

#### NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

#### A Spiritual Revival Needed

The Secretary of State, John Foster Dulles, has stated that the "need of the hour is for a spiritual revival, so that our people will demonstrate dramatically their rightcous purpose, a purpose which will be universal in its appeal, peaceful in its methods, and intense in its dedication."

#### Drink and Crime in Colorado

Governor Dan Thornton charged recently that a major portion of Colorado's 10,000 institution residents were there because of heavy drinking (*The California Liberator*, Feb. 1953). He said that apparently 75% to 80% of the convicts in the state penitentiary at Canon City are there because of drinking, and almost 90% of parolees returned to prison for violating parole attributed it to drinking.

#### Where the Money Goes

The U. S. Department of Commerce reports that the average American puts four times as much in his personal savings as he gives away. He saves about 8 per cent of his income, but he gives away less than 2 per cent to all tax-exempt philanthrophy, which includes educational and welfare causes as well as religious work.

The report states that during 1952 personal income amounted to 268<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> billion dollars. This was an increase of 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> per cent over 1951, but due to higher personal taxes the average American's disposable personal income was actually 4 per cent less than the previous year.

#### **President Eisenhower's Faith**

President Eisenhower told a Masonic group that he read the Bible through twice before he was 18. He still keeps a red leather Bible at his bedside, and, judging by the spiritual content of his speeches, he reads it.

Stanley High, writing in Reader's Digest, quotes Dwight Eisenhower as saying:

ing: "You can't explain free government in any other terms than religious. The Founding Fathers had to refer to the Creator in order to make their revolutionary experiment make sense; it was because 'all men are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights' that men could dare to be free. They wrote their religious faith into our founding documents, stamped their trust in God on the faces of their coins and currency, and put it boldly at the base of our institutions. . . .

"Our forefathers proved that only a people strong in godliness is a people strong enough to overcome tyranny.... Today, it is ours to prove that our own faith, perpetually renewed, is equal to the challenge of today's tyrants."

#### Learning Hebrew in Israel

Thousands of Jews in Israel are studying the Hebrew language in courses conducted by Government institutions and various public organizations, but about 250,000 citizens still lack an elementary knowledge of Hebrew.

#### Farmers Increasing in Israel

Israel now has 40,000 farming families and plans to increase this number to 200,000. In line with this program 46 new villages will be established this year, mainly in the south but some in Galilee and the Valley of Jezreel.

#### Israel Gets Trans-Atlantic Liner

The Zim-Israel shipping line announces that the newly acquired passenger liner "Jerusalem" will make her maiden trans-Atlantic voyage under the Israel flag from New York to Haifa on May 22. The 15,000-ton vessel, formerly called "The Argentine," is Israel's first trans-Atlantic liner.

#### Irrigation Doubled in Six Years

The area in Israel under irrigation has more than doubled since 1947, increasing from 52,500 acres to 125,000 acres. By 1960, it is expected there will be 375,000 acres irrigated which should make the country self-sufficient in farm produce. The Government has discovered sufficient, water sources to irrigate from 500,000 to 625,000 acres.

#### Jews From Yemen Happy

"Many immigrants have been disappointed," says Priority, referring to conditions in Isracl. "They expected better conditions, but not so with the Yemenite Jews. To them the land of Israel must be 'heaven.' Many of them had never seen a car, a clock, never worn shoes, nor slept in a bed. Israel, clean and healthy, must be just wonderful to them. Their poverty can be seen, but there is light and joy in their eyes. For them the long exile is over; they are home at last."

#### To Erect Memorial to Gandhi

A ten-million-dollar memorial to the late Mahatma Gandhi, Hindu nationalist leader of India, is to be erected in Washington. The Government has turned over six acres of land near Barnard Hills Park, one of the highest hills in the District of Columbia, as a site for the memorial. It will house the writings of Gandhi, a library, and an auditorium.

brary, and an auditorium. Is America's missionary program shifting into reverse gear? America has always been a missionary base from which gospel missionaries have been sent to the heathen. Now the heathen are coming over here, building temples and memorials in America and turning our land into a mission field for their false doctrincs!

#### "Voice" Quotes Isaiah on Stalin's Death

In a broadcast on the death of Premier Josef Stalin, the Voice of America quoted extensively from the 14th chapter of Isaiah. "Hell from beneath is moved for thee to meet thee at thy coming. . . . They that see thee shall narrowly look upon thee, and consider thee, saying, Is this the man that made the earth to tremble, that did shake kingdoms; that made the world as a wilderness, and destroyed the cities thereof; that opened not the house of his prisoners?"

It is in this chapter that Isaiah assured his people that the Lord would give them rest from sorrow, fear, and the cruel bondage of the King of Babylon. The Bible portion was broadcast first to Israel in the original Hebrew.

