

Which Way Is Right?

The great variety of religious philosophies in the world today can be very confusing. After surveying the wide diversity of human opinions a person is apt to exclaim in bewilderment, "What is truth? Which way should I take? Who is right?" Obviously all cannot be right. It is evident that some are wrong, and a mistake in spiritual matters is the worst mistake of all.

Someone says, "Love is the test. If a person has love he cannot go wrong." But were there not many devoted mothers in Noah's day who dearly loved their children? The love in their hearts did not keep them from being destroyed in the flood of God's wrath.

Another says, "Wisdom is the main thing. Study the wisdom of the ancients and all will be well." But Moses acquired the wisdom of Egypt, yet he would have perished in spiritual darkness had he not received a revelation of the one true and living God.

There are others who tell us, "Sincerity is what counts. Your beliefs are not so important, if only you are sincere in following them." Many of the Jews who were responsible for the crucifixion of Christ were sincere in thinking He was a heretic, but they were sincerely wrong.

Today there is great emphasis on education. Many think that mental development will emancipate men's souls from all that is evil, but we have only to read the story of Saul of Tarsus, one of the foremost scholars of his day, to see that education is not enough.

The greatest folly of all is to think that the course of the majority is the right course. "If most of the people have adopted a certain philosophy, it can't be far wrong," they say. The fact is that the majority is often wrong. In the days of Noah, the majority was lost and the minority was saved. In the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, just a few were saved while the many were lost. Jesus said, "Strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it" (Matthew 7:14).

We are all too prone to "follow the crowd." We feel we must conform to custom, like a bunch of adolescents, and very few of us have the sense or courage to be different from the rest. Living in a democracy, we are used to submitting to the will of the majority. That may be a good way to govern a nation but it's a poor way to govern your individual life. The only safe course is to study the Book that has endured through the ages and to get acquainted with the Author. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). If you trust in Christ and obey His Word implicitly, you will be in the minority as far as this world is concerned, but you will be on the right road, the narrow way that leads to everlasting life.

WE BELIEVE in the resurrection of both the saved and the lost, the one to everlasting life and the other to everlasting damnation.

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The Threefold Work of the Holy Spirit

Revivaltime Sermon by C. M. WARD

THE IMPARTATION OF THE HOLY Spirit in the new birth and the Baptism in the Holy Spirit are two separate and distinct experiences and should never be identified as one and the same. And neither of them should be confused with sanctification, which is a further work of the Holy Spirit in separating us from the world and unto God.

There is a trinity running all through God's Word. God Himself is triune. Man made in God's image is triune.

The temptation of Jesus was three-fold. We contend against a three-fold enemy—the world, the flesh, and the devil. In this warfare, the divine Trinity is pitted against the trinity of evil. The Father against the world—"If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him..." The Son against the devil—"The Son of God was manifested that he might destroy the works of the devil..." The Spirit of God against the flesh—"For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other..."

There are three upper-room experiences of the apostolic Church:

(1) "And he shall show you a large upper room furnished: there make ready. And they went, and found as he had said unto them: and they made ready the passover" (Luke 22:12, 13).

(2) "Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and

saith unto them, Peace be unto you.... And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and saith unto them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost" (John 20:19, 22).

(3) "And when they were come in, they went up into an upper room, where abode Peter, and James, and John, and Andrew, Philip, and Thomas, Bartholemew, and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus, and Simon Zelotes, and Judas the brother of James. These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication . . ." (Acts 1:13).

This same pattern is evident in the believer now. He is begotten by the Spirit—"Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." He is sanctified by the Spirit—"God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth." He is baptized in the Spirit—"For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence."

Certainly the disciples were saved before the resurrection of Jesus. Our Lord never would have sent out unsaved men to preach the gospel of the Kingdom. Then what happened to them on the first Easter evening subsequent to their conversion? That's an important question! The statement of Jesus is in the imperative mood. When we read, "Receive ye..." it means right now. Over and against this emphatic command we have reference to a future fact as recorded in Acts 1:8, "Ye shall receive the power of the Holy Ghost coming upon you..." (margin). And again in verse five, "Ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence...."

Meyer, the German commentator and a notable authority on New Testament Greek, says: "The breathing on the disciples could only be taken as a medium of the impartation of the Spirit; that is, as a vehicle for the reception which was to take place by means of the breathing...the imperative cannot merely promise a reception belonging to the future, but expresses a reception actually present."

This breathing is significant. As at creation God breathed into man the breath of life and he became a living soul, so now at *re*-creation Christ, having finished His redemptive work, breathes this time on redeemed man and he receives something infinitely more than mortal life—he receives the Holy Spirit. The first breathing made him a natural man, the second a spiritual being.

"The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last Adam was made a quickening spirit.... The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second man is the Lord from heaven."

It is proper to ask the question, "Why should Jesus say to His disciples, 'Receive ye the Holy Ghost...,' if they did not or could not receive Him then?

What they received was not what is indicated by Luke 24:49, "And behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high." Nor was it what is indicated by Acts 1:8, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you..."

Jesus indicates that there is to be an experience—a baptism—that is to come "upon" them. It is important to note that the preposition used is "upon" and not "in." There already was an experience within. I have noted in a continual reading of my Bible over many years of the differences the Word makes between the receiving of the Holy Spirit as Sanctifier and Comforter, and this coming upon the believer as the Enduer.

There is no command in John 20:22 to tarry such as we find in Luke 24:49 and Acts 1:4. The world did not witness the event. This was brought out by Judas when he asked, "Lord, how is it that thou wilt manifest thyself unto us, and not unto the world?" The atmosphere of John 20:22 is quiet. There were no outward manifestations connected with it—no tongues of fire, or speaking in tongues as accompanied the Baptism at Pentecost.

How would you feel if you learned that the owner of the drug store across from the nearest high school was selling candy containing a slow but deadly poison?

What would be your reaction if you knew your son or daughter, or members of your Sunday School class, visited that drug store frequently and very likely would become victims of these unscrupulous tactics?

How would you feel if the owner of the store justified his actions by saying that his customers liked the poisonous merchandise?

What would you do?

A hypothetical case? Yes. But in essence this is occurring all over America. Merchants are selling merchandise which will poison not merely the bodies but the minds of youth. Obscene, salacious, and pornographic literature is flooding the newsstands, the drug and grocery store counters. Slowly but surely, this Satanic sewage is perverting the minds and morals of American youth.

What does this obscene literature do? "It portrays illicit sexual relations in an attractive manner. It glorifies adultery, fornication, and prostitution.

