THE EMPTY CROSS

I had never thought much about the empty Cross until one day when God gave me a vision of it.

A friend and I were praying in my home when it seemed God lifted me up in the Spirit and I found myself on Calvary's hill. I could see the vivid green of the grass beneath me, and when I looked up I found I was kneeling at the foot of the Cross. But the Saviour was not on it—the Cross was empty! It looked so old and gray and tattered.

I wondered why I was being shown this, but even as I wondered Jesus suddenly appeared, clothed in white. He stood a little distance away, looking at me tenderly but saying nothing.

There was no need for words—I knew what the message was! His words of victory from Revelation 1:18 rang out again, "I am he that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and of death."

Thank God, Jesus is not dead! He is not still nailed to the Cross as some might think. The dead Christ hanging on the crucifix is for the dead religion it represents. His work on the Cross is *finished* and now He "ever liveth to make intercession for them."

It is to the *living* Christ we pray. It is the *living* Christ who saves, who answers prayer, and baptizes with the Holy Ghost, and who heals sick bodies. It is the *living* Christ who is coming again for all those who have personally accepted His finished work on the Cross.

The empty Cross speaks of a glorious resurrection.

THE RISEN BODY

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is of the gravest moment, and the person most anxious to prove His bodily resurrection was our Lord Himself.

He pressed the evidences upon the disciples. "See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself," He urged. And again, "Handle me and see... feel the nailprints." We are told "He showed them his hands and his feet."

All law courts accept a scar as a sufficient proof of identity; for a scar, after the wound is healed, can be so shaped and placed as to be unique and decisive.

So it was here. Not only did the prints in the palms and the soles confine the body examined to one of the three crucified, but the scar under the ribs identified it as the only body that had the spear-thrust.

It was therefore no reincarnation: the body was His

As a wound inflicted in childbirth or in infancy can bear a scar which survives all the physical changes of a lifetime, so the body of Jesus, passing under the mighty changes of resurrection, nevertheless carried the death wounds. The body had not been carried off by angels. It had not dissolved into its constituent gases. Jesus said, "It is I myself."

SOMEONE DID COME BACK!

To Job's haunting inquiry, "If a man die, shall he live again?" we fling back the unflinching affirmation, "He shall!" Christianity dares to be so dogmatic in its answer because of the empty tomb. The resurrection of Jesus Christ carries with it the certainty of the soul's immortality. As the Saviour Himself said to His disciples on the night of betrayal: "Because I live, ye shall live also" (John 14:19).

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Our Hope Abides

"And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three," the apostle said. In a world that is sick with fear, troubled and discouraged by the gathering clouds of trouble, hope is something very precious. It is rare as a treasured jewel—and yet it is freely available to all who will trust in Christ.

A review of a recent play by Jean Anouilh entitled, "Antigone and Eurydice," reflected the Greek feeling about hope. It quoted the heroine as saying, "We are of the tribe that asks questions and we ask them to the bitter end until no tiniest chance of hope remains to be strangled by our hands."

Such was the pessimistic view of the philosophers of ancient Greece. They considered hope an illusion and therefore evil. Their world view was fatalistic—fate was unchangeable to them and left no room for hope.

"It was indeed daring of the apostle Paul," says Wilbur C. Westerdahl (writing in *The Tie*, Council of Evangelical Churches of St. Paul, Minnesota), "to write to Greek Christians in the midst of such a pessimistic culture and to declare to them that hope should stand alongside love. In this Paul was faithful to his Hebrew heritage, as well as his Christian convictions. The Jews, a people of faith, were also a people of hope."

"Hope thou in God," the Psalmist said. "Why art thou cast down, O my soul?" George Muller once said there are only two reasons why our souls need ever be cast down. "If we are yet unconverted we have ground to be cast down—or if we are converted and live in sin, then we are rightly cast down. But except for these two things there is no ground to be cast down, for all else may be brought before God in prayer with supplication and thanksgiving. Regarding all our necessities, all our difficulties, all our trials, we may exercise hope in the power of God and faith in the love of God—and in His own time, help will come."

The Christian's hope is strong and sure, pledged by the Word of God and endorsed by the resurrection of our Redeemer. We have a living hope that abides in the living Christ. Because He lives we shall live also. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ," wrote Peter, "which according to his abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you."

This is our glorious hope. D. M. Panton said the root of the word "hope" in Anglo-Saxon means to open the eyes wide, and to watch for what is to come. How well this describes the Christian's attitude as he watches daily, hourly, and momentarily for his returning Lord. "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:13).

There is joy in this hope. It brings strength and peace. The fact that Jesus lives today and that He soon will come to take us to live with Him forever in our heavenly home is a hope that lifts our souls and makes our spirits sing. May that hope abide with us and grow brighter every day. May the Lord answer the apostle's prayer for every one of us: "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, in the power of the Holy Ghost" (Romans 15:13).

MEN OF ALL AGES HAVE ASKED questions about the hereafter. "With what body do they come?" asked Paul the apostle, in regard to the resurrection of the dead (1 Corinthians 15: 35). Even in Job, the oldest book of the Bible, we read, "Man dieth, and wasteth away: yea, man giveth up the ghost, and where is he?" (Job 14:10).

Saints of all ages have been confident that after death they would see God. We quote again from Job who uttered, during the time of his affliction, those immortal words, "But as for me I know that my Redeemer liveth, and at last he will stand up upon the earth: and after my skin, even this body, is destroyed, then without my flesh shall I see God; whom I, even I, shall see, on my side, and mine eyes shall behold, and not as a stranger" (Job 19:25-27, A.S.V.).


And in Hebrews 11:13-16 we are told that the Old Testament saints died in faith looking forward to seeing the Lord.

We read also in the New Testament that when a Christian dies he leaves the physical body of flesh and goes immediately to be with the Lord. "Therefore we are always confident, knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body we are absent from the Lord: (For we walk by faith, not by sight:) We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord" (2 Corinthians 5:6-8).

"For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain. But if I live in the flesh, this is the fruit of my labour: yet what I shall choose I wot not. For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better" (Philippians 1:21-23).

This brings us to a question about which many believers wonder. What kind of body will we have after death and resurrection?

WHAT THE BODY WILL NOT BE It will not be the same body as was buried. "And that which thou



sowest, thou sowest [buriest] not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain" (1 Corinthians 15:37). Surely God would not give us the same old bodies as were buried, such as infant bodies, crippled bodies, deformed bodies, aged bodies.

It will not be an earthly body. "There are also celestial [heavenly] bodies, and bodies terrestrial [earthly]: but the glory of the celestial is one, and the glory of the terrestrial is another. Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God; neither doth corruption inherit incorruption" (1 Corinthians 15:40, 50).

It will not be subject to material things nor be bound by walls or closed doors. "Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you" (John 20:19).

It will not be subject to the law of gravity. "And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9). "Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord" (1 Thessalonians 4:17).

