Thankful for Everything

How often have you given thanks in 1958? Have you thanked God every day for His mercies? Have you praised Him every hour for His goodness? If not, you have fallen behind the New Testament standard of "giving thanks always" and you had better use your Thanksgiving holiday to catch up on your praising!

It is easy to give thanks when the road is smooth, but what shall we do when the going is hard? Shall we grumble or give thanks? The Bible says, "Be filled with the Spirit . . . giving thanks always for all things unto God" (Ephesus 5:18-20).

One of our Assemblies of God families had a narrow escape from death on the night of October 15. Harold Johnson of Levittown, L. I., was driving along Southern State Highway accompanied by his wife and son when suddenly a huge airplane came down out of the hazy darkness and landed on the highway. It was a C-123 troop transport that had run out of fuel. The pilot had seen the lights along the highway and had decided to make an emergency landing on it. He would have hit Brother Johnson's car head on but avoided it by lifting his left wing. The pilot could not avoid three other cars that followed, however. The men in the plane escaped injury but one motorist was killed in the disastrous crash.

When we heard of the incident our first impulse was to thank the Lord for protecting His servants. Then came the thought, "How can we rejoice over the deliverance of some when their deliverance may have caused another to lose his life instead?" But the Bible says, "Giving thanks always for all things," so we do rejoice in the fact that God never makes a mistake. The Lord wants us to give thanks even when tragedy strikes. He wants us all to put our lives in His hands and trust His providential care each day, so that whatever comes, be it loss or gain, sorrow or joy, we can give thanks assured that He is causing all things to work together for our good and for His glory.

Bishop Lancelot Andrewes (who was one of the translators of the King James Version) had a list of topics for which he gave thanks daily. We take it from his *Private Devotions* for Thursday morning, which seems to have been his weekly Thanksgiving day:

"O Lord, my Lord, for my being, life, reason; for nurture, protection, guidance; for country, education, religion; for Thy gifts of nature, fortune, grace; for redemption, regeneration, instruction in sacred truth; for my call from Thee, my repeated calls; for Thy forbearance and long-suffering after great provocations and at numberless times; "For all blessings received, successes granted, good things done; for the use of things present; for Thy promise and my hope of good things to come; "For loving and careful parents; for patient and diligent teachers; benefactors never to be forgotten; congenial companions, sincere friends, sociable neighbors; "For all who have done me good by writings or sermons; by counsel or example; prayers, rebukes, or even injuries:

rebukes, or even injuries; "For all such which I know, which I know not, intended or not intended, remembered, forgotten, done when I wished or wished not, I bless Thee and I will bless, I give thanks to Thee and I will give thanks."

What a lot we have to thank God for, when we stop and think and the providences that seem the least welcome may actually do us the most good.

It was cold and snowy in the hills of Kentucky on Thanksgiving Day in 1937. Gloomy prospects faced the eight Christian workers stationed at Town Flat, Breathitt County, that winter morning.


The flour barrel was practically empty, the lard supply was diminishing fast, and the cupboard was bare. For three or four weeks no funds had been received with which to buy the needed supplies. Even if there had been sufficient funds at this time, there would have been no way to secure food for the Thanksgiving dinner. For the creeks, which were the roads of that day, were flooded making travel to the nearest town twenty-six miles away impossible.

Sober faces and tear-stained eyes expressed the dejected feelings of the workers as they reminisced of loved ones and friends at home. Turkey and all the trimmings no doubt would grace their tables, but here there was no prospect of even a wholesome meal. It was difficult indeed to be grateful on *this* day of all days.

Brother M. A. Mangold (now presbyter of the Mountain Section in the Kentucky District) and his wife were directors of this mission station and its six outlets at this time. Realizing the depressing situation, he tried to encourage the workers as they assembled for morning devotions.

"I know that you're thinking of home and all that would be prepared if you were there," he remarked. "No doubt your hearts are heavy as you face the prospect of doing without a Thanksgiving dinner. However, in the midst of this difficulty, let us give God thanks and praise Him from whom all blessings flow."

To thank God at the prospects of an empty table took faith and grace—but this they did. Together they knelt in prayer and began to praise the Lord. God's Spirit descended upon their waiting hearts in a wonderful way, as wave after wave of His divine glory enveloped them. They became so engrossed in the Lord that they forgot their own needs. Tears of joy re-

placed tears of heartache, and for several hours the Shekinah cloud rested upon them.



The Geophysical Year and

White Horseman

DURING THE CURRENT GEOPHYSICAL Year the tremendous progress in the exploration of the earth and the universe will be documented and evaluated. Scientific leaders are also preparing for a co-ordinated forward move into regions yet unexplored.

The scientific achievements within the last hundred years are astonishing indeed. Man has penetrated into the mysteries of the earth, its structure, evolution, and age. He has mined its treasures, captured its energies, and made them serve him. He has discovered the buildingstones of matter,

THE FOUR HORSEMEN

Various opinions have been offered as to the identity of the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse. Herbert Hoover differs with Brother Steiner as to the meaning of the rider of the white horse and the rider of the red horse.

Writing in a recent issue of the Saturday Review the former President of the U. S., a Quaker who enjoys studying his Bible, takes the view that the white horse means war because the rider has a bow—"and he went forth conquering and to conquer."

Mr. Hoover thinks that the apostle John in writing about the red horse had in mind the idea that we know in modern time as Revolution. The ex-President admits that revolutions may be good or bad but says that "St. John's horseman had no good purpose. . . . We do not allow our imaginations to extend to the idea that St. John was prophesying Communism, even though one is tempted, partly because of the prophetic statement that power was given to the horseman 'to take peace from the world.'"

The human tendency is to make the Bible mean that which is pleasing to the flesh. Whatever our interpretation of the details of the prophecies, there can be no doubt that we are living in the days foretold in the Book of Revelation.

the atomic neutrons and electrons. By splitting the nucleus of the atom he has loosened tremendous new powers. He has soared high above the earth's atmosphere with his measuring instruments and has succeeded in photographing the earth from without.

From the beginning the sun has attracted his searching mind. Today he is well informed concerning this gigantic ball of white glowing gases. A tremendous outflow of electronic energy emanates from inside it into outer space, and a tiny portion of it is sufficient to safeguard the continued existence of our earth and its inhabitants.

The sun, however, with its nine satellites is only a very small point in the great system of stars we call the Milky Way. Already two billion of its stars have been telescopically counted, and its diameter has been calculated as measuring seventy thousand light years. Giant reflector telescopes have searched out myriads of other "world islands" millions of light years beyond the Milky Way. The desire to be free of earth's fetters and to leap into the unfathomable, mysterious space beyond is increasing in intensity.

Now for the Geophysical Year new and far-reaching efforts in this direction have been planned. The two sputniks of last autumn suddenly revealed to an astonished world just how feverishly physicists have been working on the project. Since then other artificial satellites have been thrust into space and are now circling the globe. The attempt to thrust rockets to the moon has already begun.