#### A Good Motto for the Mail

A bill to authorize use of the motto "In God We Trust" on postal cancellations has been introduced in Congress by Rep. Louis C. Rabaut (D.-Mich.). The motto has appeared on practically all U. S. coins since 1862, but never on postage. In appealing to the House for approval

In appealing to the House for approval of his bill, Rep. Rabaut quoted the words of Sceretary of the Treasury Salmon P. Chase when the motto was first authorized for coins: "No nation can be strong except in the strength of God or safe except in His defense." "I feel," he said, "that this is an especi-

"I feel," he said, "that this is an especially appropriate time to re-proclaim our adherence to this reverent, historic motto. It strikes at the philosophical roots of Communism, atheism, and materialism." He pointed out that American mail

He pointed out that American mail bearing the motto would go all over the world and would bring "new hope to the oppressed people behind the Iron Curtain."

#### Four Millions for Missions

During 1952 the amount of all Assemblies of God offerings for World Missions was \$4,070,082.51.

William Sakwitz of the Statistical Division of the Foreign Missions Department says:

says: "With all the figures in from the six departments now included in our World Missions program, we find that annual missionary giving, for the first time in the history of our movement, has exceeded the four-million-dollar mark.

"The latest estimated number of members in the Assemblies of God in the United States is 330,000. Dividing this figure into the total offerings gives a national average of \$12.33 per member for 1952. This means that each member gave an average of \$1.03 to Missions each month during last year.

# The IMMUTABILITY of Jesus Christ

WHEN WE MENTION the word "immutability," instantly there comes to our minds the thought of something unchangeable, something that is known for its steadfast continuance, such as a huge rock.

A great cliff rises up; a river glides at its base. This river is a symbol of mutability, changeableness, fickleness. An old man stands at the base of this huge rock, and looks up. He sees the same dents and streaks in it that were there when he was a child. The river rises and falls. In the course of years it may cut itself an entirely new bed. But the cliff stands immutable, unchanged and unchanging, in the face of passing time.

The trees root themselves in the clefts of the rock, bear their foliage, and drop their leaves in the fall. This reminds us of the rise and fall of human generations. But the rock is the same through the centuries. Is it not a type of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is "the same yesterday, and today, and for ever" (Hebrews 13:8)? Yes, Jesus rises like a majestic cliff, at the foot of which the stream of time rolls ever onward to its tryst with eternity. The old man looks up to Jesus



and knows Him to be the same lovely, faithful, dependable Saviour that he knew when he was a youth. The generations of men come and go; kingdoms rise and fall; but concerning Jesus the Scriptures say, "Thou, Lord, in the be-

ginning hast laid the foundation of the earth; the heavens are the work of Thy hands; they shall perish, but Thou remainest; and they shall all wax old as doth a garment; and as a vesture shalt Thou fold them up, and they shall be changed: but Thou art the same, Thy years shall not fail" (Heb. 1:10-12).

Many a boy has been called to cross the seven seas to fight for liberty. Ask any of them how they felt, after being tossed about for long months or years in the turmoil of war, when at last they put their feet again on solid American soil. That is just the satisfaction a Christian feels when, amidst all the changes of this turbulent life, he lifts his eyes to heaven and recalls the immutability of his Lord and Saviour.

#### 1. HIS DISPOSITION IS THE SAME.

It is refreshing to know people whose disposition is always the same. Success never exalts them in pride, and adversity never defeats them. Most of us are subject to perpetual change. The bloom of manhood fades away into the frailties of old age. One day we are strong, the next day weak. One day resolved, the next day wavering. One hour constant, the next hour unstable as water. Our emotions rise and fall like the tide. Our disposition is as changeable as the weather. But with Christ there is no variableness, neither shadow of turning.

Promises made by men may prove unreliable. One day, on the impulse of the moment, a man may make you a glowing promise that will brighten your entire life. The next day, in a different mood, he may break his promise and cause you bitter disappointment. But Jesus never changes. He never disappoints those who put their trust in Him. In all ages and to all people He has ever been the same.

Solomon spoke of Him as being "altogether lovely, the fairest among ten thousand." Isaiah called Him "Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of peace." To the sweet psalmist of Israel He was "fairer than the children of men." Centuries later the apostle Peter called Him the Son of the living God. Paul on the road to Damascus testified that His appearance outshone the noonday sun. John saw Him

on Patmos in His glory and said, "His countenance was as the sun shining in its strength."

#### 2. HIS NATURE IS THE SAME.

All who have known Him in ages past have found Him to be the same tender, loving, merciful Christ. He has never changed. And in the age to come, when He returns to earth and His feet stand again on Mount Olivet, He will be the same. For the angels said, "This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ve have seen Him go into heaven." He who was the Man of Sorrows will be just as loving, as approachable, as gracious when He becomes King over all the earth. He will be the same Jesus, unspoiled by His glorics and triumphs, unchanged by the years of time.