It presents infidelity as the accepted way of life, holding in contempt the marriage relation and the sanctity of the home. It suggests to impressionable minds ways and means of seduction, drunkenness, theft, sadism, and general disrespect for law and order. It creates disrespect for religious ideals and for religious leaders by presenting them in a ribald and obscene manner." That is how former Congressman O. K. Armstrong, chairman of the Decent Literature Council in Springfield, Missouri, described these publications in a report to the city council.

Obscene literature is big business. In one recent year half a billion dollars was spent on this vile merchandise. A certain type of man has always been ready to sell a soul for a dollar.

Obviously the situation demands action. Two questions immediately present themselves: (1) Do Christian people have an obligation to act in such an area as this? Or would we be intruding into a sphere of action where we do not belong? (2) If we should act, what course can we take?

Some may question the wisdom and the propriety of our trying to do anything. They will remind us that we are in the world but not of it. Others might say that our job is to save the world, not to try to clean it up by legislation.

But think of that poisoned candy again. If it were actually being sold, would you not think you had a right and an obligation to act? to see that something was done to protect your children?

And it does affect your children—even your younger ones. According to J. Edgar Hoover and many other law enforcement agents, filthy reading is invariably a factor in sex crimes. By helping to stem this tide of obscenity, you will be helping to protect your own home.

We also have an obligation to protect our older youth. This type of literature appeals to the lower nature, the morbid interest and curiosity. Access to this literature can well turn thoughts in an unhealthy direction and eventually result in moral disaster, or at best a lifetime struggle to overcome these tenaciously clinging thoughts and interests. The wrong view of marriage these magazines give could also wreck chances for marital happiness.

Then too, we have an obligation to

our generation. We are trying to win it for Christ. Why make our task more difficult because a generation becomes mentally debauched?

Let's face it. We cannot be religious isolationists. It is true that we are in the world but not of it. But that phrase can be turned around and made to read, with equal force: we are not of the world, but we are surely in it.

We are no less citizens for being Christians. If anything, we should be better citizens. We have an added incentive for obeying the laws—"for conscience' sake." And if we ought to keep the law, what is wrong with helping to do away with bad laws and helping to improve the good ones?

Too often we meet defeat by default. In a city where I pastored, there was a great deal of talk when it was rumored that a film, starring a woman of questionable character, would be shown. What happened? Those responsible received hundreds of letters in favor of the film. Less than five letters opposed the film. Defeat by default!

What can be done? You will find the situation to be a great deal like the hypothetical one described earlier. The local merchant receives his supplies of magazines from a distributor, of whom there may be one or more, depending on the size of the community. The distributor, in turn, receives his supplies through the mail. You can complain to the Post Office—for it is now illegal to receive, as well as to deposit, obscene literature in the mail.

The Supreme Court in a recent ruling defined obscenity more specifically. The new test is "whether to the average person, applying contemporary standards, the dominant theme of the material taken as a whole appeals to prurient interest." (Prurient means "having lascivious longings.") The Court also ruled that both the Federal Government and the states have a right to ban obscene publications.

But there is something which can be done on the local level. The author had the privilege of serving on the Decent Literature Council in Springfield, Missouri, and here are some suggestions based on the action which we took.

In such an effort, co-operation is needed. Where the voice of one church or a group of churches of the same denomination might not have any effect, concerted action by a group of agencies may. The Parent-Teacher Association should have a lively interest. Service organizations such as the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, or the Boys' Club should be concerned. Representatives from these and other groups may form a Decent Literature Council.

Your first step will be to discover the laws on obscenity in your state and community. Usually these will be adequate for your purposes. The laws are there; they just have not been enforced.

The next step will not be a pleasant one, but it is necessary. You will need to obtain copies of some of these magazines and examine them in order to prove that the law is being broken. You will feel like washing your hands when you get through. And you will be amazed at what is being sold freely on our newsstands, readily available to our youth. Here in Springfield we had some young students purchase some of these

publications to prove that anyone could do so.

What are some of the titles to look for? There are scores of such magazines, of course. In Springfield we asked for the withdrawal of seventeen publications from the newsstands. They were: Nugget, Tiger, Fling, Bare, High, Escapade, Voyage, Hackpot, Confidential, Adam, Bedside Reader, Jem, Playboy, Rex, Monsieur, Dude, and Gent. The names of many of these certainly suggest their contents. You will find others.

Do not make the mistake of thinking you *must* be a crusading group. You may be pleasantly surprised, as we were, to find that in some instances store owners are glad to remove from display certain publications which are called to their attention.

A TOURIST'S HANDBOOK AND GUIDE book carried the advertisements of hotels and motels. After describing the advantages of the particular hotel or motel, in easy readable type were the words: "Come in just as you are." And that's the gospel message too.

Yet some poor, sin-bound, mind-darkened sinner goes on in despair. Christ is the Day Star, the Light of Life, the Water of Life, the Bread of Life, the Hope of a despairing heart. The Spirit of God whispers to every heart, "Come." The Church, in all her divinely appointed ordinances, cries, "Come." Every believer in the highways and hedges is authorized to say, "Come."

You are invited. Come to Christ just

You are invited. Come to Christ just as you are. By delaying you do not ready yourself; by your self-efforts you sink deeper into the mire of sin and shame.

As Augustine said, "God has promised forgiveness to your repentance; but He has not promised tomorrow to your procrastination."

Come penitently, come believingly, and accept this invitation from the heart of Infinite Love to come to the storehouse of His exhaustless wealth. Your guilt will be removed; your hope will be restored; new life will course through your soul. Come, just as you are; and come now.—Wesleyan Methodist

The Holy Trinity



> THE PLURALITY OF PERSONS IN THE GODHEAD IS A DOCTRINE BEYOND HUMAN REASONING BUT NOT CONTRARY TO IT

HE DOCTRINE OF THE TRINITY IS no doubt the most universally believed Christian truth, and so firmly believed and long accepted that time is seldom given to writing or speaking on it. To refresh our minds on why we believe what we believe is profitable and necessary from time to time.