The immediate aim, however, is the erection of a manned space station six hundred miles above the the surface of the earth. The Russian scientist Feodorew declared that this station would be built within the next three



years. And Wernher von Braun believes that from there a trip to the moon in five days would be a simple matter. Then would follow the attempt to travel to Mars within 260 days.

The Christian who knows that all developments on earth are in accordance with the foreknowledge and providence of God, is asking the question: Has the Geophysical Year with its phantasmic projects any special prophetic significance? Has the Bible predicted an evolution of modern civilization and culture? Is it perhaps another sign of the approaching end of the age and the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ?

In answering these questions, I shall summarize what the Word of God states.

- 1. God has given man rule over the earth. He has given the earth to the children of men (Psalm 115:16). He has commanded man to "replenish the earth and subdue it" (Genesis 1:28). That man has explored land, sea, and air, and discovered and exploited its treasures and powers, is in accord with his original destiny as planned by God.
- 2. Man, however, has taken a wrong direction since the Fall. "And Cain went out from the presence of the Lord" (Genesis 4:16). This trend away from God is clearly evident from the genealogy of Cain, and it has made itself a lasting monument in the tower of Babel.

Men have forgotten that the earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, and that He has only loaned it to them. They "glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations" (Romans 1:21). There is no fear of God, no sense of great responsibility, no thankfulness, no humility. This is why great scientific achievements are constantly abused.

On the whole, the new discoveries are not a blessing but a menace; they bring not happiness but fear. All new inventions must first serve the god of war, so that we are confronted with the fact that mankind in the Geophysical Year trembles for fear of atomic war which could mean the annihilation of the race.

3. God has appointed an end to this situation. He has drawn a line of demarcation between earth and heaven, and He will not permit fallen man to cross it. Of this the story of the tower of Babel gives a lasting warning. "God came down" and put an end to the godless enterprise directed against Him.

And now I want to call your attention to the white horseman in Revelation 6. He is the first of four. Whom or what does this imposing conqueror of the world, with a crown on his head, riding on a white horse and holding a bow in his hand, represent?

The white horseman does *not* represent the triumph of the gospel for he and the three horsemen following him give us a picture of world-wide, powerful and tragic developments at the end of our time, which under the rule of God are permitted for the purpose of judgment. Neither does he represent the Antichrist, although he may help to prepare the way for him.

The white horseman is an unmistakable picture of the conquering march of the human spirit in modern civilization, racing ahead without God and leading into final disaster. He is unable to disassociate himself from the other three horsemen who immediately follow in his footsteps.

This interpretation may startle some, but those who are aware of the scientific and technical progress of the last hundred years will easily recognize it in the striking features of the white horseman.

Sometime ago I came across a passage in the modern book on world history by Professor Pirenne which is a suitable commentary on Revelation 6: 2. He sums up the many revolutionary

discoveries and inventions leading into the twentieth century, beginning with the steam engine which resulted in the covering of the earth with a network of railway lines and the spanning of the seas with transoceanic navigation routes.

Telegraph and telephone erased the distances separating men and peoples from one another. The internal combustion motor, invented in 1875, led to the automobile, the first of which appeared about 1900. The author observed, "All peoples contributed their share to these inventions which had the appearance of the miraculous."

Mentioning the great advances in medicine and surgery, he said, "In all realms science offered herself to serve humanity and to give her the means to rule over matter."

Can you discern in this description

of the evolution of modern civilization the white horseman? Can you interpret now his white color, his crown, his bow? The horse is white, because civilization offers a bright outlook. It pretends to bring enlightenment, but it is a false brightness. It leaves man still in moral and spiritual darkness. It cannot light up the world as long as it does not acknowledge Christ, the only true Light.

The horseman has a crown because he embodies man's dominion over matter. And with his bow he has conquered both distance and outer space. One could easily envision instead of the bow a modern ballistic missile or even a moon rocket.

It is easy to see that with the appearance of the white horseman to-

The Power of Praise

ONE DAY I FELT IMPRESSED OF THE Lord that a young pastor and his wife who were home missions workers in our section needed food. Assured that God was leading, I gathered all of the groceries and foodstuffs I could obtain, loaded my car, and drove to this community about forty miles away.

When I arrived, I found the pioneer pastor and his wife on their knees crying out to God for food and help.

They told me they had been fasting (of necessity) for several days, and had had to keep the children home from school for lack of food to give them.

I told them they had fasted and prayed long enough, that deliverance had come, for I had brought them groceries. After they had prepared the food and eaten, I noted that every time this pastor's wife passed the refrigerator she seemed depressed. I asked her about it and she admitted her feelings.

"Yes," she said. "It's true, I do feel depressed when I go by the re-

frigerator. It has been empty so often, and having nothing to give my family to eat certainly makes me feel badly."

I challenged her to begin praising God every time she walked by the refrigerator. A few days later my wife and I returned to their home, and the young couple greeted us with shouts of "Hallelujah!" and "Praise the Lord."

Then they joyfully related the account of how God had answered prayer by laying it upon the heart of a man in their community to bring them a large supply of frozen meats, vegetables, and fruits, as well as many staple items which altogether had their refrigerator bulging with food.

I have seen them many times since and they declare that, in response to their praises, God has always kept their refrigerator filled.

As the Psalmist said, "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy name, O most High: to shew forth Thy lovingkindness in the morning, and Thy faithfulness every night" (Psalm 92:1, 2).

AN ADDRESS BY ALFRED WEBB,

DAGENHAM, ENGLAND, AT THE

WORLD CONFERENCE OF PENTECOSTAL CHURCHES

My TEXT IS FOUND IN ACTS 5:42
—"And daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ."

Three things are noticeable about this text: they were preaching and teaching Christ every day; they did it inside the temple; and they were equally busy outside, going from house to house.

Our mass evangelism program compares very favorably with that of the Early Church. In fact, there has never been a day in the history of the Church when so many men in the same generation were being used of God to preach to such great crowds of people. It has taken over fifty years to bring to birth approximately ten million Pentecostal believers, excluding those who have gone into other denominations and not counting the many who have been promoted to glory. It would not be difficult to prove that personal evangelism has played far too small a part in the phenomenal growth of the Pentecostal movement.

In recent years the healing ministry alone has been responsible for bringing a multitude to Christ. The same thing happened in the Early Church, but something else of equal importance also happened—the individual believers played their part in the spreading of the gospel. When Saul of Tarsus got his campaign of threatenings and slaughter into action, Acts 8 tells us the result. All the believers at Jerusalem were scattered abroad except the apostles, and they that were so scattered went everywhere preaching the

Word. It was the laymen themselves who spread the good news.

