**CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF
THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND
FOREIGN LANDS, REVISED TO
SEPTEMBER 12-19, 1935**

CONSTITUTIONAL DECLARATION

Whereas, It is the express purpose of God, our heavenly Father, to call out of the world a saved people, who shall constitute the body or church of Jesus Christ, built and established upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner stone; and

Whereas, The members of the body, the church (ecclesia) of Jesus Christ, are enjoined to assemble themselves together for worship, fellowship, counsel and instruction in the Word of God and the work of the ministry and for the exercise of those spiritual gifts and offices provided for in the New Testament; and

Whereas, It is evident that the early apostolic churches came together in such fellowship as a representative body of saved, Spirit-filled believers, who ordained and sent out evangelists and missionaries, and who, under the supervision of the Holy Spirit, set over the church pastors and teachers; therefore be it

Resolved, That we recognize ourselves as a co-operative fellowship of Pentecostal, Spirit-baptized saints from local Pentecostal Assemblies of like precious faith throughout the United States and foreign lands, to be known as The General Council of the Assemblies of God, whose purpose is not to usurp authority over the various local assemblies, nor to deprive them of their Scriptural and local rights and privileges, but to recognize and promote scriptural methods and order for worship, unity, fellowship, work and business for God; and to disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrines and conduct, endeavoring to keep the unity of

the Spirit in the bonds of peace, "till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name shall be, The General Council of the Assemblies of God.

ARTICLE II. NATURE

The General Council of the Assemblies of God is a co-operative fellowship based upon mutual agreements voluntarily entered into by its membership.

ARTICLE III. PREROGATIVES

1. To approve all scriptural teachings, methods and conduct; and to disapprove unscriptural teachings, methods and conduct.

2. To encourage and promote the evangelization of the world.

3. To provide a basis of fellowship among Christians of like precious faith.

4. To establish and maintain such departments and institutions as may be necessary for the propagation of the Gospel and the work of this Pentecostal fellowship.

5. To have the right to own, hold in trust, use, sell, convey, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of, such property, real or chattel, as may be needed for the prosecution of its work.

ARTICLE IV. PRINCIPLES

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall represent as nearly as possible in detail, the body of Christ as described in the New Testament Scriptures, recognizing the principles inherent in that body as also inherent in this fellowship, particularly the principles of unity, co-operation and equality. Its purpose is to maintain conditions under which it can, as a fellow-

ship, demonstrate these principles and their consequent development.

ARTICLE V STATEMENT OF FUNDAMENTAL TRUTHS

The Bible is our all-sufficient rule for faith and practice. Hence this Statement of Fundamental Truths is intended as a basis of fellowship among us (i. e., that we all speak the same thing, 1 Cor. 1:10; Acts 2:42). The human phraseology employed in such statement is not inspired nor contended for, but the truth set forth is held to be essential to a full Gospel ministry. No claim is made that it contains all truth in the Bible, only that it covers our present needs as to these fundamental matters.

1. THE SCRIPTURES INSPIRED

The Bible is the inspired Word of God, a revelation from God to man, the infallible rule of faith and conduct, and is superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason (2 Tim. 3:15, 16; 1 Pet. 2:2).

2. THE ONE TRUE GOD

The one true God has revealed Himself as the eternally self-existent, self-revealed "I AM"; and has further revealed Himself as embodying the principles of relationship and association, i. e., as Father, Son and Holy Ghost (Deut. 6:4; Mark 12:29; Isa. 43:10, 11; Matt. 28:19).

THE ADORABLE GODHEAD

(a) Terms Defined

The terms "Trinity" and "Persons," as related to the Godhead, while not found in the Scriptures, are words in harmony with Scripture, whereby we may convey to others our immediate understanding of the doctrine of Christ respecting the Being of God, as distinguished from "gods many and lords many." We, therefore, may speak with propriety of the Lord our God, who is One Lord, as a trinity or as one Being of three persons, and still be absolutely Scriptural. (Examples, Matt. 2:6; 8:16, 17; Acts 15:15-18.)

(b) Distinction and Relationship in the Godhead

Christ taught a distinction of Persons in the Godhead which He expressed in specific terms of relationship, as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, but that this distinction and relationship, as to its mode is **inscrutable** and **incomprehensible**, because **unexplained**. (Luke 1:35; 1 Cor. 1:24; Matt. 11:25-27; 28:19; 2 Cor. 13:14; 1 John 1:3, 4).

(c) Unity of the One Being of Father, Son and Holy Ghost

Accordingly, therefore, there is **that** in the Son which constitutes Him **the Son** and not the Father; and there is **that** in the Holy Ghost which constitutes Him **the Holy Ghost** and not either the Father or the Son. Wherefore the Father is the Begetter, the Son is the Begotten; and the Holy Ghost is the one proceeding from the Father and the Son. Therefore, because these three persons in the Godhead are in a state of unity, there is but one Lord God Almighty and His name one. (John 1:18; 15:26; 17:11, 21; Zech. 14:9).

(d) Identity and Co-operation in the Godhead

The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost are never **identical** as to **Person**; nor **confused** as to **relation**; nor **divided** in respect to the Godhead; nor **opposed** as to **co-operation**. The Son is **in** the Father and the Father is **in** the Son as to relationship. The Son is **with** the Father and the Father is **with** the Son, as to fellowship. The Father is not **from** the Son, but the Son is **from** the Father, as to authority. The Holy Ghost is **from** the Father and the Son proceeding, as to nature, relationship, co-operation and authority. Hence, neither Person in the Godhead either exists or works separately or independently of the others. (John 5:17-30).

(e) The Title, Lord Jesus Christ

The appellation, "Lord Jesus Christ," is a proper name. It is never applied, in the New Testament, either to the Father or to the Holy Ghost. It therefore belongs exclusively to the **Son of God**. (Rom. 1:1-3, 7; 2 John 3).

(f) The Lord Jesus Christ, God with Us

The Lord Jesus Christ, as to His divine and eternal nature, is the proper and only Begotten of the Father, but as to His human nature, He is the proper Son of Man. He is, therefore, acknowledged to be both God and man; who, because He is God and man, is "Immanuel," God with us. (Matt. 1:23; 1 John 4:2, 10, 14; Rev. 1:13, 14-17).

(g) The Title, Son of God

Since the name "Immanuel" embraces both God and man in the one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ, it follows that the title, Son of God, describes His proper deity, and the title, Son of Man, His proper humanity. Therefore, the title, Son

of God, belongs to the **order of eternity**, and the title, Son of Man, to the **order of time**. (Matt. 1:23, 21; 2 John 3; 1 John 3:8; Heb. 7:3; 1:1-13).

(h) Transgression of the Doctrine of Christ

Wherefore, it is a transgression of the Doctrine of Christ to say that Jesus Christ derived the title, Son of God, solely from the fact of the incarnation, or because of His relation to the economy of redemption. Therefore, to deny that the Father is a real and eternal Father, and that the Son is a real and eternal Son, is a denial of the distinction and relationship in the Being of God; a denial of the Father and the Son; and a **displacement** of the truth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. (2 John 9; John 1:1-2, 14, 18, 29, 49; 8:57, 58; 1 John 2:22, 23; 4:1-5; Heb. 12:3, 4).

(i) Exaltation of Jesus Christ as Lord

The Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, having by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; angels and principalities and powers having been made subject unto Him. And, having been made both Lord and Christ, He sent the Holy Ghost that we, in the name of Jesus, might bow our knees and confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father until the end, when the Son shall become subject to the Father that God may be all in all. (Heb. 1:3; 1 Peter 3:22; Acts 2:32-36; Rom. 14:11; 1 Cor. 15:24-28).

(j) Equal Honor to the Father and to the Son

Wherefore, since the Father has delivered all judgment unto the Son, it is not only the **express duty** of all in heaven and on earth to bow the knee, but it is an **unspeakable joy** in the Holy Ghost to ascribe unto the Son all the attributes of Deity, and to give Him all the honor and the glory contained in all the names and titles of the Godhead (except those which express relationship. See paragraphs b, c and d), and thus honor the Son even as we honor the Father. (John 5:22, 23; 1 Peter 1:8; Rev. 5:6-14; Phil. 2:8, 9; Rev. 7:9, 10; 4:8-11).

3. MAN, HIS FALL AND REDEMPTION

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, after Our likeness." But man, by voluntary transgression, fell, and his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ the Son of God. Gen. 1:26-31; 3:1-7; Rom. 5:12-21.

4. THE SALVATION OF MAN

(a) Conditions to Salvation.

The grace of God, which bringeth salvation, hath

appeared to all men, through the preaching of repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ; man is saved by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, and, being justified by grace through faith, he becomes an heir of God according to the hope of eternal life. (Titus 2:11; Rom. 10:13-15; Luke 24:47; Titus 3:5-7).

(b) The Evidences of Salvation.

The **inward** evidence, to the believer of his salvation, is the direct witness of the Spirit (Rom. 8:16). The **outward** evidence to all men is a life of righteousness and true holiness.

5. BAPTISM IN WATER

The ordinance of Baptism by a burial with Christ should be observed as commanded in the Scriptures, by all who have really repented and in their hearts have truly believed on Christ as Saviour and Lord. In so doing, they have the body washed in pure water as an outward symbol of cleansing, while their heart has already been sprinkled with the blood of Christ as an inner cleansing. Thus they declare to the world that they have died with Jesus and that they have also been raised with Him to walk in newness of life (Matt. 28:19; Acts 10:47, 48; Rom. 6:4; Acts 20:21; Heb. 10:22).

6. THE LORD'S SUPPER

The Lord's Supper, consisting of the elements, bread and the fruit of the vine, is the symbol expressing our sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Pet. 1:4); a memorial of His suffering and death (1 Cor. 11:26); and a prophecy of His second coming (1 Cor. 11:26); and is enjoined on all believers "until He comes."

7. THE PROMISE OF THE FATHER.

All believers are entitled to, and should ardently expect, and earnestly seek, the promise of the Father, the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the

command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church. With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; 1:8; 1 Cor. 12:1-31). This wonderful experience is distinct from and subsequent to the experience of the new birth (Acts 10:44-46; 11:14-16; 15:7-9).

8. THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY GHOST

The Baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is witnessed by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterance (Acts 2:4). The speaking in tongues in this instance is the same in essence as the gift of tongues (1 Cor. 12:4-10, 28) but different in purpose and use.

9. ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION

The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy Ghost we are able to obey the command, "Be ye holy, for I am holy." Entire sanctification is the will of God for all believers, and should be earnestly pursued by walking in obedience to God's Word (Heb. 12:14; 1 Pet. 1:15, 16; 1 Thess. 5:23, 24; 1 John 2:6).

10. THE CHURCH

The Church is the body of Christ, the habitation of God through the Spirit, with divine appointments for the fulfillment of her great commission. Each believer, born of the Spirit, is an integral part of the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, which are written in heaven. (Eph. 1:22, 23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23).

11. THE MINISTRY AND EVANGELISM

A divinely called and Scripturally ordained ministry has been provided by our Lord for a twofold purpose: (1) The evangelization of the world, and (2) The edifying of the Body of Christ (Mark 16:15-20; Eph. 4:11-13).

12. DIVINE HEALING

Deliverance from sickness is provided for in the atonement, and is the privilege of all believers (Isa. 53:4, 5; Matt. 8:16, 17).

13. THE BLESSED HOPE

The resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ and their translation together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord is the imminent and blessed hope of the Church (1 Thess. 4:16, 17; Rom. 8:23; Titus 2:13; 1 Cor. 15:51, 52).

14. THE MILLENNIAL REIGN OF JESUS

The revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ from heaven, the salvation of national Israel, and the millennial reign of Christ on the earth is the Scriptural promise and the world's hope (2 Thess. 1:7; Rev. 19:11-14; Rom. 11:26, 27; Rev. 20:1-7).

15. THE LAKE OF FIRE

The devil and his angels, the beast and the false prophet, and whosoever is not found written in the Book of Life, shall be consigned to everlasting punishment in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone, which is the second death (Rev. 19:20; Rev. 20:10-15).

16. THE NEW HEAVENS AND NEW EARTH

We, "according to His promise, look for new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness" (2 Pet. 3:13; Rev. 21, 22).

ARTICLE VI. RELATIONSHIPS

The General Council of the Assemblies of God shall prosecute its activities through its General and District Councils.

ARTICLE VII. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the General Council shall consist of all ministers and missionaries holding accredited fellowship certificates, and such representatives

as may be chosen by the assemblies affiliated with us, each assembly being entitled to one lay delegate.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

1. Regular sessions of the General Council shall be held biennially, pursuant to a call by the Executive Presbytery.

2. Special sessions of the General Council may be arranged by the Executive Presbytery if agreed by a majority of the General Presbyters.

3. The right of initiative in the matter of calling of special sessions shall be granted to any ordained minister of The General Council of the Assemblies of God when occasion demands. A statement setting forth the reasons for a special session of the Council, signed by not less than fifteen ordained ministers, may be considered sufficient reason for the call of a special session, such statement to be filed with the Executive Presbytery, who may, if it shall be deemed advisable, respond to the summons and issue the call for a special session.

ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS

1. Executive Officers.

The officers shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary, together with such other officers as may be required in the future. Their term of office shall be for two years and shall begin three months after the date of election.

2. Executive Presbytery.

The Executive Presbytery shall consist of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, General Secretary, together with six other brethren to be chosen from the active fellowship, six of these brethren to be resident and three to be non-resident at headquarters. (Amendment 1933.)

3. General Presbytery.

The General Presbytery shall be composed of representative men of mature experience and ability whose

lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields. Each District shall have the privilege of representation in the General Presbytery by three members, the District Superintendent together with two others who shall be elected annually at its District Council meeting and who shall take office immediately subject to the approval of the Executive Presbytery. (Amendment 1935)

ARTICLE X. DISTRICT COUNCILS

Membership of the District Council shall consist of all ordained and licensed ministers of the district, and such delegates as may be elected by assemblies to represent them in the meetings of the District Council. Such delegates shall be elected according to an agreed upon basis of representation, arranged by the Council.

The District Council shall have supervision over all the activities of the Assemblies of God in its prescribed field, except such as are agreed upon by a District Council and the General Council officials.

The District Council shall have authority to examine and to license and ordain ministers who are to become members thereof, and shall report to the office of the General Council the names of all approved licentiates.

The District Council, being the creature of the General Council and subordinate thereto, cannot be authorized, in any way, to violate the principles of the General Council constitutional agreements or its by-laws.

The District Council shall elect its own officers, and arrange for its own meetings. It shall be amenable to the General Council in matters of doctrine, and the personal conduct of ministers who are permitted to have the district endorsement.

ARTICLE XI. LOCAL ASSEMBLIES

All true Pentecostal believers associating them-

selves in local bodies as assemblies, and accepting their full personal share of responsibility for the maintenance of scriptural order in the local body, shall have a standard for membership which may be determined either by the local assembly itself, or by agreement with the District Council.

Local assemblies shall be set in order and co-operate in the work of the District. They should support the district organization and may send delegates to the District Council.

We recognize that each local assembly has the right of self-government under Jesus Christ, its living Head, and shall have the power to choose, or call its pastor, elect its official board, and transact all other business pertaining to its life as a local unit. It shall have the right to administer discipline to its members according to the Scriptures and its By-laws. It shall have the right to acquire and hold title to property in its own right, either through trustees or in its corporate name as a self-governing unit.

The fact that a local assembly is affiliated in the association of the District or General Council shall in nowise destroy its rights as above stated or interfere with its sovereignty. The local assembly shall recognize that the District or General Council has the right to approve Scriptural doctrine and conduct and to disapprove unscriptural doctrine or conduct. When in need of counsel or advice, the local assembly may appeal to the District Council for help. It may appeal from a decision by the District Council to the General Council where it may be questioned whether or not there has been proper help from the District.

Local assemblies are expected to have an interest in the missionary enterprise, and to plan for regular contribution to its support.

ARTICLE XII

Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted in writing to every District for their consideration

prior to the General Council meeting. Amendments to the Constitution shall require a two-thirds majority vote of all members present for adoption.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. PARLIAMENTARY ORDER

In order to expedite the work of the Council and to avoid confusion in its deliberations, the Council shall be governed by accepted rules of parliamentary procedure, in keeping with the spirit of Christian love and fellowship.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1: OFFICERS.

The officers of the General Council except as hereinafter provided shall be elected at one of its regular meetings, according to the manner of election as provided. They shall be chosen from the membership of the General Council, and shall be men of mature experience and ability, whose life and ministry are above question, and such qualities alone shall determine their eligibility.

Section 2: NOMINATION AND ELECTION.

(1) All candidates for office of General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, and General Secretary shall be nominated by secret ballot. A two-thirds vote of all votes cast shall be necessary to constitute an election. If no election has been declared after the third ballot has been cast, the three candidates having the highest number of votes in the last ballot cast shall be nominees to be further voted upon, and all other names shall be eliminated.

(2) Election of General Presbyters shall take place annually at the District Council meeting. (Amendment 1935)

(3) The General Presbytery shall have the right to elect resident officers at headquarters to serve on the Executive Presbytery as provided for in Arti-

cle 9, Section 2 of the Constitution. The non-resident members of the Executive Presbytery shall be nominated from the floor and shall be elected by a two-thirds vote in the same manner as provided for the presiding officers of the General Council.

