

The Song of Solomon is the most unique book in the Bible—unique, because it is the only book given over absolutely to fellowship. Then it is unique in this respect, that you do not find anywhere in the Song of Songs a word on sin, pardon, or justification. Neither will you find anything in the book that may not occur in the life of a more mature believer. The old writers used to speak of Solomon's writings in this way, "Ecclesiates, or 'Old Groans' was the porch; Proverbs, the holy place; and the Song of Songs, the holy of holies."

The song begins with these words, "The song of songs, which is Solomon's." Solomon prefigured Christ, and this song is a dialogue between Christ and His bride, with an occasional word here and there spoken by the daughters of Jeru-This book is introduced to us as a selection from a selection. We are told Solomon wrote more than a thousand songs. This is the most select song that he ever wrote. But the Bible contains the songs of others as well as the songs of Solomon. David wrote songs and so did Moses and others. We believe that this expression-"The song of songs, which is Solomon's"-not only means that it is the most select song which Solomon ever wrote but it is the most select song that ever was written by anyone.

We believe that while the Bible is a select Book and ought not to be compared to any other book, he who seeks to draw favorable comparison between other books and the Bible is either a fool or else is full of impudence beyond all bounds. The Bible is a unique Book; but the Song of Songs is the most unique part of God's Book, the most select part of the Bible. I suppose that is one reason why the enemy has tried to keep God's people from enjoying this book. There are folk who think it is not fit to be read in public. It is unfortunate that so few people appreciate this wonderful book which is spoken of as a selection from a selection. Because of this statement which we find in the very beginning of the book, I believe that the Song of Songs was intended to be very largely (if not altogether) the sole property of bridehood saints, because bridehood saints are also a selection from a selection.

Not all believe that. Some folk insist that the entire church constitutes the bride of Christ. They say, "Does not the Bible say that the church is His body?" Indeed it does, but it does not say that the church is His bride. Adam did not marry his entire body. And I do not see why we should insist that Jesus, the last Adam, should do what the first Adam did not do. That is a suggestive word that we have in the third chapter of Revelation: "To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, and am set down with

my Father in his throne." Who is it that sits in the throne with an earthly sovereign? It is his bride. And so Jesus is telling us here that His bride is going to sit with Him in His throne. But in order for her to occupy that position she must while on earth learn to be a full overcomer. This scripture seems to suggest that full overcoming on the part of the bride is to mean what full overcoming on the part of the Bridegroom meant. How did Jesus overcome? How many times did He make demands on His eternal deity in order to be an overcomer? Did He not overcome as the Son of man, depending absolutely upon the Holy Spirit -the same Holy Spirit who has come to our hearts and who, if we will consent to it, will make us a full overcomer? Thus we will be qualified for sitting on the throne with Jesus.

"The song of songs, which is Solomon's." It is the bride who speaks. She says, "Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth." You will observe this is not the kiss of reconciliation she is asking for. She has received that long ere this. But in following on to know the Lord she has discovered, as we all do, that there are new fields lying before her, that there are possessions in Him which she has not yet possessed. Here she expresses a desire to have all those possessions made real in her, and she asks that she may be brought into a place of fellowship and communion deeper than anything she has heretofore known. You do not need to be told that a kiss upon the lips speaks of a relationship which a kiss upon the cheek does not speak of.

The bride says, "Let Him kiss me with the kisses of His mouth," and then adds this glorious testimony—"Thy love is better than wine." Wine stands for the richest of earth's luxuries. Here it includes the very best the world has to offer. She says that while she has not realized all there is for her to realize in Jesus, she has tasted enough of the things of the kingdom to prove to her that the love of God is better than the best that the world has to give. Some folk make me so tired when they testify that sometimes I have to pray for grace to bear with them, for they seldom ever testify without mentioning in detail the things they gave up in order to become Christians. I wish we would stop talking about what we gave up. Suppose that all we ever did give up was put together this morning. The whole business would not make more than enough for a kite's breakfast, so why ever refer to it. like to think of how Paul viewed this matter. He tells us that on a certain day he brought the wheelbarrow to the front door of his house. That created more or less of a sensation among his neighbors. If he had taken it to the back door no one would have noticed it, for they know when it goes to the back door nothing but garbage is going out. But he brought it to the front door. Mrs. he brought it to the front door. Brown became curious and drew the curtains aside a little; and Mrs. Smith opened the door and looked out, saying to the children, "Hush, I want to see what Paul is going to do." So these folk looked on while he loaded the wheelbarrow. You might like to know what he put on it, and what his object was in taking these things out of his house. I will give you a list. "Circumcised the eighth day, of the stock of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, an Hebrew of the Hebrews; as touching the law, a Pharisee; concerning zeal, persecuting the church; touching the righteousness which is in the law, blameless." Seven things-a complete number of antiques. How some of his neighbors envied him! They would have given all they possessed to have owned just one of those antiques, and here he had seven, a complete number. Now he is putting them all on the wheelbarrow.

Where do you suppose he intends to take all those valuables? Why to the museum, of course. Some of them are to be preserved in alcohol, while others are to be put in glass cases so that tourists passing through will look at these things and say, "Oh my, what a sacrifice Saul of Tarsus made to become a follower of the Nazarene! What a pity that such a scholar as he should join himself with this despised sect!" No indeed! I will take you to the place where Paul took that wheelbarrow. He moves carefully until he arrives at the manure pile. and then turns the barrow upside down. "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. Yea, doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord; for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung." Nowhere later in the life of the apostle do we learn of him going to a hardware store and buying a manure fork in order that he might return to that pile and investigate to see if some of those relics have remained intact, in order that he may take them back. Once he caught a vision of Christ all his antiques became as dung. He put them in a manure pile and left them there to rot. Would to God we would do likewise! Please never mention anything you have given up for Tesus.

