The Father's House

"In my Father's house are many mansions" (John 14:2).

Our Lord gives us much beautiful teaching about the Father's house. "Note His first thought here, namely, that the Father's house is the cure for the troubled heart-"Let not your heart be troubled . . in my Father's house are many mansions" (John 14:2). A fierce storm was sweeping the Great Lakes. A steam tug towing a barge began to founder. The captain and his mates took to a small boat. All night long they tossed to and fro, every instant in jeopardy of their lives. In the morning they were rescued by a passing ship. The captain afterward testified that all the long night as they were beaten and tossed by the tempest, there was one thing which nerved their arms and kept their hearts from sinking in despair. It was this-shining through the darkness and the storm they saw the lights of home.

We are sailing on a stormy sea. Often our frail boat is tossed and beaten with the tempest. Sometimes the gales seem too fierce for us to weather, and we are sorely tempted to give way to the troubled heart that so easily besets us in such an hour. But the Captain of our salvation knows the sore and frequent temptation to be troubled in heart. His remedy is simple. Let not your heart be troubled. Think about the Father's house! Think of its peace, its joy, its glory, its reunions and fellowship, its sureness, its eternalness, and as you think, the troubled heart will vanish. You will be like the tempest-tossed sea captain. You see the lights of home.

Heaven is a place. The Word of God is too clear to leave any doubt as to that. Why then did Christ in answering Thomas' question as to whither He was going, suddenly change his phrasing from the "Father's house" in the second verse to "No man cometh unto the Father but by me" in the sixth? Why, when showing Thomas the way to heaven, did He point him the way to the Father? Clearly because to our Lord Jesus the great thought of the Father's House is that it is where the Father is. Beyond our dreams are its splendor and glory, yet all of it but reflects the glory of the Father who is "all and in all."

The Father's house is a sure house-"If it were not so I would have told you" (John 14:2). These are days of doubt. Men are doubting the Godhood of our Lord; doubting His atonement; His resurrection; His glorious return; doubting hell; doubting heaven. Naturally the thought arises, Can we possibly be deceived? Is it all true? Is it true that He shall change the body of our humiliation and fashion it like unto the body of His glory; that His servants shall serve Him in a service that sweeps the universe; that they shall forever live in the glory of His face-to-face presence; that they shall 'stand in their lot" through all the ages; that they shall share His kingship and follow Him whithersoever He goeth; that their tears shall be wiped away, their sufferings forgotten, their separations ended? It is surely, unshakably, and eternally true. For He who never deceived a soul in earth or heaven; He who is "full of grace and truth;" He who is the truth Himself has said with a voice of assurance which rings out from the heart of this fourteenth of John from two thousand years ago, "If it were not so I would have told you!"

Yea, and the Father's house is made sure to us not only by His word but by His will. Listen to this-

"Father, I will that those whom thou hast given me be with me where I am that they may behold my glory."

"All things were made by him." He said, "I will," and the planets began their stately march in the measureless void; He said, "I will," and the earth was hurled from His omnipotent hand like a giant projectile whizzing through space at an inconceivable speed; He said, "I will," and the lofty mountains pierced the azure skies with their snow-clad summits; He said, "I will," and the silvery moon began her nightly course, held by the binding cords of the earth she encircles; He said, "I will," and millions of blazing suns filled the uncharted eternities of space. whirling in a dizzy course through all the ages of their existence. But the most marvelous of all for you and me, the precious gift of God to Him for all the endless ages, is brought to mind by His words, "Father, I will that they also whom thou hast given me be with me where I am, that they may behold my glory."

Child of God, for you and me the Father's house is sure by the same omnipotent will which set the universe a-going. Not because of any merit in us who believe, but because of His own all-creative and irresistible will the Father's house is sure for all of us who bear His name and the seal of His own blessed Spirit.

The Father's house is a house with only one door-"I am the door. By me if any man enter in he shall be saved" (John 10:9). It is the door from which we hear a voice crying out, "This cup is the New Testament in my blood which is shed for many for the remission of sins." It is the passover door. It is a blood-stained door. It is the door which the proud and lofty spirit of man scorns to enter, for it is a humbling door to all such. Yet it is the only door. Not the door of a beautiful personality; not the door of service or sacrifice; not the door of imitation of His walk and ways; not the door of lofty ideals. By no one of these, beautiful though they may be, can we ever enter the Father's house. His own lips have said it—"No man cometh unto the Father but by Me." "Who loved us and washed us from our sins in his own blood." And no other washing than the crimson one will fit us to enter into the glory where He dwells. "By his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us" (Heb. 9:12). The blessed Book reads, "No other door:" the angels cry, "No other door;" His own tender voice adds, "No other door;" the throngs in the Father's house proclaim, "No other door;" and the cleansed consciences and triumphant souls of men here on earth cry out with unspeakable joy and rapture, "No other door.'

