Pentecost and Personal Evangelism

Acts 1:8 is as much a standard for a Pentecostal church as Acts 2:4

THERE IS EVERY EVIDENCE TODAY THAT THE HOLY Spirit is striving with the hearts of men in a manner unprecedented in Church history. There is an increasing conviction among many Christians that this may well be the final striving of the Holy Spirit to usher a victorious Church into the presence of the Lord.

In Dr. Ernest Wright's book, *The Rule of God*, the Harvard professor says, "In prophetic eschatology, the consummation of the Kingdom is to be marked by a great revival of charismatic happenings. In that day both leaders and people will be Spirit-filled and Spirit-impowered on a scale hitherto unknown."

The discovery of such possibilities is becoming more apparent every day to church leaders. Evangelist Billy Graham says, "The time has come to give the Holy Spirit His rightful place in our churches. We need to learn cace again what it means to be baptized with the Holy Spirit. I know we can rationalize and immediately ten thousand theological questions arise and we try to figure it all out, but I want to tell you we need to accept, we need to get something. Give it any terminology you want, but we do not have the same dynamic and the same power the Early Church had. They had the filling of the Holy Spirit."

Leaders of church denominations are voicing their sense of a desperate need of the Holy Spirit in their church. The Reformed Church in America, for instance, summoned its members to set aside a day of repentance to ask the Holy Spirit's forgiveness for stifling His fire and to seek in His baptism the fullness of His power. This action by the oldest denomination in America is indicative of a trend. A joint inquiry concerning the gifts and manifestations of the Holy Spirit by the Protestant Episcopal Church and Assemblies of God leaders is further evidence of a deep hunger for the moving of the Holy Spirit.

Such happenings are outward evidences of a dynamic striving for the Holy Spirit that may well signal the return of our King. With such happenings in evidence, there is a renewed hunger among our Assemblies of God leaders to probe deeper into the Word and move forward under the unction of the Holy Spirit in the compelling power of Pentecost.

Individual witnessing is the emphasis of the seven golden opportunities (seven Sundays) of the 1963 Pentecost Crusade (April 21 through June 2). Particular emphasis is being put on renewing the Sunday night evangelistic rallies by inviting hungry souls to "come hear our pastor." We believe this is the mind of the Holy Spirit and it might well result in a new move of the Spirit in all our churches.

This was voiced to me by a former member of the Jehovah's Witnesses sect who has been recently saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. He said, "The greatest need of the Church today is for Spirit-filled Christians to move out of the church circles under the compelling power of the Holy Spirit in a house-to-house ministry winning souls to Christ." Certainly the Jehovah's Witnesses have the method without the message.

A businessman recently told me that he spends every Saturday afternoon winning souls to Christ. I was thrilled when he stated he had been able to bring a new convert to church nearly every Sunday over a period of months. He said he learned soul winning from his pastor, also a great soul winner.

Another man stated he and his partners were endeavoring to win at least three souls a week and bring them out to the house of God.

The seven golden opportunities of the Pentecost Crusade call for personal involvement in winning the lost. Every Spirit-filled pastor feels a compelling urge to minister to lost souls and new converts in his Sunday evening evangelistic service. Nothing can satisfy one's heart like winning souls to Christ. There seems to be an equal stir among our laymen. Those who have been in contact with our Bible college students detect a general desire to be involved in reaching the lost. New spiritual fervor seems to be gripping the hearts of the youth as the Christ's Ambassadors are passing out tracts to their schoolmates. Action Mandatory, the soul-winning advance of Men's Fellowship, is putting particular emphasis on winning men at work.

This hunger for personal involvement is the key to the next great revival. The National Department of Evangelism has received information from several churches of a dynamic approach to evangelism as old as the Book of Acts. It is based upon the simple fact that if the unsaved do not come to us, we must go to them.

In this dynamic approach, the weekly church calendar is arranged to include an evangelism night. This night becomes the driving force behind the Sunday evening evangelistic service and the church's revival meetings.

Evangelism night is designed to reach hungry souls outside the church. The workers gather at the church and engage in earnest intercession for the lost. Then they go out and knock on doors, visiting homes that are listed on carefully screened prospect cards. They have been taught how to cooperate with the Holy Spirit. They have learned certain basic rules about approaching people. They go to strange houses confident that the Holy Spirit has gone before them and has prepared the way.

After making a certain number of calls the workers return to the church to report on the results of their work. What rejoicing there is when one team reports a soul was actually won to Christ, and another reports a family that has not been attending any church has promised to come next Sunday. The impact of these reports is amazing. A keen soul-winning appetite is whetted in every believer and faith rises in every heart.

Evangelism night will break the death grip on any church. It will bring Sunday services to life with the appearance of new converts who have come to sit under the ministry of the pastor. It will add new strength to every department of the church. Evangelism night is a tremendous compliment to all other evangelism methods such as mass meetings, Sunday school enlistment, youth outreach, and regular church promotion.

I challenge every Christian to take four simple steps:

1. Read what the Bible says about soul winning. Face up to the fact that the responsibility is not the pastor's or the evangelist's only, but is laid upon everyone who names the name of Christ.

2. Frankly confess that you have failed to fulfill your obligation. This is hard to do. It is easier to blame the minister, or others, than to blame oneself, but honest confession and repentance will change the situation.

3. Learn how to win souls. It is not difficult; it simply requires cooperation with the Holy Spirit. You do not need to attend a Bible college to become a soul winner. Just learn a few key Scriptures and ask the Holy Spirit to anoint them with His power.

4. Begin winning souls without further delay. I am convinced that no man will become a lover of souls until he begins doing it.


These four simple steps can revolutionize your life and transform your church too. A vast majority of our people have never had the joy of winning a soul to Christ. Let one man begin and others will follow his example. Let two or three attempt to win souls and a blaze of revival will sweep through the church.

It is amazing how many are leaving the soul-winning work to the "experts." They excuse themselves by saying they are not specifically called to personal evangelism. I know. I did too! The difficulty is that we confuse the ultimate with the various means of reaching the common goal. Acts 1:8 says, "And *ye* shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon *you*; and *ye* shall be witnesses unto me." Acts 1:8 is as much a standard for a Pentecostal church as Acts 2:4.

May God give us a true vision of His program for the Church, so that we realize that true Pentecostal experience involves a passion for the lost.

How can one rightly suggest we are Pentecostal if we do not compel souls to Christ?

Pentecost Crusade (April 21 through June 2) will see a bountiful harvest of souls if we begin today to pray, plan, and participate in a program of personal evangelism.



SUPPOSE SOMEONE WERE TO ASK YOU, "WHAT IS THE greatest enemy of a soul-winning church?" What would you answer? Gene Edwards' answer is devastating, "The enemy is too much *activity*."

