N STUDYING the book of Revelation we may use the microscope, and examine minutely each chapter and verse; or we may employ the telescope and take one sweeping

glance of the whole. In the study that follows the latter method is used. May this panoramic view of the book of Revelation impress us anew with the glory of its message.

The Book of Consummations

The great circle of divine revelation begun in the book of Genesis is completed in the last book of the Bible; there we witness the completion of God's plan, so that we can say with thankful hearts, "It is finished." In Genesis we read the story of Paradise Lost; throughout the ages we trace man's attempt to gain the lost Eden, till we come to the last book of the Bible and read the story of Paradise Regained. In Genesis is described Satan's entrance; we follow the slimy trail of the serpent in history till we come to the last book, and there read of his doom. In Genesis we are told of the beginning of the curse, and with sad hearts we follow its ravages throughout ages, until in Revelation we read, "And there shall be no more curse." In Genesis we read of the creation of the old heaven and earth; we study its sin-stained history till we come to the last book of the Bible and see the new heaven and earth wherein dwells righteousness. "It is finished!"

"But history repeats," we hear the unbeliever say, "the same things happen every century, the events of history move in a continuous circle, and there is no new thing under the sun." It is true that the movements of his-

The Practical Purpose

As we consider the danger of dwelling on the speculative and sensational side of prophecy, it is well to remember that all prophecy was given with a practical purpose in view-given to stir the heart and to guide conduct, rather than to provide a puzzle game for minds given to speculation. The blessing of this book is pronounced upon those who keep the words of the prophecy (1:3), that is, who conform their lives to the warnings, and the spiritual and practical truths taught therein. The book of Revelation is the great prophet of the Christian church, speaking unto us to edification, exhortation, and comfort. 1 Cor. 14:13.

Background and Message

Every book of the New Testament was written to meet a need of the Christians living in the first age of Christianity, and also to convey a message to Christians of all times. A study of the conditions under which the different books were written furnishes a historical background that makes their messages clear to us who

N MY last article I told of my remarkable healing from lung trouble and other complications, of how I failed God when He

commanded me to preach Divine Healing from pulpit and platform, and how through disobedience I finally lost my healing and also got into spiritual darkness as everyone will who deliberately disobeys God.

I want now to tell how God in His mercy brought me back again to a place of victory, and of the test that accompanied it. After I had gone on in disobedience for a time, I told the Lord that if He would again touch and heal my body, I would never again go back on His Word, but would preach a full salvation for spirit, soul, and body.

My full restoration and deliverance was accompanied by a very severe test. This test resulted in a victory that has stood out as a landmark all through my subsequent life and ministry. I was laboring in British Columbia and residing in a mining town.

One Saturday morning I started out on horseback to ride ten or twelve miles over the mountains to preach at a certain village Sunday morning and be back to my home to preach Sunday night. I had ridden about a half mile when suddenly some quail flew out from a bush near by. My mount an Indian pony known there as a cayuse, likely to do any kind of trick at a most unexpected moment. It shied and made for home at a terrific speed. As the pony had got the bit in its teeth, I had no control over it.

Coming to a sharp curve in the road, the horse turned the corner and I went straight ahead. I fell on a sharp rock, tearing a big hole in my overcoat and breaking my ribs. I lay stunned for a few moments and then arose and walked toward the road. Looking down the hill, I saw my horse tied up in front of a wayside saloon. I walked down to the horse in pain and agony and after thanking the landlord for stopping my horse I remounted and resumed my journey over the mountains without ever a thought of abandoning the trip and going to bed.

When I reached the place where the horse had shied it began to snort and look around and acted as though it was again going to run away. However, I got safely past this place and eventually reached my destination. As my broken ribs were all this time grating one against the other I was in the greatest agony.