(4) The Treasurer and Missionary Secretary of the General Council, Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel, President and Principal of Central Bible Institute, and other departmental heads shall be chosen by the General Presbytery. They shall be subordinate to the Executive Presbytery and amenable thereto for the proper discharge of their duties. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 3: VOTING CONSTITUENCY

The voting constituency shall consist of all accredited members, present and registered. Voting privileges may also be extended to accredited licentiates who may be in attendance, at the discretion of the General Council.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To preside at the meetings of the Council.
2. To be the head of the General Office, and to supervise all the work of that office during the interim between sessions of the General Council. To act as President of the Corporation in all legal matters.
3. To preside at all meetings of the Credentials Committee, and to sign all credentials.
4. To preside at all sessions of the Executive Presbytery, and to receive all communications directed to that body.
5. To be general superintendent of all work on the field conducted in behalf of the fellowship, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.
6. To administer discipline in all cases when requested to do so by the Credentials Committee.

7. To perform any other functions usual and customary as presiding officer or such as may be directed by the General Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Section 2: DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

1. To assist the General Superintendent.

2. To preside at meetings in the absence of the General Superintendent.

3. To assist the General Superintendent in the general superintendence of the work on the field conducted in behalf of the General Council and its work, and to encourage Bible and Missionary Conventions throughout the country.

4. Finally, to perform any other functions under the supervision of the General Superintendent, or such as may be directed by this Council or by the Executive Presbytery.

Section 3: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY

1. The General Secretary shall make and keep true records of the proceedings of the General Council and shall publish the same as approved and directed by the Executive Presbytery.

2. He shall be custodian of the official seal of the Council and shall issue Credentials under the direction of the Credentials Committee and shall keep a record of all ministers, licentiates and assemblies in the fellowship.

3. He shall act as Secretary of the Executive Presbytery and the General Presbytery, and shall keep accurate minutes of the deliberations of these bodies.

4. He shall be authorized to sign all official and legal documents and to perform such other functions as are customary or as may be directed by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

5. He shall act as Secretary of the Credentials Committee and shall be considered as ex-officio member of all other committees.

Section 4. DUTIES OF THE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

1. To act as head of the Missionary Department under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

2. To keep a record of all decisions of the Missionary Committee and of all official acts of the Missionary Department.

3. To conduct all correspondence with prospective Missionaries and with those already out on the field.

4. To conduct the Missionary columns in the Pentecostal Evangel from Missionary letters and reports.

5. To represent the General Council in all relationships with governments or authorities where our Missionary work is involved.

6. To direct the Missionary activities of the fellowship under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

7. To distribute all Missionary funds as directed by the donors or by the Missionary Committee.

8. To keep such records of all funds received and disbursed as will safeguard the funds from loss en route to the field.

9. To acknowledge in the Pentecostal Evangel all funds received for Missionary work.

10. To conduct all correspondence.

11. To act as purchasing agent for Missionary supplies under the supervision of the Missionary Committee.

12. To perform such other functions as may be directed by the Missionary Committee.

Section 5: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

1. To be custodian of all General Council funds.

2. He shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, conducting the work of his office according to accepted business methods.

3. He shall give a report from time to time as may be requested by the General Council or the Executive Presbytery.

4. He shall give bond to the amount of \$10,000. The treasurer's books shall be audited by outside public audit once a year.

5. He shall perform such other functions as are customary to his office or as may be directed by the Council or the Executive Presbytery.

Section 6: DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE PRESBYTERY

The Executive Presbytery shall act as trustees of this fellowship and shall have general oversight of the activities and departments of the same during the interim between General Council sessions, unless the General Council shall make other provision. It shall be authorized to act for the fellowship in all matters that affect its interests while the General Council is not in session and shall make report to the General Council of its activities in behalf of the fellowship as may be directed. It shall provide for its own meetings and its decisions shall be final unless reversed by the General Council.

In all matters of great importance, the Executive Presbytery shall communicate with the members of the General Presbytery before any final action shall be taken.

Section 7: DUTIES OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTERY

(1) The General Presbytery shall be empowered to act in all matters pertaining to foreign missionary and ministerial relationships, and all matters which pertain to the proper functioning of the departments and institutions in the fellowship. It shall constitute an advisory body to the Executive Presbytery. All decisions pertaining to constitutional order or fundamental doctrines shall be referred by it to the General Council for ratification in the manner provided in the General Council constitution.

(2) The General Presbytery shall also act as a Court of Appeal for the reviewing of testimony given in missionary and ministerial trials. Its decisions shall be final. (Amendment 1933.)

ARTICLE IV

Section 1: STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing committees shall be established or appointed as necessity may indicate. They shall be appointed by the General Superintendent in co-operation with the Executive Presbytery, and the term of office shall continue from the date of appointment to the adjournment of the next regular meeting of the General Council, unless otherwise instructed by the Council.

Section 2: CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Such members of the Executive Presbytery as may reside at headquarters shall constitute a Credentials Committee. They shall have authority to issue certificates of ordination to approved ministers, who have District Council endorsement, and to issue annual fellowship certificates.

Section 3: ROSTER COMMITTEE

A Roster Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Presbytery prior to each meeting of the General Council. This Committee shall be expected to open the Roster on the morning of the day preceding the convening of the General Council. It shall be entrusted with responsibility of examining all credentials and recognition of all delegates. Ordained ministers shall identify themselves by fellowship certificates of the current year; delegates from assemblies shall obtain letters from their church secretary or pastor certifying to their appointment by the assembly to represent it in the General Council. Suitable badges shall be issued by the Committee to all qualified delegates and ministers, such badges to indicate the classification of ordained ministers, foreign missionaries, district licentiates, lay delegates from assemblies, visitors, etc.

The Roster shall be open for enrollment during the entire meeting of the General Council and the Roster Committee shall render such reports as may be called for by the action of the Council. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 4: SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Special committees may be created at the General Council in session, or by the Executive Presbytery between sessions as may be required to facilitate its work.

ARTICLE V. MINISTRY

Section 1: MINISTRY DESCRIBED

Elders who are persons of mature experience and qualifications, able to undertake the responsibilities of the full-gospel ministry.

Licentiates who are beginners; who give evidence of being called of God; and who devote themselves to a purpose to become elders (1 Tim. 3:10-13).

Women may be ordained in any degree except eldership and be licensed to preach as provided for men.

Section 2: QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications for recognition as an elder must be in accord with the New Testament scriptures, which provide the necessary guidance in the matter of such recognition (1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1:7-9).

Qualifications for licentiates shall be:

First: Clear evidences of a divine call; a practical experience in preaching; together with an evident purpose to devote their time to preaching the gospel.

Second: Conformity to such provisions as are made for them by the General Council in reading courses and other training.

Section 3: LICENSE TO PREACH

Licenses to preach shall be granted by the District Council to properly qualified applicants.

Section 4: ORDINATIONS

(a) Applicants for ordination who shall have met the necessary requirements shall appear before the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside. All ordinations shall take place under the auspices of the District Council. No minister shall be ordained to the office of an elder until he shall have held a license to preach and shall have been engaged in the active work of the ministry as a pastor or evangelist at least two full consecutive years.

Ordination of Women

(b) The Scriptures plainly teach that while there is a difference between the ministry of men and of women in the church, that divinely called and qualified women may also serve the church in the ministry of the Word. Women who may have demonstrated a distinct ministry of evangelism and who have met the requirements of District Councils may be licensed to preach the Word. Matured women of not less than twenty-five years of age who have developed in the ministry of the Word so that their ministry is acceptable generally and who have proved their qualifications in actual service and who have met all the requirements of the Credentials Committees of the District Councils may be ordained to the ministry of the gospel and may serve either as evangelists or as pastors as their qualifications warrant. The right to administer the ordinances of the church, when such acts are necessary, shall be included in the ordination. (Amendment 1935)

Section 5: CERTIFICATES

Ordination papers with the accompanying fellowship certificates shall be issued by the General Credentials Committee from the Executive office.

Section 6: MINISTERIAL RELATION

All ministers, both ordained and licensed, shall be amenable to both the District and General Councils in matters of doctrine and conduct.

All ministers, ordained and licensed, shall be expected to affiliate with the District Council within the boundaries of which they reside, and to work in co-operation with the same. They shall be expected to co-operate with other District Councils in which they may labor temporarily.

Section 7: TRIALS AND APPEALS

Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in the trial of members. Trials shall be granted for willful violation of Council principles, wrong doctrine, or misconduct.

Reports or Rumors of Misconduct

It shall be the duty of the District Officiary to investigate any report of misconduct on the part of a minister or missionary to determine its importance to the Council fellowship. Effort shall be made to determine the source of the report or rumor and the persons involved shall be interviewed with a view to arriving at the facts in the case and ascertaining the reasons underlying the persistence of the report.

Charges

In case the report of misconduct appears to have foundation in fact and cannot be dealt with privately to the satisfaction of all concerned, the District Officiary shall arrange to have charges preferred by the original complainants, such charges to be made in writing and to describe fully every phase of the alleged misconduct. The charges shall be made in triplicate, one copy to be given the person whose conduct is under question, one copy to be retained by the District Superintendent, and one copy forwarded to the General Council Credentials Committee at headquarters. If the alleged offense shall occur in any District other than the one in which the minister under question is a member, a copy of the charges shall also be filed with the Superintendent of the home District.

All charges made against a minister or missionary shall be signed by the person or persons making such charges of misconduct, provided, however, that when the District Officiary feel such should be made and no one appears to sign them, the members of the District Officiary making the investigation may prefer charges based upon the reports in their possession.

Preliminary Hearing

The party whose character or ministry is in question shall have the right to a preliminary hearing before the District Officiary, and the result of such hearing shall determine whether or not the case should go to trial. No minister or missionary shall be adjudged guilty of misconduct upon the grounds of an unproven report or charge, but shall have the right to a fair and impartial trial before a tribunal made up of his or her brethren in the District, such trial to be conducted as hereinafter provided.

Notice of Trial

Preceding the trial of any member of the General Council, good and sufficient notice shall be given the accused and sufficient time allowed to make all necessary arrangements for the trial. Such notice of trial shall be accompanied by the copy of charges in writing signed by the complaining parties or by the District Officiary as provided above. Such notice and charges shall be forwarded by the District Officiary only, and the minister shall be recognized as suspended and required to surrender his current fellowship certificate to be retained by the District Officiary until the case has been tried and judgment was been rendered.

The time and place for the trial shall be determined by the District Officiary, the convenience of the various participants to be fully considered in connection therewith. Trials shall be held at a place convenient to the location where the facts in the case are available. In case the alleged offense occurs in a District

to which the member does not belong, right of trial may be granted the District in which the alleged offense occurred, and shall be considered as providing the accused such rights and privileges as provided by the General Council.

No hearing shall be reported as a trial unless the accused be present and be allowed all rights and privileges granted by the General Council constitution; provided, however, an accused member may be disciplined as guilty of charges preferred, if he or she refuses to appear for trial, or proof is made that there has been on the part of the accused wilful neglect to take advantage of their rights and privileges of trial in the case.

The Trial

The trial shall be presided over by the District Superintendent or an Executive or General Presbyter of the General Council. No person known to be prejudiced toward the case shall be considered qualified to preside. A group of ordained ministers, not less than six or more than ten, shall hear the case and serve as a jury.

An ordained minister resident in the District in good standing in the General Council shall be chosen by the District Officiary to conduct the case for the District. The accused may conduct his or her own case, or may have the assistance of another ordained minister of good standing in his or her District who shall be recognized as counsel for the defense and shall be allowed to act within the limits of such capacity.

Report of Trial

Provision shall be made by the District Officiary for making a stenographic record of the trial, and the accused may have an assistant to keep a record for the convenience of the defense. The record made by the District's stenographer shall be the official record and shall be kept on file in the District office for future reference. A certified copy of all such records shall be

forwarded to the General Council Credentials Committee at headquarters and become a part of the records of the Executive office.

Trials shall be conducted in all fairness to all concerned, as becometh brethren in the ministry. No discourtesy to any one is to be allowed. Counsel in the case must conduct the trial subject to the rulings of the presiding officer. When objections to such rulings are made, they may be written into the record, but the ruling shall stand for the trial.

Witnesses

Witnesses shall be free to testify under the direction of counsel without interruption by others. Witnesses shall not be required to answer questions asked by others than the one presiding or the counsel who is at the time conducting the inquiry.

No undue influence or unfair means shall be allowed to affect the testimony of witnesses. Opportunity for cross-examination of witnesses shall be given as the case proceeds.

Accusation does not imply guilt, but may imply a misunderstanding or wrong information. It is, therefore, agreed that the purpose of the trial of a member of the Council is to arrive at all available facts relative to the case rather than the conviction of the accused.

Order of Trial

The plaintiff side of the case, including all testimony intended to prove the charges made against the accused, shall be presented first. No testimony except such as refers to some part of the charges or has a helpful bearing on the case, shall be allowed.

Depositions taken by authorized persons may be used in place of personal testimony and shall become a part of the record of the trial. Such depositions must be signed by the witness and attested before two ordained ministers in good standing in the General Council.

The Defense

The defense shall be allowed time and opportunity

to present its side of the case and shall be granted all due respect and sympathy.

Defense testimony should be confined to disproving the charges and must not include countercharges against any, or offer the attitude or conduct of others as reason or excuse for the reported misconduct.

Reasonable opportunity shall be given for testimony as to the character of the accused, but such testimony shall not be accepted as proof that the charges upon which the trial is based are untrue.

When the defense has rested, the case may be reviewed by counsel for both sides and testimony in rebuttal shall be allowed if deemed relevant by the one presiding.

Judgment in the case shall be rendered solely in accord with the testimony. The case shall be given to the group called to act as a jury with proper instructions by the one presiding over the trial. Such instruction shall be confined to setting forth the true basis of judgment in the case as represented by the evidence and shall in no wise seek to prejudice the jury. The verdict rendered shall conclude the trial.

All trials shall be conducted within the District to which the minister belongs or in the district where the alleged offense occurred. In the case of missionaries, where there is no District Council, trial shall be arranged and conducted as authorized by the Missionary Department.

Appeals

Appeals from the decision of a District in matters affecting a member's standing in the Council fellowship as a result of trial may be made only upon the ground of mistrial, that is, error in either arrangement for trial or method of conducting the same. Appeal shall be made to the Executive Presbytery at headquarters and notice of such appeal shall be made in writing addressed to the General Superintendent. A copy of the notice of appeal shall be given the District Superintendent, and such notice shall be given

and appeal made within thirty days after the termination of the District trial.

Cases Appealed

Appeal from the District trial cannot result in a retrial at headquarters. It shall be the duty of the Executive Presbytery to review the case, carefully examining the official record of trial furnished by the District. In case the Executive Presbytery shall find sufficient error in arranging for or conducting the trial in the District, it shall be the right of that body to which the appeal has been made to reverse the decision or the case may be referred back to the District, accompanied by findings of the Executive Presbytery, with instructions to the District Officiary outlining proper procedure, and the case shall be retried in the District.

When exceptions are taken to the decisions of the Executive Presbytery, either by the accused member or by the District Officiary, appeal may be taken to the General Presbytery, procedure in such cases to conform to that in making appeal from the District trial to the Executive Presbytery.

Decisions of the General Presbytery in such cases shall be based upon the records of trial and review of the Executive Presbytery. No person or persons shall have the right to introduce testimony or new evidence at a review of a tried case. All such evidence or testimony must be presented in retrials by the District.

New Trial

In the event that after final decision has been rendered, new evidence is presented to the Executive Presbytery of the General Council which in their judgment is sufficient to warrant a new trial, such new trial shall be authorized. (1935)

Section 8: OFFICIAL LIST

An official list of all ordained ministers shall be compiled by the Credentials Committee of the General Council and published for the convenience of all con-

cerned. The list shall show whether or not each minister is giving full time to his or her ministry. This official list shall be revised annually, and certificates of fellowship issued to all who are in full fellowship with us.

Section 9: EXPIRATION OF FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

Inasmuch as all fellowship certificates expire on the 31st day of August of each year, all who shall have failed to renew their fellowship certificates on or before October 1st, or who shall have failed to indicate their purpose to do so, shall be considered as delinquents whose names shall not appear on the ministerial list to be mailed to the clergy bureaus.

ARTICLE VI. FOREIGN MISSIONS POLICY

Section 1: MISSIONARY PURPOSE

1. The Assemblies of God shall assume responsibility, and do all within its power for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

2. The Pauline example shall be followed as far as possible by seeking out neglected regions where the Gospel has not been preached, as well as by establishing self-supporting, self-governing, self-propagating native churches.

3. In fields where Pentecostal missionaries are already stationed, consultation shall be had with the brethren on the field and the Missionary Department, and a satisfactory plan agreed upon before an attempt shall be made to establish new stations in such localities.

4. Every Assembly shall be encouraged to assume definite responsibility for full or partial support of one or more missionaries in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department.

Section 2: MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

1. The Missionary Department shall consist of the Missionary Secretary and four others, appointed by the Superintendent subject to the approval of the Gen-

eral Presbytery, who together shall comprise the Missionary Committee. All the activities of the Missionary Department shall be carried on under the supervision of the Executive Presbytery to which the Missionary Department shall be amenable.

2. All the Missionary interests of our fellowship shall be consigned to the management of the Missionary Department in co-operation with the District Council on the field.

