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THE EDITORIAL VIEWPOINT

A Story From Alabama

In one of the magazines that came to the Editor's desk a few days ago there was a story that every Christian ought to hear. It is told by a James Worsham. We shall repeat it in his own words.

Several times a week Z. R. Word, an old colored preacher in the hills of Alabama, would come to my office asking for money for the church and orphanage he had founded. Finally one day I said, "Parson, you are all the time making demands on my time and my pocketbook for that church and that orphanage of yours, and I'm getting tired of it. I am going to stop giving, and I'm going to stop right now."

My abruptness and unusual manner surprised and hurt him. As he sat there in silence I watched him. His head was smooth as a billiard ball. He had beautiful white teeth, and his eyes really got on fire when he was "expounding the Word." I recalled when I asked him one day what his initials stood for. He answered, "Zechariah, suh." "And what is the 'R' for?" I questioned. He replied, "That's for the 'Riah' part."

Though lacking a formal education, he was a born orator and had a wonderful memory. After hearing others preach he would come back and deliver the same sermon to his own flock.

As I thought of these things, I felt a bit sorry for hurting his feelings. He was fumbling for his hat in an embarrassed manner. Finally he said:

"Mr. Jim, I think I understand exactly how you feel. I once had a little boy and he was always making demands on my time and my pocketbook. It was a nickel here, and a dime there, and a quarter some place else. There never seemed to be any let-up. I was everlastingly being called upon for candy, peanuts, a pair of shoes, a hat, a suit of clothes, and many other things. Just when I thought I had him all fixed up, I had to do it all over again.

"He'd make demands on my time, too. In the evening when I was all tired and worn out from my work in the mines, he'd climb up on my knee and I'd have to tell him stories. But, Mr. Jim, my little boy doesn't make any more demands on my pocketbook." He paused a few moments before he went on. "My little boy is dead."

Then directly he resumed. "Mr. Jim, when this colored man's church is dead, when they have nailed up the doors and boarded up the windows, there'll be no demands made on your time or your pocketbook. But as long as it's a living force in this community; as long as that little orphanage sits up there on the hill with its doors open to the little helpless black folks of Alabama, it will not only make demands on your time and your pocketbook, but these demands may be greater as the years go by."

He got up and stood for a few moments, gazing through the window at Red Mountain, and then slowly walked down the steps into the afternoon sunshine with twenty dollars more than when he came in.

Next time you get exasperated at so many demands on your time and your pocketbook from churches, missionaries, and other Christian organizations, remember that good man in Alabama and say to yourself: "When Communism has nailed up the doors and boarded up the windows of every church, there will be no more of these demands on my pocketbook. Then I would wish I had given ten times as much." -R.C.C.

SHARING CHRIST'S

Sufferings

HERE IS A VERSE IN PAUL'S EPIStle to the Colossians that always has intrigued me. It is one of the deepest and most mysterious utterances recorded in the entire Scriptures.

I refer to verse 24 of the first chapter. Convbeare translates it as follows:

"And even now I rejoice in the affliction which I bear for your sakes, and I fill up what yet is lacking of the sufferings of Christ in my flesh, on behalf of His body which is the Church."

In the more familiar wording of the Authorized Version, the apostle says: "I Paul ... now rejoice in my sufferings for you, and fill up that which is behind of the afflictions of Christ in my flesh for his body's sake, which is the church."

I never have preached from this verse, as I have felt that I was not matured enough to do so. Even now, after thirty-five years in the service of the Lord, I feel hesitant. I feel as if I can only skim the surface of this vital truth. We who can preach the Word must be careful not to traffic in unfelt truths.

All commentators are weak on this verse. In the whole realm of Christian literature there are only fragmentary remarks concerning it. These words can only be expounded from actual experience and only a man like Paul could expound them. The apostle drank deeply of the sufferings of Christ. In Philippians 3:10 we find him praying that he might know in a deeper and fuller way the fellowship of the suffering of his glorious Lord; and in 2 Corinthians 1:5 he declares:

"We share and experience Christ's own sufferings" (Vincent); or literally, "The sufferings of Christ have overflowed to me above measure."

And now the mighty warrior cries to the saints at Colossae: "I am filling in what is lacking of the sufferings of my dear Saviour. I am complementing in my own sufferings the unfinished sufferings of Christ.'

It is not that Paul could add anything to the merit of the redemptive sufferings of the Redeemer. Oh, no! These sufferings were complete and final (Hebrews 10:12). There is nothing lacking in that divine bloodshedding. There is nothing left for us to "fill in" by our co-sufferings. His was a perfect salvation wrought out by His precious death on that accursed tree (Galatians 3:13). Blessed be God, there is nothing left for the sinner to do but to rest on that finished work (John 19:30).

The sufferings of which Paul writes to the Colossians are those of the Saviour as THE HEAD OF THE CHURCH. Our Kinsman-Redeemer is now our Head, of whose body we are the members. So great is the oneness of the body with its glorious Head that the Church in 1 Corinthians 12:12 is referred to as part of Christ. "For as the body is one, and hath many mem-


Oh, my brother, my sister, let us never forget that the sufferings of our Saviour are not yet over. Church of Christ, let this startling truth arrest us. Our dear Redeemer is suffering untold anguish just now. He is suffering on behalf of His body. He is suffering for the sanctification of His people. Christ died, not only to redeem His Body, but to sanctify it wholly. He died not only to save our souls from hell, but that He might raise up a conquering people assaulting the gates of hell. The Church must be beautiful with the garments of her blessed Lord and mighty in battle. "Thou art beautiful, O my love . . . terrible as an army with banners" (Song of Solomon 6: 4).

Just as the Head suffers for the body, so the members of the body should suffer with the Head. The burning question is, Am I suffering with my blessed Head, or am I causing the Head to suffer? Have I entered into the fellowship of His sufferings, or do I drift along, careless and indifferent to His groans, tears and bloody sweat? The Saviour is travailing on behalf of His Church.

How COLORFUL BUT TRENCHANT IS the rebuke of the Saviour in Matthew 23:24! There Jesus said, "Ye blind guides, which strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel."

The margin says "strain out the gnat." This figure of speech approaches the ludicrous and even has an element of humor.

But Jesus was intensely serious. He was denouncing in round and biting terms the Pharisees, who were so ridiculous in their lack of perspective and sense of balance. Little things were so important to them, while they ignored matters of genuine value and worth. Their sense of value was completely distorted, and their emphasis on issues was greatly out of proportion. The matter was doubly serious in that the destiny of souls was affected. These men were religious leaders; they were setting a horrible example to those who followed them. They were also exceedingly zealous, making proselytes to their viewpoints and encouraging their converts to be more wicked than they were themselves.

To get the full picture of the Pharisees' perversion and iniquity, let us consider some of the contrasts of their emphasis which Jesus described as straining out gnats and swallowing camels. They were careful to make long prayers in pretense, but privately they devoured widows' houses. They swore easily by the temple, but they fastidiously abstained from swearing by the gold of the temple. They likewise profaned the holy altar in their oaths, and yet particularly avoided swearing by a gift that happened to be on the altar.

They were careful to pay tithes of mint, anise, and cumin, but they entirely ignored the weightier matters of the law—justice, mercy, and faith. They were fastidious in cleaning the outside of the platter, but they allowed the inside to be full of extortion and excess. As whited sepulchers, they outwardly appeared clean but inwardly they were full of hypocrisy and iniquity. In these six respects the blind guides made themselves ridiculous by their absurd imbalance and lack of proportion in what they considered right and wrong.

This perversion of their sense of values is seen in their attitude toward Christ Himself. It is recorded in John 18:28 that they led Jesus from Caia-



phas, their high priest, to the Roman hall of judgment early in the morning to rush through a mock hearing and to secure upon Him the sentence of death. While busy planning their act of murder of the Son of God they were careful not to go into the judgment hall themselves lest they should be defiled and thus kept from eating the passover. As if the crossing of a threshold would defile them, while the actual murder of the Son of God would leave no stain upon them! How absurd can people become in their external religious regulations while ignoring the internal values of right and wrong, even to the point of committing murder.

A Roman governor also was guilty of the same ridiculous imbalance of moral judgment. Herod promised with an oath before his lords and ladies that he would give the daughter of Herodias anything she asked. It is fair to say that the king was sorry when she asked for the head of John the Baptist, but the record tells us that "for the oath's sake, and them which sat with him at meat, he commanded it to be given her." A governor mur-dered a man whom he knew in his heart to be righteous, simply because he had made an oath and wanted to be true to it. His exaggerated sense of ethics outweighed his sense of right and judgment, even though a good man's life was at stake.

Jesus painstakingly attempted to make the Pharisees see how inconsistent and absurd they made themselves and how unfair they were in the judgments which they passed. Matthew 12 tells of the condemnation placed on the disciples by the Pharisees for plucking corn on the Sabbath. Jewish law permitted them to pluck the corn as they went through the field and to eat it as they walked; however, the Pharisees had superimposed upon the Law of Moses the proviso that such liberties should not be taken on the Sabbath. There was no legal basis for their subscription to the legal code. Jesus said unto them, "Have ye not read what David did when he was an hungered, and they that were with him; how he entered into the house of God, and did eat the shewbread, which was not lawful for him to eat, neither for them which were with him, but only for the priests?" Thus Jesus appealed to historical precedent for the act of his disciples' eating when they were hungry even on the Sabbath. Then He turned to the Scripture to strengthen

His argument. "But if ye had known what this meaneth, *I will have mercy*, and not sacrifice, ye would not have condemned the guiltless" (Matthew 12: 7; see also Hosea 6:6). Jesus here interpreted the prophet to mean that the milk of human kindness was far more important than the punctilious keeping of a ritual.

