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**CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF  
THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND  
FOREIGN LANDS, ADOPTED  
SEPTEMBER 8-13, 1931**

**CONSTITUTIONAL DECLARATION**

Whereas, It is the express purpose of God, our heavenly Father, to call out of the world a saved people, who shall constitute the body or church of Jesus Christ, built and established upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner stone; and

Whereas, The members of the body, the church (ecclesia) of Jesus Christ, are enjoined to assemble themselves together for worship, fellowship, counsel and instruction in the Word of God and the work of the ministry and for the exercise of those spiritual gifts and offices provided for in the New Testament; and

Whereas, It is evident that the early apostolic churches came together in such fellowship as a representative body of saved, Spirit-filled believers, who ordained and sent out evangelists and missionaries, and who under the supervision of the Holy Spirit, set over the church pastors and teachers; therefore be it

Resolved, That we recognize ourselves as a co-operative fellowship of Pentecostal, Spirit-baptized saints from local Pentecostal Assemblies of like precious faith throughout the United States and foreign lands, to be known as the General Council of the Assemblies of God whose purpose is not to usurp authority over the various local assemblies, nor to deprive them of their Scriptural and local rights and privileges, but to recognize and promote scriptural methods and order for worship, unity, fellowship, work and business for God; and to disapprove unscriptural methods, doc-

trines and conduct, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace, "till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The name shall be, The General Council of the Assemblies of God.

#### ARTICLE II. NATURE

The General Council of the Assemblies of God is a co-operative fellowship based upon mutual agreements voluntarily entered into by its membership.

#### ARTICLE III. PREROGATIVES

1. To approve all scriptural teachings, methods and conduct; and to disapprove unscriptural teachings, methods and conduct.

2. To encourage and promote the evangelization of the world.

3. To provide a basis of fellowship among Christians of like precious faith.

4. To establish and maintain such departments and institutions as may be necessary for the propagation of the Gospel and the work of this Pentecostal fellowship.

5. To have the right to own, hold in trust, use, sell, convey, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of, such property, real or chattel, as may be needed for the prosecution of its work.

#### ARTICLE IV. PRINCIPLES

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall represent as nearly as possible in detail, the body of Christ as described in the New Testament Scriptures, recognizing the principles inherent in that body as also inherent in this fellowship, particularly the principles of unity, co-operation and equality. Its purpose is to maintain conditions under which it can, as a fellow-



ship, demonstrate these principles and their consequent development.

## ARTICLE V

### STATEMENT OF FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS

The Bible is our all-sufficient rule for faith and practice. Hence this statement of Fundamental Truths is intended as a basis of fellowship among us (i. e., that we all speak the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Acts 2:42). The human phraseology employed in such statement is not inspired nor contended for, but the truth set forth is held to be essential to a full Gospel ministry. No claim is made that it contains all truth in the Bible, only that it covers our present needs as to these fundamental matters.

#### 1. THE SCRIPTURES INSPIRED

The Bible is the inspired Word of God, a revelation from God to man, the infallible rule of faith and conduct, and is superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason (2 Tim. 3:15, 16; 1 Pet. 2:2).

#### 2. THE ONE TRUE GOD

The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally self-existent, self-revealed "I AM"; and has further revealed Himself as embodying the principles of relationship and association, i. e., as Father, Son and Holy Ghost (Deut. 6:4; Mark 12:29; Isa. 43:10, 11; Matt. 28:19).

#### 3. MAN, HIS FALL AND REDEMPTION

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, after Our likeness." But man, by voluntary transgression, fell, and his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ the Son of God. Gen. 1:26-31; 3:1-7; Rom. 5:12-21.

#### 4. THE SALVATION OF MAN

(a) Conditions to Salvation.

The grace of God, which bringeth salvation, hath

appeared to all men, through the preaching of repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ; man is saved by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, and, being justified by grace through faith, he becomes an heir of God according to the hope of eternal life. (Titus 2:11; Rom. 10:13-15; Luke 24:47; Titus 3:5-7).  
(b) The Evidences of Salvation.

The **inward** evidence, to the believer of his salvation, is the direct witness of the Spirit (Rom. 8:16). The **outward** evidence to all men is a life of righteousness and true holiness.

## 5. BAPTISM IN WATER

The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an outward symbol of cleansing, while their heart has already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as an inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life (Matt. 28:19; Acts 10:47, 48; Rom. 6:4; Acts 20:21; Heb. 10:22).

## 6. THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements, bread and the fruit of the vine, is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Cor. 11:26); and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Cor. 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers "until He comes."

## 7. THE PROMISE OF THE FATHER.

All believers are entitled to, and should ardently expect, and earnestly seek, the promise of the Father, the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church.



With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; 1:8; 1 Cor. 12:1-31). This wonderful experience is distinct from and subsequent to the experience of the new birth (Acts 10:44-46; 11:14-16; 15:7-9).

## 8. THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY GHOST

The Baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is witnessed by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterance (Acts 2:4). The speaking in tongues in this instance is the same in essence as the gift of tongues (1 Cor. 12:4-10, 28) but different in purpose and use.

## 9. ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION

The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy Ghost we are able to obey the command, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Entire sanctification is the will of God for all believers, and should be earnestly pursued by walking in obedience to God's Word (Heb. 12:14; 1 Pet. 1:15, 16; 1 Thess. 5:23, 24; 1 John 2:6).

## 10. THE CHURCH

The Church is the body of Christ, the habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission. Each believer, born of the Spirit, is an integral part of the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, which are written in heaven. (Eph. 1:22, 23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23).

## 11. THE MINISTRY AND EVANGELISM

A divinely called and Scripturally ordained ministry has been provided by our Lord for a twofold purpose: (1) The evangelization of the world, and (2) The edifying of the Body of Christ (Mark 16:15-20; Eph. 4:11-13).

## 12. DIVINE HEALING

Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the

atonement, and is the privilege of all believers (Isa. 53:4, 5; Matt. 8:16, 17).

### 13. THE BLESSED HOPE

The resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ and their translation together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord is the imminent and blessed hope of the Church (1 Thess 4:16, 17; Rom. 8:23; Titus 2:13; 1 Cor. 15:51, 52).

### 14. THE MILLENNIAL REIGN OF JESUS

The revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ from heaven, the salvation of national Israel, and the millennial reign of Christ on the earth is the Scriptural promise and the world's hope (2 Thess. 1:7; Rev. 19:11-14; Rom. 11:26, 27; Rev. 20:1-7).

### 15. THE LAKE OF FIRE

The devil and his angels, the beast and the false prophet, and whosoever is not found written in the Book of Life, shall be consigned to everlasting punishment in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death (Rev. 19:20; Rev. 20:10-15).

### 16. THE NEW HEAVENS AND NEW EARTH

We, "according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness" (2 Pet. 3:13; Rev. 21, 22).

## ARTICLE VI. RELATIONSHIPS

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall prosecute its activities through its General and District Councils.

## ARTICLE VII. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the General Council shall consist of all ministers and missionaries holding accredited fellowship certificates, and such representatives as may be chosen by the assemblies affiliated with us, each assembly being entitled to one lay delegate.



## ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

1. Regular sessions of the General Council shall be held biennially, pursuant to a call by the Executive Presbytery.

2. Special sessions of the General Council may be arranged by the Executive Presbytery if agreed by a majority of the General Presbyters.

3. The right of initiative in the matter of calling of special sessions shall be granted to any ordained minister of The General Council of the Assemblies of God when occasion demands. A statement setting forth the reasons for a special session of the Council, signed by not less than fifteen ordained ministers, may be considered sufficient reason for the call of a special session, such statement to be filed with the Executive Presbytery, who may, if it shall be deemed advisable, respond to the summons and issue the call for a special session.

## ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS

1. Executive Officers.

The officers shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary, together with such other officers as may be required in the future. Their term of office shall be for two years and shall begin three months after the date of election.

2. Executive Presbytery.

The Executive Presbytery shall consist of nine brethren, six of whom, including the General Superintendent and General Secretary, shall be resident, and three of whom shall be non-resident, at Springfield, Missouri. (Amendment 1931)

3. General Presbytery.

The General Council shall elect representative men of mature experience and ability, whose lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship as General Presbyters in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields. The Dis-

trict Superintendent by virtue of his office shall be a General Presbyter.

#### ARTICLE X. DISTRICT COUNCILS

Membership of the District Council shall consist of all ordained and licensed ministers of the district, and such delegates as may be elected by assemblies to represent them in the meetings of the District Council. Such delegates shall be elected according to an agreed upon basis of representation, arranged by the Council.

The District Council shall have supervision over all the activities of the Assemblies of God in its prescribed field, except such as are agreed upon by a District Council and the General Council officials.

The District Council shall have authority to examine and to license and ordain ministers who are to become members thereof, and shall report to the office of the General Council the names of all approved licentiates.

The District Council, being the creature of the General Council and subordinate thereto, cannot be authorized, in any way, to violate the principles of the General Council constitutional agreements or its by-laws.

The District Council shall elect its own officers, and arrange for its own meetings. It shall be amenable to the General Council in matters of doctrine, and the personal conduct of ministers who are permitted to have the district endorsement.

#### ARTICLE XI. LOCAL ASSEMBLIES

All true Pentecostal believers associating themselves in local bodies as assemblies, and accepting their full personal share of responsibility for the maintenance of scriptural order in the local body, shall have a standard for membership which may be determined either by the local assembly itself, or by agreement with the District Council.

Local assemblies shall be set in order and co-operate in the work of the District. They should support



the district organization and may send delegates to the District Council.

We recognize that each local assembly has the right of self-government under Jesus Christ, its living Head, and shall have the power to choose, or call its pastor, elect its official board, and transact all other business pertaining to its life as a local unit. It shall have the right to administer discipline to its members according to the Scriptures and its By-laws. It shall have the right to acquire and hold title to property in its own right, either through trustees or in its corporate name as a self-governing unit.

The fact that a local assembly is affiliated in the association of the District or General Council shall in nowise destroy its rights as above stated or interfere with its sovereignty. The local assembly shall recognize that the District or General Council has the right to approve Scriptural doctrine and conduct and to disapprove unscriptural doctrine or conduct. When in need of counsel or advice, the local assembly may appeal to the District Council for help. It may appeal from a decision by the District Council to the General Council where it may be questioned whether or not there has been proper help from the District.

Local assemblies are expected to have an interest in the missionary enterprise, and to plan for regular contribution to its support.

## ARTICLE XII

Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted in writing to every District for their consideration prior to the General Council meeting. Amendments to the Constitution shall require a two-thirds majority of all members present for adoption.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY ORDER

In order to expedite the work of the Council and to avoid confusion in its deliberations, the Council

shall be governed by accepted rules of parliamentary procedure, in keeping with the spirit of Christian love and fellowship.

## ARTICLE II.

### Section 1: OFFICERS.

The officers of the General Council except as hereinafter provided shall be elected at one of its regular meetings, according to the manner of election as provided. They shall be chosen from the membership of the General Council, and shall be men of mature experience and ability, whose life and ministry are above question, and such qualities alone shall determine their eligibility. A two-thirds majority of all votes cast, shall be necessary to constitute an election.

### Section 2: NOMINATION AND ELECTION

All candidates for office to be filled by the General Council shall be nominated by secret ballot. All names thus presented shall be balloted upon until a candidate shall have received a two-thirds majority of votes cast, provided however, that if no such majority shall have been reached by the first three ballots taken, the three candidates having the highest number of votes in the last ballot cast, shall be nominees to be further voted upon, and all other names shall be eliminated.

