December Is Bible Month

ELEVEN MONTHS HAVE PASSED SINCE THE BIBLE-READING campaign was launched with the goal to "Read It Through in '62." To climax the campaign with a month of Bible blessings, December is designated as Bible Month. It will be a time to emphasize Bible reading, Bible study, and Bible distribution.

We would urge every reader to be especially diligent in his daily reading during the remaining days of 1962 so that at the year's end every church can award a large number of Bible-reading Certificates. These attractive, two-color Certificates to honor individuals who have read the entire Bible in 1962 can be obtained from the Gospel Publishing House (price 10 cents each, \$1.00 per dozen, \$7.95 per hundred). Order by number (EV 6-5106).

It will be well if special Bible-reading emphasis can be given by speakers during Sunday school, church, and C. A. meetings. Here are a few ideas for promoting Bible month:

1. An interesting Bible display on the bulletin board or on a table will draw attention to the importance of Bible reading. Perhaps a number of old Bibles can be collected to see who brings the oldest copy.

2. Next Sunday, December 9, observe Universal Bible Sunday. Join the churches of all faiths throughout the country who will be emphasizing the good work of the American Bible Society and taking an offering for its support. (In addition to its extensive program of publishing the Scriptures in hundreds of foreign languages, the Bible Society can provide American churches with inexpensive Scriptures and many aids for stimulating Bible reading, such as posters, films, daily charts, and booklets on "How to Read the Bible." Its beautifully illustrated New Testament and Testament Portions for children are particularly interesting. A free catalog of these and other supplies is available on request from the American Bible Society, 450 Park Ave., New York 22, N. Y.)

3. If individuals are not reading the entire Bible, encourage them to follow the daily readings in the Thanksgiving-to-Christmas Worldwide Bible Reading.

4. Emphasize the Bible at Christmas. The Bible Society is publishing several million copies of a special Christmas Scripture Portion containing selected passages from Luke's Gospel (only \$3.00 per hundred); order direct from the American Bible Society). Urge every family in your community to read the story of the birth of our Lord Jesus aloud in their homes on Christmas Eve, using these Portions.

5. Distribute Bibles, Testaments, and Portions from door to door. If you conduct a Bible-in-every-home can-

vass you will be surprised at the number of Bibleless homes in your neighborhood. (Another good source of Bibles for general distribution, in addition to the Bible Society, is the World Home Bible League, 425 W. 107th St., Chicago 28, Ill. The League supplies Bibles for this purpose free of charge and depends on freewill offerings to cover its expenses.)

6. The C.A.'s or some other department of the church can make a drive to place Bibles in jails, nursing homes,

hospitals, and similar institutions.

7. Another idea is a Bible Readathon. The New Testament can be read in eighteen hours and the entire Bible in about seventy hours. Readers can take turns every half hour. If properly publicized, a Readathon is an effective way to bring the Bible to the attention of the general public.

We can think of no better way to climax 1962 and to lay a good foundation for the new year than to emphasize the Scriptures during December. God's Word develops the faith we need to anchor our souls in these stormy days. It gives faith to trust Christ for every need and fills the heart with the bright hope of His soon return. Let us treasure this wonderful Word by reading it daily and urging others to do the same. Make December a month of Bible blessings.

The tailor says, "Clothes make the man," but some of the best-dressed persons have turned out to be hypocrites. It takes more than a new suit to change a scoundrel into the kind of man who is really admired. Here are some of the qualities that constitute real manliness:

Strength. The Bible says, "I have written unto you, young men, because ye are strong . . ." (1 John 2:14).

Courage. "Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid . . ." (Joshua 1:9).

Honesty. "Blessed is the man . . . in whose spirit there is no guile" (Psalm 32:2).

Industry. "If any would not work, neither should he eat" (2 Thessalonians 3:10).

Wisdom. "I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock" (Matthew 7:24).

Unselfishness. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13).

Dedication. "A man after Mine own heart, which shall fulfil all My will" (Acts 13:22).

These and other qualities of true manliness can be summed up in one word—*Christlikeness*. When Pilate presented the Lord Jesus to the crowd, he said, "Behold the man" (John 19:5). Here was a Man indeed—a Man above all other men—a Man who is the perfect example of manhood at its best.

ANTOINETTE GOETSCHIUS WROTE:

"When I am sore beset I seek some quiet place, Some lonely room or barren, wind-swept hill, And there in silence wait alone until I see again the smile upon God's face.

"I feel His presence fill me like the dawn, And hear once more His whispered, 'Peace, be still'; And know again the strength to do His will. I turn to take my load—and find it gone."

More and more I am impressed by the good, everyday names given to the Third Person in the New Testament. They imply to me that God the Father intended the Spirit to accompany us at all times while we are serving an apprenticeship upon earth.

HE IS CALLED "THE COMFORTER"

That name is no longer preacher's talk to me. I have known moments of doubt when I would have stumbled had it not been for His help. Satan's lies are too skillfully created to be exposed by help from books or exchange of conversation. The insinuation planted gnaws at my soul. I need spiritual expulsion. I need a divine counterattack. This is the ministry of the Spirit. "And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever; even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you" (John 14:16-17).

I have known moments of loneliness when I would have surrendered had it not been for His companionship. I often think of Louise Driscoll's lines:

"God pity all the lonely folk With griefs they do not tell, Women walking in the night And men dissembling well."

I have learned to fear emotional sicknesses. They are far more deadly than physical ones. They will turn you back, and out of the way. I love the official name the Quakers bear, The Society of Friends. I think every Christian should belong to the society of friends. It is unfortunate that so many of us do not. And in that moment I must turn to someone for strength. The Spirit is there—always there, thank God! Paul, the constant missionary, speaks of "the love of the Spirit..." (Romans 15:30).

I have known moments of fear when I would have made a "strategic retreat to the rear" had it not been for His reinforcement. This world-system is massive and brutal. It is designed to crush the dissenter. Paul was never far removed from it. It grew in sinister force

from the Jerusalem riot to Nero's madness. Jesus warned: "... the world hath hated them, because they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world" (John 17:14). I must summon courage. I find this power in the Spirit. Paul says: "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind. Be not thou therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, nor of me his prisoner: but be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God..." (2 Timothy 1:7-8).

HE IS CALLED "THE HOLY GHOST"

I find His company fascinating. He is the most unobtrusive of all heaven's personalities. He performs His secret service in the interest of the believer's safety and welfare immaculately. He is always in the background. He does not "speak of himself" (John 16:13). His is always a service of gentility, decency and order (1 Corinthians 14:40).

I have learned to count on His prompting. I do not know how to pray, but He does. "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought: but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered" (Romans 8:26). I do not know which direction to take. He does. "They assayed to go into Bithynia: but the Spirit suffered them not... and a vision appeared to Paul in the night; there stood a man of Macedonia, and prayed him, saying, Come over into Macedonia, and help us" (Acts 16:7-9). I do not know what to absorb and what to discard. He does. "He shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance" (John 14:26).

I have learned to count on His protection. I must learn to live in the midst of danger. A highly technical generation is also a highly liable one. I walk daily through "the valley of the shadow of death." Paul drew this life and quickening power continually from a deposit that he knew was credited to him. "But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you" (Romans 8:11).