Many have said that John 3:16 is the key verse of the entire Bible: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." In this verse the plan of salvation or redemption is revealed clearly and beautifully. But it is also a foundation stone for the doctrine of the Trinity. When one becomes confused on this great truth set forth from Genesis through Revelation, he robs John 3:16 of its meaning and the plan of salvation of making sense. Here the Bible plainly reveals a Supreme Being with the attribute of a father, loving and yearning over a lost world, and giving His Son to atone for our sins. It does not say that God so loved the world that He gave Himself, but that He gave another person— His Son. Throughout the whole Bible we learn that the redemption of the lost, (and we have all sinned and come short of the glory of God), is by a perfect blood sacrifice. The Old Testament offerings on the altar of the best sheep or bullocks or doves, were only a type of a perfect sacrifice to come. In John 3:16 we have the revelation of the great love of God the Father for a sinful world as shown in the sending of His Son to suffer and die for the sins of the entire world. Now, whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. It took nothing less than the nearest and dearest to God to atone for the sins of mankind. That one is called His Son. He was Divine the same as God, and eternal in His existence. Paul wrote in Philippians 2:5-7 that Jesus was in the form of God before coming into this world and thought it not robbery (a thing to be grasped after) to be equal with God. Two persons are mentioned here; one like God, and God Himself. If there were only one personality in the Godhead the Scripture would not have said "equal with." There has to be someone else of like kind to be equal to, or an expression such as this never would have been used. In the same chapter of Philippians, verse 9, we read that God hath highly exalted Him and given Him a name above every name. Him here does not refer to God



Himself, for that would be absurd-God exalting Himself and giving Himself a Name above every name! He already had that name and position. A careful reader would say that the one whom God exalted is Jesus Christ, spoken of in verse 5.

In the first book of the Bible we read, "And God said, Let us make man in our image" (Genesis 1:26). Us and our are plural pronouns. To whom could they refer? To God, of course, who was speaking; and to the One Paul mentioned in the second chapter of Philippians, who was in the form of God and with God from the beginning of all things. This is the One John referred to as "the Word" in the first chapter of his Gospel, verses 1 and 2. Verse 2 reads, "The same was in the beginning with God." If there is any confusion about the wording of the first verse of John 1, the second verse makes it plain by the use of the words "with God." It should be clear from the Scriptures thus far that there is more than one in the Godhead. Jesus did say, "I and my Father are one." The Bible also says that husband and wife shall be one, and Jesus prayed that Christians might be one. But no matter how devoted husband and wife are, or how two Christians may love each other, I have never seen them melt together or otherwise turn into one personality. Surely Jesus never expected us to lose our personal characteristics and identity for that would be impossible. Jesus' oneness with the Father was the same as the Christian oneness with each other, and the oneness of husband and

There are not only two in the Godhead but in many places the Trinity is plainly mentioned. Notice Matthew 3: 16, 17 which refers to the water baptism of Jesus. The Father spoke from heaven, and the Holy Spirit like a dove came upon Jesus, the Son. The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are all mentioned. Then in Acts 10:38 we again have the Trinity, "God anointed Jesus . . . with the Holy Ghost, who went about doing good; ... for God was with Him." Jesus said as recorded in John 16:28, "I came from the Father and . . . again I leave . . . and go to the Father." He also said, "I will pray the Father and He shall give you another Comforter, . . . even the Spirit of Truth." Where is Jesus now and what is His condition or position? Mark 16:19 informs us that "After the Lord had spoken these words He was received up into heaven and sat down on

the right hand of God." Whose right hand? His own? No, the right hand of God the Father, and there the book of Hebrews tells us He is our Intercessor with God.

In conclusion the apostolic benediction, repeated as many times as ever John 3:16 or the Baptismal formula, should help any that doubt: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit abide with you all" (2 Corinthians 13:14). Let us join in the great Doxology, and let the last part be sung louder than ever: "Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Amen!"

A Divine Mystery

There are some who teach that there is only one Person in the Godhead. They mistakenly teach that Jesus is the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It would seem that only one verse of Scripture is needed to refute this theory; namely, Mark 13:32. In this verse the Lord Jesus Christ is quoted as saying:

"But of that day and that hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels which are in heaven, neither the Son, but the Father."

This verse clearly states that the Father has a secret which He has kept from His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. Such would be utterly impossible if the Lord Jesus Christ were the only Person in the Godhead. For how can one Person keep a secret from Himself?

For the Father to be able to keep this secret from His Son, there must of necessity be two distinct Persons. A person may keep a secret to himself but never from himself. —J. C. Burkey

The baptismal formula has created confusion in the minds of some. Peter said, "Be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ" (Acts 2:38). The meaning of the Greek word "name" in this verse is "authority, character, reputation." It is the same word used by Jesus in Matthew 28:19—"Baptizing them in the name (authority) of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." This corresponds to the thought of the previous verse where Jesus said, "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18, R.V.).

We are Scriptural when we baptize "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost," for we do so on the authority of the Godhead.



Your Questions

Did Israel have any priesthood before they received the law?

Exodus 19:22, 24 indicates that they did.

What does Paul mean by "the ends of the world" in 1 Corinthians 10:11?

Some writers take this to mean the end of the Mosaic age or dispensation and the coming in of the new age, the Christian dispensation.

Some act as though salvation came only through their church. I believe salvation comes through Christ alone, and that therefore we ought not to be in bondage to any church. What is your answer?

Only through repentance and faith in our Lord Jesus can any be saved. "For there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). However, each church which believes in and teaches the gospel of Christ is an agency through which God works. It is through the Church, consisting of all congregations which believe in Christ, that the gospel is to be preached in all the world. Each believer ought to become a member of a recognized church or body of believers and support its fellowship and activities for the Lord, realizing the sacred task to which he and his fellow believers are called. "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25).

In Matthew 12:42-45 Jesus gave a parable of a man out of whom an unclean spirit was cast. Does this parable teach that if a person backslides he will become possessed of devils and be in a worse state than before he was saved? Or does it refer, as some teach, to "the worthlessness of self-reformation"?

If you will read the entire chapter you will find the Pharisees holding a council against Jesus because He had healed a man (vv. 9-14). They said He was casting out devils by Beelzebub (v. 24). Christ then warned that all sins against Him might be forgiven, but

that there is no forgiveness for sins against the Holy Spirit (vv. 31, 32). Jesus saw the wickedness of their hearts even though they made much profession of religion. In spite of all their religion they were servants of Satan.

Let this be a warning to us. To oppose Christ and His gospel opens the heart to Satanic powers. Our safety lies in walking humbly with our God, ever trusting in the merit of the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Is not saving faith a gift of God, as salvation is? (Ephesians 2:8)

Many give this interpretation to Ephesians 2:8 and I know that God does help us to believe when we seek Him with all our hearts. Others interpret this verse to mean that we are saved by grace, which is the gift of God bestowed on faith. They have support of many scriptures. There is certainly a human element in saving faith, and he who makes no move himself but waits for God to do it all is likely to go without saving faith.

Please explain how we are to work out our own salvation with fear and trembling (Philippians 2:12).