Jeremiah testified: "The Lord hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with loving-kindness have I drawn thee" (Jcr. 31:3). Men of old experienced the love of God. Hezekiah who lived 710 years before the birth of Christ left this testimony--"Behold, for peace I have great bitterness: but Thou hast in love to my soul delivered it from the pit of corruption: for Thou hast cast all my sins behind Thy back" (Isa. 38:17).

The apostle experienced this same divine love and said, "Herein is love,

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not that we loved God, but that He loved us." And another was moved to say: "He loved me and gave Himself for me." And He loves us just as much today. John's tribute of praise, "Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood" (Rev. 1:5), will be ours as well. The Revised Version reads, "Unto Him that loveth us," not "loved." His love is always in the present tense. It never wanes. Did you ever contemplate the love which Christ will manifest to you when He shall present you, without spot or blemish, before His Father's throne? Well, pause and remember that He loves you as much at this very hour as He will love you then; for He cannot change. His love is constant. May we reciprocate by giving our love to Him.

3. HIS POWER IS THE SAME.

There are those who would relegate His power to some past age. To them all miracles that He will ever do have already been done. But the needs of the human family have not diminished, and why should we expect God to diminish His working?

"Earth has no sorrow that heaven cannot heal." As long as Satan walks about the earth as a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour, so long will the Lord Jesus continue to go about doing good, and healing all that are oppressed of the devil. He is our eternal Contemporary. The Christ that walked the Emmaus road still walks the American road. Do, you have some great need that has brought you almost to the point of despair? Let me remind you that Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday and today and forever. His power is limitless. He stands ready to solve your problem.

4. HIS WORD IS THE SAME.

He said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but My words shall not pass away." The promises contained in His Word are just as valid today as ever. Therefore let us read them, believe them, and appropriate them for ourselves. They were written for all who will believe.

The warnings of the Scriptures are as applicable to us as the promises. It is still true today that the soul that sins must dic; and God still demands that men must repent or perish.

The old gospel is the same. Paul wrote, "Hold fast the form of sound words, which thou hast heard of me." Theology has nothing new in it except that which is false. The preaching of Paul must be the preaching of today, for Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever.

Martha said, "If Thou hadst been here, my brother had not died" (John 11:21). This put Christ's power in the past. Jesus tried to bring her faith into focus by saving, "Thy brother shall rise again." But Martha answered, "I know he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day." This put Christ's power in the future. There are many who do as Martha did. They believe that God did things in the past, and that He will do things in the future, but they refuse to believe that He will perform the miracle now. Jesus said to Martha, "I am the resurrection, and the life." He brought His power into the present circumstances. He is the Christ of the eternal now. He, the unchanging Christ, is with us today-a very present help in trouble, a Friend that will never leave us nor forsake us.

O Lord, move us by Thy example to show kindness and do good. Grant us such patience and forbearance with all sufferers gracious or ungracious, grateful or ungrateful, that in our stumbling walk and scant measure they may yet discern a vestige of Thee, and give Thee the glory. Amen.—Christina Rossetti.

The Spiritual Gift of Faith

"To another faith by the same Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:9).

IN SPITE of all our interest concerning spiritual gifts we seem to have devoted considerably less attention to the gift of Faith than the subject deserves. Its high place in the list as given by Paul, and the fundamental importance of faith as a principle, ought to move us to give the matter close attention. Surely this is a rich portion of our Pentecostal heritage.

#### NOT "SAVING" FAITH

But first we must understand what the spiritual gift of Faith is NOT. It is not the saving faith referred to in Eph. 2:8. That truly is a gift from God, but it is not a special gift of the Spirit. Saving faith is the grace that comes to all who believe in Christ for their personal salvation, and it enables the Christian to have that knowledge of God that is the very spring of his life eternal.

#### NOR EVEN PERSONAL FAITH

There is a principle of faith by which all must live if they wish to please God (Heb. 11:6). This can exist in a weak degree, and fluctuates even in truly spiritual people. For instance, the praying disciples in Acts 12:15 plainly had very little faith that Peter would be delivered, for they called Rhoda "mad" when she told them that the answer to their prayers was knocking at the door! Paul felt the need of his personal faith being strengthened "by the mutual faith both of you and me" (Rom. 1:12). Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" is read all too little these days, but in it he has for one of his characters a genuine pilgrim called "Little Faith," born in the town of Sincerity, who suffered grievous robbery on his journey, and had to struggle along with all his spending-money gone.

The eleventh chapter of Hebrews describes the shining company of great heroes of faith, but the thing to remember is that they are quoted as EX-AMPLES for us all to follow. The inference, and indeed the emphatic exhortation is that we can, if we will, lay aside every weight and run equally victoriously the same race. There was nothing unique in their faith except its degree. It was not different in character from the faith we all are called upon to exercise continually if we aspire to please God.

