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We believe the Bible to be the inspired and only infallible and authoritative Word of God. WE BELIEVE that there is one God, eternally existent in three persons: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. WE BELIEVE that the only means of being cleansed from sin is through repentance and faith in the precious blood of Christ.

WE BELIEVE that regeneration by the Holy Spirit is absolutely essential for personal salvation. WE BELIEVE that the redemptive work of Christ on the cross provides healing of the human body in answer to believing prayer. WE BELIEVE that the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, according to Acts 2:4, is given to believers who ask for it. WE BELIEVE in the sanctifying power of the Holy Spirit by whose indwelling the Christian is enabled to live a holy life. WE BELIEVE in the resurrection of both the saved and the lost, the one to everlasting life and the other to everlasting damnation.

The Church and Its Members

What is a church? According to the Constitutional Declaration of the Assemblies of God, a church in the early apostolic era was "a representative body of saved, Spirit-filled believers, who ordained and sent out evangelists and missionaries, and who, under the supervision of the Holy Spirit, set over the church pastors and teachers. . . . " The Assemblies of God, from its beginning in 1914, has endeavored to follow the apostolic pattern, and teaches that each church member within our fellowship should be saved and Spirit-filled. In this issue of the Evangel we are publishing a number of articles on the subject of church membership, hoping that the readers may see the importance and significance of affiliating publicly with a body of Pentecostal believers.

What ordinances should a church observe? The New Testament teaches two church ordinances: Water Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The Statement of Fundamental Truths (to which all Assemblies of God churches subscribe) contains the following paragraphs:

"Baptism in Water. The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed, as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an outward symbol of cleansing, while their hearts have already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life. Matthew 28:19; Acts 10:47, 48; Romans 6:4; Acts 20:21; Hebrews 10:22."

"The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements-bread and the fruit of the vine—is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Peter 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Corinthians 11:26); a prophecy of His second coming (1 Corinthians 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers 'till He come.'

If any churches have been neglecting these ordinances, the leaders and members should examine their hearts and come into conformity with the clear teaching of the Scriptures without further delay. The Bible does not specify how often we should observe these ordinances (the general practice among our churches is to have a Water Baptismal service several times a year and to partake of the Lord's Supper about once a month) but it does teach clearly and emphatically that they should be observed.

Ask the pastor to baptize you in water, if you are a born-again beliver and have not yet taken this step. And if you have been denying yourself the blessing of the Communion ordinance, deny yourself no longer. Jesus said, "This do in remembrance of me." Do it, then, in loving remembrance of Him who loved you and gave Himself for you. Remember Him as the Saviour who lives today to deliver you from all evil and to bless you with His constant presence. Come to the table of the Lord with gratitude and worship. Let your heart be warmed by this beautiful ordinance which symbolizes your communion with Christ and your fellowship with His Church.

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How wonderful it is to know that God cares for us! And He does, for a fact. The apostle Peter offered the words as a comforting truth to the believers of the first century who were undergoing fiery trials. He said, "Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you" (1 Peter 5:7). And through the Holy Spirit, Peter is still saying to all believers everywhere, "God is concerned about that which concerns you." The Lord Jesus Christ invites you to bring to Him your weights, your worries, your problems, your vexations; in short, "all your care"!

We will do something about our cares. Either they will be presented to God for His solution, or they will crush us and choke God's blessings from our lives, even as the Lord Jesus predicted in His parable of the Sower (Luke 8: 14).

How realistic this verse of Scripture is! It does not deny the presence and the pressure of care. Nor does it suggest that if you ignore your cares they will vanish. Rather, it urges you to face them—to do something about them!

No one, not even a Christian, escapes from the pressure of the cares of this life.

A tale from ancient India is of a woman who suffered the loss of her beloved. In her grief, she sought peace by wearisome pilgrimages to faraway shrines. It was to no avail. She found no peace. And then she was told that she would find peace if she could se-

cure a cup of rice from a home in which sorrow had never entered. Her search from house to house taught her the lesson we all must learn: Sorrows and cares come to all.

Not how to escape care, but how to meet care—it is this about which Peter is talking. For cares and problems can have a special ministry in your life! It all depends on how you face your cares as to whether you will be a victim or a victor; it all depends on how you face your cares as to whether they will be stumbling stones, or steppingstones for you.

Think of Joseph. He was hated by his brethren, and sold into slavery. The disappointments, disillusionments, and false accusations in his life seemed to multiply. But the Psalmist says that through his experiences "his soul came into iron" (Psalm 105:18, marginal reference). Instead of being a spoiled, pampered son, clothed in a coat of many colors, Joseph became the mighty ruler of Egypt, and the great succorer of Israel. Because of the manner in which Joseph met his cares, they were bent to God's purposes of greatness.

Have you ever heard the parable of the kite?

It is said that on one windy day in March a man watched a boy flying his kite. It seemed to the man, as he watched, that he could hear the kite speaking, and this is what he thought the kite said, "How wonderful it is to soar into the blue sky! It is thrilling beyond words. But if only that little

boy would cut the string that is holding me back, I would soar higher than any kite has ever gone. What an annoying vexing thing is that string!"

"But, poor foolish kite," the man said in his mind, "don't you realize that if the string is cut you will crumple and fall to the ground? The thing that holds you back also holds you up!"

The special ministry of your cares is to lead you to Christ who careth for you. And the burden you bear was lovingly designed to teach you to cast yourself in full complete dependence upon Him.

The painful mystery of life's cares is but a part of the greater mystery of why our great God concerns Himself with our personal problems. We do not know why He cares. We are content, however, in the knowledge that He does care. Without His loving care, life would be without meaning. Praise God, He cares!

Martin Luther was passing through a time of deep discouragement. The odds against him appeared to be too great. The battle appeared to be going adversely, and the song of joy had fled from his heart. His wife came into his study clad in the black of deep mourning. He looked up in surprise, and asked, "Has some friend died? Why have you put on the black crepe? For whom are you mourning?"

And she replied, "I am mourning for God. You have looked so sad this week. I thought surely God must have died!"

Martin Luther fell on his knees to ask the Lord for His forgiveness. His cares had well nigh crushed his faith. In the light of the Lord's tender, loving care, Luther saw that his problems

I THINK PAUL SUMS IT UP VERY well in a passage to Timothy: "These things I write unto thee, hoping to come to thee shortly: but if I tarry long, that thou mayest know how thou oughtest to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of truth" (1 Timothy 3:14-15). We all need to go to church, and we all need to be a part of it.

Many times I have heard the words, "I can be a Christian and not go to church." Assuming you are a Christian, have you no ambition? What kind of Christian are you? Of course, you can be one and not go to church. But you are a poor specimen.

A true Christian is one who, having received the great gift of salvation from the hand of God, yearns for fellowship with those of like mind. In the company of the Church there develops the desire to serve the Saviour. A sense of responsibility is formed—a sense that we are partners with God, in bringing to a wayward world the divine message. It is in this association that Christian growth takes place.

