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MAN is given courage to go among strangers, breast opposition, and overcome indifference to the cause which he represents, if he has with him

proper credentials, a letter of introduction from some one in a position of undoubted pre-eminence.

He presents his testimonials, holds up his head, and looks everybody square in the eye.

More and more we, as workers together with God, are beginning to realize that the ministry of healing, exercised in the power of the Holy Spirit, is a God-appointed letter of introduction to a gainsaying generation. It is an "Open Sesame" before which barriers melt away, bolts shoot back, and doors long barred fly open.

When God bears witness with signs and wonders you are not asked for references.

The only question is, "How long can you stay?" or, if you are compelled to leave, "How soon will you return?"

Not long ago an evangelist stopped over between trains in a strange city, and upon being asked to preach, spoke on "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today and forever," and prayed for the sick. A man, well known locally as a hopeless cripple, was healed, and hearts and homes flew open immediately. That evangelist needed no further introduction in that city.

Some time ago Dr. Finis E. Yoakum, who used to live in Los Angeles but changed his address to "Heaven" a few years since, came to hold a campaign in a town where he was a stranger to everybody. Some of the best people there were inclined to be exceedingly conservative about countenancing or supporting him.

But he had not left his credentials behind him, and before long a man who had been deaf from childhood, or early youth - following scarlet fever-received his hearing so he said he believed he could almost hear the grass grow. I was there and can personally testify as to the genuineness of the case, and also as to the permanence of the cure.

Then a messenger boy who was suffering from inguinal hernia was healed, and a young lady who was brought a distance to the meeting, looking like a lily with a broken stem. suddenly bloomed out like a rose and plunged at once into the thick of work for the Master.

A brother who had stood aloof from the campaign was meditating on these, and other similar happenings, when the Holy Spirit called his attention to these THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL



words in the twenty-second verse of the second chapter of Acts:

"A man approved of God among you by miracles, and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know."

As a result of this he called upon Dr. Yoakum and expressed his regret at the attitude which he had assumed towards him and his work, and turned right about face. He recognized his credentials.

As ambassadors for Christ we are accredited, but only as we faithfully deliver the definite message committed to us. To this end we must be filled with the knowledge of God's will concerning our bodies, filled so full that there is no room for human opinions and reasonings.

There must be absolute certainty in our note as we sound forth the trumpet of jubilee and proclaim liberty to the captives of sin and sickness throughout the land.

As a child I used to watch the cavalry drill, where orders were all given by the bugle. (My father was a surgeon in the United States army.)

Both men and horses-the latter seemed to know the drill as well, if not better, than their owners-responded with accuracy and promptitude as long as the orders were given with accuracy and precision; but when the bugler failed to "do his stuff" right, absolute demoralization resulted.

"If the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" 1 Cor. 14:8.

And it is a real battle, a "good fight of faith" in which we are engaged.

It is always God's will to save and heal, "Who healeth all thy diseases." He is not willing that any should perish. "By whose s healed." 1 Peter 2:24. "By whose stripes ye were

There can be no uncertainty about our message if we speak as we are commanded, "as the oracles of God."

Do not, I implore you, go to pray with a sick one for healing, pressing them out on the promises of God, which cannot fail if we will only release Omnipotence by believing them, and after prayer join in a discussion as to whether they had better wear a black or white dress to be buried in ! To such a pass have things come in some quarters.

Listen to the clarion call of the Scriptures summoning all who thirst, all who are burdened: "Ho, every one that thirsteth, . . . Come ye." "Come unto Me all ye that . are heavy laden and I will give you rest." Echo the message clearly and sweetly and you will see them coming.

Make the message so plain that no one, no matter how sick and sinful, may have any excuse for delay or doubt.

Never forget how all important it is that you should blow the right command, the "Thus saith the Lord" through your bugle.

In the year 1896 a terrible collision occurred, just outside of New York City, between two express trains travelling at a terrific rate of speed. There was tremendous loss of life and the whole metropolis was plunged into gloom by the tragedy.

The engineer of one of the colliding trains lay dying, pinned under his engine. He was in awful agony, blood spouting from his head, tears raining down his face, but he seemed almost unconscious of his condition, desperate as it was. He spent all his ebbing strength trying to draw the attention of pitying bystanders to a scrap of yellow paper which he held tightly clutched in his hand.

"This shows that some one gave me the wrong orders," he gasped as his life passed away.

Don't let any one be able to say that you failed to give them the right orders, to declare unto them the whole council of God.

For ages men have grappled with the problem of disease; for centuries they have sought a "Panacea" or cure-all for all the ills that flesh is heir to.

They have hunted it in earth, air, fire, and water. They have delved into the mineral kingdom in search of it, have extracted the juices of plants, the sap of trees, have dissected animals, studied gases, investigated the operation of various forces, such as light, electricity, etc., but all in vain.

You may ask, "Is it reasonable to expect one remedy to cure everything ?"

I think it perfectly logical, for a real remedy would do nothing less than this.

A medicine that would effect a perfect cure of disease of the liver, for instance, would necessarily put every organ of your body into perfect working order, for the different organs, and systems of organs, which make up the

He attempts to disperse, and often succeeds in dispersing, the people of God. His object in so doing is that he may weaken them. He knows there is power in union, and that if he can scatter them it will be easier for him to accomplish his purposes and overthrow them. Happy are the people who can say, "We are not ignorant of his devices."

Sometimes he tries to create a gulf between a faithful pastor and the people of the congregation to which that pastor ministers.

Sometimes he injects envy or jealousy or evil surmising into the minds or hearts of God's children.

Sometimes he instigates false reports which, if scattered, tend to destroy harmony and divide the saints.

Sometimes he promulgates false doctrine in order that he may precipitate a controversy and cause division. If he can introduce no worse doctrine he will bring somebody along who will preach that the saints will have to go through the tribulation, and he will convince a lot of them that it is true, and will make it appear that the teaching is well nigh fundamental.