#### BUT-A SPECIAL FAITH

But when we turn to the spiritual gift

of Faith (1 Cor. 12:9) we are immediately confronted with the statement that it is NOT given to all. "To one" this, to one that, to "another" faith. The clause means, "To a man of another kind" (see the same use of the word in 1 Cor. 15:40). One very comforting and enlightening revelation that emerges here is that our spiritual gifts fit the "kind" of personality we possess. The Master bestows various talents among His servants in accordance with their varying ability (Matt. 25:15). The fact that our spiritual gifts for service tend to run along the line of our own personality often makes their supernatural quality more difficult to detect, but actually this intertwining of God and man in the operations of the Spirit is one of the most lovely aspects of inspiration. The Holy Spirit does no violence to my true self when He deigns to use me; but rather He takes me as I am, sanctified in Christ Jesus, and floods me with His power. Men and women of strong faith, such as those mentioned in Hebrews 11, are the type most likely to have the gift of Faith as a supernatural operation of the Holy Ghost.

a. A "Manifestation" of the Spirit (1 Cor. 12:7)

All the "gifts" are also "manifestations" of the Spirit. They are the shining forth of the indwelling Spirit of God by His sovereign energy. They do not, therefore, involve or imply great effort on the part of the particular member of the body of Christ thus used. It would be distinctly helpful to some zealous people if they understood that true Pentecostal power requires no nervous strain as its natural accompaniment. Manifestations of the Spirit require a personal fulness of the Holy Ghost and a ready obedience of His leading. They reveal a Power beyond the natural. They show forth the glory of God, not the glory of man. They are most humbling when they are most mighty. The spiritual gift of Faith manifests great power, not great effort. Stephen was a man "full of faith and of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 6;5, 8) and "full of faith and power," but the whole story breathes a calm and confidence noticeable in every line.

### b. The "Faith of God" (Mark 11:22, margin)

Because we are contemplating a manifestation of the Spirit of God it follows that this excellency of power is Divine. That is to say, the spiritual gift of Faith is really the faith of God Himself operating through a God-filled and God-dominated man.

It is helpful to notice the marginal rendering of Mark 11:22—not "have faith in God," but "have the faith or God." In Young's Literal it is simply, "Have faith of God." It is a speck of Divine faith, perhaps like the proverbial mustard seed, that operates in the spiritual gift of Faith. It is the Faith or Gon. It is that one of His attributes whereby God Himself believes that it shall be done. God's faith is necessarily in Himself and in the power of His Own creative word. He speaks—it is.

If the spiritual gifts of the word of wisdom and the word of knowledge manifest, as we believe they do, the wisdom

"INTRODUCTION TO LIFE" is a thirty-minute broadcast sponsored by the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God. It was first begun in December 1951 by Derrick Hillary (now on furlough) and is produced by the Radio Staff of the Colombo Gospel Tabernacle.

NUMEROUS OPPORTUNITIES to sow the precious seed of the Word have been ours. Hearts have been touched and many have responded to the gospel message. We regularly visit three jails, a hospital, a hotel and a leper settlement. It is impossible to contact all the villages.

On Thaba Chitja, a mountain about four miles from us, lives a blind woman. Her children are regular attendants at our Sunday School and one day they asked us to come to their village. On our very first visit the mother, Evalina, accepted the Lord. Later her husband also accepted Him and now every time we go to this place a good crowd comes to hear the gospel. They would like to have an evangelist in their midst so they could have services more frequently.

Just a couple of weeks ago we had our second anniversary here. Ever since our arrival we have been carting water in kerosene tins. We had tried over and over again to locate a boring machine to drill for water but were disappointed every time.

Imagine our excitement one day when the District Commissioners came to tell us a boring machine was available. There was a lot of speculating on the part of the government people as to whether we would find water on our site or not. They had just recently sunk five holes elsewhere without success! But we had prayed a great deal and were not at all surprised when a good supply was was found in the first hole drilled. That was our special anniversary gift! We are now waiting for the windmill and should soon have all the water we need. What a difference it will make to the mission station!

The Basutos too are very happy about the water, because there will be a large dam for their own use. May the "rivers of living water" also flow abundantly from our station to thirsty souls throughout needy Basutoland!

