**CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF
THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND
FOREIGN LANDS, REVISED TO
SEPTEMBER 14-20, 1933**

CONSTITUTIONAL DECLARATION

Whereas, It is the express purpose of God, our heavenly Father, to call out of the world a saved people, who shall constitute the body or church of Jesus Christ, built and established upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner stone; and

Whereas, The members of the body, the church (ecclesia) of Jesus Christ, are enjoined to assemble themselves together for worship, fellowship, counsel and instruction in the Word of God and the work of the ministry and for the exercise of those spiritual gifts and offices provided for in the New Testament; and

Whereas, It is evident that the early apostolic churches came together in such fellowship as a representative body of saved, Spirit-filled believers, who ordained and sent out evangelists and missionaries, and who under the supervision of the Holy Spirit, set over the church pastors and teachers; therefore be it

Resolved, That we recognize ourselves as a co-operative fellowship of Pentecostal, Spirit-baptized saints from local Pentecostal Assemblies of like precious faith throughout the United States and foreign lands, to be known as The General Council of the Assemblies of God whose purpose is not to usurp authority over the various local assemblies, nor to deprive them of their Scriptural and local rights and privileges, but to recognize and promote scriptural methods and order for worship, unity, fellowship, work and business for God; and to disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrines and conduct, endeavoring to keep the unity of

the Spirit in the bonds of peace, "till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name shall be, The General Council of the Assemblies of God.

ARTICLE II. NATURE

The General Council of the Assemblies of God is a co-operative fellowship based upon mutual agreements voluntarily entered into by its membership.

ARTICLE III. PREROGATIVES

1. To approve all scriptural teachings, methods and conduct; and to disapprove unscriptural teachings, methods and conduct.

2. To encourage and promote the evangelization of the world.

3. To provide a basis of fellowship among Christians of like precious faith.

4. To establish and maintain such departments and institutions as may be necessary for the propagation of the Gospel and the work of this Pentecostal fellowship.

5. To have the right to own, hold in trust, use, sell, convey, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of, such property, real or chattel, as may be needed for the prosecution of its work.

ARTICLE IV. PRINCIPLES

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall represent as nearly as possible in detail, the body of Christ as described in the New Testament Scriptures, recognizing the principles inherent in that body as also inherent in this fellowship, particularly the principles of unity, co-operation and equality. Its purpose is to maintain conditions under which it can, as a fellow-

ship, demonstrate these principles and their consequent development.

ARTICLE V

STATEMENT OF FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS

The Bible is our all-sufficient rule for faith and practice. Hence this statement of Fundamental Truths is intended as a basis of fellowship among us (i. e., that we all speak the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Acts 2:42). The human phraseology employed in such statement is not inspired nor contended for, but the truth set forth is held to be essential to a full Gospel ministry. No claim is made that it contains all truth in the Bible, only that it covers our present needs as to these fundamental matters.

1. THE SCRIPTURES INSPIRED

The Bible is the inspired Word of God, a revelation from God to man, the infallible rule of faith and conduct, and is superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason (2 Tim. 3:15, 16; 1 Pet. 2:2).

2. THE ONE TRUE GOD

The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally self-existent, self-revealed "I AM"; and has further revealed Himself as embodying the principles of relationship and association, i. e., as Father, Son and Holy Ghost (Deut. 6:4; Mark 12:29; Isa. 43:10, 11; Matt. 28:19).

THE ADORABLE GODHEAD

(a) Terms Defined

The terms "Trinity" and "Persons," as related to the Godhead, while not found in the Scriptures, are words in harmony with Scripture, whereby we may convey to others our immediate understanding of the doctrine of Christ respecting the Being of God, as distinguished from "gods many and lords many." We, therefore, may speak with propriety of the Lord our God, who is One Lord, as a trinity or as one Being of three persons, and still be absolutely Scriptural. (Examples, Matt. 2:6; 8:16, 17; Acts 15:15-18.)

(b) Distinction and Relationship in the Godhead

Christ taught a distinction of Persons in the Godhead which He expressed in specific terms of relationship, as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, but that this distinction and relationship, as to its mode is **inscrutable** and **incomprehensible**, because **unexplained**. (Luke 1:35; 1 Cor. 1:24; Matt. 11:25-27; 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14; 1 John 1:3, 4).

(c) Unity of the One Being of Father, Son and Holy Ghost

Accordingly, therefore, there is **that** in the Son which constitutes Him **the Son** and not the Father; and there is **that** in the Holy Ghost which constitutes Him **the Holy Ghost** and not either the Father or the Son. Wherefore the Father is the Begetter, the Son is the Begotten; and the Holy Ghost is the one proceeding from the Father and the Son. Therefore, because these three persons in the Godhead are in a state of unity, there is but one Lord God Almighty and His name one. (John 1:18; 15:26; 17:11, 21; Zech. 14:9).

(d) Identity and Co-operation in the Godhead

The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost are never **identical** as to **Person**; nor **confused** as to **relation**; nor **divided** in respect to the Godhead; nor **opposed** as to **co-operation**. The Son is **in** the Father and the Father is **in** the Son as the relationship. The Son is **with** the Father and the Father is **with** the Son, as to fellowship. The Father is not **from** the Son, but the Son is **from** the Father, as to authority. The Holy Ghost is **from** the Father and the Son preceeding, as to nature, relationship, co-operation and authority. Hence, neither Person in the Godhead either exists or works separately or independently of the others. (John 5:17-30).

(e) The Title, Lord Jesus Christ

The appellation, "Lord Jesus Christ," is a proper name. It is never applied, in the New Testament, either to the Father or to the Holy Ghost. It therefore belongs exclusively to the **Son of God**. (Rom. 1:1-3, 7; 2 John 3).

(f) The Lord Jesus Christ, God with Us

The Lord Jesus Christ, as to His divine and eternal nature, is the proper and only Begotten of the Father, but as to His human nature, He is the proper Son of Man. He is, therefore, acknowledged to be both God and man; who, because He is God and man, is "Immanuel," God with us. (Matt. 1:23; 1 John 4:2, 10, 14; Rev. 1:13, 14-17).

(g) The Title, Son of God

Since the name "Immanuel" embraces both God and man in the one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ, it follows that the title, Son of God, describes His proper deity, and the title, Son of Man, His proper humanity. Therefore, the title, Son

of God, belongs to the **order of eternity**, and the title, Son of Man, to the **order of time**. (Matt. 1:23, 21; 2 John 3; 1 John 3:8; Heb. 7:3; 1:1-13).

(h) Transgression of the Doctrine of Christ

Wherefore, it is a transgression of the Doctrine of Christ to say that Jesus Christ derived the title, Son of God, solely from the fact of the incarnation, or because of His relation to the economy of redemption. Therefore, to deny that the Father is a real and eternal Father, and that the Son is a real and eternal Son, is a denial of the distinction and relationship in the Being of God; a denial of the Father and the Son; and a **displacement** of the truth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. (2 John 9; John 1:1-2, 14, 18, 29, 49; 8:57, 58; 1 John 2:22, 23; 4:1-5; Heb. 12:3, 4).

(i) Exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord

The Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, having by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; angels and principalities and powers having been made subject unto Him. And, having been made both Lord and Christ, He sent the Holy Ghost that we, in the name of Jesus, might bow our knees and confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father until the end, when the Son shall become subject to the Father that God may be all in all. (Heb. 1:3; 1 Peter 3:22; Acts 2:32-36; Rom. 14:11; 1 Cor. 15:24-28).

(j) Equal Honor to the Father and to the Son

Wherefore, since the Father has delivered all judgment unto the Son, it is not only the **express duty** of all in heaven and on earth to bow the knee, but it is an **unspeakable** joy in the Holy Ghost to ascribe unto the Son all the attributes of Deity, and to give Him all the honor and the glory contained in all the names and titles of the Godhead (except those which express relationship. See paragraphs b, c and d), and thus honor the Son even as we honor the Father. (John 5:22, 23; 1 Peter 1:8; Rev. 5:6-14; Phil. 2:8, 9; Rev. 7:9, 10; 4:8-11).

3. MAN, HIS FALL AND REDEMPTION

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, after Our likeness." But man, by voluntary transgression, fell, and his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ the Son of God. Gen. 1:26-31; 3:1-7; Rom. 5:12-21.

4. THE SALVATION OF MAN

(a) Conditions to Salvation.

The grace of God, which bringeth salvation, hath

appeared to all men, through the preaching of repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ; man is saved by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, and, being justified by grace through faith, he becomes an heir of God according to the hope of eternal life. (Titus 2:11; Rom. 10:13-15; Luke 24:47; Titus 3:5-7).

(b) The Evidences of Salvation.

The **inward** evidence, to the believer of his salvation, is the direct witness of the Spirit (Rom. 8:16). The **outward** evidence to all men is a life of righteousness and true holiness.

5. BAPTISM IN WATER

The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an outward symbol of cleansing, while their heart has already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as an inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life (Matt. 28:19; Acts 10:47, 48; Rom. 6:4; Acts 20:21; Heb. 10:22).

6. THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements, bread and the fruit of the vine, is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Cor. 11:26); and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Cor. 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers "until He comes."

7. THE PROMISE OF THE FATHER.

All believers are entitled to, and should ardently expect, and earnestly seek, the promise of the Father, the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the

command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church. With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; 1:8; 1 Cor. 12:1-31). This wonderful experience is distinct from and subsequent to the experience of the new birth (Acts 10:44-46; 11:14-16; 15:7-9).

8. THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY GHOST

The Baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is witnessed by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterance (Acts 2:4). The speaking in tongues in this instance is the same in essence as the gift of tongues (1 Cor. 12:4-10, 28) but different in purpose and use.

9. ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION

The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy Ghost we are able to obey the command, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Entire sanctification is the will of God for all believers, and should be earnestly pursued by walking in obedience to God's Word (Heb. 12:14; 1 Pet. 1:15, 16; 1 Thess. 5:23, 24; 1 John 2:6).

10. THE CHURCH

The Church is the body of Christ, the habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission. Each believer, born of the Spirit, is an integral part of the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, which are written in heaven. (Eph. 1:22, 23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23).

11. THE MINISTRY AND EVANGELISM

A divinely called and Scripturally ordained ministry has been provided by our Lord for a twofold purpose: (1) The evangelization of the world, and (2) The edifying of the Body of Christ (Mark 16:15-20; Eph. 4:11-13).

12. DIVINE HEALING

Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the atonement, and is the privilege of all believers (Isa. 53:4, 5; Matt. 8:16, 17).

13. THE BLESSED HOPE

The resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ and their translation together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord is the imminent and blessed hope of the Church (1 Thess 4:16, 17; Rom. 8:23; Titus 2:13; 1 Cor. 15:51, 52).

14. THE MILLENNIAL REIGN OF JESUS

The revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ from heaven, the salvation of national Israel, and the millennial reign of Christ on the earth is the Scriptural promise and the world's hope (2 Thess. 1:7; Rev. 19:11-14; Rom. 11:26, 27; Rev. 20:1-7).

15. THE LAKE OF FIRE

The devil and his angels, the beast and the false prophet, and whosoever is not found written in the Book of Life, shall be consigned to everlasting punishment in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death (Rev. 19:20; Rev. 20:10-15).

16. THE NEW HEAVENS AND NEW EARTH

We, "according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness" (2 Pet. 3:13; Rev. 21, 22).

ARTICLE VI. RELATIONSHIPS

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall prosecute its activities through its General and District Councils.

ARTICLE VII. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the General Council shall consist of all ministers and missionaries holding accredited fellowship certificates, and such representatives

as may be chosen by the assemblies affiliated with us, each assembly being entitled to one lay delegate.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

1. Regular sessions of the General Council shall be held biennially, pursuant to a call by the Executive Presbytery.

2. Special sessions of the General Council may be arranged by the Executive Presbytery if agreed by a majority of the General Presbyters.

3. The right of initiative in the matter of calling of special sessions shall be granted to any ordained minister of The General Council of the Assemblies of God when occasion demands. A statement setting forth the reasons for a special session of the Council, signed by not less than fifteen ordained ministers, may be considered sufficient reason for the call of a special session, such statement to be filed with the Executive Presbytery, who may, if it shall be deemed advisable, respond to the summons and issue the call for a special session.

ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS

1. Executive Officers.

The officers shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary, together with such other officers as may be required in the future. Their term of office shall be for two years and shall begin three months after the date of election.

2. Executive Presbytery.

The Executive Presbytery shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, General Secretary, together with six other brethren to be chosen from the active fellowship, six of these brethren to be resident and three to be non-resident at headquarters. (Amendment 1933.)

3. General Presbytery.

The General Council shall elect representative men

of mature experience and ability, whose lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship as General Presbyters in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields.

Each District shall have the privilege of representation in the General Presbytery by three members, the District Superintendent, together with two others to be nominated for the office by the District at its Council Meeting held prior to the meeting of the General Council. (Amendment 1933.)

ARTICLE X. DISTRICT COUNCILS

Membership of the District Council shall consist of all ordained and licensed ministers of the district, and such delegates as may be elected by assemblies to represent them in the meetings of the District Council. Such delegates shall be elected according to an agreed upon basis of representation, arranged by the Council.

The District Council shall have supervision over all the activities of the Assemblies of God in its prescribed field, except such as are agreed upon by a District Council and the General Council officials.

The District Council shall have authority to examine and to license and ordain ministers who are to become members thereof, and shall report to the office of the General Council the names of all approved licentiates.

The District Council, being the creature of the General Council and subordinate thereto, cannot be authorized, in any way, to violate the principles of the General Council constitutional agreements or its by-laws.

The District Council shall elect its own officers, and arrange for its own meetings. It shall be amenable to the General Council in matters of doctrine, and the personal conduct of ministers who are permitted to have the district endorsement.

ARTICLE XI. LOCAL ASSEMBLIES

All true Pentecostal believers associating them-

selves in local bodies as assemblies, and accepting their full personal share of responsibility for the maintenance of scriptural order in the local body, shall have a standard for membership which may be determined either by the local assembly itself, or by agreement with the District Council.

Local assemblies shall be set in order and co-operate in the work of the District. They should support the district organization and may send delegates to the District Council.

We recognize that each local assembly has the right of self-government under Jesus Christ, its living Head, and shall have the power to choose, or call its pastor, elect its official board, and transact all other business pertaining to its life as a local unit. It shall have the right to administer discipline to its members according to the Scriptures and its By-laws. It shall have the right to acquire and hold title to property in its own right, either through trustees or in its corporate name as a self-governing unit.

The fact that a local assembly is affiliated in the association of the District or General Council shall in nowise destroy its rights as above stated or interfere with its sovereignty. The local assembly shall recognize that the District or General Council has the right to approve Scriptural doctrine and conduct and to disapprove unscriptural doctrine or conduct. When in need of counsel or advice, the local assembly may appeal to the District Council for help. It may appeal from a decision by the District Council to the General Council where it may be questioned whether or not there has been proper help from the District.

Local assemblies are expected to have an interest in the missionary enterprise, and to plan for regular contribution to its support.

ARTICLE XII

Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted in writing to every District for their consideration

prior to the General Council meeting. Amendments to the Constitution shall require a two-thirds majority vote of all members present for adoption.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY ORDER

In order to expedite the work of the Council and to avoid confusion in its deliberations, the Council shall be governed by accepted rules of parliamentary procedure, in keeping with the spirit of Christian love and fellowship.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1: OFFICERS.

The officers of the General Council except as hereinafter provided shall be elected at one of its regular meetings, according to the manner of election as provided. They shall be chosen from the membership of the General Council, and shall be men of mature experience and ability, whose life and ministry are above question, and such qualities alone shall determine their eligibility.

Section 2: NOMINATION AND ELECTION.

(1) All candidates for office of General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary shall be nominated by secret ballot. A two-thirds vote of all votes cast shall be necessary to constitute an election. If no election has been declared after the third ballot has been cast, the three candidates having the highest number of votes in the last ballot cast shall be nominees to be further voted upon, and all other names shall be eliminated.

(2) Nominations for General Presbyters shall be made at the District Council Meeting held prior to the convening of the General Council. Nominees for the General Presbytery shall be elected by a majority vote.

(3) The General Presbytery shall have the right

to elect resident officers at headquarters to serve on the Executive Presbytery as provided for in Article 9, Section 2 of the Constitution. The non-resident members of the Executive Presbytery shall be nominated from the floor and shall be elected by a two-thirds vote in the same manner as provided for the presiding officers of the General Council.

(4) The Treasurer and Missionary Secretary of the General Council, Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel, President and Principal of Central Bible Institute, and other departmental heads shall be chosen by the General Presbytery. They shall be subordinate to the Executive Presbytery and amenable thereto for the proper discharge of their duties. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 3: VOTING CONSTITUENCY

The voting constituency shall consist of all accredited members, present and registered. Voting privileges may also be extended to accredited licentiates who may be in attendance, at the discretion of the General Council.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To preside at the meetings of the Council.
2. To be the head of the General Office, and to supervise all the work of that office during the interim between sessions of the General Council. To act as President of the Corporation in all legal matters.
3. To preside at all meetings of the Credentials Committee, and to sign all credentials.
4. To preside at all sessions of the Executive Presbytery, and to receive all communications directed to that body.
5. To be general superintendent of all work on the field conducted in behalf of the fellowship, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.

