REST AND REFRESHING.

A Bible Study on Isaiah 28 and 29.*



"Whom will He make to understand the message?... To whom He said, This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest, and this is the refreshing" (Is. 28:12, R. V.).

Rest and Refreshing! The two gifts offered in God's "message," as declared in the portion before us. This "message" epitomizes the substance of the gospel offered in this dispensation, and introduces us to the wonderful succession of pictures in Isaiah 28 and 29, which together make a most vivid and complete portrayal of the present age, including Christ's Ministry, Death, Ascension, Pentecost, the formation of the Church, and yet future events. Our authority for thus interpreting the pictures is based on the explanations given in the New Testament of many citations from this passage.

Our Lord Himself emphasized these two gifts as being the sum and substance of salvation, because, although He used many and varied ways of inviting people to come to Him during His earthly ministry, there are only two recorded instances when He used the expression "Come unto Me" imperatively. The first invites to come and rest; the second, to come and drink (Matt. 11:28; John 7:37).

Other reasons suggest themselves for concluding that Christ had Isaiah 28 in mind on both these occasions. The prophet says that the message would be received by childlike hearts only, and our Lord's invitation to rest followed His thanksgiving that these things were revealed to babes (Matt. 11:25).

When He offered refreshing to the thirsty He was undoubtedly thinking of this passage in Isaiah, for He said, "He that believeth on Me," as the Scripture hath said" (John 7:38). Now the phrase "he that believeth" occurs nowhere else in the Old Testament but in Isaiah 28:16; may we not therefore conclude that this was "the Scripture" to which He refer-

red? "Behold, I lay in Zion for a foundation a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone of sure foundation, he that believeth shall not make haste." The immediate result of believing on Him, Isaiah says, would be safety. Those who ceased to strive to make a shelfer for themselves from the coming storm, and rested on God's sure foundation, would never have cause to flee ("make haste")

Thus the idea here is more that of the first offer, Rest; but since our Lord refers to this verse to promise "Rivers,"—"the Spirit" (John 7:38, 39)—the question naturally arises, Does Isaiah plainly indicate the Pentecostal blessing in this passage? He does, indeed, by means of a heautiful and powerful illustration

Let us first examine the verses in these two chapters that are quoted and explained in the New Testament. No portion of equal length in the Old Testamentwith the exception of Is. 52 and 53—is cited so often in the New. Eleven times do we find quotations from Is. 28 and 29 in the gospels and epistles, in addition to the many occurrences of "he that believeth," besides various allusions that are not absolute quotations. Surely we are studying a passage of great importance.

We are not left in doubt as to the meaning of the "Stone" laid in Zion, for three times this verse is quoted and more often alluded to, to teach us that Christ, by laying Himself down, became the one sure Foundation (1 Potes 2.6)

The marvellous work and a wonder (Is. 29:14), cavilled at by the wise of this world, is shown to be salvation through Christ crucified and risen, the despisers of which must perish (Acts 13:41; 1 Cor. 1:19, 23).

"Stammering lips and another tongue" (Is. 28:11) is quoted to prove that the new sign which outwardly distinguished the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost from all previous enduements with power, was prophesied long before (1 Cor. 14:21).

The spiritual condition of the people of our Lord's time and after, is described by Isaiah as "a deep sleep," worshipping "with their lips, but . . . their heart far from Me." (Is. 29:10, 13, quoted Rom. 11:8; and Matt. 15:8). Since the main features of the picture are thus outlined by the divine explanation, we are helped to trace the fulfilment of other details prophesied in the same Scripture.

The agricultural scenes described in 23: 23-30 remind us of the three parables on sowing, spoken by our Lord, who explained that "the seed is the word," and when "sown upon good ground, such as hear the word and accept it" (Mark 4:14, 20, 26), referring specially to believers in this present gospel age, the end of which is a harvest to be reaped (Rev. 14.15).

The usual emblem for Israel is a fruit tree, but the figure used here is that of a seed, to represent the Church. Instead (Continued on Page 7)

How to Live the Victorious Life

God's Love Never Faileth.

What is the Victorious Life? It is the life of holiness, or the "perfect" life which is so often referred to by Paul in his Epistles.

Surely then the very first thing for us to do is to find out just what is commanded us, and promised us, in the New Testament. Two very definite things have been already spoken of—Holiness and Perfection. What do these words mean? And is "Holiness" the same thing as "Perfection"?

Now it is a very significant fact that really devoted—yet defeated—Christians gladly aim at "holiness," but are frightened of "perfection." "There is no such thing as 'perfection,'" is a common remark on the lips of Christian people. Our reply is, that our Lord commanded it, whatever it is.

"Perfection" Here and Now.

"Perfection," said a Professor of Theology, "is an unrealizable ideal towards which we progress through all eternity." Yet Christ demands some sort of "perfection" here and now. If we are really sincere we shall try to see what the Saviour means. "Be ye therefore 'perfect," said Christ. "That's a bewildering command," was the comment made on this verse by a modern preacher, "but when our Lord adds, 'as your heavenly Father is perfect,' we are simply staggered, and in despair give up attempting to obey!" Yet these added words are the key to the solution of the difficulty! For at once we can cut out all false ideas of "perfection."

