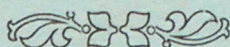

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**CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF  
THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND  
FOREIGN LANDS, ADOPTED  
SEPTEMBER 20-26, 1929**

**CONSTITUTIONAL DECLARATION**

Whereas, It is the express purpose of God, our heavenly Father, to call out of the world a saved people, who shall constitute the body or church of Jesus Christ, built and established upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner stone; and

Whereas, The members of the body, the church (ecclesia) of Jesus Christ, are enjoined to assemble themselves together for worship, fellowship, counsel and instruction in the Word of God and the work of the ministry and for the exercise of those spiritual gifts and offices provided for in the New Testament; and

Whereas, It is evident that the early apostolic churches came together in such fellowship as a representative body of saved, Spirit-filled believers, who ordained and sent out evangelists and missionaries, and who under the supervision of the Holy Spirit, set over the church pastors and teachers; therefore be it

Resolved, That we recognize ourselves as a co-operative fellowship of Pentecostal, Spirit-baptized saints from local Pentecostal Assemblies of like precious faith throughout the United States and foreign lands, to be known as the General Council of the Assemblies of God whose purpose is not to usurp authority over the various local assemblies, nor to deprive them of their Scriptural and local rights and privileges, but to recognize and promote scriptural methods and order for worship, unity, fellowship, work and business for God; and to disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrines and conduct, endeavoring to keep the unity of

the Spirit in the bonds of peace, "till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

## ARTICLE I. NAME

The name shall be, The General Council of the Assemblies of God.

## ARTICLE II. NATURE

The General Council of the Assemblies of God is a co-operative fellowship based upon mutual agreements voluntarily entered into by its membership.

## ARTICLE III. PREROGATIVES

1. To approve all scriptural teachings, methods and conduct; and to disapprove unscriptural teachings, methods and conduct.

2. To encourage and promote the evangelization of the world.

3. To provide a basis of fellowship among Christians of like precious faith.

4. To establish and maintain such departments and institutions as may be necessary for the propagation of the Gospel and the work of this Pentecostal fellowship.

5. To have the right to own, hold in trust, use, sell, convey, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of, such property, real or chattel, as may be needed for the prosecution of its work.

## ARTICLE IV. PRINCIPLES

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall represent as nearly as possible in detail, the body of Christ as described in the New Testament Scriptures, recognizing the principles inherent in that body as also inherent in this fellowship, particularly the principles of unity, co-operation and equality. Its purpose is to maintain conditions under which it can, as a fellowship, demonstrate these principles and their consequent development.



## ARTICLE V

### STATEMENT OF FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS

The Bible is our all-sufficient rule for faith and practice. Hence this statement of Fundamental Truths is intended as a basis of fellowship among us (i. e., that we all speak the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Acts 2:42). The human phraseology employed in such statement is not inspired nor contended for, but the truth set forth is held to be essential to a full Gospel ministry. No claim is made that it contains all truth in the Bible, only that it covers our present needs as to these fundamental matters.

#### 1. THE SCRIPTURES INSPIRED

The Bible is the inspired Word of God, a revelation from God to man, the infallible rule of faith and conduct, and is superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason (2 Tim. 3:15, 16; 1 Pet. 2:2).

#### 2. THE ONE TRUE GOD

The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally self-existent, self-revealed "I AM"; and has further revealed Himself as embodying the principles of relationship and association, i. e., as Father, Son and Holy Ghost (Deut. 6:4; Mark 12:29; Isa. 43:10, 11; Matt. 28:19). (The Adorable Godhead. Terms defined. Pages 90, 91, 92.)

#### 3. MAN, HIS FALL AND REDEMPTION

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, after Our likeness." But man, by voluntary transgression, fell, and his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ the Son of God. Gen. 1:26-31; 3:1-7; Rom. 5:12-21.

#### 4. THE SALVATION OF MAN

(a) Conditions to Salvation.

The grace of God, which bringeth salvation, hath appeared to all men, through the preaching of repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord

Jesus Christ; man is saved by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, and, being justified by grace through faith, he becomes an heir of God according to the hope of eternal life. (Titus 2:11; Rom. 10:13-15; Luke 24:47; Titus 3:5-7).

(b) The Evidences of Salvation.

The **inward** evidence, to the believer of his salvation, is the direct witness of the Spirit (Rom. 8:16). The **outward** evidence to all men is a life of righteousness and true holiness.

## 5. BAPTISM IN WATER

The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an outward symbol of cleansing, while their heart has already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as an inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life (Matt. 28:19; Acts 10:47, 48; Rom. 6:4; Acts 20:21; Heb. 10:22).

## 6. THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements, bread and the fruit of the vine, is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Cor. 11:26); and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Cor. 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers "until He comes."

## 7. THE PROMISE OF THE FATHER.

All believers are entitled to, and should ardently expect, and earnestly seek, the promise of the Father, the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church. With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in



the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; 1:8; 1 Cor. 12:1-31). This wonderful experience is distinct from and subsequent to the experience of the new birth (Acts 10:44-46; 11:14-16; 15:7-9).

## 8. THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY GHOST

The Baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is witnessed by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterance (Acts 2:4). The speaking in tongues in this instance is the same in essence as the gift of tongues (1 Cor. 12:4-10, 28) but different in purpose and use.

## 9. ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION

The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy Ghost we are able to obey the command, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Entire sanctification is the will of God for all believers, and should be earnestly pursued by walking in obedience to God's Word (Heb. 12:14; 1 Pet. 1:15, 16; 1 Thess. 5:23, 24; 1 John 2:6).

## 10. THE CHURCH

The Church is the body of Christ, the habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission. Each believer, born of the Spirit, is an integral part of the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, which are written in heaven. (Eph. 1:22, 23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23).

## 11. THE MINISTRY AND EVANGELISM

A divinely called and Scripturally ordained ministry has been provided by our Lord for a twofold purpose: (1) The evangelization of the world, and (2) The edifying of the Body of Christ (Mark 16:15-20; Eph. 4:11-13).

## 12. DIVINE HEALING

Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the atonement, and is the privilege of all believers (Isa. 53:4, 5; Matt. 8:16, 17).

### 13. THE BLESSED HOPE

The resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ and their translation together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord is the imminent and blessed hope of the Church (1 Thess 4:16, 17; Rom. 8:23; Titus 2:13; 1 Cor. 15:51, 52).

### 14. THE MILLENNIAL REIGN OF JESUS

The revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ from heaven, the salvation of national Israel, and the millennial reign of Christ on the earth is the Scriptural promise and the world's hope (2 Thess. 1:7; Rev. 19:11-14; Rom. 11:26, 27; Rev. 20:1-7).

### 15. THE LAKE OF FIRE

The devil and his angels, the beast and the false prophet, and whosoever is not found written in the Book of Life, shall be consigned to everlasting punishment in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death (Rev. 19:20; Rev. 20:10-15).

### 16. THE NEW HEAVENS AND NEW EARTH

We, "according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness" (2 Pet. 3:13; Rev. 21, 22).

## ARTICLE VI. RELATIONSHIPS

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall prosecute its activities through its General and District Councils.

## ARTICLE VII. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the General Council shall consist of all ministers and missionaries holding accredited fellowship certificates, and such representatives as may be chosen by the assemblies affiliated with us, each assembly being entitled to one lay delegate.

## ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

1. Regular sessions of the General Council shall be held biennially, pursuant to a call by the Executive Presbytery.



2. Special sessions of the General Council may be arranged by the Executive Presbytery if agreed by a majority of the General Presbyters.

3. The right of initiative in the matter of calling of special sessions shall be granted to any ordained minister of The General Council of the Assemblies of God when occasion demands. A statement setting forth the reasons for a special session of the Council, signed by not less than fifteen ordained ministers, may be considered sufficient reason for the call of a special session, such statement to be filed with the Executive Presbytery, who may, if it shall be deemed advisable, respond to the summons and issue the call for a special session.

## ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS

### 1. Executive Officers.

The officers shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer, and Missionary Secretary, together with such other officers as may be required in the future. Their term of office shall be for two years and shall begin three months after the date of election.

### 2. Executive Presbytery.

The Executive Presbytery shall consist of seven brethren, four of whom shall be the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Missionary Secretary, together with three ministers non-resident at headquarters, who shall be chosen by the General Council from among the General Presbyters.

### 3. General Presbytery.

The General Council shall elect representative men of mature experience and ability, whose lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship as General Presbyters in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields. The District Superintendent by virtue of his office shall be a General Presbyter.

## ARTICLE X. DISTRICT COUNCILS

Membership of the District Council shall consist of all ordained and licensed ministers of the district, and such delegates as may be elected by assemblies to represent them in the meetings of the District Council. Such delegates shall be elected according to an agreed upon basis of representation, arranged by the Council.

The District Council shall have supervision over all the activities of the Assemblies of God in its prescribed field, except such as are agreed upon by a District Council and the General Council officials.

The District Council shall have authority to examine and to license and ordain ministers who are to become members thereof, and shall report to the office of the General Council the names of all approved licentiates.

The District Council, being the creature of the General Council and subordinate thereto, cannot be authorized, in any way, to violate the principles of the General Council constitutional agreements or its by-laws.

The District Council shall elect its own officers, and arrange for its own meetings. It shall be amenable to the General Council in matters of doctrine, and the personal conduct of ministers who are permitted to have the district endorsement.

## ARTICLE XI. LOCAL ASSEMBLIES

All true Pentecostal believers associating themselves in local bodies as assemblies, and accepting their full personal share of responsibility for the maintenance of scriptural order in the local body, shall have a standard for membership which may be determined either by the local assembly itself, or by agreement with the District Council.

Local assemblies shall be set in order and co-operate in the work of the District. They should support the district organization and may send delegates to the District Council.

We recognize that each local assembly has the right



of self-government under Jesus Christ, its living Head, and shall have the power to choose, or call its pastor, elect its official board, and transact all other business pertaining to its life as a local unit. It shall have the right to administer discipline to its members according to the Scriptures and its By-laws. It shall have the right to acquire and hold title to property in its own right, either through trustees or in its corporate name as a self-governing unit.

The fact that a local assembly is affiliated in the association of the District or General Council shall in nowise destroy its rights as above stated or interfere with its sovereignty. The local assembly shall recognize that the District or General Council has the right to approve Scriptural doctrine and conduct and to disapprove unscriptural doctrine or conduct. When in need of counsel or advice, the local assembly may appeal to the District Council for help. It may appeal from a decision by the District Council to the General Council where it may be questioned whether or not there has been proper help from the District.

Local assemblies are expected to have an interest in the missionary enterprise, and to plan for regular contribution to its support.