6. To administer discipline in all cases when requested to do so by the Credentials Committee.

7. To perform any other functions usual and customary as presiding officer or such as may be directed by the General Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Section 2: DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To assist the General Superintendent.

2. To preside at meetings in the absence of the General Superintendent.

3. To assist the General Superintendent in the general superintendence of the work on the field conducted in behalf of the General Council and its work, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.

4. Finally, to perform any other functions under the supervision of the General Superintendent, or such as may be directed by this Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Section 3: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY

1. The General Secretary shall make and keep true records of the proceedings of the General Council and shall publish the same as approved and directed by the Executive Presbytery.

2. He shall be custodian of the official seal of the Council and shall issue Credentials under the direction of the Credentials Committee and shall keep a record of all ministers, licentiates and assemblies in the fellowship.

3. He shall act as Secretary of the Executive Presbytery and the General Presbytery, and shall keep accurate minutes of the deliberations of these bodies.

4. He shall be authorized to sign all official and legal documents and to perform such other functions

as are customary or as may be directed by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

5. He shall act as Secretary of the Credentials Committee and shall be considered as ex-officio member of all other committees.

Section 4. DUTIES OF THE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

1. To act as head of the Missionary Department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

2. To keep a record of all decisions of the Missionary Committee and of all official acts of the Missionary Department.

3. To conduct all correspondence with prospective Missionaries and with those already out on the field.

4. To conduct the Missionary columns in the Pentecostal Evangel from Missionary letters and reports.

5. To represent the General Council in all relationships with governments or authorities where our Missionary work is involved.

6. To direct the Missionary activities of the fellowship under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

7. To distribute all Missionary funds as directed by the donors or by the Missionary Committee.

8. To keep such records of all funds received and disbursed as will safeguard the funds from loss en route to the field.

9. To acknowledge in the Pentecostal Evangel all funds received for Missionary work.

10. To conduct all correspondence.

11. To act as purchasing agent for Missionary supplies under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

12. To perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.

Section 5: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

1. To be custodian of all General Council funds.

2. He shall keep an accurate record of all receipts

and disbursements, conducting the work of his office according to accepted business methods.

3. He shall give a report from time to time as may be requested by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

4. He shall give bond to the amount of \$10,000. The treasurer's books shall be audited by outside public audit once a year.

5. He shall perform such other functions as are customary to his office or as may be directed by the Council or the Executive Presbytery.

Section 6: DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTERY

The Executive Presbytery shall act as trustees of this fellowship and shall have general oversight of the activities and departments of the same during the interim between General Council sessions, unless the General Council shall make other provision. It shall be authorized to act for the fellowship in all matters that affect its interests while the General Council is not in session and shall make report to the General Council of its activities in behalf of the fellowship as may be directed. It shall provide for its own meetings and its decisions shall be final unless reversed by the General Council.

In all matters of great importance, the Executive Presbytery shall communicate with the members of the General Presbytery before any final action shall be taken.

Section 7: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTERY

(1) The General Presbytery shall be empowered to act in all matters pertaining to foreign missionary and ministerial relationships, and all matters which pertain to the proper functioning of the departments and institutions in the fellowship. It shall constitute an advisory body to the Executive Presbytery. All decisions pertaining to constitutional order or fundamental doctrines shall be referred by it to the General

Council for ratification in the manner provided in the General Council constitution.

(2) The General Presbytery shall also act as a Court of Appeal for the reviewing of testimony given in missionary and ministerial trials. Its decisions shall be final. (Amendment 1933.)

ARTICLE IV

Section 1: STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing committees shall be established or appointed as necessity may indicate. They shall be appointed by the General Superintendent in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery, and the term of office shall continue from the date of appointment to the adjournment of the next regular meeting of the General Council, unless otherwise instructed by the Council.

Section 2: CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Such members of the Executive Presbytery as may reside at headquarters shall constitute a Credentials Committee. They shall have authority to issue certificates of ordination to approved ministers, who have District Council endorsement, and to issue annual fellowship certificates.

Section 3: ROSTER COMMITTEE

A Roster Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Presbytery prior to each meeting of the General Council. This Committee shall be expected to open the Roster on the morning of the day preceding the convening of the General Council. It shall be entrusted with responsibility of examining all credentials and recognition of all delegates. Ordained ministers shall identify themselves by fellowship certificates of the current year; delegates from assemblies shall obtain letters from their church secretary or pastor certifying to their appointment by the assembly to represent it in the General Council. Suitable badges shall be issued by the Committee to all qualified delegates and ministers, such badges to in-

dicade the classification of ordained ministers, foreign missionaries, district licentiates, lay delegates from assemblies, visitors, etc.

The Roster shall be open for enrollment during the entire meeting of the General Council and the Roster Committee shall render such reports as may be called for by the action of the Council. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 4: SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Special committees may be created at the General Council in session, or by the Executive Presbytery between sessions as may be required to facilitate its work.

ARTICLE V. MINISTRY

Section 1: MINISTRY DESCRIBED

Elders who are persons of mature experience and qualifications, able to undertake the responsibilities of the full-gospel ministry.

Licentiates who are beginners; who give evidence of being called of God; and who devote themselves to a purpose to become elders (1 Tim. 3:10-13).

Women may be ordained in any degree except eldership and be licensed to preach as provided for men.

Section 2: QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications for recognition as an elder must be in accord with the New Testament scriptures, which provide the necessary guidance in the matter of such recognition (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:7-9).

Qualifications for licentiates shall be:

First: Clear evidences of a divine call; a practical experience in preaching; together with an evident purpose to devote their time to preaching the gospel.

Second: Conformity to such provisions as are made for them by the General Council in reading courses and other training.

Section 3: LICENSE TO PREACH

Licenses to preach shall be granted by the District Council to properly qualified applicants.

Section 4: ORDINATIONS

(a) Applicants for ordination who shall have met the necessary requirements shall appear before the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside. All ordinations shall take place under the auspices of the District Council. No minister shall be ordained to the office of an elder until he shall have held a license to preach and shall have been engaged in the active work of the ministry as a pastor or evangelist at least two full consecutive years.

ORDINATION OF WOMEN

(b) Inasmuch as the scriptures clearly teach that there is a difference in the prerogatives of the ministry of men and women in the church, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That ordination certificates of women shall clearly state that women are ordained only as evangelists.

2. That the words "bury the dead, administer the ordinances of the church, and perform the rite of marriage, when such acts are necessary," shall be omitted from Women's ordination and license certificates of the General and District Councils. (1931)

Section 5: CERTIFICATES

Ordination papers with the accompanying fellowship certificates shall be issued by the General Credentials Committee from the Executive office.

Section 6: MINISTERIAL RELATION

All ministers, both ordained and licensed, shall be amenable to both the District and General Councils in matters of doctrine and conduct.

All ministers, ordained and licensed, shall be expected to affiliate with the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside, and to work in

co-operation with the same. They shall be expected to co-operate with other District Councils in which they may labor temporarily.

Section 7: TRIALS AND APPEALS

(a) Both the Officiary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in the trial of ministers.

(b) A complete stenographic record of all trials of ministers shall be kept.

(c) It shall be the privilege of every minister who may have had a trial to appeal from the decision of such, provided such appeal shall be made within thirty days after the decision has been rendered.

(d) Whenever a minister of the General Council shall appeal from a decision of the district to the Executive Presbytery, or from the decision of the Executive Presbytery to the General Presbytery, it shall be the duty of the Executive Presbytery, or General Presbytery to review the case by full examination of the documentary evidence relative to the trial in order to determine whether or not a proper trial has been conducted and a fair decision rendered. Those who conducted the trial shall, in such a case, furnish a complete record of the trial, including all evidence produced. No new evidence shall be considered in such a review.

(e) In case the Executive Presbytery, or General Presbytery shall decide, after such a review, that the decision made has not been a fair one, it shall be the right of that Body to which appeal has been made to reverse the decision, or, if it is decided that the case has been handled improperly, it shall be the right of those listening to the appeal to remand the case for re-trial.

(f) Appeals from decisions made by the District Officials, shall not be heard by the General Presbytery until after the evidence has first been reviewed by the Executive Presbytery and their decision has been made. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 8: OFFICIAL LIST

An official list of all ordained ministers shall be compiled by the Credentials Committee of the General Council and published for the convenience of all concerned. The list shall show whether or not each minister is giving full time to his or her ministry. This official list shall be revised annually, and certificates of fellowship issued to all who are in full fellowship with us.

Section 9: EXPIRATION OF FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

Inasmuch as all fellowship certificates expire on the 31st day of August of each year, all who shall have failed to renew their fellowship certificates on or before October 1st, or who shall have failed to indicate their purpose to do so, shall be considered as delinquents whose names shall not appear on the ministerial list to be mailed to the clergy bureaus.

ARTICLE VI. FOREIGN MISSIONS POLICY

Section 1: MISSIONARY PURPOSE

1. The Assemblies of God shall assume responsibility, and do all within its power for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

2. The Pauline example shall be followed as far as possible by seeking out neglected regions where the Gospel has not been preached, as well as by establishing self-supporting, self-governing, self-propagating native churches.

3. In fields where Pentecostal missionaries are already stationed, consultation shall be had with the brethren on the field and the Missionary Department, and a satisfactory plan agreed upon before an attempt shall be made to establish new stations in such localities.

4. Every Assembly shall be encouraged to assume definite responsibility for full or partial support of one or more missionaries in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department.

Section 2: MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

1. The Missionary Department shall consist of the Missionary Secretary and four others, appointed by the Superintendent subject to the approval of the General Presbytery, who together shall comprise the Missionary Committee. All the activities of the Missionary Department shall be carried on under the supervision of the Executive Presbytery to which the Missionary Department shall be amenable.

2. All the Missionary interests of our fellowship shall be consigned to the management of the Missionary Department in co-operation with the District Council on the field.

Section 3: MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

1. The selection and appointment of missionaries shall be the prerogative of the Missionary Committee.

2. The Missionary Committee shall be governed in its selection and appointment of missionaries by the following requirements. Each applicant shall be examined—

- (a) As to personal experience of full New Testament salvation.
- (b) As to a definite call to foreign work.
- (c) As to physical, mental and spiritual fitness for work.
- (d) As to Christian standing and general qualifications, it being required that each applicant seeking appointment first secure the endorsement of his local Assembly and District Council.
- (e) Young men shall not be granted missionary appointment until they have first qualified for ordination in the homeland, and lady candidates shall prove their ministry and stability of character by a similar probationary period of service in the homeland. (Amendment 1933.)

3. Prospective missionaries shall be expected to exercise faith in God to provide their outfit and fare to the field as far as practicable.

4. Funds provided for prospective missionaries who shall for any reason be prevented from going to the field shall be remitted to their respective donors unless by the consent of said donors they can be made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes.

5. All persons making application for appointment as missionaries shall be expected to meet the requirements of the Missionary Department.

6. The Missionary Department shall confine its missionary activities within the limits of its resources and shall not accept and send out missionaries until the condition of its finances fully warrant such action.

7. Each missionary shall be expected to devote two full years to language study, if necessary, before taking up his full active work. Courses of study with examinations shall be arranged by an advisory committee on each field. Failure on the part of any missionary to obtain a working knowledge of the language during his first term shall furnish ample ground upon which to question his fitness for a second term.

Section 4: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARIES

1. The undesignated funds sent to the Foreign Missions Department shall be distributed to those who have received the appointment of the Missionary Committee and are in harmony with our Statement of Fundamentals. All funds assigned to particular persons shall be forwarded by the Foreign Missions Department exactly as directed.

2. It is recommended that all missionaries send a report of moneys received and submit a budget of expenses to the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent upon the Foreign Missions Department to send of its undesignated funds to missionaries who do not furnish such a report.

3. Missionaries expecting the endorsement and aid of the Foreign Missions Department shall report to the Missionary Committee and receive its approval before leaving this country. The Missionary Commit-

tee shall assume no responsibility whatever, where the foregoing requirements are not complied with. Funds designated for missionaries whose names do not appear on our list will be gladly forwarded by the Missionary Department.

4. It is recommended that Districts endorsing candidates for missionary appointment assume as far as is practicable responsibility for their support. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 5: ORDINATION OF MISSIONARIES

Resolved, That in the future the matter of the ordination of missionaries under appointment of the Missionary Department be determined on the basis of their qualifications for ordination rather than on the basis of their appointment. (1931.)

Section 6: FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

1. The Foreign Missions Department shall renew the Fellowship Certificates of all foreign missionaries in good standing on or before the first of the year without cost to the missionaries.

This requirement on the part of the Missionary Department shall be contingent upon the missionary's filling out in ample time the questionnaire provided by the Department and sending same to the home office.

2. Each missionary shall file with the Foreign Missions Department a full statement regarding his work, e. g., concerning his family and accommodations, period of service, language qualifications, nature of work engaged in, prospects of the field, present number of recognized adherents, etc.

Section 7: DISTRICT COUNCILS

1. District Councils shall be formed on the field where there are sufficient missionaries and trustworthy ordained native preachers, provided the approval of the Missionary Department shall first have been secured. Where numbers are not sufficient to warrant the formation of a District Council, the mis-

sionary shall be amenable directly to the Foreign Missions Department. (1931)

2. It shall be considered the duty of the various District Councils on the foreign field to co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in maintaining a high standard of Christian character and work in the interests of greater efficiency.

Section 8: PROPERTY

1. All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible.

No funds shall be made available for missionary homes, stations, schools, etc., until adequate and proper safeguards, such as complying with the laws of the respective countries for the legal holding of property and such as establishing and maintaining a proper relationship between these missionary projects and the Foreign Missions Department, shall have been provided.

2. Missionaries contemplating the purchase of property or erection of buildings should co-operate with the District Council on the field, and secure their endorsement before submitting their proposition to the Foreign Missions Department.

3. Whereas, In our Foreign Missions Policy it has been resolved that "All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible," and,

Whereas, At the present time the Foreign Missions Department for lack of information on file is unable to give accurate advice concerning many of the properties purchased on the foreign field through the offerings of our fellowship, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That a copy of the property deeds, titles, and other legal papers relating to all missionary properties which have been purchased shall be forwarded to the Foreign Missions Department for file.

Section 9: NATIVE WORKERS

1. It is recommended that great care be exercised in the selection of native workers, and that no worker be engaged who does not manifest a real consecration to the cause of Christ.

2. No offerings for the support of native workers shall be sent direct to the natives, but to the missionary representatives of the General Council. (Amendment 1929.)

Section 10: FURLOUGHES

1. Missionaries while home on furlough shall be considered as on vacation. It will be expected, however, that they shall co-operate with the home office in the interests of the work as far as possible.

2. The period and frequency of furloughs shall be governed by the recommendation of the District Council on the respective fields in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to grant a furlough allowance to missionaries who return to the homeland without first having an understanding with the District Council on the field.

3. When missionaries do not intend to return to the field or for any reason are not recommended for further service, it shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to continue their allowance for more than six months after their return to their homeland, except in cases of ill health or because of the infirmities of age.

4. All missionaries who have arranged to return to the home field shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department where there is no District Council on the field, in making arrangements for a supply to take charge of their work or station and shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in securing and forwarding funds for the maintenance of such work or station during their absence.

5. All missionaries who shall have completed a sat-

isfactory term of service shall be eligible for reappointment for another term.

Section 11: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT.

The Missionary Secretary shall from time to time prepare and send to each pastor information setting forth the financial needs of the Missions Department that the efficient administration of the department be not hindered through lack of funds. It is also requested that each pastor enlighten his assembly concerning the need of supporting the Missions Department, and an offering toward upkeep of this Department is recommended when sending missionary offerings. (Amendment 1933.)

ARTICLE VII. HOME MISSIONS

The fields everywhere are ripe for harvest, but the laborers are few. If we fail to speed up our program of home field evangelization the loss will be appalling. Our Lord's "Go ye" applies no less to the fields lying at our doors than to distant parts of the earth.

Whereas, We have the men and the means to accomplish at least twice as much as we are now doing, and the strengthening of the work at home is the only way we can enlarge our work abroad, and the urgency of the command of our Lord, and the crying need everywhere will not permit us to be indifferent or inactive; therefore be it

RESOLVED:

1. That the Executive Presbytery devise plans for opening up new work in neglected strategic points, so far as possible, and that they consider the advisability of appointing such field workers as in its wisdom may be deemed necessary.

2. That each District Superintendent use all the available resources for evangelizing his own district.

3. That so far as practicable each District Council raise funds and put one or more missionaries or evangelists to work in co-operation with the District Coun-

cil, and that the Council foster the new works started till such time as each may become able to support a pastor.

4. That each and every District Superintendent submit in writing to our General Secretary his policy for evangelization and field extension, or Home Missionary work being promoted in his district, and tell what activities have been recently put into execution in his district (for this purpose). These reports to be used for the purpose of comparing methods of labor and the discovery of the most practical ways of carrying on the work.