The Lord Jesus later made one more effort to persuade these unreasonable people that there were some things more important than the legalistic keeping of the Sabbath. They were about to condemn Him for healing a man with a withered hand on that day. They asked Him, "Is it lawful to heal on the sabbath day?" that they might accuse him. He said to them, "What man shall there be among you, that shall have one sheep, and if it fall into a pit on the sabbath day, will he not lay hold on it, and lift it out? How much then is a man better than a sheep?" He answered His own question by saying that it is lawful to do well on the Sabbath, and He forthwith healed the man. Thus Jesus appealed to precedent, Scripture, and reason to straighten out the perversion of these blind men. He evidently did not succeed in reforming them, for it was later that He denounced them as blind guides, which strained out the gnat and swallowed the camel.

But there was one guide who had heard them reasoning together and perceived that He had answered them well. He is recorded in Mark 12:32 as saying to Jesus, "Well, Master, thou hast said the truth: for there is one God; and there is none other but he: and to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the soul, and with all the strength, and to love his neighbor as himself, is more than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." Jesus saw that he had spoken discreetly, and He said, "Thou art not far from the kingdom of God."

This was a problem which the prophets of old had to face in declaring the truth of God. Isaiah wrote, "To what purpose is the multitude of your sacrifices unto me? saith the Lord: I am full of the burnt offerings of rams, and the fat of fed beasts; and I delight not in the blood of bullocks, or of lambs, or of he goats... Bring no more vain oblations; incense is an abomination unto me; the new moons and sabbaths, the calling of assemblies, I cannot away with; it is iniquity, even the solemn meeting.... Wash you, make you clean; put away the evil of your doings from before mine eyes" (Isaiah 1:11-16). Micah also wrote, "Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, or with ten thousands of rivers of oil?" Here again is the exaggerated hyperbole that Jesus used in Matthew 23:24. Micah went on to say, "He hath showed thee, O man, what is good; for what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God" (Micah 6:7, 8)?

A New Testament apostle joins in the chorus by denouncing people who talk in tongues, have the gift of prophecy, understand all mysteries and all knowledge, have all faith, bestow all their goods to feed the poor, and give their bodies to be burned, but have not love. Here is Paul's example of gnats and camels. Gnats are God's creatures and are good in their place, but they are infinitesimally small in comparison to the size and value of camels.

Present-day Christians (true to form) are rather sensitive about their gnats, and there are different kinds of gnats in different parts of the country. So we shall let discretion be the better part of valor and pass bravely by their specific mention. But let me shed a tear for some very valuable camels which are easily swallowed and completely destroyed by today's gnat-lovers. A man's otherwise good Christian reputation and character is ruthlessly torn to shreds or at best completely ignored. The tranquillity and unity of a church is rudely disturbed and the curse of Romans 16:17 brazenly is risked by causing divisions and offenses. Sometimes good preachers and good churches are actually thrown to the wolves, and many precious souls are made to stumble and fall into hell, all because a particular "gnat" is carefully preserved.

It may be too much to ask of unconverted hypocrites, Roman governors, and backslidden Israel to have a correct sense of values. But surely God's Pentecostal people, with the light of all these divine precedents, careful explanations, arguments, and vivid examples which Jesus, the apostle, and the prophets have given us, can learn to walk straight and to first take care of the things that are most important, letting the other things likewise be given the attention which is due them. "These ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." 44

THE WORD OF GOD IS REPLETE with admonitions, challenges, and pleadings, calling men to prayer. In 2 Chronicles 7:14 we read, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray...." Jesus taught that "Men ought always to pray, and not to faint" (Luke 18:1). We are further admonished in 2 Thessalonians 5:17, "Pray without ceasing."

In his earliest history man learned the power of prayer. "And to Seth, to him also there was born a son; and he called his name Enos: then began men to call upon the name of the Lord." strength-when they have prayed.

Abraham was never so splendid as when he pleaded with God to spare the cities of the plain because of the righteous. Moses saved a nation from annihilation when he prayed. He reached transcendent heights in prayer and changed the edict of God. Paul was at his absolute best when he prayed for the salvation of Israel and offered to be accursed if thereby his countrymen might be saved.

History records that our great leaders have called on God in times of national crisis. Who has not heard that George Washington knelt in the snows of Valley Forge and sought God for help? And who has not heard of the prayers of Abraham Lincoln when our nation was in the throes of death?

Prayer meetings have changed the course of history. Oh, how we need to be drawn back to the place of prayer and intercession!

Some time ago I heard a conversation between two young men. Asked the first, "Are you going to church tonight?" The reply was, "No, I do not plan to go. It's only a prayer meeting."

Only a prayer meeting! Indeed! Prayer meetings can be momentous events. Daniel and his friends got back a lost dream and gave an interpretation and a prophetic utterance that foretold the course of the nations down to this time. It happened as the result of a prayer meeting.

God poured out His Spirit on a few humble people, gave birth to the Church, disturbed a kingdom, shook an organized religion, and turned the world upside down. It all started in a prayer meeting (Acts 2). The records will show that the modern Pentecostal revival began in prayer meetings. Hungry people in widely separated areas were diligently seeking God for revival. Many of us are the beneficiaries of those prayer meetings.

Jesus Christ was the Son of God, but He resorted to prayer, for He knew the value of prayer. For Himself He "offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears"; but for us He poured out His soul unto death and made intercession for the transgressors.

Jesus was the Master Soul Winner. But a close study of His methods will reveal that before He took God to men, He first took men to God in prayer. May we learn how to take men to God in intercession that we might more successfully bring the Lord to the hearts of men.

Some years ago I preached to my

church on the uncovering of the wells by Isaac. I stressed the necessity of uncovering the well of Beersheba—the well of the oath, the well of complete surrender to the will of God. When Isaac dug that well, his former enemies came and confessed, "We saw certainly that the Lord was with thee."

A deacon came to me and said, "Preacher, by the grace of God, I'm going to dig that well."

"Go to it," I encouraged.

He returned later to say that he would have to have some help to dig the well. "How about a Monday-night men's prayer meeting?"

Again I replied, "Go to it!"

He called the prayer meeting the "Well Diggers Prayer Meeting."

Another deacon came to say he had a good slogan for the group. It was, "Be not weary in well digging." He could have added, "for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." For "he that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

Men, let's have some good prayer meetings. Let's dig wells all over America and the world, that men may have the Water of Life.



GREW UP IN A SMALL IOWA FARM community, one of five children. My parents were good to us and I was happy. My life, up to eighteen, was just plain average. No melodrama! No strange twists! No unusual events of fate!

I went to school, played with my brothers and sisters, and like most girls reluctantly did my share of the housework under Mom's cheerful but firm guidance.

Yet something was missing. I know now what it was, but did not realize it then. Although my parents lived up to a high standard of decency, they did not insist that I or the other children attend church or Sunday school regularly. I lacked early spiritual training. Many times this lack has shown itself during moments of crisis.

It was not until my second school year that I became a Christian.

Uncle Howard, Papa's youngest brother, was critically ill in a hospital. There in a dying condition he realized his need of soul salvation and accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as his Saviour. God mercifully spared his life.

He became an ardent Christian and began to witness to my parents and urge them to take their family to church. As a result, all of us began to attend a full gospel church in our community, and on one Sunday morning, at the close of the worship service, I surrendered all to Jesus. Papa and Mamma did too. And so did the other children. What a wonderful change it wrought in our lives.

We had a neighbor, a gentle, Christian woman, who often visited our home. I remembered once as a girl one thing she said to me, as she talked in the kitchen. "Whatever you do, Honey, when you grow up and think about getting married, be sure to choose a Christian man. You know that my husband is unsaved and that my life has been wretched because of it."

"Don't worry," I replied, "that won't happen to me."

A WAR-TIME MARRIAGE

But it did happen—before I realized it. It was during the war, when I was eighteen. Martin, my husband, had a sister who attended the same church as I did. One Sunday afternoon, while visiting in her home, I noticed a serviceman's picture on the piano and commented about it.

"That's my brother," she volunteered. "He's in the Marines. Handsome, isn't he?"

Jack, the sister's husband, took up the conversation. "Why don't you write him? He's a good church boy and would be glad to correspond with you. He's awfully lonely."

"Maybe I will," I answered. "What's his address?" My letters were friendly, about home town things, about the church, and even about the weather. Martin's letters were friendly, too.

In June he came home for a thirtyday leave, as handsome and stunning in uniform as his picture. After getting acquainted in person, he asked me to go out with him, and from then on we were together constantly, at his sister's, at my house, or in church.

Like any impressionable girl my age, I was taken back but really not surprised when Martin asked me to marry him. We had known each other just two weeks.

Eighteen, overwhelmed, and in love, I said yes. Then he went overseas. I wrote him every day while he was in Japan. Strangely enough, his letters were infrequent, and I noticed, too, without much spiritual content. I thought about it frequently, but brushed it aside.

Martin returned home a year later, and we were married. It was a simple but lovely wedding in the pastor's home.

