A Pentecostal preacher is playing a strategic role in Canadian government affairs. When the Prime Minister of British Columbia chose his cabinet in 1952, he selected an active pastor as Minister of Highways. Today Phil Gaglardi is one of the busiest preachers in all of Canada.

Perhaps you read the story of how Brother Gaglardi serves God and his country, as told in the current issue of TEAM Magazine. It is a fascinating account.

From his office in the government buildings in Victoria, he directs the public works program of an area much larger than Texas and Oklahoma combined. Aside from administrative duties and the regular responsibilities as a member of Parliament, he travels 100,000 miles annually to inspect and oversee the work of the Public Works Department.

The amazing thing is that a man can do all this and still successfully pastor a church. He does it by carefully dividing his week: two days at his church and five days at his government post.

Ten years ago Brother Gaglardi came to the city of Kamloops in the mountainous area of British Columbia. At that time Calvary Temple had twentyfive in Sunday School and eight in the congregation. Today he has the largest congregation in that city of 12,000. During the past year the Sunday School averaged 417, with a peak attendance of 728. The church building has been enlarged five times in the past ten years.

He is a lover of boys. He spearheaded the construction of a hobby shop which is open to all the boys of the city. Here, in a building 50 by 23 feet in size, the boys of Kamloops can spend their evenings learning electric and acetylene welding, or working with band saws, steel and wood lathes, and other power tools, thanks to the generosity of local business firms and civic clubs.

He is a lover of music. He sings gospel solos on all his radio broadcasts which are heard each day over five stations in British Columbia and one in the Yukon Territory.

This busy man plans to take time out of his full schedule of duties to attend the General Council of the Assemblies of God at Oklahoma City, and to give the main address at a laymen's breakfast being arranged by the Department of Men's Fellowship. The breakfast will be held in the Biltmore Hotel, Oklahoma City, on Saturday morning, September 3, at 7 o'clock. The seating capacity is limited to 735. Tickets are now on sale at \$1.75 each at the Department of Men's Fellowship, 434 West Pacific Street, Springfield 1, Missouri.

It is hoped that a record number of laymen will attend this General Council and make their contribution to the blessing and success of the entire convention.

What's Wrong With the Schools?

Houston Pastors Point Finger of Condemnation at "Progressive Education"

A HUNDRED PASTORS COMPRISING THE Greater Houston Ministerial Alliance of the Assemblies of God declared all-out war against progressive education and other influences they believe to be jeopardizing the welfare of public school children.

Representing 85 churches with 10,000 members, the pastors unanimously passed a scathing resolution against "nationwide educational pressure groups" that "are misleading the citizenry by concealing the significance of 'progressive education' in the Greater Houston school systems."

"We have long been disturbed at the increasing turmoil and unrest in the schools," said Rev. A. L. Parker of Highlands Church, the Alliance president, "and at the darkening shadows ahead. They are more menacing than is generally realized."

"Now that the Houston Alliance has struck the first public blow," added Rev. W. E. Berry, the district secretary, "we hope to alert the entire South Texas district.'

More than 250 churches and 550 pastors are on the district rolls.

After describing the pressure groups as "influences which teach disrespect for sacred institutions of America, the homes and the churches, or which continually contradict Bible teachings regarding discipline and authority, or which glorify doubt to such an extent that essential faith is discredited," the preamble to the resolution sets forth:

"The confusion is also apparent among our fine teachers, who are divided on the issue. We are confident that every adherent to the Christian faith would oppose the ultraliberal trends in American education if they were to analyze the essence of 'progressive education.' "Protesting against the rigid discipline of the past and forgetting the valuable benefits of dis-

ciplined education, many American educators, led by a man named Dewey, launched a quest in 1921 for what they termed 'academic freedom.' The chief target of the revolt has consistently been the churches of the land. Revolting against the restrictions of traditions and religious influences, progressive education began with the fanatical

chant: 'Don't say don't.' "Experimental patterns of behaviorism were gradually woven into the fabric of learning in our public schools. The result: chaos, confusion, mis-understanding, desectation, and juvenile delinquency -even the sacred institutions of the home and the church have not been spared from the brazen and blasphemous march of an army of intellectual libertines. Behind it all is a sinister story, the pic-ture of the real battle, not a battle of school board liberals vs. conservatives, wrangling over which teachers should be purged, but a battle of faith vs. doubt.