May I ask you a very personal question? "What or Whom do you worship?" Your answer reveals what you are now and what you are likely to become.

Everyone worships something or someone. It may be a bank account, social prestige, college degrees, the latest model sports car or boat. Perhaps it is a son or daughter. Some folk claim to be self-made and proceed to worship their maker!

Has anyone ever stated it better than the line found in the catechism, "Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever?" I affirm this to be true personally as I support the church with my attendance and membership. Nehemiah, the young prince, was quick to discipline the returning remnant of Israel in this respect. He says in chapter 13, verse 10, "Then contend I with the rulers, and said, Why is the house of God forsaken? And I gathered them together, and set them in their place."

I think I go to church for the same reason that I go to dinner with a friend. This friend has invited me and I want to go—not because someone in the home cooks well, or because there is always a good program of entertainment, but because I want to preserve that friendship. Think about that for a moment! The church is His house, dedicated to Him. Can I maintain His friendship

and ignore His hospitality? When two of Christ's earliest followers asked where He lived He replied, "Come and see." Friendship is a two-way affair. The world recognizes this friendship when it sees me moving in and out of the church.

Over and over again those who have wrecked and dishonored their lives look back in regret to say that one of the worst follies of their lives has been the neglect of active church membership. A year ago young Starkweather, who went on a murder rampage in Nebraska, attempted to write his autobiography "in his own hand, in a bare cell in death row." He summed up his misspent life with these words:

"I count my life in hours... I hold no fear for the electric chair; it is the price I am paying for taking the lives of others... I feel no rebellion... only love or peace. I received this love and peace through the Bible.

"And if I could talk to young people today I would tell them to go to Sunday school and to church and receive the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour."

I think that every parent ought to take a long, serious look at this matter. Your child is taking his or her cue from you. You wouldn't want your child to be another Starkweather. You wouldn't want your teen-ager to find out too late that your example of negligence—of failure to support the church with your membership and attendance-was a fatal mistake. Example is an influential teacher. Paul reminded Timothy of his spiritual heritage when he wrote to him, "When I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee, which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice; and I am persuaded that in thee also."

There's something else I keep in mind in my church life. Perhaps I can explain it this way. An accountant's desk is continually piled high with reports from factory, purchases, sales, and payroll departments. The job is to channel these reports into their proper accounts; then onto the balance-sheets for study. The bookkeeping ends in the proprietor's account. Here in a single line is recorded the meaning of the large enterprise—the net gain or loss.

I believe that a man should enter church each Lord's Day expecting to see more clearly the answer to his life. Right there I want to look at that final focal point. Like the proprietor in business I want all my activities throughout the week summed up in one line. I want to know regularly the answer as to what value my way of life has been to others, to myself, and to God.

Finally, I have always been interested in another line of Paul's writings found in First Corinthians, chapter 10, verse 32, "Give none offence, neither to the Jews, nor to the Gentiles, nor to the church of God." It seems to me that Paul is saying, "Give proper respect to family, nation, government, customs, the rights of others, and to the church." To honor the Church is to honor her Founder, the Lord Jesus Christ! The church is an institution of strength that ranks with the home and government as bulwarks of civilization ... or as Paul put it in our text, "The pillar and ground of truth..."

On the skirts of the town of St. Andrews, Scotland, in the sixteenth century, a slave in a French galley was one morning bending wearily over his oar. For nineteen long months he had done his work faithfully in the galleys; and, unused to such labor, his body was wasted, but his spirit was unbroken. "The day was breaking and, rising out of the gray waters, a line of cliffs, the white houses of a town, and a church tower were visible. A companion touched him, pointed to the shore, and asked him if he knew it. 'Yes,' he answered, 'I know it well. I see the steeple of that place where God opened my mouth in public to His glory; and I know, how weak soever I now appear, I shall not depart out of this life till my tongue glorify His Name in the same place."

That galley slave was John Knox; and later he went back to that same place, and from it and through him the glory of God went forth over the hills of Scotland and filled the land with new light and life. I feel when I pledge myself to the church that I am publicly acknowledging God's greatest institution on this earth. It deserves my full support.



Workers Together...

And the Lord Added to the Church Daily . . . Acts 2:47

M ORE THAN FORTY-SIX YEARS AGO some three hundred ministers from various parts of the United States met in Hot Springs, Ark., to work out areas of agreement in order to promote world missions. At the close of that meeting the Assemblies of God fellowship had come into being.

The beginning was small, but surely the blessing of the Lord has been on that first effort for He has "added to the church daily...." Since the foundation of the organization was missions, the fellowship has excelled in that area. And yet, there is much to be done in other areas and millions yet to be reached if the world is to be evangelized.

While working to reach the world, the Assemblies of God has moved into first place in number of foreign Bible schools, fifth in number of missionaries, and has shown excellent growth in the United States. Just ten years ago the organization had only 5,950 churches in the United States; today there are more than 8,100. Sunday school enrollment has advanced from 657,270 in 1951 to 951,178 in 1959.

All of this growth has been under God and to Him goes the glory. However, in one major area we have lacked in our emphasis and growth has been slow. Percentage-wise the Assemblies of God stands in the same membership position as related to other church groups as it did in 1956. We were the 27th ranking denomination in membership then—and we still are. This is not to say we have not grown, but our growth in membership has been smaller percentage-wise than our growth in other areas.

We take no pride in statistics for statistics' sake. None of us will be able to face God with a handful of numbers. Our commission is to reach souls. However, we note that God's Word often records the number of souls saved or met by the power of His Spirit. Acts 1:15 indicates there were a hun-

dred and twenty who continued in prayer in the upper room. Following the outpouring of the Holy Ghost on the Day of Pentecost there is recorded in Acts 2:41 this membership increase, "... and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls." It is also interesting to note that "they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship..." (Acts 2: 42).

Joining the church does not save any individual. It does not necessarily make a person a better Christian. The act will not prevent one from falling from grace. But there are many things it will do for a Christian.

First, joining the church helps to develop a unity of faith and fellowship. It strengthens the church in its commission to reach the world.

Second, it gives an individual a sense of belonging. One who is a church member is not as likely to become discouraged and stop attending worship services.

Third, it gives the young Christian a sense of responsibility. With this sense of responsibility will come an attitude of loyalty to the church, its pastor, and officers.

Fourth, membership in the church gives an individual a unique opportunity to serve, and service is both a privilege and a duty.

Viewing the needs for growth spiritually and in membership, the General Presbytery of the Assemblies of God, in session in San Antonio, Tex., endorsed a National Membership Sunday and requested the executive officers to carry out the approved plan. A committee, working closely with the Executive Presbytery, is carrying out the suggestion of the General Presbytery.

But lest the organization be accused of "opening the gates and throwing down the standards," the Sunday has been centered in two widely-accepted spiritual emphases to which the Assemblies of God is dedicated. It comes

Is Church Membership Scriptural?

