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Behaving at Church

This is not a tirade against noisy children or irreverent teen-agers. If boys and girls are unruly in church services it is the duty of adults to correct the situation. Firmness needs to be mixed with patience and understanding. Grown-ups need to remember how hard it was for them to keep still when they were that age! Parents lament that there is very little in the services of some churches that engages the interest of youth!

No, the apostle Paul was addressing adults when he wrote his letter to Timothy telling "how thou oughtest to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church..." Here are seven points to which we all ought to give attention:

- 1. Open the door and enter. The New Testament warns us not to stay away from the assembly of the believers. "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together... and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." As Jacob said, "This is none other but the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven."
- 2. Open your heart and worship. The Psalmist said, "O come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker." But it is not enough to kneel. We must worship with all our heart. The Saviour said, "God is a Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth."
- 3. Open your lips and pray. Don't be afraid of your voice. God loves to hear it. The Psalmist said, "My voice shalt thou hear in the morning, O Lord; in the morning will I direct my prayer unto thee." He knew the blessing of audible prayer.
- 4. Open your mouth and sing. "In psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord"—that's the New Testament pattern. Don't merely listen to others sing. The Lord is listening for your voice, whether it be flat or tuneful. If Christ has saved you, you have something to sing about.
- 5. Open the gates with praise. You are bidden to "enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise." Praise opens the way into the royal court of heaven and provides an avenue by which the King can bless His people. When you praise God more you have more to praise Him for.
- 6. Open your purse and give. In Old Testament times the people were required to bring their tithes into the storehouse to supply the needs of the Temple and of those who served there. The promise was, "Honor the Lord with thy substance, and with the firstfruits of all thine increase: so shall thy barns be filled with plenty..." Jesus made a similar statement—"Give, and it shall be given unto you.... Freely ye have received, freely give."
- 7. Open your mind and learn. Don't be preoccupied or prejudiced. The oldest, wisest saint can always learn something more from any preacher who is anointed by the Holy Spirit.
- "Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them." Then go out from the house of God and turn your faith into works. There are many *hearers* of the Word; but it is the *doers* who influence the world toward Christ and who win a full reward.

- 1. The man that doesn't know and doesn't know that he doesn't know is a fool. Pity him!
- 2. He that doesn't know but knows that he doesn't know is ignorant. Instruct him!
- 3. He that knows but doesn't know that he knows is asleep. Awaken him!
- 4. He that knows and knows that he knows is a wise man. Follow him!

Have you ever asked yourself, "How do I react to truth?" Of course there is no problem when truth is pleasing and we agree with it, but how do we react when we disagree?


Webster informs us that truth is that entity which conforms to facts or reality that which is characterized by being in accord with what is. Jesus' definition of truth was: "I am the way, the TRUTH..." (John 14:

As we stand on this side of Calvary and look back on history it is not hard for us to be objective and place the Jews who rejected Him as examples of our first category. They did not know Him as the TRUTH. They refused to know Him; therefore, they didn't know that they didn't know. We pity them.

Nicodemus, the secret believer, did not know Jesus, but he knew that he didn't know, and came to learn under cover of night. Jesus instructed him

Peter knew Jesus, the TRUTH, but he let down. He went to sleep. He

didn't know that he knew the One through whom he had power over Satan. In his weakness he denied Christ. Jesus awakened him with a look.

The apostle Paul said, "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep...." He knew that he knew. This is wisdom. Follow him! He stated, "Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ."

Truth has a way of being lost and rediscovered. Traditions of men and politics in the church had almost strangled the truth of salvation through faith, when suddenly it was rediscovered by the young monk, Martin Luther, as he penitently climbed the steps in Rome on his knees. "The just shall live by faith." Salvation is through faith, not by works. When this truth was rediscovered the Reformation was born. Again, the great majority of Christendom fell into the first category when they faced the Reformation truth.

At the beginning of the twentieth century, in a lavish old place known as Stone's Mansion, in Topeka, Kansas, a remarkable event occurred. This mansion had been turned into a faith Bible school with some forty students from different denominations enrolled. Twelve of these students already held credentials with the Methodist, Friends, Holiness, and other denominations. Their only course of study was the Word of God and prayer. They had gone through the subjects of repentance, conversion, consecration, sanctification, divine healing, and the soon coming of the Lord. Now they were studying the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Their instructor asked them to search the Scriptures and see if there was some one distinct sign in evidence when persons received the Baptism. They came to the conclusion, from studying the New Testament, that the one clear sign of the baptism of the Spirit was speaking with other tongues. Suddenly, there in Topeka, Pentecost was repeated. The Spirit of God came over a number of the students in the supernatural way that characterized the Day of Pentecost, and they spoke in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.

This baptism of spiritual power manifested itself in a special love for the Lord and in an outstanding compassion for the lost. The results traveled like fire across the nation and around the world. Wherever hungry souls sought God for more reality, the result was the same—the Holy Spirit filled them to overflowing, with the initial evidence of speaking in other tongues. The truth of access to Pentecostal power had been rediscovered.

Can you recall when you first faced this truth? What was your reaction? I can still remember mine. I asked my father to explain it to me. He was a dentist, highly respected in the community and an avid reader and scholar. He made no pretense of being a Christian and scoffed at the poor deluded Pentecostal folk who were suffering from "autohypnotism." What's more, he warned me to stay away from them because most of them were low-class riffraff and drunkards. A number of my friends in the community felt the same way. We would disturb the church services by throwing firecrackers, and even talked about riding that "crazy preacher" out of town on a rail-then tarring and feathering him.

My father, my friends, and I clearly fit into the first category. We didn't know and didn't know that we didn't know. God had pity on us.

I shall never forget my reaction when one convert, a former drunkard, spoke in tongues. That man, whose mouth used to let loose a string of oaths that could make a sinner blush, began to praise God out loud. He raised his hand, and his face shone with an inner light which impressed me tremendously. Then it happened. Under what seemed to be a powerful inward compulsion, he raised his voice and began to speak fluently in an authoritative tone. No one had to tell me; I knew. He was speaking in other tongues. The fear of God swept over my soul and I said to myself, "This is of God. I know that man, and he's not capable of doing that in himself." That night my category changed. I recognized that I didn't know; but now I knew that I didn't know. I asked to be instructed.

Several months later, on a Sunday afternoon, the power of God fell on a proud young man who had been humbled under the mighty hand of God and who, by that time, had been soundly converted. When the power of God strikes a human body it is comparable to electricity. It is a burn-

ing surge of power which causes a tingling sensation. On this occasion it seemed to come in waves of everincreasing intensity. That which was most outstanding was not the physical experience, but the revelation of Christ. From that moment Christ was made more real than He had ever been before. It was there that that young man dedicated his entire being to God and that dedication was to lead him into years of service in foreign fields. That afternoon I again changed categories. I knew, and I knew that I knew! And I wanted everyone to follow me in that experience.

Soon, however, I was to face great disappointments. As I returned joyfully to my own denomination to recount this wonderful experience, I found myself very unpopular. I was asked to leave the church! That was the typical denominational reaction to the baptism in the Holy Spirit in those days.

