

#### **DELIVERANCE**

"Thou art my king, O God: command deliverances for Jacob" (Psalm 44:4).

Well might the Psalmist pray to God for deliverances. God has always been a miracle-working God. He delights to deliver His people out of their bondage, as demonstrated in the history of Jacob and his descendants.

God came to their rescue when they were slaves in Egypt. He began His deliverance work by the miracle of the burning bush. There followed the miracle of the rod turned to a serpent, and back to a rod again. The hand turned to leprosy, and back to health again. Then, in rapid succession, there was the water turned to blood, the plague of frogs that covered the land, lice on man and beast, swarms of flies, murrain that killed the Egyptians' cattle, boils breaking out on man and beast, a very grievous hail, locusts in all the land, the darkness so thick it might be felt. Finally there was the slaughter of the firstborn of men and beasts among the Egyptians. God sent all these judgments on the wicked in order to deliver His people.

The march of miracles continued. The Israelites stood at the Red Sea. Behind them were the armies of Pharaoh, and before them was an impassable sea. Then God appeared. God was in a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. By His mighty outstretched arm He rolled the sea aside and led His people across on dry land. "Then sang Moses and the children of Israel,... Who is like unto thee, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like thee, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders?" This was divine deliverance as manifested to the children of Israel.

When Jesus stood up to read and preach in Nazareth at the beginning of His public ministry, He said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; He hath sent me to heal the

year of the Lord." The God of Israel was still bringing deliverance. When the Lord called Paul to preach, He said, "Rise, and stand upon thy feet: for I have appeared unto thee for this purpose . . . delivering thee from the people and from the Gentiles unto whom I now send thee, to open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God." God was still delivering-both Paul and those to whom Paul preached. Miracles of deliverance attended the Lord and His servant Paul. Jesus healed the sick, cast out devils, fed the multitudes and raised the dead. Paul smote the sorcerer with blindness, raised the lame man at Lystra, and performed "special miracles" in Asia.

Deliverance is an inherent part of the gospel. It was so in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be. All truly Pentecostal preachers proclaim supernatural deliverance from sin and sickness and the power of the devil; and the Lord works with them, confirming the Word with signs and wonders following.

When the Lord delivered the Israelites from Egypt they did not enter Canaan immediately. Really the greater, longer part of their deliverance experience still lay ahead. But they had the miracleworking God with them. He sweetened the bitter waters of Marah. He sent them bread from heaven. He brought them water out of the smitten rock. He gave them victory over Amalek. He enveloped Sinai with thunders, and lightning, smoke and fire, and gave Moses the Commandments by supernatural revelation. On through the wilderness He went with them, dwelling in a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night.

At last, repeating the miracle of the Red Sea, He held back the waters of the Jordan River and delivered them safely on Canaan's shore. And He did not leave them then. It is the town crier announcing to everyone the glorious gospel of salvation from sin, the gift of eternal life, a Christ who satisfies and sanctifies, the mighty baptism in the Holy Ghost, divine healing and divine health, the solution to life's problems, and the blessed prospect of the glorious return of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. All of these matters constitute the gospel. All of them are divine and supernatural. Miracles to get them out of Egypt. Miracles to see them through the wilderness. Miracles to bring them into Canaan. Our God is still a miracle-working God.

The whole gospel is Pentecostal and powerful. Pentecostal preachers have experienced deliverance in their own lives and they proclaim deliverance for all who are bound. They preach a life of power and blessing, death to self, resurrection life in Christ, brotherly love, humility and grace, the fruit of the Spirit and the gifts of the Spirit. They are zealous for evangelism, concerned with a glorious missionary enterprise both in the homeland and to the ends of the earth. What a tremendous scope! How profound and far-reaching! ## The Great Physician and His Medicines

PEOPLE SAY: "IT IS FOOLISH FOR US not to exercise our common sense and make use of the remedies God has provided for mankind." I quite agree with them. We ought to use every remedy God has provided for the healing of our sickness. But the point is, what are these remedies?

