# Dimensions of Divine Love

C an the love of christ be measured? it is astonishing how many things there are which can be calculated. Items considered immeasurable some years ago can now be computed with apparently flawless accuracy.

Distances both vast and diminutive can be precisely determined. Figures into millions of miles are employed to inform us of the gaps between stars and planets in outer space. Instruments such as the micrometer can measure distances as tiny as one-thousandth of an inch and smaller.

Density is a factor subject to measurement. The thickness of fluids such as motor oil is labelled on containers for the convenience of customers. Weather reports give us barometric information about the atmosphere, letting us know the degree of humidity.

Weight is another mode of measure. The heaviness or lightness of various objects can be determined by the use of scales. Massive materials involving millions of tons can be weighed, as also can something as minute as a pencil mark on paper.

Intensity also lends itself to computation. The loudness of sounds can be recorded on instruments designed for that purpose. A seismograph registers the direction, intensity, and time of earthquakes. A polygraph, often called a lie detector, records the intensity of bodily changes in a person as he responds to questions.

In Ephesians $3: 18,19$ the apostle Paul writes of the wonderful love of Christ which he says can be measured -after a fashion: "May be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height ; and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God." Paul admits that divine love "passeth knowledge," yet he declares that a degree of comprehension is possible. He affirms there are four dimensions to the love of Christ.

## Breadth

Breadth is a word of scope. Divine love includes everyone. Christ's love is universal in its aim and operation to all who will accept its claims. There are two great words in John 3:16 which reinforce this idea of universality: "world" and "whosoever." Jesus' love for all men was expressed unequivocally through His death on the cross. When Jesus uttered that first word from the cross, "Father, forgive them; for they know not
what they do..." (Luke $23: 34$ ), he prayed not only for the on-the-scene executioners, not only for those first-century Jews and Roman soldiers, but for the whole human race of all ages. The "them" of that prayer included you and me and everybody.

The love of Christ is broad in its impartiality. Jesus made it abundantly clear that the human distinctions of wealth, fame, appearance, and kinship made no difference to Him as far as eligibility for salvation was concerned. Nicodemus the wealthy, scholarly Pharisee was welcome to come, and so was the soiled, demon-possessed Mary Magdalene.

Christ's love is broad, but that does not mean it is shallow. Often when human resources or affections are spread, they become thin. Unless human love is concentrated on a few, it is likely to be a passionless sentiment. How different it is with the love of Jesus. Though His love is extended worldwide, its quality is not diminished. It remains true and strong.

## Length

Length is a word of time. This measurement reminds us of the longevity - or eternality-of Christ's love. He loved you long before He made Adam, and He will always love you whatever may be your destiny. Millions will inhabit that wonderful place called heaven; they will always be loved by Christ. Other millions will be consigned to that terrible place called hell; though they will be eternal, hopeless victims of the wrath of the Lamb, they will forever be loved by Jesus. It is the nature of divine love to be endless. From everlasting to everlasting is the love of Christ. It is written of our Lord that "having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end" (John $13: 1$ ). And this included Judas Iscariot who later abandoned Christ.

This dimension of Christ's love (length) is a reminder of the patience of that love. In His pursuit of erring humanity the Great Shepherd doesn't give up easily. None of us will ever know "how deep were the waters crossed; nor how dark was the night that the Lord passed through, ere He found His sheep that was lost." I think the oldest person I have won to Christ was a man 78 years old. Think how long Jesus waited patiently for him. The words of a certain verse of song express very well the patience of Christ's love:
"He stood at my heart's door 'mid sunshine and rain,
And waited, so patient, an entrance to gain;
'Twas sad that so long He entreated in vain,
For He is so precious to me."

## Depth

Depth is a word of reach. (Actually depth and height are two ways of expressing the same dimension, but one begins at the top and the other at the bottom.) How deep is the love of Christ? It is as deep as the earth.

## Dimensions of

GOD HAS PROMISED TO GIVE HIS OWN DYNAMIC POWER to Christians. "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you" (Acts $1: 8$ ). Why does God offer this power to us? What are we enabled to do when we receive the Holy Spirit?

To answer these questions shall we consider the Holy Spirit as operating through a believer in four dimensions.

## I

First, there is power in the upward dimension, to make Christ real. Knowing that, as far as His bodily presence was concerned, He was going to leave His men, Jesus promised to fill the great gap in their lives by sending them the Holy Spirit. "He shall glorify me:
for he shall receive of mine and shall show it unto you," was the enticing promise of the Master (John 16:14).

Thus it is that when the Holy Spirit fills a believer, the Divine Presence becomes so warm and vivid. At times our whole being seems drawn up to God in breathless adoration. It is as if the Spirit becomes a spotlight beaming upon our blessed Lord, magnifying His glory. At the same time, the springs of our own being are joyfully released so that we "worship God in the spirit, and rejoice in Christ Jesus, and have no confidence in the flesh" (Philippians $3: 3$ ). Oh, the rapture and glory of His unveiled Presence!

Does this kind of worship, praise, prayer, seem to you just uninteresting, unnecessary, or even out of place? Then, have you received the Holy Spirit since you believed? If not, your spiritual life is lacking in one important dimension-the upward drawing of your soul, by the power of the Holy Spirit, in devotion to your glorious Lord.

## II

Further, you can also receive power in the inward dimension, to build up your soul. Self-edification is essential to the Christian.

One delightfully refreshing and ever present way in which this comes about is by exercising the privilege of all the Spirit-filled: "He that speaketh in an unknown tongue edifieth himself" (1 Corinthians $14: 4$ ).

What an unspeakable blessing it is, in our private devotions, to speak to God in mysteries-spiritual secrets; to pray with the spirit as well as with the mind. Or, during the activities of a busy day, how refreshing to be able constantly to speak "not unto men but unto God" (1 Corinthians $14: 2$ ). Speaking with tongues, quietly, even silently, will keep the spirit in tune with God and build up that stamina of soul we need. Thus, "strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man... Christ may actually live in your hearts by faith" (Ephesians 3:16).

## III

Moreover, if you have been baptized in the Holy Spirit you have received power in the outward dimension, to witness for Christ to the world. "Ye shall be witnesses" means that you are a channel through which God's power will flow like "rivers of living water." The only conditions are (1) that you are willing to use this power in faith, as directed by God, and (2) that as a vessel you keep yourself clean.

It had become necessary for a certain acquaintance to have special electrical treatment. The practitioner asked him to sit in a certain chair and then, apparently ignoring him, turned away and read the newspaper.

After a while the patient asked when the treatment would begin.
"You are being treated now," was the answer.
The man said he felt nothing at all. So the physician took a board with several electric lamps on it and placed it against the man's bare chest. Instantly, they glowed with light.
"Sir," said the doctor, "there is enough power passing through your body to operate a street car. You do not feel it because you are insulated."