## ARTICLE XII

Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted in writing to every District for their consideration prior to the General Council meeting. Amendments to the Constitution shall require a two-thirds majority of all members present for adoption.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY ORDER

In order to expedite the work of the Council and to avoid confusion in its deliberations, the Council shall be governed by accepted rules of parliamentary procedure, in keeping with the spirit of Christian love and fellowship.

## ARTICLE II.

### Section 1: OFFICERS.

The officers of the General Council except as hereinafter provided shall be elected at one of its regular meetings, according to the manner of election as provided. They shall be chosen from the membership of the General Council, and shall be men of mature experience and ability, whose life and ministry are above question, and such qualities alone shall determine their eligibility. A two-thirds majority of all votes cast, shall be necessary to constitute an election.

### Section 2: NOMINATION AND ELECTION

All candidates for office to be filled by the General Council shall be nominated by secret ballot. All names thus presented shall be balloted upon until a candidate shall have received a two-thirds majority of votes cast, provided however, that if no such majority shall have been reached by the first three ballots taken, the three candidates having the highest number of votes in the last ballot cast, shall be nominees to be further voted upon, and all other names shall be eliminated.

The Treasurer and Missionary Secretary shall be elected to their respective offices by the Executive Presbytery and shall be amenable thereto. The choice of the Executive Presbytery shall be subject to ratification by the General Presbytery.

### Section 3: VOTING CONSTITUENCY

The voting constituency shall consist of all accredited members, present and registered. Voting privileges may also be extended to accredited licentiates who may be in attendance, at the discretion of the General Council.

## ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

### Section 1: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To preside at the meetings of the Council.

2. To be the head of the General Office, and to supervise all the work of that office during the interim between sessions of the General Council. To act as President of the Corporation in all legal matters.

3. To preside at all meetings of the Credentials Committee, and to sign all credentials.

4. To preside at all sessions of the Executive Presbytery, and to receive all communications directed to that body.

5. To be general superintendent of all work on the field conducted in behalf of the fellowship, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.

6. To administer discipline in all cases when requested to do so by the Credentials Committee.

7. To perform any other functions usual and customary as presiding officer or such as may be directed by the General Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

## Section 2: DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

(Office left vacant pending Constitutional Amendment.)

## Section 3: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY

1. The General Secretary shall make and keep true records of the proceedings of the General Council and shall publish the same as approved and directed by the Executive Presbytery.

2. He shall be custodian of the official seal of the Council and shall issue Credentials under the direction of the Credentials Committee and shall keep a record of all ministers, licentiates and assemblies in the fellowship.

3. He shall act as Secretary of the Executive Presbytery and the General Presbytery, and shall keep accurate minutes of the deliberations of these bodies.

4. He shall be authorized to sign all official and legal documents and to perform such other functions as are customary or as may be directed by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

5. He shall act as Secretary of the Credentials Committee and shall be considered as ex-officio member of all other committees.

Section 4: DUTIES OF THE FIELD SECRETARY  
(Not yet defined by the Executive Presbytery.)

Section 5: DUTIES OF THE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

1. To act as head of the Missionary Department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

2. To keep a record of all decisions of the Missionary Committee and of all official acts of the Missionary Department.

3. To conduct all correspondence with prospective Missionaries and with those already out on the field.

4. To conduct the Missionary columns in the Pentecostal Evangel from Missionary letters and reports.

5. To represent the General Council in all relationships with governments or authorities where our Missionary work is involved.

6. To direct the Missionary activities of the fellowship under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

7. To distribute all Missionary funds as directed by the donors or by the Missionary Committee.

8. To keep such records of all funds received and disbursed as will safeguard the funds from loss en route to the field.

9. To acknowledge in the Pentecostal Evangel all funds received for Missionary work.

10. To conduct all correspondence.

11. To act as purchasing agent for Missionary supplies under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

12. To perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.



## Section 6: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

1. To be custodian of all General Council funds.
2. He shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, conducting the work of his office according to accepted business methods.
3. He shall give a report from time to time as may be requested by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.
4. He shall give bond to the amount of \$10,000. The treasurer's books shall be audited by outside public audit once a year.
5. He shall perform such other functions as are customary to his office or as may be directed by the Council or the Executive Presbytery.

## Section 7: DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTERY

The Executive Presbytery shall act as trustees of this fellowship and shall have general oversight of the activities and departments of the same during the interim between General Council sessions, unless the General Council shall make other provision. It shall be authorized to act for the fellowship in all matters that affect its interests while the General Council is not in session and shall make report to the General Council of its activities in behalf of the fellowship as may be directed. It shall provide for its own meetings and its decisions shall be final unless reversed by the General Council.

In all matters of great importance, the Executive Presbytery shall communicate with the members of the General Presbytery before any final action shall be taken.

## Section 8: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTERY

1. The General Presbytery shall constitute an advisory body in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery.
2. It shall act as a court of appeal and its decisions shall be final.

## ARTICLE IV

### Section 1: STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing committees shall be established or appointed as necessity may indicate. They shall be appointed by the General Superintendent in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery, and the term of office shall continue from the date of appointment to the adjournment of the next regular meeting of the General Council, unless otherwise instructed by the Council.

### Section 2: CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Such members of the Executive Presbytery as may reside at headquarters shall constitute a Credentials Committee. They shall have authority to issue certificates of ordination to approved ministers, who have District Council endorsement, and to issue annual fellowship certificates.

### Section 3: SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Special committees may be created at the General Council in session, or by the Executive Presbytery between sessions as may be required to facilitate its work.

## ARTICLE V. MINISTRY

### Section 1: MINISTRY DESCRIBED

Elders who are persons of mature experience and qualifications, able to undertake the responsibilities of the full-gospel ministry.

Licentiates who are beginners; who give evidence of being called of God; and who devote themselves to a purpose to become elders (1 Tim. 3:10-13).

Women may be ordained in any degree except eldership and be licensed to preach as provided for men.

### Section 2: QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications for recognition as an elder must be in accord with the New Testament scriptures, which provide the necessary guidance in the matter of such recognition (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:7-9).

Qualifications for licentiates shall be:

First: Clear evidences of a divine call; a practical experience in preaching; together with an evident purpose to devote their time to preaching the gospel.

Second: Conformity to such provisions as are made for them by the General Council in reading courses and other training.

### Section 3: LICENSE TO PREACH

Licenses to preach shall be granted by the District Council to properly qualified applicants.

### Section 4: ORDINATIONS

Applicants for ordination who shall have met the necessary requirements shall appear before the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside. All ordinations shall take place under the auspices of the District Council. No minister shall be ordained to the office of an elder until he shall have held a license to preach and shall have been engaged in the active work of the ministry as a pastor or evangelist at least two full consecutive years.

### Section 5: CERTIFICATES

Ordination papers with the accompanying fellowship certificates shall be issued by the General Credential Committee from the Executive office.

### Section 6: MINISTERIAL RELATION

All ministers, both ordained and licensed, shall be amenable to both the District and General Councils in matters of doctrine and conduct.

All ministers, ordained and licensed, shall be expected to affiliate with the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside, and to work in co-operation with the same. They shall be expected to co-operate with other District Councils in which they may labor temporarily.

### Section 7: OFFICIAL LIST

An official list of all ordained ministers shall be

compiled by the Credential Committee of the General Council and published for the convenience of all concerned. The list shall show whether or not each minister is giving full time to his or her ministry. This official list shall be revised annually, and certificates of fellowship issued to all who are in full fellowship with us.

## Section 8: EXPIRATION OF FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

Inasmuch as all fellowship certificates expire on the 31st day of August of each year, all who shall have failed to renew their fellowship certificates on or before October 1st, or who shall have failed to indicate their purpose to do so, shall be considered as delinquents whose names shall not appear on the ministerial list to be mailed to the clergy bureaus.

## ARTICLE VI. FOREIGN MISSIONS POLICY

### Section 1: MISSIONARY PURPOSE

1. The Assemblies of God shall assume responsibility, and do all within its power for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

2. The Pauline example shall be followed as far as possible by seeking out neglected regions where the Gospel has not been preached, as well as by establishing self-supporting, self-governing, self-propagating native churches.

3. In fields where Pentecostal missionaries are already stationed, consultation shall be had with the brethren on the field and the Missionary Department, and a satisfactory plan agreed upon before an attempt shall be made to establish new stations in such localities.

4. Every Assembly shall be encouraged to assume definite responsibility for full or partial support of one or more missionaries in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department.

### Section 2: MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

1. The Missionary Department shall consist of the



Missionary Secretary and four others, appointed by the Superintendent subject to the approval of the General Presbytery, who together shall comprise the Missionary Committee. All the activities of the Missionary Department shall be carried on under the supervision of the Executive Presbytery to which the Missionary Department shall be amenable.

2. All the Missionary interest of our fellowship shall be consigned to the management of the Missionary Department in co-operation with the District Council on the field.

### Section 3: MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

1. The selection and appointment of missionaries shall be the prerogative of the Missionary Committee.

2. The Missionary Committee shall be governed in its selection and appointment of missionaries by the following requirements. Each applicant shall be examined—

- (a) As to personal experience of full New Testament salvation.
- (b) As to a definite call to foreign work.
- (c) As to physical, mental and spiritual fitness for work.
- (d) As to Christian standing and general qualifications, it being required that each applicant seeking appointment first secure the endorsement of his local Assembly and District Council.

3. Prospective missionaries shall be expected to exercise faith in God to provide their outfit and fare to the field as far as practicable.

4. Funds provided for prospective missionaries who shall for any reason be prevented from going to the field shall be remitted to their respective donors unless by the consent of said donors they can be made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes.

5. All persons making application for appointment as missionaries shall be expected to meet the requirements of the Missionary Department.

6. The Missionary Department shall confine its missionary activities within the limits of its resources and shall not accept and send out missionaries until the condition of its finances fully warrant such action.

7. Each missionary shall be expected to devote two full years to language study, if necessary, before taking up his full active work. Courses of study with examinations shall be arranged by an advisory committee on each field. Failure on the part of any missionary to obtain a working knowledge of the language during his first term shall furnish ample ground upon which to question his fitness for a second term.

#### Section 4: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARIES

1. The undesignated funds sent to the Foreign Missions Department shall be distributed to those who have received the appointment of the Missionary Committee and are in harmony with our Statement of Fundamentals. All funds assigned to particular persons shall be forwarded by the Foreign Missions Department exactly as directed.

2. It is recommended that all missionaries send a report of moneys received and submit a budget of expenses to the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent upon the Foreign Missions Department to send of its undesignated funds to missionaries who do not furnish such a report.