The apostle would have us feel responsibility for making our "calling and election sure." Each believer encounters various tests and trials in the development of his personal character. Each therefore must feel responsible for himself before the Lord.

But the believer is not to trust to his own strength for the needed development. He must permit God by the Holy Spirit to come into his life that he may have grace sufficient for every need. Man is to co-operate with God in working out God's plan for him.

Facing Today's Problem

Since life does not always run smoothly for any of us, either as families or as individuals, we need the courage and comfort that comes only from a personal, intimate acquaintance with God. Often life seems to be fashioned for the sole purpose of drawing us closer to our heavenly Father.

When your husband loses his position, when the children disappoint you, when your days become a treadmill of mundane tasks, it is a wonderful thing to know God cares and understands.

The world is big and unfriendly, and God seems far away, until with a catch in our hearts we grasp the wonderful truth that "God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

He has shown His love! He has sent His Son to die on the cross for your sins. Your first step toward God is the simple act of faith. If you receive Him by faith you will become His child, for "as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name" (John 1:12).

If you have been resting your hope of eternal life on your good works, your fine character, your sacrifices for your family, or even your church membership and baptism, you are not following the simple rules of Scripture. The Bible tells us "that if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved," (Romans 10:9).

If you have any doubts about your position before God, stop now and pray. Tell God that you believe Christ "hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God" (1 Peter 3:18), and that you want Him for your Saviour.

Having taken that step, you are ready to begin a daily walk with God. The only way to really enjoy a close walk with God is to keep a daily quiet time with Him. Give Him the best, the freshest hour of the day.

In all probability, you as a housewife and mother will have to wait until the "morning rush" is over—children off to school and husband off to work, before taking your quiet time with the Lord.

Your quiet time can be varied. You may like to read some simple books or articles which discuss quiet time basics. Also, there are some truly great books on prayer and Bible study, including *How I Know God Answers Prayer* by Rosalind Goforth. Reading these will enrich your devotional life.

However, day in and day out, your simplified program will consist of studying the Bible and praying. Notice that I didn't say just reading the Bible, but studying it. "Simply reading your Bible does not mean you are getting spiritual nourishment," said Dr. Wilbur Smith. "Believing the Bible is not a synonym for feeding on the Word. Bible study is the study of the Bible, not dreaming over it, or arguing about it, or defending it."

Try different methods of studying the Bible. One favorite is that of studying an entire book at one time. Many books, such as the shorter epistles or the minor prophets, can be read in a few minutes.

Read the same book or section through each morning for a week. It will be helpful to have a notebook and write in it: by whom the book was written, to whom, why, what is

the greatest truth in it as revealed to your own heart by repeated readings, and what the book's message is for you.

After your study, you are ready to pray. Normally you will make requests for your own life first, although there will be times when your heart will be burdened for the special needs of others. The Holy Spirit knows just what we need and how we should pray (Romans 8:26).

You will find it encouraging to write down the various things for which you pray. When the answer comes this can also be noted. It will build your faith as you see how the Lord works in answer to your various requests. And it is also interesting to observe that some of the things you had thought you needed would not have been best for you at all. You may even regret asking for them, but you will be glad that an all-wise Father chose to answer "No" instead of "Yes" to those particular prayers.

In remembering the needs of others, you may find the use of a small card file helpful. Write the name of each one on a separate card along with the requests you make for the person. In this way you can remember a number of them each day and begin the next morning where you left off.

Having studied God's Word and enjoyed a time of rich fellowship and intercession, you are now ready to face the problems of the day with the assurance that whether the day is ordinary or special, your Father cares.

Read: Matthew 16:13-20

Learn: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16).

For the Parent: Review the story of Peter's confession of faith that Jesus is the Son of God. Emphasize the importance of believing this—there is no salvation for us unless we do. Point out also that this revelation: (1) was not given by any human being; (2) came as a divine revelation from God; (3) was the cornerstone on which the Church was built—not on Peter, but on his statement that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God.

Question Time: Why is it so important to believe what Peter stated in v. 16? (See above) What rock is the Church built on?

Tuesday, October 21

Read: Matthew 16:21-28

Learn: "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16: 26)

For the Parent: From this passage point out: (1) how Jesus foretold His death, v. 21; (2) Peter's reaction, v. 22; (3) the necessity of spiritual discernment, v. 23; (4) the cost of discipleship, v. 24; (5) the benefits of discipleship, vv. 25-27; (6) the future rewards for the Christian, vv. 27, 28. Stress the importance of correct spiritual values.

Question Time: How did Peter react to Jesus' statement that He must die? (v. 22) What did Jesus then tell him? (v. 23) What is more valuable than the whole world?

Wednesday, October 22

Read: Matthew 16:28-17:13

Learn: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him" (Matthew 17:5).

For the Parent: Have the group review the story of the transfiguration of Jesus. Then point out: (1) the transfiguration gave the disciples a glimpse of Jesus in His glory; (2) Peter's desire to build three tabernacles, v. 4; (3) the voice of God focused attention on the One who should receive all our praise and worship—Jesus, v. 5; (4) the ministry of Jesus in taking away fear, vv. 6-9.

Question Time: What is meant by "transfiguration"? (v. 2) Who appeared and talked with Jesus? (v. 3)

Thursday, October 23

Read: Matt. 20:20-28; Philippians 2:1-8 Learn: "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30).

For the Parent: (Additional material on "The Humble Spirit" will be found on Sunday's Lesson page.) From Matthew 20:20-28 point out the importance of humility, stressing the idea of being great through service. Christ is our great Example. Philippians 2:5-8 shows how His humility caused Him to be obedient even to death on the cross. Emphasize the importance of giving Christ first place in our lives, then keeping a humble spirit in all things.

Question Time: What request did the mother of James and John make of Jesus? How did He answer it? (Matt. 20:20-28)

Friday, October 24

Read: Luke 18:9-27 (Sunday's Lesson for Juniors)

Learn: "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5).

For the Parent: Before a person can be saved, he must realize that he needs to be saved. The two illustrations in this passage emphasize this. Review each, pointing out those who recognized their need received salvation while those who did not recognize their need received nothing. Then show why all persons need to be saved.

Question Time: What must a person realize before he can be saved? (See above) How did the Pharisee illustrate this?

Saturday, October 25

Read: Luke 4:16-32 (Sunday's Lesson for Primaries)

Learn: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth" (Matthew 28:18).

For the Parent: From this passage point

For the Parent: From this passage point out: (1) for Jesus this was a return visit to the town where He grew up, v. 16; (2) He had a custom of going to church regularly, v. 16; (3) His message to the people, showing that He was the great Deliverer and the Messiah, vv. 17-27; (4) the attitude of the people, vv. 28-30; (5) the earmark of Jesus' teaching, v. 32.