The Treasurer, Missionary Secretary, and Editor shall be elected to their respective offices by the Executive Presbytery and shall be amenable thereto. The choice of the Executive Presbytery shall be subject to ratification by the General Presbytery.

### Section 3: VOTING CONSTITUENCY

The voting constituency shall consist of all accredited members, present and registered. Voting privileges may also be extended to accredited licentiates who may be in attendance, at the discretion of the General Council.

### ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

#### Section 1: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To preside at the meetings of the Council.
2. To be the head of the General Office, and to supervise all the work of that office during the interim between sessions of the General Council. To act as President of the Corporation in all legal matters.
3. To preside at all meetings of the Credentials Committee, and to sign all credentials.
4. To preside at all sessions of the Executive Presbytery, and to receive all communications directed to that body.
5. To be general superintendent of all work on the field conducted in behalf of the fellowship, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.
6. To administer discipline in all cases when requested to do so by the Credentials Committee.
7. To perform any other functions usual and customary as presiding officer or such as may be directed by the General Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

#### Section 2: DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To assist the General Superintendent.
2. To preside at meetings in the absence of the General Superintendent.
3. To assist the General Superintendent in the general superintendence of the work on the field conducted in behalf of the General Council and its work, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.
4. Finally, to perform any other functions under the supervision of the General Superintendent, or such as may be directed by this Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

### Section 3: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY

1. The General Secretary shall make and keep true records of the proceedings of the General Council and shall publish the same as approved and directed by the Executive Presbytery.

2. He shall be custodian of the official seal of the Council and shall issue Credentials under the direction of the Credentials Committee and shall keep a record of all ministers, licentiates and assemblies in the fellowship.

3. He shall act as Secretary of the Executive Presbytery and the General Presbytery, and shall keep accurate minutes of the deliberations of these bodies.

4. He shall be authorized to sign all official and legal documents and to perform such other functions as are customary or as may be directed by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

5. He shall act as Secretary of the Credentials Committee and shall be considered as ex-officio member of all other committees.

### Section 4. DUTIES OF THE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

1. To act as head of the Missionary Department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

2. To keep a record of all decisions of the Missionary Committee and of all official acts of the Missionary Department.

3. To conduct all correspondence with prospective Missionaries and with those already out on the field.

4. To conduct the Missionary columns in the Pentecostal Evangel from Missionary letters and reports.

5. To represent the General Council in all relationships with governments or authorities where our Missionary work is involved.

6. To direct the Missionary activities of the fellowship under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.



7. To distribute all Missionary funds as directed by the donors or by the Missionary Committee.

8. To keep such records of all funds received and disbursed as will safeguard the funds from loss en route to the field.

9. To acknowledge in the Pentecostal Evangel all funds received for Missionary work.

10. To conduct all correspondence.

11. To act as purchasing agent for Missionary supplies under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

12. To perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.

#### Section 5: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

1. To be custodian of all General Council funds.

2. He shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, conducting the work of his office according to accepted business methods.

3. He shall give a report from time to time as may be requested by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

4. He shall give bond to the amount of \$10,000. The treasurer's books shall be audited by outside public audit once a year.

5. He shall perform such other functions as are customary to his office or as may be directed by the Council or the Executive Presbytery.

#### Section 6: DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTERY

The Executive Presbytery shall act as trustees of this fellowship and shall have general oversight of the activities and departments of the same during the interim between General Council sessions, unless the General Council shall make other provision. It shall be authorized to act for the fellowship in all matters that affect its interests while the General Council is not in session and shall make report to the General Council of its activities in behalf of the fellowship as may be directed. It shall provide for its

own meetings and its decisions shall be final unless reversed by the General Council.

In all matters of great importance, the Executive Presbytery shall communicate with the members of the General Presbytery before any final action shall be taken.

#### Section 7: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTERY

1. The General Presbytery shall constitute an advisory body in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery.

2. It shall act as a court of appeal and its decisions shall be final.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Section 1: STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing committees shall be established or appointed as necessity may indicate. They shall be appointed by the General Superintendent in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery, and the term of office shall continue from the date of appointment to the adjournment of the next regular meeting of the General Council, unless otherwise instructed by the Council.

#### Section 2: CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Such members of the Executive Presbytery as may reside at headquarters shall constitute a Credentials Committee. They shall have authority to issue certificates of ordination to approved ministers, who have District Council endorsement, and to issue annual fellowship certificates.

#### Section 3: SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Special committees may be created at the General Council in session, or by the Executive Presbytery between sessions as may be required to facilitate its work.

### ARTICLE V. MINISTRY

#### Section 1: MINISTRY DESCRIBED

Elders who are persons of mature experience and

qualifications, able to undertake the responsibilities of the full-gospel ministry.

Licentiates who are beginners; who give evidence of being called of God; and who devote themselves to a purpose to become elders (1 Tim. 3:10-13).

Women may be ordained in any degree except eldership and be licensed to preach as provided for men.

## Section 2: QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications for recognition as an elder must be in accord with the New Testament scriptures, which provide the necessary guidance in the matter of such recognition (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:7-9).

Qualifications for licentiates shall be:

First: Clear evidences of a divine call; a practical experience in preaching; together with an evident purpose to devote their time to preaching the gospel.

Second: Conformity to such provisions as are made for them by the General Council in reading courses and other training.

## Section 3: LICENSE TO PREACH

Licenses to preach shall be granted by the District Council to properly qualified applicants.

## Section 4: ORDINATIONS

(a) Applicants for ordination who shall have met the necessary requirements shall appear before the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside. All ordinations shall take place under the auspices of the District Council. No minister shall be ordained to the office of an elder until he shall have held a license to preach and shall have been engaged in the active work of the ministry as a pastor or evangelist at least two full consecutive years.

### ORDINATION OF WOMEN

(b) Inasmuch as the scriptures clearly teach that there is a difference in the prerogatives of the minis-

try of men and women in the church, THEREFORE  
BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That ordination certificates of women shall clearly state that women are ordained only as evangelists.

2. That the words "bury the dead, administer the ordinances of the church, and perform the rite of marriage, when such acts are necessary," shall be omitted from Women's ordination and license certificates of the General and District Councils. (1931)

### ORDINATION OF MISSIONARIES

(c) Resolved, That in the future the matter of the ordination of missionaries under appointment of the Missionary Department be determined on the basis of their qualifications for ordination rather than on the basis of their appointment. (1931)

### Section 5: CERTIFICATES

Ordination papers with the accompanying fellowship certificates shall be issued by the General Credential Committee from the Executive office.

### Section 6: MINISTERIAL RELATION

All ministers, both ordained and licensed, shall be amenable to both the District and General Councils in matters of doctrine and conduct.

All ministers, ordained and licensed, shall be expected to affiliate with the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside, and to work in co-operation with the same. They shall be expected to co-operate with other District Councils in which they may labor temporarily.

### Section 7: OFFICIAL LIST

An official list of all ordained ministers shall be compiled by the Credential Committee of the General Council and published for the convenience of all concerned. The list shall show whether or not each minister is giving full time to his or her ministry. This official list shall be revised annually, and certificates



of fellowship issued to all who are in full fellowship with us.

## Section 8: EXPIRATION OF FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

Inasmuch as all fellowship certificates expire on the 31st day of August of each year, all who shall have failed to renew their fellowship certificates on or before October 1st, or who shall have failed to indicate their purpose to do so, shall be considered as delinquents whose names shall not appear on the ministerial list to be mailed to the clergy bureaus.

## ARTICLE VI. FOREIGN MISSIONS POLICY

### Section 1: MISSIONARY PURPOSE

1. The Assemblies of God shall assume responsibility, and do all within its power for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

2. The Pauline example shall be followed as far as possible by seeking out neglected regions where the Gospel has not been preached, as well as by establishing self-supporting, self-governing, self-propagating native churches.

3. In fields where Pentecostal missionaries are already stationed, consultation shall be had with the brethren on the field and the Missionary Department, and a satisfactory plan agreed upon before an attempt shall be made to establish new stations in such localities.

4. Every Assembly shall be encouraged to assume definite responsibility for full or partial support of one or more missionaries in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department.

### Section 2: MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

1. The Missionary Department shall consist of the Missionary Secretary and four others, appointed by the Superintendent subject to the approval of the General Presbytery, who together shall comprise the Missionary Committee. All the activities of the Missionary Department shall be carried on under the su-

pervision of the Executive Presbytery to which the Missionary Department shall be amenable.

2. All the Missionary interest of our fellowship shall be consigned to the management of the Missionary Department in co-operation with the District Council on the field.

### Section 3: MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

1. The selection and appointment of missionaries shall be the prerogative of the Missionary Committee.

2. The Missionary Committee shall be governed in its selection and appointment of missionaries by the following requirements. Each applicant shall be examined—

(a) As to personal experience of full New Testament salvation.

(b) As to a definite call to foreign work.

(c) As to physical, mental and spiritual fitness for work.

(d) As to Christian standing and general qualifications, it being required that each applicant seeking appointment first secure the endorsement of his local Assembly and District Council.

3. Prospective missionaries shall be expected to exercise faith in God to provide their outfit and fare to the field as far as practicable.

4. Funds provided for prospective missionaries who shall for any reason be prevented from going to the field shall be remitted to their respective donors unless by the consent of said donors they can be made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes.

5. All persons making application for appointment as missionaries shall be expected to meet the requirements of the Missionary Department.

6. The Missionary Department shall confine its missionary activities within the limits of its resources and shall not accept and send out missionaries until the condition of its finances fully warrant such action.

7. Each missionary shall be expected to devote two

full years to language study, if necessary, before taking up his full active work. Courses of study with examinations shall be arranged by an advisory committee on each field. Failure on the part of any missionary to obtain a working knowledge of the language during his first term shall furnish ample ground upon which to question his fitness for a second term.

#### Section 4: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARIES

1. The undesignated funds sent to the Foreign Missions Department shall be distributed to those who have received the appointment of the Missionary Committee and are in harmony with our Statement of Fundamentals. All funds assigned to particular persons shall be forwarded by the Foreign Missions Department exactly as directed.

2. It is recommended that all missionaries send a report of moneys received and submit a budget of expenses to the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent upon the Foreign Missions Department to send of its undesignated funds to missionaries who do not furnish such a report.

3. Missionaries expecting the endorsement and aid of the Foreign Missions Department shall report to the Missionary Committee and receive its approval before leaving this country. The Missionary Committee shall assume no responsibility whatever, where the foregoing requirements are not complied with. Funds designated for missionaries whose names do not appear on our list will be gladly forwarded by the Missionary Department.

#### Section 5: FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

1. The Foreign Missions Department shall renew the Fellowship Certificates of all foreign missionaries in good standing on or before the first of the year without cost to the missionaries.

This requirement on the part of the Missionary Department shall be contingent upon the missionary's filling out in ample time the questionnaire provided

by the Department and sending same to the home office.

2. Each missionary shall file with the Foreign Missions Department a full statement regarding his work, e. g., concerning his family and accommodations, period of service, language qualifications, nature of work engaged in, prospects of the field, present number of recognized adherents, etc., etc.