When I reached the home where I was to stay for the night, I lay down

on a sofa in great pain and weakness and later went to bed without supper. My appetite had left me. However through all this test my faith was strong and I knew that God was going to heal me. I arose next morning (Sunday) and preached in the school house though still in agony and distress. I then started on the long trip home for the night service. However, I was compelled to walk the greater part of the way as the movement of the horse while riding caused me intense pain. That was certainly the most tiresome and agonizing walk I have ever experienced. I was compelled to stop and rest every ten minutes or so; and this made it late before I reached my destination.

As I entered the little mining town I passed a doctor's office. Satan immediately suggested to me that I ought to see the docter and have him examine me, and further suggested that I send word to the church that I could not preach that night and at once go to bed. Immediately the Spirit rose up in me and the words came unbidden to my tongue, "You are a liar and the father of lies. I am going to preach and I am going to be healed."

When I reached the church the bulk of the congregation were standing outside, no doubt wondering what had become of me as I had always made it a point to be punctual at the services. and here I was over half an hour late. As I drew near the crowd, some of them remarked that I was looking quite sick. I replied that I was not feeling very well, but I said nothing about my broken ribs. I went forward to the platform in agony and, leaning upon the pulpit desk, I reached for the hymn book and announced a hymn. As we sang, I continued leaning on the pulpit desk in utter weakness and in extreme pain. We then knelt in prayer. I had uttered but five or six words when suddenly I heard a slight click in my ribs. Immediately all the pain left me and I knew that I was healed.

When I rose from my knees, I smote my ribs with all the force I could command and found them perfectly well and strong. They were knit together by the power of God in the twinkling of an eye and from that day to this I have had no more trouble with them. They have remained sound and well. To God alone be all the glory!

Needless to say I kept my vow to God and have never ceased to preach the truth of Divine Healing as a part and parcel of the gospel, and have had the joy of seeing large numbers healed of all manner of diseases throughout the

length and breadth of my travels in the United States and Canada.

Soon after this God led me out from the Methodist Church and eventually brought me into the Pentecostal work where I am free to declare "all the counsel of God."

"I must go. The time is short. Hinder me not." "But the journey thou goest is long, and what will happen unto us if thou dost meet with danger? The times in China now are so bitterbad"; and the woman's voice was full of fear. "Yet, my son's mother, the King-over-all commands me," said her husband, a poor Chinese laborer, "and He surely will supply all thy needs. I believe His promise."

So one morning shortly afterwards Dao left his humble home to begin a long, weary pilgrimage to the distant mountain villages, where the people had never heard of Christ. He left all the money he could spare to keep his family, whom he grieved to leave even for a few days, for they were very dear to his heart; but his love to his Saviour compelled obedience. His elder boy Ming (Brightness), a brave little fellow of twelve, felt quite important now. He must

and small brother, as well as poor old blind granny. He was a pupil at the local mission school, but found time after hours to cut grass on the hillside for fuel, and do many little jobs to help his mother.

Alas! his father had not gone more than a week when his mother became seriously ill. "O God," said Ming, "please help me to do all I can and be brave, while the very honorable father is away doing Thy work." Many weeks passed, and soon faith was being sorely tried in the poor little home. No news came from the absent one, for he could not write, and there was, besides, no way of sending letters from those wild mountain regions.

"No news is the best" in China, so his family did not worry, but their money and food were exhausted. The mother's illness continued, and she was unable to weave cloth, and so add her earnings to their scanty store. One never-to-be-forgotten morning the rice sing (measure) was empty, and there was

They had no relations or friends to help them, and the Chinese doctor they had called in said she must have good, nourshing rice, boiled to a pulp. Ming would not borrow from any neighbor, for his father had made him promise never to follow that universal Chinese habit. He felt much too troubled to go to school, so he hurried out early to try to earn a few cash coins by herding water buffaloes. But to his bitter disappointment no farmer wanted him, and though he searched everywhere not a single job of any sort could he get.

At last hopeless, hungry, and despairing, he crept into a thick bamboo grove to sit down and wonder why God, the great heavenly Father, was letting them suffer so. "In truth," said Ming to himself, "He cannot be like the Chinese overlords, who press men into their service, leaving their

My father is preaching the message of the God of love 'without money and without price,' and now the neighbors are all mocking at us, and saying He has left us to starve, and the Jesus religion does not help in this life, and why believe it will do so in the next?"