During the past twenty-two years I have watched this great Pentecostal revival ebb and flow across the nation and on different continents. As people face this truth they continue to fall into the four categories mentioned. It is with great joy and intense interest that we have observed in the last few years a different attitude on the part of other denominations. God is pouring out His Spirit in a variety of churches. Their ministers are experiencing this great spiritual power that results in a new love for lost humanity. Inactive, prayerless Christians are being revived. Empty churches are being refilled and are opening their doors for prayer meetings which had died out long ago. Miracles of healing are taking place. People are discovering that God is real.

The great Cuban apostle of liberty, José Martí, said, "Those who have thee, O Liberty, do not really know thee. And those who do not know thee should not just talk about thee, but must conquer thee." Truth, like liberty, must be reborn with every generation. God grant that all who have received the Pentecostal experience may never forget that there is a danger of falling into the third category and going to sleep. "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." Have you received the Holy Ghost since you believed? As you face this truth, which of the four is your category?

THE FULFILLMENT OF CHRIST'S GREAT PLAN OF REdemption for all people depended on the assumption that His followers would catch His passion and vision and accept the responsibility of His cause, even if it meant martyrdom and death. It depended on the disciples accepting the task and working at it with consuming passion, and then being able to pass on the Master's commission to others who would continue to make Christ known to the world.

These assumptions provide the framework on which is constructed the story of the Church. In it all, it would seem that everything depended on the individual and his attitudes. What were the men like who initiated this spiritual march on time and space? What was their secret? Was it something we all may share?


Perhaps we find it summarized best in the words of Paul when he says of himself and the apostles, "We are fools for Christ's sake" (1 Corinthians 4:10). Paul was not saying that he or the apostles were either ignorant or stupid, but if his all-out dedication caused men to call him a fool then Paul gladly accepted the word and gloried in it.

And the first-century world did regard the apostles as fools and fanatics. Surely they were fanatics in the truest sense of that word—"of single-minded passion or wild enthusiasm." They were men with eyes of single vision and with hearts aflame as they gave themselves to the sacred task of bringing Christ to the nations. Nothing else mattered to them.

Paul was plainly told by Festus, "Thou art beside thyself; much learning doth make thee mad" (Acts 26: 24). Paul's answer to this was both simple and forthright. "Whether we be beside ourselves, it is to God," he said (2 Corinthians 5:13). If there is any secret cause of triumph in the lives of the first-century believers, it lies right here, for their spirits were set aflame with the passion and purpose of Christ. That flame was so vital, so consuming that their lives glowed and burned for the fulfillment of Christ's great plan.

Do we follow in this sacred apostolic succession? Does this holy flame burn within us? The fiery torch of truth has been passed to us. How does it fare in our hands? With all our vaunted advantages, how do we of the twentieth century compare with the saints of the first century? Examine several check points and consider some of the reasons why Paul and the apostles were called fools and fanatics.

They were wholly, utterly abandoned to the cause of Christ. Paul records an almost unbelievable list of his sufferings for the sake of the Lord Jesus in 2 Corinthians 11:23-28. Read the list slowly. Weigh the meaning of each word. Note how simply and impersonally Paul relates his trials. He does not ask for sympathy. He rejoices in the privilege of sharing Christ's sufferings. How could he take such abuse? Why would he

accept such punishment? His spirit was aflame with the love of Christ. His heart bent in rhythm with Christ's heart. He lived for the accomplishment of God's purpose.

The intensity of Dante's life is pictured for us in these words:

"He had power to describe the infernal regions because his spirit had descended into the realms of darkness and torment. He had gazed on the awful vision till he was gaunt and emaciated, with eyes as if set in sockets of sorrow, and with heart throbbing with sympathetic suffering. From time to time as he passed along his native streets children would point to him and exclaim, 'There goes a man who has been in hell!'

Paul had not been to hell, but he had been to heaven! (2 Corinthians 12:2-4) The intensity of his dedication can only be understood by that which he had seen. The glory and the eternal triumph of Christ and His kingdom filled and thrilled him completely. There was no other cause worthy of his full and utter devotion.

In the light of that glorious kingdom, what cared he if people considered him a fool for Christ! He moved forward in absolute confidence. His life was controlled by a single passion—"this one thing I do... I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13, 14).

The early Christians dared to do the impossible. To go into all the world! Evangelize the Roman Empire! Turn a pagan world to God! This was their assignment. Of course it was impossible! Only fools and fanatics would try it.

Look at those disciples—erstwhile fishermen and tax collectors. They were without social, political, or ecclesiastical prestige. They had no funds. They owned no property. They had no printed literature. They possessed no tools of propaganda. And so the list could be continued *ad infinitum*. It obviously would be much simpler to state what they *did* have.

Their chief assets were spiritual. They were convinced completely that Jesus Christ—the crucified, risen One—was the Son of God; that in Him and through Him one may receive forgiveness of sins and citizenship in His eternal kingdom. They believed in Christ's kingship and in His kingdom; that Christ was Daniel's "stone cut out without hands"; and that His was the kingdom which ultimately would fill the entire world. All this they believed with passionate fervency.

As a group their appearance was not very impressive facing the pagan Roman Empire. The disparity between them and it seemed comparable to the shepherd boy David as he faced the giant Goliath. But, like the shepherd boy, they won! The immensity of their triumph thrills us all to this hour. Ordinary men were transformed into extraordinary men by the flame of the Holy Spirit. They dared to attempt the impossible, and by the grace and power of God they succeeded.

Centuries later John Geddie, a Canadian boy who caught the apostolic flame, became the first witness for Christ in the New Hebrides. In the span of his brief life he saw the gospel triumph over the fears, superstitions, and cannibalism of the natives. When John Geddie died the believers carved these words on his grave marker:

When he came there were no Christians; When he left there were no heathen.

The impossible becomes possible when hearts flame with the fire of the Spirit.

They regarded themselves expendable in the cause of Christ. What happened to the believers was considered incidental and secondary. The fulfillment of the Great Commission, and the extension of Christ's kingdom, was of major and primary importance.

Will White immortalized the word "expendable" in his famous wartime book, They Were Expendable. He told the dramatic story of a squadron of PT boats—six torpedo boats made of plywood, powered with Packard engines, and manned by twelve men each (seventy-two men in all). They were all sent to the Philippines. Not one of the boats came back. Only four men returned! When Mr. White asked about this, one of the survivors replied, "You see, we were expendable!"

Materials, ships, planes, tanks, money, men—all are expendable in war. And in the great spiritual struggle that the first-century saints faced they counted not their lives dear to themselves for Christ's sake. Paul summed up their feelings when he cried, "I will very gladly spend and be spent for you."

One day I walked in a sun-filled square in the beautiful city of Florence, Italy. In the center of that square I caught a glimpse of a bronze plaque fixed in the cobblestones. I looked closely and read one word—Savonarola: This was the spot where Girolomo Savonarola, the forerunner of the Reformation, was strangled and burned at the stake. He sealed his testimony with his blood. He was expendable!