How is our Heavenly Father "perfect"? Surely in everything. But He is God and we are men. He does not command us to be "perfect" as God. The Father is "perfect" in absolute sinlessness; in Majesty, in Glory, in Power, in Wisdom. Such "perfection" can not be attained by mortal man. In what then are we to be "perfect"? "Be ye therefore perfect." That word "therefore" evidently refers to what has been said just before. that? Simply a command to be full of love. Godless men love their friends; the followers of Christ are to love their enemies as well. Our Lord is commanding perfect Love. This thought came to me with overwhelming power. The Victorious Life is simply a life of perfect love.

Our Lord's "New Commandment."

Towards the end of His earthly life our Lord said, "A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another; even as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are My disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:34). There is the standard and here is the command to reach it.

As Christ loved—that is the standard; and that is perfect love. And this is commanded us. And Paul reminds us that "love" is the only thing which can

enable us to obey God. "Love is the fulfilling of the Law" (Rom. 13:10)

"The point is, can an imperfect man or woman have 'perfect' love?" That was the opening sentence of an address on this subject. But surely that is not the way to approach this question? It is the blessed Master who commands. It is not for me to cast even the shadow of a doubt on the possibility of what He bids. But, do we not feel constrained to cry out, like a seeker of old, "How can these things be?" Is there such a thing as "perfect love"?

Assuredly there is. The Father's love is "perfect." The love wherewith Christ loved us is perfect. Human love is imperfect and always will be. But does not the Bible say, "The love of God is shed abroad in our hearts" (Rom. 5:5)? Would you believe it, if you were told that this was the reason why Jesus Christ revealed God the Father? Yet it is so. We have His own words for it.

Our Lord said, "I have made known unto them Thy name, and will make it known"—that includes you and me—"that the love wherewith Thou lovedst Me, may be in them, and I in them" (John 17:26).

The Secret-"Perfect Love."

Here, then, is the secret of it all. "Perfect love" is surely possible, but only possible when Jesus Christ Himself—God Himself who is love—comes to dwell in our hearts.

John, the Apostle of love, told us this long ago. "If we love one another God abideth in us, and His love is perfected in us" (1 John 4:12).

"We know and have believed the love which God hath in us. God is love; and he that abideth in love, abideth in God, and God abideth in him. Herein is love made perfect with us" (1 John 4:16, 17). It is, therefore, as clear as day, that if we desire "perfect love," we can get it by having Jesus Christ—who is love—filling our whole being. Then, and then only, can we understand that stupendous comparison of John: "because as He is, even so are we in this world" (ver. 17).

No wonder Paul cried out exultantly—defiantly?—"Who shall separate us from the love of God" (Rom. 8:35)? No wonder he bursts out in triumphant faith, when he prays for the Ephesians "that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; to the end that ye being rooted and grounded in love, may be strong to apprehend with all the saints, what is the breadth, and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye may be filled unto all the fulness of God" (Eph. 3:17).

Before we go on to ask, not doubtingly, but in a spirit of joyous expectation, "How can these thing be?" may we just answer the questions which are in the minds of some. "And is love alone, really enough?" "Does 'love' indeed banish sin from my

life?" "Does 'perfect love' mean 'holiness'?"

To answer such questions, we need only just look at that wonderful 13th chapter of 1 Cor. in order to realize what Divine Love can work in us.

"Love suffereth long"—it drives away all impatience.

"Love is kind"-it leaves room for no unkindness.

"Love envieth not"—all jealousy is banished.
"Love vaunteth not itself"—boasting

and self-assertion disappear.

"Is not puffed up"—pride finds no place

in the heart.
"Does not behave itself unseemly"—

folly goes.

"Seeketh not its own"—"self" is dead —selfishness will be unknown.

"Is not provoked"—anger and wrath will not be seen.

"Taketh no account of evil"—brooding over so-called "wrongs" will be no more. Malice and all uncharitableness are not found in the heart.

"Beareth all things"—complainings will never be heard.

"Believeth all things"—mistrust will not destroy fellowship.

"Hopeth all things"—despair, anxiety, despondency go.

"Love never faileth."

No wonder Paul adds, "When that which is perfect is come..." What is it that is "Perfect"?—why just the love of God—shed abroad in our hearts.

If "perfect love" casts out this great procession of sins, and fills our entire being, we might well cry out in an ecstasy of thankfulness and delight, "To me to live is Christ"—and Christ is love. If we have not done so before, we must surely set ourselves the task of finding out how this great Possession can be secured.

How can we get this Perfect Love and keep it?—An Unknown Christian, in the Way of Faith.

In those days I found that the holiness experience that I had did not always work. There were times when I felt like asking the Holy Spirit to vacate while I got after my family. I would get after the family and then the Lord would get after me.

