This "way" is often spoken of as an easy way, and so it is after we have learned to walk in it. When a sinner is told that he must believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, what does that convey to him unless we carefully explain the "why" and "how" of the act involved? It only bewilders him-at least it did me. I realized that I could not find the way for myself, and cast about in my own mind for something that I could do, as no mental effort of my own helped me and I knew not how to believe. I saw no reason for this exercise of the soul called "believing on the Lord Jesus Christ" which was being presented, for I thought I had believed when as a child I had given my merely mental assent as to the historical Christ.

From the time I was seven years of age until I was thirty-three I continually sought to be a Christian. My mother prayed with me and I went to church, to Sunday school, and often to revival services, but when urged to go to the altar, I felt I would be a hypocrite, without a different experience, and I longed for a real personal talk with some one who would show me the way more perfectly. I prayed every night for salvation, knowing I was lost and yet hungering to be saved, but seemed unable to voice my spiritual distress to any one. When I read the Word of God each verse condemned me and I laid it aside. I thought it was the fault of the people who lived about us, and imagined if we were in the State of Michigan (my home was in New York) I would receive help, and I asked God to let us sell our home and move to that state where there lived a godly aunt, an earnest preacher of the Word. God heard and answered my prayer, but my aunt never helped me.

After many years of discouragement and tossing about from one place to another, mingling with an aching heart in worldly pleasures, I thought of another aunt, who also was a preacher, and arranged for a visit at her home, fully expecting her to come to my rescue. She often looked at me wistfully, but never spoke the word that I longed for. I could not believe that she would let me go without this and I could have wept aloud when the last good-byes were said. I knew that she loved me, but she said not a word that gave me an opportunity to confide in her. Arriving at home in despair I heard that a Salvation Army corps had established a work in the county seat, eight miles away. Over the dusty country roads and rocky hills I drove to the town, almost a day's journey, to attend the services; but I found they did not have a meeting until evening. Not finding the right person to whom I could voice my distress, I turned away to drive the long miles, in clouds of dust and scorching heat, back to my country home. To my horror I could not open my mouth to pray any more; the skies were brass and the earth iron.

At this time, God sent an evangelist to my home town, and I answered the first call for a desire to be saved by raising my hand for prayer. I decided to go to the altar even if I did not understand what further steps to take. Each seeker was given a word of counsel after he had knelt in prayer. When my turn came, he said, "What is the matter with you?" I managed to open my lips and stammer, "I do not know; I came to you to find out," I told him of the years of prayer and failure, and when he said, "Confess Christ," I was in dismay. How could

that help me? I was sure Christ was far, far away. My heart was cold and dark, and the enemy of souls was there to tell me I would be a hypocrite if I did this, but I was so desperate that I was willing to do anything that promised help, so I obeyed and feebly explained to the people around me my desire to be a Christian,

I went home without relief but, as I sat quietly in the garden, the trees gave forth a sound as though a breeze were stirring the leaves (it was a still night in June), and then the glory struck my soul and songs that I had known in childhood welled up in my heart. I sang for days until my throat almost gave out. The morning after this eventful night, I sought out my unsaved neighbors and urged them to go to the meetings, and many were joined to the Lord. I pressed them to confess Christ before the world even before I had found it in the Word, and every seeker or bewildered one that it has been my privilege to deal with in the years that have been mine to serve since then, has been urged to do this. ### Have We the Credentials? If not, Why Not? Pastor W. E. Moody, Zion, Ill.

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Our Lord Jesus said in John 10:37, 38, "If I do not the works of my Father, believe me not. But if I do, though ye believe not me, believe the works: that ye may know, and believe, that the Father is in me, and I in him."

Jesus had the credentials. It was manifest by His works that He came forth from God and that the Father that dwelt in Him did the works.

We also ought to be able to show our credentials; and to prove to this gainsaying world that Christ is working through us as the Father worked through the Son. In fact, our scriptural attitude to the world should be: "If I do not the works of Christ, believe me not. But if I do, though ye believe not me, believe the works, that ye may know and believe that Christ is in me and I in Him."

To some, this may seem to border on presumption, but what did Jesus mean when He said in John 14:12, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do, because I go unto my Father"? these words are not true, then they are among the most tantalizing words that our Lord ever uttered; and in seeking their fulfillment, we are on a false track and are doomed to disappointment. But, if they are true, (and they are) then they offer to us marvelous possibilities.

What did Jesus mean when He said in John 17:18, "As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world"? And again in John 20: 21, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you"? Surely Jesus said what He meant and meant what He said.