"Thirty-four years from its introduction by Dewey, the child of well-meaning progressives has grown completely out of control and is now the vicious tool of a monster called doubt, a monster

even more disastrous than communication with the second se of whom are active church members, have succumbed to the clever strategy of a subtle enemy which would ultimately destroy all freedoms, in-

cluding academic freedom— "Be it resolved that this body disapprove of progressive education and cite it to be an enemy of the Christian faith for the following reasons:

"1. Progressive education undermines the faith of innocent school children through overstressing skepticism and the element of doubt.

"2. Progressive education advocates attitudes on discipline and respect for authority which contradict America's greatest textbook, the Bible.

"3. Progressive education is now dominated by powerful pressure groups which are controlled by forces which hold no respect for America's sacred institutions.

"4. Progressive education breeds immorality, rebelliousness, and juvenile delinquency stressing behavioristic patterns of learning. and juvenile delinquency through

"5. Progressive education, carried to its ridiculous extreme, leads to a defiance of God and the

Christian faith." Officers of the ministerial alliance, in addition to President Parker, are W. C. Hardy, pastor of Pasadena's Southmore Church, vice-president, and C. C. Swain, pastor of the South Houston Church, secretary-treasurer.

We Can Reach a Million by 1960

THE 41 YEARS SINCE APRIL 1914 HAVE been years of glorious victory and achievement for the Assemblies of God. In 1914 some 300 persons responded to the call for a meeting in Hot Springs, Arkansas, including 120 pastors and evangelists. From that small beginning we have grown and developed under the blessing of God until today we have over 750,000 pupils enrolled in more than 7,000 Sunday Schools throughout the United States. Our goal is to achieve 1,000,000 in Sunday School enrollment by 1960.

Surely we have reason for rejoicing as we reflect upon the goodness of the Lord in granting us these significant gains. It is fitting that we humbly and sincerely express gratitude to God for His abundant blessings among us!

Glorious as the past has been, there comes an even greater challenge for the future. We have not arrived; we have merely laid the foundation for our present mission to this generation. No period of history has been beset with such grave problems on every hand. Ours is a distraught and frustrated world, one that is ill with a malady that well nigh escapes solution. We face a world of people who have a distorted sense of values and who have put the emphasis on the material and human to the near exclusion of God and the spiritual.

We have witnessed the ineffectiveness of the military man, the politician, the economist, the sociologist, and the educator in trying to cope with the complex problem of bringing about peace and security. It is well that we realize that the world's problem is a spiritual problem. International difficulties can be solved only when spiritual implications are recognized. That places a tremendous burden of responsibility upon all who name the name of Christ.

The Sunday School, as an agency of the church, must make its weighty contribution. No other department of the church appeals to persons of all ages as does the Sunday School. All are included in its ministry, from the youngest to the oldest. We Assemblies of God people, who embrace the Full Gospei testimony and who have shared experi-

mentally the wonderful baptism of the Holy Spirit, stand in a unique position of responsibility to mount an ever-increasing offensive against ignorance, error, and sin.

The primary purpose of the Pentecostal experience, as taught by the Master, is to endue us with power to witness for Him. With hearts set aflame with His love and zeal, we cannot do less than continue steadfastly in the work of reaching the lost, winning them to the Saviour, teaching them His precepts, enlisting them to become our fellow workers in this vital program of evangelism. This is the Sunday School in action!

As we survey the records of the last Sunday School year we note that more than 80,000 souls were saved in our Assemblies of God Sunday Schools. This represents a soul won for each 10 in Sunday School enrollment. As our enrollment grows, the number of souls won to Christ shows a corresponding increase. This emphasizes the importance of bending every effort to enroll a million in Sunday School.

The steady growth in the Sunday School enrollment of our Movement has

been little short of phenomenal. We must guard, however, lest we drift into an attitude of smug complacency when we are everywhere surrounded with a world that is ill-a people who so desperately need the cure that only Christ can bring. We as Sunday School workers -ministers, officers, teachers, and pupils -are the messengers of "good news." Our foremost task is to make Christ known.

Our goal to achieve a million in Sunday School enrollment by 1960 might seem to be a very ambitious undertaking, at first glance, but by united effort and prayerful persistence we can do it.