This question sooner or later enters the minds of many Christians. There are many sincere folk who feel that if they join the church this act makes them a candidate for heaven. Others who are equally sincere do not even believe God wants them to join a church. They feel that as long as they belong to Christ, with their names enrolled in heaven, that is sufficient. A logical question arises, "Which of these two schools of thought is correct?" Neither one is correct. Both are extreme positions as a study of the subject will reveal.

Upon careful study of the New Testament one discovers the Bible infers two "membership rolls"—one in heaven, and the other that of the local congregation of believers on this earth. It is a deception of Satan for an individual to feel he will make heaven his home just because his name is upon an earthly church roll. Salvation is only through the merits of the precious Blood shed at Calvary; we receive it by being born again into the family of God through faith, repentance, and public confession (John 3:3-7; Mark 1:15; Romans 10:9, 10).

What a stern warning we have in the life of one disciple of Christ. Judas' name was upon the earthly church roll (Acts 1:16-20, 25), yet he found himself eventually in a backslidden condition, betraying his Lord, and in the end committing suicide, going into the regions of the damned. Yes, it is possible to have one's name on a roll down here and still be lost!

It is essential that we follow the teachings of the New Testament, for it alone is the basis for the faith and practice of the church. Beyond dispute, the Bible teaches there is a roll in heaven, upon which are written the names of the redeemed; those who have been born again, and who continue to walk in the light (see Luke 10:17-20 and Revelation 20:11-15).

It is also true that the New Testament implies that the early church had an earthly membership roll, kept records, and voted into office men who should conduct the business of the church. Referring to the disciples who met in the upper room, Luke says, "The number of names together were about an hundred and twenty" (Acts 1:15). Then again, "For he (Judas)

was numbered with us..." (Acts 1: 17). It is interesting to note that the original Greek word for numbered in this particular passage is katarithm meaning to be numbered down, to number among.

In Acts 1:26 it says, "And they gave forth their lots (votes); and the lot fell upon Matthias; and he was numbered with the eleven apostles." Now a different Greek word is used in this passage which has been translated numbered in the King James Version. The original Greek word here is "sugkatapsephizo" meaning to vote one a place among by depositing a ballot in the urn.

These two different Greek words reveal an outstanding fact concerning the early church which has been overlooked by many. Believers were numbered down (Greek, "katarithm," Acts 1:17) evidently on a roll of some sort. Then they were voted into an official capacity (Greek, "sugkatapsephizo," Acts 1:26). This procedure is also portrayed in Acts, chapter 6. The apostles advised the church to "look ye out among you seven men full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom," who were to be

appointed over a certain business matter which had arisen. The Scripture states, "The saying pleased the whole multitude (of disciples, Acts 6:2) and they (the multitude of disciples) chose" seven men to hold office. A group of believers would need some type of record system to determine who among them would be eligible for an office or position.

Another interesting side light relative to the record system of the early church is found in Acts 2:41 where it is recorded that the converts numbered about three thousand souls. Later the converts numbered about five thousand men (Acts 4:4). The early church was numbers-conscious! They took time to count the converts!

Church membership and organization is necessary in order to carry out the Great Commission. No one individual, nor one local group of believers, can obey the commission of our Lord independently. It would be impossible for one man or one congregation to support our 1,040 foreign and home missionaries who labor in 71 countries of the world. By the same token, it would be impossible for us alone to support Revivaltime on the 371 radio stations around the world. However, the job is accomplished when those of "like precious faith" pool their efforts, resources, and prayers, numbering themselves together in a common cause.

Earnest Christians everywhere desire to walk in all the light of God's Word, the Bible. Therefore, to be a New Testament Christian the believer should be numbered down with those of like faith, and be willing to serve the Saviour in an official capacity if the Lord permits him to be voted a place among the body of believers.

Be among those who are counted. Join the church and help to evangelize your area and the world efficiently and speedily, thus hastening the return of the Lord Jesus Christ. Yes, church membership is Scriptural! "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Corinthians 1:10).

I do not believe any man ever yet genuinely, humbly, thoroughly gave himself to Christ without some other finding Christ through him.



Then emphasize that spiritual attainment comes as a result of constant effort and struggle toward victory on the part of the Christan (vv. 13, 14).

Question Time: Why did Paul make a complete consecration to the Lord? (See above) How can we attain spiritually? (vv. 13, 14)

Question Time: What is the end of the enemies of the Cross? (vv. 17-19)

Read: Luke 16:1-13

Learn: "No man can serve two masters" (Luke 16:13).

From the lesson review the story, pointing out why the steward was being dismissed, his problem (he probably could find no other employment), and his course of action. His actions (vv. 4-7) seem to have been to subtract from debts owed his master the amount he had used for himself. This would put him in good with the debtors, but it also apparently reinstated him with his employer (v. 8). From this parable, emphasize the importance of faithfulness to God.

Question Time: What is the important lesson of this parable?

Question Time: Why were Joseph's brothers jealous of him? What did they do to him?

BIBLES SOLD IN SUPERMARKETS

Bibles are now on sale in several Philadelphia supermarkets. The publishers admit that it seems a bit strange to see the Scriptures displayed on the grocery shelves; but some people seldom go inside a bookstore, if ever. On the other hand, nearly everyone goes into food stores—and every family needs the Bible to feed the soul even more than it needs food for the body!

MARATHON BIBLE READINGS HELD SIMULTANEOUSLY IN 25 CHURCHES

In order "to protest people's ignorance of the Bible," twenty-five Protestant churches in Goldsboro, N. C., conducted simultaneous marathon readings of the New Testament last month. The readings began in each church at 6 a.m. and took from eighteen to twenty hours. There were new relays of readers every half hour.

The reading was done aloud from the pulpit and the doors were open to the public. In some cases there were people present to listen. In other cases there were none, but the readers went ahead anyway.

BIBLE RESTORED TO GRANT FAMILY

Major General U. S. Grant III, as chairman of the Civil War Centennial Commission, is pushing a nationwide drive to turn up letters, records, and relics of those momentous days. One result of his effort thus far is the recovery of a Bible lost by his own family in 1863.

It is a small child's Bible which his father, Frederick Dent Grant, lost at the time of the siege of Vicksburg, Miss. The flyleaf of the 2½ by 3-inch Bible bears the inscription, "Nelle Grant from her brother, Fred, May 2, 1863." Fred was only twelve years old at the time, but he was serving as an orderly in the headquarters of his famous father, General Ulysses S. Grant. He intended to send the little Bible to his young sister but lost it when he was shot and wounded at Fort Gibson, Miss., near Vicksburg.

A woman in Washington, D. C. came across the "Tom Thumb" Bible recently among other old books and decided it should go back to the Grant family.

ASSEMBLY PASTOR HEADS SLUM CLEARANCE TASK FORCE

Pastor T. J. Gotcher of the First Assembly of God in North Little Rock, Ark. was named chairman of a "task force" committee organized to clear the slum area behind the city's flood wall on the Arkansas River.

He was chosen by the committee which represents the local ministerial

alliance and members of the police and health departments, state and county welfare agencies, and the Employment Security Division.