Ming was very perplexed and sorrowful, for he had learned to love his father's God, and they had all rejoiced together when the idol shrine was torn down, and the "luck almanack" had been consumed in their "cleansing fire." "This is the poor pig-sty of his residence," said Ming politely. "But he is away in the Silver Dawn Mountains, exhorting the dwellers up there."

"So! So!" said the stranger. "This load of rice is for his family. It is a free gift—nothing at all to pay."

Ming opened his eyes in glad surprise. "But who sent it to us?" he exclaimed. "Is it from our honorable father?" "Not the excellent one that abides on earth, but thy Father who is in heaven." Then, lifting his carryingyoke,

—so quickly that Ming stood for a moment wondering if he had seen a vision. The sacks of rice in front of his eyes brought him back to the real present. With childlike faith and simplicity he accepted the gift, and, thanking God for His wonderful provision, he ran indoors to tell his mother and

Oh! what joy and rejoicing filled their hearts and home; for the rice was just what the sick one needed, and she soon became stronger on a more nourishing diet. "God's rice" lasted them till the father returned, with the joyful news of much blessing on his journey. "But who sent the rice to us?" was a question he could not answer, save in the way his family accepted. It had come from the Father in heaven, who never forgets or neglects His children. Unknown to them, some of Dao's converts had secretly dispatched one of their number with the load of rice to his family, as a thankoffering for the good news they had received.

Wonderfully Healed

All my life until I was healed I had been a great sufferer; had undergone several serious operations, having many organs removed, including several feet of intestines. For 18 years I had not known a normal bowel action. The Lord completely healed me of this. January 1930 I had a fibroid tumor taken out of each breast, and after being home from the hospital six weeks it returned. One night after much suffering my sister took me to the Pentecostal church here in Atlantic City to hear Evangelist Christine Peirce, and it was in this meeting that I saw things in the Word of God that I had never known before. I was anointed and prayed for by Sister Peirce, Pastor Scott and Brother Starner, and almost at once the tumor or tumors disappeared.

In June my husband and I went to Canada on a visit. On our way home we met with a serious accident which I was badly injured. I was taken to Atlantic City and to the hospital there, where five doctors pronounced that I had a broken leg, fractured ribs, and a broken spine. They wanted to put me in casts at once, but I said, "No." We sent telegrams out to God's praying people everywhere. On the night of June 7th, while people were praying in many places, the Lord came down and healed every broken member of my body. I was in the hospital just one week and left against the doctor's orders and wishes. They told me I would never be able to walk, but I have been walking every day since and attending every service, and am in the best of health. He told us that he attended a large number of meetings of the World's Christian Fundamentalist Association recently held in Los Angeles, and that the thing which struck him most was the note of pessimism which characterized the gathering. A few years ago in all their meetings there was always a confident note that there would be a sure and certain victory of Fundamentalism in the denominations, but today they are compelled to admit that apostasy is getting its strangle hold in the majority of the churches. Men who deny the virgin birth of Christ, His miracles, and especially that miracle on which our salvation largely rests (1 Cor. 15:17)-His resurrection—are being admitted to the pulpits everywhere, and most of the deonminational seminaries are becoming hotbeds of atheistic ration-

Content to Be Small

At one time the writer was in correspondence with a Quaker brother. We had delightful fellowship through the mails, and in one letter he expressed the longings of his heart to be "a heavenly man, with a heavenly vision, with a heavenly touch and a heavenly toungue." One day he visited me and we had a glorious time of fellowship. As we got down to pray I heard him worshiping the Lord in a new heavenly tongue. I took him to meeting and suggested that if he had any word from the Lord we should be so glad to receive it. I well remember the way he interpreted the parable of the grain of mustard seed that became a great tree -Matt. 13:31, 32. He said, "All the denominations have become great trees, and in these days the trees are all filled with evil birds ready to devour the seed of the Word as soon as it is sown. But I don't think it is the thought of God for us to try to grow great mustard trees. If you want to grow good mustard, you put in tiny new plants each year. God loves new things. And I believe it is God's thought for us to have new revivals each year. Get done with bigness as an assembly and as individuals. Small plants will give the Husbandman the best mustard. You will always produce the most and the best when you become less than the least of all saints.' I do not vouch for the scientific accuracy of my Quaker friend's statement, but the lesson he sought to bring found a deep lodgement in my heart.