Some will tell us that God intends us to go to doctors whenever we are sick. To this I would reply that if such had been His will, would He not have told us so in His Holy Word, which contains "all things that pertain unto life," as well as godliness (2 Peter 1:3)? Under the Mosaic Law God gave the Israelite the most minute instructions as to their daily life, their ablutions, encamping, cooking, eating, births, marriages, deaths, etc.; but not one word as to doctors or drugs. On the contrary, He set forth in the Brazen Serpent the most clear type of the Atonement of Christ on the Cross as the remedy for sickness; and in every mention of healing during the wilderness journeys we find that the remedies were spiritual and not natural; in all things fulfilling His covenant of healing, and the promise: "I am the Lord that healeth thee" (Ex. 15:26).

Nor can any command to go to doctors or use drugs be found in the New Testament. The treatment of sickness in the apostolic church is very clearly pointed out in James 5:14-16. "Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him. Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed."

Some will tell us that God provided the various medicinal herbs, and meant us to use them to prepare drugs for the treatment of sickness. This is a question which merits careful study; because, if it be true, then we certainly ought not to neglect to use the remedies provided by God. I was meditating upon the matter and praying over it one day, when Genesis 1:29 was brought forcibly to my mind: "And God said, Behold, I have given you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of all the earth, [and this

does not leave one single herb excepted] to you it shall be for meat" (that is, food). Here God distinctly states that without one exception all the green herbs are for use as food, and does not specify any of them for medicine. (I suppose that the poisonous properties now in some plants were the result of the entrance of sin into the world, and came in with the curse, as spoken of in Gen. 3:17-18; Rom. 8:19-22).

The fact that man has made drugs from herbs does not prove that God ever intended them to be put to such use. Man has succeeded in combining various chemicals in such a way as to make poison gases that are capable of destroying all human life on this globe; but is that any proof that God ever intended those gases to be made or used for such a purpose?

Does not common sense itself tell us that it is better to take the iron needed by our bodies in the form of spinach, lettuce, or other foods made by God Himself, rather than in drugs which are made by man? Who else understands the composition of the human body or

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its needs so well as He who made it? The Bible gives us illustrations of the futility of using human remedies, one illustration being in the Old Testament and one in the New, both of which are full of instruction. In the case of Asa (2 Chron. 16:12, 13) we see how the sacred historian records with apparent surprise that "in his disease he sought not to the Lord, but to the physicians,' and how this resulted in his death. In the case of the woman who touched the garment of Jesus, we read (Mark 5:26) that she "had suffered many things of many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was nothing bettered. but rather grew worse."

But there are remedies prescribed for us by the Great Physician, and these are efficacious for all sicknesses alike. We find three definite remedies mentioned. and three symbolic actions referred to as efficacious for the healing of disease. The three remedies are as follows:

1. The Word of God Psa. 107:20, "He sent His Word and healed them." Try this remedy, dear suffering one, and see how it will allay your pains. Look out in the Scriptures the promises of God for bodily healing (for example, Ex. 15:26; 23:25; Deut. 7:15; Psa. 6:2, 9; 42:11; 43:5; 103:3; 105:37; 107:20; Isa. 35:5, 6; 38:5; 53:4, 6; Jer. 33:6). Lay each promise by faith upon your suffering member, whatever it may be, and you will prove its healing virtue.

2. THE NAME OF JESUS

Song of Solomon 1:3, "Thy name is as ointment poured forth." His name means His character, or Himself, with all that He stands for, all His divine power and efficacy. Ointment is often needed in sickness, and its very name suggests healing. Jesus is the Tree of Life, and the leaves of that Tree are efficacious for the healing of bruises and sores, as we see in Ezekiel 47:12 (margin) and Revelation 22:2. Lay the sweet name of Jesus by faith upon every bruise or sore you may have, as well as upon every

## Revival in Jerusalem Assembly

## Miracle of Healing Stirs Interest

WE PRAISE GOD FOR ANSWERING prayer. Revival has begun in Israel.

We have just completed a three-week meeting with E. P. Kopp, evangelist. The revival had been announced as a union meeting and we were happy to have several visiting ministers attending from time to time. From the very first night there was a definite manifestation of God's power in saving and healing

people. This brought a great spiritual refreshing to the Jerusalem church.