To miss the Father's house is the tragedy of all time. But there is another appalling tragedy. It is to cause some one else to miss it by your example. Christ says plainly, "No man cometh unto the Father but by me." But you, my moral friend, are claiming by implication, that there is some other door than Christ by which one may enter. Great will be your bitterness of soul if, in the years to come, some dear child, wife, husband, or other loved one, should fail to enter the Father's house because through love and admiration of you they have chosen the way of "salvation by character," and, though seemingly "not far from the king-dom of heaven," have yet fallen short. John Bunyan tells us in simple, solemn words that when Christian had reached his journey's end he perceived that there was a door leading to hell from the very gate of heaven. Alas, for some beloved one to be so near yet miss the Father's house because he or she chose to walk with you and, by so by doing, missed the blood-sprinkled door through which alone man may pass into the glory of the Father's house.

The Father's house is a house of communion-"They shall see his face" (Rev. 22:4). The face is the mirror of the soul. The face reveals the innermost soul in all its beauty. The Father's house will be filled with myriads of faces. Baby faces that have never known the shadow of sin; radiant faces that show forth the glory of the Christ within; sorrowful faces now flooded with everlasting joy; suffering faces now filled with the rest and peace of eternity; sin-marred faces now resplendent with the glory of His holi-

But "His servants shall see HIS face!" The face artists have tried to paint; the face which God's children have seen in their midnight dreams; the face which was torn with agony unspeakable upon Calvary's bloody hill; the face which little children and sweet women loved to look upon; the face into which as we gaze we are "changed into the same image from glory to glory." The first sight of Jesus Christ's face will flood the heart with a stream of joy unspeakable and full of glory which shall never cease its flow through all the endless ages of eternity. "They shall see HIS FACE!" The greatest sight of all the Father's house will be the face of Jesus. The gates of pearl; the jasper walls; the streets of gold like crystal; the bow-encircled throne; the angels and archangels; the white-robed multitude before the throne—all these shall be the wonder of the soul. But the face of Him "who sits upon the throne" is the vision which shall feed the souls of His saints through all the ages to come.

The Father's house is a house of Christlikeness- "And his name shall be in their foreheads" (Rev. 22:4). This is the word said about God's children in the Revelation. And what does His Name stand for? The Name stands for the character, the nature of God. When we become new creatures God gives us a new name which speaks of the transforming power of Jesus Christ within us. A beautiful thing is said of this name in the message of the angel of the church at Pergamos. We are told there that "no man knoweth it saving he that receiveth it" (Rev. 2:17). What a beautiful fact! No one knows, save you and God what the gift of the indwelling Christ in your heart has meant to you. No man save you knows how Christ's power has laid hold of your weakness and made you to be an overcomer in Himself: no man but you knows how Christ's peace has swept out your care and anxiety; no man save you knows the terrific battles in your innermost soul in which Jesus Christ has brought you blessed victory: no man but you knows how the hot breath of anger, lust, and passion has been swept away by the sweet ministrations of the innermost Spirit of Jesus Christ. This wondrous inner transformation; these inner battles; these life-and-death struggles with the powers of darkness and hell-no man but you knows the victory which the incoming of the Son of God into your soul has meant to you. But in the day of glory in the Father's house, when all things shall be manifested, then this new name is written in your forehead where all the assembled saints and angels of God can see it!

The Father's house will be a house of kingship-"hath made us kings" (Rev. 1:6). "He shall sit down with me on my throne." "The saints shall judge the world." "I saw thrones and they sat upon them." "If we suffer with Him we shall also reign with Him." "Who loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God." Loved-washed-enthroned! That is our glorious state. The first two, ours here; the third fulfilled in all its honor, splendor, and blessedness in the Father's house hereafter. And mark, too, this blessed fact. The scope of our kingship then is proportioned not to the greatness of our sphere down here, but to our faithfulness in it however humble it is.

I recall a message from a devoted young missionary in Central America. It came in a letter in which he gave a peep into the deeps of his own heart as well as into the trials of the work. "The work is hard," said he. "I go about on fishing boats through the day. At night I sleep on piles of hides on the decks. The people do not seem much interested in the Gospel message I bring. Sometimes the

Adversary tempts me to discouragement in the presence of seeming lack of success. But I take courage and press on anew as I remember that God does not hold me responsible for success but for faithfulness." Like a flash came the text of which he was thinking. Not "well done, good and successful servant," but "well done, good and faithful servant. Thou hast been faithful over a few things-I will make thee ruler over many." God's rulers over many things shall spring from the obscure ranks of those who have been faithful over the few. Here indeed is it true that the last shall be first and the first shall be last. In the Father's house scrubwomen may be queens; slaves crowned kings; humble servants, God's prime ministers; God's hidden ones here, God's great ones there.