#### Section 6: DISTRICT COUNCILS

1. District Councils shall be formed on the field where there are sufficient missionaries and trustworthy ordained native preachers, provided the approval of the Missionary Department shall first have been secured. Where numbers are not sufficient to warrant the formation of a District Council, the missionary shall be amenable directly to the Foreign Missions Department. (1931)

2. It shall be considered the duty of the various District Councils on the foreign field to co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in maintaining a high standard of Christian character and work in the interests of greater efficiency.

#### Section 7: PROPERTY

1. All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible.

No funds shall be made available for missionary homes, stations, schools, etc., until adequate and proper safeguards, such as complying with the laws of the respective countries for the legal holding of property and such as establishing and maintaining a proper relationship between these missionary projects and the Foreign Missions Department, shall have been provided.

2. Missionaries contemplating the purchase of property or erection of buildings should co-operate with the District Council on the field, and secure their endorsement before submitting their proposition to the Foreign Missions Department.



3. Whereas, In our Foreign Missions Policy it has been resolved that "All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible," and,

Whereas, At the present time the Foreign Missions Department for lack of information on file is unable to give accurate advice concerning many of the properties purchased on the foreign field through the offerings of our fellowship, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That a copy of the property deeds, titles, and other legal papers relating to all missionary properties which have been purchased shall be forwarded to the Foreign Missions Department for file.

#### Section 8: NATIVE WORKERS

1. It is recommended that great care be exercised in the selection of native workers, and that no worker be engaged who does not manifest a real consecration to the cause of Christ.

2. No offerings for the support of native workers shall be sent direct to the natives, but to the missionary representatives of the General Council. (Amendment 1929.)

#### Section 9: FURLOUGHS

1. Missionaries while home on furlough shall be considered as on vacation. It will be expected, however, that they shall co-operate with the home office in the interests of the work as far as possible.

2. The period and frequency of furloughs shall be governed by the recommendation of the District Council on the respective fields in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to grant a furlough allowance to missionaries who return to the homeland without first having an understanding with the District Council on the field.

3. When missionaries do not intend to return to the field or for any reason are not recom-

mended for further service, it shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to continue their allowance for more than six months after their return to their homeland, except in cases of ill health or because of the infirmities of age.

4. All missionaries who have arranged to return to the home field shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department where there is no District Council on the field, in making arrangements for a supply to take charge of their work or station and shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in securing and forwarding funds for the maintenance of such work or station during their absence.

5. All missionaries who shall have completed a satisfactory term of service shall be eligible for reappointment for another term.

## ARTICLE VII. HOME MISSIONS

The fields everywhere are ripe for harvest, but the laborers are few. If we fail to speed up our program of home field evangelization the loss will be appalling. Our Lord's "Go ye" applies no less to the fields lying at our doors than to distant parts of the earth.

Whereas, We have the men and the means to accomplish at least twice as much as we are now doing, and the strengthening of the work at home is the only way we can enlarge our work abroad, and the urgency of the command of our Lord, and the crying need everywhere will not permit us to be indifferent or inactive; therefore be it

### RESOLVED:

1. That the Executive Presbytery devise plans for opening up new work in neglected strategic points, so far as possible, and that they consider the advisability of appointing such field workers as in its wisdom may be deemed necessary.

2. That each District Superintendent use all the available resources for evangelizing his own district.

3. That so far as practicable each District Council raise funds and put one or more missionaries or evan-

gelists to work in co-operation with the District Council, and that the Council foster the new works started till such time as each may become able to support a pastor.

4. That each and every District Superintendent submit in writing to our General Secretary his policy for evangelization and field extension, or Home Missionary work being promoted in his district, and tell what activities have been recently put into execution in his district (for this purpose). These reports to be used for the purpose of comparing methods of labor and the discovery of the most practical ways of carrying on the work.

5. That every pastor recognize his responsibility for the evangelization of his own parish and the regions contiguous to his city or town; that he make a careful survey of the needs and the opportunities of his field; that he look in his own assembly for competent workers now idle who can be pushed out into needy fields; that he encourages the formation of Gospel Teams which can carry the gospel to outstations and destitute places: that Sunday schools and prayer meetings and street meetings be held, and all other scriptural means be used for establishing and enlarging the work.

6. That all our good evangelists may be kept busy in fields new and old, and that District Superintendents and pastors co-operate with them, so far as practicable; be it further

7. Resolved, That we work for a largely increased circulation of The Pentecostal Evangel and the liberal use of our own tracts and books, realizing their usefulness in the extension of the Lord's work.

8. Finally, we recommend that all our people devote much time to earnest prayer for the workers now in the field, and for the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth new laborers both at home and abroad.

## ARTICLE VIII. MEXICAN MISSIONS

### Section 1:

The General Council shall recognize and encour-

age the Mexican Missions work carried on along the American border line and in Mexico.

Section 2:

The Missionary Department, at the discretion of the Missionary Committee, shall appropriate a proportionate share of the undesignated funds for the Mexican work.

## ARTICLE IX. INSTITUTIONS

Section 1:

(a) The General Council shall recognize the need of practical training of prospective ministers and missionaries. It shall be in hearty sympathy with every effort to provide such training where the standards of teaching and discipline maintained in the school are satisfactory.

(b) The General Council shall encourage the further development of the Central Bible Institute, together with such other schools as may meet the required standard as set by the Central Bible Institute and become affiliated with the General Council through the District Council in which located.

(c) The General Council shall have some representation upon the directorate of the schools. It shall have a voice in determining the standards of teaching and policy of management through the District Council in which such schools are located.

(d) The examinations, reports, certificates, and diplomas, given by affiliated schools shall be on an equality with the Central Bible Institute in the matter of credits and conditions.

(e) All graduates of such affiliated schools as shall have met these requirements shall be considered as on a par with the graduates of the Central Bible Institute.

### Section 2: CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE MANAGEMENT

(a) The General Council shall control and manage



the Central Bible Institute through a directorate appointed by the Executive Presbytery.

(b) The directorate shall shape the policy, arrange its curriculum, provide the faculty, and have general supervision over the school.

### Section 3: OTHER INSTITUTIONS

(a) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of homes for the aged, for children, and for retired ministers and missionaries.

(b) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of academic schools for the children of our constituency.

(c) The General Council shall encourage the opening and maintenance of Sunday Schools throughout the fellowship.

(d) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of missionary schools on the various mission fields where practicable for the training of native workers, and schools for the education of the young children of missionaries.

## ARTICLE X

### Section 1: PUBLICATIONS

The Pentecostal Evangel shall be the official organ of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and shall be published in the interest of our fellowship and for the further propagation of our distinctive testimony. The Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel shall be chosen by the Executive Presbytery, said choice subject to ratification by the General Presbytery. The Executive Presbytery shall have authority to publish Sunday-school literature, children's books and papers, etc., together with such other literature, including periodicals and books, as may be decided upon.

### Section 2: PUBLISHING HOUSE

The Publishing House and its equipment shall be developed as its business shall expand and funds may be available therefore.

### Section 3: MANAGEMENT

The management of the Publishing House, with its various publications and business interests, shall be vested in the Executive Presbytery, who shall provide such personnel as may be required to supervise and carry on its work.

#### ARTICLE XI. VIOLATIONS OF MINISTERIAL COURTESY

All discourteous conduct is disapproved and all ministers are advised against interfering with pastors in charge of assemblies, whether it be by going in upon their work without consent or by such correspondence with members of the assembly as will hurt the influence of the leader. All correspondence which concerns the whole assembly, shall be addressed to the one in charge and not to private members. Where there is no pastor, letters concerning the work shall be addressed to the officers of an assembly.

Any minister who so offends shall be subjected to Scriptural treatment as an offender by the District Council, or if there be none, by the Executive Presbytery of the General Council. Such discourtesy will seriously affect the granting of annual Fellowship Certificates and may be the basis of their recall.

#### ARTICLE XII. DISCIPLINE OF MEMBERS

Occasions sometimes arise which make it necessary to deal with ministers who are affiliated with us and whose ministry may have ceased to be effective, or who for some reason may seem to have reached a place where in the judgment of the brethren the tie of Council fellowship should be dissolved.

Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in this matter, it being understood that in case the officary of a District Council shall recommend that Council fellowship be withdrawn from a minister, or his name dropped from the roll of Council ministers, the action shall be regarded as final, unless said minister shall

avail himself of the right of appeal within thirty days, in which case the matter shall be referred for ratification to the Executive Presbytery of the General Council, a three-fourths vote of said Executive Presbytery being required to adopt the recommendation of the officary of the District Council. (Amendment 1931)

In case the Executive Presbytery shall find the accused guilty, the decision shall be regarded as final, unless the accused shall within thirty days file an appeal for trial by the General Presbytery at its next session.

### ARTICLE XIII. ORDER OF BUSINESS

The regular order of business for the Council Meeting shall be:

1. Appointment of Roster Committee.
2. Report of Roster Committee.
3. Report of the General Superintendent.
4. Report of Secretary.
5. Report of Treasurer.
6. Committee Reports.
7. Unfinished business.
8. Election of Officers.
9. New Business.
10. Adjournment.

All business sessions of the Council shall commence with prayer.

### ARTICLE XIV. FINANCE

The work of the General Council in its definite program of development of the spirit of co-operation and fellowship in home and foreign fields incurs considerable expense, including financial support of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and such other help as may be needed, in maintaining headquarters, purchasing stationery and postage, and defraying traveling expenses, etc.

Therefore, every minister in the fellowship shall recognize his obligation to contribute from his tithes

or as an offering, or through his influence, the sum of one dollar per month. And further, looking towards the increased efficiency of the fellowship throughout the entire field, all who can contribute more, personally or through their assemblies, than the suggested amount, are hereby strongly urged to do so. If practicable, let each assembly take one offering each year for the upkeep of the General Council office and traveling expenses.

#### ARTICLE XV: MILITARY SERVICE

While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12:14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Ex. 20:13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5:39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5:44), etc., and

Whereas, These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life;

Whereas, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we can not conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith. (Reaffirmed 1927.)



## YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES

### ARTICLE XVI

Whereas, The Scriptures are being fulfilled that "in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy . . . and on My servants and on My handmaidens I will pour out in those days of My Spirit, and they shall prophesy"; and

Whereas, Our young people who are being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit and inspired with love to God and zeal for His service comprise the source from which shall be derived our future ministers, evangelists and missionaries, and they should be encouraged in any activities which may tend to develop them in Christian experience and service, and

Whereas, There now exist in various sections of the United States organizations comprising local and District groups of young people who feel the urge of the Holy Spirit both to meet together in Christian fellowship and to actively engage in the promulgation of the full gospel message by all available means in co-operation with other bodies of like nature and purpose; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this General Council hereby approve of all efforts which are now in existence or which may hereafter be instituted in behalf of our young people, provided such efforts fully comply with the constitutional principles of co-operative fellowship and unity of the Assemblies of God, to wit:

#### Section 1:

All local young people's organizations shall be considered as a branch of the local church work, under the general supervision of the pastor, whose counsel, advice and direction shall be respected in all activities which affect the relationship of the organization to the church and its activities in service.

The local young people may elect their own officers, subject to the approval of the pastor and the Church Board, and may conduct their own services provided

such services do not conflict with, nor detract from, the regular services of the church.

The pastor shall be considered as an honorary member of the organization and an ex-officio member of all its committees, and should be respected and honored as a shepherd and guide in all matters of service and fellowship.