On the opening night God did a notable miracle which was later published in the Jerusalem Post. Miss G. M. Webber, a school mistress of Kingston, England, had been injured in a road accident some three years ago. As a result of the accident her left side was afflicted and her hip was out of place so that she suffered continual pain. When prayer was offered, Miss Webber was instantly healed.

To quote her own words from the Jerusalem Post: "I was in great pain, and when asked to come up to the altar I limped up, although I was very doubtful about the whole thing." Prayer was offered for her healing, and she said, "I felt no particular sensation except a tenseness, and when I returned to my seat my hip was back in place and I walked like a normal person."

Before Miss Webber sailed for England she astounded the shipping staff by walking into the office and "practically dancing" around their desks. The effect of this healing is still being felt here in Jerusalem both by the local residents and by visitors to the country. Through this miracle many contacts have been made.

The percentage of healings among those who came for prayer was very high. Souls came to the altar every night, about fifty in all. To the missionaries who live in Jerusalem this was a real miracle, and the fact that the numbers attending the services nightly doubled and tripled the regular attendance was a miracle also. There are signs of spiritual awakening in Israel, for which we praise God.

Many people sought the evangelist's help privately, some even coming from Tel Aviv and other cities. Almost every time we have met it is to rejoice over new souls seeking and finding the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. The evangelist has given himself tirelessly both in and out of the services. His life and ministry have been a great inspiration to all of us.

The results of the campaign show that people have been healed of many diseases: asthma, headaches, stomach disorders, gland trouble, nervous breakdowns, deafness, neuritis, heart trouble.

A few of the outstanding cases might be mentioned:

A Jewish woman from Jaffa was healed after twenty-four years of total deafness. This dear woman had a very severe heart ailment for which she had been receiving daily injections of morphine for fifteen years.

An elderly man who had suffered all his life with rheumatic pains was completely delivered.

Several missionaries were healed; one had a severe sinus condition of twenty years standing; another had a nose stoppage and slight deafness; and another visiting missionary had severe backache. We have since heard that these wonderful healings have created quite a stir in the villages of those who were healed.

The sale of Bibles, and the free distribution of New Testaments, has increased amazingly.

We are very grateful to God for sending the evangelist our way. Our hearts have been encouraged; and many Christians have been drawn into a closer fellowship by this wonderful visitation from the Lord. The effects of the healings are still being felt here in Jerusalem. Some of the people are being persecuted for their stand. Although the government allows religious freedom, many of those who confessed Christ openly are severely persecuted. One dear woman who was saved and healed in the meeting has been tormented daily by her accusers. They threatened her life; openly boycotted her business; spit upon her shop windows; and on several occasions she has been slapped in the face. She is still calm and believing-and full of praise to her Lord.

We are trusting that this is only the beginning of a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit here in Israel. Rejoice with us for what God has done, and pray that the revival shall continue to spread throughout the land.

## English Tourist Claims Cure by Prayer

HAIFA, Sunday-An invalid Christian tourist from London, who had to be carried off the S. S. Geffen when she arrived on February 17, is returning home on Tuesday, cured of her "incurable injuries" after a visit to Jerusalem.

Miss G. M. Webber, a schoolmistress of Kingston, England, came here on a round trip on the orders of her doctors who advised her to escape the harsh British winter weather. She chose Israel only by chance, "because the trip on the Geffen best fitted my limited purse."

Ever since a road accident in Melbourne, Australia, in November 1951, she had been disabled on her left side, with her hip out of place, and she suffered continuous pain. Until March 1954 she was in hospitals and under medical treatment in Britain. Then specialists told her that she was suffering from "a spinal disease which would continue all my life and no more can be done."

The Geffen arrived in Haifa after passing through a very bad storm in the Bay of Biscay which "made my back worse through the terror and tension which caused constrictions of the spine." Although she was to have returned on the Geffen, only going ashore in Haifa and Tel Aviv for a short period, through the "kind attention of the Captain and Chief Steward," the Shoham Company agreed to share her expenses for a stay in Israel to enable her to return in the Dagan, a bigger and steadier ship.

