meetings for children and young people. As a result there are very few young people in the meetings. (Some have said at least 20 per cent of the congregations are made up of young people. I saw practically no young people in the Moscow church. Most of the worshipers were people past middle age.)

By government regulation all evangelical believers must worship in but one church in each city. The one in Moscow is called The Baptist Evangelical Church. It is not Baptist exclusively but is made up of Baptists, Pentecostals, Mennonites and others of evangelical be-

# Pentecost in Moscow 

Oklahoma Pastor Describes Visit to Russian Church on Pentecost Sunday

I WENT TO CHURCH IN MOSCOW ON PENTECOST SUNday and it was one of the most moving experiences of my life.

When I tell my friends about it, the reactions are sharp and varied. Some consider it incredible that churches can exist in a land that is officially atheistic. Others are plainly bewildered. Many doubt that in a land where Communism prevails the Spirit of God can move upon the people. Others excitedly interpret church-going throngs and fervent worship as signs of a sweeping revival in the U.S.S.R.

None of these ingrained attitudes is entirely correct. Nor are the answers that simple.

Russia is an enigma, even to those who have spent years in that country. The religious situation is not easily grasped. It is a fact that churches are jammed with worshipers. Even standing room is at a premium at any of the six services of the week in Moscow. On the other hand, the church congregations are but a speck in a great city of five million souls. The Russian capital has only one evangelical church!

Churches in Russia come under government regulations which we would term severe. Church buildings are owned by the government and rented to the congregations. Bibles are scarce. No promiscuous distribution of literature is permitted. All church advertising is prohibited. No prayer meetings or other religious gatherings are allowed outside of the church building. A representative of the Communist Party is present at every service to make sure nothing is said against the government.

In such a situation, it is astounding that there are so many conversions and baptisms.

I saw no flags on the platform. There were no prayers for public officials and no preaching on Bible prophecy. The churches are expressly forbidden to have special
liefs. That church has 4,500 members and at each service from 2,200 to 3,000 pack a building that ordinarily would not seat more than 1,200 . The church at Leningrad has 2,800 members. There are large churches also in Minsk and other cities. There is an association of such churches known as "The Union of Evangelical Churches -Baptist." In the vast expanse of the 15 republics of the Soviet Union this group is reputed to have over 5,000 churches.

There are 10 ministers on the staff of the Noscow church. The Senior Pastor devotes his full time to the church and also serves as supervisor over the union of such churches in the nation. Others on the staff serve parttime because they must devote some of their time to what the govermment calls more productive work.

Approximately seven years ago a new era dawned in the Soviet Union. Many restrictions were eased. Tourists


[^0]were permitted to visit Russia, on a limited basis, and religious restrictions were also slackened. There is not religious freedom as we know and experience it, but there is a toleration for those churches that fit into the prescribed limits of the ruling regime.

To be in the balcony of the Moscow church on Pentecost Sunday 1964 was for me a delightful privilege. I have never seen such a solid mass of people in any church. They were wedged together, sitting or standing quietly and in rapt attention. There was no shifting or signs of restlessness, although the service lasted for two hours. At times one who was seated would give up his seat to another standing but with the least possible disturbance. Just to study the intent looks on the faces was most fascinating.

The four beautiful renditions by the choir and the sermon from the pastor dealt with the Holy Spirit, in keeping with the day. As the meeting came to a close we who were visitors were asked to bring greetings to Christian believers in America and in the other countries of the world. The capstone came when the congregation stood to sing, particularly for us. With every eye turned our way they sang, "God Be with You Till We Meet Again." On the last stanza they drew out their handlkerchiefs and waved them. That sea of white, the upturned faces, the sincere expressions of this people-to-people gesture, was a sight I never shall forget. I don't weep easily but the dam broke then and the tears just rolled. The waving congregation, the grasping upward and outward to shake hands, and the warm smiles made Moscow a different city and Russia a different nation than I had dreamed them to be.

An American in Moscow has mingled feelings. He represents one nation and is visiting another. He is aware of contrasting ideologies, competing systems, clashing temperaments, and mentalities that do not understand each other. That is true in Red Square, in the Kremlin, at the tomb of Lenin, at the University of Moscow, at the Exhibition, or in the Gum Department Store. That is Moscow to the average tourist.

To me, Moscow shall always be hundreds of worshipers, smiling, waving, singing and sending greetings by me to all of yout.

## RELIGIOUS ENTHUSIAM HIGH AMONG SOME RUSSIANS

Reporting on his recent visit to moscow, John Allen Moore said: "Youth are fairly well absent from any of the numerous Baptist services, but young adults are not." Mr. Moore is director of the European Baptist Press Service in Zurich, Switzerland.

He said religious enthusiasm was very high at the church. He sat through each of three two-hour Sunday services.

In addition to the services held Sunday morning, afternoon, and night, there are two midweek meetings, he said; but the church is limited by Soviet decree from conducting Sunday school or instructing through setting up other church groups. Worship services are permitted and nothing else.

Bibles are very scarce. No Bibles have been printed in the U.S.S.R. for many years. The scarcity of hymn-
books requires the minister to read hymns aloud before they are sung.

Three teen-age girls were present. They smilingly admitted they were atheists and had come to the church out of sheer curiosity.

But not all teen-agers in Russia are atheists. Evangelical Press tells of a 16-year-old girl who recently wrote a "Miss Lonelyheart" letter to the Communist youth newspaper in Moscow-but didn't ask for advice on her love life. She wanted to know what to do with her membership card in the Young Communist League now that she has become a Baptist.

She said she no longer considers herself a member of the Komsomol (Young Communist League). "I have a Komsomol card," she wrote, "but my soul belongs to God."

In characteristic fashion Komsomolskaya Pravda replied: "The question of where she belongs is not yet decided, and we are sure life itself will persuade her that religious dogmas are groundless."