One day I got after Eliza, our colored help, to set her straight. She was so trying that I did not know how to live with her, and I guess she hardly knew how to live with me. After my attempt at straightening her out, I went upstairs and began to work, but a still small vioce said to me, "Ye have not so learned Christ." I got very busy, but that still small voice repeated the same words, "Ye have not so learned Christ." I said to the Lord, "Do I have to go down and apologize to black

'Liza?'' I continued to be very busy with my work, but at last the Lord won the victory and I started downstairs to interview Eliza again. I said, "'Liza, come in and have a talk, I am sorry I talked to you the way I did this morning, but you know you did your work so well when you came, and you don't seem to have your heart in it or your mind on it now. Are you in any trouble, 'Liza?''

The big tears came into her eyes and she said, "O Missus, I dunno what to do, that man of mine is so lazy and won't work, and we'se all behin' wi' the rent, and them two little coons of mine ain't gettin' 'nuf to cat!"

I said, "Why didn't you tell me this before and I would gladly have helped you with the rent. And as for those boys of yours, why they can come and eat off my table. And 'Liza, you and I will work together after this."

It was not long after this that I heard a voice downstairs singing, "Yes, Jesus loves me." Eliza sang it downstairs and I sang it upstairs.

Soon after this I learned that Jesus Christ was made unto me wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption, and the trouble was that I was not hooked up to Him right. When I realized this, I cried to Him, "Lord, baptize me with the Holy Ghost just as You baptized the disciples."

I had spells of such hunger and when the latter rain came I went down and down and got so little that I could not find myself any more, and then He found me. And one day, with a Mexican woman on one side of me, a colored woman on the other, and a French woman who had no teeth just in front of me, the Lord baptized me with the Holy Spirit just in the same way that He baptized them at the beginning. The London Daily Express says, "The revival possesses all the fervor, emotion and rough rhetoric of the famous religious outbursts of Wales, but it is made the more picturesque by the fact that the revivalists use innumerable sea-terms in their soul-saving metaphors. The Almighty is the "Great Skipper," the congregations are urged to drop their anchors in the faith, and hang out the riding lights of the saved.

"Meetings which are held in all the towns and villages are packed with fervent crowds, and sometimes the praying, singing and preaching extend all night and far into the morning. Churches have everywhere been thrown open to the revivalists, who are followed by enthusiastic converts, shepherds, fishermen, artisans and others, their wives and children,

who sing and pray with tears falling down

"A cooper of Wick, named Troup, has become one of the most notable of the revival leaders, and in Peterhead a young man named Cordinor, the cook of a steam trawler, is famous for the fire of his eloquence."

The revival, it is stated, began in Yarmouth and Lowestoft, where the Scottish fishing fleet made their headquarters during the herring season. It was carried back to Scotland when the fleet returned, and the 'torch of evangel,' as the revivalists call it, is blazing all over the northern and eastern coasts.'

Reference has already been made in the Evangel to the revival work of Pastor Douglas Brown, a Baptist minister, whom Lord graciously used in the revivals at Yarmouth and Lowestoft. We received the following secret of this ministry from "Things New and Old," a Pentecostal paper published by Pastor A. E. Saxby of 596 Green Lanes, London, N. 8, reland: "It is interesting to know that the prayers of those who have witnessed signs following, are at the back of Pastor

the rapidity of growth that have characterized the work, the hand of a living ing flame is the mighty breath of the Holy Spirit. One is confirmed in this belief considering the main characteristics of the movement. Part II. Ecclesiastical.

As we said in the beginning, not only the social, political, and commercial, but in the ecclesiastical world we see the same conditions prevailing. This picture we find portrayed in Rev. 12:1. 5, "And she being with child, cried travailing in birth and pained to be delivered." "And she brought forth a man child, who was to rule the nations with a rod of iron."

After the awful period of the dark ages God began to bring forth a people through whom He could restore the precious truths of His Word; beginning with justification by faith through His faithful servant Luther. Then the truth of sanctification and so on—each time the birth-pangs of suffering, persecution and even death, bringing forth a people, true and faithful, lifting up the banner of truth HIGHER and HIGHER.

About fifteen years ago, God again began to bring the Church through the birth-throes, as hearts everywhere prayed for a revival. God answered in His own way, restoring the power of the Holy Ghost as it fell on the disciples on the day of Pentecost.

Again suffering and persecution were the order of the day until there came forth a people who dared to believe and preach that all may be FILLED with the SPIRIT as the early apostles. True it means PRESSURE on all sides until we sometimes have wondered if there was any room on this earth for us after all.

It meant a real tearing asunder for those who would not follow on— for, as the churches began to refuse the light, apostacy stole over them in a way which was unprecedented. DENIAL of the DEITY of Christ began to be made flagrantly from the pulpits of orthodox denominations. Bold startling statements denouncing the EFFICACY of the BLOOD of JESUS issued forth from the mouths of those who were once ordained by the laying on of hands to the proclaiming of the Sacred Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The last fifteen years have witnessed the encroachments of the movies and dance into the church and parish-house until one scans the newspapers, almost hopelessly, for an announcement of a Gospel text for a Sunday evening sermon.