* * * * Mixture

As we view most of the denominations today, we see in them some blessedly saved people and ministers. But there are others in the churches who seem to be as full of the world and the flesh and the devil as they can be, and we cannot but think of Paul's words, "What fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? and what concord hath Christ with Belial? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel?" We wonder why more do not obey the call, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord." It seems to us that if the Fundamentalists desire to keep in spiritual health they will have to obey this word and come out, separating themselves from the fellowship of rank atheism which calls itself Modernism, with its constant ancient-modern question, "Yea, hath God said?" When Wesley separated from the Episcopal church he found plenty of room to preach in the open air. He coveted none of the magnificent buildings of the church which he had left. Wherever he went there was always a room in some home where a class meeting could be held. God honored him by giving him souls in every place, and by letting the power of God accompany his ministry as he made the great step of separation. There was plenty of good fiery mustard in the tiny plants of those early days of Methodism. Separation and sanctification were the keynote of that Methodist revival. But alas, today Methodism has become a great mustard tree, sheltering many an unseparated and unsanctified bird.

Back to Pentecost

Our gracious Lord who wrought the miracles in Bible days is the same today, and is just as willing to do the miraculous as ever He was. He is every bit as willing to endue with power from on high as on the Day of Pentecost. He is quite as ready today to confirm His Word with signs following as He was at the beginning. He has lost neither His compassion nor His willingness to heal the sick and deliver those who are oppressed of the devil. If the dear Fundamentalists would cease to listen to the prattle of Old Man Prejudice as he constantly slanders the Pentecostal saints, and would open their hearts and beings to God's best, they could come right into God's Latter Rain Revival of early church power and blessing. A church impoverished of all the supernatural is no credit to God, and a ministry that merely boasts of a past glory, that knows nothing of the miracleworking power of God today, is no match for the intrenched infidelity of modern schools of thought.

The Apostles' Doctrine

Four things which characterized the church of the early days were "they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine, and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers." What was the apostles' doctrine? All that Christ taught, for He had commissioned the apostles to teach all that He had commanded them. Their doctrine included the marvelous message of the atonement. No human has yet fathomed all there is in the precious blood of Calvary's Lamb, and we need the revelation of the Spirit to know even in small measure the victory and power there is in the cleansing, all-blotting-out, all-victorious blood of

Christ. They taught the resurrection and also the coming again of Christ. And Paul shows us that the apostles' doctrine included the whole sweep of Old Testament truth, for he pointed out that all that had been written aforetime was written for the admonition of those upon whom the end of the age had come. It included the marvelous message of grace as it is set forth in the Epistle to the Romans. It included the gifts of the Spirit as shown forth in First Corinthians, and even the despised gift of tongues! We Pentecostal people are not guilty of sticking in that part of the message afterwards. It is right there in the record of apostolic doctrine; which doctrine also includes the message of love, which is the very nature of God, without which all the gifts are as nothing It also sets forth the importance of personal righteousness and personal holiness. In the apostolic doctrine the standard is absolute righteousness and entire sanctification, but these both are shown to be of divine impartation, and never the result of our human effort or merit. The need of every child of God today is to soak himself with the Scriptures, and the doctrines of the apostles. Did you ever read George Muller's tract "Soul Nourishment First"? This man of faith arose every morning and fed his soul on the Word of God. Every question is answered and every problem solved by the inspiring words of Scripture. If we do not feed ourselves on "every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God," we shall be a starved, impoverished

And Fellowship

There is something very wonderful in the fellowship of the Spirit-baptized. The saints had a deep unselfish love one toward the other, a love that would draw them together to commune on the things of God and to worship. They gladly gave of their substance to one another as need arose. Brother Osterberg said to me on Sunday, "Fellowship is necessarily cooperation." In the first chapters of the Acts the early church is described as a wonderful fellowship of people who loved and trusted each other and worked harmoniously together under one leadership. That was true cooperative fellowship. They knew from Psalm 133 that one condition of the continuous supply of heavenly oil was the abiding of the brethren in unity. It was as they were working in cooperative unity that God commanded the blessing. Praise God He is moving us back to this phase of early church life.

