COMBINED MINUTES OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, CANADA AND FOREIGN LANDS — 1914-1923

PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTIONS OF CONSTITUTION

Whereas, God, our Heavenly Father, sent His only begotten Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, into the world, who purchased and redeemed fallen man with His own precious blood, and called out of the world and saved a people, of whom He built and established His Church (Assembly of God. Matt. 16:18), upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the Head and Chief Cornerstone (Eph. 2:20), and organized and baptized it with the Holy Spirit, with its government upon His shoulders (Isa. 9:6, 7), and said: "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (Matt. 16:18); and

Whereas, He gave the Holy Inspired Scriptures (both old and new covenants, Heb. 8:6-13) as the all-sufficient rule for faith and practice (2 Tim. 3:16), saying: "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works," we therefore shall not add to nor take from them (Rev. 22:18); and

Whereas, He commanded that there should be no schism (division, sectarianism) in His Body, the GENERAL ASSEMBLY (Church) of the first born, which are written in heaven (Heb. 12:23); and

Whereas, We recognize ourselves as members of said GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GOD (which is God's organism), and do not believe in identifying ourselves as, or establishing ourselves into, a sect, that is a

human organization that legislates or forms laws and articles of faith and has unscriptural jurisdiction over its members and creates unscriptural lines of fellowship and disfellowship and which separates itself from other members of the General Assembly (Church) of the first born, which is contrary to Christ's prayer in St. John 17, and Paul's teaching in Eph. 4: 1-16, which we heartily endorse; therefore, be it

Resolved: First, That we recognize ourselves as a GENERAL COUNCIL of Pentecostal (Spirit Baptized) saints from local Churches of God in Christ, Assemblies of God, and various Apostolic Faith Missions and Churches, and Full Gospel Pentecostal Missions and Assemblies of like faith in the United States of America, Canada and Foreign Lands, whose purpose is neither to legislate laws of government, nor usurp authority over said various Assemblies of God, nor deprive them of their Scriptural and local rights and privileges, but to recognize Scriptural methods and order for worship, unity, fellowship, work and business for God, and to disapprove of all unscriptural methods, doctrines and conduct, and approve of all Scriptural truth and conduct, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace, until we all come into the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, and to walk accordingly, as recorded in Eph. 4: 17-32.

Resolved: Second, That we recognize all the above said Assemblies of various names, and when speaking of them refer to them by the general Scriptural name, "Assemblies of God," and recommend that they all recognize themselves by the same name, that is, "Assembly of God" and adopt it as soon as practicable for the purpose of being more Scriptural and also legal in transacting business, owning property, and executing missionary work in home and foreign lands, and for general *convenience, unity and fellowship.*

Parliamentary Order

On motion it was agreed that the Council should be governed by Parliamentary usage, under the guidance of

the Holy Spirit and according to the Word of God.

Roster Committee

At each meeting of the General Council the chair shall appoint a Roster Committee of three, which shall be authorized to pass upon the eligibility of all names reported as delegates, and to prepare a roll of all those approved. Any complaints as to delegates being received should be made to this committee.

Delegates from Local Assemblies

Resolved, That each assembly in co-operation with the Council, or desiring to co-operate, should send at least one delegate each year, and that the assembly is especially invited to send its pastor or some other representative, chosen by the assembly, as a delegate to each meeting of the General Council. Each assembly should aid the pastor on the expenses of the trip.

Preacher Delegates

All men and women holding up-to-date credentials from the General Council, when in attendance, shall be recognized as full delegates.

Rules and Order

The following order of business for this session of the Council was reported by Bro. F. A. Hale, Chairman of the Committee on Rules, and adopted:

Standing Committees Made Active

It was moved and carried that the various Standing Committees should act during the Council sessions, and that all resolutions be referred to these several committees according to their subject matter and that these committees report on the same.

Chairman and Secretary Advisory to Committees

It was moved and carried that the Chairman and Secretary of the General Council be recognized as members ex-officio of all Standing Committees, and that such committees call for their advice when needed.

Duties of General Officers

The following suggestions have been made and adopted as a guide to the several officers of the Council as to their duties in the same. There shall be at least three such officers, a Chairman, a Secretary and a Missionary Secretary.

Duties of the Chairman

In addition to the duties already or elsewhere defined, the following shall be expected of the Chairman of the General Council:

1. To preside at the meetings of the Council.
2. To be the Head of the General Office, and to supervise all the work of that office from one Council meeting till the next.
3. To be Chairman of the Credential Committee, and to sign all credentials.
4. To be Chairman of the Executive Presbytery, and to receive all communications directed to that body.
5. To be general superintendent of all work on the field conducted in behalf of the General Council and its work, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.
6. To receive General Council and office funds, and to have general oversight over the same.
7. To call temporarily for the return of Credentials

on the part of any offending minister in cases where requested to do so by the Credential Committee.

8. Finally to perform any other functions usual and customary as Chairman or such as may be directed by this Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Duties of the Assistant Chairman

1. To assist the Chairman.
2. To preside at meetings in the absence of the Chairman.
3. To be a member of the Credential Committee.
4. To assist the Chairman in the general superintendence of the work on the field conducted in behalf of the General Council and its work, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.
5. Finally, to perform any other functions under the supervision of the Chairman, or such as may be directed by this Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Duties of the Secretary

1. To make proper minutes of the meeting of the General Council and to publish the same as approved and directed by the Executive Presbytery.
2. To do such work as secretary of the Credential Committee as may be directed by the Chairman or may be mutually agreed upon.
3. To be a member of the Credential Committee, and to sign all credentials.
4. To keep the books, and conduct all the work of his office in co-operation with and under the general oversight of the Chairman.
5. To perform such other functions as are customary or as may be directed by this Council or the Executive Presbytery.

Duties of the Missionary Secretary.

1. To act as head of the Missionary department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.
2. To keep a record of all decisions of the Missionary Committee and of all official acts of the Missionary department.

3. To conduct all correspondence with prospective Missionaries and with those already out on the field.

4. To conduct the Missionary columns in the Pentecostal Evangel from Missionary letters and reports.

5. To represent the General Council in all relationships with Governments or authorities where our Missionary work is involved.

6. To direct the Missionary activities of the Assemblies of God under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

7. Finally, to perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.

Duties of the Missionary Treasurer.

1. To receive all Missionary funds which are donated for the support of the Missionary activities of the Assemblies of God.

2. To distribute all missionary funds as directed by the donors or by the Missionary Committee.

3. To keep such records of all funds received and disbursed as will safeguard the funds from loss enroute to the field.

4. To acknowledge in the Pentecostal Evangel all funds received for Missionary work.

5. To conduct all correspondence with the Missionaries or the home field which pertains to the receipt and disbursement of Missionary offerings.

6. To act as purchasing agent for missionary supplies under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

7. Finally, to perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.

The General Presbytery and the Executive Presbytery

Resolved, That this Council select as many representative men in various sections of the home field as it deems advisable as GENERAL PRESBYTERS to represent this Council in all the phases of its work and interests in their respective fields; and that four of these, together with the Chairman, Assistant Chairman and Secretary of the Council, seven in all, be

appointed as an EXECUTIVE PRESBYTERY, which shall hold as a perpetual trust the Gospel Publishing House and all other properties of the General Council, to meet together as often as necessary in executing the work of the General Council; and that the Chairman, Assistant Chairman and Secretary shall serve for the term of their office, and the others to serve for four years each, or until their successors are elected. And that, in case of a vacancy for any cause in the Executive Presbytery, the remaining members of the Executive Presbytery are hereby authorized to fill said vacancy, also to add at any time such members to the General Presbytery as they shall deem necessary to efficiency.

Associate Presbyters

On motion, the names of all the chairmen of District Councils in co-operative fellowship with this General Council and Field men were recognized, by virtue of their office, as Associate Presbyters.

Qualifications of Presbyters

Whereas, It seems expedient to define a standard of qualification for General Presbyters, be it

Resolved, That only men of mature experience and ability, whose life and ministry are above question, shall be eligible to the office of General Presbyter, and that such qualifications, rather than location, determine their eligibility.

Consulting the General Presbytery

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That in all matters of great importance, the Executive Presbytery communicate with the members of the General Presbytery before any final decision is reached, or final action is taken by the Executive Presbytery.

The Work of the General Presbytery

Resolved, First: That the General Presbytery is especially charged with the duty of administering the obligations of the General Council to the young converts, young preachers, and young assemblies in unity with us; and we express the prayerful hope that the ordained ministers everywhere will co-operate with, and render

all the assistance in their power to, the Presbyters in the discharge of these arduous labors.

Second: That among other things enjoined by the Word of God upon such officers as our General Presbyters, they be expected to travel over the field, at home and abroad, as the Lord may lead, with the view to acquainting themselves and the General Council with conditions everywhere.

Third: That after consultation with the pastors and officers of the local assemblies, the Presbyters, or officers of the District Council, where such exist, recommend to the General Council, which of the local assemblies in unity with us are Scripturally set in order, and which also of said assemblies are not yet so qualified, in order that the General Council, through the Presbytery and the District Councils, may assist in the development of the latter in the will of God.

Fourth: We recognize the right of any Assembly of God, Scripturally set in order, to conduct all its congregational affairs without interference from any outside source, and we express the prayerful hope that all such local bodies will continue in unity with the General Council, send messengers to its sessions and co-operate in all of its work.

Fifth: That we recommend to those assemblies which are not thus Scripturally qualified that they seek the advice and service of the Presbytery, or the officers of the District Councils where such exist, and of such brethren as may be able to help them in "setting in order the things that are wanting" (Tit. 1:5).

Sixth: That we further recommend all assemblies, which have difficulties of any kind which seriously threaten to cause division in their midst, to seek the help of the Presbytery or the officers of the District Councils, where such exist, for advice before the division occurs.

Seventh: That, wherein any brother be used of God to establish an assembly in a new field, he be recognized as the logical overseer or pastor of that flock, and that he be encouraged to remain with the same assembly and feed it and care for it until the Lord shall raise up a pastor to take this responsibility and thus relieve him

that he may press on to new fields; and if he shall find it needful to go before this is accomplished, let him confer with the nearest Presbyter, or the officers of the District Council, where such exist, before leaving. Thus we may avoid disaster that has come to many of the young assemblies that have been left without pastoral care.

Resolution Adopted Concerning Nominations and Elections.