In another issue, the daily complained that some Pentecostal leaders in Russia were taking over "good old atheist" songs and putting religious lyrics to the tunes to attract young people at revival meetings. (If the truth were known, the songs may have been religious in the beginning!)
"The God Almighty bestowed no musical talent on members of the Pentecostal sect," the paper said, "and that's why they have to glorify their God with the tunes borrowed from the atheists."

## GOD WORKS IN STRANGE WAYS

There lives, in an eastern u.s. city, a catholic family in comfortable circumstances. All was going well until the mother and the daughter became afflicted.

The mother acquired the habit of saying to her friends and neighbors, when she met them, "Pray for us." One of her neighbors, at least, took her request seriously. This neighbor was a Pentecostal Christian and she prayed for these people in her own home. Then she went to call on her afflicted neighbors. She explained to them what the Bible teaches about salvation and healing. She showed them Mark 16:18-"They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." Then she placed her hands on both of them, and prayed for them.

In a very short time both mother and daughter showed such vast improvement that they were all delighted. This Catholic mother went to church with her Pentecostal friend. She said she wanted to learn to pray the way she does.

The mother is now thoroughly saved and is filled with the Holy Spirit. She loves the Lord and she loves the Bible-but she never was taught to read. She is learning, and is able to understand some of the words, but when she finds a Scripture passage too difficult for her she takes her Bible to her husband or daughter and they obligingly read it to her. Then she says, "What does that mean ?" and they patiently explain the passage to her.

Thus a Catholic husband and a Catholic daughter are teaching the King James Version of the Bible to this mother, who is a Pentecostal believer. God works in such strange ways. He is using this dear woman's ignorance for His glory. -by Fannie Ohanesian

## Patiently Enduring

According to the newspaper account, he was 80 years old. A truck hit him and he died.

His widow, who had lived with him for 60 years, said he had never been sick in bed a day in his life. However, an autopsy occasioned by the circumstances of his death revealed some facts about the old gentleman's physical history that even his wife was surprised to learn.

His lungs were scarred with healed tuberculosis lesions. His stomach showed signs of long-forgotten ulcers. His arteries were hardened. His kidneys showed damage. Evidently he had been sick many times but kept it secret.

He had suffered from almost every disease in the book but never complained! His wife and friends said that whenever he showed any sign of illness he would always shrug it off with the cheerful philosophy, "It will be better tomorrow."

Which reminds us that a person can endure a surprising amount of trouble if he tries. The newspaper did not say whether or not the old gentleman believed in God. If he had faith like Moses he had a sound reason for being optimistic. Moses chose to suffer affliction with the people of God, rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season, because he looked down the road to eternity. The hope of a better tomorrow enabled him to endure the worst today.

The Bible says that Moses "endured, as seeing Him who is invisible" (Hebrews $11: 27$ ). That word "endured" means he "suffered patiently." And he surely had much to suffer. He suffered the wrath of Pharaoh. Then he suffered the hardships involved in traversing a wilderness. But what caused him the most suffering, probably, was the hardness of the people's hearts. What leader was ever criticized and misunderstood more than Moses? But he "suffered patiently," overcoming one test after another by his faith in God.

At last this battle-scarred veteran died "in the faith," being old and full of years; and his name is inscribed forever in God's hall of fame. What an example he set for all who followed him!

We live in an age of ease. Not many today are willing to "endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." We want a soft life. We grumble at the slightest inconvenience. We run to the pastor at the least suggestion of unfriendliness. We are puny pantywaists compared to the spiritual stalwarts in Paul's day who "endured a great fight of afflictions" for their faith. They were ridiculed, robbed, and persecuted but they stood their ground. Paul put them in a class with Enoch, Noah, Abraham, and others "who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens."

How do we compare with our forefathers in the faith, and with our Master who "endured the cross" in order that the world might be saved? May God give us the patience to endure when the road gets rough. As the old gentleman used to say, "It will be better tomorrow." Eternal glory lies ahead. Let's keep our eyes upon the Saviour and remember that the crown of life is reserved for those who never stop fighting until the victory's won. "He that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved" (Matthew 24:13).

# ELECTION PROPAGANDA

Election year brings with it the constant exposure to campaign issues and the personal responsibility of their evaluation. But there is another election, a daily exposure to propaganda, going on all the time in the lives of men and women.

According to the Bible there are two great forces at work in the world. In 1 John $4: 6$ they are described as the Spirit of Truth and the spirit of error. Elsewhere John informs us that the Spirit of Truth has been sent to the world but the world cannot receive Him. You cannot make a compound of light and darkness.

Satan is working day and night in an attempt to influence this daily casting of votes toward his kingdom. He has many front offices, but the back room machinery remains the same. Here are four methods he uses:

## INFILTRATION

Satan, like subtle political forces of our day, will avoid open conflict. By means of infiltration Satan accomplishes his objective but circumvents open conflict. The reason is obvious. While riveting attention on something good, Satan creeps in through an unattended area of weakness. Judas, though occupied as a disciple of the Lord, attentive to Christ's teachings and seeing His miracles, allowed Satan to infiltrate his life on the issue of money. Demas, though occupied with Paul in a missionary endeavor, allowed Satan to infiltrate his life on the issue of love for the world.

In an open conflict, Satan's chance to gain entrance to these lives would have been less effective. But by pressure on their weak points he gained his objective.

## CONFUSING ISSUES

For the sake of expediency men will pass over the task of comparing issues on Christian principles and making a decision. Knowing this, Satan turns out tons of propaganda by way of radio and the printed page. His methods have been so effective that no longer is an issue right or wrong on the basis of God's Word, but consideration is also given to the ideas or interpretations of men. Adam and Eve allowed themselves to become confused over the issue of eating fruit. God said, "Thou shalt not," but Satan said, in effect, "God knows you will know good and evil." Though Satan told the truth, he confused the issue. This was not a question of what the fruit would or would not do, but a question
of obeying the command of God. The underlying reason why man has such a difficult time deciding what is right and wrong is his failure to follow the principles of God. He would rather lean to his own understanding.