Section 3: MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

1. The selection and appointment of missionaries shall be the prerogative of the Missionary Committee.

2. The Missionary Committee shall be governed in its selection and appointment of missionaries by the following requirements. Each applicant shall be examined—

(a) As to personal experience of full New Testament salvation.

(b) As to a definite call to foreign work.

(c) As to physical, mental and spiritual fitness for work.

(d) As to Christian standing and general qualifications, it being required that each applicant seeking appointment first secure the endorsement of his local Assembly and District Council.

(e) Young men shall not be granted missionary appointment until they have first qualified for ordination in the homeland, and lady candidates shall prove their ministry and stability of character by a similar probationary period of service in the homeland. (Amendment 1933.)

3. Prospective missionaries shall be expected to exercise faith in God to provide their outfit and fare to the field as far as practicable.

4. Funds provided for prospective missionaries who shall for any reason be prevented from going to the field shall be remitted to their respective donors unless by the consent of said donors they can be made

available for other missionaries or missionary purposes.

5. All persons making application for appointment as missionaries shall be expected to meet the requirements of the Missionary Department.

6. The Missionary Department shall confine its missionary activities within the limits of its resources and shall not accept and send out missionaries until the condition of its finances fully warrant such action.

7. Each missionary shall be expected to devote two full years to language study, if necessary, before taking up his full active work. Courses of study with examinations shall be arranged by an advisory committee on each field. Failure on the part of any missionary to obtain a working knowledge of the language during his first term shall furnish ample ground upon which to question his fitness for a second term.

Section 4: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARIES

1. The undesignated funds sent to the Foreign Missions Department shall be distributed to those who have received the appointment of the Missionary Committee and are in harmony with our Statement of Fundamentals. All funds assigned to particular persons shall be forwarded by the Foreign Missions Department exactly as directed.

2. It is recommended that all missionaries send a report of moneys received and submit a budget of expenses to the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent upon the Foreign Missions Department to send of its undesignated funds to missionaries who do not furnish such a report.

3. Missionaries expecting the endorsement and aid of the Foreign Missions Department shall report to the Missionary Committee and receive its approval before leaving this country. The Missionary Committee shall assume no responsibility whatever, where the foregoing requirements are not complied with. Funds designated for missionaries whose names do

not appear on our list will be gladly forwarded by the Missionary Department.

4. It is recommended that Districts endorsing candidates for missionary appointment assume as far as is practicable responsibility for their support. (Amendment 1933.)

Section 5: ORDINATION OF MISSIONARIES

Resolved, That in the future the matter of the ordination of missionaries under appointment of the Missionary Department be determined on the basis of their qualifications for ordination rather than on the basis of their appointment. (1931.)

Section 6: FELLOWSHIP CERTIFICATES

1. The Foreign Missions Department shall renew the Fellowship Certificates of all foreign missionaries in good standing on or before the first of the year without cost to the missionaries.

This requirement on the part of the Missionary Department shall be contingent upon the missionary's filling out in ample time the questionnaire provided by the Department and sending same to the home office.

2. Each missionary shall file with the Foreign Missions Department a full statement regarding his work, e. g., concerning his family and accommodations, period of service, language qualifications, nature of work engaged in, prospects of the field, present number of recognized adherents, etc.

Section 7: DISTRICT COUNCILS

1. District Councils shall be formed on the field where there are sufficient missionaries and trustworthy ordained native preachers, provided the approval of the Missionary Department shall first have been secured. Where numbers are not sufficient to warrant the formation of a District Council, the missionary shall be amenable directly to the Foreign Missions Department. (1931)

2. It shall be considered the duty of the various District Councils on the foreign field to co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in maintaining a high standard of Christian character and work in the interests of greater efficiency.

Section 8: PROPERTY

1. All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible.

No funds shall be made available for missionary homes, stations, schools, etc., until adequate and proper safeguards, such as complying with the laws of the respective countries for the legal holding of property and such as establishing and maintaining a proper relationship between these missionary projects and the Foreign Missions Department, shall have been provided.

2. Missionaries contemplating the purchase of property or erection of buildings should co-operate with the District Council on the field, and secure their endorsement before submitting their proposition to the Foreign Missions Department.

3. Whereas, In our Foreign Missions Policy it has been resolved that "All missionary property shall be held by the General Council wherever legally possible," and,

Whereas, At the present time the Foreign Missions Department for lack of information on file is unable to give accurate advice concerning many of the properties purchased on the foreign field through the offerings of our fellowship, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That a copy of the property deeds, titles, and other legal papers relating to all missionary properties which have been purchased shall be forwarded to the Foreign Missions Department for file.

Section 9: NATIVE WORKERS

1. It is recommended that great care be exercised

in the selection of native workers, and that no worker be engaged who does not manifest a real consecration to the cause of Christ.

2. No offerings for the support of native workers shall be sent direct to the natives, but to the missionary representatives of the General Council. (Amendment 1929.)

Section 10: FURLOUGHS

1. Missionaries while home on furlough shall be considered as on vacation. It will be expected, however, that they shall co-operate with the home office in the interests of the work as far as possible.

2. The period and frequency of furloughs shall be governed by the recommendation of the District Council on the respective fields in co-operation with the Foreign Missions Department. It shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to grant a furlough allowance to missionaries who return to the homeland without first having an understanding with the District Council on the field.

3. When missionaries do not intend to return to the field or for any reason are not recommended for further service, it shall not be incumbent on the Foreign Missions Department to continue their allowance for more than six months after their return to their homeland, except in cases of ill health or because of the infirmities of age.

4. All missionaries who have arranged to return to the home field shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department where there is no District Council on the field, in making arrangements for a supply to take charge of their work or station and shall co-operate with the Foreign Missions Department in securing and forwarding funds for the maintenance of such work or station during their absence.

5. All missionaries who shall have completed a satisfactory term of service shall be eligible for reappointment for another term.

Section 11: SUPPORT OF MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT.

The Missionary Secretary shall from time to time prepare and send to each pastor information setting forth the financial needs of the Missions Department that the efficient administration of the department be not hindered through lack of funds. It is also requested that each pastor enlighten his assembly concerning the need of supporting the Missions Department, and an offering toward upkeep of this Department is recommended when sending missionary offerings. (Amendment 1933.)

ARTICLE VII. HOME MISSIONS

The fields everywhere are ripe for harvest, but the laborers are few. If we fail to speed up our program of home field evangelization the loss will be appalling. Our Lord's "Go ye" applies no less to the fields lying at our doors than to distant parts of the earth.

Whereas, We have the men and the means to accomplish at least twice as much as we are now doing, and the strengthening of the work at home is the only way we can enlarge our work abroad, and the urgency of the command of our Lord, and the crying need everywhere will not permit us to be indifferent or inactive; therefore be it

RESOLVED:

1. That the Executive Presbytery devise plans for opening up new work in neglected strategic points, so far as possible, and that they consider the advisability of appointing such field workers as in their wisdom may be deemed necessary.

2. That each District Superintendent use all the available resources for evangelizing his own district.

3. That so far as practicable each District Council raise funds and put one or more missionaries or evangelists to work in co-operation with the District Council, and that the Council foster the new works started till such time as each may become able to support a pastor.

4. That each and every District Superintendent submit in writing to our General Secretary his policy for evangelization and field extension, or Home Missionary work being promoted in his district, and tell what activities have been recently put into execution in his district (for this purpose). These reports to be used for the purpose of comparing methods of labor and the discovery of the most practical ways of carrying on the work.

5. That every pastor recognize his responsibility for the evangelization of his own parish and the regions contiguous to his city or town; that he make a careful survey of the needs and the opportunities of his field; that he look in his own assembly for competent workers now idle who can be pushed out into needy fields; that he encourages the formation of Gospel Teams which can carry the gospel to outstations and destitute places: that Sunday schools and prayer meetings and street meetings be held, and all other scriptural means be used for establishing and enlarging the work.

6. That all our good evangelists may be kept busy in fields new and old, and that District Superintendents and pastors co-operate with them, so far as practicable; be it further

7. Resolved, That we work for a largely increased circulation of The Pentecostal Evangel and the liberal use of our own tracts and books, realizing their usefulness in the extension of the Lord's work.

8. Finally, we recommend that all our people devote much time to earnest prayer for the workers now in the field, and for the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth new laborers both at home and abroad.

ARTICLE VIII. MEXICAN MISSIONS

Section 1:

The General Council shall recognize and encourage the Mexican Missions work carried on along the American border line and in Mexico.

Section 2:

The Missionary Department, at the discretion of the Missionary Committee, shall appropriate a proportionate share of the undesignated funds for the Mexican work.

ARTICLE IX. INSTITUTIONS

Section 1:

(a) The General Council shall recognize the need of practical training of prospective ministers and missionaries. It shall be in hearty sympathy with every effort to provide such training where the standards of teaching and discipline maintained in the school are satisfactory.

(b) The General Council shall encourage the further development of the Central Bible Institute, together with such other schools as may meet the required standard as set by the Central Bible Institute and become affiliated with the General Council through the District Council in which located.

(c) The General Council shall have some representation upon the directorate of the schools. It shall have a voice in determining the standards of teaching and policy of management through the District Council in which such schools are located.

(d) The examinations, reports, certificates, and diplomas, given by affiliated schools shall be on an equality with the Central Bible Institute in the matter of credits and conditions.

(e) All graduates of such affiliated schools as shall have met these requirements shall be considered as on a par with the graduates of the Central Bible Institute.

Section 2: CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE MANAGEMENT

(a) The General Council shall control and manage the Central Bible Institute through a directorate appointed by the Executive Presbytery.

(b) The directorate shall shape the policy, arrange its curriculum, provide the faculty, and have general supervision over the school.

Section 3: OTHER INSTITUTIONS

(a) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of homes for the aged, for children, and for retired ministers and missionaries.

(b) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of academic schools for the children of our constituency.

(c) The General Council shall encourage the opening and maintenance of Sunday Schools throughout the fellowship.

(d) The General Council shall be in sympathy with the establishment and maintenance of missionary schools on the various mission fields where practicable for the training of native workers, and schools for the education of the young children of missionaries.

ARTICLE X

Section 1: PUBLICATIONS

The Pentecostal Evangel shall be the official organ of the General Council of the Assemblies of God, and shall be published in the interest of our fellowship and for the further propagation of our distinctive testimony. The Editor of the Pentecostal Evangel shall be chosen by the Executive Presbytery, said choice subject to ratification by the General Presbytery. The Executive Presbytery shall have authority to publish Sunday-school literature, children's books and papers, etc., together with such other literature, including periodicals and books, as may be decided upon.

Section 2: PUBLISHING HOUSE

The Publishing House and its equipment shall be developed as its business shall expand and funds may be available therefor.

Section 3: MANAGEMENT

The management of the Publishing House, with its

various publications and business interests, shall be vested in the Executive Presbytery, who shall provide such personnel as may be required to supervise and carry on its work.

ARTICLE XI. VIOLATIONS OF MINISTERIAL COURTESY

All discourteous conduct is disapproved and all ministers are advised against interfering with pastors in charge of assemblies, whether it be by going in upon their work without consent or by such correspondence with members of the assembly as will hurt the influence of the leader. All correspondence which concerns the whole assembly, shall be addressed to the one in charge and not to private members. Where there is no pastor, letters concerning the work shall be addressed to the officers of an assembly.

Any minister who so offends shall be subjected to Scriptural treatment as an offender by the District Council, or if there be none, by the Executive Presbytery of the General Council. Such discourtesy will seriously affect the granting of annual Fellowship Certificates and may be the basis of their recall.

ARTICLE XII. DISCIPLINE OF MEMBERS

Occasions sometimes arise which make it necessary to deal with ministers who are affiliated with us and whose ministry may have ceased to be effective, or who for some reason may seem to have reached a place where in the judgment of the brethren the tie of Council fellowship should be dissolved.

Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in this matter. It is understood that in case the officary of a District Council shall recommend that Council fellowship be withdrawn from a minister or his name dropped from the roll of Council ministers, such recommendation to the Executive Presbytery shall set forth in writing satisfactory reasons for the action. A copy of the recommendation shall also be placed in

the hands of the minister that is involved. If there be no protest to this action, the Executive Presbytery shall comply with the request of the District. In case the accused shall file a protest with the Executive Presbytery within thirty days after date of notice of dismissal, the Executive Presbytery shall remand the case back to the District for trial. In this event, all the provisions for the trials of ministers shall be complied with. (Amendment 1935)

ARTICLE XIII. ORDER OF BUSINESS

The regular order of business for the Council Meeting shall be:

1. Appointment of Roster Committee.
2. Report of Roster Committee.
3. Report of the General Superintendent.
4. Report of Secretary.
5. Report of Treasurer.
6. Committee Reports.
7. Unfinished business.
8. Election of Officers.
9. New Business.
10. Adjournment.

All business sessions of the Council shall commence with prayer.

ARTICLE XIV. FINANCE

The work of the General Council in its definite program of development of the spirit of co-operation and fellowship in home and foreign fields incurs considerable expense, including financial support of the General Superintendent, Assistant General Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and such other help as may be needed, in maintaining headquarters, purchasing stationery and postage, and defraying traveling expenses, etc.

Therefore, every minister in the fellowship shall recognize his obligation to contribute from his tithes or as an offering, or through his influence, the sum of one dollar per month. And further, looking to-

wards the increased efficiency of the fellowship throughout the entire field, all who can contribute more, personally or through their assemblies, than the suggested amount, are hereby strongly urged to do so. If practicable, let each assembly take one offering each year for the upkeep of the General Council office and traveling expenses.

ARTICLE XV. MILITARY SERVICE

While recognizing Human Government as of Divine ordination and affirming our unswerving loyalty to the Government of the United States, nevertheless we are constrained to define our position with reference to the taking of human life.

Whereas, We as followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, believe in implicit obedience to the Divine commands and precepts which instruct us to "Follow peace with all men" (Heb. 12:14), "Thou shalt not kill" (Ex. 20:13), "Resist not evil" (Matt. 5:39), "Love your enemies" (Matt. 5:44), etc., and

Whereas, These and other scriptures have always been accepted and interpreted by our churches as prohibiting Christians from shedding blood or taking human life; and

Whereas, We, as a body of Christians, while purposing to fulfill all the obligations of loyal citizenship, are nevertheless constrained to declare we can not conscientiously participate in war and armed resistance which involves the actual destruction of human life, since this is contrary to our view of the clear teachings of the inspired Word of God, which is the sole basis of our faith. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the General Council hereby declares its unswerving loyalty to our government and to its Chief Executive, and that we hereby restate our fixed purpose to assist in every way morally possible, consistent with our faith. (Reaffirmed 1927.)

ARTICLE XVI

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES

Whereas, The Scriptures are being fulfilled that

"in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy . . . and on My servants and on My handmaidens I will pour out in those days of My Spirit, and they shall prophesy"; and

Whereas, Our young people who are being saved and filled with the Holy Spirit and inspired with love to God and zeal for His service comprise the source from which shall be derived our future ministers, evangelists and missionaries, and they should be encouraged in any activities which may tend to develop them in Christian experience and service, and

Whereas, There now exist in various sections of the United States organizations comprising local and District groups of young people who feel the urge of the Holy Spirit both to meet together in Christian fellowship and to actively engage in the promulgation of the full gospel message by all available means in co-operation with other bodies of like nature and purpose; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this General Council hereby approve of all efforts which are now in existence or which may hereafter be instituted in behalf of our young people, provided such efforts fully comply with the constitutional principles of co-operative fellowship and unity of the Assemblies of God, to wit:

Section 1:

All local young people's organizations shall be considered as a branch of the local church work, under the general supervision of the pastor, whose counsel, advice and direction shall be respected in all activities which affect the relationship of the organization to the church and its activities in service.

The local young people may elect their own officers, subject to the approval of the pastor and the Church Board, and may conduct their own services provided such services do not conflict with, nor detract from, the regular services of the church.

The pastor shall be considered as an honorary mem-

ber of the organization and an ex-officio member of all its committees, and should be respected and honored as a shepherd and guide in all matters of service and fellowship.

The activities of the young people may include:

- (a) Bible Training Classes (the Correspondence Courses of the Central Bible Institute being recommended for this purpose).
- (b) Prayer Meetings in the church or elsewhere which have the approval of the pastor and which will tend to build up the work of the church as a whole.
- (c) Other activities, such as street work, jail services, hospital visitation, ministration to invalids, the sick and shut-ins, tract distribution, etc.

Section 2:

Groups of local organizations may be formed into State or District organizations, with the approval of the officary of the District Councils involved. The State or District organization shall be governed by the principles of co-operative fellowship and shall be considered as a branch or department of the District Council. The District Council officary shall be considered as the honorary membership of the District organization and shall be honored and respected in all matters affecting the activities of the organization. The District organization shall have the right to elect its own officers and to supervise its own activities within the boundaries of the territory involved. The superintendent of the District Council shall be an ex-officio member of all District committees. (1927)

Section 3: DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

Inasmuch as young people's state or district organizations have been authorized by the General Council resolutions; therefore: BE IT RESOLVED: That we continue such district organization with the following recommendations:

1. That the young people's President shall be an ordained minister.

2. That the manner of the election of the President by the young people's organization shall be subject to the approval of the District Council.