The Father's house is a house of unspeakable glory-"The glory of God did lighten it" (Rev. 21:23). Who has not marked even here the glory of God as seen in a great sunset? Rivers of glory wind through meadows of gold. Lakes of glory lie embedded in the evening sky. Seas of glory lap eternal shores with their shimmering waves. Mountains of glory rear themselves to the heavens with cloudcapped summits tipped with the splendor of the dying day. Earth, too, is flooded with glory. It falls in the dim aisles of great forests and illumines them with its splendor. It dances among the windtossed leaves. It splotches the trunks of giant trees. It bathes in light the upturned faces of those who watch and worship as the climaxing splendor of earth, sea, and sky turns the heart to God our Father who is Himself the glory of all creation and who deigns to give us, in the lavish, golden glory of the sunset the faith forth-shadowing of the glory of the Father's house.

But if the earthly glory is such, what must be the glory of the heavenly city? It needs no sun, for the glory of God doth lighten it. The nations of the earth walk in the glory of it. Its foundations can only be likened to the glory of the diamond, the sapphire, the amethyst, the topaz and like precious stones of earthly glory. Its gates are pearls-each wondrous gate a single pearl. The city and its street are gold. But it is gold which earth knows not. For it is called "gold like unto clear glass" (Rev. 21:18), and "transparent glass" (Rev. 21:21). That is-it is the glory-gold. It is gold through which the glory of God can shine forth in crystal splendor. God uses this earthly imagery as the nearest symbolism by which He can give us any glimpse of the glory of His house prepared for us. But when all has been said it is as naught to that glory of which He says, "Eye hath not seen nor ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him.'

WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT?

Almost six years ago—in September—I was called home from work, told to hurry, as our little darling baby girl, just sixteen months old was dying. At that time, I thought if I lived a life according to the Golden Rule, and repeated the Lord's prayer before going to sleep, it was all God would ask of one.

As my wife and I looked at our little darling, so white, so still, my wife said, "Let us pray; perhaps God will spare her." We retired to another room where we prayed fervently for God to spare her, and, while praying, it seemed as if the shades had been pulled down in the room, for all seemed so dark around me; and I heard a voice, saying, "Why are you praying? It is too late!" I lifted my face from off the bed but, before I could say anything, my wife said to me, "Willie, something said to me, "Why are you praying? It is too late!"

To those who are not right with God, may this be a warning to you to keep in constant touch with Him, that in your hour of trial, it may not be "too late."

A month later, I attended services held in the old St. Andrew's Church, under the leadership of Aimee Semple McPherson, and one night, instead of going home after work, I went direct to the church that I might hear the sermon on the "Second Coming of Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ." I was troubled with my kidneys at the time, and as Mrs. McPherson entered the pulpit to deliver the message, I had to leave, and a policeman snapped a padlock on the inside of the door after allowing me to go out, as the church was packed with people, and it was not safe for more to enter. My thought was on how sorry I felt not to be able to hear the message and as I walked up the street to take a street car, I heard a deep voice say, "Stop. Why are you running away?" I thought at first someone was playing a joke on me but, although I looked up and down the street. also up at the windows, I could see no one. I felt a presence near me, and my heart burned within me. I said, "I'm not running away, Lord. You know I can't get (Continued on Page Six)

LAZINESS

Paul wrote to the Thessalonians that if any man would not work, neither should he eat. Pretty severe, think you? Well, but just think what havoc laziness works. A lazy man means an overworked wife, underfed children, dilapidated premises. He is a rider, a slacker, a shirker. He is a barnacle, a parasite, a nuisance. Solomon speaks very scornfully of him. As the door turneth upon its hinges so does the lazy man do upon his bed. When he has something in his hand to eat, it grieveth him to bring it to his mouth. Like Ludham's dog who leaned his head against the barn to bark, the lazy man, if he were not such a tragedy and nuisance would be a laughable monstrosity. Stop the breed; let him not eat.

Speaking thus, I have elicited the hearty amens of thousands of readers. They are like the stingy man listening to Wesley preach his famous sermon on giving. The preacher's first point was: Make all you can. After he had enlarged on that sufficiently he announced his second point: Save all you can. That was fine too, and the stingy man thought he had found a preacher after his own heart. Then the third point was announced: Give all you can. Like a cat on whom is thrown a bucket of ice water, the lazy man crept off to salve his wounds. I wonder if you will be that way when you have finished reading this?

Going out once to make a sick call, I found an elderly lady, suffering with

something like appendicitis. She had received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost long ago, and felt that she ought to trust the Lord for her body. But it was easier to send for the doctor, so she had done that. She said that in the early church, healing was common, and it should be now. I reminded her that people were being healed every day.

"I feel that I ought to commit my body to the Lord and pray for healing, and for much brighter experiences than I have," she said.