In verse three the bride says, "Because of the savour of thy good ointments thy name is as ointment poured forth." You know of course that the name stands for the character, including all the inner graces of Christ. Now she says that Jesus is better than ointment poured forth. It is interesting as you study the Bible to observe how carefully the devil sought to prevent the fulfillment of God's promise made in the early days of the history of our race when He declared that the seed of the woman should eventually bruise the serpent's head. When at last the enemy discovered that the promised seed had arrived he did his utmost to destroy the seed before He could reach Calvary. He seemed to sense that if the Christ should succeed in reaching Calvary something tremendous would happen-and

something tremendous did happen. That scene at Calvary was not set merely for stage effect. That was a great conflict between sin and holiness, between heaven and hell, between God and the devil. And I am happy to tell you that God and heaven and holiness won out that day. Possibly for just a moment even Satan thought he had won the victory. I scarcely believe that he recognized that the most glorious alabaster box there ever was, was being broken that day, and as a result there was going to flow out to the ends of the earth this rich ointment which has flowed on until millions have been healed by it.

There are marvelous healing properties in this ointment which the bride speaks of as being poured out. She does not say it is concealed, nor sealed up. She speaks of it as being poured out, suggesting not only a plentitude of the ointment but suggesting that it is within the reach of the folk. It is being poured out so that all may obtain. What healing properties there are in this ointment! We are forever advertising various remedies. Some ointments are advertised extensively and folks are told that some of them are almost a cure-all and will heal any disease. But here is an ointment that is not mentioned as often as it should be. If properly applied, it will heal the deepest wounds that sin has ever made.

Years ago I became interested in a young Scotchman. He was a promising young fellow but unfortunately he took to drinking and became a beastly drunkard. He used to stagger into our mission, and when the service was over I would take him by the arm and together we would stagger down the street until we came to a large lodging house where at times as many as 300 men were kept over night. But more than once they refused to keep this boy although I was willing to pay for the night's lodging. From there we would stagger along until we came to a dive run by foreigners, and there I had to leave him, paying perhaps ten cents for the night's lodging. Five years passed by and I did not hear from him or see him until one night, while I stood waiting for a street car in a western city, a man staggered in front of me. I did not know who he was but I said, "My friend, Jesus Christ has a better life for you to live than the one you are living tonight." Then I observed that he had been in a drunken brawl; his head had been gashed open and he was in an awful condition. When I discovered who he was I said to him, "You will come home with me won't you, my boy, for I am as glad to see you as though you were my own brother." He was too drunk to clean up so I rolled him up in one of our beds. In the morning he was sober, but oh so sick. I fed him with a spoon, and I told him I thought salvation was what he needed. He said, "I have never been saved. I don't believe reformation would do me any good. I need salvation." By the following Sunday I secured enough clothes to fit him up so he could go to church. He listened to the message, came to the altar, lifted his hands toward heaven and prayed from his heart, and in a moment or two said, "It is all

gone. I can face the whole world now." In less time than it has taken me to tell you, Jesus Christ set him free from every devilish habit. There are wonderful healing properties in this ointment. It will heal mental ailments, and physical ailments as well. Let us advertise this ointment more than we do. Let us tell the neighbors we have an ointment that will work like magic in their life. Tell the men in the shop about it. When at the bank tell the bankers about this ointment. As folks come in your way, drop a word about this healing, holy ointment that was poured out at Calvary and has reached millions of people.

"Draw me," the bride says in the fourth verse. This is a confession of need, and acknowledgment of helplessness. There are folks who are afraid to confess any spiritual need. They feel it would be so contrary to their theology. Others do not seem to be conscious they have a need. You know without being told that the only thing which insures us against decay is growth, and self-satisfaction is the end to all progress. If you are satisfied with the experience you have, you are well on the way to a backslidden life; and so long as you remain satisfied you will certainly not make any further progress. There was a time when I was afraid to confess my need because a confession of need was inconsistent in those days with what I believed. "Draw me," says the bride. She has discovered something more in her Lord for her. Oh that there might come to us a revelation of what there is in Jesus for us! None of us have gone much beyond the outer fringes of what Jesus has for us.

One day while meditating the Spirit said to me, "Child, do you know the majority of people never pass beyond the initial stage of any experience? Twenty years ago, when Pentecost was in its full glow and we were having those days of heaven upon earth, I never dreamed I would live long enough to witness the spiritual declension in this movement I have witnessed, which is due to the fact that instead of pressing on into the interior of this experience we have been content to remain just on the outer circles of it. One time I was meditating and the Lord said, "Child, I am organizing an exploring battalion and I am prepared to enlist all who are willing to become reckless adventurers in God. How many of you are willing to become loyal desperadoes in this holy war? Oh, the possibilities that lie within our reach. Some of these days we will find we have run our race without more than touching what God had for us.

"Draw me." The bride says, "I see these possibilities but I am so dependent I cannot realize them unless God draws me. What dependent creatures we are! So much so that I cannot see why anyone should ever strut about and appear proud and haughty. The root of true humility is knowledge, and if a man knows himself he cannot be proud. And if he knows God he certainly will not be. If he struts about exhibiting pride he is saying that he neither knows himself nor

"Draw me." I want to tell you this is

going to mean a deeper crucifixion than we have ever known. It is going to mean a closer separation than we have ever experienced. You say you have separated from a good many things already. Well, God bless you, but if you run after Jesus as the bride speaks of, you will experience a closer separation than you have ever known. God never intended the Pentecostal movement to become a popular movement, and it never will become popular if we keep running after Jesus. Just as long as we keep hot in the love of God, no religious movement on earth will want to have anything to do with us any more than an English military camp would want to have a good dose of German measles.