We can reach a million because we have the guarantee of Christ's presence. He has commanded us to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. He prefaced this command with the bold assertion, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth." He followed the command with the glorious promise, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We are not alone in this task, for He is with us. The first 120 Pentecostal believers, with the impact of the Holy Ghost anointing upon them, reached the whole known world with the gospel within one generation. The believers at Jerusalem filled the city with their doctrine. We must fill every city, every community with our message.

We can reach a million because we have the advantage of tools with which to work-materials and methods which have been prayerfully planned and which will implement a program of growth and expansion. We have proper organizational guidance and we have training programs

THE FIVE-YEAR PLAN! A PLAN WITH goals and objectives in the local church, in the district, in the nation, and around the world! It is a plan that will advance our Sunday Schools both in quality and in quantity.

This is the challenge that caused the leaders of the Assembly of God at Newcastle, Wyoming to set goals for the Five-Year Advance.

"LET'S REACH OUR SHARE"

On June 26 Pastor W. Neil McDaniel gave a challenge to his congregation to "reach their share in Newcastle."

The national goal is an increase of 10% each year in enrollment, resulting in a million members by 1960. New-castle's leaders set their goal for an increase of 20% each year! This was their increase last year, during a heavy build-ing program. They feel that this is their share!

They have averaged 132 in Sunday School for 1954-55. An increase of 20% each year will give the Newcastle Assembly an attendance of 158 in 1956, 190 in 1957, 228 in 1958, 274 in 1959, and 329 in 1960. This means an increase in souls won for God in Newcastle.

COWBOYS, ROUGHNECKS, LUMBERJACKS, AND PROSPECTORS

Newcastle is a typical Western town. It is cold in winter, hot in summer. Its 5,000 people work in oil fields, on ranches, in lumber, and a number of the people take hunting in the hills with Geiger counters as a serious pastime.

Newcastle has its main street—the center of most activity. Until recent years this little Western town had more saloons than churches. It now has fifteen churches of various denominations to serve its people. These churches reach from 1,200 to 1,500 people each Sunday morningElmer Inich teaches his class of Junior Boys at the Newcastle Assembly of God



in a town with a population of 5,000. Cowboy, roughneck, lumberjack, prospector, truck driver, housewife—each must be reached. That is why the Newcastle Assembly must reach its share!

FACILITIES FOR "THEIR SHARE"

Brother McDaniel became pastor in Newcastle in 1949. One of the immediate problems was facilities. Where would they put the people? This called for a building program.

They began an expansion program in June 1952 and they have been building ever since! They have had financial difficulties. Much of the work had to be done by the congregation. Pastor Mc-Daniel became an expert block layer. All did their part as they built for God!

When the present building is completed this church of forty members will have 17 classrooms and four Sunday School departments.

A board member asked Pastor Mc-Daniel what they would do for room in 1960 when the goal of 329 is reached. The pastor's reply was, "We will make room for them!"

(2) Mrs. McIntosh keeps good records for the Sunday School.

Five-Year Plan of ADVANCE!

LOCAL LEVEL



How We Can Reach a Million

Lead 250,000 to Christ

We need the tonic of a big task, and we have it in the Five-Year Plan. We have a goal—250,000 souls to be won to Christ and enrolled in our Sunday Schools by 1960! To accomplish this great task, we must have the following:


1. Leadership with vision. The story is told of a farmer moving into a new location. While he was unloading some corn his new neighbors informed him that he was wise in bringing the corn, since it was not likely that he would have a good crop here on his newly ac-quired property. That fall Dan plowed his fields and fertilized them well. In the spring he purchased the very best of seed and planted it. Dan was delighted because of the fine crop that was forthcoming. When one of the neighbors stopped in to see him, Dan took him to a field near the house and proudly pointed out the wonderful stand of corn. His neighbor responded by stamping his foot and saying, "Dan! It's not in the land; it's in the man!" This can be said of our great task in the local church, "It's in the man who serves as a leader with 'vision!"

2. Organization with technique. Success is for those who plan well. It is necessary to have sufficient organization to guarantee growth and regular attendance. The organization will determine the reach of the local School. Proper grouping and departmentalizing as soon as growth permits, a training program for all staff members, and an air-tight follow-up visitation program all associate themselves with organization that produces growth.