When Miss Webber disembarked in Haifa, she had practically to be carried off the ship, the Shoham passenger department stated. The next day she went by taxi to Jerusalem, and last Monday astounded the shipping staff, when she walked into the office unaided and "practically danced all around our desks."

She explained to The Jerusalem Post that in Jerusalem she checked in at the Y.M.C.A. There, two American gentlemen asked her whether, as she was in pain, she wanted to pray with them. She agreed and was invited to a prayer meeting the next day. "I was in great pain, and when asked to come up to the altar, I limped up, although I was very doubtful about the whole thing," she said.

"I felt no particular sensation except

a tenseness, and when I returned to my seat my hip was back in place and I walked like a normal person," Miss Webber said. "After the service I walked back to the Y.M.C.A. as I have not walked for the past four years. The specialists who had given me up as a bad job were proved wrong."

Since her cure, Miss Webber, who is "over 50," has used her time to go sightseeing. She has found the people here "extremely kind," and was especially full of praise for the excellent treatment on the Geffen. She intends to return here soon for a "real holiday."

## Bible Sales Increase After Healings

THE SALE OF BIBLES AND NEW TESTAments has increased amazingly during the weeks of the recent revival campaign in Jerusalem. Following the favorable article in Jerusalem Post concerning the healing of an English woman, the sale of Bibles and Testaments started to rise. In a few days general gospel literature sales increased three to four times what they were formerly. It is not only the poorer class who come to buy the Scriptures, but doctors and people of other professions also come.

Our missionaries in Israel could distribute thousands of New Testaments in Yiddish, Arabic, English, German and other languages if they were available. Frequently, soldiers come to the Mission to obtain New Testaments. Funds are needed for this cause. ## Malignant Cancer Healed

For several months last spring I suffered a great deal of pain in my body, and finally I had to give up housekeeping and stay in bed. One of my daughters came to see me and took me to a doctor in North Platte, Nebr. After giving me a thorough examination, which included sending a specimen of tissue to Omaha, my doctor called and told me that I had a positive report of malignant cancer of the female organs. I must have an operation immediately, he said.

Because I am seventy years old, my husband and seven children had yery little hope that I could live through an operation. But the doctor assured them that I wouldn't live long without surgery either, so he made preparation by consulting a specialized surgeon and setting a time for the operation.

Contrary to the wishes of the doctor I was taken home on Friday morning, and on Sunday afternoon I attended a specially scheduled divine healing service. Pastor J. D. Mayfield, as well as many of the congregation, were so concerned for my healing that they remained to fast and pray after the morning services until the healing service was to begin.

Pastor L. L. Roggow of the North Platte Assembly brought some of his people along with him and joined in the afternoon service. After a short message on divine healing both of the ministers laid hands on me while everyone prayed for me to be healed.

After I went home my appetite returned and I began to eat normally. Sores which I had on one side of my face disappeared, and in the next several days my tongue—which had been black on both sides—began to look healthy again.

For two years my hands and feet had been crippled with arthritis until I needed the help of a cane as I walked painfully in bedroom slippers. But the arthritis vanished; I am wearing hard-soled shoes again and do not need assistance in walking.

The following Saturday I went back to the doctor for a check-up. He could not believe that I had no symptoms of cancer, so he sent another specimen of tissue to the laboratory. On August 6 he sent me the following letter, signed by the surgeon specialist:

"I am happy to write that I received your report from the pathologist of Omaha and that your test is negative for malignancy."

Since my healing, I am in the best of health and am serving the Great Physician in witnessing of this healing wherever I go. God has been good to me, and I want to live for Him and praise Him for making me perfectly well.—Mrs. Delbert Ballard, Maxwell, Nebr.

## Restored After Nervous Collapse

Wonderful is Jesus to deliver! I have found by experience that He is the same yesterday, and today, and forever (Heb. 13:8).

In May, 1953, I suffered a nervous collapse. The doctor said that my nerves would get worse if I didn't get away from the children so I could have some rest. I continued to grow worse.