Target date for clearance of the area is July 4.

MINISTER MEDIATES IN STRIKE

A Presbyterian minister in Albert Lea, Minn., helped to settle a strike at the Wilson and Company meat packing plant. Pastor Lloyd A. Peterson, acting on his own initiative and at his own expense, talked to leaders on both sides of the dispute over a period of months. He reasoned with management and labor officials, continually urging them to compromise in order to get the

ITALY ASSEMBLIES OF GOD GET OFFICIAL RECOGNITION

SPRINGFIELD, MO. — After waiting more than thirteen years, the Assemblies of God of Italy has received official recognition, according to a recent issue of the Gazette, counterpart to the United States Congressional Record.

Although the Supreme Council of Italy, highest court, ruled in favor of the Assemblies of God more than five years ago, official registration of the decree has been held up in the office of the Minister of Interior, denominational leaders said. As a result, the denomination has been prevented from holding property, legally performing marriages, and holding funerals. Buildings owned by the Assemblies of God have been held in the name of trustees who are leaders of the church. The government has assessed taxes but these have been unpaid during hearings on an appeal.

Noel Perkin, director emeritus of the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions Department, has indicated "official pressure" was brought to bear on the Italian Government to get the decree out of the Minister of Interior's office. "It has taken a long time," he said. Pentecostal work was begun in Italy around 1908. However, lack of official recognition has hampered rapid growth. Currently the Assemblies of God in Italy has approximately 500 churches and a membership of around 100,000. It is said to be the largest Protestant group in the country.

In 1947, most of the independent Pentecostal groups united and affiliated with the Assemblies of God of the U.S. The group has remained autonomous in its operation, however.

The churches of Italy have been supported by the U.S. Assemblies of God and by the Christian Churches of North America, an Italian Pentecostal body. During recent months, the American churches have raised funds for a new Bible school in Rome, replacing smaller facilities. The new building will take care of some 100 students.

Alfred J. Perna, representative of the U. S. Assemblies of God, works closely with the churches of Italy. He hailed publication of the decree as the dawn of a new day of freedom and opportunity for the Assemblies in that land. workers back on their jobs; and toward the end of the process he went without sleep for forty hours, shuttling back and forth over a well-beaten path between the company's general offices and the labor union's headquarters two miles away. Urged by his continual pleading and persuading, the two sides gradually whittled down their differences, and the 108-day strike was brought to an end.

Post Office

NEW POSTAGE STAMP DESIGNED FOR RELIGIOUS MAILINGS

On June 17, 1960, the Post Office Department will issue a one and onefourth cent postage stamp, in preparation for an increase in the bulk mailing rate for religious and other nonprofit organizations which goes into effect July 1. It will be the first time the U.S. has issued such a fractional postage stamp, although at present 11/2cent and 2½-cent stamps are issued.

POST OFFICE FIGHTS OBSCENITY WITH CANCELLATION SLOGAN

The Post Office Department is placing slogan cancellations in use in thirteen major post offices in a drive to encourage the public to co-operate with its drive against the mailing of obscene literature. The slogan says: "Report Obscene Mail to Your Postmaster." The cancellation dies are available for all post offices if postmasters or postal inspectors request them.

TEEN-AGERS WANT PARENTS TO ATTEND CHURCH WITH THEM

One way parents can raise the moral standards of the country is to stop sending their children to church and to take them instead. This was the consensus of a cross-section of more than 12,000 teen-agers at a Future Homemakers annual convention in New York City.

"If parents do not attend church with their children, the children feel the church is not important," the teenagers said. "Parents and school teachers should not tell and teach us one thing and do something different."

NEW ENGLAND CATHOLICS WORSHIP IN SHOPPING CENTER

A Roman Catholic chapel has been installed in a store in downtown Portland, Maine, for the convenience of Catholic shoppers and store clerks. Mass will be celebrated every Wednesday morning.

. . LATE NEWS AT PRESS TIME

AN ALL-EXPENSE TOUR OF BIBLE LANDS will be available to people attending the World Pentecostal Conference in Jerusalem next year. The Advisory Committee of the World Conference (of which Gayle F. Lewis is Secretary) has arranged a 24-day trip by air from New York and return, including a guided tour of Bible lands, costing only \$995.00. Watch your Evangel for details.

TWO IMPORTANT EVENTS WILL OCCUR THIS SUMMER on the campus of Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Missouri. The first is a school of orientation for new and prospective foreign missionaries, to be held June 6 to 17. Noel Perkin, Missions Director Emeritus, will be in charge.

THE OTHER EVENT is the Advanced Christian Training School (A.C.T.S.) which will be conducted August 22-26 by the Sunday School Department. The program is designed for Sunday school and child evangelism workers and for all ministers desiring help along the lines of Christian education in their churches.

THE BOOM IN CHURCH CONSTRUCTION is continuing across America. Adverse weather of the coldest March in many years cut new construction to \$74,000,000 but this was still \$7,000,000 ahead of a year ago. The first quarter of 1960 produced almost 10 per cent more church construction, in terms of dollars, than the first quarter of 1959.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY, in its annual report, said that portions of the Bible were published in 15 new languages and dialects last year, bringing to 1,151 the number of tongues in which the Scriptures now can be read. Only 219 languages have complete Bibles, however, and only 271 others have the entire New Testament. There are still about 1,000 tongues in which no part of the Bible whatever has yet been published.

DURING THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE on Children and Youth there was a very strong emphasis on the importance of religious and moral training. The 18 forums into which the 7,500 delegates were divided approved a total of 1,600 recommendations. These are being processed into a final report which will be published and given to the nation in due time.

THE FORUM ON MASS COMMUNICATION MEDIA, by unanimous vote, adopted a resolution calling for more scientific research into the effects of television and radio on children, youth, and parents.

THE FORUM ON EDUCATION adopted a recommendation that religious education among youth be encouraged by classes away from schools conducted during "released-time" in the regular school day. The vote was 206 to 14.

THE FORUM ON FAMILY LIFE adopted a report favoring the dissemination of birth control information, following spirited debate. The delegates voted 233 to 65 on the issue.

A FORUM CONSIDERING PROBLEMS OF THE CHILD from infancy to puberty recommended "that the school assume supportive responsibility for moral and character values by example and the teaching of ethical principles."

Growth at Nigeria's Eastern Bible Institute

Eastern Bible Institute of Nigeria has had a short but eventful history. The school came into existence as a women's training institute designed to meet the needs of many of the women and girls in Ogoja Province. Girls from three areas were given spiritual teaching and practical help to equip them to be effective in testifying to their people and in their villages. Soon the need was apparent for a place of training for both young men and young women for the work of the Lord in Ogoja.

Three areas in Ogoja Province have been entered: Obudu, Ogoja, and Bansara. New converts and candidates for the ministry had to be sent some 300 miles to Central Bible Institute of Nigeria if they were to receive formal training for the ministry. This involved great expense in travel, which neither the students nor the missionaries were able to afford. Too, students from more primitive areas had little or no educational background. We recognized the need for a preparatory class in Ogoja for students from the primitive areas must minister the Word of God to their people from the English Bible since they have no Bible or literature in their vernacular.