Resolved, That nominations for all official positions, including that of General Presbyters, be made from the floor of the house; and thereafter before any name for a general office or for a General Presbyter or an Executive Presbyter be voted upon, the entire list be referred to the Nomination Committee, and this committee be instructed to review the list and report back the names of as many as they deem best qualified, and best situated on the field, to be voted upon for officers and Presbyters, and that all objections to any nomination be made to said committee; provided, however, that the committee shall be empowered to add such names to the list as they deem advisable.

And that voting for all officers except the General Presbyters and Executive Presbyters be by ballot.

On motion it was agreed that the names proposed should be voted upon one at a time, and each nomination should require a two-thirds' majority to insure election.

Resolutions on Incorporation

The Resolution Committee made the following report:

Whereas, It is necessary to become an incorporated body in order legally to transact business in the United States and Foreign Lands, we recommend the following resolution:

Resolved, That the General Council now assembled hereby authorizes the Executive Presbytery to incorporate the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

The above, after discussion, was, on motion, adopted unanimously.

In accordance with these instructions the General Council was incorporated according to the laws of the State of Arkansas, on October 30, 1914, with headquarters at Hot Springs, Ark., and according to the laws of the State of Missouri, on Nov. 1, 1916, with headquarters at St. Louis, Mo., and the incorporation was amended Oct. 6, 1919, with headquarters at Springfield, Mo.

District Councils

The Resolution Committee recommended to the GENERAL COUNCIL that, whereas, it is impractical for all the Local Assemblies of God in the United States, Canada and Foreign Fields to meet in the GENERAL COUNCIL, and whereas, it would be impossible for the GENERAL COUNCIL to transact the business of the Local Assemblies of God in the various sections of the United States, Canada and the Foreign Fields, we recommend that the Local Assemblies, in the various fields, establish District or State Councils, and that the Executive Presbytery be authorized to appoint Elders or Evangelists to assist the Local Assemblies of God in the recognition and establishing of the District or State Councils, that everything may be in harmony in the District Councils with the Constitution of the GENERAL COUNCIL.

Concerning District Councils

Whereas, There has been some misunderstandings and complications arising out of the attempt to run a small district council within territory covered by a larger one, therefore be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby expresses its disapproval of attempting to create and maintain a smaller district council within a portion of any field covered by a larger and more important district council. It disapproves of a district within a district. However, large districts covering several states may be divided whenever the forces in one of these states are large enough to maintain an effective council of their own and when these workers in any state are agreed the time for such move has come, and when this can be done peace-

ably and without impairing the effectiveness of the former district.

Resolved, That whenever a new district council in the future is to be formed and to be recognized as such by the General Council, due notice beforehand shall be given by those so contemplating to the General Council Office and to the officers of other adjacent districts whose territory or usefulness may be affected by the forming of the new district council. The new move should first have the approval of the General Office, and then be duly announced in the Evangel as to time and place where the forces intend to meet to carry out such purpose.

The two above resolutions were adopted.

Report on Changing Council Meetings

Your Committee appointed at the last session of the General Council to consider the advisability of changing the frequency of the meetings makes the following recommendations:

1. That the General Council meet biennially (once in two years) instead of annually as heretofore.

2. That all Ministers or Assemblies affiliated with the Assemblies of God, with headquarters at Springfield, Mo., be invited to affiliate themselves with the District Council with which they can the most conveniently be affiliated, and that in the future all recommendations for credentials come through the District Councils to the General Council Office.

3. That the District Councils be encouraged to make their annual meetings great and profitable gatherings to all the Pentecostal people of the entire District; and, with this end in view, we suggest that the officary of the General Council, or others qualified to help, be invited to attend such meetings for the purpose of keeping alive a proper relationship between the General Council and the District Councils and to advise in matters pertaining to our common interests.

4. That the officers of the General Council, including the General Presbytery, be elected at each biennial session of the General Council to hold office for a term of two years, and that a corresponding change be made also in the terms of the various Executive Presbyters.

Church Offices and Officers

The subject of the recognition of the different offices of the Church, which was referred back to the Resolution Committee, was revised and adopted as follows:

We, the Resolution Committee, recognizing that in the Word of God there are set certain offices, which represent the various activities of the body of Christ, recommend that the GENERAL COUNCIL declare itself in accord with the Word of God on this question, and stand ready to accept and endorse any and all of these various offices as they may appear or develop among us, and so far as they may now be present, we do stand ready to do so by suitable letters of commendation; and as a matter of convenience in their recognition, that we adopt the Scriptural terms of Elder, Pastor, Evangelist, Minister, Exhorter, and Deacon.

Rights and Offices of Women

The Resolution Committee recommended to the GENERAL COUNCIL that whereas the hand of God is mightily upon many women to proclaim and publish the "good tidings of great joy" in a wonderful way, that the GENERAL COUNCIL of the ASSEMBLIES OF GOD submit the following Scriptures for consideration:

1. In Christ, that is, in the matter of salvation, the lines of sex are blotted out (Gal. 3:28).
2. Women are commanded to be in subjection and not to usurp authority over the men in the churches (1 Tim. 2:11-15).
3. They are called to prophesy and preach the gospel (Acts 2:17). "He that prophesieth speaketh unto men to edification, to exhortation and to comfort" (1 Cor. 14:3; Ps. 68:11, R. V.).
4. To be helpers in the gospel (Rom. 16:3).

Therefore be it, Resolved, That this Council recommend to the ministry and Assemblies of God, that we recognize their God-given rights to be ordained, not as elders, but as evangelists, after being duly approved, according to the Scriptures; and that they serve as assistant pastors, missionaries, or as evangelists.

Women Given the Voting Privilege

Whereas, There is a strong sentiment among us in favor of granting our women a larger share of responsibility and privilege in our work, be it

Resolved, That all restrictions upon the privileges of women on the General Council floor be removed from the Minutes and records of the Council, and that they be given equal privileges with the brethren in voting upon all questions at the Council meetings, as well as in speaking. Carried.

Violations of Ministerial Courtesy

RESOLVED, That all discourteous conduct is disapproved and that all ministers are advised against interfering with others who may have charge of an assembly, whether it be by going in upon the work without consent of the one in charge or by such correspondence with the members of the assembly as will affect the influence of the leader. All correspondence which concerns the whole assembly, such as visiting that field, holding meetings, etc., should be addressed to the one in charge, not to private members. When there is no pastor, letters concerning the work should be addressed to the deacons or elders of the Assembly.

Any minister who so offends should be subjected to a Scriptural treatment as an offender, and it is recommended that it be given him by the local authorities, or the District Council, or if there be none, by the Executive Presbytery of the General Council. Such matters will seriously affect the granting of annual Fellowship Certificates and may be the basis of their recall.

Standing Credential Committee

Resolved, That the Chairman, Assistant Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Presbytery constitute a Credential Committee, and that the Council hereby authorizes them to bring out a form of credential certificate in keeping with the constitution and fundamental principles of the Council, and to issue annual certificates of fellowship to all ordained ministers in good standing; and further, on account of the expenditure incurred, and for the upkeep of the general office, applicants for credentials are requested

to send in an offering of one dollar with their application for ordination certificate, and that each year thereafter, an annual offering of fifty cents be asked for to cover the cost of the fellowship certificate.

Duties of Credential Committee

Resolved, That the Credential Committee shall issue credentials to qualified ministers in accordance with recommendations set forth in the Combined Minutes.

Resolved, further, That in the case of serious unscriptural teaching, of ministerial discourtesy, or other conduct unbecoming to a minister of the gospel, that those concerned refer these matters to the District Council or General Presbyter in the district where such minister may be located; and where these evils can not be corrected by this means, that these matters be referred to the Credential Committee, which shall deal with the same in a Scriptural way; and if it is found necessary, the Chairmen shall, with the agreement of the rest of the Committee, call for the credentials of such offender; but such accused person shall be later granted a fair and impartial trial, if desired, by a council of ministers under the direction of a District Council or before the Executive Presbytery, or by a council of ministers chosen by the Executive Presbytery, and that a final disposition of the case shall be made as these direct after such Scriptural trial.

Prerequisites to Ordinations

On motion, the following resolutions on the question of ordinations were adopted:

1. Resolved, That the General Council recommend that all candidates for ordination be first proved as licentiates, and only such as stand true and prove efficient, be ordained to the full ministry by any District Council.

2. Resolved, That the Credential Committee provide for the issuing of annual licenses to worthy candidates where this matter can not be attended to by a District Council or by a mature and well accredited assembly where there is no District Council.

3. Resolved, That we recommend no persons be ordained as missionaries. Persons *qualified* for the full ministry, whether called to the home work or the for-

eign field, should be ordained to the ministry. Those not qualified for the ministry should not be ordained, even though endorsed for the foreign field as workers.

Examinations and Time for Ordinations

The following resolutions were adopted:

1. Resolved, That this Council advises all district councils to have published a regular set time and place once or more each year at which, as a rule, ordinations shall be performed in said districts.

2. Resolved, That each district is advised to have a committee of three or more which, with a General Presbyter, shall carefully examine into the candidate's character, life, soundness of doctrine, Christian experience, ministerial ability and previous success; and that these should be found satisfactory before the district council proceed with the ordination.

3. Resolved, That in states and territories where there are no district councils, the candidate for ordination or for credentials shall associate himself with the nearest or most convenient district council and then take the matter up with that district.

A STATEMENT OF FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS APPROVED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD, October 2 to 7, 1916

According to our Constitution we have the right to approve of all Scriptural truth. The Bible is our all-sufficient rule for faith and practice. Hence this Statement of Fundamental Truths is not intended as a creed for the Church, nor as a basis of fellowship among Christians, but only as a basis of unity for the ministry alone (i. e., that we all speak the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Acts 2:42). The human phraseology employed in such statement is not inspired nor contended for, but the truth set forth in such phraseology is held to be essential to a full Gospel ministry. No claim is made that it contains all truth in the Bible, only that it covers our present needs as to these fundamental matters.

I. THE SCRIPTURES INSPIRED.

The Bible is the inspired Word of God, a revelation from God to man, the infallible rule of faith and con-

duct, and is superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason (2 Tim. 3:15, 16; 1 Pet. 2:2).

2. THE ONE TRUE GOD.

The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally self-existent, self-revealed "I AM;" and has further revealed Himself as embodying the principles of relationship and association, i. e., as Father, Son and Holy Ghost (Deut. 6:4; Mark 12:29; Isa. 43:10, 11; Matt. 28:19).

3. MAN, HIS FALL AND REDEMPTION.

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let us make man in Our image and in Our likeness." But man, by voluntary transgression, fell, and his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ the Son of God (Gen. 1:26-31; 3:1-7; Rom. 5:12-21).