When any minister, unknown to us, appears at our assemblies with a desire to preach, we as pastors are on safe ground in asking him if he has credentials to show; and if not, we hesitate in giving him the platform. Just so the people to whom we would minister have a right to demand our credentials. And not only do men expect this of us, but God also expects that as workers for and with Him we should be able to present scriptural credentials.

Any careful reader of the New Testament can easily see that again and again Christ appealed to His works as confirmation that He was sent of God. In John 14:10,11, Jesus said to Philip, "Believest thou not that I am in the Father and the Father in me? the words that I speak unto you I speak not of (from) myself; but the Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father in me; or else believe me for the very works' sake."

I am safe within scriptural bounds when I say that we ought to face the doubter with the challenge, "Believe me that I

am in Christ and Christ in me: or else believe me for the very works' sake." When John the Baptist, from behind prison bars, sent two of his disciples with the question, "Art thou he that should come, or do we look for another (Matt. 11:2-5)?" He said, "Go and shew John again those things which ye do hear and see: The blind receive their sight and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached unto them."

It is clear that John was satisfied with the credentials and his doubtings ceased,

In that marvelous sermon on the Day of Pentecost, Peter, under the inspiration of the Spirit, says, "Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know." Acts 2:22. It is our privilege also to be approved of God by "miracles, wonders and signs." And in his sermon in the house of Cornelius (Acts 10:38) Peter says "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil: for God was with him." It is surely our privilege to be so anointed with the Holy Ghost and with power that we may do His works over again and greater works than these. John 14:12

In Romans 15:18, 19, Paul says that the Gentiles were made obedient "by word and deed, through mighty signs and wonders by the power of the Spirit of God." And in our day thousands who are now unbelieving and rebellious will be made to

gether they prayed with one accord: "And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto thy servants that with all boldness they may speak thy word, by stretching forth thine hand to heal.

When the Lord stretched forth His hand to heal, they became bold to declare the Word of God. And to-day, when signs and wonders follow our ministry, it gives us great boldness in preaching the Word, And why? Because we know, and others know too, that God is working with us confirming the Word with signs following. And such preaching and such results are directly in the order of God.

It is our privilege to have tangible proof that God is with us. The striking words of Acts 3:9, 10 should be a constant experience with us in our work. "And all the people saw him walking and praising God . . . and they were filled with wonder and amazement at that which had happened to him." And, moreover, when God thus works with us it closes the mouths of the gainsayers. "And beholding the man which was healed standing with them, they could say nothing against it." Acts 4:14. With the apostles, evangelists, elders, and deacons of the early church, it was the usual thing to witness the miraculous power of God in their work. "And by the hands of the apostles were many signs and wonders wrought among the people. . . . Insomuch that they brought forth the sick into the streets and laid them on beds and couches that at least the shadow of Peter passing by might overshadow some of them." Acts 5:12-16. Peter was so charged with power that his very shadow brought healing to the people. And note verse 16 "they were healed every one."

In this day many consider it marvelous if a tenth of those they pray for are healed. "And Stephen, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people." Acts 6:8. Stephen was but a deacon, but God wrought marvelous works through him. The secret was, he was full of faith and power. "And the people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Philip spake hearing and seeing the miracles which he did." Acts 8:5-8. And the people to-day are giving heed to the words of those who have the signs following.

"Long time therefore abode they speaking boldly in the Lord, which gave testimony unto the word of his grace and granted signs and wonders to be done by their hands." Acts 14:3. "And God wrought special miracles by the hands of Paul: So that from his body were brought unto the sick handkerchiefs or aprons and the diseases departed from them, and the evil spirits went out of them." Acts 19: 11, 12. There was need for special miracles in Ephesus, for there was strong and bitter opposition to the truth. And surely if there ever was a time in the history of the church when special miracles

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were needed it is to-day. In the face of the onrush of Spiritism, Christian Science, Evolution, Modernism, the denial of the supernatural, and increasing apostasy, we need the mighty working of God in special miracles. We need God-given apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers who, mightily empowered by the gifts and graces of the Spirit, will be able not only to "hold their own," but also to "carry the war into the enemy's country," and snatch men and women from the hands of the destroyer. And to do this, miracles must become as common as in apostolic days.

In the Saviour's last commission, (Mark 16:17, 18) He said: "And these signs shall follow them that believe: In my name shall they cast out devils... they shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover." And verse 20 tells us, "They went forth and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word with signs following." Can we show scriptural credentials? If not, why not?

In Luke 9:1, we are told that Christ "gave the twelve disciples power and authority over all devils and to cure diseases." And in Luke 10:19, He said to the seventy, "Behold I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions and over all the power of the enemy." And surely He does not offer anything less to us, now that the Holy Spirit has been given to the church.

