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"Ye Are Bought With a Price."

Two Glimpses of Physical Sufferings Involved in That Price. But What Human Tongue Can Describe, or Imagination Conceive, the Spiritual Agony Involved?

"He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid, as it were, our faces from Him; HE WAS DESPISED, AND WE ESTEEMED HIM NOT" (Isa. 53:3).

THE SCOURGING (Matt. 27:26).

"Victims condemned to the cross first underwent the hideous torture of the scourge, and this was immediately inflicted on Jesus. He was now seized by some of the soldiers standing near, and after being stripped to the waist, was bound in a stooping posture, His hands behind His back, to a post, or block, near the tribunal. He was then beaten at the pleasure of the soldiers, with knots of rope, or plaited leathern thongs, armed at the ends with acorn-shaped drops of lead, or small, sharp-pointed bones. In many cases not only was the back of the person scourged cut open in all directions; even the eyes, the face, and the breast were torn, and the teeth not seldom knocked out. Under the fury of the countless stripes the victims sometimes sank—amidst screams, convulsive leaps, and distortions—into a senseless heap; sometimes died on the spot; sometimes were taken away, an unrecognizable mass of bleeding flesh, to find deliverance in death, from the inflammation and fever, sickness and shame. The scourging of Jesus was of the severest; for the soldiers only too gladly vented on any Jew the grudge they bore the nation, and they would, doubtless, try if they could not force out the confession which His silence had denied to the governor. Besides, He was to be crucified, and the harder the scourging the less life there would be left to detain them afterwards on guard at the cross."

Eusebius, the greatest of the early Church historians, describing a scourging of some of the martyrs wrote: "All around were horrified to see them so torn with scourges that their very veins were laid bare and the inner muscles and sinews, and even the very bowels exposed." (From Cunningham Geikie's "Life of Christ.")

"But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; AND WITH HIS STRIPES WE ARE HEALED" (Isa. 53:5).

THE CRUCIFIXION (Matt. 27:35).

"Among the Romans crucifixion was preceded by scourging, undoubtedly to hasten impending death. The victim then bore his own cross, or at least the upright beam, to the place of execution. . . . When he was tied to the cross nothing further was done and he was left to die from starvation. If he was nailed to the cross, at least in Judea, a stupefying drink was given him to deaden the agony. The number of nails used seems to have been indeterminate.

"The suffering of death by crucifixion was intense, especially in hot climates. Severe local inflammation, coupled with an insignificant bleeding of the jagged wounds, produced traumatic fever, which was aggravated by the exposure to the heat of the sun, the strained position of the body and insufferable thirst. The wounds swelled about the rough nails and the torn and lacerated tendons and nerves caused excruciating agony. The arteries of the head and stomach were surcharged with blood and a terrific throbbing headache ensued. The mind was confused and filled with anxiety and dread foreboding. The victim of the crucifixion literally died a thousand deaths. Tetanus not rarely supervened and the rigors of the attending convulsions would tear at the wounds and add to the burden of pain, till at last the bodily forces were exhausted and the victim sank to unconsciousness and death. . . . Death was sometimes hastened by breaking the legs of the victims and a blow delivered under the armpit before crucifixion. The peculiar symptoms mentioned by John would seem to point to a rupture of the heart, of which the Saviour died, independent of the cross itself, or perhaps hastened by its agony." (From "The International Standard Bible Encyclopedia," published by the Howard-Severance Co.)

--: "WANT ANY HELP?" --:

It was the last Sabbath in February this year (1921) a snowstorm was on, known as the "New England blizzard." It was the last day of a Pentecostal convention in Worcester, Mass.

I awakened in the morning to find it had been long snowing on the Saturday night, and the drifts were so high, as I started from my lodgings, to go to the convention hall, that with difficulty I made my way down the hill. I passed a church building where a couple of men had attempted to clear walks for church service, but so fierce was the storm, the wind and the sleet and the snow ever piling higher, that in disgust they shouldered their shovels and left the job unfinished. I had to keep closing my eyes to prevent the sleet from cutting the eyeballs.

But the convention was full of the power of the Holy Ghost, increasingly so as the day wore on. For two meals, we backed out of the hall to a next door restaurant; it seemed impossible to face the blast. However, we were so pre-occupied with "the glory of the Lord in the midst" we hardly sensed that the city was a blockade, and all autos and trolleys were out of commission, and that the mothers with little children had ploughed their way home after the midday services, nor did I learn till next day that brethren living some distance from the hall had to stay for the night in a nearby hotel, it being impossible to reach their homes.

I am so glad all this was hidden from me, as satisfied with favor, and filled full with the blessing of the Lord, I started for the short walk to my lodgings. It was about midnight as I left the hall, drifts increasing, and the fine ice-stones of the blizzard cutting the very skin. I got about half way up the short hill I was to walk, when I struck a snowdrift I could only break with my body, had pushed through but a short distance when my heart failed. I realized then that a seventy-eight-year-old machine was of little value—even a motor car, run 15 or 20 years, has not the worth of a new one fresh from the factory.

I glanced around,—one could keep the eye open but a second at a time on account of the stinging hail,—not a human being in sight! the night one of the darkest, save for the light of the snow. "Ha!" sneered the devil, "You will drop here in the snow and the corpse will be found in the morning without even a card on your person to tell where to send the body."

I have learned never to answer Satan, but in my heart I hearkened up, as you know we Christians do, and down upon me came, "The Lord is the strength of my heart and my portion power." I stood sucking the delicious sugar-plum, and in the joy of it "far above all" I

forgot my surroundings, till something prompting me said, "Go on," and lo! I could! and broke the length of the drift and then easily up the remainder of the hill, till I came to the turn down, where at the side door I was to insert my key. Here five streets intersected, and between me and the house door there had been blown up a drift so immense not the body of a man could have broken it!

Midnight—not a soul in the streets. I must get through that drift. So I simply threw myself on top of it and rolled and wallowed, till I came opposite the door, when behold a screen door barred my entrance, snow piled to its very top. I tried the door; no man could have moved it. A dilemma! The house as black as the outdoor midnight. Its occupants doubtless off in their second or third hour top-sleep. The howling storm would have drowned my voice had I tried to shout to them—but still looking up—not yet recovered from the heavenly anesthetic that had been administered, I felt a glow of delight that GOD was "my portion forever."