The activities of the young people may include:

- (a) Bible Training Classes (the Correspondence Courses of the Central Bible Institute being recommended for this purpose).
- (b) Prayer Meetings in the church or elsewhere which have the approval of the pastor and which will tend to build up the work of the church as a whole.
- (c) Other activities, such as **street work**, jail services, hospital visitation, ministration to invalids, the sick and shut-ins, tract distribution, etc.

#### Section 2:

Groups of local organizations may be formed into State or District organizations, with the approval of the officary of the District Councils involved. The State or District organization shall be governed by the principles of co-operative fellowship and shall be considered as a branch or department of the District Council. The District Council officary shall be considered as the honorary membership of the District organization and shall be honored and respected in all matters affecting the activities of the organization. The District organization shall have the right to elect its own officers and to supervise its own activities within the boundaries of the territory involved. The superintendent of the District Council shall be an ex-officio member of all District committees. (1927)

#### Section 3: DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

Inasmuch as young people's state or district organizations have been authorized by the General Council resolutions; therefore: **BE IT RESOLVED:** That we

continue such district organization with the following recommendations:

1. That the young people's President shall be an ordained minister.

2. That the manner of the election of the President by the young people's organization shall be subject to the approval by the District Council.

3. That a constitution and by-laws covering the activities of the district organization shall be submitted to and approved by the District Presbytery with a view of standardizing such constitutions with those of other districts.

4. The President of the district organization shall be subject to call by the District Presbytery for consultation in matters pertaining to young people.

5. Sectional meetings of the district organization shall be strictly spiritual in character and arranged through the cooperation of the pastors and young people's leaders in each section, taking care not to conflict with other local or district meetings.

6. That we disapprove of any attempt to effect a national organization of the young people at this Council.

7. That in the future the matter of organization of young people in a district in which such organization does not now exist shall receive the approval of the District Council before being effective. (1931)

## ARTICLE XVII

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council. Amendments to be adopted shall require a majority of all votes cast.

## ESSENTIAL RESOLUTIONS

### MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

First. There are now among Christian people those who became entangled in their marriage relations in their former lives of sin, and who do not see how these matters can be adjusted. We recommend that these cases be left in the hands of the Lord,

and that they walk in the light as God lets it shine on their souls.

Second. Low standards on marriage and divorce are very hurtful to individuals, to the family, and to the cause of Christ, therefore we discourage divorce by all lawful means and teaching. We positively disapprove of Christians getting divorce for any cause except for fornication and adultery (Matt. 19:9); and recommend the remaining single of all divorced Christians, and that they pray God so to keep them in purity and peace. (See 1 Cor. 7).

Third. Since divorced and remarried persons in the ministry usually cause stumbling, reproach and division, whatever may have been the cause of divorce, we disapprove of District Councils ordaining or licensing to the gospel ministry those who have remarried and are now living in a state of matrimony while former companions are living (Ezek. 44:22). (Amendment 1931)

Fourth. As a means of making the above more effective, we disapprove of our Pentecostal ministry performing a marriage ceremony between any believer and a divorced person whose former companion is still living. We also especially warn all our people that unions made in the future and in the face of this warning between any of our ministers and such divorced persons will affect the standing of both the minister who performs the ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, and of the minister entering into such union, whether man or woman, and no matter on which side the divorce lies (1921). (Reaffirmed 1931.)

### PAYING TITHES

We recognize the duty of tithing and we urge all our people to pay tithes to God.

According to the Scriptures tithes should be used for the support of the active ministry and for the propagation of the Gospel and work of the Lord in general and not given to charity or used for other



purposes. All ministers should be tithers, practicing what they preach. (Reaffirmed 1931.)

Regarding our basis of fellowship in reference to tithing, WHEREAS the basis of our fellowship is that of voluntary cooperation, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that making the paying of tithes into the District Treasury by the ministry a basis of fellowship be disapproved. (Amendment 1931)

### TRANSFERRING FROM ONE DISTRICT TO ANOTHER

Resolved, That we recommend that our District Councils refrain from ordaining to the ministry any preacher who may have been licensed in another District until such licentiate shall have resided in the District in which he is seeking ordination at least one year and shall have met the requirements of the District granting him a license.

### CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER

Resolved, That a certificate of transfer be issued to all workers who are leaving their home district to permanently locate in another district, and that the General Council office be instructed to prepare a suitable form. (1931) (This certificate can be secured from the Gospel Publishing House.)

### REINSTATEMENT OF MINISTERS

Resolved, That we recommend that hereafter when a minister connected with our fellowship shall have been dropped from our rolls or shall have ceased to be connected with us by virtue of having become identified with another organization, or for any other cause, and shall apply to be reinstated, the Credentials Committee of the General Council may hold the matter of reinstatement of such a minister in abeyance until the next session of the General Council in order that the General Presbytery may have the opportunity to review the case; and that the matter of reinstatement of such minister be left entirely with that body. (1931)

## REGARDING MORAL STANDARD FOR MINISTERS

WHEREAS there is an outstanding demand that we define our position relative to a moral standard among our ministers who preach the Word of God, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that any minister proven guilty of the gross sin of immorality shall be removed permanently from the roll of our ministerial fellowship. (1931)

## AFFILIATING WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Resolved, That when any of our ministers shall identify themselves with other organizations granting ministerial credentials and shall have received such credentials, we shall regard their affiliation with this body as having ceased, and that they be requested to return to headquarters the credentials issued by our Executive Office.

## ATTITUDE TOWARD THOSE REMOVED FROM COUNCIL FELLOWSHIP

Whereas, In our Constitutional Declaration we have included this prerogative, "To disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrine, and conduct," and have provided adequate safeguards in the By-Laws by arranging for appeals from local and District decisions, thus guaranteeing fair and impartial consideration of all matters affecting standing and fellowship; therefore, in order to render effective decisions made in the interest of proper discipline among the ministry and for the protection of our assemblies, be it

Resolved, That decisions arrived at after investigation and consideration of all facts by those qualified to act in such cases according to our co-operative agreements shall be by all considered just and final; and be it further

Resolved, That all ordained and licensed preachers refrain from taking any attitude toward such offenders that would tend to nullify or set at naught the solemn verdict of the brethren entrusted with this responsibility. (1927)

And be it further Resolved: In the event of a vio-

lation of this agreement the offender shall be subject to a reprimand, or such other discipline as shall be agreed upon by the officary of the District with which he is affiliated. In the event that the agreement shall be violated outside of his District the officary of the District in which the offense is committed may communicate with the Secretary at headquarters, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to notify the offending brother that a repetition of the offense will seriously affect his standing as a Council minister, and, if persisted in, may result in his suspension or severance from our fellowship. (1929)

### REGARDING WORLDLINESS

Inasmuch as a spirit of worldliness has been creeping into many of our assemblies and our pastors in some places meet with much opposition as they hold up Bible standards and take a stand against popular sins, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we as a body unitedly declare ourselves against all forms of worldliness, but particularly against modern immodesty and extremity in dress, and that we all agree as pastors, evangelists, licentiates, exhorters, Sunday-school superintendents and teachers, to speak the same things and voice ourselves against all forms of popular sins.

### REGARDING SECRET SOCIETIES

That all ministers affiliated with us refrain from identifying themselves with any of the secret orders which we recognize as essentially of the world, worldly, and we advise any who may have identified themselves with such orders to sever their connection therewith.

### GOVERNMENT OF U. S. A. REQUIREMENTS

Resolved, That whereas the government of the U. S. A. requires of headquarters a report periodically of the number of lay-members of our assemblies, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That each assembly of our General Council fellowship keep an up-to-date record of its membership and that a record

of same be sent annually to the office of the General Council Secretary. (1931)

#### DISTRICT BOUNDARY LINES

Resolved, That in the event that Districts fail to reach an agreement relative to boundary lines, the Executive Presbytery of the General Council be authorized to set such lines, and that said Executive Presbytery be empowered to create new Districts when and where deemed advisable, it being understood that the brethren who may be occupying such territory as new Districts are to be formed in, be consulted and their wishes given due consideration.

#### GENERAL PRESBYTERY MEETINGS

Resolved, That it be the sense of this General Council that there should be an annual business meeting of the General Presbytery, subject to the discretion and call of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

#### ARRANGEMENT FOR GENERAL COUNCIL MEETINGS

Owing to the uncertainties which the future always holds, and in consideration of our Council fellowship as a whole, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the arranging of time and place for the meetings of our General Councils be left in the hands of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

#### EVANGEL MISSIONARY NUMBERS

Resolved, That we recommend that four issues of the Pentecostal Evangel each year be denominated Missionary Numbers, and that they be devoted as exclusively as may be found practicable, to the publication of missionary articles and the dissemination of missionary information.

#### REPORTS FOR THE EVANGEL

Whereas, Reports of meetings held and announcements of meetings to be held which are of small value as items of news and are of strictly local interest are sent to the Evangel for publication from time to time, and



Whereas, It is our desire to use all Evangel space to the best possible advantage for the glory of God, therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this General Council that the editor of the Evangel, together with the Executive Presbytery, shall be authorized to leave out of the Evangel such reports and announcements as seem to them to be of not sufficient interest to the majority of Evangel readers to be printed.

### SAFEGUARDING THE ASSEMBLIES

It is known that many unreliable and unsafe teachers and preachers go about seeking entrance into assemblies without any recommendation, therefore all pastors, workers and leaders of assemblies should make proper investigation regarding such not known to them, and the platform be denied strangers until proper recommendations be forthcoming.

The advice and counsel of the District Presbytery should be sought in such cases, and in all matters of importance when at all possible. Pastors and presbyters should notify each other, reciprocally, as to such persons when any unreliability becomes manifest.

### AGAINST SETTING A TIME FOR THE LORD'S RETURN

It is unwise to teach that the Lord will come at some specified time, thereby setting a date for His appearing; and also it is unwise to give out from the platform, or publish visions of numbers and dates fixing the time of the second coming of the Lord.

### HERESIES DISAPPROVED

The General Council hereby disapproves of the Seventh-day teaching, of the extreme so-called Eternal Security teaching, and of the Restitution of All Things doctrine, and those holding and agitating such teaching, thereby causing confusion and division among God's people, shall be dealt with according to Titus 3:10.

## MEATS

The pressing of the question of eating, or not eating meats, is causing divisions in some of the assemblies,

Therefore, the General Council disapproves of such extreme positions on this question which cause these divisions, and we recognize the right of each individual conscience in this matter, according to Col. 2:14-17; Rom. 14:1-23.

## REGARDING PRIVATE OWNERSHIP OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS

Resolved, That we disapprove of the private ownership by members of the General or District Councils of church buildings, schools, or other institutions that are supported by funds solicited for the work of God; and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That where such private ownership exists we strongly recommend that a properly constituted incorporated body be formed and that the title to the property be transferred to such body, or that the soliciting of such funds cease.

A disregard of this attitude and recommendation of the General Council may effect the relationship to the General Council of members involved in such private ownership. (1931)

## MINUTES OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

Held at San Francisco, California, September 8 to 13,  
1931

The Fourteenth Session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God convened at 10 a. m., September, 8, 1931, in the Glad Tidings Temple, San Francisco, California.

### TUESDAY MORNING

At 10 a. m. the devotional meeting opened with praise and prayer, being led by Brother A. W. Frodsham, after which Brother J. W. Welch brought a very inspiring and profitable message which was much enjoyed by all.

The business session opened at 10:30, General Superintendent E. S. Williams presiding. He proceeded to read the names of the various committees that had been appointed.