Are you ready to run?-not after an experience, not after a blessing, not after manifestations, not after demonstrations, not after gifts, not after signs, but after the Lovely One. You say, "Don't you belive in demonstrations and manifestations?" Indeed I do. I believe they have their place. But I believe God wants to wean us from the whole business and shut us in with Himself so that we will see only Jesus, and we will be able to

Some time ago I was in California and wanted to return home. I went part of the way by the Southern Pacific, and then by the Great Northern, and then by the Canadian National, and finally arrived at home. Those railroads were splendid, the dining car service was excellent, but the finest dining car on any of them was not to be compared with putting my feet under our old kitchen table back home. I got on those roads and went home, and I am glad for the roads that took me home. But when I got home I did not spend the time talking about those railroads. I was so delighted to be home that my whole conversation was about home. Let us thank God for experiences. Let us praise Him for whatever we have had which has brought us to this point where our vision has been filled with the Christ. But you can't blame a fellow whose vision has been filled with Jesus, if he stops talking about experiences and magnifies the living Christ.

"The king hath brought me." Do you know something about the kingship of Christ? Some folk talk glibly about the kingship of Jesus, but so far as they are concerned His kingship is largely the product of their imagination. When Austria declared war on Servia and it looked as though all Europe was going to be thrown into the conflict and that England might become involved, before she ever declared war on Germany and the Central Powers, Canada cabled to the mother land this message, "If you find it necessary to declare war on the Central Powers, we would like the home government to know she can depend upon the Dominion of Canada for all the man power and money that it is possible for a small colony to contribute." THE MIRACLE OF MY HEALING By C. H. Gootee

"Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him" (James 5:14, 15).

I have been delivered from years of suffering-pain so great that it well nigh Through the mighty drove me insane. atonement for sickness made by Jesus on the cross, and by obedience to this scripture was I healed. My father was a consumptive, and I inherited the germs of that dreadful disease, which took away a lovely sister shortly after her return from college. I had aggravated my sufferings by a life of sin and drunkenness, until I had well nigh destroyed myself.

How the Glorious Gospel of Healing Came to Me

My dear father, an educated Christian gentleman, lived and died without ever having heard it preached or explained. It came to me in the following way:

Back of our home was a garden with peach trees in it. Walking there one day, I picked up a scrap of paper. It contained the simple account, given by some reporter, of the healing by the Lord of a man in Pittsburgh, Pa., after prayer had been offered for him. My mind, as well as my body, was being wrecked by intense, unabated suffering that I was enduring all the time. I could scarcely arrange one thought along with another. I mailed a request to these people and asked prayer for myself. I withheld from them, however, any description of my desperate and deplorable condition, fearing that if I should relate it to them, they would despair of praying for me.

One day after making the request for prayer, I took a seat in a chair in the front yard, and there I sat, the embodiment of misery and wretchedness, tempted to end all by self-destruction; but as I sat there something came over me as softly as the summer mists rise over the meadows, and while that something covered me I saw the wooden cross, and Jesus the crucified Lord upon it. It appeared as if it had been thrown upon a canvas by a magic lantern. Then a fear, no doubt suggested by Satan, came to me, and I vielded, and that something. that inexplainable covering, vanished for the time being. That mysterious, soft covering which came over me was the Holy Ghost, showing me what Christ wrought for me on the cross. I have learned since, "Himself took our infirmities, and bare our sicknesses" (Matt. 8:

17). "Who . . . bare our sins in His own body on the tree, . . . by whose stripes ye were healed" (1 Peter 2:24).

When I became fearful and doubted, He, the Holy Ghost, withdrew, for doubts and fears are not of His making, but come from man, suggested and aggravated by the devil. Then for several months these words would come to me. "Fear not." It was the Lord speaking to me. The Lord was in that place, and I knew it not. The Methodist minister in the village at that time was indeed a God-fearing man, and I believe a converted man. In conversation with him one day I spoke to him about being anointed with oil, as in James 5:14, 15, but he informed me -and that without any Bible authoritythat the days of miracles were over, and that they belonged to apostolic times. The Word of God states that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever (Heb. 13:8). He discouraged any hope of my being healed that way. The question arose in my suffering mind: Now, which will you believe, the minister er the minister's God, and God's Word forever fixed in heaven? Heaven and earth may pass away, but my words shall not pass away. Now, which will you be-lieve — the minister or God — which?" Grace was given me to determine with what little strength I had, to take sides with God, who can not lie, deceive or prove untrue.

The devil was extremely busy at this time, filling me with doubts and fears, and suggested that I had committed the unpardonable sin, which I confess I believed for a long time. The devil also tempted me to end it all by suicide.

About this time I heard of the healing of Carrie Judd Montgomery. I learned the name of the old colored saint who prayed for her, and wrote to her requesting her prayers for me. The text was in my mind, "If two of you shall agree on earth as touching any thing that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 18:19). There are no words to describe what my mental, physical and spiritual sufferings were at this time. These words would, however, force themselves upon my mind, "Be anointed with oil in the name of the Lord."

Rev. A. B. Simpson and Rev. Henry Wilson were holding a meeting in New York City for healing at this time, and the Lord arranged it for me to go to New York and attend one of these meetings. The day came when I started alone to get anointed. The uppermost thought in my mind was, if I can only live to get there and not die on the way, I will surely be healed. When I reached the city the meeting was in progress. After a little while the call was given to those who desired healing to come to the front chairs. I was one of the fourteen persons who knelt. Rev. Henry Wilson came along, dipped his finger in oil and touched my forehead, and prayed. As I knelt there, I saw the blood of Jesus sprinkled on my breast and body.