I have learned to count on His potential. All of us have the capacity to do much more work than we think we can do. It was after a tiring day at rail splitting or clerking in a store that Abraham Lincoln went at his books and studied law. Young Edison earned his keep as a telegraph clerk while carrying on his experiments in his time off. The Wright brothers tinkered with their flying machine after the family bicycle shop was closed for the day. What is lacking is not time enough to realize one's possibilities, but the resolution to use all of one's time productively. I shrink. I avoid. I play too much. I coddle myself. I stop striving. Sud-

denly life is closed without a net gain. Who will provide this needed spark and stir to my soul? The Spirit will. Paul mentioned this in a prayer for the Ephesians: "That he would grant you, according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man..." (3:16).

HE IS CALLED "THE THIRD PERSON"

The mystery of mysteries is triangular. Wherever you go it faces you. There is the relationship of father, mother, and child. There is the triangle of sap, wood, and bark. There is the threesome of spirit, soul, and body. Electricity produces heat, light, and power.

The Holy Spirit unites God the Father and God the Son. He unites the Head of the Church with the Body. He is the Administrator of Calvary's victory.

He makes both incarnation and inspiration possible. God became flesh through the Spirit and man is clothed upon by divinity through the Spirit.

Count on Him! His residence means assurance—unshakable confidence. His absence means conviction—a haunting fear that payday is ahead and you are not prepared to appear at court.

He is a part of everything. That is a fact. It is undeniable. Seek His help. You do so with the full approval of Jesus Christ.

UNCONSCIOUS GOODNESS

Many people today are making the mistake of measuring their spiritual stature by the things in which they do or do not indulge. While it is true that the things we do or do not do are indications of our spiritual condition, these things are the **effect** and not the cause.

It is not the quitting of his unrighteousness that saves a man;

it is because he **is** saved that he quits his unrighteousness: Neither is growth in grace produced by our works. It is the result of our association with Jesus Christ whose indwelling presence causes us to be righteous and godly.

Grace is defined by many as the unmerited favor of God. That is only half the definition; it is also the influence on the heart, reflected in the life.

When we try to produce growth "by the works of the law" we are fully conscious of our efforts. But when the grace of God produces the growth there is little awareness on our part of any goodness. The beauty of the face of Moses was that "he wist not that it shone!"

Soul-Winning Businessmen Have Weekly Breakfast

From the shores of tiberius to downtown Oklahoma City is quite a long way; and from A.D. 33 to A.D. 1962 is a very long time.

Life has changed considerably since that distant dawn when Christ looked out upon the shimmering Galilean waters to spot a boatload of fishermen, and shouted the question, "Have ye any meat? Have you caught anything yet?"

In most respects, the similarities between a businessmen's breakfast in a modern American hotel and an early-morning fish fry on the rocky Palestinian coast in the time of Christ are very few.

But the meaning of Christian discipleship has never changed. Christ still calls His followers to be fishermen—to catch men; and in purpose at least, the Friday breakfast meetings of a group of Assemblies of God busi-

nessmen in Oklahoma City are not so different from that breakfast meeting of Christ and His disciples by the sea.

The pastor of the Capitol Hill Assembly would meet his men at the breakfast table each Friday and would ask, "How was the fishing? Were you able to win some souls for Christ this past week?" And the men would give their reports.

The idea behind the breakfast meetings was born three years ago when God began to deal with Pastor Otis Keener's own heart about his responsibility to witness outside the pulpit. He began to exercise a greater effort to win souls through personal evangelism. Then he recalled a statement he once heard Billy Graham make during a ministers meeting.

"If I were a pastor," the evangelist had said, "I would pick out twelve men and train them, be with them, share my burden, my feelings with them, until I multiplied myself twelvefold. That is a Biblical pattern. It is what Christ did."

Brother Keener decided to put the idea into practice. First he carefully selected three men and met with them. The four then prayed for divine guidance in picking others. Each week another man was added to the number, to whom the pastor would present a Soul Winner's New Testament and a pledge "to become a partner with my pastor in personal witnessing." Each man was asked to make a threefold promise: (1) to witness to other men of Christ, (2) to list the names of those to whom a witness is given, and (3) to pray daily for the men on this list.

"We may choose whether or not to be a Christian," said the pastor, "but once a Christian, we may not choose whether to be a soul winner or not. Christ made that choice for us."

The breakfast meetings are held at 6:45 each Friday in a private room in a downtown hotel. The men open their New Testaments, read a portion of Scripture, eat together, share their witnessing experiences, and pray one for another.

In the very beginning Brother Keener laid down some rules for these meetings. This was not to be merely a social gathering. All the conversation was to be Christcentered, the primary theme being soul winning. None of the yarns men like to exchange when they get together were to be swapped on these occasions. It was to be an hour dedicated wholly to God. And the men have kept these rules.

"The Friday morning breakfasts have meant much to my life," says Sam Turnbow, assistant vice president of Oklahoma National Bank. "These past months have strengthened my spiritual life and given me courage to witness to others about Christ."

Ray Parsons, a home builder, says his life too has been changed by these months of association with other businessmen interseted in souls. "The breakfast meetings have made this the most constant time of witnessing to others that I've ever known," he says. "Daily I've been aware of the business world's need for a constant Christian influence by each follower of Christ. Thank God for these breakfasts which center on souls and prayer."

One of the men, after the breakfast, was walking to his bank when a business friend came along and asked what could have gotten him up so early. "I thought bankers had better hours than this," he remarked.

The banker replied, "I have just had a good time of Scripture reading and prayer." Seeing the other man's eyes open wider, the banker explained, "I have been at a prayer breakfast with my pastor in the hotel." The man asked some other questions. Finally he asked the banker for an appointment. Later he came to the banker's office and told of his troubles. His home, he said, was about to be broken up that very week. His heart was so heavy. He wondered if God was able to solve his problem.

As a result of that interview, the man was converted, the home was salvaged, and the family was in church the following Sunday.

-Message of Peace

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At the breakfast meetings the men tell not only of their victories, but also of their frustrations—for soul-winning efforts do not always bear fruit immediately. These situations become the objects of united prayer. The men also discuss their manner of dealing with different situations. How to approach an individual concerning his salvation; how to turn the conversation in a spiritual direction; what scriptures to use in various cases—these are some of the things the men learn from each other as well as from their pastor.

For example, there was the story of the elevator operator. A member of the breakfast group said he felt led to speak to the operator; so, as they were going up together, he looked at the man and said, "I hope our last ride will be *up*, don't you?" That was

all he said; but he prayed for the operator, and the seed of truth planted in this way bore fruit. The elevator operator said to him later, "Do you remember what you said, 'I hope our last ride will be *up'?* Well, I keep hearing those words." This opened the door for a clear gospel witness.

"There is only one way to be assured that your last ride will be *up*, and that is to know that Christ is your personal Saviour. Have you accepted Christ?"

"No, I never have," the man said.
"I know a lot about the Bible but I never have accepted Christ." It was not long after that until the operator was converted.

Christian businessmen find these breakfast meetings give them the added strength they need to serve Christ in the business world. As W. H. Farmer, an insurance agent, puts it: "Hearing firsthand the experiences of others is a constant reminder that the Lord by His Word and through our witness and prayers can change lives."

The urgency of "working while it is day" was impressed upon the men when one of their number was killed in an automobile wreck. "I remember how he prayed that Friday morning, a few days before the tragedy occurred," says Brother Keener. "He was a relatively new convert-a salesman for a distributor of plumbing supplies. He prayed so fervently at our breakfast meeting. His whole heart was filled with a desire to serve God. When we met for the next breakfast session following the tragedy, it was with the sober recognition that 'the night cometh when no man can work,' and we resolved to make each day count for Christ."

The breakfast group now has a new pastor. Melvin Brewer became pastor when Brother Keener resigned to answer a call to missionary evangelism in the Far East. But the Friday morning meetings continue to spur the businessmen to be faithful in the soulwinning business.