5. That every pastor recognize his responsibility for the evangelization of his own parish and the regions contiguous to his city or town; that he make a careful survey of the needs and the opportunities of his field; that he look in his own assembly for competent workers now idle who can be pushed out into needy fields; that he encourages the formation of Gospel Teams which can carry the gospel to outstations and destitute places: that Sunday schools and prayer meetings and street meetings be held, and all other scriptural means be used for establishing and enlarging the work.

6. That all our good evangelists may be kept busy in fields new and old, and that District Superintendents and pastors co-operate with them, so far as practicable; be it further

7. Resolved, That we work for a largely increased circulation of The Pentecostal Evangel and the liberal use of our own tracts and books, realizing their usefulness in the extension of the Lord's work.

8. Finally, we recommend that all our people devote much time to earnest prayer for the workers now in the field, and for the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth new laborers both at home and abroad.

ARTICLE VIII. MEXICAN MISSIONS

Section 1:

The General Council shall recognize and encour-

age the Mexican Missions work carried on along the American border line and in Mexico.

Section 2:

The Missionary Department, at the discretion of the Missionary Committee, shall appropriate a proportionate share of the undesignated funds for the Mexican work.

ARTICLE IX. INSTITUTIONS

Section 1:

(a) The General Council shall recognize the need of practical training of prospective ministers and missionaries. It shall be in hearty sympathy with every effort to provide such training where the standards of teaching and discipline maintained in the school are satisfactory.

(b) The General Council shall encourage the further development of the Central Bible Institute, together with such other schools as may meet the required standard as set by the Central Bible Institute and become affiliated with the General Council through the District Council in which located.

(c) The General Council shall have some representation upon the directorate of the schools. It shall have a voice in determining the standards of teaching and policy of management through the District Council in which such schools are located.

(d) The examinations, reports, certificates, and diplomas, given by affiliated schools shall be on an equality with the Central Bible Institute in the matter of credits and conditions.

(e) All graduates of such affiliated schools as shall have met these requirements shall be considered as on a par with the graduates of the Central Bible Institute.

Section 2: CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE MANAGEMENT

(a) The General Council shall control and manage

the Central Bible Institute through a directorate appointed by the Executive Presbytery.

(b) The directorate shall shape the policy, arrange its curriculum, provide the faculty, and have general supervision over the school.

Section 3: OTHER INSTITUTIONS

(a) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of homes for the aged, for children, and for retired ministers and missionaries.

(b) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of academic schools for the children of our constituency.

(c) The General Council shall encourage the opening and maintenance of Sunday Schools throughout the fellowship.

(d) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of missionary schools on the various mission fields where practicable for the training of native workers, and schools for the education of the young children of missionaries.

ARTICLE X

Section 1: PUBLICATIONS

The Pentecostal Evangel shall be the official organ of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and shall be published in the interest of our fellowship and for the further propagation of our distinctive testimony. The Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel shall be chosen by the Executive Presbytery, said choice subject to ratification by the General Presbytery. The Executive Presbytery shall have authority to publish Sunday-school literature, children's books and papers, etc., together with such other literature, including periodicals and books, as may be decided upon.

Section 2: PUBLISHING HOUSE

The Publishing House and its equipment shall be developed as its business shall expand and funds may be available therefor.

Section 3: MANAGEMENT

The management of the Publishing House, with its various publications and business interests, shall be vested in the Executive Presbytery, who shall provide such personnel as may be required to supervise and carry on its work.

ARTICLE XI. VIOLATIONS OF MINISTERIAL COURTESY

All discourteous conduct is disapproved and all ministers are advised against interfering with pastors in charge of assemblies, whether it be by going in upon their work without consent or by such correspondence with members of the assembly as will hurt the influence of the leader. All correspondence which concerns the whole assembly, shall be addressed to the one in charge and not to private members. Where there is no pastor, letters concerning the work shall be addressed to the officers of an assembly.

Any minister who so offends shall be subjected to Scriptural treatment as an offender by the District Council, or if there be none, by the Executive Presbytery of the General Council. Such discourtesy will seriously affect the granting of annual Fellowship Certificates and may be the basis of their recall.

ARTICLE XII. DISCIPLINE OF MEMBERS

Occasions sometimes arise which make it necessary to deal with ministers who are affiliated with us and whose ministry may have ceased to be effective, or who for some reason may seem to have reached a place where in the judgment of the brethren the tie of Council fellowship should be dissolved.

Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in this matter, it being understood that in case the officary of a District Council shall recommend that Council fellowship be withdrawn from a minister, or his name dropped from the roll of Council ministers, the action

shall be regarded as final, unless said minister shall avail himself of the right of appeal within thirty days, in which case the matter shall be referred for ratification to the Executive Presbytery of the General Council, a three-fourths vote of said Executive Presbytery being required to adopt the recommendation of the officary of the District Council. (Amendment 1931)

In case the Executive Presbytery shall find the accused guilty, the decision shall be regarded as final, unless the accused shall within thirty days file an appeal for trial by the General Presbytery at its next session.

ARTICLE XIII. ORDER OF BUSINESS

The regular order of business for the Council Meeting shall be :

1. Appointment of Roster Committee.
2. Report of Roster Committee.
3. Report of the General Superintendent.
4. Report of Secretary.
5. Report of Treasurer.
6. Committee Reports.
7. Unfinished business.
8. Election of Officers.
9. New Business.
10. Adjournment.

All business sessions of the Council shall commence with prayer.

ARTICLE XIV. FINANCE

The work of the General Council in its definite program of development of the spirit of co-operation and fellowship in home and foreign fields incurs considerable expense, including financial support of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and such other help as may be needed, in maintaining headquarters, purchasing stationery and postage, and defraying traveling expenses, etc.

Therefore, every minister in the fellowship shall recognize his obligation to contribute from his tithes or as an offering, or through his influence, the sum of one dollar per month. And further, looking towards the increased efficiency of the fellowship throughout the entire field, all who can contribute more, personally or through their assemblies, than the suggested amount, are hereby strongly urged to do so. If practicable, let each assembly take one offering each year for the upkeep of the General Council office and traveling expenses.

ARTICLE XV. MILITARY SERVICE

While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12:14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Ex. 20:13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5:39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5:44), etc., and

Whereas, These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life;

Whereas, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we can not conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed

purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith. (Reaffirmed 1927.)

ARTICLE XVI YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES

Whereas, The Scriptures are being fulfilled that "in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy . . . and on My servants and on My handmaidens I will pour out in those days of My Spirit, and they shall prophesy"; and

Whereas, Our young people who are being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit and inspired with love to God and zeal for His service comprise the source from which shall be derived our future ministers, evangelists and missionaries, and they should be encouraged in any activities which may tend to develop them in Christian experience and service, and

Whereas, There now exist in various sections of the United States organizations comprising local and District groups of young people who feel the urge of the Holy Spirit both to meet together in Christian fellowship and to actively engage in the promulgation of the full gospel message by all available means in co-operation with other bodies of like nature and purpose; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this General Council hereby approve of all efforts which are now in existence or which may hereafter be instituted in behalf of our young people, provided such efforts fully comply with the constitutional principles of co-operative fellowship and unity of the Assemblies of God, to wit:

Section 1:

All local young people's organizations shall be considered as a branch of the local church work, under the general supervision of the pastor, whose counsel, advice and direction shall be respected in all activities which affect the relationship of the organization to the church and its activities in service.

The local young people may elect their own officers, subject to the approval of the pastor and the Church Board, and may conduct their own services provided such services do not conflict with, nor detract from, the regular services of the church.

The pastor shall be considered as an honorary member of the organization and an ex-officio member of all its committees, and should be respected and honored as a shepherd and guide in all matters of service and fellowship.

The activities of the young people may include:

- (a) Bible Training Classes (the Correspondence Courses of the Central Bible Institute being recommended for this purpose).
- (b) Prayer Meetings in the church or elsewhere which have the approval of the pastor and which will tend to build up the work of the church as a whole.
- (c) Other activities, such as street work, jail services, hospital visitation, ministration to invalids, the sick and shut-ins, tract distribution, etc.

Section 2:

Groups of local organizations may be formed into State or District organizations, with the approval of the officary of the District Councils involved. The State or District organization shall be governed by the principles of co-operative fellowship and shall be considered as a branch or department of the District Council. The District Council officary shall be considered as the honorary membership of the District organization and shall be honored and respected in all matters affecting the activities of the organization. The District organization shall have the right to elect its own officers and to supervise its own activities within the boundaries of the territory involved. The superintendent of the District Council shall be an ex-officio member of all District committees. (1927)

Section 3: DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

Inasmuch as young people's state or district organizations have been authorized by the General Council resolutions; therefore: BE IT RESOLVED: That we continue such district organization with the following recommendations:

1. That the young people's President shall be an ordained minister.

2. That the manner of the election of the President by the young people's organization shall be subject to the approval by the District Council.

3. That a constitution and by-laws covering the activities of the district organization shall be submitted to and approved by the District Presbytery with a view of standardizing such constitutions with those of other districts.

4. The President of the district organization shall be subject to call by the District Presbytery for consultation in matters pertaining to young people.

5. Sectional meetings of the district organization shall be strictly spiritual in character and arranged through the cooperation of the pastors and young people's leaders in each section, taking care not to conflict with other local or district meetings.

6. That we disapprove of any attempt to effect a national organization of the young people at this Council.

7. That in the future the matter of organization of young people in a district in which such organization does not now exist shall receive the approval of the District Council before being effective. (1931)

ARTICLE XVII

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council. Amendments to be adopted shall require a majority of all votes cast.

ESSENTIAL RESOLUTIONS

DIVORCE AND REMARRIAGE

First. There are now among Christian people

those who became entangled in their marriage relations in their former lives of sin, and who do not see how these matters can be adjusted. We recommend that these cases be left in the hands of the Lord, and that they walk in the light as God lets it shine on their souls.

Second. Low standards on marriage and divorce are very hurtful to individuals, to the family, and to the cause of Christ, therefore we discourage divorce by all lawful means and teaching. We positively disapprove of Christians getting divorce for any cause except for fornication and adultery (Matt. 19:9); and recommend the remaining single of all divorced Christians, and that they pray God so to keep them in purity and peace. (See 1 Cor. 7).

Third. Since divorced and remarried persons in the ministry usually cause stumbling, reproach and division, whatever may have been the cause of divorce, we disapprove of District Councils ordaining or licensing to the gospel ministry those who have remarried and are now living in a state of matrimony while former companions are living (Ezek. 44:22). (Amendment 1931)

Fourth. As a means of making the above more effective, we disapprove of any General Council minister performing a marriage ceremony for any who have been divorced and whose former companion is still living. We also warn that any minister of our fellowship who performs such a ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, may be dismissed from the Council. (Amendment 1933.)

PAYING TITHES

We recognize the duty of tithing and we urge all our people to pay tithes to God.

According to the Scriptures tithes should be used for the support of the active ministry and for the propagation of the Gospel and work of the Lord in general and not given to charity or used for other

purposes. All ministers should be tithers, practicing what they preach. (Reaffirmed 1931.)

Regarding our basis of fellowship in reference to tithe paying, WHEREAS the basis of our fellowship is that of voluntary cooperation, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that making the paying of tithes into the District Treasury by the ministry a basis of fellowship be disapproved. (Amendment 1931)

TRANSFERRING FROM ONE DISTRICT TO ANOTHER

Resolved, That we recommend that our District Councils refrain from ordaining to the ministry any preacher who may have been licensed in another District until such licentiate shall have resided in the District in which he is seeking ordination at least one year and shall have met the requirements of the District granting him a license, and until endorsement be secured from the officary of the district in which the candidate was licensed. (1933.)

CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER

Resolved, That a certificate of transfer be issued to all workers who are leaving their home district to permanently locate in another district, and that the General Council office be instructed to prepare a suitable form. (1931) (This certificate can be secured from the Gospel Publishing House.)

REINSTATEMENT OF MINISTERS

Resolved, That we recommend that hereafter when a minister connected with our fellowship shall have been dropped from our rolls or shall have ceased to be connected with us by virtue of having become identified with another organization, or for any other cause, and shall apply to be reinstated, the Credentials Committee of the General Council may hold the matter of reinstatement of such a minister in abeyance until the next session of the General Council in order that the

General Presbytery may have the opportunity to review the case; and that the matter of reinstatement of such minister be left entirely with that body. (1931)

REGARDING MORAL STANDARD FOR MINISTERS

WHEREAS there is an outstanding demand that we define our position relative to a moral standard among our ministers who preach the Word of God, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that any minister proven guilty of the gross sin of immorality shall be removed permanently from the roll of our ministerial fellowship. (1931)

AFFILIATING WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Resolved, That when any of our ministers shall identify themselves with other organizations granting ministerial credentials and shall have received such credentials, we shall regard their affiliation with this body as having ceased, and that they be requested to return to headquarters the credentials issued by our Executive Office.

ATTITUDE TOWARD THOSE REMOVED FROM COUNCIL FELLOWSHIP

Whereas, In our Constitutional Declaration we have included this prerogative, "To disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrine, and conduct," and have provided adequate safeguards in the By-Laws by arranging for appeals from local and District decisions, thus guaranteeing fair and impartial consideration of all matters affecting standing and fellowship; therefore, in order to render effective decisions made in the interest of proper discipline among the ministry and for the protection of our assemblies, be it

Resolved, That decisions arrived at after investigation and consideration of all facts by those qualified to act in such cases according to our co-operative agreements shall be by all considered just and final; and be it further

Resolved, That all ordained and licensed preachers refrain from taking any attitude toward such offenders

that would tend to nullify or set at naught the solemn verdict of the brethren entrusted with this responsibility. (1927)

And be it further Resolved: In the event of a violation of this agreement the offender shall be subject to a reprimand, or such other discipline as shall be agreed upon by the officary of the District with which he is affiliated. In the event that the agreement shall be violated outside of his District the officary of the District in which the offense is committed may communicate with the Secretary at headquarters, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to notify the offending brother that a repetition of the offense will seriously affect his standing as a Council minister, and, if persisted in, may result in his suspension or severance from our fellowship. (1929)

REGARDING WORLDLINESS

Inasmuch as a spirit of worldliness has been creeping into many of our assemblies and our pastors in some places meet with much opposition as they hold up Bible standards and take a stand against popular sins, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we as a body unitedly declare ourselves against all forms of worldliness, but particularly against modern immodesty and extremity in dress, and that we all agree as pastors, evangelists, licentiates, exhorters, Sunday-school superintendents and teachers, to speak the same things and voice ourselves against all forms of popular sins.

REGARDING SECRET SOCIETIES

That all ministers affiliated with us refrain from identifying themselves with any of the secret orders which we recognize as essentially of the world, worldly, and we advise any who may have identified themselves with such orders to sever their connection therewith.

GOVERNMENT OF U. S. A. REQUIREMENTS

Resolved, That whereas the government of the U.

S. A. requires of headquarters a report periodically of the number of lay-members of our assemblies, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That each assembly of our General Council fellowship keep an up-to-date record of its membership and that a record of same be sent annually to the office of the General Council Secretary. (1931)

DISTRICT BOUNDARY LINES

Resolved, That in the event that Districts fail to reach an agreement relative to boundary lines, the Executive Presbytery of the General Council be authorized to set such lines, and that said Executive Presbytery be empowered to create new Districts when and where deemed advisable, it being understood that the brethren who may be occupying such territory as new Districts are to be formed in, be consulted and their wishes given due consideration.

GENERAL PRESBYTERY MEETINGS

Resolved, That it be the sense of this General Council that there should be an annual business meeting of the General Presbytery, subject to the discretion and call of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

ARRANGEMENT FOR GENERAL COUNCIL MEETINGS

Owing to the uncertainties which the future always holds, and in consideration of our Council fellowship as a whole, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the arranging of time and place for the meetings of our General Councils be left in the hands of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

EVANGEL MISSIONARY NUMBERS

Resolved, That we recommend that four issues of the Pentecostal Evangel each year be denominated Missionary Numbers, and that they be devoted as exclusively as may be found practicable, to the publication of missionary articles and the dissemination of missionary information.

REPORTS FOR THE EVANGEL

Whereas, Reports of meetings held and announcements of meetings to be held which are of small value as items of news and are of strictly local interest are sent to the Evangel for publication from time to time, and

Whereas, It is our desire to use all Evangel space to the best possible advantage for the glory of God, therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this General Council that the editor of the Evangel, together with the Executive Presbytery, shall be authorized to leave out of the Evangel such reports and announcements as seem to them to be of not sufficient interest to the majority of Evangel readers to be printed.

SAFEGUARDING THE ASSEMBLIES

It is known that many unreliable and unsafe teachers and preachers go about seeking entrance into assemblies without any recommendation, therefore all pastors, workers and leaders of assemblies should make proper investigation regarding such not known to them, and the platform be denied strangers until proper recommendations be forthcoming.

The advice and counsel of the District Presbytery should be sought in such cases, and in all matters of importance when at all possible. Pastors and presbyters should notify each other, reciprocally, as to such persons when any unreliability becomes manifest.