Secretary J. R. Evans read a telegram of greetings from Brother George A. Chambers, General Superintendent of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. Motion was made and carried that the Secretary be instructed to write a letter to Brother Chambers, expressing our appreciation of the greetings of our brethren in Canada and expressing at the same time the thought that we are ready to reciprocate at all times and that we appreciate the privilege of fellowship and working together in the interest of our Lord.

Brother J. R. Evans then announced that the financial report was put in printed form, 2,000 copies of which were distributed to the members present.

## REPORTS BY THE VARIOUS OFFICERS OF GENERAL COUNCIL ACTIVITIES DURING THE PERIOD BETWEEN SEPTEMBER 1, 1929 AND AUGUST 1, 1931, A PERIOD OF TWENTY- THREE MONTHS, COVERING ALL DEPART- MENTS OF THE WORK

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The first ten months of official ministry of the Superintendent were divided about equally between the General work and that of his pastorate at Philadelphia. Being then relieved of the pastoral responsibility by the calling of Brother Flem Van Meter to the pastorate, he has since devoted his entire time to the duties of his office. These duties have, among other things, carried him over a considerable part of the country where he has received the kindest welcome from the brethren, and where he has been much encouraged by the spirit of love and unity that have been manifest in the various District Councils.

It has also been his privilege to attend several conventions and other gatherings of our Pentecostal young people. A growing interest in the youth of our Fellowship is being constantly manifest by the older members of our ministry, and, in the Districts which the Superintendent has visited, the District Executives and presbyters are taking the young people under their protecting arms and seeking to encourage and guide them into stalwart and co-operative members of the District organization, and into faithful membership in the local Assemblies of which they are a part. This interest taken in them is appreciated by our youth who, in turn, are endeavoring to make their presence a blessing both to their Districts and to their local assemblies. We are glad for this joyful response to the interest shown in them.

#### *Ministers and Assemblies*

God continues to bless our fellowship for which we are very thankful. At the close of our fiscal year, 1929, there were 1641 ordained ministers on our list. On July 31, 1931, twenty-three months later, we had 1851 or-



dained ministers enrolled, a net gain of 210 or 12.8%.

In 1929 our reports show there were 1612 Assemblies with a membership of 91,981. On July 31, 1931, twenty-three months later, this had been increased to 2,030 Assemblies with a combined membership of 101,093, a gain of 418 assemblies and 10,112 members.

Concerning the various activities of the Headquarters office and the Publishing House interests, since a full report will be given by representatives of the different departments, the Superintendent will make no further report concerning these than to express his thankfulness for the love and co-operation that have been enjoyed, and his appreciation of those with whom it has been his pleasure to labor.

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## GENERAL TREASURER'S REPORT

According to custom, I am pleased to furnish a report of the Secretary-Treasurer's Office given in brief form, covering the period from September 1, 1929, to the close of business, July 31, 1931.

To any who may wish a statement in detail, we kindly refer them to the regular report of the Southwest Systems and Audit Company, a copy of which is on file in this office.

Since our last report we have issued \$29,400.00 in Annuity Bonds, all of which has been covered by investments in high-class stocks and bonds. The Gospel Publishing House has transferred to the Treasurer's Office, \$35,308.35 which has been disbursed as follows:

\$7,995.25 for the erection of a modern bungalow for the Central Bible Institute; \$6,707.29 was transferred to the Central Bible Institute for operating purposes, and \$3,440.16 for repairs and replacements for the main building.

\$2,638.20 represents a deficit in the operation of the General Council Office. (See statement below). \$4,666.06

was used in the operation of the General Council Investment Department, represented by annuity interest, repairs, and other necessary operation expenditures as duly set forth in the various exhibits of the auditor's regular report. \$7,623.13 was invested in the property located at 2039 North Douglas Street, Springfield, Missouri. The balance of \$2,238.26 is properly shown in exhibit "A" of the regular report as forming a part of the increase in the General Fund.

In conclusion, we are presenting two statements—Operation of General Council Office, and Condensed form of exhibit "A" of Auditor's report of Financial condition as of July 31, 1931.

Our business has so grown that it would burden this brief pamphlet unduly if we were to attempt any thing like detail here, therefore, we have left to the various exhibits of regular report to carry the detailed information in their proper forms.

## REPORT OF THE GOSPEL PUBLISHING HOUSE

Following is a brief summary of the activities of the Gospel Publishing House for the past twenty-three months. As the General Council meeting is being held in California this year we cannot give a full two years' report, for the reason it was necessary that our books be closed one month earlier in order to get a printed report completed in time for this meeting.

PRINTING DEPARTMENT—We are pleased to state that this department has made real progress since our last report was made. Some new equipment has been added, consisting of an automatic feeder for one of our large cylinder presses, an automatic feeder for our Cleveland folder, a new automatically fed job press, and a Dupli-graph machine for the mailing room, also other small equipment has been installed, the total of which amounts to \$12,702.82.

PUBLICATION DEPARTMENT—Our publications have all shown a marked increase in circulation during the past two years, except Our Pentecostal Little Folks. This paper shows a slight decrease owing to the introduction of a new Sunday School paper for pupils of this grade. In December, 1929, the Christ's Ambassadors magazine was discontinued for the reason that the circulation was too small to justify us in continuing its publication.

Considering the great financial depression which is prevalent all over the world, we feel that the advancement made in this part of our work has been very good. Elsewhere a more complete report of this department is given.

BOOK DEPARTMENT—This department also shows a substantial gain since our last report. During this time we have published and placed on the market two new song books, *Spiritual Songs* and *Evangel Songs*. Over 90,000 *Spiritual Songs* have been printed in less than two years, and at the present time this song book is having a splendid sale. We have been highly commended on the publishing of this book. *Evangel Songs* was placed on the market last March, and at the present have printed approximately 40,000 copies. This song book was prepared for use in camp meetings, revival services, Sunday Schools and the smaller assemblies. All indications point to a very large sale of this book.

We have added a number of new books to our already large stock, and have some manuscripts being prepared for the printer at present.

A new line of illustrated tracts has been printed recently and a splendid sale is being realized. Last spring a Million Tract Campaign was started and over a million and a half tracts were mailed out from this department. At present we are in the midst of another such campaign and indications are that we will reach our goal.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT—Just a little over two years ago this department was transferred from Central Bible Institute to the Gospel Publishing House. Our records show that there are at present 682 students studying these specially prepared correspondence courses.

During the past two years 102 students have finished their courses and received certificates. Also thirty Group Study Classes have been enrolled. We believe a real service is being given through this Department to our young people, as well as others, who are unable to attend Bible School. We regret to report, however, that this department is not self-supporting at present. We trust we may have the hearty co-operation of our ministerial brethren regarding this branch of the work, which if utilized can have a wide influence for good in establishing our people in a clear understand of the Scriptures and in preparing them to do effective service for the Lord.

## REPORT ON PUBLICATIONS

The Lord has surely been our helper during the past two years at the Gospel Publishing House. When most publishing houses have to report a decline in output, we are grateful to the Lord that we are able to state that we have been printing and publishing more Pentecostal literature than at any time in our history. We desire to give God all the glory for this.

## *The Pentecostal Evangel*

During the past two years we have endeavored to keep the Evangel true to our distinctive Pentecostal testimony and have published three special numbers devoted entirely to the message of the Baptism in the Spirit, reprinting more than one hundred thousand of these for special distribution. We learned of one sister receiving the Baptism while she was reading one of these special numbers. We also printed a special number devoted to the truth of Divine Healing.

We have endeavored to keep the missionary vision constantly before our Evangel readers, realizing that the Lord filled us with the Spirit with this purpose in view, that we carry the full gospel message even unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

More than three million copies of the Evangel have been printed and circulated during the past twenty-three months.

### *Sunday School Literature*

There has been an increasing demand for our Sunday school literature and leaflets. We are now supplying Sunday school literature for 171,000 each Sunday as compared with 154,000 two years ago. Approximately 8,500,000 copies of our three Sunday school papers have been put into circulation since last Council. We greatly appreciate the loyalty of our Pentecostal assemblies in using our literature. This greatly helps us. The loss on sending out the Evangel at a subscription price less than cost is more than offset by what is made on our Sunday school literature.

### *Other Literature*

During the past two years we have printed twelve new books by Spirit-filled authors. We have printed forty-eight thousand books altogether. In addition to the above we have printed 20,000 booklets on the Baptism in the Spirit, most of which we have given away as premiums to the Pentecostal Evangel. We have also started the beginning of what we trust will be a large issue of inexpensive booklets.

During the present year we have published 63 new tracts, 59 of which are illustrated by Dr. Pace's unique cartoons, which the Sunday School Times have generously allowed us to use. We have had to print more than two million of them. We have printed 3,651,400 tracts during the past twenty-three months in contrast with 3,173,669 tracts in the previous two years.

The following is a comparative statement of the circulation of our different publications, at the close of our fiscal years, August 31, 1929 and July 31, 1931.

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## REPORT OF MISSIONS DEPARTMENT GENERAL REPORT

It is with gratitude to God that we make our report of the missionary activities conducted by the splendid band of workers who are affiliated with the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

With few exceptions the work established during the past few years has been maintained and in a number of fields notable advances have been made.

Further details giving the number of missionaries, stations, and native workers in each country where our missionaries are laboring will be found in another part of this report, and may be referred to at your leisure. I shall therefore confine myself in this present report to a few outstanding facts worthy of our special attention.

At the beginning of this blessed Pentecostal outpouring many who, in their first glow of enthusiasm went to the foreign field to work for God, did not know very much about missionary work. Their chief thought was to tell others the good news that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever, and that He was ready to save, heal, and baptize whosoever was willing to receive Him. Men and women whom God has filled with His Spirit went from our ranks to all parts of the world telling the blessed story, but in many cases they did not realize the importance of learning the language and becoming "all things to all men," with the result that their future ministry was considerably hindered. Others went here and there without any definite plan other than that they were constrained to tell men and women everywhere how to get saved, but not following Scriptural precedent in the establishing of assemblies, the converts who were gathered out were often left to the mercy of countless foes. Yet in spite of our ignorance and zeal, which was not always according to knowledge, God graciously overruled and helped in the establishing of many gospel centers which are still shining with undiminished light.

The work as a whole is now much better established than formerly and the new fields we are entering are occupied with definite plans for the founding of the native church and evangelizing of the territory occupied. Our Department is not assuming the credit for this since, in most cases, the missionaries themselves have seen that God has always a best way for doing everything and that this applies to missionary work as well as to matters of comparatively minor importance.

New missionaries are impressed with the importance of their acquiring the native language during their first term on the field, or at least sufficient of it to assure their

becoming efficient workers in the future. Any who fail to qualify in this respect are held up to question when the matter of reappointment to the field is considered, the objective of the Missions Department being to safeguard the investment of the people's offerings that such may go for the support of those who manifest the anointing and qualifications for missionary work.

At the last Council meeting the Missions Department was authorized to appoint someone to visit the fields as a representative from headquarters in order that we might have one at the home end who would be in a position to give us reliable information concerning the different fields and thus enable us to deal sympathetically with the problems of the mission field. As yet the way has not seemed open for one person to visit all fields; in fact the Department is rather inclined to believe that when at all possible it would be better to appoint for this work persons who have had some previous contact with the respective fields.