Too much activity in the church, that is. As the Israelites thought that sacrifice was a substitute for obedience, Christians think activity within the church is a substitute for soul winning.

"Almost every present-day, church-related organization was begun for the exclusive purpose of winning souls.... All this organization and activity was started with the thought in mind of producing a greater soulwinning movement. But through long years of growth it has evolved to the point where it is the greatest single *hindrance* to that goal." Keep in mind that Edwards is not a member of the Assemblies of God, though the book is published by the Gospel Publishing House, a department of the Assemblies of God. He is not specifically talking about Assemblies of God churches. You still have the uncomfortable feeling, don't you, that maybe he is looking just a few years into the future?

For we know that it could happen to us if we lose our sense of mission.

Is a loss of sense of mission inevitable? Not at all, according to Edwards. But each church must make a choice. It must choose between "doing many things poorly, or a few things well." If it is to maintain its sense of soul-winning mission, it must simplify its program to make room for visitation evangelism, for in a crowded program, visitation evangelism is the first thing to suffer.

"To have both a soul-winning church and a church brimming with activities is impossible. Exhausted Christians will never recognize the Biblical importance of soul winning and visitation, when it is sandwiched in between other activities, and *treated as though it were on the same level of importance*.

"If you want your people to engage in New Testament soul winning, then there is no alternative: MANY OTHER TIME-DEMANDING ACTIVITIES MUST BE DROPPED." In building a church, the author argues, there is no substitute (Continued on page twenty-one)

When Death Comes

Every one of us, sooner or later, must encounter death. A loved one who is very close to our heart is suddenly taken from us, and we probe again the age-old questions concerning human existence and the life to come.

Two factors will determine our emotions and reactions at such a time. One factor is whether the departed person professed faith in Christ. The other is whether we ourselves who survive are truly "born again" and whether we believe God's Word which, after all, is the only light we have to lift the heavy darkness of bereavement.

Briefly, here are Biblical answers to four questions that confront a Christian whose loved one has departed.

(1) What has happened to my loved one?

The Scriptures state very clearly that "the body without the spirit is dead" (James 2:26). At death there is a temporary separation of the spirit from the body. Your loved one has "moved out" of the "house" in which he was living. The empty "house" is laid to rest but the real person has departed to be forever with Christ if he was a Christian believer.

(2) Why has God permitted this to happen?

Though it may seem hard to understand, the Bible reveals that for a Christian this temporary separation is a definite manifestation of the love of God. The Psalmist said, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints" (Psalm 116:15). And our Lord Himself testified that those who die in Him are "blessed" (Revelation 14:13.) The realization of this precious truth should enable you to say with Job of old, "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21).

(3) Where is my loved one now?

Jesus said, "In my Father's house are many mansions. . . . I go to prepare a place for you" (John 14:2). Your loved one has simply taken a journey from his earthly house to the heavenly mansion God prepared for him. The apostle Paul told us that to be "absent from the body" is to be "present with the Lord" (2 Corinthians 5:8). And he said that to be with Christ is "far better" (Philippians 1:21-23). What a blessing that your loved one has been ushered into the loving embrace of our wonderful Saviour!

(4) Will I ever see my loved one again?

Yes, there will be a joyous reunion for all who trust in Christ. The Saviour promised He would come again and receive us unto Himself, that where He is there all His followers may be also (John 14:3). This is our blessed hope. Those whose bodies have fallen asleep in Jesus will be united with all Christian believers who are still living on the earth at the time of the Rapture of the Church, as described in 1 Corinthians 15. The "corruptible" (the dead in Christ) shall "put on incorruption." The "mortal" (the living Christians) shall "put on immortality."

Notice the glorious statement in 1 Thessalonians 4: "The dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words."

These words offer comfort that is comforting indeed. Do not sorrow as those who have no hope. The separation from your loved one is only temporary. Your reunion with him will be eternal.



We Conquer Through the Cross

God has given us an all-conquering weapon in the blood of His Son. He has sent the Holy Spirit to anoint us and to teach us to wield this mighty weapon in battling the forces of Satan.

THREE AMAZING STATEMENTS IN THE SCRIPTURES SET forth the great need of man, the stupendous price that God paid to meet that need, and the fullness of the provision He made for us in the Atonement:

"For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him" (2 Corinthians 5:21).

"Christ... being made a curse for us... that the blessing of Abraham might come on the Gentiles through Jesus Christ; that we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith" (Galatians 3:13, 14).

"Yet it pleased Jehovah to bruise him; he hath made him sick" (Isaiah 53:10, literal translation).

How terrible must have been our spiritual condition that the Father, in order to redeem us from sin, should make His own Son to be sin in our behalf! The first statement implies that the man who is in the grip of sin is in the power of such a strong enemy that to deliver him from its clutches required the uttermost sacrifice on the part of God. If there was no other way of delivering some poor leper from the grip of his awful disease, would you make your only son to be a leper that leprosy's captive might be set free? God did this for us. When no other eye pitied, His holy eyes looked with divine compassion upon our terrible condition, and His Son brought us salvation!

How terrible, too, must have been the power of the curse that is upon humanity to make our Redeemer become a curse in our behalf! Because of sin the ground was cursed and brought forth thorns; therefore the symbol of the curse was the crown of thorns. Our blessed Saviour took those thorns upon His head, indicating that the curse rested especially upon the minds of men! The thoughts, conceptions, and judgments that arise in our minds, the feelings that we entertain, are truly like thorns and thistles, piercing both us and our fellows. Mental hospitals are full of men and women and children whose minds are desperately sick. "O great compassion! O boundless love!" that would come down to a wretch cursed with a distorted mind and become a curse on his behalf!

Then think of the horror of the ills of men everywhere. The world is full of the sick, the lame, and the blind. Thank God, He has revealed to us in His Word that He has been moved by the terrible havoc of humanity's physical anguish. When we needed a true and all-sufficient physician, He did not withhold His only Son.

In the second place, the verses we are considering reveal the stupendous price that God paid to meet the spiritual and mental and physical needs of man. What tremendous desire must have arisen in the heart of God to deliver the souls and minds and bodies of men from all their ills. In adoring wonder, love, and praise, we stand before Him as He goes to Gethsemane, then to Gabbatha, and on to Golgotha! We listen with grateful, believing hearts as He tells how His glorious sacrifice has provided a full and free salvation.

In the third place, these passages assure us of the glorious and comprehensive redemption provided for us. It is unthinkable that healing provided through such great suffering and sacrifice would be impractical or unavailable! Instead we are assured that man can become every whit whole. The only condition required is faith.