## God Is Speaking

God speaks to men in many ways. He spoke to the world through His Son but they nailed Him to a cross. Then He spoke through an earthquake to tell mankind that this was no ordinary crucifixion. Even the pagan officer of the Roman army, as he stood by the cross, was moved to acknowledge. "Truly this was the Son of God" (Matthew $27: 54$ )

Last week (March 27) He spoke again through an earthquake, the worst to shake the U.S. in 58 years. And again it was on a Good Friday. How many Americans "listened" as well as the Roman officer? How many paused at Easter to acknowledge their need of divine grace and to worship the risen Christ?

Scientists tell us the earthquake in Alaska represented a force ten millions times as great as the atomic bomb that destroyed Hiroshima. Surely this display of power should make people think. The earthquake, mighty though it was, represented only a small part of the power of the Almighty. One day He will shake not only one state, or one country, but the whole earth-and the heavens as well.

Earthquakes may be traced to natural causes but the Bible connects many of them with divine purposes. The earth trembled when God gave the ten commandments to His servant Moses. "The whole mount quaked greatly" (Exodus 19:18). It quaked again when Korah incited a rebellion against God in the wilderness. The earth opened its mouth and swallowed Korah and his associates, their houses and all their goods. They sank in a great crevasse and perished (Numbers 16:33).

Other Biblical references could be cited, but there have been sufficient earthquakes in the past five years to convince modern man that, as one network newsman put it, "he is being spoken to."
"See that ye refuse not him that speaketh.... Yet once more I shake not the earth only, but also heaven. ... Wherefore we, receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear" (Hebrews 12 :25-28)

## CHILDREN EVACUATED SAFELY FROM VALDEZ

Mildred Pitts, supervisor of the Assemblies of God children's home in Valdez, Alaska, reported on Monday, March 30, that all personnel at the home were safe. Calling by telephone from Fairbanks to Springfield, she talked with Gayle F. Lewis, executive director of home missions. Sister Pitts said she and her associates, Gertrude Bishop and Julia Ford, and all the children were evacuated to Fairbanks by the Air Force. The only possessions they could take were the clothes they were wearing. She said the children would be moved to Juneau on Wednesday, April 1, to be housed temporarily in the Assemblies of God children's home there.

At the time of the evacuation the children's home building was still intact, Sister Pitts said, though surrounded by rubble. The church also was standing but the Sunday school annex was severely damaged by the earthquake.

A phone call from Paul Riley, pastor at Wassila, brought news that both of our Assemblies of God churches in Anchorage are standing. Brother Riley said our church at Seward also is intact. All members and pastors at Anchorage and Seward are safe and uninjured but the homes of many of them were damaged.

As we go to press there is no authentic news available at present from Kodiak. We were saddened to learn that L. Duane Carriker, an Assemblies of God missionary at Valdez, is among those missing and presumed dead. Pray for Mrs. Carriker and for all our brothers and sisters in Alaska who are greatly in need of the Lord's help at this time.

## IV

Finally, there is power in the downward dimension to conquer Satan. "Behold, I give you power . . . over all the power of the enemy" (Luke 10:19), authorized Christ, in sending out the 70 disciples.

Satan's mind is full of malicious schemes by which to dominate the souls and bodies of men and enslave the nations. Possessed of an above-human wisdom, he cannot be outwitted by mere human astuteness. But God's power operating through Spirit-given words of wisdom and of knowledge make available a divinely supernatural wisdom that can defeat the infernal plans of Satan.

Receive the Spirit; keep filled with the Spirit; live in the Spirit; walk in the Spirit in all its glorious dimensions-and so realize a total experience of the promise of God- "Ye shall receive power."
baptized me with the Holy Spirit. The Spirit just came upon me in a downpour. He poured on me and out of me, and the river has been flowing ever since. Hallelujah!

I began to preach, and God blessed my ministry. The first Pentecostal convention I attended was at Stone Church in Chicago where the power of God fell in a remarkable way upon all present.

In 1928 I heard of a Pentecostal camp meeting to be held at Alexandria, Minn. Being definitely led of God, I went, not knowing it was an Assemblies of God camp. What a wonderful time we had! ... By this time I had two nice congregations in Milwaukee, one English and one Hungarian, and God's blessing was upon us in a wonderful way. At this camp I was very much impressed by the Assemblies of God ministers and their organization in action, so before leaving the camp I joined the General Council.

Next year our whole family went to the camp, and what a meeting we had! One afternoon Dr. Charles S. Price preached on faith. After his sermon the power fell upon the entire congregation. For an hour the Holy Ghost was upon us in such power that many thought the Lord was coming right then!

In 1930 God told me to go to Europe, so I went. Mrs. Wannenmacher took charge of our two congregations and our three children while I was gone. Feeling definitely led to have evangelistic meetings, she engaged an evangelist. Two young men gave themselves to continuous intercession. As a result, the Holy Spirit began to fall in mighty outpourings so that in three weeks' time 122 received the baptism in the Holy Ghost.

Meanwhile, God led me step by step to Riga, Latvia, where a Pentecostal conference was in session. The brethren had rented a large hall, and about 600 people were present that night. After the message of the evening, a mighty outpouring of the Spirit came, and the "slain of the Lord" were many. The owner of the hall, seeing so many people prostrate on the floor, called the hospital, and two ambulances arrived with two doctors, and four male nurses. They began immediately to check the pulses of the people who were prostrate under the power of God. They found them all normal; so after declaring that the people wère not sick, the doctors went back to the hospital. God had His way with His people, and their joy was unspeakable.

These are but a few of the wonderful outpourings of the Holy Spirit I remember. Let us earnestly pray during this anniversary year that such great movings of the Holy Spirit may continue among us, for they leave a divine stamp upon us which neither foe nor persecution can erase.

# Challenge of the Indian Chapel

GAllup, n. mex., a thriving city with a population of approximately 15,000 , is located in the heart of Indian country at an elevation of 6,500 feet. It is the gateway to various Indian reservations-the Navajo, Zuni, Apache and others-whose inhabitants number many thousands. A great part of the country is desert.

As we look back over the nine and one-half years that have passed since we came to Gallup and see what God has wrought, we rejoice for "hitherto hath the Lord helped us." Prior to September 1954 He helped us also in our work among the Pima Indians when we pioneered churches at San Tan and at Casa Blanca, Ariz.

Nowhere else in the great Southwest is one so close to the first Americans as here in Gallup. This city is known throughout the world as "The Indian Capital" because: (1) it markets more authentic Indian arts and crafts than any other place; (2) the annual inter-tribal Indian Ceremonial, which is held during the first part of August, has made the town quite famous. The Ceremonial features some seven to nine thousand Indians from about 30 tribes.