At the beginning of 1958 we launched a preparatory Bible course for the Ogoja-Egede fellowship and adapted the instruction to meet the problems of students from these more primitive areas. Preparatory classes were begun on three levels of English knowledge: one for the benefit of students with no education, another for those with a little training in English, and a third

for those with more advanced English understanding but not sufficient to qualify them for first year Bible school work. Twenty-three students enrolled and twenty-one of them completed their preparatory studies at the end of 1958.

The question might arise in the minds of some as to why these students were not taught in their own vernacular. There are several reasons why this was not and could not be done: first, there is no Bible or literature in the vernacular of these students; second, students from at least six different tribes (each with its own vernacular) were attending the classes; third, changing conditions in Africa, and especially in Nigeria, are making it more and more imperative that all Nigerians know English to span the great gulf caused by so many different languages being spoken in this country. Since Nigeria is expecting independence this year, it is imperative that a common means of communication be established.

All of the students were anxious to learn. Along with their studies in English they also received studies from the Bible. The more advanced students were promoted to first year Bible school work at the beginning of the school year in 1959. The remaining students continued to study and eventually will be passing on to first year work.

With this nucleus, and others who were capable of first year studies, we launched our own first year Bible school work in 1959. Word was sent through national pastors to the churches that first year Bible school work was available and 56 students enrolled for preparatory and first year Bible school training. Of this number, 21 were enrolled as first year students. This meant that added staff members were needed. Miss Florence Metcalf and Miss Irene Crane lived on the compound, and Miss Minnie Ecklund came 300 miles from Umuahia to assist in the school. My wife and I drove to the Bible school from our station in Obudu once a week-a round trip of about 73 miles-to minister in the school.

The next pressing need was for classroom space. God undertook in a most wonderful manner. During the visit of one of our Pentecostal pastors from the States, this need was presented. Immediately upon his arrival back in the States, he presented the need to both his own church and to the pastors and churches in his section. As a re-

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sult, funds have been forthcoming for the erection of three classrooms. The students, with a real zeal to help, have moulded practically all the cement blocks, cut the wood forms, carried (on their heads) most of the sand and rock used for the concrete, plaster, etc., and have contributed greatly toward the completion of these classrooms.

Nigeria Eastern Bible Institute is not dependent upon one or a few persons, but upon teamwork-you at home with your prayers and gifts, the missionaries on the field with their know-how and knowledge of the need, and the African converts themselves contributing their share. Truly we are workers together with Christ. This is His work and His church, and one day we will share the rewards together. You have a very definite part in the preparing of these young African men and women for the work of carrying the gospel to their darkened peoples and to areas where no light has shown. Your prayers are coveted by native workers and missionaries alike.



DEAD-YET ALIVE!

BAPTISM AS A RITUAL IS NEVER ENOUGH TO SAVE A SOUL, ONLY A PERSONAL HEART KNOWLEDGE AND POSSESSION OF CHRIST BRINGS ETERNAL LIFE.



who was dead and buried? It might happen to you at any time, though you do not know it! There are quite a few "dead" people walking around today —men and women who have been converted from the Jewish faith, and whose funeral has already been solemnly held by their families. For one of the chosen race to accept the Lord Jesus means a very real dying to an old life!

This should, in fact, be the experience of every child of God—the experience of death to an old life in water baptism (Romans 6:4). Compare the crossing of the Red Sea and the death of the army of Egyptians which enabled the children of Israel to see their old masters stretched out on the sand (Exodus 14:30). Here we have a type of water baptism in which all our old sin, with its mastering power, is killed and we are free to yield ourselves to God (Romans 6:10).

Are you free from sin's power? How can you be? There is a simple way of faith.

The faith which delivers you from sin is more than believing certain facts of history. Certainly we believe that Jesus took on Himself the whole of our old sinful nature (2 Corinthians 5:21). He also bore sin's penalties of disease and separation from God (1 Peter 2:24). Yet the power of God was still able to raise Him from this state (Acts 2:31) and to place him at the right hand of the Majesty on high (Ephesians 1:20-21). All these are facts of history.

Now apply these facts to ourselves. We must believe that not only did our old sinful nature die with Jesus, but also that the same power which raised Him is available also to raise us (Ephesians 5:6-7). This faith we show by our actions (James 2:17).

The steps are quite simple. You have asked Jesus to come into your heart. You know He has come in-otherwise He is a liar when He makes the promise of Revelation 3:20. Since He has come in, God says that all things are become new and your old life is passed away (2 Corinthians 5:17). If you believe God keeps His word, then show your friends in water baptism that you are a Christian and that (no matter how you feel) you believe God has changed your nature. You go down into the water of baptism to show your old nature is dead. You come up out of the water to show that God has raised you up a new person. Because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved from your sin, according to Romans 10:9. You are not properly "saved," it would seem, until you have taken this step in faith. You must be known as a Christian if you really want to enjoy God's power!

Baptism in water, then, is a public confession of faith in the Lord Jesus to change your character. The washing of the body in water and the cleansing power of the Lord's blood is fully described in Hebrews 10:22. Then the Word of God goes on to say: "Let us hold fast the *profession of our faith*" (v. 23). This is the New Testament description of water baptism. Have you taken this step?

Must a person be baptized to be saved from sin's power and penalty? The Bible suggests that in abnormal

circumstances—such as the thief on the cross (Luke 23:43)—a simple confession of faith in the Lord Jesus was sufficient; but the normal New Testament way was baptism after conversion (Acts 8:36-37). Not only that, but the Lord Jesus Himself was baptized as an act of obedience to God (Matthew 3:15) and suggests that baptism was shown to mankind from heaven (Mark 11:30). Can we afford to neglect His example?

Baptism, of course, does not guarantee salvation. The washing of the body in water—or any such ritual by itself—cannot save you. "Baptism doth also now save us," explains 1 Peter 3:21, "not the putting away of the filth of the flesh; but the answer of a good conscience toward God."

Some folk believe you can never have a clear conscience or be free of sin, and quote 1 John 1:8. George Fox, the Quaker leader, answered one such by pointing him to 1 John 1:9. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and



And walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweet-smelling savour.

EPH. 5:2

just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." When all unrighteousness is cleansed, how much unrighteousness is left?

Yes, the conscience may be cleansed, not only by the confession of sin but by the acceptance of the sacrifice of the Lord Jesus for you personally (Hebrews 9:13-14). Then alone has water baptism any real meaning for you. This is your responsibility.

Some folk who are doubtful on this point are like the young man who was dressing up to go out. "Is my collar dirty?" he asked, bursting in on his mother who was bending over the stove in the kitchen with her back toward him.

"Yes," she said without even looking round. "But how do you know?" asked her son. "I've been out all day with it on and I've only just come in." "You wouldn't be asking me, if it were clean," she replied. An honest dealing with sin solves many of our problems in a similar way!