AGAINST SETTING A TIME FOR THE LORD'S RETURN

It is unwise to teach that the Lord will come at some specified time, thereby setting a date for His appearing; and also it is unwise to give out from the platform, or publish visions of numbers and dates fixing the time of the second coming of the Lord.

HERESIES DISAPPROVED

The General Council hereby disapproves of the

Seventh-day teaching, of the extreme so-called Eternal Security teaching, and of the Restitution of All Things doctrine, and those holding and agitating such teaching, thereby causing confusion and division among God's people, shall be dealt with according to Titus 3:10.

MEATS

The pressing of the question of eating, or not eating meats, is causing divisions in some of the assemblies,

Therefore, the General Council disapproves of such extreme positions on this question which cause these divisions, and we recognize the right of each individual conscience in this matter, according to Col. 2:14-17; Rom. 14:1-23.

REGARDING PRIVATE OWNERSHIP OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS

Resolved, That we disapprove of the private ownership by members of the General or District Councils of church buildings, schools, or other institutions that are supported by funds solicited for the work of God; and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That where such private ownership exists we strongly recommend that a properly constituted incorporated body be formed and that the title to the property be transferred to such body, or that the soliciting of such funds cease.

A disregard of this attitude and recommendation of the General Council may affect the relationship to the General Council of members involved in such private ownership. (1931)

MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

Resolved, That we recommend that in selection of candidates for missionary appointment emphasis be laid by the Missionary Committee more upon fitness of the applicant than upon funds pledged toward applicant's support and that this resolution modify Article 6, Section 3, clause 6, of the By-laws. (1933.)

MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES

Resolved, That the General Council Office issue a membership certificate of proper proportions and script for framing to all churches coming into the fellowship, cost of same to be provided by the church becoming affiliated to be forwarded through the District Superintendent to the General Council Office at the time of accepting the church into the fellowship, and be it further

Resolved, That churches already affiliated be encouraged to secure such certificate. (1933)

HONORARY MEMBERS OF GENERAL PRESBYTERY

Whereas, There may be a tendency to overlook the valuable counsel of some of those who for years have been highly esteemed among us as General Presbyters, who because of age or infirmity can no longer assume the full burden of such an office, therefore be it

Resolved, That such brethren may be made honorary members of the General Presbytery by the sustaining action of the General Council, provided the General Presbytery should so recommend, and be it further

Resolved, That addition of such honorary members shall not disturb the regular number by Presbyters granted any District. (1933)

BIBLE SCHOOLS

Whereas, There are now several Bible Training Schools in our fellowship, and believing that all students should have proper training and supervision, therefore be it

RESOLVED:

1. That we place ourselves upon record as expressing our conviction that it is unwise to unduly multiply Bible schools, as such multiplication tends to make difficult, through inadequate support, the maintenance of proper standards in the curriculum and equip-

ment of schools already established and operating among us.

2. It shall be understood that the endorsement of a Bible school by a District Council does not constitute it a General Council Institution. Any school in order to be regarded as a General Council school must have the endorsement of, and be controlled by, the General Council. Bible schools that have been endorsed and are controlled by Districts, but not by the General Council, shall be regarded as District Bible schools. Any Bible school not endorsed by a District Council shall have no recognition in notices inserted in the Pentecostal Evangel.

3. Attention is called to the fact that Central Bible Institute is our only General Council Bible school. We place ourselves upon record as reaffirming previous declarations made concerning this institution. We have confidence in the management and the faculty and agree to stand whole-heartedly back of this school and to do all we can to promote its interests and to give to it, through proper publicity, the place it deserves in our fellowship.

4. We record our conviction that in the matter of publicity given to Bible schools in the Pentecostal Evangel the fact that Central Bible Institute is our only General Council Bible school should be borne in mind. Publicity to District schools should be stressed in the Districts and afforded through District channels. We express our conviction that only such notices concerning District Bible schools as are likely to interest our constituency as a whole should be published in the Pentecostal Evangel. (1933)

Minutes of the General Council

Held at Philade'phia, Pennsylvania,

September 14 to 20, 1933

The Fifteenth Session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God convened at 10:00 a. m., September 14, 1933, in Highway Tabernacle, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

THURSDAY MORNING

At 9:00 a. m. the devotional meeting opened. The song service was led by Brother R. A. McClure of Fort Collins, Colorado. Prayer by Brother Williams. A word of welcome was given by Brother Flem Van Meter, pastor of Highway Tabernacle. Brother J. W. Welch brought the morning devotional message.

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with Brother E. S. Williams, General Superintendent, presiding. The printed reports were distributed to the members present, and the Superintendent's report was read by Brother Williams and the Missionary report by Brother Perkin. It was moved and carried that the reports be accepted and that the recommendations contained therein be referred to the Missions Committee and the Committee on Resolutions before being presented to the brethren for consideration. It was moved and carried that the brethren read the Treasurer's report contained in the printed report rather than to have it read before the Council.

REPORTS BY THE VARIOUS OFFICERS OF GENERAL COUNCIL ACTIVITIES DURING THE PERIOD BETWEEN AUGUST 1, 1931, AND AUGUST 1, 1933, COVERING ALL DEPARTMENTS OF THE WORK

Report of General Superintendent

The Superintendent's report will be the only verbal report made by the Executive Committee at Headquarters at this Council and will therefore be a general report.

The past two years have been years of blessing and progress throughout the fellowship. At the close of the fiscal year 1931, there were 1,851 ordained ministers enrolled. At the close of the fiscal year 1933, there were 2,086, a gain of 235 or 12.7%. In 1931 there were 2,032 assemblies, with a combined membership of 101,093, and in 1933 there were 2,562 assemblies with a combined membership of 136,705, a gain of 530 assemblies, or 26.08%, and a gain of 35,612 members, or 35.23%.

During the past ten years the following increase of ministers is shown. September 1, 1923, there were 1,085 ordained ministers; July 31, 1933, there were 2,086, a gain of 1,001, or 92.25%.

During the past eight years the following increase of members is shown. September 1, 1925, there were 909 assemblies with a membership of 50,386; July 31, 1933, there were 2,562 assemblies with a membership of 136,705, a gain in assemblies of 1,653, or 181.8%, and an increase of 86,319 members, or 171.3%.

Since last General Council 535 ordained ministers have been added to our ministerial list and 300 have been removed. Of this number 64 withdrew, 33 were dropped, 18 have gone to be with the Lord, and 185 failed to renew their fellowship certificates. It is probable that most of those who have failed to renew have done so through carelessness. Ministers often move, without giving us their change of address; others who receive the annual questionnaire neglect to return the same.

Co-operation among the brethren at Headquarters has continued most pleasant and the fellowship and counsel

of Brother J. W. Welch, whom the Presbyters returned to our assistance at last General Council, have been much appreciated. Besides his duties as President of Central Bible Institute and as Executive Presbyter, our brother has also done considerable field work at the invitation of different districts.

Central Bible Institute

Central Bible Institute continues to serve our youth, but needs fuller support than in the past if it is to fill the place in the fellowship for which it was intended. It would also be appreciated could the brethren of the different districts take upon their hearts the need of finding places for students who graduate from the school. Kansas has contributed most masterly in this respect and with very satisfactory results. Could well-planned co-operation be arranged it is our conviction that the message which God has given us could be established in many places which do not now have it.

The Principal of Central Bible Institute has been devoting his summers to itineraries in different districts either in Bible conventions or camp meetings and would be pleased to contact those who might wish his summer ministry, as would also other members of the Faculty.

We would here like to make a brief report directly from the President of the School:

"Since being invited by the General Presbyters at last General Council, which was held at San Francisco, to return to Springfield to participate in the affairs of Central Bible Institute, I have had the happy privilege of taking some part in furthering its interests and assisting in its management.

"I have always thought Central Bible Institute was approved of God and intended to provide a definite need in our Council fellowship. These two years of personal contact with the institution has confirmed this conviction, and I am convinced that God directed its founding and that it is an essential feature of the institutional work of the fellowship.

"Looking back over the history of the school one is convinced that its influence has been productive of much

good and that its graduated students have proved the wisdom of maintaining the Institute as a feature of the General Council work for God. And it still appears that the General Council should own and control a Bible training school of high standards where ministers and missionaries may be prepared for service in the Kingdom.

"Buildings and property are in excellent condition, and an experiment is now being made in gardening and canning of vegetables and fruit which, if it proves satisfactory, it is hoped will become a real saving. A well is also at present being drilled, and if sufficient flow of water is found, it is planned to install our own water supply, thus saving city water bills which now run to as high as \$70.00 per month. Overhead expenses are being studied carefully and allowances for members of the Faculty have been reduced. Sanitation is standard and the health of students is given careful consideration.

"God has provided us a good Faculty and the curriculum is replete in courses of study specially provided to meet the various needs of students. In view of these things it is safe to advise all who desire Bible training to look toward Central Bible Institute, and to this end we invite, not only the sympathy and respect of the fellowship, but their hearty, practical support."

Central Bible Institute Correspondence School Department

In this department, 550 students from thirty-six states and seven foreign countries are studying courses. Many of our young men and women, as well as older ones who are unable to attend Bible school are taking advantage of gaining a knowledge of God's Word through splendid Correspondence Courses. Owing to a growing demand from many of our young preachers and Sunday school teachers for Bible training courses which will enable them to become better equipped for Christian service, we are now publishing such courses in pamphlet form. Two courses are now completed, the "Personal Workers' Course" and "The Life and Teachings of Christ." Two other courses will soon be completed.

We are confident that much good is being accomplished through this department.

Pentecostal Evangel

The Pentecostal Evangel, as we believe all will agree, has never been higher in spiritual tone or more serviceable as a dispenser of religious knowledge, and it is desired that it may be always at its best. To this end we solicit the prayers and co-operation of our brethren, and invite carefully prepared articles which would minister grace unto the hearers. Since the depression the number of annual subscribers has fallen off, but this has been more than compensated by the number of *Evangel*s being ordered in bundle lots by different assemblies. *Evangel* boxes are provided free to those assemblies which take twelve or more copies each week for at least one year, and could each assembly take a bundle of the papers each week, its field of service could be much enlarged. Having no agents we are largely dependent on our pastors to keep interest in the *Evangel* stirred, and would appreciate their taking an active interest to this end. We are now printing 36,500 copies of the *Pentecostal Evangel* weekly.

Sunday Schools

Sunday School interest has become almost a revival in our assemblies since last General Council, resulting in larger enrollments and an addition of approximately six hundred new Sunday schools. Interest is also being shown in Teacher training classes and in Daily Vacation Bible Training. With this interest the Gospel Publishing House is endeavoring to keep pace. We are now printing 167,000 Sunday school quarterlies, and 38,500 lesson leaflets each quarter, an increase of approximately 17½% over our output of two years ago. Our Sunday school papers, *Gospel Gleaners*, *Our Pentecostal Boys and Girls*, and *Our Pentecostal Little Folks*, have a combined circulation of 90,000. We desire to recommend these three papers to all our Sunday schools, in view of the fact that every item in them presents the gospel and important Scriptural truths. Nothing is ever put in these papers

simply to amuse. We want only that which will edify and help our children and young people heavenward. Three TEACHERS' quarterlies are now being printed, in an earnest endeavor to meet the needs of those of different ages. Brother Myer Pearlman, instructor at Central Bible Institute, is writing the teachers' quarterly for adults and young people, and should our ministers study his lessons, they would find a wealth of Biblical knowledge such as would be hard to find in any other publication of similar size. We would greatly appreciate the loyal co-operation of all our assemblies in securing their Sunday school supplies from Springfield, where the staff of writers are all Pentecostal, in preference to securing their supplies from houses which are distinctly antagonistic to our Pentecostal testimony.

Missions

The Foreign Missions Department is one of the busiest offices at Headquarters, serving a present active missionary force of 259 and laboring to try to secure funds sufficient to meet their simplest needs. Since the depression a conservative missionary policy has been necessary, and while no missionaries have been recalled because of shortage of funds, a number of new applicants for missionary appointment have been restrained from going forth.

We believe an advance step in our missionary program was taken when the General Presbyters, at their meeting at Springfield in 1932, instructed that a Special Missionary Committee be appointed to investigate our missionary program and personnel and request that fuller information from the fields be given to the Missionary Department relative to character and efficiency of missionaries. This has brought heavy responsibility to those holding office in our foreign Districts, but it has already resulted in removal of some who were deemed ineligible for reappointment, and, if followed faithfully by our missionaries on the field, we believe it will do much toward preserving our work of Missions as it ought to be.

Further Report

We now wish to bring to you a further report in which are some things which we recommend for your careful consideration.

Divorce and Remarriage

We recommend that section four, under "Marriage and Divorce," page 34, be corrected to read as follows: "We disapprove of any General Council minister performing a marriage ceremony for any who have been divorced and whose former companion is still living. We also warn that any minister of our fellowship who performs such ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, may be dismissed from the Council."

Handling of Appeals

Heretofore we have had no clear policy as to handling of appeals of ministers or local assemblies, should such appeal be made from a decision of a District to the Executive Committee or to the General Presbytery. As it is quite impossible for either the Executive Committee or the General Presbytery, who may be distantly removed from the place of trial, to re-try the case, we recommend that a correct and written record of all trials be taken, and that, in cases of conviction in the districts, a complete record of such trial be filed with the Credentials Committee of the General Council, and that all appeals be considered on the basis of the evidence submitted in writing, the Executive or General Presbytery to review the same and decide whether the accused has had a fair trial.

Discipline of Members

Under Article XII, page 28, provision is made for removing persons from the ministerial list whose ministry may have become ineffective. To safeguard this provision against abuse, we recommend that, in all cases handled under this by-law, a satisfactory written reason be filed with the Credentials Committee before the name of such persons be dropped from among our ministers.

General Councils

At last General Council a resolution, to the effect that in the future General Councils should be held at Spring-

field, Mo., was tabled with the understanding that it should be recalled for consideration at this Council. It would be well to take into consideration the fact that at the present time there is no adequate building at Springfield for holding General Councils, and, should it be decided that in the future our general gatherings should be held at Springfield, we then recommend that a suitable building be erected on the school campus, and that in addition to using the same for General Councils, the tabernacle be also used for an annual General Council camp meeting and such other uses as the providence of God might direct. Could our General Councils then be held in the latter part of August, or early in September, meals and rooms might be provided in the school buildings for a goodly number at very reasonable cost. It would be necessary to have sufficient time after the Council for the Faculty to have buildings put into condition for the opening of school the latter part of September. The earlier dates would also please many parents who would like their children home for opening of school early in September.

Co-operative Fellowship

It would be well could we take time to interpret afresh the meaning of our Constitution and By-laws as we find different interpretations in different places. This is most pronounced as to the meaning of "Co-operative Fellowship" and "Sovereignty of Local Assemblies," which the Executive Committee is constantly asked to interpret. In order to avoid possibility of District officials and the Executive Committee giving different interpretations, we recommend that the General Council make a clear definition. This would greatly help in answering letters and in cases of appeal.

Missions

We here give a fuller report from the Foreign Missions Department in which will be found some recommendations.

The Foreign Missions Department continues to send all money sent in for Foreign Missions 100% to the field.

Some have wondered how this is possible. It must be remembered that the Foreign Missions Department has no expenses for office, light, or heat, these being supplied by the Publishing House. And the allowances for Secretary and stenographers is met through offerings sent from assemblies for Office Expenses. These offerings have, however, fallen off considerably and at present are far short of meeting the need. It is recommended that each assembly seek to send some offering toward this expense when sending offerings for Missions. It is our hope that, throughout the fellowship, all money given for missions shall continue to be used 100% for that purpose.

In addition to providing offices for the Missionary Department, the Publishing House has given for Missions during the past two years as follows:

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That we might report our missionary activities as clearly as possible, we are dividing it as follows: (a) A brief statement of our present missionary personnel as compared with seven years ago. (b) Present policy as to appointment and support of missionaries. (c) Methods of financing missions as related to the home constituency. (d) Occupation and supervision of missionary fields. (e) Some suggestions for improving our missionary work.

It was reported at the 1925 General Council that there were 235 missionaries on our list. At present but 113 of that group remain as active missionaries of the Assem-

blies of God. Explanation of this is as follows: Before the General Council passed the resolution that missionaries and ministers should not hold papers with two organizations (see "Affiliating with Other Organizations," page 41, *Constitution and By-laws*) the Canadian missionaries in good standing were on our list. These were then removed, although we continue to have happy fellowship with them in the Lord, thus reducing our number to 211. The 1925 number has been reduced another 18 through death, 48 are now in home service, and 32 have resigned, or been removed for cause. Loss of this number from our list has given us an annual decrease in old missionaries of about 7%, which has necessitated sending forth new missionaries equal to 7% of those on the fields to maintain our forces to the 1925 level. Our present missionary force numbers 259 active members, an annual average increase of $3\frac{1}{4}\%$ above the number necessary to sustain the 1925 level.