3. Missionaries expecting the endorsement and aid of the Foreign Missions Department shall report to the Missionary Committee and receive its approval before leaving this country. The Missionary Committee shall assume no responsibility whatever, where the foregoing requirements are not complied with. Funds designated for missionaries whose names do not appear on our list will be gladly forwarded by the Missionary Department.

#### Section 5: FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

1. The Foreign Missions Department shall renew the Fellowship Certificates of all foreign missionaries

in good standing on or before the first of the year without cost to the missionaries.

This requirement on the part of the Missionary Department shall be contingent upon the missionary's filling out in ample time the questionnaire provided by the Department and sending same to the home office.

2. Each missionary shall file with the Foreign Missions Department a full statement regarding his work, e. g., concerning his family and accommodations, period of service, language qualifications, nature of work engaged in, prospects of the field, present number of recognized adherents, etc., etc.

#### Section 6: DISTRICT COUNCILS

1. District Councils shall be formed on the field where there are sufficient missionaries. Where numbers are not sufficient to warrant the formation of a District Council, the missionary shall be amenable directly to the Foreign Missions Department.

2. It shall be considered the duty of the various District Councils on the foreign field to co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in maintaining a high standard of Christian character and work in the interests of greater efficiency.

#### Section 7: PROPERTY

1. All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible.

No funds shall be made available for missionary homes, stations, schools, etc., until adequate and proper safeguards, such as complying with the laws of the respective countries for the legal holding of property and such as establishing and maintaining a proper relationship between these missionary projects and the Foreign Missions Department, shall have been provided.

2. Missionaries contemplating the purchase of property or erection of buildings should co-operate with the District Council on the field, and secure their

endorsement before submitting their proposition to the Foreign Missions Department.

3. Whereas, In our Foreign Missions Policy it has been resolved that "All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible," and,

Whereas, At the present time the Foreign Missions Department for lack of information on file is unable to give accurate advice concerning many of the properties purchased on the foreign field through the offerings of our fellowship, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That a copy of the property deeds, titles, and other legal papers relating to all missionary properties which have been purchased shall be forwarded to the Foreign Missions Department for file.

#### Section 8: NATIVE WORKERS

1. It is recommended that great care be exercised in the selection of native workers, and that no worker be engaged who does not manifest a real consecration to the cause of Christ.

2. No offerings for the support of native workers shall be sent direct to the natives, but to the missionary representatives of the General Council. (Amendment 1929.)

#### Section 9: FURLOUGHS

1. Missionaries while home on furlough shall be considered as on vacation. It will be expected, however, that they shall co-operate with the home office in the interests of the work as far as possible.

2. The period and frequency of furloughs shall be governed by the recommendation of the District Council on the respective fields in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to grant a furlough allowance to missionaries who return to the homeland without first having an understanding with the District Council on the field.



3. When missionaries do not intend to return to the field or for any reason are not recommended for further service, it shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to continue their allowance for more than six months after their return to their homeland, except in cases of ill health or because of the infirmities of age.

4. All missionaries who have arranged to return to the home field shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department where there is no District Council on the field, in making arrangements for a supply to take charge of their work or station and shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in securing and forwarding funds for the maintenance of such work or station during their absence.

5. All missionaries who shall have completed a satisfactory term of service shall be eligible for reappointment for another term.

#### ARTICLE VII. HOME MISSIONS

The fields everywhere are ripe for harvest, but the laborers are few. If we fail to speed up our program of home field evangelization the loss will be appalling. Our Lord's "Go ye" applies no less to the fields lying at our doors than to distant parts of the earth.

Whereas, We have the men and the means to accomplish at least twice as much as we are now doing, and the strengthening of the work at home is the only way we can enlarge our work abroad, and the urgency of the command of our Lord, and the crying need everywhere will not permit us to be indifferent or inactive; therefore be it

#### RESOLVED:

1. That the Executive Presbytery devise plans for opening up new work in neglected strategic points, so far as possible, and that they consider the advisability of appointing such field workers as in its wisdom may be deemed necessary.

2. That each District Superintendent use all the available resources for evangelizing his own district.

3. That so far as practicable each District Council raise funds and put one or more missionaries or evangelists to work in co-operation with the District Council, and that the Council foster the new works started till such time as each may become able to support a pastor.

4. That each and every District Superintendent submit in writing to our General Secretary his policy for evangelization and field extension, or Home Missionary work being promoted in his district, and tell what activities have been recently put into execution in his district (for this purpose). These reports to be used for the purpose of comparing methods of labor and the discovery of the most practical ways of carrying on the work.

5. That every pastor recognize his responsibility for the evangelization of his own parish and the regions contiguous to his city or town; that he make a careful survey of the needs and the opportunities of his field; that he look in his own assembly for competent workers now idle who can be pushed out into needy fields; that he encourages the formation of Gospel Teams which can carry the gospel to outstations and destitute places; that Sunday schools and prayer meetings and street meetings be held, and all other scriptural means be used for establishing and enlarging the work.

6. That all our good evangelists may be kept busy in fields new and old, and that District Superintendents and pastors co-operate with them, so far as practicable; be it further

7. Resolved, That we work for a largely increased circulation of The Pentecostal Evangel and the liberal use of our own tracts and books, realizing their usefulness in the extension of the Lord's work.

8. Finally, we recommend that all our people devote much time to earnest prayer for the workers now in the field, and for the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth new laborers both at home and abroad.

## ARTICLE VIII. MEXICAN MISSIONS

### Section 1:

The General Council shall recognize and encourage the Mexican Missions work carried on along the American border line and in Mexico.

### Section 2:

The Missionary Department, at the discretion of the Missionary Committee, shall appropriate a proportionate share of the undesignated funds for the Mexican work.

## ARTICLE IX. INSTITUTIONS

### Section 1:

(a) The General Council shall recognize the need of practical training of prospective ministers and missionaries. It shall be in hearty sympathy with every effort to provide such training where the standards of teaching and discipline maintained in the school are satisfactory.

(b) The General Council shall encourage the further development of the Central Bible Institute, together with such other schools as may meet the required standard as set by the Central Bible Institute and become affiliated with the General Council through the District Council in which located.

(c) The General Council shall have some representation upon the directorate of the schools. It shall have a voice in determining the standards of teaching and policy of management through the District Council in which such schools are located.

(d) The examinations, reports, certificates, and diplomas, given by affiliated schools shall be on an equality with the Central Bible Institute in the matter of credits and conditions.

(e) All graduates of such affiliated schools as shall have met these requirements shall be considered as on a par with the graduates of the Central Bible Institute.

## Section 2: CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE MANAGEMENT

(a) The General Council shall control and manage the Central Bible Institute through a directorate appointed by the Executive Presbytery.

(b) The directorate shall shape the policy, arrange its curriculum, provide the faculty, and have general supervision over the school.

## Section 3: OTHER INSTITUTIONS

(a) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of homes for the aged, for children, and for retired ministers and missionaries.

(b) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of academic schools for the children of our constituency.

(c) The General Council shall encourage the opening and maintenance of Sunday Schools throughout the fellowship.

(d) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of missionary schools on the various mission fields where practicable for the training of native workers, and schools for the education of the young children of missionaries.

## ARTICLE X

### Section 1: PUBLICATIONS

The Pentecostal Evangel shall be the official organ of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and shall be published in the interest of our fellowship and for the further propagation of our distinctive testimony. The Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel shall be chosen by the Executive Presbytery, said choice subject to ratification by the General Presbytery. The Executive Presbytery shall have authority to publish Sunday-school literature, children's books and papers, etc., together with such other literature, including periodicals and books, as may be decided upon.

### Section 2: PUBLISHING HOUSE

The Publishing House and its equipment shall be



developed as its business shall expand and funds may be available therefore.

### Section 3: MANAGEMENT

The management of the Publishing House, with its various publications and business interests, shall be vested in the Executive Presbytery, who shall provide such personnel as may be required to supervise and carry on its work.

## ARTICLE XI. VIOLATIONS OF MINISTERIAL COURTESY

All discourteous conduct is disapproved and all ministers are advised against interfering with pastors in charge of assemblies, whether it be by going in upon their work without consent or by such correspondence with members of the assembly as will hurt the influence of the leader. All correspondence which concerns the whole assembly, shall be addressed to the one in charge and not to private members. Where there is no pastor, letters concerning the work shall be addressed to the officers of an assembly.

Any minister who so offends shall be subjected to Scriptural treatment as an offender by the District Council, or if there be none, by the Executive Presbytery of the General Council. Such discourtesy will seriously affect the granting of annual Fellowship Certificates and may be the basis of their recall.

## ARTICLE XII. DISCIPLINE OF MEMBERS

Occasions sometimes arise which make it necessary to deal with ministers who are affiliated with us and whose ministry may have ceased to be effective, or who for some reason may seem to have reached a place where in the judgment of the brethren the tie of Council fellowship should be dissolved.

Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in this matter, it being understood that in case the officary of a District Council shall recommend that Council

fellowship be withdrawn from a minister, or his name dropped from the roll of Council ministers, the action shall be regarded as final, unless said minister shall avail himself of the right of appeal, in which case the matter shall be referred for ratification to the Executive Presbytery of the General Council, a three-fourths vote of said Executive Presbytery being required to adopt the recommendation of the officary of the District Council.

In case the Executive Presbytery shall find the accused guilty, the decision shall be regarded as final, unless the accused shall within thirty days file an appeal for trial by the General Presbytery at its next session.

### ARTICLE XIII. ORDER OF BUSINESS

The regular order of business for the Council Meeting shall be:

1. Appointment of Roster Committee.
2. Report of Roster Committee.
3. Report of the General Superintendent.
4. Report of Secretary.
5. Report of Treasurer.
6. Committee Reports.
7. Unfinished business.
8. Election of Officers.
9. New Business.
10. Adjournment.

All business sessions of the Council shall commence with prayer.

### ARTICLE XIV. FINANCE

The work of the General Council in its definite program of development of the spirit of co-operation and fellowship in home and foreign fields incurs considerable expense, including financial support of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and such other help as may be needed, in maintaining headquarters, purchasing stationery and postage, and defraying traveling expenses, etc.

Therefore, every minister in the fellowship shall recognize his obligation to contribute from his tithes or as an offering, or through his influence, the sum of one dollar per month. And further, looking towards the increased efficiency of the fellowship throughout the entire field, all who can contribute more, personally or through their assemblies, than the suggested amount, are hereby strongly urged to do so. If practicable, let each assembly take one offering each year for the upkeep of the General Council office and traveling expenses.

#### ARTICLE XV: MILITARY SERVICE

While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12:14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Ex. 20:13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5:39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5:44), etc., and

Whereas, These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life;

Whereas, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we can not conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith. (Reaffirmed 1927.)