The people speak a variety of languages and their customs differ considerably. Thousands remain bound by the traditions and superstitions of their forefathers. In addition, during the past several years many of the

Indian people have become enslaved by the Peyote drug and the liquor habit. But the situation has been changing since many missionaries, including our own Assemblies of God workers, have begun to go among them and minister the Word of God.

Our first approach was through prayer meetings and personal witnessing. While ministering earlier among the Pima Indians it was our privilege to get acquainted with a Navajo family who at that time lived in Phoenix, Ariz. When we arrived in Gallup, we found that this couple had moved back to the reservation and the husband was working here in Gallup. We met these friends on the street when we arrived and they invited us to their home for a service. Through this providential contact many doors were opened.

The hogan (house) became too small to accommodate the crowds. After much prayer we were able to rent a building in town. The rent was extremely high but, feeling it was the Lord, we moved by faith.

As the services progressed the Lord confirmed His Word. Many were saved and a number received the baptism of the Holy Spirit. While we were in this rented building, the Lord answered prayer and a saloon on each side of the building was closed.

We kept praying and finally we were led to our pres-

ent location. We were able to purchase the property at a very reasonable price, and to erect a church valued at $\$ 20,000$. Our debt on the building is now $\$ 2,500$. Our district superintendent, Raymond Hudson, and some of the brethren came and helped on the construction several times. We used "The Reaper," a church plan from the Home Missions Department book, Plans for Pioneers.

We have seen a steady growth. Our attendance is averaging over 100. We have six Navajo Sunday school teachers in addition to English teachers. We use an interpreter for the benefit of the older people. God has marvelously opened the way to reach the Indian school children with the gospel here in town at the Manuelito Boarding School. We go out every Sunday morning and bring about 30 boys and girls to Sunday school and morning worship. We also reach about 50 children in two other government schools with classes on Wednesday
afternoon and Thursday evening. These schools are on the reservation, quite a distance from town.

Since prayer and Bible reading have been taken from our schools, dedicated Christian workers are faithfully trying to meet the children's spiritual needs through re-leased-time religious classes

We have baptized about 70 Indian people in water. We have a good Bible study on Wednesday night and our people are gradually responding to the Word. They are beginning to practice stewardship.

Our present building now four years old, is packed out and we have no place for Children's Church. We and our people are praying that God will enable us to build a larger auditorium. Since Gallup is an Indian center, has an Indian hospital, and is so close to the Navajo reservation, the potential for ministry here is almost unlimited. Pray that God will help us meet the challenge.

# NEW YORK'S FIRST BEATNIK CHAPEL OPENS 

Established by Ann Wilkerson, mother of Teen Challenge director

Strains of "the old RUGGed cross" mingled with hot jazz in the heart of Greenwich Village on Friday night, November 22, when New York's first beatnik chapel opened officially.

A basement cafe at 99 MacDougal Street, once known as the Den of 40 Thieves, has been transformed into the Catacomb Chapel. Bibles have replaced ash trays; coffee and doughnuts are the only refreshments. Hymms sung to guitar music have taken the place of rowdier entertainment of former days.

The chapel was established by Mrs. Ann Wilkerson, mother of Evangelist David Wilkerson, founder and director of Teen Challenge in New York, which works with young narcotic addicts, homosexuals and beatniks. Mrs. Wilkerson is known as the beatnik preacher of Greenwich Village for her work during the past three summers when she and her co-worker, Fay Mianelli, carried the gospel to Washington Square. Last fall they decided to continue their ministry during the winter months. Teen Challenge therefore rented the underground cafe and set up the chapel coffee house.

On two weekends Mrs. Wilkerson was in the Catacomb Chapel to serve coffee and to pray with visitors. It was a test. So many young people dropped in that Mrs. Wilkerson decided to make it a permanent venture.

All are welcome to visit the basement chapel, which is open from 8 p.m. to midnight every Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Visitors may leave contributions if they wish, but no requests for money are made. There is
one firm rule: no smoking! But visitors to the chapel dress as they please, in the informal beatnik style of the village.

Assisting in this ministry are workers from Teen Challenge headquarters in Brooklyn and some recent converts, including Laurie, a young woman who joined the movement only recently. Laurie plays the guitar and sings gospel hymns. She used to sing professionally in some of the other establishments in Greenwich Village but that is something she would rather not talk about now. "I know there is nothing else but this," she says of her newfound Christian life.

# Meeting the Anchorage Challenge <br> BY GILBERT MORT <br> ANCHORAGE, ALASKA 

This article was written before the earthquake. A report from Alaska

THe fairview assembly of god is located in the geographical center of the most heavily populated area of Alaska. The Anchorage Chamber of Commerce conservatively estimates the population to exceed 100,000 .

Anchorage, cited as an "All American City," is a modern and beautiful place and is known as the air crossroads of the world. People of several nations mingle as their jet airliners touch down at International Airport. Strategically located, Anchorage is favored with an ideal climate that successfully avoids the extreme temperatures common to some parts of Alaska, making it a delightful place to live.
"Fairview" is the second Assembly of God in the city of Anchorage and, even with the growth it has enjoyed, it is quite obvious that the combined outreach of the two Assemblies is not keeping pace with the rapid increase of population.
We accepted the pastorate of the Fairview Church in July 1959. Prior to this Brother and Sister Hodges had spent several years laboring in the Fairview area of the city. The sacrifices and disappointments they suffered, as well as the spiritual victories they enjoyed, may never be widely known. However, they were able to amass a large amount of used build-

ing material out of which the larger part of the Fairview Church is constructed. Brother Hodges also was able to get a contract signed for the purchase of the site on which the church now stands. He began construction and framed in the main auditorium of the building with 1,440 square feet of floor space early in 1959. In 1961 an addition to the building provided six Sunday school rooms, one of which doubles as a kitchen and another as C. A. room and prayer room.

No great revival has come to Fairview, but God has been saving souls from time to time and some have been baptized with the Spirit. A second annex, started in the fa!! of 1962, will soon be ready for occupancy. It will give us approximately 3,500 square
feet of floor space which is badly needed now to relieve the overcrowded Sunday school facilities. The Sunday morning attendance has exceeded 100 a few times.
Our enthusiastic C.A.'s have caught the vision of reaching out after the lost, and have initiated a visitation program. There is also an active WMC group, organized two years ago.