And Breaking of Bread

What is meant by the breaking of bread? The ancient Chrysostom is our authority for stating that this was the name the early church gave for the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The writer well remembers being at a meeting in Los Angeles some years ago when a sister rose and told of a vision she had seen the previous week. She saw a communion table upon which the bread and wine were laid, and the Lord appeared to her and said three times to her, "This is my medicine for my saints!" He showed her that many were weak and sickly among the saints because they did not realize that at the communion table they could, if they discerned His body, become recipients of His imparted life and strength. In the early days of the church they celebrated this simple feast every Lord's day. The writer is deeply convicted that no week should pass without our remembering the Lord in His atoning death, in the breaking of bread, until He comes. On the last Sunday of the Eureka Springs Camp Meeting I was so delighted that the communion service was put first on the Sunday morning, and oh how God blessed!

And Prayers

The early church continued in prayers. In Acts 4 we have one of their recorded prayers. The apostles got into trouble over the healing of the lame man at the beautiful gate. They were warned not to speak any more in the name of Jesus. But they went back to their own company and immediately began to pray for yet greater displays of the supernatural. Listen to their prayer. "Lord . . . grant unto Thy servants that with all boldness they may speak Thy word, by stretching forth Thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of Thy holy child Jesus." seems as though God was so pleased with that prayer that He baptized the very place where they were assembled, for the whole place was shaken, "and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spake the word of God with boldness." We read further "that the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul . . . and with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus; and great grace was upon them all." This is the practical outworking of Pentecost. Let us get back to like prayer and we shall see like results, praise God. May I make the suggestion once more, that everywhere in our Pentecostal assemblies we get to prayer in downright earnest. We again pass on the suggestion of

a ten days prayer meeting for every assembly. We are certain that as we petition God for Rain He will not fail to send torrential showers of Latter Rain blessing. And don't forget to pray for the Fundamentalists.

The Anchor's Holding Ground

During the closing months of the late war a constant stream of merchant vessels used to pass through Norwegian waters on their way to or from the ports of North Russia, where troops were at that time engaged. Early one morning one of these ships came to anchor off the harbor mouth of a port in the north of Norway, where she was presently boarded for purposes of instrection by a Norwegian naval officer. His business on board was transacted in a couple of minutes. or so, and he continued for a while in friendly conversation with the captain, walking up and down deck. Presently the officer, glancing at the sky, remarked, "I think there is going to be some wind." To this the captain agreed. "Then," continued the officer, "if I were you, I would let down another anchor." "Oh," said the cap-tain, "my anchor's all right." To this the officer replied again, "I have no doubt that your anchor's all right; but the bottom isn't."

How many are there, voyaging the ocean of life, who trust themselves to their "anchor," whatever it may be, without a thought as to whether there is any holding ground for the anchor. By "anchor" I mean anything in which a man may repose his confidence. One man's anchor may not be the same as another man's anchor. One man may trust in his own self-righteousness (Though he doesn't usually call it that); another, to his church connection, or to the ordinances of the church to which he belongs; another, to his own idea of what God is like, thinking His love and His mercy can be manifested at the expense of His truth and justice; and so forth. But when the testing time comes, and the storms arise, he will find that however strong his "anchor." or his confidence in the object of his choice, it will avail him nothing if he has no holding ground for the anchor in the Word of God. Thank God, we have in "the hope set before us," "an anchor of the soul. both sure and stedfast." by the Word of God Himself.—E. J. C. Titterington in Elim Evangel.