Question Time: What part had the city of Nazareth played in Jesus' life? (v. 16) How do we know Jesus went to church regularly? (v. 16) What was His text?

Books

LONDON EVANGELICAL LIBRARY NOW AVAILABLE IN U.S.

An American branch of England's Evangelical Library has recently been established in Philadelphia. As a result books covering all aspects of Christian doctrine, theology, history, hymnology, biography and similar subjects are more readily available to preachers and laymen on a loan basis. The new repository is one of a hundred located in more than forty-five countries of the world with chief headquarters in London.

The founder and chief librarian, Mr. Geoffrey Williams, was converted to Christ as a lad of seventeen and thereafter became interested in the writings of the great Christians of the past. He gradually collected an immense quantity of evangelical books. His library was later moved to London where at the present more than 100,000 volumes are available from its two and a half miles of shelving.

Schools

LIQUOR INTERESTS CHARGED WITH PRO-MOTING SALES THROUGH SCHOOLS

Alcoholic beverage agencies are attempting to use public institutions, including schools, to increase the sale of alcohol, the president of the National WCTU charged at Washington, D. C. Mrs. Glenn G. Hays told delegates to the Temperance Union's 84th annual convention that the agencies are pressing for slanted "alcohol education" in the schools to assure "future customers for the liquor sellers." She named Licensed Beverage Industries, Inc., as one of the agencies. This group, she said, maintains an "education director" to get its materials into schools. It also makes "increasingly aggressive attempts to force state education departments and school systems to adopt an

educational approach favoring moderate drinking," she said.

Claiming that pressure by the liquor agencies on teachers and school administrators was "enormous," Mrs. Hays charged that the industry presses for use of pro-drink texts which contend alcoholism is a disease with no relation to "the normal use of alcohol."

INDULGENT PARENTS CRITICIZED FOR SPOILING CHILDREN

Over-indulgent parents are making things increasingly difficult for educators by spoiling their children, a priesteducator said in Cleveland.

Clarence E. Elwell, superintendent of Cleveland Catholic schools, said that teachers don't get the cooperation of parents in disciplining children. "Punishment at school used to be reinforced at home," he said. "Now parents complain when the child is punished and the youngster plays the home against the school."

Sometimes loving a child means "a spanking rather than a sucker," the priest concluded.

Denominational

FIRST NATIONAL RETIREMENT HOME SEMINAR

A seminar for administrators of retirement homes operated by individuals or groups affiliated with the Assemblies of God will be held in Springfield, Mo., November 11-12.

Purpose of the meeting will be to work out common goals and standards for the care of the aged in Assemblies of God institutions.

The seminar is being sponsored by the Department of Benevolences and is the first national gathering of Assemblies of God leaders in this field.

RALLY DAY-OCTOBER 26

October 26 is the last Sunday of the Enlargement Campaign sponsored by the National Sunday School Department. The 1958 campaign has been designated as a "Go to Sunday School" Crusade.

The activities of the first three Sundays (Census Day, Contact Day and

Bible Day) were preparatory to Rally Day which climaxes Enlargement Month. Rally Day is a decision day—a time to encourage an evangelistic response from Sunday School pupils. The goals for the first two Sundays of October were: "Find those who are ready" and "Reach those who have been found." Today's goal is: "Teach those who have been reached." The ultimate goal of Rally Day and of the entire crusade is: "Win those who have been taught."

Foreign

JEWISH NEW YEAR FINDS ISRAEL "GATHERING IN EXILES"

President Izhak Ben-Zvi of Israel, urged his small country to continue its mission of "gathering in exiles." The president spoke in connection with the Jewish New Year 5719 which came in Sunday, September 14.

Reviewing ten-year-old Israel's achievements and plans, Ben-Zvi declared: "It is our task to continue the gathering in of exiles, consolidate them into one nation and go on with the revitalization of wastelands of our country and rebuilding of its ruins. We must prepare for immigration and reconstruction."

MOSLEMS SUBJECT TO FINE FOR POOR SABBATH ATTENDANCE

In a determined effort to draw a large attendance at the Friday prayer services, the Johore Religious Affairs Department in Malaya issued a circular warning Moslems that if they didn't attend the prayer service at the mosque on Friday (the Moslem sabbath day) they would be fined five dollars.

POPE DECLARED TO BE JESUS IN DISGUISE

A Catholic devotional magazine, called *Tabernacle and Purgatory*, makes clear Roman Catholic identification of Christ with the Pope. In one issue it states: "The Pope is a visible Jesus. Beside the actual presence of Jesus upon the altar, Christ is also present in the person of the Pope who is a living, authentic Jesus, truly present under the

cover and disguise of Peter. We unite the Eternal King and his Vicar in the same love. We consider the Pope a second Eucharist."

ESKIMOS GIVE DRIED FISH FOR HONG KONG REFUGEES

Eskimos around Teller, on Alaska's northwest coast, eke out a meager living by fishing, picking berries, hunting, and trapping for furs. However when they heard of the desperate plight of the Chinese refugee masses in Hong Kong, they felt compelled to share with them. As a result, they sent a parcel of fish part of what they had caught and dried this summer while living in tents along the coast and rivers. The Eskimos are members of a Lutheran mission group.

LIGHT ECONOMY MEASURE DISCONTINUED

Officials of Nuneaton in Warwickshire, England, have discontinued the economy measure of switching off street lights between midnight and 5 a.m. because of increased vandalism.

Miscellaneous

PSYCHOLOGIST SAYS NON-SMOKERS BETTER ADJUSTED

Cigarette smokers "seem more on the impulsive, restless, over-talkative, and distractable side" when compared with non-smokers, a research psychologist declared recently. Dr. Daniel S. Schubert of the University of Chicago made this observation at Washington, D. C., during the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association.

He said a study he conducted of young smokers at a large northeastern college indicated that while the smoker tends to be "more vigorous and ambitious" he "does not profit from experience as much as the non-smoker does." The non-smoker, Dr. Schubert added, seems more thoughtful, restrained, and cautious than his smoking counterpart, "and also seems to take the dictates of society more seriously than the college cigarette smoker." He declared that "the personalities of smokers are definitely different from those of non-smokers."

"PRAYER ROCK" WILL REMAIN

The Vermont Highway Department has decided to bypass historic "Prayer Rock" in its latest road building plans.

The stone, located near Bristol, Vermont, was engraved with the Lord's Prayer in 1891 at the direction of Dr. Joseph Greene in an effort to discourage swearing by loggers as they passed his home.