3. Evangelism with fervor. It has been said that we must place a warm heart against a cold heart by personal visitation, and let the people know that Christ loves them and that they need Him. Bible words like these call us to action: "Go ye," "all the world," "all men," "everywhere." God has invited us to work with Him in the divine transaction of the New Birth. To be present when a soul passes from death unto life is one of the most hallowed experiences a Christian can have. Let us give ourselves to the great task of evangelism and go ON TO A MILLION!

Provide for Growth

To develop a Sunday School that faithfully reaches out to teach as many as possible, workers must give attention to physical provisions for growth.

Organizing into departments will promote growth. If we divide our age levels departmentally and provide more classes, we will reach and hold more people in our School. It is not usually possible to departmentalize all at once, but separate departments can begin with the youngest age group, and from that point progress can be made as rapidly as room and personnel will permit.

Facilities and equipment are growth factors. Buildings should be large enough and properly arranged to accommodate every department in comfort.

A program is needed to reach people for God. Definite thought and prayer should be given to a consistent pattern of programs that will enliven Sunday School interest. Each calendar campaign, such as Enlargement, Workers' Training, Loyalty, Vacation Bible School, and BGMC, as well as various special days, should be utilized.

Publicity will help to provide for growth. A program of activity means progress, and progress can always be given publicity. Oral announcements, newspaper notices, posters, and letters, are a few of the means which can be utilized. We must occupy till Jesus comes. We must expect to keep growing until the trumpet sounds, and reach every individual we possibly can while time remains.

Take an Inventory

It is a part of good business to take an inventory. The word *inventory* means a listing of resources on hand at a given time and available for use.

The important business of the Sunday School calls for the perpetual or continuous method of inventory. Records are kept more accurately; errors and irregularities are discovered and adjusted more quickly. The results of the inventory should be revealed periodically in the workers' conferences. In this way, all will be kept aware of the resources and needs of the School.

This continuous inventory should determine the spirituality of the School. Spirituality is the Sunday School's most important resource. The atmosphere of a spiritual School will have a decided effect upon the pupils.

The inventory should reveal the aims of the School. Neither aimless plans nor planless aims have ever accomplished much for God. But a very definite aim, supported by very definite and wellformed plans, will be found behind every worth-while Sunday School.

Organization is another thing the inventory should determine. Organization is to the Sunday School what the nervous system is to the human body. To build the School, keep widening the organization. Challenge the School by moving up from a class school to a departmental school. There is power in organization; it distributes responsibility, increases efficiency, and multiplies influence.

This continuous inventory should con-



sider the outreach of the School to see if it is meeting the challenge of those pupils who attend and also that of the community.

Good business has found that it is necessary not only to take an inventory but to control the inventory. This assures that the resources on hand will be balanced with the current need. To control the Sunday School's inventory one must establish goals, adhere to known principles, discover mistakes, and take steps to remedy them.

The initial steps in setting up inventory control involve: advance planning, organization, standardization, setting up records, and training personnel. Inventory is making sure that preparation is equal to the need.

Your Sunday School should be striving to reach its potential growth. Only by taking an inventory and striving to control it can that potentiality be known and a plan be made. This plan should indicate the method of "bridging the gap" between the School you now have and the one you hope to have—the one that will do its part to help the Assemblies of God Sunday Schools go ON TO A MILLION!

Enlist, Train, and Motivate Workers

To reach our goal of one million by 1960 we will need additional officers, teachers, secretaries, and departmental workers.

As soon as Sunday School leaders reach out for additional workers they will immediately face three problems: (1) What is the best source of new workers? (2) How can these new workers be trained and qualified? (3) How can these workers be motivated to do their best? Growing out of these three problems are three imperatives:

1. Administrators of the Sunday-School must see the need for more trained workers.

The divine command to teach is an urgent command. Its claims should be presented to all followers of Christ. Both Old Testament and New Testament



point up the need emphatically. Moses told the Israelites the commandment of the Lord, "These words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children." And Jesus said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations."

Furthermore, the anticipated enrollment increase of 250,000 pinpoints the need for more workers. The ratio in the average School is one worker for every ten pupils. The Assemblies of God nationally now has approximately 75,000 workers for an enrollment of 750,000. If we anticipate an increase of 250,000 in enrollment, we must have 25,000 new workers. We cannot hope to reach our goal unless we do.

We will find most of these workers among our present pupils. We must take another look at our potential workers and challenge them under God to enroll in a training course and prepare to teach. In some cases we will have to interview them personally, and in all cases we will have to guide their progress if they are to develop into the workers we need.