## MOB PSYCHOLOGY

Every individual has the inborn desire for recognition. Some satisfy this desire by "tooting their horn," others through outward adornment, or by working hard for a cause. If the recognition desire is not satisfied through one of these, one more avenue remains-becoming part of a demonstrating mob. Mob leaders know this trait and exploit it. But how often the demonstrator himself does not understand his reasons for association. In the "lynch trial" of Christ, the subtle method of mob psychology was at work and three definite steps are visible.

The first step was the demonstration for the release of a prisoner as Pilate used to do (Mark $15: 8$ ). Step two was the demonstration for the release of the mob's choice. The chief priests "moved" the people to ask for Barabbas (Mark 15:11). Having gained one objective the leaders swayed the people to gain the second.

The final step was the demonstration for carrying out the mob's sentence. The prisoner who wasn't released must be punished, and although the mob made the decision for Pilate, this was the main objective of the priests all along. So frenzied is this method of securing recognition that people do and say things they would not do under other conditions. This mob took an oath upon themselves. If Pilate wouldn't take the responsibility for Christ's sentence, they would. "His blood be on us and our children," they cried. Common sense says, "If in doubt, don't." But these people were in no state of mind to employ common sense. The reluctance of Pilate should have caused them to take a careful view of what they were doing.

## FEAR

There is a fear against standing alone for anything, even if it is right. Satan knows this and uses fear as an effective influence in men's decisions. To help in his campaign, he has coined words and phrases such as squares, old fogies, goody-goodies, etc., which he applies to anyone who follows right principles. Those who fear such names offer no fight. A vote is cast for Satan and he wins another election. When we stand for the principles of Christ, we are standing for Christ. Mark

# Your Questions 

Answered by Ernest S. Williams

What is the meaning of "Let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me"? (Matthew 16:24)
To take up our cross means that we live unselfishly, bear burdens patiently, and show the spirit of Christ in our relationships with others. Sometimes it is hard to do these things, and this is where the cross comes. If we can suffer in the spirit of Jesus, or serve anywhere helpfully for Jesus' sake, we are then taking up our cross in a right spirit. If we serve grudgingly instead of cheerfully as a Christian should, we suffer spiritual loss, which if continued, could result in loss of the soul.
I have heard it said that the witch of Endor did not actually bring up Samuel (1 Samuel 28). Was Samuel really brought up, or was it a spiritualistic hoax?

Some believe what the witch brought up was a demon, pretending to be Samuel. Others believe that God intervened and it was actually Samuel. If it was a hoax, why should the witch have become terrified when she "saw Samuel"? (v, 12) How was it revealed to her that it was King Saul who had come to her, who had decreed that all witches should be put to death? And could a demon spirit have foretold that the next day Israel would be defeated and Saul and his sons slain?

If it was Samuel, then this is another evidence of conscious life after death. Those who believe the soul dies with the body, to await the resurrection, naturally would refuse to believe it was actually Samuel.
Were the Laodiceans saved, or were they only professors of salvation? (Revelation 3:14-20)

The Laodicean church was one of those spoken of as golden candlesticks, among which Jesus walked (Revelation 1:13). He rebuked them for their lukewarmness but this was not a sign that He did not love them, for He said, "As many as I love I rebuke and chasten." Its members were exhorted to overcome, with the promise, "To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne." But the church as a whole; while greatly blessed materially and probably socially, was woefully lacking spiritually.

Some believe the church was in such a state of spiritual declension that Jesus, who had been pictured as "in the midst of the seven candlesticks," was now on the outside, pleading for individuals to open their hearts and let Him in. "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me" (Revelation 3:20).

The condition of this church is a great warning to us not to court material prosperity and worldly approval at the expense of self-sacrifice and the way of the Cross. "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."

[^1]8:38 says, "Whosoever therefore shall be ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation ; of him also shall the Son of man be ashamed, when he cometh in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

Being aware of the "wiles of the devil," let us also be aware of the provisions of God.

Against evil infiltration we have a defence through God. "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand" (Ephesians 6:11-13).

Against the deceitful confusion of issues we have the messenger of clarity. "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come" (John 16:13).

Against seeking recognition of people by mob psychology, or bragging, or self adornment, we have the recognition of God. "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly" (Matthew $6: 6$ ).

Against the fear of standing alone, we have the companionship of God. "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" (Matthew $28: 20$ ).

The facts have been given. Your life is at stake depending on your vote. You are voting in the biggest of all elections. Someone said: "There is an election going on all the time. The Lord votes for you; the devil votes against you; but you cast the deciding vote."

## S. S. SCULL LAID TO REST

-Know ye not that there is a prince, and a great man fallen this day in Israel?" (2 Samuel 3:38)

It was an honor to lay to rest samuel sherred Scull, one of the Lord's princes. Brother Scull died at the age of 101 years, one month, and 12 days. He said he lived in the most interesting period of world history. He lived to see many great changes-from the days of horses and sailboats to the landing of a rocket on the moon. But more important to him was the privilege of living in the days of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. He believed this was part of God's last great move before the coming of Christ.

Brother Scull was born in a log cabin in Inzerne County, Pennsylvania, on July 16, 1863. First licensed to preach in Iowa and later ordained as a Methodist elder, he was assigned his first pastorate at Mapleton, Iowa, in 1894. Afflicted with tuberculosis, he moved to Arizona in 1903 but was physically unable to preach for some years after that. In 1907 he grasped the truth of Divine Healing. He prayed earnestly and the Lord healed him.

While operating a gospel mission in Phoenix Brother Scull heard about the outpouring of the Spirit in Los Angeles, and went to see for himself. What he saw moved him so deeply that he began conducting Pentecostal meetings in Phoenix in 1907 although he himself did not receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit until 1908. By identifying himself with the Pentecostal movement he lost his membership in the Methodist church.

Sometimes called "the father of Pentecost in Arizona," he continued for the rest of his life to preach the full gospel. After affiliating with the Assemblies of God in 1922 he evangelized and engaged in Bible-teaching ministry in the West, mostly in California and Arizona. Among the churches he pastored were those in Pasadena and North Hollywood, Calif., and Phoenix, Ariz.