- THE 1959 YEARBOOK OF AMERICAN CHURCHES, just released, lists the Assemblies of God as first in the number of foreign Bible schools, fifth in number of foreign missionaries, seventh in number of Sunday Schools, eighth in number of churches, eighth in number of ministers, tenth in Sunday School enrollment, and twenty-seventh in church membership.
- THOUSANDS OF SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS OF ALL DENOMINATIONS met last week at Des Moines, Iowa, for the thirteenth annual convention of the National Sunday School Association. The Sunday School Department of the Assemblies of God presented a visual message entitled, "Train Up a Child." Two speakers at the convention were Bert Webb, an Assistance General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, and Mrs. Webb.
- OCTOBER IS BIBLE MASTERY MONTH and thousands of Christians throughout the nation are observing it by reading the Book of Mark. Each October since 1930 an interdenominational committee chooses one book of the Bible and urges Christians of all faiths to concentrate on studying it by reading it repeatedly during the month. Four chapters a day are suggested by participants.
- GROUND WAS BROKEN IN MARION, INDIANA for a new half-milliondollar building which will serve as international headquarters of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The former headquarters in Syracuse, New York, was completely destroyed by fire last January.
- AN ELDERLY WIDOW HAS SETTLED AN OLD ACCOUNT. Mrs. Letta Dickson, 78, has given a \$50,000 farm in Kansas to the Baptist Foundation of Texas. "I have never given to the Lord like I should," she said, "and now I want to pay up."
- A 70% WAGE CUT WAS TAKEN VOLUNTARILY by John L. Wesley, Jr., of Frankfort, Kentucky, in order to promote the missionary cause. He has given up an \$11,000-a-year job as a water supply expert for a consulting engineering firm, and has taken a \$3,100-a-year job as a missionary well-digger. Wesley will operate drilling rigs in the Congo and other areas where Methodist missionary stations are located.
- TWO YEARS IN FEDERAL PRISON is the sentence handed down to Andrew E. Shrock, 23-year-old Amish farmer of Ashland County, Ohio, for refusing to accept military service or substitute civilian work. He told Federal Judge Paul C. Weick that his religion taught him to "love my enemies." He said his religion would also prevent him from accepting alternate service in a hospital.
- A 2000-YEAR-OLD COPY OF THE TEN COMMANDMENTS, written in Hebrew, has become the property of the Unitarian Church of All Souls in New York City. It is the earliest complete copy known to exist today. Five thousand dollars was given to the church to purchase some fragments of the Dead Sea Scrolls which were still for sale. When the deal was closed with some Bedouin herdsmen in Jordan, scholars were surprised to find the "fragments" comprised the complete decalogue.

As time went on adults and young people began attending the services and found that CHRIST IS THE AN-SWER. With the Lord's blessing upon the work it came time to begin praying and making plans for the construction of a new church. God laid this burden upon the hearts of Pastor T. Kermit Jeffrey and the people of Calvary Temple in San Jose, California. While they were in the midst of a large building program, their motto was "Build Abroad While We Build At Home."

Because of this vision, we now have a beautiful church which can seat 500

AN ENGLISH NOBLEMAN AT THE outbreak of World War I stated sadly, "The lights of Europe are going out." He visualized lands such as Germany whose people had been instrumental in the great reformation and in the organizing of missionary societies for the proclamation of the gospel throughout the world.

As the bugles called the people of Europe to a great world conflict, it appeared that the ministry of the gospel through European nations was closing down, at least as far as its outreach to other nations was concerned. The truth of the statement made by the nobleman seems only too evident since, through all the succeeding years since 1914, the foreign missionary work by most of the European nations has been greatly restricted.

God seemed to smile on America so that her economic power has steadily increased until we now talk of the national budget in terms of billions instead of millions. Figures become so stupendous that we do not properly comprehend them. There is wealth in abundance so that to the average inhabitant of Asia and Africa, the average American looks almost like a millionaire appears to the rest of us.

God gives His gifts for a purpose. He called Israel not because it was a nation He wished to favor above all others for its own sake. He called

Israel to be a servant. He blessed her with spiritual light and His overshadowing power that it might in turn be a light to lighten the Gentiles. Israel failed in her mission, and became selfcentered, not apprehending that for which she had been called. She counted her blessings lightly so that God cut her off as a nation.

We who have been born into the family of God face a fresh challenge. We would like to make it very definite and bring it down to the Assemblies of God, and more particularly to the youth of the Assemblies of God on whom the mantle of responsibility must largely rest. John said, "I write unto you young men because you are strong." Your strength is an endowment of God. Your spiritual experience is a blessing of God. Your material blessings make you a steward of God.

What is it all for? What is the need? The gifts of God are given for a purpose. God has promised many blessings, but with His promise of

blessing there is invariably a command or commission attached. "I will be with you," He promises, but it is linked with an imperative "Go." To whom shall we go? We sing, "To the regions beyond I must go." This is but a song, but it was born out of a sense of urgency brought about by the moving of the Spirit of God in a human heart. "I must go." God indicates in His Word that in the last days He is going to do a short work. Things will be accelerated. They can be and they must be if the task is to be accomplished.

The Foreign Missions Department wholeheartedly endorses this effort on the part of the Christ's Ambassadors, and looks to them for the supplying of the equipment that is so vital to the completion of our task as a church.

If we should fail, the work must yet be done and God will find others to do it even if He has to put us aside just as He had to put Israel aside. UKIAH, CALIFORNIA

The Northern California-Nevada Indian Camp was held at Ukiah, California, this year. J. F. Pepper was the evening speaker and Ely Persing was the morning Bible teacher. Brother Persing's teaching will be long remembered. He brought out rich spiritual truths and each morning the attendance grew.

Brother Pepper, who is a Cherokee Indian and has traveled throughout the United States among the reservations, brought an anointed message each night.

Indians came to our camp from Washington, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon. and California.

HOOPA, CALIFORNIA

The 16th annual Hoopa Indian Reservation Camp Meeting convened July 11 through 20. Brother Albert Lewis, evangelist of the Northern California and Nevada District, was the evening speaker and Brother Fred Howe, pastor of the Ferndale Assembly of God Church, was the Bible teacher. Both brought inspiring messages.

The presence of the Lord was manifested in a great spirit of love among all the campers. Several Indians gave their hearts to the Lord and others were baptized with the Holy Spirit.

God is working in the hearts of the Hoopas for the valley has been stirred as never before with its need for Christ. This hunger caused a week's extension of the camp meeting.