#### FIRST CHURCH OFFICERS

#### Lesson for May 10

#### Acts 6:1-8

When we speak of "first church officers" we mean the first ones to be humanly selected. Before this time Jesus had many disciples, which means followers or learners. From among them He chose twelve whom He named apostles (Luke 6:13). Later He chose seventy others also and sent them forth (Luke 10:1). These had been chosen directly by Christ. At Pentecost the offices which Jesus had ordained and the persons chosen to fill these offices were recognized by the church (Acts 1:26 and 2:14). After the Holy Spirit was given, the disciples "continued in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship" (Acts 2:42). Some have said that the Church at Pentecost was entirely under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. True, it was infilled and inspired by the Spirit; but at the same time it was under the guidance of men whom Jesus had chosen to be overseers.

#### 1. NEGLECT AND DISCONTENT

a. Carnality in the Early Church. To be carnal is to please the flesh, to follow our self-life. It is the plane of the natural. The Church began at Pentecost with great glory, and for a short time it continued in perfect unity of the Spirit. Under the thrilling blessing of the outpoured Spirit, such love was manifest among the disciples that they gladly disposed of what they had, laying down the sums at the apostles' feet so that equal distribution might be made to all on a basis of need (Acts 4:34, 35). But it was not long until favoritism was shown in the distribution. The Jews of Palestine were preferred above the Grecian Jews (Acts 6:1). Thus the human element became manifest in the early Church.

manifest in the early Church. When God instituted in type what Pentecost was to mean—the establishing of the Church—He ordained that the two loaves, representing Jew and Gentile (Lev. 23:17). should be baked with leaven (yeast). This showed that, although the Church was to be divinely endowed and graciously blessed, it was not to be without elements that might lead to corruption. Let all believers realize that, although spiritual, we are all as yet human. May we have patience and love one for another.

b. Unity Endangered. When those believers who came from outside Palestine saw that their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution, they began to murmur. How soon this trouble arose after the day of Pentecost we are not told, but it appears to have begun almost immediately. Those who were being neglected evidently had come to Jerusalem to keep the Jewish feast; but upon hearing of Jesus they had embraced the gospel and they had not yet returned to their homes. Perhaps they were tarrying in Jerusalem longer than they had planned, in order to learn as much as possible about this new doctrine, and they were taking advantage of the provision that had been made to feed and keep the new converts.

There was a murmuring of the Grecians (Grecian Jews) against the Hebrews (those living in the land). Murmuring is defined as "low, muttered complaint; grumbling." Perhaps it was not expressed publicly but there were private expressions of discontent from those who saw the widows neglected, and that was enough to mar the unity of the Spirit. Many murmur in order to obtain sympathy, who would never rise up in open rebellion. But let no one think that such grumbling is harmless. It can be ruinous. Where there is discontent, believers ought to do all in their power to get it out of the way.

#### 2. NEEDED ORGANIZATION CREATED

a. Putting First Things First. The people recognized the official position of the apostles. Leadership was the apostles' responsibility; therefore the complaint came to them, and they accepted the responsibility. At the same time they saw that their apostolic calling must have priority over business matters. "It is not reason that we should leave the Word of God, and serve tables," they said. Satan would have delighted to see

have delighted to see the apostles encumbered with care for the material welfare of the church, with the possibility of becoming embroiled in the trouble which was brewing. May each church learn to keep its minister as free as possible from the burden of the material prosperity of the church. Let him give himself to prayer and to the ministry of the Word.

b. Choosing Seven Deacons. The apostles were not so spiritual as to ignore material need. They said to the believers, "Look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and of wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business." They were to look after material matters, but this was to be a service for God, and so they must be spiritually qualified. It is generally believed that these seven were the first deacons. Organization in the Christian Church grew gradually, as needs arose, and not arbitrarily.

#### 3. BLESSING AND INCREASE

Had some people been in the apostles' place they would have said, "We have no time to consider material matters; we must live only for the spiritual." By such a course the divine purpose of the church might have been thwarted. The murmur of discontent would have developed into open hostility. True spirituality may lift a person's heart into the clouds, but it never takes his feet off the earth. As long as we live on earth we must face material realities as well as enjoy spiritual blessings.

The seven deacons assumed responsibility for the daily ministration while the apostles continued in prayer and the ministry of the Word (v. 4). The favor of God was upon the arrangement, for "the Word of God increased: and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem greatly" (v. 7). The deacons did not become unspiritual because of their business. One of them was Stephen and we read that "Stephen, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people" (v. 8).

Lest we forget

This is the first in a series of four articles, written by or about some of our elderly Assemblies of God ministers who are now receiving Old Age Assistance. Only twice each year does the Department of Benevolences ask for an offering from our churches for the support of our elderly ministers. The spring date for this offering to be received is Sunday, May 31.

"I began my full-time ministry as a young Methodist circuit rider on the Western plains fifty-three years ago. My first circuit consisted of five preaching places—most of them in log cabins owned by the ranchers, for church buildings were scarce, and even school buildings were few and far between in that country in those days.