At the age of 90 he retired from active ministry but occasionally he preached and wrote articles for The Pentecostal Evangel in his 90's. He even preached several times after his 100th birthday.

He passed away Aug. 28, 1964, in a nursing home near Mesa, Ariz. James D. Bell and L. V. Hertweck were assisting ministers at the funeral which was held in the First Church of the Assemblies of God in Mesa. Brother and Sister Delbert Gribling sang, and Vi Rawlings played the organ. The pallbearers were Assemblies of God ministers.

Married three times, two wives having preceded him in death, Brother Scull is survived by his wife Florence (Carhart) Scull, age 89; two sons, Reese E. Scull, a minister in Rialto, Calif., and Samuel C. Scull of Los Angeles; two daughters, Mrs. O. E. Brained of Northampton, Mass., and Mrs. L. Dow Wright, wife of a minister in Oakridge, Oreg.; eight grandchildren; 23 great-grandchildren; and a number of great-great-grandchildren.

Brother Scull was an honorary member of the general presbytery of the Assemblies of God. He left a great influence for right wherever he lived and ministered. He was such an inspiration at the last; one almost wished to go with him when he talked about going to heaven.

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A CASUAL COMPARISON of an average free community with a penitentiary, or "iron city," would reveal significant similarities. In each exist necessities essential for survival: food, clothing, and shelter. Some of the population are transients. Some are settled residents. They are from north, south, east, and west. They represent practically every state, the majority of professions, and about every vocation. Yes, you might almost assume that the little iron city is the same as any free community. But it is not!

Prisoners are not different because of any apparent lack of emotion. They are usually aware of every pang. They are not unlike the paralytic boy who dreams of baseball and football, or the destitute person who wistfully gazes through the store window. This is their emotion. Their tears fall within the heart.

Neither are prisoners different because they have a number. Is not all of life a total of digits entered in an unseen ledger which will be accurately tallied some day? The prisoner is different because he cannot stand alone on the crest of the hill with his face to the breeze. The breeze must glance off a stone wall before it brushes his cheek. The moon and stars must look upon him

through iron bars. Yes, in the iron city there is an abundance of steel and concrete. And an abundance of time.

Time is endless and everywhere. They know it so well. Not as youth and laughter know it, utilize it, and live it-but as a speck of dust on a crumpled page-as tears and age know it. The prisoner's calendar refuses to beckon the seasons. Its consort, the timeless clock, clings eternally to every ticking moment.

Bitterness and resentment are brought into sharp focus by failure in the prisoner's life. Add to this the pangs of separation, the lingering loneliness when sleep does not come. Here there is no present. Only a taunting yesterday and an uncertain tomorrow. Know these, and you will know the inmate's innermost feelings. Into this fertile field, this unavoidable vacuum, the seed of the Word of God is often readily accepted.

Mankind must never underestimate the recreative powers of the Holy Spirit. God has promised that His Word shall not return unto Him void, empty, fruitless. Considering these factors, the Prison Division of the Assemblies of God has directed its efforts for the salvation of the imprisoned. Several thousand Bible correspondence courses especially designed for inmates are sent monthly to those serving time. These courses help the inmate find himself in relation to God and his fellowman, thereby acquiring an inward peace, a sense of direction, and true freedom. The Prison Division has received in turn hundreds of testimonials of regenerated lives through the prisoners' study and acceptance of God's Word.

This new-found completeness has dispelled the anxious hours of uncertainty and loneliness, changing a living death into a vibrant life. Time is now being invested in growth of spirit and mind.
"Stone walls do not a prison make, nor iron bars a cage." This is true for the inmate of the iron city who has found freedom of soul. Freedom is not a physical quality but a spiritual inheritance.

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# 'O Death, Where Is Thy Sting?' 

(1 Corinthians $15: 56$ )


These last words, "i'll be Waiting over there to say 'Good Morning,'" were spoken by a condemned prisoner, James Cohen, just before he died in Alabama's electric chair September 4, after spending almost four years on death row.

Clifton Carney, pastor of First Assembly, Demopolis, Ala., and James Cohen had just prayed and read the Bible together for almost three hours.

The condemned man left a testimony of the goodness of the Lord. With Christ in his heart he walked calmly to the chair. It was after telling everyone good-bye that he turned and said, "Everything is all right now, Brother Carney. I'll be waiting over there to say 'Good Morning.'" With a smile of peace on his face, the prisoner met his Maker.

Pastor Carney has faithfully been counseling with the men on death row in the Kilby Prison, Montgomery, Ala., about their spiritual well-being. Mr. Cohen found the Lord as his personal Saviour last July 26. Another inmate was baptized in water September 19.

Since the Cohen death, four more men have met their scheduled date of execution. These four men also knew the Lord as their Redeemer. Two of them have diligently studied God's Word through the free Bible study courses the Prison Division of the Assemblies of God supplies to prisoners. Pastor Carney stated that he was planning to walk the last few steps with these men as they go to meet their death. Even in the face of punishment by death God's children are able to know the all-sustaining grace of the Everlasting Arms.

Eleven of the remaining 16 men on Kilby's death row are taking our correspondence courses. We are able to provide these courses because of the many faithful contributors who support this ministry.

The Prison Division is most grateful for pastors like Brother Carney who have expanded their ministry to include those inside prison walls. We also appreciate the kindness and cooperation of the Kilby Prison authorities,

Edwards Street Assembly in Alton, I11., includes jail ministry as an important part of its church program. Facts in the following article appeared recently in The Alton Telegraph.

## Regular Jail Ministry Yields Dividends

For three years a group from the edwards street Assembly of God in Alton, Ill., has faithfully visited Madison County jail to offer spiritual comfort to prisoners, assuring them that they are not forgotten men in the eyes of God and their fellows.