Finally, fear gripped my heart, and I left my family and went to Modesto, Calif., to rest in the home of my sister-in-law. I had been there about a week, when the Lord began urging me to pray. As I read the Bible, the Lord kept impressing me that someone needed my

prayers; and as I forgot myself in praying for others, the Lord set me free. Praise His name! That was the last part of June, 1953. God surely answered the prayers of our pastor and his wife, as well as the others who were praying for me. It is wonderful to be free from fear.

In November, 1953, I had another serious illness which affected my whole body. All the connective tissue supporting my female organs gave way and caused extreme pressure on the main nerve in my back. I couldn't use any part of my body without severe pain. I was miserable in any position. Finally I went to the doctor. He told me I would need surgery before I would be well again.

It seemed that whenever Brother and Sister Ross anointed me and prayed for me I would feel better for a while. Then I would soon be worse than before. But one day last January the Lord showed me that I was not fully yielded to Him for His work. Then and there I yielded, and what a healing I received! I have never felt the least pain since. I am putting my trust in Jesus to guide me in a teaching ministry for Him.—Mrs. Esther Quinn, Box 99, Westwood, Calif.

## Child Healed of Asthma

My little boy was a premature baby. At birth he received a severe head injury, and we had to leave him in the hospital almost two months. The doctor told us he would not live; but he did, although he was never well or strong. Whenever he caught cold he would run a high fever, and it would take him two or three weeks to get over it. He also had asthma.

I took my boy to many doctors for help, and he always had the best of care and the best of food. We gave him vitamins and medicine all his life, but none of it seemed to help him. When he was in kindergarten, he was absent 30 days, due to general weakness and asthmatic attacks.

In May of his kindergarten year he had a very severe attack of asthma. I put him to bed that night, propped him up on pillows with a tent over his bed, and set the vaporizer going so he could breathe. Before we went to bed, my husband and I went in to look at him. He was asleep, but was breathing with great difficulty.

We had been attending an Assembly of God for about six months. Those folk believed in divine healing, and we could see that Jesus was real to them. I wanted Him to be real to me, too; so we had been praying and reading God's Word quite a bit.

My husband suggested that we pray for our boy. So we did. I knew God could heal him. The next morning he woke us up about 5 a.m., talking and laughing in his bed. All of his asthma was gone!

I didn't let him go to school that day. My mother kept him while I went to work. When I got home that afternoon I asked my mother how he was. She said she had never seen him show so much life as he had that day.

That evening we were late getting to bed, and I was tired. As I lay in bed saying my prayers, it seemed as if someone said to me, "If you really think Jesus healed your child, why don't you get out of bed, get down on your knees, and thank Him properly?" This I did. Together my husband and I thanked Jesus for His healing power and wonderful blessings. There in the bedroom the Lord revealed Himself to me in a wonderful way.

Since then my child has never had another attack of asthma, and that was over two years ago. He began gaining

"Should I be ashamed because my husband lies bedfast, no longer able to preach as once he did? (Continued from page three) burn or scald, and it will heal you perfectly.

#### 3. THE LORD'S SUPPER

In 1 Cor. 11:30 we read that many of the Corinthian Christians were weak and sickly, and many had even died (fallen asleep) for lack of rightly discerning the Lord's body in the Holy Communion. Just as the fruit of the vine is to us a sacred symbol of the precious Blood shed on the Cross for our pardon, so the broken bread is a type of the body of Jesus broken on that Cross for us, when "Himself took our infirmities, and bare our sicknesses' (Matt. 8:17). His body was crushed that ours might be healed; He bore all the sufferings possible to humanity, that we might be made every whit whole. He left the Holy Communion for us as a continual reminder of His death in its twofold efficacy as forgiving all our iniquities and healing all our diseases.

If we discern aright the Lord's body in this sacrament, it will be to us every time a healing medicine for the cure of any disease with which the enemy may attack us. And not only so, but it will be the means of our appropriating the resurrection life of the Lord Jesus, that we may be kept in health moment by moment. "If the Spirit of Him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, He that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by His Spirit that dwelleth in you" (Rom. 8:11).

There is another sense in which we are to discern the Lord's body; namely, by recognizing our oneness with our fellow-members in the Church which is His body. As we learn more and more to realize our oneness and mutual dependence, we shall be filled with a tender love for one another which will keep us from all bitterness, envy, or divisions; and this will help us to receive aright the benefits of healing and health which our risen Lord offers to us.