Sometimes he endeavors-and succeeds in his endeavor-to drop a mantle of indifference down over some who have been awake and armed for the conflict and upon whose courage, consecration and continuance God has been counting.

Satan not only attempts to disperse, and often succeeds in dispersing, the people of God; he attempts to disperse, and sometimes succeeds in dispersing, the angelic legions commissioned by God to come to the help of THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL



God's praying people. Daniel prayed for three full weeks. At the end of that time there appeared unto him one whose "body was like the beryl, and his face as the appearance of lightning, and his eyes as lamps of fire, and his arms and his feet like in color to polished brass, and the voice of his words like the voice of a multitude." Daniel tells us that when he saw the vision he was alone, and there remained no strength in him, and his comeliness was turned into corruption. He had been fasting and praying for twenty-one days, and his visitor informed him that at the beginning of that time his prayer had been heard, and the messenger with a message from God had been dispatched from the courts of heaven. "From the first day that thou didst set thine heart to understand, and to chasten thyself before thy God, thy words were heard, and I am come for thy words. But the prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me one and twenty days: but, lo, Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me."

If Daniel had stopped praying at the end of a week, or at the end of twenty days, he might have been defeated; the answer might never have reached him. But he prayed on, cooperating with God and the messenger God had dispatched, and the enemy was defeated. Angels are God's messengers; they have been appointed to minister unto the heirs of salvation; and there are reasons to believe that often Satan succeeds in dispersing these angelic legions that have been commissioned to come to the rescue of praying saints. He succeeds for the reason that the saints fail to hold on in earnest, importunate, prevailing prayer.

We are informed what attitude we should assume, what course we should pursue, in view of the fact that the disperser is come up before our face.

We should keep the munition. God has provided us with weapons, and they are not carnal; they are spiritual, and mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds. The munition we should keep is the munition God has provided, not the munition we may have manufactured. It may have looked foolish to some of the people for David to discard Saul's armor and to go forth to meet Goliath with

a shepherd's sling and five smooth stones that he had picked up out of the bed of the brook; but if he had gone in Saul's armor the giant would doubtless have killed him. We often fail in a conflict with the enemy because we meet him in human armor,

armor of our own manufacture, instead of with "the weapons of war" our Captain has provided for us. "Keep the munition."

We should watch the way. What way? The way the enemy is likely to take, the way to our hearts. Watchfulness is repeatedly enjoined in God's Word. It is easier to fight than to watch. But if we recognize the importance, the necessity, of watching, it will not be so hard. A young man who was a soldier in the Philippines in the days when difficulty was being encountered in overthrowing the rebellion of Aguinaldo told me that he was assigned one evening to duty in a place where the night before a man had crept up on the guard and brutally murdered him. Several guards in fact had been murdered there. It was a very dangerous post, one of the outposts, and not far from the enemy's camp. The young man had no disposition to sleep that night. The rustle of the leaves startled him. Every time he saw a bush move he imagined that the form of a foe was creeping towards him. He was almost afraid to wink. His eyes were wide open all the time; he had no difficulty in keeping awake; every nerve was tense. But the night passed and nothing happened. How glad he was when the morning came, and he was relieved! No enemy had appeared, but if one had appeared he would have found the young man ready, for all through that never-to-be-forgotten night the young man was watching, his gun in his hand, and his finger on the trigger. The young man had kept the munition, and had watched.

We should make our loins strong. This is another way of saying that we should gird ourselves with strength, How can we do it? God is strong, and we can be strong only as by faith we appropriate His strength; and that strength we can appropriate by reading His Word until we become saturated therewith, and by waiting upon Him. Read Isa. 40:28-31.

We should fortify our power might-ily. Jesus said to the disciples, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." Did they receive it? They certainly did. And that power equipped them for service.

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Sudden Destruction Cometh

"And whereas thou sawest the feet and toes part of potter's clay and part of iron, the kingdom shall be divided; . . . and whereas thou sawest iron mixed with miry clay, they shall mingle themselves with the seed of men; but they shall not cleave one to another, even as iron is not mixed with clay. And in the days of these kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed: . . . but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever." Dan. 2:41-44.

Degeneracy is thus seen in the latter days. Man sees ascendency in the latter days. God and unregenerate man never saw alike.

Daniel saw what the magicians could not see and what the king did not see until it was explained to him. In the latter days the image was to be so deteriorated that the feet were to be iron and clay, though the head was gold. Evolution is not taught here. Devolution! In the last days the ten toes were to be of iron and clay. It was miry clay! That slippery clay! And the great image was supported by this deteriorated foundation.

When was it to be? In the latter days. Men don't see it. Why? Because they don't believe the Word and they won't take the trouble to inquire of it. Men take infinite pains to find out the secrets in the air, in the heavens, on the earth, in the sea, and under the earth; but as to the times and seasons and God's plans for the world, they don't take trouble. They are interested to find out about the construction of the earth, but not interested to find out what God says about the destruction of the earth and the kingdoms of the world.

When the kings are set up, are reigning, and the clay also is prominent, each seeking its place of pre-eminence to support the whole fabric, then the stone cut out of the mountain without hands (vs. 45) is to be cast down, and God will set up His kingdom. How will it fall? With sudden destruction. An avalanche gives but scant warning, and so there will be scant warning when God's avalanche falls. Why? Because there has been a warning for thousands of years.

The prevalence of clay in earthly governments is bringing a foreign element into world government. The lewdest of men in morals, in vision, in honesty, are trying to establish governments. This is a sure evidence that the miry clay has come into the feet of the world governments. It is the terminal of the image and it will be the terminal of man's endeavor to govern.

The loud boast of what these people can and will do is just the clay trying to oust the iron from the feet. They do not mix, and never will. The iron will stick into, penetrate, and irritate the clay. Man is proud of his efforts, but these efforts are to end in disaster.

The stone cut out without hands will be irresistible in its power of destruction and irresistible in its progress to fill the whole earth; but it cannot fill the earth until after the image has been destroyed.