Reconstruction, social ethics, and reform are the cry of the day as the old ecclesiastical body tries to draw herself together; but we see her floating down the stream of worldliness, formalism and unbelief until she is whirled away and swallowed up in the maelstrom of Antichrist and his power, only to plunge into the awful birth-throes of the tribulation. But even here, the God, "who in wrath remembers mercy," will bring forth a little remnant who have WASH-

ED their ROBES in His own BLOOD, though at the cost of their lives!

Let us again consider those who were born in the native air of the church—the breezes of the Holy Spirit—as God graciously poured forth His Spirit fourteen years ago. As we mount up and look at this precious movement from God's view-point we realize He has been dealing and leading on in a wonderful way. About seven years ago God put the message and cry on the people's hearts, "That I might know Him and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death."

Everywhere one would go - to Camp Meetings, Conventions and even as one glanced through the Pentecostal papers from its very pages—the cry seemed to RING, "That I might know Him!" True, our hearts were raptured with the thought of knowing Him in the power of His resurrection, as we rejoiced and shouted and danced for joy; but no longer would we be HIGHER CRITICS, and omit the last half of the verse. Again the heart-cry -"And in the fellowship of His sufferings," that we might be "made conformable unto His death." This, the Spirit's own cry, as He revealed to us, that, if we would know the full power of His resurrection, we must know Him in the fellowship of His suffering.

He began to deal again; taking down through the valley of suffering into the fiery furnace—placing between the mill stones that He might bring forth a people strong in the Lord, in the power of His might,—a people who would dare not only to preach a FULL Gospel, but to FULLY preach the FULL Gospel; as Paul declared of his ministry, "by signs and wonders, he fully preached the Gospel of Christ."

And again we see the sifting and shaking as He has been working. How much it has reminded us of little Bobby, who, when he runs to the Christmas tree early Christmas morning, mother hands him a little silver horn. It's 'good-bye' Bobby! Off he runs, toot-toot-toot, all through the house. Mother is distracted—father laughs and says she'll soon get used to it and so will Bobby. The whole house is confusion until mother finally succeeds in attracting Bobby's attention to the other gifts around the tree—the lovely velocipede, and the brand new engine that runs all alone.

Now Bobby does one of two things when he sees the other gifts. He either drops his horn in the middle of the floor and goes after the velocipede; or else he starts the engine going—jumps on his velocipede, with his precious little horn in one hand and guiding himself by the other, the happiest little fellow in town!

While this is a homely illustration, yet it seems to portray the different classes into which the Pentecostal ranks are being sifted.

God so wonderfully manifested Himself by the Holy Ghost speaking through us in other tongues, just as He did

through the early apostles. Oh, how precious as we consider that it didn't just HAPPEN to be that way, but God followed a plan and a pattern which He had from the very beginning of creation. For if we look at the Peace Offering in the Old Testament, we find that the first to be made was the offering of Thanksgiving and then the offering of the vow. The Thanksgiving was one of praise and communion between the offerer, the priest and God. Afterward, the offering of the vow, which was for service.

So, when the Holy Spirit was outpoured, the first manifestation of His presence was the offering of thanksgiving, just for worship and communion—the creature with the Creator in a relation and a manner that none ever experience except those who have been so filled as were the apostles. Then afterwards followed the gifts for service man-ward.

But there are many like little Bobby, whose vision has been eclipsed by this one precious gift, which must not be wrested out of its place. They cannot see anything more; they are satisfied with all they have, making Acts 2:4 a hitching-post until they become hard, technical and dogmatic, with the name "Pentecost" a mere THEORY and not a LIVING REALITY as it was in the lives of Peter and of Paul. With them, this manifestation must be pushed to the front and preached or else they feel one is compromising. But Paul declared that he preached CHRIST!

Referring to our illustration, we might compare the second class of people to Bobby, who, when he sees the other gifts around the tree, drops his little horn in the middle of the floor and runs. So they, though they have been filled as were the Apostles, when their eyes are opened and their hearts gripped with the vision of the other gifts God has bestowed, begin to drop even the precious gift, which, although placed at the end of the list of gifts, God singles out and places at the very BEGINNING—the Birth of the Church.

They begin to shade the standard of that which the Apostles received; and they reason that it isn't necessary after all to receive just like the Apostles, now that there are other gifts God has bestowed. So they swerve a little bit from the PATTERN—just a little bit—but, Oh, just enough to miss God's HIGHEST and BEST!

The third class we have pictured by Bobby, who when he sees the other gifts, runs to the tree—starts his engine going—jumps on his velocipede with his little horn still tightly clasped in one hand and off he goes. So these, with their hearts burning with the vision of the gifts God has for them, come to the TREE of LIFE, JESUS HIMSELF, and claim all He has to bestow, neither discounting that which He has already done, nor changing the standard of God's Word.

They let not their eyes look to the right hand nor the left—to the re-

proaches, inconsistencies and experiences of others; but obey the injunction, "Let thine eyes look straight on and thine eyelids straight before thee!" and as they look, they see only the PATTERN—realizing "JESUS CHRIST, the same YESTERDAY, TODAY and FOREVER."