3. That a constitution and by-laws covering the activities of the district organization shall be submitted to and approved by the District Presbytery with a view of standardizing such constitutions with those of other districts.

4. The President of the district organization shall be subject to call by the District Presbytery for consultation in matters pertaining to young people.

5. Sectional meetings of the district organization shall be strictly spiritual in character and arranged through the cooperation of the pastors and young people's leaders in each section, taking care not to conflict with other local or district meetings.

6. That we disapprove of any attempt to effect a national organization of the young people at this Council.

7. That in the future the matter of organization of young people in a district in which such organization does not now exist shall receive the approval of the District Council before being effective. (1931)

ARTICLE XVII

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting of the General Council. Amendments to be adopted shall require a majority of all votes cast.

ESSENTIAL RESOLUTIONS

DIVORCE AND REMARRIAGE

First. There are now among Christian people those who became entangled in their marriage relations in their former lives of sin, and who do not see how these matters can be adjusted. We recommend that these cases be left in the hands of the Lord, and that they walk in the light as God lets it shine on their souls.

Second. Low standards on marriage and divorce are very hurtful to individuals, to the family, and to the cause of Christ, therefore we discourage divorce by all lawful means and teaching. We positively disapprove of Christians getting divorce for any cause except for fornication and adultery (Matt. 19:9); and recommend the remaining single of all divorced Christians, and that they pray God so to keep them in purity and peace. (See 1 Cor. 7).

Third. Since divorced and remarried persons in the ministry usually cause stumbling, reproach and division, whatever may have been the cause of divorce, we disapprove of District Councils ordaining or licensing to the gospel ministry those who have remarried and are now living in a state of matrimony while former companions are living (Ezek. 44:22). (Amendment 1931)

Fourth. As a means of making the above more effective, we disapprove of any General Council minister performing a marriage ceremony for any who have been divorced and whose former companion is still living. We also warn that any minister of our fellowship who performs such a ceremony, unless he is innocently deceived into doing the same, may be dismissed from the Council. (Amendment 1933.)

PAYING TITHES

We recognize the duty of tithing and we urge all our people to pay tithes to God.

According to the Scriptures tithes should be used for the support of the active ministry and for the propagation of the Gospel and work of the Lord in general and not given to charity or used for other purposes. All ministers should be tithers, practicing what they preach. (Reaffirmed 1931.)

Regarding our basis of fellowship in reference to tithe paying, WHEREAS the basis of our fellowship is that of voluntary cooperation, THEREFORE BE

IT RESOLVED that making the paying of tithes into the District Treasury, by the ministry a basis of fellowship be disapproved. (Amendment 1931)

TRANSFERRING FROM ONE DISTRICT TO ANOTHER

Resolved, That we recommend that our District Councils refrain from ordaining to the ministry any preacher who may have been licensed in another District until such licentiate shall have resided in the District in which he is seeking ordination at least one year and shall have met the requirements of the District granting him a license, and until endorsement be secured from the officary of the district in which the candidate was licensed. (1933.)

CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER

Resolved, That a certificate of transfer be issued to all workers who are leaving their home district to permanently locate in another district, and that the General Council office be instructed to prepare a suitable form. (1931) (This certificate can be secured from the Gospel Publishing House.)

REINSTATEMENT OF MINISTERS

Resolved, That we recommend that hereafter when a minister connected with our fellowship shall have been dropped from our rolls or shall have ceased to be connected with us by virtue of having become identified with another organization, or for any other cause, and shall apply to be reinstated, he shall in no case be eligible for reinstatement until at least six months shall have elapsed after he has been removed from our list of ministers. The Credentials Committee of the General Council may also hold the matter in abeyance until the next session of the General Council in order that the General Presbytery may have the opportunity to review the case, in which event the matter of reinstatement of such minister shall be left entirely with that body. (1931 and 1935)

AFFILIATING WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Resolved, That when any of our ministers shall identify themselves with other organizations granting ministerial credentials and shall have received such credentials, we shall regard their affiliation with this body as having ceased, and that they be requested to return to headquarters the credentials issued by our Executive Office.

ATTITUDE TOWARD THOSE REMOVED FROM COUNCIL FELLOWSHIP

Whereas, In our Constitutional Declaration we have included this prerogative, "To disapprove unscriptural methods, doctrine, and conduct," and have provided adequate safeguards in the By-Laws by arranging for appeals from local and District decisions, thus guaranteeing fair and impartial consideration of all matters affecting standing and fellowship; therefore, in order to render effective decisions made in the interest of proper discipline among the ministry and for the protection of our assemblies, be it

Resolved, That decisions arrived at after investigation and consideration of all facts by those qualified to act in such cases according to our co-operative agreements shall be by all considered just and final; and be it further

Resolved, That all ordained and licensed preachers refrain from taking any attitude toward such offenders that would tend to nullify or set at naught the solemn verdict of the brethren entrusted with this responsibility. (1927)

And be it further Resolved: In the event of a violation of this agreement the offender shall be subject to a reprimand, or such other discipline as shall be agreed upon by the officary of the District with which he is affiliated. In the event that the agreement shall be violated outside of his District the officary of the District in which the offense is committed may communicate with the Secretary at headquarters, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to notify the of-

fending brother that a repetition of the offense will seriously affect his standing as a Council minister, and, if persisted in, may result in his suspension or severance from our fellowship. (1929)

REGARDING WORLDLINESS

Inasmuch as a spirit of worldliness has been creeping into many of our assemblies and our pastors in some places meet with much opposition as they hold up Bible standards and take a stand against popular sins, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we as a body unitedly declare ourselves against all forms of worldliness, but particularly against modern immodesty and extremity in dress, and that we all agree as pastors, evangelists, licentiates, exhorters, Sunday-school superintendents and teachers, to speak the same things and voice ourselves against all forms of popular sins.

REGARDING SECRET SOCIETIES

That all ministers affiliated with us refrain from identifying themselves with any of the secret orders which we recognize as essentially of the world, worldly, and we advise any who may have identified themselves with such orders to sever their connection therewith.

GOVERNMENT OF U. S. A. REQUIREMENTS

Resolved, That whereas the government of the U. S. A. requires of headquarters a report periodically of the number of lay-members of our assemblies, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That each assembly of our General Council fellowship keep an up-to-date record of its membership and that a record of same be sent annually to the office of the General Council Secretary. (1931)

DISTRICT BOUNDARY LINES

Resolved, That in the event that Districts fail to reach an agreement relative to boundary lines, the Executive Presbytery of the General Council be authorized to set such lines, and that said Executive

Presbytery be empowered to create new Districts when and where deemed advisable, it being understood that the brethren who may be occupying such territory as new Districts are to be formed in, be consulted and their wishes given due consideration.

GENERAL PRESBYTERY MEETINGS

Resolved, That it be the sense of this General Council that there should be an annual business meeting of the General Presbytery, subject to the discretion and call of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

ARRANGEMENT FOR GENERAL COUNCIL MEETINGS

Owing to the uncertainties which the future always holds, and in consideration of our Council fellowship as a whole, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the arranging of time and place for the meetings of our General Councils be left in the hands of the Executive Presbytery. (1931)

EVANGEL MISSIONARY NUMBERS

Resolved, That we recommend that four issues of the Pentecostal Evangel each year be denominated Missionary Numbers, and that they be devoted as exclusively as may be found practicable, to the publication of missionary articles and the dissemination of missionary information.

REPORTS FOR THE EVANGEL

Whereas, Reports of meetings held and announcements of meetings to be held which are of small value as items of news and are of strictly local interest are sent to the Evangel for publication from time to time, and

Whereas, It is our desire to use all Evangel space to the best possible advantage for the glory of God, therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this General Council that the editor of the Evangel, together with the Executive Presbytery, shall be authorized to leave

out of the Evangel such reports and announcements as seem to them to be of not sufficient interest to the majority of Evangel readers to be printed.

SAFEGUARDING THE ASSEMBLIES

It is known that many unreliable and unsafe teachers and preachers go about seeking entrance into assemblies without any recommendation, therefore all pastors, workers and leaders of assemblies should make proper investigation regarding such not known to them, and the platform be denied strangers until proper recommendations be forthcoming.

The advice and counsel of the District Presbytery should be sought in such cases, and in all matters of importance when at all possible. Pastors and presbyters should notify each other, reciprocally, as to such persons when any unreliability becomes manifest.

AGAINST SETTING A TIME FOR THE LORD'S RETURN

It is unwise to teach that the Lord will come at some specified time, thereby setting a date for His appearing; and also it is unwise to give out from the platform, or publish visions of numbers and dates fixing the time of the second coming of the Lord.

HERESIES DISAPPROVED

The General Council hereby disapproves of the Seventh-day teaching, of the extreme so-called Eternal Security teaching, and of the Restitution of All Things doctrine, and those holding and agitating such teaching, thereby causing confusion and division among God's people, shall be dealt with according to Titus 3:10.

MEATS

The pressing of the question of eating, or not eating meats, is causing divisions in some of the assemblies,

Therefore, the General Council disapproves of

such extreme positions on this question which cause these divisions, and we recognize the right of each individual conscience in this matter, according to Col. 2:14-17; Rom. 14:1-23.

REGARDING PRIVATE OWNERSHIP OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS

Resolved, That we disapprove of the private ownership by members of the General or District Councils of church buildings, schools, or other institutions that are supported by funds solicited for the work of God; and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That where such private ownership exists we strongly recommend that a properly constituted incorporated body be formed and that the title to the property be transferred to such body, or that the soliciting of such funds cease.

A disregard of this attitude and recommendation of the General Council may affect the relationship to the General Council of members involved in such private ownership. (1931)

MISSIONARY CANDIDATES

Resolved, That we recommend that in selection of candidates for missionary appointment emphasis be laid by the Missionary Committee more upon fitness of the applicant than upon funds pledged toward applicant's support and that this resolution modify Article 6, Section 3, clause 6, of the By-laws. (1933.)

MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES

Resolved, That the General Council Office issue a membership certificate of proper proportions and script for framing to all churches coming into the fellowship, cost of same to be provided by the church becoming affiliated to be forwarded through the District Superintendent to the General Council Office at the time of accepting the church into the fellowship, and be it further

Resolved, That churches already affiliated be encouraged to secure such certificate. (1933)

HONORARY MEMBERS OF GENERAL PRESBYTERY

Whereas, There may be a tendency to overlook the valuable counsel of some of those who for years have been highly esteemed among us as General Presbyters, who because of age or infirmity can no longer assume the full burden of such an office, therefore be it

Resolved, That such brethren may be made honorary members of the General Presbytery by the sustaining action of the General Council, provided the General Presbytery should so recommend, and be it further

Resolved, That addition of such honorary members shall not disturb the regular number by Presbyters granted any District. (1933)

BIBLE SCHOOLS

Whereas, There are now several Bible Training Schools in our fellowship, and believing that all students should have proper training and supervision, therefore be it

RESOLVED:

1. That we place ourselves upon record as expressing our conviction that it is unwise to unduly multiply Bible schools, as such multiplication tends to make difficult, through inadequate support, the maintenance of proper standards in the curriculum and equipment of schools already established and operating among us.

2. It shall be understood that the endorsement of a Bible school by a District Council does not constitute it a General Council Institution. Any school in order to be regarded as a General Council school must have the endorsement of, and be controlled by, the General Council. Bible schools that have been endorsed and are controlled by Districts, but not by the General Council, shall be regarded as District Bible schools. Any Bible school not endorsed by a District Council shall have no recognition in notices inserted in the Pentecostal Evangel.

3. Attention is called to the fact that Central Bible

Institute is our only General Council Bible school. We place ourselves upon record as reaffirming previous declarations made concerning this institution. We have confidence in the management and the faculty and agree to stand whole-heartedly back of this school and to do all we can to promote its interests and to give to it, through proper publicity, the place it deserves in our fellowship.

4. We record our conviction that in the matter of publicity given to Bible schools in the Pentecostal Evangel the fact that Central Bible Institute is our only General Council Bible school should be borne in mind. Publicity to District schools should be stressed in the Districts and afforded through District channels. We express our conviction that only such notices concerning District Bible schools as are likely to interest our constituency as a whole should be published in the Pentecostal Evangel. (1933)

MINISTRY IN NON-COUNCIL ASSEMBLIES

Inasmuch as unity is a vital principle of the church, the condition of growth and spiritual development and power in the apostolic body, it is essential that we recognize our vital relationship to each other, and that we practice Christian co-operation in all our pastoral, evangelistic, missionary, and local church work and business. Therefore we recommend that our evangelists and pastors consult with our Council officials before putting on a campaign with a non-Council assembly in any given city, so as to ascertain whether or not such non-Council assembly is approved as to doctrinal standards and co-operative fellowship with Council assemblies, and if not approved by the District officials, they shall be expected to not hold a campaign for them. (1935.)

Minutes of the General Council

Held in Dallas, Texas

September 12 to 19, 1935

The Sixteenth Biennial Session of the General Council of the Assemblies of God convened at 9:00 a. m., Thursday, September 12, 1935, at the Fair Park Auditorium in Dallas, Texas.

The song service in the devotional period was led by Brother Wallace Bragg of Asher, Oklahoma, and Brother C. A. Lasater, Fort Smith, Arkansas, led in prayer. The meeting was opened for testimonies by the General Superintendent, E. S. Williams, after which Brother J. Roswell Flower, Assistant General Superintendent, brought the morning message, "Back to Calvary," speaking from 1 Cor. 1:17, 18. Following the morning message, the Lord poured out His Spirit upon the people, and all hearts were filled with praise and worship.

A word of welcome to the General Council was given by Brother E. L. Newby, Superintendent of the Texas District. The General Superintendent then made an announcement regarding the programs during the General Council session and read the personnel of the various committees appointed.

The reading of reports followed, Brother E. S. Williams reading the Superintendent's report, Brother Noel Perkin the Missions Department report, and Brother W. I. Evans the report of Central Bible Institute and the Gospel Publishing House. It was moved and carried that these reports be accepted as read. Attention was called to the printed financial report, this report to be presented for acceptance after the brethren had had opportunity to give it careful reading.

REPORTS BY THE VARIOUS OFFICERS OF
GENERAL COUNCIL ACTIVITIES DURING
THE PERIOD BETWEEN AUGUST 1, 1933,
AND AUGUST 1, 1935, COVERING ALL
DEPARTMENTS OF THE WORK

REPORT OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT

Desiring to read as brief a report as possible the Executive Committee at Headquarters has decided to combine all reports into one general report, recommending that those who wish to study all reports fully read the printed copies which are here for distribution.

The past two years have been years of blessing and progress throughout the fellowship and of happy harmony among those who have labored together at Headquarters.

At the close of the fiscal year 1933, there were 2,086 ordained ministers enrolled. At the close of the fiscal year 1935, there were 2,606, a gain of 520 or 24.88%. In 1933, there were 2,562 assemblies, with a combined membership of 136,705, and in 1935 there were 3,149 assemblies with a combined membership of 166,118, a gain of 587 assemblies, or 22.9%, and a gain of 29,413 members, or 21.52%.

During the past ten years the following increase of ministers is shown. September 1, 1925, there were 1155 ordained ministers; July 31, 1935, there were 2,606, a gain of 1451, or 125.63%.

During the past ten years the following increase of members is shown. September 1, 1925, there were 909 assemblies with a membership of 50,386; July 31, 1935, there were 3,149 assemblies with a membership of 166,118, a gain in assemblies of 2,240, or 246.42%, and an increase of 115,732 members, or 229.69%.

Since last General Council 667 ordained ministers have been added to our ministerial list and 147 have been removed. Of this number 58 withdrew, 24 were dropped, 33 have gone to be with the Lord, and 32 failed to renew their fellowship certificates. It is probable that most of those who have failed to renew have done so through

carelessness. Ministers often move, without giving us their change of address; others who receive the annual questionnaire neglect to return the same. It would be greatly appreciated if ministers would immediately renew their fellowship certificates upon receiving their questionnaires.

REPORT OF MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

Our missionary personnel at this time numbers 287, which is an increase of 28 over the 1933 report. These missionaries are ministering in 37 different countries and are assisted by 641 native ministers. They occupy 871 stations and outstations, where the gospel message goes forth regularly.

Seventeen of our reported missionaries are ministers of the General Council, not under regular appointment; but by the consent of the Credentials Committee are working in foreign lands under the supervision of the Missions Department. The countries in which this latter number are located are as follows: Hawaiian Islands, Samoan Islands, Philippine Islands, Manchuria, Transvaal, Cuba, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Ceylon. Another group of eleven are ministering in Eastern Europe.

Sixteen have been removed from our missionary list since the last General Council meeting, six of these having for various reasons transferred to the home ministerial list, three have died and seven were not recommended for reappointment.

Financial Report

We are glad to report a decided increase of missionary funds over that which was reported for the last Council period in that we have received for home and foreign missions \$475,957.52 in comparison with \$444,695.45 of the 1931-1933 period. Of this amount \$14,355.83 was devoted to home missions and the balance for work in foreign fields. In addition there was \$8,831.64 given for the expenses of the Missions Department and \$33,923.59 reported as given by assem-

blies direct to missionaries, making a grand total of \$518,712.75 given for the missionary enterprise during the past two years. The expense of the department has increased materially during the last two years, owing to increased activity in putting out missionary publications and a 33 1-3% increase in the number of contributors, involving the sending out of approximately 500 more receipts per month than in 1933. The office staff has also been increased by an Assistant Secretary and some part-time helpers, in addition to our three regular clerical and stenographic helpers.