"Meeting each Friday morning with our pastor and other men," says Hoyt Estes, accounting supervisor at the Oklahoma Natural Gas Company, "makes me aware of the need to tell others of the saving power of Jesus Christ. I go out from the breakfast inspired by the lives of the others. I have come to believe and practice Proverbs 11:30—'He that winneth souls is wise.'"

Keep MF Spiritual

MEN ARE A "MUST" IN GOD'S PROgram. I believe every Assemblies of God church should have a Men's Fellowship. There's something about a group of men gathered together that brings a little bit of heaven down to earth.

We have enjoyed a special anointing on our MF meetings in Pontiac. We have discovered that the key to successful men's meetings is to keep them *spiritual*.

Testimony time is a vital part of our gathering. Our fellows sing praises to the Lord and tell how God has saved them and answered their prayers—how He has healed them spiritually and physically. This, in turn, makes a great impression upon the unsaved we bring out to these meetings. The informality of our meetings creates a good atmosphere in which to win unsaved men to Christ.

If your church does not have an MF group, I would recommend that you organize one now. It does not take many to start. It may begin with only the pastor and one layman, for Christ said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). So now you have three. Christ and two disciples had a glorious MF meeting on the way to Emmaus one evening. Afterward they were so on fire from that meeting that they could not sleep; so they went back to Jerusalem and stirred others.

Every member of Men's Fellowship should stand like a rock behind the pastor. We must help him carry the load of the church.

One of the greatest goals of MF is to win men to Christ. In order to win them, we have to go where they are and give them the message. At First Assembly we are making plans for the 1963 ACTION MANDATORY soul-winning advance, which begins on New Year's Eve. Just think what the total result would be if all our MF groups would mobilize for this great task of winning the lost.

It makes us feel good at First Assembly in Pontiac to know that we are joined with other men around the nation in winning men to Christ. Our fellows also are much interested in Light for the Lost, the MF missionary thrust. It thrills us to know that we can have a specific part in bringing spiritual awakening in key cities over the world where revival efforts are being planned by our missionaries. It interests us to see other men focusing their prayers and efforts on these target cities.

We're looking with interest on other activities, such as the ROYAL RANGERS program for boys. If young men are worth five or ten thousand dollars each year to General Motors to build cars (as in our city), they're certainly more valuable to the kingdom of God. We have pledged to train them and send them forth.

Christ once needed a lowly colt, a dumb beast that could not talk. To-day He needs men whose tongues have been loosed and whose lives have been freed from sin to carry the gospel to other men. Personal evangelism is still building the kingdom of God. Who can do this better than the men of our churches who have been saved by the grace of God?

Men Want Action!

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP IS A "MUST" IN our church. Through this organization we have been able to tap the spiritual resources of many men.

It is the responsibility of MF to mobilize the men of our church and to find a place in the harvest field for each of them. I believe the manpower of the Assemblies of God is a sleeping giant that, in many ways, has never been put to work.

The ministry of our Lord illustrates how to realize this great potential. He called twelve disciples and sent them forth to win their own kind—to be fishers of men. They were unlearned—diamonds in the rough—yet Jesus could see the possibilities not evident to the eyes of others.

There is great, hidden potential in the unpolished lives of our men. The MF motto hits the right key—"Mobilizing Men for Christian Action." I think of men in my own church who had great potentialities for God which for a long time were never used because they were never challenged.

Many men feel that religion is for the women and children. MF develops a strong, masculine, spiritual leadership that is wholesome and vital to every church. It is a pity if our Sunday schools, visitation programs, and soul-winning endeavors are void of male leadership. Really, a man's spiritual leadership must begin in the home. In this way he gains the respect of his family—they respond to spiritual leadership by the head of the house—and a man who has spiritual influence at home can have great spiritual influence in the church.

Perhaps the greatest ministry of MF is to weld fellows together into a strong evangelism team. Jesus said, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me..." (Acts 1:8). Our men at First Assembly have accepted the Action Mandatory pledge which involves three months of intensive soul-winning effort and spotlights the responsibility to witness to other fellows. We are already "in gear" for our 1963 emphasis.

It is difficult, if not impossible, for the pastor to reach the man on the assembly line. Worldly men can be won for Christ when they see Joe Doaks on the assembly line living his religion each day. I believe in instructing my men in methods of winning the lost and providing them with spiritual ammunition (gospel literature) to help them reach men and bring them to Christ.

An example is the conversion of Harry Tibbets, a long-distance truck driver for the Truck-Away firm of General Motors. Harry was converted along with his wife Thelma one Sunday morning in our church. Harry was delivered from the drinking and smoking habits then and there.

Thelma, his beloved wife, passed away a few months later and left a radiant testimony that influenced many. For the first time in the history of the trucking company, they closed down all dispatches for the day and all employees were able to attend the funeral.

That night, after the funeral service, Harry brought his entire family of brothers and sisters back to the mid-week service. Beginning with that Wednesday evening and in the services that followed, Harry had the joy of winning them one by one.

The MF of the church has challenged Harry. He never misses a service unless he is out on the road. He brought his brother Louis to the MF on a Saturday night and the seed of God's Word was planted. On the following Sunday he knelt with Louis who accepted Christ and Louis now has had the joy of winning his first soul to Christ, his nephew. The MF has had an active ministry in helping to establish these men and many others in the faith.

Harry, as an example, found that men can be men without the bottle. The other day, when he barely escaped a collision with another truck, he stopped and for one hour—with his Gospel of John and his personal testimony—told the love of God to a man along the road somewhere in North Carolina.

An active MF will share the joy of soul winning. And, as a pastor, I wouldn't miss those testimonies at the MF service for the world.

It Began With a Burden

The Story of
Light for the Lost



THE MAN LAY PROSTRATE ON THE FLOOR. HIS EYES were closed, tears were streaming down his face, his hands were stretched toward heaven.

Sam Cochran was oblivious to the other men who were kneeling around him at the altar of the First Assembly of God in Santa Ana, California, that Sunday night in 1952; nor did they realize what was transpiring in Brother Cochran's life.

But on Sunday afternoon, a few weeks later, he told

a group of laymen what had happened.

I was one of the men whom Sam had invited to his home that Sunday afternoon. In the course of our conversation, he explained that he had called us together to tell us a story.

"A few Sunday evenings ago," he said, "I received a vision from the Lord. I saw a great multitude of people standing, looking up. A large hand out of heaven was holding a Bible toward the people. The people were all reaching up as far as they could, stretching out their

hands to take the Bible. As the hand and Bible came down, a trap door opened beneath them, and flames and smoke shot into the air as the people dropped screaming into the pit.

"I knew at that moment what God's purpose was for my life," he added: "to send the Word of God to every soul on earth as long as He gave me breath."

Brother Cochran, a successful insurance broker, told the group that he was setting aside a certain amount of his own money each month to purchase gospel literature for distribution among those who had never heard about Christ. He asked the group if any of us would like to do the same.

Each man agreed, and slips of paper were passed out. We placed the amount we would give each month but we did not sign the slips. This was a pledge to God, not to man.

It was by means of a male quartet that the burden for gospel literature was carried to other churches. It happened that the members of this vocal quartet were among those who had pledged money to buy literature. When churches in the surrounding area invited our quartet to come and sing, we refused, until one of the pastors said, "If you will come and sing at our church, we will take up an offering for your missionary literature work." Our pastor, Brother Ben Hardin, was in favor of this, as he had missions on his heart, so we went to the neighboring church and received an offering of about sixteen dollars.