Therein lies the all-important difference between the first- and twentieth-century churches. All the early Christians had a passion for souls. Gibbon the historian says, "It became the most sacred duty of a new convert to diffuse among his friends the inestimable blessing which he had received."

Carlyle said, "How did Christianity rise? Not by institutions and well-arranged systems; it arose in the mystic deep of a man's soul, was spread by simple and individual effort, and flew like hallowed fire from heart to heart."

Such observations prove conclusively that something has gone wrong somewhere along the line. There is danger of believing so much but achieving so little. The Lord Jesus never intended that the apostles should merely go running around with Him, listening to His wonderful sermons and watching His mighty miracles. Right from the very first word to Peter and Andrew it was obvious that He intended them to be soul winners. "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men," He challenged; and they immediately left their nets and followed Him.

The same thing happened to James and John. If these Jews were willing to lay aside business interests (of all people to do such a thing) and were prepared to follow Him of whom they knew so little, how much more should we today who know the Saviour so well. Their example is a biting challenge to us today.

It is time every one of us was awake to the fact that we are only entitled to say we are following Christ when we are making efforts day by day to catch men for Christ. We are not worthy of the name Pentecostal if we are not out winning souls. There is no greater joy on earth than to know you have been responsible for the salvation of lost souls.

I believe that every one of us would be very happy to see a great resurgence of personal evangelism, and I contend that the following reasons explain why individual soul winning is at such a low ebb:

First, Christians generally have adopted the attitude that soul winning is some special ministry-gift to the few. How wrong this is. Personal evangelism does not belong to the parable of the talents with its varying abilities, but to the parable of the pounds with its equal opportunities. How very convenient it is to go smugly on day after day month after month, without saying a word to the lost, but giving the hypocritical excuse that we are not called to that work. With all my heart I believe that every one of us has an eternal responsibility in this matter.

A short time ago in a large town near my home a small boy was missing. Darkness had fallen and he could not be found; immediately hundreds of policemen were drafted to search the area all through the night. The next morning the newspapers carried his photograph on the front page and throughout the day the radio kept the public informed. Indeed the whole na-

tion was moved with pity because one little child was lost. When he had not been found by the weekend the police appealed for volunteers to join the search on Sunday. Fifteen thousand people responded, gladly forfeiting their day of rest to help in finding just one little boy. Although they finally found him in a pool of water, face downward, the army of seekers will forever be thankful that at least they tried to find him. How much more should we who name the name of Christ be actively concerned for the multitude of our fellows who are also lost.

Samuel Chadwick was right when he said, "We cannot all be evangelists but we can all be soul winners. Try it. There is no work so romantic, so enduring. For myself I covet above all gifts to win souls." Individual soul winning must be given number one priority in the program of the local church, otherwise no matter what other activities are carried on it will finally disappear into oblivion.

Let me tell you a true story of two churches which came into being as a result of campaigns held by one of our most eminent Pentecostal evangelists in Britain at the time. In one town an entirely new assembly of 650 people was formed as a result of a one-month campaign. In the other city about fifty people organized the campaign and when it ended the number had grown to 400.

Then began the work of consolidation and follow up. In the first case no program of personal evangelism was introduced, and within the course of a few years the group of 650 dwindled to nothing and the church was closed. The story in the second case happily was just the opposite. The pastor had a tremendous passion for souls and in-


fused that love into the new converts as well. The result was that a large percentage of the congregation went out into the highways and byways compelling the people to come in. Souls have been saved in the church and it has grown numerically because it has remained active in personal evangelism.

It has always been a surprise to me that so many Christians fail to take advantage of God's offer in James' epistle—"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." How very merciful God is to us. He offers all the wisdom we need for the task.

Second, we who are ministers have not stressed the importance of soul winning; so often it is just an after-thought instead of something to be earnestly sought after. There is a great need of teaching a further initial evidence of the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. Let us stand as clearly as ever for speaking with tongues, but let us state with equal emphasis the truth that "ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me..."

This great fact needs to be stated right from the very first, and in this respect the evangelist has a unique opportunity, for in the pure virgin soil of the new convert's mind he can do much to mold the right vision. The pastor and teacher also have a large responsibility here. Spurgeon said, "Every Christian should be bound apprentice to Jesus...to learn the trade of a Saviour; if you yourself are saved...the work is but half done until you bring others to Christ."

Dare we allow modern cults that deny the very personality of the Holy Spirit to beat us at the task of going from door to door with our message

of life? There are some people who are willing to be influenced by those who will go out after them. They will only be won for Christ through door-to-door evangelism. God help us to rise to the challenge. The only hope of continued blessing in the local church is through personal evangelism. The churches without it will ultimately pass into oblivion.

Third, many have been unwilling to suffer the stigma involved. Often this is because of the fanatical extremes shown by some workers. It can be embarrassing where some have spoiled their opportunity, but no matter how others fail it is our duty to pursue this work until we succeed.

Fourth, the majority of Christians are terrified at the thought of witnessing to the ungodly. How true it is that "the fear of man bringeth a snare." When the apostles felt that way they prayed, "Grant unto thy servants that with all boldness they may speak thy word." A confession of lips as well as of life is required. We

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Practical Thanksgiving

not be among us. Everything we have of spirituality and progress began with those who went before us.

Twenty-five years ago I was at a district council. One of the faithful pioneers had gone to be with the Lord, leaving his wife and family in great material need. Having no funds with which to rent a home, they were living in a house partly destroyed by fire. The brethren raised at that council enough to pay rent for a simple home for that family for the ensuing year.

At a council during the depression was an aged minister who was trying to build a two-room cabin for his aged wife and himself on a piece of land lent by a friend. To assist him, an offering of almost eighty dollars was received. When it was turned over to him, with almost a bewildered look he said: "This is the biggest offering I ever received in my life!" Later I saw him again and he was so happy that his wife and he had a shelter for their declining days. It was not much, but it meant much to one who had pioneered, living on the scant income received in those days.

An old couple was seeking to build a simple place of abode. Learning that they had the building up except for a door and windows, the executives at headquarters provided a check for these. When the check arrived the minister was in conversation with some other men. Telling of the incident later he said: "I couldn't help it, I had to cry. Then I turned to the men and said, 'See this check. This is the kind of an organization I belong to!" His heart was overflowing with gratitude and pride in the fellowship which had proved faithful to him.

It has now come time for us to show our love once more for our older ministers who are still living. They have weathered many a storm and have sacrificed as some of us may not have had to do. They are among those who "labored," sowing precious seed; we are among those who have "entered into their labors."

If I am correctly informed half of our churches throughout the country have made no contribution for our aged ministers in the last three years. Let us all unite this Thanksgiving in providing for those for whom nothing was prepared in the days when they gave their all for the gospel which we so richly enjoy. Your Questions

ANSWERED BY ERNEST S. WILLIAMS

What did Jesus mean when He said, "No man hath ascended up to heaven, but he that came down from heaven, even the Son of man which is in heaven" (John 3:13)? How could He be in heaven when He was here on earth?