According to Sheriff Barney Fraundorf, the Edwards Street Assembly squad is the only group that makes regular visits to the prisoners in this jail. Their program is a simple one. After being admitted to the cell block, the squad members travel from cell to cell greeting inmates. The leader then invites the prisoners to choose favorite hymns. If there is no request, the group will launch into a gospel song such as "The Lily of the Valley," or "Washed in the Blood." Following this, sometimes a prisoner will request a particular hymn. "The Old Rugged Cross," "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," "Throw Out the Lifeline," "Amazing Grace" and "Near the Cross" are the most frequently requested songs. Often the inmates join in the singing. At times they kneel to pray with the squad.

The informal services include brief portions from the Bible such as the parables of the prodigal son or the good Samaritan. Before leaving, members of the band reassure the inmates of their constant prayers and interest.

Squad members make no attempt to proselyte for their denomination. They state: "We only want these men to turn or return to God. If they belong to a church we want them to turn toward it once again." Members of the group feel that their efforts have been amply rewarded, and Sheriff Fraundorf agrees. Their visits have done much good among the prisoners. A number of prisoners contacted have taken Bible correspondence courses supplied by the Prison Division of the Assemblies of God. Several who have been transferred to the state penitentiary at Menard, Ill., are still systematically studying God's Word.

The pastor of the Edwards Street Assembly, Richard Dortch, and the assistant pastor, Roger Johnson, often counsel with the prisoners encouraging them to enroll in the Bible correspondence courses and leading the inmates to find themselves in relationship to God and their fellowman.

## TODAY IS NATIONAL PRISON SUNDAY

Over 105,000 Bible study courses have been distributed free by the Prison Division of the Home Missions Department. Over 5,200 prisoners are presently studying our Asemblies of God courses.

# The Bíg 'Hi'-Operation Utah 

D. V. Hurst Tells Thrilling Story of Gospel Invasion of Salt Lake Valley

It was the cheery greeting and the big smile that opened doors for teen-age witnesses in Operation Utah. By the end of the week they were being invited into better than 50 per cent of the homes they approached. On the final day, by actual count, one group was welcomed into 40 of the 43 homes approached.

Almost 100 C.A.'s from the Rocky Mountain District and Oklahoma, Arizona, California, Idaho and Texas converged on Salt Lake City, Utah, August 22. They were there for a week of intensive door-to-door literature evangelism preceded by orientation and training. These young people had been challenged to expect "long hours, hard work, fatigue and sunburn." There would be "no social time and they would have to furnish their own transportation to the city and back." They would be provided "meals and a place to stay." And they would have full opportunity "to engage in front-line soul winning with many other teen-agers." They came with eager anticipation, anxious for the training and days of soul-winning action.

Operation Utah was sponsored by the C.A.'s of the Rocky Mountain District led by Darrell Madsen, District C. A. president. It had been planned long in advance as an expansion and follow-up of Operation Tooele of the previous year. It was assisted by friends from

Light Representative of the National C. A. Department. He learned what others were contemplating and doing. In Tooele, Utah, a national Home Missions "Breakthrough" project, Darrel Madsen had what he needed - a challenging opportunity in his own district. He took a squad of young people to Tooele for a saturation invasion. It paid! And the biggest reward was "the change in the kids, themselves; they were transformed," he said.

Now for a bigger field! The C.A.'s targeted on 11 areas in the Salt Lake Valley where Assemblies of God churches were needing help. They would enlist the aid of ministers, too. For a whole week they would go "door to door" during the day and then hold services at night in each of 11 churches. They would cover some of the towns in their entirety. In larger cities, selected areas would be covered.

Saturday afternoon, August 22, was an exciting time at First Assembly, Salt Lake City, the orientation center. The literature had arrived; the young people had gathered and the counselors worked to interview and assign squads. Orientation followed-lecture and lab. There

would be more lab and retraining on location. Saturday and Sunday the squads dispersed to the field and the invasion was on!
Cities included in the invasion territory were: Salt Lake City, Ogden, Roy, Layton, American Fork, Moal. Monticello, Roosevelt, Kearns, Provo, and Midvale.
The approach at the door that the C.A.'s used varied. But the big "Hi" and broad smile worked best. One young lady used this: "Hi! My name is
This is my friend
I'm sure you can't guess what we're doing!"
It was my privilege to work with Darrel Madsen in "lab training" and "riding circuit" (going from squad to squad, counseling, encouraging and retraining).
The experiences the C.A.'s had would fill a book! Experiences ranged from total rejection at the door (including the "slammed door" and anger) to complete acceptance with hour-long conversations, conversions and prayer. Many C.A.'s were fearful at first ; but not for long. Many were exceptionally well-experienced in soul winning and they helped the others.

Typical comments of the teen-agers were: "I'm having the time of my life. . . . I wouldn't miss this for anything. ... This is fun. ... I can do this at home.... I wish were here. . . I was afraid; but not now...." And even, "I'd like to forget school and do this all year!"

These C.A.'s had a sense they were in a "Book of Acts" kind of experience. And the advisers and pastors had, too! The WMC's who housed, fed and transported the young people from street to street felt the thrill of it all and wanted to be involved further. Pastors felt this was the answer. The church was seeing something it had long yearned for.

These C.A.'s were out to sow the gospel seed in testimony and literature and to reap a harvest where they found it. Many teams had opportunity to pray with friends the first day. Others met rebuff and resistance; but they continued on confidently. By the end of the week they had made over 12,000 home contacts and had given out over 26,000 pieces of literature. Many testimonies to conversions were reported. At least 90 decisions in homes and 30 conversions in the services were recorded, with some reports yet to come. Several were filled with the Spirit in the evening services. In one city, for example, at least 40 names and addresses of

receptive persons were left with the pastor for follow-up.
The climaxing Saturday night rally, featuring the ministry of Dave Wilkerson, was held in a Junior High auditorium in Salt Lake City. It saw scores come for salvation and dedication in its altar call.
But there are more contacts to be made - there is more literature to be given out-and the Rocky Mountain C.A.'s are doing it. In fact, local Utah squads continued the week following and reached into additional areas. Some of the C.A.'s are starting this "invasion" activity back in their own groups in Colorado. Pastor Peter Pilot of the First Assembly, Salt Lake City, scheduled an "invasion" for Cedar City during the Utah Teachers Convention October 8-9.
Tentatively the C.A.'s have set aside their Easter vacation for another lab invasion in Utah. Again the typical comments of the C.A.'s themselves tell the story: "T'll be back.... I'll go anywhere to do this; just let me know. ... Let's do this again."