Other pastors caught on to the idea. They invited the quartet to their churches and took up offerings for liter-

ature evangelism. The funds were used to purchase Gospels of John for Mexico. Later the Gospels were provided for Central America also; then shipments went to Peru, Argentina, and Brazil. Later we shipped Gospels to Italy and Ceylon. Our goal was to give the Word to the world.

It was not long until the laymen decided they should organize this program, give it a name, and ask the Southern California District of the Assemblies of God for official recognition. A meeting was called and ten men drew up a statement of purpose. The name Missionary Gospel Society was selected. A board of directors was organized. Sam Cochran was asked to be chairman. A vice-chairman and secretary-treasurer were elected. In 1953 the organization was incorporated as a nonprofit corporation in the state of California.

It was announced that the quartet would sing in any church which would receive an offering for the Missionary Gospel Society. A member of the quartet would speak to the congregation about the need of gospel literature on the mission fields. The quartet was not to use any portion of the offerings for expenses; traveling expenses would be paid by the members of the board of directors and the offerings would be used a hundred per cent for foreign literature.

Brother Cochran gave a large amount of time to the program. He took care of his insurance business during the week and spent his weekends promoting the literature project.

Experienced ministers who shared this burden for literature evangelism and were acquainted with distribution methods offered to travel with the quartet to raise funds for the work. Interest multiplied. As enthusiasm spread throughout the state it became evident that the small group of laymen who had started the work in Southern California would not be able to supply all the funds needed to promote it properly. An additional laymen's group therefore was organized in Northern California.

By 1959 the work had spread to such proportions that the General Council of the Assemblies of God, meeting that year in San Antonio, Texas, decided to incorporate it in the program of the Men's Fellowship Department and make it nationwide. Immediately after this a committee was organized in the Oregon District. Next came Southern Missouri, Arizona, West Central, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Northern Michigan. In each of these districts a committee of laymen was organized, and each committee member pledged to provide a monthly sum of money to underwrite all the costs of promoting the program and distributing the literature.

Since 1959 the program has been called "Light for the Lost." Due to the fact that the laymen across the country make donations each month, all the offerings are used one hundred per cent for the purchase of gospel literature. Each district committee designates one of its members to serve on the National Men's Fellowship Missions Council which administers the program. Sam Cochran is National Administrator.

It has been thrilling to watch a vision become a reality. Although the growth has been gradual and many people have been involved in spreading the program, yet the miracle of the fulfillment of the vision is bold and clear. "Light for the Lost" began with a burden and continues

because dedicated laymen of the Assemblies of God are willing to shoulder this burden for lost men and women around the world.

The program is expanding everywhere as members of Men's Fellowship catch the vision that God revealed to Sam Cochran and consecrate themselves to the task of sending light to the lost.

WINNING MEN AT WORK

Irvin is a married man, but he decided to live in the barracks in order to win his fellow servicemen to Christ.

The CHILL OF A DARK SEPTEMBER night was quickly dispersed by the brightly burning campfire. It seemed that the warm glow of the Holy Spirit also permeated the atmosphere as Christian men gave thrilling testimonies of victory. This was the climaxing feature of the second annual Indiana District Men's Fellowship retreat held September 7, 1962.

As I stood by the fireside, I looked

As I stood by the fireside, I looked across at Irvin Cullison and briefly reviewed the year's events. I thought of the series of circumstances which had crowded in upon his life, causing him to yield himself entirely to the will of God. Just a year before, at this identical spot, a miracle had its beginning. I was impressed with the scripture found in James 5:16, "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

Irvin Cullison's conversion was a

direct result of the intercessory prayer of our men during last year's ACTION MANDATORY advance. It was just one of the many answers to prayer as a result of this three-month soul-winning crusade launched by the national Men's Fellowship Department.

In January of 1961 our men faithfully added two names each to the prayer list especially prepared for Action Mandatory. A new convert named Joe Baker prayerfully listed the names of his brother and son-in-law. That son-in-law was Irvin Cullison. He was anti-Pentecostal. His wife, however, was one of our recent converts and truly on fire for God. Irvin vigorously opposed her attending our church, and made life miserable for her. He did not realize that he was fighting a losing battle.

As Brother Baker and other men faithfully prayed for Irvin, things began to happen. On the surface it appeared that everything was going in reverse. Mrs. Cullison was sent to the hospital with a severe case of kidney

infection. The entire situation became desperate, but it was all a part of God's answer to prayer. Soon after her release from the hospital she returned to church—but this time accompanied by her husband. In that service he was visibly impressed and convicted, but not yet ready to yield to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

The Men's Fellowship group continued to pray. When time for the next service rolled around, Irvin Cullison again attended church with his wife. At the conclusion of the service, as the altar call was being given, he nudged his wife and said, "Come on, let's go!" She started down the aisle towards the door, but Irvin took her arm and said, "Not that way; let's go to the altar!" That night Irvin Cullison found the Lord, and another soul was won to Christ through Action Mandatory.

When the reserves were called up, Irvin was obliged to return to the armed forces for a year. He could have taken his wife along but he decided that he could witness to the other men more effectively if he lived in the barracks with them. He talked it over with his wife. She too wanted God to have first place. Though it was a great sacrifice for them both, Irvin lived in the barracks and let his light shine.



Crime

London Crimes Double in Twenty-three Years

A British magazine quotes the London Commissioner of Police as saying that the number of crimes committed in that city has more than doubled since 1939. Indictable offenses in London last year totaled 196,854—the highest figure yet recorded.

As a result, prisons are overcrowded with more than 30,000 inmates. The Commissioner says that more than 8,000 men are living three to a cell. "It is no easy task in these conditions," he says, "to send prisoners out better men, physically and morally, than when they came in."

Evidently crime is on the increase in every part of the world.

Church Burglars Please Note

After the Bethesda Evangelical Church of Springfield, Mass. had been broken into several times with property damage, including a forced safe, Pastor C. V. Bergstrom decided to take action.

On his office door he put a sign addressed, "To Unrepentant Thieves." It declared:

"1. The pastor is not the treasurer of the congregation, and all money is deposited promptly in downtown banks.

"2. Many people who make sacrificial contributions work hard for their money. I suggest you do likewise.

"3. The entire building (including this door) was dedicated to the glory of God, and we are mighty tired of destruction.

"4. You will eventually be caught, one way or another, and I think patience has gone the third mile."

Bible

Book Fair in Colombia Sees 28,000 Scriptures Sold

More than 28,000 Bibles and Scripture portions were sold during the recent nine-day Book Fair in Medellin, Colombia. At the start of the fair,

leading Roman Catholic clerics spoke against the "sale of Protestant Bibles" and attempted to have the Bible Society's permit canceled, but the other seventeen book exhibitors declared that if the Bible Society stall was closed they would all quit the fair.

It was reported that scathing articles appeared in the local press coupling the sale of Protestant Bibles with communism, and declaring it to be an anti-Catholic book. The opposition only served to advertise the exhibit which sold an average of 3,000 copies of the Scriptures per day.

Before the fair closed, armed policemen were standing on both sides of the booth—not to prevent the sale of Bibles, but to keep order among the large groups of people who were eager to discuss its message.

Law

Postage Increase Affects Religious Publications

Congress has passed legislation (effective January 7, 1963) providing for increased postage rates that will raise the costs of *The Pentecostal Evangel* and other religious and nonprofit periodicals circulating in second-class mail by twenty percent.

The new rates are designed to offset an annual Post Office Department deficit of \$800,000,000 and to increase salaries of employees. In the second-class mail category, the increase will be spread over a three-year period.