S. D. Gordon imagined a conversation between Christ and the angel Gabriel after the Ascension. Gabriel tenderly looked at the wounds Christ received at Calvary and said, "Master, you died for the whole world?"

"I did, Gabriel," replied the Saviour.

"And the whole world knows this?" inquired Gabriel.
"Not yet. But they will. For, you see, I asked Peter,
James, John, and the others to go and tell them," said
Jesus.

"But Master, what if they fail! Judas failed. What if they fail?"

The answer came, "I have no other plan. I am depending on them. They will not fail."

And they did not fail! So what if the world called them fools and fanatics? They were! Glorious fools! Magnificent fanatics! Heroes of the Cross!



Supermarket Christianity

I WALKED HOME ABOUT HALF DISgusted with myself. I had gone to the store a few minutes before to get soap —we had been out of it for several days and had not remembered to buy any—and here I was carrying home a bag with over five dollars worth of groceries in it.

True, they were all things I needed, but I had already done my shopping. How then did a trip to get one forgotten item turn into an additional shopping tour?

I thought back over my expedition. Inside the store I had started toward the soap counter. Enroute I noticed the boxes of wax paper. "Better take one," I had thought, "mine is getting low." Nearby, the pickles were on sale, so I chose a jar. Graham crackers had also been overlooked in my previous shopping, I noted. And that cheese, grated, would be just right for a salad topping.

With company coming I certainly needed some whipping cream, which

also caught my attention. From item to item I had gone until, when I finally secured the soap and reached the check stand, I had collected a bag of groceries that I hadn't intended to buy at all when I came in.

What had happened? Why had I chosen all these items? The answer seemed evident: they had been packaged and displayed in a fashion to attract my attention and to cause me to desire them.

I thought back to the grocery stores I had known as a child. In those days the grocer stood on one side of the counter and the customer on the other. The customer enumerated the items he wanted and the grocer gathered them up. But somewhere someone got the idea that if the customer could see and smell and feel the groceries he would buy more. That someone put the idea to a test and it worked so well that now most grocery stores have adopted it. And by my own experience I had just proved it successful. I had spent about fifty times more money than I had originally intended when I came to the store.

The thought was staggering! A fifty-fold increase! Being a Christian worker I turned the thought to the spiritual. Suppose that Christians could be increased that much? Suppose that instead of just the preacher standing behind the pulpit telling people about the gospel, we put it out in view where folk could really examine it? Suppose that instead of waiting for someone to come and ask for it we scattered it freely about, done up in pleasing packages? Suppose that every Christian was overflowing with the kind of Christianity that made all whom he met want some? Would Christians increase fifty-fold?

These thoughts were firing rapidly through my mind when suddenly another thought hit me: that was exactly what Jesus had in mind when He said, "Ye shall be witnesses"! Not just the preacher but every Christian is to be an advertisement for Him.

Under the Law the priest approached God for the needs of the worshiper—sort of like the old-style grocer getting the goods for the customer. But on Calvary Jesus opened the way for each of us to approach the throne of God for himself and do his own shopping among the bounties of heaven.

Then on the Day of Pentecost He poured out power so that His disciples could take Calvary's blessings to all the world. It was God's way of saying, "Here it is! See what's happened to quaking Peter and doubting Thomas! Look at these men who but a few weeks ago had bolted themselves in an upstairs room for fear of the Jews. Now they stand boldly proclaiming the message on the street. And this same power is for you!" Christianity had been brought out from behind the counter into full view.

The people of the disciples' day came and saw. Seeing, they desired, and sought, and received. The Spirit's impact on their lives changed their world. Neither they nor it were ever the same again. They had something that sent them forth and everywhere they went they displayed Christianity so attractively that the reaction started all over again.


Wouldn't we change our world more than we do if we were all completely filled with the Spirit—so completely filled that it would bring the love of Calvary into view in our every word and deed, testifying to the world, "This is Christianity! This is what it does for me."

Paul listed for us the things that the Spirit would cause to come forth from our lives, in Galatians 5:22, 23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against such there is no law."

He is saying, "Here are the things a real Christian ought to have to show to the world. These are the displays that attract those who are longing for a changed life."

And it works! When the fruit of the Spirit is present, others desire Christianity. It sells to those who never intended to buy.

Finally I realized that I was standing at my own front door. This idea had gotten such a hold on me that I just stood there thinking. Supermarket Christianity! It was a new dimension of thought to me. I went into the house praying, "Lord, let the evidences of your love be so prevalent in both my attitudes and my actions that others will see and desire a personal acquaintance with you. Fill me so full of the Spirit that only His fruit will be evident in my life and all else will be hidden. Make me a supermarket Christian!"



"ALL THE DAYS"—AND WHAT DAYS may not come? Spring days, when all the world shall be full of glad, young life; summer days, in which the year shall have reached its glorious prime; autumn days, when the fields shall be full while busy hands work; winter days, season of mist and rain and somber light when we gather around the bier of the departed year and lay its glory in the dust.

We sometimes stand, as it were, on the brow of a hill, looking off to the next peak, and wonder what kind of days lie in the valley between. What will a year, a month, a week bring? Will the days be golden, or will they be red-letter days stained with blood of sacrifice and suffering? Will they be bright and happy or drab, dark, sad? Birthdays, death days, marriage days, anniversaries of past joys and sorrows (which refuse to be forgotten); how much of weal or woe, of sweetness or bitterness, may be crowded into one brief space of time which we call a day!

But there will never come a day throughout all the future in which we shall not have the two guardian angels - heaven-commissioned escorts, God-sent messengers. "Goodness and Mercy" shall attend us during all the days of our earthly pilgrimage. We have never seen angels like the two that came to Sodom-nor even like the angelic forms which bent over the ark in the inner shrine of the holy tent. But there is something better even than angel help-the personified attributes of God, His goodness and His mercy. We have God, Himself, in all His tenderest manifestations of love and pity toward men.

Goodness and Mercy—not goodness alone, for we are sinners needing forgiveness; and not mercy alone, for we need many things besides forgiveness; but both, each linked with the other. Goodness, to supply every want; mercy, to forgive every sin. Goodness, to provide; mercy, to pardon.

What shall we say of these blessed attributes? *Goodness* is laid up in vast reservoirs in the nature of God, prepared for the poor, the food of the hungry, the lodge of the righteous, the crown of the year. "O taste and see that the Lord is good." "How great is his goodness, and how great is his beauty." *Mercy* is the daughter of God, in whom He delights. "He delighteth in mercy." Mercy is His

wealth, for "He is rich in mercy." Mercy is His throne, for He has said, "I will commune with thee from off the mercy seat."