## ARTICLE XVI

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council. Amendments to be adopted shall require a majority of all votes cast.

### YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES

Moved and carried to adopt the recommendation of the committee on Young People's Societies, viz.:

Whereas, The Scriptures are being fulfilled that "in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy . . . and on My servants and on My handmaidens I will pour out in those days of My Spirit, and they shall prophesy"; and

Whereas, Our young people who are being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit and inspired with love to God and zeal for His service comprise the source from which shall be derived our future ministers, evangelists and missionaries, and they should be encouraged in any activities which may tend to develop them in Christian experience and service, and

Whereas, There now exist in various sections of the United States organizations comprising local and District groups of young people who feel the urge of the Holy Spirit both to meet together in Christian fellowship and to actively engage in the promulgation of the full gospel message by all available means in co-operation with other bodies of like nature and purpose; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this General Council hereby approve of all efforts which are now in existence or which may hereafter be instituted in behalf of our young people, provided such efforts fully comply with the constitutional principles of co-operative fellowship and unity of the Assemblies of God, to wit:

1. All local young people's organizations shall be considered as a branch of the local church work, under the general supervision of the pastor, whose counsel, advice and direction shall be respected in all activities which affect the relationship of the organization to the church and its activities in service.



The local young people may elect their own officers, subject to the approval of the pastor and the Church Board, and may conduct their own services provided such services do not conflict with, nor detract from, the regular services of the church.

The pastor shall be considered as an honorary member of the organization and an ex-officio member of all its committees, and should be respected and honored as a shepherd and guide in all matters of service and fellowship.

The activities of the young people may include:

- (a) Bible Training Classes (the Correspondence Courses of the Central Bible Institute being recommended for this purpose).
- (b) Prayer Meetings in the church or elsewhere which have the approval of the pastor and which will tend to build up the work of the church as a whole.
- (c) Other activities, such as street work, jail services, hospital visitation, ministration to invalids, the sick and shut-ins, tract distribution, etc.

2. Groups of local organizations may be formed into State or District organizations, with the approval of the officary of the District Councils involved. The State or District organization shall be governed by the principles of co-operative fellowship and shall be considered as a branch or department of the District Council. The District Council officary shall be considered as the honorary membership of the District organization and shall be honored and respected in all matters affecting the activities of the organization. The District organization shall have the right to elect its own officers and to supervise its own activities within the boundaries of the territory involved. The superintendent of the District Council shall be an ex-officio member of all District committees. (1927)

## MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

First. There are now among Christian people those who became entangled in their marriage rela-

tions in their former lives of sin, and who do not see how these matters can be adjusted. We recommend that these cases be left in the hands of the Lord, and that they walk in the light as God lets it shine on their souls.

Second. Low standards on marriage and divorce are very hurtful to individuals, to the family, and to the cause of Christ, therefore we discourage divorce by all lawful means and teaching. We positively disapprove of Christians getting divorce for any cause except for fornication and adultery (Matt. 19:9); and recommend the remaining single of all divorced Christians, and that they pray God so to keep them in purity and peace. (See 1 Cor. 7).

Third. Since divorced and remarried persons in the ministry usually cause stumbling, reproach and division, whatever may have been the cause of divorce, we disapprove of our ministers and District Councils ordaining to the full gospel ministry those who have remarried, and are now living in the state of matrimony, while former companions are living. (Ezek. 44:22).

Fourth. As a means of making the above more effective, we disapprove of our Pentecostal ministry performing a marriage ceremony between any believer and a divorced person whose former companion is still living. We also especially warn all our people that unions made in the future and in the face of this warning between any of our ministers and such divorced persons will affect the standing of both the minister who performs the ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, and of the minister entering into such union, whether man or woman, and no matter on which side the divorce lies (1921). (Reaffirmed 1927.)

### PAYING TITHES

We recognize the duty of tithing and we urge all our people to pay tithes to God.

According to the Scriptures tithes should be used for the support of the active ministry and for the

propagation of the Gospel and work of the Lord in general and not given to charity or used for other purposes. All ministers should be tithers, practicing what they preach. (Reaffirmed 1927.)

### REGARDING SECRET SOCIETIES

That all ministers affiliated with us refrain from identifying themselves with any of the secret orders which we recognize as essentially of the world, worldly, and we advise any who may have identified themselves with such orders to sever their connection therewith.

### TRANSFERRING FROM ONE DISTRICT TO ANOTHER

Resolved, That we recommend that our District Councils refrain from ordaining to the ministry any preacher who may have been licensed in another District until such licentiate shall have resided in the District in which he is seeking ordination at least one year and shall have met the requirements of the District granting him a license.

### REGARDING WORLDLINESS

Inasmuch as a spirit of worldliness has been creeping into many of our assemblies and our pastors in some places meet with much opposition as they hold up Bible standards and take a stand against popular sins, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we as a body unitedly declare ourselves against all forms of worldliness, but particularly against modern immodesty and extremity in dress, and that we all agree as pastors, evangelists, licentiates, exhorters, Sunday-school superintendents and teachers, to speak the same things and voice ourselves against all forms of popular sins.

### AFFILIATING WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Resolved, That when any of our ministers shall identify themselves with other organizations granting ministerial credentials and shall have received such credentials, we shall regard their affiliation with this body as having ceased, and that they be requested

to return to headquarters the credentials issued by our Executive Office.

## ATTITUDE TOWARD THOSE REMOVED FROM COUNCIL FELLOWSHIP

Whereas, In our Constitutional Declaration we have included this prerogative, "To disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrine, and conduct," and have provided adequate safeguards in the By-Laws by arranging for appeals from local and District decisions, thus guaranteeing fair and impartial consideration of all matters affecting standing and fellowship; therefore, in order to render effective decisions made in the interest of proper discipline among the ministry and for the protection of our assemblies, be it

Resolved, That decisions arrived at after investigation and consideration of all facts by those qualified to act in such cases according to our co-operative agreements shall be by all considered just and final; and be it further

Resolved, That all ordained and licensed preachers refrain from taking any attitude toward such offenders that would tend to nullify or set at naught the solemn verdict of the brethren entrusted with this responsibility. (1927)

And be it further Resolved: In the event of a violation of this agreement the offender shall be subject to a reprimand, or such other discipline as shall be agreed upon by the officary of the District with which he is affiliated. In the event that the agreement shall be violated outside of his District the officary of the District in which the offense is committed may communicate with the Secretary at headquarters, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to notify the offending brother that a repetition of the offense will seriously affect his standing as a Council minister, and, if persisted in, may result in his suspension or severance from our fellowship. (1929)

## EVANGEL MISSIONARY NUMBERS

Resolved, That we recommend that four issues of



the Pentecostal Evangel each year be denominated Missionary Numbers, and that they be devoted as exclusively as may be found practicable, to the publication of missionary articles and the dissemination of missionary information.

#### REPORTS FOR THE EVANGEL

Whereas, Reports of meetings held and announcements of meetings to be held which are of small value as items of news and are of strictly local interest are sent to the Evangel for publication from time to time, and

Whereas, It is our desire to use all Evangel space to the best possible advantage for the glory of God, therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this General Council that the editor of the Evangel, together with the Executive Presbytery, shall be authorized to leave out of the Evangel such reports and announcements as seem to them to be of not sufficient interest to the majority of Evangel readers to be printed.

#### SAFEGUARDING THE ASSEMBLIES

It is known that many unreliable and unsafe teachers and preachers go about seeking entrance into assemblies without any recommendation, therefore all pastors, workers and leaders of assemblies should make proper investigation regarding such not known to them, and the platform be denied strangers until proper recommendations be forthcoming.

The advice and counsel of the District Presbytery should be sought in such cases, and in all matters of importance when at all possible. Pastors and presbyters should notify each other, reciprocally, as to such persons when any unreliability becomes manifest.

#### AGAINST SETTING A TIME FOR THE LORD'S RETURN

It is unwise to teach that the Lord will come at some specified time, thereby setting a date for His appearing; and also it is unwise to give out from the

platform, or publish visions of numbers and dates fixing the time of the second coming of the Lord.

### HERESIES DISAPPROVED

The General Council hereby disapproves of the Seventh-day teaching, of the extreme so-called Eternal Security teaching, and of the Restitution of All Things doctrine, and those holding and agitating such teaching, thereby causing confusion and division among God's people, shall be dealt with according to Titus 3:10.

### MEATS

The pressing of the question of eating, or not eating meats, is causing divisions in some of the assemblies,

Therefore, the General Council disapproves of such extreme positions on this question which cause these divisions, and we recognize the right of each individual conscience in this matter, according to Col. 2:14-17; Rom. 14:1-23.

## **MINUTES OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL**

**Held at Wichita, Kansas, September 20 to 26, 1929**

The Thirteenth session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God convened at 10 a. m., September 20, 1929, in the Wichita City Forum, Wichita, Kansas.

### **FRIDAY MORNING**

At 10 a. m. the devotional meeting opened with praise and prayer. The song service was led by Brother John Kennedy, of Los Angeles, California.

Brother George A. Jeffrey, of Long Beach, California, read the Scripture lesson.

Brother Fred Vogler, chairman of the Program Committee, called upon Elder E. S. Williams to open with prayer, after which he introduced Mayor Charles S. Lawrence, who in a very excellent address welcomed us to the city of Wichita.

Brother J. Narver Gortner of Oakland, California, then gave a very splendid address in response to the hearty welcome accorded us by the Mayor of the city.

Brother W. T. Gaston then read the list of standing committees, after which he gave a very inspiring message from the text found in Zechariah 4:6, 7.

The Council adjourned at 12 m. to meet at 2 p. m.

### **FRIDAY AFTERNOON**

The meeting opened at 2 p. m. with song service led by Brother Kennedy, following with prayer by Brother P. C. Nelson.

Brother C. A. McKinney then favored us with a special song entitled "The Lord Followed Me."

Brother Donald Gee, of Edinburgh, Scotland, then brought us official greetings from the Assemblies of God in England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales, after

which he brought a splendid message from Matthew 4:1, taking as his subject "The Temptations of Pentecost."

This was followed by two choruses and a short prayer by Brother C. A. McKinney.

Brother Gaston then took the chair and called upon Secretary J. R. Evans to read the minutes of the Executive Presbytery meetings from September 1927 to September 1929. These were adopted as read.

### READING OF REPORTS

Brother W. T. Gaston, General Superintendent, read his report, which was adopted as read.

Brother J. R. Evans read the Secretary's report, which also included the financial statement, which was adopted as read.

After a short song service, followed with prayer by Brother C. A. Lasater, the report of the Gospel Publishing House was read by Secretary J. R. Evans, in the absence of Brother J. Z. Kameron, Manager of the Gospel Publishing House. Adopted as read.