D. C. Church Closes Bazaar Sponsoring Gambling

Holy Trinity Roman Catholic church in Washington, D. C., closed its annual bazaar some weeks ago when a Methodist minister (Kenneth C. Hamrick) complained to District of Columbia authorities that federal laws against gambling in the district were being violated by wheels of chance. The church in the fashionable Georgetown section was formerly attended by President and Mrs. Kennedy when they lived in the neighborhood before his election to the White House.

Mr. Hamrick, a theological student who lives in the neighborhood, said: "Gambling breeds juvenile delinquency as well as delinquency among adults. Since we have these laws against gambling activities, they should not be flouted by churches or other organizations."

A spokesman for the parish said that the games of chance in former years offered prizes of merchandise, most of which was contributed by local merchants, but that two games at the bazaar had switched to "small cash prizes" this year "without any

idea that the law was being violated."

Chief of Police Robert V. Murray, who received the minister's complaint, said he took the matter up with the U. S. District Attorney's office which held that games of chance are illegal under Congressional statutes governing the District of Columbia, whether conducted by churches for charitable purposes or not.

Miscellany

One Dog for Every Six Americans

According to a pastor of the Reformed Church in America, families in the U.S.A. own some 33,000,000 dogs. If Assemblies of God families have as many dogs as other families do, they own nearly 85,000 of them.

At an average expenditure of \$1.15 per dog per week, Assemblies of God families are estimated to be spending \$97,750 weekly, or \$5,083,000 annually, on dog food. Add to this the thousands of dollars spent on dog medical treatment and it will be seen that more money "went to the dogs" last year than went to our Foreign Missions budget. Receipts of the Assemblies of God in 1961 for foreign missions amounted to \$4,544,271. The reader is invited to draw his own conclusion.

British Assembly Sponsors Canalboat Evangelism

The Assembly of God at Tipton, England, recently engaged in a new type of ministry—canalboat evange-lism. The city of Tipton is circled and crisscrossed with canals and the church decided to do something different in an effort to reach its community.

A firm loaned the group one of its coal barges. Church members cleaned it out, whitewashed it, erected a platform on it, and installed flags, bunting, and large posters which advertised the church.

Pastor Jack Duckworth said: "The Lord granted us a perfect day for our 'Procession of Witness,' and for four hours we sailed, singing, preaching, and holding Bible quizzes for the children on the towpath. We received a great welcome; all within reach of the barge listened to us and heard us with evident interest. Many of the press came along to report and the BBC and ITV placed it on their news. It has caused much public interest in our church."

YOUR QUESTIONS

Since God told Adam and Eve to be fruitful and multiply, do you not think they had children before they fell?

If Adam and Eve had had children before they fell, those children would have been born without a sinful nature. But the Bible says, "By one man [Adam] sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned" (Romans 5:12), which indicates that all of the children of Adam and Eve were born after the parents had sinned.

* Was Paul in the will of God when he went to Jerusalem after he had been warned through the Holy Ghost not to do so (Acts 21:11)?

Some may believe that Paul's zeal caused him to go to Jerusalem against the warning of the Spirit. But Agabus merely warned Paul as to what would take place—he did not tell Paul not to go. Had Paul wilfully disregarded warnings, knowing he was going against the will of God, I question that God would have stood by Paul so wondrously through all the sufferings and imprisonments that resulted.

That God stood with Paul all the way through indicates He was pleased with Paul's willingness "not to be bound only, but also to die at Jerusalem for the name of the Lord Jesus" (Acts 21:13).

* How do you reconcile Revelation 3:14 which states that Christ was "the beginning of the creation of God," and Colossians 1:15 which says He was "the firstborn of every creature"?

Some argue from these verses that the Lord Jesus was a creation of God. This would separate Him from His eternal deity, for if He were only a created being He would be less than the Creator.

But our Lord Jesus is "the beginning of the creation of God" because all things have been created through Him. He began it all. John 1:3 says, "All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made."

That He is "the firstborn of every creature" is an expression of position. In ancient times the firstborn son was head of the family, both as leader and as priest. He also received a double portion from the estate of his father. God spoke of Israel as His firstborn, because they were chosen by Him above all others. They were His chosen ones to whom was given the "adopttion, and the glory, and the covenants" (Romans 9:4, 5; see also Exodus 4: 22). It pleased the Father that "in all things he [Jesus] might have the pre-eminence"; that is, that He might be "the firstborn." What this includes may be found by reading Colossians 1:15-19.

Why do good Christians have to suffer so much pain and sickness?

The bodies of Christians remain mortal and are subject to disease and infirmity as long as they are on earth. We are part of a groaning creation, "waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of our body" (Romans 8:23).

* Will conditions on the earth before the rapture of the Church-or before Christ comes to reign—be the same as they were in the days of Noah? Matthew 24:37-39.

Ever since Jesus spoke those words the world has been "eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage." Living for this world, the people of the world suddenly will be caught unprepared as those-just as those in the days of the flood were caught unprepared. Christians are to be watchful lest they follow "the course of this world" and thus be left behind when Jesus comes.

An open letter to mothers and dads by a daughter who, though grown, still bears the

SCARS OF DIVORCE



"Please, please don't sign them! O Daddy, don't sign those papers!" My pleadings must have added greatly to my father's burden, but the pen held firmly in his hand continued to write his name on the final papers.

Thus was my world destroyed and I with it, for on that day something died in the heart of a child. A child? In years, yes, but the child pleading in the divorce court that day would never again be a carefree little girl. From now my mommy and daddy were divorced. It was a big word and a hateful one. What it meant to grown-ups I did not know, but what it meant to me is a story that can never be told.

Right now it meant that the home we had known existed no longer. To us children our home was our world, with both Mother and Daddy essential parts of it. But that world had suddenly crumbled. Like a storm that strikes suddenly and leaves you to pick up the pieces, so life had suddenly turned our home inside out and upside down. Much of the shock lay in the fact that the ones destroying it were the two who had been our very security and life.

From now on the family must be divided. I was told to choose between my mother and father—I could not have both, though I loved both and wanted them, both of them, to love me. Each was so necessary to me; how could I turn my back on one and say I wanted the other more?

I remembered nights when I was sick and how my mother kept vigil—how she had fed me and tended to my needs. Surely she loved me! When things troubled me, I had always gone to her, and her explana-

tions had banished childish fears. I had great faith in my mother.

Nor could I doubt my father's love or the close place I had in his heart. Often my brothers had sent me to Dad when they wanted some favor, knowing he seldom refused me. This special place I had with Daddy was perhaps because I was so like him and we understood each other so well. I had deep respect for my father—but how could I compare it with what I felt for Mother? And how could I make a decision that would separate me from either?

This was the down payment in the price of divorce—and the children had to pay. To parents who still count the cost, I plead the cause of your children! If you subject them to the agony of choosing between the parents he loves, something wonderful has to die in his heart during the unnatural struggle that choice entails.

Years have passed, but I still shudder at the memory of the day I left our home—with my mother. Daddy cried like a child, and then just stood and stared into space. I have wondered what went through his mind then. He had worked so hard to do right by his family, and now all he had built was gone. Was part of his grief due to the fact that missing from the circle of his motherless children was his only daughter? Was he thinking of what might have been?

In my mind there is no doubt of what might have been: theirs could have been a successful marriage had they determined to keep the home intact—had both, or even one been willing to sacrifice personal feelings.

As far back as my memory goes, I remember my parents quarreling.