And just as the sap in a maple pulses up through the boughs and branches, creating new leaves on the tree in springtime, then and there came into my body, bones and lungs a new life from the risen Christ on high (John 10:10; 2 Cor. 4:10, 11).

After the meeting was over, I walked down Broadway and stopped over night in a hotel, sleeping sweetly for the first time in several months. When I arose next morning, that new life was abounding in my soul and body! The hot, scorching pains down my back and spine had gone. The sciatic rheumatism in my right thigh, which had caused me such intense suffering, had ceased. The pains in my head and lungs had disappeared. Better still, my mind was clear and easy, and I knew I was clothed and in my right mind.

For months I had been unable to eat anything without great suffering followed by spells of vomiting until blood came from my stomach. I sat up and ate heartily, and have seldom missed a good meal since. God's Word came to me, "Ye shall eat in plenty and be satisfied, and praise the name of the Lord thy God, which hath dealt bountifully with you, and my people shall never be ashamed." I believed what God said, went on eating, and have kept it up ever since.

Since Jesus healed me, thirty years ago, I have known the Lord's life for spirit, soul and body, only suffering at intervals here and there, because of some sin or disobedience to the Lord. When this was confessed and forsaken and the lesson learned, the sweet manifestation of the permanent life of the Lord came back. I have preached the gospel of healing, regeneration, sanctification, fortification, and the gift of the Holy Ghost, for thirty years; have prayed for thousands and seen healings of almost every disease—consumption, insanity, etc.

I have traveled thousands of miles in America and foreign lands; have spent \$25,000 in Richmond, mostly in mission rescue work and spreading the printed gospel. I am now in my sixty-first year, and with the life of Christ in soul and body I feel as fit and fine, as young and nimble, as when I was eighteen, and expect to preach thirty years more, or until Jesus comes. For all this, to Father, Son and Holy Ghost I give all the glory and praise.

Proving the Bible True

2 Tim. 3:15-16; 1 Pet. 2:20-21.

For certain knowledge of God, of immortality, of every great line of spiritual truth we are dependant on the Bible. Once its unique authority as a Divine Revelation from God to man is denied, we have absolutely no alternative but the ever-changing theories of human philosophy, with all their hopeless uncertainty on those issues where, above all others, the soul craves for assurance and satisfaction.

Belief in the Divine inspiration of the Bible liberates among men that tremendous power hidden within the Word that makes it one of the greatest forces in the universe. The Scriptures are alive with the very power of God, but these immeasurable resources are almost unknown, and surely are unavailable, to the man who does not believe in their Divine inspiration.

Very few justly appreciate the incalculable havoc wrought during the last generation by so-called Higher Criticism. We are only just beginning to reap the harvest in every sphere-religious, moral, and political. The great denominations of Christendom are spiritually powerless today very largely because their pulpits and training-colleges have thoroughly inculcated a more or less modified unbelief in God's Word. The supreme authority of the Bible is well nigh destroyed among all classes of the people; even including church members and ministers. Again we say, few realize all that this means, and will yet mean, in the liberating of lawlessness on every hand and in every

It remains to also point out that as a final Court of Appeal amid the everincreasing welter of conflicting doctrines with which men darken the roads that lead to truth, the absolute necessity of belief in the inspiration of the Bible is more and more apparent after every conflict. We MUST have some Final Authority by which we can discern between Truth and Error, if such an authority can by any means be provided. Thank God that many of us believe such an Authority IS provided in the "Grand Old Book." We are going to demand that every doctrine presented for our acceptance must pass the test of agreement with the Word of God: we are equally prepared to grant that every doctrine we believe shall also be fairly judged at the

But WHY do we believe the Bible to be the inspired Word of God? Surely this is a reasonable and most important question, and one to which we ought to be prepared to give a satisfactory answer. Friends who feel (and from their point of view rightly enough,) that their experience is TO THEM all-sufficient proof, must have patience while we muster but one or two of the many lines of

argument that should appeal convincing ly to the open-minded, intelligent enquirers.

1. The Testimony of the Lord Jesus Christ.

If we accept the Divinity of the Lord Jesus Christ it is obvious at once that we have in our hands the strongest evidence for believing also in the Inspiration of the Bible. He distinctly believed it. and regarded Old Testament Scriptures as coming from the Holy Ghost. (Mark 7:13; Matt. 5:13; John 10:35; Luke 24: 27; Mark 12:36). Moreover, He promised like inspiration to the apostles who should afterwards become the writers of the New Testament (John 16:13). Surely the testimony of the Son of God OUGHT to be conclusive. Even those who question His Divinity, but willingly recognize His supreme authority in the realm of Truth, must admit the force of this argument.

2 The Wonder of the Bible.

Every flower that grows, every tiny fly that lives but for a day, every organism great and small, speaks to him who has ears to hear of the existence and greatness of the Creator. The Bible by its very construction equally speaks of its Divine authorship. The whole Book is constructed on a mathematical plan. Take Genesis 1:1. The number of words in this first verse of the Bible (in the original Hebrew,) is seven. These seven words have 28 letters, or 4 sevens. whole verse is built up on a wonderful system of sevens and multiples of seven which we have not space to give here in detail. We submit to the reader whether this is accident or design.