"Well, Mother, what is the matter? Why do you not do it?"

"I am too lazy. I feel that it would take days of prayer and fasting, too, and I am just too indolent to undertake it."

She seemed to think that she had faith enough to enable her to find her way to heaven, but not faith enough so that she could be restored to health.

Laziness in the spiritual realm is a very common complaint, but it is seldom that it is owned up to. Thousands of folks have sought the Baptism up to the point when they had some manifestation which, by stretching the facts to the utmost possible degree, could be called tongues, and then they settled back. They have the Baptism. No need for them to work any more. Others come to seek and they kneel with them a few moments and then, leaving the altar, sit lazily by, so glad they do not have to seek any more. Like an uncle of mine in his teens, who proudly displayed a quarter, saying, "No need of my working any more."

If a man will not labor, neither let him eat. Why, you do not suppose the Lord is going to feel that way when He calls us to His table, do you? Why, of course. Do you suppose a man who is lazy in the physical world and so brings about mere physical and temporary disorder and discomforts to himself and others, is going to be starved into activity at the command of Jehovah, and the man who is lazy in the spiritual realm be allowed to come right on in and put his feet under the Lord's table? No.

Why just think of the difference. The spiritually lazy man, like the physically lazy one, lets his garden grow up to weeds and his choice plants are spoiled. But what are his choice plants? Why, they are: love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance and many others. Through laziness his love becomes formal, his joy is clouded, his peace broken, his longsuffering often breaks down, his gentleness has become hard, his goodness is only a set of forms, his faith is inactive, his meekness is boasted of and his temperance is used to judge others by. The garden of precious fruits planted by the Lord is ruined by his laziness; the Lord's vineyard is grown up in weeds.

The Lord blessed him as He did that he might serve the better in the great work of getting men saved, but instead of working, this lazy soul lets the others do the preaching, the praying, the shouting, the altar work. He sits and listens to the preacher, if he can keep awake, and surely that is enough to be expected of

one who works so hard all week as he has to.

Have you seen him? He is a member of your church "like's not." He is one of the many who seek to get in but will not be able. He is one of the foolish ones who allows the oil to leak out and be gone. He is of the chaff, to be driven away by the wind from the fan in His hand.

The physically lazy man is condemned right roundly by his fellows. He has the open disapproval of his neighbors as a spur to stir him up to activity. But not so the spiritually lazy one. He is called brother in the church; he votes when they elect a new pastor; he pays a little when a new church must be built; he sometimes gets slightly warmed up in revival times and blusters about a little for a few days; but he is too tired to go to prayer meeting, or if he does go he does not testify or pray, or if he does testify or pray, people wonder why he doesn't stop. He is as dry as Sahara; his words are as cold as Labrador; his hand-shake feels like shaking hands with a beef steak. Have you seen him? Possibly you should look in the mirror to see him best.

Can it be helped? Yes, it can. Jesus is your refuge. But the first thing is to wake up to the fact that in the church you are on the broad road, going with the multitude down to hell. If you are not convicted by this time; if you do not understand the scandalous awfulness of a prayerless, praiseless, inactive life in the church, in Jesus' Name and in His stead I beg of you, get the friends to pray for you that your eyes may be opened, and that the conviction of the Holy Ghost may be given to you.

THE IMPENDING CONFLICT

There is a wide-spread, deep-seated conviction among thoughtful people everywhere, that we are on the verge of another world-war, so tremendous in its devastating power as to totally eclipse the great conflict just past.

The late war, instead of stabilizing the nations of Europe and bringing them to terms of mutual understanding and peace, has only fanned the flames of jealousy and hatred, and the various countries are working with feverish energy to train and equip their armies for the inevitable clash.

Field Marshal Foch, of France, the great military leader, said recently, "Every one would like to believe another great war is a remote contingency, but the fact cannot be ignored that one may come at any time, unexpectedly from any quarter. It may involve the whole world. If another war comes, it will be more terrible than the last."

Oswald J. Smith, a prominent Bible teacher, says: "If there was nothing else to convince us of the imminence of another great war we would surely have sufficient evidence in the deadly inventions of the last decade, which without question are being prepared for the next world conflagration. Machine guns, we are told, have been invented which will spit forth a fan-shaped tail of 6,000 bul-

lets a minute. Aeroplanes at a height of several miles can now drop bombs weighing 4,300 pounds, and thus create destruction over a radius of a mile. Guns have recently been constructed with a range of 150 miles, and tanks which, concealed in their own smoke, can out-distance the fleetest hound. All these things are here now. . . . In the United States there has been invented a gas which, when dropped on a city, will kill everything, men, animals and vegetation—thus blotting out the entire population in a very short time. One whiff of this gas, we are told, means almost instant death. 'There is nothing,' says Thomas Edison, 'to prevent fifty aeroplanes flying tomorrow over London's millions with a gas which can

suffocate those millions in three hours." No human power can avert these calamities. All the efforts of peace congresses or league of nations cannot avail. According to the sure word of prophecy, this fearful conflict is impending, and will mark the close of the present age.

