JUST YESTERDAY I started up the Sunday School which had been in recess for a while. The response was wonderful. The children were enthusiastic and the building was well filled—several hundred in all. It stirs us to see how hungry they are for the services.

Mrs. Carlblom and the family will be

coming this week on the missionary ship M. V. Evangel, which is now in Indonesia. I was anxious to get here so flew ahead to get things going again, as it had been three weeks since we arrived in Djakarta, and the journey to that point had taken two months. You can imagine my impatience to get back on the job.

One must first acquaint these people with what Christianity really is. Then almost always there are the hurdles of Mohammedanism, Chinese ancestry worship, or other ties that must be broken in becoming a Christian. We have seen what God has done, and are looking for better things than at the beginning.

Parts of our public address system as well as our Coleman pressure lamps have been stolen, since the house has been empty some time. The batteries brought on the boat were dead and will need to be replaced. There are many other details that need attention and we are trusting the Lord to help us. Pray much for the work here, that we may see a real moving of the Spirit of God and an ingathering of souls.

Progress in San Miguel

FAMINE AFFECTS ORPHANAGE


The Junnar Boys Orphanage in South India has been instrumental in caring for many boys and leading them into definite spiritual experiences with the Lord.

THE FIRST MISSIONARIES' WORK Lesson for May 13

Acts 13:1-13

Missionary work had begun before our lesson begins. Missionary work was to begin at Jerusalem, to extend to Samaria, then to the uttermost parts of the earth (Acts 1:8). This seems, by the providence of God, to have been the course followed by the church in the beginning. Who could call it less than missionary work that was carried on at Jerusalem after Pentecost, and then throughout the land of Palestine, to Samaria (Acts 8), and now to the "uttermost parts"? We may sometimes put a halo around one part of the work to the overlooking and neglect of other parts.

Was the whole church at Antioch present when Barnabas and Paul were called to the Gentiles? Evidently not. Our lesson indicates that it was a group of ministers who were engaged in prayer and fasting when "The Holy Ghost said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them" (v. 2.)

Neither does our lesson tell us the means by which the Holy Ghost said, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul; if it did, people would conclude that the method used then was the method which God would always use. God is not bound to any certain method. That which we need is sufficient nearness to God that His will may be made known to us.

1. "The Field Is the World"

God has given a general command, "Go ye into all the world." This is His commission to the Church. Since no one person can fulfill such a commission, individuals must choose the particular field of their calling. This may be decided by the inward drawing of their heart and by the opening of the way. If a person feels specially drawn to one people—if he finds in his heart a special love for them, and an opportunity to help them—he need not fear to consecrate his life to go to them. And since God's field is the world, he may be assured that his labor will not be in vain, wherever that field may be.

2. The Lord Will Be Our Guide

The call was made very clear to Barnabas and Saul themselves, and was confirmed to others who were present. Others may feel that God has laid His hand upon us for service, but we need to feel also that God has called us. Should we go at the advice of others, without clear assurance in our own hearts, we may find that we have missed the way. Human influence is very strong. Let anyone under strong human influence get alone with God and see how the Lord deals with him.

Once called, we may ever look to the Lord for guidance. This guidance will often be through the opening of doors. Barnabas and Saul knew by the Spirit that they were called to the Gentiles. They started forth, going from town to town, accepting open doors as guidance from God. They knew that the people everywhere needed the gospel. God's openings, once He has outlined our lives for us, are as much His will as is His voice. When we would decide a course not in keeping with His will, He will check us as He did Barnabas and Saul when they assayed to go into Bithynia: but the Spirit suffered them not." Acts 16:7.

3. To Hear God's Voice We Must Listen

We cannot ignore the human element in our work. We are human beings. We have intelligence. Work for God requires thought, convictions, and decision. We are to "look on the fields." Unless we keep our eyes open we will never see much, and unless we plan we will never go very far. But our planning must be in harmony with God. This harmony comes only through a careful walk, regular times of earnest devotion, feeding the soul on the Word, and meditation in which God is able to impress upon us His thoughts concerning the work He wants done. Our human danger is that we set up machinery which we think we are duty bound to make function whether it is directed by God or not.

It was as God's servants waited before Him that He said, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul." It was as Peter prayed that the sheet was let down before him. It was as Philip moved in the Spirit that he was sent to minister to the eunuch. May these facts call all of us to less reliance on self, more reliance on God, and more earnest seeking for His guidance in our labors for Him.