Like all quarrels, these were born of selfishness and stubbornness, with neither willing to give in to the other. Foolish advice was, "Separate if you can't get along; it will be better for the children." (Better to crush six young hearts than for one or two to bear small hurts? Better the blow should fall on six lives, young and tender, not old enough to know why they must be separated from one another?)

Bitter protests and tears were vain for divorce courts do not consider human hearts when they collect their dues. Mother and Daddy were to be "free," but we children were not. I became a slave to despair. The quarrels? They ceased, to be sure, but cries of heartbroken children took their place, and I, for one, longed to hear those quarrels if only it meant I could have my mother and daddy back!

FROM BROKEN HOMES

Of 45,000,000 children of school age in the nation 12,000,000 come from homes broken by divorce or death. Of children charged with infractions of the law 85 percent come from these broken homes.

This story is my own—the plea I make is that of my own heart, though my brothers, too, could write their stories, and neighbors in our small town could add to it. Perhaps it is just a familiar story—Daddy, too busy to do the little things that count so much, and having to neglect his sixand eight-year-old boys. My little brother longed for his mother, but his loss and grief gave expression to meanness; so he became a problem child in school. My teen-age brothers became involved with the law to the extent that they spent a night in jail. I realized even then that this, too, was part of the price of divorce—that the children pay.

Perhaps a girl needs her mother even more than do the boys. I seemed to be cut the deepest and to suffer the most. The shock of that day in court was indelibly printed on my memory, but I had only *begun* to taste the bitter portion dealt to a child of divorced parents.

With Daddy thrust out of my life, my brothers gone, my heart fastened more tenaciously than ever on Mother, and words cannot express the shock that was mine when I found her in the arms of another man. In that instant I knew utter desolation. I had

lost my father—now my mother no longer belonged to me! Another man—a stranger to me—had taken her and this discovery completely changed and embittered my life.

Emotions that had been sealed within me now broke forth in endless
weeping. Bitterness enveloped me like
a cloud and resentment made it impossible for me to speak peaceably
to Mother. Back of confused emotions
came the resolve that no one else
should have her—she belonged to me
and to Daddy! I became crazed with
the idea that I must win her from
the one who I felt now was the cause
of my sorrow.

A showdown had to come. One day I found Mother and her boy friend with other friends in the front yard. Blind despair and a lingering hope gripped me, and for me that gathering became a court session, with a child as prosecuting attorney and the neighbors as jurors. The desperation that filled my heart poured out: our need of Daddy, our need of the home we had left—"Oh, please, Mommy, let us go back and be happy!"

Artists may paint human suffering but neither artist's brush nor writer's pen can recapture the horror of the moment when a child realizes it has lost the battle for its mother's love. One day she had been my mother—the next, she was a stranger whose only feeling seemed to be displeasure at the scene her unreasonable child was causing. Neighbors pitied and tried to comfort, but their words did not reach me—I knew only departed hope. I had failed, and no failure had ever involved so much.

I may have been in a state of shock as I found my way back to the old home. A few weeks before I had been in this home—a happy, confident child, but as I entered the familiar yard there was no joy in my heart—no anticipation or eagerness. Daddy met me at the door and seemed thankful I had returned, but he found to his sorrow that it was not the same little girl who had come back. Shock and grief had caused youth to flee, and with it had gone laughter and joy.

He tried, but was not able to save me from the depths of despair to which I sank. I wept until tears no longer came. Many pitied but there was no healing for my wounded heart. When we heard that Mother had remarried, great bitterness possessed me.

THE WORD "CHICKEN" IS USED COMmonly among today's teen-agers. To them it is a word of challenge. It gets attention.

Chicken is the title of the tiny booklet which will be used during Operation Saturation (January 6-13), a crash literature program sponsored by the National C. A. Department. Written in language teen-agers understand, Chicken is hard-hitting and contains a straightforward gospel message.

It has been tried and proved effective by Teen-Age Evangelism crusades in New York City, Chicago, Philadelphia, and other cities. And it is still being used effectively. It is a tool which makes it possible for the most timid young person to witness for Christ. For those who are more bold in their approach, the *Chicken* booklet often opens the door for a more personal witness.

A survey reveals that young people acknowledge their need of help in two main areas of their Christian experience: (1) how to know God's will and (2) how to witness effec-

tively. We are obligated to help our youth in both areas. Operation Saturation provides one way to witness. This is the church's opportunity to place materials into the hands of Christ's Ambassadors to help them witness. Young people are a force at the disposal of the church. Their talents need to be challenged and channeled. If we fail to use their abilities and influence for evangelism, we not only do them a great injustice but we miss their important contribution to the cause of Christ.

OPERATION SATURATION coincides with the special Week of Prayer designated by the executive officers of the Assemblies of God. As Christ's Ambassadors witness to other young people, their efforts will be fruitful if saturated with prayer. God has promised that His Word "shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

We urge every pastor and church to take advantage of the materials and helps available for Operation Saturation (see back page for price and order information). The goal of one million witnesses during January 6-13 is not farfetched—it is possible to go far beyond this goal. Missionary

Morris Plotts-

Trailblazer

It is not emotional appeal that causes Missionary-Evangelist Morris Plotts to minister overseas; it is logic. "After having seen the desperate need of preaching the gospel in areas that do not have the privileges we Americans have, I want to take the gospel to those who have never heard it," Brother Plotts says.

This reasoning has called the fifty-four-year-old minister from the comforts of a successful pastorate in the United States to overseas ministry.

"I have been interested in the mission field ever since entering the ministry thirty-one years ago," states Brother Plotts, "but it was not until 1952 that I did any overseas work. A fellow clergyman invited me to visit his church in Japan and do some preaching. After this, my first experience in foreign nations, I realized how much potential there was and how few people there were over there to do the work.

"I don't want to go where the gospel has already been preached," he added, "I am happy to blaze a trail."

In 1958 Brother Plotts resigned his church in Lake Charles, La., and sailed

to Kenya, East Africa. While visiting one of the missions there, Brother Plotts heard of a tribe of 50,000—the Wangas—who had never been evangelized.

"Lead me to them!" he told a missionary friend.

The chief consented to see Brother Plotts because "he heard of a blind beggar in a market place who had regained his sight after I had prayed for him. At our meeting Chief Wamakoya looked at me, pointed at me, and said suddenly, 'You build me a church!'"


With the help of missionaries, Brother Plotts built a church for the Wangas at Kisumu near Lake Victoria.

Brother Plotts' next project in Africa was in the Kilimanjaro region of Tanganyika. Surrounding famous Mount Kilimanjaro are the Masai warriors who slash the neck veins of cattle and drink their blood. The nationals believe that the mountain possesses magic powers and they dare not let any man stand between them and it. Brother Plotts accepted the challenge of this area filled with darkness and superstition. He climaxed his stay in Tanganyika by building an evangelistic center in Moshi, a town serving a population of more than 13,000. The Kilimanjaro Revival Temple is a center from which the gospel will radiate throughout Tanganyika. Six additional works have been started in the area.

Brother Plotts has now accepted a new challenge—the proposed Global

Conquest evangelistic center in Georgetown, British Guiana. Presently, crowds in excess of 500 attend Sunday afternoon evangelistic services in a downtown theater. Brother Plotts is itinerating in the United States to raise \$15,000 with which to construct the much needed evangelistic center to house this congregation. When funds are available, he will travel to Georgetown to oversee construction of the center. In addition to his work in Africa and British Guiana, Brother Plotts has ministered in Australia, Fiji, Indonesia, Japan, and his native Canada. He has been a trailblazer, not only on the foreign field, but in America as well—pioneering the New Sharon, Iowa, Assembly of God. He also pastored in Lindville, Iowa, and in Lake Charles, La. "I never enjoyed anything better than starting from nothing," he says. "When it is going well I want to turn it over to someone else and start again."