Report of the Publication Department was read by Brother H. H. Moss. Adopted as read.

Meeting adjourned at 5 p. m.

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## REPORTS BY THE VARIOUS OFFICERS OF GENERAL COUNCIL ACTIVITIES DURING THE PERIOD BETWEEN SEPTEMBER 1, 1927, AND SEPTEMBER 1, 1929, COVERING ALL DE- PARTMENTS OF THE WORK.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I shall here present only a very brief synopsis of some matters of general interest to this body.

During the past two years I have spent considerable time visiting District Councils, camp meetings, and general gatherings of various kinds in the interest of the Kingdom of God in general and of our fellowship in particular. There are varied experiences in a work



of this kind with many opportunities for observing conditions. Sometimes and in some places we have found conditions that are most ideal and full of encouragement, but this happy state is not yet universal. I am happy to say, however, that the lovely and beautiful examples of the grace and power of God are always sufficient to keep one rejoicing in the Lord, who in wondrous grace is manifesting Himself to and through His believing people.

I am glad to report that the work in general is making steady progress. There has been a stabilizing influence working in the movement that was sorely needed in the beginning. Preachers are no longer content to move about making converts and leaving them to be devoured by wolves, but are set on building a permanent work on a solid Scriptural basis. This is encouraging and augurs well for the future. On the other hand, if I am able to properly diagnose conditions, there has been a gradual waning of the evangelistic fervor that characterized the days of the early outpouring, and I am convinced that the prime need of the work at this time is a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit to give a new impetus to the smoldering fires of evangelism.

### **Ministers and Assemblies**

Our records show that we are having a healthy growth both in the number of ministers and in churches. At the close of our fiscal year 1927 we had 1,457 ordained ministers on the list. We now have 1,641, a net gain of 184, or 12.6%. In 1927 we had reports from 1,353 assemblies showing a combined membership of 72,143. We now have 1,612 churches with a membership of 91,981, a gain of 259 assemblies and 19,838 communicants. This does not fully represent the numerical strength of the Council fellowship, but we are unable to provide complete figures until all of our ministers co-operate in supplying the necessary information.

### **Missions**

If missionary giving is a true barometer of the

spiritual condition of a religious movement, we have reason to rejoice. The report of our Missionary Secretary will show that considerable more than a half million dollars has been received for missions during the past two years. This represents the largest increase of any like period in our history, and is very encouraging when we consider that this is a pioneer movement and that most of our congregations are still grappling with the problem of building or paying for their places of worship.

The grace of giving, increasingly manifest in our fellowship, calls for humble thanksgiving to God. Let us take courage and rededicate ourselves to the cause of world evangelization.

### **The Evangel**

The Pentecostal Evangel is having a great ministry to our fellowship and it is indeed unfortunate that some of our ministers are slow to see the importance of enlarging its circle of influence. The Evangel placed in the homes of our people will deepen spirituality, increase loyalty to local responsibility and missionary giving. I would here urge on the ministers in particular a consistent and constant loyalty in the support of our official organ and other publications.

### **Gospel Publishing House**

A little over two years ago we increased our floor space approximately 100%, and to-day every available space is being utilized and the entire plant is a beehive of bustling activity. The recent audit shows a net profit of \$21,405.11 for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1928, and for 1929, \$23,402.53, a grand total of \$44,807.64 for the two years.

Part of this money has been invested in machinery, fixtures, etc., and the plant is now an up-to-date institution, where the business of our fellowship is being conducted with efficiency and economy. With an appropriation to the Missionary Rest Home and extensive and necessary improvements and additions now being made at the Central Bible Institute, to-

gether with a new venture in publishing a song book, the balance of the profits will be entirely consumed and the Publishing House will be running on a close margin for a few months to come.

Through the blessing of God and hearty co-operation of all our people, this your own publishing establishment should continue as a great channel of blessing whose influence will be increasingly manifest throughout the world; and since there are no selfish interests served by this business, but its legitimate profits are available for advancing the united interests of our fellowship, it should have the unstinted loyalty of every individual that is interested in advancing the cause we represent.

## REPORT OF GOSPEL PUBLISHING HOUSE

We are pleased to present to the General Council in session, a report of the activities of the Gospel Publishing House. In looking over the financial statement, you will notice that the blessing of the Lord has graciously rested upon this branch of the work, and to Him we ascribe all the glory.

While there has not been a sensational gain in any one department in particular, yet our business has shown a steady increase since the last General Council meeting.

Some important and necessary improvements have been made during the past two years. On account of the existing high insurance rates, it was decided to install an automatic sprinkling system. This has greatly reduced our insurance rates, and at the same time gives us much greater fire protection. The installation of this system cost approximately \$6,000.00.

In December, 1927, a new printing press was purchased for the printing department, at a cost of \$10,000. This press is the best of its kind, and is equipped with an automatic feeder, and pile extension delivery. On this press most of our publications are printed.

Our printing department is now equipped with the very best of machinery which enables us to produce our literature and books very rapidly and economically.

On May 1, 1929, we installed the United Typothetæ Cost Finding System, which is proving a great benefit to us in determining our actual costs of operation throughout the different departments of the Publishing House. We have been highly commended for installing this system by the company which has just completed the audit of our books.

Some changes have been made in our publication department. Last December Brother Moss was appointed acting editor of our different publications, with an almost entirely new editorial staff.

We have added one new paper to our list of publications, the "Christ's Ambassadors Monthly." This paper is published in the interest of our young people, and contains sixteen pages with cover.

The Sunday school literature has shown a splendid gain. A number of schools outside of our movement are now using our literature, and the outlook for future business along this line is bright. Expansion in this part of the work has made it necessary to provide and equip several new offices for this department.

Our book department has shown a steady growth, until now our large number of shelves are crowded with many books which we publish, also with an exceptionally fine line of books and Bibles published by other publishers. Much care has been taken in the selection of these books, in order that we may present to our patrons only the best obtainable.

We now have a number of manuscripts for new books which will be published in the near future.

We have felt the need of publishing a new song book. After much labor and care in selecting songs we have made a compilation which we are confident will prove to be one of the best song books on the market.

At the close of the Central Bible Institute last



spring the Correspondence Courses were transferred to the Publishing House, and from now on all business pertaining to these courses will be conducted from this place. We are anticipating a large enrollment in these correspondence Bible studies, and it is our aim to give the best service possible to those who enroll.

## REPORT OF PUBLICATION DEPARTMENT

The publication department has once again been prospered of the Lord. There has been considerable increase in the output of literature during the past two years.

The editorial staff suffered the loss of three of its oldest members, Stanley H. Frodsham, Mrs. Clara B. Clark and Miss Marjorie Head. Their places have been filled and the work is progressing normally.

### Pentecostal Evangel

The change of editors resulted in a depression in

the circulation of the Evangel, but for the last several months the circulation has been steadily increasing. Notwithstanding this depression, we have printed 3,211,050 Evangels in the two years, which is an increase of 145,020 over the report for 1925-1927.

Plans are under consideration regarding the addition of a Family Circle, a Children's Page and Sunday school lesson comments, that the Pentecostal Evangel may have the fullest possible ministry.

### **Christ's Ambassadors Monthly**

The rapid growth of the Christ's Ambassadors organizations in our assemblies has presented the need for a periodical especially designed for the Young People.

The Christ's Ambassadors Monthly was launched a little over a year ago, and it has been met with interest and appreciation among the Young People. There have been 79,594 printed since its beginning.

### **Sunday School Literature**

The rising tide of Modernism and the resultant loss of spirituality have affected much of the current denominational Sunday school literature. The spiritually-minded are turning to new sources of supply for their quarterlies and papers. We have felt that this was a real opportunity for an enlarged and effective ministry, and so have entered the open door, with the result of a material increase in the number of Sunday schools using our literature.

There are at the present time nearly 3,000 Sunday schools taking the papers and quarterlies. The output of Sunday school papers has now reached a total of 7,388,648 for the two years, which represents an increase of 2,163,815. The output of the quarterlies and leaflets is now 1,384,500 for 1927-1929, which is an increase of 523,500. The combined increase in output of quarterlies is 1,908,000 over the report for 1927.

### **Books**

There have been nineteen books printed since the

last report was given. The combined copies printed of these books totaled 67,288.

There are several new manuscripts which are ready for publication. Among the books to be printed are two for children. It is noteworthy that our children's books are being well received by publishing houses and bookstalls outside of our movement.

There is also a book of poems, which is one of the finest and most spiritual that has been produced in Pentecostal circles.

Perhaps one of the greatest needs in the publication of books which bear directly upon the work of our fellowship has been for missionary books. The first along this line will be ready to print shortly, "Jungle Trails" and "Life on the Congo." Both tell in a graphic manner the story of Pentecostal missionary work in the Belgian Congo. A special effort is being made to procure missionary manuscript from our missionaries on the various fields.

In addition to this a new song book, which will contain 256 pages, has been compiled. An abridged edition has been published for use in the General Council.

### **Tracts**

There has been a decrease in the circulation of tracts. This was due to the fact that sending out of free tracts could not be carried on, as the free literature fund was depleted and insufficient funds were forthcoming to provide for the free printing of the tracts. This necessitated a return to the original policy of charging for tracts. However, the sale of our tracts has been growing rapidly and we are well on the way to overcoming the depression.

The report for 1927 showed an output of 3,762,400 tracts, whereas the 1927-1929 output has been 3,173,699, which represents a loss of 588,731 in the circulation of this class of literature.

### **A Forward Step**

The tremendous growth in the output of pernicious literature which is degrading to the moral and spiritual life of the youth of this present time, has brought

forcibly to us the power in the printed page. Never in the history of the world has there been so great a need for the spread of the gospel message through the agency of the printed page, to offset the sinister evil of modern literature.

We have added another member to the editorial staff for the purpose of giving special attention to the circulation of our printed matter.

We have also secured another experienced writer to develop the Family Circle and Children's Page, and also to prepare missionary literature.

### **Correspondence School**

The constant appeal from the field for a course of Bible study which could be taken by correspondents led to the preparation by the faculty of the Central Bible Institute of a series of correspondence courses.

This work has now been taken over by the Publishing House. It will hereafter be known as the Central Bible Institute Correspondence School.

There are 208 enrolled students taking these studies at the present.