How sadly disappointed God must be after providing divine righteousness for us that so few of His people have forsaken their own thoughts and yielded their minds to the health-giving control of the Holy Spirit. So few are appropriating the healing of His stripes and the health purchased by Him who was made sick with our sicknesses. May we let the Holy Spirit make real to us the terrible price that Jesus paid to make this threefold blessing available to believers!

Some time ago when I was much troubled by the defeats that I and some of my friends had suffered at the hands of self and sin (even though we had been baptized in the Holy Spirit), I became conscious that God was talking to me. This is what He seemed to say, "Where did I defeat sin, self, the world, and the devil? In the Upper Room?"

"No, Lord," I replied, "it was at Calvary through the Blood."

Then He said, "Get back to the Cross and to the Blood if you really want victory over self and sin. Call my people back to the Cross and to the Blood, that they may become more than conquerors over the powers of evil. A Lesson From the Chuppah

CHRISTIANS MAY LEARN MANY RICH SPIRITUAL LESSONS from the customs of the Jews. The custom of performing weddings beneath the *chuppah* (canopy) suggests many precious truths.

The *chuppah* is a canopy of equal length and width, made of either silk or satin, supported by four staves (one in each corner) which four guests carry. Over each of the staves on the canopy there is printed one of the following phrases in Hebrew: "The Voice of the Bride, The Voice of the Groom, The Sound of Gladness, The Sound of Joy" (Jeremiah 33:10, 11).

This *chuppah* reminds the Jew of the litter in which the bride was carried in the processions of long ago. It also brings to remembrance the ancient tent life of Israel and stands as a picture of the future home of the couple. The groom (*chassan*) is taken under the canopy first. Then the bride (*cholee*) comes in and walks around the bridegroom seven times in the presence of all the guests. This number (seven) of circles stands for her purity—it indicates that she is a perfect bride for the bridegroom. What a picture of the Bride of Christ (the Church) who is described as holy, without spot, blameless, and some day to be declared *perfect* in Him before a countless number of guests at the greatest of all weddings!

As the saints of God look upon the canopy of Jewish custom, they can see the future home of the Bride and the Heavenly Bridegroom: "And the city lieth four-square, and the length is as large as the breadth.... The length and the breadth and the height of it are equal" (Revelation 21:16).

Silk or satin can hardly compare to the materials of which that city is made; for "the building of the wall of it was of jasper: and the city was pure gold, like unto clear glass. And the foundations of the wall of the city were garnished with all manner of precious stones" (Revelation 21:18, 19). "And the twelve gates were twelve pearls; every several gate was of one pearl: and the street of the city was pure gold, as it were transparent glass" (Revelation 21:21).

The number "four" suggests the world: "And the nations of them which are saved shall walk in the light of it." (Revelation 21:24). Yes, from the four corners of the globe, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south the company of the redeemed shall come and they shall enter into the New Jerusalem, that city that lies foursquare.

The Heavenly Bridegroom went first under the *chup-pah*, but before He went away He encouraged His disciples who were then living, and all those who would believe in Him through their word, by saying: "Let not your heart be troubled... I go to prepare a place for you.... I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:1-3).

Soon, soon, my brother and my sister, there will be heard the "voice of the Bride." Soon, very soon the "sound of gladness" and the "sound of joy" and the "voice of the Bridegroom" will ring out! And we who have made ourselves ready shall go to be with Him for evermore! Hallelujah!



FOR PARENTS WHO CANNOT ADOPT

SHE ARRIVED ONE BRIGHT MAY AFTERNOON, CARRYING a huge stuffed toy and grinning shyly. The next day we mailed announcements: "We have become the foster parents of blue-eyed, blond Marie, age six." That was seven years ago.

Last summer, we proudly watched her receive a two weeks scholarship to a camp for excellence in one of her school subjects.

Today Marie is a lovely teen-ager on the threshold of maturity. On the basis of response to her environment in our Christian home, we are confident that she will bloom into beautiful womanhood.

Many childless Christian parents who do not meet the requirements of adopting societies are unaware of the existence of a foster care agency which may help them satisfy their yearning for a child. At the same time, they can do a valuable service in helping a needy child.

This agency seeks to provide homes for children and young people whose natural parents are unable to care for them. The purpose is eventually to reunite the child with his family. However, if this is inadvisable or impossible the child remains in the foster home indefinitely or in some cases is offered for adoption.

Most foster children are insecure and greatly in need of loving care. Here then is the challenge and opportunity for Christians to undertake a unique service both to their state and to their God.

The happy Christian home, in which parents are living in right relationship with one another, their neighbors and their God, provides the ideal environment for a disturbed child or teen-ager.

Religion being the greatest force for molding character, a Christian home will provide the moral foundation which is basic to a child, who because of problems arising from lack of proper care and training in his real home, is a potential delinquent and charge to society.

The foster child needs to know that he belongs, that he is wanted, that he is loved and important to someone—all of which the substitute parents will provide.

But no foster parent can give the inner security resulting from a vital spiritual experience. In this area



they can become the channels through which the love of God flows to the child, as they guide him into a personal relationship with the Lord Jesus as Saviour, friend and ever present companion.

Now the child knows he belongs. He belongs to his foster parents, to his church, but above all to the family of God.

Recently we had a teen-ager with us for just one month, pending placement in a girl's school. That she responded to our love and spiritual guidance was evidenced by her remarks: "If a person couldn't believe in God and go to Him with troubles, he would go cuckoo.... When you haven't any friends and no one to understand you, then you can go to God.

Younger children are even more responsive. During her four-month stay in our home, six-year-old Jane prayed one day: "Dear Jesus, we have a picture of you in my room. You are holding a little child. You love the little child and you love all the kids in this house."

Another time she prayed, "Jesus, I know you love me even when I am bad. But you are sad when I am bad. Help me to be good. Amen."

Our own Marie, being a long-term placement, has indicated in many ways the positive and stabilizing influence of her acquaintance with the Lord. At bedtime prayers she confides in God as naturally as she does to us. As she grows older, she will feel rightly entitled to a private domain into which none can enter. At an age when "no one, but no one, understands" it will greatly add to her security to be able to confide in Someone who does understand. More than anything else, this assurance will undergird her for the complexities of life which she will face after leaving home.

Christian parents interested in the foster care plan can receive necessary information by phoning or applying to their local department of welfare. But for those who would like a general idea of what is involved, the following basic requirements are presented:

There must be sufficient income to maintain average standards of living.

The child must have his own room, or share one with someone his own sex and reasonably similar in age.

Working mothers are not eligible.

Parents must love children, be patient and understanding; willing to cooperate with the agency and with the natural parents, if they visit.

Age limits are between 24 and 60, but exceptions are made. The agency prefers placing very young children with younger parents. Parents with teen-age children or married ones often do well with teen-agers.

Parents must be in good enough health to discharge their responsibilities adequately.