2. The administrators of the Sunday School must respond to the God-given challenge to train.

This is a scriptural challenge. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

This is a practical challenge, for how else can we get the trained workers that are needed? Our past growth, both nationally and locally, has proved the necessity of the training method.

This is a present, personal challenge each worker should be made to feel responsible to participate in every training opportunity.


3. The administrators of the Sunday School must feel deeply the urge to teach.

It is a natural urge, for he who knows the truth immediately discovers a strong desire to make the truth known. Truth cries to be published!

It is a Christlike urge, for Jesus, who was addressed two out of every three times as a teacher, said, "Follow thou me." A desire to be like Christ will be accompanied by a desire to teach.

It is a spiritual urge, for it is the spontaneous expression of the indwelling Holy Spirit, who is Himself a teacher and who desires to teach through the believer.

Our Sunday School administrators themselves must see the need for more workers, respond to the God-given challenge to train, and feel deeply the urge to teach. As they do, they will in turn cause others to see that same need, respond to that same challenge, and feel deeply that same urge.

Tokyo, the capital, is the third metropolis of the world, with 8,000,000 people living within the city limits. In the majority of the homes there is a radio, and people love to listen—especially to good music.

Ray T. Pedigo for several years has had the vision of reaching Japan's millions by means of radio. The vision has been materializing, step by step. Under great handicaps, programs were put on tapes and broadcast over two important stations. Response has been good and already a thousand interested listeners are regularly taking the correspondence course offered in Bible Study.

But in order to make better taperecordings and increase the over-all quality of the programs, much more equipment was needed. Support of the broadcasts was insufficient, also, and in late 1954 it was decided that Brother Pedigo should make a trip to the United States to solicit financial and prayer support for the important program. God richly blessed the trip and hundreds of our churches have become interested. And now the dream has come true!

On June 25, 1955, the new Radio Studio was dedicated. It is beautifully situated on the lovely campus of Japan's Central Bible Institute. Where formerly the choir and speaker had to travel miles across Tokyo to cut tapes at the little Japanese house where Brother Pedigo lives, now the work can be done in a modern and well-equipped studio. Gone are the days when screaming jets over our heads spoiled the tapes; or when carpenters' hammers and barking dogs punctuated the sermon at awkward intervals. The new studio is scientifically designed, with correct proportions, and the sound quality is most gratifying.

God has given the studio splendid equipment. Milton Sondeno has designed and built a master-console, so that the magnecorders, turntables, etc., can all be used to blend a perfect reproduction of the program. The engineer's room is a thing of beauty and utility from which the entire studio can be clearly seen through a tilted, sound-proof, double-glass window. The new magnecorder was given by Harold Spurgeon of Houston, Texas.

In the studio itself is a fine Hammond organ, the gift of the Oakcliff Assembly in Dallas, Texas, of which Roy H. Stewart was the pastor. This church continues to make possible the important Osaka broadcast which reaches millions in southern Honshu Island. The Milton Sondenos have loaned the studio their excellent piano.

Pastor Herbert Eicher and the church at Warren, Ohio, have given largely in order that the beautiful new building might become a reality. Our Pentecostal contractor, Brother Tazake, has made these dollars stretch as far as possible, constructing the studio of cement and steel, even to the roof itself.

Hundreds of other churches and friends have given so generously. As a result, the studio is completely modern, including air conditioning. May God bless them all!


Many of the converts have been young people, and it is encouraging to see them joining the choir, teaching in the Sunday School, and taking an active part in the new Revival Center.

DAVID AND THE LAME PRINCE-2 Samuel 9:1-13

"And David said, Is there yet any that is left of the house of Saul, that I may shew him kindness for Jonathan's sake" (v. 1)?





165,000,000 persons, so that we have one School for each 23,571 people. This is our challenge!

A stewardship is committed to our trust.

In this task of reaching a million we have for our encouragement the law of the harvest as taught by the Master. The more we sow, the more we will reap! If we work diligently for Him we cannot fail!

Branch Sunday Schools

When the Sunday School workers visited Johnny's home, his mother said: "We're sending Johnny to the ______ Sunday School now. It's just two blocks from here. Bethel Assembly is so far from our home."