During the camp meeting we had two baptismal services. One night at 11:30 p.m. four young men wanted to be baptized right then as they felt that not

being baptized hindered them from receiving the Holy Spirit. We baptized them in the river by moonlight.

SKOKOMISH, WASHINGTON

The Indian Camp opened July fourth and from the beginning there was an air of expectancy among the people.

One evening there was no preaching, as believers were so blessed during the song service that many came right to the altar without an invitation and began seeking God. The praying lasted until midnight. Every service was touched by the presence of the Lord. Several were saved, some were healed and about eighteen were filled with the Holy Spirit.

On the afternoon of the closing day of camp twenty-eight were baptized in water. Two men from the Little Boston Reservation were filled with the Holy Spirit as they came up out of the water.

NORTH CAROLINA

The first North Carolina District Assemblies of God Indian Camp Meeting convened June 20-29.

Brother Andrew Stirling, district superintendent and our evening speaker says concerning the camp: "We estimate that around fifty sought the Lord for salvation and quite a number received a definite witness of their conversion. Some nights the altar service lasted until around 11 p.m. The closing night of the camp meeting saw the largest congregation remembered by some throughout the area when an estimated eight or nine hundred gathered in and around the church."

Average daily attendance was from 100 to 120. All present enjoyed God-inspired messages from the speakers, Jimmy Dann, a Shoshone Indian, and Leslie Sampson, a Pima Indian.

Souls were saved and backsliders were reclaimed. Many Christians were refilled with the Holy Ghost.

During one service, a count revealed that seven tribes were represented. These were the Papago, Pima, Apache, Shoshone, Yaqui, Seneca and Crow.

The co-operation of various churches made our camp meeting a success.

We enjoyed the services in an outdoor tabernacle (a "wapito" or brush arbor).

NORRIS, SOUTH DAKOTA

The Indian camp at Norris, South Dakota, was held July 13-20.

Sunday's Lesson

THE HUMBLE SPIRIT

Sunday School Lesson for October 26, 1958
MATTHEW 20:20-28; PHILIPPIANS 2:1-8

In Matthew 20:20-28 we have the story of an ambitious mother who wanted her sons, James and John, to have the highest positions in the Kingdom of Christ. Christ did not completely refuse her request, nor did He say it was impossible of fulfillment. Instead, He pointed out to her that the way to greatness in the Kingdom was the way of humble service. "Whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister [servant]... Even as the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister [that is, to serve]." Our text in Philippians deals further with this same principle.

MOTIVES FOR THE HUMBLE SPIRIT.

Paul appeals to the Philippians on the basis of their own experience with Christ. "If you have found consolation in Christ," he says; "if you have enjoyed His love, if you have known something of the fellowship of His Spirit, if you have felt His compassion and tender mercies extended toward you, then fulfill my joy by extending this same love and these same mercies to others." And is not Paul's appeal reasonable? Surely those who have experienced Christ's wonderful love can do no less than allow that love to flow through them to others.

THE APPEAL FOR THE HUMBLE SPIRIT.

"Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory." Paul warns against the carnal spirit of competition which makes one individual or group strive against another for selfish reasons. The true motive for all Christian service is not personal glory but the glory of God.

"In lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." This includes putting others before ourselves, serving others and advancing others rather than ourselves.

"Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others." By nature every man is self-centered. It is only as we are led by the Holy Spirit that we reverse the natural order and put Christ first, others next, and ourselves last.

THE EXAMPLE OF THE HUMBLE SPIRIT.

"Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus." Weymouth says, "Let the same disposition be in you which was in Christ Jesus." We are to follow His example not only in our outward conduct and service, but in our inner life and attitude.

Christ's pre-existence and Deity. "Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God:" Christ's existence did not begin at His birth. He existed in the beginning "in the form of God."

Christ's incarnation. "But made himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men." Though Christ possessed all the attributes of deity, though He was perfect God, yet He was willing to take on the essential attributes of humanity and to become perfect man.

Though Christ was fully conscious of who He wasvery God—yet He was willing to lay aside temporarily His prerogatives and privileges as God, and to become subject to all the limitations which humanity must suffer and endure—all in order that He might redeem mankind from sin.

Christ's humiliation. "And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Christ's condescension was twofold; first, he lowered himself to take on the nature of man; second, he lowered himself to die the death of a man—and not only so but to die the most shameful of all deaths—the death on the cross as a common criminal!

Christ's exaltation. "Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name."

And what does all this mean to us? (1) Christ the Lord of glory was willing to take the lowly place to bring peace to man. Can we refuse to take the lowly place in order to serve and bless our fellow man? (2) "He that humbleth himself shall be exalted." (3) The way of true humility is the way of obedience and service. (4) True greatness is determined by the extent of one's sacrificial service.

promise of the Father which antedated New Testament promises by many centuries. In fact, Peter called it a direct fulfillment of Joel 2:28. When it occurred, a large part of Jerusalem was drawn to the place by the tremendous noise made by the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. He came like a hurricane, "a rushing mighty wind," at this time.

Human experience bears out the contrast between John 20:22 and Acts 2:4. I have known and associated with some of the grandest workers for Christ that it is any man's privilege to know. I know that they know the Holy Spirit, and I know that the Holy Spirit has a real place in their lives and ministries, and yet these dear friends never have given evidence of any of the Pentecostal manifestations that we have grown accustomed to witness among those who are baptized with the Spirit. But I have yet to hear of a genuine case of anyone being baptized in the Spirit without that person speaking in an unknown tongue. The Scripture is clear that after an inward experience something later came upon the disciples. I think millions of God-fearing and spiritually sensitive people today around the world need something to come upon them. They need a fiery, heaven-sent baptism of power.

Peter wrote of a sanctifying experience for the believer through the Holy Spirit: "Elect according to the fore-knowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ."

Paul also spoke of a sanctifying experience for the believer through the Holy Spirit: "That I should be the minister of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, ministering the gospel of God, that the offering up of the Gentiles might be acceptable, being sanctified by the Holy Ghost."

How can I be sanctified within aside from the presence and the work of the Holy Spirit in my life? Long after His disciples had received Him, Jesus prayed for their sanctification (John 17). Certainly they were not sanctified the night before the crucifixion. They were wrangling then, and the next day Peter cursed, and all the disciples forsook Him and fled.

The record shows that something wonderful happened to them on Easter night when Jesus breathed upon them. A spirituality took hold upon them that enabled them to wait patiently in one accord and in one place. What a difference in their natures! But the mighty Baptism did not come until later. I long to see the people who know the "breath" of God press on to enjoy the mighty Baptism!