No small part of the Secretary's time has been devoted to field work during the past twelve months which we believe has been beneficial in developing a better understanding of the work of our department in some sections.

A detailed report of the leading assemblies in missionary giving and the amount given by the different states will be found listed under the full financial report of the Missions Department.

Advance Movements

While some notable gains have been made in nearly all of our mission fields, perhaps some of the most encouraging reports come to us from French West Africa, where many hundreds are stated to have found the Lord during the past two years and many outstations have been opened. God has also poured out His Spirit on little groups with Pentecostal fullness.

In Southwest China the work among the Lisu people has resulted in so many turning to God that the worldly element has been aroused and has tried to burn our missionaries out by destroying the mission property. At the present time there is war in this area between the government forces and the Communist armies so that our missionaries have in many cases temporarily had to vacate their stations but the work is going on.

Our Central American field continues to show development worthy of special comment inasmuch as it consists in the establishment of self-supporting, self-govern-

ing and self-propagating assemblies, of which there are now about 33 in El Salvador and Nicaragua. In addition to the Bible schools already established in some of our mission fields we are seeking to develop similar schools for the training of native Christian workers in Peru, El Salvador, Japan and North and South India. In some of the fields mentioned there are schools already operating but they require additional help and extension for the most effective service.

Missionary Publications

We would like to call your attention to the regular publications that are put out by our Missions Department through the co-operation of the Gospel Publishing House. These include the *Mossi Land News*, the *Congo Field News*, a monthly Prayer Pamphlet covering the needs from all fields, and a selected missionary letter, which is sent out each month to all assemblies requesting it. We also have printed a number of booklets giving surveys of our different mission fields.

This literature is printed and mailed without charge, although we are obliged to rely upon the freewill offerings of those who receive the same in order to defray expenses involved.

Other publications representing different fields are put out by the missionaries in the various countries such as the *Morning Star*, a gospel paper in Arabic which is printed in Cairo, Egypt, and is circulated among a number of the Arabic-speaking countries.

El Evangelista Pentecostal of Porto Rico, *Agua de Vida of Peru*, and *La Luz Apostolica*, the official organ of our Latin-American work, are all published in Spanish.

Spiritual News is published in Chinese and is the official organ of our South China District Council. The *Singapore Messenger* of Singapore and the *Gold Coast News* from our Gold Coast field are both published in English.

Any of these publications may be secured by requesting the same from our Missions Department.

Suggestions Regarding Missionaries on Furlough

We have not been altogether satisfied with the man-

ner in which our missionaries on furlough have been obliged to utilize their time, and we are making a careful record regarding all assemblies affiliated with the General Council in order to try to arrange for them systematic visitation of these assemblies at suitable times without having too many visit in some places, very irregular visitation in others, and some assemblies missed altogether. It is our recommendation that in the future we endeavor through the pastors and District Councils to work out a system whereby our best missionary speakers may be utilized in the visitation of assemblies by arranged itineraries through the district, and that these missionaries' needs be supplied through headquarters if the amount they receive in some of the smaller assemblies is not sufficient to cover their expenses. Their monthly allowance could be determined by the standard scale of allowance for missionaries in full service which would be granted to them over and above their traveling expenses.

Missionaries who may not be particularly gifted as platform speakers we would recommend locating in places where assemblies need additional help for visitation or church secretarial work, so that they may assist the pastors in these different places. This latter group of missionaries would be granted a furlough allowance from headquarters which could be supplemented by some help from the assembly assisted.

Under these circumstances the Missions Department would assume responsibility for the return fares of the missionaries, since all funds raised by the itinerating missionary speakers would be turned into headquarters and anything over the missionaries' needs could be used to defray the extra expense of raising return fares to the field. We believe in the end this would result in an economy of missionary funds, since it would not necessitate so many traveling around and would provide that all assemblies receive some regular missionary contact.

We do believe it would be well to emphasize that missionary speakers, not accredited by the General Council, should not be encouraged in the local assemblies until the needs of our own endorsed missionaries have been

fully provided. If a missionary seeks to visit our assemblies who does not hold papers or a letter of endorsement from headquarters, there is usually some good reason why he does not have papers which should be sufficient ground to cause question as to the advisability of having him speak in the assembly.

REPORT OF CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE

A bold step of faith was taken in planning for the year 1934-35. The cost of a student's schooling for one year was reduced to \$160.00, if paid in advance. As a result the school was overcrowded with an enrollment of 181 students. Offices and class rooms were converted into dormitories to meet the need. At the close of the term the financial report showed that we had more than paid all expenses for the operation of the school.

Now, just prior to the beginning of our school year 1935-36, the newly enlarged building is ready for occupancy providing accommodations for 235 students. The expense to students has again been materially reduced. To date, August 26, 1935, 323 young people have applied for admission, and 213 boarding students have been accepted, besides 23 day students and we find ourselves now in the enlarged school confronted with the same problem of overcrowded conditions that faced us a year ago when the building was much smaller.

The Teaching as well as the administrative staff of the school has been enlarged and strengthened so that we are more able now than ever to give our students the best in courses of study.

The spiritual life of the school seemed to reach new high peaks during the past year. The Sovereign Lord by His Holy Spirit manifested Himself most wonderfully throughout the days of school routine and even set aside school order on a number of occasions wherein we were led to newer depths of consecration and higher heights of revelation. The beautiful spiritual atmosphere of the school created and maintained by the gracious presence of the Lord Jesus calls for the

expression of deepest gratitude. In it the lives of our students have developed like unfolding flowers. Parents have been so impressed by the evidence in their children's letters of genuine spiritual development that they have written expressing their thanks to God and their appreciation to the school for this most desired benefit.

In the Practical Work Department where our students are given exceptional opportunities for service not only are the students afforded an excellent and varied field for ministry but a real work for God is being done in lives. In a number of the country churches wherein students minister genuine Pentecostal assemblies are being formed. Believers are seeking and receiving the Baptism with the Spirit and the services have taken on the true Pentecostal character.

REPORT OF GOSPEL PUBLISHING HOUSE

From the following report it will readily be seen that the blessing of the Lord has been very gracious in this branch of the work.

In all departments marked advances have been made during the past two years, and as a result it became necessary to enlarge our building and install more equipment in order to carry on the work in an economical and efficient manner.

In the spring of 1934 work was started on an addition to the building, of approximately 8,000 square feet, making room for the necessary equipment which was later added. Many changes were made in the old parts of the building, the main one being in our business office. We now have a large, light room with ample space for the carrying on of our business. The approximate cost of these additions and improvements was \$16,000.00.

In the spring of 1935 we installed new equipment to the amount of approximately \$20,000.00. This included one large cylinder press, with automatic feeder, one job press, one large Dexter folder, book sewing machine and other equipment for the bindery department.

While good reports are made in other departments, the Sunday School department heads the list. As a

Publishing House we have been putting forth extra efforts to improve all our literature and to supply the material and helps which would strengthen this important part of our work.

Part time services of Brother R. M. Riggs has been secured and he has aided us greatly in building up interest in the Sunday schools. He has written a splendid book entitled "A Successful Sunday School." Every superintendent, officer and teacher should possess a copy.

Another remarkable book just recently published is that written by Myer Pearlman, entitled "Successful Sunday School Teaching." This book contains a great amount of helpful material for the teacher.

As interest has grown in the schools, there likewise has been a growing demand by the teachers for helps and literature which will enable them to become more proficient in their calling. In order to supply this demand Teacher Training Courses have been provided whereby those desiring special training can secure it. Two special courses are now prepared and the third will be ready in the near future.

Since our last report we wish to state that splendid gains have been made in the circulation of practically all of our publications. We are now printing 49,000 copies of the *Pentecostal Evangel*. This is a gain of more than 12,000 copies in the past two years.

While all Sunday school papers, class and teachers' quarterlies are increasing in circulation, the paper, *Gospel Gleaners*, has had the greatest increase of all. Our records show that we are now printing 53,000 copies each week, a gain in circulation during the past two years of 45%.

It may be of interest to know what the circulation of our different publications is at the close of our fiscal year, July 31, 1935. It is as follows:

The above figures show that there are 379,000 pieces of literature being used by different schools each week.

It is our plan, beginning with the first quarter of 1936, to still further strengthen and improve our literature by publishing a Primary Quarterly and a new special paper for the scholars of this grade.

We are also pleased to report that progress is being made in our book department. Owing to the crowded condition on the first floor, our entire stock of books, with the steel shelving, has been transferred to the new addition on the second floor. A number of new books have recently been added to our large line, and others are being prepared for publishing.

In January of this year we placed on the market our new song book, *Songs of Praise*. Judging from the comments received, and from the sales already made, this song book surpasses any which we had previously published.

The combined working force in the different departments numbers between 75 and 80 persons. There have been no labor troubles of any kind among our employes, and the working conditions are splendid.

We take this opportunity to thank our brethren and the constituency at large for their splendid co-operation, and we earnestly covet your prayers that this work, for the spreading of the gospel, will continue to grow and prosper for the glory of our blessed Lord.

ASSEMBLIES OF GOD IN FOREIGN LANDS

The purpose of the General Council of the Assemblies of God is to do all within its power to fulfill the Lord's last commission in preaching the gospel to every creature. As far as possible we seek to follow the example of the apostle Paul in seeking out neglected regions where the gospel has not been preached and encourage the native church to take responsibility for the ministry, and also for the maintenance of the church and its native ministers and to further the gospel among their own people as far as they are able.

At present missionaries and ministers of the General Council are located in the following fields: Belgian Congo, Egypt, Gold Coast, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Sierra Leone, the Transvaal, China, including work along the Tibetan Border, Mongolia, Manchuria, India, Ceylon, Peru, Venezuela, Argentina, Japan, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Porto Rico, San Domingo, Cuba, Palestine, Transjordan, Syria, Greece, Poland, Bulgaria, Jugoslavia, Russia, Hawaiian Islands, Philippine Islands, Fiji and Samoan Islands, Canary Islands and Straits Settlements.

This makes a total of 37 different foreign fields in which there are 871 stations and outstations, 287 missionaries, and 641 native ministers. These figures also include the work among the Latin American people of the U. S. A. and along the Mexican border.

AFRICA

The great continent of Africa covers one fourth of the earth's surface and is four times as large as the United States of America. There are approximately 800 different languages spoken, of which 500 have been reduced to writing. There are only two States in the whole of Africa which are governed entirely by native people, namely Abyssinia and Liberia. Africa has three outstanding religions—Paganism, Mohammedanism and Christianity, about 100,000,000 belonging to the first.

40,000,000 to the second, and 10,000,000 Protestant and Catholic Christians.

The Assemblies of God have 60 missionaries under appointment for the African field. They are distributed throughout the land as follows:

Belgian Congo

Population, 8,510,037

11 Missionaries, 3 Stations, 25 Outstations.

The territory assigned to our organization to evangelize includes approximately 50,000 people, who live in scattered villages which fortunately are becoming easier of access through the development of good roads which permit travel by automobile. However, many villages are still hidden away in the jungle and can be reached only by the use of native carriers. A definite effort is being made to train the native Christians through systematic Bible study to evangelize their own people. Many chiefs are calling for the gospel.

The stations occupied are Gombari, Betongwe, and Katenta. This last mentioned station is occupied by Mrs. A. Gittings and her husband in co-operation with the Congo Evangelistic Mission. An interesting little publication called the Congo Field News is prepared by our missionaries on this field, and edited and printed by the Foreign Missions Department. There are about 650 missionaries of all denominations in the Congo and there are 3,070 places where there are established churches or regular services are being held.

Egypt

Population 12,750,918

5 Missionaries, 3 Stations, 16 Outstations.

In the course of the past years many problems have confronted us in our work in this country, but God has been helping our missionaries and encouraging them by some remarkable demonstrations of His power and blessing. Some wonderful revivals have broken out in different places, which have been accompanied in practically every case by numbers having received the baptism in the Holy Spirit in Pentecostal pattern.

The work has been organized under the supervision of a District Council composed of both missionaries and Egyptian ministers, the purpose being to break down any barrier of race distinction so that the Assembly of God's people in Egypt may operate as a unit. There are a number of very capable, spiritual and well educated Egyptian brethren ministering in Egypt and we value their counsel and ministry in our District Council meetings.

The ministry in Egypt as in all of our fields is mainly evangelistic but mention should be made of the splendid orphanage at Assiout with 650 persons being provided for on the basis of a daily dependance upon God for the supply of the need. There is also a good school of 250 students conducted in Cairo. A paper of real spiritual worth known as the Morning Star is published by our missionaries for the benefit of Arabic speaking people.

Our main mission stations are located in Cairo and Assiout. Sixteen other assemblies are conducted by the Egyptian brethren affiliated with the Assemblies of God.

The religion of Egypt is almost entirely Mohammedan, the followers of Mohammed being about 91.2 per cent of the population. There are about 33 places in Egypt where missionaries are resident and 300 other places where work is being carried on. It is stated by reliable authorities that Egypt is more open today than at any time since the Moslem conquest, but that the hope of the country lies in the native church being alive and aflame in witnessing for God. Only the power of the Spirit in their lives can accomplish this.

Gold Coast

Population, 2,266,308

8 Missionaries, 2 Stations

Our Assemblies of God work in Gold Coast is confined to the area known as the Northern Territories having a population of 527,914. The work was commenced the latter part of November, 1931, and since that date has shown most encouraging progress, although we are sad to have to lose one missionary through death so early in the work. However, he lived long enough to see some

fruit from his labors. The ministry of our missionaries touches a number of different tribes, since in the first baptismal service there were representatives of Mossi, Issala, Dagomba, Dagomba-Hausa, and Chakosi tribes. However the tribes we are concentrating our efforts to reach are the Dagomba and Mamprusi peoples. In our district there are also an interesting people known as the Konkombas, who are the aborigines. The difference between them and the Dagombas is most striking. The Dagombas have a mixture of Mohammedanism with their fetishism. They call the Konkombas "heathen," and oppress them very much. The Dagombas are quite well clothed while the Konkombas have only a loin cloth. Thus far the Konkombas have been almost entirely untouched by the gospel; so it is the desire of our missionaries to give them an opportunity to hear the blessed message. There are approximately 32,000 of them right in the vicinity of our Yendi station. Our other station is at Tamale. In each place good substantial buildings have been erected and a number of converts have been made. All the time itineraries are being made for the surrounding towns and villages, so that the people may have an opportunity to know about God's message of love.

About 25 native young people are receiving special instruction in the Word of God and we are trusting that they may soon become witnesses for Christ to their own people.

Ivory Coast (Mossiland)

Population Mossiland 2,000,000.

16 Missionaries, 5 Stations, 68 Outstations.

The population of the Mossi tribe is a little uncertain but we feel safe in estimating their numbers around 2 million.

Our mission stations are located at Ouagadougou, Yako, Kaya, Tenkodogo, and Ouahigouya. For a time, a Bible School was conducted at Ouagadougou, but we soon found that this was impractical with but a small number of missionaries. The work at other places must be supervised, and stations occupied; the language com-

mittee must meet to revise translations so that the Scriptures can be made available to the natives. These needs made it imperative to discontinue the Bible School, for the time being, at least. We have not changed our opinion as to the need of a Bible Training School, however, but we are simply trying out another way.

Since the disbanding of the Bible School, the missionaries on each station have been giving Bible teaching to those in their respective districts, and it may be that this method will prove more advantageous than the other, due to the fact that many who could not have left home can now attend the classes.

A splendid feature of the work is the manner in which the native church has been taught to take care of their own native preachers. They do not have much in the way of money, but are able to provide foodstuffs, etc. A number of blessed revivals have taken place in Mossiland during the past years, during which God has done a deep work in the hearts of the native Christians, and a number have received the Pentecostal Baptism, speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance. These revivals were accompanied by confessions and restitution where wrong had been done, and also great joy in the Holy Ghost.

With the support of the homeland in prayer and funds this field has great possibilities before it.

Our missionaries are assisted by 32 native preachers.

Liberia

Population 1,750,000.

18 Missionaries, 6 Stations, 20 Outstations.

It is estimated that out of the million inhabitants of the interior only about 100,000 have as yet been reached with the gospel. We have been much encouraged by a new desire on the part of the native Christians to take over responsibility for the maintenance of their local churches. The buildings for worship are most frequently built by the natives, and they send carriers to bring the missionary in order to help get the work started. Formerly the missionary had to take almost entire responsi-

bility for funds and help in the erection of the church buildings. Our missionaries have pressed into the interior and many inspiring reports come to us of God's power manifested in salvation, healing, and in baptizing people in the Holy Spirit. Sometimes the native Christians have had to suffer severe persecution because of their stand for God, but the Lord has given grace, so that whereas some have fallen yet more are standing true. The great need for this field is more men workers and help in the Bible school and other school work.

In addition to the stations mentioned as being established works with resident missionaries there are five associate mission stations supervised by Pentecostal missionaries not under our appointment, but who work co-operatively with us. We also have a District School for Bible Training as well as for education along general and industrial lines, and a Girls' Training School having an enrollment of 24 students. We have 31 approved teachers engaged in local schools with a total enrollment of 1,080 pupils. It is necessary for some educational work to be done in addition to our evangelistic work in order to conform with the government requirements.