The Welfare Department pays a monthly rate for room and board (differing in each state); clothing, medical and dental care are provided. Because standards of payment are admittedly low, foster parents must be willing to supplement when necessary and supply extras such as music lessons, toys, holiday gifts, etc.

Agencies endeavor to place children in homes of similar faith, under the broad designation of Protestant, Catholic, Jewish.

You may express preference as to sex, age, and type of child you would like.

You are expected to give character references.

If you are not ruled out on basic requirements, an investigator will visit your home. If you are approved, there may be a waiting period of several months to a year, depending on availability of a child to fit your family. It might be well to contact your agency every few months, to assure them of your continued interest.

When the happy day finally arrives, your caseworker will bring the child for a preplacement visit. If, for some reason, the child does not appeal to you, you may so indicate. Or, if after having him for a period, it becomes apparent it isn't going to work, you are not obliged to keep him. (However at this point, as an experienced foster mother, I advise parents not to become too easily discouraged. Because removal of a child from his own home is bound to be upsetting, one must allow six months to a year for adjustments to be made. In time, prayer, love, and patience will produce rewarding changes.)

A challenging ministry awaits those willing to undertake foster care of teen-agers. Here is an opportunity to check delinquency at its source. It may be a difficult task, but a rewarding and badly needed one for those who qualify.

Although in most cases the agency does not permit more than four children at a time, some allow more.

A friend of mine has had as high as nine at one time, not siblings, their ages ranging from three to eleven.

She is a comfortable-looking mother type, forty-eight years old and a devoted Christian. Here is her explanation for taking in welfare children:

"I wanted to do something for the Lord. So I did the thing I loved best because I knew they needed my care. What a blessing it has been! Poor, ragged beggars they all are, but I love them every one; almost as much as the Lord does.

"Most of them had received no religious training. I began to read them Bible stories at bedtime, teach them to say grace at the table and prayers at night. I take them to Sunday school regularly. In the atmosphere of our happy Christian home, they blossom like little wild flowers."


This was her way of fulfilling the Scripture: "Suffer the little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

One of the rules of the Welfare Department is that "The foster home shall provide moral and spiritual guidance, a happy and stable home."

If you qualify, why not contact your welfare agency?

Scriptures

Bible Society Taking on Forty New Countries

The American Bible Society, which already is giving regular support to Bible work in 104 countries, plans to take on forty more.

Faced with the fact that demands for Scriptures are skyrocketing throughout the earth as new millions become literate each month, and the tendency of other nations to look more and more to the U.S. for help, the American society is attempting to raise an additional half-million dollars in 1963 for this extra work.

This year's budget for translating, printing, and distributing Scriptures is \$5,382,000-a record amount. The society depends on contributions from all Protestant denominations to meet this budget as its Scriptures are sold at less than cost or, in some lands, given out free.

Last year the American Bible Society provided 60 per cent of all the Scriptures that were distributed by the various Bible societies throughout the earth.

Of the forty new countries it is adding, twenty-five are in Africa, six in Asia, and nine in the Caribbean area. At present the largest demands are coming from Latin American countries where the churches are growing rapidly and where great prominence is being given to the Bible both in worship and in witness.

Criminals

Slight Decrease Reported in **Juvenile Delinquency Cases**

For the first time in thirteen years, the number of juvenile offenders appearing in courts has shown a slight drop, according to Mrs. Katherine B. Oettinger, director of the Children's Bureau of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

"Our figures for 1961 show a one percent drop," she said, "although in this year the number of children in the population increased about three percent."

Although there was a two percent increase in the number of delinquency cases before juvenile courts in major urban centers, this was offset by a four percent decrease in the number of such cases in smaller cities, and an 18 percent reduction in cases coming before rural courts.

However, 1961 was still the second worst year on record. In 1960 a six percent increase occurred in the number of juvenile offenders.

Statistics for 1962 are not yet available.

Radio Station Loses Its License Due to Vulgarity


The Federal Communications Commission unanimously revoked the license of a radio station in Kingstree,

PUBLICATION STRIBUTION S. C., for permitting a disc jockey to broadcast material it described as "coarse, vulgar, suggestive, and of indecent double meaning." This was the first revocation of a license on such grounds in the history of the FCC, according to Religious News Service.

The FCC followed this drastic action by warning all radio stations to guard against the airing of indecent remarks by persons interviewed by telephone. It told of a number of recent incidents in which persons thus interviewed uttered profane or obscene remarks which went out over the air. It reminded the radio stations that the U.S. criminal code imposes fines or imprisonment on anyone "who utters any obscene, indecent, or profane language by means of radio communication.'

The FCC action ought to help a situation which has been growing seri-



ous. If the President of the U.S. would set a good example this also would help. On December 17, 1962, he used the word "hell" on all three television networks. Other presidents before him have been guilty of the same offense but his immediate predecessor in the White House at least apologized when he learned that an oath he uttered on a political platform had gone out over the air.

Government's Use of Lying As Policy Is Condemned

The U. S. Government has been condemned for using lies as an "instrument of government policy." Pastor John L. Hunt of Frankfort, Ky., based a sermon on a statement attributed to Assistant Defense Secretary Arthur Sylvester in which the secretary allegedly said: "I think the inherent right of the government to save itself when faced with nuclear disaster is basic." The statement referred to the use of news as a "weapon" in American foreign policy during the Cuban crisis last autumn.

Such a philosophy—that the end justifies the means—"is the creed of the dictator," said Pastor Hunt. "Atrocities are always committed under the banner of good. If safety condones the lie, then we are not worth saving."

Christian Missionaries Evicted

Seventeen United Presbyterian and Reformed missionaries from the U.S. were evicted by the Sudanese government in January. A new law passed by the predominantly Moslem country requires that every missionary or mission society be licensed annually to carry on any activity. Under this law, church schools have been confiscated, resident missionaries expelled or arrested, and contact restricted between Christian clergymen and their congregations.

"Dial-a-Thought" Brings 400 Calls a Day

A Baptist minister in Canada who started a "dial-a-thought" telephone service in his church three years ago says he now gets an average of 400 calls daily. Pastor Allen Crawford of Oakville, Ont., says he publicizes his telephone ministry with car bumper stickers. He dictates a new message into an automatic answering device every evening.



In Ecclesiastes 7:20 we read, "For there is not a just man upon earth, that doeth good, and sinneth not." In 1 John 3:6 we read, "Whosoever abideth in him sinneth not." How can these verses be reconciled?

In Ecclesiastes 7:20 the natural man is described; in 1 John 3:6 the saved man. When God saves a person He implants in him the seed of righteousness, giving him a new, redeemed nature. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature" (2 Corinthians 5:17).