4. THE SALVATION OF MAN.

(a) *Conditions to Salvation.*

The grace of God that brings salvation to all men has appeared through the preaching of repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ; whereupon man is saved by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, and, having been justified by grace through faith, he becomes an heir of God according to the hope of eternal life (Titus 2:11; Rom. 10:13-15; Luke 24:47; Titus 3:5-7).

(b) *The Evidences of Salvation.*

The *inward* evidence, to the believer of his salvation, is the direct witness of the Spirit (Rom. 8:16). The *outward* evidence to all men is a life of righteousness and true holiness (Luke 1:73-75; Titus 2:12-14); the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22); and brotherly love (John 13:35; Heb. 13:1; 1 John 3:14).

5. BAPTISM IN WATER.

The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an

outward symbol of cleansing while their heart has already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as an inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life (Matt. 28: 19; Acts 10:47, 48; Rom. 6:4; Acts 20:21; Heb. 10:22).

6. THE LORD'S SUPPER.

The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements, bread and the fruit of the vine, is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Cor. 11:26); and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Cor. 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers "until He comes."

7. THE PROMISE OF THE FATHER.

All believers are entitled to, and should ardently expect, and earnestly seek the promise of the Father, the baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church. With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; 1:8; 1 Cor. 12:1-31).

8. THE FULL CONSUMMATION OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY GHOST.

The full consummation of the baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is indicated by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterance (Acts 2:4). This wonderful experience is distinct from and subsequent to the experience of the new birth (Acts 10:44-46; 11; 14-16; 15:7-9). The speaking in tongues in this instance is the same in essence as the gift of tongues (1 Cor. 12:4-10, 28), but different in purpose and use.

9. ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION THE GOAL FOR ALL BELIEVERS.

The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy

Ghost we are able to obey the command, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Entire sanctification is the will of God for all believers, and should be earnestly pursued by walking in obedience to God's Word (Heb. 12:14; 1 Pet. 1:15, 16; 1 Thess. 5:23, 24; 1 John 2:6).

10. THE CHURCH A LIVING ORGANISM.

The Church is a living organism; a living body; yea the body of Christ; a habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission. Every true believer and every true local assembly are integral parts of the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, written in heaven (Eph. 1:22, 23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23).

11. THE MINISTRY AND EVANGELISM.

A divinely called and a Scripturally ordained ministry is the command of the Lord for the evangelization of the world and the chief concern of the Church (Mark 16:15-20; Eph. 4:11-13).

12. DIVINE HEALING.

Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the atonement, and is the privilege of all believers (Isa. 53:4, 5; Matt. 8:16, 17).

13. THE BLESSED HOPE.

The Resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ, the rapture of believers which are alive and remain, and the translation of the true church, this is the blessed hope set before all believers (1 Thess. 4:16, 17; Rom. 8:23; Titus 2:13).

14. THE IMMINENT COMING AND MILLENNIAL REIGN OF JESUS.

The premillennial and imminent coming of the Lord to gather His people unto Himself, and to judge the world in righteousness while reigning on the earth for a thousand years is the expectation of the true Church of Christ.

15. THE LAKE OF FIRE.

The devil and his angels, the beast and false prophet, and whosoever is not found written in the Book of Life, the fearful and unbelieving, and abominable, and mur-

derers and whomemongers, and sorcerers, and idolators and all liars shall be consigned to everlasting punishment in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death (Rev. 19: 20; Rev. 20: 10-15).
16. THE NEW HEAVENS AND NEW EARTH.

We look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness (2 Pet. 3: 13; Rev. 21 and 22).

ADDENDA:

THE ESSENTIALS AS TO THE GODHEAD.

(Being an explanation of Sec. 2 above.)

(a) *Terms Explained.*

The terms "Trinity" and "Persons," as related to the Godhead, while not found in the Scriptures, yet are words in harmony with Scripture, whereby we may convey to others our immediate understanding of the doctrine of Christ respecting the Being of God, as distinguished from "gods many and lords many." We, therefore, may speak with propriety of the Lord our God, who is One Lord, as a trinity or as one Being of three persons, and still be absolutely Scriptural. (Examples: Matt. 2: 6; 8: 16, 17; Acts 15: 15-18.)

(b) *Distinction and Relationship in the Godhead.*

Christ taught a distinction of Persons in the Godhead which He expressed in specific terms of relationship, as Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that this distinction and relationship, as to its existence, is an eternal fact, but as to its mode it is *inscrutable* and *incomprehensible*, because *unexplained*. (That is, it is not explained as to *how* there can be three persons in the Godhead.) (Luke 1: 35; 1 Cor. 1: 24; Matt. 11: 25-27; 28: 19; 2 Cor. 13: 14; 1 John 1: 3, 4.)

(c) *Unity of the One Being of Father, Son and Holy Ghost.*

Accordingly, therefore, there is *that* in the Father which constitutes Him *the Father* and not the Son; there is *that* in the Son which constitutes Him *the Son* and not the Father; and there is *that* in the Holy Ghost which constitutes Him *the Holy Ghost*

and not either the Father or the Son. Wherefore the Father is the Begetter, the Son is the Begotten; and the Holy Ghost is the one proceeding from the Father and the Son. Therefore, because these three eternally *distinct* and *related* Persons in the Godhead are in a state of *unity* and one in essence, there is but one Lord God Almighty and His name one (John 1:8; 15:26; 17:11, 21; Zech. 14:9).

(d) *Identity and Co-operation in the Godhead.*

The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost are never *identical* as to *Person*; nor *confused* as to *relation*; nor *divided* in respect of the Godhead; nor *opposed* as to *co-operation*. The Son is *in* the Father and the Father is *in* the Son as to relationship. The Son is *with* the Father and the Father is *with* the Son, as to fellowship. The Father is not *from* the Son, but the Son is *from* the Father, as to authority. The Holy Ghost is *from* the Father and the Son proceeding, as to nature, relationship, co-operation and authority. Hence, neither Person in the Godhead either exists or works separately or independently of the others (John 5:17-30).

(e) *The Title, Lord Jesus Christ.*

The appellation "Lord Jesus Christ" is a proper name. It is never applied, in the New Testament, either to the Father or to the Holy Ghost. It therefore belongs exclusively to the *Son of God* (Rom. 1:1-3, 7; 2 John 3).

(f) *The Lord Jesus Christ, God with us.*

The Lord Jesus Christ, as to His divine and eternal nature, is the proper and only Begotten of the Father; but as to His human nature, He is the proper Son of Man. He is, therefore, acknowledged to be both God and man; who, because He is God and man, is "Immanuel," God with us (Matt. 1:23; 1 John 4:2, 10, 14; Rev. 1:13, 14-17).

(g) *The Title, Son of God.*

Since the name "Immanuel" embraces both God and man in the one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ, it follows that the title, Son of God, describes His proper Deity, and the title, Son of Man, His proper

humanity. Therefore, the title, Son of God, belongs to the *order of eternity*, and the title, Son of Man, to the *order of time* (Matt. 1:23, 21; 2 John 3; 1 John 3:8; Heb. 7:3; 1:1-13).

(h) *Transgression of the Doctrine of Christ.*

Wherefore, it is a transgression of the Doctrine of Christ to say that Jesus Christ derived the title, Son of God, solely from the fact of the incarnation, or because of His relation to the economy of redemption. Therefore, to deny that the Father is a real and eternal Father, and that the Son is a real and eternal Son is a denial of the distinction and relationship in the Being of God; a denial of the Father and the Son; and a *displacement* of the truth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh (2 John 9; John 1:1, 2, 14, 18, 29, 49; 8:57, 58; 1 John 2:22, 23; 4:1-5; Heb. 12:3, 4).

(i) *Exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord.*

The Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, having by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; angels and principalities and powers having been made subject unto Him, and, having been made both Lord and Christ, He sent the Holy Ghost that we, in the name of Jesus, might bow our knees and confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father until the end, when the Son shall become subject to the Father that God may be all in all (Heb. 1:3; 1 Pet. 3:22; Acts 2:32-36; Rom. 14:11; 1 Cor. 15:24-28).

(j) *Equal Honor to the Father and the Son.*

Wherefore, since the Father has delivered all judgment unto the Son, it is not only the *express duty* of all things in heaven and in earth to bow the knee, but it is an *unspeakable joy* in the Holy Ghost to ascribe unto the Son all the attributes of Deity, and to give Him all the honor and the glory contained in all the names and titles of the Godhead (except those which express relationship. See paragraphs b, c and d), and thus honor the Son even as we honor the Father (John 5:22, 23; 1 Pet. 1:8; Rev. 5:6-14; Phil. 2:8, 9; Rev. 7:9, 10; 4:8-11).

Unity in the Ministry

Inasmuch as unity among ministers is dependent upon their speaking the same thing on all fundamental matters (1 Cor. 1:10), the Credential Committee is hereby instructed to ask each applicant of the ministry for Credentials, or for a Certificate of Fellowship whether he recognizes and accepts the truth in the Statement of Fundamentals to the extent that he will endeavor, with all lowliness and meekness and loving forbearance, to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ (Eph. 4:2, 3, 13).

This Committee is hereby instructed to issue credentials to those who agree, and to refuse to those who seriously disagree; and that in the case of minor disagreements, the committee is instructed to use its own discretion in the matter; and that in the case of violations of the agreement and the causing of trouble and division, they are instructed to deal with the case as directed in the item pertaining to Violations of Ministerial Courtesy.

Our Distinctive Testimony

The resolution was adopted as follows:

Resolved, That this Council considers it a serious disagreement with the Fundamentals for any minister among us to teach contrary to our distinctive testimony that the baptism of the Holy Spirit is regularly accompanied by the initial physical sign of speaking in other tongues as the Spirit of God gives the utterance, and that we consider it inconsistent and unscriptural for any minister to hold credentials with us who thus attacks as error our distinctive testimony.

Resolution on Baptismal Formula

Resolved, That since the words in Matt. 28:19 and the words in Acts 2:38 were both inspired of God, we hereby disapprove of contending for the one to the exclusion of or as against the other, because confusion and a party spirit are sure to follow such unscriptural con-

duct. This Council therefore recommends that all our preachers include in their formula used in connection with the act of baptism the words used by Jesus in Matt. 28:19.

Marriage and Divorce

The Resolution Committee recommended to the GENERAL COUNCIL that:

First. Whereas, There are now among Christian people those who became entangled in their marriage relations in their former lives of sin, and who do not now see how these matters can be adjusted, therefore we recommend that these cases be left in the hands of the Lord, and that they walk in the light as God lets it shine on their souls.