It is not pessimism to recognize and declare these tremendous facts, but it is folly to ignore them and declare a peace and security which every thoughtful person realizes does not exist.

Thank God, there is a place of refuge for His people. He has promised to hide us under His shelter. Let us avail ourselves of His mercy and loving care.-A. G. B. in Pisgah.

BAPTIST MISSIONARY GETS BAP-TISM THROUGH READ-ING TRACTS

Testimony of Elijah Gcwabe Tshedza Mission Station, Zoutpansberg, Transvaal, South Africa

I am very thankful to the Lord to be able to write and testify to the saving power of His gospel. I was saved in the year 1912, on Christmas Day under the preaching of Rev. J. E. East, of the Native Baptist Church. When he called for those who needed salvation, thank God, there and then I felt the need of a Saviour, and after struggling, trying to get rid of my fear of the people, God gave me grace to break loose from the chains and fetters that bound me and I went forward and surrendered my whole heart to the Lord Jesus Christ. Since then I have never doubted my salvation. I was baptized immediately and was soon conscious that the Lord was calling me to preach His Gospel to the native people of South Africa. At the first opportunity I applied for training under the tutorship of Rev. J. E. East and his colleagues. I can never thank God enough for the teaching I received. In June, 1917, I with two others was ordained to the ministry.

While at my home on vacation during 1918, I received some tracts and papers dealing with the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, Divine Healing, and the Second Coming of Christ. FREE TRACTS REPORT FOR AUGUST

From many hundreds of different places requests came in for free tracts. The writers told of their desire to serve the King and to see people saved and healed, and said if we would send them the free tracts they would prayerfully and faithfully distribute them.

Miraculously Healed of Double Curvature and Paralysis

When Only the Master Touched

Before a large audience in Portland, Oregon, on December 1, 1925, Miss Ruby Dimmick, of Vancouver, B. C., told the story of her miraculous healing April 20, 1923, as follows:

Friends in Portland, I am here before you to tell you about the wonderful things the Lord has done for me. I am not going to tell you all about the sickness I went through, but I will give you just a few details and tell you some of the trials that I endured so that you will really understand that my case is not a fake.

For eight years I was an invalid. It started with appendicitis, which I had two years before I was operated upon; we were hoping that with treatment we would avoid an operation. However, the treatment did not help and an operation was necessary. From this operation I never fully regained my health and strength for there was other trouble besides that, which the doctors had not reached. I was in Prince Rupert when I was operated on for appendicitis, and the doctor's name was Dr. Kergin. I have all the doctors' names if you want them.

Two years after, having spent nearly one year in bed and suffering intensely, I was operated on once more by a Vancouver specialist—a threefold major operation. He came up to Chiliwack and said that that was my only hope of life. Six months later, although I was still unable to walk or move around from the effects of this operation, I was operated on again and my tonsils were removed, gatherings having formed constantly. This was a case of going on the operating table again.

While I was in this weakened condition, pain was continually running down my right side, down through the leg; the ankle joint became separated and fluid formed in between the joints; the inner cords drew up and the outer cords stretched until the foot formed a club, and no feeling remained. The leg itself withered until it was just like a paralyzed, withered leg and foot. The doctor put this in a cast; he had an X-ray of it taken. to see just where the ankle bone had separated, but when he took it out of the cast it was no better. So he advised us to go to Vancouver and see if anything could be done there. We went there to Dr. McKechnie who said nothing could be done unless I went to Toronto, and there they might help me.

So my father took me down to Toronto that summer, and once more I had to go on the operating table while they straightened the foot as well as they could and put it in a cast. After this foot was taken out of the cast I went under steady treatment day after day, and after these treatments, I had to learn to use my foot once more and to try to straighten the

spine, which was curved and which caused my leg to shorten an inch and a half.

Although I do not like to recall those days, I think I will just tell you a little bit of the experiences I went through.

In order to learn to walk, there was a pulley which was attached to a part of the ceiling of the gymnasium, and on that was a cross-bar; a harness was fitted on the head and attached to the crossbar: I was raised up until my toes touched the ground and then as it went along I was dragged; the main strain was on my neck, because the weight of the body hung free from the head. One nurse walked on one side and put out my foot, and another on the other side put out the other foot-until, after three months, I was able to move one foot, and then the other; and after six months, I could walk with the aid of a cane and an extension boot with braces.

For the straightening of the spine, I was hung up about two feet from the floor with this same apparatus, the whole weight coming on my head so they could try to straighten my spine; but just as soon as they let me down again the spine would go back. I only tell this to you tonight because I want you to know that Jesus has really and truly healed me.