What about baptizing infants who have no conscience? If the saving work of baptism is linked to individual conscience by God's Word, it follows that we should not baptize those with no real knowledge of sin against God. For instance, in the case of Timothy, the only certain third-generation Christian in the New Testament (2 Timothy 1:5), we are told that when called to eternal life he was able to profess his faith before "many witnesses" (1 Timothy 6:12). Nobody else replied for his conscience. He made his own confession at baptism. Similarly while Jesus Himself blessed many infants (Mark 10:13-16) He never considered it necessary to baptize one (John 4:2). The Bible says, in fact, that baptism as a ritual is never enough (1 Corinthians 10:2, 12). Only personal heart knowledge and present possession of Christ can save you (1 John 5: 10-12). What, then, is the point of baptizing infants? You may be baptized and think you are going to heaven, when in reality you are well on your way to hell.

As far as children are concerned, we may gather that God's kingdom includes infants before the age of discretion (Matthew 19:14). Their angels—heavenly beings who are sent to minister to those who will be heirs of salvation (Hebrews 1:14)—are able to see God's face (Matthew 18:10). May we not infer that such a little one passes directly on to the Lord when he dies? Holiness is placed by some folk after

conversion and linked with a baptism of the Spirit. The Bible, however, links holiness always with water baptism (e.g., Romans 6; Galatians 3:27 and 5:24; Ephesians 5:26-27; Colossians 2:11-3:6; 1 Peter 3:8-4:5, etc.). Certainly the Word brings increasing light on our life, but obedience and a new nature mark a child of God from his birth (1 John 3:5-10).

Other folk think it impossible to be holy and pure till Jesus returns. Romans 6:12 says: "Let not sin reign in your mortal body"—not your immortal one! 1 Peter 4:1-2 adds: "He that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin; that he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men but to the will of God." In fact, as Pentecostal folk we do well to heed the warning of Matthew 7:22-23. As those looking for the coming of Jesus we must remember that without holiness "no man

shall see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14).

The Lord Jesus has asked for our perfect love and obedience; in fact, He has commanded it (Matthew 5:48)! He would not have given this command if it were not possible for you to obey and if God's power (which raised Him) were not able to raise you. If you have confessed your sins, repented, and accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as your personal Saviour, the next step you should take is to be baptized in water.



The Unseen Destroyer

Strontium-90 has been labeled: "The Unseen Destroyer." It is one of the deadly radioactive substances created in nuclear explosions, and a mantle of it now surrounds the earth. It falls to earth in snow and rain. It then becomes absorbed by the soil and is taken up by growing vegetables and grass and makes its way into the milk of cows. Strontium-90, which we then eat in vegetables and drink in milk, finds its way into our bones and may well be the deadly factor in the great rise of bone cancer and leukemia.

Many cases are now known of human beings who accidentally or ignorantly took small amounts of radium into their bodies and died later of cancer. Experiments made on rats, mice, rabbits, dogs, and monkeys prove that animals die of cancer of the bone several months after S-90 has been administered. And the S-90 content of our bones rose about sixteen times between 1953 and 1958! It is still rising!

It is in the bone marrow that the red and white blood cells are formed. And the type of radiation which S-90 emits is known to cause cancer of the bone and blood. Growing children are more susceptible to S-90 than adults. They need more calcium than adults and thus their bones take up more S-90. Should no more nuclear tests be made, the S-90 level in human bone would continue to increase until 1966; and some S-90 content, from bomb tests already over, should the world hold together, will be present in soil, vegetation, and human bone in the twenty-first century.

Look about you today and contemplate the situation. What you will realize, after reflection and meditation, will not be good. These facts are not the rantings of one who does not know the world situation in the light of nuclear explosions, but are the statements of the eminent scientist, Dr. J. Gordin Kaplan. He said: "As the situation stands at present, only a fool, a cad, or an ignoramus would not be alarmed by the S-90 fallout problem of today."

In the Book of Revelation, the Scriptures inform us that sores will break out in the bodies of men. These sores need not necessarily be a direct judgment from God. They might be the direct or indirect result of nuclear explosions. Man's inventions (which could be used for the good of humanity) could easily play havoc with the human race.

We are living in momentous times. Dispensations do not break off as one would make a clean break of a rotten stick. Dispensations become as rotten as a stick but they overlap. Already we can see the build-up of the terrible judgments which will eventually engulf the human race. Man is already on the way to destruction!

If we are correct in our interpretation of Scripture, the Book of Revelation reveals that more than half the population of the earth will be destroyed during the Great Tribulation. Man is already preparing horrible death for his fellow man. God knows that unregenerate man, left to his own devices, will certainly destroy himself.

In the light of these events which

are already breaking upon us today, what hope does the future hold? Very little, my friend, very little! As one scientist has said: "There is no future."

Death comes slowly to some and suddenly to others. What causes that death is of minor importance. It is important, however, as to how we die, whether with faith in Christ or otherwise. If we have no faith in Christ, we are eternally lost. With faith in Christ, we are secure.

The unseen destroyer (Strontium-90) can destroy the body, but never the soul! Sin can destroy the soul—ETERNALLY! It is more to be feared than S-90. Jesus said: "Fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him who is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matthew 10:28).

Dr. Kaplan has said that Strontium-90, the unseen destroyer, is in the bodies of men, women, and children around the world today! Nobody can escape it! Likewise, the S-90 of sin, the terrible moral cancer, is in the souls of all men everywhere, and it too is doing its silent, deadly work, "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God."

Terrible days are ahead for the world of men. But a terrible eternity is ahead for every individual who rejects the Christ. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." For "the blood of Jesus Christ God's Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).

The trouble with us is our proud hearts refuse to accept the position in which God's Word places us. It charges us with sin and corruption and we would like to excuse ourselves and harp a little upon the dignity of human nature. . . Not until we accept the position of sinfulness and weakness are we prepared to receive His blessing.

Your Questions

ANSWERED BY ERNEST S. WILLIAMS

I hear ministers say, "Church membership will never save you," then hear them urge that we join the church. Is church membership important? Why?

There are a number of reasons why believers should join the church. It is a means of identifying themselves as members of the body of Christ, the local congregation of believers. It gives them a voice in the business activities of the church, voting for pastor, church officers, buying or selling of church property. It causes them to feel that they are part of the family of God, responsible members working together.

How am I, a Sunday school teacher, to defend the need of church membership against those who say we ought to be free? Where is the Scripture that I might use?

All those who were Israelites had their names recorded as members of Israel, and Israel is spoken of as "the church in the wilderness."

The New Testament Church consists of the "ekklesia," those called out. The church has always been a body of Christian believers, uniting for service and fellowship, as is shown all through the New Testament. The church members assembled together; they had their appointed services, shared together in the Lord's Supper, had their elders and deacons, and carried the work of the Lord forward together. There was need of knowing who were members that they might know where each lived and be able to deal with those whose conduct was a reproach.

