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The Only Way of Peace

OD willeth not the death of any sinner, but that all should come unto the knowledge of the truth (2 Peter 3:9; 1 Tim. 2:4). That is the declaration of God's thought and of God's attitude towards the sinner. What is the condition of man? "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God," and "the soul that sinneth it shall die." Because ALL have sinned, ALL have to die. Distressing condition! Is there a way out of it? Is there a remedy? God has provided it. "For God so loved the world"—the world full of sinners, yet God so loved them. And His love took action, "That He gave His Son, His only begotten Son"—the only remedy God could accept, God's own Son.

He gave His Son, His only begotten Son"—the only remedy God could accept, God's own Son. "That whosoever"—He loved the world but He loved the individual in the world. He loved you, that if you "believe in Him"—an individual transaction—you "should not perish"—He has no desire for you to perish—"but have everlasting life."

What is the most precious thing to a man who is drowning? Life. He does not value it when he is on the ship, but when the ship is wrecked then he values life as never before. Then he values the lifebuoy which he hardly noticed before. Now it is precious, for it saves his life.

Why are men not saved today? Because they do not realize they are lost. And yet God says, "There is no difference, all have sinned." "He that believeth not is condemned already."

How can the God of love, the God of compassion, the God that gave His Son, Jesus Christ, be brought into relationship with a man who seeks salvation, who realizes he is lost? Believe God's record where He says through His Son, "Him that cometh unto Me I will in no wise cast out." Make an advance toward God as the prodigal did, and God will run toward you. Yes, even when you are a great way off. The father ran, had compassion, fell on the neck of his son and kissed him. That is Christ's picture of the reception that the sinner gets when he starts toward God. Throw aside your doubts. Never mind your rags. Never mind the elder brother. Never mind the past. Say, "God be merciful to me a sinner, for I have sinned against heaven and before Thee."

You will have a royal welcome, the kiss of reconciliation, the best robe to take the place of your rags—the righteousness of Christ imputed unto you. And there will be music and making merriment. God loves the sinner and has made a way to divest him of his rags, to purge him, to cleanse him from his sins, to forgive, to receive, and send him on his way rejoicing. God's thoughts towards a sinner are thoughts of peace. He has given Jesus, His own Son, who gives peace, for He is our Peace. You can never, never have peace any other way. There is no peace, saith my God, to the wicked.

Jesus commanded the stormy wind and raging sea to cease, and there was a great calm. There was peace. He can do the same for a troubled heart as He could for a troubled sea.

THE BRIDEGROOM AND THE BRIDE

"And the Lord God caused a deep sleep to fall upon Adam, and he slept: and he took one of his ribs, and closed up the flesh instead thereof; and the rib, which the Lord God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto the man. And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man" (Gen. 2:21-23).

Adam was a type of our Lord Jesus Christ. "And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last Adam was made a quickening spirit. Howbeit that was not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural; and afterward that which is spiritual" (1 Cor. 15:45, 46). Notice that Adam is called the first man Adam, but there is another Adam spoken of in the same verse: "the last Adam was made a quickening spirit." Do you know Him? He is Jesus. "The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second man is the Lord from heaven."

We saw from those verses in Genesis that the Lord God put the first Adam to sleep and he slept. And it came to pass, while he slept, that the Lord God opened his side and took thereout a rib, of which He made his bride, and He brought her to Adam. "And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man." Was there anything answering to this in the case of the last Adam? Yes, on Calvary's cross the last Adam was put into a deep sleep: "He bowed His head, and gave up the ghost." "But one of the soldiers with a spear pierced His side, and forthwith came there out blood and water" (John 19:34.) Just as the first Adam while he slept had his side opened, so the last Adam also had His side opened while He slept. The first Adam could not have a bride of which he could say, "this is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh," without being put into a deep sleep and having his side opened. The last Adam also could not have a bride suitable to Himself without going into a deep sleep and having His side opened that forth might come the bride that should be His forever.

Paul writes to the Corinthian church, "For I am jealous over you with a godly jealousy: for I have espoused you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ" (2 Cor. 11:2). Espoused, engaged to Jesus Christ! Hallelujah! How wonderful it is that we are engaged to Jesus Christ. It looks as if there is going to be a wedding.

"Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ: that ye should be married to another, even to him who is raised from the dead, that we should bring forth fruit unto God" (Rom. 7:4). What is the meaning of "dead to the law"? Well, we were married to the law; the law was our first husband, and there was no such thing as divorce in this case. We could not get a legal separation because the law was legal, and so we had to live with our first husband until something happened. Either the law must die or we must die to effect a separation. Somebody did die. Who was it? It was ourselves. When? When Jesus died. "Wherefore, my brethren, ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ." Paul says, "If one died for all, then were all dead." So we are dead and done

for. Do you believe that? You will not get any beuefit from it unless you believe it.