Second. Whereas, Low standards on marriage and divorce are very hurtful to individuals, to the family, and to the cause of Christ, therefore be it recommended that in the future we discourage divorce by all lawful means and teaching, and that we shall positively disapprove in the future of Christians getting divorce for any cause except for fornication or adultery (Matt. 19:9); and that we recommend the remaining single of all divorced Christians, and that they pray God so to keep them in purity and peace. (See 1 Cor. 7.)

Third. Whereas, Divorced and remarried persons in the ministry usually cause stumbling, reproach and division, whatever may have been the cause of divorce, therefore we advise and recommend our ministers and Assemblies in the future not to ordain to the full gospel ministry those who have remarried, and are now living in the state of matrimony, while former companions are living (Ezek. 44:22).

Fourth. And as a means of making the above more effective, we further advise our Pentecostal ministry not to perform a marriage ceremony between any believer and a divorced person whose former companion is still living. We also especially warn all our people that unions made in the future and in the face of this warning between any of our ministers and such divorced persons will effect the standing of both the minister who

performs the ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, and also that of the minister entering into such union, whether man or woman, and no matter on which side the divorce lies (1921).

Support of the General Council Office

The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The work of the General Council in its definite program of development of the spirit of co-operation and fellowship in home and foreign fields will incur considerable expense during the coming year, including financial support of the Chairman, Assistant Chairman, and Secretary, and such other help as may be needed, in maintaining headquarters, stationery, postage, traveling expenses, etc.;

Resolved, That every minister in the fellowship be requested to contribute from his tithes or as an offering, or through his influence, the sum of one dollar per month. And further, looking towards the increased efficiency of the General Council throughout the entire field, all who can contribute more, personally or through their assemblies, than the suggested amount, are hereby strongly urged to do so. If practicable, let each assembly take one offering each year for the upkeep of the General Council office and traveling expenses.

Auditing the Accounts

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That we hereby direct the Executive Secretary to have the books of the General Council office, Missionary Department and Publishing House audited each year.

Paying Tithes

Resolved, That this Council hereby urges all its ministers to teach their people the duty of paying tithes to God, and to turn them over regularly as much as is needed to the support of their local ministry; and any surplus, or where there is no local ministry, to their respective headquarters, for the spread of the Gospel throughout the world. According to the Scriptures, tithes are to go to the support of the active ministry, and not to charity and other purposes. All ministers should practice what they preach.

Publishing Interests

The oldest paper in the movement was the free paper called *The Apostolic Faith*, published in Houston, Texas. About 1911 Bro. E. N. Bell was made editor of this paper, and it was moved to Malvern, Ark., where it was later united with another paper from Nashville, Tenn., as the *WORD AND WITNESS*. This paper had a circulation of 25,000 when it became the official organ of the General Council, organized at Hot Springs, Ark., in April, 1914. This was the nucleus of the publishing interests of the Council.

In the summer of that same year the *Christian Evangel* also became the property of the General Council, and the Gospel Publishing House became the name of the publishing branch of the Council, printing both papers. At the Council in Chicago in the fall of 1914, it was ordered that the publishing interests be moved to St. Louis, and a printing plant established. That Council also asked that Sunday School literature be published as soon as possible. In the 1916 Council the following resolution was passed to supercede all other directions about the publishing business:

Resolved, That the Gospel Publishing House, with all its interests, including all papers and periodicals, be and is hereby committed permanently into the hands of the Executive Presbytery to supervise and direct, also to appoint such help as is needed personally to conduct the same.

Circulation of Good Literature

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, In view of the great need of spreading the Gospel to all men everywhere, that Pentecostal preachers and laymen distribute freely in all depots, jails and public places our Pentecostal Evangel and other good Pentecostal literature; and that the various assemblies be recommended to subscribe for the Evangel to go into the Public Libraries in their cities, and all other places where permitted.

Resolution on Publications

Whereas, It is deemed advisable to safeguard the

Publishing House from matter for publication that is undesirable,

Resolved, That all matter offered for publication, and to bear the imprint of the Gospel Publishing House, which contains doctrines that in the judgment of the staff at Headquarters are seriously questionable, shall be submitted to a Committee on Publications, composed of five men, three of whom shall be outside the staff at Headquarters, for investigation and approval, such committee to be elected by the Council, and such books to receive the approval of at least a majority of this Committee before being published with the Gospel Publishing House imprint on them.

The above resolution was adopted, and the following committee was elected: J. W. Welch, Wm. M. Faux, D. W. Kerr, Joseph Tunmore and J. N. Gortner.

It was moved and carried that all books and pamphlets that have already been published with the imprint of the Gospel Publishing House on them which cover doctrinal matters, and to which objection has been or shall be raised, shall also be referred to this Committee on Publications.

Foreign Missionary Work

Resolved, That this Council exert all its powers to promote the evangelization of heathen lands according to New Testament methods, viz.:

First. In the proper testing of those who claim to be called to foreign work (Rev. 2:2; Acts 13:1-4).

- A. As to a personal experience of full New Testament salvation.
- B. As to a definite call to foreign work.
- C. As to physical, mental and spiritual fitness for work.
- D. As to Christian standing, being first endorsed by their local assemblies.

Second. In the proper supporting and supervising of those approved.

- A. Every assembly ought to have a definite part in it, either sending and maintaining one or more missionaries of its own, or sharing the burden

of one of more missionaries with one or more other assemblies.

- B. Missionaries receiving the baptism on the field ought to be brought in touch with and supported by the assemblies having no missionaries of their own.

Third. Missionaries home on furlough should be maintained and supervised by the Foreign Missions Committee the same as while on the field. Every opportunity should be afforded them to present the needs of their field and of mission work in general, not only to their own assemblies, but the Assemblies of God everywhere.

Re-affirmation of Missionary Resolution

Whereas, The Foreign Missionary work of the General Council is calling for immediate attention and consideration to meet the demands of the hour occasioned by changed world conditions and the growth of our missionary activities, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Council re-affirm its declaration as stated under item entitled "Foreign Missionary Work," on page 21 of the Combined Minutes of the General Council for 1920

Establishment of a Missionary Department

Resolved, That we hereby establish a distinct Missionary Department under the supervision of the Executive Presbytery, which Presbytery shall constitute the Foreign Missions Committee, and direct that all of the missionary interests of the General Council be co-ordinated into it.

Be it further Resolved, That a fund be provided to meet the expenses of such department, and that a Missionary Secretary and Missionary Treasurer be elected to conduct this department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

Expense Fund

Further, Recognizing the many expenses entailed in the maintenance of a forward missionary policy, that this Council recommends that all assemblies and individuals, when sending in missionary offerings, send addi-

tional contributions for the support of the Missionary Department.

Monthly Missionary Offerings

Whereas, Our blessed Master said to His disciples, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature," we believe it is alike our privilege and our duty to assist in every practical effort to get the full Pentecostal message to the uttermost ends of the earth. Therefore be it

Resolved, That this Council heartily recommends that every local Pentecostal assembly take up a monthly offering for our Pentecostal missionaries who are faithfully laboring to preach the Gospel "to every creature."

Distribution of Missionary Funds

Resolved, That the undesignated funds sent to the Missionary Treasurer of the General Council should be sent to those who have received the endorsement of the General Council and who are in harmony with the Fundamental Truths for which this Council stands.

All funds assigned to particular persons will be forwarded by the treasurer exactly as directed.

Co-operation for Missionary Work

The Resolution Committee presented the following resolution for consideration, which was adopted:

Whereas, In the providence of God there have sprung up spontaneously in this movement throughout the country, Pentecostal centers; and whereas, these places have gathered about them a constituency by the publication of periodicals for the dissemination of Pentecostal truths; and whereas, in consequence moneys for missionary purposes are being sent to these several centers and distributed upon the missionary field, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Presbytery be instructed to seek to bring about a more perfect co-operation among these centers, in the matter of distribution of missionary funds, and the sending out of missionaries, with a view to greater efficiency in each of these various centers.

Endorsement of Missionaries

Resolved, That all missionaries going out to the foreign field who desire the endorsement of this General Council and its aid, by having it divide among them the

undesignated funds coming into our hands, shall report to the Missionary Committee and receive its approval before leaving this country. Otherwise this Council will assume no responsibility for their going out or for their support after arrival upon the field. That in all cases where there are representative Pentecostal missionaries on the field who do not seek such approval, we will nevertheless gladly forward to them all funds coming into our hands designated for them.

Renewal of Fellowship Certificates

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Credential Committee be instructed to renew the Fellowship Certificates of all foreign missionaries on the field in good standing on or before the first of the year without cost to the missionaries.

The New Policy of the Foreign Missions Dept.

Whereas, The General Council of the Assemblies of God has purposed to obey the great commission of Mark 16: 15 and Matt. 28: 18-20, and to co-operate with Christ for the evangelization of the world through its Foreign Missions Department, and

Whereas, The General Council has put itself on record as being ready to follow the New Testament methods in the conduct of its work in foreign lands, and

Whereas, It is incumbent upon the General Council to make provision for the proper care and support of its missionaries both on the field and while home on furlough; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Foreign Missions Department (which consists of the Foreign Missions Committee and the missionary personnel) be guided by the following New Testament practices:

First. The missionary work of the Council shall be on the "Co-operative faith" basis, viz., the missionaries, the Foreign Missions Committee and the home constituency shall look to God together to supply the needs of the work. Publicity will be given to the needs of the field through the printed page and by word of mouth, leaving the results with God. Furthermore, the work at home and abroad shall be conducted on a cash basis.

Debts will not be incurred, and work shall be undertaken only as funds are available for the need.

Second. The Pauline example will be followed so far as possible, by seeking out neglected regions where the Gospel has not yet been preached, lest we build upon another's foundation (Rom. 15:20).

Third. It shall be our purpose to seek to establish self-supporting, self-propagating and self-governing native churches.

Fourth. The system of supporting missions and missionaries shall be based on the principle outlined in Acts 4:34, 35, which principle found favor by the apostles and was put into operation by the early church in caring for its poor. This system is based on the principle of a common fund, placed in the hands of a committee for distribution among those who are eligible, according to the needs.

(This system presupposes that all interested ones make a report of their needs to the committee, who shall act on the information given to them and make distribution insofar as funds in hand will justify.)

A. A proper distribution of funds may be made according to an understanding had between the missionaries on the field and the Foreign Missions Committee.