When is it to be? When there is enough clay to fill up the necessary places in the toes and the feet. Is the clay increasing? Are governments be-coming more democratic? Watch Europe. Sometimes the clay is violent as in Russia. In other cases it is orderly as in Britain. But the clay will have to be dealt with, also the iron; and the Lord Himself, the Stone, the Rock of Offense, will smash, overthrow, grind to powder, the world empires, and Christ the true King shall reign. God will set up His kingdom. The contrast will be so great that words fail to describe it. Sufficient it is to say that God will give His Son a kingdom worthy of the God who gave it. Amen.

The Conversion of an Infidel A True Story

Peter Cartwright was at one time in West Tennessee and met a wealthy and popular practicing physician. At the close of a camp meeting Mr. Cartwright visited this doctor and had a talk with him. The doctor said to him, "Suppose you were called upon as a judge or juror to decide a case and there were five witnesses introduced, all of them honorable, high-minded men, whose veracity was never called in question; and suppose a matter in controversy were brought before you, and one of the witnesses deposed to the facts as stated by the plaintiff A, but the other four came forward and with equal clearness deposed to the facts as claimed by the defendant B. Now how would you decide the case? Would you not instantly decide that all the probabilities and all the possibilities were in favor of the four who deposed to the facts as stated by the defendants, and that the one lone witness who deposed to the facts claimed by the plaintiff must, to a certainty, be mistaken?"

Mr. Cartwright thought for a moment and replied, "It is altogether likely I should give judgment for the defendant B."

"Well now, Sir," said the doctor, "you contend that the Christian religion is an experimental fact. Man has five senses, namely, seeing, hearing, tasting, smelling, and feeling. Now, Sir,' said the doctor, "permit me to ask you a few solemn and serious questions. Did you ever see religion?" Mr. Cartwright an-swered, "No." "Did you ever hear religion?" "No." "Did you ever smell religion?" "No." "Did you ever taste religion?" "No." "Did you ever feel religion?" "Yes." "Now, then," said the doctor with apparent triumph, "I have proved beyond a doubt by four respectable witnesses that religion is not seen, heard, smelled, or tasted; and but one lone, solitary witness, namely, feeling, has testified that it is an experimental fact. The weight of evidence is overpowering, Sir, and you must give it up.'

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Mr. Cartwright was perplexed for a moment but then put this question, "Doctor, are you willing that your practice shall be tested by the same array of testimony as you have used to overthrow religion?" "Yes, Sir." "Well, Sir, you have had, and now have, a large and lucrative practice. You profess to have cured various diseases and to have relieved many pains, and you have amassed a princely for-tune by your practice." "All true," said the doctor. "Well, Sir, do you not know that you have been playing the hypocrite, and practicing a most wretched fraud on the gullibility of the people?" "No, Sir," replied the doctor fiercely. "Why, Doctor," said Mr. Cartwright, "a man of your profound science must know that there is no such thing as pain in the human system, though ignorant people have thought so. You have visited poor dupes who thought they were in great pain and have administered medicine to them thus persuading them that you, by your medical skill, had removed their pains. You charged them large bills, although you knew you were practicing a fraud on them, and getting their money under false pretense, for you certainly knew there was no such thing as pain." "I certainly know no such thing, Sir," said the doctor fiercely.

"Well, Doctor," said Mr. Cartwright, "I will ask you a few questions, wingin, 1 win ask you a rew questions, if you please, and I demand honest and prompt answers." "Very well, Sir," said the doctor. "Well, Sir, did you ever see a pain?" "No, Sir." "Did you ever hear a pain?" "No, Sir." "Did you ever smell a pain?" "No, Sir." "Did you ever taste a pain?" "No, Sir." "Did you ever feel a pain?" "Certainly I did." By this time Mr. Cartwright had well nigh taken the wind out of the doc-tor's sails. He continued, "Do not be alarmed, Doctor; four respectable witnesses have testified that there is no such thing as pain in the human system, and but one lone witness has deposed that there is; therefore the idea of there being pain in the physical system is fallacious, there is no reality in the thing, and you ought to go and restore the money you have taken from your patients and acknowledge the fraud you have practiced on them, doing so no more. I charge you, as an honest man, to do it, and quit those fraudulent practices."

Just at that moment the Lord, in a very powerful manner, blessed the wife of the doctor and she shouted aloud and blessed God for revealed religion. She ran and threw her arms about her husband's neck and exhorted him with streaming eyes and words that burned

to be reconciled to God. Mr. Cartwright suggested prayer and the doctor fell on his knees and wept like a child and prayed fervently. The great deep of his heart was broken up, his infidelity gave way, and, for the first time in his life, he wept and prayed. He fled to the woods and earnestly sought salvation. That night, after prayer, he retired to bed, but not to sleep, for he prayed as in an agony; and about midnight God spoke peace to his troubled soul and the whole household awoke and joined in prayer and praise. Mr. Cartwright said, "Such thrilling shouts I seldom have heard from lips of mortal man. His conversion was the beginning of a glorious revival in the settlement, and many were the souls saved by grace."

A Wonderful Discovery!

Last December the London Times, which boasts of being a very accurate paper, reported the discovery of a Dinosaur (prehistoric reptile), half buried in Moroccan sands, which men of science on the spot computed to be fifty million years old. In February last the same paper announced that the supposed Dinosaur was a hay making machine, stamped with the name of its Canadian manufacturer, which had been left derelict in 1917. When trained scientists of the modern age mistake the spikes of a twentieth century hay making machine for the ribs of a Dinosaur "fifty million years old," we need to be very cautious of their other interpretations of "nature" and their evolutionary hypotheses. He who stakes his soul on science and not on Scripture builds on the sand that buried the Dinosaur.

Professor J. MacMurray told the Science Federation a few years ago, "Science has become as full of pride and prejudice as ever religion was. Modern science is very liable to superstition, and tends to breed superstition in its devotees."

What Hinders Revival?