CHANGED BEHAVIOR

Two weeks were all that we had been married when it happened. His attitude and behavior changed. Believe me, that is an understatement. He came out of the bedroom to breakfast in levis and a T-shirt. It was on Sunday. "Aren't you going to Sunday school?" I asked.

"Does it look like it?" he replied


curtly. It was the first time he had been curt.

Christians, too, are to honor their leaders, be at peace, warn, comfort, support, be patient, and do good (vv. 12-15). Question Time: What is one comfort the

Then, as time permits, discuss each, stressing especially those which you feel apply to the group. Discuss ways in which these exhortations can be made real in the life of each member of the group. Verses 23-28 are Paul's benediction in this letter. From them emphasize God's faithfulness to His children.

Question Time: How can the Christian learn to give thanks "in every thing"? What important values are there in avoiding "all appearance of evil"?

Question Time: How did Rahab show her faith in God? (Joshua 2:4) What reward did her faith bring? (Joshua 2:12-14)

HIS PRESENT WORLD

Evangelism GOSPEL MISSIONS REPORT 85,543 DECISIONS LAST YEAR

A total of 85,543 "decisions for Christ" were recorded last year by the 272 units of the International Union of Gospel Missions in the U.S. and 17 other countries, it was reported at the group's annual meeting in Charleston, West Virginia. C. E. Gregory, president of the International Union, and superintendent of the City Mission at Cleveland, Ohio, said the total number included men, women and children.

The 272 gospel missions served 7,366,116 meals during the year, furnished beds for 2,190,198 persons, and assisted 21,628 families. In addition they conducted 66,264 religious services that were attended by 3,298,780 persons, Gregory said.

CONVERSIONS TO PROTESTANT FAITH FIVE TIMES MORE NUMEROUS

The Protestant magazine *Christian Heritage*, in an attempt to learn why Protestants and Roman Catholics change their religion, sent a questionnaire to 2,370 pastors throughout the U. S. There were 437 replies from 33 different denominations, indicating a high degree of interest in the situation. The compiled statistics reveal that "in the past five years, for every Protestant church member turning Roman Catholic, there were five Roman Catholics who embraced Protestantism."

Publications FILTHY LITERATURE TRACED TO POLAND

Congressman John Dowdy of Texas says that many of the obscene magazines being sold in the U. S. are published in Poland. It has been proven, he declares, that the Communists are using pornographic literature, written in English, to infiltrate American youth and demoralize our country. (Mr. Dowdy is chairman of the interdenominational Churchmen's Commission for Decent Publications.)

POST OFFICE STEPS UP ITS FIGHT AGAINST OBSCENITY

In its stepped-up battle against the mailing of obscene materials, the U. S. Post Office obtained 23 percent more arrests this past fiscal year than the former year. It apprehended one of its own postmasters who was engaging in the smut traffic. Following the arrest of Acting Postmaster John H. Wells of Farhams, Massachusetts, and his wife, postal inspectors searched a safe in the post office and found 1,000 obscene photos. Mr. Wells has been relieved of his postal duties and has been convicted and fined \$2,000 for possessing pornographic material.

Authorities also won a conviction against Dr. Herman L. Womack, formerly a Washington, D. C., college professor, who was allegedly using a post office box located in the lobby of the Post Office Department building itself. He was convicted on 29 counts for selling nude male photos and received a three-year prison sentence. He had a mailing list of 40,000 names, postal inspectors said.

On July 18 President Eisenhower signed into law a bill which will give the Postmaster General greater power and freedom in his fight against the mailing of obscene materials.

CATHOLIC POLITICIANS BOUND TO VOTE BY CHURCH RULINGS

Party discipline need have no hold over a Roman Catholic member of parliament if his conscience or the edicts of his church are in conflict with party directives, the authoritative Catholic periodical *Palestra del Clero* declared recently.

According to a *Religious News Serv*ice dispatch from Rome, the periodical was commenting on the actions of sev-

ADRIAN, Michigan—A hand-written copy of the Bible has been completed by the Christ's Ambassadors (youth) group of the Bethany Assembly of God in Adrian. It was the main feature of the church booth at the Lenawee County Fair in August.

This unusual project attracted hundreds of viewers each day and gave opportunity to church members to witness for Christ and to distribute gospel literature to fairgoers. Thousands of "Hi Neighbor" tracts as well as Evangels and Sunday School papers were given out with invitations to church services.

Children were given baloons with invitations to Sunday School. Teen-agers were given copies of the C. A. Herald. Various phases of C. A. activity were on display, including Speed-the-Light and Servicemen's Division. The Missionettes also displayed their projects.

The book is about a foot thick and weighs more than 20 pounds. Nearly eight months were required to complete it. Included in the first few pages are letters of congratulations to the young people from President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, and Governor Williams. eral Italian members of parliament who in recent years voted either secretly or publicly against their party or parliamentary group to bring governments crashing to the ground. The Catholic periodical declared:

"A representative of the people can and must vote and act politically against the directives of his party when he is sure in his conscience that the supreme good of the nation demands it and above all when the church intervenes with ruling and norms."

MASSACRE REPORTED IN TIBET

According to a Tibetan priest, Chinese Reds routed nearly 4,000 lamas (Buddhist priests) following the escape of the Dalai Lama from Tibet last year. The lamas were placed in a prison camp near Lhasa, the Tibetan capital, and ordered to work on construction jobs. When about 1,000 refused, they were starved to death by the Communists. In March, 1960, the remaining 3,000 lamas revolted, killed or overpowered the guards, and fled, according to word reaching Katmandu via this Tibetan priest.

AMERICAN INVENTOR EXPLORING SEA DEPTHS ALONG ISRAEL'S COAST

Edwin A. Link, who invented the famous Link Trainer for training pilots before they take to the air, has designed a vessel for underwater archaeological exploration. At present the 56-year-old American inventor is exploring the waters off Caesarea, Israel, in his special craft, the *Sea Diver*. He is being assisted by a crew of twelve, including his wife and nineteen-year-old son. Israeli divers are augmenting the team.

The venture is sponsored by the America-Israel Society, Princeton Seminary, and other institutions who look upon it as one of the most important probes of the ancient port of Biblical times.

SHIPS OLD AND NEW ON DISPLAY IN ISRAEL

Israel's Navy and Merchant Marine are among the newest in the world, yet the land of the Bible has a nautical past that dates back thousands of years. The story of shipping is told in a most interesting display in the Maritime Museum in downtown Haifa.

Dominating the scene are some 100 ship models, all built to scale, representing the evolution of shipping from around 3,000 B.C. to the present day. Tourists visiting the museum also see artifacts from craft which floundered off the Israel coast ages ago.



What is the kingdom of God?

In a broad sense, the kingdom of God is the sphere of God's rule and operation, whether it be in time or eternity. For us individually it is "righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost" (Romans 14:17).

Is it right to call the Bible The Holy Bible? God says we are not to add to, or take away from the writings of this book. Rev. 22:18, 19.

The term Bible means book in the Greek language. When we speak of the Holy Bible we distinguish the Word of God from other books.

Ought not we to pray that the dead might be raised as Paul did? Acts 20:12.

Since "nothing is impossible with God" we dare not say God could not raise the dead in our day, but were one raised in answer to prayer it would be "a special miracle." All men must die. Our bodies are mortal. God's appointed time for us to receive new bodies is when the Lord comes.

Should Christians observe the Passover?

Christians observe the Lord's Supper in place of the Passover. "This is the new testament in my blood," Jesus said.

Should Christians engage in lawsuits?

Christians should be able to settle their differences within the church. Let the church, by appointments which it makes to hear and decide differences, judge our causes. It could be that to resort to law might in some circumstances be necessary in dealing with the world since the law is made "for the lawless," but as much as possible let all believers avoid going to law. "Agree with thine adversary quickly whiles thou art in the way with him; lest at any time the adversary deliver thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee to the officer, and thou be cast into prison" (Matthew 5:25).

Is the Jewish law still in effect?

The law is "for the lawless and disobedient, for the ungodly and for sinners, for unholy and profane, for murderers of fathers and murderers of mothers, for manslayers, for whoremongers, for them that defile themselves with mankind, for menstealers [kidnapers], for liars, for perjured persons [perjurers], and if there be any other thing that is contrary to sound doctrine" (1 Timothy 1:9, 10).

For the believers "Christ is the end of the law for righteousness" (Romans 10:4). Christians have a new standard and example in Christ. They have a new power and life in the Holy Spirit. Through the Spirit "the righteousness of the law is fulfilled in them (Romans 8:4). Faithful Christians worship God, giving Him first place. They make no idols, worship no idols, do not take the name of the Lord in vain, they honor their father and their mother, do not murder, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not bear false witness, and do not covet. (See Exodus 20:1-17.) All the principles of the law are fulfilled in loving God with all the heart and loving one's neighbor as oneself. "Love worketh no ill to his neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law" (Romans 13:10). In salvation the grace of God saves, but it makes no provision for lives which disregard the principles of God's law.

You Are What You Read


AN INTERVIEW WITH A CHRISTIAN PSYCHIATRIST

Henry A. Pucek

Question: It has been said that "You are what you read." Does this have any base in psychological fact?