So the visitors thanked the mother, and said they were glad Johnny was going to Sunday School SOMEWHERE. Then they went on to visit the next absentee on their list.

Bethel Assembly has a Sunday School bus to carry Johnny and the other children to and from Sunday School. But to Johnny's parents, the convenience of the neighborhood Sunday School is more important than that Johnny get the clear Bible teaching that is given in the Assemblies of God Sunday School. Besides, they like Johnny to be with his neighborhood friends.

Isn't it a pity that there is no Assemblies of God church in Johnny's neighborhood?

If there were, Johnny would not be lost to the Assemblies. Not only that, but Johnny's brothers and sisters, mom and dad might all be won to Christ. In addition, other people in their community would be influenced by their testimony. But all this is lost for lack of a neighborhood Assemblies of God Sunday School.

The Sunday School must reach Johnny and his family. They must find Christ. That is our mission. The highest purpose of our Sunday School advance, "On to a Million," is that men and women, boys and girls everywhere shall come to know Christ and live for Him.

Soul winning through the Sunday School is a channel of obedience to the Great Commission. Statistics show that 85% of all church members come from the Sunday School. Why? Perhaps it is because Sunday School workers GO with the Gospel. They obey the Great Commission by actively bringing folk into the church.

225,000 more souls need to be brought into Assemblies of God Sunday Schools in order to reach a million in enrollment by 1960. Each year there is a steady increase in the number attending Assemblies of God Sunday Schools. However, the average attendance of the schools remains comparatively even... 114 average enrollment in 1952; 113 average enrollment in 1953; 115 average enrollment in 1954.

How can the increase of 50,996 from 1953 to 1954 be accounted for if the average enrollment per school is remaining the same? Certainly the 386 new Assemblies and other branch Sunday Schools opened during 1954 are largely responsible for the increase in enrollment. One sure way for Assemblies of God Sunday Schools to reach the million enrollment goal by 1960, based on the 1954 Sunday School Checkups, would be to open 1,956 churches and branch Sunday Schools.

Naturally every pastor is expected to co-operate by striving to enlarge his Sunday School. But the facts remain that two-thirds of Assemblies of God Sunday Schools have an enrollment of less than 100, and only 58 of the churches reporting during 1954 had an enrollment of more than 500. Assemblies of God people cannot despise small beginnings. They must continue to open branch Sunday Schools, never forgetting their ultimate purpose of gathering people together to open new Assemblies.

You may ask, "When is a church strong enough to open a branch Sunday School?" Any school that can afford the price of the literature needed for the Sunday School pupils who will attend the new school is ready. (If the sponsoring school cannot afford to buy current literature, it may order free of charge from the Gospel Publishing House back-dated literature in any quantity needed. Or it may purchase current literature for half price for the first six months. If you wish to do this, write to the National Sunday School Department requesting "marked order blank.")

When you open your branch Sunday School, you may wish to conduct the classes in the home of a member of your church. Keep in mind that you are trying to reach out into new territory. If you use someone's home, choose a home that is farthest from the church. And be sure you do not move into an area where another Assemblies of God church is already thriving! Before you open the branch, make sure there are prospects in that community to attend the Sunday School.

It may be that you will decide to rent a hall or a building. A certain pastor declared that he felt it more profitable to rent a hall for a branch Sunday School than to buy a bus to carry the children from a distant community to the "Mother" Church.

If your church is not located in a large metropolitan area, you may plan to open your branch in a rural neighborhood. Many times it is possible to secure the use of community school houses in which to conduct the Sunday School.

Perhaps part of the Sunday School staff from the "Mother" Church can teach in the branch school on Sunday afternoons. They can use the same visual aid and other lesson materials in both schools.

The branch Sunday School is a good place to train teen-agers and new converts. They can be put to work as teachers or helpers in the branch school and still get the instruction they need by attending a class in the "Mother" Church.

In order for the branch school to be a success, constant contact must be made with the parents of the Sunday School children. Extra effort must be made to draw the adults into the school. Just as soon as possible, adult classes must be conducted; care for babies and nursery children must be provided. Mothers' clubs can be fostered; a Men's Fellowship can be begun. Men and women from the "Mother" Church can take the leadership until the parents are won to the Lord.

Never forget that your branch Sunday School is touching eternal souls. Your mission may ultimately result in a strong church which, in turn, will go out to win others as the Assemblies of God advance "On to a Million."