With all the wonderful assets and attractions that nearly 10,000 visitors annually find irresistible in Anchorage, yet the sad marks of $\sin$ are clearly visible in the hopeless, sinblighted lives that surround us. These present a challenge that we cannot easily ignore. Anchorage's Fairview Assembly has come into existence through the sacrifice, toil, and earnest prayers of a faithful Spirit-filled few who had a vision of the need and a desire to help meet the great challenge of this area.

## THE RED TRUCK

I SUPPOSE YOU DON'T KNOW ME, BUT where I live almost everyone does because I'm used to bring Navajo Indian people to church. I'm a one-ton red panel truck. I guess you're wondering how I got here so I'll tell you.

Back in Illinois I was once a florist's delivery truck. Then I got too old. My motor was good but my body was in bad condition. They were talking about putting me in the junk yard. I didn't like that. I wanted to be useful.

Then one day a man bought me. He was going to use me for a camping truck. I didn't like that either, although it was better than going to the junk yard. But one day my chance finally came. A missionary came and told the people at my owner's church that he needed a truck. Mr. Merv Thompson of Lincoln, Ill., said he would give me to the work of the Lord. When I heard this I was over-joyed-I was glad I could do something useful.

The missionary drove me, loaded from top to bottom with toys, quilts and other things for Christmas, back to New Mexico. The Navajo boys and girls had a wonderful Christmas because of me.

I remember one day when it was very cold- 31 below zero! I was one of the few cars in town that would start.

I traveled over 23,000 miles bringing boys, girls, mothers and fathers to church. My youngest passenger was two weeks old and the oldest a grandmother of 88 (I heard the missionary say her husband had been a medicine man many years ago).

On October 23, 1963, something terrible happened! I remember it as if it only happened yesterday. Mr. Missionary and I were going out on the reservation to pick up the people for church. Suddenly, a great big brown horse was right out in the middle of the road. It was impossible for me to avoid hitting it. I was completely wrecked, and the horse was killed, but Mr. Missionary wasn't hurt.

Even though I am ruined, I can now go to the junk yard happy because I spent the last year of my life serving God.

But who will take my place? Mr. Missionary now needs another truck. I am wondering who will bring the Navajo boys and girls to Sunday school.

Editor's Note: Although Speed-theLight funds have made it possible to supply vehicles for several missionaries on Indian reservations recently, the area which this story involves still has not received one.

OPEN THE DOOR

"If it is god's time he will open the door," people say to me. But the more I have thought about this the more I have wondered if we are not prone to use it as an excuse because of our lack of faith rather than a reason because of our faith.

It is easy to sluff off responsibility for missing a good opportunity by simply shifting the blame onto God with a thoughtless "if it had been God's time He would have kept the door open for us."

Does God have a time for us to open churches in cities yet unreached with our message? Certainly. But that time is now. For us to wait until a ready-made situation drops into our lap may be to wait forever, for our adversary is actively engaged in keeping doors closed.

In God's mind the Church is a part of Himself by which He accomplishes His purposes. By the Church He turns the knob on closed doors. And by the Church He expects to batter down the very gates of hell. Who is to say that closed doors are anything less than the gates of hell?

Brethren, we must exercise ourselves in the opening of doors. If Jonathan and his armor-bearer had waited until God miraculously slew the Philistines, the glorious story of First Samuel 14 never would have been written. But Jonathan acted in faith, and became God's arm stretched forth to open the door to mighty victory.

We are confident there is scarcely a community in America where a church cannot be established. But this confidence is not enough. Districts, churches and individuals must act. Doors are shut and bolted and they don't swing open easily. Yet we must remember that by the Spirit's enablement, not only can doors be opened but even city gates can be disposed of. "And Samson ... arose at midnight, and took the doors of the gate of the city, and the two posts, and went away with them, bar and all..." (Judges 16:3).

B large American city than any other in India. Her skyline of high office and apartment buildings is ablaze with neon lights. Some $15,000,000$ tons of cargo pass annually through her wide harbors. Her residents and businesses pay fully one-third of the country's income taxes.

Her $4,500,000$ people are crowded into a narrow, palm-dotted peninsula, giving her a far greater population density than that of London or New York. Every month she attracts hundreds of additional Indians who are

searching for work and a better life.
One out of every 66 persons in Bombay has no home at all except on sidewalks, under staircases, or in cattle sheds. Try walking in Bombay at night and you will find you cannot stay on the sidewalks for they have become vast dormitories.

Bombay is a wicked city. A popular magazine has stated that only Tokyo rivals it as "the world's queen city of vice."

Until recently, little had been done to reach Bombay's masses for Christ. Now plans have been laid and ma-

chinery has been set in motion to bring them the gospel. Thousands upon thousands of tracts and other pieces of literature are coming off the press to be used in launching an all-out attack against Satan. Prayer bands are being organized and evangelism courses are being prepared which will be used to train personal workers for the coming campaigns.

For purposes of these campaigns, a map had been prepared which divides the city into four sections. In sequence, the first three sections will be flooded with gospel literature which includes an announcement of the revival to be held in a central location in that area. Trained workers will be present at each revival campaign to deal personally with every soul who responds to the gospel messages. These workers will take names and addresses, and after each revival they will spend about two months in intensive followup work. Bible courses will be conducted for the converts. A minister will be ready to pastor each new flock and to form it into an established, self-supporting church.

In the fourth section a slightly different approach will be used. Since this area has the greatest population density, more time will be required for literature distribution. It will be flooded at least three times with gos pel literature before the revival campaign begins. This campaign will last not less than two months and will eventually culminate in the establishment of a strong evangelistic center.

I urge you to pray earnestly that all of these plans and preparations will be successful and that many souls will be saved. Pray also for the provision of all that is necessary to win this battle for Bombay's millions.

## ANNUAL CHECKUP TIME

New highs have been reached in Assemblies of God foreign missions. Four new fields have been entered in the last two years: Ecuador, Surinam, the Marshall Islands, and Bechuanaland. We have also opened six new evangelistic centers. These developments, together with the dedicated giving of our fellowship here in America, give cause for gratitude. Ours is an ever-expanding missionary enterprise. Forty-one new missionaries were sent out last year. We must appoint approximately this number annually to replace the five per cent loss of missionaries due to retirement, death and other causes. In recent years our missionary staff has remained around the 800 mark; we now have 808. This does not mean that our overseas program is static; as a strong national church emerges our missionaries fill the role of helpers rather than leaders. Increasingly their task is to mature the church brought into being earlier by pioneers.

In Buenos Aires recently I met our church leaders from seven republics of Latin America. Three of these brethren are converted Catholic priests who were educated and trained in Spain. They have been saved and filled with the Holy Spirit and are now preaching and teaching the full gospel in Latin America. These and other leaders are the product of our ever-growing Bi ble school program which now consists of 74 Bible schools with a combined enrollment of 2,660 .
Foreign missions giving reached a new record of over five million dollars. Our gain in 1963 was close to a half-million dollars. Budget-wise we stand fourth or fifth among today's Protestant missionary operations.
I hope you will pray through the remainder of 1964 for our missionaries scattered throughout the world. They are staggered by opportunities and needs greater than any that have ever before been afforded us.