Answer: Yes indeed! Just as physiologically one is what he eats, so psychologically he is in an important measure what he reads. Just as food is assimilated into the body, so what one reads is incorporated into his psychic structure. Actually, many engaged in the study of the psychodynamics of human behavior would change this to say that "you read what you are." All behavior is causative, they maintain; every human act has some specific motivation. So we ask what motivates a person to read a certain type of literature. In treatment, this gives us a better understanding of the individual; and when we see what type of literature he reads, this gives us a clue to what might be a problem area.

Question: Does continued reading of a particular type of literature tend to



Answer: In everyday living, we reflect the scientific dictum of the Russian scientist, Pavlov; namely, conditioned reflex. As we repeat a process it becomes a natural part of our psychological and physical make-up. We establish a habit pattern. Incidentally, these habits generally reflect the conscience or attitude of our parents or a parent substitute.

Question: There has been some controversy about whether or not the reading of obscene and violent literature would stimulate anti-social behavior. Would you comment on this?

Answer: This is becoming more of a crusade than a controversy, as many individuals in various fields of human behavior are decrying the violence and obscenity in lurid literature as affecting attitudes and behavior of the impressionable mind. While we cannot specifically lay all the blame on the influence of this literature, it is undoubtedly another factor (and possibly the precipitating stress) in the culmination of the violent act. It is a sort of auto-hypnosis, for the reading helps the crime to become more meaningful and appealing in the mind of the youngster or disorganized individual. "Sin is a monster which we abhor at first. Next we tolerate it, and soon we are

embracing it." The repeated influence of obscene literature will undoubtedly weaken moral defenses, deteriorate ego strength, and stimulate the reader to anti-social and pathological behavior.

Question: Can you cite any experiences along this line?

Answer: A young man under observation in the psychopathic hospital of a large city told how he read many different books on crime, noting where the criminals had failed. Obsessed with a drive for success and money, he eventually died in the electric chair for having killed a man. Too, the famous Loeb and Leopold case recalls the preoccupation with violent literature.

Question: If the previous question is true, would the opposite also be true? That is, would wholesome reading stimulate rational and relevant behavior?

Answer: Yes, stories and articles portraying successful business men and missionary heroes, for example, afford readers an opportunity for certain vicarious participation in Christian activity. The young reader incorporates in his own psychic makeup the strength of this ego-ideal. He wishes to be like or to emulate the hero in the story or article. This has a profound influence, for it further conditions the individual to follow his Christian precepts and more closely walk with God.



In this process of living for his Saviour, he becomes an altruistic individual instead of ego-centric—alert and sensitive to the needs of those around him.

Question: Comment on America's reading habits or the lack of them—from the psychiatric viewpoint.

Answer: People are conditioned by their environment-and what they read reflects this. In our culture, Veblen's theory of Conspicuous Consumption (i.e., "Keeping up with the Joneses") is everywhere evidenced. Even in Christian circles, financial success is a criterion for one to be admired and respected-often beyond normal limits. For this reason, secular books telling how to "make a million" in real estate or in the stock market have become best sellers. Other individuals whose psycho-sexual development has been retarded may find a vicarious thrill in reading books like that of the movie star who wrote about "my wicked, wicked ways." This manifests immaturity in their attitudes toward sex. It is unfortunately true that some Christians do not regard Christian literature as especially interesting and inspiring. This is not so much an indictment against the literature as a reflection of the influence of our current technological living where many minds are incubating under the TV light. This type of audio-visual "non-aid" creates lethargic minds.

Question: Is there any particular




thing you could say about Christian magazines and their contribution to our psychological well-being?

Answer: As I have previously indicated, many individuals find inspiration in Christian magazines. Uplifting articles, graphically presented, often have more influence than the spoken word, for the individual has sought out the article as one of interest to him and one that may be meeting a specific need at the moment. Where individuals may have weak and uncertain faith, Christian literature helps to firm it with what we might call an alter-ego-that is, the example of the transmitted strength and trust of the Christian writer. I personally am very happy to see much of Christian literature today offering help for individuals grappling with the problems of everyday living. How important it is that such information be presented within a Christian frame of reference.

Yes, we are what we read.

The wrong kind of reading material can lead to psychological disintegration, can condition an individual to lowered standards of thought and morality... but the right kind of wholesome Christian literature can contribute much to the development of solid, integrated, Christian personality and action. We are what we read... so let's read what we ought to read in order that our lives may be all that God wants them to be.

REVIVAL in Orange Free State

UNTIL JUST A FEW YEARS AGO, LITTLE was known of Orange Free State, a province of the Union of South Africa. The discovery of what is believed to be the world's second richest gold reef has caused this area to come into world-wide prominence almost overnight. Where only a little more than a decade ago there was nothing more than fields, today modern flourishing towns have come into being.


This unexpected growth in industry and population opens up unlimited opportunities for evangelism in Orange Free State. Through the ministry of Philip Molefe, an African national evangelist, a revival began at Vereeniging and has spread throughout Southern Transvaal and into the Orange Free State.

When Brother Molefe began a campaign in Virginia, Orange Free State, people from throughout the Orange Free State, parts of Basutoland, and Southern Transvaal attended the revival services. Many were saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. On the very first night of the revival a member of the Location Advisory Board was saved. He had been a drunkard, and when his wife saw the change in his life she also was converted.

A girl who could neither speak nor hear was brought by her parents to be prayed for. God honored their faith and her hearing was restored instantly as we prayed. On the second day she began to speak. Another totally deaf girl from Maseru was healed completely.

One young man who belonged to a "tsotsi gang" was wonderfully saved. His testimony of salvation led other members of his gang to Christ.

The African clerk at the Provincial Hospital came to the meeting and told Brother Molefe that not a single stabbing case had been admitted to the hospital since the meetings had begun. This highly educated African was so impressed by what God had done that he gave his life to Christ also. The nurses came to see what was changing

the stabbing "tsotsis." As a result, several of them were saved.

At a recent convention of Orange Free State and Southern Transvaal approximately five hundred delegates from various towns of the province gathered in Welkom. Missionaries E. D. Pettenger and Vernon Pettenger met with us to give special thanks to God for what He has done in the Orange Free State during the past few years.

On Sunday morning of the convention 422 children gathered with their teachers for a great Sunday school session.

On Sunday afternoon more than twenty children were dedicated by Brother Molefe. It was wonderful to see these consecrated parents dedicate their children to God.

Special singing was provided for the convention by the choirs from Sharpeville, Welkom and Odendaalsrus. They were anointed by the Holy Spirit and were a real blessing to the convention.

Although the revival services have closed, yet the Holy Spirit is still moving throughout the Province. The unusual move of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the new converts in Virginia is especially outstanding. On one Sunday morning fifty were filled with the Holy Spirit. On the following Sunday twenty others received the Pentecostal experience.

Unbelievers who were curious about this demonstration of the power of God came to observe these strange happenings. The Holy Spirit convicted their hearts and many were wonderfully saved.

One of the most feared "tsotsis" of the area who lived in the bush and made his living through robbing is also a 'new convert. He is very well known to the police because of his many arrests and jail sentences. Today he is saved, filled with the Holy Spirit, and is a Sunday school teacher. He now has a job and this outstanding transformation is a testimony among the police ranks.

Now that God is blessing so wonderfully, we feel that we must do our utmost to assist in every way possible to see the establishment of solid and lasting works. The Lord has enabled us to assist in building a church for the white people in Welkom but there is not a church for the African nationals in Orange Free State.

More than three years ago we were given a government grant for a church site in Odendaalsrus. We have only been able to build the pastor's house and lay the foundation of the church. The believers are busily making bricks in anticipation of their new building. They are crowding into a little iron shack week after week and praying that the Lord will supply them with the materials which are necessary for their own church.

As the government authorities are beginning to realize that Africa's only hope is Christ, they are urging us to speed up our evangelization program. Pray for us that we may be able to take advantage of every opportunity offered to us in winning the lost of South Africa

Evangelistic Thrust in the Bahamas

M OST PEOPLE ARE ACQUAINTED WITH the Bahama Islands only by visits to Nassau, the principal city and the center of a wealthy tourist area. In this city we have three substantial, selfsupporting Assemblies.

Few people, however, are acquainted with the vast out-island reaches where national workers are laboring under the most primitive and sacrificial conditions.

Income on most of these islands is from fishing, which is seasonal, thus causing the economy of the out-islands to be very fluctuating. Despite this, national workers have succeeded, by their own efforts, in establishing a large number of congregations and in providing suitable meeting places. Much of this work, however, is supported by supplemental offerings from the churches in Nassau.

It was my privilege recently to visit the Bahamas and to minister in the Assemblies of God conference there. I am happy to report that a new evangelistic thrust is being made in this foreign missions field that is geographically so close to the United States.

The Foreign Missions Department has approved the appointment of Mr. and Mrs. Caleb C. McAfee as our

missionaries. Brother McAfee is the newly-elected superintendent of the Assemblies of God in the Bahamas. Under his supervision the Christians of the Bahamas will be able to work unhindered in the far reaches of their island chain.

The McAfees soon will be itinerating in the United States to raise sufficient support for their missionary work. One of the principal needs in the islands has been Bible school training for young men interested in entering the ministry and for those already preaching. Missionary Paul Davidson, during the past year, has been conducting short-term Bible courses through the islands. This work will be continued by Brother McAfee who will also spearhead a new evangelistic thrust into the towns and communities of the hundreds of islands outside of New Providence, the island on which Nassau is located.