Let us turn now to the three symbolic actions:

#### 1. LAYING ON OF HANDS

This is mentioned in the Lord's healing ministry, as well as in that of the apostles (Mark 6:5; 16:18; Luke 13:13; Acts 5:12; 9:17; 28:8). In the case of Jesus it symbolized the transmitting of healing power to the sick ones (Luke 6: 19; 8:46). In the case of His disciples it probably signifies the same thing, as we are told to lay hands on the sick in His name, or as representing to them the touch of the hands of the great Physician, through whom alone can come their healing.

#### 2. Anointing With Oil

This was commanded in the Epistle of James, quoted above. It is also mentioned in the ministry of the apostles (Mark 6:13). Oil throughout the Scripture is a type of the Holy Spirit. It is He who

ministers to us the resurrection life of Jesus, quickening our mortal bodies as promised in Rom. 8:11. The anointing with oil is also a sign of consecration, as we see from the ceremonies prescribed for the setting apart of prophets, priests and kings. Even the poor leper, after his cleansing, was to be anointed with oil, as a symbol of the entire consecration of his new life to the service of God. So when an elder anoints the sick person with oil in the name of the Lord, it is not only a symbol of the Holy Spirit's healing work, but also a sign that the sick one's renewed health and strength are to be entirely consecrated to God —a sign that he is to live no longer unto himself but unto Him who saves and heals him.

#### 3. THE USE OF HANDKERCHIEFS

These are mentioned in Acts 19:11-12. "God wrought special miracles by the hands of Paul: so that from his body were brought unto the sick handkerchiefs or aprons, and the diseases departed from them, and the evil spirits went out of them." In these "last days" also the sending of handkerchiefs to the sick has been blessedly used by God, and has resulted in the healing of many sick ones.

Thus we see that our Great Physician has not left us without remedies, nor without outward signs and symbols which are intended to strengthen and encourage us to trust Him for our healing. Let us learn to use these divinely prescribed remedies for every case of sickness, and to rely more and more on the almighty power and continual willingness of Him who has promised: "Behold, I will bring it health and cure; and I will cure them, and will reveal unto them the abundance of peace and truth" (Jer. 33:6).

ISRAEL DEMANDS A KING-1 Samuel 8:1-10

"And the Lord said unto Samuel..., They have forsaken me, and served other gods, so do they also unto thee" (vv. 8, 9).

These verses reveal the blessed relationship that exists between the Lord and the Christian. Samuel felt that he was being rejected as the leader of God's people, but God told him that it was He, not Samuel, who was being rejected. What the people did to Samuel they were also doing to God.

In Matthew 25:42, 43, Jesus said, "I was an hungred, and ye gave me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me not in: naked, and ye clothed me not: sick, and in prison, and ye visited me not." Then He said in verse 45, "Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to me."

"If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen? And this commandment have we from him, That he who loveth God love his brother also" (1 John 4:20, 21). The truth is made very plain here. Man's love to God is seen in his love to his brothers and sisters in Christ and toward a world that is lost and dying in sin.

WARNINGS CONCERNING A KING-1 Samuel 8:11-22

When God made man in the beginning, He gave him the freedom of choice. As man exercised his will in his fall, so he must exercise his will for conversion. God also allows man to exercise his will in many areas after conversion.

When it became apparent that Israel wanted to reject the Lord as their King and install a human king like the heathen nations, God still did not remove from them the prerogative of choice. Israel had come to the place where conformity to other nations was more desirable in their estimation than conformity to God's perfect plan. Over the prophet's protest, over the prophet's warning, they demanded a king. Still God did not cast Israel aside. He merely allowed them to complicate their own future by demanding their will instead of His. How much better it would have been if they had gratefully accepted God's perfect will for them!

MURMURING PEOPLE—Numbers 12:1-15

God has always hated spiritual pride, and when it occurs in His people He judges it on the spot. Not only does this sin show the base desires of the flesh, but it also implies that the creature is a rival of the Creator.