The law saw you in Jesus Christ, saw your sins laid upon your Substitute. And when the law saw sin upon that great Substitute, the law drew its sword and slew Him. God said, "Awake, O sword, against my shepherd, and against the man that is my fellow, saith the Lord of Hosts." God's holy law could not withhold its sentence although it was Jesus the holy One who was the sin-bearer. So the law thrust its sword through the heart of Jesus, and Jesus died. But He took us all with Him when He went to Calvary and so we are dead.

Now then, we are free to get married again. Why? We died but we came to life again. When Jesus came out of the grave He brought us out with Him; not the old dead self; this is the new creation. Jesus hath proposed. Will you accept Him? You have accepted Him, you say. Then it looks like a wedding. I find there are people who don't seem to want to give up the old husband; they want to flirt with the law and be married to Jesus Christ. I was very glad to get away from my first husband. Oh, there was nothing the matter with him, but there was something the matter with me. He kept telling me what to do but I could not do it. He commanded me and I tried to do it, but I could not. Every time I tried not to do something I went and did it. And when I did it he used to roar against me till my hair almost stood upright with fear and anguish. I did my best but I could not obey him. "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?"

Nothing but death could separate me from my first husband. Then Jesus came and proposed and I accepted Him. And when I tell my story I am telling yours. Some people do not know where they are, under law or under grace. Do you feel a sneaking regard for the old husband still? I am quite satisfied with the new one. I have not a word of fault to find with the old one, he was "holy and just and good." Fancy wanting to get away from anyone like that! But when he told me what to do he never gave me any strength to do it. My new Husband catches hold of my arm and helps me over all the rough places. Even when I am fainting and failing He says, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee. And so I am not going back to the first husband. I did flirt with him just after being saved and soon found myself in chains again. I began to read all the commandments of the law and said, "I am going to do this," but soon I was clanking about with heavy chains on me. I could show you the very place where God came and knocked the old chains off again. "Ye also are become dead to the law by the body of Christ; that ye should be married to another, even to him who is raised from the dead, that we should bring forth fruit unto God." This is a love story, the only love story worth telling.
"Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also

"Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave Himself for it; that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to Himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish" (Eph. 5:25-27).

Jesus loved the church and gave Himself for it, that He might present it to Himself. That is it. That He might present it to Himself without spot or wrinkle or any such thing. I believe on the wedding morning Jesus will look into the face of His bride and will say, "Thou art all fair, my love; there is no spot in thee." But Lord, what about the spots? "Oh, they are all gone." But, Lord, I was nothing but a mass of wrinkles! "There is no spot or wrinkle or any blemish in thee." Are you looking forward to that day when you will satisfy the heart of Jesus? You are far from satisfied with yourself, but on that wedding morning Jesus will be satisfied with His bride.

Let us suppose a case. Suppose a young man in Australia sees the photograph of a young lady in the United States. A friend of his takes it over and tells him all about her and from the description given by his friend and from the photograph he falls in love with her. He writes and tells her he loves her, and if she returns his affections he will come and they will be married. What will the young lady do? If she considers him at all she will write back and say, You have my photograph, but I have never seen yours. Will you send me one? Well, you have never seen Jesus face to face, but you love Him though you have not seen Him. "Whom having not seen ye love." You ask about the photograph business, what has that to do with the case? It has a lot to do with it. The Bible is an album full of photographs of Jesus.

No picture of Jesus ever flattered Him. Why? Because He is altogether lovely. The 45th Psalm is an excellent photo of Jesus. I happen to know the photographer; He is a friend of mine—the Holy Ghost. It is a pen-picture but it is perfect in every part. "Thou art fairer than the children of men; grace is poured into thy lips: therefore God hath blessed thee forever. Gird thy sword upon thy thigh, O most mighty, with thy glory and thy majesty." If I am going to get married I want someone strong to take care of me. Well, He is strong; He is the most mighty. "Thy throne, O God, is forever and He is God. O bow and worship Him. Who says this? It is God who says this. To whom does He say it? He says it to the Bridegroom, to Jesus. What is His character? "Thou lovest righteousness, and hatest wickedness: therefore God, thy God, hath anointed thee with the oil of gladness above thy fel-

Look at Him again. "All thy garments smell of myrrh, and aloes, and cassia, out of the ivory palaces." Have you ever smelled the garments of Jesus in the midst of the assembly?

"Upon thy right hand did stand the queen in gold of Ophir." Divine righteousness.

Listen to the proposal: "Hearken, O daughter, and consider, and incline thine ear; forget also thine own people, and thy father's house; so shall the king greatly desire thy beauty: for he is thy Lord; and worship thou him."