The present officers of the Assemblies of God in the Bahamas, in addition to Brother McAfee, superintendent, are: Leonard Chappell, assistant superintendent; Earl Weech, pastor of Evangelistic Temple, Nassau, and secretary-treasurer of the Assemblies of God in the Bahamas; and Brother Bethel, presbyter for the out-island work.

KUALA LUMPUR, MALAYA— June 28. This is one of the most amazing places I've seen! I had expected a village of thatched houses and a food market in a rubber plantation! Instead I found a large city of beautiful modern buildings.

Just outside Kuala Lumpur is Petaling Jaya, known as "Malaya's first new city." Though only eight years old, it already has 50,000 residents. Hundreds of attractive new homes are springing up everywhere. There are fine new highways and residential streets. Businesses are booming, and industries are moving in rapidly. Yet the whole thing is as clean and picturesque as a park.

Kuala Lumpur and Petaling Jaya, like Singapore, are made up largely of young people. The vast University of

Malaya, architecturally magnificent, is filled with eager young people hungry for education.

In the midst of this beauty and accelerated progress is the work of the Assemblies of God. There is an attractive church in Kuala Lumpur, while Petaling Jaya is the site of the new Assemblies of God Bible school, which fits in beautifully with the other new buildings of this mushrooming city. I was privileged to minister a number of

HONG KONG-July 10. Just out of Hong Kong in the New Territories near the communist border, a conference of tremendous spiritual importance has just taken place. It was the first East Asia Conference of Assemblies of God missionaries and national workers. The Ecclesia Bible Institute in Shatin was the site of the conference, attended by representatives from Japan, Korea, the Philippines, Indonesia, Singapore, Malaya, and Burma. Philip Hogan, Assemblies of God foreign missions director, and Maynard Ketcham, field secretary for East Asia, were in charge.

Because of tight immigration regulations, many delegates came only after great difficulties. But all agreed it was well worth the effort. Much constructive work was accomplished which should help shape the course of our future work in this area. Each delegate seemed concerned with how he could more effectively reach the masses for Christ. This was indeed a united

nations gathering on the highest level!

Hong Kong is a city of towering hills and prosperous merchants, surrounded by Communist China. Little political tension is evident; everybody is too busy making money. The streets are jammed with every kind of conveyance.

The First Assembly of God, pastored by Missionary Harland Park, is one of Hong Kong's thriving churches. I was invited to speak to the C. A. group there on Saturday night. It was thrilling to watch their shining faces as they sang their own C. A. chorus. After a prolonged consecration service, they presented me one of their beautiful C. A. pins. The C.A.'s, expressed sincere appreciation for Speedthe-Light equipment.

High up on the hills surrounding the city are the flimsy tin and scrapwood homes of countless refugees. The Government is doing what it can to put up permanent structures for this great influx. At best, the quarters are crowded and inadequate, but they are certainly much better than the makeshift places thousands of unfortunate people call home. During the Shatin Conference a neat new Assemblies of God church in one of these resettlement areas (pastored by Missionary Dale Barber) was dedicated.

Hong Kong, sitting on the doorstep of communism, needs the prayers of God's people everywhere.

BANGKOK, THAILAND — July 12. Bangkok, capital of Thailand, is something like a glorified Disneyland. It has an intricate system of fascinating canals filled with floating markets —small sampans loaded with everything from fruit to raw rubber. Sellers

and housewives in sampans of all sizes congregate on the canals to negotiate their business. Anything edible from fresh fruit, exotic herbs and spices, live chickens, terrapin, and shellfish to meat of the "barking deer" can be purchased.

Waves from the motorboat in which I was riding sank a small boat full of vegetables, together with its shopkeeper -a lady of large proportions. Pandemonium reigned for a few minutes as people on shore raised the sunken boat and rescued the woman. They even rescued part of her vegetables. The first thing she did was to count her dripping paper money, get back into the boat, rearrange her produce, and start out again with a business-as-usual attitude. The canals are so crowded that two eyes are painted on the prow of each boat so that it can see its way through the snarl of traffic.

About 23,000,000 people live in Thailand (formerly known as Siam). The national religion is Buddhism claiming over 90 per cent of the population. Every man is expected to enter a monastery for at least a few months in his life to become thoroughly familiar with the religion of Buddha. This, however, is not compulsory.

There are nearly 400 colorful temples in Bangkok. Thai people call it "Metropolis of the Dieties." In one temple is a huge Buddha made of about eight tons of pure gold! In the "Wat Po" temple is a colossal bronze "Reclining Buddha" 160 feet long. The soles of the feet are flat and made of an intricate design of inlaid mother-of-pearl.

Perhaps the most famous of all is the temple of the Emerald Buddha. The porch of the temple entrance is one vast altar. The Buddha itself is only about 18 inches high and is made of jade. The temple is continually filled with Buddhist monks that prostrate themselves before the relic.

As yet there is no Assemblies of

God work in all Thailand. The doors are wide open to the gospel and the king is known as "the upholder of all faiths." However, all religious broadcasts are banned except Buddhist.

I spoke in the small Finnish Pentecostal church here. This is the only Protestant church in the Dhonburi section, just across the river from Bangkok, with a population of more than a half million! Certainly, in this land that is wholly given over to religion, there should be additional forces to lift up the name of Christ!




BANGALORE, INDIA—July 23. India has not yet witnessed the mass revival sweeping much of East Asia, but the steady advance of the gospel is most encouraging.

Our Evangelistic Center in Calcutta is the first new Christian church to be built in India in the last 100 years. The construction was not done without heartaches, however. At one point the work was stopped by government order with a demand that it be demolished. But through much earnest prayer and with the help of Speed-the-Light funds, the work was resumed and the building completed. A fine congregation now worships there. Except for a splendid indigenous Bengali church, this is the only Assemblies of God work in a city of seven million.

In Lucknow, I watched Missionaries Paul Schoonmaker and Mal Blakeney completing a recording studio in the basement of the new Assemblies of God church. The recording equipment was supplied by Speed-the-Light. These two missionaries periodically devote weeks of concentrated effort to making gospel broadcasts. These are cleared through Missionary Bob Merian and

subsequently released for broadcast over FEBC.

As I stepped off the plane in Bangalore I spotted Missionary John Wright, principal of the Southern Asia Bible Institute, filming my arrival. I then saw an inspiring line-up of the Speedthe-Light vehicles used in this areaa bus, Jeep, Jeep station wagon, car, motor scooter, and four bicycles! All were gaily decorated with flowers and Speed-the-Light signs. Two huge garlands of sweetscented white jasmine and red roses were placed around my shoulders as a welcoming gesture. They hung to my knees! What a royal welcome, and what a glorious procession as the Speed-the-Light parade moved down the streets of Bangalore!

It was thrilling to minister to the young men of Southern Asia Bible Institute. These godly young men have been called from many different areas, even as far away as Fiji, with a burning passion to carry the gospel to all parts of India.

One of the very unique ministries being carried on here is the Home Study Division, led by Missionary Ken Weigle. They send a "Life of Christ" study course free to all who request it. Small ads are placed in the classified sections of a few newspapers. From these, the division is swamped with requests not only from India but from 33 other lands as well. One single classified ad in a communist newspaper of South India brought 800 responses-many from Mohammedans! This course is being sent out in four languages and there are at present 9,307 enrolled. Already, 1,974 have taken the course and received certificates. Martha Kucera, veteran missionary connected with this work, said: "Where the missionary cannot go, the postman can go." The courses are mailed in plain wrappers to keep them from being destroyed before reaching the student.

Many of the testimonies from those who have already taken the course read like this one: "I have faith in Jesus Christ and in His precious Word. I bought your book for one anna and I read it. I am very grateful to Jesus and to you for that good book. It created faith in me. Now I am prayand become a Christian. I do not know what to do first about that. I know there will be oppositions from my people. But I believe that Jesus will hold me through. I have full confidence in His words. So after getting my letter, please write to me, telling what is the first step I have to take."

While India has yet to see a great sweeping revival, we can praise the Lord for what is now taking place in this land—the home of nearly onequarter of the earth's population. * * *

As this article was prepared, Kenneth Short was completing his roundthe-world itinerary—ministering in Africa and Europe.

This firsthand report testifies of victories already won through the united efforts of Christians at home and abroad. With the help of Speed-the-Light, missionaries have been able to increase their effectiveness for God to reach those who would otherwise have been unreached.

But we are also challenged to move forward for God. There is yet much to be done. Many remain in darkness. Only as we give ourselves and our resources to God will we be able to *speed the light* to those in darkness. Let us witness world-wide. tive purposes of the sacrificial death of Christ are thwarted and defeated if we are not walking in the holiness of God. A Christian has only one purpose in this world and that is to reveal Jesus Christ in all His beauty and glory to a sinful race. A Christian is also absolutely worthless unless he is revealing Jesus Christ.

A missionary said recently, "One of the bitterest moments of my life was when an earnest young Buddhist boy said to me, 'I want to believe in Christ, but I have never seen Him in those who profess Him. How can I believe in someone whom I have not seen?""

Paul shared in the sufferings of his blessed Lord for the holiness of the Church. He toiled mightily in the presentation of the truth of redemption, that the churches might be conformed to the image of God's Son. He labored in earnest conflict, in mighty intercession against the forces of darkness, in order that he might present every one of the converts matured and perfect in Christ.

THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL

"Him we proclaim, while warning every person and instructing every individual in the whole range of wisdom, so that we may present every person complete in Christ. And for this I toil, wrestling with the energy with which so powerfully He energizes me" (Colossians 1:28, 29—Berkeley).

This Gethsemane ministry is seen again in his words to the church at Galatia: "My little children, for whom I am *again* suffering birth pangs until Christ is completely formed (or moulded) within you..." (Galatians 4:19, literal).

The apostle had travailed the first time for their salvation, and now he travails the second time for their sanctification. It cost this man of God more anguish and heartache to bring these Galatians to full Christlikeness than to bring them to a saving knowledge of His Person. The true undershepherd enters into the longings of the Chief Shepherd. Alas, many Christian leaders of today have never entered into the sufferings of the Redeemer. Is it because they are smug and complacent? Is it because they shrink from entering into their anguish of their Gethsemane? Is it that they have never entered into the truth of God's plan and purpose of redemption, the holiness of His blood-bought people as is revealed in Ephesians 5:25, 27:

"Husbands, love your wives, as Christ also loved the Church, and gave Himself for it, that, having purified it by the water wherein it is washed, He might hallow it by the indwelling of the Word of God; that He might Himself present unto Himself the Church in stainless glory, not having spot or wrinkle, or any such thing, but that it should be holy and unblemished" (Conybeare).

No one can be mightily used of God in bringing revival to his church who has not himself been made conformable to the death of Christ. (Phil. 3:10).

Oh, how cold much of the Church is today! She is cold in her prayers. She is cold in her worship. She is cold in her singing. She is cold in her service. She is cold in her Bible study. She is cold in her giving. She is cold all the way through because she is cold in her devotion to Christ. Occupied with the glitter and glamor of the world with its comforts and its pleasures, she has slowly but surely drifted

away from her deep intimate love-life with her ascended Lord. Instead of leaning on the bosom of her Saviour like John, she is following Him afar off as did Peter. Professing a name that she lives, she carries on week by week a cold, mechanical routine of worship and witness, a nauseating spectacle for the Head of the Church. Unless she repents she will be spewed out of the mouth of the Priestly King. While we thank God for the glorious truth of John 3:16, we must never forget the solemn message of Revelation 3:16. What a tragic picture we see in the church at Laodicea, with the Redeemer standing outside the door, seeking admission: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock."

Out in the dew and the cold He stands, The drops of night are on His hair; In patient love He waits without; And who, who keeps Him there?

Our ear is sealed, our heart is cold, And we refuse both hearth and fare; He speaks, we hear not: Ah, 'tis we, Yes we, who keep Him there!

Because of the coldness in love and loyalty Christ is standing outside the door of many assemblies of His people today. CHRIST IS SUFFERING UNTOLD AN-GUISH BECAUSE OF THE PERSECUTION OF HIS PEOPLE.

Paul learned the truth of the Redeemer suffering on behalf of His suffering body when, as a proud enemy, he sought to destroy the Church. Breathing out threats of destruction against the disciples of the Lord, he was hurrying on to Damascus to exterminate the little group of saints in that city. Arrested and apprehended, he heard an accusing voice from heaven saying, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me?" This boastful Pharisee discovered that when he was persecuting the Church on earth, he was persecuting the Head in Heaven.

The believers in the apostle's day carried on the gospel witness in the face of great opposition. And when the apostle was converted, his sufferings excelled all the sufferings of the other persecuted members of his day. Read his writings to the churches and see how he entered into their sorrows. Not only was he fully identified with them in fervent intercession and through the faithful presentation of God's truth, but he himself was fiercely

persecuted for Christ's sake and the gospel's. The heartbreaking account of his sacrifices and sufferings is found in his second letter to the Corinthians:

"I am hard pressed, yet not crushed; perplexed, yet not despairing; persecuted, yet not forsaken; struck down, yet not destroyed; in my body I bear about continually the dying of Jesus, that in my body the life also of Jesus might be shown forth. For I in the midst of life, am daily given over to death for the sake of Jesus, that in my dying flesh the life whereby Jesus conquered death might show forth its power" (2 Corinthians 4:8-11, Conybeare).

Christ is still suffering because of the persecution of His people. In some Moslem lands the churches are composed of as few as five members and these pass through the fires of affliction daily. In other heathen lands the people of the Lord are cast into prison, beaten and deprived of their livelihood. In their anguish they are crying unto the Lord to give them grace to continue their vital witness as good soldiers of the Lord Jesus. The Church in America must share the burden of our dear Redeemer on behalf of His weak

infant Church in these pagan lands. Yet the picture today is heart rendinginasmuch as a rich proud, prosperous Church has no real fellowship with the sufferings of the Saviour on behalf of His little flock in the furnace of sorrow.

Seven hundred years before Calvary the Holy Spirit portrayed for us the suffering Saviour. The fifty-third chapter of Isaiah fills us with sorrow and sadness when we think of what Christ endured to pay the price for our redemption, but our hearts are lifted up with joy and thanksgiving when we read in verse eleven the words, "He shall see of the travail of His soul and be satisfied." Blessed be God, one day our Kinsman-Redeemer will see the final fruits of Calvary's sufferings when the last soul is gathered in!

PRAYER CHANGES THINGS

His deep longing over those for whom He died.

"He was not willing that any soul perish; Am I His follower, and can I live Longer at ease, with a soul going downward,

Lost for the lack of the help I might give?"

Such was the concern of the apostle Paul, who labored fervently night and day in order to evangelize the perishing multitudes. F. W. H. Myer, in his famous poem "St. Paul," seeks to put into the apostle's mouth the burning desire of his heart:

"Then with a rush the intolerable craving Shivers throughout me like a trumpet call—

Oh, to save these! to perish for their saving,

Die for their life, be offered for them all!"

Hear his battle cry as he contemplates his visit to the wicked city of Rome: "I am debtor! I am ready to preach the Gospel...!" He not only wept for the salvation of the lost, but he suffered and sacrificed in exhaustive evangelistic labors in order to fill up that which was lacking in the body of Christ. Flogged, stoned, imprisoned, shipwrecked, suffering untold thirst in burning deserts, cold and hungry, he gladly identified himself with the sufferings of his Redeemer in his yearning over lost souls.

No man can enter into deep fellowship with the Lord Jesus who does not enter into His longing for a lost and dying world. Just as Garabaldi recruited his army with which he liberated Italy by calling for such who were ready to accept hardship and death, so the Lord would recruit His army from those who are willing to follow Him to death. "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of man hath not where to lay His head." An easy-going, selfish Church can never be conquerors in the battle of the Lord. It is said that when the knights of King Arthur's court returned from the field of battle, if they did not bear in their body some scar of the conflict they were thrust forth by the king with the command, "Go, get your scar!" Oh, how few of us can say with Christ's faithful warrior, "I bear in my body the brand-marks of the Lord Jesus" (Galatians 6:17, free translation).

Said Chalmers, that brave Scottish missionary, as he looked back upon his labors among the heathen, addressing his Lord:

"Recall the twenty-one years of my service; give me back its shipwrecks, give me its standings in the face of death, give me it surrounded by fierce savages with spears and clubs, give it back to me with arrows flying around me; give it back to me with clubs knocking me down—give all this back to me and I will be Your missionary still."

While I was conducting an evangelistic campaign in the city of Neuchatel, Switzerland, with La Marechale (Mrs. Booth-Clibborn, the eldest daughter of William Booth), she asked me to visit with her one of the most sacred spots to her soul. This I discovered was a prison. She had been sent by her father when a young lady to plant the flag of the Salvation Army in France, Holland and Switzerland. While evangelizing in Neuchatel, she was arrested and confined to a lonely cell in this prison. Now, many years later, she sang exultingly the very hymn that she wrote during this time of imprisonment:

"Best-beloved of my soul, I am here alone with Thee; And my prison is a heaven Since Thou sharest it with me. "All my life is at Thy service, All my choice to share Thy cross; I am Thine to do or suffer, All things else I count but dross."

Oh, brethren, this is no time to be cold and indifferent! This is no time to be occupied with social and financial prestige here on earth. These are the last days of a dying dispensation of Grace, and we must sacrifice and suffer with our blessed Lord until the last soul is gathered in. Let us not shrink from sharing His suffering, no matter the cost.

John Henry Jowett entered into the significance of the words of the battlescarred warrior when he said:

"I fill up that which is behind of the sufferings of Christ," wrote Paul. That is not the presumptuous boast of perilous pride; it is the quiet, awed aspiration of privileged fellowship with the Lord. Here then, is a principle. The gospel of a broken heart demands the ministry of bleeding hearts. If that succession be broken, we lose our fellowship with the King. As soon as we cease to bleed we cease to bless. When our sympathy loses its pang we can no longer be the servants of passion. We no longer 'fill up the sufferings of Christ.' And not to 'fill up' is to paralyze and to 'make the cross of none effect.'

"The ministers of Calvary must supplicate in bloody sweat, and their intercession must touch the point of agony. If we pray in cold blood, we are no longer the ministers of the Cross. True intercession is a sacrifice, a bleeding sacrifice, a perpetuation of Calvary, a 'filling up' of the sufferings of Christ.

"My brethren, this is the ministry which the Master owns, the agonized yearnings which perfect the sufferings of His own intercession. Are we in His succession? Do our prayers bleed? Have we felt the painful fellowship of the pierced hand? I am so often ashamed of my prayers. They so frequently cost me nothing; they shed no blood. I am amazed at the grace and condescension of my Lord that He confers any fruitfulness upon my superficial pains."