Laymen and pastors from both the Harbor and Los Angeles sections gathered Saturday, June 6, at 7:30 p.m., for a united rally at the beautiful Western Avenue Assembly of God. The impact and inspiration which at-

# Humility 

Sunday School Lesson for November 15, 1964<br>Luke 14:7-14; 1 Peter 5:1-6

In the spiritual realm the way up is down! This principle was stated by Christ in the words of our text: "Whosoever exalteth himself shall be abased: and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted." Jesus had been invited to dinner at the home of a prominent Pharisee. What he saw as the other invited guests gathered provided the occasion for His teaching.

Humility's Pathway (Luke 14:7-11). "Now he told a parable to those who were invited [when] he noticed how they were selecting the places of honor" (Amplified Version). And human nature has not changed. There is still the mad scramble by status seekers and social climbers, by men greedy for prominence and power. This in turn means pride, cruelty, dishonesty, snobbery. In the process there is resultant envy, jealousy, hatred, bitterness, and misery. Worst of all, this scramble for honor from men is seen in the church where of all

places it should lee conspicuously absent! How we need to return again and again to Christ's own words for life's guiding principles!
To these proud ones Jesus said, in effect: "It is better to take the lowest place and be invited up, than to take a higher place and be invited down!"

Humility's Practice (Luke 14:12-14). Humility expresses itself in true hospitality. These verses have a definite bearing upon the preceding ones though the relationship may not seem evident. In the scramble for social, political, or religious favor, men are prone to invite others to dinner in order to attain social status or political favor; and much that goes under the label of hospitality may be simply calculated selfishness and selfseeking! Jesus made it very clear we ought to make a special effort to show love and hospitality toward those who cannot do anything for us in return. How many of us take Him seriously at this point?

Humility's Pattern (1 Peter 5:1-6). "Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility; for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble. Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time.

A study of Peter's letters reveals the fact he often alluded to some of his own experiences recorded in the Gospels. For example, compare 1 Peter $5: 8$ with Luke $22: 31,32$; and 1 Peter $5: 2$ with John $21: 15-17$. It is very likely when Peter spoke about being clothed with humility he had in mind the time when Jesus washed the disciples' feet.

The expression be clothed comes from a Greek word that describes the apron worn by slaves when at work, to keep their dress clean; so these words might be rendered as follows: "Put on the apron of humility to serve one another.'
"Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God and went to God...riseth from the supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself and began to wash the disciples' feet." Here is one of the most beautiful and sublime statements in God's Word. It illustrates and illuminates the meaning of true humility. Jesus, fully aware of His divine origin and deity, fully cognizant of the authority given Him by the Father, and fully conscious of His mission and destiny, thought it not inconsistent with all this to stoop to the most menial of tasks, doing what was always the duty of the household servant-washing the feet of household guests!

By this act Jesus forever glorified the common task. Furthermore, He emphatically disproved the common notion that a man may be too big or too great to stoop to an insignificant task.

Humility, then, as seen from the above examples, has to do with our attitude toward ourselves, toward others, and toward our actions in relation to others.
"Humility," according to William Law, "does not consist in having a worse opinion of ourselves than we deserve, or in abasing ourselves lower than we really are. But, as all virtue is founded in truth, so humility is found in a true and just sense of our weakness, misery, and sin. He that rightly feels and lives in this sense of his condition, lives in humility."

# Iran

The short visit i was privileged to pay to iran as speaker for the recent Assemblies of God ministers conference was a highlight in my life. Since no Assemblies of God ministers from America have been stationed there for 20 years, I had opportunity to observe the progress of an indigenous work.

There are 13 churches and preaching points and 13 ministers, with about 1,300 believers in this predominantly Moslem country. Tooma Nasir is superintendent of the work. He was saved in Russia under the ministry of John Varonaeff in 1921, and God has used him in a special way through the years.

While in Iran I was a guest in the home of Brother and Sister Youarish Neesan, pastors in Rezaieh, not far from the USSR border. They treated me royally. On the first Sunday there I was privileged to minister at the dedication of the new church at Dezzatakka, a village some 15 miles from Rezaieh. Joseph Solomon was the host pastor.

For the next seven days the Iran ministers conference was held in Rezaieh. We had morning, afternoon, and


evening services. There were also children's meetings every day with as many as 90 in attendance at one time. Evangelist David Thomas and three other young men from the Filadelfia Church in Teheran went into the outlying villages every morning, distributing tracts and inviting people to the evening services.

Many came to these evangelistic meetings as a result of this effort. After several of the evening services people stayed to pray for the infilling of the Holy Spirit. At the close of the meetings we counted 69 converted and several filled with the Spirit, including one of the elders.

On Monday we went back to the village of Dezzatakka for a picnic and baptismal service. Here seven more were saved; then Superintendent Nasir and I baptized 14 believers. Mrs. Neesan, the wife of my host, was one of these. It was a happy climax to a great week for all of us.

I returned to Lebanon with the knowledge that our brethren in Iran are pressing forward to victory, and that they welcome and appreciate our fellowship.

## Homemade Missionaries

BY MARY TREGENZA

There is a large chapter in missionary annals for Mary Slessor of Calabar. But Mary was only one of the 14 Slessor children who went to the mission field. There were seven others. And the mother went too while staying at home.

Mrs. Slessor's going was in the lives of her children whom she raised with the vivid consciousness of the world's unreached millions. She went also in the ministry of intercessory prayer. It was her custom to pray daily for the salvation of all men everywhere.