4. To Work for God We Must Be Separated

In the calling of Barnabas and Saul it was the Holy Ghost who said, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul." All God's children are called to separation. We are to be separated from the world and from worldly alliances. "Have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness." Eph. 5:11. "Come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing: and I will receive you." 2 Cor. 6:17. I saw a group of men who were in town to be initiated into one of America's strongest lodges. I saw them as they paraded the streets with their faces caricatured by markings. I beheld many of them so drunken that they reeled as they walked. Then I thought, "How could any who name the name of Christ swear secret brotherhood with such persons as that?" God help His children to be

Christian separation is two-sided; it is a separation from and a separation to. It begins with separation from that which is ungodly, a separation from the world and its ways. It then includes separation unto God. Self-interest is shown in far too many who name the name of Christ. God wants us separated from self-interest, from self-will, and from sin. Let us examine our hearts lest, having begun in the Spirit, we think to perfect ourselves in the flesh. The Galatians resorted to keeping the law, seeking to justify themselves by their own works. It is natural for man to depend on himself. When we neglect prayer and dependence on God, it is human to turn to "our own devices." May we remember, whatever our calling be, that "having begun in the Spirit" we cannot be perfected through the flesh (Gal. 3:3).

HOW TO PAY YOUR DEBT

An oculist who was expert in his profession, but with few patients as yet, one day saw a blind man on the street. He stopped him and asked if he might look at his eyes. A comparatively slight operation proved successful, and the man exclaimed: "How can I repay you? I am poor and have no money."

"Oh, yes," said the oculist, "you can search for others who cannot see, and tell them what I did for you, and bring them to me."

It is true that you and I can never repay Christ for what He has done for us, but we can show our gratitude by telling others about Him and bringing them to Him. The sense of gratitude for what Christ did for us on Calvary is the strongest motive for Christian service.—Frederick Wood.

NEW HUNGARIAN CHURCH

Our Hungarian Branch of the Assemblies of God started the new year right, and scored a victory, when they dedicated their fine new church at South Bend, Indiana, January 7, 1951.

Constructed of red brick, the church is 35 by 62 feet, and seats about 200. There are four Sunday School rooms on the main floor, and additional facilities in the complete basement. The entire cost of the new church was about \$30,000. On the dedication day the church was entirely free of debt. There was still a small mortgage on the parsonage.

Several years ago Brother and Sister Andrew Szuhan went to South Bend to pastor a few Hungarian believers who were worshipping in a small tabernacle. Some time later God laid on the pastor's heart a burden to build a larger church. "The people had a mind to work," Brother Szuhan writes, "and God worked with them. The blessing of the Lord has been upon the work from the beginning. We have also opened a Sunday School in the English language. We ask your prayers for this English work as well as for our Hungarian work."

FILIPINO FULL GOSPEL CHURCH

Pastor P. Mones sends in a good report of the Filipino church in Pasadena, California. He tells of his burden for his people when in 1941 he began personal evangelism among the Filipinos in Los Angeles and Pasadena. He found hundreds of these people working in that area, and hundreds of their children and young people in the schools, and yet there seemed to be no one concerned for their spiritual needs.

After a short time of personally winning them to the Lord, Brother and Sister Mones were granted the use of one of the churches for "Filipino Night" once a week. Those early days in the development of this work were often discouraging. The group was small, and many times it was difficult to raise funds to pay the rent; but together they sacrificed, worked and prayed. Brother Mones

now writes, "Praise God, I can report a great victory. God has given us a church called 'Filipino Full Gospel Church' with good attendance in Sunday School every Sunday, We have five active teachers for the Sunday School, and are still needing more. Souls are continually being saved, and believers are being filled with the precious Holy Spirit."

don't believe our churches which kitchen facilities (and there are many old ones which always have had such) make use of them for mere social times. To lose our spiritual appetite and to desire food for the body more than for the soul would indeed be tragic, but

having a kitchen where the food can be warmed up before it is served need not do that.

If we regard eating as "frills which attract the vain side of our nature," we must wonder why the Lord Himself multiplied the loaves and fishes. Was it to encourage vanity?

Some have spoken disparagingly about our camp meetings simply because there are a certain number who go there to idle the time or misbehave. While we deplore the fact that some do not enter into the meetings as they should, we would hardly suggest closing all our camps. No more should we condemn a church with a kitchen just because there are other churches which use their kitchens for unworthy pur-poses. Shall we do away with our altars because poses. Shall we do away with our altars because there are churches which use them only for decorative purposes? No, we shall keep our altars and use them for places of prayer. Let us keep our kitchens, too, and use them when necessity demands, leaving the social suppers which take the place of prayer meetings to the modernist churches.—Gordon Preiser, Dickeron City, Po son City, Pa.