Dr. Goforth in his book, "By My Spirit" fearlessly diagnoses the disease that is making the church of today weak and anemic: "We cannot emphasize too strongly our conviction that all hindrance in the church is due to sin. It is sin in individual church members, whether at home or on the foreign field, which grieves and quenches the Holy Spirit. I imagine that we would lose much of our selfrighteousness if we were to find that pride, jealously, bad temper, back-biting, greed, and all their kindred are just as heinous in God's sight as the

so-called grosser sins. All sin in the believer, of whatever kind, mars the redemptive work of Christ. The most piercing cries that I have ever heard have come from Chinese Christians, when the Holy Spirit made plain to them that their sin had crucified the Son of God afresh. 'Behold the Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save; nor is His ear heavy, that He cannot hear; but your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid His face from you, that He will not hear.' Isa. 59: 1, 2. The filth and blood-guiltiness of the churches can only be swept away by the Spirit of Judgment and of Burning."

Restitution

We can "whiten our robes" when soiled after conversion. Charles Finney tells of a young woman who came to him in great distress; for she was guilty of that scripture which says: "Exhort servants to be in subjection to their own masters, *not purloining* (not pilfering) but shewing all good fidelity." Titus 2:9. What, she asked, was she to do? Mr. Finney answered, "You must restore the stolen things, and confess your sin to those you have wronged."

She started on her path of selfhumiliation, one guilty memory raising another: some laughed at her, others felt for her, but all forgave. She came at last to the episcopal palace, for the unhappy girl had stolen a shawl from Bishop Hobart's daughter. She wrapped it up, and handed it in at the palace gates, without a word of explanation. Conscience whispered, "Someone else may have been suspected: you must go in and confess." She immediately went back, and sought admittance. She was shown in to the Bishop; and she told him all the truth. The old man wept aloud, and, laying his hand on her head, prayed God to forgive her, as he did. Peace came to her, in a flood past all understanding: her life, ever after, says Mr. Finney, adorned the doctrine in all things.

The Prophet



HERE is considerable haziness in the minds of many people concerning the real nature of the office and ministry of a "prophin the church.

Some would have us believe that the "prophet" is simply

another name for the preacher, and that all true preachers are prophets, and all their preaching is prophesying. There is an element of truth in this, but it plainly does not meet the case for the obvious reason that it completely fails to recognize the essential place in the prophesying of the New Testament of direct inspiration and immediate revelation.

Others simply think that a "prophet" has little to do but foretell the future. This also has an element of truth, but is very far indeed from the complete picture.

Others again have unfortunately distorted the office by trying to make its chief function that of guidance in church or private affairs; and their exaggeration and abuse of the office on this line has only added confusion, and prejudiced people against the truth. Here also there has been an element of truth, in that the Holy Spirit DOES guide at times through this channel, when He so pleases in sovereign grace; but it is never "to order," and the New Testament gives no such all-important place to prophets in the conduct of affairs.

It is unfortunate from one aspect that we no longer generally use the title "prophet" in describing the ministry of certain brethren, because this lack gives the impression that the office has ceased to exist in the church today, or is limited to those who actually use the title. As a matter of fact we believe it is still present among us in considerable measure, and one would only expect a revival of an inspirational nature to produce a corresponding increase in this type of ministry. The Ministry of Prophets Defined

The Ministry of Prophets Defined A "prophet" in the New Testament sense is one who speaks "from the impulse of a sudden inspiration, from the light of a sudden revelation at the moment ('apokalupsis'—1 Cor. 14:30). The idea of speaking from an immediate REVELATION seems here to be fundamental, as relating either to future events, or the mind of the Spirit in general" (Robinson). "Prophets" are particularly distinguished from "teachers" (Acts 13:1; 1 Cor. 12:28; Eph. 4:11) in that the latter exercise a more logical ministry in the Spirit, appealing principally to the reasoning faculties of the hearers; while the former appeal The Ministry-Gifts of Christ Donald Gee

to the conscience more generally through the emotions. "Prophets" are distinguished from "evangelists" in that while these may be powerful emotional preachers, yet they do not necessarily minister from an immediate revelation at the moment.

The Prophet as a Preacher In the early church the prophets

In the early church the prophets undoubtedly provided a large part of the preaching ministry, and gave it a distinctive note of divine authority and power which must have been tremendously arresting to the hearer. 1 Cor. 14:25. In this they were worthy successors of John the Baptist, and the great prophet-preachers of the Old Testament.

To recognize this ministry today we have to look among those preachers who speak very largely by inspira-tion as they go along. We personally know, and highly esteem, certain brethren who have a singularly powerful and uplifting ministry in the Spirit; and yet avowedly hardly know what they are going to say when they step on to the platform! Some Scripture becomes illuminated to them, and provides a thought from which to start; or some line of immediate need in the company present brings divine revelation as to the word applicable. Their utterances are usually without any attempt at logical reasoning and sequence (sometimes they are even hopelessly illogical!)-and yet they captivate the heart by a declaration of truth which is convincing to the conscience. Often also they bring real enlightenment to the understanding, but it is usually through the intuitive rather than the logical faculties. Thank God for such ministry! It is often a powerful agent to promote revival.

Silas, who was a "prophet" (Acts 15:32) found a valuable place in apostolic missionary labors with Paul: and in evangelism this type of ministry has a powerful and legitimate sphere.

A word of warning is required lest this truly God-given gift and ministry should be confused with the lazy, slipshod habits of some preachers who waste precious hours which should be spent in preparation, and then expect the Holy Spirit to help them out by a last-minute revelation. Such often quote, "Open thy mouth wide and I will fill it," but their messages are May 10, 1930

usually not such as to bring much glory to the supposed divine giver. A true prophet DOES need preparation, as much as any preacher, but it is the preparation particularly of the heart. He has to "prophesy according to the proportion of faith" (Rom. 12:6), and his faith must be

kept living, strong and enlightened by hours of communion with God.