But another wonder of the Bible is its fascination for the most diverse readers. The little tot just beginning to read, and delighting in the stories of Joseph or David and Goliath for the first time, is equalled in its satisfaction in this wonderful Book of books by the famous scientist and renowned scholar who, perhaps in another room in the same house, is lovingly fingering the pages of a wellworn Bible, familiar through a life-time of use. Of no other book could this possibly be true. Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" comes nearest, but that would never have been written had there been no Bible, or had Bunyan doubted the Divine inspiration of its pages.

We have time for only one more wonder; the universality of the Bible among men of every tongue and nation. It is an Oriental book, written originally in languages now "dead," yet it pervades every corner of the Western world and can be found in every hotel, every steamship, and nearly every home.

To the majority of people it is a difficult matter to realize it is a translated Book at all. Who of us does not feel that Jesus really said IN ENGLISH

"Come unto me." Yet we know, if we make the effort to remember it, that the words His lips actually framed in that old, far-off Eastern tongue, would sound strange to these ears of ours. We remember how one afternoon a Norwegian friend was bravely trying to read Psalm 23 out of an English Bible; but the eifort too severely robbed David's words of their sweetness, and a well-thumbed, Norwegian Bible was lovingly brought out that the phrases familiar from childhood might again speak to the soul. Yet David wrote in neither English nor Nor wegian! The same wonderful Book translated into Kiluba quite recently was greeted by a native of the Congo with the ecstatic word, "It speaks!" To him Jesus will ever speak nothing but pure Kiluba.

Only the Divine origin of the Bible can adequately account for the fact that when translated into the strangest and most diverse languages it still lives and speaks from every line with gripping, compelling interest and power.

3. The Unity of the Bible.

Part of the wonder, yet worthy of separate consideration, is the unity of the Bible.

It is not always realized that the Bible was not originally one, but 66 books. It is really a Library; a collection of most varied writings by about 40 contributors, including kings, shepherds, fishermen, prisoners, and at least one physician. A period of more than 1500 years passed between the writing of the first and last books. Any collaboration, in view of all these circumstances, is manifestly impossible. Yet the marvel of marvels is that when bound together these 66 books quite naturally make ONE Book. And so perfectly one do they become that it really requires an effort to realize that they were originally separate compositions: for they are truly part of each other; the bookbinder only clinches an integral unity recogniz able by the simplest-minded reader.

One of the finest illustrations of this wonder that we ever heard was given at a Whitsunday Convention in Kingsway Hall London. The speaker asked the audience to imagine 40 different people filing on to the platform at irregular intervals, each striking a note on the piano, and then going their way. If when the last had passed, the notes were collected and found to form a piece of Divinest melody, what a miracle it would be! Yet this is only an excellent illustration of what has actually taken place in the construction of the Bible. Again we submit that no otleer explanation is adequate except that "the Bible is the inspired Word of God."

4. The History of the Bible.

Just as we might expect, the Bible being inspired, is the best loved—and the most hated book in the world. Sarcasm, learning, persecution, have all united to try and stamp it out of existence. Yet still it stands intact, triumphant, constantly breaking its own records for circulation.

Diocletian, "the mightiest ruler of the mightiest empire of the world," issued edicts that every Bible should be burned, and that all who possessed a copy should be put to death; yet 22 years after his fancied triumph Constantine enthron—I the Bible in Rome.

In Luther's day Bibles had become so scarce that the now famous little monk had become a grown man before he had even seen a copy. Yet that same wonderful Book quickly smote Medieval Europe like a whirlwind and liberated whole races from superstition and darkness.

Voltaire's jibe is familiar to all, that "in 100 years the Bible would only be found as a curiosity." But the very house in which he uttered the words, so we are told has become a distributing center for the Word of God. Today its circulation is numbered in millions, and it is being printed in over 500 different languages.

Even these few facts from the vast bibliography of the history of the Book are phenomenal. They speak unmistakably of something in this Book to be accounted for on no ordinary lines. Again we submit that the only satisfactory explanation is that "the Bible is the inspired Word of God," and Divine in its origin.

5. The Power of the Bible.

With joy we take up this last section with which we have space to deal. The Bible has power to entirely change man and nations. It has done it again and again, it is still doing it. One verse will sometimes alter the whole current of a life or melt the hardest criminal into the tenderness of a child. Its words are the only words that bring real comfort in the storms of sorrow. Its promises bring peace in trouble. When grasped by faith they have power to turn deteat into victory, sickness into health, weakness into power.

It must be admitted that in the realm of the personal experience of those who receive it, we have evidence that, if properly valued, is overwhelming, as to the Divine Inspiration of the Bible. And after all, valuable though all intellectual reasons undoubtedly are on occasion, personal experience provides an argument within the reach of all, and available with crushing success against the cleverest foes.

One of the most moving occasions we remember was at Kingsway Hall, London last Whitsuntide when a great congregation with Bible held high in their hands sang, "I'm acquainted with the Author and I KNOW this Book is true." The atmosphere was simply charged with Divine power. Those who sneeringly ascribe such profound and sincere emotion to "mere sentiment" need to remember that its spring is not in some impassioned address or clever logic, but in the experience of men and women in just the ordinary walks of life who have prove! that Book and its Author in the testings of hard experience through many, many years. Thank God for the Bible!

It is—the Word of God; God-breathed; God-given; coming from God, and inevitably leading back ultimately to God. Thank God for the Bible!

We are candidly amazed at "Fundamentalists" who, after valiantly pleading for the inspiration of the Scriptures and the absolute truth of all they record of the miraculous and supernatural in God's dealings with men, deliberately deny the reality and sometimes even the possibility of these things for today. Such a

position seems strangely illogical. No wonder it often makes a weak point in the armor of which the Modernist is not slow to take advantage.

What was once true is always true. How much better, how much more logical, to believe that God has not changed,—and expect Him to prove it to every reverently believing heart.