I was verily stuck in the snow which was melting and dripping from my skirt. I happened (?) to glance behind me—I could not turn, so wedged in—when looking for all the world, as if he were just coming down like the rest of the snow and sleet, was a man with a wooden snow shovel on his shoulder! Before I could recover my astonishment, an indescribably enheartening voice said, "Want any help?" Oh, the quality of that voice! Shall I ever again hear anything so inspiring? "Indeed I do," I cried back. Did the man fly? Immediately he was at my back from behind me repeatedly shoveling till the great bank of snow was removed from the screen door. It sprang open. Thanking him most heartily, I inserted my house-key and rushed in, intent on removing my dripping skirt. How the Lord delivered me from illness and brought me next day to my home town would be another story.

It was not till the second day at home the question was brought to me, "Who was that man with the wooden snow shovel?" Then I saw that He who had visited Abraham in the form of three men in his tent door on the plains of Mamre and sent father Lot two angels in man-form in the gates of Sodom, in my extremity had sent poor, unworthy me help from heaven! For there was not a man in all Worcester fool enough to be out with a wooden snow shovel Sunday past midnight looking for a job and the storm still on the increase and everything like locomotion gone out of commission some six or eight hours earlier on account of the violence of the storm.

Can I describe the rush of gratitude

that filled my heart as I saw this commentary on "The Lord . . . my portion forever"? In the keen sense of His favor to unworthy me, I cried, "Lord, You could do anything! and if You should ask me to walk across the Atlantic Ocean, I would start and know You would bring me through."

Oh, the way God wants to move us on, but the limitations of our unbelief!!!

I remember once when I lay for more than an hour under the power of the Spirit on the floor at Beulah Heights, N. J. convention, among many other illuminating things, God said to me, "Elizabeth, from the crown of your head to the sole of your feet, you are one skeptic." This He said, not of the conscious and voluntary parts of my nature—all that was His—but of that Adamic substance which, alas! we have all inherited from our original ancestor.

David under Divine illumination said, "I was a beast before Thee" (Psa. 73:22).

It must be so, else why would we not run easily and rapidly into that great supernaturalism God has provided for us in the life of Christ? He, the Anointed of God, walked at ease on the water, commanded the waves, stilled the storms, multiplied ad libitum loaves and fishes (by the way they had a touch of that food multiplication at Elim Bible School, Rochester, N. Y., a year or more ago), commanded money from the mouth of a fish, as well as healed the sick, cleansed the lepers, cast out devils, raised the dead, and the provision for us still reads, "The works that I do shall ye do also, and GREATER . . . because I go to the Father."

Well, did He ever go to the Father? Peter tells in his drunken sermon, i. e., in his sermon under the filling with THE SPIRIT, that consequent on Jesus arriving at the right hand of the Father, was the shedding of that intoxicating Spirit upon the waiting one hundred and twenty and the thrilling scenes of the Day of Pentecost and the rainbow-like supernaturalism arching the whole book of the "Acts of the Apostles."

Did that exhaust the supernaturalism of God in the life of the church? Nay, verily, for He speaking by the prophet in the book of Joel (2:23) says that the former rain of that hour was but a "moderate" exhibition of His grace provided for His church. "I will cause to come down for you the former rain and the latter rain."

Looking into the Palestine climate, which was the parable then in the mouth of God, we see it means treble or fourfold the fall of the Spirit's power given in the apostolic age. For such was the latter rains compared with the light early rains. Then turning to Zech. 10:1, we find God dating a command in the time when latter rains were thus falling, to pray for torrential showers, over and above and upon all this treble or fourfold latter rain, "lightning" clouds and showers.

Oh, those tropical tempests! I call to mind some I have witnessed in In-

-:- Because of Your Unbelief. -:-

"Then came the disciples to Jesus apart, and said, Why could we not we cast him out?"

"And Jesus said unto them, Because of your unbelief: for verily I say unto you, If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible to you" (Matt. 17:19, 20).

When the Lord Jesus sent His disciples into different parts of Palestine, He endued them with a double power, that of casting out unclean spirits and that of healing all sickness and all infirmity (Matt. 10:1). He did the same for the seventy who came back to Him with joy, saying, "Lord, even the spirits are subject unto us through Thy name" (Luke 10:17). On the day of the Transfiguration, while the Lord was still upon the mountain, a father brought his son who was possessed with a demon, to His disciples, beseeching them to cast out the evil spirit, but they could not. When after Jesus had cured the child, the disciples asked Him why they had been unable to do it themselves as in other cases, He answered them, "because of your unbelief." It was, then, their unbelief, and not the will of God which had been the cause of their defeat.

In our days divine healing is very little believed in. One may ask the reason, and here are the two answers which have been given. The greater number think that miracles, the gift of healing included, should be limited to the time of the primitive church, that their object was to establish the first foundation of Christianity, but that from that time circumstances have altered. Other believers say unhesitatingly that if the church has lost these gifts, it is by her own fault; it is because she has become worldly, that the Spirit acts but feebly in her; it is because she has not remained in direct and habitual relation with the full power of the unseen world; but that if she were to see anew, springing up within her men and women who live the life of faith and of the Holy Spirit, entirely consecrated to their God, she would see again the manifestation of the same gifts as in former times. Which of these two opinions coincide the most with the Word of God? Is it by the will of God that the "gifts of healing" have been suppressed, or is it rather man who is responsible for it? Is it the will of God that miracles should not take place? Will He in consequence of this no longer give the faith which produces them? Or again, is it the church which has been guilty of lacking faith?

What Saith The Scriptures?

The Bible does not authorize us, either by the words of the Lord or His apostles, to believe that the gifts of healing were granted only to the early times of the church; on the contrary, the promise which Jesus made to the

apostles when He gave them instructions concerning their mission, shortly before His ascension, appear to us applicable to all times (Mark 16:15-18). Paul places the gift of healing among the operations of the Holy Spirit. James gives a precise command on this matter without any restriction of time. The entire Scriptures declare that these graces will be granted according to the measure of the Spirit and of faith.

It is also alleged that at the outset of each new dispensation God works miracles, that it is His ordinary course of action; but it is nothing of the kind. Think of the people of God in the former dispensation, in the time of Abraham, all through the life of Moses, in the exodus from Egypt, under Joshua, the time of the Judges and of Samuel, under the reign of David and other godly kings up to Daniel's time; during more than a thousand years miracles took place.