Why not lay up treasures in heaven by investing our money in something more lasting than earthly buildings? Perhaps I sound like a joy-killer, but I'm not. 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with his wife, whom he met in college, in December 1948 and has been wonderfully used of the Lord in reaching the Japanese people, who have been thrilled to see this former prisoner of theirs returning to them with love in his heart, despite his cruel treatment.

Last April he was instrumental in leading to Christ Captain Mitsuo Fuchida, commander of the 360 planes which bombed Pearl Harbor. Fuchida's personal testimony appeared in the Evangel last Fall.-Frank M. Boyd.

A REVELATION OF END-TIME BABYLON

By MILDRED H. DUNCAN (published by the author, price \$2.50). Number 3-2384.

The Book of Revelation has much to unfold about end-time Babylon, and because it is end-time Babylon the interest of God's people in Revelation is all the more keen. This climactic Book makes it very clear that there will be a resurgence of the mysticism of ancient Babylon, which was transmitted by Chaldean priests, fleeing from the Medo-Persians, to Attalus III, king of Pergamos, 133 B. C. (Rev. 2:13); and by him to the Romans; and then to the popes of Rome.

Mildred H. Duncan, one of our Council ministers, has given us an excellent book on the Revelation, with special emphasis on the transmission of Babylonian mysticism of old to "Mystery Babylon" of the end time-the Roman Catholic hierarchy.

While there may be some difference of opinion on a few minor points of interpretation, this volume is most interesting and highly informative-Frank M. Boyd.

EVANGELICALS STIRRED BY RECALL OF MACARTHUR

Meeting in a week filled with repercussions President Truman's dismissal of General President Douglas MacArthur from his commands in Japan, the ninth annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals in Chicago interrupted its schedule of business to consider this dramatic event.

In an emergency session it voted unanimously to urge "complete Congressional investigation of all facts relating to MacArthur's dismissal. of all facts relating to MacArthur's dismissal."
Approximately 1.000 delegates and visitors gave close attention to the discussion. The convention praised the General's "Christian leadership" and contrasted MacArthur's "personal integrity" with "the lack of integrity and widespread corruption and graft in high places."

The convention's request for action is to be transmitted to Congress through Senator Charles
W. Tobey well-known member of the Kefauver

transmitted to Congress through Senator Charles W Tobey, well-known member of the Kefauver committee, who came to Chicago to address the N A E. Convention.

Senator Tobey was the principal speaker at the climactic meeting on Friday night. Other night speakers were Frederick C. Fowler, R. L. Decker. Clyde W. Taylor, and R. G. LeTourneau. The convention heard a recorded message from Billy Graham and a written message from from Billy Graham and a written message from Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Loren Doss. an Assemblies of God pastor in Chicago, welcomed the convention to the city

on Tuesday night.

Wesley R. Steelberg, our General Superintendent, delivered an inspirational address before the convention on Friday afternoon.

Charles W. Denton addressed the Com-mission on Church Schools on the subject, "What Sunday Schools Mean to the Assemblies of God."

Hart R. Armstrong, Editor of Church School Literature at the Gospel Publishing House, gave a report on the Uniform Bible Lesson Series at a meeting of the National Sunday School Asso-

siation.

The convention was held at the Congress Hotel and lasted four days, April 10—13. Much of the time was spent in group discussions in particular fields of interest, such as radio. Sunday school, youth, foreign missions. Bible day school, youth, foreign missions. Bible schools, etc. Of special interest was a forum for Christian Social Action.

A resolution was passed by the convention commending the Kefauver committee for its investigation of crime. Coupled with this was a strongly worded resolution opposing gambling in any form.

Another resolution protested against "frivolous or carnal" television programs and com-mercials which "promote the use of alcoholic beverages and encourage other habits injurious to youth." The convention demanded that laws be passed "requiring television to present be passed "requiring television to present programs of education, artistic culture, and constructive entertainment, and that the ap-parent monopoly of the liquor, beer and tobacco interests over this form of domestic entertain-ment be broken up."

A plea was made for the constituent churches of the N.A.E. "to enlarge their Sunday School activities" as an answer to the growing problem of juvenile delinquency, and to bring children and young people "to a saving knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Frederick C. Fowler, pastor of the Knoxville Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh. Pa., was re-elected President of the N A E for his second term. J. R. Flower, our General Secretary, was elected to the Executive Com-

mittee.

Brother Steelberg is our denominational representative on the N.A.E. Board of Administration. Other representatives of the Assemblies of God are R. M. Riggs and E. A. Balliet, Don Mallough. 

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