"Goodness and mercy shall follow." In the East, the shepherd always goes in front. And our Good Shepherd never puts us forth to the work or warfare of any day without going before us. But He does not leave us unprotected in the rear. We have a rear guard against the attacks of treacherous foes. We have two strong helpers to lift us from tier to tier on the pyramid of life. You may not realize that they are near; you may be lonely and sad and desolate. It may be one of your bad days, sunless and dreary without a ray of comfort. Yet there, close by you-though veiled from your faithless sight-stands the glorious, loving, pitying forms of God's infinite Goodness and tender Mercy which cannot fail. They will spread a table before you in the desert as they did for Elijah. They stand beside you, bidding you fear not as they did for Paul. Of this there need be no doubt.

"Surely," says the psalmist, "goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life." Why so sure? "Surely," because God has never failed in the past. "Surely," because it would not become Him to take us in hand and not complete His promise. "Surely," because He has pledged Himself by exceeding great and precious promises which he cannot break.

Courts

Amish Tangle Over Social Security Law

Leaders of the Old Amish Order have gone to court at Pittsburgh, Pa., to establish their right to stay out of the Social Security System. Action was begun in U.S. District Court after 84 bishops and leaders of the Church decided it was not immoral to become involved in litigation.

Social Security, the Amish claim, violates their religious belief. They object for several reasons, including a fear that it will lead young people to shirk the Biblical injunction to care for parents, widows, and orphans and pass this duty off to the state. They have always rejected insurance plans, holding that these imply a lack of faith in the judgment of God.

Bishop Andy M. Byler said that if the Old Amish are forced to pay Social Security taxes they will leave this country and settle in Australia. "We're looking for a place to go where we can escape religious persecution," he said.

Court Rules Against Wichita Church

The Kansas Supreme Court has ruled that the First Baptist Church of Wichita may not be withdrawn from the American Baptist Convention and related groups, even though a majority of the congregation voted for such action.

The State Supreme Court, reversing a decision of a state district court, declared that "not even in an autonomous Baptist church may the denomination of the church be changed by a mere majority vote."

Two years ago the congregation, then the largest in the denomination, voted 739 to 294 to withdraw from the American Baptist Convention, the Kansas Baptist Convention, and the Wichita Association of Baptist Churches, to protest the denomina-

tion's affiliation with the National Council of Churches. A minority group, loyal to the ABC, asked for an injunction from the court to prevent the larger faction from using the church property, which is valued at about \$2,500,000, and the Supreme Court has granted it.

Population Explosion Poses Challenge

The human race took many centuries to reach its present population total of three billion. But if current trends continue unchanged, says the Population Reference Bureau, Washington, D. C., three billion more will be added in only forty more years, and there will be six billion people on earth by the year 2000.

Should Jesus tarry, the challenge

to world evangelization looms greater than ever before. The harvest field will be twice as big in another generation!

Spotlight on Marriage

Brides and grooms in the United States are younger in age at first marriage than are those in any other *urban-industrialized* country in the world, according to the National Office of Vital Statistics, Washington, D. C. In 1960, the median age was 22.8 for grooms and 20.3 for brides. More men married at 21 than at any other age; and more women at 18.

Men are now marrying about three years earlier and women two years earlier than at the turn of the century. Census data for 1890 show that at first marriage the median age for men was 26 years and for women, 22 years. The median age has been

declining slowly but steadily since.

India's nuptial partners are youngest: 20.0 years for grooms and 14.5 years for brides. India's Marriage Restraint Act of 1930, curbing child marriage, forbids marriage of men under 18 and girls under 14 (later amended to 15 years for girls).

Statistics indicate that Ireland's couples marry at the oldest ages: 31.4 for grooms and 26.5 for brides.

T. F. Zimmerman to Preach in Far East

Thomas F. Zimmerman, general superintendent of the Assemblies of God, will conduct a preaching mission in Okinawa and Japan in October at the invitation of Major General Terence P. Finnegan, Air Force Chief of Chaplains. Previously, Brother Zimmerman participated in a similar mission to servicemen in Iceland.

Plans Unveiled for Three Chapels at New York Airport

The Port of New York Authority has made public architectural plans for the Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Jewish chapels to be erected at the International Airport at Idlewild, N. Y.


About forty feet high and twenty-eight feet wide each, the chapels will serve some 30,000 employees and 10,000,000 passengers annually, along with thousands of airport visitors.

The three modern chapels, each on a one-acre site, will be located on a picturesque 655-foot-long lagoon in the central landscaped area of the airport.

Colored Nations to Rule World?

The colored nations of Asia and Africa will be controlling the world by A.D. 2000, according to Dr. Martin Niemoeller, president of the Evangelical Church of Hesse and Nassau. Addressing a group of Protestant clergymen at Washington, D. C., recently, the German churchman said the colored nations will be dictating to the people of Europe and America "how many calories a day we shall eat or not eat" within forty years.

The present situation will change radically, he said, as the more populous races of the underdeveloped countries, rich in raw materials but currently poor in industrialization, begin to match and surpass Europe and America in productivity.

Bartlett Peterson, Executive Director

In 1952 Bartlett Peterson first became associated with *Revivaltime* as announcer. He has served the broadcast service in a number of capacities

since then and at present is the executive director of the Radio Department which produces *Revivaltime*.

For more than thirty years Brother Peterson has engaged in evangelistic, pastoral, and administrative ministries. The Pastor Is a Gift

A MINISTER IS ALWAYS RELUCTANT TO discuss his own office. Yet there is no one else to explain it for him. The apostle Paul was quite frank in discussing the ministry in his letters to the churches. Here is one sample:

"When he ascended up on high...
he gave some, apostles; and some,
prophets; and some, evangelists; and
some, pastors and teachers; for the
perfecting of the saints, for the work
of the ministry, for the edifying of
the body of Christ: till we all come
in the unity of the faith, and of the
Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto
the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:8, 1113).

The New Testament says nothing about Christ conferring wealth upon His Church. The work of the Lord has never been hindered, primarily, for want of money. The retardation of God's work is always caused by a deeper lack than that. It is the need of what Peter had when he said, "Such as I have give I thee..." (Acts 3:6). When we have power to minister to needy people we need not worry about money. That will follow as day follows night.

You may have known a preacher or two whom you doubted were gifts from the resurrected Christ. But who could doubt that such men as the Wesleys, Whitefield, Finney, Moody, were such gifts? So the first thing to do when you want a pastor is to pray. Any other course is unthinkable, for who but the Head of the Church would know where to find one? All true pastors are in Christ's hands.


A pastor is a divine gift. Schools cannot make pastors. They can guide them a little in their studies, but a real pastor is God's gift. Paul said, "How shall they preach, except they be sent?" (Romans 10:15). This means that no man can possibly preach the gospel unless he is sent of God. You can recognize such a man immediately. That man is the gift of God. Be careful what you do with God's gift! Prize him highly. Prize him much more than you would your church property or your church program. God's man for God's place is

the most important single matter in your community. Everything else will work out if you have the right man—God's man.

Jesus Christ is the Bishop. He reserves the right to place preachers. Paul said to the elders of Ephesus,

at Miletus, "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers..." (Acts 20:28). Unless a man is appointed by God he will never accomplish anything that will stand in eternity. He may wear certain clothes like a preacher; he may use words like a preacher; he may be paid like a preacher; but he must be confirmed by the Holy Ghost if he is to accomplish anything that will stand the test of time. Accept such a man as God's selection.

