
This startling question is asked by one of the most awful and mysterious personages in Holy Writ, Balaam, the son of Beor, brought from Aram, out of the mountains of the east, by Balak, king of Moab, to curse Jacob, and defy Israel.

That Balaam was possessed of extraordinary powers is

evident from the absolute confidence reposed in him by his fellow men as represented by Balak, who said to him: "I wot that he whom thou blessest is blessed, and he whom thou cursest is cursed." Num. 22:6.

The wonderful testimony to God's faithfulness which he uttered, "God is not a man that He should lie; neither the son of man, that He should repent" (Num. 23:19), and the sublime prophecy of the Messiah as the Star and Sceptre that issued from his lips when, for the third time Satan vainly tried to use his tool to the destruction of Israel, mark him as one singularly gifted of God.

confession of absolute inability to accomplish that for which, with great care and effort, he was brought from the mountains of the east to do, that we are concerned.

Behind the Masks

With the yearly festival of "Hallowe'en" or the "Vigil of All Saints," come again the age-old superstitions and the customary masquerade. Our city streets throng with grotesque figures and false faces which are often hideous and repulsive. Indeed, the more impossible the mask, the better the disguise. We notice in this the tendency to entirely change or cover the real character, and so it is that the naturally bright and happy folk disguise themselves in the sober and long-faced expression, while that laughing grotesque figure and face cover and utterly belie the character of the wearer. This same tendency is seen everywhere in life and in the yearly masquerade season we find the very index of human nature and conditions of the world about us.

Much that should be exposed is covered up, but Jesus said in Luke 12:2, "There is nothing covered that shall not be revealed, neither hid that shall not be known." Even now there is nothing hidden from His eyes. Whether the eyes of the majority are actually blinded to conditions of sin or not, we find within the borders of human life and society a pitiful polishing over, and covering up of true facts and conditions. Call a thing anything but its rightful name! The aim is to falsify everything! Sin is merely "an error of the human mind," wicked habits, just "weakness of character." We know the terms of "good-fellow," "good time," "Sport" and others are applied to the very opposite of what their names actually indicate. How we should like to tear the mask off things and reveal the corruption beneath such terms!

Every sort of beastly thing can hide behind the masks of beauty and respectability; error decks itself with truth and thus religions that seem beautiful to the carnal mind cover sin and make it seem enticing with their lies and false doctrines. "Whitened sepulchres" our Lord called them, "full of dead men's bones." A professor's cap and degree can and does cover up atheism, unbelief and ignorance, and at the same time poses as Wisdom, the very beginning of which is the fear of God! What irony that even the clergy in this day and age are not exempt from practicing deception and often times are found in the livery of Heaven . . . and therein serving the devil. How discouraging it is to those who look for truth and sincerity in society and find nothing but pretense! This masquerading

and disguising of mankind began away back in the Garden of Eden when Adam and Eve laid aside a robe of glory for an apron of fig leaves, and then tried to hide from the all-seeing eyes of Jehovah. Since then there has been a long and tiresome parade of humanity, attempting disguise before God and man.

"The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked . . . who can know it?" Jer. 19:5. Many times men deceive themselves by their own actions. "I? Do a thing like that? Impossible!" Hazael turned in disgust and unbelief at the very thought of the prophet's associating him with the horrible atrocities he named. "But what, is thy servant a dog that he should do this great thing? He cried, and straightway went and committed the deed. 2 Kings 8:7. Man's very nature may loathe and rebel against a thing and he may think himself utterly incapable of it, but only God can know the wicked and deceitful heart; only He can govern it and keep man from that very wickedness. Out of the same deceitful and desperately wicked heart which men carry within their bosoms may spring forth evil of every description, except they turn to the God of salvation and receive from Him a new heart.

How many admirable and splendid persons reject the Gospel light fuse to get saved, and immediately or in later life shock their best friends with deeds and acts which seemed far beneath them. Oh, it is a timely thing for anyone to come to the realization that he is not the master of his own heart and life. that only God who created it can perfectly know and control the human heart from which are all the issues of life. The wisest thing anyone can do is to lay the heart bare in exposure to God, taking aside all covering of sin and corruption. Remember, "Some men's sins are open beforehand going before to judgment, but some men they follow after." 1 Tim. 5:24. Do not try to hide any longer. . do not try to deceive God or yourself! Would it bring shame and a head bowed in humiliation if your inmost thoughts and words and actions were thrown on a screen before even a few people? But think of the day when your friends, your enemies, and heaven itself will see all that you have carried secret with you during your past life, "For there is nothing covered that shall not be revealed. neither hid that shall not be known."

In the parade and the masquerade of life, there is one who is so perfectly, and so completely disguised that many folk deny his very existence. Recently, in answer to questionnaires sent out to some five hundred Protestant ministers, fifty per cent denied the existence of such a creature as Satan. It is small wonder, then, that he leads them around at his will, and that the whole world lies in the lap of this wicked one! You cannot protect yourself from an enemy of whom you are not aware. From the very beginning it was to his advantage that this clever rebel masked himself in bringing temptation of sin to the human race, and he has not yet changed his policies although his disguise changes with every demand of man. From behind his clever mask today, the devil is the instigator of a great apostasy. 2 Peter 2:11. "But there were false prophets also among the people even as there shall be false teachers among you, who privily shall bring in damnable heresies even denying the Lord that bought them, and bring upon themselves swift destruction." Following his suggestion, we have these prophets of Satan advocating doctrines saying, "There is no hell" . . . and immediately the trap door flies open for unwary feet! Leave off the "d" in "devil," he suggests and throws ridiculous slurs upon the actions of our Saviour who resisted attacks and temptations of a personal devil, whose reality and personality are revealed throughout the entire Bible.

