Christ is Born. God's Wonderful gift to Men. Luke 2:10.

coming King. In His prayer for us, together with His first disciples, as He petitioned the Father in our behalf before departing to be at the right hand of God as High Priest over the house of God, there are some things of rich import which represent the Divine thought and purpose for God's children in Christ.

Turning to John 17 Ch. we notice some. of them for comfort and encouragement and for our admonition as well. This is not a prayer for the world. Jesus said, "I pray not for the world." His cry for the perishing world came out of his heart when upon the cross. Luke 23:34. Here-He pleads for them that had been given Him out of the world. Notice His prayer which covers seven distinct phases of our need.

1st. Kept by the Father.

He prayed saying "Holy Father, keep them in thine own name those which thou hast given me (v. 11)." To be kept in His own name, is to be kept in the relationship between God and His child; to be continually acknowledged and claimed as His child, and to be treated as such. Christ had manifester that name to them. (v.6) "The name of the Lord is a strong tower; the righteous run into it and are safe."

2. Happy in Themselves.

Jesus prayed saying "that they may have My joy fulfilled in themselves" (v. 13). Joy is to be the portion of God's children; not simply a pleasure found in amusement nor a satisfaction derived from carnal things, but real joy born of an appreciation of God's love and care as administered by the Holy Ghost. "The Kingdom of God is not meat and drink"-carnal matters-"but / 23b'enusnes2 peace and joy in the Holy Ghost."

3. Protection From Evil.

'That they should be kept from the evil one" (v. 15 R. V.) Christ knew from personal experience the danger that lay in being tempted of the devil, so He prayed that we might be kept from yielding to Satan's alluring devices. All evil comes to us through Satan and his agencies, which are intended to interfere with and to defeat God's plan in our lives. Christ's prayer suggests our need of being kept from all evil. He is still praying for us to that end, and we may be kept for, "He ever liveth to make intercession for us." 4. Holy unto God.

"Sanctify them through Thy truth, Thy Word is truth * * * for their sakes I sanctify myself that they also may be sanctified through the truth." God intends that we be holy, that we be separated unto God to be wholly and sacredly His. Being made pure through the cleansing of our defilements by the holy blood, we are be kept holy by the Word of truth, which, if administered by the Holy Spirit, whose sword it is, will be the means of our enlightenment and admonition, that we may keep our place under the blood and in the will of God.

Let the world rejoice in the REFLECT-ED light and enjoy as best it can what it has, in its present state of selfish appreciation of what is good, but let all of God's true children be glad with exceeding joy as we contemplate the nativity.

The Manner of Christ's Advent into the World.

There has been much speculation about the manner of Christ's birth. Some have wondered. Others have scoffed. Very many have thought it strange. Not all have understood it. Let us look at it carefully and see why it was as it was and what importance attaches to the facts. Surely God knew best about how Christ should be born. We can expect to see nothing but divine wisdom displayed in it all and, if we try, we can readily see why it was as recorded.

January 2, 1916. THE ASCENDING LORD.

Lesson Text.-Acts 1:1-14.

Golden Text .- When He ascended on high, He led captivity captive, and gave gifts unto men. Eph. 4:8.

Leading Thought .--- "Coming in like manner."

1. The Risen Lord. vs. 1-5. Luke, the author of the third Gospel is recognized to be the author of this wonderful book of the Acts of the Apostles, or more correctly the Acts of the Holy Ghost. V. 1; Luke 1:4. It is pre-eminently the history of the founding, the order, and the outworking of the Church. It will be the basis for the most of the lessons for the coming year, and should be read prayerially again and aga through out, and in connection with it the Our lesson includes the introductory part of the book. The matter of first moment with Luke was the declaring of the Lord to be alive. It was surely the paramount joy of those disciples to actually know that the one whom they had so sorrowfully given up was living, and proving to their natural senses the reality of His resurrected life. They saw Him; they talked with Him; they walked with Him; they ate with Him; they handled Him. "Many infallible proofs!" Yea, verily. And we have not only their testimony but the continual personal realization of His presence through the out-poured Spirit to assure our hearts that He is truly "alive forevermore." Hallelujah! May all our hearts be mightily quickened of God as we recrucified the flesh with the affections and view these wonderful scenes so very real and precious to all our hearts who have felt the power of the Pentecostal out-pou

They were already regenerated men (Jno. 13:10; 15:3.); so the Baptism of the Holy Spirit as God designed it, is a thing distinctly apart from regeneration. Acts 8:12, 15. 16: ch. 10.

2. The Ascending Lord. Vs. 6-11. With all Christ's instruction the disciples had a poor understanding of His meaning. Like many today they were looking for the temporal gain as regarding their nation, rather than the spiritual welfare of themselves, and through them of the whole world, as God intended. God had a larger vision than simply restoring the kingdom to Israel. They were to receive power that they might be effective witnesses unto the uttermost part of the earth. God never pours out His Spirit for the temporal welfare of some church or party (Acts 8:18-24) or to make them happy alone; but to make them useful, "witnesses unto Christ," first in the place of receiving blessing, and thence outward to the farthest border God may direct. There are some good people more concerned about the "times and seasons" than about witnessing for Christ. They are missing the mark of God's intention and purpose. We are to leave those things with the Father and proceed about the business for which we have been divinely equipped. And then He was parted from them. No wonder they stood gazing steadfastly into heaven. V. 9. His words, His very appearance, and then His marvelous disappearance were enough to leave them in open-mouthed wonder. It is very probable that the two men who appeared in white apparel and delivered the promise of His return were Moses and Elijah. They had been vitally interested in Christ's decease on a former occasion (Luke 9:31) and were no doubt equally interested in his resurrection and ascension. They are to appear again during the tribulation. Rev. 11:3-11. But oh the comfort and hope of their message. Ring it to the ends of the world-"this same Jesus is coming in like manner as ye have seen Him go in to heaven." It is plain, it is clear, it is unquestionable, and our hearts are thrilling with the certainty of its fulfilment. Glory to our coming Christ for ever! "Now is our salvation nearer than when we first believed."

3. The Waiting Disciples. Vs. 12-14 The disciples were obedient, whether they fully understood or not. They might have said "we have the greatest message of the day and the people must hear at once." But what a failure they would have made, had they gone before God sent them. There comes a waiting time for all God's servants who would do effective work for Him. It was the obedient tarrying that made possible the joyful realization. The Holy Spirit is given to them that obey God. Nor were their tarrying days listlessly spent in gossip, self-seeking, arguing; instead "they continued in prayer and supplication." And don't overlook the blessed "one-accordness" without which there would never have been a Pentecost. Thank God for the part the women had in it. And God is still including the handmaidens. Praise His name for that!-Alice Reynolds Flower.