You have heard the proposal, now turn to Gen. 24:58, "And they called Rebekah, and said unto her, Wilt thou go with this man? And she said, I will go. Rebekah said what every bride has to say, "I will." Hallelujah! "I will go." In order to go she must leave her father and mother, friends, brothers, country, old associations, and go away to someone she had never seen. Most extraordinary, but she did it. She said, "I will go." Shall I tell you why she went? She was in love with Isaac. Do you object and say that she could not have been because she never had seen him? But she was; if she had not been, she could never have gone. That is where the type is so wonderful. We have not seen Jesus but we are in love with Him. She had never seen Isaac, but she said she would go, because she loved him. Do you say the same as Rebekah-I will?

I suppose you are wondering if it is going to be a ne wedding and if there will be any gifts. Well, let fine wedding and if there will be any gifts. Well, let us read again: "And the daughter of Tyre shall be there with a gift; even the rich among the people shall intreat thy favor.'

What is the bride going to wear? "The king's daughter is all glorious within: her clothing is of wrought gold. She shall be brought unto the king in raiment of needlework."

Any bridesmaids? Of course. "The virgins her companions that follow her shall be brought unto thee. With gladness and rejoicing shall they be brought."

You say you hope they will have a fine day for the wedding. You can be quite sure of that point. "Happy is the bride that the sun shines on." Jesus is the Sun of Righteousness and so she shall be extraordinarily happy. Watch the procession—"With gladness and rejoicing shall they be brought: they shall enter into the king's palace.'

Where are they going to live? I think I know. "In my Father's house are many mansions. . . I go to prepare a place for you." Perhaps you think you ought to be going and getting the house ready, buying the furniture and so on. No, Jesus is going to furnish it. Do you think you will like the furniture Jesus chooses? "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go I will—send somebody to fetch you?" Oh, not a bit of it! He paid too much for His bride to send anybody else to fetch her. He is going to fetch her Himself. "I will come back and fetch you, receive you unto myself, that where I am there ye may be also."

Jesus is the greatest heir that ever was born; but the bride is not marrying Him for His wealth, but for Himself. But they do endow a bride with a dowry, don't they? Well, this bride is an heir of God and joint-heir with Jesus Christ. You know the old love stories used to say that they lived happy ever after. Of course they didn't. But in this case, it is true, true to the letter and to the spirit. They are going to live happy ever afterwards.

Of course, you say, this is only a figure of speech. No, it is a reality. It is the greatest reality. The weddings we have here are only shadows; they last only a short time and then death breaks them. But, thank God, up there they shall never die any more.

Look here! Don't you think it most extraordinary that, when the great King looked for a bride for His Son, He did not look among the aristocracy of heaven? Why did He not? Because there was one whom Jesus loved, who lived down in the slums of this world, the filthy slums, and she was the same as the slums. It is a most extraordinary thing that He loved her, but He did; and He made up His mind to have her. He would not force her, oh no, He would win her. And how did He do it? He just drew the vail aside a little bit and let her have a peep at Himself. And every time she saw Him she fell deeper in love. "These things did Jesus in Cana of Galilee and manifested forth His glory." They said, "We beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." 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"THE DAY IS AT HAND"

The hardest and severest winter with all its chilling frosts has to go before the summer sun. The earth has been bound, frozen and held, but the Sun of Righteousness is rising with power to thaw, melt and break up. When the winter is over and gone, the bride will hear the Bridegroom's voice, saying, "Rise up, my love, my fair one, and come away.

The Word of God has been scattered by Bible societies, east and west, north and south. The Spirit can put life into every Scripture that has been circulated. The Spirit can raise up an exceeding great army of workers and teachers. Do you think God is not mindful of the millions of Scriptures that have been circulated? Scriptures are now hidden in garrets and cellars and are stored in libraries to no purpose, like the dynamite in the enemy's camp and waiting to be ignited by the spark from heaven. He spake the word and it was done. He who on the Day of Pentecost could give so many languages by the same Spirit, can quicken the Word in four or five hundred different languages. The world is encircled by the Word. God can encircle the world by His Spirit.

The word of the Lord came to Ezekiel, "Prophesy unto the wind, Thus saith the Lord God." And God is challenging us, "Call My Spirit to make the dead letter a life-giving word." The Word, printed and circulated in advance, is an instrument for God to work on, and an instrument through which to work.

He can also raise up an army of Spirit-filled men and women to interpret the Word in the light of the fulness of the Spirit and the fulness of the times. We see through a glass darkly and we read through a glass darkly. Take for example the fourteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians, how you read it now and how you read it seventeen years ago. If God can throw light on one chapter, think of the light He can throw on all the chapters of the Bible, illuminating the eternal Word of God by the Spirit.

"Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away." The great and wonderful lights in the heavens which He made shall pass away, but not His Word. Why? Because the Gospel is the unfolding of God's heart and God's secrets. His revelations are not going to fade away like decadent suns and wandering stars. The Word of God is no comet. God is going to illuminate His Word with so much light that the lights in the heavens will be eclipsed by its splendor and will pass away. "The words that I speak unto you are spirit and are life." The Word endureth forever. The Word liveth and abideth forever. It is the sure word of prophecy, the chart for the coming ages.

Calvary is going to regulate the destinies of eternity. The garden of Eden was linked to the garden of Gethsemane, and this again to that further scene described by John: "And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb. In the midst of the street of it, and on either side of the river, was there the tree of life, which bear twelve manner of fruits," all regulated and controlled from Calvary.

In the splendors of glory, the greatest splendor is the Lamb of Calvary. "I beheld . . . in the midst of the throne a Lamb as it had been slain." Calvary is the central place of time, the slain Lamb in the throne, the central place in eternity. Blessed are they and thankful should they be who have kissed the Son in time, so they can enjoy Him in eternity.

It does not appear what we shall be, but we know that when He shall appear we shall be like Him. When He who is the center of time and eternity shall appear, we shall be like Him.

The Lamb bore scars in eternity. We will have to bear our scars. Paul bore in his body the stigmata of the Lord Jesus. My First Sermon That I Did Not Preach

A Methodist Minister Tells of His Pentecostal Experience

I came in contact with Pentecost in Wichita, Kansas about fifteen years ago. One balmy Sunday morning I casually dropped into a mission service on the West Side, and thoroughly enjoyed a spirited service of praise and prayer. On learning that I was planning on entering the ministry, the leader asked me to preach for them the next Sunday morning. I had just recently heard a noted evangelist preach on the Prodigal Son, and since I was getting myself groomed for a ministerial start in life, I decided to borrow the noted man's sermon and start in. That week I carefully studied the Prodigal Son from his mother's door yard to the hog-pen, and, by the time I had chased him from the companionship of pigs back to his father's arms and the banquet table, I was feeling quite full of preach. I knew little about God, but I had the urge in my soul, and with the tread of a conqueror I marched straight to that Mission Hall that next Sunday morning. I persuaded a young friend of mine by the name of Dow Brown to go along and enjoy the triumph of my first sermon.

Soon I arrived, with the "borrowed" sermon chained, like Caesar's captives, to my chariot wheels, and was ready for business. The meeting did not start off to suit me. In fact, it started with a testimony meeting, and several of them almost forgot that they had a preacher on hand with another man's sermon burning in his soul. Every nerve was tense and taut with suspense, and my heart got to beating like a trip hammer against my ribs; and the delay gave me time to think that perhaps I could not remember as much of that fellow's sermon as I had thought for earlier in the I had prayed much and had the inspiration for convincing multitudes -in my room before starting; but, somehow, it had all gone before I knew it, and my spiritual sky had become leaden and gray.

About this time something happened, and little did I think that my hurried action of a moment would be the forerunner of such bitterness of soul in after life. Many times since I have repented for that hour's rashness. It pays to have an ear open to the voice of God. Well, now to the story again. I was still anticipating giving them a real preachment until, all at once, the shadows of Africa blotted black my sky of youthful en-thusiasm. One old colored Auntie got up and began to praise God, and soon gave hilarious vent to her religious ecstasy. My mother's folks had come from the heathered hills of Scotland to old Virginia, and I had deep prejudice in nov heart of hearts. The old lady had a midnight skin, but a snow-white heart, and seemed to be in considerable favor with the Pentecostal brethren.

I looked on with amazement that they did not put a stop to her vociferous

praises. Her face began to shine and glisten with the glory of God, and my heart froze and froze. When the swarthyskinned testimonialist had finished they all went to prayer and all began to call on God in mighty power. The heaven opened and I turned my cup upside down and began looking for my hat, then, beckoning for my young friend to follow, I left the building. Once on the outside, we held a hasty consultation, and Dow urged me to stay and preach my sermon; but I was unvieldingly obdurate.

With the statement that I was not called upon to worship God with "niggers" I marched away with ill-disguised disgust. When their prayer meeting was over and they opened their eyes they were minus the young preacher with a "borrowed' sermon, but I guess they were not grievously inconvenienced by being deprived of the sermon. I was the big loser and did not know it.

When I returned to my little room that morning the heaviest burden fell on my soul and I felt like going back and apologizing to the folks for not preaching, and I trembled from head to foot for an hour or more, but I did not go. How I wish I had. I reasoned finally that a crowd that did not know enough to make "niggers" stay where they belonged did not need any apology from me and thus I dismissed the matter for fourteen years.