# REPORT OF MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

## General Report

It is with thanksgiving that we can look back over the past two years of missionary endeavor, in consideration of what has been accomplished through our missionaries for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands. At the last Council meeting we had 277 missionaries on our list while at the present time we have 279. The total number of appointments during the last two years amounts to 43. The reason we do not show a similar increase in numbers above the total of missionaries reported in 1927 is because a number of names have been removed from our missionary list of those who are no longer actively engaged in foreign work or who are uncertain as to when, if ever, they will return to foreign countries. In addition we deeply regret having to report a few names as missing who were with us at our last gathering—Miss Sara Coxe of India, Mrs. Carrie Chawner of South Africa, Mrs. Esther Juergensen of Japan, Miss Jessie Eustace of Liberia, and Miss Katherine Kirsch of Liberia. All of these died in faith having a good report and we are sure do not regret having given their lives for so great a cause.

Our General Council work now covers stations on the following fields: Belgian Congo, Egypt, French Sudan, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Transvaal, China (covering twelve provinces known as the North China, South China, West China and S. W. China fields), North and South India, Ceylon, Straits Settlements, Japan, Palestine, Syria, Persia, Transjordan, Porto Rico, Nicaragua, Mexico, Peru, Venezuela, Argentina, Fiji Islands, Hawaiian Islands, Bulgaria, Hungary, Greece, Latvia, Poland and Russia.

Much has been accomplished, but much more yet remains to be done. We are living in a day of general upheaval and changes are taking place in practically every phase of life, whether it be in the political, commercial, social, or religious field.



One of the most outstanding and far-reaching of changes which is taking place in the political world and which is exerting its influence upon religion is the wave of Nationalism that is rapidly spreading from country to country. The effect it is having upon the religious life of the people is that it tends to make the native Christians feel their own responsibility for the maintaining of the church work, just as much as they desire to control the affairs of their nation.

This is not altogether an unfavorable situation, since it has even been our Council policy to plant the native church on a self-supporting basis, both as regards its ministry as well as finance, and anything that helps to that end should be an encouragement to us. It is very doubtful whether the churches Paul established ever had help from Jerusalem, but rather they helped the home base by sending gifts to the poor of that city. Of course, things are somewhat different in comparing the wealth of America with the poverty of most heathen lands; but if Mohammedanism can plant its creed in the hearts of people and spread with such tremendous rapidity merely through the efforts of its adherents, how much more should the church of Christ expand, not necessarily through the support of more hired preachers or erection of buildings, but through the conversion of souls who have been brought into the knowledge of the truth because of the witnessing of those who have heard and passed the Good News along?

It is an encouragement to us to know that this is not merely a theory, but on some of the fields our missionaries have been able to put this into effect with a good measure of success, and we are convinced that the nearer we approach to Scriptural methods in the conduct of our work, the greater will be the blessing of God upon our ministry.

A big problem that faces us, and we presume will continue to do so, is the arranging of the support of candidate missionaries, since the funds we are now receiving are not nearly adequate for the workers we

already have on our list. If new missionaries are sent out, we must make sure to secure additional funds for every new member appointed. Otherwise, any benefit derived through the help we send to the field in the form of additional helpers will be more than offset by the reduction of finances.

We fully realize that from a natural standpoint the maintenance of our work as a whole depends entirely upon the good-will and co-operation of our local Assemblies and District Councils with the Foreign Missions Department, and it is most essential that everything possible be done to encourage this happy bond of fellowship and united endeavor, so that the Foreign Missions Department may function as the channel through which the Assemblies of God carries on its missionary work. Independent effort not only results in an inequality in the distribution of funds, but also is based upon unscriptural principles. Unity of spirit and of effort seemed to characterize the activities of the early church which we are endeavoring to pattern after.

A matter which should demand the consideration of our fellowship is the advisability of appointing someone to visit the various fields in which our missionaries are employed, with the object of contributing first-hand information to the Missionary Committee to guide the brethren in their decisions. The right man selected for this position would not only be of help to the home office, but would undoubtedly be of real value to the missionaries on the field, in helping them in their problems and encouraging them by his ministry; while again, at home he would be able to impart to the fellowship as a whole the experience gleaned from such a trip. Another and still more important result would be the enlarging of our vision of the work as a whole and a fuller realization of how much territory is yet to be occupied. This could not all be arranged at once, but different countries could be selected each year for visitation.

I would recommend that the Executive Presbytery

be authorized to appoint some one to this responsibility.

Another matter that should have our careful consideration is the arranging for the relief of missionaries who either through old age or disability are obliged to suspend their activities on the foreign field. To provide for this emergency satisfactorily a minimum term of service should be decided on in order to determine the eligibility of applicants for the aforementioned benefit; and also some basis on which we may decide when physical disability of missionaries entitles them to continued help. It would seem that, in view of the fact that as yet there is no provision made for the relief of our ministers who may be in such a predicament, we ought to confine the relief of our missionaries to those who break down directly in consequence of their service on the foreign field, due to climatic or living conditions which they would not have experienced in the United States.

Before closing this report, I wish to express on behalf of the Missionary Committee the appreciation of the splendid co-operation we have experienced from the fellowship. May the Lord anoint us all afresh for the responsibilities that are laid upon us and enable us to press forward in His Name to new victories during the next two years, should our Lord tarry that long.

### **Financial Report**

It is gratifying to note that the offerings for missions have still continued to increase steadily in spite of the fact that in some localities there has been financial depression. Our offerings for the two years ending August 31, 1929, total \$500,652.91, showing an increase of \$88,892.19 over the previous two years ending August 31, 1927, and an increase of \$179,230.32 over the two years ending August 31, 1925. Since we calculate that only about two thirds of the money sent to our missionaries

passes through the hands of the Missionary Department, we are safe in estimating that at least another \$250,000.00 has been sent to the field, making a grand total of approximately \$750,000.00 that has been given for Foreign Missions during the last two years.

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The reason some of the States do not figure more prominently is because some have only recently adopted the Plan, or else facilities have not been provided to put the Plan into operation. Again, it would be well to explain that more than the figures represent has actually been given for Home Missions under the Busy Bee Plan, since for a time the offerings were divided by the Assemblies and sent direct to the District Treasurer, with the result that it was almost impossible for us to know how much was being given in this way. All offerings in the Busy Bee Plan are now sent direct to headquarters at Springfield, and there the recommended division is made between Home and Foreign Missions. The Home Missions money is supposed to be used for pioneer work in the respective Districts, so that by investing the money in this way more Assemblies are started, and in consequence more money flows into the treasury for Foreign Missions. In case some one might criticize in thinking that we are robbing the foreign missionaries for the home end, we would like to explain that the Busy Bee Plan in its first form was originated by one of our missionaries in the North Central District, and our year's figures show that in spite of the \$4,135.68 extra that has gone for Home Missions, the amount for Foreign Missions has not only kept up to its level, but has gone over that of years when everything was put into the foreign work alone. From the many favorable comments we receive and the encouraging results derived from this Plan in operation, we are fully convinced that it has been a prominent factor, not only in causing funds for Missions to increase, but also in securing a steadier flow of funds than formerly, since there has not been the big fluctuations during the summer months experienced in other years. Many Assemblies have doubled and in some cases trebled their offerings without causing their other interests to suffer in consequence. Another direct result of the Plan has been the adding to our list of around 117 Assemblies who were formerly giving

nothing for Missions. The underlying principle of the Plan is to get everybody busy for God from the least to the greatest. It is better to give a nickel a week than to give nothing at all.

The money represented as given by the above-mentioned Assemblies was not necessarily all given

through the Foreign Missions Department, but we have given each local Assembly credit for any funds given direct to the missionaries when the amount has been reported to us.

The expenses of the Foreign Missions Department have been partially met from offerings received especially designated for this purpose. The balance has been made up through the interest secured on accounts or an appropriation from the fund which is made up of contributions sent to the office for us to use in any branch of the work "wherever needed most."

The policy of sending all money to the field exactly as designated has been consistently carried out. All money marked for Foreign Missions is used for no other purpose, and when money is designated for missionaries the total amount is always sent to the particular missionary as requested.

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## FIELD REPORT

### Africa

**Belgian Congo** has a population of eight and one half million souls. At present we have just 12 missionaries on this field with one other under appointment. We are happy to report that considerable progress has taken place since we last reported on this field. At that time we had but one station at Gombari, which is our headquarters; but now we are branching out and have occupied two other stations, with the prospect of entering a third in the near future. We have no native evangelists as yet.

**Sierra Leone** has a population of a million and a half. It is at present without an Assemblies of God representative on the field. Our station is at Freetown, which is under the supervision of native workers.

**Liberia** has a population of one and three-quarter million souls and is occupied by 16 of our mission-

aries and 14 native workers. New outposts have been opened during the last two years, but owing to the lack of workers others have had to be closed, so that our figures remain the same as two years ago with seven stations and five outstations.

**French West Africa** has a population of about 12 million. We have 11 missionaries under appointment for this field, and have as our objective the evangelization of the two million Mossi people. The prospects are good for the opening of new stations in this territory. We are at present occupying two stations and have one native evangelist. The work is comparatively new, so that considerable work has had to be done in the translation of the Scriptures into the vernacular. Several of the Gospels have now been prepared so that the converts have the joy of reading God's Word for themselves.

**Transvaal.** Although there are large numbers of English and Dutch settlers in this territory, yet the native population outnumbers the white five to one. Our missionaries, during the last few years have taken some real progressive steps, and new work has been opened.

We have 6 missionaries and 3 stations with 13 outstations. The missionaries are assisted by 13 native workers.

**Egypt,** with a population of 12,750,000, is mostly Mohammedan in its religion, although there are a large number of Copts. These last mentioned people can only be called Christian in name, but they are much easier to win than the Mohammedans. We have 9 missionaries under appointment for this field, several of whom are now home on furlough. A very fine work is in progress at Assiout, where one of our missionaries is conducting an orphanage and mission. Over 500 widows and children are being provided for and taught God's Word. A considerable part of the support of this work comes from Egyptian sources, which reveals the appreciation of the Egyptian people for what is being done in their midst. Another

good work is being conducted in Cairo, where a school and mission are supervised by our missionaries. Also an Arabic paper is published, sending to the people the gospel in their own language. This paper reaches many other lands where Arabic is spoken. The rest of the work is mainly evangelistic in character, and comprises altogether 4 stations. The native Assemblies have been placed entirely under native supervision, and a good report was sent to us recently by the native representative.

### China

Most figures for China are out of date, in view of the fact that there has been no satisfactory survey made for a number of years. But to quote from a recent publication which we believe to be comparatively accurate, there are 333 counties with 166,500 towns and villages having a total population of 38,508,305 without a single evangelistic center or a single Christian. This poor country has been torn by war, famine and banditry as far back as we have record, but changes are taking place which we hope may tend to a better condition of affairs.

A progressive move that is being made at the present time by some of our missionaries is an attempt to open up the field of Manchuria, which hitherto has been untouched by Pentecostal missionaries. Space forbids our going into detail in this report, so it will suffice to state that the field of Manchuria presents golden opportunities for the establishing of the church of Christ.