It is recommended that the District Councils on the foreign field shall agree on a budget of expense based on the personal needs of all the missionaries, the mission station expenses, and the expenses of native workers in that district, and a report of the same be made by the District Council to the Foreign Missions Committee who shall be governed by this report in making an equitable distribution of funds insofar as funds in hands will justify. Where there are no District Councils, it will be necessary for the missionary to communicate directly with the Foreign Missions Committee giving these facts and looking toward an agreement on the expenses of the work and for provision to meet the needs.

B. Where assemblies or individuals have assumed the support of missionaries, native work-

ers or mission station expenses, and offerings are sent to the Missionary Treasurer designated for particular purposes, the Missionary Treasurer will disburse these funds just as designated, taking these designated offerings into account in the general distribution of missionary funds.

C. Appeals for special offerings to meet special needs shall be made in agreement with the District Councils on the foreign field and the Foreign Missions Committee.

D. Missionaries home on furlough shall share in the distribution of missionary funds according to their needs so long as the circumstances shall justify in the judgment of the Foreign Missions Committee.

E. The Foreign Missions Committee shall cooperate with the missionaries home on furlough in working out a plan for handling offerings which may be given to the missionaries for the work, whether designated or undesignated. Provision shall be made for outfits and fares of returning missionaries through agreement between the missionary and the Foreign Missions Committee, as circumstances may warrant.

F. Prospective missionaries will be expected to exercise faith in God to provide their outfit and fare to the field so far as practicable.

(Recommendation from Combined Minutes, Page 25, Par. 13, which recommendation was made by the missionaries at the Missionary Conference in 1919 and adopted by the Council.) "Resolved, That we heartily recommend that funds received by prospective missionaries which are intended for outfit, passage or expenses while on the field, should be deposited with the Missionary Treasurer or other responsible agency, and should such prospective missionary be prevented from going forward to the field, for any reason, such funds shall be either returned to the parties from whom received, if desired by them, or made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes."

G. The spirit of confidence in one another, of co-operation and sacrifice should be in the hearts of all concerned in order that God's blessing may rest upon the entire system of handling missionary offerings.

Fifth. If funds are needed for the support of native workers, special arrangements should be made to meet these needs between the District Council on the field and the Foreign Missions Committee. Should there be no District Councils on certain fields, the special arrangements must be made between senior missionaries and the Foreign Missions Committee. No offerings for the support of native workers shall be sent direct to the natives, but to the missionaries in charge of the station. The native workers should receive a call from God for the work, just as do the missionaries who go from the home base. When necessary, the training of these native workers should include industrial or agricultural work so that they will not look to the missionaries for their support, nor be actuated by the love of money in their choice of Christian service. All native workers should be moved alone by a direct call from God and a burning desire to bring Christ to their own people.

Sixth. The Foreign Missions Committee shall define proper standards for the training and testing of candidates as to their call and qualifications for foreign service, as the needs of the work shall require.

Whereas, The above policy will of necessity require some adjustment of existing conditions in order to bring it into operation, it is understood that in the carrying out of the above policy, it shall be considered by the Foreign Missions Committee as the ideal toward which we are working, and all missionaries should have this policy fully explained to them and should be invited to co-operate with the Foreign Missions Committee of the General Council in carrying it out:

A. By first accepting the policy as Scriptural and proper.

B. By concerted action gradually working toward placing the ideal into operation.

Work that has already been established which does

not fit in with the new policy, may not be well overthrown and abandoned, but all new problems and plans for development would be considered in the light of the new policy. Co-operation will be the keyword, and much can be gained by working out together a complete survey of the situation and prospective lines of development.

Co-operation in Missionary Work Defined

1. Resolved, That all missionaries who desire the endorsement of the General Council should make application for an appointment certificate, provided they already hold credentials from the General Council; and that those not holding credentials may make application for the same and for appointment certificate.

2. Resolved, That all missionaries making application for credentials and appointment certificates shall be expected to subscribe to the Statement of Fundamental Truths approved by the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

3. Resolved, That each missionary be requested to file with the Foreign Missions Committee a full statement regarding their work, e. g., concerning their families and accommodations, period of service, language qualifications, nature of the work engaged in, prospects of the field, present number of recognized adherents—Christian and non-Christian—etc., etc.

4. Resolved, That it be urged upon the Foreign Missions Committee the necessity of insisting upon two full years of language study, if necessary, before taking up the full active work; and that courses of study with examinations be arranged for by an advisory committee on each field. No missionaries should fail to get the language during the first term out on the field. If he does fail, his fitness for a second term may be questioned.

5. Resolved, That in order to facilitate the equitable distribution of funds, each missionary be requested to furnish such quarterly financial reports as will enable the Foreign Missions Committee to understand the needs of their respective stations with a view to intelligent and hearty co-operation.

6. Resolved, That we recommend that the Pentecostal missionaries in the several distinct foreign districts come together in co-operation according to our liberal constitution and establish District Councils in co-operative relationship with the General Council of the Assemblies of God. We recommend that officers be elected who are in full sympathy with the Fundamental Truths for which this Council stands, and who have the endorsement of the Council. That the election of these officers be referred to the Executive Presbytery for ratification. After approval the Chairmen of the District Councils shall be recognized as associate members of the General Presbytery.

7. Resolved, That advisory committees, or District Council officers on the respective fields, shall determine and report to the Missionary Department of the Council what in their estimation constitutes a proper term of service.

8. Resolved, That in the matter of providing funds for missionary homes, stations, schools, and such like, adequate and proper safeguards, such as complying with the laws of the respective countries for the legal holding of property, and such as establishing and maintaining a proper relationship between these missionary projects and the General Council, be made first before Council funds are made available for same.

9. Resolved further, That all missionary property purchased with missionary funds should be transferred, where legally possible, to the General Council; and where not legally possible, a District Council or local corporation be formed in affiliation with the General Council, in accordance with the laws of the country in question, to hold such property in perpetual trust for missionary purposes. The General Council does not approve of any property, bought with funds received from the public, being held as a personal possession, or in one's own name, either on the home or foreign field.

10. Whereas, There is, and has been for sometime, a great demand from the missionaries for a deputation from the homeland to visit the various fields, and

Whereas, We recognize this as a real need in order

to a fuller understanding of missionary conditions and problems, and for the encouragement and assistance of missionaries on the field, therefore be it

Resolved, That we authorize the Executive Presbytery, as soon as practicable, to arrange such deputation, consisting of one or two suitable men for this work, and that when such deputation has been appointed, the Missionary Treasurer shall be authorized to place the names of such appointees upon the list of endorsed missionaries to receive a share in the monthly distribution of missionary funds. (The purpose of this motion is to secure through a practical missionary representative an unbiased report of the conditions and opportunities, to set missionary centers in order where needed, give instruction, and encourage and support the ministry and constituency abroad.)

11. Resolved, That missionaries at home keep the Foreign Missions Committee informed as to all moneys received and all moneys forwarded by them to the foreign fields.

12. Resolved, That wherever possible the Foreign Missions Committee be advised to recognize mission centers at various points and ports of entry as receiving homes.

The following resolution was recommended by the missionaries themselves in their independent conference, and passed by the Council at their request:

13. Resolved, That we hereby recommend that funds received by prospective missionaries which are intended for outfit, passage or expenses while on the field, should be deposited with the Missionary Treasurer or other responsible agency, and should such prospective missionary be prevented from going forward to the field, for any reason, such funds shall be either returned to the parties from whom received, if desired by them, or made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes.

Maintenance of Missionary Stations

Resolved, That all missionaries planning to return to the home field co-operate with the Missionary Department, where there is not a District Council on their field, in making arrangements for a supply to take charge of

their work or station, and that they co-operate with the Missionary Department to secure and forward funds for the maintenance of such work or station during their absence.

Missionary Itineraries

Whereas, Promiscuous and independent itineraries by returned or prospective missionaries often take them over the same ground and to the same assemblies at close intervals, thus burdening some and neglecting others, and

Whereas, We desire the development of every place in the entire home field on missionary lines, therefore be it

Resolved, That we discourage these promiscuous and independent itineraries, and that we recommend co-operation with the Missionary Department in *systematic* itineraries through the District Councils where such exist, otherwise through various representative men on the field. (The idea is that the Missionary Secretary aid the missionaries in such arrangements.)

Permanent Missionary Work

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That we, as representatives of the Assemblies of God and of the saints in the homeland, hereby disapprove of all floating missionary efforts, of all aimless traveling from place to place, and from station to station, instead of settling down to learn the language and opening up stations and doing permanent missionary work.

Resolved, further, That in fields where there are already Pentecostal missionaries on stations, that consultation be had with the brethren on the field and the Missionary Department, and a satisfactory place be agreed on before opening up new stations in those regions.

Resolved, further, That hereafter women missionaries be advised not to travel alone in going to or from the field; and when going out for the first time, that they and their work be under the supervision of the older and more experienced missionaries on the field.

Missionary Schools

Resolved, That the General Council hereby directs the Missionary Committee to take under advisement the establishment of schools for the education of duly accredited Native Workers, in the various fields where practicable, also schools for the education of the young children of missionaries where possible.

Mexican Missions

Whereas, There is already a blessed and prosperous work among the Mexicans along the Mexican border, and

Whereas, There are quite a number of approved missionaries who are giving their entire time to this work, therefore be it

Resolved, That a special fund be created by appeal from the Missionary Department through the Pentecostal papers for the support of this Mexican work, and that a proportionate share of the undesignated funds be available for this work, at the discretion of the Missionary Committee..

Missionary Rest Home

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Council hereby approves and ratifies the action of the General Presbytery in providing for, through the officers of the General Council, a Missionary Rest Home in Chicago, and that we provide for the election of a Committee of Management.

And further, That a committee be appointed to formulate a general policy for the government of the Rest Home, this policy to be subject to the approval of the Council.

Committee of Management and Policy for Home

Resolved, That the Executive Presbytery be delegated to appoint the local committee of management, and also be the committee to formulate a policy for this Home.

Further, That they submit this policy, when formulated, to the General Council.

Resolution on Home Missions

Whereas, There exists among us a strong conviction that a beginning should be made, looking toward

the speedy evangelization of the neglected places in the Home Field, therefore be it

Resolved, That all well organized districts capable of a Home Missionary program shall be left to the District Councils to care for, and that all other territory be considered as Home Missionary fields.

Section 1. We suggest to the well organized districts that some definite plan for raising and distributing Home Missionary funds be devised at the next regular meeting to which all associated ministers can agree after a careful survey of the field.