During this period I never again came in contact with Pentecostal teaching or testimony direct, nor a tract, nor a book, nor a sermon, nor one individual to interest me in the matter. I made a careful and painstaking study of comparative religions; namely, Buddhism, Confucianism, Brahmanism, Mohammedanism, and of all the modern cults, for the purpose of refuting their viewpoint. For the purpose of refutation merely I laboriously and studiously went through all the tenets of the modern cults, but never did God permit me to get interested in the Latter Rain movement. There in my room, refusing to go back to the Pentecostal Mission to apologize to the folks for my action I had insulted God and His Truth. Bitterly did I pay for my stiffnecked action.

Just before coming back to Wichita, Kansas, I was in Amarillo, Texas holding a meeting; and the first direct contact with Pentecost in fourteen years was made there. We had a fine tent meeting in progress and a lady came in and gave a Pentecostal testimony in a very modest manner. I challenged her statements, however, and told her before them all that her blessing was of the That night the crowds began to fall off, and the tent blew down. The The next night it blew down again. crowds got less and less, and the third night the tent went down. I said I would put in bigger stakes and do it myself so it would not blow down again. The

day was hot and the sledge was heavy, the perspiration streamed, my back ached; but my determination carried me through the day in triumph. Tired but victorious, I had the tent up in fine shape by the time the shadows fell. That evening, the service ended, I walked home under a beautiful starlit sky, aching in every muscle and soon I fell into wearied slumber. About one o'clock in the morning I was awakened by the fearful howling of wind, and immediately I thought of the tent. I knew that I had not planned for a storm and that I must hurry to the tent, and hurry I did as fast as my feet would carry me.

When I got there it was ripping and tearing and my big stakes had failed to I let it down as best I could and decided to give it up that day. I knew that I did not have money to pay for it if it was completely ruined, and in desperation I did give it up. Pentecost and the Almighty was putting me to confusion. We can not trifle with God and escape the penalty of wrong doing. see now that God was beginning to lead me back again toward the light.

All through the years I hungered to settle some day in Wichita, Kansas. life had been teeming with activities that had taken me criss-crossing all over this continent, and I had not isolated myself in seclusion. From New York to California, and from Canada to many parts of Texas, I had been; but, as the Jew turns his face toward Jerusalem, so had my face been turned always toward Wichita.

About a year ago I failed completely in health, and a doctor said I had about six months more to live. For three years I had seen this coming, and had hoped against hope that I might tide through. And so to Wichita I went with the consciousness that unless God healed me I was through with this little game of life. I tried to face my future as a man in that condition should; but at times I was furiously rebellious against meeting with my end with so little accomplished. I was unable to work and properly support my family. It was a Cethsemane hour for me, and I drank a cup of sorrow to the bitter dregs.

One day, in Wichita, a lady brought up the subject of speaking in unknown tongues, and suggested that I read Mrs. McPherson's book. I did my best to conceal the commiseration that welled up in my soul, and yet that lady did succeed in convincing me that the subject was in the Bible. As I walked home to one of the best and most faithful wives any man ever had. I decided that I had no right to be totally indifferent to a Bible theme.

I had always prided myself on standing for the non-mutilation of the Word of God, and I saw that I had no right to be indifferent to any part of it. At last I decided to read Mrs. McPherson's book and see what she had to say. She had recently been in Wichita, and the very best homes of culture in Wichita were openly for her, and everywhere I went I heard her name sounded as being a wonderful woman. The preachers had opposed her, but the great majority

of folks had stoutly championed her. I got her book, "This is That," and read it, and was amazed to find my eyes swimming with tears as I read of her early trip to China and her early heart-breaks.

This crying stunt of mine surprised me very much, as I am not given to such procedure as a rule. When I got through with her book I still thought, as I had at the beginning, that I had experienced the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. I asked my wife to read the book and she did so; and she too, was in tears over the story. God had warmed my heart as I read, but I had gained no doctrinal satisfaction from the persual of the book. However, I was hooked for God by it. I decided that I would take my Bible and abide by a scriptural decision. I carefully read every verse on the Baptism and the speaking in other tongues until I got to the very last verse on the subject of tongues, 1 Cor. 14:39, where Paul concludes by saying, "Forbid not to speak with tongues." When I read this verse I got some light.

I turned to my wife and told her that this verse settled it with me, in that any person who forbade the speaking in other tongues was going contrary to the express Word of God. Mrs. Perkins looked me in the eye for a moment, and, woman-like, smiled, then said, "Maybe that is what killed your meeting down in Texas last summer," and I had no more to say. It put me to thinking, and then I thought it was about time for me to take a walk, which I did.