The forty days following His resurrection during which Jesus appeared and disappeared are probably a type of the life of the redeemed after they receive resurrection bodies. They shall freely pass from earth to heaven. Hence the sudden appearances and disappearances of Jesus-followed by long lapses when the disciples did not see Him. There is evidence of a spiritual quickening which held the disciples steady during this period. This was the result of the experience of Easter night when He breathed on them and said, "Receive ye the Holy Ghost." He gave them "another Comforter."

The mighty Baptism is for a different purpose entirely. The purpose of the Baptism is not so much "comfort within" as it is "power to witness."

Jesus said, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

This great world conference of Full Gospel believers is met together to reemphasize these three great experiences by the Holy Spirit—regeneration by the Holy Spirit, sanctification through the Holy Spirit, and baptism in the Holy Spirit. I need His birth. I need His breath. And I need His baptism. My Christian life is only complete when I have all three.

I urge all who love the Holy Spirit and who know the touch and working of the Holy Spirit in their lives to press on until they experience the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. Do not shrink from external manifestations! The Spirit of God has done a lovely work of grace and comfort within you. Now yield to His outward manifestation. Yield yourself a witness! You have a responsibility toward others. Your Baptism in the Spirit will be a sound that will be heard in your community and among your circle of friends for Christ.


In some instances, perhaps in smaller communities, such action will be adequate. If so, do not forget to give favorable publicity to stores which cooperate in protecting our youth. They will deserve bouquets for their help.

If, however, you do not get voluntary co-operation from some distributors, you may have to apply to the legal authorities. Incorporated cities will have a city attorney. Where such legal counsel is unavailable, there will be an officer of the state known by varying terms, such as county attorney, district attorney, or prosecuting attorney.

Avoid a rough, demanding attitude. Are we not to be "wise as serpents, and harmless as doves"? Calmly, but with assurance, present your findings.

The time has come for Christian people to do something to stop this tide of immoral mud, smut, and jeers. Let us know the steps you have taken. It will encourage others. Your action may save lives—both for time and for eternity.

New Church Dedicated at Alton, Illinois

Pastor C. L. Gruver and the congregation of Alton Gospel Tabernacle, Alton, Illinois, rejoice in the completion of their new church building. The seven deacons of the church have served an average of twenty-seven years each. One man has served thirty-five years and the newest member has served twenty-four years.


The church also has a board of ten deaconesses who assist in visitation work and in looking after the sick and needy.

A TOTAL OF 55 MEN REPRESENTING 36 districts of the Assemblies of God registered for the Men's Fellowship seminar, which was held in Springfield, Missouri, on August 30. It was a time of reviewing the existing program of Men's Fellowship and of concerted and intensive planning for the future.

In the history of Men's Fellowship there has never been a national project. Local groups have undertaken projects within their churches, and districts have had some around which all the men of the area have rallied. During the seminar, two national projects were recommended by the men in session.

The first project recommended ties in with the schools of the Assemblies of God and calls for a revolving Men's Fellowship tuition loan fund that would enable capable young people to further their education who would not otherwise be able to do so.

A second project receiving approval was that of a world-wide program of literature distribution through our missionaries.


In both of the suggested projects there are many details that have yet to be worked out, and the plans of implementing and promoting are yet to be made.


There was a strong feeling expressed about the vital need in the lives of men for more active soul winning. It is the hope and plan of the Department of Men's Fellowship to develop a course in soul winning that will be available to Men's Fellowship chapters and will help to meet that need.

Inasmuch as there are many organized MF groups which have not yet been chartered by the national department, it was recommended that all MF directors lay particular emphasis upon the many advantages of being fully chartered. The directors went away from the seminar purposing to encourage this.

After an intensive time of discussions, buzz sessions, and inspirational messages, the men went home determined to heed the motto of Men's Fellowship, "To Enlist All Men."



Traders All

A MAN WHO WITNESSED A MURDER BY HOODLUMS WAS warned not to testify at the trial of the criminals. The witness was frightened, but after an ordeal of spirit he took the stand and told the truth. In retaliation he was assaulted by thugs and almost killed. When the press asked for a statement the injured man said, "I traded a good body for a good conscience. My body will heal. My conscience wouldn't have, had I lied on the witness stand."

Much is said in the Church about giving. The Bible has much to say about it also. But over and over again in the Scriptures there is the implication that righteous people are also traders. They give one thing and they gain another.

"Give!" That is a New Testament command. But the command is identified with the pledge, "...and it shall be given you."

A man said to me, "We should never do anything as Christians expecting a reward." That, of course, is a noble attitude. However, it does not quite agree with the thought of the primitive Church. Jesus was always talking about the rewards for goodness. So were Paul and the other spiritual minds of that era. Paul wrote, "I count all things but loss...." Why? "For the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord." The apostle had traded the lesser for the greater.

Life is a vast trade mart. We are forever trading one thing for another. In the early days in America, people traded one item for another, such as a keg of molasses for a wagon wheel. In our time we exchange money for commodities. But we are all "swappers." We are always getting rid of something and getting something else.

The spiritual-minded man soon learns that to keep some things is to forfeit his inner joy. The cry of the flesh must be silenced for the hymn of angels.

"We are children of God," said Paul, "and if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ." This is a high state. But Paul added more to his sentence: "if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also



glorified together!" We cannot have the "glory" that Paul talked about without giving something for it.

A boy came to me with a broken toy, but when I put out my hand to take it he drew back. He was afraid I would keep the toy. How could he know that I had no use for the bit of metal? I persuaded him to let me have it and I fixed it. But when he received it again, it was not the same toy he had given me. It was a better thing.

And in God's world we are always promised the better of the bargain when we give up the earthly for the heavenly. We are guaranteed against disappointment! "Give!" commanded Jesus. And if we give it will be given back to us—pressed down, heaped up, shaken together and running over! Trade a half-full basket for an over-full one. That is the guaranteed offer of the world's finest Gentleman!

It does not matter that we often come to life's marketplace with small items to trade. We are not told that the wise men who came to the stable offering gold, frankincense, and myrrh were classified according to the value of their gifts. Jesus said the widow's mites were the greatest gift. The small gift we bring may be large in God's economy. The lad with the five loaves and two fishes couldn't have fed five people; but he fed five thousand by surrendering what he had to Christ.

It was said of Jesus that He "endured the cross." He who had been offered a kingship took a gangster's stick. But see the whole statement: "...for the joy that was set before him (He) endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down on the right hand of God." He who appeared to have traded an earthly crown for a humiliating cross actually traded it for a crown of eternal glory.

Those who deal with God cannot lose.