God said, "Every firstling of an ass thou shalt redeem with a lamb; and if thou wilt not redeem it, then thou shalt break his neck" (Exodus 13:13; 34:20). I do not understand why an innocent animal should receive such cruel treatment. Please explain.

I believe the Jews knew how to break the neck of an infant colt of an ass without causing it much pain. The truth portrayed here is that, while God desires the firstborn, and asks for first place in every life, He cannot accept the unclean. The unclean must be redeemed by the clean if it is to live. God desires us, but we were born in sin. He cannot accept us in our natural state. We must be redeemed by the "Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world" or else perish.

Paul said, "Ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ" (Romans 7:4). Did he mean Christians are no longer under the law of Moses?

He said that "Christ is the end of the law for righteousness for every one that believeth." We are saved through believing in what Christ has done, not through trusting in our own ability to gain merit through seeking to keep the law. "Ye are not under the law, but under grace."

It does not mean that Christian believers are free to be lawless. In salvation the Holy Ghost comes into the life "that the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit" (Romans 8:4). When we are saved the law is written "not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in fleshly tables of the heart (2 Corinthians 3:3).

Is it true that believers in Christ, the Church, Constitute the "firstborn" through whom the residue of men are to be saved after the Church is taken away? (Acts 15:14-17).

The "firstborn" was considered as belonging to God. The first of the flock and of the field was to be made an offering to God (Exodus 13:12). In this respect, Israel was considered the firstborn—belonging to God (Exodus 4:22).

In the New Testament, Christ is spoken of as the firstborn (Romans 8:29; Colossians 1:15, 18). Christian believers are described as members of "the church of the firstborn" (Hebrews 12:23). Early Church believers (which probably includes us also) are spoken of as "a kind of firstfruits of his creatures" (James 1:18).

I believe Acts 15:16, 17 refers to the time, following the Church age, when Christ will restore the tabernacle of David which is tallen down, thus restoring the kingdom to Israel. From this kingdom blessing will be spread to all the nations of the world.

Korea Field Chairman's Report

CHURCH EXPANSION

Four years ago, two of our Korea Bible school graduates saw the need of establishing a church near the Bible school campus. Cho Yonggi and Che Tashil held their first services under some pine trees on the edge of the mission compound—only a handful of children attended. Three months later, these boys took a step of faith and built a small house, arranging part of it for services.

The neighbors stood somewhat aloof and very skeptical. Then it happened! Friends of a totally paralyzed woman asked Brother Cho to come to the stricken woman's house to pray for her. She had been paralyzed since the birth of her child. Everyone in the community knew of her condition. As the Korean workers prayed, God completely healed the woman! The spell of heathenism and the bondage of ancestral traditions were broken. Slowly the number of people attending the services grew until, by the end of the first year, twenty members crowded the little rooms.

These two graduates received no support from the missionaries nor from the national church. They simply launched out by faith and God proved Himself to them. A tent was pitched beside the house. More and more people were saved and healed by the power of God. Soon the tent became too small and had to be enlarged—not once, but three times. Buddhists, idol worshipers, drunkards, and a communist were saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. The congregation grew until it reached nearly 300.

Brother Cho was called into the Korean army. During his absence Missionary John Hurston assumed oversight of the church. Last spring he conducted a revival campaign in the new Global Conquest tent which was

pitched right in the market place of the rapidly developing community. As a result of the successful tent revival, more than fifty new members joined the church.

The thrice-enlarged tent church could hardly hold the expanding congregation. So, an old revival tent was borrowed and pitched on the mission compound. With the completion of the new Global Conquest Revival Center in downtown Seoul, Brother Hurston with Cho Yonggi, now released from the army, left the Full Gospel Assembly tent in Tae Cho Dong to take charge of the Revival Center.

I was asked to become pastor of the Full Gospel Assembly, in addition to my other missionary duties. Brother So Kyomin became my assistant and he is carrying the major share of the pastoral duties.

With winter approaching, it was not possible to worship in the huge tent, because there was no way to heat it. By faith we launched a building program. By Christmas, we were worshiping in the half completed church. God marvelously met every need. When we needed \$1,500 to complete the roof, God laid it on the heart of a Christian couple in St. Louis to send us that amount. Former church property was sold to put in the floor, platform, and add two rooms.

April 29, 1962 was the dedication day for Tae Cho Dong Full Gospel Assembly. Maynard L. Ketcham, Field Secretary for the Far East, was our guest speaker. Immediately after the dedication we plunged into our first revival campaign in the new church with the Reid Evangelistic Party in charge. Revival fires burned brightly as people filled the church. Scores received healing. Each morning people sought the infilling of the Holy Spirit and each night many responded to the salvation call. On the last day of the campaign there was much rejoicing when one member pledged nearly \$1,000 to finish the interior of the church.

Tae Cho Dong Full Gospel Assembly is only one of many churches coming into being in Korea as a part of the Global Conquest program.

ORPHANAGE TO BE ENLARGED

How well I remember the first time we climbed the steep slope of a mountain on the edge of Seoul to visit two old army tents which were home to twenty orphans! As we climbed that wintry day, our feet slipped frequently on the icy path. When we reached the tents we were awed at the condition under which these halfstarved children lived. There were no stoves or beds; the children were poorly clad.

Miss Lois Yardley (now Mrs. Loren Beans) had discovered the orphans and had become burdened for them. Immediately she appealed to Christian servicemen of the 177th ASC Unit. These American boys interested their entire outfit in assisting the orphans by giving liberally each payday.

Obviously the children had to be moved to a different location and a permanent building erected for them. The American GI's made this a unit project. Our mission allocated about half an acre of its land for the building and the servicemen began *Operation Orphanage*.

It did our hearts good to see the soldiers digging the foundation and laying blocks. After the last tile was laid on the roof and the Korean-type heated floors all finished, the soldiers proudly moved the children into their new home.

Today, under the direction of my wife, Edith, the orphanage is improving its facilities and efficiency in operation. The thirty children it now houses range in age from five to fifteen years. They are happy and well fed.

You would fall in love with the children if you could see them! They crave affection and attention. When I go to the orphanage they cling to me. Besides having daily devotions, the orphans attend Sunday school and children's services at the Full Gospel Assembly.

Now we are faced with a serious problem. The new Korean government is passing a law eliminating small orphanages. Unless an orphanage has at least fifty children and 3,200 square feet of floor space, the government will not renew its permit. We will have to close the institution or build a unit to house twenty more children. With cement and lumber, which we anticipate receiving from a U.S. military agency, it will cost us about \$1,500 for labor and other materials.

"Where did I come from?" you may ask. But there would be more point in asking, "Where am I going?" for although we cannot alter the facts of our birth we can choose where we shall spend eternity. Life is a tormenting puzzle to a thinking man until He finds the answer in Christ.