My interpretation is that, while Jesus was on earth, He nevertheless enjoyed continued and heavenly fellowship with the Father in heaven.

Is it wrong to sell corn to the elevators when we do not know whether it may be used for whiskey?

If the one who sells the corn does not know where it will go he need not worry concerning this. Paul has shown that, while Christians are to be free from doing evil, in the world they must do business with those who do not have such conscientious convictions. "I wrote unto you in an epistle not to company with fornicators: yet not altogether with the fornicators of this world, or with the covetous, or extortioners, or with idolaters; for then must ye needs go out of the world" (1 Corinthians 5:9, 10).

Is Romans 7 a description of true Christian experience?

In the fourth and fifth chapters of Romans, Paul set forth the fact that salvation is entirely through our Lord Jesus Christ, with no possibility for man to add anything to this merit. Christ is our righteousness, and he who is justified by faith is declared righteous wholly upon faith in the merits of Christ and His atonement.

In chapter seven Paul showed that before grace came we were united to the law—the law had dominion over us. Through seeking to be justified by the law we were only bound more deeply in the consciousness of the evil in our natures.

Then came deliverance (chapter 8). Through Calvary we now are dead to the law but alive unto Christ. Through faith in Christ there is deliverance; we are no longer under condemnation, for "the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death." We no

longer look to the law, seeking by human strength to live in obedience to God; we look to the indwelling Holy Spirit, "that the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit."

Some believers live more than they ought to in Romans 7. This is either because they are unwilling to give their lives wholly to the Lord, or because they depend too largely on self-effort. They need to move into Romans 8 and trust Christ for victory.

Can a person backslide overnight?

A person could backslide in a minute if he turned his back on the Lord Jesus. Usually, however, backsliding is a gradual process. It begins by occasional carelessness in little things. But God does not want any to backslide, and if they will continue to trust in Christ they never will. They may be severely tempted and they may at times fail, but they need not despair. They must remember that they are children of God's love and will ever be so as they seek to do His will. See Romans 8:31-35.

How can the prince of Tyre (Ezekiel 28) refer to Satan?

The account at first speaks of the king of Tyre, who was undoubtedly made successful and filled with pride by the prince of darkness. At verse 11 the account evidently goes beyond the earthly prince and describes the being by whom the earthly prince had been animated. This being had enjoyed great divine blessings, even being an anointed cherub (v. 14), perfect in his ways until iniquity was found in him (v. 15). At verse 18 the scripture seems again to talk of the prince of Tyre, still activated by the fallen one who had once been the anointed cherub.

STORE TITHES SALES AT THANKSGIVING

A department store in Nashville, Tenn., will continue this year a oneday event in which ten per cent of all its gross sales will go to the churches or synagogues designated by the buyers.

The event is planned as an annual "tithe all sales" day which will occur the Monday preceding Thanksgiving.

Fred Harvey, president of the department store, notified around 950 churches and synagogues of the plan by personal letter.

STILL GRATEFUL AFTER 127 YEARS

On a storm-wrecked ship off the coast of Maryland on September 17, 1831, some 40 German families vowed that if they were saved, the day would always be considered a holy day by themselves and their future generations.

This past Sept. 17, a hundred twenty-seven years later, descendants of those families went to Trinity Lutheran Church in Jenera, near Findlay, Ohio, for their annual giving of thanks.

The original immigrants were from Darmstadt, Germany. They came to America to settle on farm land set aside for them at Jenera. After the shipwreck, they were without tools and other necessities of farming and had to work their way across Pennsylvania and Ohio.

NEW NAVY CHAPLAIN REPORTS

Another Assemblies of God minister has reported for active duty as a Navy chaplain. Making a total of three, this now gives our denomination a full quota of Navy chaplains on active duty.

The new chaplain is Lt. (JG) Marvin E. Snyder. He enrolled in the Navy Chaplains' School at Newport, Rhode Island. After completing this schooling he expected to be assigned to a U. S. Naval installation or U. S. Marine base in the continental United States.

Our other two Navy chaplains are Stanford E. Linzey and David W. Plank. Brother Linzey is attached to the Naval Training Center at San Diego. Chaplain Plank is currently on duty in the Pacific with a Destroyer Squadron.

The Assemblies of God currently has sixteen chaplains on active duty. Three serve in the Navy, five in the Air Force, and eight in the Army. The Marines are served by Navy chaplains.

PENTAGON WOULD CLASSIFY "MOON SHOOTS" WITH EXTRACTING OXEN FROM DITCH

J. Douglas Gibson, pastor of the First Methodist church of Conyers, Georgia, was pleased when he learned the second attempt to "shoot the moon" was made on a Saturday. He had lodged a vigorous protest, on behalf of his congregation, over the fact that the first "moon shot" was made on a Sunday.

But the Pentagon is reserving the right to launch the next "moon rocket" on a Sunday if it so desires. Roy W. Johnson, spokesman for the Defense Department, told the Georgia pastor that the rockets must be launched when

the moon is in the right position and atmospheric conditions are ideal. "If all conditions are met on a Sunday, we must proceed," the research director declared, "asking the Lord's forgiveness for this rude imposition on His day."

Schools

"RELEASED-TIME" REQUEST REJECTED

Directors of the Boyertown Area Schools near Reading, Pa., rejected a request by the Good News Club to teach the Bible on a "released-time" basis; that is, during school hours. The board acted on the advice of its lawyer who ruled that religious instruction may not be given to public school pupils during school hours, whether on or off the school grounds.

BILLY GRAHAM LINKS CRIME WITH BANS ON RELIGION IN SCHOOLS

Evangelist Billy Graham, in the midst of a four-week crusade in his old home town, declared that bans against religious teaching in public schools "take God and morals out of the classroom and reap a harvest of crime, perversion, and immorality." However, he said that in spite of this

Israel

DESERT BLOSSOMS AS THE ROSE

A Jewish newspaper reports that Israel has special reason to sing Hallelujah this *Succoth* (feast of thanksgiving). The reason for rejoicing is that the family of the *ethrog* (the citrus fruit) has earned Israel this year an income of 50 million dollars.

Extension of the water pipeline from the Yarkon River to the Negev, with the aid of Israel Bond dollars, will bring thousands of additional acres under cultivation, not only for the citrus fruits, but for many other farm products. Israel's farm exports last year of peanuts, olive oil, vegetables and flowers also showed increases.

RAM'S HORN SOUNDED AT WAILING WALL FIRST TIME IN A DECADE

The Shofar (ram's horn) was sounded on Yom Kippur at the Wailing Wall this year for the first time in more than a decade.

Worshipers in Jerusalem straining their eyes toward the Old City for a glimpse of Jewry's most sacred shrine heard the blasts of the shofar at the close of their New Year services. There was an awed silence until the word passed that the "phantom shofar" was sounded for a group of Jewish soldiers among British troops stationed in Jordan.