Then began my spiritual tug of war, for I saw I had to fellowship people who spoke in other tongues or repudiate the plain teaching of the Word of God. Plainly it says: "Forbid not to speak with tongues." I had received the Holy Spirit in my life eleven years before, but I was conscious of a deep need in my soul. The more I prayed and read the more I saw that speaking in other tongues was a Bible theme, but I was absolutely positive that I had the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. I had no thought of seeking tongues nor did I dream that I was ever to speak in other tongues.

Every day I was getting weaker physically, and I saw that I was having to make more and more of an effort to walk a mile. I began to fast and pray and call on God in deep desperation. I finally got to where I was willing to fellowship Pentecostal folks if their life tallied with their profession; but I had not the least thought of seeking tongues or speaking in tongues.

One night I was apprized of the colored camp meeting in the north end of Wichita, and a Pentecostal sister said that she was sure God had a blessing up there for me. The colored preacher asked me to preach, and I consented. Right in the middle of the sermon I thought for the first time in years of the old colored auntie who had been the effective undoing of my "first sermon that I did not preach." I was very sick in body and I wanted healing and help if there was any for me, and I was so broken that I was willing to accept it anywhere. While preaching, the Lord began to talk to my soul, and in the midst of my ser-

mon God thundered in my soul, "What are you going to do about Pentecost?" Immediately I declared that the Bible said, "Forbid not to speak with tongues," and that I had never been around Pentecostal folks since that colored woman had scared me away years before, but that now I would accept all of God's World.

I went home to my room to pray again. It never entered my head that I had not had the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. I thought the tongues idea was simply the manifestation of one of the lost gifts. I did feel so hungry, however, for Supernaturalism that, that night, I pleaded for God to make Himself more real, but never thought of asking for tongues. As I prayed it seemed as though my soul was poured out as water (and water poured out can not be regained). I finally felt an awful loneliness and emptiness come over me; I heard the clock strike one, two, three, four; and at a little past four I got a glimpse at least of the loneliness that Jesus had in Gethsemane. It seemed that I would die of loneliness, and I got where I could not pray nor ask for a thing. Words ran out, and I just waited on my knees before God. At four-thirty I began to pray in just as calm a frame of mind as I am now in at the present moment; then, all at once, without the least bit of excitement, I found myself praying in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. Hallelujah to Jesus and His precious Blood!

My first feeling was one of surprize over the matter, and immediately I stopped. My burden had lifted, and then it fell on me again; and when I started to pray again I was praying again in an unknown tongue. Then it flashed on me that I was getting the same kind of an experience that they got on the day of Pentecost; and I thanked God. I prayed on for awhile and then came right back into English again. A little while and I was sleeping sweetly and restfully as a babe. The big feature of my experience was a wonderful rest and the reality of Jesus Christ. The next day I prayed several times in an unknown tongue, and it was wonderful to me. As I would walk down the street that day in prayer all at once the Lord would switch my language into words that I did not understand, and I felt that I wanted to run and leap and praise my Jesus. The Blood of Jesus became more real to me, and I saw that hitherto I had preached more of doctrine than of Jesus Christ. Thank God I had received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, with the speaking in other tongues as Bible evidence, according to Acts 2:4. Even now it sets my soul on fire with a love for Jesus as I

I turned down the Pentecostal truth fourteen years before because of a black-skinned woman, but I had to wade through a whole camp meeting of them when I got the Baptism. God surely broke me over the wheel of my prejudice.

During this time my wife had been out in the country visiting her mother, than whom no finer character ever lived.

I wondered how she would take it when she found out that I was preaching to the colored folks, and had got the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. She is a woman of culture. But when she came back to Wichita she began immediately to seek the Baptism in the Spirit. She had received an experience that she had called sanctification several years before, and if ever anybody lived all she professed she did. One afternoon we had a tarrying meeting in one of the fine homes in one of the best parts of the city. Somehow that afternoon I felt sure that my wife would get the Baptism in the Spirit. Just as we went to prayer I looked out and saw another woman coming, and in her car she had a little colored missionary in the back seat. I said something to myself, and when we went to prayer I could think of nothing but the little colored woman. We prayed for a long while, and finally I prayed until God helped me to forget all about the woman. Somehow I felt impressed to open my eyes and look around (something I seldom do in a prayer meeting). I saw the colored woman get up from her knees and go over to my wife and put her hands on her head, and at that time my wife received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and the Spirit of God spoke through her just as He did through the 120 on the day of Pentecost.