It will not be subject to sexual appetites. "For when they shall rise from the dead, they neither marry, nor are given in marriage; but are as the angels which are in heaven" (Mark 12:25).

WHAT THE BODY WILL BE

It will be a body according to God's pleasure. "But God giveth it a body as it hath pleased him, and to every seed his own body" (1 Corinthians 15:38).

It will be like Christ's glorious body. "Who shall change our vile body [body of humiliation], that it may be fashioned like unto his glorious body, according to the working whereby he is able even to subdue all things unto himself" (Philippians 3:21). "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is" (1 John 3:2).

It will be a spiritual body. "It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body" (1 Corinthians 15:44).

It will be an incorruptible body. "So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption; it is raised in incorruption" (1 Corinthians 15:42).

It will be a heavenly body. "And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly" (1 Corinthians 15: 49).

It will be an immortal body, not subject to death. "Behold, I show you a mystery: We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed. For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory" (1 Corinthians 15:51, 53, 54).

Inasmuch as the body will be like Christ's, it will be a body able to eat and drink. "And while they yet believed not for joy, and wondered, he [Jesus] said unto them, Have ye here any meat? And they gave him [Jesus] a piece of a broiled fish, and of an honeycomb. And he took it, and did eat before them" (Luke 24: 41-43).

It will be a body able to appear and disappear momentarily. "And it

EVERY MOMENT OF THE EARTHLY LIFE OF JESUS CHRIST was an expression of the will of God. At no time did He deviate one hair's breadth from it.

Yet it is evident that He had a supreme goal in view—a crisis to which His entire earthly life moved. It was an hour of destiny. He called it "mine hour." It was the climactic hour which would see the realization of the great and eternal purpose of His coming to this earth—the moment of His majestic and redeeming death on the cross of Calvary. After this "hour" of fulfillment, things became completely different.

At the very time when He instituted the holy communion He promised: "I will not drink henceforth of this fruit of the vine, until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom" (Matthew 26:29).

A breath-taking scene takes place—described to us in Revelation 19:5-9: "And a voice came out of the throne, saying, Praise our God, all ye his servants, and ye that fear him, both small and great. And I heard as it were the voice of a great multitude, and as the voice of many waters, and as the voice of mighty thunderings, saying, Alleluia: for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth. Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready.... And he saith unto me, Write, Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb."

It may be that we already have partaken of our last communion here on earth. The next could be interrupted by His coming!

service. However, we have a deadline in the use of talents, time, money, and spiritual gifts. Our opportunities will not last forever. "Look carefully then how you walk. Live purposefully and worthily and accurately, not as the unwise and witless, but as wise—sensible, intelligent people; making the very most of the time—buying up each opportunity" (Ephesians 5:15, 16, Amplified New Testament).

Our probation on earth will then give way to our jubilation in heaven. Christ will say to His faithful stewards: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord" (Matthew 25:21). Surely "till He come" denotes a date with destiny!

Our temptation will end.

At present we "are temporarily harassed by all kinds of trials and temptations" (1 Peter 1:6, Phillips). But this "proving of your faith is planned to bring you praise and honor and glory in the day when Jesus Christ reveals himself" (1 Peter 1:7).

To brace up and fit the disciples for their trials Jesus said: "Ye are they which have continued with me in my temptations. And I appoint unto you a kingdom" (Luke 22:28, 29).

We have no reason to suppose that in heaven crowns will be distributed like souvenirs, but we do have good grounds for believing that "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him" (2 Timothy 2:12). Our coronation will come when the contest ends.

Our limitation will vanish.

Even we ourselves "which have the firstfruits of the Spirit...groan within ourselves waiting..." (Romans 8:23). Although by the redeeming power of Christ we are delivered from the penalty and power of sin, we are limited by its presence in creation and by its effects upon our body. But this is only "till he come."

At that day our limitation will hold us no more—our manifestation as sons of God will take place. "The whole creation is on tiptoe to see the wonderful sight of the sons of God coming into their own" (Romans 8:19, Phillips). Then "the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God" (Romans 8:21). The manifestation of the sons of God awaits *His* manifestation as THE Son of God.

Our separation will be over.

We love our Lord and Saviour, yet we have never seen Him. The anticipation of this vision glorious fills us with "joy unspeakable and full of glory." In addition, the separation from our loved ones who have died in Christ will be over.

With our separation ended, our mobilization will commence in accordance with His promise: "If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive

you unto myself" (John 14:3).

The summons for such mobilization will be when "The Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God" (1 Thessalonians 4:16). One word of command, one shout from the archangel and one blast from the trumpet of God, will signal the start as Christ sets out from heaven on His return. The effect of such mobilization will be that "the dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord" (1 Thessalonians 4:17). This deadline has dramatic dimensions!

Our consternation will cease.

The ways of God are inscrutable. We peer at them with myopic vision and see but dimly. The Master's guiding words to us are often misunderstood as they were by Peter when Jesus said to him, "If I will that he [John] tarry till I come, what is that to thee? Follow thou me" (John 21:22).

So Paul admonishes us, "Judge nothing before the time, until the Lord come" (1 Corinthians 4:5). There are many misunderstandings that await this moment. But our consternation will receive its full and final explanation. "What I do thou knowest not now (the sum total of all of life's puzzles and mysteries); but thou shalt know hereafter," our Lord promised (John 13:7).

"At present all we see is the baffling reflection of reality: we are like men looking at a landscape in a small mirror. The time will come when we shall see reality whole and face to face. At present all I know is a little fraction of the truth, but the time will come when I shall know it as fully as God now knows me" (1 Corinthians 13:12, Phillips).

All these things are only till He come! Zero hour draws near. Maybe the countdown has already begun!

God Can Banish

YOUR CHILDREN'S FEARS

JACK, AGE SEVEN, CAME HOME FROM school the other night shocked and excited. A boy in his class, together with two smaller sisters, had died tragically the night before when their home burned.

Of course, the children had talked of it at school all day. Jack had been unable to eat lunch. He would not eat supper until dessert tempted him. Shortly after going to bed he lost that. A little later I heard him screaming and found him crying, choking, fighting about his room in half-awake panic. He couldn't tell me what was terrifying him but, in this case, I knew.

I put him back in bed, held him close, and picked up the Bible near his bed. Quiefly I read him Isaiah 43:1, 2.

"Fear not: for I have redeemed thee, I have called thee by thy name; thou art mine. When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee."

Jack sighed with relief and relaxed. "Is there any more to make me feel good?" he whispered, "What else did He say?"

This time I chose Psalm 103:1-4. "Bless the Lord, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies."

Now I saw he was sleeping peacefully, and he was not disturbed again that night.

We looked about our house the next

morning to see what fire hazards there were and cleaned a lot of old clothes and papers from boxes in the attic and basement. We practiced fire drills, too. The children were shown how to tie a handkerchief over their noses and creep along the floor to safety to keep below the smoke. My husband put a sturdy permanent ladder up to the porch roof under the children's bedroom and our older ones practiced climbing down it.