Significance of this event is found in the fact that the Wailing Wall is where the Jews assembled on Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement) to pray for the restoration of Israel. For ten years the Jews have been unable to get closer than Mt. Zion to the wall.

"CHARIOT WHEELS" TO SOUND IN ASKELON

The land of the Hittites of Old Testament times is being invaded again. This time it is the American Kaiser Company rather than Samson or the Iews.

The American company, assemblers of Jeep cars and Renault cars and trucks, has made plans to open three new factories in Israel (in partnership with local companies) to make metal-

with local companies) to make metalworking machinery, gears, and spare parts for automotive equipment.

Three plants, all to be located near Askelon (land of the Hittites), will be financed by American, Israeli and French capital.

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

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Nothing is ever done by chance in the kingdom of God. God's call of workers into the ministry is never a fortuitous occurrence. That "all may hear" was the purpose of Christ's coming. No partiality is expressed in the invitation of the Spirit: "Let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely" (Revelation 22:17).

God's desire that every creature should hear the gospel is reflected in the testimony of Paul, "We teach everyone we can" (Colossians 1:28, Phillips Translation). To manifest this loving aim. God chose Livingstone to tell the Africans, Wesley to revive the English, Luther to revolutionize the formalism of Germany, David Brainerd to die for the American Indians. But the manifestation of God's love for every individual did not terminate in past centuries. His tender hand is still touching lives. His gentle voice continues to plead, "Preach the Word."

In His all-inclusive plan, God has not overlooked calling workers to minister to the deaf. For a time it seemed that the language barrier of the deaf would exclude them from the gospel. Just a few generations ago, deaf persons in many places were not even regarded as human beings in the full sense of the word. They were chained to posts in asylums or left to rot in dungeons. In fact, the ancient Spartans even threw them over cliffs. Domestic animals were considered more important. The development of the Sign Language and finger spelling, together with intelligent teaching of speech effected one of the most dramatic transformations in human history. For the first time the deaf could master language and contend with their environment. Through the use of this language of signs, the deaf are "hearing" the

elderly man attended our services. We knew nothing about his personal life. He was almost blind, but walked from Kansas City, Missouri, Sunday after Sunday to attend the services. Spiritual and numerical progress has been evident in his deaf group. Souls in the "silent world" have been saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. Mr. Bratton reports that they have an earnest desire to study God's Word. Last month five of the group completed a Pentecostal correspondence course which was conducted in the church.

AUCAS FIND CHRIST

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN THE Ecuador jungle indicate that the martyrdom of the five missionaries is bearing fruit among the Aucas who killed them. Ten Auca Indians have walked from their jungle village to visit the Arajuno mission station—the base for the first Auca contact.

They were led by three Auca women who, after living with the missionaries for many months, had returned to their village to tell how the "foreigners" had befriended them. They brought further details of the killing of the five missionaries along with increased evidence that the Aucas want friendship. As the strongest friendship token the group brought with them a Quichua Indian girl whom they had kidnapped less than a year ago.

Among the group was Dayuma who fled the tribe many years ago as a young girl and who more recently has been converted to Christ while serving as language informant to Rachel Saint, sister of the martyred Nate Saint. During her three-week reunion with her people Dayuma gave her testimony and told them the gospel story of God's love for them.

On hand to meet the seven women and three children were Betty Elliott and Marj Saint. They were joined the following day by Rachel Saint and Dr. Wilfred Tidmarsh, veteran Ecuadorian missionary who has been manning Arajuno for nearly two years.

After the martyrdom of the five, Arajuno was renamed "Chapana," a local word for "waiting." The agreed-on strategy of waiting for the Aucas to make the next move first paid off in November, 1957, when three women appeared at a Quichua Indian village in the area. Two of them decided to stay. The third one, Dowa, returned to her own village where the recent visitors report she made this statement: "Probably they've eaten them by now."

This remark cost the life of a Quichua Indian man. Seeking revenge against presumed cannibalism, the Aucas ambushed a Quichua couple on the edge of their village, spearing the man and carrying his wife captive. Right after that, Missionary Aviation Fellowship pilots witnessed the first signs

of Auca hostility while making periodic gift drops over their village.

For ten months the other two women, Mintaka and Mankamu, lived with Betty Elliott and served as language informants. Mintaka is one of the three Aucas who visited the five men of "Palm Beach." When Rachel Saint returned from furlough with her informant, Dayuma, the three Auca women began to speak of going back to their village together.

On September 3 the three women set out from Chapana while the missionaries prayed. Flights made over the Auca village netted little satisfaction concerning the safety of the three women.

On September 25, a Quichua girl came to Chapan from an outlying village. Betty Elliott asked if she had heard anything about the Auca women. Her casual reply was, "Oh, yes, they're over at our house." After further questioning she indicated that they were now coming to Chapana. Betty and Marj set out for the village. But just as they reached the end of the airstrip, they heard a song wafting from the jungle. It was "Jesus loves me," in English! A moment later Dayuma appeared leading the other Aucas. The Quichua girl had already been left with her family in the outlying village; there was every evidence that she had been treated kindly by the Aucas.

Reports brought back by the three

MISSIONARIES NOW LIVING AMONG AUCA SAVAGES

Latest news from Eucador is that the wife and sister of two missionary martyrs are now living among the Auca Indians. They are:

Betty Elliott, widow of James Elliott, who is accompanied by her three-yearold daughter Valerie.

Miss Rachel Saint, sister of the missionary pilot, Nate Saint.

The Aucas invited the American women to live with the tribe, and built houses for them. The missionaries are equipped with a two-way short-wave transistor radio and keep in contact with the Missionary Aviation Fellowship base at the edge of the jungle. The missionary planes fly over them regularly and drop food to them.

women not only shed further light on how the five men were killed, but very possibly paved the way for further friendly contact.

There is evidence now that "George" may have been the leader of the killing party. George has subsequently been killed. One of his wives was among those who came to Chapana for this visit.

Apparently George was vying with a husky Auca named Dabu for the leadership. Dabu told Dayuma that he did not approve of the killing. She quoted Dabu as saying: "Do you remember how the tree was cut down at the Cururay Beach? I cut that down. I thought to myself: more foreigners will come and they will be killed in the same way. So I won't let the airplane land. Ever since they killed those nice foreigners I have lived by myself with just women."

MAF pilots confirm that an Auca man answering this description does live in a separate place as described. Dabu, who apparently now has some leadership among these Aucas, went on to tell Dayuma that he cried when he heard that the five foreigners had been killed.

Mintaka and Mankamu assured the villagers that the foreigners did not want to eat them. They told their friends: "Why did you think they would eat anyone? They think you are the people-eaters." As they continued to tell about the "nice foreigners" with whom they had lived, the villagers commented on the killing of the five: "Now we see that we did that for nothing; it was only because George lied."