We moved after that from Chiliwack over to Victoria and I went to one of the eminent physicians and surgeons there day after day and day after day. It was very discouraging because the gatherings in my throat kept continuing, and although the doctor burned my throat and tried to stop the gathering, it did not help. He told me he did not know what more he could do for me, unless it were more operations.

But a new day dawned for me when Dr. Price came to Victoria. I never will forget those days as long as I live. They brought such joy and peace to my heart that I just long to tell others about it. He came about April 8th (if I remember correctly), 1923, to Victoria. I might say that Dr. Couie had been there just previously; and as we were talking about Dr. Price's meetings, I remember my father saying, "Well, I will go down with an open mind, but if he is anything like Couie I do not want to have anything to do with him." After hearing Dr. Price once or twice, he became so enthused, feeling that this was the work of the Lord, that he put fresh courage into my own heart.

I stopped in one afternoon on my way back from the doctor, but I was really too miserable to stay long enough to get much good from the meeting, and I was taken ill and unable to go again for ten days. On the 20th of April, 1923, my father had arranged for me to be prayed for after the morning service, a prepara-

tory service for the sick. I was taken down that morning, weak and miserable, unable to support myself, but my heart filled with joy because I knew that the Lord would answer prayer.

Many people were praying for me that morning, and that strengthened my faith. It was during the singing of the hymn, "How Firm a Foundation, Ye Saints of the Lord," and especially when they came to the second verse, "Fear not, I am with thee, Oh, be not dismayed, for I am thy God, I will still give thee aid," that my faith reached forth to Jesus and I claimed His promise. I could just feel Him at my side, and as I reached forth my hand I said to my father. "O Daddy, He is right here." Just as I said it, the power seemed to stream right up through this arm and down my back and all through me. My spine had a double curvature, and I felt just as though a heavy hand were passing on the small curvature; and where the big curvature was another hand seemed to press there, and all of a sudden the spine straightened and went into place. I felt a tug.at my foot, and I looked down to see who was touching it. I saw my foot coming down until it was even with the other; and the extension on the bottom of my shoe was below the other shoe.

I cannot tell you the joy that was in my heart as I poured out my thanks to God, but I know that when I got outside I just ran up and down as hard as ever I could. I hadn't run for over eight years, I had scarcely walked except with the aid of something else, and to walk was almost more than I could bear. When I got home I got a tin can out of the garbage can; and I kicked it all around. I ran up and down the steps; nobody could stop me, I couldn't stop until I was just tired out from the day's work, and I have been going ever since. Praise God! I am gaining strength every day, and I am able to do, I think, as much as the average girl. I have my own work, and am kept busy from day to day. God has wonderfully blessed me and it is my greatest joy to do all I can to help Him.

I pray that in some way this testimony may help somebody here, and that you will reach forth in faith unto Christ, who is "the same yesterday, today and forever." May God bless you all.—The Latter Rain Evangel.

SAYINGS ON BENEVOLENCE

John Bunyan very quaintly says, "A man there was, some called him mad; the more he gave, the more he had." A Christian man well known for his large gifts to the cause of Christ, was once asked how he could give so liberally to every good object, and his reply was: "Before I was converted I spent liberally for self and the world, and at my conversion I solemnly promised to give a fixed proportion of my income to doing good, and every year my business has steadily increased so that now I can give more to Him who gives me all."

A man who had lost heavily in business was passed by when the pastor was making a canvass to raise money for the Lord's work, but the brother said to him, "I have suffered great losses and must begin to retrench, but retrenchment must not begin at the house of God." A Mr. Thornton, rich and liberal friend of the poet Cowper, was in similar circumstances (it seemed to be a testing from the hand of God, for we must admit that He does permit testings to come), and he said, "The wealth is not mine but the Lord's, and it may be that He is going to take it out of my hands and give it to another who will be more faithful, and if so I ought to be making use of what is left." And he doubled his usual subscription.

Richard Baxter, the author of "The Saint's Rest," testified: "I never prospered more in my small estate than when I gave

away the most. My rule has been to study to need as little as possible for myself; to lay out nothing on 'need-nots;' to live frugally on little; to serve God so well on what He allows me that what I use of my income on myself may be as well expended for the common good as that which I give away for others, and to do all the good I could with the rest. When I gave away almost all, the more came in, I scarce know how, unexpected and unplanned for. And when by improvidence, I was tempted to use much on myself, or on things of little importance, then I prospered less than when I did otherwise. If I had planned to give only after my death, then all might have been lost, whereas, when I gave away at present and trusted God for the future, then I wanted nothing and I lost nothing." Does not that remind you of an epitaph on the old tombstone in Italy: "What I spent I had, what I gave I saved, what I kept I lost." Mark Anthony said, "I have lost everything except what I have given away."