"My salary the first year was 108 dollars. On my second circuit I received a little more; a little over 300 dollars, I believe. You see, I did not enter the ministry for what I thought I could get out of it, but rather for what I hoped I could put into it. All down through the years it has brought us endless joy to freely give our time and strength and money for the work of the Lord, and to help win souls for Jesus.

"Forty-six years ago I learned that God was baptizing people with the Holy Spirit as on the day of Pentecost. For more than a year previous to this I had been praying over and over again, 'Lord, make me as holy as a pardoned sinner can be made, and fill me as full of Thyself as Thou art willing to fill me.' My heart was now open for the outpouring of the Holy Ghost.

Chost. "The first night I really tarried, I received the Comforter in Pentecostal power, but soon I discovered that this was just the beginning of a long series of infillings which have continued to this day. Oh, the marvel of it all! How I wish I could tell what walking with the Comforter for well-nigh half a century has meant to me.

"The way has not always been easy. During the first years I ministered to small groups of Pentecostal believers who gathered in homes, mission halls, or on street corners. Later our camp-meeting ministry began, and then for thirty-five years it was my privilege to preach and teach at many of our great camps extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coast, from the sunny south into the far north, and also in conventions and conferences.

"In one of these first conventions I preached several times. The people said they enjoyed my preaching and expressed the hope that I might return some day, but they neglected to give me anything for my services.

"That left my wife and our new son at home, with only fifty cents to carry on with until I could send them something. I did so wish the saints had remembered to give me even a small offering, but the Lord assured me He would care for my little family and so my heart was comforted.

"Often we received very little above our traveling expenses; still we were so happy to be preaching the full gospel and helping to establish what has since become our great Pentecostal movement.


"The first Assembly we pastored, our salary (we received only what was handed to us) amounted to seven dollars some months, and we got as high as nine dollars occasionally. One month it dropped to nothing. However, the Lord never failed us; in ways that were sometimes miraculous He provided for us.

"I think our greatest joy down through the years has been that of helping many young people to reach the mission field. Some forty or more have gone from the various Assemblies we have pastored, or have gone out because we raised the funds for their transportation and support. Sometimes it mean that my good wife and I gave most of what we had to assist in this great undertaking. "Helping to pioneer our movement has

"Helping to pioneer our movement has made heavy demands, not only upon the physical life, but also upon all funds which have passed through our hands, so it has not been easy to provide for the days which are now upon us. However, both my dear wife and I feel that we would do it all over again if we could.

"I think if our younger brethren in the ministry only knew what a comfort and help it is to us older men to receive some support each month from our head office, they would receive great joy out of urging upon their people the need of supporting the Old Age Assistance fund which makes such help possible.

"We older ministers can no longer lead God's warrior souls to battle but we can still pray and so we may still be of some



value to our movement. Don't let the old soldiers fade away entirely. God bless our great fellowship the world around." REMEMBER—MAY 31.

and the knowledge of God, then equally the gift of Faith manifests the faith of God. It is the realm of the miraculous, though not necessarily the spectacular. It is a pity that so many people confuse the two, and seem blind to the supernatural in any gift of the Spirit unless it is openly unusual and remarkable or showy. The childishness of the Corinthians was seen in these precise matters. The spiritual gift of Faith is often hidden, but not the less mighty and miraculous.

c. For the Will of God (Romans 8:26)

A truth we need constantly to relearn is that we cannot "use" God, or the gifts of the Spirit, for our own purposes. "Once I tried to use Him, now He uses me," as A. B. Simpson put it.

How many times have we plunged ourselves into perplexity because we have struggled with our own faith, even our united faith, to bring to pass that which all the time was our own will? We have failed, and wondered why. We sincerely felt that we were believing the promises of God. Of one thing we can be sure the spiritual gift of Faith will not work in us to fulfil our own purposes. It operates only to accomplish the purpose of God.

When we send one of our own children on some errand to make a purchase for us we give them the money they will need. In like manner our heavenly Father stands ready, by His Spirit to give us whatever faith we need for His business. "Who goeth a warfare at his own charges?"

Rightly to know the will of God almost invariably demands time spent waiting before Him. So true it is that "we know not what we should pray for as we ought." Only as the heat of our own desires, even some of our religious desires. is calmed by waiting upon God do we come into that place of quiet rest of spirit where intercession, inspired by the Holy Spirit, is made according to the will of God. When that happens we may find ourselves moved to ask for things that look positively absurd to the natural mind, and even to natural faith. It is just there that the spiritual gift of Faith most gloriously comes into action. A Divine calm floods the soul with quiet certainty. We even may begin to laugh with a holy laughter at the apparent impossibility of the thing we find ourselves asking for, but it is a laughter of assurance and not of unbelief. We know it shall




### The Little Jetts YOUTH TALKS


be done. Something of this Faith must have filled the soul of Elijah when he soaked the sacrifice with water on Carmel but KNEW the Fire would fall. Too often our screaming prayers are reminiscent of Baal rather than the servant of Jehovah.