On September 1, 1923, there were 1,085 ordained ministers on the General Council Ministerial List, and on July 31, 1933, there were 2,086, a gain of 1,001, or 92.25%. On September 1, 1925, our records showed 909 assemblies with a membership of 50,386, and on July 31, 1933, they showed 2,562 assemblies with a membership of 136,705, a gain of 1,653 assemblies or 181.8% and an increase in membership of 86,319 or 171.3%. This phenomenal growth is likely in part the result of assemblies already co-operative becoming affiliated. This indicates that missionary activities have not kept pace with our growth in the homeland. There must, however, be taken into consideration that in 1925, in addition to the Canadian missionaries on our list, there were also many who could not properly be considered as active missionaries. Our records also showed many more missionaries than there were funds for their maintenance. Since then a conservative missionary policy has been followed that serious consequences might be avoided. We are happy to report that between the years of 1925 and 1931 giving for Missions by our fellowship increased 35.75%. Unless income for Missions had been steadily built up, and

missionary personnel restricted, we would have been unable to carry on through the days of the depression and it would have become necessary to recall a number of missionaries from the field. While the casual reader might think missionary progress has not kept pace with our growth at home, the careful reader will be convinced that our present missionary force represents an active list and an efficiency that was not true in 1925.

Advances Made

Although our missionary personnel is not greatly increased in numbers over 1925, the work on the field has been remarkably extended. Many new stations have been opened on all our old fields and numbers of outstations. The following new fields have also been entered from which we receive most encouraging reports: Gold Coast, W. Africa; Manchuria; Singapore; Straits Settlements; Malay States; Bulgaria; Greece; Spain; Canary Islands; Fiji Islands; and El Salvador, Central America. The work from El Salvador is being extended to the neighboring countries of Guatemala and Honduras, where we are expecting to see Council assemblies formed and affiliated. Good reports are being received from the Gold Coast and from Manchuria. Though development in these countries is yet in its infancy, a number of stations have been established and souls are rejoicing in full gospel blessing which includes the Baptism with the Holy Ghost.

A noble work has also been done in Russia through the ministry of our missionary, Brother John E. Voronaeff and his co-workers. Although it is now impossible for us to send missionaries to that land there are estimated to be about 80,000 Pentecostal believers and in the neighborhood of 500 groups of worshipers who worship in Spirit and in truth.

Missionary Giving

The last two years have seen some falling off in offerings for Foreign Missions which, when at their highest, were not fully adequate to meet the needs on the field. There need not be any falling off if each member of the fellowship would do only a little. Five cents per

week from each member would restore our missionary giving to its highest level of the past and six cents per week from each member would enable us to put on advanced missionary effort. Our trouble has been that 30% of our people have been doing almost our entire giving for Missions, the other 70% giving almost nothing.

Missionary Conventions

During last winter and spring some Bible and Missionary Conventions were conducted by representative brethren from Headquarters in a few of the districts, which were reported to have resulted in much blessing locally and we hope also to the advancement of the cause of Missions. As they are able, the Executive Committee would like to arrange similar brief conventions throughout the fellowship and solicit co-operation of district officials and local assemblies. Those at Headquarters know they could not supply the personnel for such conventions throughout all the districts, but believe that, if systematic conventions for the purpose of edifying the local assemblies and creating missionary interest could be arranged by the District officials, at least annually, throughout each district, great good could be accomplished. The Executive Committee stands ready to assist such efforts to the full extent of its ability.

Present Arrangement for Appointment and Support of Missionaries

Missionary appointment at present is granted a candidate as soon as same is approved by the Missions Department. Such approval is based upon (1) References furnished by applicant. (2) Recommendation of the officials of the district, which recommendation ought to be based upon actual knowledge of applicant's character and ministry. (3) Ability of applicant to provide his support without interfering with money already coming to the Missionary Department for support of Missions.

Recommendation For Future Policy of Appointment and Support of Missionaries

We recommend that in the future the District endorsing applicant for missionary appointment take re-

sponsibility as far as is practicable for raising funds for the missionary's support. This might be arranged at District Council or Sectional Fellowship Meetings where a number of ministers are present. Different assemblies might thus be encouraged to take part of a missionary's support, where one assembly was not able to do so. It has been proved that an assembly with definite missionary obligation is more consistent in its giving than one which, without responsibility, gives whatever sum may chance to be given on Missionary Day.

We further recommend that we take a new step of faith in God, giving greater consideration to quality of candidates than to funds for support. We would recommend that no young man be given missionary appointment who has not first sufficiently proved his ministry in the homeland as to be regarded qualified for ordination, and that a similar probationary service in the homeland prove the ministry and stability of character of young ladies who apply for missionary appointment. We believe that, if only God-sent missionaries go forth, God will supply the financial needs. While we do not wish to unwisely send forth recruits to the field, we do not wish through our unbelief to fail God by closing the door before those whom He might wish to go.

How best to carry on our missionary program in the fear of God has become a burden on our hearts. Years ago the China Inland Mission needed 100 new missionaries to fill strategic places and began to pray that the need might be met. At the end of twelve months they found that God had provided funds for the number they had asked for. There were many more applicants, but the number selected without pre-arranged plan, was 100. Again, in the midst of the present depression, they were bold enough to ask God for 200 new missionaries and again prayer was answered. We understand that in this latter step of faith there were 600 who applied, but only 200 accepted. Does not this divine provision of funds, and sending forth, reveal that prayerful care must be taken in selection of missionary candidates and show that

not all who apply qualify? Our own experience also has proved that not all who apply prove their worth on the field. Responsibility of sending our young people to distant and foreign lands is far more serious than most of our people realize. Finances must not be made the chief consideration, but ought to be of secondary importance, for, if our people are willing to pray, trust the Lord, and give, and a divinely called missionary is willing to trust and go, God will provide.

Missionary Policy at Home

Policies for raising missionary funds are now varied. Some assemblies, having taken responsibility for part, or full, support of missionaries, seek to raise this amount by special appeal at the time of the monthly missionary offering. Other assemblies have adopted the pledge system and seek to raise their missionary budget through annual pledge-offerings. Then there are those which have adopted the World Missions, or Busy Bee, plan, whereby a certain sum is given by each member each week, the proceeds being brought to the assembly on Missionary Day to be forwarded to the Missions Department at Springfield. For those who follow this last plan the money is then divided by the Missionary Department as follows: 75% to Foreign Missions; 20% to Home Missions in the District from which it was sent; 5% for deputational work, to be used by the Missions Department for maintenance of missionaries or workers doing deputational work in the interest of missions.

There are assemblies with no definite missionary plan. Some of these receive monthly missionary offerings which are sent to Headquarters, but assume no responsibility for any definite amount; others, we regret to say, take no missionary offerings at all. Then there are assemblies which, instead of sending their offerings to the Missionary Department, hold the same, giving it to such transient missionaries as might come along, without thought as to whether the missionary is endorsed by the Foreign Missions Department or not. Were all such missionary speakers worthy of endorsement, this would not be so

bad; but we regret that this is not always true, there being those whom the Missionary Department, from knowledge of previous records, could not endorse. We believe it would please the Lord could all our missionary giving go toward support of our endorsed and qualified workers.

We do not believe that missionary giving should be pressed to the neglect of the pastor or other local responsibilities, but we do believe that each assembly ought to have some definite missionary policy in which the people would be encouraged to give systematically. Where the World Missions plan is adopted the established policy of only 20% for Home Missions ought to be followed, and this percentage ought to be used only for developing new work in the district and not for other purposes.

Supervision of Missionaries

In the past, missionary activity on the mission field has been left much to personal choice of the applicant for missionary appointment. It is still believed that as far as possible consideration should be given to an applicant's personal convictions, but it is also believed that senior missionaries laboring on a field know that field much better than a new applicant, and the policy of the General Council to seek to labor in unoccupied territories ought to be conformed to. With hundreds of millions as yet unreached by the gospel, congregating of missionary forces in comparatively few local centers ought to be discouraged. We therefore recommend close co-operation of new missionaries with those over them in District responsibility on the field in which they plan to labor.

We further recommend Bible training schools on the different fields, to be planned for and arranged by the different Districts and the Foreign Missions Department, for training of native workers, since the only hope of evangelizing any country is through its native people.

Supervision

Through the closer co-operation of the Councils on the foreign fields with the Foreign Missions Department information is now accessible at Headquarters relative

to efficiency of our missionaries which we did not formerly have, and we believe that in faithfulness to God and to those who compose our fellowship, those ought not to be retained on our missionary list who, during their first term of service have shown themselves unqualified for further missionary appointment.

It is also believed that regular visitations to the field for purpose of spiritual encouragement of our missionaries and native converts and to secure first-hand information to disseminate among our constituency at home to be of vital importance. Some missionary bodies send their best workers abroad for these purposes, the missionaries needing the fresh quickening which results from such visits, just as our home assemblies require for their refreshing for further service. The times in which we live are solemn and demand that we launch out in fresh faith and aggressiveness that, in obedience to our high calling in the Holy Spirit, this gospel of the kingdom may be preached in all the world for a witness before the end come.

The Gospel Publishing House

We are pleased to report that the Lord has graciously blessed the Publishing House during the past two years. All departments have been very busy and have shown some very marked gains. Until now it has been necessary to put a substantial part of the profits from the business of the Gospel Publishing House into investments to safeguard our annuitants. During erection of Central Bible Institute \$22,000 of annuity money was put into the building. On this the Publishing House had been required to keep up the interest and to pay back the principal to our Annuity Department. All investments also have shrunk since the depression, as far as market quotations are concerned, and it is possible that a few investments are not of highest grade. We believe, however, that our annuitants are now fully and safely covered and therefore recommend for the future the following policy relative to net earnings from the Publishing House. First: To follow a policy of sound business, as recommended by the

auditors, there ought to be laid aside for depreciation the following percentages from profits of the business: Depreciation on buildings and sprinkler system 4% on value of property; Depreciation on furniture, machinery and equipment 10% on value of investment; Depreciation on type metal 25% on value of type, and type metal. This is important as some of our equipment has been in use for about ten years with nothing having been laid aside for repairs or replacements.

Second: It is recommended that any deficits in operating expenses at Central Bible Institute be cared for. This may require \$2,000 annually.

Third: Should such meet approval of the General Council, we recommend that twenty to twenty-five promising young men be given Bible training on the following conditions: (a) Central Bible Institute to provide one-half their expenses, the students to give in exchange part-time work, the District endorsing the student to provide the other half of his support. Students would be received according to time when their applications were received by the school, seeking to give each District opportunity to cooperate. It might be possible to give such students only one year of training under this agreement in order that others also might have similar privilege, but if only one year of training were received this would be of great value. (b) Students to be received under this plan would be subject to the decision of the School Directorate as to their remaining in the school and might be dismissed at any time should the Directorate decide they were not of proper quality to succeed, or to properly represent the fellowship. This recommendation is made for your consideration, because we know there are choice young men whose ministry would greatly strengthen the work, either as ministers or missionaries, who cannot afford to pay their way through school.

Fourth: Should the blessing of the Lord provide earnings beyond that which would be needed to keep the plant in proper condition and to provide needs which we have mentioned, we recommend that such surplus earnings

be divided as follows: 15% to assist indigent ministers and missionaries and 85% for missions, administration of these accounts to be left to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Note

It is estimated that change of working hours in compliance with the National Recovery Agreement will increase the pay-roll of the Gospel Publishing House \$5,000 or more annually, and we do not know what the increase may be for paper and other supplies.

ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN FOREIGN LANDS

The purpose of the General Council of the Assemblies of God is to do all within its power to fulfill the Lord's last commission in preaching the gospel to every creature. As far as possible we seek to follow the example of the apostle Paul in seeking out neglected regions where the gospel has not been preached and encourage the native church to take responsibility for the ministry, and also for the maintenance of the church and its native ministers and to further the gospel among their own people as far as they are able.

At present missionaries and ministers of the General Council are working in the following fields: Belgian Congo, Egypt, Gold Coast, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Sierra Leone, the Transvaal, China, including work along the Tibetan Border, Mongolia, Manchuria, India, Ceylon, Peru, Venezuela, Argentina, Japan, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Porto Rico, San Domingo, Cuba, Palestine, Transjordan, Syria, Greece, Poland, Bulgaria, Hawaii, Fiji and Samoan Islands, Canary Islands, Straits Settlements.

This makes a total of 32 different fields in which there are over 800 stations and outstations supervised by 274 missionaries.

AFRICA

The great continent of Africa covers one fourth of the earth's surface and is four times as large as the United

States of America. There are approximately 800 different languages spoken, of which 500 have been reduced to writing. There are only two States in the whole of Africa which are governed entirely by black people namely Abyssinia and Liberia. Africa has three outstanding religions—Paganism, Mohammedanism and Christianity, about 100,000,000 belonging to the first, 40,000,000 to the second, and 10,000,000 Protestant and Catholic Christians.

The Assemblies of God have 68 missionaries under appointment for the African field. They are distributed throughout the land as follows:

Belgian Congo

Population, 8,510,037

11 Missionaries, 2 Stations, 7 Outstations

The territory assigned to our organization to evangelize includes approximately 50,000 people, who live in scattered villages which fortunately are becoming easier of access through the development of good roads which permit travel by automobile. However, many villages are still hidden away in the jungle and can be reached only by the use of native carriers. A definite effort is being made to train the native Christians through systematic Bible study to evangelize their own people. Many chiefs are calling for the gospel. The stations occupied are Gombari and Botongwe.

There are about 653 missionaries of all denominations in the Congo, and 3,070 places where there are established churches or places where regular church services are held.

Egypt

Population, 12,750,918

7 Missionaries, 4 Stations, 19 Outstations

In the course of the past two years many problems have confronted us in our work in this country, but God has been helping our missionaries and encouraging them by some remarkable demonstrations of His power and blessing. Some wonderful revivals have broken out in different places, in most cases where the native Egyptian

ministers have been in charge. This in itself is most encouraging, as it reveals how the church in Egypt is becoming established. These revivals have been accompanied in practically every case by numbers receiving the Baptism of the Spirit after the Pentecostal pattern. The most recent outbreak is the revival at the orphanage in Assiout, Egypt. In this blessed institution there are around 650 widows and orphans who are being clothed and fed and instructed in the gospel.

Our Assemblies of God mission stations are located at Cairo (two stations), Assiout, and Minia. The 19 other assemblies are under the supervision of capable Egyptian ministers.

The religion of Egypt is almost entirely Mohammedan, the followers of Mohammed being about 91.2 per cent of the population. There are about 33 places in Egypt where missionaries are resident and 300 other places where work is being carried on. It is stated by reliable authorities that Egypt is more open today than at any time since the Moslem conquest, but that the hope of the country lies in the native church being alive and aflame in witnessing for God. Only the power of the Spirit in their lives can accomplish this.

In addition to the orphanage at Assiout, there is a good school conducted in Cairo, and a paper published monthly known as the *Morning Star*. This paper is printed in Arabic and has a circulation not only in Egypt but also among other Arabic-speaking lands.

Gold Coast

Population, 2,266,308

6 Missionaries, 2 Stations

Our Assemblies of God work in Gold Coast is confined to the area known as the Northern Territories having a population of 527,914. The work was commenced the latter part of November, 1931, and since that date has shown most encouraging progress, although we are sad to have to lose one missionary through death so early in the work. However, he lived long enough to see some fruit from his labors. The ministry of our missionaries

touches a number of different tribes, since in the first baptismal service there were representatives of Mossi, Issala, Dagomba, Dagomba-Hausa, and Chakosi tribes. However the tribes we are concentrating our efforts to reach are the Dagomba and Mamprusi peoples. In our district there are also an interesting people known as the Konkombas, who are the aborigines. The difference between them and the Dagombas is most striking. The Dagombas have a mixture of Mohammedanism with their fetishism. They call the Konkombas "heathen," and oppress them very much. The Dagombas are quite well clothed while the Konkombas have only a loin cloth. Thus far the Konkombas have been almost entirely untouched by the gospel; so it is the desire of our missionaries to give them an opportunity to hear the blessed message. There are approximately 32,000 of them right in the vicinity of our Yendi station. Our other station is at Tamale. In each place good substantial buildings have been erected and a number of converts have been made. All the time itineraries are being made for the surrounding towns and villages, so that the people may have an opportunity to know about God's message of love.

The need of this field at the present time is for some married couples and capable teachers.

Ivory Coast (Mossi land)

13 Missionaries, 5 Stations, 5 Outstations

The population of this country is uncertain, owing to a changing of the territory included under the Ivory Coast administration, but we gather it is something over five million.

The work on this field is among the Mossi tribe, of whom there are estimated to be about two million.

Since last report we are able to announce the opening of two new stations at Tenkodougou and Ouahigouya, these together with our other stations Ouagadougou, Kaya, and Yako make up the main stations for the present. Plans are well advanced for the development of a Bible school for the training of native evangelists and pastors. This is most necessary inasmuch as the native

workers can reach their own people so much more effectively than the foreign missionary. A splendid feature of the work is the manner in which the native church has been taught to take care of their own native preachers. They do not have much in the way of money, but are able to provide foodstuffs, etc. A number of blessed revivals have taken place in Mossi land during the past two years, during which God has done a deep work in the hearts of the native Christians, and a number have received the Pentecostal Baptism, speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance. These revivals were accompanied by confessions and restitution where wrong had been done, and also great joy in the Holy Ghost.