It is the privilege of the prophet to very often interpret to the people the very emotion of the Spirit, entered into by a walk with God of the closest fellowship in which he shares the very "feelings" of God, if we may reverently so put it. So we may expect a prophet to be somewhat emotional. As a rule; this is a distinctive feature of his office. This may likely make him very sensitive to the spiritual atmosphere around him-reacting most favorably to a responsive audience. Yet perhaps it is one test of a prophet's true measure of divine unction if he has the power to bring the Word home convincingly to those who are unsympathetic. Such were the great preacher-prophets of the Old Testament.

The Prophet as a Fore-Teller

The New Testament also indicates that there was a ministry of prophets which we should hardly call "preaching." It was too spontaneous, and perhaps—fragmentary. There were inspired utterances in the assemblies which brought "exhortation, edification, and comfort" (1 Cor. 14:3); or voiced some immediate "revelation" at the moment (verses 6 and 30). These were probably brief, for "two or three" could speak in one meeting (verse 29); perhaps even the whole company (v. 24). Among those who thus exercised the prophetic gift in this form were believers who spoke with tongues and interpreted, for in this case the dual gift was esteemed as equal to prophesying (v. 5).

Then there were cases of distinct foretelling, conspicuously illustrated in the case of the Prophet Agabus (Acts 11:27-30; 21:11). The Early Church evidently had confidence in the prophetic gift of Agabus, and rightly so, for that which he foretold came to pass, thus fulfilling the Old Testament test. Deut. 18:22. Even fulfilled prediction however is not a final proof of a prophet's divine inspiration, if he deviates from the commandments of God. Deut. 13:1-5.

With regard to this type of prophet, it should be carefully noted that in the present dispensation there is no suggestion of "enquiring" through such a gift, or of systematically applying to it for guidance. The prophecies of Agabus obviously came quite spontaneously, and without any seeking. It is evident from the New Testament that this was not the regular way by which the Holy Spirit guided the church, although He used it on occasion.

The Prophet as a Foundation

During the period covered by New Testament history, the canon of Scripture such as we now possess was in-complete. In the Early Churches there were practically no Scriptures at first that dealt with the very truths of the New Covenant which were especially vital to them. They were even then only in process of being finally "revealed unto His holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit." Eph. 3:5. The ministry of prophets who spoke forth genuine revelations of divine truth from the Holy Spirit were plainly of incalculable value. The church was in a very real way being "built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets." Eph. 2:20.

It is a serious error however to presume that this necessarily places the prophetic gift and office on an equality with the Scriptures for infallibility; —as is proved by 1 Cor. 14:29; 1 Thess. 5:19-21. Discernment as to the source, and the relative value of prophetic utterances was needed, and divinely given. 1 Cor. 12:10.

In the midst of all the prophetic ministry in the Early Church; much of it doubtless transient in interest, local in application, and apparently sometimes questionable in veracity, there was growing up a lasting body of "Prophecy of Scripture" (2 Peter 1:20) which is infallible and not of any private interpretation, and which came at an early date to be rightly so regarded. It was given to Paul and John, along with the other New Testament writers, to pen those matchless writings under the direct personal inspiration of the Holy Spirit which finally completed the glorious and infallible revelation of the written Word of God.

Henceforth the office of the prophet remains, not to add anything to the perfect revelation of the Scriptures, but for the building up of the body of Christ through an inspired and an inspiring ministry-gift that interprets and applies those Scriptures with new light and life and power to every generation and circumstance by a fresh and immediate operation of the Holy Spirit.

"An ounce of mother," says a Spanish proverb, "is worth a ton of priests." "A good mother is worth one hundred schoolmasters," said George Herbert. But, alas! all mothers are not godly. God help the children who go out into life carrying with them the memory of a bad mother! They have sustained a loss for which nothing can compensate. They have lost a precious heritage which all the wealth of the world cannot purchase. The good mother—the bad mother. Compare the above stories, which are all true. So there is no need whatever for a bad mother to remain bad. He can gloriously save and make anew all who come to Him. He is able to do it for any poor sinner this very day.

An Old Mother's Faith A True Story

Through no fault of his own, Jacob Polruan, a farmer, had experienced a very anxious time. Both he and his wife had been sick for months, and he had lost much cattle through disease. Ere long he found himself heavily in debt. His farm, too, was mortgaged up to the hilt, and the interest had fallen seriously into arrear. He struggled to make his prospects better, but his efforts were of no avail. He confided his troubles to his wife, and also to his aged mother, who was dependent upon him for food and shelter. Then the inevitable happened. His creditors, realizing that he was practically penniless, decided to sell his property, and the auction was duly advertised. On the day of the sale hundreds of prospective buyers came from various parts of the county. Just as the auctioneer was about to offer the first lot for sale, the farmer's mother, a frail old lady whose saintly face was beautiful to look upon, and whose hair was silvery white, tottered out of the house and made her way to the auctioneer's stand. In her gnarled hands she carried a huge family Bible, the weight of which seemed almost too much for her. Every one watched her curiously, wondering what she was going to do. At last she reached the auctioneer's stand, and holding out the Bible, said to him, in a tremulous voice, "Sell that first, sir. It is of more value than all else on this farm."

Her voice had a strange effect upon the assembly. The auctioneer seemed uncertain what to say or how to act. A sense of hush brooded over the would-be buyers, who only a few moments before had discussed in excited tones the farmer's worldly goods.

"Do you mean to say that that Book is worth more than everything else?" The auctioneer's voice disturbed the silence, and all eyes were forthwith turned to the old lady, who firmly stood her ground. "Yes, sir," she replied. "It is worth more than everything else put together. Sell it first, sir, for this has been a matter of much prayer."

A light of unquestioning faith shone in her eyes. Her words were charged to the full with meaning, and she spoke feelingly. So great was the impression she made upon her hearers that one by one the creditors came forward and with tears in their eyes declared that the sale should be cancelled, and that they would be content to wait until such time as the farmer was in a position to clear his debts. Remarks of approval were expressed on every hand, and before long the farm premises were cleared of all save the farmer, his wife, and his mother.