We have six children and, from the time the oldest one was about eleven months old, we've been fighting their various fears; but each little one has had a different way of showing fright. Some rush right to me with their troubles. Others can't seem to talk about what scares them. I first know something is wrong when they start being naughty, won't eat, can't sleep, and cry without reason.

When any fear threatens my child, I first take it to God. I ask Him to give comfort and wisdom to help in the battle.

Children face fears before they can talk, and I often pray aloud for them. This never fails to comfort them... and soon I see them turning to God with prayers of their own, taking things to Him they cannot even express to me. I try to help them learn one lesson which I honestly believe: we cannot know Christ and stay afraid. For me, fear is a thing we meet unexpectedly. It's like an animal that leaps without warning. And I've never been able to avoid being occasionally, temporarily afraid.

When our Danny first started school, he loved it. Then, suddenly, he would not eat breakfast. I had to force him to start the short walk to school. He would not tell me why he hated it so. I talked to his teacher, but she had no clue. She told me he

That night we talked things over with Danny. "You can go to school another way or you can learn not to fear the dog," I told him. "Don't you remember, 'Fear not, for I am with you alway'?"

He considered me gravely. "What was it about the sparrows?" he asked.

"Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear ye not therefore, ye are of more value than many sparrows" (Matthew 10:29-31).

He learned to say the verse by heart, and he walked past the dog willingly. He had deepened the faith that could make him fearless with God beside him.

The dark has always frightened my children. They do sleep with night lights, which I think are safety features, but I hated to see them nervous about the loveliness of the night. One dark night in the summer, we took a powerful flashlight and sat under a tree in the dark on the front lawn. They shivered and huddled closer to me at a terrible racket... and we saw a dog chasing a kitten. Then the children trembled at a threatening thud from beyond the fence. The light showed one of our cows peacefully grazing.

Suddenly Michael spoke up: "The heavens declare the glory of God..." He hesitated, and I finished for him, "And the firmament sheweth his handywork. Day unto day uttereth speech, and night unto night sheweth knowledge" (Psalm 19:1, 2).

"Let's learn those verses," Donna spoke up, "Then we could play hideand-seek in the dark and have a lot of fun." They did just that, too.

Another aid I have against the dark are some records of pleasant music, fine poetry, gentle stories of Jesus, and some of the most beautiful Psalms. When the children are in bed, I often let these play until sleep closes every eve.

In our section of the country, death-dealing tornadoes strike each spring. Our children happened to see some pictures showing the aftermath of an especially terrible tornado. The scenes were enough to frighten anyone. Our Billy has a very keen and sensitive mind, and they affected him especially. Each time a storm came up and the wind rose, he came running to us, frightened. The first few times I took him to our storm cellar where he was assured of safety. And while the high winds howled, we repeated Isaiah 26:

"Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee."

Then one night a particularly violent wind arose. Breaking branches struck the house. I hurried to Billy's room, thinking he'd be terrified. But I found him lying peacefully in bed.

"Oh, Mother," he said, sleepily, "I'll just say my verse here in bed, I guess." As I left, he was repeating the words in perfect peace and trust.

One day our doctor told us that Donna, who was then just over six, must go to the hospital and have her appendix out. Donna has always been a sunny, happy child, but she is very shy. If she goes to the store for me, I must write the order down, even if it is just one or two items. If any thing must be explained to her teacher and I cannot do it in person, she wants to carry a note.

She felt badly about the operation, though we talked it over with God. Also, we played that she was in the hospital. I put her to bed, and pretended to be the nurse, taking her temperature, feeding her, even pretending to give her a shot. She enjoyed all that, but still I could see she was disturbed. Finally she told

Nuns Get Liquor License

According to a UPI report from Edinburgh, Scotland, nuns at Trachrogue House, a guest home run by a religious order are practicing the art of bartending. The guest home is Scotland's first religious establishment to obtain a liquor license.

"We're very pleased to have this license," said one nun. "It means we shall be able to cater for our guests properly."

Bill Would Prohibit Cocktails on Airliners

U.S. Senator Olin D. Johnston (S.C.) has presented a bill in Congress which would prohibit the serving of free cocktails on commercial planes.

"There is no reason in the world why passengers who do not drink, but who wish to travel first class, cannot do so without paying a price that covers the cost of liquor they do not consume," the senator said.

Bible

Bibles Distributed on Philadelphia Waterfront

Representatives of the Pennsylvania Bible Society regularly visit ships along the Philadelphia waterfront and offer Scriptures to officers and members of their crews. The organization is an auxiliary of the American Bible Society.

On visits recently to 384 ships, 11,-132 Scriptures were distributed. Because Philadelphia is a port of call for ships of many nations, the Scriptures are provided in a variety of languages and are carried all over the world.

Gideons Give Scriptures to Antarctic Explorers

Members of the Gideons International recently presented a hundred copies of the New Testament and a

hundred additional copies of the complete Bible to personnel of the U.S. Navy's "Operation Deep Freeze," which is headquartered at the Christchurch (New Zealand) Airport. All men attached to the operation will be offered the Scriptures for their companion as they go out to explore unknown areas of the Antarctic.

Illustrated New Testament Now Ready

Publication of a slick-cover edition of the New Testament in the King James Version, profusely illustrated with photographs and selling for one dollar, was recently announced in New York City by the American Bible Society.

Twelve years in the making, the new 259-page edition was produced by rotogravure and contains 566 photographs, nine maps, and six diagrams to illustrate various portions of the New Testament in the light of recent archaeological and historical studies. A similar edition in Spanish was published simultaneously.

Since it was founded in 1816, the American Bible Society has distrib-

uted more than a half-billion volumes of Scriptures. It is a nonprofit organization supported voluntarily by churches and individuals of many denominations.

Bible Reading Ban Called Serious Blow

Methodist Bishop Fred Pierce Corson of Philadelphia said that the recent court decision barring Bible reading from Pennsylvania public schools "will be a serious blow to the public schools."

If the Federal District Court's decision is permitted to stand by the U. S. Supreme Court, he said, it will have "revolutionary effects upon the entire system of public education, as well as upon the meaning of separation of Church and State."

Protestantism

Protestant Gains in South America

Evangelist Billy Graham, back from South America where he conducted a month-long crusade in five countries, said that Protestant churches "are growing faster there than they are anywhere in the world."

"Many American church members couldn't qualify for membership in Latin American churches," the evangelist said, explaining that members there cannot smoke or drink and "must devote a prescribed amount of time daily to prayer and attend church regularly."

He said the Pentecostal churches are the most vigorous in South America because they require every lay member to preach on street corners.