In addition to telling her people the gospel story that had given her new life, Dayuma also tried to teach them elementary sanitation and offered them worm medicine she had with her.

Ecuadorian missionaries point out that while these recent events mark a big step forward in reaching the Aucas for Christ, there still exists a great need for prayer. As Nate Saint put it, "It is no small thing to try to bridge between the twentieth century and the Stone Age."

Rolling Hills district and show you people who have so much more than I that you'd think I didn't want anything.'

Candy's mother felt defeated, for Candy was right. True, there were those who had less than they, but there were others who had a great deal more. So she went on trying to get all she could for Candy-and never satisfying her for very long at a time.

Candy tried to tell her mother some of the things for which she was thank-



Monday, November 24

Read: Psalm 148

Learn: "Praise the name of the Lord: for his name alone is excellent; his glory is above the earth and heaven" (Psalm 148:13).

For the Parent: This is a psalm of praise to God. Through this Thanksgiving week, why not have each member of the family each day name one thing for which he is thankful. Stress the importance of praising God for all His benefits and goodness to us. This psalm emphasizes how nature praises God, and how we too should praise Him and honor His name.

Question Time: Why should the things listed in the first four verses of this psalm praise God? (v. 5) Why should we praise Him? (vv. 11-14)

Tuesday, November 25

Read: Psalm 149

Learn: "The Lord taketh pleasure in his people: he will beautify the meek with salvation" (Psalm 149:4).

For the Parent: Again today have each member list something for which he is thankful. This psalm emphasizes praising God with song. Let your family altar be a praise time using choruses and songs of praise. Stress the value of being joyful in the Lord, and show that the Lord takes pleasure in His people. God has done so much for us that it should not be difficult for us to praise Him.

Question Time: In what was Israel to rejoice and be joyful? (v. 2) What will God give to the meek? (v. 4)

Wednesday, November 26

Read: 2 Timothy 1:3-7; 3:12-17

Learn: "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6).

For the Parent: (Additional material on "Witnessing in the Home" will be found on Sunday's Lesson page.) Timothy was the product of a godly home. Emphasize: (1) the example of faith found in his mother and grandmother, 1:5; (2) Paul's reminder for Timothy to continue practicing the things he had learned at home, 3:14; (3) the importance of God's Word in training, 3:15.

Question Time: What kind of "spirit" has God given to us? (1:7) What is a purpose of the Scriptures? (3:15) What are other purposes of them? (3:16, 17)

Thursday, November 27

THANKSGIVING DAY

Read: Psalm 150

Learn: "Let everything that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord" (Psalm 150:6).

For the Parent: Emphasize today the true meaning of Thanksgiving Day—not a day merely of feasting and fellowship but a day to express our sincere appreciation to God for all His blessings. This psalm is another psalm of praise, the great climax to the Book of Psalms. Point out the various ways we can praise God, emphasizing that the important thing is that we do praise Him.

Question Time: Who should praise God? (v. 6) Why? (v. 2) Where and how should we praise Him? (vv. 1-5)

Friday, November 28

Read: Matthew 7:21-29 (Sunday's Lesson for Juniors)

Learn: "He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me: and he that loveth me shall be loved of my Father, and I will love him" (John 14:21).

For the Parent: This lesson deals with obedience to God and His laws. Stress this from this passage and from Acts 5:29 and Ephesians 2:2. Point out that we are to obey God's laws. Have various ones read: Psalm 19:7; 119:165; Joshua 1:8; Heb. 8:10; John 14:23. Discuss these as they relate to obeying God's laws.

Question Time: To what did Jesus liken those who heard His sayings and did them? and those who didn't do them?

Saturday, November 29

Read: Mark 4:35-41 (Sunday's Lesson for Primaries)

Learn: "What manner of man is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?" (Mark 4:41).

For the Parent: Have the group review the story of how Jesus stilled the storm. From it emphasize: (1) the dangerous situation, v. 37; (2) the great fear of the disciples that they would perish, v. 38; (3) Jesus has power over nature, v. 39; (4) He urged them to have greater faith, v. 40. Stress that Jesus is able to calm the storms of our lives as we trust Him.

Question Time: Where was Jesus when the storm arose? What did the disciples say to Him and what did He do?

Sunday's Lesson

WITNESSING IN THE HOME

Sunday School Lesson for November 30, 1958

2 Тімотну 1:3-7; 3:12-17

We may put it down as an incontestable fact that the breakdown of our modern civilization is a direct result of the breakdown of the modern home. What our homes are the nation will be. It cannot be otherwise. An overwhelmingly large percentage of those ministers, missionaries, and other Christians who have exerted a powerful spiritual influence upon our world have been the products of homes in which the parents demonstrated the reality and power of the Lord Jesus Christ. Such was the case with Timothy, a product of a godly home.

TIMOTHY'S FAITH

"I thank God . . . when I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee." Paul is speaking. He points out:

- (1) The quality of Timothy's faith. It was unfeigned, that is, genuine, dwelling in his heart and not merely in his head; the result of a definite personal experience with God.
- (2) The background of his faith. "Which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice." Timothy's faith, character, and usefulness in the ministry could be traced to the influence of a godly mother and grandmother.
- (3) The responsibility of faith. "Wherefore I put thee in remembrance that thou stir up the gift of God, which is in thee by the putting on of my hands. For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." Those who have had the greatest spiritual privileges have the greatest responsibilities. It was the duty of Timothy to fan into flame this faith which dwelt in him, to use it in exercising any and all spiritual gifts and abilities which he possessed. He was at this time pastor of the large church in Ephesus. Due to his youthfulness and a natural timidity there was the possibility that he would fail to exercise the spiritual initiative and leadership which would be necessary for progress and development in the church. Thus Paul sought to encourage him by reminding him of his spiritual privileges and blessings.

TIMOTHY'S HOME

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived. But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them." Christians will suffer persecution. The forces of evil will increase as the endtime draws nearer. But Paul points out the way of victory, reminding Timothy of several things:

(1) Godly example in the home. Says Paul, in effect, "Remember, Timothy, the godly life which you saw demonstrated before you while you were growing up, the daily lives of your grandmother and your mother. Remember how real God was to you as you watched their lives." Are we

making Christ real to those who live in our homes by the manner in which we conduct ourselves?