A pastor must be a teacher. Too many people expect the pastor to be a sort of glorified nursemaid. The pastor's real duty is to teach. It is his God-given task to teach "line upon line . . . precept upon precept . . . here a little, and there a little" (Isaiah 28: 10). He must know the Bible. He can't teach it unless he knows it. His time should not be cluttered with trifles. He must get on with the Lord's work in the souls of men-not with what the decorations will be at the next church social. The pastor's big business is preaching the Bible. Paul said to Pastor Timothy, "Preach the Word . . ." (2 Timothy 4:2).

Notice the purposes of pastorship which are set forth in our text. These will serve to give us a healthy appreciation of the work of the minister.

"For the perfecting of the saints..." That is one of the most comforting lines in the entire Bible. Even saints are not perfect. I have not met many who thought they were perfect.

It is a lovely thing to see God's people growing up into Christ. The greatest reward a preacher can have is to see a man who has been won to Christ through his ministry and to have him come to his office years later and say, "Pastor, you have taught me all I ever learned of grace—save what I learned directly from the Book itself." That's the joy of spiritual parenthood—to see people grow spiritually. The real profit of an extended pastorate is to see people grow spiritually.

"Unto the work of ministering...."
How do you make saints perfect? This is done by encouraging the believer

unto good works. Paul said, "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2: 10). Biblical ministry will make a church a working church. Every member of every church ought to be busy doing something for Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit has a place for every born-again member.

The work of the pastor is to constantly proclaim the truth by the expository preaching of the great principles of God's Word. Thus members are brought into a knowledge of the place each one has in the ministry of the body of Christ. Soon folk are busy working for Christ; they don't have to be told or begged to serve; they find their places.

"Till we all come in the unity of the faith..." This is not accomplished overnight. It isn't the result of one sermon, or one revival campaign, or the decision of a committee. People enter a church with different ideas and viewpoints. All of us like to ride spiritual hobbies and we usually want the whole road to ourselves. I believe in contending for the faith, but I hate contentiousness as I hate the devil. It isn't a mark of Christian character to be contentious. It's a mark of the flesh-of the carnal nature. Preach the Word, in season and out of season, and little by little people will move into the unity of the faith.

It isn't easy to weld a working, winning team together. Individual performers have to learn to work with each other—to place the welfare of the whole above the pleasure and profit of the individual. This takes time and direction, and God realizes that. By nature we are born with preferences and prejudices; we are psychologically and emotionally different; it isn't easy to learn how to live and work together. Pastor, keep your eye on that goal of unity.

"And of the knowledge of the Son of God..." Here is the secret of success—the secret of secrets! Keep everything Christ-centered. That must be our "major"—to know more about our Saviour.

Paul was a university man. No one ever called Paul "unlearned and ignorant." They charged that he knew too much. His enemies said, "Much learning hath made thee mad." He said as he grew older and wiser by

experience: "I count not myself to have apprehended...but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus.... I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord..." (Philippians 3:13, 12, 8).

I have been learning about Jesus during many years of ministry, but I'm still an undergraduate. Jesus is so wonderful. Every day I want to know Him better!

"Unto a perfect man..." The business of the church is to make men—real men. There's so much pretense in this world—so much that is fraud and sheer buildup.

I like to read the story of David. There is a remarkable thing about his administration. He built no cities, but he did fight battles. And there was something about him that made men. Read these words, "These are the mighty men that David had." I admire people with backbone—folk who will stand for right—who can be counted upon. If the church doesn't produce this kind of humanity, who will?

"Unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." Thank God for stability! Some folk are always trying out churches, sampling preachers, tasting sermons. I'll tell you the churches that are full. They are the churches where the gospel is preached —where the Word is ministered. You will find there people whose appetites are satisfied. People will settle down when they are served a full meal, piping hot, right out of a heart that is full of God's anointing and blessing.

All life organizes itself. Remember that! You cannot organize an oak, a maple, or any other kind of tree; they organize themselves according to their own nature. So does a vital, New Testament church—I mean a body of believers in which this spiritual life abounds. In such a body every member will find and exercise his or her own peculiar function-ministry.

I do not know of anything this side of heaven to equal the fellowship found among' Bible believers who simply believe the Word. This is the New Testament goal for us. Let us set our eyes upon it and work toward it.

I prayed for faith and thought it would strike me like lightning. But faith did not come. One day I read, "Now faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." I had closed my Bible and prayed for faith. I now began to study my Bible and faith has been growing ever since.

The Chicago Story

Teen-age Evangelism in America's big cities is the newest ministry of the National Home Missions Department. On Home Missions Day, July 8, we spotlight this great crusade to win Chicago's teengang members and drug addicts to Christ.

On June 4 thirteen bible school students moved into the Teen Challenge Center situated right in the heart of Chicago. Located at 315 Ashland Avenue, this building offers complete facilities for an extended ministry among the teen gangs and drug addicts in the great metropolitan Chicago area.

Duplicating the work of Teen Challenge in New York City, these consecrated students are spending their full time on the streets this summer preaching deliverance to the thousands of youth who roam troubled turfs.

The establishment of a Teen Challenge ministry and center in Chicago is a miraculous story of divine lead-

ership, apostolic faith, and personal sacrifice. It started over a year ago when a few metropolitan pastors began to follow with great interest the work that God was doing in New York City under the direction of Dave Wilkerson and his committee. Recognizing the great need in their own city, and alarmed at the critical delinquency problem, these metropolitan Chicago pastors made exploratory visits and calls to New York. Initial contact was made by Paul Bredesen.

In December Dave Wilkerson and G. F. Lewis, executive director of the Home Missions Department, met with Illinois Section One pastors, at which time a temporary committee was appointed to initiate a Teen Challenge ministry as soon as possible. In a few weeks God miraculously led the committee to a strategically located nursing home that could be converted into a Center. The owners were asking \$85,000 for the building and furnishings, but the committee held a prayer session and afterwards agreed upon an offer of \$35,000. Their offer was accepted.

The building is a stately stone structure well furnished and recently decorated. It provides offices, dining facilities, three apartments for married workers, and thirty additional beds. A chapel on the third floor will seat over 100 youth. A large supply of canned foods and other supplies already had been purchased by the previous owners and this was donated to the Teen Challenge Center.

By spring the committee had thirteen willing workers, an available building, a great desire to undertake the necessary risks—but they had no money. Within thirty days they needed to raise \$13,500 for the down payment of the Center, money to purchase vehicles for street evangelism, and funds to purchase literature for the summer invasion. No less than \$15,000 was needed. A meeting of all interested pastors was called. At this meeting the committee decided to request Brother Wilkerson to itinerate in the Chicago area for two weeks to challenge the people and ask for support.