The common conception of Satan is that of a hideous and frightful being. Peter, when he was warned of a coming attack of Satan, seemed to expect some glaring monster to face him, and felt that he was quite ready to resist. But the devil who was used to dressing and masquerading since the time he cloaked himself in the beautiful serpent and faced Mother Eve in the first masquerade, was ready for Peter. Using the form and voice of a little maid, he faced the disciple and brought him to shame and defeat. Satan will use even you, for his mask and voice, Christian, if you are not constantly on the alert.

People demand new things, so today the devil uses a so-called new dress to deceive them (2 Cor. 11:14), "For Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light . . ." He may not overcome you when he approaches as a roaring lion, although some weak, cowardly characters are thus devoured, and you may recognize and shun open sin, but be not ignorant of his many wicked devices. Today, his best guise is the religious one. "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils." 1 Tim. 4:1. The world is full of this very thing! A new

and damnable religion is offered with just a little religious bait, and the whole doctrine is accepted! "But," someone says, "Are not all religions good, and their intentions all right?" No, a thousand times, no! Satan even dared to quote Scripture to Jesus, and today, through his subtle methods, fundamentals of Truth and Scripture are actually being denied from the pulpits of our land. Even where there is not an open denial, beware of false doctrine that adulterates the truth for those who cannot stand sound doctrine.

The last mask that Satan will wear will be that of the Antichrist, for whom the world is speedily preparing, and in whom Satan's deeds and purposes will be wrapt. This last great fraud of his is impending right now and every rejector of the truth, every one who will not receive Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour is in danger, for the Scriptures tell us "Because they received not the love of the Truth that they might be saved . . . for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie . . ." 2 Thess. 2:10.

Many good folks are of the opinion that God, too, is masked; that it is impossible to know Him, and to them He is an unreal, far-off Someone or Something with whom they feel they are playing a game of "Blindman's Buff" groping to see "... If haply they might feel after Him, and find Him..." Acts 17:27. They have not found the remainder of that same verse-true, "That He is not far from anyone of us, for in Him we live and move and have our being."

Wonder of wonders that the time should come when the Apostle John could write, "And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us and we beheld his glory; the glory as of the only begotten of the Father"! He who was "The brightness of His glory, and the express image of His person" came to earth one day, not to hide from man the glory of God but to bring it close to the human heart and life!

We read in Hab. 3:3, 4, "There was a hiding of His power . . ." and thus we see the eternal Word cradled in the arms of a weak woman, as the Virgin Mary clasps close to her bosom the Infant Son of God. Thus the time comes when an earthly Governor threatens Him with, "Knowest thou not that I have the power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee?" When He might easily have summoned ten legions of angels to defend Him from mere worms of the dust, He withheld His power, even though weak mortal humans nailed Him to a cross, and railed on Him, "If thou be the Son of God, come down from the Cross!" There was a hiding of His power, but today it is manifested to anyone who will call upon His name for

Salvation! Today it is not hidden from the believer in the Christ of God!

Again, there was a hiding of His beauty, for the one altogether lovely took on Him a form that was not comely, and a form that was not desirable to them that looked upon Him. So marred was His visage at the last that it hardly bore the resemblance of man. His immaculate purity was veiled in the likeness of sinful flesh. Rom. 8:3. Sinner, have you beheld Him thus hiding His own

But as we look away beyond the seen and get a glimpse of the heavenly, assured that we "have in heaven a better and an enduring substance" (Heb. 10:34), and as we by faith see Him who is invisible, our hearts will be filled with strength and courage.

The Supply of the Spirit

For the encouragement of Zerubbabel there was given to the prophet Zechariah the vision of a golden candlestick. It had a bowl at the top with seven lamps above. The lamps were receiving a constant supply of oil from two living olive trees, which emptied the golden oil out of themselves through two golden pipes into the bowl, so that the lamps could burn and shine for God continually. And the prophet applied the vision to the discouraged Zerubbabel and said in substance to him: "Zerubbabel, it is not by might, for you know you have none; and it is not by power, for you are absolutely devoid of the same; but by the Spirit of God and by Him alone, that you can fulfill the task allotted to you. Before those eyes of yours you have seen a great insurmountable mountain of difficulty, but let me tell you, Zerubbabel, because of the full and exhaustless supply of the Spirit of God, this huge mountain of difficulty shall become a plain before you. Have you despaired of ever finishing the rebuilding of the temple because of the enormous obstacles in the way? Be assured, Zerubbabel, that through the plentiful and contiuous supply of the Spirit you shall see the completion of this task, and you shall have the joy of seeing the headstone placed upon the temple, and you shall hear all the people shout for joy as they cry, 'Grace, grace unto it.'

Only By His Spirit

Are you frightened at the task set before you in the service of God? Are

there mountains in the way? Fear not; as you receive the supply of the Spirit, before you every mountain shall be eliminated, they shall become a plain. Are you seeking to build for God? Are you one of those whom Paul describes as "workers together with Him?" Then know this, that through the plentiful supply of the Spirit of God your work shall be finished; the headstone will be placed upon it; and as you realize it has been all of "grace, grace," you will shout for joy. And know this, that as you labor in simple faith your work shall be rewarded. And know this also, that as you work in absolute dependence on the Spirit of God, the service that the Father has given you to do shall be accomplished. But ever remember, it is not by might; ever remember, it is not by power; always remember that it can be accomplished only by the Spirit whom He so lavishly supplies.