WHY AM I HERE? WHERE DID I COME from? WHITHER am I going? WHAT is it all about anyway? There are no greater nor more profound questions that anyone may ask concerning himself.

One may be interested in the structure of the atom, or flight into space, or the cure of cancer. As profitable as the answers to such questions may be, yet they are of no help when it comes to answering these others which concern us most. Answer all other questions and leave these unanswered, and how great is that darkness. It is neglect to find the answers to these questions which leads to sorrow, frustration of spirit, disappointment, suicide.

These questions come to everyone of us; and strange as it may seem, how many there are who instead of trying to seek out the answers, seek to snuff them out and forget them. Yet the questions still stand. The matter is personal. It can't be avoided. Eternity hangs in the balance. Science has no answer, biology has no answer, psychiatry has no answer, evolution has no answer. Man in himself has no answer and never will have.

Only God has the answer, and He came down to earth in the Person of His Son that we might know. It is Jesus Christ who is the "Light of the world." As He said, "He that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life" (John 8:12).

How earnest are you to really know the answers, rather than to slip off into utter darkness? You have heard about Jesus Christ. Have you ever cared enough about Him to read the story of His life when He was here among men? You will find it in the first four books of the New Testament. You can read any one of them in a little over an hour. It is well worth while to look into.

He is alive forever more; the same yesterday, today and forever.

He is either the Light of the world, or else the greatest deceiver who ever joined human ranks. That's what it is all about, and our choice here determines our eternity. —American Tract Society

ALCOHOLISM CURED

WHEN THE DOCTORS CANNOT HELP, God can. This I discovered when, at twenty-five years of age, I found myself an alcoholic.

I had been brought up in a Christian family but by the time I was fifteen I had gotten away from the Lord. I drank a little then, but it was when I entered the army at the age of seventeen I really started. By the end of my first month I was drinking like a veteran.

Drinking caused my discharge from the army, so my father got a job for me in a factory. I did not work there long until I was "fired" because of my drinking. Poor dad, he had given such a good recommendation for me, and I had done this to him. But, because he was saved and loved God, he forgave me. My other jobs went the same way.

I do not know why the Lord put up with me as He did, but His Spirit, kept dealing with me. I would curse God for everything that went wrong. When it was lightning fiercely, I stood and dared Him to strike me dead. Only by His grace am I still alive!

It took God ten years to bring me to my knees. Only an alcoholic can understand what I suffered. But when I was told there was no help for me, I was really frightened. For the first time in seven years, I asked my father's advice. But when he told me that my only help was God, I laughed in his face and said, "Go to God! He would never help me—not after what I have done to Him."

As I said that a big lump formed in my throat. The Holy Spirit began to convict me of my sins. I finally agreed to pray for help. I had a little doubt in my mind, but I started to pray. One week went by—two weeks —three weeks—then a month with no



The Roe Messner Construction Company enlarged the auditorium, provided a balcony, added seventeen classrooms, assembly rooms, nursery, etc. increasing the floor space of the church plant by 5,000 square feet. Pastor S. J. Colburn reports Sunday school attendance has grown from 137 in 1958 to 231 in 1962.



WASHINGTON, INDIANA—On the spot formerly occupied by a remodeled store building, Washington's First Assembly of God has erected this beautiful Bedford stone edifice with stained glass windows. Robert L. Covington, who has been pastor over three years, says the padded pews in the new structure will seat 340. Washington (UPI)—The Census Bureau estimated the nation's resident population at 187,069,000 as of last December 1.

This was 1.5 per cent higher than the estimate for December 1, 1961.

Counties Losing

One-half of the counties in the States are losing population each year due to the tremendous migration to urban or metropolitan areas.

Church Membership Down

"For the first time in 100 years, there has been a decrease in the percentage of church members in the nation.

"The 1961 membership is given as 116,109,929 for all faiths, 63.4 per cent of the population against 63.6 per cent one year ago.

"There was a gain of 1.2 per cent, or 766,131 members, among the 228 Protestant bodies reporting memberships in the 1963 *Yearbook of American Churches*. They represent a combined membership of 64,434,966.

"The Roman Catholic gain of 1.9 per cent also is a decline, in comparison with the 1960 gain of 3.2 per cent. The yearbook lists 42,876,665 as that church's reported membership.

"Not all churches use the same reporting system, it was noted by the National Council of Churches bureau of research, which compiled the yearbook. Some include all infants and family members.

"There was a loss of 3.1 per cent in Protestant Sunday school enrollment.

"For the first time since World War II, church membership percentage gains fell below the estimated population increase. They were 1.4 per cent in 1961, compared with an estimated 1.6 per cent rise in the population. The ratio had been 1.9 per cent against 1.8 per cent a year earlier.

"The yearbook lists Jewish congregations as having 5,365,000 members and Eastern churches 2,800,401. There were 572,897 members of the Old Catholic, Polish National Catholic, and the American churches. The Buddhists, who had 20,000 last year, reported 60,000 in the new yearbook, possibly indicating a change in their reporting system."

A Land of Rain and Fruitfulness

DURING FORTY YEARS OF WILDERNESS wandering. Moses had stood between God and the men with whom he had journeyed. Many times they had sorely tried his patience and love, but he had faithfully borne them in prayer before the Lord.

Now they were coming to the Promised Land and soon would reach their journey's end. Although he knew, because of a moment of weakness in dealing with them, he would not be permitted to pass over into the land, Moses still loved them enough to spend many hours imparting the knowledge God had given him concerning it. And in Deuteronomy 11: 7-17, 22-25 are recorded some special words of warning and exhortation.

First he brought to their attention that he was not speaking to their children, but to them! Because their eyes had seen all the great acts of the Lord which He did, obedience to the Word of God was required of them. They MUST go in and possess the land. It might be difficult for these weary travelers to look beyond Jordan and make the plunge that would take them in to possess the land, but God. had promised them nothing this side of

Jordan! Remember, it is one thing to be touched by the Spirit of God and to be almost persuaded, but quite another to press one's way through to a knowledge of the things of God.

As Moses pointed out, an entirely different land from that which they had formerly known awaited them. In Egypt, they had sown their seed and then worked long hard hours in the blistering heat of the sun to bring water to it by means of a crude pump operated by foot pressure. There was never a refreshing rain, and food supplies were limited. Now after years of aching muscles, the lash of the whip, and ill treatment, they were suddenly to come into a land flowing with milk and honey!

It was a land of hills and valleys where the soil drank water of the rain of heaven. It was a blessed land where in due season they might gather in their corn and their wine and their oil

True, Moses warned, there would be battles until they had conquered the inhabitants of the land. God never promises His people freedom from test and trials. Moreover He laid down conditions for the ultimate blessing of

His people-"If ye shall hearken diligently unto my commandments," said He. A prerequisite to blessing and fruitfulness is obedience.