There are only two institutions in our society that are of divine origin: the home and the church. And their task is the same. When properly oriented to God's plan, both are engaged in the task of producing disciples. The Slessor ratio should not be considered umusual-only unusually high where foreign missions are concerned.

In his secular education, alert parents chart a tentative course for Johnny even before he is born. The whatare - you - going-to-be-when-you-grow-up-Johnny attitude might be leaving it a dozen years too late. What sort of world will Johnny enter, cap in hand? (Better if that cap be a college gradu-
ation cap with matching diploma and gown.) And Christian parents must inevitably add, "What will be the claims of Christ on our son's life?" This son with an eternal destiny.

Most of the child's religious education must take place in the home. Ideally, the repetition of these truths in the Sunday school and church only confirm and illustrate these principles in the wider Christian community. Early ideologies-the lasting ones-are unconsciously formed in the home years. Education never happens. In its finest sense education is not the formal communication of subject matter. It is the shaping of people. Constant, reverent exposure to the plan of God and the claims of Christ at the altar in the home must result in dedication. The geography of that con-secration-home or foreign-will depend a great deal on the exposure of that life to the needs of the world missions field and to the missionary personalities who are actively meeting that challenge.

Do we need a converse illustration to show us the strength of the Christian home? "In the Soviet Union of the sixties, the atheist State and vigorous Christianity are battling for the souls of children and youth," writes
J. C. Pollock in Christianity Today. "Broadcasts and articles continually attack the 'harm done to young children by religious instruction at home.'"

Elsewhere in his article, "Christian Youth in Soviet Schools," Pollock had this to say:
"Where a Christian couple are determined to prevent atheist indoctrination, and teachers or Party equally determined the other way, stronger measures are used: the parents can be deprived of parental rights and the children sent away to be brought up in a State home or in an 'Internat,' one of the new experimental boarding schools. Deprivation of parental rights is becoming lamentably frequent."

How shall Christian parents in America steward their privilege of freedom and surround their families with a curriculum of discipleship?

They might begin by selecting a missionary family with the same age children for special correspondence and interest. And a missions bulletin board in the home could become the meeting place for a changing panorama of maps, missionary prayer cards, correspondence, foreign stamps, and photographs. The Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God offers a growing number of missionary biographies and brochures.

As well as including missionary biographies in family reading, children should be similarly introduced to national workers. It heightens both personal and prayer interest to know by name that Bible woman in India and the national evangelist in Africa. Remember though, a realistic view of all missionary personalities is important
to avoid hero worship. If a missionary is special, it is because he is a servant of God and not because he has crossed the ocean and seen a lot of wild animals.

With the step-up in communications, the family unit is exposed to constant appeals for finance from within and without its own denomination. Obviously local church and denominational commitments deserve priority. We have sent our missionaries abroad with this assurance. They are, in this respect, from our own house. Paul warns that neglect of our own renders us worse than an infidel. But above and beyond these regular commitments, how about a family council coming together after individual research to debate and nominate a particularly needy field for an additional selfdenial offering? The area of consideration could relate to that section of world missions the family is studying.

Requests for curios to be used decoratively and as special occasion gifts would place an undue burden on the missionary often many miles from mail centers. But these heighten foreign missions interest and may be obtained from the listings in the classified columns of leading national home magazines.

One missions-minded family learned to speak French at the dinner table. The experiment of praying in the foreign language was a highlight of progress, and an association of sorts with the French-speaking peoples of the world. This also made the entertainment of a missionary who spoke the language a special delight.

## "NOW"

A Bible Study By ARTHUR PETRIE

Some very precious truths are connected with the word "now" in the New Testament.

## 1. The "Now" of Salvation

"Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2). This shows that we live in the age of grace, and that the door of salvation is wide open. It is "now" for each soul. Many have let that "now" go by and have lost out.

## 2. The "Now" of No Condemnation

"There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1). Glorious fact! Blessed experience! Paul indicates that "the accusation is thrown out, and the indictment quashed." Believers are not "reckoned" or accounted righteous before God.
3. The "Now" of Sonship
"Beloved, now are we the sons of God" (John 3:2). There is more in that statement than any of us can take in fully. If we only knew what it really means-"Now are we the sons of God!" It is a fact Christian believers may well take to heart. We may rejoice in that we are now children of God. Other relationships of the flesh matter little if one is a child of God.

## 4. The "Now" of Holy Living

This is seen in Romans 6:22-"But now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, ye have your fruit unto holiness." It is the purpose of God that all justified souls live a holy life. The sixth chapter of Romans shows how. There are two other "now" verses in the chapter, and these must be true of us if we are to realize the "now" of verse 22 .

Verse 21 speaks of "those things whereof ye are now ashamed." Am I thoroughly ashamed of the deeds of the self-life, of all the sins of the flesh?

Verse 19 says to all believers, "Now yield your members servants to righteousness unto holiness." God grant for His glory that we may not only rejoice in the "now" of no condemnation, but may also rejoice His heart in the "now" of holy, wholesome living.

## 5. The "Now" of Citizenship

"Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellowcitizens with the saints, and of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:19). No matter what our citizenship may be down here, faith in Christ brings us into the family of God and makes us citizens of heaven. And we may hope to have our part in the holy city which is to come down out of heaven from God.

## 6. The "Now" of Abiding

"And now, little children, abide in him; that, when he shall appear, we may have confidence, and not be ashamed before him at his coming" ( 1 John $2: 28$ ). It is important in view of the imminence of the coming again of the Lord Jesus that we be abiding in Him now. We should be abiding in Him so that when He comes we shall have an open countenance for Him ; and have no occasion for blushing at His sudden appearance.
7. The "Now" of Release and Comfort
"Now he is confronted" (Luke $16: 25$ ). It is the statement concerning the poor beggar named Lazarus. It shows us that those who have departed this life in the faith of Christ are in a present state of happiness, and are comforted. (The original here is very expressive and picturesque. It shows Lazarus as then receiving comfort from ministering hands. "But now and here he is receiving consolation.") There is therefore a "now" of blessedness to the ones who were in Christ, but are now with Him.