In a remarkable way God blessed these Teen Chal-

lenge rallies. A converted gang leader, Nicky Cruz, and a converted drug addict, Sonny Aronzoni, assisted in challenging the hearts of the people. Some drug addicts and gang members from the Chicago area attended the downtown rallies. Five gang members were saved.

Most unusual was the sacrifice so evident in each rally. In one suburban rally an offering was to be taken for a Volkswagen bus for street work. The need for \$1,200 was presented. Before the offering could be taken a young couple stood weeping. They asked for the privilege of buying the vehicle with their life savings. They had been saving for a new car.

At the end of the two weeks over \$15,000 had been raised in cash and pledges.

The summer workers are all students of Central Bible Institute. Each of them had to obtain parental permission to enter this ministry because of the great risks involved. Furthermore, each must take care of his own transportation to and from Chicago. These students are working without salary. They spend at least six hours each day on the streets and in nightly open-air rallies.

Grady Fannin, full-time Teen Challenge evangelist, itinerated throughout the Illinois District. These Teen Challenge rallies focused attention on the great challenge in Chicago's teen gangland. Hundreds of sponsors pledged to support the work with monthly offerings.

On Saturday, June 9, a great kickoff rally was held in the Filadelfia Church. Ministers and members of all Chicago Pentecostal churches participated including the Full Gospel Business Men, the Pentecostal Ministers Association of Greater Chicago, and the PYPF, all looking to God for a mighty spiritual awakening on the streets and for His protection on all the young workers.

The Teen Challenge Committee of Chicago requests the earnest prayers of friends throughout the nation—that Chicago will have a great witness among its teen gangs and drug addicts, and that every financial need in this great undertaking will be supplied.

It was one of those busy hectic mornings. Each member of the family was in a hurry to get off to work or school.

Mother hastily placed the breakfast on the table. Daddy reached for the butter and began spreading his toast. The small son of the family with a worried expression exclaimed, "Mother, we forgot Jesus!"

Father's butter knife stopped. Mother glanced up, feeling that their son had given their haste a just rebuke. At other times they had always said grace, but this time they had been too busy. Humbly they paused to return thanks and to silently ask pardon for "forgetting Jesus."

It is so easy to forget. This is why some of us circle "special-engagement" dates on the calendar. Others use "jot-em-down" tablets for shopping or business reminders. Advertisers spend millions of dollars to keep their products before the public eye. The observance of our national holidays serves to keep alive the memory of important people and events.

Yes, it is so easy to forget—especially to forget Jesus! God knew man's tendency to stray from Him. That is why He warned Israel, "Beware lest thou forget the Lord..." (Deuteronomy 6:12). "Take heed...lest thou forget the things which thine eyes have seen and lest they depart from

thy heart" (Deuteronomy 4:9). "We ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we should let them slip" (Hebrews 2:1).

We forgot Jesus! Careless soul, have these words ever haunted you for your spiritual neglect? Your Bible lies untouched—the door to your prayer closet is unopened. You really didn't mean to forget. "I'll wash the dishes first," or "I'll do my shopping—then pray." You were waiting for the "right time" but the "right time" never came. As you pillowed your weary head after a hard day's toil you remembered the Lord. With shame you prayed, "Lord forgive me!"

It takes bulldog tenacity to put first things first these days. So many other things seek the pre-eminence of "the one thing needful" (Luke 10:42). The Christian must lay aside hindering forces and "take time to be holy." Dwight L. Moody said, "He who is too busy to find time for prayer is busier than God asks him to be."

We forgot Jesus! Christian, have these words ever condemned you for your lack of gratitude? "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits," cried the psalmist (Psalm 103:2). Then he lists the blessings of salvation, healing, protection, lovingkindness, and provision.

A kind uncle who had just returned from Paris brought his little niece a fine French doll. "Did you thank Uncle for the beautiful present?" asked her mother as the little girl rushed into the house all aglow with delight over the new toy.

"Yes, Mama, but I didn't tell him so," was the surprising reply.

This is how poorly some of us express our gratitude to God. "My people have forgotten me days without number" (Jeremiah 2:32), God said of Israel.

How many days have we let slip by without praising Him? Let us vow with the psalmist, "I will remember... the most High. I will remember the works of the Lord... I will meditate... and talk of thy doings" (Psalm 77:10-12).

However, the doctor was intent on further X rays and tests; so I consented to let him try every means. Once I heard a nurse in the hall say, "Well, *God* can heal."

After two sets of X rays and the use of a fluoroscope, the doctor made another set of X rays of the entire digestive tract. Thank God, they couldn't find a thing wrong!

The Lord answered the prayers for

Healed of Rhumatic Fever and Heart Murmur

When I was six years old I was stricken with rheumatic fever. For a whole year I was bedridden—my temperature running as high as 103 degrees. At the end of the year our family physician said there was nothing else he could do for me and recommended me to the Los Angeles Children's Hospital.

Before my parents took me there, they requested prayer for me. When the heart specialist at the hospital examined me he told me I didn't have rheumatic fever, after all. He said that my heart, which had been enlarged, was now normal in size!

However, there was still a hole in one of the heart valves, causing me to lose some of the pure blood. The heart specialist told me I would always have that murmur and would have to be very careful.

I CAN REMEMBER SITTING OUTSIDE THE doctor's office, waiting while my mother talked with the doctor. I was thirteen years old and had waited many times before, but somehow I knew it was different this time.

Many months before I had complained of pains in my neck, so my parents had taken me for a checkup. This was followed by specialists, tests, an operation, and radium treatments. And now, months later, the doctor said there was no hope. I was to die in a matter of weeks of Hodgkin's disease.

Hatti is unique among the countries of latin America and the West Indies. It is an all-Negro republic, and the languages spoken are French and Creole. A visitor in Haiti could well imagine he was in Africa because, although Roman Catholicism is the accepted religion of the people, the real religion—voodooism—is a mixture of African paganism, witchcraft, and spiritism. The beating of drums, devil dancing, pagan shrines, and fetishes are evidences that Africa is the mother country of this small republic. Haiti has over six million people, and poverty and disease are everywhere.

Some of the people readily admit that they worship the devil. They say, "God is good; He won't hurt you. But the devil is mean. We want to stay on the good side of the devil so he will do us no harm." So they pray to the devil and make sacrifices to him. They burn his mark upon the cheeks or hands of babies so the devil will know the children belong to him. Their reasoning is that the devil won't hurt his own property.

There are now fourteen established churches in Haiti, thirty-one outstations, and a total of 1,700 members. Three missionary families are laboring in this harvest field: Mr. and Mrs. Ray Fairbanks, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Turnbull, and Mr. and Mrs. Homer Specter.

Mrs. Homer Specter tells what it's like to be a missionary's wife in Haiti.

A Missionary's Wife in Haiti

When voodoo drums echoed through the night her heart stood still!

"Tourists are almost always impressed with the beauty of this tiny island republic. They often have the opinion that life here is a veritable paradise on earth. Just the other day I heard someone exclaim, 'Why, Haiti has everything!'