(a) That a fund be established and placed in the hands of the District Presbytery to be disbursed according to the plan agreed upon.

(b) That the plan of the District Council in its Home Missionary work include an agreement with all missionaries employed as to the place of effort, the time of its beginning, the amount of funds to cover expenses for the first month, and succeeding months; also as to the reports from the missionaries to the District Presbytery with a view to maintaining proper co-operation and oversight in the work.

Sec. 2. In the matter of providing for the Home Missionary Field, that there be established in the General Council a Home Missionary feature under the supervision of the existing Missionary Committee.

(a) That a fund be created through appeals in the Evangel and plans agreed upon for offerings to be made by the assemblies and individuals; funds to be distributed as authorized by the Missionary Committee on the same 100 per cent basis as is done in the case of Foreign Missions.

Sec. 3. Further, the Missionary Committee is instructed to perfect a plan for providing workers for the Home Missionary field and for the disbursement of funds for the Home Missionary Department, upon an understanding previously made with workers similar to those suggested to the District Councils.

Sec. 4. In districts now or at any time to be organized where the District Council is not sufficiently

strong to meet the needs of an unoccupied territory, such District Council may officially appeal for help to the Home Missionary Department for assistance, providing such assistance be rendered according to funds in hand and at the discretion of the Missionary Committee, who should consider all appeals upon their merits. Such Home Missionary work done in organized fields should be done in accord with the plans of the Home Missionary Department, the District Council co-operating. Applications for help from such territories are to be made by District Council officers and not by individuals.

Sec. 5. In the matter of taking offerings, the Committee suggests, where no better plan is provided, that there be set out three baskets. The first to receive offerings for Foreign Missions, with the understanding that special emphasis is to be given this item of the offering. The second basket to be for Home Missions. The third basket to represent the expense fund of the whole Missionary Department, both Home and Foreign. Simply give God a chance by placing all three interests regularly before the saints, and leave it to the Lord as to what they shall put in each basket.

The Committee worked out the following plan:

Home Missionary Plan

First. Work will be undertaken only as funds are available.

Second. The choice of fields for operation shall be made by the Missionary Committee after all available information is in hand.

Third. Only such persons as have been approved and appointed by the Missionary Committee will be listed as home missionary evangelists.

Fourth. All Home Missionary work shall be under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

Fifth. Missionary evangelists will be expected to remain on the field until the work is established and its care provided for.

Sixth. Each community where work is undertaken will be encouraged to help support the workers from the beginning and the new assembly will be expected to assume its entire self-support as soon as able to do so.

Seventh. As soon as possible each community evangelized will be given an opportunity to make an offering to replace the fund expended on its evangelization for the purpose of evangelizing another new field.

Recognition of Our Relationship in the Body

Whereas, The Scriptures teach that we are all in one Spirit baptized into one body; and whereas, because of this fact, we are already organically, co-operatively, and sympathetically related one to another; and whereas, there seems to be everywhere a prevailing lack in the understanding of these principles, therefore be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby recommends to all our ministers that they give definite and repeated instructions on the necessity of *recognizing* these already existing principles as set forth in Paul's teaching in 1 Cor. 12: 12-27, etc., and urge them to a faithful adherence to the same in all their relations one to another in the body of Christ.

Fellowship and Co-operation

Resolved, That we again declare our Christian fellowship with every true child of God, and that we stand ready also to co-operate with all Christians who stand for our Fundamental teachings.

Resolved, further, That the officers of this Council and of our Publishing House are hereby directed to heartily co-operate with all such who will also really co-operate with us.

Co-operative Relationships

Resolved, That this General Council recommend to the Executive Presbytery that they proceed to formulate suggestive plans to be presented to the officers of the various District Councils and General Presbyters, where District Councils do not exist, clearly defining co-operative relationships, that there may be a uniformity in the matter of setting churches in order, and an understanding of the relationships that exist in the local assembly, its officers and pastor, and between the local assemblies and District and General Councils.

Safeguarding the Assemblies

On motion, the following resolution presented by the Eastern District Council was adopted:

Whereas, It is known that many unreliable and unsafe teachers and preachers go about seeking entrance into assemblies without any recommendation, be it

Resolved, That all pastors, workers and leaders of Assemblies make proper investigation regarding such not known to them, and that the platform be denied strangers until proper recommendations be forthcoming.

Futhermore, be it resolved, That the advice and counsel of the District Presbyter be sought in such cases, and in all matters of importance when at all possible, and that pastors and presbyters notify each other, reciprocally, as to such persons when any unreliability becomes manifest.

Recommendation to Local Assemblies

Resolved, That the General Council recommends to all local assemblies that they seek to establish a well-ordered assembly and to maintain Bible order and Bible government. They should be set in order and proper records kept of all business meetings.

A Co-operative Evangelism

As a Council, we hereby express our gratitude to God for His great blessing upon the movement in the past. We are grateful to Him for the results attending this forward movement, and we commit ourselves and the movement to Him for the greatest evangelism that the world has ever seen. We pledge our hearty co-operation, prayers and help to this end.

Field Work

Resolved, That this Council shall encourage a series of Bible and Missionary Conferences in various centers throughout the country, and that the Chairman shall be Office Superintendent of this field work. He shall have the right to appeal to any presbyter, evangelist, teacher, missionary or other minister to aid in the conduct of such work.

Bible Schools

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Executive Presbytery is hereby authorized to take under advisement the matter of encouraging Bible Schools for young preachers in various

parts of the country; that they take such steps in this direction as to time and places as in their power and judgment are practicable.

Bible Study and Convention Lectures

On motion, the matter of Bible Schools was referred to the General Presbytery, who brought forth the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, There is a great famine in the land for the Word of God and a great need that the people of God should be fed with knowledge and understanding of the Scripture by those who are placed over them in the Lord; therefore,

Resolved, That we encourage our people as a whole, and our young people especially, to attend faithfully to a diligent search of the Scriptures, and if possible to attend some properly and Scripturally accredited Bible Training School; and further,

Resolved, That in all our public gatherings, camp meetings, and conventions, we give to the Bible its due place, and that provision be made by those in charge, for the fullest exercise of the gift of teaching by those who are specially called and qualified thereto; and be it further

Resolved, That we encourage "Ten-Day Bible Conferences," or "Itinerary Bible Schools," to be held in different sections of a given district, in which due attention shall be given to evangelistic work for the unsaved, and solid Scriptural teaching for the saints.

Sunday Schools

A resolution also passed recommending to the Executive Presbytery that they do their best to make provision for, and stimulate interest in Sunday Schools for the children and young people in our midst.

Against Setting a Time for the Lord's Return

Resolved, That it is unwise to teach that the Lord will come at some specified time, thereby setting a date for His appearing; and also, that it is unwise to give out from the platform, or publish visions of numbers and dates fixing the time of the second coming of the Lord.

Heresies Disapproved

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Council hereby disapproves of the "Seventh Day" teaching, also of the extreme so-called "Eternal Security" teaching, and of a teaching known as the "Fourth Blessing of Perfection."

Meats

The Conference Committee recommended that whereas the pressing of the question of eating, or not eating meats, is causing divisions in some of the Assemblies, that the General Council recommend their disapproval of such extreme positions on this question which cause these divisions, and that we recognize the right of each individual conscience in this matter, according to Col. 2: 14-17.

Resolution Concerning the Attitude of the General Council of the Assemblies of God toward Any Military Service which Involves the Actual Participation in the Destruction of Human Life

While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

Whereas, In the Constitutional Resolution adopted at the Hot Springs General Council, April 1-10, 1914, we plainly declare the Holy Inspired Scriptures to be the all-sufficient rule of faith and practice, and

Whereas, The Scriptures deal plainly with the obligations and relations of humanity, setting forth the principles of "Peace on earth, good will toward men" (Luke 2: 14); and,

Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12: 14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Ex. 20: 13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5: 39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5: 44), etc., and

Whereas, These and other scriptures have always

been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life;

Therefore, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we can not conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith.

Expression of Loyalty to the Government.

Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our Government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith.

MINUTES OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL HELD AT ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI, SEPTEMBER 13 TO 18, 1923

The tenth session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God convened at 9 a. m., Sept. 13, 1923, in the Salem Methodist Church, St. Louis, Mo. Elder D. W. Kerr had charge of the first devotional hour. As Chairman of the Program Committee he announced what would be the plan of the meetings during the Council sessions.

Thursday Morning

At 10 a. m. Acting Chairman Elder J. W. Welch gave his opening address. He stated that there had been a healthy growth in the Council fellowship and that whereas in 1921 there were 937 ministers in fellowship with the Council in the homeland, today there are 1085 ministers having Council endorsement. In 1921 we had 234 foreign missionaries on our Council list, and in 1923 we have 222.

The Chairman made the following financial report:

In submitting this report of General Council finances I am following the custom of former years.

In the list of assets appears a very conservative valuation upon the property owned by the General Council without including the Bible School grounds and partially completed buildings thereon.

Under the item "Other Assets" is included an equity in the lot upon which stands the local Church at Springfield. This will be transferred to the local assembly in the near future and the General Council treasury increased to the amount due.

Under expenditures, allowances is the largest item, amounting to \$5676 for the two years, which includes salary of office help. Included under this general heading is the amount appropriated to pay Brother Bell's funeral expenses.

An appropriation from the balance shown has already been made to the Bible School fund by the Executive Presbytery.

In comparison with report of two years ago, it is to be seen that the assets have increased from \$31,569.47 to \$52,432.60, showing a growth of \$20,863.13. Report of the Missionary Treasurer For Two Years Ending Sept. 1, 1923.

The Missionary Secretary-Treasurer brought in the following financial report:

The two years which have just ended have shown both a decrease and an increase in missionary giving. During 1922, many of the missionary societies were compelled to recall workers, and to close mission stations on account of the shortage of funds, but the Assemblies of God was enabled to go straight on with its work and no stations were closed or workers recalled, although the work has been greatly hindered for lack of sufficient means to do effective work. The total offerings received for home and foreign missions during the year of 1921 amounted to \$107,953.55. The total for the year 1922 was \$104,205.70, the decrease only amounting to $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, for which we were very grateful. These offerings were received for the following purposes:

The year ending September 1, 1923, however, has shown a marked increase of 37 1-3 per cent over 1922, the total offerings received for all purposes amounting to:

The increased offerings have helped greatly in enabling us to make a distribution of funds on a more even basis and more nearly covering the needs of the missionaries. There is still vast room for im-

provement, however, and we cannot feel we have reached the goal until we are able to send at least \$40.00 per month to each missionary, \$15.00 per month to each missionary's child for personal support, in addition to the special needs for upkeep of mission stations, rents, native workers, etc., which oftentimes amount to more than the amount needed for the personal support of the missionary.