But, it is said, miracles were more necessary in the early days of Christianity than later. But what about the power of heathenism even in this day, wherever the Gospel seeks to combat it? It is impossible to admit that miracles should have been more needful for the heathen in Ephesus (Acts 19:11, 12) than for the heathen of Africa in the present day. And if we think of the ignorance and unbelief which reign even in the midst of the Christian nations, are we not driven to conclude that there is a need for manifest acts of the power of God to sustain the testimony of believers and to prove that God is with them? Besides, among believers themselves, how much of doubt, how much of weakness there is! How their faith needs to be awakened and stimulated by some evident proof of the presence of the Lord in their midst. One part of our being consists of flesh and blood; it is therefore in the flesh and blood that God wills to manifest His presence.

In order to prove that it is the church's unbelief which has lost the gift of healing, let us see what the Bible says about it. Does it not often put us on our guard, against unbelief, against all which can estrange and turn us from God? Does not the history of the church show us the necessity of these warnings? Does it not furnish us with numerous examples of backward steps, of world pleasing, in which faith grew weak in the exact measure in which the spirit of the world took the upper hand? For such faith is only possible to him who lives in the world invisible. Until the third century the healings by faith in Christ were numerous, but in the centuries following they became more infrequent. Do we not know from the Bible that it is always unbelief which hinders the mighty working of God?

Oh, that we could learn to believe in

the promises of God! God has not gone back from His promises; Jesus is still He who heals both soul and body; salvation offers us even now healing and holiness, and the Holy Spirit is always ready to give us some manifestations of His power. Even when we ask why this divine power is not more often seen, He answers us: "Because of your unbelief." The more we give ourselves to experience personally sanctification by faith, the more we shall also experience healing by faith. These two doctrines walk abreast. The more the Spirit of God lives and acts in the soul of the believer, the more will the miracles multiply by which He works in the body. Thereby the world can recognize what redemption means.—Andrew Murray.

That dear old man of God, George Muller, who raised millions of dollars and never told a soul his needs, said when he started to pray that he made up his mind to get up in the morning at four o'clock and that he was determined not to let the devil get the best of him. He got a tub of water and every time the old devil would put him asleep we would douse his head in that tub of water. If some of you young people will jump out of bed in the morning and wait on God in the early hours, you would find heights in God that would surprise you, and when you get the habit of prayer, God will give you a spirit of prayer, and your life will be a prayer everywhere you go. It will be like the incense which went up to God in the temple; the incense represented prayer, and it was continually going up to God. God has a purpose in the lives of all you dear young people, but you never will find it out until you begin to pray. Then God will reveal to you just where you ought to be and put you into the place that He has designed for you. How many people are out of place because they do not pray! If you get into place you will feel you are right in heaven because you are working in the will of God.—Joseph Tunmore.

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QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

CONDUCTED BY E. N. REILLY

1123. Is there any danger of a person who has once been saved sinning against the Holy Ghost? What is the sin against the Holy Ghost?

The Lord has warned us against committing this sin, and there must be some danger or He would not have done so. However, a truly saved person should have little temptation to do so. The blasphemy of the Holy Ghost lies in the seeing of a miraculous work done by the power of God and in the knowing full well in our hearts that it is done through the Holy Spirit, yet, because we are not willing to own that it is of God, we willfully and knowingly attribute what we know to be a miraculous work of God's Spirit to the work of the devil. This is blaspheming the Spirit.

1124. The Assemblies of God constitute about what part of the Pentecostal movement? Are they not the largest body of believers in the movement?

We have not the statistics at hand to answer the above question. I should estimate, however, that the Assemblies of God constitute more than one-third, and possibly nearly one-half of the whole Pentecostal movement. Yes, I think it is the largest wing of the Movement. But we do not and should not boast of this. All baptized saints should be in one united body. Christ baptized in one Spirit into one body and they should stay where He put them, and should act consistent with this great fact.

1125. What reason do writers advance that Babylon is to be rebuilt, when Isa. 13:19-22 seems clearly to teach the very opposite?

They hold that Babylon in the prophetic scriptures, such as the book of Revelation, refers to a literal city, and to a Babylon that will exist in the last days. They hold all the prophecies concerning Babylon are not yet fulfilled. Hence they hold it is necessary for Babylon to be rebuilt in order for these prophecies to be fulfilled in the last days.

1126. Please explain Matt. 16:28. Was Jesus speaking of the resurrection?

No, this does not refer to the resurrection, but to the transfiguration. The next verse after says, "And after six days." "After" what? Why, after the saying in the previous verse. Then follows the transfiguration. Now if you will turn to 2 Peter 1:16, you will find that Peter speaks of "the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ," the coming being spoken of as in Matt. 16:28. Peter then goes on to explain that in the 18th verse how this happened "when we were with Him on the holy mount." So Peter here conclusively

shows that Matt. 16:28 refers to the transfiguration, as recorded in the 17th chapter of Matthew.

1127. Does Scripture anywhere give promise of a second chance of salvation?

No, the Scriptures rightly understood teach no such doctrine. God says, "Today is the day of salvation."

1128. Are the gifts in the Pentecostal Assemblies already established as they were in the days of the Former Rain? Are these gifts already in operation as in 1 Cor. 12? If they are not when will they be?

I don't think they are fully so established. But if we were to bring together in one town all the miracles that have been wrought in the various parts of the world in Pentecostal circles, it is likely that nearly every miracle recorded in the New Testament would be in the number. There have been more people reported raised from the dead in the Movement in the last 15 years than are reported raised from the dead in the New Testament. But this is not conclusive, since it is not likely that all the miracles of the Apostolic days are recorded in the New Testament, nor have we a complete record in the present day of what is now being done. Some wonderful miracles, about which very little is ever heard, are now occurring in out of way places among the most simple people of a simple, child-like faith in God. But on the whole we are much short of some things we see in the New Testament. There was once in the New Testament church such an overmastering, sweeping presence and power of God that when the multitudes came to Peter with their sick, lame, and crippled, the Word says, "They were healed every one." While I have seen wonderful healing meetings, I have never yet seen one in modern times, when many appeared, that all were healed. We have need for this mighty manifestation of God's power in this way. I feel that every well-ordered, good sized church of today ought to have within it the nine gifts of the Spirit. So far we have not seen it. Why not? Because we are not yet humble enough and self-sacrificing enough and sufficiently enlightened. When shall we see these things? When we meet the above conditions.

1129. What is meant in 1 Tim. 2:9 and 1 Pet. 3:3 of women being given to broidered hair or plaiting the hair? Does it mean for them to wear it straight?