With all the mistakes they sometimes make, with all the dangers of occasional fanaticism we still feel compelled to respect more highly those "Fundamentalists" who are prepared to carry their belief to its only logical conclusion, and consequently leave a place for the supernatural on Scriptural lines in Christian experience today.

Why should it be thought a strange thing that the Spirit should still confirm the Word of which He is the Author with "signs following." Should we not expect that God's own answer to the challenge of "higher criticism" and the counterfeit of Spiritism, and Christian Science would be some mighty, fresh Divine

Movement that would prove the Bible true by actual manifestation of Divine power, and answer false claims by bringing forth the true? The Jehovah of Carmel lives today. "Where is the Lord God of Elijah?"

Where? Thank God we can supply the answer. In every tribe and nation, just now before Jesus comes again, children of God are simply believing His Word as it stands and are finding their Heavenly Father answering their faith by a "Latter Rain" outpouring of the Holy Spirit which is bringing glorious Pentecostal days back again, even to the outward manifestations. Praise the Lord!

It is cause for thankfulness that the Assemblies of God are standing for nothing outside the Bible. They believe that the final answer to Modernism in every shape and form must not only be IN WORD but IN POWER.

They invite the hearty co-operation of all who are one with them in this conviction.

Homely Things from a Pastor's Diary

Tuesday, September 20. On the way to the post office this morning my heart was made glad as it is from day to day to see the pleasant looks and receive the jovial greetings of those who are the solid men of the town. Jesus grew in favor both with God and man, and it is a great source of joy to me to realize that I am following in His steps. Sister Drelling's work is at the bottom of a very large part of the good will prevailing in town toward the Pentecost preacher and so of course toward his message. She, seeing every man and woman (and even the big boys and girls) with her intense, eager, radiant face, telling them what the literature contains and how free it is from fault-finding, has induced a great many to buy who never before had the slightest interest in our message; and, having bought, they read what they have paid for so that they may get the worth of their money; and reading, their hitherto false and unfounded opinions about us are dissipated and from that it is easy for them to come to feel glad when they see me coming along.

At the post office I got a letter that

gave me a jolt. That is the way of our loving Father. He encourages us by letting us see people smiling at us from every side, and then to keep us humble He shows us how others are finding fault with us. The letter was from Brother Prewter, our pastor at Parkside. He said he had been at a Fellowship Council where he had met a number of our pas-They had heard of the large Sunday-night crowds, that we have, plentifully sprinkled with intellectual and wellto-do people, and of my being well thought of among all classes, and they decided that I must be softening our message to tickle the ears of the people. He asked me for old friendship's sake to let him know all about it, though he was sure, he said, from what he knew of me, that I would make no effort to set myself in a better light before my critics.

Here is what I wrote him: "My dear old friend Jesse:

"Your letter telling of how the brethren are finding fault with me came this morning, and, as you suppose, but for the little appeal you make in Old Friendship's name, I would make no reply. I have no time to spend defending my name from slanders. You will remember that Jesus answered nothing.

"There is absolutely nothing to hinder our ministry being attended by large and intelligent crowds composed of the poor as well as the well-to-do classes. It was so in the early church and as we have the identical gospel the early church preached, it should be so now. In the sixth of Acts we read of a 'great company of the priests' being obedient to the faith. Are my critics going to affirm that Peter and his coadjutors were letting down the

standard and that it was by that that the priests were brought in to hear? I suppose they would not venture so far. The priests no doubt came in very large numbers and when they came the 'best people' came with them in droves. How do we know? Because it would not be supposed that anything like all of those who came renounced the calling of their lifetimes and became of the despised, Nazarene crowd, and yet a great company of them believed and were obedient to the faith. Where a great number of the priests attended, the best people went

"But so many preachers have so far forgotten the divine injunction to have things done decently and in order, and overlooked the apostolic warnings in the fourteenth chapter of First Corinthians, and have so conducted themselves in the pulpit and on the street that they have offended the God-given sense of propriety in the minds of the thinking public, and being thus repelled the people stay away. Thereupon the preacher speaks harshly of them and opines that they do not come because of pride of heart, and proceeds to set a premium upon ignorance and squalor.

"In 1 Corinthians 14 Paul has the wary eye of a wise leader on the crowds he wants a chance to preach to, and warns the saints that they must repress their emotions and keep down such manifestations and tongues as will repel the sinners and keep them from attending. He in no sense speaks against tongues but he demands that people do not allow their tongues to drive away the public. The mission of the church is to the world. If a man is going to catch fish he does not bring with him a brass band and so drive them clear up above the rapids out of reach. No, he learns the ways of fish and so conducts his fishing that they will remain in his fishing grounds and take his bait. God called me to be a fisher of By His grace and help I'm not going to frighten away the fish he appointed me to fish for.

"I and my friends may enjoy speaking in tongues, and shouting and leaping and showing forth in all sorts of ways the indwelling Spirit, but when I find a given thing is driving away the fish God called me to go forth and catch, that thing is going to stop or else I will go somewhere else to fish.

"The saints here found a high-class, cultivated, quick-witted, radiant-faced woman, Mrs. Drelling by name, whom they induced to go forth with Pentecost books and periodicals to sell and take subscriptions for, agreeing with her that she should call on every man and woman and even every big boy and girl in the town, using her very best endeavors to sell them books and get their subscriptions. They agreed to pay her twice as much

as her commissions might amount to. She went and visited everyone twice, selling a very large percentage of the people at least something, and now under a new arrangement she is going over the ground again to induce the short-term subscribers to renew their subscriptions.