# Isaiah Prophesies Deliverance 

Sunday School Lesson for April 26, 1964 Isaiah 37:15-23, 26-29

## The Trial of Faith

1. Sennacherib's Invasion of Judah (Isaiah 36:1;2 Kings $18: 13-16$ ). From Assyria came Sennacherib, capturing the cities of Judah. Hoping to avert national ruin, Hezekiah offered to pay tribute and was forced to empty the treasury and even strip the gold from the very doors of the temple in order to meet the enemy's heavy demands.
2. Rabshakeh's Blasphemous Address (Isaiah 36:222; 2 Kings 18:17-37). Hezekiah thought matters were settled, but not so! Sennacherib, not content with tribute, sent a great army under his general, Rabshakeh, to demand the surrender of Jerusalem. Rabshakeh made a blasphemous but clever speech near the walls of the city and within the hearing of the people. By this he sought to undermine their faith and confidence in God and in their king.
3. Sennacherib's Blasphemous Letter (Isaiah 37:8-13). Hezekiah's trials were not yet over!' Sennacherib him-

self sent a letter in which he daringly declared himself greater than God and attempted to show Hezekiah the folly of resisting him.

## The Act of Faith (Isaiah 37:1-35)

Perplexed as to what to do and conscious of his own inability to cope with the situation, Hezekiah resorted to the Almighty, All-knowing God-the only wise thing to do. He spread Sennacherib's letter before the Lord. What do we do in the moment of peril, in the hour of testing, when opposed or falsely accused? Hezekiah let the Lord fight the battle for him. "The Lord shall fight for you, and ye shall hold your peace" (Exodus 14:14).

God responded to Hezekiah's prayer and gave the prophet Isaiah a message for the king. He assured him, first, of the recovery and renewed cultivation of the long neglected land (v. 30) ; second, of the strengthening of the remnant of the people (v. 31) ; and third, of deliverance from Assyria (vv. 33-35).
The Deliverance of Faith (Isaiah 37:36-38)
God's answer to Hezekiah's prayer was sudden and miraculous. An angel of the Lord was dispatched that night, and in the morning 185,000 soldiers were corpses ! Sennacherib, ashamed to see himself thus defeated after such boastful threats, and terror-stricken lest he be smitten, returned to Nineveh where he was murdered by his own sons!

## Practical Lessons

The Need for Soul Travail. When Hezekiah was informed of Rabshakeh's threats he made a significant statement: "The children are come to the birth and there is not strength to bring forth." What did he mean? Hezekiah likened the condition of the nation to that of a woman in travail, quite spent with her throes, so that she has not strength to bring forth her child. One successful blow at the enemy and the nation would be brought forth into freedom, but there was not strength for that deliverance. What did Hezekiah do? He gave himself to that intense, agonizing prayer which is described in the Word as travail of soul (Galatians 4 19), and deliverance came!

Hezekiah's statement seems descriptive of many of our churches today. How is it that so many sinners sit unmoved in our services, and so many people bound by sickness, sinful habits, and evil spirits are not delivered? Is it not because there is a lack of that intercessory soul travail which is absolutely necessary to the work of God in the souls of men?

Laying Down Our Burdens. Hezekiah felt his responsibility as king of the nation of Judah, and when threatened by the enemy he realized that the burden was too great for him. Therefore, he laid his burden out

# 600 CHURCHES IN NIGERIA 

NIGERIA TAKES ITS NAME FROM ITS MOST IMPORTANT geographical feature, the mighty Niger River. Niger means "black." The sprawling Niger Delta covering some 14,000 square miles has been described as "an amazing sponge dripping with little rivers."

Nigeria lies between Dahomey and Cameroun on the Gulf of Guinea in West Africa. Its 373,250-square-mile area includes mangrove swamps, tropical forest, grass savannah, and encroaching desert.

The country is abundantly endowed with natural resources. Its economy is built around agriculture which occupies 80 per cent of the working population. Chief exports are palm kernels, palm oil, peanuts, rubber, cotton, and cocoa. Other exports are hardwoods and columbite. Nigeria boasts more than 1,000 manufacturing plants.

Portuguese explorers landed on the Nigeria coast in the 15 th century. During the next two centuries many European settlements were made. British penetration came in the 18th century. Under the combined influence of the British government and Protestant missionaries, Nigerians made great cultural and economic progress. Although divided by tribes and languages, Nigerians were united in their desire for political freedom and economic security. The desire for independence became paramount. On October 1, 1960, Nigeria ceased to be a protectorate and achieved full independence within the British Commonwealth.

With a population approaching 40 million Nigeria is a giant among the countries of Africa. It is the world's most populous black nation. Lagos, the federal capital

and chief seaport, is a city of 350,000 . Ibadan, capital of the western section, has a population approaching $1,000,000$ and is the biggest truly African city in the world. It also is the home of the splendid new University College.

Nigeria comprises nearly 250 tribal and linquistic groups. The four major tribes are Yoruba, Ibo, Hausa, and Fulani. English is the official and commercial language. Hausa is the lingua franca in the north.

The majority of the people hold to the tribal religions of their fathers. Islam is strongly entrenched among the Hausas. Roman Catholicism is promoted throughout Ni geria by an ever increasing number of missionary priests. Communism seeks to capture the awakened African mind through an expert use of literature.

Protestant missionary enterprise in Nigeria began more than a century ago. The Church Missionary Society sent its first missionaries in 1842; Southern Baptists in 1850. Today numerous societies have representatives in the land. Protestant churches claim a membership of 250,000 and a body of adherents said to be four times that number.

The Pentecostal Evangel is credited with being the instrument God used in 1930 to bring the Pentecostal message to Nigeria. Spiritually hungry people were stirred by reports they read of the sick being healed and believers being filled with the Spirit. Convinced of their need, they began to pray for the same experience. God manifested Himself to them in miracle-working power and many churches came into existence. A fervent appeal for missionaries was made to the Assemblies of God foreign missions department. The first to respond to this need were Mr. and Mrs. Everett Phillips who were appointed in 1939 and located in Port Harcourt. In 1941 Rex Jackson and Elmer Frink were sent to the field. Additional personnel followed as the work continued to expand.