As an example, Brother H. C. Ball, who has had such a prominent part in establishing the Latin American work in this country and in Mexico was sent on a visit to Mexico and the Central American countries. His trip resulted in a most valuable report of the work in the countries visited. The fact of our Brother Ball's having the Spanish language enable him to minister to the people, and we understand his ministry was very much appreciated by the resident missionaries and also by the native Christians. We are hoping that in the near future it may be possible to send others to other lands in order to encourage the missionaries and native Christians and to help the home constituency by bringing back a report of the good things the Lord is doing, as well as to let us know what obstacles have to be overcome.

Inasmuch as it is the policy of the General Council to encourage the establishment of the native church as a self-governing, self-propagating and self-supporting institution, it would no doubt be of interest to many to learn how far this is becoming effective.

It is always easier if things are started right from the



foundation, than it is to cast away policies that have already been adopted and start all over again. It is therefore true that some of the most encouraging results along this line are being effected in the newer fields occupied.

In El Salvador, which we occupied only a few years ago, there is a splendid work in progress that is almost entirely under native supervision. When we entered this field there were already a number of little groups of Pentecostal believers worshipping throughout the country. These groups have now been set in order as assemblies and others have been established. We are a little slow in sending money for the help of the native workers in this field since we feel it is so much better for them, if they can see the privilege they have of looking after their workers whenever possible. When once they begin to look to America for support the whole project takes on a foreign aspect, and is branded as supported by foreign funds and therefore does not draw the interest a self-supporting native assembly attracts and also lacks that ruggedness which personal responsibility brings.

The Nationalistic spirit is forcing us in some cases to take radical steps in putting on native shoulders the responsibility of governing the assemblies. For instance in Mexico the law does not permit foreign control of religious activities. We have therefore found it necessary to hand over the entire control of the work in that country to our Mexican brethren. We are glad to know that through the faithful ministry of those who have had the Mexican work on their hearts the seed has been firmly planted and we have no fear but that the Assemblies of God in Mexico is a permanent institution that the gates of hell will not prevail against; and although under native leadership it is still a branch of the General Council of the Assemblies of God in the United States of America and Foreign Lands.

The situation in Venezuela is somewhat similar to what is found in Mexico since, although it is still permitted that foreigners already resident in that country may minister, yet steps have been taken to prevent any

more foreign ministers or missionaries entering the country. It therefore means that unless there are changes in the present rulings of the government, which we know God is well able to effect, our time in that country is limited to the period our missionaries can endure without a furlough.

The fact that we may only have a limited time shows the necessity of our teaching the natives to take responsibility as soon as possible that, even though the missionaries should be withdrawn, the Assemblies of God may continue to prosper and increase.

Our missionaries on the French Sudan field having had the privilege of starting on practically a new foundation have given special recognition to the necessity of the natives' taking responsibility for the evangelization of their own people, and as a result there are a number of natives giving their time to the preaching of the gospel, who are supported entirely by the native Christians.

We are looking forward to a similar course of procedure in the opening of the Gold Coast field, to which two of our missionaries are already on the way. We had hoped that a larger party of missionaries might have gone out, but, owing to financial conditions that prevail, a number of those who have volunteered have had to be held back for a time until they are able to get support. The field that has been allotted to us by the British Government is in the northern territories of the Gold Coast and includes a large number of the Mossi people, a tribe among whom Brother and Sister Shirer, who are in charge of this new venture, formerly worked. It appears that a great opportunity is before us in this field since it is not as yet occupied by other Protestant missionary societies and is right in line with our Council policy of "seeking out neglected regions where the gospel has not been preached."

While dealing with Africa we might mention the situation in Egypt. Egypt has given us some concern, but we have much to rejoice over in that the Lord has truly honored the testimony of our missionaries, and some very splendid people have been gathered out of darkness into

the light of the Lord's salvation. One of our missionaries has been appointed as superintendent over the native church for a period, in order to help our Egyptian brethren in the problems which are consequent upon the shifting of responsibility from the missionaries' to the natives' shoulders. There are many of the Egyptian brethren in the ministry who are men of real ability and of staunch Christian character who, we feel confident, in the near future will be able to take over the entire responsibility for the governing of the native assemblies.

The large fields of China and India are so extensive, and their problems so manifold, that we hesitate in referring to them lest the necessity of our being brief may make some feel that we are unmindful of the good work that is being accomplished in these parts of the great harvest field.

We shall, however, refer just briefly to one or two sections. Manchuria is one of the newer fields opened up. Here God is graciously manifesting His good pleasure, and several flourishing assemblies have already been established with earnest Christians in attendance.

In South China our missionaries have for some time been seeking to develop the native church as a self-governing body, and have now taken the bold step of placing almost the entire responsibility in the hands of the native Christians. We have in this field some native Christians of splendid qualities in whom we have every confidence, and much prayer is following the new move that God may help our dear Chinese brethren in the duties entrusted to them. The objective of our missionaries in this field is to leave the assemblies in charge of the native workers, thus leaving the missionaries free for the opening up of new territory for God.

Mention ought also to be made of the appeal that comes to us almost constantly for new recruits for Kansu Province and the Tibetan Border. The work in Kansu has progressed remarkably and about 40 assemblies are functioning under native leadership, many of them entirely self-supporting.

India has ever been a problem as to how to make the

church a self-supporting institution, in view of the peculiar circumstances existent in that land, which are unfavorable to the native Christian church. However we are praying and watching with great interest the experiments of others, and trust that in due time God will show us the way out of the difficulties in that land. We thank God for the splendid work accomplished there by our missionaries in spite of the hindrances.

Our missionaries in Japan are making a brave effort to establish the native church in that progressive little country. They have many difficulties to contend with, but we have confidence that, given the right encouragement, they are going to accomplish their objective.

Time will not suffice to make mention in detail of the fine work that is being carried on in the islands of the sea. In Hawaii, the Fiji Islands, the Samoan Islands, the Philippine Islands, the Canary Islands, and in Singapore. In all these fields God is graciously confirming His Word through the witness of our missionaries and ministers.

The work in Europe has almost entirely been handed over to the supervision of the Russian & Eastern European Mission whose President, Bro. Paul Peterson is a General Council minister, and whose Vice President, Brother Gustav Schmidt, is both a Council minister and missionary. The work is being very ably carried on by these brethren assisted by the Board of Trustees and between them and our General Council there is the utmost co-operation and fellowship. Europe, like some of our other fields, presents a great opportunity today, but it is a question as to just how long the doors will be open. The forces of communism and religious prejudice are becoming increasingly manifest, and it is very uncertain as to just how long the missionary will be tolerated. Every effort is being made to train the natives for the ministry through the Bible school at Danzig. This school is therefore filling a most important place in the work.

At the last General Council it was decided to do something more for the evangelization of the North American Indian, and a committee was appointed to

investigate the need and report. It has taken some little time to bring this matter before the home constituency, but we believe a forward move has been made and these needy people right at our doors are going to get a better chance than before.

We thank God for the many souls who have been saved in these many lands where the General Council of the Assemblies of God through its representatives is laboring. I am sure that our hearts go out to the many members of Christ's body to whom we are so vitally united. There are however still many unsaved who must be brought in. May God help us to be faithful to the trust He has committed to us, and grant that our vision may not grow dim, or our zeal flag, until we have done our utmost to see that the gospel is preached to every creature.

It would hardly be fitting at this time to go into any detailed report of the vast unoccupied fields; it is perhaps sufficient to state that as yet we are only touching the fringe of the unevangelized millions, and that there is yet much land to be possessed. In order to intelligently carry out our Lord's great commission we recommend that whereas we would respect the leadings of the individual applying for missionary appointment, yet we must also respect the principles of that great master missionary, the apostle Paul, who sought to preach the gospel "not where Christ was named," lest he should build upon another man's foundation.

In order to do this it would seem that every prospective missionary should make a careful study of the comparative needs of the various foreign fields and make his chief concern the reaching of those sections that are as yet untouched.

We have found that more funds can be raised and a steadier flow of money assured as assemblies take over definite responsibility for the support of special missionaries that they consider their particular care.

It would however be a great help if the individual assembly before deciding to give its offerings for some new worker, would confer with the Missions Department to ascertain whether we may not know of a more urgent



need or more qualified worker who is ready to go forth. We have known of a number of cases where missionary candidates with several years of experience in the ministry have applied to us for appointment, but we have not been able to send them out owing to our funds not being adequate for the need. At the same time we receive an application from a young lady candidate hardly out of her teens whose assembly promises to support her. The references are all satisfactory, and the assembly and District Council endorses the applicant. We are therefore almost forced to grant the inexperienced worker appointment, while the seemingly more valuable worker must wait, perhaps indefinitely.

A report from a recent survey of certain mission fields made by competent authorities on missionary work gave a favorable report of the work of the Assemblies of God but adds "the work of the General Council of the Assemblies of God depends too much on woman workers." All credit is due to our missionary sisters who are so splendidly filling the gap, but do not let us forget that men and married couples are greatly needed, and when we find those of this class who are called and qualified, shall we not do all within our power to help them to the field?

It is with sincere regret that we have to report a number missing from our ranks who have been called to higher service since our last Council meeting. The following have passed on to be with the Lord: Miss Laura Gardner of India, March 9, 1930; Mr. Fred G. Leader of Belgian Congo, June 14, 1930; Mrs. Margaret Baltau of N. China, Dec. 24th, 1930; Mr. Richard J. Williams of Peru, Feb. 24, 1931; Mr. K. A. Timrud of India, March 15, 1931; Mr. A. H. Post of Egypt, June 22, 1931. We thank God for these dear soldiers of the Cross and are sure that there are many in distant lands to whom they are particularly precious and who will miss them greatly. Let us ask God to fill the gaps in our ranks that no ground be lost.

Before closing we want to express appreciation of the blessed spirit of co-operation we have experienced from

the District Superintendents, pastors of assemblies, and individuals who have helped so faithfully in the furtherance of our missionary responsibility, and we are sure that our missionaries are also grateful for those who are so loyally holding the ropes. May the Lord help us to keep pressing forward and possessing more land for the Master.

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## FIELD REPORT AFRICA

### *Belgian Congo*

Population 8,500,000; missionaries 15; stations 3.

Since the report of the 1929 Council Meeting there has been considerable progress on this field. Our missionary force has increased so that we now have fifteen missionaries under appointment for this field. We regret that owing to Brother Fred G. Leader's death we have lost his valuable service.

One of the Heart of Africa Mission Stations was taken over at Botongwe and arrangements are being made to occupy Duye. We shall then have three stations: Gombari, Botongwe, and Duye with good prospects of opening a fourth at Andudu.

### *Sierra Leone*

Population 1,500,000; missionaries none; stations 1.

Our work on this field has been confined to the Kru people but has suffered somewhat owing to the breakdown in health of the missionaries in charge. However, the little church at Freetown has continued to hold services and has received help from a Scotch Pentecostal missionary who is resident in that city. We are hoping to get recruits to fill this place shortly. There are from 100 to 200 persons who attend the assembly services and among them are many earnest Christians.

### *Liberia*

Population 1,750,000; missionaries 20; native workers 14; stations and outstations 14.

This little country of West Africa has long been a field for Pentecostal missionaries. We now have twenty missionaries, an increase of four over last Council report. We are grateful that of this increase two are men, since the ministry in Liberia has, until the present time, been left largely to the ministry of women who have been carrying more than their rightful burden.

There are ten stations and four outstations occupied by our missionaries and native workers. An encouraging development during the last year has been the opening of an evangelistic work at Cape Palmas.

Our mission has twelve schools in Liberia with twenty-four teachers and 225 scholars.

#### *French West Africa*

Population 12,000,000; missionaries 10; stations 3.