There is still a practice of sending offerings direct to the field by some assemblies instead of sending to the Missionary Treasurer for distribution. In addition, there are considerable offerings which are taken up in assemblies and handed to visiting missionaries. There is no way of knowing the total amount of such offerings, but a number of assemblies have made report of the amounts given to visiting missionaries or sent direct to the field as follows:

Until February of this year, the Detroit, Mich., assembly preferred to send direct to the field, but since that date, they have taken advantage of the opportunity to use the Foreign Missions Department for the distribution of their missionary funds. Brother Ulrich, of Milwaukee, Wis., who has quite a ministry among our German brethren, makes his own distribution of funds, and the amount reported to the missionary treasurer this year by him was \$2,893.21. Last year he reported about \$800.00. Credit has been given to all the assemblies sending funds direct to the field on the books of the Missionary Treasurer, and a report of the amount sent has been published in the Pentecostal Evangel.

An Analysis

From year to year, it has been found profitable to give an analysis of missionary offerings received with a view to the encouragement of our assemblies in various parts of the country. The records of the Missionary Treasurer reveal some interesting information.

For the year of 1922, nineteen states sent the Missionary Treasurer over \$1,000, and six of them yielded

over \$5,000 each. The offerings from these six states represent 60 per cent of the total received by the treasurer.

For the year of 1923, four additional states were added to the \$1,000 class, and seven states yielded over \$5,000 each. The offerings from these seven states represent 65 per cent of the total received by the treasurer.

The remaining twenty-five states yielded less than \$1,000 each, in the following order: Wisconsin, Louisiana, Tennessee, Alabama, Florida, New Hampshire; (the remainder less than \$500 each), Kentucky, Geor-

gia, Mississippi, Virginia, South Dakota, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Arizona, District of Columbia; (the balance less than \$100 each), Nevada, North Carolina, Maine, Rhode Island, Wyoming, South Carolina, Utah, Vermont, Delaware.

The offerings from Canada amounted to \$912.69 for 1922 and \$1,660.89 for 1923. Most of the Canadian offerings pass through the hands of R. E. McAlister, Treasurer, 740 Queen's Ave., London, Ontario.

A number of offerings were received from Great Britain and other foreign lands during both years, the total for 1922 amounting to \$1,084.31, and for 1923 the total was \$2,110.93.

The state sending the largest amount direct to the field, the amounts being reported to the Missionary Treasurer only, was Ohio. The total sent direct to the field or handed to visiting missionaries was \$5,341.08. Michigan reported \$2,766.25 sent direct and New York \$1,140.30. This was for the year 1923. Similar amounts were given directly to missionaries during 1922.

A Home Missions Suggestion

The above report of the Missionary Treasurer should provide food for thought to those who have home missions on their hearts. Surely the states that have yielded less than \$1,000 for foreign missions during a whole year, furnish plenty of fruitful opportunities for undertaking home missionary work. As home missionary work is undertaken, and the people imbibe the spirit of missions, offerings will naturally increase for our foreign missions program, and therefore home missions should receive special emphasis until every need is fully supplied in our foreign mission work.

Missionary Department Expense Fund

Ever since the formation of a distinct Missionary Department of the Council, the development of the Department has been hindered through lack of sufficient funds for meeting the needs of the home office.

The 100 per cent policy has been rigidly adhered to in the disbursement of missionary offerings, not one penny having ever been appropriated for postage or the many other needs of the work incidental to handling of the funds. Work has been undertaken by the department as the offerings specially designated for the expense fund would permit.

For a time the entire work of the home office was carried by the Treasurer alone. Finally it was considered to be safe to employ an assistant, who was badly needed. For the past three and a half years the department has been carried on by these two persons, although there was great need for four or more in the office. When the magnitude of the work is considered, the large number of fields we are developing, the large number of missionaries who must be provided for, the purchase of goods to be shipped to missionaries, arrangement for passage to and from the fields, editorial work on the Evangel, etc., the marvel is that the work has been carried on as well as it has been. Few of us have considered the fact that we have developed the equivalent of a \$150,000.00 a year business, with three hundred agencies located on forty different fields. Such a business cannot be efficiently managed with the small office force found in the Missionary Treasurer's office.

But God has been gracious, and the actual needs of the treasurer and his family, his assistant, the postal and cable bills, and a hundred and other necessary things, have been met. The report of offerings for expenses of the Missionary Department for the past two years is as follows:

Offerings for 1922.....	\$4,026.86
Offerings for 1923.....	\$4,405.88

The offerings for 1922 amounted to 35-6 per cent of the total missionary offerings handled, and the offerings for 1923 amounted to 3 per cent. For the office to be conducted efficiently and sufficient help to

be employed, the offerings for expenses of Missionary Department should not have been less than 6 to 8 per cent.

An examination of the offerings received daily shows that not more than one in eight or ten include an offering for expenses and therefore the burden of carrying the expense of the Missionary Department is borne by the few who make donations of more than 5 per cent, often sending special offerings in order to keep the home office running.

It is sincerely hoped that during the coming year some provision will be found for increasing the offerings for expense of conducting the Missionary Department so that the home office can be conducted more efficiently and the needs of the office more fully met.

The above report is respectfully submitted to the tenth General Council of the Assemblies of God.

Thursday Afternoon

Report by the Editor of the Evangel

The Editor of the Evangel made the following report of the publications of the Gospel Publishing House:

Pentecostal Evangel

We are now printing 19,000 copies of the Pentecostal Evangel, having on our list the names of 17,188 paid-up subscribers. Some of these subscribers receive bundles for distribution. Although at times, after a subscription drive at a special cut rate, our list has been larger than it is today, we have had a substantial list of fully paid subscribers.

Sunday School Literature

We are now printing 24,000 quarterlies for adult scholars, 11,500 for the intermediates, and 14,000 for the juniors. Two years ago we brought out two quarterlies only and the combined circulation was only 26,000. We are also printing 11,000 sets of lesson leaves as against 7,800 two years ago. The circulation of the quarterlies and leaflets together has increased in two years from 33,800 to 60,500. In addition to this we are supplying 17,000 sets of cards for the primary children. We are thus supplying Pentecostal Sunday School literature for 77,500 scholars.

Our Papers for the Children

Two years ago we had one paper and the circulation of the same was 5,000 copies. We now have two papers for the children and the combined circulation is 22,000.

Tract Department

We have had many new tracts on Salvation, Healing, The Coming of the Lord, and 15 new tracts on our distinctive Pentecostal testimony. We are now printing more than 1,000,000 tracts yearly. It will be seen from the above that we are printing and sending out approximately 3,250,000 copies of publications of our own printing each year.

Stanley H. Frodsham, Editor.

On motion this report was unanimously accepted.

The Secretary read the Minutes of all the sessions of the Executive Presbytery held since the last Council meeting.

Bible School Report

Elder Frank M. Boyd, Principal of the Central Bible Institute, reported progress on the building and

spoke at some length concerning the Scripturalness of Bible Schools.

Roster Committee Report

Elder J. C. Wilder, Chairman of the Roster Committee, read the list of names accepted on the roster. On motion the roster was accepted.

New Offices Created

Elder J. N. Gortner, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, recommended that, in view of the increased work of the Missionary Department, instead of a Missionary Secretary-Treasurer being elected, two separate offices, one of Missionary Secretary, who would head the department, and the other of a Missionary Treasurer, should be provided for. On motion this recommendation was adopted by the Council.

The Nomination Committee also recommended that in view of the great increase in the burden of the Chairman's work an Associate or Assistant Chairman be provided for by the General Council.

On motion it was agreed that the position of Chairman be augmented by the office of Assistant Chairman. This was adopted by the Council.

Friday Morning, September 14

After the devotional hour, Elder Frank M. Boyd gave an address on the relation of the tithe to the kingdom of God and to our Council fellowship.

Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions

A committee was appointed by the Chair to deal with resolutions that could not be referred to the various standing committees. The following brethren were appointed: Ira E. Surface, Frank Gray, Harold Needham, J. Wm. Bostrom, Hermon L. Harvey.

Nominating Committee Elected

Inasmuch as the Minutes required that a committee that should deal with nominations should have seven members, on motion it was agreed that the five members of the standing committee on nomina-

tions appointed by the Chair, plus two others, should be made the Council Nominating Committee.

This motion was carried.

The names of Elders T. K. Leonard and Robert A. Brown were added to the list, making the full Nominating Committee consist of J. N. Gortner, Harold Needham, E. N. Richey, W. J. Walthal, Hugh Cadwalder, R. A. Brown and T. K. Leonard.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution on page 9 of the Combined Minutes of the General Council be amended to include the new offices created by the present session of the Council. (See new Combined Minutes.)

Report of Committee on Schools

The following resolution was brought forward by the standing committee on school matters:

Whereas, There has developed the need and desire for an enlarged Bible School program in keeping with the growth of the Council fellowship and interests, and that there be eliminated competition and what has appeared to be discrimination against our Pentecostal schools and their graduates in the matter of recognition and recommendation, and

Whereas, There has developed a desire for closer harmony and cooperation on the basis of standardization of courses and the use of Council channels of publicity,

Therefore, Be It Recommended, That a Bible School Commission be provided for, which shall supervise the Central Bible Institute and other schools desiring this fellowship, to the end that the doctrines and general interests of the Council and all these schools be safeguarded in line with Council principles and polity.

Whereas, There are schools which now desire this relationship,

Be It Recommended, That they be permitted to come in on the same basis of affiliation as now obtains for the individual assembly.

Be It Further Resolved, That the Executive Pres-

bytery be, and are hereby authorized to act in the capacity of said commission.

On motion the above resolution was adopted.

Council adjourned until 2:30.

Friday Afternoon

The report of the Roster Committee was re-read and the names of those who had placed their names on the list since the former reading of the report were accepted by the Council.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That all licentiates of the Council be allowed the privilege to have their names on the Roster and to vote in the election of officers.

The Chairman of the Roster Committee reported that there were 274 ministers and delegates who had placed their names on the Roster.

Report of Standing Committee on Publications

Elder Fred Lohmann, Chairman of the Publication Committee, brought forward the following resolutions:

Whereas, We recognize that as a God-ordained movement we are lacking in the literature, in the books and pamphlets that we ought to have, to set forth in clear language what we most surely believe,

Resolved, That we recommend to the management of the Gospel Publishing House that they take this matter under immediate advisement, and endeavor to produce in the near future such books and pamphlets on our message of full salvation, of practical holiness, of divine healing, of the soon coming of Christ, and of our distinctive Pentecostal testimony as are actually needed in the movement.