With keen foresight Brother Phillips began a training program which was the beginning of Nigeria's Central Bible Institute in Umuahia. From less than a dozen students the enrollment has increased to 120 . The classes are in English. A number of graduates are enrolled in (Continued on next page)

the fourth year of study recently added to the curriculum. A vital branch of Nigeria's C.B.I. is the Bible correspondence school with 40,000 enrolled. This is directed by Esther Cimino.

Various missionaries have directed the school since its inception. Ralph Cimino currently is principal and a number of missionaries and Nigerians are associated with him in the school. It has made a vital contribution to the development of our work; all the ordained ministers are alumni of the school.

As workers became available new areas were opened to the gospel. The Kenneth Godbeys, together with other missionaries, entered Ogoja Province, which is densely populated by a backward pagan people. There was tremendous response to the gospel and today there are 120 self-supporting churches under the care of national pastors.

The Vinton Shumways went to Abakaliki to work among the Ibos. Revival came to this pagan area and today scores of new churches are pastored by Ibo ministers, many of them trained in Nigeria's Eastern Bibble Institute which was opened in 1958. The 70 students enrolled represent 20 different tribes.

Northern Nigeria, while predominantly Moslem, has a large pagan population open to the gospel. From mission stations located in strategic centers, surrounding villages are being evangelized. In 1955 the Ralph Cobbs opened Northern Nigeria Bible Institute in Rahama. Classes are conducted in Hausa and students come from many tribes.
Through the ministry of Gabriel Oykahilome, an Ishan Christian who attended the first Bible classes conducted by Mr. Phillips in Umuahia, Benin Province was opened to the Pentecostal testimony. Gabriel established more than 20 churches.

The first major response in Ibadan, the western capital, came during meetings held by Evangelist Lorne Fox in 1959. Western Nigeria Bible Institute was opened in 1957 to provide workers for Benin Province.
The Assemblies of God of Nigeria now includes 600 churches. The 450 ordained or licensed pastors and evangelists minister to a constituency estimated at 25,000 . The Bible schools are dedicated to the task of training tomorrow's leaders.

In 1961 the gavel of the presiding officer passed from missionary to African when Matthew Ezeigbo was elected superintendent.
A major phase in communicating the gospel in Nigeria has been the effective employment of Christian litera-
ture. The printshop in Aba produces millions of pieces of literature each year in various African languages. Rex Jackson is chairman of the Nigerian Literature Management Committee.
When the Sunday school program was first presented to the Nigerian Christians they quickly recognized its value and began organizing schools. The attendance now exceeds 25,000 . Rex Jackson is Sunday school director for all of West Africa.
Secular education was emphasized in the early days of our work because there were few government schools. Each mission was expected to provide education for its own constituency. Today our 22 day schools have 4,500 children enrolled. The Nigerian teachers (135 in all) are supported by the government. May Garner is director of the day school program.

Mr . and Mrs. Bernard Bresson were recently appointed to direct Evangel High School in Umuahia. This is the first high school in Nigeria under Assemblies of God supervision.

Our lady missionaries in Nigeria provide training classes for women. By a wide variety of courses women are trained to be better Christian wives and mothers, and also witnesses for Christ.

With cheap transistor radios available to almost everyone, radio has become a powerful medium of communication in Nigeria. Since December, 1960, Revivaltime has been released from the Ibadan station. In addition to this coverage a new program is planned which will feature Nigerian speakers and musicians. This program, originating in Enugu, will reach all Nigeria and neighboring countries as well.

Twenty-five years have passed since our first missionaries went to Nigeria. Forty-four missionaries currently are under appointment to this land. What has been accomplished represents the consecrated labor of many missionaries and national workers who have been colaborers together with God. It is not possible in this short review to mention by name all the missionaries who served in the past or those now associated with our work in Nigeria. The tremendous growth has been possible because of the solid foundation laid by early missionaries and African leaders.-Christine Carmichael

Sin created a dreadful distance between heaven and earth. Only the interposition of Christ could bridge that awful chasm. The penetration of the Son of God from heaven's throne down through this vast abyss to Bethlehem and Calvary was very deep. It was a long staircase from the celestial to the terrestrial. How grateful we are that Jesus was willing to take this fearful descent and come down to earth to rescue a fallen humanity. Praise God for the depth of Christ's love.

Divine love is as deep as human degradation. And sin can be awfully deep; it is entrenched in the lives of multitudes. Evil lies firmly embedded in the warp and woof of unconverted mankind. Sin digs subterranean passages in human nature and disintegrates precious men and women created in the image of God. Its roots are absolutely ineradicable by human effort. But here is good news: Christ's love reaches deep and also buries deep. The Old Testament prophet writes, "And thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea" (Micah $7: 19$ ). Remember, Christ dearly loves those who are on the lowest rung of the human ladder.

## Height

Height is a word of excellence-we do not confine this word to physical altitude. It measures degrees on a scale of values. Christ's love is higher than all the varieties of human love. Its superiority is unquestionable. Speaking of His own matchless love Jesus said, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John $15: 13$ ). Isaiah has a relevant quotation by the Lord for us, "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways [including His way of love] higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isaiah $55: 9$ ). But although divine love is towering and lofty, thank God it is available to sin-bound men and women.

Christ's love is high in its purpose. It promises the highest quality of life possible on this earth. Paul speaks of the elevation of saved people in these words: "And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:6). The acquisition of holiness, a life of selfless service, and the building of Christian character are among the high purposes of divine love for God's children.
Finally, height reminds us of the potential-or ulti-mate-of divine love. It is the loving plan of Christ that all of His followers shall dwell eternally in that high place called heaven. Jesus said, "In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:2, 3).

Friend, have you experienced this wonderful love of Jesus? Do you know what it is to have "the love of God shed abroad in your heart by the Holy Ghost"? If you will confess your sins, and put your faith in the finished work of Christ on the cross, you can know the wonderful love of Jesus in your life.

## Three Missionaries Describe

## THE 'NEW GHANA' FOR WOMEN

The american woman would be reluctant to exchange positions with her West African neighbor. Whoever framed the adage ". . . woman's work is never done" described exactly the situation of Ghana's women. To hold the heavy calloused hands of African women is an unforgettable experience. Hoe and axe have toughened the skin into leather.

By the age of six the average girl is following her mother to the well for water, to the bush for wood, to the farm to hoe. Before then she has swept the compound, fanned the fire, and carried a younger child on her back. Adult African women cannot remember when they were without responsibility and burden. At a tender age they become companions of sorrow and death.

But there is a "New Ghana!" Twentieth-century progress has opened doors to the African women who are gladly stepping into new vocations. Education on a primary level is now compulsory. In all subjects girls are equaling the boys. Hospitals, schools and businesses have women staff members.