Steady progress has been made on this field. Three main stations are now occupied and plans are in operation to occupy a fourth as soon as funds and workers permit.

The present stations are Ouagadougou, Kaya, and Yako. God has graciously shown His approval on this work and we believe great possibilities are ahead of us as we seek to carry the Truth of the full gospel to the great Mossi tribe.

#### *Transvaal*

Missionaries 6; stations and outstations 12.

Transvaal is a section of what is known as the Union of South Africa comprising the provinces of the Cape of Good Hope, Orange Free State, Natal, and Transvaal. The combined population of these provinces is 6,928,580 (1,519,488 whites). Nearly all denominations of the Christian faith are represented and there are also some Mohammedans, Hindus, Buddhists, Confucians, and Jews.

We receive urgent requests from this field for others to assist in the work.

#### *Egypt*

Population 14,055,000; missionaries 10.

There are about 17 assemblies in operation in this field. The work also comprises an orphanage at Assiout with

about 600 widows or orphans, a school at Cairo with about 300 students, and a paper is published known in Arabic as "The Morning Star."

About 92% of the inhabitants of Egypt are Mohammedans and about 8% are professing Christians of various denominations. The Copts are the descendants of the ancient Egyptians and are the most influential of the Christian denominations. The Jews number about 59,400.

There are a number of splendid Egyptian preachers associated with our work and we have reason to be proud of what God has accomplished in Egypt through our missionary force.

### *Gold Coast*

Population 2,266,308.

There is a considerable part of the Gold Coast that is entirely untouched by missionary effort and two of our missionaries who formerly were ministering in French Sudan have entered this field to establish a work for God. There are many thousands of the Mossi people to be found here who speak the same language as those in the French Sudan, so that a great work can be done in this field without our missionaries from French Sudan having to learn another language.

Active steps are being taken to establish a mission on this field and the first party of missionaries are already on their way.

### CHINA AND CENTRAL ASIA

Population, including Mongolia, Sinkiang, and Tibet 455,610,584.

The ratio of missionaries to every one million people is 15.

To think of China at once brings the thought of trouble and strife, of suffering and poverty. The world looks on usually with comparative indifference while the country is literally bleeding to death. Surely China is our neighbor, lying wounded by the roadside, and in dire need of the loving hand of the servant of Christ to bring the message of life and comfort which the gospel provides.

At our last General Council Meeting we announced the opening up of the new field in Manchuria and we are now happy to report that after two years of ministry the work is getting established splendidly and 40 to 50 souls are rejoicing in the salvation of the Lord. Three stations have been opened.

The Assemblies of God workers are confined to eleven out of the nineteen Provinces of China and also we have work in Mongolia and Tibet. The Provinces where no work under the Assemblies of God is established are:

Some of these untouched Provinces should present a loud challenge to us to further efforts on their behalf.

We have 64 missionaries under appointment for service in China and Central Asia assisted by 126 native workers. Our missionaries are occupying 26 stations and 78 outstations. This shows no increase in our missionary force for China over last year but does reveal four more stations opened and 31 more outstations, for which we praise God.

Our work in China is largely of an evangelistic nature but in addition we have a Bible school in North China. Five day-schools and an orphanage at Taianfu with approximately 500 men, women and children who are cared for. Also an orphanage at Ningpo with approximately 100 orphans or dependent folk.

#### INDIA

Population 330,184,877.

In considering India with its innumerable languages, variety of costumes and customs, its great differences in



architecture, one is almost inclined to feel the country is bigger than is actually the case. It is at least true that in population it is one of the greatest countries in the world.

A missionary of experience writes: "I found one missionary among one million people and less than 100 Christians in the whole area. Again, in three districts of Bengal I visited I found two men and seven women among four and three quarter million people. I visited parts of Bihar, Rajputana, and Central Provinces, Sendh, and many points along the 3000 miles of frontier which were quite untouched. I traversed native state after native state in which there were no resident missionaries." Surely the harvest is great, and the laborers are few.

We have 80 missionaries on our list for India who are assisted by approximately 160 native workers. Twenty-nine stations have been opened and sixty-eight outstations.

Our missionaries are primarily engaged in evangelistic work but also have established a most encouraging work among the lepers at Uska Bazar, two baby folds at Bara Banki and Allahabad, a Boys' school, both industrial and for Bible training, at Rupaidiha, another at Nawabganj, and a Girls' Industrial School and Young Widows' Home at Partabgarh. A Bible training school for the zenana women has been recently opened at Dehra Dun and plans are approved for the establishing of a general Bible school for the training of young men and women which is expected to be located at Unao.

Conditions in India during this time of anxiety over political change has made it very difficult in some places to continue the ministry of the gospel, but God has been gracious in manifesting His protecting care over our faithful laborers in that needy field. Let us pray that these coming days may bring some great forward strides for the gospel in India.

## JAPAN

Population (including Formosa and Korea) 76,988,379.

Japan has not escaped the prevalent unrest and trouble which is afflicting this needy world. The people are too

congested in so limited an area; Japan must have room for expansion, or war is bound to ensue. Hundreds and thousands of men are out of employment and the agents of Communism are busy secretly sowing their literature on this fruitful soil. The trouble is aggravated in that it has been discovered that the political leaders have abused their office in taking large bribes to give favor to individuals. It is said the Tokyo prison is full of rich men who have been giving and taking bribes. One redeeming feature is that the hard times are causing many to call upon God.

We have 14 missionaries under appointment for this field, and they are assisted by 12 native workers. Six stations and eleven outstations are being occupied at present. As in other fields, one cause of our inability to possess more land in this country is seemingly a lack of funds. We are anxious to establish a Bible school that will provide training for the young native men and women who manifest the qualifications for service and upon whom the call of God is resting.

The work at present is entirely evangelistic with the exception of the orphanage conducted by Miss Mae Straub.

## PALESTINE AND TRANSJORDAN

The population of Palestine and Transjordan is composed of Mohammedans 590,890, Jews 73,026, Christians (Nominal) 7,028, Druses 163, Samaritans 205, Bahais 265, Miscellaneous races 2,000. We have eight missionaries under appointment for this field who occupy three main stations and three outstations. They are ably assisted by some Pentecostal workers of other organizations. A most encouraging work is in progress in Transjordan, where many people are seeking the Lord.

## SYRIA

Syria has a population of 3 million and is occupied by three of our missionaries. An orphanage and school has been established in addition to the evangelistic work that is carried on. There are two outstations and one main station.

## PERSIA

Persia has a population of about 10,000,000 and has long been a difficult field to work in, owing to the influence of Mohammedanism. However we rejoice to report that the old established beliefs of the people are beginning to crumble and they are now open as never before to the gospel message. We have recently appointed three new missionaries to this field which increases our missionary force in Persia to five. One main station has been opened and 8 outstations. We are expecting in the near future to be able to establish more stations.

## CENTRAL AMERICA

### *El Salvador*

This little republic of Central America has a population of 1,688,129, and has proved a fruitful field of endeavor during the past two years. When the District Superintendent of our Latin American work visited this field just prior to our last General Council meeting in 1929, he discovered that there were eight assemblies of Pentecostal believers and a number of native pastors active in the work. Since that time two missionaries have been sent and we are now happy to report that there are about 25 assemblies and 13 native pastors. A Bible school is planned for this field to train the prospective native preachers.

### *Nicaragua*

An encouraging report comes to us as a result of the visit of our Latin American District Superintendent to this field. The estimated population is 2,778,000. The work has suffered considerably because our missionaries here have had to minister with insufficient help. The climatic conditions are none too favorable and for this reason, the health of some who have gone there has been unequal to the strain. However two stations have an active ministry—Matagalpa and Leon.

The work seems to be in a good spiritual condition. We are hoping that our borders may be enlarged in this field in which we have only two missionaries.

## SOUTH AMERICA

### *Peru*

Our largest work in South America is in Peru. The population of the country is 5,500,000; we have nine missionaries and a number of native workers. Four main stations have been opened and about ten outstations. In addition the gospel has been preached in approximately 30 other towns.

### *Venezuela*

This country has a population of 3,026,878 and at the present time our missionaries are facing a very difficult situation inasmuch as the government has forbidden foreign ministers to enter the country. This means that unless there is a change those missionaries who go home on furlough will not be able to return to the field. It has therefore become the resolve of those on the field to stay as long as possible so as to get the gospel securely planted. We have just two missionaries on this field who are co-operating with some other well accredited Pentecostal workers who were responsible for opening the work in Venezuela.

### *Argentina*

The population of the Argentine Republic is 10,904,022 and it is a country of considerable progress and possibility. Our only missionary is located in 25 de Mayo from which she works three outstations with the assistance of some native helpers.

There has been a steady growth in the work both as to numbers and spirituality but we feel much more ought to be done for this field.

## EUROPE

The work of the General Council missionaries in Europe has very largely been handed over to the supervision of the Russian and Eastern European Mission whose workers are very ably carrying on this ministry. Missionaries under General Council appointment have entered Latvia, Greece, Bulgaria, Poland, Soviet Russia, and Hungary. In practically all of these countries considerable opposition to the work has been experienced either

from the Communist party or the established church denominations who resent the activities of our workers. However God is blessing the work in a very marked manner. It seems where persecution abounds that there also the Lord works mightily.

## THE ISLANDS OF THE SEA CANARY ISLANDS

In these little islands lying off the west coast of Africa one of our missionaries in co-operation with some independent missionaries has opened a Missionary Home and evangelistic center. One purpose is to provide a home for our missionaries in West Africa so that they may obtain a complete change of climate without the necessity of returning home so frequently. In addition to this every effort will be made to evangelize the territory. The islands are under Spanish rule, and under the dominion of the church of Rome which is very much opposed to Protestant effort in any form. The recent revolution in Spain will undoubtedly result in greater freedom in these islands for the gospel ministry.

## FIJI ISLANDS

We now have four missionaries under appointment for this field and God has been graciously encouraging the hearts of the workers by some fruit of their labors. Up until the present we have only been able to establish one station although the gospel has been preached in many of the surrounding villages. The population of the Fiji Islands, which comprises 250 islands, is composed of Europeans 4,184, Fijians, 89,401, Indians 68,733.

## HAWAIIAN AND SAMOAN ISLANDS

There are Pentecostal works conducted by General Council ministers in both of these island groups, but not under the supervision of the Missions Department.

## SINGAPORE, STRAITS SETTLEMENTS

We have been very much encouraged by the good report we have received of the progress of the work in this field. It is only a few years' old, but God has already saved a number of people and enabled our mis-



sionaries to establish one outstation in addition to the main station. The work is chiefly among the Cantonese of whom there are about 200,000. In addition to the evangelistic work two schools are conducted which prove of help in reaching the people.

## LATIN AMERICAN WORK IN THE U. S. A. AND MEXICO

The work among the Latin American people in the United States continues to be most encouraging. Approximately 100 assemblies are in operation giving forth the full gospel testimony. Many of our Latin American brethren are now taking active part in the supervision of the work, thus relieving some of the missionaries for other lines of service.

A most important part of the work is carried on by the Bible schools in San Antonio and San Diego where young men who have been called of God to the ministry are able to prepare themselves for active service. The financing of these schools has been somewhat of a problem, but the Lord has helped and we are believing for even greater things this coming year. The San Diego school is especially in need of better accommodation and is asking prayer that funds be provided for a new dormitory. The population of Mexico is estimated at a little over 15 million.