Under this condition of obedience, God would give the rain of the land in due season. How lovely to have the showers when and where they are needed-at seedtime and harvest!


A real feast lay ahead for the Israelites! It meant a new menu and a "balanced" diet. There would be milk and honey-two of the most highly refined and nourishing foods, containing well-balanced portions of all food elements. Corn [of wheat] with its strong protein content, as well as other elements, was also promised. Then there would be oil and the strengthening, refreshing fruit of the vine, as a bonus God said, and He added, "I will send grass in thy fields for thy cattle, that thou mayest eat and be full."

Nevertheless Moses warned: "Take heed to yourselves, that your heart be not deceived, and ye turn aside, and serve other gods, and worship them; and then the Lord's wrath be kindled against you, and he shut up the heaven, that there be no rain, and that the land yield not her fruit; and lest ye perish quickly from off the good land which the Lord giveth you." How dreadful to be without the rain from heaven, and to dwell again in a dry and thirsty land enjoying none of the promised fruits! And all this because His statutes were not kept.

This is also a most timely warning for God's people in our day. On every hand the enemy is seeking to wear out the saints and to offer them many alluring comforts and pleasures. If they fail to remain watchful and to preserve their separation unto God, they will find themselves deceived and led astray.

The enemy delights in the failure of any soul who would turn back after he has started for the kingdom. Responsibility rests upon the seasoned saints to labor in prayer until every seeker has truly experienced the new birth and has been firmly established.

To remain in the land of rain and fruitfulness one must practice absolute obedience. Obedience is bolstered by continuously keeping God's Word in the heart and mind, teaching it to our children, and speaking it to all with whom we come in contact. If (Continued on page twenty-three)

for personal evangelism. Preaching, films, literature, radio, television—these are impersonal and in themselves will not get the job done. Personal evangelism, including visitation evangelism, is the answer.

An interesting theory, but does it work? The author says it does. He cites examples to back up his theory: attendance at one church grows from 50 to 220 in four weeks; at another place 67 new families are brought into fellowship in two months; laymen in one church win over 200 souls to Christ in less than three months.

"But he has the know-how!" you may object. Yes, he does, and he is willing to share it with you. The second section of the book is a discussion of the problems and principles of a soul-winning church. In this section he discusses the matter of leadership, the mechanics of a visitation program, and new concepts in soul-winning methods and training. The author in the last two chapters in this section emphasizes the necessity of depending upon the Holy Spirit.

The last section of the book is very specific. It sets

forth seven steps necessary for a personal evangelism campaign.

Step one occurs when it is realized that personal evangelism is part of the Church's mission and that the local church is responsible for evangelizing its community.

Step two is the taking of a religious census. Very specific help is given. No one can plead, "But I don't know how." He can learn.

Step three is the planning of the campaign. Here again the book is valuable because it is specific. The fourth step is spiritual preparation. Mechanics are not enough; it takes spiritual power to do spiritual work. Step five is a week of training for personal evangelism; a schedule for each session is included.

A week of visiting is the sixth step. Two kinds of witnessing are suggested: evangelism in institutions and house-to-house evangelism. The last step is the establishing of a sustained visitation program, not merely to invite people to Sunday school and church, but to talk to them about the Lord.

one has strayed he must return to the Word of God in order to receive again the Lord's blessing.

The Land of Promise provides for more than the physical body. "For if ye shall diligently keep all these commandments... then will the Lord drive out all these nations from before you, and ye shall possess greater nations and mightier than yourselves." The giants of habit must be defeated, and the storms that rage within and without must all be conquered in His Name.

God's Word to the Israelites had been: "Fear ye not, stand still, and see the salvation of the Lord...the Lord shall fight for you, and ye shall hold your peace." In Zechariah 4:10 the prophet has expressed it so well: "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord." And Jude urges that we build ourselves up in the most holy faith, pray in the Holy Ghost, and keep ourselves in the love of God. Oh, what a strong bulwark for the child of God!

How wide was the scope of the new land to which Israel traveled? It was as wide as the need! The promise was: "Every place whereon the soles of your feet shall tread shall be yours; from the wilderness... even unto the uttermost sea." God also told them that no man would be able to stand before them, for He would place the fear of them and the dread of them upon all the land their feet should tread upon.

Beloved, the land is ours. Why stand we idly by, failing to claim all God has provided for us? We sing of the wideness in God's mercy being like the wideness of the sea. Why not plant our feet firmly upon every inch of the ground from the wilderness to the farthest sea, and claim it for ourselves? Why not move out into new power and authority under the Holy Ghost and meet the needs of lost men and women in these last days? It is all a part of the fruitfulness of *our* land of promise.

"Let us therefore fear, lest, a promise being left us... any of you should seem to come short of it!"



Christ Gives Sight to Bartimaeus

Sunday School Lesson for March 17, 1963 MARK 10:46-52; 2 CORINTHIANS 4:3-6

BY J. BASHFORD BISHOP

How often we allow the apparent hopelessness and difficulty of our circumstances to prevent us from seeking and securing the help which Christ is so willing to give! It is on this point that Bartimaeus sets us an example which should inspire our faith.

THE BLIND BEGGAR (Mark 10:46-48)

His Need (v. 46). "As he [Christ] went out of Jericho with his disciples and a great number of people, blind Bartimaeus . . . sat by the highway begging." What a picture of human helplessness and hopelessness! Here was a man not only blind, but poverty stricken and friendless. He is representative of all who need not only physical healing but spiritual help of every kind as well!

His Cry (v. 47). Consider his actions and observe: (1) He took advantage of a passing opportunity. Jesus was passing by and would soon be gone. Since he had no guarantee of another day of opportunity he acted at once. How wise he was! And his wisdom is to be

imitated! (2) He ceased to desire material gain. Bartimaeus might have begged a small fortune from the crowd on this day. But he forgot alms-getting in his desire for sight-getting. Yet all their lives, multitudes of people in their pursuit of material gain and glory ignore the Christ who alone can give them the light which will relieve their spiritual blindness and save their immortal souls! Not only so, but Christians as well can blindly waste time gathering gold and pass up irretrievable opportunity for securing spiritual blessing and power which would make them a blessing to the world! (3) His prayer was a petition and not a dictation. "Jesus ... have mercy on me." He did not say, "Lord, you healed others; you are obligated to heal me." We do well to remember that everything we get from God, regardless of our spiritual status, is a matter of mercy and grace and not of merit. God is not at all under obligation to us, but He delights to be merciful!

His Opposition (v. 48). Bartimaeus refused to be hindered by his circumstances. He was blind, poor, friendless, and surrounded by unsympathetic people. His voice would be almost lost in the swelling tumult of the crowd. Yet for all this, he was full of hope and lifted his voice in fervent expectation!