In order to understand the extent to which this country has been evangelized we would state it is estimated that the total work of the Protestant denominations includes 140 organized churches and 111 other places where regular services are being held. This means that each center is responsible for a congregation of about 6,972 who are often scattered over a widely spread area.

Sierra Leone

Population, 1,541,311.

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 2 Outstations.

The work the Assemblies of God have been conducting in this country has been largely confined to the city of Freetown among the Kru people. However, those reached are tribesmen who have often come from the interior and frequently return to their people, thus spreading the gospel message. Many of the native Christians who have been saved in this work are employed as sailors on the boats, so are frequently away. Nevertheless,

there is nearly always a good congregation of about 200 people. They fill up the neat little chapel which they feel great pride in inasmuch as it was built, we understand, by their own labor, although funds were provided from America for materials, etc. The Christians carry on the outstation work, and altogether we feel that a very worthy work is being accomplished in this place and a true witness going forth to a needy people.

CHINA AND CENTRAL ASIA

Population, 474,000,000.

68 Missionaries, 32 Stations, 81 Outstations.

The territory included in our estimated population covers the nineteen provinces of China together with Manchuria, Mongolia, Sinkiang, Tibet, and Chinese Turkestan.

Some very remarkable revivals have broken out in China during the past few years, some in our Assemblies of God work and others in other denominations. One singular feature of nearly all these movements of the Spirit has been the accompaniment of the miraculous element. Sick have been healed, demons cast out, and many have spoken in other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance. It is stated on good authority that China is today one of the most if not the most encouraging mission field in the world as far as opportunities and definite results are concerned. China is the biggest country on the map, if we consider the countries included in our brief survey. It is larger than the whole of Europe, and contains one fourth of the population of the world. China has the oldest race and culture the world can show. In religion the Chinese are Taoists and Buddhists, but since the time of Dr. Sun Yat Sen a fervent nationalism has almost become the religion of large numbers. There are 6,346 missionaries registered in China. We wish that we could state that they are all preaching the pure gospel of Jesus Christ. Unfortunately many are the apostles of Modernism which ignores the authority of God's Word.

Our Assemblies of God missionaries are located in the provinces of Chekiang, Chihli, Kansu, Shansi, Shantung, Yunnan, Kwangsi, Kwangtung, Manchuria, and Mongolia.

A steady growth has been manifest in most sections, but the newer work is always more conspicuous because of breaking into virgin soil. The missionaries in Manchuria continue to press ahead and are carrying on regular tent meetings in order to reach the masses. Manchuria is to China what the United States was to the old world a century or more ago. Those with a pioneer spirit have left the desolated and impoverished lands of their fathers to seek life anew in the fertile plains of Manchuria. Of course this field has also suffered the effects of war, but it would seem on the whole that the people are better off there than in many other parts of China.

In one station in the north the native Christians have felt their responsibility for the unevangelized in neighboring provinces, so have sent some of their number as missionaries to Mongolia. In Yunnan Province very blessed results have been reaped in the ministry among the Lisu and tribes people. One of our missionaries reported 450 families as having thrown away their idols in their desire to follow the Lord. Whole villages have turned en masse to Christ; that is to say, they have outwardly accepted Him, and we are sure in many hearts a real work of grace has been accomplished. Many cases of outstanding conversion are recorded, where the converts had formerly been in deep sin, drug addicts, etc.

In Kansu Province, in spite of severe persecution and the martyrdom of several missionaries, the Lord continues to add to the church. There are about 40 Assemblies in this province witnessing to a real Pentecostal experience. Most of these are under native leadership, and a large number are self-supporting, although they are desperately poor in this world's goods.

The whole of Tibet is not yet open to the gospel, but Tibetans can be reached at the stations where our missionaries are located and in their itineraries through the land. The Tibetans are hard to reach, inasmuch as many of them are of a roving disposition, going from place to place with their flocks and herds wherever there may be pasture. This makes it difficult to get to them long enough

to give them a clear understanding of the gospel message. God, however, is able to make His blessed Word bring forth fruit. There are some notable instances of fine character who have been saved through the ministry of the gospel.

In South China there have been both encouraging and discouraging features. The spirit of nationalism has been quite manifest in the work and has influenced some of the Chinese leaders so that they feel the missionary should turn everything over to them without restriction. We are seeking to lead the native churches so that they may assume responsibility, but we believe that as long as we are responsible for the supply of buildings and support some measure of control should still rest in the hands of the missionary.

Our missionaries frequently have to be diplomats in the highest sense as well as preachers of the gospel. They are establishing a branch of God's kingdom, and are opposed by a wicked foe and his legions of wicked spirits, but God's grace is sufficient. Our present mission stations are located in the following places: Ningpo, Tsingtao, Tientsin, Peiping (2 Stations), Chang Pe Hsien, Pu Chi, Ta Chang, Taiyuanfu, Hohsien, Taai Waan, Saiwaan, Fat Shan, Kowloon City, Hongkong, Hoi Kin, Shek Kok, Canton, Hwangyuan, Minchow, Labrang, Losari, Lan Ping, Amichow, Likiang, Wei Hsi, Lunan, Chi Tien, Shiku, Mukden, Harbin, Port Arthur.

Our missionaries are assisted in their ministry in China by 161 Chinese evangelists, pastors and Bible women. Bible School work has been undertaken in both North and South China, although the school in the north is not operating for the time being under the leadership of our missionaries. An encouraging orphanage work is being conducted by our missionaries in Ningpo where they are given the material things of this life as well as spiritual teaching to 60 of these needy little ones. A Bible school and evangelistic work is also conducted from the same station. Altogether we are happy to report real progress in the work in this field.

INDIA AND CEYLON

Population 352,000,000.

70 Missionaries, 23 Stations, 106 Outstations.

Approximately one fifth of the human race are gathered in the land of India, the majority of whom endure a distressingly sad and sorrowful existence. The Hindu religion is responsible for widespread moral corruption. Poverty is so far-reaching that it is estimated that at least sixty millions of India's people are never free from the gnawing pangs of hunger.

India calls for more of our funds and forces than any other land, and yields in visible results the least encouraging returns, yet the call of the Master is to preach the gospel to every creature; so whether they hear or reject, we must still go to them with the message. We would not want however, to leave the impression that God is not working in India. We are more than happy to say that from a number of our stations reports come to us of souls seeking God. The work on the whole is, nevertheless, slower than in some other fields. This is in part due to the awful caste system which holds the people in bondage and fear. If one confesses Christ he is at once an outcaste and experiences difficulty in supporting himself. He is frequently turned out from his home and rejected by his relatives. Our work is confined chiefly to the Northern Provinces although a progressive ministry is being conducted in South India under our South India and Ceylon District Council, the Northern territory being under the supervision of the North India District Council. Missionaries under appointment of the General Council of the Assemblies of God are engaged in direct evangelistic work, and also in other phases of activity which are indirectly evangelistic, such as school, orphanage, and leper work. Some of our missionaries who have large numbers of dependent people in their mission are seeking to develop the industrial phase of the work, so that the natives instead of being dependent upon the funds of the mission can earn their own support by their activities. This is done by promoting the weaving industry, carpentry, canning of fruits and vegetables, etc.

We feel this is a splendid thing, as it lifts a considerable burden from the missionary's shoulders along financial lines, although of course this phase of the work is as yet in its initial stage. The hope of the field is to train native workers to go out and evangelize their own people. Something like 100 million souls of India are yet beyond the reach of gospel light, and foreign funds and workers can never meet the need.

Our mission stations in North India are located at Moghul Sarai, Nanpara, Siswa Bazar, Rupaidiha, Uska Bazar, Basti, Nawabganj, Purulia, Chapra, Ormanjhi, Lakhimpur, Dehra Dun, Laheria Sarai, Cawnpore, Bettiah, and Unao. In South India, at Poona, Mavelikara, Cannanore, Quilon, and Oolos. In Ceylon at Colombo and Galle. There is a total of 91 native preachers, and Bible women who are co-operating with our missionaries in the evangelizing of the people of India and Ceylon. Mention should be made of the efforts that are being undertaken to establish a good Bible school at Unao. This school is already operating as far as the limited premises will permit, but the hope of India is in a God-called and Bible-trained native ministry. Contributing factors to this end are the Boys' school at Rupaidiha where there are 35 young men who are not only taught the Bible but trained to support themselves along industrial lines. A similar kind of program is followed at Nawabganj where there are 130 students and 47 orphans who are being cared for and trained to become useful servants of the Lord Jesus. Our Girls' School is located at Bettiah and here we have 75 students ranging from just small children to those who are of mature age and are receiving training as prospective Bible women. At Dehra Dun a very excellent work has been started preparing young women as workers most of whom have been saved from the zenanas of India. The leper colony at Uska Bazar is always a center of interest. There are about 40 who are being cared for who are unable to provide for themselves, many of them being in a pitiful condition through the terrible ravages of that awful disease known as leprosy. It would however delight the heart and eyes of any true Christian to see in the meetings a goodly attendance

of whom at least 100 are sincere followers of the Lord Jesus. India needs our prayers, and the missionary workers and native preachers and helpers need our prayers. Let us not forget them.

JAPAN

Population 56,068,952.

11 Missionaries, 7 Stations, 19 Outstations.

The gospel was first preached in Japan by Francis Xavier about 250 years ago, but Protestant missions were started a little over 70 years ago. Since that time God has blessed the steady efforts of the missionaries of the different denominations until today it is estimated there are about 250,000 professing Christians. This, however, is a very small percentage in comparison with the 55,-750,000 non-Christians. The Pentecostal work under the Assemblies of God in Japan is largely of an evangelistic character. Our chief method in reaching the people is by open-air meetings, and the souls who thus become interested are gathered into the mission halls.

One of the great needs of our work in Japan is for a Bible school where the young men and women who show promise of becoming Christian workers may receive training in the Word of God. Individual missionaries have done some good work along this line, but there is a need of further development in this branch of the work. Our stations are located at Takinogawa (Tokyo), Yokohama, Kobe, Nishinomiya, Hamamatsu, Nagoya, and Hachioji. The religions of Japan are Shintoism, Buddhism, and we are happy to state that Christianity is also now reckoned as one of the religions of the country. As in most fields the greatest need is in the rural districts where it is estimated there are still something like 40 million people who are not being reached by the gospel. The large part of all missionary activity is confined to the cities. We are trusting that in preparing the young Japanese men who have received the call of the Lord to the ministry that these rural areas or at least a part of this untouched territory may be reached for Christ. In considering institutional work mention should be made

of the orphanage conducted at Nishinomiya where 25 boys and girls are being provided for and trained in the knowledge of God's Word. Many of these little lives have been very definitely changed by the power of the gospel, and we look for some of them to become real preachers of the gospel, should our Lord tarry.

There are seventeen native ministers and Bible women working with our mission in Japan.

PALESTINE AND TRANSJORDAN

Population, 760,000.

7 Missionaries, 3 Stations, 5 Outstations.

In many respects Palestine could be considered as having an adequate staff of missionaries if one considers all the Protestant denominations working there, there being 160 missionaries and one professing Christian to every 250 of the population. However, as in many other countries, the missionary force is unevenly distributed and many of the villages are still in great need of the gospel. In view of the varied religions and racial strife which exist among the people of Palestine, it is very difficult to work there, most of the converts being won for the most part one by one. We rejoice over the encouraging news that continues to come from Transjordan where God has been convicting the people by His Spirit of their need of a Saviour. Some remarkable manifestations of God's presence have occurred in our work revealing to the people the serious times in which we are living and the necessity of their repenting of sin and preparing for the coming of the Lord. The religions of Palestine and Transjordan are Mohammedanism, Judaism, and Christianity. Our main stations are located at Jerusalem (two stations), and at Es Salt, Transjordan.

There are 7 native preachers and Bible women working with our mission in Palestine and Transjordan.

SYRIA

Population, 3,000,000.

1 Missionary, 1 Station, 5 Outstations.

Three quarters of the population of Syria is Moslem; however, a large number of the younger generation, particularly those who have received a Western education,

have lost faith in Islam and have drifted into agnosticism. The work of the Assemblies of God in Syria has its headquarters at Shweifat, Syria, but outstation work has been opened at five other points.

The work at Shweifat comprises a gospel mission, a school of 185 students who are taught elementary subjects, and also a knowledge of God's Word, and an orphanage of 15 boys and girls who are sheltered, clothed and fed under the kindly supervision of our missionary in charge, who ministers to these little ones in the name of our Lord. The work is not confined to Shweifat as the report of five outstations witnesses the fact that there is some very definite evangelistic efforts being made to reach the souls outside in the villages who have not yet heard the gospel. The work in Syria is conducted by our one missionary and 14 native Christian workers. Much more territory could be covered in this field if an automobile were available for reaching some of the outlying villages and towns.

PERSIA

Population, 9,000,000.

4 Missionaries, 3 Stations, 15 Outstations.

The prevailing religion of Persia is Mohammedanism, but as in many other countries great changes are taking place. The power of Islam has been shaken, and many are turning to other forms of worship while thousands are drifting towards rationalism. Armenian, and Assyrian Christians have been in the country for centuries, but they represent only about 80,000 of the population. Most of these people are Christians only in name. The Assemblies of God work has been strengthened during recent years by additional missionaries, and very encouraging reports come to us of revival in many sections. Assemblies are established in Abajaloo, Abdulah-Kandy, Ada, Dizatakah, Hamadan, Karajaloo, Kermanshah, Mooshavah, Sultanabad, and Tabriz. Persia is poor, probably fifty per cent of the people having to live on charity. The people reached by the gospel are varied in character, religion and race—Jews, Assyrians, Bahais, Armenians, Zoroastrians, and Mohammedans. It

is estimated that there is one Christian to every 4,345 of the population.

There are fifteen native ministers and Bible women working with our missionaries in Persia.

CENTRAL AMERICA

El Salvador and Nicaragua

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 33 Outstations,
30 Native preachers.

The population of El Salvador is 1,526,000 and of Nicaragua 638,119.

We have been much encouraged by the good reports coming to us from these two little republics especially for what has been accomplished in El Salvador. The work was established a few years ago so that a regular native conference is held and the work is progressing almost entirely under native leadership and finance. There are now thirty or more assemblies which are conducted by native brethren who are self-supporting. Many of these faithful followers of the Lord have suffered severe persecution for the gospel, and some have been thrown into prison, but the work continues to advance. Our missionaries are located at Santa Ana, El Salvador and we are expecting to locate another missionary couple at Matagalpa, Nicaragua, shortly.

A Bible School is conducted in El Salvador for prospective preachers with very excellent results but we are hoping that a better location and property may be secured for this important ministry in the near future. Some friends have already sent in a substantial gift for the school property and we are looking to God to move on others that the balance required may soon come in. The work is already extending out into the neighboring republics of Guatemala and Honduras.

SOUTH AMERICA

Peru

Population, 5,500,000

8 Missionaries, 4 Stations, 9 Outstations

The bulk of the population consists of Indians of un-

mixed blood. The Roman Catholic Church is the official church in Peru, as it is in most of the Latin-American countries, but the religion of the Roman Catholic Church in Peru is, in the words of another, "no more Christian than counterfeit coin is money." Some of our missionaries have suffered stoning and imprisonment at times because of their strong stand for the gospel, and some have been seriously wounded by mobs; but out of it all the Lord has delivered and the work goes on. The stations where missionaries reside are Callao, Trujillo, Huaraz, Huancayo, Miraflores, Chicama, Caraz, Casilla. For some time open air meetings were prohibited, but now the government looks more leniently upon religious effort outside the Roman Catholic Church, so that good opportunity is often afforded to witness to the people in open air gatherings. There are ten native preachers assisting our missionaries and there could be many more but like other fields Peru is in need of a good Bible training school. We are therefore trusting that one may be opened within the next year or two. Plans are being made for that purpose. A number of remarkable healings have taken place in this field, as well as numbers having been saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. The relative need of Peru may be better understood when we mention that in the United States there is one Christian to every four of the population while in Peru there is one Christian to every 1,407 of the population. Thus the need of Peru is over 300 times greater than that of the United States of America.

Venezuela

Population, 3,026,878

1 Missionary, 1 Station

The mass of the population is Venezuelan by birth, but there are also 136,000 Indians. There is estimated to be one professing Christian to every 825 of the population. The work of all missionary societies has progressed more or less encouragingly during the past few years, but there is still much land to be possessed. The work of the Assemblies of God has been conducted in co-operation

with other Pentecostal missionaries not regularly affiliated with the General Council but who are yet in full sympathy with our program, so that a very harmonious relationship has existed.

Argentina

Population, 10,348,189

3 Missionaries, 1 Station, 2 Outstations

The population includes a foreign-born element numbering 2,280,000. This country is one of the most progressive of all the South American Republics, and it is estimated that the population will have doubled again within the next twenty-five years. The majority of the immigrants are Spaniards and Italians, while there is a goodly number of Poles and Germans.

Our missionaries in Argentina are located at 25 de Mayo and have two outstations under their direction. They have three native helpers in the work. For many, many years our sole representative in this country has been one lady missionary but we are glad that work is now being strengthened by the addition of a married couple. It is estimated that in the entire Argentine Republic there is one Christian to every 767 of the population. There is therefore much land yet to be possessed.