## PORTO RICO

Porto Rico has a population of 1,299,800. According to the most recent figures the gospel is now being proclaimed at fifty-six different points by our missionaries or the native workers of the Assemblies of God. A large number of these assemblies are self-supporting but others require some help for the time being, owing to the extreme poverty of the people. The work is chiefly of an evangelistic nature, and shows considerable development since our last report. A paper "El Evangelista Pentecostal" is published monthly. We have three missionaries under appointment for this field who are assisted by a large number of native ministers.

## FINANCIAL REPORT OF MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

We have every reason for gratitude to God for the way in which offerings have kept up during the past two years when the country has been passing through a period of unusual depression. Practically every missionary society has suffered because of financial conditions, and many have had to make drastic cuts in the allowances of their missionaries as well as put a number off the list. Our receipts for the two years show a total of \$513,698.51 which is \$13,072.60 over the total of last Council period. We must also take into consideration that we have closed our books a month earlier this year in view of the need of our getting figures ready at an earlier date. The total, therefore, for the two years will quite probably be \$24,000.00 in excess of what is quoted, making a gain of around \$37,000.00. This is really quite remarkable and should be an occasion for much thanksgiving to God.

The assemblies who adopt the Busy Bee Plan which calls for a division between home and foreign missions do so voluntarily, so that we only divide an offering when this is the wish of the contributor.

There are still many assemblies who are doing nothing for missions, and it would be a tremendous help if each one would take a monthly offering, however small it might be. The bulk of our offerings is made up of small amounts, and the measure of continued progress will be based upon the extent to which we are all taking a part in this great responsibility of completing the Unfinished Task. We are deeply grateful to the host of friends who have stood so loyally with us and thus have helped sustain our dear missionaries.

May God enable us to press forward during this next



two years and take more territory for God should our Lord still tarry.

## CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE

The blessing of God continues to rest upon the activities of Central Bible Institute and we believe several advance steps have been taken during the past two years. Among these, those which are outstanding are the opportunities for practical work and the courses of study now available. In addition to hospital work and other activities, nine rural churches are now pastored by the students. Senior students are appointed to the pastoral position, and other students assist them in the different church activities, which include Sunday school work and conducting of regular services. Much interest is shown in this work and a number have been saved through the ministry of the students.

Instead of the one regular three years' course of study formerly offered, Central Bible Institute now offers a choice of five three year courses of study.

1. Department of General Bible Study. This course provides a complete and thorough study of the Bible that "the man of God may be thoroughly furnished unto every good work."

2. Department of Christian Ministry. Studies in this

department are designed to afford training for those called of God to enter the pastorate. Its establishment has been urged upon the Institute Directorate by the pressing need of trained leaders in our Pentecostal fellowship.

3. Department of Missions. The courses in this department are designed to give special missionary training to men and women called of God for work in foreign mission fields. They include, besides the subjects in the General Bible Study Department, the following: History of Missions, Religions of Mission Fields, Missionary Principles and Practice, Practical Nursing, and Special Missionary Lectures.

4. Department of Christian Education. The purpose of the Department of Christian Education is to train students as teachers and leaders for the Sunday school, Daily Vacation Bible School, Young Peoples' work, and Boys and Girls Work.

5. Department of Music. This department seeks to provide opportunities for the student to specialize in music while he pursues the study of the Bible.

In addition to these major courses, Central Bible Institute is also providing the following Christian Workers Courses. These courses have been prepared principally for those who have had some experience in Christian work and who feel their need of special Bible Study.

A. The Christian Workers Two Year Course.

B. The Christian Workers One Year Course.

In either of these courses the student will be permitted to elect his own subjects and will be awarded a certificate for the work done.

We are thankful to report that at the close of school last spring we were able, through the interest taken in the students by some of our District Superintendents, to see all those who graduated placed into fields of service. We believe many excellent young people are being graduated from our Pentecostal Bible Schools, and we would appreciate the hearty co-operation of the different District Officers and ministers in opening for them a field



of labor. It is not easy for those newly entering the ministry to establish themselves and they need encouragement and practical help from our older brethren.

### **Report of Committee on Bible Schools**

Your Committee on Bible Schools beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We would express our hearty appreciation of the remarkable way in which scores of our present leaders and pastors have overcome the handicap of lack of schooling or of Bible school training and declare our respect for them and our appreciation of them in every way.

2. We would, however, reaffirm our conviction of the need of thorough training for our prospective ministers and missionaries, and deplore the lack of whole-hearted interest and cooperation on the part of many of our pastors and other leaders in the matter of Bible school education.

3. We sincerely believe that it will be better to supply the present affiliated Bible schools of the constituency with the number of students needed to enable them to operate without financial loss before erecting or endorsing other schools which would detract students, or prospective students from our established schools.

4. We wish to call attention to an apparent discrepancy between the present practice of endorsing certain Bible schools and the requirements set forth in Article IX of our By-Laws (Section 1, p. 25).

5. We would voice the need of the most hearty cooperation of all our District Superintendents and pastors in opening doors of usefulness for the graduates of our Bible Schools. Many of them should work a year or more under the direction of mature, experienced pastors, before being entrusted with the full responsibilities of pastoral charges. Some pastors could employ one or two of these recruits in assisting him in his local work, and in opening new fields under his direction, and with his cooperation. Many of these graduates are willing to work very hard, if only they can get an opportunity to work and serve the Master.

6. We feel the need of an Educational Commission which shall function between the sessions of the General Council, and shall be charged with the following duties:

(1) To make a careful study of the educational needs of our fellowship, gather information regarding the institutions we now have, and the various kinds of training and schools actually required to meet our needs, and the best manner of fostering present institutions, and the most strategic or advantageous locations for any schools that should be established to meet these needs.

(2) To counsel with those conducting schools in our constituency, and those who are trying to establish schools to meet these needs.

(3) To seek so far as possible so to relate and co-ordinate the work of the various institutions as to secure the highest degree of economy and efficiency, and to lay out an educational policy and program, which in the opinion of this Committee, should include academic as well as Bible school training.

(4) This Commission should be appointed by the Executive Presbytery and should represent the General Council in an official capacity between sessions.

The Fourteenth Session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God adjourned at 5:30 p. m. with prayer.

Preceding and following the session of the General Council it was the privilege of those who visited San Francisco to have a real spiritual feast on Sunday, September 6, and Monday, September 7, and also on Sunday, September 13. There was a large attendance at all of the services these three days as well as the night services during the time that the General Council was in session. God was present and manifested His power throughout these services, and it was the general expression of all those who attended the 1931 session of the General Council that it was one of the best Councils that had ever been held. To God be all the praise and glory for His wonderful goodness to us in these last days. A report of these spiritual meetings was made in several editions of the Pentecostal Evangel.

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### THE ADORABLE GODHEAD

#### (a) Terms Defined.

The terms "Trinity" and "Persons," as related to the Godhead, while not found in the Scriptures, are words in harmony with Scripture, whereby we may convey to others our immediate understanding of the doctrine of Christ respecting the Being of God, as distinguished from "gods many and lords many." We, therefore, may speak with propriety of the Lord our God,

who is One Lord, as a trinity or as one Being of three persons, and still be absolutely Scriptural. (Examples, Matt. 2:6; 8:16, 17; Acts 15:15-18.)

(b) **Distinction and Relationship in the Godhead.**

Christ taught a distinction of Persons in the Godhead which He expressed in specific terms of relationship, as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, but that this distinction and relationship, as to its mode is **inscrutable** and **incomprehensible**, because **unexplained**. (Luke 1:35; 1 Cor. 1:24; Matt. 11:25-27; 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14; 1 John 1:3, 4.)

(c) **Unity of the One Being of Father, Son and Holy Ghost.**

Accordingly, therefore, there is **that** in the Son which constitutes Him **the Son** and not the Father; and there is **that** in the Holy Ghost which constitutes Him **the Holy Ghost** and not either the Father or the Son. Wherefore the Father is the Begetter, the Son is the Begotten; and the Holy Ghost is the one proceeding from the Father and the Son. Therefore, because these three persons in the Godhead are in a state of **unity**, there is but one Lord God Almighty and His name one. John 1:18; 15:26; 17:11, 21; Zech. 14:9.

(d) **Identity and Co-operation in the Godhead.**

The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost are never **identical** as to **Person**; nor **confused** as to **relation**; nor **divided** in respect to the Godhead; nor **opposed** as to **co-operation**. The Son is **in** the Father and the Father is **in** the Son as to relationship. The Son is **with** the Father and the Father is **with** the Son, as to fellowship. The Father is not **from** the Son, but the Son is **from** the Father, as to authority. The Holy Ghost is **from** the Father and the Son proceeding, as to nature, relationship, co-operation and authority. Hence, neither Person in the Godhead either exists or works separately or independently of the others. John 5:17-30.

(e) **The Title, Lord Jesus Christ.**

The appellation "Lord Jesus Christ" is a proper name. It is never applied, in the New Testament, either to the Father or to the Holy Ghost. It therefore belongs exclusively to the **Son of God**. Rom. 1:1-3, 7; 2 John 3.

(f) **The Lord Jesus Christ, God with us.**

The Lord Jesus Christ, as to His divine and eternal nature, is the proper and only Begotten of the Father; but as to His human nature, He is the proper Son of Man. He is, therefore, acknowledged to be both God and man; who, because He is God and man, is "Im-

manuel," God with us. Matt. 1:23; 1 John 4:2, 10, 14; Rev. 1:13, 14-17.

(g) **The Title, Son of God.**

Since the name "Immanuel" embraces both God and man in the one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ, it follows that the title, Son of God, describes His proper Deity, and the title, Son of Man, His proper humanity. Therefore, the title, Son of God, belongs to the **order of eternity**, and the title, Son of Man, to the **order of time**. Matt. 1:23, 21; 2 John 3; 1 John 3:8; Heb. 7:3; 1:1-13.

(h) **Transgression of the Doctrine of Christ.**

Wherefore, it is a transgression of the Doctrine of Christ to say that Jesus Christ derived the title, Son of God, solely from the fact of the incarnation, or because of His relation to the economy of redemption. Therefore, to deny that the Father is a real and eternal Father, and that the Son is a real and eternal Son, is a denial of the distinction and relationship in the Being of God; a denial of the Father and the Son: and a **displacement** of the truth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. 2 John 9; John 1:1, 2, 14, 18, 29, 49; 8:57, 58; 1 John 2:22, 23; 4:1-5; Heb. 12:3, 4.

(i) **Exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord.**

The Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, having by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; angels and principalities and powers having been made subject unto Him. And, having been made both Lord and Christ, He sent the Holy Ghost that we, in the name of Jesus, might bow our knees and confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father until the end when the Son shall become subject to the Father that God may be all in all. Heb. 1:3; 1 Peter 3:22; Acts 2:32-36; Rom. 14:11; 1 Cor. 15:24-28.

(j) **Equal Honor to the Father and to the Son.**

Wherefore, since the Father has delivered all judgment unto the Son, it is not only the **express duty** of all in heaven and on earth to bow the knee, but it is an **unspeakable joy** in the Holy Ghost to ascribe unto the Son all the attributes of Deity, and to give Him all the honor and the glory contained in all the names and titles of the Godhead (except those which express relationship. See paragraphs b, c, and d), and thus honor the Son even as we honor the Father. John 5:22, 23; 1 Peter 1:8; Rev. 5:6-14; Phil. 2:8, 9; Rev. 7:9, 10; 4:8-11.