The Assemblies of God work in China covers 12 Provinces; namely, Mongolia, Kansu, Shansi, Chihli, Peking, Shantung, Kiangsu, Chekiang, Kwangsi, Kwangtung, Yunnan and the new Province of Manchuria. The work in each locality that has been opened is progressing satisfactorily, but especially in those where the work is more of a pioneer nature, such as that conducted in Kansu, on the borders of Tibet, and among the tribes people of Yunnan Province.



In Chihli Province we have recently heard of an encouraging example of what the Holy Spirit can do through the native Christians without the continual assistance of foreign help. A little company which had been saved through the ministry of the missionaries had been left to themselves for a considerable period of time without any further help, and the missionary was happily surprised to find when revisiting the work that a number had been saved in the intervening period and were awaiting his arrival in order to confess their new found Lord in baptism.

In our entire China field, we have 64 missionaries occupying 22 stations and 47 outstations. The missionaries are assisted by 118 native workers.

Most of the work in China is of an evangelistic character, although our missionaries have some school work and two splendid orphanages are in operation, one in Shantung Province, where over 600 widows and orphans are cared for, and another is in Chekiang Province. A paper is published in the vernacular by one of our missionaries in South China. It is proving a real blessing to people, not only of our own viewpoint of truth, but to others also who are seeking after God.

## India

**India**, the land of many gods and aflame with religious zeal, is yet steeped in the darkness of night. It has a teeming population, three times as many as that of the United States, although her land area is not so large. Over 700,000 villages and towns are still without a witness for Christ. We have a noble little army of missionaries doing the best they can to give forth the Message of Life against these tremendous odds. We have 77 missionaries under appointment for this field who are assisted by 160 native workers. These figures include North and South India and also Ceylon. The work has been progressing in both sections of the country. In the North the most recent development has been to establish

a Bible school for the training of native men as evangelists and women as Bible women.

In addition there is a boys' school, a girls' school, a young widows' home, a children's home and a leper colony. In all, 26 stations have been opened and 68 outstations.

### **Japan**

**Japan** has a population of 76,988,000. Although there are many evangelical agencies at work in this country, yet the distribution of Christian forces is very unequal. For instance, in one city a short time ago there were 62 Protestant missionaries, and all but 6 were living in one section of the city. Christianity is now considered by the people of Japan as one of the big religions of their country. Christianity, Shinto, and Buddhism are looked upon as the big three.

We have at present 15 missionaries on this field occupying 7 stations and 11 outstations assisted by 12 native workers. The work has been growing steadily, although not rapidly, since as is the condition in many other countries, our missionaries have to contend with a shifting population. A few souls may be won for the Lord and then they move off into a different section of the country. A marked feature of the work during the past two years has been a real endeavor on the part of the missionaries to organize the work more substantially so that they may present a more united front, in the great task entrusted to them. In addition to a Bible school for women, there is also some school work and an orphanage conducted by our missionaries.

### **Mexican Work**

The population of Mexico is estimated at 15 million, but there are many thousands of Mexicans living on the American side of the border who are engaging the attention of the missionaries. The work is growing so continuously that it is difficult to give accurate figures of the number of Assemblies established or native workers who are assisting in the

work. This is one of the ripe harvest fields and God is adding large numbers to the church. We have 11 missionaries under appointment for this work. Three Bible schools are in operation: one in San Diego, Calif., one in San Antonio, Texas, and another in Mexico City. A most useful department of our Latin-American work is the publishing house for Spanish literature operated in San Antonio, Texas.

### **Porto Rico**

**Porto Rico** has a population of 1,299,800, the larger number of whom are extremely poor and with little education. We have four missionaries on this field who are assisted by 23 native workers. Twenty-nine Assemblies have been opened, of which a large number are self-supporting, while others assume a good part of the financial burden. The work is generally evangelistic in character. A paper is published by one of our missionaries to facilitate the circulation of the gospel.

### **Salvador**

A recent development in the Latin-American work has resulted through the visit of our Superintendent of the Latin-American work to Salvador. It was discovered that there is a real prospect of a flourishing work in this territory, since there are already 8 Assemblies with native pastors which are functioning without foreign aid. Three chapels have been built by the native Christians, and there are at least twelve tried and able native preachers who are actively engaged in the spread of the gospel. It is estimated that the number of those who have entered into the Pentecostal experience in Salvador approximated 1,000.

### **South America**

**South America** is assuming an increasingly large place in the world. Capital and people are pouring into that country from the overcrowded sections of

Europe. South America proper has a population of 64,840,278 and includes 13 republics.

Our missionaries are working in but three of these republics—Peru, having a population of 5,500,000; Argentina, having a population of 8,698,516; and Venezuela with a population of 2,411,952. Peru is occupied by 10 of our missionaries who are helping to fill 4 stations and 5 outstations, assisted by 3 native workers. The progress in this country has been encouraging.

**Argentina** has only one Assemblies of God station and 2 outstations, although our Canadian brethren are developing a work on this field.

**Venezuela** has two of our missionaries, who went to the field during the last year.

**Nicaragua** is another land of opportunity. The work in the past has been seriously handicapped owing to the lack of workers. We now have 4 missionaries and 2 stations with 2 outstations. The missionaries are assisted by 4 native workers.

**British West Indies.** Two of our missionaries are working in this territory under the direction of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada.

## Europe

Our work in Europe has taken some very definite strides forward since we arranged to work in co-operation with our brethren of the Russian and Eastern European Mission.

Europe is generally considered to be evangelized territory, and yet the vast majority of the people are absolutely ignorant of the saving truths of the gospel, rather clinging to the traditions and faith of their forefathers than the Word of God's truth.

**Greece** is a country of 4,943,000, where we have one missionary.

**Hungary** has a population of 7,980,143. This country like many others has been going through great trial. Her population before the war was 18 million souls and has now been reduced to less than eight. God is working in the hearts of the people and a real

revival spirit is on in many places. We have four missionaries on this field.

**Latvia** has two Assemblies of God missionaries and a population of 1,865,870.

**Po'and**, with a population of 27,192,600, has 6 of our missionaries.

**Bulgaria**, with a population of 4,958,400, has two missionaries. God has prospered the efforts of our representatives in this land which was lacking in teachers, and our brother and his wife are gradually winning the respect of the people, who are adopting a more Scriptural order in their meetings.

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**Soviet Russia** has only one of our missionaries, but he is ably assisted by a large number of native workers, so that between 400 and 500 Assemblies have been gathered out and affiliated with the Assemblies of God. Our Russian brethren need much prayer at this time, since they are having to face the issue as to whether they will conform to all the requirements of the Soviet Government, which some feel contrary to their conscience, or suffer the severe penalties exacted by that Government on those who are not subject to it.

**Persia** has a population of between eight and ten million. We have two missionaries on this field. Others will be sent out as soon as funds are available. The work is very largely among the Nestorian Christians, although efforts are being made to reach the Mohammedans.

**Syria, Transjordan, and Palestine.** Although three separate countries yet they have much in common so that we are linking them together. At present there is considerable unrest in each of these lands. The unity of Islam has been badly shaken by the rising spirit of Nationalism. In Palestine, there is extreme tension between Jew and Arab. Syria is very much disturbed and Transjordan is necessarily affected by what transpires in the other two lands. God is blessing, however, in spite of these condi-



tions, and there is a real revival spirit on in Trans-jordan where the people manifest a hunger for God's Word. We have two missionaries in Syria occupying one station, and are ministering to 4 outstations assisted by 8 native workers. The population of Syria is approximately 3 million.

There are 8 of our missionaries in Palestine occupying 3 stations and two outstations. The missionaries are assisted by several native workers.

**Hawaiian Islands**, with a population of 298,500, have two of our missionaries.

**Fiji Islands**, with a population of 117,000, have three missionaries, and another under appointment for this field is making preparations to sail as soon as practicable.

**Straits Settlements.** This is a new work that has been recently opened by two of our missionaries and is proving very successful. God has blessed the ministry in Singapore and a flourishing mission and school are in progress.

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## CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE

Central Bible Institute is a General Council school duly authorized and established by the Council. To the Council it is responsible and to the Council must it look for co-operation and help, if its standards be maintained, and if it is to grow and fulfill its mission.

The school has been in existence six years, two years operating in the basement of the local assembly and four years in the present building. Four classes, numbering in all 105 students, have been graduated. Of this number many are engaged actively as ministers of the gospel, 35 are on the foreign field, and others are engaged in minor activities connected with spreading the glorious gospel of Jesus Christ; such as, home missionary work, song leaders, Sunday school teachers, etc.

Each year for the past four years the student body

has been organized into a Missionary Band, with officers elected from the body, for the purpose of directing and stimulating missionary interests. During this past year alone the students pledged to foreign missions \$6,250.00, most of which has already been collected and distributed. The interest has been steadily growing since the institution of this organized effort among the students for the definite promotion of missions.

Each noon hour from 12 to 12:30, the students gather to pray for missions and the different needs of the different fields are brought to the Lord, as a volume of earnest prayer ascends to the throne. Often one or more is given a deeper glimpse of the great need of bearing these needs to God in prayer, and when the dinner bell sounds, they remain and pray. At other times the Lord specially blesses and the students file into the dining halls with tear-stained faces and a holy hush is over all.

On Friday afternoons the students meet in groups according to the field in which they are more definitely interested, for a study of the facts relating to the land, people, the needs of the respective fields, and to pray for the missionaries on that special field and for the extension of missions in that country.

Each week-end the students have assignments for meetings at near-by towns and country schoolhouses. They also have services once a week in two clothing factories in the city, jail services and services at the poor-farm. In these meetings some are led into the light of salvation, or healing, and many hearts cheered and helped.

There has been a change in the management of the school which will go into effect this present school year. Since Brother Frank M. Boyd has accepted school work on the west coast, the school directorate has been fortunate in securing Brother W. I. Evans as principal and manager of Central Bible Institute. Brother Evans was for a number of years principal of Bethel Bible Training School of Newark, N. J. He is a deeply spiritual man, with a vision of the need of

the careful training of our young people along the lines of spiritual life and service.

The enrollment of the school last year was 123. We expect an enrollment this year of 135. We take this opportunity to bring before our people, and especially the pastors, the need in their assemblies for encouraging and stimulating the interest of the young people in preparing themselves definitely, especially the young men, as there is a crying need everywhere for more consecrated Spirit-filled young men.

### **Enlargement**

This year a new heating system has been installed, and a 10-room brick and tile bungalow erected. We rejoice that just when those improvements seemed imperative our bountiful heavenly Father made them possible.