Giving to the Lord is but transporting our goods to a higher floor. A converted heathen one time came to one of our missionaries and gave first for himself, then for his wife, then for each of his children, and, being asked if he was not giving too much, replied, "God's work must be done and I may be dead." God's Word teaches most emphatically that in being faithful we shall be blessed. An effort made to bless others lifts us above ourselves. Mr. Spurgeon says, "Never try to save out of God's cause; such money will canker the rest." Giving to God is no loss; indeed it is putting your money in the best bank. Giving is true having; it is "laying up treasures in Heaven where moth and rust doth not corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal."

How few people there are who know the luxury of doing good with money. Oh, beloved, open your hands before death closes them forever! OPPORTUNITIES IN JAPAN

In Japan are a number of cities each having a population of 200,000 or more in which, as well as in other smaller ones, there is not one Christian worker and where the Gospel has never been heard. The need for missionaries and native workers is great. The time to get into these places is now.

To take advantage of these many wide open doors, we need more educated, trained, experienced, consecrated, Godcalled and Spirit-filled men, capable of training and supervising native Christians. The natives can be better reached and won to Christ through native preachers than through the missionary. Pray that the Lord will raise up many native workers called and filled with the power of the Holy Spirit. This is what the field needs now.

Another great need is to have our own buildings and property for mission purposes. Renting is both costly and unsatisfactory. It is discouraging both to missionary and the native Christians. In the whole of Japan we have not one building of our own. The missionaries have been there for a number of years and not one has a church building or residence. What have they been doing all this time? Have we been backing them up with our prayers and our means? Have we failed them? Have we missed our golden opportunities? May the Lord help us all to be obedient to the Great Commission.

But thank God, a forward step has been taken in Japan recently. At a meeting of the missionaries the need of Bible training schools was discussed. Upon the suggestion of the Missionary Secretary, it was decided to have two schools, one for young women, and the other for young men. Sister Dithridge was elected principal of the young women's school and Brother Juergensen of the young men's school. These two schools are to be supervised by a committee of five, including the two principals. These two schools will be Council schools and will meet a long felt need in our missionary work in Japan.

Sister Dithridge will soon open the young women's school with a view of speedily and efficiently preparing women for the Lord's work. It is hoped that Brother Juergensen may also be able to begin the men's school this fall. With these two schools well under way we will soon be in a position to have native workers trained in a recognized Pentecostal school. They will then be sound in doctrine and equipped for an effective spiritual work. When these agencies become recognized facts we will then be able to accomplish effective work in Japan

and have stations that will be a blessing to the people, a credit to our missionary enterprise, and to the work in general. Pray earnestly for the work in Japan and especially that these two great needs may be speedily met.

Before service we hold an open air meeting which helps to arrest the attention of the people and afterwards to bring them into the hall. A Sunday school has been started and already a goodly number attend, as also a meeting for women during the week. We have in addition a day school in charge of our native worker Blanche.

"The work at Robinson and Randfontein is encouraging. Brother Law and Brother Richards are kept busy in the different places on the Rand, and God is working all along the line. We are especially happy over what He has done for our Randfontein Sunday school. Robinson was always in the lead, but recently Randfontein has surpassed Robinson and there has been a real awakening there among the children. Brother and Sister Bennett report good meetings in the Zeerust work, and souls are being saved. Our God is marching on, and we praise Him for His continued presence and blessing on every hand. Hallelujah! Please keep on praying. God answers prayer."

CONDITIONS NEAR PEKING

May the Lord graciously strengthen and protect our sister and bring her safely to her destination. The work continues to progress in South China and we rejoice over each warrior of the cross who, not counting his life dear unto himself goes forth to proclaim the gospel and thus hasten the return of our blessed Lord.

BIBLE SCHOOL IN NORTH CHINA

It is a great cause for thanksgiving that the Lord has enabled the Pentecostal missionaries of North China to establish a Bible School, for the training of native workers. Already fruit has been borne from this work to the praise and glory of God.

Brother W. W. Simpson was the instrument used of God to start this work. In 1922, somewhat in the way of an experiment, he took a number of students for a course of one month. The following year things began in real earnest, and in the 1924-5 term, one woman and four men graduated. We are glad to testify that these workers are proving the benefit of their training, by their faithfulness and efficiency in the service of the Lord.

The last term has been glorious in every respect both in the number of students who enrolled and spiritual results. Altogether during the term 76 students came under the influence of the school training, while our average attendance through the school year was 42. We rejoiced in witnessing 9 of this number receive the Baptism in the Holy Spirit with the sign of speaking in tongues following. Praise His name! Hallelujah!

Our aim is to confine our course strictly to the teaching of the Word and thus cover the whole Bible in two terms of six months each. The course adopted is the one originated by Brother Simpson, and we find it covers the ground very well.