"Towering mountains, arid desert, rugged coastline, verdant foliage, brilliant flowers—yes, Haiti has all of these and more. Haiti is fascinating, mysterious, and enchanting—until one looks beyond the beauty to the unspeakable filth, hopeless poverty, and hapless condition of a people weakened by decades of disease, malnutrition, and starvation. Looking still further one sees spiritual poverty, sin and moral degradation, and indifference to God. This, of course, is the concern of the missionary. If it were not for this spiritual darkness, we would have no reason for being in Haiti.

"The missionary, unlike casual visitors, sees both the good and the bad, the beautiful and the ugly. The missionary experiences moments of exultation and times of deepest depression. A missionary's wife, less active in travel and visitation work than her husband, is more subject to times of depression than he.

"My faith was tried again and again during our early years in Haiti. We lived in the mountains, far from any village or town, with no English-speaking neighbors. I was not proficient in Creole or French and I was left with no means of transportation when Brother Specter had to be gone for several days. The children

would become suddenly, and sometimes violently, ill. Several tropical maladies are quickly fatal. Their symptoms are so much like those of less serious diseases that no one but an experienced physician can safely diagnose an illness.

"Faced with the almost unsurmountable task of learning a foreign language, of teaching the children their correspondence courses (a time-consuming, nerve-racking job unless one is especially gifted for it), of adjusting to an entirely new way of life while coping with incompetent, untrained and illiterate help, the first-term missionary-wife often has a brutal battle with nerves that saps her strength and spiritual vitality, and threatens her sanity.

"The missionary wife sometimes feels that the children have a mental block and will never learn anything, and that the help are deliberately conspiring to drive her out of her mind. Hours of waiting for her husband's return from a hazardous trek become an eternity of anxiety, and wild imaginings seem to become a terrible reality.

"I shall never forget my first experience with voo-dooism. It happened soon after our arrival in Haiti ten years ago. Brother Specter had gone on a trek which was to last several days. Our little two-room house was located high in the mountains. Our neighbors were all Creole-speaking people who lived in little thatch-roofed huts around us. At that time I knew about ten words of Creole.

"Being nervous on the first night without my husband, I put the children to bed but I did not fall asleep for quite awhile. I could hear the voodoo drums echoing back and forth through the mountains. At last I slept from sheer exhaustion—but not for long. At 3 A.M. I was suddenly awakened. My heart seemed to stand still as I listened. What an unholy din of horrible noises! I slipped from my bed and, by the light of the full moon filtering through the cracks of the heavily shuttered windows, I tip-toed to the door. I didn't dare open it, so I found a small opening near the high iron lock and looked through.

"There, in front of the house, I beheld hundreds of voodooists carrying torches. They were chanting and beating their drums and cracking whips. Some were screaming and writhing under demon possession. I had no idea what it meant, but I was caught in a vise of fear. I couldn't move! Finally, I mustered all my strength, crept back to my bedside, and dropped to my knees. My attempt to pray was very feeble but God heard and understood. At last, although the noise continued on the outside, the beating of my heart grew quieter and my troubled spirit became calm as I committed myself and the safety of my children to the loving care of the Lord. Finally, a little after 5 A.M. the throng of voodooists dispersed and we were left in peace. I never learned their intentions, but God protected us.

"There have been times when I felt my own sanity was at stake as the powers of darkness and oppression became very strong. And thieves often tried to break into our home. At such times my only refuge was in quoting portions of the Holy Scriptures. Through all these things I have found that His grace is sufficient for me!

"All this, of course, is the dark side of missionary life. There is a much brighter side, too. There are seasons of rejoicing when souls are brought to Christ. After a trek, there is the joyful reunion when the loved one arrives home safely. The knowledge that we are working for the Lord is gratifying.

"Although education for the children (we have six) is a problem, and we, like other missionaries, face the loneliness of being separated from our children in their later school years, we are grateful for the added experience travel gives them.

"I praise God for these years on the mission field—for every trial experienced, for every battle fought, and for every victory won. Our lives are unique.

"My trials in Haiti are perhaps different from those of a missionary wife in Japan or Alaska. We are fighting a common enemy, however—the principalities and powers of darkness. We have the same Captain leading us. Momentary defeats shall turn into glorious final victory for all of us whether we are in the States, on the home mission front, or on the foreign mission field."

GOD DEFEATS DAGON

Sunday School Lesson for July 15, 1962 1 Samuel 5:1-8, 11; Psalm 32:3-5

THE CAPTURE OF THE ARK (1 Samuel 5:1)

In our previous lesson we saw that Israel was defeated by the Philistines and the ark of God in which Israel had trusted was captured. It was placed in the temple of Dagon, the Philistine god.

What was God's purpose in permitting the ark to be taken? (1) To discipline Israel and to teach the nation that God's presence did not accompany a people who lived in sin against Him. (2) To reveal both to Israel and to the heathen that He was supreme and far more

powerful than the Philistines and their gods.

The Philistines assumed that because Israel's God permitted His people to be defeated and the ark (symbolizing His presence) to be taken, He was therefore inferior to Dagon, and that Dagon had triumphed over Him. Acting on this false assumption they destroyed Shiloh, the city in which the ark had been kept, and massacred its priests (Psalm 78:60-64; Jeremiah 7:12; 26:9). After this they placed the ark in the heathen temple beside Dagon.

All of this made it appear that God had suffered defeat and that His plan had been hindered and frustrated.

However, it was Israel and not God who had failed. This often happens. Human failure may seem to thwart God's program, but not so! God's eternal purposes are irresistible. God always wins. The vital question is—shall we be on His side and line up with His holy will?

THE FALL OF DAGON (1 Samuel 5:2-5)

The ark was brought into the temple of Dagon as an offering to Dagon. It was set by the idol to indicate the subjection of the God of Israel (whom it represented) to the god of the Philistines. But—

"On the morrow, behold, Dagon was fallen upon his face to the earth before the ark of the Lord." Thus Dagon's position suggested prostration before Jehovah and adoration of Him. The Philistines, however, thought Dagon's fall was accidental and replaced him on his

pedestal.

The next day Dagon was found to have suffered an even worse calamity. Not only had he again "fallen upon his face" before the ark, but "the head of Dagon and both the palms of his hands were cut off upon the threshold." The supernaturalness of this judgment was quite evident. Note that Dagon's head and hands were not broken off but "cut off," as if God had taken a knife to him. The head and hands, instead of being scattered promiscuously on the floor, were laid on "the threshold" to indicate the contempt in which God held Dagon, since the threshold represented that which was to be stepped upon! A number of practical lessons suggest themselves.

1. Wrong cannot stand finally before right. Wrong-doing is contrary to God's universe. God's moral laws are not arbitrary. Long before they were written in the Bible they were written in the nature of man, written in the universe, written in the nature of things. Though wickedness seems to triumph it is only that God's judgments which are certain, are sometimes delayed due to

His longsuffering.

2. God will tolerate no rivals. It has been well said that "God's place is never by anything else, or on a level with anything else. His place is above everything else. He is not to be given a place, but given the place in a house, a home, a heart. Many people would give God a second place in their hearts if their idols might remain. But that cannot be; there must be a choice—God or idols—not both."