This broidering or plaiting of the hair refers to the worldly fashion of the day that women in Apostolic days had of doing up their hair, and on which they

spent much of their time. I do not think the women must wear their hair straight down over their shoulders, but I do think it forbids them wasting their time in fixing themselves up after the fashions of the world. A child of God should have something far more absorbing to do for the Lord than the adorning of themselves so as to catch some worldly man's eye. It is the worldliness in it that is wrong for a child of God. A saint with a face shining with the glory of God is happier and speaks louder for God than all worldly adornment can ever do. In fact worldliness kills our testimony for Jesus.

1130. I belong to a lodge and my wife thinks it wrong. Please let me know.

I, too, once belonged to three lodges, but the Lord convicted me of it, and I left all three of them. I wrote one of them and gave it as my reason that these societies were made up largely of the people of the world, and that John says, "The whole world lieth in the evil one" (1 John 5:19 R. V.). I told them that I did not want to be bound by oath to those who were in the wicked one, and asked them to drop my name. They brought charges against me "for writing a letter unbecoming of the order," and appointed a committee to hear my case, and asked me to appoint somebody on my side of the case. I appointed the same fellows that the lodge had appointed in their own behalf and told them to get busy and turn me out. They kindly complied with my request. Since then I have never been bothered with any lodges. I do not go round with a chip on my shoulder fighting lodges. I think that it is a mistake. What men need is a salvation that will take them out of the world. When they get that they will not desire to be bound by oath to these worldly societies. One of the things that hurt me once was that my Woodman Lodge voted to give a smoker and took part of the money that I had given in, intending it for the widows and orphans and spent it on a godless smoker. This was before I got Pentecost, in fact, I left all the lodges before I got Pentecost. This illustrates how ungodly men belonging to worldly lodges can do. They tell us that it is for charity and such like that we are to join, but when they take a notion to, the majority can vote money in their treasury, paid in by godly men to be spent in worldly smokers. This is also true in many other matters. The majority rules, and since the majority are almost invariably sinners this puts saints to be ruled over by their own consent by the decision of the ungodly. I could not get my conscience to feel good about such matters, and so I left them, and I have felt better about it ever since. If your conscience is bothering you, or if you have any doubt about the matter, I would suggest you give God and your soul the benefit of the doubt, by cleaning up from them. If you have not any doubt about it, just

wait, look up to God, and pray for light and honestly receive and honestly welcome the light that the Lord gives, and you will come out all right. I never try to rush people in such matters, but

I have never known a man who honestly sought light on this matter very long and very earnestly who did not receive it from the Lord. He is no respecter of persons.

THE GREAT APOSTASY.

The coming of the Lord Jesus Christ and our gathering unto Him is associated with apostasy, falling away, and the revelation of the man of sin. (See 2 Thess. 2:1-3.) The connecting link of the chain, between the coming of the Lord and the revelation of the man of sin, is the falling away. Falling from the "gathering together unto Him," and falling unto the man of sin. Falling from the Man of Truth and siding with the father of lies.

The coming of Christ can not take place until there is a falling away. Of how many? There will be a great number. Because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold. When the Son of Man shall come, shall He find faith on the earth? He will find plenty of schemes for betterment and reconstruction and improvement, and lots of lukewarmness. Yes, and a multiplication of manner of forms, and different religions with emphasis on error. And they are all based on the first lie, "Ye shall not surely die. Ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil."

Shall be as gods! They have been trying at it for thousands of years, and witness the product! Ye shall be as gods. Look at Europe and the world today, the rule of the would-be-gods, Satan's gods, and then they still say: "We must reconstruct." Adam and Eve started the first reconstruction program with fig-leaves, and man has not yet learned the lesson. Reconstruction! And God says: "I will overturn, overturn, overturn" (Ezek. 21:27).

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse" (2 Tim. 3:13). Why? They have got to prepare and be fit to cooperate with the man of sin when he is revealed. And the apostasy, the falling away, is where he gets his main reinforcements. A religious apostate will suit and be a fit person for the one who rebelled against God. Who crucified Christ? Religious apostates, those who fell away. And Christ said to them, "Ye are of your father, the devil." Religious people, but apostate.

Satan is working overtime. The printing press of hell is being reinforced. The devil is busy publishing "The Key to the Scriptures." It is a guide to the lower regions. It has the mark of the beast in it from beginning to the end. This is only one volume of the library. God's presses are being multiplied and the devil is also multiplying his. Bibles by the millions, and Satan is sending his literature by the millions. "Undermine, undermine, undermine," is his motto. God's people

need to be warned not to be ignorant of Satan's devices.

Opposing and pushing away the truth and seeking to destroy it, and at the same time pushing himself forward, exalting himself above all that is called God—that is the program of the man of sin. He exalteth himself. Christ humbled Himself. But God hath highly exalted His Son, and when iniquity shall have reached its height, when evil has reached its limit, the Son will be on the throne. When it has reached the limit that God will allow, the Son will come forth victorious upon His white horse, with vesture dipped in blood, with His white robed army following, slaying His enemies with the sharp sword that proceedeth out of His mouth. And the man of sin and his false prophet will be taken and cast alive into the lake of fire.

It is going to be done. As sure as the tragedy of Calvary was enacted, so sure will the tragedy of the overthrow of the beast and false prophet be enacted. Taken alive. Cast into the lake of fire. Resistance will be futile. Destruction will be sure, final and everlasting.

The apostasy you see round about, the falling away, spells ruin, defeat and the lake of fire for the enemy, and for all those who follow him.

Can you turn the stream? Can you divert the stream of apostasy as it flows toward the lake of fire? No. Are you helpless? No. As the stream comes down, there are particles floating on the surface, and some of these are caught, taken ashore and rescued. And so with this stream, the falling away, some will be saved and rescued, as brands plucked from the burning, through the preaching of the Gospel.

The Saviour once said: "Satan has desired to have you. I have prayed for you." What He prayed for Peter, He will pray for others. **Every hand put out to be saved will be grasped and rescued.** But the main stream goes on until the revelation day from heaven, the coming day of our gathering together unto Him.

Meantime the Lord will supply all grace, all strength, and all wisdom necessary to hold fast and to rescue those who desire it. The Master says: "Hold fast till I come, let no man take thy crown." There are crown stealers prowling round, those who have lost their own, and they hate to see you with a prospective crown. But the Lord Jesus is able to save to the uttermost all that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them.