With the support of the homeland in prayer and funds this field has great possibilities before it.

Liberia

Population, 1,750,000

19 Missionaries, 10 Stations, 17 Outstations

It is estimated that out of the million inhabitants of the interior only about 100,000 have as yet been reached with the gospel. We have been much encouraged by a new desire on the part of the native Christians to take over responsibility for the maintenance of their local churches. The buildings for worship are most frequently built by the natives, and they send carriers to bring the missionary in order to help get the work started. Formerly the missionary had to take almost entire responsibility for funds and help in the erection of the church buildings. Our missionaries have pressed into the interior and many inspiring reports come to us of God's power manifested in salvation, healing, and in baptizing people in the Holy Spirit. Sometimes the native Christians have had to suffer severe persecution because of their stand for God, but the Lord has given grace, so that whereas some have fallen yet more are standing true. The great need for this field is more men workers and help in the Bible school and other school work.

In order to understand the extent to which this country has been evangelized we would state it is estimated

that the total work of the Protestant denominations includes 140 organized churches and 111 other places where regular services are being held. This means that each center is responsible for a congregation of about 6,972 who are often scattered over a widely spread area.

Sierra Leone

Population, 1,541,311

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 2 Outstations

The work the Assemblies of God have been conducting in this country has been largely confined to the city of Freetown among the Kru people. However, those reached are tribesmen who have often come from the interior and frequently return to their people, thus spreading the gospel message. Many of the native Christians who have been saved in this work are employed as sailors on the boats, so are frequently away. Nevertheless, there is nearly always a good congregation of about 200 people. They fill up the neat little chapel which they feel great pride in, inasmuch as it was built, we understand, by their own labor, although funds were provided from America for materials, etc. The Christians carry on the outstation work, and altogether we feel that a very worthy work is being accomplished in this place and a true witness going forth to a needy people.

CHINA AND CENTRAL ASIA

Population, 455,610,584

62 Missionaries, 26 Stations, 120 Outstations

The territory included in our estimated population covers the nineteen provinces of China together with Mongolia, Sinkiang, and Tibet.

Some very remarkable revivals have broken out in China during the past few years, some in our Assemblies of God work and others in other denominations. One singular feature of nearly all these movements of the Spirit has been the accompaniment of the miraculous element. Sick have been healed, demons cast out, and many have spoken in other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance. It is stated on good authority that China is

today one of the most if not the most encouraging mission field in the world as far as opportunities and definite results are concerned. China is the biggest country on the map, if we consider the countries included in our brief survey. It is larger than the whole of Europe, and contains one fourth of the population of the world. One estimate has placed the population at 474 million, but this includes Chinese Turkestan. China has the oldest race and culture the world can show. In religion the Chinese are Taoists and Buddhists, but since the time of Dr. Sun Yat Sen a fervent nationalism has almost become the religion of large numbers. There are 6,346 missionaries registered in China. We wish that we could state that they are all preaching the pure gospel of Jesus Christ. Unfortunately many are the apostles of Modernism which ignores the authority of God's Word.

Our Assemblies of God missionaries are located in the provinces of Chekiang, Chihli, Kansu, Shansi, Shantung, Yunnan, Manchuria, Mongolia, Tibet.

A steady growth has been manifest in most sections, but the newer work is always more conspicuous because of breaking into virgin soil. The missionaries in Manchuria continue to press ahead and are carrying on regular tent meetings in order to reach the masses. Manchuria is to China what the United States was to the old world a century or more ago. Those with a pioneer spirit have left the desolated and impoverished lands of their fathers to seek life anew in the fertile plains of Manchuria. Of course this field has also suffered the effects of war, but it would seem on the whole that the people are better off there than in many other parts of China.

In one station in the north the native Christians have felt their responsibility for the unevangelized in neighboring provinces, so have sent some of their number as missionaries to Mongolia. In Yunnan Province very blessed results have been reaped in the ministry among the Lisu and tribes people. One of our missionaries reported 450 families as having thrown away their idols in their desire to follow the Lord. Whole villages have turned en masse to Christ; that is to say, they have outwardly

accepted Him, and we are sure in many hearts a real work of grace has been accomplished. Many cases of outstanding conversion are recorded, where the converts had formerly been in deep sin, drug addicts, etc.

In Kansu Province, in spite of severe persecution and the martyrdom of several missionaries, the Lord continues to add to the church. There are about 40 Assemblies in this province witnessing to a real Pentecostal experience. Most of these are under native leadership, and a large number are self-supporting, although they are desperately poor in this world's goods.

The work in Tibet should take a step forward now, as a few additional recruits have been added to our force, who are seeking to send the gospel to these needy people. The whole of Tibet is not yet open to the gospel, but Tibetans can be reached at the stations where our missionaries are located and in their itineraries through the land. The Tibetans are hard to reach, inasmuch as many of them are of a roving disposition, going from place to place with their flocks and herds wherever there may be pasture. This makes it difficult to get to them long enough to give them a clear understanding of the gospel message. God, however, is able to make His blessed Word bring forth fruit. There are some notable instances of fine character who have been saved through the ministry of the gospel.

In South China there have been both encouraging and discouraging features. The spirit of nationalism has been quite manifest in the work and has influenced some of the Chinese leaders so that they feel the missionary should turn everything over to them without restriction. We are seeking to lead the native churches so that they may assume responsibility, but we believe that as long as we are responsible for the supply of buildings and support some measure of control should still rest in the hands of the missionary.

Our missionaries frequently have to be diplomats in the highest sense as well as preachers of the gospel. They are establishing a branch of God's kingdom, and are opposed by a wicked foe and his legions of wicked spirits,

but Jesus is Victor. A great door and effectual is open for us in China but there are many adversaries. Our stations are located as follows: Amichow, Chi Tien, Chuchowfu, Canton, Fat Shan, Gashatay, Hongkong, Hoi Kin, Kenedy Town, Labrang, Mukden, Minchow, Newchwang, Ningpo, Peiping, Pu Chi, Shek Kok, Sainam, Salwin Valley, Shi Ku, Tai Yuan, Tientsin, Ta Ch'ang, Tangar, Waitsay, and Wei Hsi. If the locations of all places where there is regular ministry were properly distributed, and every preacher was presenting a clear message of salvation, there would be about 30,000 people to every center; but unfortunately the places are not fairly distributed, and every preacher is not giving a clear statement of Bible salvation; so the need of this land should appeal to us for our utmost help.

INDIA

Population, 330,184,877

78 Missionaries, 27 Stations, 106 Outstations

Approximately one fifth of the human race are gathered in the land of India, the majority of whom endure a distressingly sad and sorrowful existence. The Hindu religion is responsible for widespread moral corruption. Poverty is so far-reaching that it is estimated that at least sixty millions of India's people are never free from the gnawing pangs of hunger.

India calls for more of our funds and forces than any other land, and yields in visible results the least encouraging returns, yet the call of the Master is to preach the gospel to every creature; so whether they hear or reject, we must still go to them with the message. We would not want however, to leave the impression that God is not working in India. We are more than happy to say that from a number of our stations reports come to us of souls seeking God, and several real Pentecostal revivals have broken out quite recently. The work on the whole is, nevertheless, slower than in some other fields. This is in part due to the awful caste system which holds the people in bondage and fear. If one confesses Christ he is at once an outcaste and experiences difficulty in sup-

porting himself. He is frequently turned out from his home and rejected by his relatives. Our work is confined chiefly to the Northern Provinces although a progressive ministry is being conducted in South India under our South India and Ceylon District Council, the Northern territory being under the supervision of the North India District Council. Missionaries under appointment of the General Council of the Assemblies of God are engaged in direct evangelistic work, and also in other phases of activity which are indirectly evangelistic, such as school, orphanage, and leper work. Some of our missionaries who have large numbers of dependent people in their mission are seeking to develop the industrial phase of the work, so that the natives instead of being dependent upon the funds of the mission can earn their own support by their activities. This is done by promoting the weaving industry, carpentry, canning of fruits and vegetables, etc. We feel this is a splendid thing, as it lifts a considerable burden from the missionary's shoulders along financial lines, although of course this phase of the work is as yet in its initial stage. The hope of the field is to train native workers to go out and evangelize their own people. Something like 100 million souls of India are yet beyond the reach of gospel light, and foreign funds and workers can never meet the need. Let us pray the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth laborers, not only missionaries, but natives who can preach in their own language, live much cheaper than a missionary, and endure the climate without the need of a change. The missionary is necessary, but the native when called and qualified is in a better position still to help his people.

JAPAN

Population, 56,068,952

10 Missionaries, 7 Stations, 15 Outstations

The gospel was first preached in Japan by Francis Xavier about 250 years ago, but Protestant missions were started a little over 70 years ago. Since that time God has blessed the steady efforts of the missionaries of the

different denominations until today it is estimated there are about 250,000 professing Christians. This, however, is a very small percentage in comparison with the 55,750,000 non-Christians. The Pentecostal work under the Assemblies of God in Japan is largely of an evangelistic character. Our chief method in reaching the people is by open-air meetings, and the souls who thus become interested are gathered into the mission halls. Some expansion has been made during the past two years, and new stations and outstations opened including Asukayama on the outskirts of Tokyo, Kofu, and Urawa Machi. A new main station was also opened in the city of Yokohama the latter part of 1931 and is progressing nicely.

Every effort is now being made to train the young men in Japan who manifest qualifications for the ministry, so that they themselves may become witnesses to their own people.

We are sorry to lose through death the help of one of our faithful missionaries who had labored so faithfully for a number of years in the orphanage at Nishinomiya. She has passed on to her reward, but the work is being ably carried on by another of our missionaries who has stepped into the breach. The religions of Japan are Shinto, Buddhism, and Christianity. Unfortunately while there are 1,078 missionaries of all denominations, they are unequally distributed, the majority being located in the large cities while approximately 40 million country people are very largely untouched. Our main stations are located at Tokyo (2 stations), Yokohama, Kobe, Hachioji, and Nagoya.

PALESTINE AND TRANSJORDAN

Population, 760,000

7 Missionaries, 3 Stations, 2 Outstations

In many respects Palestine could be considered as having an adequate staff of missionaries if one considers all the Protestant denominations working there, there being 160 missionaries and one professing Christian to every 250 of the population. However, as in many other countries, the missionary force is unevenly distributed and

many of the villages are still in great need of the gospel. In view of the varied religions and racial strife which exist among the people of Palestine, it is very difficult to work there, most of the converts being won for the most part one by one. We rejoice over the encouraging news that comes to us from Transjordan where God has been convicting the people by His Spirit of their need of a Saviour. Recently there was some remarkable manifestations of God's presence in our work revealing to the people the serious times in which we are living and the necessity of their repenting of sin and preparing for the coming of the Lord. The religions of Palestine and Transjordan are Mohammedanism, Judaism, and Christianity. Our main stations are located at Jerusalem (two stations), and at Es Salt, Transjordan.

SYRIA

Population, 3,000,000

1 Missionary, 1 Station, 4 Outstations

Three quarters of the population of Syria is Moslem; however, a large number of the younger generation, particularly those who have received a Western education, have lost faith in Islam and have drifted into agnosticism. The work of the Assemblies of God in Syria has its headquarters at Shweifat, Syria, but outstation work has been opened at four other points. During the past year it has been a joy to learn of the first Bedouin converts to our mission. The work consists of an orphanage of about 120 children, where they are clothed and fed, given an elementary education and the study of the Bible. This work does not prevent the missionary and her helpers from doing aggressive evangelistic work in the surrounding territory as the four outstations indicate. There are a number of missionary societies working in Syria, having a representation of over 200 missionaries; but progress is slow, there being one professing Christian to every 800 non-Christians. An automobile would be a great help in evangelism.

PERSIA

Population, 9,000,000

6 Missionaries, 4 Stations, 8 Outstations

The prevailing religion of Persia is Mohammedanism, but as in many other countries great changes are taking place. The power of Islam has been shaken, and many are turning to other forms of worship while thousands are drifting towards rationalism. Armenian, and Assyrian Christians have been in the country for centuries, but they represent only about 80,000 of the population. Most of these people are Christians only in name. The Assemblies of God work has been strengthened during recent years by additional missionaries and very encouraging reports come to us of revival in many sections. Assemblies are established in Abajaloo, Abdulah-Kandy, Ada, Dizatakah, Hamadan, Karajaloo, Kermanshah, Mooshavah, Sultanabad, and Tabriz, the last mentioned having been quite recently opened. Persia is poor, probably fifty per cent of the people having to live on charity. The people reached by the gospel are varied in character, religion and race—Jews, Assyrians, Bahais, Armenians, Zoroastrians, and Mohammedans. It is estimated that there is one Christian to every 4,345 of the population.

CENTRAL AMERICA

El Salvador

Population, 1,526,000

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 26 Outstations

We have been much encouraged by the splendid reports coming from this little country relative to the increase and enthusiasm manifested in the local Assemblies. Some of our dear brethren have suffered much persecution, but in spite of this the Lord continues to add to the church.

There are possibilities of reaching out into the adjoining republics of Guatemala, and Honduras, where already there are some Pentecostal brethren. Special attention is being placed upon the training of native preachers in the Bible School established during the last two

years. Many calls are coming for qualified Latin-American preachers, and we thank God that He is thrusting forth these laborers into His harvest. Our main station in Salvador is at Santa Ana. The other assemblies are under native leadership, all of which are self-supporting.

Nicaragua

Population, 638,119

The work in Nicaragua has necessarily suffered because of the political unrest, but we believe we see a brighter day ahead. The stations are Matagalpa, Leon and Esteli. At each place there is a Latin-American brother in charge, and good results are being secured from the work at Leon. The other places have not been supervised by the present ministers long enough to report the results. Formerly Matagalpa was under missionary supervision, and a good nucleus of believers has been gathered out. This field is under the general supervision of the missionary superintendent resident in Salvador.

It is estimated that Nicaragua has one professing Christian to every 165 of the population. Thus it still provides a big field for evangelism.

SOUTH AMERICA

Peru

Population, 5,500,000

8 Missionaries, 4 Stations, 9 Outstations

The bulk of the population consists of Indians of un-mixed blood. The Roman Catholic Church is the official church in Peru, as it is in most of the Latin-American countries, but the religion of the Roman Catholic Church in Peru is, in the words of another, "no more Christian than counterfeit coin is money." Some of our missionaries have suffered stoning and imprisonment at times because of their strong stand for the gospel, and some have been seriously wounded by mobs; but out of it all the Lord has delivered and the work goes on. The stations where missionaries reside are Callao, Trujillo, Huaraz, and Huancayo. The outstations are places where assemblies

have been formed under the supervision of native workers or directly ministered to by the missionary. For some time open-air meetings were prohibited, but now the government looks more leniently on religious effort outside the Catholic Church, so that good opportunities are provided for witnessing to the people in the plazas of the cities.

A number of remarkable healings have been reported recently, and numbers have been saved, for all of which we thank the Lord. The relative need of Peru can be realized when we learn that there is one professing Christian to every 1,407 of the population.

Venezuela

Population, 3,026,878

3 Missionaries, 2 Stations, 4 Outstations

The mass of the population is Venezuelan by birth, but there are also 136,000 Indians. There is estimated to be one professing Christian to every 825 of the population. The work of all missionary societies has progressed more or less encouragingly during the past few years, but there is still much land to be possessed. The work of the Assemblies of God has been conducted in co-operation with other Pentecostal missionaries not regularly affiliated with the General Council but who are yet in full sympathy with our program, so that a very harmonious relationship has existed. Our missionaries are located at the stations of Carora, and Barquisemeto. The latter station is not under our supervision, however.

Argentina

Population, 10,348,189

1 Missionary, 1 Station, 1 Outstation

The population includes a foreign-born element numbering 2,280,000. This country is one of the most progressive of all the South American Republics, and it is estimated that the population will have doubled again within the next twenty-five years. The majority of the immigrants are Spaniards and Italians, while there is a goodly number of Poles and Germans.

This presents a fruitful soil for evangelistic effort, and some encouraging results have been achieved. The work of the Assemblies of God is suffering for lack of missionaries, one lone lady missionary having the burden of responsibility for many years. It is estimated that there is one professing Christian to every 767 of the population. The main station is situated at 25 de Mayo.

EUROPE AND SOVIET RUSSIA

The work of the Assemblies of God in Europe has been very largely turned over to the Russian and Eastern European Mission to supervise, inasmuch as they have a Field Council operating in Europe which we feel is in a better position to care for the missionary interests than our headquarters so far removed from the field. Nevertheless, missionaries still retain their General Council appointment and are ministering in the Bible school at Danzig, in Poland, Bulgaria, and Greece.