Survey Shows Missionaries Risk Leprosy

In modern leprosy work in certain sections of Africa, missionaries stand about one chance in a hundred of contracting leprosy from the people with whom they work.

missionaries in northern Nigeria disclosed that there were twelve cases of leprosy among them. This is a prevalence rate of 13.2 per 1,000 as compared with 35 per 1,000 among the native population in the same year.

In a survey of two schools for missionary children with 223 students in northern Nigeria, only one early, mild case was discovered.

Spanish Court Upholds Protestant Wedding

Protestants in Madrid, Spain, hailed a decision of the Spanish Supreme Court of Appeals in December, which ruled that there was no objection in law to a Spanish Protestant (Baptist) couple contracting a civil marriage in that country.

It is believed that this decision constitutes an important precedent which will bear on similar cases in the future. Under article 42 of the Spanish Civil Code, persons who formally affirm that they are not Roman Catholics may contract a civil marriage. According to an official estimate, Spanish Protestants number about 20,000.

Miscellaneous

Well-known Tract Publisher Dies

Clyde H. Dennis, 48, founder and president of Good News Publications, died February 14 following a long illness with hepatitis. Thirty years ago, when gospel tracts were dull and unattractive, Dennis pioneered an effort to make the little printed messengers colorful and readable.

In addition to his publication plant in Westchester, a Chicago suburb, he established gospel printing plants in Switzerland and Nigeria.

Christendom World's Largest Religious Body

Statistics show that Christendom now constitutes the largest religious body in the world, numbering 888,803,000. This is more than double the next largest group, the Moslems, with 430,325,000.

A breakdown within the "Christian" constituency shows 537,533,000 Roman Catholics, 214,133,000 Protestants, and 137,137,000 Eastern Orthodox. The total world population is estimated at three billion.

In the United States the figures reportedly are: 62,000,000 Protestants, 42,105,000 Roman Catholics, and 2,820,000 Orthodox.

YOUR QUESTIONS



*If God finished His work of creation on the seventh day, how can it be said, "For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth?" (Genesis 2:2 and Exodus 20:11).

The Samaritan and Syriac Versions read, "In six days God ended his work which he had made." Calvin and others translate it as "had finished," making Genesis 2:2 read, "And on the seventh day God had finished his work which he had made."

*What scriptural grounds have you for saying that communication with the dead is not of God, but is the work of the devil?

Throughout the Old Testament period God's people were forbidden to seek communication with the dead. See Exodus 22:18; Leviticus 19:31; and Deuteronomy 18:10-12. In the New Testament we are warned that this practice will bar our entrance into the kingdom of God. Read Galatians 5:20, 21.

Spiritism is demonism, according to Acts 16:16-18. Those who practiced "curious arts" burned their books of instruction when they accepted Christ as Saviour. See Acts 19:19. We cannot warn too strongly any who dabble with spiritism—lest they become demon possessed.

*In Jonah 2:2 we read, "Out of the belly of hell cried I, and thou heardest my voice." Did Jonah die in the fish? Then was he restored to life that he might be a type of our Lord in His death and resurrection? See Matthew 12:40.

Matthew 12:40 does connect Jonah with Christ's death and resurrection, but it does not state that Jonah died. I believe Jonah spoke of hell in a figurative sense. We all have heard people say, when passing through some tormenting experiences "I have been in hell." Such a word is used to emphasize the tortures of mind through which they were passing. Jonah, while inside the fish, felt he was not much better than dead. His life was cut off

from the earth—he was swallowed up in darkness. Moreover he was conscious that his rebellion had cut him off from God and he was suffering from guilt. He cried in this distress, and God heard him.

\$\pi\$ I am told that Jesus was not a fullblooded Jew since Ruth the Moabitess was a maternal forebear. Is this correct?

Jesus had in His lineage, on the maternal side, two women who were not Jewish hy birth: Rahab of Jericho, and Ruth the Moabitess. Jewish genealogy, however, was reckoned through the paternal line—the line of fathers. Jesus, therefore, was just as much a Jew, or descendant through the tribe of Judah, as was either David or Solomon. He was a direct descendant of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; He was of the tribe of Judah.

*In Matthew 16:28, Jesus said, "There be some standing here, which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in his kingdom." It is now almost two thousand years later and He has not come yet. How then could some of His disciples see Him as He promised?

The answer is found in Matthew 17, involving Jesus' transfiguration—when He appeared in kingdom glory. Peter, James, and John saw Him transfigured. I believe Peter had this event in mind when he wrote of "the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ..." (2 Peter 1:16). Peter went on to describe the honor that the Father conferred upon Jesus on that occasion.

The transfiguration also gives us some idea as to what our glorified state will be, when "we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is" (1 John 3:2).

Sunday Evening BREAKTHROUGH

Large Sunday evening crowds have been typical of Pentecostal churches in past years. Can we expect this to continue in the present highly-competitive age?

While I was pastoring in kelso, Wash., the minister of a large neighboring church visited my study one Monday morning and made an interesting observation.

"It amazes me," he said, "to see large crowds at your church every Sunday night as I return home from my own services. Ours is an evangelical church, but we have to struggle to get a handful of people out to our Sunday evening services. Please tell me, what is the drawing power that causes your people to attend church on Sunday night?"

That morning we spent some time discussing why an evangelistic, Pentecostal service is different. Our discussion brought a new conviction to me that a great Sunday night evangelistic service is the very heart of our Pentecostal movement.

Many of my most precious memories of spiritual advancement are framed against the background of an outstanding revival meeting where we meet God—a Sunday evening service that is bathed with the glory of the Lord. The great tarrying meetings have added a great deal to our spiritual advancement.

It is always a thrill to see large groups of young people lost in the Spirit—oblivious to time, perhaps unmindful of term exams to be written the following day. The Sunday night evangelistic meeting has been the scene of many a sinner weeping his way through to God, and Christians being filled with the Holy Spirit.

Recently it was necessary for me to drive through our city during church time. I reflectively viewed the huge darkened churches. Upon my return to our great evangelistic meeting I pondered how so-called Christians could possibly stay at home on Sunday night, for the Sunday night evangelistic meeting has always been an integral part of my own life and that of my children. Yet it is well that we evaluate our Pentecostal fervency in the light of this present day.

The world needs to feel the impact of a major spiritual breakthrough by the church. Evangelism is the very heart of our spiritual progress as a movement. Yet no evangelism program can possibly exist without a strong moving of the Holy Spirit upon the service. The Sunday evening meeting requires the drawing and compelling power of the Holy Spirit to make it effective.

Let us evaluate the secret of our success in reaching sinners for God.

How can we make the evangelistic meeting a blessing to new converts and the young people of our church?

1. There must be a burden for the lost.

No evangelistic meeting is complete without sinners at the altar and new converts seeking for a victorious, Spirit-filled life. It is utter folly to expect an evangelist to bring a revival without believers doing their part in bringing the unsaved to the meeting. What would be your greatest concern if you were the pastor or the evangelist entering the pulpit on Sunday night after having spent time in prayer for the salvation of the lost? Your first question would be: "How many unsaved are here tonight?" Some of my own darkest hours followed one of these meetings where I felt a strong anointing and burden to reach sinners, yet the altars were empty because no one was saved. I have awakened in the middle of the night with a deep sense of failure, realizing that only a few unsaved people had been in the service.