We also recommend that our Pentecostal children be not overlooked in the matter of book publications.

Concerning Spanish Pentecostal Literature

Whereas, Our missionaries who are laboring among the Spanish-speaking people are persuaded that a printing press and equipment will be of real service to them in their work for the Lord,

Resolved, That we recommend that the Missionary Department take this matter under advisement, that they counsel with these missionaries as to what are the immediate needs on this line, and that they do all in their power to help these missionaries to secure such equipment as is deemed necessary for the propagation of the full Pentecostal message in the Spanish language.

On motion these two resolutions were adopted.

New Song Book Authorized

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed by this Council to arrange with the officers of the Gospel Publishing House for the selection and printing of a Pentecostal song book, the said committee to be appointed by the Chairman.

Correspondence Course

A recommendation was made that a correspondence course suitable for ministers should be provided for as soon as possible.

A resolution was brought forward that the names and addresses of our Presbyters be published four times each year in the Pentecostal Evangel. This motion was adopted.

Election of Officers

The following brethren were elected to the various offices of the Council by unanimous vote:

Chairman, J. W. Welch; Assistant Chairman, D. H. McDowell; Secretary, J. R. Evans; Missionary Secretary, William M. Faux; Missionary Treasurer, J. Roswell Flower; Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel, Stanley H. Frodsham.

On motion the time was extended for one hour beyond the usual time of adjournment.

Report of Home and Foreign Missions

Resolved, That all funds for Home Missions be set free to be used in any home missionary effort deemed wise by the Missionary Committee.

On motion this resolution was adopted.

World-Wide Cooperation

Elder F. A. Hale, who had been appointed Chairman of a Committee on World-Wide Cooperation, the function of which committee was to get into communication with the different leaders of the various branches of the Pentecostal Movement in this country, with a view to calling a conference of brethren of these various branches, with the hope of reaching an agreement on a method of cooperation, and of promoting a closer bond of fellowship, and also arranging the calling of a conference for the formation of an ecumenical union of Pentecostal believers for the more perfect and rapid evangelization of the world, made his report. He stated that his committee had not been able to meet during the past two years as they lived at great distances from one another, and although much had been done by way of correspondence, no united meeting had been provided for by the committee.

Deputational Work

Brother D. W. Kerr reported that at the request of the Chairman he had made a trip of 17,000 miles and had visited seven different District Councils. He reported many souls having been saved at these Council meetings and a blessed unity had been manifest.

The meeting adjourned until Saturday morning at 9:30.

Saturday Morning and Afternoon

The time was devoted to the conclusion of the election of officers, and much time was given to the reports of Home Missionary work and reports from the field. There was also an address by the Assistant Chairman.

Adjourned to meet Monday morning at 9:30.

Sunday Services

Sunday was given wholly to devotion and worship. There was a special Divine Healing Service in the morning, presided over by Elder A. H. Argue. Many sick ones were ministered to. In the afternoon we had our great missionary service. Sister Lavada

Leonard of China, Brother Frank Nicodem of India, and Brother George Kelley of China, addressed the meeting, after which Brother D. W. Kerr took charge of the missionary offering. This offering, including pledges, amounted to \$92,830.69. At the evening service, addresses were given by Pastor J. Narver Gortner and Evangelist Watt Walker. Elders R. A. Brown and David H. McDowell preached at the overflow meetings at the McMillan Avenue Church.

Monday, Sept. 17, 1923

After a devotional service led by Brother F. A. Hale, and an address on the "Virgin Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ" by Elder S. A. Jamieson, the Council was called to order by the Chairman.

Report of the Committee on Nominations and Elections

The committee reported a number of names of brethren for the office of General Presbyters, and recommended their election. All these brethren were elected to the office of General Presbyters by acclamation. (See list at back of Minutes.)

Regarding Free Literature

After considerable discussion regarding the necessity for the distribution of free literature, and the importance of having the Pentecostal Evangel going into every Pentecostal home, many of those present telling of the great blessing the Evangel had been to them and their assemblies, quite a number responded to an appeal for the free literature fund, and the sum of \$194.00 was raised for this fund, also \$50.00 for subscriptions to the Evangel.

It was moved and carried that the Assistant Chairman be made a member of the Executive Presbytery by virtue of his office.

Adjournment to meet at 1:30 p. m.

Monday Afternoon, 1:30

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman with prayer, after which there was a MEMORIAL SERVICE for those of our number who had been called home to glory since our last General session.

Memorial Service

Brother J. R. Flower spoke with much feeling of our departed missionaries. He read from 2 Cor. 4: 7-18 and Acts 21:10-14.

He referred to the great sacrifice of all our missionaries, and the hardships they have to endure in their work. A cablegram had just been received on September 13, informing us of the homegoing of Sister L. M. Jacobs of India. Mrs. Jacob Mueller, also of India, went to her reward in August, 1922, a true child of God who laid down her life for Jesus. Brother Charles Daniels, of South Africa, a precious missionary threescore years and ten, had gone to be with his Lord. He was not as well known as some of our missionaries, but had ripened in the service of his Master. Brother Bendiksen was another saint who heard the call to come up higher from the Congo, West Africa. Brother James Harvey of India also heard the call in 1922. He was an English soldier who heard the voice of God while in the employ of the British Government. He became a soldier of the cross, and with these others has gone to receive a crown of glory.

While these have gone on before, and there are gaps to be filled, thank God there are others who are ready to answer the call to arms and go, whether it means life or death to them, "For to die is gain."

Brother J. W. Welch spoke with great tenderness of the homegoing of Brothers E. N. Bell and John Coxe. He spoke of their lives of faithfulness to the Master, and the hardships and struggles endured, but it was for Him.

He referred to Brother Bell's early struggles and hardships, of his last trip to California and what it meant to him. He gave his life for God and the cause. Brother Welch said, "I am not eulogizing the man, but I see the grace of God in his life. I would not recall him. A crown of rejoicing awaits everyone who proves faithful to the end."

Brother D. H. McDowell then led us to the throne in a touching prayer.

The missionaries present asked permission to stand as an appreciation of their love for Brother Bell for his sacrifices for the mission fields. This permission was gladly given.

The Council Was Then Opened for Business at 3 P. M.

Brothers H. L. Harvey and J. N. Gortner resigned as members of the Executive Presbytery. On motion their resignations were accepted.

Brother Tunmore spoke of the important work that will come before the Executive Presbytery, and the need of a representative body.

Resolution Regarding the Executive Presbytery

A motion was made that the Nominations and Election Committee be instructed to present a resolution regarding the Executive Presbytery to meet the present conditions. (See Combined Minutes for this resolution.)

Moved and carried that we recognize the work Brother D. W. Kerr has been doing on the field, and that we appreciate his services.

On motion the following resolution was passed:

Whereas, In an interim of two years many questions of vital importance arise, and instead of having closer fellowship, the brethren are more or less separated, be it

Resolved, That we open the question of the advisability of having a General Council meeting every year, instead of every two years, especially in view of the near return of our Lord.

After a free discussion of this question, by motion it was decided to have the next meeting of the General Council after an interval of two years.

Tuesday Morning

After a devotional service led by Brother Wm. Bostrom, and an address by Sister Amy Yeomans on "Giving to God," the Council was called to order by the Chairman for business at 9:45 a. m.

Report of the Ordination Committee

The Ordination Committee recommended the following names for ordination: F. Webster Tyler, Benjamin H. Caudle, W. W. Thompson, Laura Radford, Ray Fosteque, Joshua Calvert Jeays, Robert Pollard, Ada Pollard, Paul Jones and Herbert L. Halwe.

Brother R. J. Craig gave a charge to the candidates in a few fitting remarks, showing the necessity for a tender ministry, after which the foregoing were duly ordained by the laying on of the hands of the brethren appointed for this work.

After a discussion relating to the matter of a Reading Course for our young preachers who have not had the advantages of a Bible School training, the matter was referred to the committee on reading course to consider and formulate a resolution.

Council then adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m.

Tuesday Afternoon

Brother Wm. M. Faux gave a message on "The Psychological Crisis in Pentecost." He emphasized the importance of the preacher living in the Word of God, that it was a safeguard against all false doctrines and errors.

The meeting was then called to order by the Chairman.

A resolution defining the duties of the Assistant Chairman was then passed. (See Page 7 Combined Minutes.)

Reading Course

On motion the following recommendation from the Committee on Reading Course was adopted:

Resolved, That a Reading Course, covering a period of two years, be prepared by the committee, with the approval of the Executive Presbytery, and that our young ministers be advised to avail themselves of the advantages of said course.

Missionary Station in the East

The matter of having a representative for our missionaries in New York City, and a place for their en-

tertainment while awaiting sailing was discussed. Beulah Heights, North Bergen, N. J., was proposed as a suitable place.

It was moved and carried that this matter be left to the Executive Presbytery to confer with the brethren at Beulah Heights regarding such an arrangement.

Miscellaneous Matters

The following miscellaneous matters were taken up in order and passed.

Moved and carried that all remaining necessary business be referred to the Executive Presbytery, and they be authorized to properly care for same.

Moved and carried that the Executive Presbytery be authorized to edit, correct and publish the Minutes of this Council session as soon as possible, and a copy be sent to each minister of the Council.

Moved and carried by standing vote that a vote of thanks be tendered Pastor Eisler and his congregation for their courtesy in granting us the use of Salem M. E. Church for this Council session.

Moved and carried that we express our appreciation of the untiring efforts of Pastors Lohmann and Markley and their assembly in providing conveniences and comfort for us, and of the very hospitable manner in which the General Council has been received and cared for by them.

Moved and carried that not only the names of ministers be printed in the Minutes, but also the names of the District Chairmen.

Moved and carried that we extend a vote of thanks to the Remington Typewriter Company for the use of three typewriters during this Council session.

Moved and carried that the time and place of holding the next General Council meeting be arranged for by the Executive Presbytery.

Moved and carried that a book be prepared suitable for funerals and marriages.

Brethren Lohmann and Markley extended an in-

visitation to the Council members present to attend a Spiritual Convention in their new church in the fall of 1924.

On motion the Council was then adjourned to meet again at the call of the Executive Presbytery. And thus ended the session of the 1923 General Council meeting with a HALLELUJAH SHOUT. Amen.