This little note would not be complete without an addendum concerning my precious wife. She is a woman with naturalborn culture of life and of soul. When my lagging feet would prove truant and loiter in the path of duty she has for eleven years been right at my elbow to urge me on. It takes courage for a woman to stand by with three children at skirts, and watch' her husband's lungs go out and the sight fade from his eyes. The flu was the cause of my trouble and I thank God that in the Blood of Jesus I have found healing for my body as well as for my soul. Instead of taking a ride to the grave with the undertaker followed by grieving wife and fatheriess children, I am hearty and well and am looking for the Uptaker, which is Christ Jesus our Lord. Praise His Holy name.

No matter how long I live or where I go I shall never forget, "my first sermon that I did not preach."

About twelve years ago in Switzerland my father and mother were saved out of the deep Catholic religion; the only ones saved on both sides of the family. Oh, they had to go through great trials, but the Lord brought them through them all, praise His dear name. Their relatives tried to take their home away from them and in order to save it my father had to have quite a bit of money. But where to get it from was the question. All that they knew to do was to ask the saints (Baptists) to help pray with them. And when the day came to have the money, my father was there at the courthouse with it. The Lord had led a sister, altogether unknown to the folks, to lend it to them.

About ten years ago they left Switzerland and came to America and went to the German church in order to hear God's Word. But they were not satisfied. While working in Fresno I heard Sister McPherson preach, and there I heard the saints all praying together. GREAT MEETING AT PUEBLO, COLO.

The District Convention for Colorado closed Sunday night with a crowded house. The attendance of ministers and delegates was the largest in several years. People came from other towns and stayed at hotels so they could attend the revival that preceded it. Brother Walker could not come as announced, so Brother Ora D. Hurley held the meeting. Brother Hurley is a good preacher of

the Old School kind. The chain prayer was a wonderful instrument in bringing the revival. Souls were saved from the first service. Twenty received the Baptism in the Spirit and several were saved. The power was falling continually. Many special demonstrations of the Spirit were manifested. At one time visible fire fell in a shower over the altar. One young lady who was at the piano fell and lay for an hour under the power and saw a wonderful vision of the saints marching around the walls of a city. She heard a march played to the beating of drums and heavenly singing. With one finger, under the power of the Spirit, she played a beautiful march on the piano without moving her hand. In this time we have averaged twelve hundred dollars a year in offerings. Two assemblies have been established and one built Over three hundred have received the Baptism in the Spirit and two hundred saved as a direct, or indirect, result of our labors. This I say to encourage those who hesitate to obey God." Pastor John B. Jacobs of Fort Morgan is continuing the special meetings. Brother Jacobs is a powerful evangelist and deep in the Word, and we are expecting great things from God. Our next convention will be held at Trinidad, in August with Pastor Stuart, our present Assistant Chairman.-One who was blessed in the meetings.

We believe a revival is on the way, praise the Lord. Our hearts are encouraged to believe God. In several places the people want a missionary, but we are so few in number that we must turn them away with a sad heart."

Brother Sugar of Sharannagar, India, writes: "It is over two years since we came to India, and we can say that the Lord has never forsaken us, praise His name. At the beginning of this new year, looking over the one just gone, we realize that our lives are just as the grass which is here today and gone tomorrow. Seven months ago death stared us boldly in the face; but God was with us and gave us the victory, praise His name. Oh, how can we ever thank the Lord for all His goodness and mercy: and then, they endure forever; how wonderful! It cannot be told. We look into the coming year and wonder, after what we have seen, what it will bring forth. Who knows? He knows; and it is with faith and assurance that we surrender ourselves anew to Him, and know that He is able to keep that which we have committed unto Him against that day.

We had a very nice Christmas. On New Years Day we dedicated six children to the Lord, and we trust that in the coming days, as they grow up, they will be real shining lights to bring others of their own people to Jesus.'

A SPANISH COLONY IN SOUTH WALES

During the summer months of last year, Miss Luce and Doctor Murcutt were in England for a time of rest from their work among the Spanish-speaking people of Mexico. They were speaking at the Whitsuntide Pentecostal Convention at Crosskevs, Monmouthshire, and while there, were told of a Spanish Colony at Dowlais, South Wales. These two sisters felt it a call from the Lord to visit these Spanish people and bring them the light of the glorious Gospel.

Some of the Spaniards have been here for twenty years, others for fifteen years, and probably had never heard the Gospel in their own language until they heard it from these sisters.

Miss Luce and Dr. Murcutt stayed here a few weeks and worked amongst these people, visiting their homes, and conducting the open-air meetings in the streets where they lived. The Lord rewarded their labors in saving a number of these precious souls. Praise His Name! The time came all too soon for these two dear missionaries to return to their work among the Mexicans, but before leaving they arranged for the work to be continued by interpretation, one of our Spanish sisters being able to speak both the Spanish and English languages. Since then others have been saved, and there is now a little assembly of Spanish believers who are rejoicing in this wonderful salvation. To God be the glory!