Yet we dare not retreat. We must preach evangelistically and believe God for the salvation of the unsaved. If the minister compromises through discouragement and ceases to preach salvation messages, the program of God comes to a standstill. The next step in reverse would be for this to become just another meeting to bless the saints. That is but a short distance to another darkened church on Sunday night. There is one absolute requirement. Sinners must be present to hear the gospel and to meet God through divine conviction.

It is time we learned how to shift gears to reach the lost. The simple fact is, they are not coming to us as in former days. Therefore we must go to them. We must not be discouraged. There are various ways in which individuals can bring the lost to Christ. A number of our pastors are packing the Sunday night evangelistic service by setting aside one night during the week for personal evangelism.

A pastor recently made this interesting observation: "There are many types of mid-week services in my church, yet I esteem my evangelism night the most important." He continued, "This is not just a night to invite people to Sunday school or church, but to go out and win the lost to Christ through a simple, effective, Holy Spirit-anointed plan—

personal evangelism." This pastor also stated "As the groups return to the church with reports of victory, the prayer time together has all the elements of a Holy Ghost-anointed meeting. You see this spread throughout the Book of Acts. People were not just listening; they were individuals participating in a revolution."

Sunday night services in this man's church reflect the elements of Pentecost. His mid-week efforts are feeding in candidates for salvation and for the baptism in the Holy Spirit. Here are some other factors that make the Pentecostal meeting different:

2. A Holy Spirit-anointed song service is imperative.

Song leading is a God-given ministry. The greatest requirement for any song leader is to reflect his personal concern for the lost and his desire for God. Sufficient time should be given here for hearts to be opened through worship, so that waves of the glory of God might move over the service. Even sinners can detect the anointing of the Holy Spirit on the song service. A leader should no more attempt to lead the singing without the anointing of the Holy Spirit, than the pastor or evangelist should try to preach without it.

3. The testimony service plays an essential part of our Pentecostal services.

This has been a source of untold blessing in our movement. I am deeply convinced that some time must be found in the worship pattern of our church for it. When the church relegates a testimony meeting into the realm of the obsolete, she has deprived the congregation of one of its most potent weapons against Satan. It must be said that the Sunday night evangelistic meeting is still a good place for personal testifying, for testimonies are a powerful tool to bring conviction into the hearts of sinners. We must recognize again that the participation of the individual believer has always been a singular avenue for God to work through, regardless of the size of our churches.

4. The altar call is the major battleground of each service.

Every part of the meeting is focused on the final goal of pulling in the net. The Spirit-filled believers must assist the minister in battling down the leagues of hell. This can be done through intense prayer before the service. Our men's group covenanted with God to spend an hour early Sunday morning in earnest prayer for a spiritual breakthrough in our services. As we participated in such spiritual efforts, it was easy to recognize the cooperation of the Holy Spirit in answered prayers.

As the unsaved are brought to the meeting, members should be alerted to assist the minister in inviting them to Christ. A corps of godly, alert ushers is a prize asset to any minister—particularly during the altar call.

5. Prayer time is indispensable.

This period can be set aside, not only to take special requests unitedly to the Lord, but to open avenues for spiritual worship. These times of praise create an ideal climate for the Holy Spirit to move upon the hearts of the unsaved.

6. The prayer room is the place where many spiritual battles are won.

I favored the use of the prayer room in my church, because there we found strength in united prayer. However, it could be more desirable to invite the unsaved to a public altar. Some years ago, an older minister brought to my attention the fact that the Spirit of God seems to move in waves. There will be a real surge forward in prayer, followed by a period of calm when a number of people have reached the end of the tarrying period. The Spirit of God will move again, and then there will be another pause, and another group will leave. Of course, the small group that stays till the last receives the richest experience.

It has been my practice to encourage the hour of prayer just before the main meeting. The evangelistic service must be preceded by much prayer and certainly followed by much more. This Pentecost Crusade is spotlighting the winning of new friends to Christ. This indicates again that many people are hungry for God.

It is the conviction of many that this is the time of our greatest spiritual opportunity. We must believe God for the greatest harvest of the Church. I believe God has only begun to use our movement, yet we must become obedient to His plan and humbly confess where we have missed Him. We must renew again the fires of consecration upon our altar.

TO THE LANDS OF THE ANDES

Come with ME SOUTH OF THE BORDER to the lands of Latin America. Our immediate destination is Santa Cruz, Bolivia, to participate in the first Bible school seminar of the Assemblies of God in South America.

We leave Miami International Airport about midnight, January 12, and, in the comfort of our Panagra DC-7, wing across the broad Caribbean which is cloaked in darkness so that we do not see the numerous islands spotted on the inky sea.

Stopping at 4 A.M. in Balboa, Panama, we immediately became aware that we are in the tropics. How different this heat from the eight-below-zero temperatures we left in Springfield! We are surprised to see, in this last outpost of the United States, that alcoholic beverages are the chief attraction at the airport. A free port, Balboa offers luxuries of many lands without duty, but the longest lines are queued at the liquor counters. Is this our "best foot forward" for our Latin neighbors?

Guayaquil, Ecuador, is our next brief stop. Walking into the terminal is not a rewarding experience, for there is nothing here but a few Indians trying to palm off monkey heads for shrunken human heads. Flying over Guayaquil upon departure, we become aware of the vast city that sprawls on the lowlands of Ecuador's mountainous terrain. It is here that a nucleus of Pentecostal Christians has formed and petitioned for a missionary. As we look down upon the simple corregated houses and mud streets, we are aware that the Lowell Dowdys have a tremendous challenge as they plan to open our first mission station in Guayaquil later this year.

Following a pause at the oil port of Talara, Peru, we trace the coast-line of the ancient Inca country, bound for the capital city of Lima. The pilot calls to our attention that we are flying over the ancient city of Trujillo which was established by the Spanish conqueror, Pizarro, in 1525. It is gratifying to know that we have a thriving Assembly in this third-largest city of Peru.

Pulling into a steep bank, the pilot maneuvers over the heights of Mount Huascaran which rises 22,334 feet. Only two days before, tons of ice and

rock broke away from the peaks of Huascaran and descended with cataclysmic force upon the unsuspecting villages below. Only eleven minutes from the time the avalanche started, the deluge thundered to the foot of the mountain, leaving behind about three thousand dead and a half dozen villages stripped from the mountain sides. The only survivors were those who were not home! Later reports indicate that several of our church members in these villages were killed; the pastor of one Assembly lost seventeen relatives in the inundation.

Solemnized by this new illustration of how quickly life can be extinguished, we thoughtfully continue our trip. It is only when we follow the coastline into the Lima airport that we return to thoughts of our flight and anticipate the city of Lima.