HOME MISSIONS

STL Builds **Churches Too**

A NUMBER OF PIONEER CHURCHES over the nation have received substantial assistance from the C.A.'s Speed-the-Light offerings. This may surprise some, for Speed-the-Light is usually associated with the foreign missionary work. The fund was set up originally to provide vehicles for our foreign missionaries, and it has been a source of tremendous blessing on all the foreign fields.

But the C.A.'s recognize the fact that there is missionary work to be done in the U. S. A., also. Therefore it was decided some time ago that Speed-the-Light offerings that were not designated for some particular project would be divided so that 20 per cent could be returned to the district from which it came, where it would be used for erecting church buildings in pioneer areas.

Thus Speed-the-Light has played an

important part in helping struggling new assemblies get established. Here are stories of just a few of those grateful pioneer churches that have benefited in this way.

CRESTVIEW, FLORIDA

Crestview, Fla., a subdivision of Kresge (having a population of approximately 14,000) boasts a lovely little new brick church. A large farming area surrounds Kresge. Several industries are located in or near the city, as well as the Elgin Air Force Base. One of the Crestview church members is a pipeline contractor who is now engaged in a \$5,000,000 project in the town.

The new North Central Assembly. is located on a lovely pine tree drive in a neighborhood of attractive homes. J. D. McVicker began the effort in 1956 with 22 in Sunday school. The property was purchased by the West Florida District. This new church received \$874.80 from district Speed-the-Light funds. Although it is only four vears old, indebtedness has been cut to \$2,000 and the property is evaluated at \$18,000. Some of the labor was donated.

The auditorium seats 200 at present. The basement, used for Christian education, can accommodate 200. The Sunday school now averages about 87. The congregation plans to build an annex soon.

James Wellborn, the present pastor, has ministered here a year. During this time the floors in the auditorium have been finished and new church furniture has been purchased.


PORTLAND, OREGON

The Parkrose district is a suburb of Portland, Oreg., a city of 400,000. In 1956, N. D. Davidson, superintendent of the Oregon District, asked the Oscar Martins to conduct a few services at Parkrose Heights and to look into the possibilities of building a church in that area. A group of five adults and a few children were meeting in a rented hall which was quite unsuitable for church services. They were hoping to build and had accumulated \$600 toward the project.

The Martins were able to obtain a loan for a down payment and purchased an excellent site in a new housing development of several thousand people. Since Parkrose is one of the fastest growing districts in the greater Portland area, the potential outreach is almost unlimited.

In 1957 the building project was initiated. The property was cleared and the first unit of a proposed three-unit plan (suggested for pioneer churches by Joe Colombo, chairman of our Na-

tional Church Planning and Building Commission) began to take shape.

When the building was partly erected, depleted funds forced discontinuance of operation for several months. At this critical time the church received \$1,500 from *Speed-the-Light* funds of the Oregon District. Work was immediately resumed and the building was made usable.

The first unit of 2,650 square feet (which consists of a chapel, six classrooms, a nursery, and rest rooms) has been completed and is evaluated at \$35,000. The floors have been tiled with money from WMC groups in the Portland churches.

This Gold Crown Sunday school had an average attendance of 68 this past summer.

IONE, CALIFORNIA

Ione, Calif., having a population of 1,600, is a historic city in the Mother Lode area of California's wild past. It is now the site of one of the State's largest youth reformatories. This last year has seen the beginning of the first new home construction projects on a large scale in fifty years.

Due to some unfortunate circumstances of the past this was a very difficult area in which to establish any Pentecostal church. The small Assemblies of God church struggled on for several years in a totally inadequate building until the spring of 1958 when the effort was abandoned.

In the meantime, the District C. A. Department was looking for a promising area in which to invest some Speedthe-Light funds. They wanted a place with a potential for supporting a church, but which might need assistance in erecting an adequate church building. The Christ's Ambassadors and Home Missions Departments of the District jointly selected Ione as a suitable town. They purchased property and God performed a miracle when the city decided to grant them a building permit.

The new church received \$5,000 from the district *Speed-the-Light* home missions fund. The Northern California-Nevada District Home Missions Department agreed to furnish another \$5,000 in the form of a bank loan. Paul Seaberg was called as pastor.

Paul Seaberg was called as pastor. In April, 1959, the 38-by-50-foot building was dedicated. It was built from a National Home Missions Department plan, "The Evangel," designed by Architect Jim Shade (a few alterations being made for economy). The auditorium will seat approximately 100. Landscaping and some finish work is still in progress.

When the first service was conducted in the new building there were ten people present. Growth has been slow but encouraging. The highest attendance at a regular service has been forty. The congregation is looking forward to steady growth from now on.

GRAFTON, OHIO

Chester F. Roig began the new church at Grafton, Ohio, now known as Midview Assembly of God, in August, 1957, while he was pastoring the Litchfield Assembly. The only suitable meeting place he found was the Grafton Town Hall.

Although this town of 3,000 is almost totally Catholic, it has a Methodist mayor who was able to persuade the Town Council to permit Brother Roig to use the hall for Sunday afternoon services. Later the congregation was permitted to use it on Thursday nights also, and eventually for revival meetings.

In the meantime, Brother Roig also conducted cottage prayer meetings. Many Grafton inhabitants favored and supported the meetings. The Midview area, with a population of over 10,000, had no full-gospel services prior to the beginning of the new assembly.

The Roigs conducted services in Grafton on Sunday afternoons for fifteen months, in addition to their regular responsibilities at Litchfield. Attendance averaged 39 for the first quarter. In November 1958 Brother and Sister Roig came to Midview Assembly full time. Sunday school average attendance reached 104 recently.

A lovely church building now houses this fast-growing new assembly. Constructed of concrete block, the 88-by-32-foot building is stuccoed and has a sandfront. A wing for educational purposes is to be added as soon as possible. L. L. Foster, pastor at Galion, Ohio, drew the plans for the church. The property is evaluated at \$30,000 and only \$10,000 indebtedness remains.

Just when no more money was available to continue the building project, the church received \$1,000 from District *Speed-the-Light* funds. This made it possible to continue operations until the church could get a loan from the local bank. Some of the neighboring assemblies provided financial assistance and labor. Members of the congregation also donated labor. The potential for soul winning in this growing community is tremendous.



the world in its mission to reach the lost for Christ.

RAHAB, A WOMAN OF FAITH

Sunday School Lesson for October 23, 1960 JOSHUA 2:1-15; HEBREWS 11:31

God had assured Joshua that He would enable Israel to conquer Jericho, yet Joshua felt it was necessary to send spies into the land in order to obtain information which would assist them in their actual seizure of the city. "And Joshua...sent out two men to spy secretly, saying, *Go, view the land, even Jericho.* And they went and came into an harlot's house, named Rahab, and lodged there."

THE CONDUCT OF RAHAB.

1. Her falschood. Whatever disguise the spies employed was all in vain. Watchful eyes reported their presence to the king, who in turn sent soldiers to Rahab's house demanding the surrender of the two men. Meanwhile, Rahab had hid the spies on the roof, and now she told the messengers she did not know where they were. It is useless either to uphold or condemn Rahab for her double lie. She lived in a comparatively unenlightened age. She may have been unaware of the fact that there was any great sin either in her mode of living or in her lie to save men's lives.

2. Her treachery to her own people. In shielding the spies Rahab was really being instrumental in the destruction of her own people and city. She has been accused of despicable treachery. In reality, her conduct was justifiable in that she was simply recognizing a higher loyalty than loyalty to her people—a loyalty to divinely-implanted convictions that the God of Israel was the true God and that to fight against His people would be to fight against Him. Her action proved she was well on her way to justification in the eyes of the Lord. See Matthew 10:34-42.

THE FAITH OF RAHAB.

"By faith the harlot Rahab perished not with them that believed not, when she had received the spies with peace" (Hebrews 11:31). "Likewise also was not Rahab the harlot justified by works, when she had received the messengers, and had sent them out another way?" (James 2:25). In tropical forests lovely orchid blossoms are found growing on rotten pieces of wood. Similarly, on a pagan creed, an immoral life, and a heathen environment, an equally unexpected and beautiful flower of righteousness may begin to unfold itself. Such a flower was the harlot Rahab.

1. Her faith at first was inspired by fear. She had heard how God had enabled Israel to conquer its enemies and she feared for the safety of herself and her loved ones. Nevertheless, was not this faith of value? Were not many of us motivated by fear of punishment when first we sought the Lord?

2. Her faith was undoubtedly fed by the spies. No sooner had the king's men gone than Rahab went to the housetop to' give further aid to the spies. And while she helped them, undoubtedly they witnessed further to her of the goodness, grace, and power of God. So there on the housetop Rahab made her decision for God. She had convictions concerning Jehovah. Furthermore she was true to them and acted upon them—and it is such decisiveness which brings the grace and power of God into mighty transforming action in any life!

3. Her faith was the result of sound reasoning. The fact that the God of Israel had parted the waters of the Red Sea and had delivered Israel from Pharaoh led Rahab to believe that such a God must be the true God.

4. Her faith was maintained in spite of surroundings which were against her. Here was a woman who lived in the midst of heathenism and unbelief, yet was true to her convictions concerning Jehovah. Here was a woman who could stand alone! Does she not teach us that faith may flourish in an unfriendly atmosphere?