Our hearts were rejoiced when one evening last March we saw seven of these dear people follow the Lord through the waters of baptism, one sister being 68 years of age. It is most wonderful too that each one of the sisters has received the blessed experience of the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. The Lord has also blessed among the children, four of the girls, whose ages vary from eight to thirteen years, having received the same experience, speaking in other tongues as the Spirit give utterance, according to Acts 2:3. They have proved the Lord too as the Healer of their bodies, some of them being able to testify to instantaneous healings of minor complaints on more than one occasion.

It is good to see how eagerly they drink in the Word of God and to hear their exclamations and comments as it is explained, as well as their singing of the hymns in Spanish. We have Spanish Bibles and hymnbooks; much help is derived too, from a monthly Pentecostal magazine-La Luz Apostolica-which we receive from San Antonio, Texas.

Open-air meetings are held occasionally near the homes of the Spaniards, and the Word is read, Gospel hymns are sung, and tracts are distributed-all in their own language. The prayers of God's people are requested on behalf of this work, and especially that those English brethren who are helping may speedily be enabled to speak Spanish.-G. H. REASONS TO PRAISE GOD

Brother Wm. E. Simpson from Labrang, Kansu, writes: "One special reason for thanksgiving is that the Lord has enabled us to open a new station at Rongwo, a monastery and trading station two days northwest of Labrang, in this center of one of the most populous and wildest agricultural districts in this portion of Tibet. This is my third station to take care of.

"Another reason to praise the Lord is that just during the past few weeks the Tibetan authoritties here in Labrang have granted me a piece of land on which to build a house. This is assuredly the Lord's working, as such a thing would have been impossible a few years ago; and even now there are many priests who are prejudiced against us. There is also every prospect of our obtaining a similar site for building over at Rongwo. Of course, as yet I have not received a cent for building purposes, but I believe that the silver and the gold and the cattle on a thousand hills all belong to the Lord and that "He that spared not His own Son but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him freely give us all things." And so I am going ahead in faith and have already given out contracts for part of the

"But still the burden of Tibet presses upon me heavier all the time. When I get down to the bottom of things it is really only getting Tibetans saved that counts, all other things are only secondary. It is becoming a passion to me. I can truly say, "One thing have I asked of the Lord, and that will I seek after," and that one thing is that people from this land of darkness and of the shadow of death may see the glorious light of the Gospel. Compared with modern missionary work we have very much indeed to be thankful for. Mission centers have been established and the Gospel is being carried to one of the wildest and most inaccessible countries on the face of the earth. Many thousands have received a knowledge of Redeeming Grace who had never heard the name of Jesus. But, when judged by the high standards of the New Testament, we fall very far short indeed. I have been among the Tibetans a little over three years and only a handful of Chinese have been saved. Paul was in Thessalonica only about three weeks and a very strong church was formed there. Where is the power by which the three thousand were pricked to the heart on the day of Pen-The power that brought the Philippian jailer to his knees; the power that said: "Aeneas, Jesus Christ healeth thee; arise and make thy bed;" that said to the man at Lystra: "Stand upright on thy feet"? Honestly, I am not satisfied at all with the results of our work. I could very easily keep quiet about it and boast of what we have done; but, Friends, I see something better in the Book; and I cannot rest until I see it realized here. Jesus has promised: "These signs shall follow them that believe," and I believe that that promise is just as much for us in the twentieth century as it was for those in the days of the apostles; just as much for us who are out here in Tibet as it is for you who are enjoying all the blessings of the full Gospel in America. I wish to see Jesus glorified and the Tibetans saved. For this cause I am willing to lay down my life if need be. Dear Friends, please pray for me."

Note.—This is a type of the sterling character of our missionaries, willing to sacrifice their lives for Missions. Here is a young man giving his all for Jesus and the Tibetans. Pray, oh, pray, for more men for these needy fields. Thank you.

For about two years I have been seeing what appears to be a vision of little groups of hungry sheep scattered about on hillsides and in valleys, quietly making the best of the pasturage on which they were feeding, but looking up every now and then with large, hungry eyes, as though they wondered why they were having to wait so long for the coming of some of those whom the Lord, the Good Shepherd, had been speaking to concerning them and their welfare. During the same time a deep impression has been forming within me that I was one of these to whom God was speaking. Urgent calls have been coming to me steadily throughout the last two years to come and help in various sections of the country. Most of these I have had to refuse on account of the pressure of my work in the pastorate. I have been sorely grieved every time that I have had to refuse these invitations, inasmuch as I felt it to be the will of God for me to cast my lot among these with whom God had put me in such close spiritual fellowship.