A Notable Example

Look at Moses. Just an unequipped shepherd on the backside of the desert! But the Lord appeared to him in the burning bush, and sent this solitary peasant, this solitary shepherd, to go down by himself to conquer the vast power of the greatest empire of his day. How did he go? Had he a hundred thousand chariots? Had he the equipment to provide for a great army to conquer this mighty empire? Oh, yes, he had something; he had a shepherd's rod. See that solitary shepherd with his simple rod setting forth by himself to conquer that mighty empire of Egypt, and to bring to confusion the great potentate who sat upon the throne of that empire!

God's Ample Provision

But know this-that Moses did not go down alone. No, He who spoke from the bush said, "Certainly I will be with thee." And Moses went down and encouraged that company of slaves who were in bondage to that great potentate, and the Lord went with him. He said to the Lord, "Oh my Lord, I am not eloquent . . . I am slow of speech and of a slow tongue." But the Lord promised to put His words in his mouth. Are you a weakling? Is your speech contemptible and your bodily presence weak? Fear not, for the great I AM is with thee, and with Him you are more than a match for all the potentates of earth, and all their armies, and all their sorcerers, and all their might and power. And you need not fear about your speech, for as you

look to the Lord, He will be with your mouth and give you the words you shall speak.

Victory Over the Adversary

Moses went down to Egypt and God was with his mouth and gave him the words he should speak. He stood before Pharaoh and spoke as the spokesman of Jehovah, saying, "Let My people go." And that mighty king, with all his armies, with all his counsellors, with all the weight of his empire back of him, said, "No, I will not!" He gripped tighter those slaves and he made their bondage more terrible. But He who went down with Moses loosened that tight grip; and the people of God, those poor slaves, came forth. And He who was with Moses made a way through the Red Sea for them. By faith they walked dry shod through the Sea. And presumptuous Pharaoh, who was following, thought that he and his mighty army could go through that Sea to pursue those miserable slaves who were endeavoring to escape from them. But Moses, at the word of the great I AM, lifted up that simple rod, his sole equipment against the whole empire of Egypt, and the mighty Sea enveloped Pharaoh and his hosts and they were drowned in its midst.

The Indwelling Christ

Are you full of fear? Do you recognize that you have a great enemy? Do you hear your foes say with great venom, "We will not let them go"? Do you see that that enemy is determined to put you in bondage and to keep you there? Fear not, for it is written, "Greater is he that is in you—the great I AM. the living Christ—than he that is in the world." I John 4:4. Back of the world you see might, you see power, but weigh those against the Spirit of God, and know this, that He that is within you is greater than all. And you need not fear, for you shall be more than conqueror over all the opposition of the enemy. In the crucial hour, as you trust your God fully, you shall see His power manifested and your enemies overthrown.

Victory Assured

Fear not the difficult place. Fear not when you come to the Red Sea and the enemy follows on to overwhelm you. Cry to your God and He will not fail you. By simple faith in your God you shall see the waters of the Red Sea removed and you shall go through dry shod. And you shall see the waters come upon your enemies and consume them, and you shall sing a song of praise to Jehovah. Yes, even now you can begin to sing in simple faith, "The horse and his rider hath He thrown into the sea." For before the battle begins you can be assured of victory and you can say, "Thanks be unto God which giveth us

the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Finished Course

Look not with fear at things seen. Do not be discouraged about the great mountain in front of you. Look not at the task He has given you and say, "It is impossible." Look not at the mighty armies that are following after you. But look to the Throne on High, look at the olive trees supplying the oil continually, look at the continuous supply of the Spirit of God, so that there shall be no lack. And know that through the supply

of the Spirit that mountain of difficulty shall become a plain. Know that through the Spirit your task shall be accomplished and that you will be able to say with one of old, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." And you shall see the enemy overthrown. Yes, you shall see your enemy and all his hosts cast into the lake of fire.

The Passing and the Permanent

Polish Jews for Palestine

According to Jewish Missionary Magazine, the Warsaw Palestine Office announced that preparations for sending 2,000 Polish Jewish emigrants to Palestine have been completed.

Jacob's Trouble

A Jewish conference recently met in Geneva, whose subject was "The threatened existence of the Jewish people." One of the delegates declared that "everything has turned against the Jews." The inspired writer explains the reason for this: "But they rebelled, and vexed his holy Spirit; therefore he (Jehovah) was turned to be their enemy." Isa. 63:10.

A Religious Survey

World Dominion prints a survey of the religious life in London, England, and the figures are far from encouraging. In 20 years the population of Greater London has increased from 5,500,000 to 7,400,000; and the churches have decreased from 4,029 to 3,800. Church attendance has decreased from 510,664 to 391,400. And while churches are half empty, the movies and saloons are crowded. The religious condition of all the world's largest cities is largely like that of London.

Religious Liberty

The following words, written by a German religious leader before he was shot to death, will help us to appreciate the religious liberty we still enjoy in our land. According to the International Missionary Council, he wrote, "It is nothing short of a miracle that I am still able to continue my work in spite of the fact that I have not gone over to the powers that rule. May God continue to give me the necessary strength to bear witness of Him even though the Antichrist demand of me torture, imprisonment or life itself. . . . In these days a man knowing present world conditions but without faith in God must utterly despair."

The Four Horsemen

It has been repeatedly observed that we are living in days when statesmen and other public men are using Bible language in describing present world conditions. Sir Herbert Samuels, British member of Parliament, made the following statement during a re-armament debate: "The horses of war, pestilence and famine, and death, the four horses of the Apocalypse, are now careering about Europe."

Scrap-Iron and War

Before swords are beaten into plough-shares, another and different process must take place. The following appeared in a daily: "Whether wanted for munitions or not, nearly 100,000 tons of scrap iron have been shipped to foreign countries from Atlantic coast ports of the U. S. A. so far this year. Heaviest shipments are made from Boston where the junk yards are buying up all wornout rails, old stoves, discarded machinery and automobile parts they can get hold of to load on the steamers at the army base in South Boston. Shipments from this point are going to Japan, Italy, Germany and Holland."