When the disciples failed to cast out the dumb spirit, and they asked Him privately "why could not we cast him out," He said unto them, "because of your unbelief"; and added, "This kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting." Matt. 17:19-21. It is faith that links us to God and enables us to do the impossible.

Mark 10:27 says that "with God all things are possible." One writer in the "Sunday School Times" of July 2, 1927 says this passage "does not mean only that to God's power all things are possible, or that God can do everything. word translated 'with' is 'para' which means 'along with!' This is the same word compounded to make up the principal name of the Holy Spirit of God in the New Testament in connection with believers, namely 'para-kletos', or one called to be along with, translated 'Comforter' or 'Advocate.' (Scofield in his footnote on John 14:16 has it 'Gr. Parakletos, one called alongside to help.' Translated 'Advocate,' John 2:1, Christ is the believers' Paraclete with the Father when he sins; the Holy Spirit the believers' indwelling Paraclete to help his ignorance and infirmity and to make intercession). Thus the full meaning of the last clause of Mark 10:27 is along with God all things are possible."

At Nazareth even Jesus Himself could not do many mighty works because of unbelief. See Mark 6:5, 6. We must have faith. Indeed, in Mark 11:22 (Margin) we are told to "have the faith of God." Wherever God finds **His** faith, there He supernaturally works.

Where are our credentials? May God help us to shake ourselves from our lethargy and seek that equipment which He is only too ready to bestow upon the humble, believing heart!

#### "THESE SIGNS SHALL FOLLOW"

"And Jesus went forth, and saw a great multitude and was moved with compassion toward them, and he healed the sick.' Matt. 14:14. He had compassion on those who were being destroyed by the power of the enemy. Jesus' heart is still compassionate to those who are the slaves of the enemy. His heart of compassion, bowels of mercy and desire to release the oppressed have not changed. And He says to His disciples: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. . And these signs shall follow them that believe: In my name shall they cast out devils." That is a part of the compassionate work of Jesus Christ. He had compassion upon the multitude because they were hungry. How much more His compassion on the individual under the control and under the dominion of Satan and his

"These signs shall follow them that believe." Why are there no more signs? There would be if there was more believing. There is too much belief in the evil spirits and too little belief in the Lord Jesus Christ. Our eyes are on the visible, the results we see, on the possessed ones. And our eyes are not on the Lord Jesus Christ.

And He differentiates. He says, "This kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting." He knows them all—every class of demons. There is this kind and that kind and the other kind. There are the cruel ones, throwing down the boy; there are the knowing ones, "Thou art the Son of God"; and there are the fearful ones, "Art thou come to destroy us?" and there are those who go in herds, congregating together, who are legions. And they went out of the man and filled and possessed about two thousand swine. He knows them all, this kind and that kind. Consult Him on every case and concerning every kind and He will give you wisdom as to how to act, when to fast, when to pray and what to do.

There must be unity of action, oneness of purpose, pureness of heart and cooperation of heaven and earth. "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth," Jesus said to the father of the possessed boy. He said, "Lord, I believe: help thou mine unbelief." The father answered for the helpless son.

Christ reproved the disciples, "O faithless generation! How long shall I be with you? How shall I suffer you?" And He says it truthfully anl sorrowfully to-day to His disciples of this generation with centuries of experience behind them. The disciples tried to cast out the demon and failed. Many of the modern disciples do not even try. Better to try and fail than not to try at all. Failure will only drive you to the Lord more. "Why could not we cast him out?" Know the cause.

Jesus wants to show His compassion today toward those who are led captive by Satan against their will. And He does it and wants to do it through His believers. "These signs shall follow them that believe: In my name shall they cast out devils. Through the Name which is rejected on earth, magnified in heaven and held in abhorrence in hell! Use the heavenly Name against the denizens of hell in the bodies of men on earth. Bring heaven against hell on earth. You have a great privilege, a great honor; do not neglect it.

Get familiar with Him who bears the Name, and use it not as a name but as His Name, showing forth His nature, His power, His might and His glory. In My Name! The Name which is above every name! At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, of things in heaven, and things on earth, and things under the earth, and every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

#### HOW YOU CAN BE FILLED WITH THE SPIRIT

The ability of the Lord Jesus to give is limited only by your capacity to receive. Enlarge your borders. Bring in all the vessels that the oil may not fail. The Lord has special seasons for refilling. He has His, set times for refreshing. The oil flows, flows, flows. Fresh oil flowing down from the head to the skirt. Psalm 133. Don't be afraid of having your garments drenched. Down to the skirt—your everyday walk—your feet.