EUROPE AND SOVIET RUSSIA

The work of the Assemblies of God in Europe has been very largely turned over to the Russian and Eastern European Mission to supervise, inasmuch as they have a Field Council operating in Europe which we feel is in a better position to care for the missionary interests than our headquarters so far removed from the field. Nevertheless, missionaries still retain their General Council appointment and are ministering in the Bible school at Danzig, in Poland, Bulgaria, Greece, Hungary and Jugoslavia.

The only missionary under General Council appointment in Russia has been imprisoned because of his bold stand for the gospel. He was arrested in January, 1930, and taken from his wife and family, languishing under the hardships of Russian prison routine in the frozen

north. Prayer has been offered without ceasing for this dear brother's release, and we are hoping that in the near future permission may be granted for his deliverance. It is difficult for the people of America, living in comparative comfort, to realize the awful sufferings of our brethren in this dark land where they seek to banish God.

We are glad to report that though the godless element have thought to dethrone the Almighty, reports reach us of 80,000 Pentecostal Christians who are assembling together for worship in different places, often in secret for fear of arrest. Baptismal services are held under cover of night, but in spite of all the persecution the Church to Jesus Christ is proving to the world that the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. We have eleven of our representatives ministering in European Countries.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS

Population, 93,402,437

4 Missionaries, 3 Stations

The British Malay States have a population made up of nearly all nations of the world, but perhaps two thirds of the population are Chinese. There are, however, between fifty and sixty million Malays in British and Greater Malaysia which is the area covered by our population estimate. The work of the Assemblies of God was originally among the Cantonese of Singapore, who number about 30,000, but we are glad to report that our missionaries are branching out and have opened work at Ipoh, and at Sakai among the Malay people. The great obstacle in this field is the great expense involved in carrying on the work. Nevertheless, it has been encouraging to note the numbers who have accepted the Lord, many of whom are of the student class.

FIJI ISLANDS

Population, 176,793

4 Missionaries, 2 Stations, 1 Outstation

Fiji offers a good example of what the Bible has effected in a grossly heathen land. In 1835 two missionaries of the Methodist Church landed and in 20 years

translated the Bible into the difficult Polynesian language. In the meantime they had seen a nation of cannibals come to the place where the outstanding chief and his people had bowed the knee to the Lord Jesus. Like many other lands once visited by God, there has come a time of comparative coolness and there are still many thousands who have not had a proper presentation of the gospel. There are also many Indians from India who are practically untouched by gospel ministry. Two of our missionaries have been studying the Indian language so as to reach these people as far as possible. The stations opened are at Flagstaff, and Suva.

THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

Population 10,314,310

The Philippine Islands, an outlying possession of the United States comprise over 7,000 islands. About 7,000,000 of the inhabitants are Roman Catholics, and approximately 500,000 are Mohammedans. The two missionaries associated with the Assemblies of God working in the islands are not under missionary appointment, but are natives of the Philippine Islands who have received their education in the United States and are now working in their own country with the approval of the Missions Department. They hold General Council ministerial papers. The islands have been placed under the supervision of our South China District Council which is the nearest organized District to this field.

THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

Population 298,500

This group of islands has been sometimes called the "Paradise of the Pacific" and is a favorite place for tourists to visit. There are all kinds of religions and creeds represented and as many different races and nationalities in the population. It has been found a little difficult by our General Council ministers in this field to establish anything of much permanence owing to the migratory habits of the people. However we have in the islands 6 ordained ministers working under the supervision of our Missions Department, with assemblies at Honolulu and Hilo.

SAMOAN ISLANDS

The work in the Samoan Islands is largely among a people who make a profession of Christianity but who unfortunately have little knowledge of the truth of God's Word in actual experience. We have two ministers of the General Council working in these islands with their main station at Pagopago.

CANARY ISLANDS

Population 735,163

The work in this little center of Roman Catholicism has been carried on for some years by one single lady missionary of the General Council and a coworker who went to the field independent of any organization. There are other Protestant missionaries now entering the field but there is real need of some other helper to assist in our work. The established church does not look favorably on Protestant missionary effort so that there are many obstacles to contend with. However a little Sunday school has been established at Santa Cruz and the gospel is being spread by house-to-house visitation.

PORTO RICO

Population 1,299,809

2 Missionaries, 1 Station, 39 Outstations

The headquarters of our work in this field is at Aibonito where the superintendent missionary resides. The work is almost entirely under native control and is very largely self-supporting although large numbers of the believers are desperately poor. Even the ministers, like the people, frequently have difficulty in making ends meet, and it is not unusual for us to receive requests that we might help so that some of the ministers might have sufficient to buy clothes for their children to attend meeting. They are poor in this world's goods, but rich in faith. Many gracious revivals have been reported during the past years. There are native ministers in charge of the 39 outstations.

SAN DOMINGO

Population 897,405

This island was taken into the territory of our missionary activities a little over two years ago. We have one native minister and his family working there and he is having quite encouraging results. The field is considered as a part of the Porto Rico District Council and receives some help and encouragement from our representatives in Porto Rico. A number of souls have turned to the Lord and most of them have received the baptism of the Holy Spirit through the faithful leadership of our brother who stands as our sole representative.

CUBA

Population 3,123,040

This island was taken into our field of operations when we saw the need of Cuba and realized somewhat late how neglectful we had been during all these years concerning a field in such need of the gospel and so near at hand. We now have two missionaries working in Cuba and two ordained ministers of the General Council besides a very faithful brother sent from the Latin American District Council. The reports received concerning the work are encouraging and we believe there are great possibilities of advancement in the near future. The territory is under the supervision of the Latin American District Council.

Latin American Work in U. S. A. and Along the Mexican Border

In the U. S. A. the population of Latin American people is estimated at 1,422,533 among whom work was commenced before our organization existed by some who are now representatives of the General Council. We are happy to report that through the faithful and constructive ministry of these our brethren there are now 185 assemblies among the Latin American people in the U. S. A. and Mexico and about 176 Latin American ministers. The work in Mexico while maintaining a very friendly and co-operative relationship with the American Assem-

blies is yet independent as far as their leadership and government is concerned since this is required by Mexican law. The Latin American people make splendid Christians and their willingness to sacrifice personal interests and their devotion to their Lord is inspiring.

Mention should be made of the two Bible Institutes in the U. S. A. for the preparation of Latin American students which are under the direction of our organization. One is located at San Diego, California and the other at San Antonio. Students have graduated from these schools and are now making effective ministers of the gospel not only in the U. S. A. among their own people, but also among the Spanish speaking people of Mexico, Nicaragua, Cuba and Spain. An advance move is now being taken to purchase a farm on which to locate the San Antonio Institute where the work could be made largely self-supporting and at the same time be in the center of Spanish speaking territory which the students could have practical experience in evangelizing. This branch of our work is under the supervision of the Latin American District Council.

Adjourned at 12:00 N. Dismissed in prayer by Brother J. W. Welch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. with Brother Glen Rennick of Hannibal, Missouri, leading the singing. Brother W. I. Evans led in prayer, and Brother C. A. Lasater, Fort Smith, Arkansas, brought the afternoon message, speaking from the third chapter of Colossians and 1 John 2:15-17. The theme of his message was non-conformity to the world.

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m. The report of the Committee on Discipline of Members in printed form was distributed among the ministers and delegates. The report was read by the secretary of the committee, W. I. Evans. Several amendments to the printed report were suggested by the committee.

After some discussion it was moved that this report go back to the Committee on Discipline of Members

for reconsideration before further presentation to the general body. Seconded and carried.

There were no other committees ready to report.

It was moved that the election of officers take place on Tuesday afternoon, September 17. Motion seconded and carried.

Meeting adjourned at 3:50 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by the General Superintendent, E. S. Williams.

FRIDAY MORNING

The morning devotional meeting opened at 9:00 a. m. with Brother Willis Smith of Sioux City, Iowa, leading the song service. Brother Byron Jones of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., led in prayer, and the morning message was given by Brother J. C. Thames, Elba, Alabama, who spoke from Matt. 20:25-28, the theme of his message being "Stewardship."

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother J. R. Evans. The minutes of the Thursday meetings were read and approved.

The report of the Treasurer as contained in the printed report was presented for acceptance. It was moved and carried that this report be accepted.

The next item of business was the report of the Committee on Church Buildings. Tracings had been prepared showing plans of various types of church buildings. It was suggested that any of the ministers interested could meet this committee, and the committee could go over the plans with them, explaining the various features, giving approximate cost of construction, etc. It was moved and carried that the report of the Church Building Committee be accepted.

It was moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to all licensed ministers, withholding from them only the privilege of voting. Seconded and carried.

Attention was called to the fact that Section 3, Article 9, in the Constitution was an amendment which was to have been presented at this Council session for adoption and that it appeared in the Constitution

by mistake. It was moved and seconded that this amendment be adopted, the amendment reads as follows: "The General Council shall elect representative men of mature experience and ability, whose lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship as General Presbyters in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields. Each District shall have the privilege of representation in the General Presbytery by three members, the District Superintendent, together with two others to be nominated for the office by the District at its Council meeting held prior to the meeting of the General Council." It was moved and carried that this amendment be amended to read as follows: "The General Presbytery shall be composed of representative men of mature experience and ability whose lives and ministry are above reproach, who shall represent the fellowship in all phases of its work and interest in their respective fields. Each District shall have the privilege of representation in the General Presbytery by three members, the District Superintendent together with two others who shall be elected annually at its District Council meeting and who shall take office immediately subject to the approval of the Executive Presbytery." The motion before the house was then adopted that the amendment be placed in Section 3, Article 9, of the Constitution.

It was recommended by the Resolutions Committee that the resolution entitled, "Reinstatement of Ministers" in the Essential Resolutions of the General Council be amended by adding to the resolution after the word "reinstated" in the sixth line the following: "He shall in no case be eligible for reinstatement until at least six months shall have elapsed after he has been removed from our list of ministers." It was moved that this amendment be adopted. Seconded and carried.

Considerable discussion followed relative to a suggested change in the Essential Resolution "Moral Standard for Ministers." It was moved and seconded

that this resolution be amended by dropping the word "permanently" in the sixth line, and adding the following: "Ministers having been dropped for such cause shall not be eligible for reinstatement until a period of two years shall have elapsed, when, if proper investigation by the officials of the District in which the offense was committed seems to prove that said ministers have sincerely repented and been restored to divine favor, they may be favorably considered for reinstatement, but if such persons shall again lapse into immorality after reinstatement, they shall then be permanently expelled from Council fellowship." It was moved and carried that this matter be taken up as the first item of business in the afternoon session.

Adjourned at 12:00 N. Dismissed in prayer by Brother C. A. Lasater.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. Brother Charles Eyler of Johnstown, Pa., led the song service, and Brother Todd of Los Angeles, Calif., led in prayer. Brother I. A. Smith of Memphis, Tenn., was the afternoon speaker, using as his text Zech. 4:6, "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit saith the Lord of hosts."

The business session opened at 2:20 p. m. with prayer by Brother A. C. Bates. The resolution before the house at the close of the morning session relative to a change in the Essential Resolution "Moral Standard for Ministers" was presented again for consideration. After considerable discussion, the brethren called for prayer and Brother Lasater led in prayer. Following a recommendation from Brother Gortner and a suggestion of the chair, it was moved and carried that the motion be tabled and that at the morning business session a vote be taken relative to rescinding the action taken at the General Council session in San Francisco in passing the resolution, "Moral Standard for Ministers."

Meeting adjourned at 4:50 p. m.

SATURDAY MORNING

The devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. Brother T. A. Sandall of Seattle, Washington, led the song service, and Brother W. I. Evans led in prayer. The topic of the morning message, given by Brother R. M. Riggs of Springfield, Missouri, was "The Development of our Sunday School Work." Following the message, Brother Stanley Frodsham, Editor of the PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL, spoke briefly regarding the Sunday School literature published by the Gospel Publishing House.

The business session opened at 10:15 a. m. with the singing of "My Faith Looks Up to Thee." Brother C. W. Harned of Dallas, Texas, led in prayer. The minutes of the Friday meetings were read and approved.

It was moved and seconded that the action taken at San Francisco in passing the resolution "Moral Standard for Ministers" be rescinded. The entire morning session was spent in discussing the motion, and before a vote was taken, Brother Flower led in prayer. The motion to rescind the action in passing this resolution carried.

After the singing of the doxology, Brother H. T. Carpenter of Springfield, Massachusetts, led in prayer. Adjourned at 12:15 p. m.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. The song service was led by Brother Bynum Greene of Maud, Oklahoma, and Brother W. C. Gilbert of Chickasha, Oklahoma, led in prayer. The afternoon message was on missions and was given by Brother Noel Perkin, Missionary Secretary of the General Council.

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m. with prayer by Brother Jacob Miller of Fort Smith, Arkansas. The first item of business was the reading of the report of the Sunday School Committee by Bro-

ther R. M. Riggs. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted and that the resolution offered by the Sunday School Committee be adopted.

Report of Sunday School Committee

After examining the condition of our Sunday Schools as thoroughly as we were able with the information at our disposal, and after much prayer and study concerning how to improve our Sunday Schools, we make the following observations.

1. That varying degrees of interest and attention are given Sunday Schools by our various District Councils. The Kansas and the North Central Districts, especially, use the District-wide contest method for the stimulating of interest in Sunday School work, the California Districts emphasize educating their people as to how to improve their Sunday Schools, and the Arkansas-Louisiana District also comes in for honorable mention along this line. Most Districts as such, however, seem to be showing very little interest in and taking very little action for the development of their Sunday Schools.

2. That, for the purpose of our constituency at large, and considering the spiritual character and results of the various methods which can be used in the development of Sunday Schools, we feel that a thorough, intensive, and persistent program for the educating and exhorting of our people toward the development of their Sunday Schools is, on the whole, better than the promotion of contests in the church, in the section, or in the District as a whole.

3. That, in the educating and exhorting of our people toward the development of their Sunday Schools, we consider the following the standard of a good Sunday School, regardless of its size.

1. A gain in average attendance of at least 20% each year.
2. With its enrollment at least equal to its church's membership.

3. Its pastor present at at least 95% of its regular sessions and monthly business meetings.
4. Its superintendent present at at least 95% of its regular sessions and monthly business meetings.
5. Its regular teachers present at at least 90% of its regular sessions and monthly business meetings.
6. Conducting a Teacher Training Class and completing at least one subject a year.
7. At least 90% of whose scholars (over 8 years of age) attend church weekly.
8. With conversions each year at least equaling three per cent of its enrollment.
9. With regular offerings increasing at least 25% each year.
10. With missionary offerings increasing at least 25% each year.
11. With its cradle roll at least 5% of its total enrollment.
12. With its home department at least 5% of its total enrollment.

This committee further recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Executive Presbytery be requested and authorized to use the medium of the PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL, all Sunday School literature, and other means available through the Gospel Publishing House, to put on immediately an intensive effort to teach and encourage our constituency to develop their Sunday Schools in spirituality, efficiency, and numbers.

The committee on the Discipline of Members made its report. The report was read by Brother

W. I. Evans. It was moved and carried that this report be accepted. Moved and carried that this report be placed in the By-Laws of the General Council to take the place of Section 7, Article V, "Trials and Appeals." (See page 22)

Brother A. G. Osterberg read the report of the Committee on Old Age Pensions and explained the recommendations given in the report. Each recommendation was considered separately and the report as adopted is as follows:

1. Each District Executive Committee make a survey of its constituency to ascertain the approximate number of our retired ministers and missionaries who are now in need of assistance.

2. A questionnaire comprehensive from the actuary standpoint be drafted by the Executive Presbytery which may be furnished by the District officary which will provide the basis in fact upon which relief may be given.

3. The creation of a fund by endowments, free-will offerings, gifts and pledges, as well as by systematic giving by a plan to be agreed upon as most practical and reasonable; this fellowship fund to be raised by our entire constituency.

4. This fellowship relief fund to be placed in the hands of the Executive Presbytery to be disbursed as may be found possible to our needy retired ministers and missionaries who may be in need of aid, upon the recommendation of the District Superintendent and officary where disbursement is made.

5. Publicity be given the plan decided upon through the PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL and in all District meetings to the end that interest be created as soon as possible.

* * * *

It was moved and carried that the suggestion of the committee be adopted relative to the establishing of a burial fund. Moved and carried that the chair be authorized to appoint a committee to work

out the details of the recommendations in the report and submit a definite plan for consideration. The chair appointed the following committee: A. G. Osterberg, Frank Gray, Flem Van Meter. (For final report of Committee on Old Age Pensions, see minutes of Thursday afternoon meeting).

Brother P. C. Nelson read the report of the Committee on Education. It was moved and carried that the report be accepted. Moved and carried that consideration of the report be deferred until the first matter of business in the Monday afternoon session and that mimeographed copies of the recommendations of the committee be furnished the ministers and delegates.

Meeting adjourned at 4:25 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother J. R. Evans.

MONDAY MORNING

The morning devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. with Brother Edgar Bethany of Kinston, Alabama, leading the song service. Brother Earl Bond of Conneaut, Ohio, led in prayer and the speaker of the morning was Brother Gayle F. Lewis of Youngstown, Ohio. The text of the morning message was John 2:1-11.

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother Walter Harriss of San Diego, California. The minutes of the Saturday meetings were read and approved.