Combating Communism

The Christians of Gt. Britain have their own way of combating Communism. According to Scott Pearson, a well known London journalist, everywhere that the Communists have preached atheism, a Society known as "The Christian Evidence Society" is preaching Christ. Pearson says, "This is a most successful Christian organization, whose speakers have conquered the Communistic parts of London with their presentation of facts to show the way to God. They deserve their success largely because their secretary, a well known religious writer—C. L. Drawbridge by name—gives his time to this work, day and night, freely. His men are drawn from every social sphere, and represent every profession as well as every section of the industrial community.'

"Defiler of All Churches"

Such is a title given to Upton Sinclair, candidate for governor of California, in a pamphlet issued by the United for California League. It quotes the following from one of his books: "Their ministers of religion are occupied to scrub and clean and dress up their disreputable Founder—to turn Him from a proletarian rebel into a stained-glass window divinity." According to the same pamphlet Upton Sinclair is a member of the Advisory Board of Revolutionary Writers, the headquarters of which is in Moscow.

How close is the reign of Antichrist in America?

The Dead Sea

Major Tulloch, one of the directors of the Palestine Potash Co., gave the following information in a lecture. From the Dead Sea, he said, "They were able to obtain magnesium chloride which was used for floor covering, and magnesium oxide for the manufacture of soil cement, a substance which had considerable elasticity, and was capable of taking a hard polish. This substance had recently been used in road making and its use would revolutionize the process of road making where the most expensive item had always been the provision and transport of road metal or stone. Soils treated by this oxide became as hard as was required for road-making. The use of potash for fertilizers was universal. It might be said that there was no life without it. The demand for potash had increased 10 per cent in the last year, and if there were no other source of supply in the world than the Dead Sea, there was enough there to last two thousand years."

The State and the Church

"There was a big demonstration in Berlin when army chaplain Mueller, the pliant tool of the all-highest Hitler, was made head of the German Protestant Church," writes the *Presbyterian*. "The demonstration, however, was only about five per cent as large as advertized. The inside of the cathedral was thronged, and there were more 'heils' than 'holies.' But outside the public was comparatively indifferent to the show. The following winter I had an attack of gall stones. As my husband was not a Christian, the doctor was again called. He requested me to dispense with all work and gain strength enough to undergo an operation. The attacks came regularly every two weeks and I again began to trust God to heal me. Some of my friends began to fast and pray. After three days of prayer and fasting God wonderfully healed me. I have never had another attack.

Along with these two healings I was healed of severe heart trouble, extreme nervousness, stomach trouble, and asthma.

By the middle of February I was doing my work. I had the cooking and washing for fifteen boarders, as well as the sewing. I had an eight room house to keep up. I walked anywhere I wished to go.

I will be forty-eight years old this coming August. I am the mother of twelve children, and the responsibility of the last five I had to shoulder alone.

Not long ago I had occasion to go to a doctor for lung examination. Upon examining me, they discovered I have a complete new right lung. The tissues have been completely formed anew. The doctor said it was nothing short of a miracle.—Josephine Wilds, 637 Woodworth St., San Fernando, Calif.

"How Shall I Curse Whom God Hath Not Cursed?"

. . . Surely there is no enchantment against Jacob, neither is there any divination against Israel." Num. 23:19-21, 23.

In despair Balak implores—"Neither curse them at all, nor bless them at all." But his plea is in vain. Balaam says: "If Balak would give me his house full of silver and gold, I cannot go beyond the commandment of the Lord, to do either good or bad of mine own mind, but what the Lord saith, that will I speak."

Then from his controlled lips pour sublimely glorious prophecies of the coming Messianic kingdom: "There shall come a Star out of Jacob, and a Sceptre shall rise out of Israel. . . . Out of Jacob shall come He that shall have dominion."

Note that in every instance increased effort to curse only results in augmented blessing. Had there been iniquity in Israel? Alas the Bible makes it clear that they had repeatedly failed God. Did God condone it? Never. He condemned and punished them, but when Satan rose against them to curse them by means of his tool Balaam, He stood like a lion and defended His people. For the Rock had been smitten and abundant life-giving water (type of salvation by grace), had reached the need of the people.

The Brazen Serpent, type of the Cross of Christ, had been lifted up in their midst and they had received life for a look. "Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth." Rom. 8:33.

We read that these things "happened to them for ensamples: and are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come." The curse for

disobedience to God's commands includes every disease to which humanity is liable. This is explicitly stated in the 28th chapter of Deuteronomy, verses 58-62. Satan comes with all his power, exhausts his resources, to curse us with some blighting, blasting, devouring disease, but if we will look to the One who was made a curse in our stead, in simple faith, the enemy is inevitably defeated.

He cannot curse whom God has not cursed, nay more, his very efforts to do this only result in increased blessing for us. On his own confession we learn this, "Behold I have received commandment to bless: and he hath blessed and I cannot reverse it." Num. 23:20.

Beloved, who are threatened with alarming symptoms in your bodies, have no fear! Israel was abiding in their tents, "according to their tribes," when God wrought this mighty deliverance for them. See to it that you are "in the circle of His arms, in the center of His will." If the Holy Spirit shows you that you have strayed, come home to your tent by the appointed path of repentance towards God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Then rest securely in the knowledge that Satan cannot put disease (part of the curse) upon you.

Does some one ask, "But Dr. Yeomans, what about Sister So and So, or Brother This or That, who is suffering at this moment from an awful ailment, and how can you explain the case of a saint who died of a deadly disease?"