"Upon whom thou shalt see the Spirit descending and remaining." Death upon the cross did not take the Spirit from the Son. "Upon whom thou shalt see the Spirit descending and remaining on him, the same is he which baptized with the Holy Ghost." John 1:33. The Holy Ghost from the Holy Father, through the Holy Son, upon a holy vessel cleansed by the holy Blood. The holy Blood can make you holy, as an abode for the Holy Spirit. Introspection of yourself does not cleanse; you are cleansed by the Blood. Rather make inspection of the Word, and the Word tells what the Blood does.

The Blood cleanses from all sin, that the Spirit may fill all. Every crevice is cleansed. Moses put the blood on the outside of the high priest's ear. Christ puts the Blood within, and then puts the oil where the Blood has cleansed.

The work of the Blood is invisible. The work of the Holy Spirit is ofttimes as unconscious to the individual, but is none the less effective. God wants to make the filling just as effective as the cleansing. Give heed to the command, "Be filled with the Spirit." Eph. 5:18.

### READY FOR BOTH

It is said that an old Roman coin bore the figure of an ox standing midway between an altar and a plough. Underneath were the words, "Ready for either." But the Christian might write under such a figure, "Ready for both," for that is ever the spirit of the true believer. In Rom. 12:1 Paul writes: "I beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." The highest and best service we can render the Lord Jesus Christ can only be rendered after we have presented our bodies, our very selves. to Him as a living sacrifice.

## A Letter to One Recently Baptized in the Holy Spirit

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Dear Friend:

It has given me the greatest joy to receive your letter telling how the Lord has graciously baptized you in the Holy Spirit according to the promise of the Father (Acts 1:4 and 2:39), and that you received the Scriptural evidence of this glorious experience in that you spoke with other tongues as the Spirit gave you utterance (Acts 2:4; 10:46; and 19:6). It is yet another proof that "every one that asketh receiveth." Luke 11:10. Hallelujah!

You have passed another, and a momentous milestone in your Christian experience, and I feel constrained to write a few lines of loving counsel just now concerning your future walk and further progress.

The joy which is filling your heart because you have now "received" that for which you prayed and longed and waited may for the moment make you feel like one who would rest upon his oars after winning the race; but I would urge you to remember that this enduement of power from on high is not a goal but a gateway. You have not achieved an end—you have come to a beginning.

Failure to grasp this tremendously important truth may mean the almost complete failure of the divine purpose in His thus having blessed you; for though the Holy Spirit has come to you in all His fullness this does not alter the fact that He needs the willing, believing, and intelligent co-operation of all that is within you to achieve God's plan concerning your life and work as a believer.

Having "received" the Spirit (Gal. 3:2, 5,14), it is now your business to "walk" in the Spirit. Gal. 5:16-26. It is not necessary that I should write in detail here of all such a "walk" implies and demands. You will find this "walking" described in Eph. chaps. 4, 5 and 6. My principal purpose at the moment is to urge upon you this one essential truth—that you should "GO ON." You have received the Holy Spirit that you should progress in personal holiness, and in power for service.

Do not get taken up too much with personal feelings and ecstacies. To be filled with the Spirit of God necessarily implies that you will receive an abundant share of these tokens of His love and favor, and as He bestows them upon you receive them with all gratitude and yield-edness, for they are probably intended to strengthen you against future persecution and trials. Do not be afraid to drink of this heavenly "new wine" of the kingdom.

Nevertheless be careful not to demand and clamor for continual ecstacy of feelings if the Lord sees fit to slightly withdraw or hold them. Especially, and above all, do not attempt to fill their place by trying to work up that which is artificial. Wait upon the Lord continually. In His own good time He will grant you such manifestations of His presence as are best in His sight.

Many believers when they first receive the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, and with it what may very probably be their first experience of God's supernatural power and touch, want to henceforth live entirely by and in the supernatural as it were. They want to get supernatural guidance for even the little details of their daily life; they want all their spiritual nourishment whether in the assembly or in private to come by supernatural means-by gifts, visions, revelations, etc. Now as a matter of fact the child of God does live a supernatural life by supernatural means in the very deepest sense of the word, for the believer is drawing his life from Christ every moment. But much of this may be unconscious to the senses. It is the declared purpose of God that the "just shall live by faith" (Rom. 1:17), and that we shall "walk by faith and not by sight." 2 Cor. 5:7. The Lord will therefore graciously see to it that His children continue to walk by faith, even though baptized in His Spirit; and if they begin to lean too much upon the continual supernatural working of His power in their lives it may be in highest wisdom that He will withdraw such working for a time. The lives of His greatest saints in the Bible are a remarkable blending of the supernatural and the natural, the miraculous and the very ordinary.