They press on for the FULL PENTECOSTAL ministry. They see a FULL SALVATION that saves to the UTTERMOST. They see a FULL GOSPEL of HEALING for those who are sick. They see and preach a FULL BAPTISM in the Holy Spirit, just like the hundred and twenty received on the Day of Pentecost. Not a skimpy measure, not a half-filled-fulness, but a filled-full or a FULLY-FILLED-FULNESS.

They see not only a full Gospel to be preached; but if they would have the ministry of Peter and of Paul, they must FULLY PREACH the FULL GOSPEL through SIGNS and WONDERS. That not only shall the second chapter of Acts be fulfilled in their lives, but the Third Chapter, and the Fourth—and even in greater measure; for He says, "the LATTER GLORY of this house shall be GREATER than the FORMER."

God is bringing forth a 'people out of a people,' an army of men and women, who will carry the full Gospel message in the full power and reality of Pentecost—with great power, giving "proof to the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." "by signs and wonders done in the Name of the Holy Child Jesus."

Missionaries in the heart of Africa, India, and China, as well as in the Homeland, who will go forth with the same fulness of power as Peter had, when he said, "Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have, give I unto thee; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, ARISE AND WALK." The same as Paul had, when from his body, handkerchiefs were taken and the sick were healed, miracles were wrought—yea, the dead raised.

What will it mean when this FULL RESURRECTION POWER is manifested through the dear missionaries on the field, not as an unusual happening, but as the regular order of the day, in the same proportion even, as we read in the Book of Acts?

Would it not mean that instead of laboring for years and seeing just a few converts, hundreds, yea, thousands would know of a truth that JESUS the CHRIST whom they preach, LIVES!—and would turn from their idols to serve the true and living God in NUMBERS unheard of before? Would it not stem the tide of Mohamedanism that is sweeping over Africa and India today? Would it not drive back all false "isms" as no other argument could?

Oh, look up, dear ones! What if the old Pentecostal Boat does look like it is going to be wrecked. God is bringing out of the Birth-Throes, in this movement, a people so moved with the compassion of Jesus that doctrines and differences will be laid aside, and JE-

SUS will be preached in the fulness of His power. This does not mean compromise, but, by their ministry, giving such proof to the REALITY of Pentecost in LOVE and SIGNS and WONDERS, that the World will SEE and BELIEVE and be SATISFIED with nothing less than the BIBLE STANDARD. Jesus will be so LIFTED UP from the earth and exalted that HE will draw ALL men unto HIMSELF.

Rest and Refreshing

of a seeming irrelevance to the preceding subjects, we have here a beautiful sequence; after a description of Pentecost (as we shall presently see), comes this parable of the formation of the Church—cach kind of seed being "put in the appointed place," each having its own individuality, and each receiving the needed discipline and care in order to produce the greatest harvest (1 Cor. 12:4-6, 18).

1 erses 14-20 or chapter 28 give a graphic sketch of the incredulity and scoffing attitude of the rulers at Jerusalem, at the time when the Stone came to do His work. How they boasted of their own righteousness! God's judgments had no terrors for them-"it shall not come unto us" (ver. 15). Yet in spite of themselves, "morning by morning" they were convicted by the life and words of Jesus. They refused to humble themselves, and own that they needed the proffered refuge, but they could not escape the piercing of His word. It was "naught but" ("vexation"—A. V.) or "terror to understand the message" (ver. 19, R. V.) same expression as in verse 9-i. e., God's message. How aptly Isaiah describes the futility of their arguments with the Lord! The bed was too short, the covering too narrow (ver. 20).

And when His enemies had done their worst against God's Anointed, and appeared to be the victors, how the glorious triumph of Christ's ascension and receiving His Father's Gift is portrayed in verse 21! "For the Lord shall rise up as in Mount Perazim, as in the valley of Gibeon, that He may do His work, His strange work; and bring to pass His act, His strange act." What is this strange new act? We sometimes hear it explained that judgment is His strange work. The Bible does not say so, for God has all along been wont to deal with His people in judgment, for discipline. It cannot be said to be a new departure, a strange or foreign way of gaining a victory, such as this verse foretells. But why is Perazim chosen of all the many victories of olden days? The only time we read of it is when David conquered the Philistines (1 Chron. 14:10). It is the circumstance that provoked the enemy which makes it a type of the unique triumph of Pentecost. It was "when the Philistines heard that David was anointed King over all Israel, all the Philistines went up to seek David." After prayer, God gave him such a mighty victory that he called the place "Baal-perazim," the place of breakings forth (ver. 11, R. V.

The parallel is clear. It was when Jesus was "at the right hand of God exalted," and the powers of darkness, unable to reach Him, were now set on exterminating His followers (John 20:19); that then God arose and in a new, mighty breaking forth, shed forth His Holy Spirit to be the power in each disciple (Acts 2:33). This was indeed His strange new act. The enemy was routed. The members of the infant Church were set free, and 3,000 more souls were delivered from his grip. The torrent that brought destruction to the foe, was a glorious Refreshing to the believer.

Is not this a practical lesson for us? As the Holy Spirit was not given until Jesus was glorified (John 7:39), so, today, it is not until a soul has made Jesus Lord of all that a personal receiving of the Holy Spirit can be realized.