The Gift is in the "Body"

No gifts of the Spirit operate alone; they are likened to various members of a physical body (1 Cor. 12:11-12). There is a high and holy fellowship one with another in an operation of the gifts of the Spirit that keeps us mutually dependent, and necessitates love for them to work according to the will of God. Thus the word of wisdom or the word of knowledge may be used by the Spirit to reveal some hitherto undreamed-of possibility (1 Cor. 2:9); or a revelation by the gift of prophecy may show an urgent need; or discerning of spirits may uncover a grave danger. In a fully functioning Pentecostally gifted church the gift of Faith will then set in motion those mighty spiritual forces and processes that "move mountains" and give a creative word.

It is not without significance that in the list in 1 Cor. 12:8-10 the gift of Faith comes between the words of wisdom and knowledge on the one hand, and the gifts of healing and working of miracles on the other. Its position can correct some of our faulty ideas. There is a tremendous desire for a manifestation of the "sign-gifts" in Pentecostal evangelism, but how much is it understood that they do not stand alone? They need liberating by other Spirit-filled believers exercising the gift of Faith. There seems a clear indication of this principle of interaction between the gifts in Acts 3:16, where Peter performed the "notable miracle" of healing the lame man. It was "the faith which is by Him" that gave the man the perfect soundness before them all. On that occasion Peter apparently possessed first of all a God-given faith that opened the way for an act of power. But the whole Church with "one accord" (Acts 4:24) was behind Peter and John, and the signs and wonders wrought by the apostles were not independent of the Church as a whole.

The spiritual gift of Faith opens up rich possibilities for a hidden ministry that actually is at the source of those public ministries that catch the imagination of the crowds. A day is coming when each man shall receive his own reward, and what surprises there will be! "The first shall be last, and the last first," as far as popular estimation is concerned. But no servant can do more than wholly yield himself to the Lord as a living sacrifice. After that the gifts are according to the grace that is given to us. Our part is to be diligent and faithful. High on the list of manifestations of Pentecostal power stands the gift of Faith. Let us covet it earnestly, along with the love by which alone it can achieve its fullest purpose to the glory of God.

## **Convention** Series Accelerates W.M.C. Work

A great national WMC convention in six parts is being realized this spring through special meet-ings being held in connection with the Regional Sunday School Conventions. Four such WMC conventions have already added their impetus to WMC work, and the fifth (at Mobile) will have been added by the time this issue of the EVANGEL reaches you, with the North Central Regional yet to come.

Crowds of 500 to 800 have come together in each convention for conference regarding bet-ter ways to help the missionaries and to assist in carrying forward the great missionary pro-gram of the Assemblies of God. Outstanding in each convention was the presence of the Lord and the spirit of worship and consecration which and the spirit of worship and consecration which settled down over the congregation. At each down ideas as various lines of WMC work were spotlighted. Numbers of missionaries and pastors were present to add their testimonies to the good work of WMC groups, and to take back with them new missionary zeal.

#### SOUTHWEST REGIONAL-FRESNO

The convention of the Women's Missionary Council groups of the southwest section was held in California at the Fresno Gospel Taber-nacle March 3. A "How-to-do-it" feature was presented by Mrs. R. J. Thurmond, showing in detail how certain necessary supplies for the missionaries can be made by the women of our churches. Missionaries need visual aid materials for teaching, flannelgraph background scenery, Sunday School awards, greeting cards, Christmas gifts for orphanage children, and the sundry furnishings for their mission stations. Her demonstration was most helpful. Mrs. R. P. Murray spoke on organizing missionary clubs among teen-age girls.

Our Wisconsin District WMC President, Mrs. E. A. Beck, visited the Fresno convention, and

told how to make beautiful and useful articles for the missionaries from old materials no longer usable in their worn-out condition. The work of the national WMC office at Springfield was presented by Martha McLean, Assistant National WMC Secretary.

The next day about eighty-five attended a noon luncheon meeting, when an impressive mis-sionary skit, prepared and presented by women of the San Diego Section, again brought out the opportunties for the women of our churches to that their class in misionary work find their place in missionary work.

#### NORTHWEST REGIONAL-PORTLAND

Two weeks later the WMC's of the Northwest section of the country met in the beautiful new auditorium of the First Assembly of God in Portland, Oregon. Under the direction of Mrs. F. J. Walton, Oregon District WMC President, and through the use of impressive visual aid, leaders of the Oregon WMC's presented a most comprehensive six-point program: (1) Practical work (sewing, canning of food, etc.); (2) mission work (sewing, canning of rood, etc.), (2) inston study; (3) literature for missionary use; (4) visita-tion and personal soul winning; (5) financing WMC projects; and (6) intercessory prayer. The national scope of WMC work was presented by the National WMC Secretary.