Especially seek therefore to become established in the Scriptures. Therein you will find the true nourishment for the life of faith: and therein you will find that which will balance you regarding your supernatural experiences of God's favor, and thus save you from those fanatical excesses which have marred so many testimonies to the reality of the supernatural in the experience of God's children.

Expect some spiritual gift to be granted to you, for the "manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal." 1 Cor. 12:7. Especially seek humility where these things are concerned. Rom. 12:3-6. If you receive these gifts of tongues or of prophecy, then make it your business to thoroughly master and always to strictly observe the rules laid down for the exercise of these gifts in 1 Cor. 14. Remember to "covet earnestly the best gifts," and that in the use of spiritual gifts you will always be called upon to exercise faith, and to work in willing and intelligent co-operation with the Spirit of God. Sometimes it must be your part to "stir up the gift" within you (2 Tim. 1:6): on other occasions you must exercise self-control to the point of keeping silence, 1 Cor. 14:28-30. The Golden Rule in such matters is in regard to that which will build up the greatest number in the best possible way. 1 Cor. 14:26. In these things always "obey them that have the rule over you" (Heb. 13:17), even though at the moment you may question their decision. Lawlessness never glorifies God or proceeds from His Spirit. A conscientious objection can always be acted upon in a lawful manner and with a gracious spirit.

Seek fellowship where you will find a real spiritual home and real spiritual food; where you will enjoy true spiritual liberty and not continually be compelled to quench the Holy Spirit; while at the same time you must keep an eye upon opportunities for general Christian service. Decision here must be a personal matter for you to decide for yourself, but if you ask wisdom from God He will give it to you, Jas. 1:5.

One final word; -always remember that "the way of the cross leads home." You will find that the greatest power, the greatest liberty, yes-and the greatest joy too, will come into your Pentecostal experience as you walk in the way of the cross. By this I mean a real personal crucifixion of self, so that to all that constitutes your self-life-its ambitions, its affections, its antipathies-you "die daily." Your calling now is that out of you shall "flow rivers of living water" (John 7:38); but the measure of this flowing out will principally depend upon the measure of your own brokenness, combined with the measure of His continual flowing in.

Receiving the Baptism of the Holy Spirit does not automatically guarantee a life of power and victory and blessing, though it does make the utmost provision for it. But to achieve such a life the laws of all Christian living must be observed; and one of the chiefest is this—"If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me."

#### THE PALESTINE EARTHQUAKE

Miss Laura Radford writes to us from Jerusalem, July 13: "You know of the terrible earthquake that occurred Monday. News comes from Salt that none of our brethren were injured, but nearly all the houses are a complete wreck. Our building here in Jerusalem is badly cracked, but no serious damage. But the awful roar that came with the quake is something never to be forgotten. It was truly as a roar from God's judgment throne. Over 400 deaths are thus far reported in Palestine, nearly all Moslems, which is a matter of real comment to-day.

"The earthquake originated in the vicinity of the Dead Sea, and the Mount of Olives was badly shaken, Government House being badly damaged and the Hebrew University nearly a complete wreck. The Mosque of Omar in Jerusalem is badly damaged. Men are thinking, and we must continue to preach the Full Gospel in this city."

One of these tracts quoted Christ, "I said ye are gods." And again, "You can heal all your ills, overcome all conditions of adversity, and bring yourself into a state of serene happiness. This consciousness is the heritage of all men, and it does not make any difference whether you are a Christian, infidel, or pagan." When the reaping time comes, and we find ourselves in glory, that child for whom we prayed will be found there! That aged cripple whom we met incidentally on the road, and to whom we spoke, will be in Heaven. That person in consumption whom we visited every day for a long time, and who gave little or no heed at all to what we had to say, will be found in glory, having at last laid to heart what we spoke so many times to him, and though we had no information about it, God blessed our word. Oh, the multitude of instances we shall find at last when our work, labor, or service has, contrary to natural expectation, been blessed!

I was once standing here about sixty-two years ago, preaching the Word of Life, and after I was through I was cast down because my words seemed to me so cold, so dull, so lifeless. Not till three months after did I hear that through that very address abundant blessing had been brought to nineteen different persons.

But let us carefully see to it that when the reaping time comes there will be something to reap because we have been laboring. If there be no labor, if there be a careless, thoughtless walk, without prayer and crying to God mightily, then let us not be surprised if when the harvest time comes there is no reaping as far as we are concerned. But as assuredly as there has been the crying mightily to God, as there has been the sowing, as there has been the laying out of ourselves for God, most assuredly we shall reap.