The only missionary under General Council appointment in Russia has been imprisoned because of his bold stand for the gospel. He was arrested in January, 1930, and taken from his wife and family, languishing under the hardships of Russian prison routine in the frozen north. Prayer has been offered without ceasing for this dear brother's release, and we are hoping that in the near future permission may be granted for his deliverance. It is difficult for the people of America, living in comparative comfort, to realize the awful sufferings of our brethren in this dark land where they seek to banish God.

We are glad to report that though the godless element have thought to dethrone the Almighty, reports reach us of 80,000 Pentecostal Christians who are assembling together for worship in different places, often in secret for fear of arrest. Baptismal services are held under cover of night, but in spite of all the persecution the Church of Jesus Christ is proving to the world that the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS

Population, 93,402,437

4 Missionaries, 3 Stations

The British Malay States have a population made up of nearly all nations of the world, but perhaps two thirds of the population are Chinese. There are, however, between fifty and sixty million Malays in British and Greater Malaysia which is the area covered by our population estimate. The work of the Assemblies of God was originally among the Cantonese of Singapore, who number about 30,000, but we are glad to report that our missionaries are branching out and have opened work at Ipoh, and at Sakai among the Malay people. The great obstacle in this field is the great expense involved in carrying on the work. Nevertheless, it has been encouraging to note the numbers who have accepted the Lord, many of whom are of the student class.

FIJI ISLANDS

Population, 176,793

4 Missionaries, 2 Stations, 1 Outstation

Fiji offers a good example of what the Bible has effected in a grossly heathen land. In 1835 two missionaries of the Methodist Church landed and in 20 years translated the Bible into the difficult Polynesian language. In the meantime they had seen a nation of cannibals come to the place where the outstanding chief and his people had bowed the knee to the Lord Jesus. Like many other lands once visited by God, there has come a time of comparative coolness and there are still many thousands who have not had a proper presentation of the gospel. There are also many Indians from India who are practically untouched by gospel ministry. Two of our missionaries have been studying the Indian language so as to reach these people as far as possible. The stations opened are at Flagstaff, and Suva. A motorboat is used in visiting neighboring islands with the gospel. This last year there has been an encouraging revival in which a number have been saved and filled with the Holy Spirit.

PHILIPPINE, HAWAIIAN, AND SAMOAN ISLANDS

In each of these groups of islands there are representatives of the General Council ministering. Although they are not under regular appointment of the Missions Department, yet we rejoice that we have those of our number bravely witnessing for God in the "islands of the sea."

CANARY ISLANDS

Population, 735,163

A missionary home has been opened by some of our missionaries in these islands lying off the West Coast of Africa, the purpose being to provide a place where in emergency missionaries in our West African fields might go to a nearer place than the homeland for rest and recuperation. The climate of the islands is good, and a number have been benefited by going there. At the same time an effort is being made to reach the natives of the islands with the gospel. The statistics of missionary work show them as entirely unevangelized. The Roman Catholic Church has gotten hold of the people, but the mass of them are in gross darkness as far as real salvation is concerned. Street meetings are forbidden, but they do not prohibit the distribution of Bibles and tracts. Our missionaries are therefore sowing the seed of the Word from house to house, looking for a harvest in due season. A number have given their hearts to God, and a nice little Sunday School is in progress. The mission station is at Santa Cruz, Tenerife.

PORTO RICO

Population, 1,299,809

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 38 Outstations

The headquarters of our work is at Aibonito, where the District Superintendent is located. Gracious revivals have attended the work in Porto Rico, and the District Council there has progressed spiritually and numerically. The work is very largely self-supporting, although some

of the ministers in the smaller places receive some financial aid.

San Domingo and Cuba

The Missions Committee passed a resolution including the islands of San Domingo and Cuba in the General Council missionary field, since they are so nearly located to Porto Rico and are occupied by General Council ministers. One dear brother in San Domingo who has suffered much for the gospel has succeeded by great sacrifice in establishing an assembly of believers, and also a work has been opened in Cuba.

Latin-American Work in U. S. A. and along the Mexican Border

In the U. S. A. the Mexican population is 1,422,533.

From its inception, gracious revivals have marked the Latin-American work in the United States, and an ever increasing number of Assemblies is indicative of the stability of the work. Our Latin-American ministry has been particularly hard hit by the depression, some 200,000 Mexicans having left the United States and returned to Mexico. We are glad that many who have returned have taken with them the knowledge of salvation. Conditions in Mexico and along the border are almost unbearable, the Mexican government having enacted laws which make it impossible for a foreigner to do missionary work and very difficult even for native-born Mexicans. The Bible institutes at San Antonio, and San Diego have been doing a splendid work in training young Latin Americans for ministry among their own people. As a result some thirty graduate students are active in ministry, and others have gone abroad to other Latin-American fields to take the gospel. The Latin-American work in the U. S. A. is under the direction of the Latin-American District Council.

Finis

This report is necessarily brief, in order to avoid making too large a booklet. A more comprehensive report relative to the different fields is being prepared in separate booklets covering each field.

Financial Report of Foreign Missions Department

For the first time in many years we are obliged to show a decrease in missionary offerings below that of the last Council report, although the amount has by no means fallen off to the extent most missionary bodies have suffered. No missionary has been called home on account of lack of funds, but we have exercised a greater caution in the selection of those who are being sent out. For the past two years, our Home and Foreign Missions disbursements have amounted to \$454,775.49 which is approximately 13% less than was sent out during the Council period 1929-1931. We are happy to state that this does not mean that less has been accomplished, since many new stations and outstations and some new fields have been opened.

Motion was made and carried that the time for the election of officers be the first item of business at the beginning of the afternoon session, Friday, September 15.

Adjourned at 12:15 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Branch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Meeting opened at 1:30 p.m. Song service led by Brother Edgar White of Nebraska, followed by prayer by Brother Willis Smith of Iowa. Brother C. A. Lasater of Fort Smith, Arkansas, brought the afternoon message, speaking from Acts 2:42, 43. Pastor Clinton of the Congregational Church, Philadelphia, gave the General Council a hearty welcome from his church and his official board.

The committee appointed at the 1931 General Council to recommend means whereby the General Council might become a Delegated Body reported. It was moved and carried that the report of the committee be accepted, the recommendations to then be considered.

Motion was made and carried that the courtesy of the floor be granted to all our licensed as well as ordained ministers, and that they be privileged to vote at all times except in the election of officers.

The following resolution made at the 1931 General Council was brought before the house: *Resolved*, That in the future our General Council meetings be held at Springfield, Missouri. Resolution tabled.

Moved and carried that the chairman appoint a Central Committee to submit to the Council an interpretation of the terms "co-operative fellowship," "sovereignty of local assemblies," etc. The chairman announced that appointment would be made the following morning.

Business session adjourned at 5:00 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother McCafferty.

FRIDAY MORNING

The morning devotional meeting opened at 9:00

a. m. with Brother A. F. Berg of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, leading the song service. Brother Glenn Renick of Hannibal, Missouri, led in prayer, and the morning message was given by Brother A. G. Osterberg of Los Angeles, California, who spoke from 2 Corinthians 4:5. Following the message a number of prayer requests were read by Brother Williams, and Brother A. Newton Chase of Tottenville, New York, led the congregation in prayer.

The business session opened at 10:15 a. m. The minutes of the Thursday meetings were read and accepted as corrected.

The following were appointed by the Chairman as members of the Central Committee: Brothers J. W. Welch, Samuel Swanson, D. P. Holloway, P. C. Nelson, and E. F. M. Staudt.

Brother J. R. Flower, Chairman of the Roster Committee, reported the number who had registered up until Thursday night, and stated that other names were being added. It was moved and carried that the reading of the names of the ministers and delegates that have registered be omitted. A suggestion was made that the roster be left open until after the noon report was made.

The report of the Special Missions Commission was read by Brother G. F. Lewis, Chairman of the Committee. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted.

The following resolution presented by the Missions Committee was passed: "*Resolved*, That in view of the expense involved in the administration of the Missionary Department and the fact that insufficient funds have been coming in to properly administer the same, the deficit being provided from a source that is not likely to be available for that purpose in the future, we recommend that each assembly sending in an offering for missions be requested to add a suitable amount to be used in helping to defray the expense involved in administering the office." (See page 29) Adjourned at 12:10 a. m.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. Brother A. Newton Chase of Tottenville, New York, led the song service, and Brother Joseph Tunmore of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, led in prayer. Brother and Sister Myer Tan Ditter, singing evangelists, gave a message in song. Brother Frank Gray of Tacoma, Washington, brought the afternoon message, using for his text 2 Timothy 2:19.

The afternoon business session opened at 2:30 p. m. A further report was made by Brother Flower, chairman of the Roster Committee. Brother Flower announced that the committee's work was not yet complete, but that approximately 675 had been enrolled up to that time, the voting constituency being about 375. It was moved and carried that the report of the Roster Committee be accepted and the roster be closed.

The next item of business was the election of officers. The election resulted as follows:

General Superintendent, E. S. Williams.

Assistant General Superintendent, J. R. Flower.

General Secretary, J. R. Evans.

Nominations were then made from the floor for General Presbyters. The names of sixty-eight brethren were presented. It was moved and carried that nominations be closed.

The Chairman then appointed a nominating committee of five as follows: Brother E. L. Newby, A. G. Osterberg, J. R. Flower, Edgar White, and Fred Vogler to bring to the body recommendations as to those to be elected as Presbyters as has been the custom in the past.

It was moved and carried that a telegram be sent to Brother S. A. Jamieson, assuring him of our love and of our great appreciation of his services in the General Council during the past nineteen years of its existence. (Later: Brother Jamieson died November 14th.)

The following resolutions presented by the Missions Committee were adopted.

(1) *Resolved*, That hereafter the District endorsing a candidate for the foreign field assume the responsibility of financing the missionary as far as practicable. (See page 26)

(2) *Resolved*, That no young man be granted missionary appointment who has not first sufficiently proved his ministry in the homeland as to be regarded qualified for ordination, and that a similar probationary service in the homeland prove the ministry and stability of character of young ladies who apply. (See page 24)

(3) *Resolved*, That we recommend that the emphasis in the selecting of candidates be laid by the Missionary Committee upon the fitness of the candidate for missionary appointment more than upon funds pledged for support, and that this resolution modify the By-Laws, Article VI, Section 3, clause 6. (See page 45)

(4) *Resolved*, That we recommend that the Missionary Secretary from time to time prepare and send to each of our pastors information setting forth the need of supporting financially the Missionary Department in order that the efficiency of the administration of the same may not be hampered by a lack of funds, and that each pastor be requested to enlighten his assembly concerning this need and endeavor to secure needed offerings to be used in defraying the department's expenses. (See page 29)

It was moved and carried that the report of the General Treasurer as contained in the printed report be accepted.

Adjourned at 5:10 p. m.

SATURDAY MORNING

The devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. Brother Alex. Clattenburge of Conneaut, Ohio, led the song service, and Brother William F. Voodre of Hornell, New York, led in prayer. The morning mes-

sage was brought by Brother G. F. Lewis, Canton, Ohio, his text being taken from the fourth chapter of 1 John.

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother J. R. Kline of Detroit, Michigan. Brother Paul Peterson, president of the Russian and Eastern European Mission, who had just returned from a trip through Europe, brought to the General Council words of greeting from the Pentecostal brethren there.

Brother G. F. Lewis read the report of the Special Missionary Commission which met at Springfield in September, 1932, and expressed the confidence of the Commission in the personnel and management of the Foreign Missions Department. It was moved and carried that the report of the Commission be accepted and that appreciation be extended to the Missionary Commission for the good work which they have done.

Brother Perkin, Missionary Secretary, then brought a helpful message on the work and responsibilities of the Foreign Missions Department.

The committee appointed to approve nominees as General Presbyters brought its report, which was accepted. It was moved and carried that two General Presbyters be elected from each District. These to be in addition to the District Superintendents.

Adjourned at 12:00 N. Dismissed in prayer by Brother F. Ewald.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. The song service was led by Brother W. L. Couzens of Peckville, Pennsylvania, and Brother Thomas Twiss of Lake Ariel, Pennsylvania, led in prayer. Brother and Sister C. L. Musgrove of Port Arthur, Texas, brought a message in song, and Brother A. C. Bates of Clovis, New Mexico, spoke on the "Anointed Ministry."

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m. with prayer by Brother C. E. Long of Davenport, Iowa. Brother Frank Gray spoke a few moments in behalf of the "Pentecostal Evangel" and the splendid work of its Editor.

Election of General Presbyters was the next item of business. It was moved and carried that in order to conserve time we elect the General Presbyters by a plurality vote rather than by a two-thirds majority. It was moved and carried that where only two names were presented from a District, election be made by acclamation.

The following resolutions presented by the Resolutions Committee were adopted:

(1) *Resolved*, That section four under "Divorce and Remarriage" of the Essential Resolutions be corrected to read as follows: "We disapprove of any General Council minister performing a marriage ceremony for any who have been divorced and whose former companion is still living. We also warn that any minister of our fellowship who performs such a ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, may be dismissed from the Council." (See page 39)

(2) *Resolved*, That in the future the General Council office issue a membership certificate of proper proportions and script to the churches coming into the fellowship and to those churches already in the fellowship who may desire it, which may be suitable for framing, and be it further

Resolved, That the cost of same be provided by the church and forwarded by the District Superintendent to the General Council office at the time of affiliation. (See page 46)

The following resolution was presented by the Resolutions Committee:

Resolved, That the following paragraph pertaining to appeals from trials be inserted in our By-laws after paragraph one, Section 6 of Article V. "It shall be the privilege of every minister who may have had a trial by a District Council to appeal from the decision of the District Council, provided such appeal be made within thirty days after the decision of the District Council shall have been rendered.

"It shall be necessary for each District to keep a complete stenographic record of all trials conducted by the District.

"Whenever a minister of the General Council shall appeal from a decision of the District Council to the Executive Presbytery or from the decision of the Executive Presbytery to the General Presbytery it shall be the duty of the Executive or General Presbytery to review the case by full examination of the documentary evidence relative to the trial in order to determine whether

or not a proper trial has been conducted and a fair decision rendered.

"The District Council, in such a case shall furnish a complete record of the trial including all evidence produced. No new evidence shall be considered in such a review.

"In case the Executive or General Presbytery shall decide, after such a review, that the decision has not been fair, it shall be the right of the body to which appeal has been made to reverse the decision of the District. If said body decides that there has been an improper trial, it shall be its right to remand the case to the District where the trial was conducted for retrial."

It was moved and seconded that this resolution be adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the resolution be amended by substituting the words "report in writing" for the words "stenographic record."

It was moved and carried that we continue our consideration of this resolution Monday morning, September 18.

Adjourned at 5:30 p. m.

MONDAY MORNING

The morning devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. The song service was led by Brother B. H. Cox of Philadelphia, and prayer was offered by Brother Charles Eyler of Johnstown, Pennsylvania. The morning message was given by Brother W. T. Millsaps, his subject being, "A Chosen Ministry."

The business session opened at 10.00 a. m. The minutes of the Friday and Saturday meetings were read and approved.

It was moved and carried that Brothers Donald Gee and Charles Price be extended the privilege of the floor in the remainder of the Council session.

Brother Donald Gee brought greetings to the Council from the different countries he visited in Europe, from Great Britain, and from Canada. It was moved and carried that we send through Brother Gee the official greet-

ings of the General Council to all our brethren of like precious faith in all the countries where our brother may minister.

It was moved and carried that the Secretary of the General Council of the Assemblies of God write a letter to the Secretary of the Assemblies of God in Great Britain extending the greetings of this Council to our brethren across the waters.

It was moved and carried that before the election of the Executive Presbyters an amendment of the By-laws affecting the election of General Presbyters be considered.

The following resolution was presented and passed:

Resolved, That our Constitution, Article IX, Section 3, the last sentence of which reads, "The District Superintendent by virtue of his office shall be a General Presbyter" be changed to read as follows: "Each District shall have the privilege of representation in the General Presbytery by three members, viz., the District Superintendent together with two others to be nominated for the office by the District Council in its meeting held prior to the meeting of the General Council." (See page 12)

It was moved and carried that the roster be opened.

By common consent the brethren who had not yet registered were privileged to vote in the morning session.

Moved and carried that Section 1, Article II, of the By-laws, entitled "Officers," be amended by dropping the last sentence as unnecessary. The sentence reads: "A two-thirds majority of all votes cast shall be necessary to constitute an election."

Moved and carried that the following clauses should be substituted for Section 2, Article II, of the By-laws.

(1) All candidates for office of General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary shall be nominated by secret ballot. A two-thirds vote of all votes cast shall be necessary to constitute an election. If no election has been declared after the third ballot has been cast, the three candidates having the highest number of votes in the last ballot cast shall be nominees to be further voted upon, and all other names shall be eliminated.

(2) Nominations for General Presbyters shall be made at the District Council meetings held prior to the convening of the General Council. Nominees for the General Presbytery shall be elected by a majority vote.

(3) The General Presbytery shall have the right to elect resident officers at headquarters to serve on the Executive Presbytery as provided for in Article IX, Section 2, of the Constitution. The non-resident members of the Executive Presbytery shall be nominated from the floor and shall be elected by a two-thirds vote in the same manner as provided for the presiding officers of the General Council.