There is an answer to every legitimate question in the Bible, a solution to every problem, and I find it in this case in the 29th chapter of Deuteronomy and the 29th verse: "The secret things belong unto the Lord, our God: but those things which are revealed belong unto us and to our children forever, that we may do all the words of this law."

It is clearly revealed that Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, including every sickness to which humanity is liable. This truth belongs to us, and our children, and we are responsible before God for the use which we make of it. Things which God has not seen fit to reveal to us at this time are not our property, and we do well to remember this and refrain from touching them even in thought.

The fact that the prophet Elisha, who raised the dead in his ministry, fell sick "of his sickness whereof he died" does not exonerate us from our responsibility in regard to God's provision for our healing and health; neither does it justify us in judging the prophet. If we feel any inclination to do this it would be well for us to note that when a dead man was put into Elisha's tomb he was revived and rose to his feet the moment he touched Elisha's bones. Just so we are healed the moment our faith really touches the sac-

rificial death of our Lord Jesus Christ on Calvary.

When I was on the very brink of the grave, the holiest person I ever met nearly rolled me in by the fact that she was so ailing and frail. The enemy would ask "How can you hope to be healed when Mrs. So and So always has one foot in the grave and the other on the brink? You know you are not holy like she is and have no hope of ever being her equal spiritually. Explain her condition before you expect restoration to health."

How much precious time I wasted trying to explain Mrs. So and So's case. But one day I got desperate and said "I don't care if every saint on earth dies of disease the Word of God promises me healing and I take it, and I have it."

I have had it ever since.

I may say that years after I met this lovely saint who had almost consigned me to my grave and found her (I had not seen her for years and did not know if she was on earth or in the glory) in a great department store purchasing a new black silk dress. That didn't look as though she contemplated casting off these earthly cerements. I took courage and approached her and a fresh surprise awaited me. Her terrible illness had caused her to lose all her hair but now her beautiful, abundant silvery locks were a halo of glory around her face.

I stared at them until she said sweetly, "Were you looking at my hair, Lilian?" "Is it real?" I stammered, forgetting my manners in my astonishment. "Quite real. God gave it to me in answer to prayer. Do you like it?" "Like is a feeble word; I love it, I never saw anything more heavenly in the way of hair."

Left Behind?

Have you stood on the platform at the railroad station and waved "Goodbye" to some friend or relative as the train pulled away and finally went out of sight? If so you know the feeling of those who watched their young friends leave for Bible school during the past few weeks. Possibly you are one who watched your friends leave, and as you thought of the life of study, inspiration, and Christian fellowship into which they were entering you had a sort of desolate, "left behind" feeling. You had hoped that sometime you could go to Bible school and prepare yourself for more efficient service for the Lord. But circumstances have prevented, and you are still plodding along with what Bible knowledge you can pick up in your own personal study. You still feel the need of teaching. But how are you to get it?

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Broken Chains

"I have always believed I got a view of eternity right there in that gin-mill. I believe I saw what every poor lost sinner will see when he stands unrepentant and unforgiven at the bar of God. It filled me with an unspeakable terror. I supposed I was dying and this was a premonition. A saloon is an awful place to die in if one has had a praying mother. I walked up to the bar and pounded it with my fist until I made the glasses rattle. Those near by who were drinking looked on with scornful curiosity. I said: 'Boys, listen to me! I am dying, but I will die in the street before I will ever take another drink'-and I felt as though this would happen before morning. A voice said to me, 'If you want to keep that promise, go and have yourself locked up.' There was no place on earth I dreaded more than a police station, for I was living in daily dread of arrest; but I went to the police station in East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, near Lexington Avenue, and asked the captain to lock me up. 'Why do you want to be locked up?' asked he, as I gave him an assumed name.

"'Because,' said I, 'I want to be placed somewhere so I can die before I can get another drink of whiskey.' They locked me up in a narrow cell, Number 10, in the back corridor. That has become a famous cell to me since. For twenty years I have visited that same cell on the anniversary of that awful night of darkness, and have had sweet communion there with Jesus.

"It seemed that all the demons that could find room came in that place with me that night. They were not all the company I had, either. No, praise the Lord, the dear Saviour who came to me in the saloon was present, and said, 'Pray.' I did fall on my knees on that floor, and said, 'God be merciful to me a sinner.'

So says Samuel Hadley. He was released from prison, went to the Jerry McAuley mission, made a full surrender to Christ and was thoroughly converted. His work at Water Street Mission is well known. Hundreds of outcasts, such as he had been, were saved through his ministry. It is said that when Hadley was dying, he was seen struggling to say something. When some one bent over him to hear the faint whisper they heard him say, "Oh, who will care for my poor bums now?"

The One who saved Sam Hadley is ready to save all who come to Him with the same cry, "God be merciful to me a sinner."

Guidance

"Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel." Psa. 73:24.

The difficulty is that men imagine that their own wisdom is sufficient for their guidance in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred; and only on extraordinary occasions do they need any counsel from on high. They resort to Him only in times of peculiar embarrassment. The great and the little are intimately connected together in our lives; and if we could know the truth it would be evident to us that our great difficulties are just the termini of slight divergences. Healing for All

Abimelech had broken the law of God, and as a result there was an affliction in his household. It was a unique affliction, an affliction that none of the physicians of his land would be able to understand. They would have to confess, "This is beyond anything of which we have knowledge. That the womb of every woman should be fast closed up (Gen. 20:18) is unique. We do not know what to prescribe." But God in His mercy looked down. He knew that through ignorance Abimelech had sinned, and He gave to that heathen king in a dream a revelation of the cause of the trouble. He had coveted what was another's. He had been innocent in that he had not known that Sarah was another man's wife. He had taken the wife of a prophet of God-and God was not pleased.