#### A CHARIOT OF FIRE

Aunt Sally was an old negress, who lived a few miles from Nashville, Tenn. She was quite old, and had been a slave in her youth. Her husband and children were dead, and she lived alone in a little tumble-down shanty near the edge of a forest. She was widely known as a nurse, and also took in washing, and so managed to earn enough to live very well; "for," she said, "an old darkey like me don't need much to carry dem 'trugh dis low ground of sorrow." She was very pious, and her hymns and testimonies were an inspiration in the revival meetings that were held in the little log house near her home.

Aunt Sally's greatest desire, so she said, was to be carried to heaven in a chariot of fire. "Such a thing was quite possible," so she said; "for wasn't Elijah carried to heaven in a chariot of fire? and wasn't Enoch translated? and who knew where Moses was buried? Dey was all taken to heaven in a chariot of fire, and so will I be, de Lawd willin'; mark dat, chilluns." She would also say, tossing her arms aloft: "I knows I'se pore and ignorant, but dat has been my prayer all my life. 'Spose anything is unpossible with God? Wait and see." Aunt Sally's whole life had been spent in the little town where she lived, and her face was as familiar to its inhabitants as the rocks and trees by the roadside. But her oft-repeated prophecy was to be literally fulfilled, and the place that had known her so long was to know her no more.

A meeting was held in the little log hut near Aunt Sally's home one evening in August. The house was crowded, and the hymns and testimonies of the dusky-faced children of a long-despised race were very inspiring. Several white people, young men and women, were present, and they listened half-fearfully, half-derisively, to what was said and sung. At last Aunt Sally rose, and every eye was turned upon her face. "Chilluns," she said, "I am old, and my work is almost done, my prayers are almost ended, and I am looking for the coming of my Lawd and Master. What do you think, chilluns, is the sweetest sound I ever heard? It is the sound of chariot wheels that are rolling over the mountains! I hear dem in my work during de day, and in my dreams at night. Dey is almost here. Sisters, chilluns, I shall be carried to heaven in a chariot of fire!" tossing her arms wildly on high-"in a chariot of fire! Mark dat, chilluns!" and she sat down. A feeling of awe crept over the assembly, and the white ladies looked fearfully at each other. The meeting was dismissed, and they all walked thoughtfully home beneath the bright light of the southern stars.

That night a fearful storm arose. The lightning flashed, and the thunder rolled in awful grandeur. Tom Oliver, Aunt Sally's nearest neighbor, arose and looked from the window. "I suppose Aunt Sally is awake, singing her jubilee hymns: 'G'wine to ride up in a chariot in de morning'; that's what she sings," he said. The storm soon ceased, and he and his wife lay down once more and had fallen asleep,

when Mrs. Oliver woke her husband with a scream: "Look out the window," she cried; "Aunt Sally's house is on fire!" They ran over to where the burning building stood. Several negroes stood around, looking helplessly on. "Bress de Lawd!" an aged negro cried; "de angels are all about us! Dey have taken Aunt Sally to heaven in a chariot of fire."

## ON SHORE OF KOKO NOR, TIBET Victor Plymire

The following brief word has been received from our Brother Plymire, whose letter has June 14 stamped upon it:—
"Thus far our journeying has been without much difficulty. We crossed one snow-covered pass at an altitude of 13,100 feet. Four of my animals have given out, and it seems that I shall lose a few more, the grass has been very poor so far. We rested here for two days. I have suffered constantly from rheumatism, but yesterday the Lord so graciously heard my humble and unworthy cry, and delivered me almost entirely; I am expecting complete deliverance.

"I am all alone and have to fight my battles alone, but He is with me, my ever blessed Lord and Saviour. He will never leave me—blessed be His holy, worthy name forever!

"I have met a good number of Tibetans, and have given them the gospel message. Some twelve of their tents are within a short distance of my tent now. This is sent back by a messenger; I may be able to send one more note." Brother Plymire is endeavoring to get out of China by way of Tibet, and expects to reach India some time in October. Do not forget to pray for him in his journeyings, over these almost untrodden paths, untrodden so far as the gospel is concerned.

But we need patience. Seed must first be planted, then watered, and even then you have to wait for the fruit. First the blade, then the ear, then the full corn in the ear.