Prayer was again resorted to, and before long Jacob Polruan was able to settle his financial obligations. God wonderfully blessed him, and he prospered so well that past sorrows lost their bitterness; past disappointments were swallowed up in the victories of the future. All this was the outcome of the earnest, heartfelt prayers of the farmer's saintly mother.—L. M.

Victory Over Demons

"Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy." Luke 10:19. This commission was given before Pentecost, not to the twelve apostles only, but to the seventy.

"These signs shall follow them that believe." Mark 16:17. Here there is no limit to the number; and the promise is to all those who believe. "In My name shall they cast out demons" empty out undesirable tenants, usurpers. Every class of demons cast out in the NAME.

When Christ said. "In My name shall they cast out demons," He did He did not designate any particular kind of There are some kinds that demons. the Lord does designate, and these are particularly hard to get rid of-hard for the disciples but easy for the Lord. On the occasion when they were not able to deliven the boy who was a lunatic, who often was cast into the fire and into the water, the Lord upbraided the disciples, not for their lack of power but for their unbelief. The demonstration in the possessed boy, of the power of the enemy, obscured faith. The Lord did not rebuke them for their lack of power but for their lack of faith. They saw the power of the ene-

mv; and their faith in the power of the check mv; and their faith in the power which the Lord had given them, failed them. Unbelief! How is it expelled? By prayer, and if necessary by fasting. Christ said, "Bring him hither to Me." Then there was a fresh exhibition of demon power tearing the boy. There must have been mixed feelings in the disciples as they saw this further demonstration, this supreme effort of the demons. The remnant of their faith must have entirely gone. But this extra power manifested by the demons in the boy, and the mixed belief and unbelief of his father, did not hinder Christ. He commanded—and out they came.

Imagine the feelings of the disciples. No wonder they said, "Why could not we cast him out? We used language, and He used language." But His word was with authority. There was victory, there was faith, and there was life. The disciples lacked authority and power, but after Pentecost there was no lack of authority and no lack of power. It was then that Ananias and Sapphira were handed over to death itself. In the case of Dorcas and others, death itself was also commanded to give up its victims—and commanded with authority.

The authoritative word is the need of to-day, and can be had. How can it be obtained? By conscious union with Him who has all power in heaven and in earth. But with this proviso, that He is THE authority all the time. He is the spokesman, you are the mouthpiece. You are the instrument, but He handles the instrument. Remember continually that these demons possessing human bodies, the bodies of those for whom Christ died, are enemies to Him. He died for those whom the demons are possessing.

"Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." Acts 1:8. Never get out of the realm of power. Move in the realm of the Spirit. Let the Spirit Himself move, guide, control and dominate you at all times. But especially seek the activity of the Holy Spirit if there is an activity of the evil spirit. In other words, when a Spirit-filled person is coming in contact with a person filled with evil spirits, look for and expect that there will be activity on both sides. This was the experience of Paul, of Peter, of the apostles and especially of the Lord Himself.

In these last times in which we are living there will be increasing activity of the powers of darkness, but God Himself is making provision to meet this onslaught. God's people in general have a hard time and the enemy gets an advantage. But when the saints wake up to their weakened position and cry to God, victory is certain. The history of the saints in the Old and New Testaments, of the early church, and of the church and all down through the ages, proves this. "When the enemy comes in like a flood," flood that sweeps all before it, then the Lord will raise up a standard. How? Through Spirit-filled individuals. No angel, no arch angel, no seraphim are requisitioned, but common people, filled with uncommon power to meet the common enemy.

The Holy Spirit is likened to the wind. It blows where it listeth and thou canst not tell whence it cometh nor whither it goeth. Unlimited and uncontrolled! Christ allowed Himself to be limited; He was limited when He was born-there was no room for Him in the inn. But the Holy Spirit is never limited. He is uncontrolled like the wind as far as man is concerned. The sails of the ship can be turned and hoisted to meet the wind and the great sailing ship is driven through the angry sea by an unseen force. The same wind drives many ships and its force is not diminished. Connect yourself submit and allow yourself to be con-trolled and moved by the unseen Spirit --- it may be through angry seas. The ship does not operate the wind, but the wind the ship. You do not control the Spirit but the Spirit controls you. A mighty wind came upon the hundred and twenty on the Day of Pentecost. and the source from whence it came is not exhausted. The promise "I will send" is as fresh to-day as when given by Christ while He was on the earth.

(Continued from Page Three) Peter preached; the other disciples prayed, and I suppose corroborated with their testimony the truth Peter proclaimed, and the result was the conversion of three thousand souls in a single day. But the disciples afterward felt the need of having the power which they had received fortified. Read Acts 4:23-33; 5:12-16. Here is where many of us have failed. We received the blessed Baptism in the Spirit, and had power for service. We were effective for a while. But we failed to fortify the power which we had, and today many of us are well nigh powerless. We might just as well face the facts. Not all who have been baptized in the Holy Ghost are rendering effective service today; some have actually backslidden, and are in sin. Others have not altogether backslidden, but they are doing little or nothing for God; they are as powerless as they were before coming into this blessed experience. The reason is that they have failed to fortify their power.

The early disciples fortified their power mightily, and what notable victories they were able to achieve! The enemy was everywhere driven back; victory perched upon the banners of the saints on every battle front. Despite the most bitter persecution, despite the fact that the saints were imprisoned, banished, burned at the stake, thrown to wild beasts, crucified, and forbidden almost everywhere, under penalty of death, to meet to worship, the cause of Christianity prospered, the church grew, and it was not long until the Roman Emperor openly proféssed to be a Christian for the reason that the Christians had become so numerous and so influential that he felt he could best advance his own interests and strengthen his kingdom by turning from paganism to the new faith that had spread so rapidly and seemed destined to soon claim as its adherents all the people of the earth.