- (2) Godly teaching in the home. "From a child thou hast known the holy scriptures." The Jewish home was strongly religious in character. Its aim was to stimulate the child's conscience and to engrave upon it the Law of God. As soon as he was old enough to talk every Jewish boy was made to commit to memory the "Shema" or Jewish creed consisting of nineteen verses taken from Deuteronomy 6:4-9; 11:13-21 and Numbers 15:37-41. Next he was taught the Ten Commandments and how to pray. The many sacred days in the Jewish religious year provided opportunity at home for further religious instruction. If religion played such a prominent part in the Jewish home, ought it not to receive at least as much emphasis in a Christian home today? Do the words in Deuteronomy 6:6, 7 have no application to us today? In view of Paul's advice in Ephesians 6:4 that we bring up our children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," should we place the responsibility for all religious training of the child upon the church and Sunday School?
- (3) The Bible in the home. Study 2 Timothy 3:15-17 very carefully. From childhood Timothy had known the Holy Scriptures. Are our children learning them at home? Since it is by the Word that we obtain salvation and grow in the Lord, ought we not give the Word due prominence in our homes by means of family reading and family prayers? "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." One cannot claim the promise here unless one fulfills the condition; namely, the giving of spiritual training in the home.





WITH CHRIST





Fifteenth Birthday for Worldwide Bible Reading

The mother, whose tearful voice relayed this message over the phone and then hung up before the Bible Society Secretary was able to get her name, did not realize that this letter would begin a program now known as Worldwide Bible Reading, sponsored by the American Bible Society.

"THE BOOK THAT LIVES," the theme for this year, gives added meaning to the program because it was just fifteen years ago that the longing of this unknown marine for spiritual fellowship on Guadalcanal started a chain reaction of Bible reading that now reaches millions of people in fifty different countries.

Each year a packet containing an attractive poster, a brochure, a bookmark of Bible reading, an information sheet and a sample bulletin is sent to every minister in the United States and to chaplains in the churches and on military posts for use on Universal Bible Sunday, the climax of this program. Since its inception, the program has followed an upward curve in co-operation from the churches and enthusiastic coverage by the religious and secular press. A cautious estimate reveals a coverage by approximately 5,000 news-



One of the most gratifying results of this Bible reading emphasis is its growth around the world. Thirty-six thousand posters and a million bookmarks were shipped from the United States to all the foreign agencies and sister Societies. In addition to this, thousands of the posters and bookmarks were printed on the field.

In Thailand, for example, the Bangkok municipal government permitted the display of the Bible posters in public places. Many leading bookstores and newsstands had Bible displays, and the program was announced on radio and television. Two leading newspapers, Siam Roth (Thai) and Bangkok Post (English) carried the Bible reading lists in significant places.

Bible Day in Brazil has become a significant event. In Sao Paulo, in a Bible Day mass meeting, thirty thousand people blocked part of the eightlane thoroughfare passing through the city. Two planes of the Brazilian air force scattered two million leaflets advertising the meeting. Music was provided by a 200-piece band from the Assemblies of God and a quartette from the Russian Baptist Church. At the singing of the closing hymn, thousands of Bibles were held high in praise to God.

And so in Japan, Korea, India, the Congo, Liberia, Egypt, Greece and many other countries, Bible reading was emphasized. From person to person, family to family, friend to friend—wherever there is love and concern for others and the Living Word—the little bookmark continues to be a bond of



love, a declaration of faith and a circulating testimony that the Bible lives in the lives of people everywhere.

For a number of years our Assemblies of God people have helped make the Bible "The Book That Lives" by their financial support of The American Bible Society. Offerings from individuals and churches again this year will assure the continuation of this tremendous worldwide Bible reading program. cannot excuse ourselves by saying we live a Christian life and that is more eloquent than words. Let us consider the great possibilities of individual soul winning. If, beginning this year, 10,000 Christians would each win one soul a year, and each soul won would do the same, and so on, the whole world would be evangelized by 1979. Instead it has been estimated by one competent to judge that an average

church of 400 members adds only twelve real decisions per year. In other words, one Christian in every thirty-three wins a soul for Christ every year, and this takes in the work done by all the pastors as well.

METHODS IN SOUL WINNING
The simple old-fashioned methods
are as effective as ever.

Prayer prepares the one who prays, giving him wisdom and power for the right approach, and it also affects the one prayed for. A godly mother came to the local church prayer meeting and poured out her heart to God for the salvation of her son. The fact that he was on his way to a lost eternity gripped her soul and in great anguish of spirit she pleaded with God to save him. In a very short time this fine young man was gloriously saved and filled with the Holy Ghost.

Charles Finney was right when he said that one of the most powerful weapons for anyone's conversion is to hear the prayer of a loved one for his salvation.

A knowledge of God's Word will equip the soul winner with the right remedy for the sinner.

Door-to-door evangelism is both a challenge and a responsibility. The Early Church did this and we must do it. We must organize the church for the task.

Private conversation brings its own opportunities for witnessing. We must acquire by constant practice the ability

to converse with people in a winsome manner about the thing that should concern them more than anything else on earth. We must refuse to be in bondage and fear about it.

We need a compassion that moves us to tears for the lost. Jesus wept over Jerusalem and we too must weep over our cities. Let Christian character find its best expression in our grave concern for the lost.



Real thanks comes from the heart. Thanks from the lips may be polite, but it is the heartfelt thanks that rings true and warms the heart of the one who receives it.

Moreover, gratitude is the test of character. Shakespeare tells us that the winter wind is not so unkind as man's ingratitude. The wind may chill the body but ingratitude chills the soul.

Of course there may be some who say, "I have nothing for which to be thankful." Such a one is poor indeed, for these words flow only from a poverty-stricken heart—unhappy, bitter, jealous, covetous. Did you ever notice that it is the poor who are often more thankful than the rich? The reason is that they count their blessings. They have God's sun and air, health and life, and loved ones; the things that make life rich indeed. Thanks is not measured by the amount of our pos-

sessions. It is the man with a thankless heart who is poor, and it's the man with a thankful heart who is rich.

If, when we are offered a gift, we snatch it out of the hand of the giver and say, "That's mine; it belongs to me anyway," there is no gratitude there. How often a child does that, and "a thankless child is sharper than a serpent's tooth." Yet that is what countless thousands do toward their heavenly Father—they count every earthly blessing plus all the beauty of this world as theirs by right.

Robert E. Speer told of a boy brought up in a Christian home where family worship and grace at meals were the common order. On being invited to a pal's house for dinner where everyone pitched in and ate as soon as they were seated, the lad looked up and said, "Around our house we always give thanks and then eat. But you are just like my dog, Fido. He just eats!" How many there are who live on the animal level.

Once again our nation is summoned to observe its national day of Thanksgiving. We do not thank a thing, nor a law of nature, nor luck; we thank a Person. We do not thank America; we thank God for America. Whether it be on the bleak New England shores of the Pilgrims, or in the dark days of the Civil War when Abraham Lincoln called our nation to give thanks, or today, how much there is to be thankful for to Him! Yet when our God looks down upon this nation which we want Him to bless, I wonder if He sees us snatching everything out of His hand and boasting of our own sufficiency; or does He see us in His courts giving thanks? How much do we warm His heart? How much can we expect His mercy and blessing?