Central Bible Institute is a growing institution, and there is need for a chapel, music rooms, prayer rooms, etc. We invite the prayerful interest of our fellowship that these needs also may be supplied.

In this time of growing apostasy we especially desire the intercessions of the church to the end that Central Bible Institute may continue and increase as a spiritual power house, where the Word of God may be studied in a spiritual atmosphere where knowledge is not obtained at the sacrifice of faith and character, but where increase of knowledge is balanced by a corresponding growth in grace.

## RESOLUTIONS

Resolved, That the matter of the change of the name be deferred indefinitely.

Resolved, That in accordance with constitutional agreement we recommend that the Constitution be so revised as to eliminate the office of Assistant General Superintendent.

Resolved, That we refrain at this session from electing an Assistant General Superintendent, allowing the office to remain vacant through a failure to elect.

Resolved, That in view of the need of some competent person to do field work, we elect a Field Secretary to work under the supervision of the Executive Presbytery, and that the Executive Presbytery be authorized and instructed to outline the duties of said Field Secretary, said outline to take the place in our By-Laws of Article III, entitled, "Duties of the Assistant General Superintendent." It is understood that the sections of Article III of our By-Laws shall be so arranged that each section shall appear in its logical place.

Resolved, That Section 2 of Article 9 of our constitution be changed so as to read: "The Executive Presbytery shall consist of nine brethren, six of whom, including the General Superintendent and Secretary, shall be resident, and three of whom shall be non-resident, at Springfield, Missouri."

Resolved, That in the event that Districts fail to reach an agreement relative to boundary lines, the Executive Presbytery of the General Council be authorized to set such lines, and that said Executive Presbytery be empowered to create new Districts when and where deemed advisable, it being understood that the brethren who may be occupying such territory as new Districts are to be formed in, be consulted and their wishes given due consideration.

Resolved, That the following paragraph be added to the resolution on "Attitude Toward Those Removed from General Council Fellowship," found on pages seventy-one and seventy-two of our "Constitution and

By-Laws of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, including Essential Resolutions Revised and Adopted, September 16 to 22, 1927." (See page 34.)

Whereas, There is a large Indian population in the U. S. A. among which very little gospel work is being done, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That we, as a fellowship, place ourselves on record as in favor of every effort made for the evangelization of this people, and

Be it Further Resolved, That the General Superintendent be requested to appoint a committee of three ministers to make due investigation and formulate a plan for the evangelization of the Indians, and report to the Missionary Committee, who are hereby authorized to take such action as they may deem advisable.

It was moved and carried that Brother J. D. Wells, of Eureka, California, be given permission to speak on the Indian question at a later meeting.

Council adjourned at 12 m.

#### MONDAY AFTERNOON

Devotional service opened with singing led by Brother Carl Graves, after which Brother and Sister C. E. McCarrell of Oklahoma sang a special song entitled, "Have I Not Chosen You?"

### **Report of Committee on Bible Schools**

Your Committee on Bible Schools beg leave to report as follows:

1. Recognizing the need of a great host of reapers to gather in the golden grain, now ripe for harvest in all parts of the world, and recognizing also the need of thorough training for these workers, we rejoice in the fact that Bible schools have been established in different parts of the country to meet this need. Our Lord Himself set the example by giving His apostles a thorough course of training before He trusted them with the full responsibility of carrying on the work. Before He ascended He commissioned His followers to go and teach all nations (Matt. 28:19). The early disciples continued steadfastly in the apostles' teaching (Acts 2:41). When Jesus ascended on high He gave some teachers (Eph. 4:11). "The things which thou hast heard of me among many witnesses commit thou to faithful men who shall be able to teach others also," was the admonition of Paul to Timothy. If the office of teacher in the church has the sanction of our Lord, the teacher is entitled to the respect and esteem of the churches which he serves in this capacity.

2. While we believe in the most thorough training in the Word of God, under the guidance of divinely-called, Spirit-filled teachers, we recognize the need of practical experience in Christian work to supplement the faithful study of the Word. For this reason we would lay special emphasis on the necessity of giving our students such training before they are graduated from our Bible schools.

3. In view of the fact that many of our brethren have been called from the shop and the plow to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ, without opportunities to take courses in Bible schools, we would recommend that all such, as far as possible, avail them-



selves of the excellent correspondence courses now provided by our publishing house in Springfield, Missouri.

4. In order to discover and select the best candidates available to study in our Bible schools we recognize the need of hearty co-operation of our pastors with the schools.

5. We feel the need of co-operation on the part of our district superintendents and pastors in locating the graduates of our schools who feel called to labor at home, and we call on our people to pray most earnestly that funds may be provided to send forth the many graduates who have the call of God upon them for foreign missionary service.

6. Our experienced brethren can render valuable assistance to our new recruits who are earnestly striving to render faithful and efficient service to our King, by visiting them, and giving them fraternal love, and the benefit of their larger experience.

7. On account of the worldliness of many of our high schools and colleges and their antagonistic attitude for the most part to the Pentecostal message, there is a growing need of academic schools of our faith in different parts of our country to provide education without contamination of worldly and antichristian influences. We believe that our fellowship should look with favor upon the establishment of such schools, and should look forward to the time, if the Lord tarry, when we may have somewhere an institution of college grade, where the most complete and thorough education can be obtained under Pentecostal auspices.

That we express our thanks to Brother Phillips and to Brother Bauer for the help rendered in securing the use of the two grand pianos that helped to make possible the splendid musical treats of the Council, and to the firms that loaned these pianos to us without cost; to Brother Donald Gee for his able and inspirational messages, which have greatly helped to make this session one of the most memorable in the history of our organization; to our General Superintendent, Brother W. T. Gaston, for the courteous and able manner in which he has presided at our business sessions; and to the editorial and publishing house staff of the Gospel Publishing House of Springfield, Missouri, for the efficient service rendered.

Resolved further, That we acknowledge our indebtedness to our Secretary, Brother J. R. Evans, for the painstaking efforts he has put forth in the discharge of his official duties.

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## THE ADORABLE GODHEAD

### (a) Terms Defined.

The terms "Trinity" and "Persons," as related to the Godhead, while not found in the Scriptures, are words in harmony with Scripture, whereby we may convey to others our immediate understanding of the doctrine of Christ respecting the Being of God, as distinguished from "gods many and lords many." We, therefore, may speak with propriety of the Lord our God, who is One Lord, as a trinity or as one Being of three persons, and still be absolutely Scriptural. (Examples, Matt. 2:6; 8:16, 17; Acts 15:15-18.)

### (b) Distinction and Relationship in the Godhead.

Christ taught a distinction of Persons in the Godhead which He expressed in specific terms of relationship, as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, but that this distinction and relationship, as to its mode is **inscrutable** and **incomprehensible**, because **unexplained**. (Luke 1:35; 1 Cor. 1:24; Matt. 11:25-27; 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14; 1 John 1:3, 4.)

### (c) Unity of the One Being of Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Accordingly, therefore, there is **that** in the Son

which constitutes Him **the Son** and not the Father; and there is **that** in the Holy Ghost which constitutes Him **the Holy Ghost** and not either the Father or the Son. Wherefore the Father is the Begetter, the Son is the Begotten; and the Holy Ghost is the one proceeding from the Father and the Son. Therefore, because these three persons in the Godhead are in a state of **unity**, there is but one Lord God Almighty and His name one. John 1:18; 15:26; 17:11, 21; Zech. 14:9.

(d) **Identity and Co-operation in the Godhead.**

The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost are never **identical** as to **Person**; nor **confused** as to **relation**; nor **divided** in respect to the Godhead; nor **opposed** as to **co-operation**. The Son is **in** the Father and the Father is **in** the Son as to relationship. The Son is **with** the Father and the Father is **with** the Son, as to fellowship. The Father is not **from** the Son, but the Son is **from** the Father, as to authority. The Holy Ghost is **from** the Father and the Son proceeding, as to nature, relationship, co-operation and authority. Hence, neither Person in the Godhead either exists or works separately or independently of the others. John 5:17-30.

(e) **The Title, Lord Jesus Christ.**

The appellation "Lord Jesus Christ" is a proper name. It is never applied, in the New Testament, either to the Father or to the Holy Ghost. It therefore belongs exclusively to the **Son of God**. Rom. 1:1-3, 7; 2 John 3.

(f) **The Lord Jesus Christ, God with us.**

The Lord Jesus Christ, as to His divine and eternal nature, is the proper and only Begotten of the Father; but as to His human nature, He is the proper Son of Man. He is, therefore, acknowledged to be both God and man; who, because He is God and man, is "Immanuel," God with us. Matt. 1:23; 1 John 4:2, 10, 14; Rev. 1:13, 14-17.

(g) **The Title, Son of God.**

Since the name "Immanuel" embraces both God and man in the one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ, it follows that the title, Son of God, describes His proper Deity, and the title, Son of Man, His proper humanity. Therefore, the title, Son of God, belongs to the **order of eternity**, and the title, Son of Man, to the **order of time**. Matt. 1:23, 21; 2 John 3; 1 John 3:8; Heb. 7:3; 1:1-13.

(h) **Transgression of the Doctrine of Christ.**

Wherefore, it is a transgression of the Doctrine of Christ to say that Jesus Christ derived the title, Son of

God, solely from the fact of the incarnation, or because of His relation to the economy of redemption. Therefore, to deny that the Father is a real and eternal Father, and that the Son is a real and eternal Son, is a denial of the distinction and relationship in the Being of God; a denial of the Father and the Son: and a **displacement** of the truth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. 2 John 9; John 1:1, 2, 14, 18, 29, 49; 8:57, 58; 1 John 2:22, 23; 4:1-5; Heb. 12:3, 4.

(i) **Exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord.**

The Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, having by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; angels and principalities and powers having been made subject unto Him. And, having been made both Lord and Christ, He sent the Holy Ghost that we, in the name of Jesus, might bow our knees and confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father until the end when the Son shall become subject to the Father that God may be all in all. Heb. 1:3; 1 Peter 3:22; Acts 2:32-36; Rom. 14:11; 1 Cor. 15:24-28.

(j) **Equal Honor to the Father and to the Son.**

Wherefore, since the Father has delivered all judgment unto the Son, it is not only the **express duty** of all in heaven and on earth to bow the knee, but it is an **unspeakable joy** in the Holy Ghost to ascribe unto the Son all the attributes of Deity, and to give Him all the honor and the glory contained in all the names and titles of the Godhead (except those which express relationship. See paragraphs b, c, and d), and thus honor the Son even as we honor the Father. John 5:22, 23; 1 Peter 1:8; Rev. 5:6-14; Phil. 2:8, 9; Rev. 7:9, 10; 4:8-11.