But the Philistines rallied for another attack. David asked for definite guidance; and victory was again granted, but in a different way, at Gibeon (1 Chron. 14:16; Is. 28:21). Further onslaughts await the newly baptized believer, when, like the company in Acts 4:24-31, he must again plead for fresh enduement to meet the fresh need. Victory will come in a new way, for God's manifestations are various. Let us not, through lack of expectant waiting on Him, fail to obtain the Refreshing He delights to bestow.— L. M. Mackinlay.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Conducted by E. N. BELL.

1153. Is there any place in the Bible where the Lord Jesus condemns or upbraids the sick for taking medicine?

No, I do not know any passage that specifically condemns the taking of medicine in a direct "thus saith the Lord." It does condemn our depending on "the arm of flesh." If a man sets God aside and does not trust in the Lord, through taking medicine or in any other way, he will not get anything from God because he is not trusting in God. Our manner of life should on a whole be such as would cultivate contact with the Lord and trust in the Lord, and not such as would tend to take us away from the Lord and to increase faith in other things than the Lord. Some man with little light might take medicine because he thought he had to, and it would not hurt his relation with the Lord. Some one else in doing exactly the same thing might make of it a definite drop-down, a definite turning away from God to something else, and thus be badly hurt. 30 let us cultivate contact and fellowship and confidence in the Lord.

Another ground for caution is the danger of being poisoned by medicines. Many habitual takers of patent drugs are known by good physicians to be now suffering more from the medicines taken than from the original disease. They have grown worse and worse, and think it is the disease getting worse when in the majority of cases it is dosing of themselves which is poisoning their systems, and making them worse. Even a sinner should be careful about what he takes, and the best rule for them is to take as little medicine as possible.

1154. Isn't it a fact that every man stands or falls on his own interpretation of the scripture?

Yes, Peter says that some "wrest the scriptures to their own destruction." This is a case where a man "falls" on his own interpretation. On the other hand if he "rightly divides the word of truth," and obeys it in his neart, he will stand approved before the Lord.

1155. What is the idea or meaning of speaking the unknown tongue? To whom and about what is such a one speaking?

The man speaking in other tongues as the Spirit of God gives him utterance is usually "magnifying the Lord" (Acts 10:46). In Acts 2:11 they are said to be speaking about "the wonderful works of God." In the 14th chapter of 1 Corinthians it is said that they are speaking "mysteries" in the Spirit. "Mysteries" refers to the hitherto unrevealed things of God, but which may be the Lord is then revealing through the Spirit.

1156. Does Paul's language m 1 Cor. 4:15, where he declares to have begotten the Corinthians through the Gospel as a father, conflict with Jesus' language in Matt. 23:9, where Jesus tells us to call no man on earth our father?

No, the prohibition is against making a title out of the word father and spelling it with a capital "F." This injunction would be against calling preacher Jones "Father" Jones. Paul in spiritual things merely compares himself to a father in the natural realm. Children would not be here but for a father. The Corinthians would not be alive in Christ but for the fact that Paul brought them the seed of life in the gospel.

1157. Please explain Luke 16:9, where Jesus counsels us to "make friends with the riches of unrighteousness." Does He encourage us to lie as the unjust steward did?

No, this passage does not justify any one doing any unrighteous thing. The point that is commended by Jesus is the wisdom the man used. As he used his wisdom for earthly gain, so the child of God is to use his wisdom for heavenly gain. In verse 8 where it says. "And the Lord commended the unjust steward," the word "lord" here does not refer to Jesus Christ, but to the lord or master of the steward. Jesus wants us to show wisdom by using our money for the salvation of souls, and He says if we do this as Christians, a joyful welcome in heaven will greet us when we get there from those saved through our means.

1158. What are the "two immutable things" referred to in Heb. 6:18?

One is the "promise" of God and the other is the "oath" by which it is confirmed, or one is the Covenant, made unconditionally to Abraham, which is therefore immutable or unchangeable, and the other is the oath. In Heb. 6: 13 it says that God swore "by Himself." Some hold that God Himself is one of these unchangeable things, and the other is His oath. But the general teaching of the scriptures is to the effect that the Covenant is unchangeable, for you remember that Paul says that even though it were a "man's covenant." nobody would have a right to add to or take from it; that is they could not change it.

1159. Should an ordained preacher serve as a deacon in an assembly?

This depends on circumstanes. There is no scripture against such, nor is there any in favor of it. So far as the scriptures are concerned any one could serve as a deacon who can meet the scriptural qualifications. These are practically the same for the deacon as for the minister, except that the min-

ister must be "apt to teach." So any true minister could meet the qualifications for deaconship. Whether the church should elect him to serve as deacon, and he should accept the office would depend on circumstances. If there were no other persons qualified to serve as deacons, and the preacher is a member of the congregation and can serve God better in the capacity of deacon in the local assembly than as elder in the local assembly, then there is no reason why he should not do so. He may serve in both capacities if necessary and possible. But where there is plenty of material there can be and should be both elders and deacons. This was the case in the Apostolic days. In Phil. 1:1 the church is addressed "with the bishops and deacons." The word bishop means overseer, and the elder is an overseer. So they had both.