With their new economic freedom has come a new place for women in the church. What would have seemed impossible a decade ago is becoming commonplace in the northern Ghana Assemblies of God. Women-God's good, clean, dedicated women-are leading services, visiting homes, praying for the sick, reading, writing, sewing and teaching!


As this article is going to press, word comes from Ghana that WMC's there have been organized on a national basis with Mrs. Edwin Ziemann as national president. Her husband has been elected to serve another year as superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Ghana.

These new practices have not come easily. Hours of tedious repetition have preceded the simplest steps. Only with much personal encouragement from the lady missionaries has the women's work progressed, quickly at first, then steadily.

The results are felt in the churches. Pastors are saying, "The church has become alive ... the women are helping to lift the spiritual load... they are doing with their hands a work of which we all are proud."

WMC goals for Ghana-every woman a praying woman, every woman a working woman, every woman a learning woman-are emphasized in each meeting.

Again WMC has proved itself to be a tender but strong helpmeet of the church.

## GHANA'S FIRST RETREAT

It was a high day for women of northern Ghana when they congregated in the chapel of the Bible school for their first WMC retreat. Long had missionaries and national women looked forward to a meeting that would call all the women together as a step toward organizing WMC groups in every church.

Ladies in crisp, colorful new dresses showed no signs of their tiresome trips in dusty, rough-riding lorries or the Speed-the-Light pickup truck. White dusts of powder on their shiny faces showed evidence of the scrubbing they had had in preparation for the service. Babies bobbing up and down on the mothers' backs had new dresses too, many of them from a WMC barrel.

As Mrs. McCorkle, hostess-director, stood under the big welcome sign and pointed out the WMC motto, "We Minister as unto Christ," songs of praise and testimonies in many dialects blended in one spirit. Reflecting upon the incident Mrs. McCorkle said, "We were one in Him."

Registration on the following morning was exciting. WMC open-heart badges with blue and yellow ribbons were signed and pinned on the back of the blouse out of reach of baby hands.

Each registrant received a "carrying bag" (supplied by WMC's in America) of retreat materials which served as her registration envelope.
The retreat instructors (Aneice McCorkle, Pauline Smith, Adeline Wichman, and Ruby Johnson) packed every session with lectures on WMC organization, health talks, challenges for WMC soul winning, and instructions in practical handwork.


[^1]Sewing was a great thrill to the women. For all time, only Ghana men have been the tailors, so needles were slippery in the women's coarsened hands. Thread was hard to see and handle. Sometimes a needle broke or the stiches went the wrong direction, but time and patience produced a nice article to display in the home church where every delegate would be pressing her friends for local WMC organization.

The results of the retreat are far-reaching. WMC meetings are being held regularly. Groups are traveling to nearby villages to testify. Practical work in the church is being sponsored by women, and, best of all, the women are setting aside days of fasting and prayer as they wait upon God for power for service. Ghana WMC's are already looking forward to the next retreat.

## 'All Wool and a Yard Wide'

My grandmother came from sweden, where, as a young girl, she learned to spin wool on an old-fashioned spinning wheel and to weave cloth on a hand loom. How well I remember her quality mindedness concerning fabrics! I can see her now as she would carefully finger the material in a new suit and pass judgment on its warp and woof. Her respect for the garment was based on the quality of the cloth.

Frequently the compliment "all wool and a yard wide" is used to describe a person's fine character. A moral, upright person may be described in this manner, even though he is not a Christian; but as flawless as the fabric of that natural man's character might be, it cannot meet the standard of a righteous God.

Neither is conversion a synonym for character. Passing from death unto life at conversion is a miraculous transformation but it does not suddenly make one a finished product. Conversion is when the Holy Spirit begins weaving that fabric of Christian character that will be beautiful, strong, enduring, useful for God-"all wool" —unfeigned, unadulterated, sincere-described in 1 Peter $3: 4$ as the "hidden personality of the heart" (Montgomery's translation) ; "a yard wide"-". . . the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:13).

We have come to a time when so much emphasis is placed on developing a pleasing personality that we stand
in grave danger of becoming more personality conscious than Christ-conscious. Personality development is important to a degree, but to substitute it for Christlikeness is to be clothed with filthy rags.

We must cooperate with the Holy Spirit in the weaving process by eliminating those personality habits that might offend and hinder our Christian testimony. It may hurt to pull out those stray threads that got woven in, but when the Holy Spirit points out a misweave it will pay us to correct it.

Influence is our strongest asset as witnesses for Christ. We influence people by what we are, not by what we superficially assume to be. There is an amazing product on the market for renewing old upholstery. "Just spray it on, and the old faded chair looks like new." That might do for furniture, but character cannot be sprayed on. It is meticulously woven through and through by reaction to the experiences of life, by treatment of the Word of God, and by response to the Holy Spirit.

The world has changed since my grandmother wove cloth for her family. Every generation witnesses startling transformations of methods and ways. But God's standard for genuineness of Christian character remains the same. "... we are His handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for good deeds, which God predestined us to make our daily way of life" (Ephesians 2:10-Montgomery).

Your Questions

Answered by Ernest S. Williams

Does "lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth" mean that we should not save anything? (Matthew 6:19).

I will not try to explain away any direct commandment of the Scriptures, but I notice there were persons possessing wealth in the early Christian Church (1 Timothy $6: 17$ ). Such were charged to be humble, not to trust in uncertain riches, but to do good and be willing to distribute from their wealth where they saw there was need of help.

If a pastor resigns, but continues to reside in the city where he has pastored, should he attend the church he formerly served? Should he seek to influence the course of the new pastor?

If a former pastor resides in the city, I see no reason why he should not attend the church, using his influence for good in the church. He ought not to try to dictate the policy of the church, nor try to supervise its activities, but conduct himself as a member of the congregation. Let him encourage the new pastor. He ought not to form a habit of visiting in the homes of his former parishioners if this would divert any of their loyalty or support to him. Let him do all he can to advance the church, doing nothing that would create a problem for either the pastor or the people.
In view of the fact that the Bible says women should keep silent in the churches and are not suffered to teach, is it right for women to preach? (1 Corinthians 14:34, 35; 1 Timothy 2:11-14.)

Women prophets were not uncommon in Old Testament times. Miriam, sister of Moses, was a prophetess (Exodus $15: 20$ ). Deborah was both a prophetess and a judge (Judges $4: 4$ ). Hulda, to whom Hilkiah the priest went for advice, was a prophetess (2 Kings $22: 14-20$ ).

In the New Testament, Anna was a prophetess (Luke $2: 36)$ and Philip had four daughters who prophesied (Acts $21: 8,9$ ).

From 1 Corinthians $14: 35$ we learn that the women who were to keep silent in the churches were not teachers, but women seeking information. Men sat on one side of the room, the women on the other. Evidently some were disturbing the meetings by asking their husbands questions. "If they will learn anything, let them ask their husbands at home."