WHOM THE LORD LOVETH HE CHASTENETH.

Heb. 12:6.

We recall a striking story from the lips of a friend. A lady was summering in Switzerland. One day she started out for a stroll and presently, as she climbed the mountain side, she came to a shepherd's hut. She walked to the door and looked in where sat the shepherd, and around him lay his flock. Near at hand on a pile of straw, lay a single sheep which seemed to be suffering. Scanning it closely, the lady saw that its leg was broken, and at once her sympathy went out to the poor sheep.

She asked, "How did it happen?" To her amazement, the shepherd answered: "Madam, I broke that sheep's leg." A look of pain swept over the visitor's face. Seeing it, the shepherd went on. Secret of Effectual Service to God.

The welfare of our families, the prosperity of our business, our work and service for the Lord, may be considered the most important matters to be attended to; but, according to my judgment, the most important point to be attended to is this—**Above all things, see to it that your souls are happy in the Lord.** Other things may press upon you; the Lord's work even, may have urgent claims upon your attention; but I deliberately repeat, it is of supreme and paramount importance that you should seek, above all other things, to have your souls truly happy in God Himself. Day by day seek to make this the most important business of your life. This has been my firm and settled conviction for the last five and thirty years. For the first four years after my conversion I knew not its vast importance; but now, after much more experience, I specially commend this point to the notice of my younger brethren and sisters in Christ. The secret of all true, effectual service is—joy in God, and having experimental acquaintance and fellowship with God Himself.

But in what way shall we attain to this settled happiness of soul? How shall we learn to enjoy God? How obtain such an all-sufficient, soul-satisfying portion in Him as shall enable us to let go the things of this world as vain and worthless in comparison? I answer, this happiness is to be obtained **through the study of the Holy Scriptures.** God has therein revealed Himself unto us in the face of Jesus Christ.

In the Scriptures by the power of the **Holy Ghost,** He makes Himself known unto our souls. Remember, it is not a God of our own thoughts, or our own imaginations that we need to be acquainted with, but the God of the Bible, our Father, who has given the blessed Jesus to die for us. Him should we seek intimately to know, according to the revelation He has made of Himself in His own most precious Word.

The way in which we study this Word is a matter of the deepest moment. The very earliest portion of the day we can command should be devoted to meditation on the Scriptures. Our souls should feed upon the Word. We should read it—not for others, but for ourselves; all the promises, the encouragements, the warnings, the exhortations, the rebukes, should be taken home to our bosoms. Especially let us remember, **not to neglect any portion of the Bible;** it should be read regularly through. To read favorite portions of the Scriptures, to the exclusion of other parts, is a habit to be avoided. But to read the Bible thus is not enough: we must seek to become intimately and experimentally acquainted with Him whom the Scriptures reveal, with the blessed Jesus, who has given Himself to die

in our room and stead. Oh, what an abiding, soul-satisfying portion do we possess in Him!

But another point here needs especially to be noticed: it is that we seek habitually to carry out what we know; to act up to the light that we have received, then more will assuredly be given. But if we fail to do this, our light will be turned into darkness. It is of the deepest moment that we walk with a sincere, honest, upright heart before the Lord. If evil be practiced or harbored and connived at, the channel of communication between our souls and God (for the time being) will be cut off. It is all important to remember this. Infirmities and weaknesses will cleave to us as long as we remain in the body; but this is a different thing from willingly allowing evil. I must be able with a true, honest, upright heart to look my heavenly Father in the face to say, "Here I am, blessed Lord; do with me as Thou wilt."

Then let us remember that we are His stewards. Our time, our wealth, our talents, our all, are His, and His alone. Let us seek to remember this, and carry it out, and then what happy Christians shall we all be! It is a divine principle, "To him that hath shall more be given;" and as assuredly as we seek to make good use of that which is confided to us, more will be imparted. We shall be used of the Lord, and shall become increasingly happy in His own most blessed service. Beloved! we have only one life—one brief life; let us seek, with renewed purpose of heart, to consecrate that one life wholly to the Lord—day by day to live for God, and to serve Him with our body, soul and spirit, which are His.

As we advance in years, let us not decline in spiritual power; but let us see to it that an increase of spiritual vigor and energy be found in us, that our last days may be our best days.

Our holy faith does not consist in talking. "Reality, reality, reality," is what we want. Let us have **heart-work;** let us be genuine. Beloved! we should live so as to be missed, missed both in the church and in the world, when we are removed. Oh, how rapidly is time hastening on! We should live in such a manner that if we were called hence, our dear brothers and sisters might feel our loss, and from their inmost souls exclaim, "Oh, that such a one were in our midst again!" We ought to be missed even by the world. Worldly persons should be constrained to say of us, "If ever there was a Christian upon earth, there was one."

But to revert to the Scriptures. In them, through the teaching of the Holy Ghost, we become acquainted with the character of God. Our eyes are divinely opened to see what a loving Being God

is! and this good, gracious, loving heavenly Father is ours, our portion for time and for eternity; and our Lord Jesus, who gave Himself for us, is that blessed One, to whose image and likeness we shall be conformed; and to serve Him should be our greatest joy and privilege as long as we remain on earth.

But then, when trial and affliction come; when God deals with us as though He were not the lovely, kind, and gracious Being presented to us in His Word, shall we murmur and despond? Ah, no. Beloved in Christ, let us trust our heavenly Father; let us, like little children, hang entirely on Him, reposing in the sweet assurance of His unchangeable, eternal love. Let us remember how He acted towards His saints of old, what His dealings were with them; let us remember what is recorded concerning their history, for now, as He has ever done, God will most surely act according to His Word. This intimate, experimental acquaintance with Him will make us truly happy. Nothing else will. If we are not happy Christians (I speak deliberately, I speak advisedly) there is something wrong. If we are not in a happy frame of spirit, the fault is ours and ours alone.

In God our Father and the blessed Jesus, our souls have a rich, divine, imperishable, eternal treasure. Let us enter into practical possession of these true riches; yea, let the remaining days of our earthly pilgrimage be spent in an ever-increasing, devoted, earnest consecration of our souls to God.

What am I doing, what are you doing, and what is the Church doing to make the Cross of Christ—"God's plus sign to men's minus lives"—known to the uttermost ends of the earth?