Abimelech had a willing heart to put away his sin and to restore that which he had unlawfully taken. In the morning he told his servants the revelation, and they saw that a wrong had been done. What should they do? They must resort to the prophet of God and ask for his prayers. The prophet explained he had done that which he thought was wise and expedient, and there is no record that God censured the prophet. It is not good to heap censure on the prophets of God. God's prophet prayed the prayer of faith and there was a gracious healing. That which the physicians could not do, that which could not be accomplished by all the medical profession, was accomplished when a man of God sent up a simple petition to God; and God who had closed the wombs of the house of Abimelech opened them, and the affliction was lifted.

Many of us have lived in ignorance, we have broken the laws of God, but He has had compassion on our ignorance. He will reveal to us by His Spirit where we have failed. And He will send us to His Prophet-a Prophet who went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil. This Prophet lives for one purpose-to make intercession for His own.

Let us go to that Prophet and He will pray for us, and that which is beyond the realm of the whole medical world, God will accomplish. For the Prophet of Nazareth prays the prayers that prevail. If healing were the portion of a heathen king through the prayer of the prophet Abraham, how much shall the greater Prophet, who is none other than the Son of God, pray the prayer of faith that will prevail for those who put their trust in

The Sinday School Jesson

Christian Growth

Lesson 5, Nov. 4: Luke 2:42-52; 2 Peter 1:5-8

The lesson-text finely follows the Gospel order; the first section sets forth Jesus as our Example and inspiration, while the second imposes the duty of growth in grace. We need the inspiration of Christ to live the life of Christ, who declared, "Without me ye can do nothing."

I. OUR EXAMPLE

(Luke 2:42-52)

Lost in the Crowd. According to the custom of devout Jews, Joseph and Mary went to Jerusalem to attend the Passover. They took with them, for the first time, the boy Jesus, perhaps as a reminder to Him that He was close to the age of thirteen at which a Jewish boy attained his majority and became obligated to the fulfillment of the Law of Moses. At the close of the feast as they returned, the child Jesus tarried behind in Jerusalem; and Joseph and his mother (notice that Joseph is not called His "father") knew not of it. But they, supposing Him to have been in the company, went (back) a day's journey; and they sought him." We would hesitate to charge the parents of Jesus with neglect on this occasion; nevertheless the situation suggests the following lesson to us: in the rush and turmoil of life's activities we may almost imperceptibly lose the presence of Christ, and have to confess, "As thy servant was busy here and there, he was gone." 1 Kings 20:40. Many years ago a building committee of an institution for the blind decided that it was a waste of money to put windows into such a building. What use was light to those who cannot see? they reasoned. But things did not go well. One by one the patients sickened; a languor fell upon them; they felt always distressed and restless, craving for something, they hardly knew what; and after one or two had died, and the rest were ill, the committee decided to put windows in the building. As the sun poured in, health and cheerfulness returned. In like manner when neglect or sin obscures the windows of heaven the soul sickens and becomes depressed and restless.

But here is the encouraging note: "And when they found him not they turned back again to Jerusalem seeking him." If we have lost Him in the bustle of life's cares, we can return to seek Him—and find Him.

Found in the Temple. (1) The astonished teachers. "After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the doctors (teachers of religion), both hearing them and asking them questions." The inspired writer is evidently describing a crisis in the life of Jesus. Heavenly stirrings are moving Him in the direction of His Father's house; the Divine life within Him is prompting questions and statements that amaze the sages of Israel. When Persian statesmen visited the court of the father of Alexander the Great, the boy Alexander asked questions relating, not to matters of inter-

est to boys, but to the business of leading armies. The boy Alexander was conscious of the man Alexander within him and had a presentiment that some day he would be a great general. In like manner the boy Jesus felt the Divine Man within Him; no wonder the doctors were astonished-they were listening not to a boy, but to the Son of God and their Messiah! (2) The astonished parents. Their feelings are reflected in Mary's gentle rebuke, "Why hast thou thus dealt with us?" No matter how exalted a person may be, to his mother he ever remains her "boy." He may be the dictator of a great land, but that will not keep his mother from warning him not to get his feet wet, or noticing a missing button in his garments, etc. The mother-nature of Mary obscured for a while the knowledge that her child was the Son of God, and she yielded to motherly concern. Let us see in this incident an evidence of the truthfulness of the Gospel. No forger would have pictured this incident in such a natural way. He would have considered a motherly rebuke derogatory to the Deity of Jesus. (3) The astonished Jesus Reminding His mother of the prophecy that preceded His birth He said, 'Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" These words suggest why the inspired writer records the only boyhood incident of Jesus in the four Gospelshe wants to tell us that as early as the age of twelve Jesus knew that He was the Son of God and that He had a mission to fulfill in the world. And there is a practical lesson for us; namely, the Christian according to Christ is the one who makes it his "business" to live for Christ. He goes to work to pay expenses.

Living in the Home. "And he went down with them, and came to Nazareth, and was subject to them. . . . And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." There is another reason why Luke tells us about Jesus' childhood: he wishes to teach us that Son of God though He was, He was also the Son of man, and grew like a normal child. The Lord Jesus is so supernaturally natural! His conception by the Spirit was supernatural; yet how natural for Him to be BORN into the world like those whom He came to save! His life, with its words and works, was so supernatural; and yet how natural, how approachable, yes, how simple He was! The same was true of Him after His resurrection, when, moving about in a glorified body He was not above preparing breakfast for His "boys"! See John 21:1-12. And I am confident that in heaven He will still be the same—so humanly supernatural, and yet so Divinely natural!