Built as the "city of kings" by Pizarro in 1535, Lima is capital of Peru and the fifth largest city in South America, with 1,186,600 inhabitants. It never rains in Lima, so they say. Rain is so rare that the roofs of the homes are flat layers of adobe with no weatherproofing. It is a view

of these roofs from the air that marks Lima as a unique stop on our trip to the lands to the south.

Although time does not permit our lingering here, we know there is a strong Assemblies of God Bible school with sixty students under the directorship of Richard Palmer whom we shall meet when we arrive at our destination. This is the alma mater of Domingo Torres and other Peruvian workers. There is also a strong literature ministry which centers in the city and reaches into the mountains of the interior and villages in the headwaters of the Amazon to the north and east.

Leaving Lima, we wonder if our climb into the mountains will ever end. But in three hours we are taken from the desert coasts of Lima to the airport above La Paz, Bolivia. About 14,000 feet above sea level, this is the highest commercial airport in the world, and we are aware of this fact as we step from the pressurized cabin of the plane into the rarefied air of the Andean altiplano. We notice our hearts beating faster and our lungs laboring for oxygen. We are told that those who remain in the city for several hours suffer altitude sickness, similar to sea or air sickness. We are fortunate, however, because Paul Hoff and Don Haas meet us and quickly transfer us to another airport where we make arrangements to continue our flight to Cochabamba. Brother Hoff is working with the Monroe Grams at the Evangelistic Center in La Paz and Brother Haas, brother of Sister Grams, is teaching in a local school.

Although we have been told the flight from La Paz to Santa Cruz does not go on Saturday, the flight does go as far as Cochabamba, and Brother Hoff informs us that a group of missionaries has driven the three hundred miles from Santa Cruz to meet us at the Cochabamba airport. How thankful we are that we can proceed on our trip! Otherwise, we would have missed our scheduled Monday classes. This change of plan is just another of many circumstances which make us feel the Lord has prepared this trip.

In the hour it takes us to reach the Cochabamba airport, we fly over the high Andes and descend to 8,392 feet and Bolivia's second largest city. Here the Leland Goods are stationed and it is a welcome relief to see Brother Good with Missionaries Bryan Mock, and Paul Pugh, and Lawrence Olson at the terminal. With them are Harmon Johnson from Chicago and Joao De Oliveria who teaches in the Bible school in Brazil. Reunions and acquaintances made, we leave the airport for the mission house.

Entering Cochabamba, we drive to the concha (street market) which is at its height on Saturday afternoon. Walking through the narrow lanes between the miniature stalls is an intriguing experience. Native products are in abundance. Literature stalls are on every corner. It is surprising to see how much the Bolivians are reading, but it is disheartening to see the abundance of communist literature and paperback comic books and thrillers translated from English works.

The greatest surprise in the concha is the abundance of American goods. We are told that these products are from Care packages that have been diverted for sale on the black market!

After a hearty supper at the Leland Goods' we retire, for we must leave early Sunday morning and it is an eleven-and-one-half-hour drive through the mountains to Santa Cruz where the seminar is already in session.

As we retire this first night in South America, we reflect on the goodness of the Lord that has made this trip possible and we seek His guidance for the days ahead. This seminar is of vital importance: the results will be felt in Assemblies of God Bible schools in Peru, Bolivia, Argentina, Chile, Uruguay, Paraguay, and Brazil.

As the sounds of Cochabamba city float through the window on the night breeze, we are acutely aware that we are in a strange land and we feel a new urgency to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ while there is time. Closing our eyes we can still see the anti-American signs scrawled on the walls of the city and the host of Roman Catholics in clerical garb at the La Paz airport. We remember the monks and nuns from more than a dozen monastic orders who had gathered to greet the papal nuncio arriving on our plane.

This is a needy land: it is passive to the full gospel and unfriendly to the American way of life if the numerous signs are indicative of popular opinion.

We need not anticipate tomorrow, so we drift off to a peaceful sleep.

"This building, BEAUTIFUL AS IT is, has not been erected to the glory of any denomination, or of any man or group of men. It has been erected to the glory of God."

So said Brother T. F. Zimmerman, our general superintendent, at the dedication of our new headquarters building on Friday, March 2. The dedication service climaxed six days of special activities here at Springfield during which many hundreds of visitors toured the new edifice.

The series of dedication week events began Sunday afternoon with formal cornerstone-laying and flag-raising ceremonies. It included a series of luncheons on ensuing days at which hundreds of local clergymen, educators, and businessmen were our guests.

Other hundreds visited the building on Tuesday afternoon and evening during the general open house. We wish every *Evangel* reader could pay us a visit in our new home. Your many friends who serve you in the various departments here at headquarters would love to greet you and to show you the fine facilities God has provided for carrying on His work.

The building is 360 feet long and it is 105 feet wide where it joins the printing plant of the Gospel Publishing House. It contains 156,000 square feet of floor space including auditorium, cafeteria, prayer chapel, library, bookstore, storage and supply areas, as well as offices, conference rooms, and lounges.

It is appropriate that the words, "Into All the World—Mark 16:15," are engraved on the cornerstone for the new building is the headquarters of the worldwide missionary program of the Assemblies of God.

It is also the center from which the Revivaltime radio broadcast, heard on 380 stations in the U.S. and overseas, originates each Sunday night.

It is here that the editorial offices of

the Evangel and other Assemblies of God periodicals having a worldwide circulation are located. The new building houses more than a dozen service departments which minister to all branches of our constituency.

For nearly forty-four years our headquarters offices were located on West Pacific Street. Between 1918 and 1948 these premises were remodeled and enlarged five times to accommodate the ever-growing operation. In 1949 the production and merchandising divisions of the Gospel Publishing House were moved to a new site where a large, modern printing plant was erected, but the headquarters remained on West Pacific Street until December 1961 when the new office building at 1445 Boonville Avenue was completed. Our work is expedited greatly now that all operations are under the same roof.

The exterior of the four-floor office building is done in molded squares of turquoise porcelainized aluminum divided at intervals by tall panels of gleaming white steel. All the windows are tinted glass. The walls of the foundation and foyer are of Minnesota rainbow granite.

The handsome foyer measures 20 by 40 feet. It contains a receptionist's desk, visitors' lounge, and space for a sculptured mural of Christ's Second Coming which is being created by Warren Straton. Above it, on the third-floor level, is a large conference room attached to the executive offices.

The predominant color in most of the office areas is earth beige accented by the colors of nature. Marbleized tile covers the floors. The building has zone heating and air conditioning for maximum temperature control the year around.

A color guard composed of uni-

formed employees of the Assemblies of God who are in reserve units of the armed forces was spotlighted in the flag-raising ceremony.

The Evangel College band and concert choir provided stirring music before and after the cornerstone-laying.