THE PUNISHMENT OF THE PHILISTINES (1 Samuel 5:6-9)

Not only was their god destroyed, but the Philistines of Ashdod were smitten with a loathsome, painful, and fatal disease. Furthermore, it appears from chapter six that God sent a plague of field mice who devastated their crops and reduced them to dire economic straits. Thus the Philistines who had been proud of their victory were cursed by their ill-gotten gain. So it always is. The great preacher, Dr. Joseph Parker, commenting on the incident, said, "It will be even so with ill-gotten results; with undeserved, unrighteously attained gain; be it wealth or influence (or position) or what it may. The bad man has a hard time of it; when he wants to get clear of his gain, he begs and cries that somebody will relieve him of his very victories."

SUMMERTIME IS HARVESTTIME

The Scriptures said "Go"—the Spirit said, "Go"—so she went. And Jane accepted Christ.

SUMMERTIME IS A WONDERFUL TIME TO WORK IN THE harvest field for the Master. Contacts seem easier to make at that time of the year when people love to be out of doors and are so accessible to one who is looking for opportunities to testify. Relatives come that you perhaps see only once a year. Friends get together for outings and picnics.

What a responsibility this puts on us, and how sad it would be if some whom we might be able to contact and win for the Lord should come to the end of that swiftly passing season and have to say in the words of Jeremiah 8:20, "The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved."

I am thinking of Jane (we'll call her) who was won for the Lord last summer. I was asleep one night and dreaming. The dream was different somehow—so vivid and distinct that I could not forget it after I awoke. It seemed that in my dream I saw Jane hungry and looking for food; and when I went to help her, she accepted the Lord as her Saviour. When I awoke the Lord spoke to my heart, "Now is the time for Jane to be saved. Go to her."

Jane was my husband's cousin who lived some fifty miles from us. But no matter what the distance—no matter that it was haying season and my husband needed me at home, I knew I must go. I had promised the Lord I would always go at His direction and we were determined to put His cause first.

In my morning devotional, the key word seemed to be "Go." The Scriptures said "Go," the Spirit said "Go," so I went.

As I covered the distance to their farm, the car wheels sang a song of salvation and the wind whispered it to me. Every breath was alive and anointed. I felt the presence of the Lord very real and could not doubt that He would make my mission successful.

My thoughts dwelt on Jane and her family. I remembered that she had not been to church for several years. Both she and her husband once had been saved, but sin had entered and the last few years were dark and ugly—scarred by the ravages of sin. The month before, her husband had gone away to the city to find work while she had remained on the farm, sending the children to summer school. The dream had indicated that she was hungry for natural food (I was longing to see her receive spiritual food, and had almost forgotten the other aspect in my dream). What had happened that they were also in physical need?

When I arrived, it was the husband who greeted me at the door. His explanation was quickly heard and did not surprise me. He had lost his work in the city—the food supply was low. There were hungry mouths to feed.

Jane herself was spending the day helping her aunt who had been in the hospital, and in a little while we were talking together in the back bedroom of her uncle's house. I told her my mission—how the Lord had sent me—and for an hour I talked to her about her soul's salvation. Then we had prayer together. Big hot tears splashed—first of repentance, and then of joy. Jane was saved! God had prepared her heart for my coming and had made my trip profitable. I knew there was joy also in the presence of the angels over the soul that had repented.

It was time for me to leave and in my mind there was no question as to what I should do. Could I take the message of salvation and then return home, leaving this family destitute? Of course Jane didn't want to accept it, but I insisted on leaving her our grocery money for that month. I knew the Lord would send in our meat and potatoes, and He did.

Along with the lesson on obedience, the Lord had opportunity to teach us also a lesson on trust in the month that followed. We simply passed up the grocery stores as though they didn't exist, and soon Elijah's raven would come by with a balanced diet for God's children!

Every week, and from sources wholly unexpected, God sent the "ravens" bringing every kind of food for His children: milk, eggs, peas, tomatoes, corn, rice, beans, pickles—even chocolate cake! I remarked to my husband one day how full our table had been since the day I gave our grocery check away! The food kept coming —in abundance.


There came a day when I wanted apples and I mentioned it to the Lord. "Lord, I'd like apples on our menu—fried apples like those Mother used to fix." Could they come in when there was no money and no grocery list for human eyes to see? Yes. That very day a neighbor who had not sent me anything in all these years sent over apples—big, juicy red ones. The Lord included this in His liberal promise, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

The summer ended, the harvest passed, but thank God, Jane is saved.

Bethany Bible College Plans Expansion

SANTA CRUZ, CALIF.—At the recent Northern California and Nevada District Council in Sacramento, Calif., the Bethany Bible College Corporation unanimously approved joint recommendations of college president C. C. Burnett and the college board of trustees for a two-phase expansion program costing approximately \$245,000.

The program includes conversion of the present camp-meeting tabernacle into a multi-purpose, year-around auditorium, and the construction of a new dormitory to house one hundred additional students.

Construction costs for converting the tabernacle are estimated at \$95,000. The sloping floor will be leveled to seat 700 on the main floor. Bleachers will extend from the floor upward on three sides of the proposed auditorium to accommodate 1,050 additional persons, bringing the total seating capacity to 1,750. The main floor will also be used for a gymnasium and related activities.


The stage area of the auditorium will be shell-shape in design to afford the best of surroundings for musical presentations, baccalaureate and commencement services, and similar occasions.

The present gymnasium which occupies the rear of the building will be divided into several small classrooms on a two-level arrangement. Installation of removable walls on the lower level will permit easy conversion of those rooms into a spacious prayer room accessible from the auditorium proper. The prayer room will be used during summer camp meetings.


Because of the additional classrooms provided in the new ar-The "Stone of Faith," which rangement, it will be possible to remodel the present library allowing for twice its current capacity.

Construction on the multipurpose auditorium is expected to begin early this fall.

The second phase of the expansion program involves the erection of a new dormitory building on campus across the street from the student center. Construction costs for the proposed two-story structure are estimated at \$150,-000. Shells were bursting all around. Presently there was a black cloud as pieces of shrapnel came whizzing past. Poor Bert fell like a log. Tiny Jim (6 feet 3 inches) jumped down beside him and then returned to his place in the trench.

Suddenly there was a startled cry, "Can you tell me the way to heaven?" Tiny jumped down again. "The way to heaven? I'm sorry, buddy, I don't know the way, but I'll ask the other fellows."

He returned to the fire step and walked along to the next man and asked him, but he did not know. So he went on to the man beyond him, but he did not know either.

Jumping down, he walked around the trench into the

next fire bay, jumped on the fire step, and inquired of the third man. Then he went to others until he had asked seven men the same question, but none of them knew the way to heaven.

Leaving that part of the trench, he went on to the next. His question was always the same, "Bert is dying. He wants to know the way to heaven. Can you tell him the way?" He had now asked sixteen men, but not one of them could answer his question, though they had all come from a so-called Christian country.