(4) The Treasurer and Missionary Secretary of the General Council, Editor of the *Pentecostal Evangel*, President and Principal of the Central Bible Institute, and other departmental heads shall be chosen by the General Presbytery. They shall be subordinate to the Executive Presbytery and amenable thereto for the proper discharge of their duties. (See page 14)

By common consent nominees for non-resident Executive Presbyters were made from among the General Presbytery. The names of nineteen brethren were nominated.

Brother Osterberg brought greetings to the Council from our aged brother, S. A. Jamieson. It was moved and carried that a motion be presented giving recognition to some of our aged presbyters.

Adjourned at 12:00 N.

MONDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. Brother A. F. Crouch of St. Joseph, Missouri, led the song service, and Brother P. C. Nelson of Enid, Oklahoma, led in prayer. A message in song was given by Brother Warren Anthony, and Brother E. S. Williams brought the afternoon message, speaking from 2 Timothy 1:12. A time of praise and fellowship followed.

The business session opened at 2:50 p. m.

Brother W. I. Evans spoke for a few minutes concerning Central Bible Institute, outlining the courses offered.

A letter was read from Brother Chambers, Superintendent of the Canadian Pentecostal Assemblies, extending greetings from the brethren there. Motion was made and carried that a letter be written exchanging greetings to our Canadian brethren.

The resolution on "appeals" presented by the Resolutions Committee and the amendment to substitute the words "report in writing" for the words "stenographic report" were brought up for consideration. Moved and carried that the amendment be withdrawn. The resolution was passed in its original form. (See page 22)

The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, There may be an unintentional tendency to overlook the valuable counsel of some of our General Presbytery brethren who for many years have been highly esteemed members thereof; therefore be it

Resolved, That such brethren may become honorary members indefinitely of the General Presbytery by the sustaining action of the General Council, provided the General Presbytery shall so recommend; and be it further

Resolved, That said action shall not disturb the regular quota granted any District involved. (See page 46)

The Central Committee brought their report on the interpretation of the terms "co-operative fellowship" and "sovereignty of local assemblies." It was moved and carried that the report be referred back to the Committee

to change the wording of the sentence, "Our movement is a fellowship rather than an organization or denomination in the ordinary acceptance of this word."

It was moved and carried that the report of the Central Committee be mimeographed so that each of the brethren could have a copy before action was taken on it.

Report of balloting for the election of the non-resident Executive Presbyters. No election on first and second ballots. It was moved and carried that in order to expedite matters the rule for voting be suspended and all names be eliminated except those three receiving the highest number of votes.

It was moved and carried that we amend the By-laws, Article IV, by adding the following section to be known as Section 3; Section 3 as it now appears to be known as Section 4. (See page 19)

"The Roster Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Presbytery prior to each meeting of the General Council. It shall be expected to open the Roster on the morning of the day preceding the convening of the General Council. It shall be entrusted with the responsibility for examination of all credentials and the recognition of all delegates. Ordained ministers shall identify themselves by fellowship certificates of the current year; delegates from assemblies shall obtain letters from secretaries or pastors certifying to their appointment by the assembly to represent it in the General Council. Suitable badges shall be issued by the committee to all qualified delegates, such badges to indicate the classification of ordained ministers, foreign missionaries, District licentiates, lay delegates from assemblies, visitors, etc.

"The Roster shall be open for enrollment during the entire meeting of the General Council, and the Roster Committee shall render such reports as may be called for by the action of the Council."

It was moved and carried that Article III, Section 7, of the By-laws be amended to read as follows: (See page 18)

1. The General Presbytery shall be empowered to act in all matters pertaining to foreign missionary and

ministerial relationships, and all matters which pertain to the proper functioning of the departments and institutions in the fellowship. It shall constitute an advisory body to the Executive Presbytery. All decisions pertaining to constitutional order or fundamental doctrines shall be referred by it to the General Council for ratification in the manner provided by the General Council Constitution.

2. The General Presbytery shall also act as a Court of Appeal for the reviewing of testimony given in missionary and ministerial trials. Its decisions shall be final.

Further report on balloting for election of non-resident Executive Presbyters. No election on third ballot. It was moved and carried that the rules be suspended that we elect by a two-thirds vote and that we elect by a majority vote. The election resulted as follows: J. Narver Gortner, C. A. Lasater.

Adjourned 5:20 p. m.

TUESDAY MORNING

The devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m., and the song service was led by Brother Silas Rexroat of Humboldt, Kansas. Brother J. N. Gortner led in prayer, and Brother M. T. Draper brought the morning message.

Business session opened at 10:00 a. m. Brother J. R. Evans reported that the following were elected by the General Presbytery as resident Executive Presbyters: Brother W. I. Evans, J. W. Welch, Noel Perkin, and S. H. Frodsham. Brother Evans also announced that the General Presbytery recommended the names of Brothers S. A. Jamieson and Joseph Tunmore as honorary General Presbyters. It was moved and carried that the recommendation of the General Presbyters be accepted and that Brothers Tunmore and Jamieson be elected honorary members of the General Presbytery.

The following resolution presented by the Resolutions Committee was adopted:

Whereas, We recognize the need among us for the care of some of our faithful workers who have grown old and impaired in physical strength, many of whom have labored in small and new fields, receiving but little fin-

ancial support, and believing the admonition of Paul found in 1 Timothy 5:8 applies to the church as well as to the family; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the General Council of the Assemblies of God, do hereby authorize and instruct the Executive Presbytery to carry out such plans and methods, receipts and distribution of funds for this purpose as may be agreed upon in this session of the General Council. It was moved and carried that a committee be appointed to study this matter and report back at this General Council, if possible. The following committee was appointed: A. G. Osterberg, Frank Gray, Flem Van Meter.

It was moved and carried that Article IX, Section 2, of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "The Executive Presbytery shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary, together with six other brethren to be chosen from the active fellowship; six of these brethren shall be resident and three non-resident at headquarters." (See page 11)

The report of the Sunday School Committee was read and accepted.

It was moved and carried that our people be encouraged to use the Sunday School literature which is published at Springfield rather than that published by non-Council and non-Pentecostal societies. Considerable discussion on Sunday school literature followed.

It was moved and carried that the recommendation of the Sunday School Committee relative to definite management of the Sunday School Department be referred to the Executive Presbytery.

Adjourned at 12:00 N.

Mrs. Robert A. Brown of New York City brought the afternoon message.

The business session opened at 3:00 p. m.

The minutes of the Monday meetings were read and approved.

The report of the Central Committee was read by Brother Gortner. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted.

Report of Central Committee

In his report our Superintendent expressed the need of the Council's interpretation of the terms "Co-operative Fellowship" and the "Sovereignty of Local Assemblies" as used in our Constitution and By-laws, and this committee has been asked to give due consideration to this matter and to report back a statement to be adopted, revised or modified by this Council. Your committee begs leave to submit the following:

(1) "Co-operative Fellowship." This phrase was coined by those who framed our Constitution to designate a body of believers, one in experience and purpose, bound by the cords of Christian love but not by ecclesiastical traditions or powers. Our movement is based upon the principle of Co-operative Fellowship. In the New Testament we find its model. The word used in the inspired record might be translated "partnership"—something held in common. We hold in common truths and experiences which distinguish us from other bodies. We have received "like precious faith." We have a great God-given task to perform—to preach this Gospel of the Kingdom throughout the world. This fellowship is large and rich enough to afford a field of operation for all the talents and powers vouchsafed by divine grace to every member of the blessed partnership, and it is so precious that no price is too great to pay to attain and so maintain it.

By "*Co-operative Fellowship*" we understand a partnership in *service* in which the efforts of individual believers are co-ordinated and united, instead of every man doing that which seems good to himself without regard to the effect his doings may have on other members of this body. The members voluntarily agree to work together for this spreading of the Gospel; at home and abroad, and for the edification of the body of Christ. The ground of this fellowship is the Word of God, and it can be maintained only by the indwelling Spirit of God in the hearts of believers who are dominated with the desire to glorify our Lord, the Great Head of the Church. The success of the fellowship depends

upon (1) agreement as to what should be done; (2) practical plans for accomplishing the task; and (3) faithful performance of duties by those on whom they devolve. The principles of this fellowship naturally affect Council fellowship in all of its aspects. It touches the relations of the General Council to the District Councils, of the District Councils to the assemblies, and of every member in an assembly to the assembly.

Violations of these principles result in disturbances and failures and defeat the purpose for which the Council exists. In our Council fellowship we have proceeded so far as to agree on the purpose for which we have come together, the truths we are called to proclaim to the world, and the organizations through which the will of the body is expressed, and through which it attempts to achieve its purpose. These agreements have found expression in the General Council, District Councils and local assemblies. In the General Council certain departments have been found necessary for the successful prosecution of our work. Full co-operation with these departments is essential to carry on this work. This touches in a most vital way the relation of our ministers and missionaries to our Council, and failure to co-operate constitutes a violation of the principles of co-operative fellowship.

(2) "The Sovereignty of Local Assemblies" is another phrase requiring careful definition. It is fully set forth in our Constitutional Declaration on page 3; and in Article XI, entitled "Local Assemblies," on page 12 of the Constitution and By-laws.

It is obvious that the sovereignty of an assembly is limited by the rights of other assemblies in the fellowship, and by the rights of the general body. The sovereignty of an assembly in no wise permits it to do anything injurious to other affiliated assemblies; neither should any assembly stand in the way of the development of other assemblies within a reasonable distance of its place of worship, in localities where the size of the population would justify the opening of new assemblies.

An assembly is jeopardizing its own interests by

refusing to co-operate with the District and General of-ficiary. It is obvious that the District officary has a right to protest against the action of an assembly which persists in making unwise decisions in matters which are vital to its own welfare and to the fellowship at large. The District officary should at all times have the right to an open door in the assembly to give advice and render such aid as may be necessary for the welfare and peace of the assembly.

(3) The Purpose and Rights of District Councils. It is obvious that the organization of the District Council is to care for the work of the fellowship in its prescribed field. Its purpose is to lend assistance to the development of the local assembly and to promote the spirit of general fellowship among its members. The District Council has no right to usurp authority over the local assembly for its own benefit. Decisions of the District Council, while in session, are passed as recommendations to the local churches. The local church is bound by the decisions of the District and the General Council in matters pertaining to doctrine and practice. All other matters not vital to constitutional order are left to the discretion of the local assembly for compliance therewith.

Adjourned at 5:30 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Warton.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The morning devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. with Brother Vernon Gortner leading the song service. Brother Charles Shuss of Rochester, N. Y., led in prayer, and Brother W. D. Burris of Russellville, Arkansas, brought the morning message, speaking on the subject of "Broken Altars."

The business session opened at 9:50 a. m.

It was moved and carried that the article headed "Transferring from One District to Another" under "Essential Resolutions" be amended by adding the following clause: "and until endorsement be secured from the of-ficiary of the District in which the candidate was li-censed." (See page 40)

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That we, the General Council now in session, authorize the Executive Presbytery, in the event that it should deem it advisable to do so, to secure a contract on a radio station, centrally located, of not less than 10,000 watt for at least one hour per week, to broadcast the glorious full gospel message that God has entrusted to us.

It was moved and carried that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, The Christians of the U. S. S. R. are suffering severe persecution; therefore be it

Resolved, That a suitable petition be drawn up by the Executive Presbytery and forwarded to President Roosevelt requesting that the United States of America shall not give official recognition to the U. S. S. R. until such time as assurance is given that the people in Russia shall be granted:

1. Religious liberty.
2. Liberty of speech, assembly, and press.
3. Freedom to emigrate to other countries without exorbitant passport charges.
4. Freedom to receive provisions and clothing for the destitute and starving, without duty charges.

It was reported to the Council that the situation in Roumania was very acute. It was moved and carried that this matter be referred to the Executive Presbytery to seek wisdom from God in protesting against the situation there.

It was moved and carried that we have a day of fasting and prayer in behalf of our afflicted brethren in other lands, and that notice of same be given to our people through the *Pentecostal Evangel*.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the directorate of Central Bible Institute be authorized to provide Bible training annually for a number of promising young men who may be recommended by the District Councils. This number shall not exceed twenty-five. The expense of each such young man shall be provided in the following manner:

1. Central Bible Institute shall provide one-half his support, the student to give in exchange part-time work.
2. The District endorsing the student shall provide the other half of his support.

It was reported that the committee appointed to investigate annuities would be unable to report in so short a time.

Adjourned at 12:15 p. m.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

At 1:30 p. m. the devotional service opened. The song service was led by Brother Corbett Musgrove of Port Arthur, Texas, and Brother Ralph Jeffrey of Hagerstown, Maryland, brought the afternoon message.

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m.

The Committee on Bible Schools reported as follows:

1. We place ourselves upon record as expressing our conviction that it is unwise to unduly multiply Bible schools, as such multiplication tends to make difficult, through inadequate support, the maintenance of proper standards in the curriculum and equipment of schools already established and operating among us.

2. It shall be understood that the endorsement of a Bible school by a District Council does not constitute it a General Council institution. Any school in order to be regarded as a General Council Bible school must have the endorsement of and be controlled by the General Council. Bible schools that have been endorsed and are controlled by Districts, but not by the General Council, shall be regarded as District Bible schools. Any Bible school not endorsed by a District Council shall have no recognition in notices inserted in the *Pentecostal Evangel*.

3. Attention is called to the fact that Central Bible Institute is our only General Council Bible school. We place ourselves upon record as reaffirming previous declarations made concerning this institution. We have confidence in the faculty and in the management and agree to stand whole-heartedly back of this school and to do

all we can to promote its interests and to give to it through proper publicity the place it deserves in our fellowship.

4. We record our conviction that in the matter of publicity given to Bible schools in the *Pentecostal Evangel* the fact that Central Bible Institute is our only General Council Bible school should be borne in mind. Publicity to District Council schools should be stressed in the Districts and afforded through District Council channels. We express our conviction that only such notices concerning District Bible schools as are likely to interest our constituency as a whole should be published in the *Pentecostal Evangel*. (See page 46)

It was moved and carried that the report of the Bible School Committee be adopted.

Brother Fred Vogler of Kansas told what the Kansas District was doing for Bible school graduates in providing places of ministry and how the students were making good and proving themselves.

The following resolution was presented by the Resolutions Committee and adopted:

Whereas, No approved method has been agreed upon by either the General or District Councils for the trial of ministers or its officers, and

Whereas, Such a deficiency tends to a lack of confidence in judicial administration; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this session name three Executive or General Presbyters who shall outline the methods of procedure involved in the acceptance of charges, who shall be qualified to accept charges, and the rules that shall govern the withdrawal, expulsion, and calling in of ministerial credentials, and the methods of trial procedure; and, be it further

Resolved, That this draft be submitted to a joint meeting of Executive and General Presbyters at the earliest moment for their consideration to the end that they may submit a recommended draft to the General Council session as soon as may be possible.

It was moved and carried that the chairman be

authorized to appoint the three persons to bring a report as to the best method of conducting trials.

It was moved and carried that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, The General Council of the Assemblies of God has been privileged to hold its Fifteenth Session at Highway Mission Tabernacle of Philadelphia in delightful fellowship with its pastor and people; be it, therefore

Resolved, That we express our indebtedness and appreciation to Brother and Sister Van Meter and Brother B. F. Scott, the members of the congregation, and all who have aided in making this session of the General Council such a season of blessing under the hand of God.

Moved and carried that the following resolution be placed before the house for consideration:

"In view of the fact that there are Bible Schools now being conducted by Districts in the fellowship of the General Council that are now doing a splendid work, and whose schools are being conducted on the General Council principles and standards for Bible schools and in full co-operation with the General Council; therefore be it

Resolved, That such schools desiring recognition by the General Council be investigated by a committee appointed for that purpose, and when found to be in a satisfactory condition, they be given full recognition by the General Council of the Assemblies of God."

After considerable discussion, it was moved and carried that the discussion come to a close and the entire matter be referred to the Executive Presbytery, and that they be authorized to edit the By-laws in keeping with the new resolution that has been passed.

It was moved and carried that the General Council express its hearty appreciation for the presence and valuable ministry of Brother Donald Gee.

It was moved and carried that the General Council express its thanks to Pastor Clinton and the officials of his church for their warm-hearted welcome and practical co-operation in offering the use of the Central Congregational Church at this General Council.

It was moved and carried that we express our appreciation to the members of the several committees appointed for the efficient manner in which they have performed the work assigned to them.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Presbytery be authorized to edit, correct, and publish the minutes of this General Council and to mail a copy of the same to each minister and missionary of the fellowship.

It was moved and carried that all unfinished business be committed to the Executive Presbytery and the Executive Presbytery be authorized to care for the same.

Brothers Van Meter, Benson, and Cox, pastors of the assemblies in Philadelphia, all expressed their appreciation of the Fifteenth Session of the General Council being held in their city.

Before the session adjourned Brothers Couzens and Dawson, at the request of the General Superintendent, sang together.

Adjourned at 4:35 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Donald Gee, who closed his prayer with the benediction found in Jude 24 and 25, "Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and forever. Amen."