Some who believe they ought not to become members, are as faithful as any who are members; but most of those who oppose joining a church, saying, "We must be free," are persons who wish to flit here and there taking no responsibility for the welfare of the church either spiritually or financially. A church is a body of responsible people, willing to be identified as members, working one with another for the upbuilding of the kingdom of God and mutual edification of each other.

Does Jesus weep as He sees the world now?

He evidently grieves as He sees the world condition, and the Bible teaches that He "is touched with the feeling of our infirmities" (Hebrews 4:15, 16). But the descriptions we have of Jesus since His return to heaven tell of power and triumph. John might weep as he sees no one worthy to open the book, but Jesus the Lamb triumphantly takes and opens it. (Revelation 4:7). We will know more about it bye and bye.


How did the term Protestant originate?

Persons favorable to Luther and his doctrine of salvation by faith without works protested against the decision of the Diet (or council) of Worms against Luther. Those who protested were spoken of as Protestants. Later, the term came to be used also for other groups who refused to follow the dictation of the Roman Catholic Church.

How many women are spoken of in the Bible as prophetesses?

There were Miriam (Exodus 15:20); Deborah (Judges 4:4); Hulda (2 Kings 22:14); and the false prophetess Noadiah (Nehemiah 6:14). In the New Testament there was Anna (Luke 2:36, 37); and there were the daughters of Philip the evangelist who prophesied (Acts 21: 8, 9). I believe these young women preached, or declared the gospel under the inspiration of the Spirit. Then there may have been a false leader in the church at Thyatira who called herself a prophetess, spoken of in the scripture as a Jezebel (Revelation 2:20).

THE UNJUST STEWARD

Sunday School Lesson for May 8, 1960 LUKE 16:1-13

THE FACT OF STEWARDSHIP

"There was a certain rich man which had a steward; and the same was accused unto him that he had wasted his goods." A steward is "one who manages the household affairs and expenditures of another; especially one who manages a large estate, establishment, or institution."

The Bible tells us that Christians are stewards of the Lord because: (1) All they possess really belongs to God. See Psalm 24:1; Exodus 19:5; Deuteronomy 10:14; Psalm 50:10-12; 1 Corinthians 4:1. (2) They themselves belong to God both by creation and by redemption. (3) All they possess as to time, talents, life itself, is God-given and Godsustained.

Just as it was possible for this steward to be careless or dishonest in handling his master's affairs, so may a Christian be unwise or careless in the handling of possessions and abilities entrusted to him by the Lord.

THE STEWARD'S ACCOUNTABILITY

"Give an account of thy stewardship." This every child of God shall do. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ" (2 Corinthians 5:10). "It is required in stewards that a man be found faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2).

THE STEWARD'S FORESIGHT. Vv. 3-7.

These verses need not puzzle us. This steward had an eye to his own future, and in that respect he is an example to us. When he realized that he was about to lose his position he decided to use his master's money in such a way as to make friends who would receive him into their homes when he lost his position. So he quickly contacted those men who were in debt to his master and discounted their mortgage notes! He may have been dishonest in this act but he was very wise in his purpose—and it was for that wisdom that he was commended and held up as an example.

THE STEWARD'S WISDOM

"For the children of this world are considerably more shrewd in dealing with their contemporaries than the children of light. Now my advice to you is to use money, tainted as it is, to make friends, so that when it comes to an end they may welcome you into eternal habitations" (Phillips). In these words of Jesus we have the application of the entire parable. The unconverted act with more wisdom and foresight, and make better investments "in their generation" (that is, in the realm of material things) than do the Christians in the realm of spiritual and eternal things. Therefore, Christ exhorts us to follow the example of the steward by using our earthly goods in such a way that when we leave earth for heaven we shall be welcomed by those whom our money and possessions have helped. We are to invest our money in the light of eternal values, so we may enjoy an eternal interest from our investments.


In the Old Testament God's people were taught, through various laws and sacrifices, this same principle of stewardship. They were taught particularly to be faithful in bringing to God's house, as an act of worship, both "tithes" and "offerings."

During the administration of President Wilson a new tax bill was being considered by a government finance committee. This bill, to become known as the Income Tax bill, would provide exemption from taxation of ten per cent of one's income if that amount were given to church and charity. But before the bill could be voted on, a representative of the orthodox Jewish faith appeared before the committee and, quoting from the Old Testament, showed that this bill as it stood would be unfair to his people, for he declared that the faithful orthodox Jew has always given at least fifteen per cent of his income to the synagogue and charitable institutions. As a result the bill was altered to permit deduction of up to fifteen per cent!

If a Jew, under the law, gave at least fifteen per cent (and some scholars who have done a great deal of research on the subject say the amount went as high as thirty per cent) how can a Christian, living in this privileged dispensation of grace, conscientiously give less! (If all of God's true children gave at least fifteen per cent of their income to the Lord, how many more churches might be built here at home, and how many more missionaries might be sent to foreign fields!)

Finally, since the Christian is a steward, he will surely give an account unto God, not only for what he has given -whether ten, twenty, or thirty per cent-but for the total income and all possessions which God entrusts to his steward--J. Bashford Bishop

THE APOSTLE JOHN, THE REVElator, has recorded in the Apocalypse the vision God gave him on the Isle of Patmos of things shortly to come to pass. The scenes he witnessed while in the Spirit are faithfully and dramatically written.

The description of the throne, with multitudes surrounding it, is climaxed as John sees the Lamb proceeding to take the book out of the hands of Deity sitting upon the throne and to open the seals thereof. We then read the significant words, "And when he had taken the book, the four living ones and the four and twenty elders fell down before the lamb, having each one of them harps and vials full of odors, which are the prayers of the saints."

There are many wonderful things which could be said about this powerful scene, but our particular attention is directed to the tremendous fact that such a prominent place should be given to the prayers of the saints at a time of the unfolding of climactic truth.

The prayers of God's people are never forgotten in the remembrances of heaven. We are informed that they are bottled up, preserved for the final action of Almighty God in the completion of His redemptive plan in this evil world and in the cleansing of the universe from the disastrous effects of

sin. Their groanings and travailings may seem to have been ignored—but not so. God remembers every plaintive cry: He never forgets their pains, their sufferings, their tortures, and their martyrdoms, and now judgment is at hand

Golden bowls of incense, which are the prayers of the saints, are brought into focus before the mighty armies of men and angels, so that all may know that God answers prayer. Not one entreaty is forgotten, not one earnest plea is set aside. The redeemed of all ages sing together, with angelic accompaniment, "And we shall reign with Him on earth." That sounds to me like a final anthem of complete answered prayer!

From that throne scene, the word picture is given of the terrible judgments of God which follow the riding forth of the apocalyptic horses. To read is to understand. Says the Spirit, "Blessed is he that readeth," and the seven angels with seven trumpets usher in the awful anger of Almighty God against all sin and uncleanness. Another angel appears having a golden censer; much incense proceeds therefrom, which he offers with the prayers of the saints. "And the smoke of the incense which came with the prayers of the saints, ascended up before God out of the angel's hand." To read is to marvel at the desolation wrought by God's wrath as He remembers the prayers of His suffering, sorrowful saints. "And the angel took the censer, and filled it with the fire of the altar; and there were voices, and thunderings, and lightnings, and earthquakes."