"She has avoided with the utmost care all criticism of other folks' forms of religious observance, talking up her own goods, and telling of the wonderful things God does for her and her brothers and sisters in the church, but having not one little word to say against anyone else or their ways. Her own presence and testimony, followed up with the Evangel and our fine books in a great number of homes, has had a remarkable effect in bringing the people of every grade to hear me, and having come once and sensed the saneness and peace and power and love that radiate from our services, they have come again, and soon in large numbers have become regular attendants. As a result of this, many of them (like the first century priests) have become obedient to the faith. God meant to its full the promise He made in the last line of Psalm 1:3. He wants me to prosper in my ministry. And all He demands is that I shall pray to Him in faith for that prosperity, live before Him in love, and use my ordinary horse sense to avoid the things that prevent Him in His efforts to bring prosperity to me."

It may have been a pretty sharp letter, but some things set me going "proper."

the thought of conscription ever entered the minds of the people, the noblest in the land hastened from schools and colleges and donned the colors. I used to stand on the street and watch those handsome men pass by. The tears would come to my eyes and course down my cheeks as I thought of what might be.

They had acknowledged the kingship of an earthly sovereign. What did it imply? That the king sent a delegation to ask those men what their preference would be, whether they cared to remain at home on home defense, or to go over to France, or to the Dardanelles? the king send a delegation to say, "Some of you look as though you have never been away from home and it would be a pity to put you into hardships, so we are going to give you your choice." No indeed. The fact that they had donned the colors meant they were ready to go anywhere. They had surrendered themselves unconditionally; they could be left at home or sent abroad. That is what kingship implies. And yet in the spiritual so many folk talk glibly about the kingship of Jesus who know nothing about it, for when He says, "You will go there," they sit up and say, "Indeed we will ro go there." And when He puts His hand on their son and says, "I want this boy for Africa," they say, "Indeed You will not have him for Africa." When He touches their bank book and says, "Please sign a check for a hundred dollars, they say, "Indeed we will do no such thing. We have worked hard to get this money

and it is ours." Please never talk of the kingship of Jesus unless it is a fact in your life. If it is a fact in your life, it will mean quite as much to you as the acknowledgment of an earthly sovereign meant to our men in the first days of the world war.

"The king hath brought me into his chambers." The King has done it. I like that. Some folks cannot wait until the King does it; they get so anxious to get into His chambers that they grow impatient, waiting for the King to take them in. They hear there is an evangelist who is a specialist on getting folk into the chambers of the King, and so they must have him come. He comes and proves to be a specialist for he runs ten through the first night, and the next night twenty. Over in a certain place they put on a big campaign. Some big campaigns have become a huge joke to me. made big announcements, and when the meetings ended a lot of people had the Baptism. A gentleman followed for a month's meeting and the first night he was there a lady came up and said, "Brother, do you think I have the Baptism?" He said, "Evidently not, from your question. The Baptism of the Holy Ghost is not so near next to nothing that you would not know you had it unless the evangelist told you." She said, "That is what I thought, but the evangelist said I had it." Then she proceeded to tell how he worked her through. He began to do what you and I used to do when school boys when we took a notion we would say a word, as fast as lightning, and we said it so fast we did not know what we were saying. He took her through that way. Just as though the mighty, flaming, fiery Pentecostal Baptism consists only in saying something without knowing what one is saying! My friend said that not less than twelve people came to him with that same question. I am dealing with the principle of telling folk they have the Baptism when they have no more Baptism than the man in the moon. Leave people to God. It is time enough when God takes them through into that experience. He will do it when they are ready. Come around and pray, and surround them with an atmosphere of faith, and leave them with

And they of the circumcision were astonished as many as came with Peter, because that upon the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost. For they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God." It says: "And when they heard this they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus, and when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came upon them, and they spake with tongues and prophesied." That is the way that people received the Holy Ghost in Bible days. God made the pattern on the day of Pentecost; and all through the Acts the Apostles it was adhered to. tou receive the Baptism of the Holy Ghost like Mary the mother of Jesus, Peter, James and John, and the rest of the 120 received it; like the Ephesians upon whom Paul laid his hands received it, you will speak with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance.

"Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed?" is a question sharper than any two-edged sword. God is not going to let the world, the flesh or the devil cheat any of His precious children out of this blessed promise. In spite of those who are wresting the scripture, "Do all speak with tongues?" and those who will not enter into the experience and would hinder those who would, there is a heart hunger in every Christian that will not be satisfied short of a Bible Pentecost.—Selected.

NATIVES OF LIBERIA PLEAD FOR TEACHER

"Recently I paid a visit to a tribe four days' journey from our station, taking one of our oldest native workers and a number of our saved boys and girls with me. I had a boy who originally came from this tribe who could not rest after he was saved until he knew I was also going to tell his own people. As we passed through the country we held meetings with the different tribes, some of which had only been visited once before by a missionary. On reaching our destination, the peoplé turned out to welcome us, while the boy who was from their tribe, unable to restrain himself, ran ahead and told them what we were coming for, They had never seen a white person before, but when I began to tell the old, old story they seemed deeply interested, although they were the worst looking people as to appearance, I have ever met. The boys who accompanied me were so glad to give their testimonies, I didn't have to urge them. All they needed was an opportunity. We did not lack for an audience in any place, especially in the big town where the old chief of the whole tribe resided. Here the people were so desirous to welcome me that they started a dance. Of course, I couldn't permit this, so stopped them at once, telling them my reason for coming to them. It was late before I could close the meeting. The old chief sat and listened eagerly, drinking in the message and came in the morning bringing other chiefs, begging that they also might have the privilege of hearing this message. It was most pathetic. I could hardly keep back the tears. Their beseeching looks went to my heart and a cry has been going up to God, 'O God, send someone to these people.' I told them I would write to Brother Perkin and in the meantime I would pray that God would send someone in answer to their cry. When I left the old man followed on behind. We continued on in this way for some time until at last he told the native worker to call me because he had something he wanted to say. I stopped, and again he pled with me and wished me to understand that they wanted to have a teacher, that this was the first time they had ever heard about Jesus, that they were pleased with the Word, and that I must do my best to obtain a teacher. Pray for these people. Many tribes beyond them are in the same condition, without the Gospel. I thank God for the privilege of getting out and telling of the love of Jesus. Truly, Jesus is very precious in these days. I do praise Him for the strength He gives me day by day.