A thousand fields at home and abroad are in the blackness of darkness, and man-made Modernism is increasing that darkness. The long-time citadels of Christianity have been taken possession of in numberless instances by a type of prophets and teachers whose doctrines are utterly at variance with the Word of God. Bolshevism is wrecking its millions in a small part of the old world; while Modernism, its unnumbered millions in a large part of the whole world.

The preaching of the death and resurrection and coming again of Christ is the world's only hope. If ever the professing Church needed to be shaken from center to circumference, it needs it today! If ever the world needed to "behold the Lamb of God," it needs it today! If ever a fallen race of men needed the Cross of Christ, it needs it today! If ever the true Church of Christ needed apostolic courage, it needs it today! If ever blood-cleansed and Spirit-endued intercessors were needed, they are needed today!

GONE TO A SURE REWARD.

For the benefit of the many friends of our esteemed Presbyterian and friend, Bro. John Coxe, we print the following clipping from the Evening Journal of Wilmington, Del.:

The funeral of Pastor John Coxe was held yesterday afternoon. The officiating clergymen were Pastor Robert A. Brown, of New York City, Pastor Edward Sykes, of Newark, N. J., and Pastor Ernest Williams, of Philadelphia.

Mr. Coxe was born in Tavistock, Devonshire, England, Feb. 26, 1853. At the age of nine years he was left with his widowed mother, when his father, who had come to America as a civil engineer, died of cholera. Due to his own indomitable will and perseverance he helped maintain a family, secured an education, and fitted himself for the ministry. He was affiliated with the Bible Christians and Primitive Methodists in England.

In 1881 Mr. Coxe came to this country and settled in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. From there he carried on his ministry in the Methodist Episcopal Church, but when the Christian and Missionary Alliance was organized, under the late Dr. A. B. Simpson, Mr. Coxe was one of the pioneers and organizers of the movement. Later his daughter, Miss Sara Coxe, went to India as a missionary, under the Christian and Missionary Alliance. She remained there for eight years before she returned on her first furlough, in 1915. Mr. Coxe was then pastor of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Tabernacle, in New Castle, Pa. He also served as pastor of the Christian and Missionary Alliance churches in Butler, Pa., and in Wilmington. Under his ministry in Wilmington, arrangements were made for building the church, which now stands in West Fifth Street, near Washington.

During Mr. Coxe's ministry in Butler, Pa., the modern Pentecostal movement started and spread rapidly over this country and abroad. Mr. Coxe was one of the prime participants in the Pentecostal movement and had traveled repeatedly into almost every state in the union, bearing the Pentecostal message of the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, according to Acts 2:4.

During the war, while he was engaged in evangelistic work in Texas, he preached in the army cantonments along the Mexican border. Lately Mr. Coxe has been Presbyterian for the Pentecostal churches in the New England states, with a charge in Boston, headquarters in Springfield, Mass., and churches throughout the New England states.

Recently Mr. Coxe attended the National Council of Pentecostal Churches in St. Louis and returned from there determined to devote the remainder of his life and ministry to the work in Wilmington, and the state of Delaware. It was upon his return home from the Council that he contracted pneumonia from which he died last Monday.

A friend writes the following regarding the departed clergyman:

"Mr. Coxe was a singularly strong and determined man; and, though he made many friends and commanded the respect of associates, he lived a life apart, apparently above this world, consecrated to a noble and consuming ministry."

QUENCHED THE VIOLENCE OF FIRE.

(From a private letter from one of the students at Elm, Rochester, N. Y.)

A little incident occurred this noon which brought three of us closer to the Lord. While serving the tea and hot water at our table, one of the students spilled almost a whole cup of scalding

water down Helen's back (she sits next to me). She screamed out (not very loudly) and buried her face in her hands and began sobbing. I told her she had better go to her room right away and get her dress off. We have to go through the lecture room and chapel to get over to the home, and when we got as far as the lecture room, poor Helen just leaned her head against the wall and cried like a baby. She said the pain was just terrible.

I helped her over to her room and took off her dress, and her right shoulder blade and down her back was cooked red and the skin was raised in a few places. Three of us knelt down and each prayed, taking victory in the promises, "By His stripes we are healed," and "The prayer of faith shall save the sick." We sang in faith:

"Victory, victory, precious blood-bought victory,
Victory, victory, victory all the time;
As Jehovah liveth, strength divine He giveth
Unto those who trust Him, victory all the time."

We sang it three times, and the third time Helen stood up and said that while we were singing, the pain all left as quick as a flash, so we all thanked and praised the Lord. The burn still looked very bad, as though it would blister.

When we came back to the house, after we had had our dinner, she had me look at her back to see if it had blistered, and I could hardly find the burnt place (it was about eight inches long and a few inches wide), as it was just a little pinker than the rest of her skin. I touched it real hard and she said that it did not feel tender or the least bit sore.

That was such a quick and wonderful answer to prayer that we were so encouraged and it seemed to bring us closer to the Lord. A little over a week ago, Helen took the Lord for her Healer, and she felt this was a test to her faith.

MISSIONARY ARRIVES IN RUSSIA.

One of our missionaries has arrived in Russia at last. Bro. J. E. Varonaeff, a native of Russia, received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and ministered to his own people in America for some years. Then the call of God came for his return to Russia. But he could not get across the border and so was detained in Bulgaria for a number of months. Under date of August 5th he writes, "I wish to report good news. God has opened a door into Russia for me. After one week I will leave on Bulgarian steamship 'Sophia' and will go to Russia with Russian refugees. My family and I with five Russian brethren will go to Odessa, Russia."

The last word that was received from Bro. Varonaeff was written Sept. 28th, as follows: "Six weeks ago I, with my family, arrived in Odessa, Ukraina from Bulgaria. Now I have received full freedom as a citizen of Russia. The Greek Orthodox Church and the Russian Protestants now have religious freedom for which we thank God and our Lord Jesus Christ. I have preached in the Baptist Church in Odessa and God blessed us and two souls received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost like in Acts 2:4, and many souls have begun earnestly to pray for the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. There is a big spiritual revival now among the Greek Catholic people, but no literature, Bibles, New Testaments, tracts and papers. Please pray for Russia and especially at this time. In many parts of Russia there is a great hunger, because there was no rain during the summer. Please pray for Russia and don't forget us."

NATIVE OF INDIA VISITS AMERICA.

Makes Great Claims Which Have Not Been Proven.