## 8. The "Now" of the Resurrection of Christ <br> "But now is Christ risen from the

 dead" (1 Corinthians $15: 20$ ). The Greek original brings out the permanence of the fact of the resurrection of Christ. It is a present truth and a present fact of the Christian faith that we have a resurrected Christ, and that there is blessing for believers now in that fact. For it is written, "Now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept."

In desperation, I accomplished my immediate objective, and then I was nearly helpless!

My first thought was to find a chiropractor and have my back put into place. Upon inquiry, I was told that seven miles to the west in a small town there was one. With my wife and four-year-old daughter in the trailer, we drove to the next town, only to find the doctor had gone to Michigan, deer hunting, but they said there was another chiropractor 10 miles farther on.

When we arrived there we found this one had gone to Florida. In the next town, five miles on, was an osteopath, but he had closed his office and quit business. Also, there was an ordinance against house trailers staying overnight in the town! There was nothing to do but drive on.

It was after 10 p.m., and I was nearly exhausted with pain and fatigue. The enormity of the situation became overwhelmingly real-in a strange state, several hundred miles from home, helplessly crippled, with an invalid wife and a small daughterwhat could be worse?

I was not conscious of praying, other than my habit of praising the Lord in all circumstances, but $I$ sensed a Presence in the seat beside me. A voice, I am not sure whether or not it was audible, said: "Am not I the God that healeth thee?" For a while I had no knowledge of the passing of time or miles-just a wonderful sense of well-being!

When I came back to awareness of my surroundings, my back no longer hurt. And, as I placed my hand on the offending location, the dislocation no longer existed.

My eyes cleared of tears and I saw a neon sign with a very welcome "vacancy," where we had no trouble arranging for a parking place for the night. And the next morning we continued on our journey.-H. M. Stitt, Hastings, Michigan.

I recall how we took the matter to our Heavenly Father. We told Him our fears; that if our clothes were damaged we had no money to buy new ones for ourselves and six children.

While praying, I was impressed to "anoint" the doors and windows with oil. The thought seemed foolish and I tried to dismiss it. When it became persistent I told my wife about it. Almost 4,000 students have been enrolled in NCAG and its graduates number nearly 1,500 since it was organized by Dr. Ness 30 years ago. From among the graduates and former students more than 200 are serving as missionaries and over 500 as pastors.

Mr . Chei came to America on a student visa and enrolled at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. A friend helped arrange for his passage. A person of less courage would have been dismayed at the idea of taking graduate courses in a strange country and in a new language, but Li Chung Chei persevered until he earned his Master of Music degree with commendations from the faculty.
While studying in Chicago, Mr. Chei served as director of the choir of the Melrose Park Community Gospel Church

(Assemblies of God). It was here he first learned about Evangel College and its ministry to Pentecostal youth.
Mr . Chei joined the Evangel College Music Department faculty as a voice instructor in September, 1963. His application to the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization for "first preference quota status" was approved. He is currently waiting for a place on the immigration quota. When this is granted he will be able to terminate the years of separation and bring his family to the U.S.A.
Mr. Chei loves America. "This country has been so good to me," he declares.

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## Who Says He's Dead!



Funeral services for 92-year-old chris johanus Wyngaart of Long Beach, California, proved an exceedingly happy occasion for his two daughters! Tears that had welled in their eyes as the service progressed vanished the instant the two women stepped to the casket to say farewell to the mortal remains.
"That's not our father!" they excitedly advised the mortician.

The funeral director consulted his records. Identification of the body which had been delivered to the
mortuary from a Los Angeles hospital was unquestionable. But how could they argue with a man's daughters? Surely they knew their father.

The women persisted, "That's not our father!"
A call to the hospital unravelled the mystery. Officials discovered that both Wyngaart and 80-year-old John Collins were admitted to the institution a week earlier. Both were deaf and senile, and documents from their respective rest homes became switched at the hospital. It was Mr. Collins who died of bronchial penumonia. According to last reports Wyngaart was doing very well, recovering from tumor surgery

It all tends to prove that some people you think are dead really are not. And others thought to be alive are actually dead! Indeed, the only real death is a spiritual one.

The world looks at an unsaved individual and assumes he is alive. Physically this is true, but spiritually it is false. His body is alive but his soul is dead because God does not live within it! As the presence of the human soul imparts life to the body, so the presence of the indwelling Christ imparts life to the soul! James declared, "The body without the spirit is dead" (James 2:26).

Some years ago, a pastor in Los Angeles twisted a slogan then widely heralded by a religious sect, "Millions now living will never die," and insisted, "Millions now living are already dead." And it is true. Millions now living are spiritually dead-in $\sin$.

In order to enjoy existence on earth a person must experience physical birth. And in order to have spiritual life he needs spiritual birth. As Jesus told Nicodemus, "That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit" (John $3: 6$ ). Then Christ added, "Marvel not that I said into thee, Ye must be born again." The Bible takes the position that until this happens a man is dead.

The new birth is communicated to the spiritually dead through an act of faith. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life" (John 3:36).

No one needs to remain dead, spiritually. The words of the father in our Lord's parable illustrate this: "This my son was dead, and is alive again. ..." There is nothing medical science can do to revive a dead body. But God daily restores life to sinners who had been dead in trespasses and in sins.

The world weeps over a body from which the soul has departed in death, but sheds few tears over a soul from whom God is absent! The world regards men dead who are gloriously alive today in the presence of God.

The Bible says, "She that liveth in pleasure is dead while she liveth" (1 Timothy $5: 6$ ). But new life is available to all who are dead in sin. The Spirit of Him who raised up Jesus Christ from the dead delights to dwell in the lives of men and women. He will quicken to life the soul of the sinner who embraces Christ as Saviour, and raise him up at the last day.

For the Scriptures tell us, "He that hath the Son hath life" (1 John 5:12). And all may have Him, for Jesus said: "If a man love me, he will keep my words: and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him" (John 14:23).

This is the life which physical death can never touch! This is life eternal.