The enemy is not attacking us today as he attacked the early church; his tactics are different. He is not instigating persecution now; that may come later; be on the lookout for it, if the devil's present tactics fail. Today he is injecting indifference into human hearts, and endeavoring to create discord in our ranks, and trying to make us satisfied with ourselves, and in various other ways is putting forth efforts to prevent our presenting a solid front to the enemy. We need to fortify our power mightily lest we sustain defeat. This seems to me to be a crisis hour. There is a sense of course in which every hour is a crisis hour.

But a condition is almost everywhere prevailing in our ranks at the present time that ought to arouse us to a sense of the great danger that is confronting us, and to a consciousness of the critical character of the situation that exists.

We are in a conflict. Against us are arrayed the powers that are marshalled under the leadership of Satan. It is not a time for us to take our ease; it is not a time for carelessness. He who shirks his responsibility in the day of battle is a slacker.

During one of the hard fought bat-tles of the Civil War, General Grant, who was the commander of the Union forces, had occasion to look down over the bank of a creek, and there he saw a number of Union soldiers concealed. They were protected by the bank, and were smoking their pipes and talking and having a good time while their comrades in the heat of the battle were being exposed to shot and shell. Others were risking their lives for their country and doing their utmost to save the day and drive the enemy back, but these men were taking their ease, and were seeking their own pleasure and safety, at a time when the fate of the republic, the future of the nation, was in the balance.

Shall we who have been saved from sin and who have come into this blessed experience of the Baptism in the Holy Spirit in these marvelous days of the Latter Rain, these days in which our Lord is making ready a people for His coming-shall we allow ourselves to become settled on our lees, and fail God at the crucial moment when every soldier should be out on the firing line and doing his best for God? Peter was sure that he was ready to die for his Lord, but in the garden where his Lord was wrestling with the powers of darkness until He sweat as it were great drops of blood, Peter slept, Jesus, finding Peter and James and John asleep, for their eyes were heavy, inquired, "What! could ye not watch with me one hour !" I wonder what He is saying to some today?

Listen, my soul, to God's exhortation to thee: "The disperser is come up before thy face: keep the munition, watch the way, make thy loins strong, fortify thy power mightily."

The Gospel in Foreign Lands

The Missionary Secretary's Mail

Letters from all parts of the world strew my desk. Some have come in comparatively quick time, having traveled part of the way by airplane and then on swift ocean liners, making connections with express mail trains, while others have been nearly two months on the way, dusky carriers have transported them through tropical jungle, along winding paths, threading their way through tangled vines to a point where faster methods of transportation could be used. Others have come in the hands of men on horseback through bandit-ridden mountains or across arid plains, but in spite of all these difficulties very seldom do we learn of letters being lost. Our hands join those of our faithful missionaries in the uttermost parts of the earth through these various means of contact, but more effectively still through the throne of our heavenly Father. This means will never fail even though the earthly lines of communication break. What a wonderful time we should have if we could all get together as is recorded of the early church in the acts, "and when they were come and had gathered the church together they rehearsed all that God had done with them." Perhaps we shall have to wait until we reach the glory for such a meeting but let me tell you of a few things that are in the letters before me.

Blessings on the Work

I could not begin to tell you of all the places where revival fires are burning but it seems that the countries which are suffering most from persecution or lack of what we consider the necessities of life are enjoying the greatest outpouring of God's blessing and power. In Russia, Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria, and other countries of Eastern Europe, our missionaries are experiencing great opposition from the authorities and sometimes from religious leaders. Also in Liberia and parts of China the devil seems busily occupied trying to frustrate the progress of the gospel.

Russia

Reports are coming to us from various sources regarding the significant developments which are taking place in Soviet Russia.

Everything would seem to indicate that the spirit of Antichrist is rapidly gaining sway in the earth. death because of their refusal to accept the sign of Communism. What this sign is we are not sure, but such startling facts are surely a call to prayer to every watchful child of God.

In spite of this serious condition of affairs we have learned indirectly that God is continuing to draw souls to Himself in Russia and when a decision for Christ may mean severe persecution and possibly death none are going to step out but those who are absolutely sincere. With material like this to work upon, the fire of God will always burn and one encouraging aspect of the situation as reported to us by Brother John G. Warton of Persia is that "Because of the bitter persecution of Christians in Russia, about one hundred of the Pentecostal brethren, native born Persians, who were resident in Russia have escaped to Persia recently. They were not allowed to take any money with them so that consequently they are very poor and needy. It may be, however, that as in the scattering of the saints at the persecution at Jerusalem, the coming of these brethren may mean the spread of the gospel in Persia. Let us pray that it may work out to this end."

Bulgaria

In Bulgaria where every effort seems to be made by the nominal church to suppress the ministry of our Pentecostal missionaries we find the people just crowding together to hear God's truth and they refuse to be dismissed until at times the meeting has continued until the early hours of the moning. Their thirst for God's Word seems insatiable.

Hungary

For a time it seemed as if we might have to withdraw our missionaries from Hungary but God graciously intervened and Brother Raroha writing of the last conference of the Assemblies of God which they held says, "In the month of March we had our third conference in Hungary. God blessed in a real way and five more assemblies were added to the conference. Many came to the conference from a long distance, some from Roumania and some from Jugoslavia. We had a very blessed baptismal service in which 34 were immersed, among them was a medical doctor and a member of the state police. A remarkable healing took place. A girl who had not been able to talk or walk for eight years was healed and is now walking. She is now waiting for the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. The more we are persecuted the more God is working for us. The only trouble we have now is that we have not room for the people who want to tarry for the Baptism.'