1160. Had Mary, the mother of Jesus, any other children, and if so, what were the names of her sons and daughters?

In Mark 6:3 the people who seemed to be acquainted with Jesus and his family and who could not understand how a carpenter with such humble associations could be any great somebody asked the question: "Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary, the brother of James, and Joses, and of Juda and Simon? and are not his sisters here with us?" In Matt. 13:55, 56 the same four brothers of Jesus are mentioned; mention is also made of His sisters; but in neither case are the names of the sisters given.

These passages seem to teach conclusively that Jesus had other brothers and sisters on His mother's side. But the Catholics hold, in order to uphold their idea of the sanctity of Mary, that these brethren were no real blood kin to Jesus, but that they were the sons of Joseph by a former marriage. I do not think that their idea that it would have made Mary unholy to have been the mother of other sons is true, and therefore there is nothing to worry about in either case.

1161. Where should we pay tithes if there is no Assembly in our town?

They should be sent to the General Headquarters of the body of the saints with which you cooperate. They may be sent either for missions or for the spread of the gospel in any other way that is being carried out by the Assemblies of God.

"SO NEAR" YET "SO FAR."

Remember, many go far on and reform many things, and can find tears, as Esau did; and suffer hunger for the truth, as Judas did; and wish and desire the end of righteousness, as Balaam did; and profess fair and fight for the Lord, as Saul did; and desire the saints of God to pray for them, as Pharaoh and Simon Magusdid; and prophesy and speak of Christ, as: Caiaphas did; and walk softly and mournfor fear of judgments, as Ahab did; and put away gross sins and idolatry, as Jehu did; and hear the Word of God gladly, as Herod did; and yet all these are but like gold in clink and color, and are watered brass and base metal.-Rutherford.

A SUNDAY AT CHAPRA, INDIA.

I wakened with the feeling that the day was different, and it was, for it was Sunday, the best day of all the week. It was early morning and I was burdened for the work of the day, beginning with the meeting for women at nine o'clock. My heart cried out to God to give me a real message for those who would be hearing the Gospel for the first time. How to reach their darkened minds I did not know, so I turned to my Heavenly Father for a real touch of life and power for this service.

Just before nine o'clock I was passing

Just before nine o'clock I was passing through the village on the way to our mision compound where we always hold the service with the women on Sunday morning. As soon as I leave the gate the children, little boys and girls, dressed exactly as Adam and Eve were in the garden, begin to crowd around me saying, "salaam, salaam" and some in very broken English "good-amorning, good-a-morning". And I stop here and there and talk to them and to their mothers, and the mothers beg me to come into their tiny mud houses and tell them all I have in my mind. So we became acquainted, and I long, with a great longing to bring them all to Jesus.

And now here we are at our own Mis-

And now here we are at our own Mission compound! And here are about 40 women and girls, all seated on the ground, waiting for me. They must all greet me and show me their babies, and I do love these women because they are all working on the old bungalo, taking away the debris, after the flood, and daily I have talks with them, but today we meet together at the Master's feet, and I try to bring them to Him. Very soon they are all seated on

the floor of the tent, cross-legged, Indian fashion, and I on a stool near by, and the meeting begins—well, what shall we sing? fashion, and I on a stool near by, and the meeting begins—well, what shall we sing? Let us try Jai Prebu Eaus, Jai Prebu Raja. (Victory through Jesus, victory through Thee, Lord Jesus.) And I wish you could hear them sing! These poor ignorant, heathen women who know neither how to read nor write; their effort to sing is pathetic. And I have to go over it again and again with them, word upon word, and line upon line, and then I have to explain to them the meaning of it all. After the hymn we take the Lord's prayer. And in teaching them this I also explain to them what it means to pray in the Name of Jesus. Next comes the Text John 3:16. And over and over again I tell them the story of God's love and the cross. They do listen, and we do pray that God's Word will not return void. In the midst of earnest pleading for their souls there are many interruptions, some one is sick, a baby cries, some wants a drink, and some are

asking questions about America and my home; and then, just as they begin to listen attentively again an old, heathen woman comes running in with a wee baby in her arms, she is all excitement, and explains to us the mother has thrown the baby away, and begs us to take it. Now we must stop again, for, everybody wants to look at the baby that has been thrown out. And surely it is a wee, half starved little thing, wrapped in an old, dirty cloth. Finally I tell the old woman, and all the women to sit down and keep quiet, and that after the meeting we will take care of the baby. Everybody is quiet again now and we go on with our service; just an earnest plea to those poor darkened minds, and the meeting is over for today.

"Now Missi Sahib take the baby, will you take it, or will the choti Missi Sahib?" I have Miss Builder with me, and they call me, the big Miss, and Miss Builder, "The little Miss", because she is a new missionary. What shall we do with this poor out-cast baby? Where shall we keep her? Who will support her? All these questions come to us, and we know that we can not throw the infant baby away, so we take her home, wash her, feed her, and watch over her. She is a poor, half-starved little thing, only a month old, but in a week the pinched face begins to get round, and she does look so different. Miss Builder worked very hard for her. We have called her Sundri. Will you not pray for us that God will help us, and make these Sundays a time of blessing to all? —Sara Coxe.