The prayers of God's royal priest-hood down through the ages are about to be answered once and for all. The saints have cried with broken hearts, "Thy kingdom come: Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." Their prayers were heard, and now they are remembered by the God of their salvation. It is quite plain that those prayers have much to do with the sounding of the terrible trumpets.

Here is the vision given of the vindication by God of His faithful believers. The day of God's wrath has come at last. The poor, downtrodden saints who lived and died in the patience of the gospel, are to witness the amazing judgments of God as He answers their prayers and makes the world to know that "God is faithful" and that He will do what He has prom-

ised. Heaven's administrations are moved by the prayers of those who cried at the mercy seat saying, "O Lord, how long?" It is your prayers and mine, which mingle with the prayers of all saints, that bring into action the long-awaited divine move to deal with Satan and his power over man.

All God's people should read over and over again the revelator's description of the vision God gave him. Many are the interpretations in differing schools of thought concerning this marvelous Book of Revelation, but none need cease from reading it just because men differ in understanding. The blessing is promised to the reader and not to the supposed exact interpreter. The full understanding of such a mysterious book will undoubtedly be unfolded as the age progresses to the climax, as portrayed by the Spirit of God to His servant John. The intention of this article is to bring to our attention the linking up of prayer with God's wrath outpoured upon an evil and perverse generation of Christ rejectors. The heart-rending cries of the saints down through the long years of persecutions have been, and are, "How long, O Lord, how long," and the message from God is that they should have patience because their prayers are kept in trust up in heaven for the final burst of God's fury and the complete vindication of His Blood-bought people.

Knowing this, how precious should be the practice of prayer in our own lives. Prayer is by no means a popular pastime, yet it is indispensable to the believers. The Ministry of Norman T. Spong Illustrates

THE POWER OF A PIONEER SPIRIT

A FTER SUCCESSFULLY PASTORING four established churches over a period of thirty years, Norman T. Spong has not lost his pioneering spirit.

In 1954, he was called to serve a pioneer church in Somerville, N. J., and accepted. Responding to this challenge took courage and faith, but Brother Spong had both. On April 15, Good Friday night, a lovely new \$75,000 Assembly of God church building was dedicated in Somerville because the pastor and his seventy-member congregation had a vision of the possibilities and "worked together with God" to make it come true.

Pioneering is not new to Norman Spong. After two years at Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Mo., and graduation from Southern Bible College, Pasadena, Calif., Brother Spong pioneered a new church in Erie, Pa. During that time he also served as C. A. director and Sunday school representative of the Eastern District which, at that time, comprised four states. While serving in these capacities, he was appointed to the five-member committee to present to the General Council a Sunday school program. Other churches Brother Spong pioneered were: West Side Assembly, Youngstown, Ohio; The Greek Assembly, Los Angeles, Calif., and the Assembly in Coldwater, Conn. He also contributed to the establishment of the Assembly in Salem, Ohio.

When Brother Spong became pastor of the congregation in Somerville, N. J., the property carried a mortgage of \$18,000 and the pastor's salary was \$20 a week. The site had been purchased by the New York-New Jersey District of the Assemblies of God in 1952. Soon, with God's blessing, the new church matured and became a sovereign assembly and it affiliated with the General Council in 1957.

In July, 1959, the pastor and the congregation felt it was time to erect

a church building. The indebtedness had been whittled down to \$8,000 by this time, so the little congregation agreed with the pastor to begin operations on the new building with the \$5,000 building fund (which might have been paid on the old mortgage). The congregation was expanding and Brother Spong saw the potential for tripling the congregation with a new church building.

This enthusiastic group did not let any grass grow under its feet. On August 23, ground was dedicated for the building site and excavation work was begun August 29. After three and one-half months, the thrilled pastor and his flock laid the cornerstone of the new edifice. A newspaper reporter who happened to notice the construction work wrote a small announcement about the new church. Then, a reporter and photographer for the New York Daily News made an appointment for an interview with the pastor. Three other

Since Brother Spong had been a professional engineer for seven years before he entered the ministry, he was able to act as general contractor. At the time of the cornerstone laying, *The Daily Home News*, New Brunswick, N. J., boldly declared, "Do-It-Your-

able to act as general contractor. At the time of the cornerstone laying, The Daily Home News, New Brunswick, N. J., boldly declared, "Do-It-Yourself Project Makes Church Reality." And this was true. There were only five paid workers on the construction site—three masons and two carpenters. The rest of the work was done by the pastor and approximately a dozen men from the congregation who donated their labor at nights and on Saturdays.

Brother Spong served as chief chef, too, during the construction work. He prepared breakfast, lunch, and dinner for the men working on the job. One lady from the congregation even pushed a wheelbarrow for the workers the day they leveled the ground floor!

Nicholas La Rosa, carpenter-concontractor of Vineland, N. J., supervised the pastor and his parishioner-helpers in the building of five 46-foot wooden trusses to support the roof of the church. James Wilson, also of Vineland, was masonry contractor and Clayton Coffman, an Assemblies of God member of Milford, Pa., served as architect. Among the part-time workers was Brother Spong's son, Charles, who is employed elsewhere during the day and attends Rutgers College three nights a week.

The small congregation provided cash as well as labor for the project. Help came from unexpected sources, as well. Private contractors who were not affiliated with the church but desired to help donated some materials and professional services. The onestory, modern design, brick-and-wood structure, costing \$22,000, has a floor area of 62 by 66 feet and a seating capacity of 300.

The pioneering spirit such as exhibited by Norman Spong and his enthusiastic congregation is essential if the Assemblies of God is to make strides for God in the future. Over 135,000,000 souls are yet unreached in the U.S. by the full gospel.

Gayle F. Lewis, Executive Director of the Home Missions Department, says, "If established churches once catch the vision, the Church Extension goals will easily be reached. A national goal of 366 new churches in 1960 has been set. It is my firm conviction that if we fulfill our responsibility to get the Pentecostal message to our own American people, the task must be accomplished by establishing Assemblies of God churches in *every* community. This will only be done when our present estab-

lished churches feel the burden and will take the responsibility of becoming 'mother churches'—that is, assist in starting other churches either within their cities or in areas adjacent to them. Just as a church will grow through supporting foreign missions, so a church will grow as a result of sharing in the homeland in order to establish other Assemblies of God churches."

Not to take in people simply to fill the roll book, but to bring into active and responsible fellowship those born-again believers who can become a force of strength in each congregation.

May we renew our dedication to reach the lost of our communities, and having reached them let us urge them to follow the Lord in water baptism and church membership. Should Jesus delay His coming, we have an even greater task during this decade than during the past one, for there are more people to reach, and we have faster and more effective means to tell them the message of salvation.