#### RESULTS OF THE EARTHQUAKE

July 18, 1927

I have just returned from Salt, Transjordania, where I went to see the results of the earthquake that occurred on the 11th inst., and of the lighter shocks that have been occurring several times daily since Monday. The miracle is that any one in our part of the town escaped. We praise God that none of the people of our mission were killed, although three women were badly injured. One lad was found buried to the neck in ruins, and when taken out seemed in a dying condition, but the next morning found him perfectly recovered. One wee baby was found quite unhurt under the ruins of the house as three large stones had fallen around him in such a way as to protect him completely from the falling roof. But the death rate in the town has been very heavy. Not far from our mission bungalow, which is a complete wreck, three families of 22 persons were killed. walls of our bungalow did not fall, although they are so damaged that they must be pulled down before being rebuilt, and so but little of our furniture was destroyed. The boys' school is a complete wreck, and the landlord is so poor that unless we can give him the rent for next year, although it is not due until October, he will not be able to rebuild the house. There are 22,000 people in Salt, and it is estimated that not less than 18,000 are left homeless. One man who owned 18 houses lost them all and is now living out in a cave on the mountain side. A new house near by our bungalow was completed last week and as it did not seem seriously damaged our native pastor took it as a shelter for us. We slept there two nights but after the sharp shock we had yesterday morning, he did not feel it safe for us to stay in it last night and his decision was a wise one, for during the night large stones from the ceiling fell in one of the sleeping rooms and some one would have been injured had we been sleeping there. We accepted the hospitality of one of the native brethren for the night and, taking with us our mat-(Continued on Page Fifteen)

#### AMONG INDIA'S LEPERS

On June the ninth, we had a most precious baptismal service at the Leper Home, at which time six of the dear lepers and another man in our midst, took the step that means separation and isolation.

For se long a time we have seen conviction—marked, pungent conviction, upon the faces of a number, and it has all helped us to believe our God. Our dear

Indian helpers have sought to do their part and Saul, the one we have put over the lepers, especially, has gone right after things and has prayerfully endeavored to bring them to a point of decision, in the meetings he has had with them, and one day came to us saving there were two at least, that were ready to take the step. Then as the day approached, we were made so happy as we saw others making their decisions, until at last there were seven, in all,

who had made an open confession!

A widow has for so long a time been on the point of deciding for Christ, but because of relatives she really hardly dared, for they threatened her, and it is so impossible for us who have never known of these persecutions, to at all comprehend the conflict. But at last the Spirit won His way and she voluntarily went to her village, told her friends and relatives of what she was about to do, and on the date above mentioned, followed her Lord in baptism, thus' separating herself forever, from caste and relations. We have given her the name of Naomi, for she has most truly left her own "country" to follow in the footsteps which the God of Israel shall make known to her. Quiet, deep, real, has been the joy of this dear woman, and as we watch her come into the meetings and sit down on the floor, placing her poor stumps of hands (no fingers) up to her eyes in prayer before the beginning of the service-well, our hearts are just a bit full! Then we must tell vou of the man to

whom we have given the name Simon. For such a long time his face has been fairly another than the change we knew had taken place in his heart. He some time ago asked that we baptize him, but we wish to await God's time. Now as the day approached the light in his face grew brighter, and he spoke with such feeling of being a disciple of the Lord Jesus. He had been caring for another some larger who is a great sufferer, and

who was of the same caste as he, the carpenter caste. This latter man was so very ill and seemed so far from making any decision, that when he suddenly said one day that he, too, wanted to follow Jesus, we were almost taken off our feet! Oh, how we were reminded of the word that tells us of the God who doeth marvels, for this was certainly nothing short of that very thing. We were also brought face to face with the fact that we had been a bit like the people who prayed for Peter when he was shut up in prison and we felt to bow low before the Lord! PRAISE?? Ah, yes, we were almost too full for utterance! And all of a sudden, there was such a change in the carpenter! He has such a very bad arm that dear Miss Dutton is so faithfully and lovingly cleansing and dressing, daily and part of the time twice a day, that we wondered how he could manifest such desires, BUT GOD!!

And now a word or two about Dayal (which means "mercy" and is a very good, Christian name here in India). He is one

of the very first ones who came to us when we had no Home, and lived under a tree while we were making bricks and just beginning things. Quietly has he listened, taking in the truths of the gospel all these more than three years and now when the day for the baptism had come, he proclaimed himself as one who desired baptism, and he is just one of those steady souls whom we feel will go right on living the life he professes. Do

please pray for

Next is Thomas, for this is the name we have given him at his baptism. Again, God has given us a real surprise. He seemed such an impossible case - so full of his old ways and seemingly with no desire to ever be anything but a heathen if only he might stay at the Home and be cared for, with his wife and one little boy of about three. One day one of our number said, "Oh, it isn't too much to ask God for Ner-

hu" (his old name). And when we learned that he, too, despite the fact of his having a very naughty, troublesome wife, had decided to be a follower of Jesus of Nazareth, our heart was full indeed. And oh, the change that has come! He really is a new man in Christ Jesus and we can but praise and rejoice. And what was our amazement, at the very last to have his wife, who has caused so much trouble by her quarrelsome ways, also take her place by the side of her husband and receive baptism. We felt a bit uncertain about the step, but felt we hardly dare forbid her, as it is of course the thing for an Indian woman to do,-go with her husband, so we feel she at least has broken away from heathenism and that since she lives right there in the Home, we have every opportunity of teaching her and helping her to be a real Christian, Will you please take this dear woman especially upon your heart, asking God to do a real work of grace in her heart?