Theme for the afternoon service, "The Word of God Multiplied," was presented by the women of the Northwest District, under the leadership of Mrs. Vernon Skaggs, District President, bringing out that as the efforts of the missionaries are reinforced by the work of the Women's Mis-sionary Councils, sending forth of the Word of God is multiplied. The David Pecks were present to relate the incident of their homecoming from Africa, when they found that Calvary Temple in Seattle had prepared a lovely home for their use while on furlough, and had also anticipated other needs such as furnishings, food and clothing.

At a round table three WMC leaders and three missionaries discussed the importance of: (1) Intercessory prayer; (2) saving a missionary's time by sewing and making necessary supplies; and (3) putting certain necessary materials into the hands of the missionaries, such as visual-aid mate-rials, record players with recordings in the lan-ruage of the land rowthm band instruments for guage of the land, rhythm band instruments for new villages, first aid kits, bandages, etc. The National Secretary spoke on the seven-point goal of the Women's Missionary Council.

The following day two hundred WMC mem-bers, missionaries and interested pastors gathered for a luncheon meeting, with Mrs. Leonard Lanphear as the main speaker. Theme of her message was the Women's Missionary Council as seen through the eyes of an "adopted" missionary family. Other missionaries testified briefly to benefits they had received from the women's groups. The thirteen children in our new As-semblies of God Children's Home at Valdez, Alaska, were adopted by various groups, and several items were pledged for the furnishing of Childers Lodge at Landour, North India.

#### TEN DISTRICTS MEET AT CLEVELAND

On March 31 WMC's from the ten districts of the northeast area met in Cleveland, Ohio. The morning devotional service was led by Mrs. Roy Wead, Indiana WMC President. The Na-tional Secretary spoke on the National WMC Department as a co-ordinator for the needs of the missionaries and the work the women can do. Much of the furnishings needed at this time for Childers Lodge was pledged. Mrs. E. A. #### CATHOLIC MISSION BECOMES A PENTECOSTAL MISSION

YBOR CITY, FLORIDA—Yes, the former Catholics are coming to Christ. Hallelujah! I am now preaching in a Catholic church, but not for the Catholics. It is in Ybor City, a suburb of Tampa. The great Miracle Worker threw this opportunity into my. lap, though I was all un-worthy, and I am thrilled. Last year the Foreign Missions Committee asked

us if we would go to Honduras. We prayed, and the still small Voice said, "Wait, your work in Tampa is not finished yet." It was hard to tell the Committee our decision. It was hard on our pride. It was also hard on our faith, for in refusing to go to Honduras we were automatically taking ourselves off the Foreign Missions list and we knew the little church in Tampa could not support us.

At the same time invitations came to us to pastor well established churches. These tempted us but each time the still small Voice said, "Wait patiently and you will have a new ministry which will be greater than you have ever had." Already that has begun.

When my cousin was elected to the Presidency of the United States I decided I would attend the Inauguration. I obtained reservations and was planning to leave for Washington the morning of January 14, but on Sunday, January 11, a member of our church asked me if I would go with her to pray for a Catholic priest, Péter Boto, the following Wednesday—the very day I was to leave for the Inauguration! I felt a constraining Hand so I canceled the trip. Though I did not know it, I was to witness a greater event than the Inauguration in the scale of eternal values.

That night of January 14 became a memorable date. "Father Boto," as he is known in Tampa, lost his title that night. He became "Brother Boto" as he prayed through and received the Bap-tiem in the Hely Solitie

Boto" as he prayed through and received the Bap-tism in the Holy Spirit. The following Sunday I brought the first evangelical message in that Catholic church with all the images still standing. But the images did not hinder me any. I preached on the text, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free," and, "He whom the Son sets free is free indeed."

Even though we had witnessed a wonderful work of grace in our brother, we knew it would take a still greater work of grace to enable him to clean out all the idols. We did not urge him. We let the Holy Spirit speak, which He did. Just eight days later Brother Boto said, "Brother Epler, we must take out the idols, candlesticks, everything today." So I phoned a number of ministers, asking them to help, and together we carried these things out, shouting the praises of the Lord.

On Sunday afternoon, January 25, our Dis-trict Superintendent Howard S. Bush dedicated the church for the preaching of the full gospel. Oh, what a great time it was as people wept, laughed, and marvelled at the great miracle God had done.

Brother Boto is a happy man and is growing daily in the Lord. But he is in the fires of perse-cution and desperately needs your prayers. A few days after his conversion there came a long-dis-tance call from the Archbishop in New York warning him to give up this fanaticism and re-turn to the Old Catholic Church, threatening him if he failed to do so The "Mother" of his local the failed to do so. 