II. OUR DUTY

(2 Peter 1:5-8)

With such an inspiring Example before us, we are ready to heed Peter's exhortation that we grow in grace, or in Divine life. The growth of the Christian, like that of the flower, should be spontaneous, symmetrical and beautiful; but unlike the flower he has a will with which he can decide either

to grow or not to grow. Hence growth in grace becomes a duty to which we are to give "all diligence."

The Diligent attitude. No one can become a spiritual Christian in his sleep; neither can he slide up to heaven. He must give "all diligence" to his growth in the Divine life; and diligence implies earnestness and industry. During a hard frost, so says the fable, when everything was frozen, one little stream continued to flow. "Little stream, why aren't you frozen?" The answer was, "I am too busy to be frozen. I am going too fast, too quickly, to be frozen." The diligent Christian is moving too fast to become cold.

The Spiritual Addition. "And besides this, giving diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity." They are not told to add faith, for as believers, they possess it already. It is mentioned first because it is the beginning and foundation of all Christian graces. But what avails a foundation without a superstructure? And what avails a beginning without progress? Real faith must lead to growth in grace. The apostle therefore places before his readers some i'ems for "spiritual addition," as follows:
(1) Virtue. Manly courageousness in conduct. "Be strong in the Lord." (2) Knowledge. Astronomy is ever finding new stars; Christians should always be finding new depths, new heights in God. (3) Temperance or self-control. A little girl once explained the meaning of self-control by saying that Paul kept his body under by keeping his soul on top. (4) Patience. Temperance is the grace of holding back; patience is the gift of holding on. (5) Godliness. Godliness is God-likeness. That was the standard set before the Israelites: "Ye shall be holy for I the Lord your God am holy." Lev. 19:2. (6) Brotherly kindness describes the affection that children of God, members of the same spiritual family should have for one another. This means that each Christian is to be a "brother," and not a "bother" to his fellows. (7) Charity refers to the love of the brotherhood as it overflows the banks of the church and streams over all mankind regardless of nationality, position or condition.

The Spiritual Total. The addition of these graces leads to the following total: "For if these things be in you and abound, they shall make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the (experimental) knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." There is no standstill in the spiritual life; if we are not advancing we are retreating. When Israel came to the edge of the Red Sea, and Pharaoh was close in pursuit, God commanded Moses, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward." Ex. 14:15. Forward! that was the only safe direction for them, and it is the only safe direction for the Christian.—Myer Pearlman.

The Gospel in Foreign lands

INDIA SUFFERS FLOOD

About nine months ago one of the worst calamities known to history fell upon India when many cities were shaken to ruins and thousands of lives lost in the great earthquake. Word has just been received this week that many are again homeless because of floods, and many lives have been lost.

One of our missionaries, Mrs. V. Schoonmaker, writes: "I feel I must tell you what a sweet experience I had the night the flood was rising in our compound. All the previous night and day the water had been coming into the city, and all that day into our compound. We had moved our Indian families out of the houses into the bungalow and its verandas. Hour after hour I went out to measure the water and found it was rising two inches an hour. I knew it would reach the bungalow within a few hours.

"I was sitting on the front veranda watching it when the lightning began to flash, and to all appearances a storm was about to break upon us. The previous night I had spent hours pleading with God to hold back the flood. At that moment doubt overtook me—that awful doubt that blinds us so that we cannot see His blessed face. It seemed so useless to pray. It seemed that He didn't care, and a cry sprang from my lips, 'Master, carest thou not that we perish? Lord, are we not Thine? Are these mission buildings not Thine? Dost Thou not care? Is it nothing to Thee if we are destroyed?'

"Then He drew near in the darkness and in the approaching storm, and spoke to me: 'Why are ye so fearful? How is it that ye have no faith?' His peace flooded my heart and I began to sing. Then I said, 'Lord, it doesn't matter now. I'm not afraid any more of the flood or the storm. Let them rage if needs be. Thou hast a right to do what Thou wilt with Thine own.' Again I went and measured the water. It was standing still and rose no higher after that hour! Praise the Lord! We were comforted, but what about the thousands of homeless sufferers all about us? God help us to minister to them!"

The night lies dark upon the earth, but we have light.

So many have to grope their way, but we have sight.

One path is theirs and ours—of sin and care, But we are borne along, and they their burdens bear.

Footsore, heart-weary, faint on the way, Mute in their sorrow, while we kneel and

To reach it haply somehow and some day? May I not go and lend them of my light? May not mine eyes be unto them for sight? (Selected) Mrs. Schoonmaker tells of the damage which was done to their mission bungalow, and reports that it will require considerable repairing. The recent earthquake is probably partly responsible for the damage done to the building by the flood, in that the walls and foundations were weakened at that time.

One real problem which now faces the missionaries is that of obtaining food. Their fruit trees have been destroyed by the flood, which have always been their main item of diet. They cannot buy food from the bazar at this time because of the epidemic of cholera, making it unsafe to use fresh food of any kind. Mrs. Schoonmaker states that it would be a rare treat as well as a neces-

sity to have some canned fruit and vegetables sent from this country to them. She suggests that if any are able to send a few tins of food, it would be well to send them to the Missionary Rest Home in New York City at 1003 Summit Ave., to be sent out with the first outgoing missionary. All funds, however, should be sent to the Foreign Missions Department, 336 West Pacific Street, Springfield, Missouri.

TIBET-THE MYSTERY LAND J. H. Andrews

(Part 3; continued from last issue)
As we made our way along the road the
Tibetans greeted us with great respect, dismounted and showed themselves most
friendly, extending their tongues and spread-

ing their hands out, palms upward.