Miriam and Aaron made the grave mistake of assuming that God had placed a premium on their blood-line. They presumed that they and their brother Moses were a triumvirate ordained of God to effect joint leadership of Israel. They convinced themselves that they were equal with Moses, allowing their reasoning to doubt the intelligence of God in choosing their brother before them. Base effrontery of this sort was flung into the face of Jesus Himself in later years: "Is not this the carpenter's son?" Such disrespect is an insult to God.

This story is a lesson in showing respect for others. The sin of Miriam and Aaron did not die in the wilderness; it is with us today, and very active. Some people still speak evil of the dignitaries of the church whom God has chosen. Their murmuring is like throwing a boomerang—the words return to trouble the sender! Certainly all men are born equal, but in respect of office God has chosen some above others. Invectives against God's man always result in confusion, and as in the case here mentioned, interfere with the progress of the church.

If one is tempted to talk about leaders, he had better talk to God about them in prayer. Nothing but good can come of that.




REBELLIOUS PEOPLE—Numbers 20:1-13

# 27 Spanish-Speaking Youth Graduating May 10

May 10, 1955 will be a banner day in the Latin American Bible Institute of Ysleta, Texas, as 27 young people complete three years of studies and go forth carrying the Gospel. Students from Mexico, Puerto Rico, and eight states will then be ready to return home and from there go into all the Spanish-speaking world if the Lord should so lead.

It has been said that the sun never sets on Spanish-speaking Assemblies of God churches; but we can add that it does shine upon many millions of Spanish-speaking people who know nothing of the Gospel. Graduates of our Bible Institute march into a field white to harvest.

Perhaps you have wondered just what kind of young people attend our four Latin American Bible schools. Most of these men and women have unusual backgrounds. The following comments will help you to realize their fine consecration to the work of God.

RUBEN GUAJARDO and PABLO DE LEON will return to Mexico. Ruben was reared

in the industrial city of Monterrey. With a desire for sports, he was beginning to participate in the Mexican's delight: bull fighting. But the Lord reached his heart and now he says, "My desire is to evangelize with all my heart, and I will do so until He comes or demands my life."

Pablo was born in the little city of Reynosa. As a boy he longed to reach military age so that he could become a pilot in the Mexican Air Force. The Lord changed his desire. Now he "longs to preach the Word."

Luis Colon was born in Puerto Rico of Catholic parents. Now his family lives in New York City. Hopes were great that he should become a Catholic priest, but our joy is complete as he goes out to minister the Gospel as a humble servant of the Master.

EUSEBIO RODRIQUEZ came from Puerto Rico to visit a brother in El Paso, Texas, just in time to attend the Osborn Healing Campaign. He was converted and healed. A few months later he enrolled in L.A.B.I. Here he was filled with the

Holy Spirit and called to preach. He has made great progress in the Lord.

ART ORTEGA from Saginaw, Michigan, was born into a family of musicians. He, himself, was well on the way to becoming a dance band leader when the Lord called. After two and a half years in C.B.I., he came to L.A.B.I. as a student-teacher.

NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

#### Twenty Tongues in Israel

Although every effort is being made to transform the Israelis into a people of one tongue—Hebrew—newspapers are still to be found on the stands in Israel in twenty different languages.

#### Plan Chapel in Grand Canyon

A campaign is under way to raise a million dollars for a chapel in Grand Canyon National Park. The chapel, to be known as "Shrine of the Ages," will be designed for use by all religious groups.

#### Eisenhower Chapel Opened

The city of Denver has an Eisenhower chapel. It is a non-denominational prayer and meditation room in one of the city's newest skyscrapers, and it is open to the public. The chapel was named for President Eisenhower in tribute to the spiritual leadership he has provided for the nation.

#### Foreign Students in America

Each year thousands of foreign students enroll in American colleges and universities. Last year there were over 6,000 in New York alone, over 4,000 in California, some 1,700 in Illinois, and hundreds in each of twenty other states. What impression are these young people getting of so-called "Christian" America? Many of them will be future leaders in Asia, Africa, Europe, and South America.