This is the spirit of the missionary trailblazer!

RANCHI, A SLEEPY NORTH INDIAN town, has presided over the jungles and hills of the great plateau of Southern Bihar with queenly grace. Her moderate climate, beautiful forests, and waterfalls have attracted many tourists.

But India, with its serious population problem, is bursting at the seams. This, coupled with the immense natural resources of coal, minerals, and hydro-electric power available in the area, has led to the exploitation of these treasures in furthering India's great industrial program.

Ranchi's quiet slumber has been interrupted by the introduction of a master plan to convert her into a bustling city, twelve miles square. She is destined to become India's greatest industrial center. Her roads are to be widened and new constructions are to be brought into conformity with regulations. Hundreds of engineers and technicians from Russia and Czechoslovakia have come to Ranchi to supervise the construction of large industrial plants, and to train Indians to run them. Added to the massive state development programs are the feverish activities of private companies springing up within the city. Humble laborers and craftsmen are crowding from all parts of India to this industrial Mecca. The face of the city is rapidly becoming cosmopolitan and the rigidity of caste regulations and social restrictions are being broken down.

College Students Receive Help from Revivaltime

Grief had so eaten away at my life that I became hard and rebellious. The faith that my mother had destroyed caused me to lose confidence in everyone, even my father, and I felt that everyone was against me. Nothing mattered anymore. When Daddy corrected me, I thought that he too had turned against me, and I rebelled under his authority.

I left him and stayed with anyone who would have me. Later, harsh circumstances compelled me to go back to my mother and her husband.

I must have been a shadow of the past to them, and I lived with the stinging reality that I was not wanted. Yet every fiber of my being craved to be loved. Violent arguments—a war of hate—began between me and the intruder. Strain began to show on Mother's face and in my misery I found secret consolation in the fact. My strained emotions became a physical illness, for the human system can be overtaxed just so long before something breaks. Clouds of gloom settled

over me; nightmares caused me to run screaming through the house. I suffered cruelly and, being alone most of the time, actually developed a fear of people. I succumbed completely to shattered nerves.


I wish I could take the hand of every parent harboring the thought of divorce, and lead you back with me into the valley through which I have come. If the hurt of an innocent child's heart, the bitter shock of a tender life, the tears of the unwanted, misplaced child, the horror and gloom could be called to witness in the divorce courts, no child would again have to walk the dreadful road that starts with the signing of those final papers in the divorce courts. Instead, the tears would become your own and in the valley you would realize that the ones who suffer in divorce and remarriage are the innocent children.

Thank God, in my struggles through that darkness I met the Saviour and slowly—very slowly—began to live again. Since that time I have married, and at one time it seemed that I would fail as my parents had. But through sacrifice and love I was able to prove

that marriage can be made to last. My wonderful husband and lovely children are my reward after having, as Job, drunk scourging like water.

Many will say, "But my case is different." I contend that every marriage can be made to last if either husband or wife will fight to that end. Mine did not succeed overnight, but every effort proved worthwhile for. through sacrifice of my own feelings, I brought out qualities in my husband that I had not known existed. God alone knows the joys I now reap from every battle I fought-with myselfinstead of with my husband. I had to learn to give when I would rather take, to smile when my heart rebelled, and to hold my peace and let God speak for me. But it was worth all it cost when compared with the reward—one of the most happy marriages in the world.

From experience I know divorce is not the answer—sacrifice is. You who contemplate divorce—I beg of you, remember me. Hold that child of yours in your arms more closely, and in pity spare him that which I have had to endure and can never forget.

Another Breakthrough Project in Orbit

The Newest National Break-through project has been launched in Kinston, N. C., a thriving city of 25,400. "This city is the hub of a three-county population area of more than 200,000 with no Assemblies of God church. Nearby are two fine cities—Goldsboro, site of a naval air base with 28,873 population, and Greenville with 22,860. Neither of these cities has an Assemblies of God church."

The first services were conducted September 30 with twenty in Sunday school and twenty-five in the evening service. The second Sunday twenty-five attended Sunday school. The pastor, Daniel Duncan, was able, with the help of an Assemblies couple, to find a house within three hours and began moving in. F. L. Jones, superintendent of the North Carolina District, helped Brother Duncan look for a suitable meeting place. They decided on a church building recently vacated by the Free Will Baptists and made

an offer of \$15,000 which was accepted.

The pews in the recently painted auditorium accommodate around 175. There is a good cooling system. There are seven Sunday school rooms and rest rooms in the annex. The entire cement-block building is freshly painted white. It occupies the back of a 90- by 150-foot lot. The location on Highway 70, not too far out, is excellent. Within a week's time, most of the entire population of the city passes by.

Breakthrough funds from the Home Missions Department and the North Carolina District made it possible for the new church to pay \$5,000 down for the property. Without this help they would have been unable to consider this building.

Brother Duncan and the Walter Wheeler family are contacting a number of people who are interested in the work. Sister Duncan is working in one of the shirt factories and is getting some good contacts. Brother Duncan, working for a paint contractor, has had numerous opportunities to testify.

The Duncans greatly appreciate the fine assistance of the Wheelers who

moved to Kinston from Washington State to help as "vocational volunteers." They are sacrificing much to help get this work started, since the wages are much lower in this area. Brother Wheeler, an excellent carpenter, is an ordained minister, and Sister Wheeler has a background of experience in child evangelism. Another family has recently moved to Kinston and will be helping with the church work. The husband will be teaching in the Caswell Training School.

The workers are exploring the possibilities of extension services in the nursing home, the city and county jails, and the training school. They are in need of a good accordion.

The Breakthrough presentation at the General Council in Portland, Oreg., gripped Brother Duncan's heart. But the Duncans decided to return to their church in Quincy, Wash., and give their best to the work for one year before making any move. During this time they saw God bless the church in many wonderful ways. Souls were saved and filled with the Spirit and the Lord performed miracles for the congregation.

The Duncans' attention was directed again toward missionary endeavor and Breakthrough and they contacted National Home Missions Secretary R. L. Brandt concerning their burden. With no church, home, or support guaranteed, the Duncans in faith resigned from their church. Since then, God has led them step by step and has confirmed His call. Brother Duncan feels Breakthrough is an excellent opportunity for Christian laymen to do something constructive for God that might never be done by anyone else.

Brother Duncan was ordained in 1955. He became assistant pastor in Ogden, Utah, after one year in Southwestern Bible Institute. Two years later he became pastor at Meeker, Colo., and later, after spending eight months in evangelistic work, became pastor in Dragerton, Utah. He served the district as C. A. representative for several years.

Leaving Dragerton, he pastored in Quincy, Wash., for over four years. During this time he served as director for the boys and girls and youth camps. The Duncans are musically talented. They have two sons, three and nine, and a daughter seven.

A Christian Psychiatrist Prescribes

In the field of psychiatry, the one thing people seek above all others is peace. Until July 4, 1954, my prescription for this rare quality was of little or no use. Now I am convinced there is an infallible remedy for the turmoil and confusion of individual lives today. I prescribe it with the utmost assurance and confidence, and I have yet to find it to fail.

The answer came to me at Devil's Lake, Michigan, where I own a summer cottage. A sound car drove around the lake advertising a drive-in church where a gospel film was being shown. As I viewed the picture, I heard about the gospel of Jesus Christ for the first time, and that began a struggle within my heart that lasted for five months.