Our staff consists of a very gifted Chinese pastor by the name of Wei and myself. We are finding however that the work is too heavy for us alone so that

we are planning to have an additional Chinese teacher this coming year.

You may be interested to know that this work up to the present has been supported entirely by the offerings of the Pentecostal missionaries of North China, with the exception of a few gifts that have come from interested persons at home

We are feeling now that we should appreciate others sharing this burden with us, since the work is expanding so and becoming too much for the missionaries to carry alone. We feel confident that our friends in America will rally to our assistance in order that this work, begun so manifestly in the Lord, may be continued for His glory. We covet your prayers and are looking forward with great expectancy to the coming term, that in spite of war and unrest all around us, the Lord, should He tarry, may make this term the best we have ever had.—J. C. Beruldsen.

"O LORD, REVIVE THY WORK IN THE MIDST OF THE YEARS" (Hab. 3:2)

In the "midst of the years" we gaze out over this vast district of nearly three million souls in heathen darkness in which we, with a band of Indian workers, labor alone, and then we take a second glance into mystic Nepal, which has been "veiled" for so many centuries and we see such opportunities and needs. Our district borders on this "forbidden" land, and a stream of pilgrims and traders is constantly coming and going to and from its hidden villages.

Good roads, like spokes of a wheel, reach out in many directions from Laheria, Sarai, and with the car God has given us for the district work, we can continue to reach hundreds of villages in the interior. There are also the large Melas where great numbers of pilgrims gather from Nepal and other untouched fields.

Realizing the near approach of our Lord, we have been looking definitely to Him for His plan for reaching these thousands upon thousands who in their blind way are saying, "Sir, I have no man . . . to put me into the pool." Our voices cannot reach them all, so our hearts are burdened to spread the printed page instead, and our deep desire is to put several hundred thousand Bible portions into the hands of these needy ones during the cool season. Like Paul, we feel a passion to preach and spread the Living Word "where Christ is not named."

The Bible Society has bound different portions of the Bible in little books, and Matthew, Mark, Luke and John separately and such are available in the five languages spoken in our district.

In the past, for the most part, we have followed the general rule, and sold the portions for one cent each, but in this campaign, while a few may be sold, the burden for this interior district work is to enter a village, give copies free of charge to the headman of the village, to the village schoolmaster and students and others. Often when in earnest conversation with a receptive individual or community, we feel the written Word would

seal the lesson or sermon and so having handed them a Gospel portion, they will walk away still meditating on the words and looking into the Book for its verification. To break into the sacred moment with "Is ka dam do paisa hai" ("The price of this is one cent"), would divert and cause them to conclude at once that there must be some mercenary advantage in it for us and the supreme message is lost when it might have been clinched. There are, of course, pros and cons which experience teaches in these things, but in these interior places, we are convinced that to give the Gospel without charge brings better results than to sell it. Also in traveling, we find on some stations the sale of the Gospel portions is prohibited while the "give-away" plan works, and the Gospel, which cannot return void, is spread to many who might have no other opportunity of hearing.

In the heathen temples among other abominations of idolatry, the people worship the idol in a very peculiar way: They write their prayers on a bit of paper, wrap the papers up in mud balls and throw them against the idol. If the prayer mud balls stick to the idol, they believe their prayers are answered. May not this in a crude way illustrate the nature of prayers we should offer to the Living God? Prayer cemented with great desire and faith that may hold on until the answer comes. Surely prayers that "stick" must be moistened with tears, molded by faith and thrown with persistence.

We need prayers that will "stick" for the chapel meetings, the regular station work in the zenanas, the day school, and the Indian library, where hungry souls come for private instruction. Also we desire earnest prayer to follow us as we, with as many Indian workers as can crowd into the car, and with Bible portions in our pockets, and piled up under the seats, set off for as far into the interior as each road will take us, slacking up to hand a Gospel to all we pass on our journey. If they cannot read, someone in their family or village can, and they so seldom have a book in their hands, that it is not a lost effort. At each village we stop, and after singing and preaching, distribute Bible portions. Next, separating, we find our way "by twos" into all the houses in sight, visiting the sick, seeing some healed, comforting the broken-hearted, meeting the men of the village or the women of the harem and purdah-home, and leaving Bible portions to continue their ministry after we pass on to the others who have never heard.

We have reached our "Kadesh-Barnea" and need your cooperation. Do you catch the vision of the waiting heathen? Shall they have the Gospel during these coming months if He tarries? One dollar will buy seventy-seven Bible portions and meet the need of spreading the Gospel in one or two of these villages in the interior. Will you stand with us in definite prayer for these several hundred thousand Gospels that shall bring fruit for eternity? Psalm 85:8: "I will hear what God the Lord will speak."—J. J. Muller.

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