#### Moslem Missions in Eritrea

Ever since Eritrea, former Italian colony on the Red Sea, was federated with Ethiopia following the end of World War II, the Ethiopian government has refused to permit Moslem missionaries to enter the area. The population is about half Moslem and half Christian. Moslem leaders claimed they were discriminated against, inasmuch as Christian missionaries were allowed to enter Eritrea and Moslem missionaries were not. Ethiopia now has decided to permit Moslem religious missionaries to enter that area.

#### Bible Reading on TV

The one-minute films of Bible reading that were used on television during the World-wide Bible Reading Program were so popular that the American Bible Society has begun producing films for daily use throughout the entire year. At present the Society has enough ready for six months. As a result, there will be a daily Bible reading in millions of homes where the Word of God is seldom if ever read.

#### Worship Services in Siberia

Prisoners in the Soviet concentration camp of Vorkuta in Siberia have managed to organize worship groups, according to John Noble, an American civilian who was held in forced labor for nearly ten years. Mr. Noble was seized by the Soviets in Leipzig, Germany, in 1945 and was released only recently.

"The religious services sometimes took place deep in the Vorkuta coal mines," he told the U. S. Information Agency. "It was strictly forbidden to have religious services in the camps."

#### Salvation Army Re-Enacts Its Invasion of Chicago

"Come one, come all—see the Devil defeated." That was the advertising on the handbills that described a special anniversary program sponsored by the Salvation Army in Chicago.

The program, held in an abandoned building on West Madison Street, celebrated the diamond jubilee of the Army's invasion of the United States from England. The now-crumbling hall, once the scene of many Salvation Army activities, echoed again with shouts of praise and sounds of hand-clapping and foot-stomping as eight hundred people engaged in an old-fashioned "hallelujah" meeting.

With great fervor they sang the old hymn, "Oh, Yes, There's Salvation For You." Then a cast of a hundred people staged an old-time skit with the Devil, Drunkard, Businessman, Atheist, Woman of Wealth, Man About Town, and Salvation Army Lassie as chief characters.

"Sister Flossie," dressed in the fashion of 75 years ago, marched on stage and said, "One year ago tonight I was bound down by the chains of sin and drink. I had no home, no friends, no hope. Then, while walking the streets, I heard the music of the Salvation Army Band..."

"Amen, sister!" shouted the crowd. Commissioner Claude E. Bates, Central territorial commander, suggested that modern Salvationists should rededicate themselves to the spirit and fervor of

their forerunners.

#### Inspirationals by Telephone

Residents of Baltimore, Maryland, now can get a half-minute "inspirational" by dialing a certain number on their phone—in the same way that they get weather or time reports. The service, instituted through the joint efforts of the local YMCA and the telephone company, is believed to be the first of its kind in the nation. A typical message goes like this:

"Hello! We're glad you called. This is the day the Lord hath made. We will rejoice and be glad in it. Yesterday is but a memory, tomorrow a promise, today an opportunity. Make the most of it. Your YMCA urges you to get active. Attend the church of your choice. Thank you."

After the first few days, calls were averaging 120 to 130 an hour, with the result that the telephone company had to rush installation of a second trunk line.

#### Alaskan Church Is Re-Assured

Trustees of the Sitka Lutheran Church had a bit of a fright recently. While conducting a documentary search in an effort to clarify the tax status of the church, they found that the land was not included in the formal survey of the transfer of territory to the United States in 1867 when Alaska was purchased from Russia.

They quickly appealed to the City Council for a ruling on whether the land on which the church is located is owned by Russia or the United States. The city fathers voted unanimously that the church lot is in U. S. territory.

#### Ancient Shrine Comes to Light

French archeologist Jean Perrot has discovered at Beersheba in southern Israel the remains of what is believed to be an idolatrous shrine denounced by the prophet Amos (Amos 5:5).

Diggers working at the site unearthed a large quantity of iron figures which definitely date the building as of the era of the early Jewish Kingdom, the Israeli

Department of Antiquities said.

Prof. Perrot was quoted as saying he is hopeful that continued digging may unearth the sanctuary of Abraham, which he believes is at the same site. Indications of a civilization earlier than that of Amos have been found under the idolatrous shrine.