5. Her faith was accompanied by compassion. This is just another way of saying that Rahab's faith was proved genuine by her works. She was a good daughter, tenderly concerned for the welfare of her parents and loved ones. Is it not true that genuine religion begins at home?

6. Her faith was rewarded greatly. Her own life, as well as the lives of her loved ones, were spared from destruction. Rahab later became the wife of Salmon, a prince of Judah, and consequently an ancestress of Jesus Christ!

Rahab stands out as a glorious monument to the transforming power of the grace of God. Her story ought to encourage us to believe that the same power can transform all of us, even the most lost of men, until we become the very opposite of what we were by nature.

Saved By Reading the Bible

O NE WHO HAS NOW GONE TO BE with the Lord used to tell of his experiences in seeing the Bible at work. Here is the story:

"As a young man lately arrived from England, I was wandering one evening in the bush in Australia, having lost my way, when suddenly I saw a light; and making for it I found myself at a large farm. I asked permission of the farmer to pass the night under cover, who somewhat surlily said, 'You can go into the barn if you like, but there is someone there already.'

"I thanked him and went into the barn, and by the light of a lantern I saw another man lying in a corner coughing violently. After putting down my gun and shooting-bag, my only luggage, I went over and asked him if I could do anything for him.

"Speaking with difficulty, he told me he was an Englishman, had been at the same university as I; but in early life, having disgraced his family, he had been sent out to the Colonies, and had led a dissolute life for fiveand-twenty years. Now he felt he was about to die. Did I know anything about the hereafter? he asked, as he was anxious to find out what was going to become of him.

"I was totally ignorant of God and His grace at this time; unconverted; a man of the world. I said I thought the Bible was the book he needed. 'Oh,' said he, 'the Bible. Why, my mother put one in my box when I left home. I have never opened it yet. Will you go and get it out and bring it here?' "I went into another shed and got the book and brought it to him. 'Now,' he said, 'where are we to turn?' and we both confessed we did not know. 'Well, clap it together,' he said, 'and see where it opens.' I did so, and the book opened at Isaiah 53.

"I began to read, 'He is despised and rejected of men; a Man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief,' and the dying man asked, 'Who is the He?' I hazarded the reply, 'Jesus Christ.' 'Ah,' he said, 'go on,' and I read slowly on until I came to the words, 'All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way.' 'Stop,' he said, 'that's me, that's me; that's just what I have done all my life,' and after a little while he said, 'Go on.' 'And the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all.' 'Ah,' he said, 'Jesus Christ!' And then a minute or so after, 'Read it again.' 'All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all.'

"He lay back on the straw, and I quietly read on. Turning over the pages I found some passages about Jesus" Christ in the Gospels. After some time he asked me to leave him, which I did, and I was soon fast asleep.


"In the morning, the beams of the sun were making their way through the boards of the barn when I awoke. Going over to the place where my poor friend lay, I was struck by the change in him. His face seemed to have caught some of the sunbeams; he looked so happy and peaceful; no cough, quite at rest. I did not understand what had happened, but he said to me, 'The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquities of us all—*Jesus Christ* is my Saviour.' He told me that in the night the Lord had come to him and showed him His hands and side, and now all was joy and peace.

"I listened, but thought he must be light-headed, but it was because I saw no beauty in the One he was so occupied with now. The day or two that he lingered he could not hear enough or talk enough of 'Him.' Shortly be-fore he died (for he passed away while I tarried at the farm) he said to me, 'I have a request. I want you to write in the flyleaf of this Bible an account of your meeting with me here and reading to me Isaiah 53:6, and of the 'Him' it speaks about, Jesus Christ. And how the Lord came to me in the night, and how I die believing on Him as my Saviour. I want, if I can, to put my name to it, and I want you to put yours, and then pack it up and send it to my father in London,' and he gave me his address.

"I did as he requested, and soon in the rush of a godless life forgot the incident. Many years after this I was converted. One day, while in London, I was musing over my life in Australia, and I thought of this incident. I wondered whether the Bible ever reached the old father, and determined to call on him.

"I made my way to the proper address and was shown into the presence of a very old man sitting in his library alone. After making myself known to him I inquired if he ever received the Bible. 'Indeed I did,' he said, and he drew a book from the drawer of his desk. 'Well I remember receiving it,' he said, 'I was then a careless man of the world, without God and without hope, but through infinite mercy, on reading what you and my poor son pointed me to in Isaiah 53: 6, my eyes were opened to my sinful condition, and soon after to Him, Jesus Christ, my Saviour, and from that time to this I have not ceased to praise Him."

Thus the Spirit of God graciously encircles the globe, overcomes all obstacles, brings to bear the particular verse of Scripture at the particular time, and illuminates the soul as to Christ. May the readers of these lines be led by the same Spirit to know and confess Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

apparently for no cause that I could see. I was heartbroken! Disillusioned! He wasn't at all what he had pretended to be at first. And I didn't give myself time to really put him to the test; I had married an unsaved boy whom I really had only known fortyfive days. And I said it couldn't happen to me!

Not only that; he started drinking and has drunk heavily from then on. He is cynical in his attitude toward religion, blames bickering in the church for it.

PROBLEMS OF DIVIDED HOME

No one *really knows* the problems of a divided home unless he or she has experienced it. Nor is it possible for me to convey what it is like. Soul anguish is something I simply cannot put into words.

Take the children, for example. We have two bright, healthy little boys. Neither one is old enough yet to really understand why daddy does not come home night after night. But the older one is starting to wonder. What am I going to tell him? What is there to tell him?

The strain of a torn-up home tells on them and on me. When Martin is "taking it out" on me with his drinking, prolonged absences, and sullenness, I find myself—quite unconsciously—



"taking it out" on the children. A few times I have had to drop to my knees, sobbing convulsively, and ask God's help. "Forgive me, Lord, for slapping Jimmy in anger, and give me grace sufficient for the day."

"Why not leave him?" This has been suggested by friends, well-meaning perhaps; but I will not yield to it. I do not believe in divorce. As the apostle Paul said, "The wife is bound by the law as long as her husband liveth" (1 Corinthians 7:39). Marriage is binding until death, except for the one cause (Matthew 19:3-9). I find that in my case-that of a woman with an unsaved husband-God's Word says, "If he be pleased to dwell with her, let her not leave him" (1 Corinthians 7:13). For myself, to go contrary to this plain teaching would be to sin against light.

Then there is the matter of friends. Martin has nothing to do with my Christian friends. I hesitate to bring them home for fear he will either be drinking or insulting; and to say the least, I miss the fellowship of others of "like mind." There are times when all of us, humanly speaking, need to lean on others for spiritual comfort and encouragement. I am denied this comfort in my companion and in close personal friends, because of the home situation.

I, of course, have little in common with the kind of people Martin brings to the house. You can imagine what the atmosphere of the home is like when they are around. It's not easy to be fervent about the things of the Lord in such an atmosphere. Gradually it wears you down.

Our Sunday routine, I suppose, is like that in most homes where the partners live in two worlds. I get myself and the children ready for Sunday school and church. Martin sleeps. When I return, he is ready to go out for a holiday, to places where I, by conviction, cannot go on Sunday. And so it goes on, Sunday after Sunday.

Occasionally, strong feelings of resentment well up within me. I see whole families seated together in church—happy families. There I am, alone, trying to manage two restless children. I have not known complete happiness in my marriage. True, the children bring some measure of happiness, but it is offset by the fear I have for them and their future should Martin remain unsaved for a long time. My husband and I have never prayed together—not once. He devotes most of his leisure time with cronies, not with me and the children, spending money foolishly that should go for necessities. I live in dread of what he is going to do next. I cannot trust him nor take his word at face value; probably it is a carry-over from his awful false pretence in the beginning, and certainly from the way he has treated me since then.

With nerves raw and on edge, I sometimes come near to the breaking point, and have to choke back a cry, "Why do I have to pay for what he is doing? Do I have to suffer all my life for one mistake?"

SPIRITUAL LIFE SUFFERS

More than anyone else, I know my spiritual life has suffered. I have neglected important things. I am not the Christian I ought to be, nor can I really serve God under the circumstances. When I married Martin, I did not marry his unbelief, but it is awfully hard to keep his cynicism from taking root in my thinking. Oh! the awful distress that one suffers from being pulled from two sides.

If we are not to put asunder what God has joined together, then it follows that we are not to join what He has separated. God does not sanction mixed marriages—Deuteronomy 7:3, 4; Amos 3:3; 2 Corinthians 6:14-16; James 4:4—for a reason! He knows the inevitable cruelty, anguish, and injury which result to both parties. I don't believe I could bear up under it, had I not the assurance that Martin is going to be saved. Pray God that it will be soon.

I believe every pastor ought to counsel with his young people before their marriage. The pastor in whose home I was married never gave us any kind of counsel or word of caution. Nor did he inquire into the matter of spiritual status. If, beforehand, such counsel had been given, and such inquiry made, it might have helped.

The most important thing is for young people to know positively, before they are married, that they are both Christians and that they have the same interests in life. As one minister put it, "Make sure your friend is a true believer in Jesus Christ. Do not wait until the courtship develops, for you may be too weak to halt it. Before the first date, settle this subject. Even then you will want to pray much about your courtship and marriage."