China

One of our missionaries in South China writes, "Communist activities are alarming in some parts of China," while a letter from Brother W. W. Simpson gives a lurid picture of conditions in Kansu Province. We quote a part of his letter. He writes:

"At last there is prospect of getting a letter to the Coast. Such a long time we have been shut up in this remote corner of the world with bandits and brutish soldiers chasing and fighting each other and devouring all the food they can get hold of, carrying off the girls and young women, after killing their husbands, torturing any one supposed to have money and making a very hell of a once peaceful district. Last winter was bad enough but this has been ten times as bad. The horrors are simply indescribable. We were warned a month before the greatest danger threatened by numerous prophecies and messages in the Spirit, as to what was coming and when it would come, how long it would last, and when relief would arrive, and also told to put away all sin, to repent and pray for mercy. We had meetings every day in which scores of our famine children confessed their sins and were baptized in the Spirit. Practically every one in the Girls' Industrial Home received the Spirit. Also many others who had never before sought in earnest, received. There was a marvelous outpouring and great iov and blessing but always messages of warning that the danger was drawing nearer every day. Finally, De-cember 23rd, the bandits 20,000 strong arrived. I dared not refuse the demand of their General Ma Ying-piao to give him and his guard rooms, fuel, horse feed, and food. All work had to cease and everybody was busy waiting on them. Often I was called from my

meals to serve them and look after various matters relating to them. On New Years Day, they seized and bound the Chinese General Wang who held the city with 1500 troops. They sent me to demand the surrender of this army and the opening of the city gates. I persuaded them to give up their arms and save the city from destruction in the siege. The bandits, mostly Mohammedans, sacked the city and carried more than 100 young women and girls into the vilest slavery. I interceded for six whom I knew and got them released but later two of them were retaken.

"From January 2nd to 7th the bandits received many reinforcements until they numbered nearly 30,000. They tortured hundreds of men to death for money. One of them searched our dwelling with his automatic pistol cocked, ready to shoot. Twenty young women were hidden in a room at the head of the stairs on the second floor but he didn't see the door although he passed it twice. He searched every other room in the house but that. We had marvelous deliverances every day. Some of the most wicked of the General's guard discussed the matter of killing me and our three little girls and taking my wife captive but the Lord prevented it.

"January 7th the Kansu army approached on the very day the Spirit had given a month before. Most of the bandits went out to fight General Kao who was ten miles east of the city, leaving General Ma Chuen-pao with one division to hold the city against General Li Song-kuen who came from the west. But by 2:00 P. M. General Li took the city, the bandits fled east and we had a short breathing spell but the mail could not function. January 29th the bandits returned and stayed another day, leaving again January 31st pursued by the Kansu army. General Li had no food for his army and took more than 250 bushels of grain that I had stored up for our own and the famine children's use. He promised to have it returned to me later but we have not yet received it."

Africa

A missionary from the South of Africa reports that the spirit of rebellion is rife in the land and that some of the government officials are also manifesting antagonism to the gospel, but God is working. Some interesting illustrations of the simple faith of the natives is brought out in a letter from Brother J. A. Barney of the Belgian Congo. He writes:

"We have sent two of our Gombari boys to the evangelists' school at Aba this year. They arrived at Aba about

a week before the school began and just at that time one of the white teachers lost his little baby, and as the boys were total strangers and did not know any one, they suffered a bit, partly from homesickness and partly because the white teacher was not able to give them attention during his bereavement. Mbungu writes back pathetically: 'We arrived with only three francs between us. I was sick for two days. Mori went and bought 31 sweet potatoes with the money. I did not tell Mori or anybody else but each day I went away alone in a large field where none would see or hear me, and prayed. I prayed the first day, and the third day, and still survived on the potatoes. I prayed the fourth day and the fifth day and the sixth day, but nothing happened and even the potatoes were about gone and we did not have a pot to cook anything in, nor a pail of water, nor even a cup of our own (such is the way the native travels). I praved the seventh day in the boiling sun and cried to God to save us as we were actually hungry. That night we were about to give up, but I determined in my heart to pray one more day out in the field. On the eighth day a man gave me some bananas. I prayed on the ninth day and the white man came and gave us a pot for cooking and something to bring water in and some plantains. I prayed on the tenth day and the white man came and gave us each eight francs with which to buy food. And I tell you everything has come out fine!""

And again, from Liberia a missionary tells us of a native convert who was earnestly seeking God and who also was in need of food. He therefore asked God to send him some meat.

"As soon as he had finished praying he supposed there was nothing else to do but to go and see if God had sent the answer, and there in his trap was a little bush pig. The young man came back to give thanks to God."

Remarkable Healings

Some remarkable healings have also taken place in Liberia. Miss Ada Gollan writes: "An old woman came to the mission and asked prayer for the healing of a cancer which she had on her breast. A few days after prayer had been offered she came back and reported in her way that her sickness was all over, and as a proof of it she began to pound her breast where the cancer had been, and at the same time looked up to heaven saying in the native tongue, 'Glory, Glory Glory.'"

While Miss Bertha Dommermuth writes of another case as follows: "Jonah is one of four sons that the king from this tribe (Palipo Tribe)

has put in the mission. About one year ago the terrible disease of leprosy broke out in terrible sores upon his feet. It looked as though his toes were going to drop off and the odor from them was terrible. We then noticed the light spots all over his body. Our mission people told us that this was leprosy. Jonah told us that he had had the disease since he was a child. It was necessary to send him away to another place so that he would not contaminate the other children but he came to us every Friday afternoon to have us pray for him that the loathsome disease might leave him. One day he came to us and said that the previous night as he lay on his mat, a beautiful light came and filled the room and two men stood by in white. One stooped and took his feet in his hands while the other laid his hands on Jonah's head. From that time on his feet began to heal and in a few weeks' time they were perfectly healed, all spots had disappeared from his body. Since his healing Jonah has walked to the coast several times which is a journey of eight to ten days, thus proving that his healing is real.

Thank God for all that He is accomplishing. I feel before closing this little talk together I ought to tell you of some of the needs.

Needs for Prayer

A very urgent request has just come to us from our dear brother and Sister Finkenbinder of Porto Rico. Their little eight months' old baby is afflicted with cataracts on its eyes and unless God does a miracle it will never be able to see beyond a dim ray of light. Let us share this burden with our brother and sister and unite in prayer for the deliverance of their little one.