Some weeks ago the Missionary Treasurer was surprised to receive a visit from a native of India, who styled himself M. B. Alla and who claimed to be the crown prince of Afghanistan. He claimed that his stand for Christ cost the lives of his wife and two sons and that he himself was saved from death by a miracle. He desired the endorsement of the Council so that he might work among his own people. He claimed to be well known in many places, freely giving us names and addresses to whom we might write. The Missionary Treasurer has started an investigation, and so far we have utterly failed to substantiate the claims of the man. He claims to have been converted in Lucknow and to have served under the Methodist Board, but the secretaries of both the Methodist Church South and the Methodist Church North disclaim any knowledge of him. We can not substantiate any of his claims and therefore we would warn every one that if Mr. Alla presents himself to your assembly and desires the platform, that he does not bear the endorsement of the Foreign Missions Department.

A CLOUDBURST IN GRANITE CITY, ILLINOIS.

Evangelist A. H. Argue, with son and daughter, Zelma and Watson, have just closed a four weeks' campaign for us. After the first week, Brother Watson had to leave us to enter the Bible Training School at Newark, N. J. God's power was greatly manifested throughout the entire four weeks, but especially the last three weeks. During the whole meeting, about 130 received the baptism of the Holy Ghost. A great number were saved, but I do not know exactly how many. The last two weeks about 107 of the above number received the baptism of the Spirit; 67 received it in one week; 13 received it in one day. Our building seats over 500, but the crowds increased until at times hundreds of people were unable to gain standing room inside the tabernacle.

Some of the most consecrated Christian workers in five or six different churches, among them Sunday School superintendents, deacons, Sunday School teachers and trained singers, received the baptism of the Holy Ghost. The whole city is stirred and moved upon by the power of God. The manifestations of God's power and Spirit in this meeting were marvelous. Men and women were brought under God's power in their homes at night and were baptized with the Spirit. The power of God took hold of people while sitting in their seats during service (people who had not expressed a desire publicly to be baptized with the Spirit) and they were not released until they were filled with the Spirit. Others arose from their seats and started to the prayer rooms, and the Spirit fell upon them before they had time to kneel and they would shout, talk with tongues and praise God.

I have attended some of the big meetings that have been held by leading evangelists in the U. S., both Pentecostal and denominational, but for the presence of living, saving and baptizing power, this surpasses anything that I have ever witnessed. Visiting ministers give the same report. Real, old-time Pentecostal scenes were reproduced. Many strong, husky young men were slain under the mighty power of God and received the baptism in the Spirit. Others, when they were baptized, saw visions, prophesyings were heard and interpretations given. The gift of discernment, on one occasion, was very remarkably manifested.

There is a large Welsh element living here. Most of them are religious people. The Lord moved in among them in a very precious way and poured out His Spirit upon different ones of them. The Welsh choir, which is one of the best in this section of the country, sang for us one night.

The Argues greatly endeared themselves to us during their stay among us. We surely praise God for what He has done for us and the people of our town and surrounding country. Last night a crowd of happy people gathered at the depot to give the Argues a "good-bye" and a "God bless you." They sang "We will be ready when the train comes in," and as the train departed we commended them to the saints in other places as princes among evangelists.—C. M. O'Guin, Pastor.

PIONEER WORK IN COLORADO.

Fort Morgan is a pioneer field along Pentecostal lines. Satan did his best to hinder our pitching a tent here, but God made us feel that we were to go forward and occupy and He would bring us out victorious. Oh! I feel if we would only enlarge our borders in the homeland and march in and occupy some of these vast and needy fields, we never know what far reaching results it will have on both the home and foreign fields. This aggressiveness will put new vitality into the work as a whole. I am so glad that at the G. C. the need of this forward movement was emphasized. The Lord blessed us and gave us over one hundred souls. There were also some

remarkable cases of healing, among whom were cases of tuberculosis, deafness, appendicitis, diseased eyes, gilters and many other sicknesses. One sister wrote: "I have more reasons today for thanking Jesus than ever before, for His healing me so thoroughly through your prayers. My eye was badly diseased but was relieved instantly. My lame spine is rapidly becoming normal, I feel so fresh and new at all times and have such endurance."

Another girl testified of a remarkable deliverance saying: "I can not praise the Lord Jesus enough for what He has done for me. My trouble began when I was six years old. We tried different doctors, some said I had pleurisy, others said I had tuberculosis. I suffered continually for nine years. In August 1921 the Lord sent the Booth-Clibborn brothers to Fort Morgan, Colo., to minister to us. Attending the meetings I found salvation for my soul. 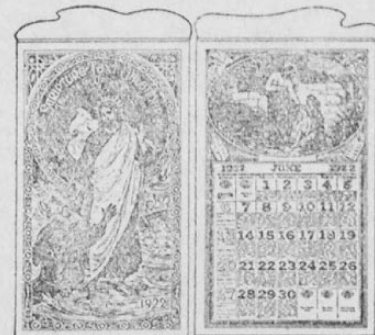

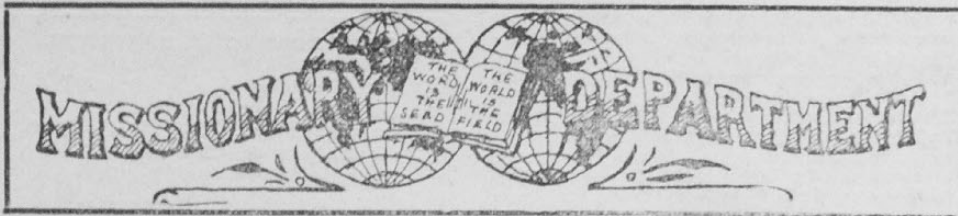


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THE CHAPRA FLOOD.

The story of the Chapra flood and the destruction of the mission station has finally been received from Sisters Coxé and Builder. The story follows:

Miss Builder and I came to Chapra to finish the work on the house in July. We were hoping to have it completed and ready for use by the end of October. The house was very, very old, but we had repaired it as funds came in to do the work. We were quite satisfied with the old house

of mud walls, for many houses are built of mud and sun-dried brick in India. We were just praising God daily for all He had done for us,—and we are still praising and trusting Him, for, we know that all things work together for good to them that love God.