At the dedication services inspiring music was provided by the Revival-time choir. A large number of distinguished guests were present including city officials, government representatives, officers of various Assemblies of God district councils, and fraternal delegates from other organizations. Among those introduced were the architect, Eugene F. Johnson, of Springfield, Mo., and the general contractor, Don Sharp of the Sharp Brothers Construction Company, of Kansas City, Mo.

Brother Zimmerman presided at the





to his retirement, served as general superintendent of our fellowship for twenty years. He recalled the early days of the Assemblies in Springfield when the activities were confined to a small building once used as a meat and grocery store. He also recalled that the present site of the international headquarters was then a baseball park.

"Little did we comprehend in those days that today we would be meeting in such a building as this,' he said. "To employees here I would say this is no ordinary place where you are employed. This is God's house. You are doing God's work.

"Some of you have grown gray-haired in the employ of

the Assemblies of God. No longer are you 'sweet sixteen,' but by the grace of God you can be 'sweet sixty.' And 'sweet sixty' is sweeter than 'sweet sixteen.'

"As we dedicate this building to God, may we make it an occasion of fresh dedication for each of us. . . . God bless every member of the headquarters staff, of the Gospel Publishing House, and everyone of us."

Said Brother Zimmerman: "This lovely structure, with its beautiful appointments and its modern facilities, speaks loudly of God's goodness to us. It has come into being because of a ministry; its greatest glory will lie in expanding that ministry.

"May there ever flow from this, the heart of the Assemblies of God, ever-increasing streams of life and light, of blessing and help, to the ends of the earth."



BONES SUPERNATURALLY REPLACED BY FAITH

It was while I was sitting in a funeral home attending the funeral of a friend that God reminded me of His healing power. I saw that Satan was trying to destroy my life, and I determined that I would trust the resurrected Christ to heal me by His life-giving touch.

I had suffered first one trouble and then another, and was wondering why all these things were happening to me. Did the Lord want me to be constantly afflicted?

For more than nineteen years I had known Him as my personal Saviour and Physician. Just three years earlier I had suffered a kidney infection from which the doctors had given me no hope of recovery. However, after prayer, the X rays had showed the kidney again functioning—to the great surprise and delight of the doctor.

Now I was afflicted with something that seemed even worse—deterioration of the bone. I nearly died during my first surgery in October, 1961, and the doctor found a tumor on the spinal cord, the removal of which could have meant death or paralysis for me. But thirty days after I was released from the hospital I was facing another major operation—bone grafting. I was told I might have to spend six months out of the year in the hospital.

I felt I could not go through anything more. One day, while my pastor preached a funeral message, God showed me just what Satan was doing to me—how he wanted to destroy my life and put me where this friend was. My faith reached up to God and that night my body was completely healed. God performed a miracle, replacing bones where there were no bones. I threw away my brace which I had been told I must wear for a year.

I was scheduled to go into the hospital on January 23, but X rays on

that day showed that God had done the work. The doctor was amazed to see what had happened. He said he had never witnessed such a healing. God had truly performed a miracle.—Lorene Still, Fowlerville, Mich.


The doctor intended to do scraping but upon examining the samples of tissue, he discovered cancer. He packed me to stop the bleeding until he could operate the following morning.

CHRIST, THE TESTED HIGH PRIEST

Sunday School Lesson for April 29, 1962 MARK 1:9-13; HEBREWS 4:14-16; 5:1-10

Only in the Epistle to the Hebrews is Jesus called the High Priest. And how precious are the truths relating to those priestly aspects of both His earthly ministry of the past and His heavenly ministry of the present! In Hebrews 3:1, we are told to "consider the ... high priest of our profession, Christ Jesus." This we shall do in our lesson today.

AN EXALTED HIGH PRIEST

"Inasmuch then as we have a great high priest who has (already) ascended and passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession (of faith in Him)," as the Amplified New Testament reads. The earthly high priests were all just types of Jesus, who is here called the "Son of God" to remind us of His divine nature. He is called "Jesus" to remind us that He is also a man, God's man in the glory. His presence there is a pledge of our future position with Him.

Just as the earthly high priest passed through the veil into the Holy of holies, so the great High Priest passed through the heavens. He triumphed over all spiritual opponents in the heavenlies, putting them to open shame (Ephesians 1:19-22; Colossians 2:15), and appeared in the holy place in heaven-in the very presence of God, presenting the perfect sacrifice of His own blood. In view of this fact, we are exhorted to "hold fast our confession of faith in Him."

A SYMPATHETIC HIGH PRIEST

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to understand and sympathize and have a fellow feeling with our weaknesses and infirmities and liability to assaults of temptation, but One who has been tempted in every respect as we are, yet without sinning" (Amplified Version). How can Jesus sympathize with us since He never committed sin? He did not have to experience sin in order to sympathize with us! He who resists until victorious feels the strength of temptation far more keenly than he who yields. Jesus felt the strength of temptation not with our coarse, dull, blunted sensibilities, but with the keen and delicate sensitiveness of a sinless nature. He can sympathize with us perfectly, and with His sympathy He can pour in grace sufficient to enable us to overcome the enemy.

"Let us then fearlessly and confidently and boldly draw near to the throne of grace—the throne of God's unmerited favor (to us sinners); that we may receive mercy (for our failures) and find grace to help in good time for every need-appropriate help and well-timed help, coming just when we need it" (Amplified Version).

Satan is everlastingly engaged in seeking to discourage


us from availing ourselves of our blessed blood-bought access to God. What wonderful words are mercy and grace-mercy freely available when we have sinned, and grace available to enable us to overcome and to keep us from sinning! So then, far from hesitating to come to God through Christ when conscious of sin or of needed grace, let us immediately and confidently come to the One who waits to plead our cause!

A PERFECTED HIGH PRIEST (Hebrews 5:1-10)

The earthly high priest had to fulfill two qualifications: (1) He was "taken from among men"; that is to say, he must be one who had fellowship with other men, conscious of his own sinfulness and frailty in order to have compassion on those for whom he acted as a mediator (vv. 1-3). (2) He must have been called and authorized by God (v. 4). Christ more than fulfilled these qualifications. He was, first of all, divinely appointed, an appointment that was based on His eternal Sonship. Second, He had fellowship with man, "tempted in all points like as we are"-and yet, unlike the earthly priest, "without sin."

Furthermore, Christ's earthly life and conduct resulted in His being declared "perfect," and "the author of eternal salvation to all who obey him." Verse 7 reveals the school in which He was perfected; namely, the school of suffering. Verse 8 discloses what He learned; namely, obedience. Verse 9 shows the result of His schooling-"He became the author of eternal salvation." This does not mean that there was ever in Him any resistance to the will of God; it means that He was willing to obey the Father in submitting to humiliation and to the death of the Cross, though this -J. Bashford Bishop involved agony and suffering.