An amendment to Article XII of the By-laws "Discipline of Members" was presented for consideration, and after considerable discussion was referred to the Resolutions Committee.

It was moved and seconded that Article V, Section 4, of the By-laws be amended by substituting the following after the words "District Council" in the fifth line: "No minister shall be ordained to the full ministry until such candidate shall have reached the age of twenty-five years and shall have held license to preach and been engaged in the active work of the

ministry as a pastor or evangelist for at least two full consecutive years. Candidates for ordination who have not graduated from our endorsed Bible schools shall be expected to comply with the requirements made by the District Councils regarding reading courses and examinations thereupon, before ordination is granted." The motion was amended by substituting the words "twenty-three years" for the words "twenty-five years." (For disposition of the motion, see minutes of Tuesday morning meeting.)

Meeting adjourned at 12:10 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Bates.

MONDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. Brother Leonard Rogers of Modesto, California, led the song service, and Brother H. H. Shelley of Brockton, Massachusetts, led in prayer. The afternoon message was brought by Brother Fred Vogler of Wichita, Kansas, the theme of his message being, "Earnestly Contending for the Faith which was once Delivered unto the Saints."

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m. with prayer by Brother Vogler.

Inasmuch as it had been decided by the house that the report of the Committee on Schools should be presented for consideration as the first item of business in the afternoon session, this report was brought before the house. It was moved and carried that the first recommendation in the report be adopted which reads as follows: "That a special committee be appointed to work out a basis and a plan for standardizing our Bible Schools, so far as possible, as suggested in our General Council by-laws and that schools which meet the requirements be given liberal publicity in our periodicals." It was moved and carried that we recommend to the Committee on Schools that we drop the last clause of the recommendation pertaining to liberal publicity because of its not being germane to the first

part of the recommendation. The motion that the recommendation be adopted was then carried.

It was moved and seconded that the second recommendation of the Committee on Schools be adopted, which, as amended, reads as follows: "That the General Council take steps to establish a literary institution to meet the needs of our young people who desire literary training. This school to be provided by the Council and operated under Council control." It was moved and carried that the recommendation under consideration be referred back to the committee with the recommendation that they formulate plans for financing the building, the upkeep, and the control of this said literary school and report again as soon as possible at this session.

Meeting adjourned at 5:00 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother W. B. McCafferty.

TUESDAY MORNING

The morning devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. and the song service was led by Brother Guy Phillips of East St. Louis, Illinois. Brother G. F. Lewis of Youngstown, Ohio, led in prayer, and the speaker of the morning was Brother William B. McCafferty, member of the faculty of Southwestern Bible School. Brother McCafferty read the 28th chapter of Isaiah, and the subject of his message was "The Earth's Last Great Revival Movement."

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother P. C. Nelson. The reading of the minutes of the preceding day's business sessions followed, and the minutes were approved as read.

The report of the Committee on Schools was brought before the house for further consideration. Inasmuch as the recommendation in the report regarding the establishing of a General Council literary school was referred to the committee for the formulating of plans for financing the building, etc. with the instructions to report again at this session of the Council, the Committee on Schools presented a

supplemental report. It was the recommendation of the Committee that in view of the divided opinion of the Council concerning the wisdom of attempting anything as a Council, that it would be wise to defer further consideration of the recommendation that a literary school be established at this time. Moved and carried that the supplemental report of the Committee on Schools be adopted.

There was no motion that the third recommendation in the report of the Committee on Schools be adopted that the Council encourage the establishment of Bible Schools and literary schools wherever they may be needed. It was felt that this matter was already covered in the By-laws.

Moved and carried that the fourth recommendation of the report be adopted which reads, "That, so far as possible, work should be provided by these schools to enable worthwhile young people to earn at least part of their support while in school."

It was then moved and carried that the entire report be adopted as amended.

The following motion which was before the house at the close of the Monday morning session was presented for further discussion: "No minister shall be ordained to the full ministry until such candidate shall have reached the age of twenty-three years and shall have held license to preach and been engaged in the active work of the ministry as a pastor or evangelist for at least two full consecutive years. Candidates for ordination who have not graduated from our endorsed Bible schools shall be expected to comply with the requirements made by the District Councils regarding reading courses and examinations thereupon, before ordination is granted." It was moved and carried that the resolution be tabled.

The morning session adjourned at 11:50 a. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother O. L. Mabry of Colorado.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon devotional service opened at 1:30 p. m. Brother Wallace Bragg was in charge of the song service and Brother Savage of New Mexico led in prayer. Brother H. C. Ball, superintendent of the Latin American work, was the afternoon speaker.

The business session opened at 2:30 p. m. The following resolution was presented, and it was moved and carried that it be adopted. "In order to assist us in arriving at the mind of the Lord in the choice of the officers who shall serve the General Council during the coming two years, be it resolved, That the nominating vote be not considered as an elective vote even though one candidate shall have received two-thirds or more of the nominating ballots. Be it further resolved, That the nominating votes be not counted and that the names of all nominees for any office of the General Council shall be posted to be voted upon until an election is declared according to Article II, Section 2, 'Nominations and Elections' of the By-laws of the General Council."

Nominations were then made for General Superintendent, and on the first elective ballot, Brother E. S. Williams was returned to office by an overwhelming majority. Nominations were then made for the office of Assistant General Superintendent. On the first elective ballot cast, Brother J. Roswell Flower was returned to office. The next office to be filled was that of General Secretary. Brother J. R. Evans, who has served the General Council in this office for twelve years, asked that his name not be considered because of his misfortune in having his vision greatly impaired. It was moved and carried that the Executive Presbytery be authorized to make such provision as in their godly judgment ought to be made to supply the needs of Brother Evans during the coming two years. Nominations were then made for the office of General Secretary, and after the first ballot had been cast no election was declared.

Meeting adjourned at 5:45 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Wallace Bragg.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The morning devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. with Brother Robert E. Parten of Austin, Texas, in charge of the song service. Brother Clyde Bailey of Mobile, Alabama, led in prayer, and Brother Carl O'Guin of Rockford, Illinois, was the morning speaker. The subject of the morning message was, "Promises of the Abrahamic Covenant."

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother W. I. Evans. The minutes of the preceding day's business sessions were read and approved.

The following report of the Roster Committee was read. The number of ordained ministers who registered was 631; licensed ministers, 252 delegates, 149; missionaries, 30; visitors, 829, making a total of 1891.

Brother Milton Summers spoke briefly regarding the PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL and copies of the EVANGEL were given to those desiring copies.

Balloting continued for the election of General Secretary, and after the fourth ballot an election was declared, Brother J. Roswell Flower being elected to the office.

It was moved and unanimously carried that this Council declare its appreciation to Brother J. R. Evans for his faithful and efficient service during the past twelve years. Brother Evans then expressed his appreciation of the kind thought of the brethren and of the co-operation he has received from those on the field and stated that he wanted to be useful in some capacity until Jesus comes.

It was moved and carried that the Memorial Service be held at 6:00 p. m. and that the business session convene at 1:30 p. m.

Adjourned at 12:20 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother Musgrove.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon business session opened at 1:30 p. m. with prayer by Brother Whitworth. The General Superintendent expressed his appreciation of the favorable publicity given the Council by the Dallas newspapers.

Brother Flower stated that inasmuch as he had been elected to the office of General Secretary he wished to resign as Assistant General Superintendent. It was moved and carried that his resignation be accepted.

Nominations were then made for the office of Assistant General Superintendent. While the ballots were being counted, other matters of business were brought before the house. An amendment to the Essential Resolution on worldliness was presented to the house but was rejected since it was considered that this matter was fully covered in the Essential Resolution on worldliness.

A resolution that a committee be appointed to present a plan at next General Council relative to the General Council becoming a delegated body was presented to the house but was rejected.

A resolution regarding the Executive Presbytery securing prints for church buildings was presented to the house, and it was moved and carried that this resolution be referred to the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, the Central Bible Institute with its enlarged building is already crowded beyond capacity, and

"Whereas, it is doubtful, in consideration of the greatest degree of efficiency, whether it would be wise to further extend the capacity of Central Bible Institute and to concentrate a larger number of students in the one place, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the General Council approve of the establishing of General Council schools, one on the East Coast and one on the West Coast, such

schools to be under the direct control and management of the Executive Presbyters, similar to Central Bible Institute. Be it further

“Resolved, That the General Council approve of still other General Council schools being established in different parts of the country as the needs may demand.”

It was announced that after the sixth ballot had been cast for the election of an Assistant General Superintendent, no election was declared. Because of the divided opinion of the house, it was moved and carried that the action taken in accepting Brother Flower's resignation as Assistant General Superintendent be reconsidered. It was moved and carried that Brother Flower's resignation be not accepted and that he be retained in the office of Assistant General Superintendent as well as in the office of General Secretary.

The election of the General Presbyters followed. The names nominated by the various Districts were presented, and it was moved and carried that the recommendation of the Districts be accepted and that by acclamation the nominees from the different Districts be elected in a body. The following are the newly elected General Presbyters.

Wisconsin and Northern Michigan District: Joseph Wannenmacher, D. M. Carlson.

The election of the non-resident Executive Presbyters followed. During the balloting, Brother Williams spoke regarding the problem of standardizing Bible schools and recommended the appointing of a committee to function the year round. A resolution authorizing the appointment of such a committee was considered and was referred to the Resolutions Committee for framing.

On the third ballot cast for election of non-resident Executive Presbyters, Brother C. A. Lasater and Brother J. N. Gortner were elected. It was decided that the third non-resident Executive Presbyter be elected at the Thursday morning session.

Meeting adjourned at 5:30 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother E. S. Williams.

THURSDAY MORNING

The devotional service opened at 9:00 a. m. with Brother Glenn Millard in charge of the song service. Brother A. B. Cox of Dayton, Ohio, brought the morning message. The subject of his message was "Holiness."

The business session opened at 10:00 a. m. with prayer by Brother Newby. The minutes of the preceding day's business sessions were read and approved.

The first item of business was the election of the third non-resident Executive Presbyter. After the fifth ballot had been cast, no election was declared. Brother G. F. Lewis then asked that his name be withdrawn in favor of Brother E. L. Newby. Brother Lewis then moved that Brother Newby be elected by acclamation. This motion was seconded and carried.

The following resolution was adopted.

"Whereas, in the report of the Educational Com-

mittee which was adopted at this General Council, there was the recommendation that a committee be appointed to arrange a basis on which schools might receive General Council endorsement, and

"Whereas, there is need of such a committee; therefore be it

"Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed as a standing committee on institutions and that this committee be authorized to visit all institutions wishing General Council endorsement, the co-operating institutions to share equally in meeting the expense of such visits; and be it further

"Resolved, That this committee be composed of men connected with no institution."

It was moved and carried that in view of the fact that the General Superintendent has been working very hard, not only during this General Council convention, but during the past year, that he be granted a month's vacation free from all duties.

It was moved and carried that Article XII of the By-laws "Discipline of Members" be amended by changing the second paragraph to read as follows: "Both the officary of the District Council and the Executive Presbytery of the General Council shall be recognized as having the right of initiative in this matter. It is understood that in case the officary of a District Council shall recommend that Council fellowship be withdrawn from a minister or his name dropped from the roll of Council ministers, such recommendation to the Executive Presbytery shall set forth in writing satisfactory reasons for the action. A copy of the recommendation shall also be placed in the hands of the minister that is involved. If there be no protest to this action, the Executive Presbytery shall comply with the request of the District. In case the accused shall file a protest with the Executive Presbytery within thirty days after date of notice of dismissal, the Executive Presbytery shall remand the case back to the District for trial. In this event, all

the provisions for the trials of ministers shall be complied with."

The following resolution was adopted:

"Inasmuch as unity is a vital principle of the church, the condition of growth and spiritual development and power in the apostolic body, it is essential that we recognize our vital relationship to each other, and that we practice Christian co-operation in all our pastoral, evangelistic, missionary, and local church work and business. Therefore we recommend that our evangelists and pastors consult with our Council officials before putting on a campaign with a non-Council assembly in any given city, so as to ascertain whether or not such non-Council assembly is approved as to doctrinal standards and co-operative fellowship with Council assemblies, and if not approved by the District officials, they shall be expected to not hold a campaign for them."

Adjourned at 12:10 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother C. A. Lasater.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon business session opened at 1:45 p. m. with prayer by Brother T. J. Gotcher.

Moved and carried that Article V, Section 4 (b) of the By-laws "Ordination of Women" be changed to read as follows:

"(b) The Scriptures plainly teach that while there is a difference between the ministry of men and of women in the church, that divinely called and qualified women may also serve the church in the ministry of the Word. Women who may have demonstrated a distinct ministry of evangelism and who have met the requirements of District Councils may be licensed to preach the Word. Matured women of not less than twenty-five years of age who have developed in the ministry of the Word so that their ministry is acceptable generally and who have proved their qualifications in actual service and who have met all the requirements of the Credentials Committees of the

District Councils may be ordained to the ministry of the gospel and may serve either as evangelists or as pastors as their qualifications warrant. The right to administer the ordinances of the church, when such acts are necessary, shall be included in the ordination."

Moved and carried that this resolution be made retroactive.

Moved and carried that Article II, Section 2 (2) of the By-laws be changed to harmonize with the amendment to Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution "General Presbytery. "

Brother A. G. Osterberg read the report of the Committee on Old Age Pensions, and it was moved and seconded that this report be accepted and that the resolutions contained in the report be adopted. Each recommendation in the report was considered separately, and the following is the report as adopted.

Report of Committee on Old Age Pensions

Your committee on pensions for retired ministers, while pointing to the voluntary aspect of the two plans submitted, would also desire to emphasize the solemn obligation that rests upon each member of our Council fellowship to provide aid and relief for our aged and retired ministry when needed. In all honor, it is our duty to provide means for their welfare. A process of educating and acquainting our fellowship with this obligation as well as the means for caring for it is vitally necessary. The columns of the Evangel and its editorial staff, all our District Superintendents in their Council sessions and visits to our assemblies, and all our ministry when fitting occasions may arise to do so, should speak upon the subject and make a plea in their behalf. We as a committee feel it will be entirely fitting and pleasing to God to do our utmost to begin immediately to interest ourselves and others in the matter.

Fellowship Fund for Retired Ministers

We submit for your consideration the following

plan for obtaining the necessary monies to sustain the fellowship fund for retired ministers:

1. That each assembly in our fellowship be requested through the pages of the Evangel, by a letter from headquarters, and by effort of the District officary, to take up an assembly free-will offering twice each year, advisedly during May and November, if suitable and convenient in the local assembly. If these months may not be convenient, others more convenient may be substituted.

2. We offer the recommendation that each Council minister be also requested to send in to headquarters his own free-will offering for his needy fellow ministers twice each year at the times stated for assemblies.

3. That our entire Council fellowship and constituency be urged upon any fitting occasion and through the Evangel to interest kind friends in making special gifts, and endowments to this fund.

Death Benefit

1. That a letter be sent from headquarters to our Council constituency calling attention to the establishment of a voluntary death benefit.

2. That those desiring to benefit by such an arrangement fill out a questionnaire which shall be enclosed, together with the initial fee of membership which shall not be less than one dollar and which shall establish a fund from which the beneficiary shall be paid as a result of death.

3. That the beneficiary shall be paid the accumulations of this fund to the extent of three hundred dollars. It shall be understood that if the accumulation shall not amount in total to this amount, the beneficiary shall receive whatever amount may be in the fund, but shall not receive a sum in excess of three hundred dollars.

4. That each member of the association be notified when the fund requires replenishment. Upon such

notice the member shall forward the sum of one dollar. Should the member fail to do so and become delinquent, after ninety days of the first notice, said member shall be dropped from membership of the association.

* * * *

It was moved and carried that when the details of this plan are worked out, copies should be sent to each of the Districts for their consideration and adoption.

It was moved and carried that since the members of the Women's Missionary Council of Dallas have taken such an active part in meeting the incoming visitors from the North, South, East, and West who came by bus and train to attend the General Council and have labored in many ways for the success and comfort of those who have attended, that they be extended a rising vote of thanks for their courtesies.

It was moved and carried that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, the General Council of the Assemblies of God has been privileged to conduct its Sixteenth Session in Dallas and has been extended hearty hospitality by all the assemblies of the Dallas section and the hospitality of the Assembly at Peak and Garland Streets in particular, therefore be it

Resolved, That we express our indebtedness and appreciation to the pastors and their assistants and to all the assemblies in Dallas who have aided in making this session of the General Council such a blessing under the hand of God.

Moved and carried that we express our appreciation to the members of the several committees who have faithfully performed the tasks that have been assigned to them.

Moved and carried that we extend a vote of appreciation to the newspapers of Dallas—The Times Herald, Dallas News, and Dallas Journal.

Moved and carried that the Executive Presbytery

be authorized to edit, correct, and publish the minutes of this General Council and to mail a copy of the same to each minister and missionary in the fellowship.

The General Superintendent extended to the General Council in behalf of the city of Memphis, Tennessee, an invitation that the next session of the General Council be held in that city. It was moved and carried that we express our appreciation to the city of Memphis for this invitation and that we commit this matter to the Executive Presbytery for their sincere consideration.

Moved and carried that any unfinished business be left in the hands of the Executive Presbytery.

The Sixteenth Session of the General Council adjourned at 3:30 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by Brother J. W. Welch.
