Glory to God! Hallejah! Well, we are really sailing for South Afriea. We pulled in right alongside the boat at about $2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. St. John's time and set sail a little before 3 p. m. God works things around to His own glory.

We had a very nice journcy here from Indiamapolis. At Hamilton, Ohio, we made very good connection, only a few minutes wait. At Detroit, Mich., we had about three hours wait but none of us went to the Mission as all our time was needed to see after our huggage and lunches, and then Bro. Lake's folks were there to see and bid them a final farewell. Also Sister Winnie left for her destination thirty minutes after our arrival. She seemed to be anxious to get to her destination.
During that night on the train little Johnny took seriously ill, but prayer was made and the answer was given. In the morning when we looked out the window we found the ground covered in snow, and all the way from that on to St. John's a white sheet covered the ground.

Last night about $9 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. we arrived at Montral where we changed cars, and on boarding the train we found it packed to its utmost capacity, so another train was made up and we followed in about twenty minutes. This will be a very interesting voyage to all of us. We ought to have a good stenographer in our company. I wish Roswell could be with us.
This boat eneountered the hardest storm since it was built the last voyage from England, but she came out all right. We have quite a crowded boat, cspecially our class. Third-class on this looat is quite satisfactory-better than expected.

We have decided to write you a party letter, so I will tell you of my impressions of England: In most things in my judgment America is a full century ahead of England. Religious life is if anything deader, and with less power than even the denominational churches in America. I attelded Wesley Chapel down town (Liverpool) last night. A largely middle-class congregation with splendid congregational singing, but without spiritual power. Very, very formal. When I said "amen" out loud the congregation was shocked. They had a Men's Lodging House service, a real Jerry MeCauley South Water St., New York, Bum congregation, but the preacher advised all to sign the pledge and quit drinking and brace up, saying the Christian life is a very hard way, but it is the best way. I prayed "O Jesus, do let me have five minutes to tell them there is power in the blood to deliyer from the curse of appetite," and He did. The audience straightened up at the first sentence and twenty-five or thirty came up to sign the pledge, and that gave Louie and Lehman and I a chance to talk personally with a good many about Jesus and His redenption,
The most terrible thing here is drunken women. A bloated-faced, reel-nosed woman sat in the meeting with not a stiteh on the baby hut a little cotton dress that came (o) the baby's bare knees, ragged and dirty beyond what the vilest American slums produce. When I got to Liverpool my pennies were all gone. We had to have our underclothing all eleaned at the laundry, and so we prayed about it and sent our bundle to the laundry, and not until an hour before we were ready to leave Liverpool did the Lord send me the price of the bill, some two or three shillings, and I had a shilling left over. We did not need any more money until we arrived at Capetown, as our party was in the hands of the slip company, but I knew that just as soon as we arrived at Capetown there would be doek fees and transfer accounts and hotel bills, ete., right away. Mrs. Lake and I held the matter steadfast before the Lord, and before we left the ship, while it was yet at the docks at Capetown, before the gang planks were put down, a passenger touched me on the shoulder and called me to one side. He handed me an American Express Order for $40 £$, saying, "Boy, the Lord told me to give you that, and He has been telling me that for the last two and a half weeks," It paid all my expenses and landed us in Johannesburg.

To show you how wonderfully God works: You know we were landing in a new country without a single acquaintance, but while we were on ship board we made it a special matter of prayer that God would provide us a home when we got here. Rents here are desperate in comparison to what we are accustomed to in America. The houses on the street where we live are a good deal like people's wood-sheds roof and the outer wall consists of galvanized iron with no sheeting. The inside downstairs is coarsely
plastered, The attie (there being But, Brother, we have seen the Lord no upstairs) is nothing bat the gal- anoint the house with prayer before, vanized, iron overhead. When the sun shines on this it is something the powers of hell were prayed out like the Babylonian furnace, and of presence as I belicve I have often when the sun goes down it gets very told you. They prayed continuchilly, much like a November night ously for three-quarters of an hour. at home. People do not have fires They wept tears, confessed their in their houses here as we have been sins, took off their idolatrous aceustumed to. How I have longed charms, ete., and when the service for a good American stove that would warm the marrow in a fellow's shins at once.

But to return: as we stepped off the train at Johannesburg a little bustling lady whom I at once recognized as an American stepped up to me and said: "Are you a missionary?" I repliedyes." Shesad"the Lord told me to come down here, that I would find a family on this train who were missionaries. I have a house for you furnished in real missionary style. You can have the house." But, I said "Sister, the Lord has not given me any money to pay rent." "And the Lord told me not to accept any rent," she replied. So we are here in a little crowded home all furnished.