PAUL AND HIS VOCATIONAL VOLUNTEERS

Paul's letter to the church at Rome was committed to the care of a Christian businesswoman for delivery. The sixteenth chapter reminds us that she was a servant of the church at Cenchrea. The saints at Rome were urged to assist her in any way she might need their help. Paul declared that she had been a savior of many including himself.

The outstanding thing in Paul's letter to the Romans is the introductory verse of chapter one. "Paul, a servant [bond slave] of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, separated [isolated] unto the gospel of God..."

In the fifth verse of this chapter we read that his call to "apostleship [was] for obedience to the faith. . . ." I would assume that Paul was a "bond slave" of Christ before his call to apostleship. I would declare just as assuredly that he was isolated to the gospel before he was called to be a preacher and an apostle.

I like to think of Phebe, the servant of the church at Cenchrea, as being a "bond slave" and "isolated" to the gospel, even though she had no ministerial call. It is evident that she was a servant of the church and a strong supporter of those that preached the gospel.

I follow Paul through the epistle and read his generous tribute to his fellow laborers. I am not able to determine whether they are preachers or "vocational helpers." We know Dr. Luke was a divinely inspired writer and an apostle. He may not have done a great deal of preaching, but he was known everywhere as the "beloved physician." What a joy it must have been for a young preacher to be supported by Dr. Luke.

Paul urges Titus to "Bring Zenas the lawyer and Apollos [the young preacher] on their journey diligently that nothing be wanting unto them (Titus 3:13). Oh, what our young preachers today would not give to have an attorney-at-law helping them found a new congregation in a strange city. This seems to have been an order in Paul's day. Churches were started by "bond slaves"—"isolated" to the gospel. Some were preachers, of course; but primarily they were dedicated laymen giving all possible support to the gospel.

I am deeply impressed with the reasonableness of this practice. After all, every person shares equally in the grace of God. Those called to preach have no greater stake in the gospel than others receiving the grace of God. It is equally glorious to all. We have allowed a gulf to develop between preachers and those that support the gospel in closely related ways.

Some teach, and others support in the administration of the program of God. All are to work as laborers and helpers. The sixteenth chapter of Romans is an honor roll of "gospel greats"—a host of persons immortalized by the Holy Ghost for unselfish service to Christ. These are "bond slaves" and "isolated," whether preachers or lay members. Preachers or lawyers, and men or women are all one in the gospel.

One vital facet of the new Home Missions "Breakthrough" program is "Vocational Volunteers." Let us face it; God's plan through the ages has been just this—never anything less.

The church world is waiting for a great preacher to head a mass revival but God is looking for "bond slaves" of Jesus Christ who will "isolate" themselves to the gospel as vocational "fellow helpers" of the dedicated preachers of our day.

Another Victory in Texas

A FEW MONTHS AGO I CONDUCTED A revival for Artie Jones, pastor of Calvary Assembly of God in Henderson, Tex. While there I heard the story behind this new church and felt impressed to write it.

Brother Jones, with his family, felt the burden for a new church in this city of about 10,000 population, and with the permission of the district officials began to seek a place to hold services. He found a church building on the west side of town that was no longer in use. However, he also discovered that other groups had tried unsuccessfully to rent it.

Brother Jones began to pray and to believe God for the use of this building. Soon he was able to rent it and then was extended the privilege of buying it at a very reasonable price with low monthly payments. The people from whom the congregation purchased the building carried the note.

Feeling the location of the church was a little too far out of town, Pastor Jones began to pray about a new

In a short time the group was able to purchase a choice lot valued at \$1,000 for just \$350!

However, the most miraculous part of the story is that although the church is less than two years old and started with only the pastor's family, it now averages nearly 100 in Sunday school attendance and has at times gone over that number. It was a privilege to conduct a revival in such an up-and-coming church. Surely God still works with those who work for Him, as in Bible days: "And they went forth...the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following' (Mark 16:20).

NEW CHURCH IN NEW YORK

FOUR YEARS AFTER SERVICES WERE started, the Assembly of God in Boonville, N. Y. (population 3,000) has a new church building. And it was erected in only eight weeks!

The dedication service was held on January 14, when 160 happy people filled the church. Five ministers from the community and two sectional officers of the Assemblies of God took part in the service. Mayor William Hall was present and extended a word of greeting. Then Paul R. Buchwalter, district Home Missions director, brought the dedicatory message.

For some years Peter Wasco, a member of the board, had a burden for his home community. About four years ago services were started there in a second-floor hall by the Ernest Darlings, pastors at Rome, N. Y. After that William Snyder was in charge of the fledgling congregation for several months.

William R. Sanders began his ministry in Boonville on July 31, 1961. A lot had been purchased before his coming, and under his leadership the new building was constructed to the glory of God.

Only nine people were present at

the first service when Brother Sanders came, but he and the church members were determined to build a church. Several banks refused to lend money to the small group, but God intervened and one local bank granted the loan of \$16,500 through the intercession of a Catholic lawyer.

The new thirty-by-sixty-foot church is located in the heart of the city and accommodates about 150 persons. Though the structure is valued at \$30,000 the actual cost will be around \$22,000. The basement of the church contains Sunday school classrooms and living quarters for the pastor. Pastor and congregation are confident that God will continue to bless and add souls to His kingdom in Boonville.





"I was not, I became, I am not, and care not." "Wine, women, and indulgence corrupt our bodies, but they constitute life." "After death no reviving, after grave no meeting."

On the tombstone of a little child: "I, Procope, lift up my hands against

the god who snatched me away, being innocent."

Pessimism, gloom, hopelessness, cynicism, and defiance characterized the pagan world in its prospect of death. And hundreds of years later a modern unbeliever, Robert Ingersoll, spoke these words over the grave of his brother: "Life is a narrow vale between the cold and barren peaks of two eternities. We strive in vain to look beyond the heights. We cry aloud, and the only answer is the echo of a waiting cry."

In contrast read the epitaphs over the graves of the primitive Christians: "Weep not, my child; death is not eternal." "Sweet Simplicius lives in

eternity." "Gemella sleeps in peace."

"Alexander is not dead, but lives above the stars." "He sleeps, but lives." "He went to God."

Consider the difference Christ has made! His words inspire the hope of eternal life. "I am the resurrection and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live." And His resurrection from the grave gives a solid basis to His promises.

However, note the condition—"believeth." Faith means a trustful acceptance of Christ as our Saviour and Master; and death cannot sever

that relationship.

The promise of life beyond the grave serves to remind us that this short span of life is not insignificant, that we cannot lightly flick off the passing days as if they were of no account. God wants us to understand that life is meaningful and important. We all are traveling to the grave. But the grave is not a terminal; it is a gateway either to life and light or to gloom and wretchedness. Jesus said, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life. Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live" (John 5:24, 25).

You have heard Christ's word. Will you believe on Him? Will you repent and turn away from all evil, accepting Christ as your personal Saviour, and thus be ready for the Resurrection Morning?—M. P.