Then above all this we hear the clear call, "Thanks be unto God for his unspeakable gift," the Lord Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 9:15). We can't be thankful for that which we refuse to accept. Our hearts will never know the thrill of that joy if we have not accepted Him. Christ has come, the gift of God's love, freely offered to all, and if our hearts are not warmed with gratitude it is because we have not received Him.

If you have not accepted Christ as your Saviour, do it now. As you confess your sins and forsake them, Christ will come into your life as Lord and Saviour. You cannot earn this; it is a gift, and all you can do is accept it. When you have accepted God's most precious gift, the gift of eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord, you will find true thanksgiving welling up in your heart.

time of the end has come upon the world. With the year 1914 and since, the other horsemen have also come upon the scene. Civilization could not prevent the tragedy of two world wars (the red horseman), and it cannot solve the problem of world peace now. It is not able to stop the impending world economic crisis (the black horseman). It cannot hinder the powers of disease and death to kill in the last days by the hundreds of millions, perhaps through an atomic war, or as a result of the radioactive infection of the earth's atmosphere and surface (the pale horseman).

Thus the Geophysical Year finds the white horseman rapidly reaching the climax of his race. This is another outstanding sign that the end of this dispensation is at hand.

When a jet plane at supersonic speed breaks the sound barrier, it causes a terrifying thundering noise. Scientists



have not yet discovered the real cause of this sinister phenomenon which jars the body of the plane as well as the nerves of the pilot. To me this thundering is a symbolic sign that God is calling our generation to a halt in its mad rush toward boundless heights and distances. It seems like a cry of protest from violated nature. Or is it even an alarm sounded by invisible heavenly watchmen at the threshold between heaven and earth?

Professor Carl F. Weizsacker, one of the leading nuclear physicists in Germany (whose name has become world renowned because of his famous "Appeal of Gottingen" of last year, as well as by his lectures on atomic energy and the atomic age), has given a very remarkable testimony. Speaking to the theologians, and also, as he puts it, "to every one who is of the faith which the theologians are only to interpret," he uttered the following words:

"The truth which is conserved in this faith is, according to my conviction, the only one which exceeds the truth of science, on which the atomic age is founded. The truth which the Christian Church has kept, reaches—this I believe—deeper than modern rationalism. When rational planning shall fail, men and women will without a doubt again turn to it."

What a fine and true confession by a respected leader in the modern scientific world! What a challenge to all who believe in the Bible! In the midst of an age which has arrived at the brink of self-destruction and which is groping in moral darkness in spite of the light of civilization, we as Christians are challenged to witness to the truth of the Word of God. We know that the end is near. The Lord Jesus Christ is coming very soon.

This fact must pierce all our hearts. It must awaken every sleeper. The question comes to every one: Are you ready for His coming? You should be and you can! The very Lord who is standing at the door of time is also standing at the door of your heart. He is still the Saviour. Still He offers His salvation to every one who accepts-forgiveness of sin, peace with God, and eternal life through the blood He shed on Calvary. He is even now very near. Can you realize how He extends His hand to you? Will you reach out by faith and take it, and pray, "Lord I want to be saved. Forgive my sins and save me now.'

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

Think on the Mercies

A GOOD WAY TO GET OUT OF A HARD place is by praise! Grumbling will not help; sighing will not help; complaining will not help—but thanksgiving to God will! Praise does change things, and it will bring us out of the darkness into the light.

"By him therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving praise to his name" (Heb. 13:15).

The day in which we are living is a peculiar one. On every hand we find suspicion, bewilderment, and confusion. Governments are tottering, and nations watch each other with mutual distrust and fear. No wonder that some people are tempted to become discouraged and fainthearted; but even in the face of these facts the Christian can, and should, offer praise to his heavenly Father. And this brings us to our first thought.

WHOM SHALL WE PRAISE?

Praise must have an object. Mere optimism without cause is folly. This would be no better than a fool's paradise so common to the drunkard who attempts to drown all his trouble in forgetfulness. Mere hopefulness and a denial of the existence of difficulties will not help. Denying a thing does not alter the fact—and it may bring us ruin. Yes, our troubles are real;

but on the other hand, God is also real! And God is bigger than all our troubles. He it is who should be the object of our praise.

"Let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God." His love, His grace, His power, His knowledge and wisdom are infinite and unchangeable; and even though there is darkness, danger, and disaster in the world today, He knows all about it. His Word has predicted it, and His Word also gives us ample assurance of His presence and help in this hour. So let us take courage and thank God.

WHO SHOULD PRAISE?

"Let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God." All of us should praise God at this Thanksgiving season; for no matter what our lot has been there are others who have fared worse; and no matter how severe may have been the test there are countless things for which we can all render thanks.

Are you familiar with the 100th Psalm set to meter? It is very refreshing.

"All people that on earth do dwell, Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice; Him serve with fear, His praise forthtell, Come ye before Him and rejoice.

"The Lord ye know is God indeed;
Without our aid He did us make;
We are His flock, He doth us feed,
And for His sheep He doth us take.

"Oh, enter then His gates with praise Approach with joy His court unto; Praise, laud, and bless His name always, For it is seemly so to do.

"For why? The Lord our God is good,"
His mercy is forever sure;
His truth at all times firmly stood,
And shall from age to age endure.

"Praise God from whom all blessings flow, Praise Him all creatures here below; Praise Him above, ye heav'nly host, Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost."

How Should WE PRAISE?

"Let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God...the fruit of our lips."

We need no longer present a burnt offering on the altar to express our appreciation to God for all His benefits; we can just open our lips and offer a sacrifice of praise.

Billy Bray, the Cornish preacher, was a constant visitor among the sick, needy, and dying. On one occasion he was sitting by the bedside of a Christian brother who had been always very backward and reticent, and afraid to confess openly his faith in Christ. Now, however, he was filled with extreme joy. Turning to Billy, whose happy smile and sunny words had done so much to produce this joy, he said, "Oh, Mr. Bray, I wish I had the strength to shout the 'Glory' I feel in my soul."

And Billy Bray wisely answered, "What a pity it was thee didn't shout 'Glory!' when thee hadst the power."

We must not wait until we are dying to praise God; let us praise Him with our lips now!

WHEN SHOULD WE PRAISE?

"Let us offer the sacrifice of praise ... continually." Some students do most of their studying immediately before a test. We call this "cramming." And it seems to be true also that many Christians do a lot of "Thanksgiving cramming" in the month of November. This is not an ideal practice, either in study or in praising. It is much better to praise God all through the year.

Whom should we praise? God. Who should praise? All of us. How should we praise? With our lips. When should we praise? Continually.

In a scene in *Uncle Tom's Cabin* where the troubled slaves are bemoaning their harassed condition, Uncle Tom rouses them with this simple exhortation: "Think on the mercies, children; think on the mercies." In our own times of trial let us do the same—think on God's mercies and give thanks in His name. —Alliance Witness