As I read and studied and searched the Scriptures, I tried to justify my staying in a "religion," rather than trusting in a Person. Finally, on December 14, 1954, in my medical offices in Toledo, Ohio, I fell to my knees and asked the Lord Jesus Christ to come into my heart. He did just that and transformed my life. Two weeks later, my office nurse said she too wanted Jesus Christ as her Saviour.

"Why?" I asked.

"I see the transformation in your life," she said,

simply.

To have Jesus Christ is to have peace, I quickly learned. To be without Him is utter confusion. Relatives in the other "religion" declared I had gone nuts. They did not realize that true religion is a living Person, the Lord Jesus Christ, and without Him is no salvation.

Today we have a peace-seeking, pleasure-hungry world. The only remedy they know is tranquilizers. But I have to tell them the truth: tranquilizers are not the answer. They have never cured a mental illness. The shock machine cannot cure all mental illness. Insulin shock has never cured a mental illness.

To have Jesus Christ as Saviour will bring you peace. It will not give you a new Cadillac, nor immediately solve all your problems, but God has promised to give life—eternal life. I have seen the power of the gospel transform lives.

When I was staff psychiatrist at the Ohio penitentiary,



it was my privilege to talk with five murderers as they were about to go to their death. As I witnessed to them, the two guards standing nearby listened intently. "Say," one of them said, "I'd like to know about Jesus, too." I witnessed to him from the Word, he received Christ as his own personal Saviour, and what a transformation took place in his life! The other guard allowed his intellectualism to stand in his way. Because he could not reason it all out, he turned down the opportunity for genuine peace and eternal life.

In the privacy of my therapy room I have many who unburden their souls. How they try to seek the pleasures of this life! I believe God has left a void in every heart that only He can fill. There is no substitute. God came to seek that which was lost....

Three years ago I witnessed to a cardiologist on the boardwalk in Atlantic City.

"Fred," he asked, "why don't you stop that nonsense?" As we continued to wait for two other doctors with whom we planned to eat, I refrained from witnessing to him further.

"Here they come," he said. "I'm hungry!" In the next moment, he dropped dead although he had never been sick a day in his life. He had turned his back on Jesus Christ; he was without excuse.

None of us has a promise from one heartbeat to the next. "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26). The price has been paid; the Lord Jesus Christ shed His blood. I can promise you today, on the authority of God's Word, that if you settle it with Jesus Christ, you will have peace. No psychiatrist can promise you more.

IT WOULD TAKE PAGES TO TELL ALL the wonderful things that God has done in my family. But I do want to tell some of them.

I was saved when a teen-ager but did not remain true to the Lord. Seven years ago I was married. My husband's people belonged to Jehovah's Witnesses, and he was unsaved.

However, at eleven months of age he too began to have epiletic seizures like his sister. Not once did I stop to think that this might be chastisement for turning my back on God.

Last December God gave us another wonderful little boy. We thought surely nothing could happen to little Mark, but God showed us differently. When eight days old he had a convulsion. I took him to the doctor. He told me that my little baby had blood clots on his brain and that I had better hope and pray that the medication he gave would do the work.

Pray? I could not pray because I did not know how. I was a lost sinner and was much in need of help.

I went to one of my friends and asked her to call Pastor Gilbert whom I had known for years. He came to my house and began to talk to me. I fell on my knees and asked God to save me before it was too late.

Brother Gilbert walked over and laid his hands on my baby. God healed him. Then he laid his hands on the other three children and the Lord gloriously healed them too—all my children were healed at this same time.

These miracles happened about one o'clock on January 8, 1962. I took the baby back to the doctor that same afternoon. He said that all the blood clots were gone. I lifted my hands right there in the office and cried, "Thank God."

Beth, Glen, Danny, and Mark are well and happy today because of our Saviour. It is wonderful to know that my children can go out to play and I do not have to be out there with them—or else run out every few minutes—to see if one of them has had an attack of epilepsy. The little boy with the big heavy shoes and braces walks around barefooted and plays as never before.

My husband accepted the Saviour two weeks after the children were healed. Since then we both have striven to do our best for the One who has done so much for us. We love Him today and praise His name!—Mr. and Mrs. L. I. Jeffreys, 247 O'Hara Drive, Jonesboro, Ga.

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
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THE VALUE OF THE BIBLE


Sunday School Lesson for December 9, 1962 John 5:39-47; Luke 24:25-27; Colossians 3:15-17

Rather than discuss the verses in our lesson text we shall deal with the topic of the lesson itself, and briefly point out some of the values of the Bible in relation to Christian experience.

Conviction by the Word. While it is true the Holy Spirit must operate on the human heart to produce conviction, it is also true that such conviction is impossible apart from the Word. "For by the law is the knowledge of sin." It is the preaching of the gospel which creates the awareness that one is lost and needs salvation. Not only to the sinner, but conviction is also brought to the heart of the Christian when the Spirit brings the Word to bear upon his life. For examples of the convicting power of the Word see Nehemiah 8:5-9; 9:3; Acts 2:37; Hebrews 4:12.

Salvation by the Word. Salvation is provided through the atoning death of Christ and is effected by the Holy Spirit. But it is only through the Word that we know such provision is made for us and is available to us.

Thus we are said to be "born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever" (1 Peter 1:23). The necessity of the Word for salvation is clearly illustrated in Acts 8:29-35.

Sanctification by the Word. The sanctifying power of the Word is beautifully illustrated by the incident of Christ's washing the feet of His disciples. When Peter asked Christ to wash him all over, Jesus replied, "He that is washed [bathed] needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit." Just as the disciples needed their feet washed after contact with the dusty roads in their daily walk, so the Christian needs daily cleansing by the Word in order to be kept clean after contact with the world around him.

This cleansing power of the Word is affirmed in the following references: "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you" (John 15:3). "That he might sanctify and cleanse it [the church] with the washing of water by the word" (Ephesians 5:26). (See also John 17:17; Psalm 119:9, 11; 1 Thessalonians 5:23; 2 Corinthians 7:1; 1 Peter 1:22; 2 Peter 1:3, 4; 1 Timothy 4:5.)

Overcoming Temptation by the Word. Three times Christ met Satan with the words, "It is written." By contrast, Eve's downfall began when she entertained doubts concerning God's Word. When the enemy comes to us let us follow the example of Jesus—silence Satan with Scripture! The better acquainted we are with God's Word and its principles, the more successful we shall be in recognizing and overcoming the satanic and fleshly origin of certain suggestions that come to us.

Guidance by the Word. Jesus said, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God" (Luke 4:4). The Christian, in all his actions, is to be governed not by his own natural desires and whims, but by the will of God which can only be ascertained through His Word.

Growth by the Word (1 Peter 2:2). There are Christians today who have never grown up spiritually. They can only be described as unstable and carnal, and are still babes in Christ! They have never put into practice what the inspired writer calls "the first principles of the oracles of God." The reason? The Word of God never has had its proper place in their lives.

We do not grow spiritually by our feelings, but by the extent to which we apply the Word of God in our everyday lives and experiences. (See Hebrews 5:12; 1 Corinthians 3:13.)

Healing by the Word. "He sent his word, and healed them" (Psalm 107:20). Healing is one of the provisions of the atonement, but it is only by means of the Word that we know this is true. Healing is appropriated according to conditions set forth in God's Word. Again, healing is in response to someone's faith and obedience to God's Word.

"Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God" (Romans 10:17). Thus the Word of God is shown to be an indispensable agent in the healing of the body as well as of the soul!