AN OUTPOURING AT THE DOOR OF HOPE, SHANGHAI.

A very gracious ministry was given to Brother W. W. Simpson when he visited Shanghai last fall. In Brother G. A. Anderson's work the Spirit was mightily outpoured, ten being baptized in the Holy Ghost and sixteen immersed in water. The mightiest outpouring of all occurred at the Door of Hope Children's Home at Kiangwan, five miles from Shanghai. This Children's Home provides a Christian home, teaching and industrial training for young slave girls who are rescued from a destined life of sin. It is in charge of Miss E. G. Dieterle, who has received the Spirit and spoken in tongues. Some of the Chinese teachers have also received the Spirit and a few of the girls so that the Home has the reputation of being Pentecostal. Brother Simpson writes:

"There were about 160 girls, twenty helpers and a few people from the outside in the meetings, nearly 200 in constant attendance. From the first the Spirit gave me such a yearning, lov-ing compassion for these dear girls who had been destined, so far as in the power of men and devil to do so, to an eternal slavery to sin, hell and Satan, that I just poured out to them without stint or reserve all the power and life and love of God my heart was able to contain; teaching, admonishing, warning, beseeching, with the broken body and bleeding heart of Jesus crucified striving for expression through pleading voice and weeping eyes until the Lord gave me the unutterable joy of beholding the travail of His soul in the mightiest flood of brokenhearted repentance I have ever seen. At one time I counted more than 100 crying, weeping, wailing, screaming in agony of conviction as they confessed their sins and called on God for mercy.

"Some went through to the Baptism we know, for we heard speaking in tongues as the Spirit gave utterance, but it was impossible to keep track of all where the noise was as many waters and mighty thunders.

"Twenty dear girls were buried with Christ in baptism on Sunday A. M., October 16, and more than 100 came forward in companies of six or seven at a time to the Lord's table Sunday evening, discerning in the broken bread and fruit of the vine the crushed body and shed blood of our Lord Jesus on Calvary. I left afterwards but the meeting could not be closed. On Monday they began at 10 A. M. and continued without intermission until 10 P. M. On Tuesday they began

at 8, hoping to get through soon, but they continued right on until 10 P. M. just the same. So Miss Dieterle sent for me to come once more. Almost uninter-ruptedly those nearly 200 girls and young women had poured forth a solid stream of confessed sin for three days, but they were not yet through.

"We began at 6:30. I gave a short message on the three parables of Luke 15, showing how Father, Son and the Spirit are longing, seeking, searching for the salvation of the lost; and the confessions began again. All night long they continued, one girl after another rising with streaming eyes and broken voice to praise the Lord for dying on the cross for such a sinner as she; then recounting the sins she had formerly cherished hidden deep down in an impenitent heart but now flung from her bosom in pitiless abhorrence. If the angels rejoice over one sinner that repents, what must have been their joy over the 100 that night?

"At dawn the burden of sin was gone and we knelt in adoration of the Prince and Saviour who had given such repent-Then I hurriedly ate breakfast, for I must leave Shanghai at 9:30 A. M., and I had not yet packed my suit case and bedding. But they pressed into the dining room with their gifts and offerings-poor slave girls, some rescued only a month agolaying before me all they had; handkerchiefs, towels, pennies, dimes and dollars; sacred, holy things, for they are sacrifices under God. The value of all is more than \$50.00 but what must it mean to God?

"Oh, my brethern at home, the time and opportunity for sacrifice is almost passed! I have no need of anything, so don't take this as a low-down, groveling appeal for money! It isn't a few paltry pennies or dollars, nor even yet your thousands that fill the measure of that biggest, divinest word in God's vocabulary, SACRIFICE. It is your very self, your soul, your life and all the powers of your regenerated, Spirit-filled being that God wants and must have if His work in this world is to be done and His many sons be delivered from the toils of sin and bondage of Satan and be brought into glery. Don't try to hold me back from a living Calvary, but come along with me in your prayers and fellowship, for I am going through, yes, I am going through; I'll pay the price whatever others do; I'll take the way with the Lord's despised few; I'm going through, Jesus, I'm going through!"

He told them that Jesus loved him and would care for him, to which they replied, "Do you think He will deliver you? We will see what your Jesus can do." So they tied his hands behind him, and then tied his feet up close to his body as he sat on a log in the house. Then the thieves lay down around him, one taking his umbrella for a pillow, and were soon fast asleep. Mr. Wan (That is the Christian's name) also fell asleep, but was awakened about midnight and heard as it were a voice saying to him, "Hui La! hui! la!" which means to go away or depart. He believed that it was the voice of God and so, with seeming little trouble he got free from the rope that bound him and opened and passed through three doors before he got outside. The next morning he was far enough away to be out of danger, and as he took breakfast in the village he had

arrived at, the people were very much astonished to see him free, having known he had been captured the day before. He related his experience to them and came on back to his village and then on up here to Waitsap. He certainly is a happy man.