"While I was away the Lord poured

out His Spirit on those I left at the station and baptized my native worker, Moses, in the Holy Spirit. I had been praying for this. He was not the only one, but his wife also besides a number of boys and girls were saved and baptized in the Spirit. Quite a number of our boys have the Baptism and God is using them as they go among their people."—Miss Jessie I.. Eustace.

PENTECOSTAL REVIVAL IN BURMA Acts 2:7

We do praise the Lord that this scripture is being fiterally fulfilled in our midst. Those of you who have been standing with us in prayer will rejoice that a real Pentecostal revival has at last broken out in our midst. The tribe amongst whom this work of God has begun is the Loheh tribe at Ming-tz-shan, and already for ten weeks it has been going on and increasing in power every day.

Approximately 60 have received the Baptism of the Spirit according to Acts 2:4 and numbers are at the altars seeking. You will no doubt be interested to know how it all began, but it was not by any planning on our part; the Lord brought it about in His own blessed way.

We had been having quite a test in regard to the work among the Loheh people, and were brought to a place where we realized more than ever that only God Himself was sufficient for the need.

One night, at the close of our Sunday evening service, one of our young evangelists who had been through the refining fires of persecution in a considerable measure, got up and said he felt that the Spirit was putting it on his heart to suggest a week of prayer, having the meetings early in the morning so that all could come. The Spirit of God witnessed to this in a very real manner so that at once meetings beginning at 4 o'clock in the morning were started. After we had met together a few times, Mrs. Tao, the wife of one of our workers said she heard someone singing a very beautiful hymn and that she believed it must be the voice of an angel. The same voice afterwards exhorted her not to forget the words of the hymn that had been sung; they were an appeal to us not to forget the assembling of ourselves together but to encourage one another to watch and pray.

After we had spent one week in this way the Lord began to work, and in the Sunday evening meeting, Li-keh-san, our evangelist got under deep conviction and found no peace until he stood up and made a clean confession of sin in his life, and of the way in which he had failed God. He had no sooner finished than Mrs. Tao got up and weeping aloud confessed to unfaithfulness to her husband. This

seemed to start things going and others immediately followed, with various confessions of sin and short-coming. In the meantime Li-keh-san had been down before the Lord and now beckoned to me to come and pray with him. I did so readily and before very long the power of God began to shake him and after a little while he broke out speaking in an unknown tongue, which he was afterwards able to interpret. Surely God was in our midst. Not until two o'clock in the morning were we able to close the meeting. Since that day this brother seems to have caught a real vision of God's purpose in pouring out His Spirit upon all flesh and is preaching it with all the energy of his being. Never have I seen a greater change in any preacher than that which has taken place in Brother Li. His theme is now, ever, and always JESUS ONLY. Mrs. Tao, who also received the Baptism of the Spirit has been given a wonderful ministry of prayer. The Lord really seems to speak to her in a definite way and has shown her many things concerning the work here. Among the others who have been baptized in the Holy Ghost, was one man who had been notoriously wicked, but when the Spirit began to move a change came over him, and, unable to resist the strivings of the Lord, he at last broke down and confessed his sin and asked for forgiveness. The Lord speedily came in to bless him when he got to this stage, and in a short time another had joined the happy ranks of those who have been baptized in the Spirit.

Much prayer went up for the following Sunday meetings, so that when we came together the ground was thoroughly prepared for God to work. Brother Li got up to give a message from the Word, but was unable to finish it. He broke down and wept, pleading with the people to repent and get right with God. At once two young men began to weep and confessed their sin. The Spirit of God descended and baptized one of them immediately and with shining face, he arose to testify to what God had done for him. Soon after the other young man also received. Now they both are out winning souls for God.

When we met together the next Sunday, I think I never saw the power of God so manifest in any meeting before. For two whole hours previous to the commencement of the meeting prayer had been going up to God for His blessing upon the meeting. About 200 people had gathered together that morning, and God just took control of things. At last we felt led to ask all those who wanted the Baptism of the Spirit to raise their hands. Immediately the people arose to their feet in a body and with uplifted hands called upon the Lord. Again the Spirit descended upon us and the scene which followed was beyond description. Some were shouting for joy, others weeping under deep conviction, in fact the Lord

the Holy Spirit. This aroused the devil and one old man tried to stop the meetings, telling the people that they were crazy, and that he was going to stop the noise and have peace and quiet.

However God thought differently and the man became sick and in three days was laid in the grave. This naturally made a deep impression on the ones who were opposing the work and some came and confessed their sin, in the stand which they had formerly taken.

The universal testimony in tongues of these people when they receive the Baptism is that the coming of the Lord draweth nigh and that He is calling upon men to repent and prepare for that day.

We are sure that it is the will of the Lord to pour out His Spirit on all these tribes people and ask you to join with us in prayer that this work may go on and spread to the regions all around.—Hector Sigrid McClean.

After the battle was over and the soldiers had driven off the robbers they brought their captives back and before all the people, cut out their hearts and ate them.