Arriving at Chong-tien, our first step was to look around the town a bit. Seeing the situation, we loaded ourselves with Gospels and tracts and began our house to house mission, speaking to people in the homes a few words of the grace of God, and salvation alone in Him. In every home we left both Gospels and tracts, and in the eight days we spent there we left not one home without the gospel and a personal visit.

During the evenings we held illustrated gospel services, and long before the meeting began, crowds would gather and eagerly await the message. The days we spent there were blessed and encouraging. Two families brought their idols to us and smashed them, burning what the fire would destroy. How clever the idol makers are! They had made the idols of red wood so that when the axe fell across them the edge came out red, appearing to have struck blood. The people who were looking on cried out, "It is bleeding." One lama (priest) gave me all his charms, pictures, prayer wheel, idol, rosary, spirit-box, and sword. All these he carried on his person. He also promised to destroy what he had at home. The people prized the tracts highly and posted them up in their homes.

During the early hours of the morning we gave our attention to the many complaints of the people, washing their sores and binding them up. While the people were waiting their turn for help they made good use of their time by engaging in a public delousing ceremony. When a catch was secured the abominable little creature was passed on to the owner, from whose head it came, and placed in a little blue cloth. They seemed to enjoy the public hunt, and to all appearances it was a most prolific hunting ground. They were much surprised to learn that I did not have any such creatures on me.

At the Lamasery

A lama is a Tibetan priest and a lamasery is a monastery, where the priests live and worship. When we visited the lamasery the first man to meet us was a madman. He approached us in a strange manner and with a queer look in his eyes. I did not wish to cast him off nor offend him so waited to see what his action would be. Someone suddenly called out, "He is going to strike you!" But, praise God, he did not, and soon he seemed quite friendly.

When visiting a lamasery to do gospel work, it should be remembered that one is treading on dangerous ground, and he should observe as much Tibetan custom as possible. When a Tibetan approaches a lama of high standing, gifts are to be given to the head lama. Knowing this, we did the same. The first and most important gift is a "khata" or a ceremonial scarf. These scarfs are from two to ten feet long and about a foot wide, made of either silk or grass cloth.

Having obtained one of these scarfs from a lama, we made ready our gift and proceeded to the abbot's sacerdotal abode, high up in the lofty building. Soon we were ushered into the presence of "His Holiness." As he stretched his hands out to receive the gift we laid the "khata" across them, and then sat down opposite him. The "khata"

takes the place of a visiting card. Lamas have no surnames, but on entering the lamasery, they take the name of the god or spirit they feel most drawn to, so their name is always a religious name.

We presented the abbot with a beautifully bound New Testament in the Tibetan language, and a similar one to all the presiding lamas in the room. We told them that in the Book is found the way of life. Then we gave them a torch light, a pair of boots, a small clock, six glasses, twenty blocks of green Tibetan tea, and 18 pieces of Chinese shae-t'ang (a dirty brown sugar).

All this paved the way for our business. We then asked the abbot if he would be willing for us to have a magic lantern service by the monks' meeting hall and show some pictures to help illustrate the gospel message. I then asked him if he would be so kind as to honor us with his presence at this meeting, to which his attendant replied that "His Holiness" dare not mix with me, or with the common lamas. What a contrast to our Christ, who delighted to mingle with the needy, and when little children gathered around Him, and He took them up on His knees! Oh, thou Lover of souls, teach us how to move among men!

When I realized that the abbot could not go out to the meeting, I asked him to allow me to bring the meeting to his room; to which he consented. Placing a chair in front of the large crowd, I led him to it and seated him there where he could not miss a word of the message. Thus for three days we held forth for the Master in that lamasery, preaching Christ to all, and giving out Gospels and tracts until all were supplied. Thank God, that once more the gospel has been preached inside the enemy's camp.

The Lama and His Devotions

Under a roof of gold we saw an enormous idol, clothed in pure gold, whose head towered up through two stories. Before it were numerous butter lamps burning, some made of solid silver; flowers were set in array at his feet, and draped pieces of silk-the whole sight an object of abomination. In the darkness sat lamas mumbling and fumbling prayers. As the priests prostrated themselves before this lump of evil there was no change or smile on its placid face. The heart cries of the worshipers fell on deaf ears; its expressionless eyes showed no thought of pity; nor did the silent lips utter a word of blessing to those seeking peace, though they had worn the hard stones as smooth as glass in prostrating themselves before it.


Fabulous wealth was given to the idol, yet the people were clothed in the poorest of rags. They lived wholly for the god and no gift was too costly to give. In their zeal they put us to shame. They even refused suitable food, fearing that it might hinder them in their worship. Hanging before one part were bear skins, wolf skins, and ugly faces of devils. These were placed there to frighten off evil spirits. It was a horrifying place, in utter darkness except for the tiny altar lamp which made it still more dreadful. One could not help feeling that it was the very seat of the enemy, containing every device of sorcery imaginable. Prayer to the devils was offered continually, and hideous idols of the worst description were there.

Sword Throwing and Sword Twisting

It would seem that at one time the priest of Chong-tien specialized in twisting swords, and great was the number hung up before the idols. I saw one that was far too thick and wide for any man to twist without being helped with supernatural power, yet these priests, under the power of Satan, take these sharp swords, (so sharp that those who carry them must be well armoured about the loins to prevent being cut) hold the point on the hip, handle in hand, and in a flash it is tied up in knots.

Then there is the sword-throwing, which of all varieties of sorcery I think is the worst. The living Buddha takes a heavy sword by the point and throws it with all his might at a helpless crowd that are unable to get away from it. If the sword wounds a person it is a call to repentance. If it kills him, justice has been given to him, for he must have been a bad man.