My heart was drawn out toward the native work very intensely and the Lord at once opened a native tobemacle, the property of the Congregational American Mission where we have held services twice a day. Last Sabbath afternoon the house was packed with natives, some with clothes on, one or two dressed in green table-eloths with a fashy-colored horder, some with loin-elothis on, half of them bamefooted, miny with painted legs, etco, as is eustomary here. As the servies proceeded the spirit of God fell upor the house in prayer. The natives reoognized it just as quickly as we did, and without suggestion fell on their knees to pray as all natives here do, being exceerlingly devout. They didn't wat for one another to pray. Out of the five hundred present ewo hundred and filty broke out in prayer aloud at one time. The missionaries who were with us, as observers, of the starely churchy order, were amazed and astounded because we did not stop the noise.

Just a few lines from Johannesburg before the English mail goos torlay:

God is working most mightily here in Johamosburg. The Holy Spirit has fallen and numbers have been baptized with the INoly Ghost, and numbers are being baptized daily.

Saturday evening one dear man got saved, sanctified and baptized in about ten minutes, and he lay there under the power of God for soveral honrs, praising God in tongues, speaking in German and Dutch languages he never knew before. The interpretation was given by a prominent Jutchman who is the editor of a Transvaal paper who also got saved and sanctified the other night. Pcople are getting : saved, sanetified, healed and baptized with the Holy Ghost every day.

We began our first continued meetings in the eolored chureh, and notwithstanding the prejudice that exists with the white people against the natives, when God began to work the white people came in such crowds that the natives became timid and were crowded out. Since then we are offered the large Zion Tabernacle which seats several hundred in_which to hold our meetings.

I never saw a more hungry people than these deat Zion folk. Truly (iod is working.

Last Sabhath we had three great meetings going on, one in Pretoria and two in Johamesbong. There is a wonderfal futwe for south Mriea. We are crying lor mighty signs, wonders and miractes to follow our ministry in the name of the Moly Child Jesus.

We are greatly in need of some good reliable workers. Wre could make use al them now. Pray for us hate mightily.

## The Threefold Standard.

The scriptures hold out to the believer a threefold standard of experience. If he falls short of this he fails to be satisfied, and fails to satisfy the heart of our Lord. People profess to be contented with measuring part way up the standard and sometimes seem to be, but deep in their heart of hearts it is not so. A human soul never enjoys perfect rest and contentment until Jesus Christ is satisfied by becoming the satisfying portion of that soul.
The first step upward along this standard is found in John 13:10, "clean every whit." These gracious words fell from the tender lips of the soon departing Master. A little later in the same discourse He confirms His earnest verdict by adding; "Already are ye clean through the word which I have spoken unto you." John 15:3. Clean every whit. What a radical assertion that was. Eleven men who could be made no cleaner in God's sight. That was not flattery, neither was it deception. He who knew what was in men could not be deceived, neither would He deceive. Jesus had chosen these men and was presently to finish their equipment to start a ball which should roll down over twenty centuries. They must be true, tried and trained. And especially must they be elean and know it, and have such an unquestionable witness thereto that the shrewdest critics could never successfully gain say it. God be praised! This is very important. If there is a defect in the first section of this glorious standard, if such were possible, it might weaken and topple over. How disastrous that would be. Nevertheless we can and must be clean every whit. "If we walk in the light $* * *$ the blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin." "And almost all things are by the law purged with blood, and without shedding of blood is no remission." Dear reader does the blood consciously cleanse you now? Have you the joy of full salvation evidenced by the Holy Ghost through the word? You are certainly an apostolic candidate for an apostolic Pentecost.

The second section of this gospel standard is recorded in John 7:23, vis; "every whit whole," and confirmed by restoring to "perfect soundness" an impotent man. Acts 3:16. Paul also prayed, "The very God of peace sanctify you wholly," and declares that He will do it. I Thes. 5:23. The same power that lifted Jesus from the dead and set Him above the principalities in the glory is pledged to do this for all who will believe for it. The number of testimonies to these two glorious experiences is multi-legion.
The third section of this standard is every bit full. Acts 2:4. "They were all filled with the Holy Ghost." This filling meant much more than that of Elizabeth, or John the Baptist, or any before their day, for they "began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." By this manifestation, no doubt, it is known whether believers enjoy pentecostal or pre-pentecostal fullness. God's operations are dispensational. This is the dispensation of the Pentecostal fullness of the Holy Ghost, previously announced as the baptism in the Holy Ghost and Fire. No one can be fully satisfied, as God counts satisfaction, until he receives what Jesus and John promised, and that which was so abundantly shed forth upon the expectant 120 . Not that tongues satisfy. No gift does. But the Giver can not satisfy us nor Himself except by imparting Himself in just that measure and manner that He designs. Hence, the absolute necessity of perfect yieldness to and endorsement of all His will. How can people clain to have Pentecost while they mimify and resist and denounce and explain away the one distinctive pentecostal signal-new tongues?