"And many charged him that he should hold his peace." The reaction of the multitude to the fervent cries of the beggar is typical of those who neither understand Christ nor appreciate His ministry and who have no sympathy with those whose spiritual longings are deep and genuine. Spiritually dull or indifferent people with carnal pride and human reasoning are "wet blankets" which would silence the voices of sincere and fervent prayer if they could. Knowing nothing of agonizing or Holy Spirit inspired intercessory groanings, the cold formalist criticizes the energetic and earnest praying of the truly consecrated ones whose prayers are a rebuke to his own heartless prayers.

His Persistence. "But he cried the more a great deal." No wet blankets could smother his cry nor quench his aspirations. What an example he sets for us all! How often we grow fainthearted and cease to pray because the opinions of others have discouraged or disheartened!

THE COMPASSIONATE CHRIST (Mark 10:49-52)

Divine Invitation Extended (vv. 49-51). "And Jesus stood still!" How dramatic and thrilling! The cry of an insignificant and unknown beggar held up, as it were, the plan of God! Jesus was en route to Jerusalem and the Cross, yet He stopped to heed the voice of a needy soul! Two lessons are suggested: (1) We ought never to be in such a hurry that we cannot stop and do work for the Lord which for the moment is more important. (2) We ought to be convinced by this incident that the eyes of the Lord are indeed upon the feeblest Christian and His ears are attuned to his cry!

Divine Healing Accomplished (v. 52). Bartimaeus who knew exactly what he wanted from Christ and that Christ could meet his need persistently pressed his claim on the ground of mercy and received according to his faith. Blind Bartimaeus saw Jesus with the eye of faith. Jesus said, "Thy faith hath made thee whole." Faith in Jesus Christ, the Lord, opens the door to the fullness of His supply!



ALTHOUGH I HAVE SUFFERED MUCH. the Lord has healed me. He has done a complete work in my body.

X rays taken in February 1954 revealed four small growths on the right side of the colon, but doctors said it would require two years to determine the development of the growths. Sure enough, just two years later I was taken violently ill. Since I worked for the railroad, I went to the M.K.T. Railroad Employees' Hospital.

When surgery was performed the

surgeon found ulcers. These when tested showed signs of malignancy. The incision was twenty-seven inches long. The doctor removed one-half of the colon and changed the entry of the small intestine.

However, I recovered rapidly and was back at work in ninety days. Then in the following December I had trouble with my other side. About this time I was examined by doctors in Kansas City. They discovered I had a double hernia and listed me as 42 percent disabled.

When early in 1960 my side began to pain me again I was prayed for. I felt the power of God, but the trouble persisted. My in-laws continued to believe for my healing.

Finally on April 20, 1960, I had a thorough examination at the Veterans Hospital in Muskogee, Oklahoma. When they learned I had had cancer they checked very carefully. The radiologist informed me that the X rays showed the large right bowel which had been half removed lacked but onefourth of being its normal size, and the doctor found no scars of ulcers nor any trace of a hernia. 

TAKE TIME TO LAUGH!

A merry heart is a good medicine. — Proverbs 17:22, margin

ONE THING THAT HAS SURVIVED MAN'S FALL INTO SIN is the ability to laugh, and even this ability, all too often, is perverted to the laughter of scorn and derision. Abraham's laughter of incredulity (Genesis 17:17) is not mentioned in the New Testament, but the future loud laughter of the saints is indicated by the Greek text in Luke 6:21, "Blessed are ye that weep now: for ye shall laugh." The short-lived frivolity of the world is described in poetic form by J. Narver Gortner in his poem concerning Belshazzar:

"As crackling of thorns beneath a pot can never last, .So is the laughter of a fool—it crackles and is past!"

However much there may be of the laughter of scorn, derision, and incredulity, there are two types of laughter which characterize the people of God. The first may be called "the laughter of a merry heart." This is the joy which springs from a sense of well-being, the knowledge of sins forgiven, and the fact that all is well between us and our fellowmen. There are many things in our daily living which may cause good, clean laughter—the antics of a little child, the naturally witty speech of a friend, a humorous slip of the tongue. What a miserable world this would be if we could not laugh!

Man's ability to laugh at himself becomes to him a redeeming quality amid the frustrations and perplexities of life in this world. This "laughter of a merry heart" is especially prevalent among evangelical Christians. Our conviction and guilt have been brought to the Cross of Christ, and our hearts exult within us over the good news of salvation. This exulting brings praise to the lips, smiles to the face, and the desire to share our inner joy with others. As the inspired writer said: "He that is of a merry heart hath a continual feast" (Proverbs 15:15) and "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine" (Proverbs 17:22).

The ultrapious type of Christian who frowns upon all forms of humor and merriment should take note that following the revival in Samaria "there was great joy in that city." Jesus said, "Be of good cheer [cheer up]; I have overcome the world." He emphasized the very purpose of His coming in the words: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." His coming was to bring to those who would believe in Him life, happiness, joy, and release from drudgery!

The second type of laughter which characterizes the people of God is "laughter in the Spirit." It is true that everyone does not react in the same way to the Presence of God, but it was common in the early days of our Pentecostal movement for people in our services to be overcome with "holy laughter" when they were blessed by the Holy Spirit. As they sought Him, wave after wave of ecstacy swept their souls for long periods of time. Laughter was mingled with praises and expressions of love toward Christ. People left those meetings feeling they had been caught up into the Lord's presence.

I was preaching in revival meetings in a little Kansas town in 1947. My text one evening was: "Wherefore did Sarah laugh . . . ? Is any thing too hard for the Lord?" (Genesis 18:13, 14). Tired from the work of the campaign and feeling no humor whatever, I stood up to read my text at the appointed time. After I read it I could not speak another word. Like a deluge from heaven, holy laughter descended upon me until I was beside myself with joy and inner blessing. This wave of glory not only stirred me but that entire congregation began to peal forth laughter and praises as God swept that meeting with His Presence. From the front row to the back the people were laughing. One man was gloriously refilled with the Holy Ghost while sitting in his seat. He confessed later that he had not spoken in other tongues since he had been baptized with the Spirit five years before. His wife later told me that he was still laughing when he prepared to retire for the night, and, upon awaking in the morning, again burst forth in an ecstacy of laughter and praises to God. Perhaps this is what the Psalmist meant when he said, "In thy presence is fullness of joy." That entire campaign was transformed by this service, and subsequent nights saw God work in unusual ways about the altar.

Laughter is a medicine. It releases within the body forces which tend toward well-being and health. It helps to smooth out the rough places of life. Our ability to engage in it in a clean wholesome manner makes us easier to live with and takes much of the hard toil out of daily living.

"Yea, happy is that people, whose God is the Lord" (Psalm 144:15).