Some few weeks, or perhaps months ago, one day a poor paralytic appeared,

having gotten some men to bring him in an ox-cart from his village, where he had been cast out of his home as he was helpless. His stroke had come quite suddenly at the last, and he was left with no one to care for him, so having heard that we were "merciful" he asked to be brought to us. Accordingly, he was dropped off in front of our place (the mission home) but across the street, so that he was there a day ere we knew it, as of course there are many beggars and passers-by through the day. Finally we found him, and at first thought him to be crazy, but upon further inquiry, found him to be a poor paralytic, unable to walk and only with difficulty, to be able to move at all. He told us why he had come, but we said we could not keep him, that our work was among the lepers, but, like the widow who refused to leave the judge till her case was settled, so this poor man simply would not leave, saying he was looking to us for help as he had heard we cared for the poor and helpless. Who could turn a deaf ear to such a pitiful case, and although we really did not know where to put him at first, Harry said he would make a way someway; his heart is far too tender to do otherwise!

Accordingly, a grass hut was quickly made on the grounds of the Leper Home, and the poor man was given a place to stay. Of course, he was too helpless to get to the chapel, and I found myself wondering HOW he would ever be gotten ready to meet the Lord. He was very ill part of the time and it was pitiful to see his sufferings. BUT when our Indian brother Saul was getting the candidates ready for baptism, this poor paralytic said he, too, wanted to become a Christian! Surely, we thought, he does not understand (he had of course been ministered to spiritually in his hut) and when we suggested that he wait at least till Christmas, feeling he might be more ready, he said, "I may not be here at Christmas and I want to become one of you now." When asked if he really understood what it meant to become a Christian, he replied that he did, therefore we could not refuse him and oh, what a happy time it was to see him receive baptism, and he has been so happy since.

#### RESULTS OF THE EARTHQUAKE

tresses and blankets, slept out of doors on the ground with all the other refugees. It was a warm night, and the stars were beautiful, but the "pariah" dogs and the stray cats were curious visitors all night long. As I lay there with our Bible woman in that friendly dooryard, not far from the roadway, I thought of the many people in India who had in those famine years come into the large towns to find food, and had no sleeping place but the edge of the footpath. I have seen roadways lined for many blocks with these silent sleepers, and I found myself in a like crowd last night and lay down with a thankful heart saying, "Lord, I thank you for this safe shelter." Just as I was ready to lie down, some one came saying, "Will you pray for that man yonder? He has been sick with fever for several days." So I went over and pray-ed for him and for another man also who was sick. What a wonderful Saviour we have! When I saw the city such a complete wreck I wondered if the Lord meant our work to be closed there, because oftentimes a city so completely destroyed is never rebuilt again; but I could not find one of our people who wants to leave Salt; they beg us to help them build a shelter for their families and their animals during the coming winter. During the summer they will live in booths and tents in their vineyards, but in October they must come back into town that their children may be in school again. But where can they live and where can we have a school? The problem before us seems an impossible one, and as I have prayed and prayed about it, the only way seems to be to ask for money with which to build a school that will do also as a mission hall. There is a cleared plot of land that we can buy for perhaps \$1,000, large enough to build a school on and with space where we could permit a few families to pitch their Arab tents for the winter. But to think of their living in a tent when the winter's snow may be a meter (more than 3 feet) deep! For \$2,500 we could build a row of temporary barracks that would shelter several families. Our school will cost about \$1,500. Nearly all these people are very poor. During the war they lost everything, but during these years of peace they have bravely struggled on, building up their houses and their vineyards that were destroyed by the Turks and for a year past have been so happy in the thought of being formed into a Protestant mission. And now they have been left homeless. So I plead for the money with which to buy the land and build them a mission hall and school, and also, if possible, some barracks that can be used as a shelter for a few of the poorest families during the winter. Have you ever seen a flourishing town shaken to pieces in the space of half a minute? Yet this is what has happened to Salt. And on behalf of these our brethren there I am pleading for your help. We need five thousand dollars at once. Will you help to send it?—Laura Radford

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