This has been a heavy rainy season. We had had several days of steady rain and on the night of the 14th of Sept. there were eight hours of incessant rainfall—it looked like a cloudburst. All night we heard the cries of the people as they escaped from falling houses. Five were killed in one house alone. On the morning of the 15th, our worst fears were realized when the dam of the river Gunduk broke and the town began to fill up with water. The waters rose in some places from six to eight feet. Huts have been washed away, buildings have collapsed, and the crops completely destroyed. The homeless people are living on the railway embankment and feeding on Indian corn. It is feared that when the floods subside there may be an outbreak of disease—fever, cholera etc. Railroad employees have been compelled to live in wagons.

The flood extends over a vast area. Chapra has never experienced such a severe flood.

In the town alone, 2,000 houses have fallen, and thousands are homeless. Our own loss is complete. The house still stands, but the inside walls were built of sun-dried bricks and mud, and after standing some days in several feet of water the mud walls fell away. The inside is one mass of debris, while the outside walls are cracked and the foundations of the house shaken.

We also lost our personal effects, clothes,

shoes, books, etc., but we are not concerned about ourselves; it is the work, and the present need to buy brick and put up a bungalow built of burnt brick and lime, that can endure and stand any floods. We have much material on hand and the land, but we have not got the money, a question of \$2,000, to buy brick, lime etc., and to pay for the putting up of the house.

We are homeless now, but Miss Builder and I are going to pitch a tent on the compound and the work will go right on. We have begun the work of dismantling the old house, for the roof and floors are new and can be used in the new house. The need is very great. Mrs. Schoonmaker and her little children must have a home, and God has called Miss Builder, Miss Rediger and myself to this needy field, and we must have a roof. Oh, do pray for us now that every need shall be met.

Chapra is one of the most needy fields in all N. India. Men are constantly asking about the way of life, and the Zenana women (shut-ins), plead with us to bring them the gospel. Miss Builder and I had visited in some of the homes, and we found open doors and eager inquirers. On Sunday mornings we have services on the veranda, and one Sunday fifty men and boys came in from the road and listened attentively. We do need help and prayer for this needy field right now. Will you not pray for us at this time?

Miss Katie P. Builder writes one week later concerning the Chapra disaster as follows:

Miss Coxé wrote last week telling of the flood in Chapra. Now that the water has gone down we realize the awful havoc it has made. It is the worst flood Saran District has ever had. They tell us that in 8 hours 21 inches of rain fell, breaking all records. Then on the 15th, the dam of the river Gunduk burst and the water rushed over the City. The whole of Saran District is flooded and the distress is awful. Crops are destroyed and the grain

they had stored is gone also, as it got soaked and has gone bad. Whole villages are wiped out and in this city over 2,000 houses have fallen. Most of the Indian houses are of mud and sun-dried brick put together with clay. The government officials are doing all they can to relieve distress and giving out food to the hungry, also helping the people to rebuild their houses.

The government buildings are of first-class brick, so they have stood, but there is a great loss there also, as important papers and books were water-soaked when the water was five feet deep in some of the buildings. They will have a lot of repair work to do.

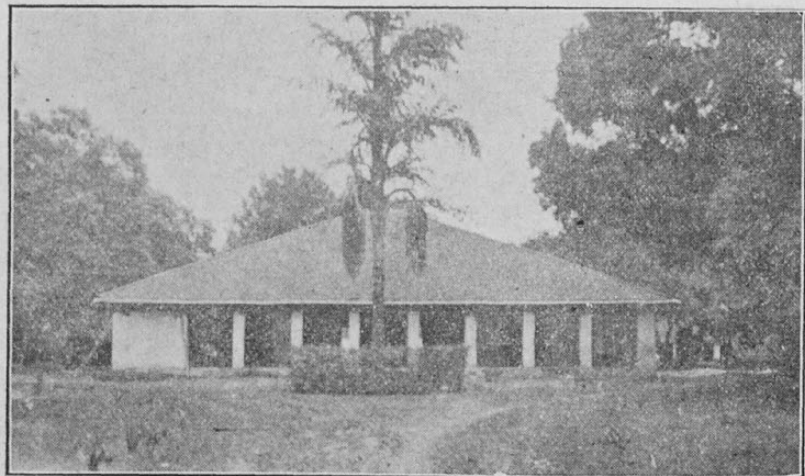
The water was eight feet deep in some places. Our compound is low, so the water rushed in and lay for nearly a week five feet deep about and in the house, thus undermining the foundation. All the out-houses are down. The bungalow is a battered shell with the inside a mass of debris. Part of the outside wall has stood and the roof caved in in places. We used props of bamboo to keep the roof from falling, thus saving all our new tiles from breaking. Of course the house is beyond repair and the work of months is gone, and just when it was ready for us to move in and settle for the other missionaries.

Everything Miss Coxé and I had in the house was soaked with water; but as the water rose we got coolies to carry our boxes and furniture over to a friendly mission, built on high ground, where we are now staying. Some of our personal effects are destroyed, but we are thankful to have escaped so well.

The water is down now, and we have forty-five men and women working on the place gathering the good material for rebuilding. We have put up a shack to store tiles, roofing, wooden beams and stone. If it lay in confusion it would soon be stolen.

Mr. W. K. Norton, the chairman of our mission, spent a day with us and advises our building at once if we feel this is the field God has called us to, which we do. So we have ordered 70,000 bricks and will put in a good foundation. Then we can use much of the old materials to go on with, and trust God to supply the rest. Our new house will be smaller and more compact. This is one of the most needy districts in all India and the most thickly populated. The people are hungry for truth, and the door stands wide open. So the only thing to do is to rebuild. We got this promise, "The barrel of meal shall not waste, neither shall the cruise of oil fail" (1 Kings 17:14).

We are about to pitch tents on the compound for the cold season (the rains are over now), and watch the work go on. We are hoping to have a roof on the new home before March, when the hot weather sets in again. We need your prayers as things go slowly at best in India. We are

not daunted and believe it is God's will that we move on and give the gospel to this needy people. This is a time of wonderful opportunity. As the destitute people come asking for help we can give them work, thus helping temporarily and spiritually, and reaching many we otherwise could not reach. Daily Miss Coxie preaches to them and many have heard the gospel for the first time. Those that can read are studying the Bible for themselves and our hearts are made glad as they show a real desire to know the truth. Last week Mr. Norton baptized a boy who has been working for us and there are other hopeful candidates.

These are busy days and full of opportunity. So we need your prayers that we may be kept in health. It is feared as the water goes down, cholera and fever will follow. There is much sickness now. We are very conscious that we are being cared for and have no fears.

Very sincerely yours for souls in this dark land of India.