Women are not to usurp authority, making themselves the head either in the church or in the home; neither are they to formulate new doctrines (1 Timothy $2: 11$ 14). But why should they not expound the accepted doctrines under the guidance and blessing of the Holy Spirit? If women are to have no public place, we must then dismiss all women who teach in the Sunday schools. How few teachers would be left!

Our purpose in visiting this city was to begin a church. A West Coast city situated on the Uruguay River, Carmelo presents a big challenge. There is practically no Protestant church work.
The weather seemed to do its best to hinder us. It should have been warm. Instead it was cold and it rained for days. After some difficulties we have been able to rent a hall where we can have services on rainy days. A young pastor and his wife are ready to take this work when we leave shortly. They are planning to buy a lot and build a simple church.

## Progress in Palimé

Since arriving in Palimé-a mountain valley in the Togo forest -we have had daily services at first in our home. It was a happy occasion when we were able to dedicate the Revival Center, a former coffee-cocoa warehouse located on a main street of the city. The first service was well attended. A number of tribal chiefs and city officials were present. Two Moslem leaders came, but did not stay. They were under the impression they had been invited to a feast instead of a religious service!

This area was among the first reached by Protestant missionaries, in fact as far back as 1847. From talking with some of the old men in the community we are led to believe that many were truly converted in those early years. It is with regret that we must add the fact that most nominal church members now follow the fetishes and native customs. One hears funeral drums in the homes of socalled Christians. We have been told many times that it will be impossible to build a congregation of believers who separate themselves from heathen customs and strong drink. But we believe God -and so the impossible becomes possible.
So far eleven men have sought the Lord. Twenty-four children are enrolled in Sunday school. Some of the converts are showing concrete evidence of changed lives. This morning a young man came to our home under deep conviction. He had been listening to the

rising in the Blanding area and the Ute Indian is still inclined to distrust the white man.

## Bylas, Arizona

Indians about nine miles away have driven to his services. Since Melvin can speak Apache he makes it easier for the people to understand the gospel. Some new people are now coming
to the Bylas church as a result of these services.
Another note of victory from Bylas is the news that Happy Moses, one of those who helped the Wycliffe Translators in their work, has recently seen her son and his wife give their hearts to the Lord. Sister Moses is the adult teacher in the Bylas Assembly.

## TEEN CHALLENGE MINISTRY

## New York

Kirby Trew from Miami, Fla., and his helpers have opened another "gang" church. They have painted and cleaned up the little three-room chapel.

Several Indian missions have been the happy recipients of new Speed-the-Light vehicles for their work. The missionaries at Tuba City, Ariz., write that they are now bringing 63 boys and girls to the church from the boarding school for services with their

STL bus. Five souls have been led to the Lord here recently.

The Don Johnsons, missionaries at Winslow, Ariz., use the 1961 Ford Econoline provided by STL in many ways in their work. The greatest part it plays is transporting Indians to church and back to their homes-some 60 miles out on the Navajo reservation.
The STL vehicle is also used in times of emergency-to transport Indians to the hospital; to
take the dead for burial ; to take Christians to Indian fellowship meetings and camp meetings, etc. The Wesley Ericksons, formerly at Nixon, Nev., now pastors at Yerington, have received a bus for their work. Another STL bus is presently in use at Wadsworth, Nev.

STL funds made it possible for the Jerry Holders, missionaries at Grants, N. Mex., to place a new motor in their STL bus.

In spite of an unusually cold winter, the attendance averaged 70 in December and 90 in January, which broke all records for eight years! in their work at Winslow, Ariz. igh in the colorado rocky Mountains is a little mining town that was fabulously wealthy in the evening of the last century. The city was labeled Leadville, though its hills were rich with both silver and gold. Legends say it was named Leadville because of all the gunfights that took place there.
Wealthy silver kings in the area liked entertainment. As a new exciting endeavor they built a huge palace entirely of ice.
Over 5,000 tons of ice was used to construct the palace. It covered five acres. The glamorous structure contained towers ninety feet high made in octagons and circles. An eighteenfoot ice statue of a lady was placed at the entrance and in her hand she held a scroll with the figures $\$ 200$,000,000 written on it in raised gold. Other statues were spread through the rooms.
Glistening in the frigid mountain sunshine, the mammoth ice cubes reflected rainbow colors making the ice palace appear as an enchanted castle in a child's fairyland.
Inside were gambling rooms, curling alleys, a skating rink, dance halls, a dining room and concessions.
It opened on New Year's Day 1896.
The people of Leadville played and frolicked at the ice palace. But within ten weeks, the spring thaw came and the ice began to melt. Soon it was completely dissolved. From a $\$ 100$,000 investment all that remained was a big mud puddle!

Of course, the builders knew this would happen. But many people are making a foolish investment of their lives without realizing it.


One of Hollywood's famous singers did just that. Earlier in life he had a fine Christian home, attended church, and sang for the Lord. One day a talent scout discovered him and offered him a career in worldly entertainment. He accepted. Thoughts of church and God were thrown to the wind and he indulged in making himself a success.

But the day will come when he must give an account of his life. Unless he turns to God, nothing in his life will remain toward a future in eternity but a big mud puddle.

A young Bible school student also made a poor investment. He attended an Assemblies of God Bible college one year. When he went home for summer vacation there were no eligible Christian girls to date. He began dating an unsaved young lady whose father was a wealthy uranium miner and later he married her. The young man now is very rich, but never attends church. When God cuts the string that holds his life, he will find the investment he made with his life melting suddenly in the thaws of eternity.

There are people all over the world who have invested their lives in something that will turn out valueless. A person who shuns God for career, money and sometimes even his own
loved ones, will find that all these can be wiped out any time God wishes to bring about a "thaw."
"For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:7).
There are persons, however, who do make wise choices in the investment of their lives. Betty Jean, the late mother of Kenneth R. Schmidt, pastor of First Assembly, Grand Junction, Colorado, was a Hollywood actress when God spoke to her heart. She accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as her personal Saviour. She discovered happiness such as few actresses find-the peace that eludes so many who finally commit suicide-and she began preaching the gospel.

Mrs. Schmidt tore down her flimsy "ice palace" and began building on a firm foundation, the solid rock-the Lord Jesus Christ. She laid up treasure in heaven where rust and moth do not corrupt, neither do thieves break through and steal (Matthew 6: 19).

She died while preaching behind the pulpit-her life was a definite investment in a future in heaven.

Yes, $\$ 100,000$ is a staggering figure for less than ten weeks of business in the Leadville Ice Palace. But so is a soul a staggering investment for a brief period of sinful pleasure.