Soviet Russia's Attack Upon God

An attempt is being made by the Russian Soviet leaders to refute the allegations of religious persecution brought against them. Red Russia's effort to cover her sins is futile. Europe and America are stirred by her outrages. We quote from a rent issue of Our Hope:

"The program of Atheism to end all religious worship seems to be carried out on a larger scale than ever before throughout Russia. Churci; buildings are confiscated and used for clubs and other institutions. It is pathetic to hear that in Russia, Catholic, Greek-Christians, the different Protestant denominations, the Jews and even the Mohammedans have united into a league of defense. The Jew is to help the Christian, the Christian the Jew, the Catholic the Protestant, the Protesunt the Catholic, and so the Moham-

banishment).

"Of the abolishment of church service one can obtain an idea from the following: in Moscow, for instance, with something like eighteen Evangelical churches of different denominations, the authorities have recently closed, on different pretexts, about fifteen.

"The Christian press is practically being abolished. The Christian papers are not stopped officially, but gradually exterminated under the pretext of lack of paper, or through the printers being compelled to stop working, and

"Brother Theofilus writes to us: . . . In 1926 a well known atheist, Tutchkoff, said: "The most formidable enemies of the Soviet power are —the Evangelical Christians; they preach of a Christ that never has been, as well as of a God, and thereby lead the people to slavery. . . . Not much time remains—we shall annihilate you, branches, roots and all; if there exists a devil, we are with him!"

"'The foundations of family life are being mercilessly trodden down. I was at a preacher's; he and his wife are white-haired, and two daughters lamented unconsoled, for the Communists had insulted them. This wronged preacher was put out from his home, hungry and destitute and with the daughters sick.

"'The president of an executive committee wrote an official note with seal and three signatures commanding that the wife should leave her husband and come to them: "Then you shall have everything in plenty; otherwise neither you nor your husband will have the possibilities for life, as he spreads religious intoxication." From all platforms is heard a comor to destroy family life.

"The young people are attracted the atheists. Youngsters are given by the atheists. great rights."

Quoting from The Presbyterian: "The organized efforts of the present hour in Russia to promote Atheism have perhaps never been exceeded or equaled in history. . . . Even the darkest days and the most daring deeds of the French Revolution never equaled the horrors of this Russian Soviet atrack upon God, believers, and religion. Rivers of blood have been shed to silence all words of faith and prayer in that land. The Soviet Government had in 1928 enlisted 250,000 trained men, as Communist Catechists, to teach Atheism to the people, including the children. A paper known as 'The Godless,' has been circulated by the millions. Millions of copies of atheistic books have been published and distributed. Ten thousand antireligious clubs have been organized. Schools to teach Atheism are established. A score of broadcasting stations are employed in this awful rebellion, and only recently the commissar of public education broadcasted a series of atheistic lectures for teachers and pupils.

"It was only recently that the order went forth calling for a competition among the towns and cities of Russia. as to which should most speedily and most thoroughly conform to the standard of godlessness. . . . Parents may not speak a word of religious meaning in the presence of a child. It is the purpose that not one place of worship shall be left by the year 1933."

The Life of Faith, April 9th issue, publishes letters from persecuted German colonists in South Russia, which were translated by a German correspondent and personal acquaintance of the editor in order that the English speaking Christians might be made acquainted with the situation pre-vailing in Russia. The correspondent

states that the original letters can be produced. We have space for only a few excerpts:

From the Crimea: "We are almost in despair. People are being turned out into the street one after another, without a piece of bread or any extra covering; thousands are in prison. Those who in the autumn would never have thought of leaving the country, now yearn to do so-anywhere, if only one yard across the border! All, not only we Germans, but Armenians, Russians, Jews and Tartars, every one who works on the land. . . . Almost every one has been outlawed, and that means being turned out into the street, whether rich or poor, the woman near her confinement, or with half a dozen small childr. n, without food, without money, often almost without clothing. ... Every day the despotism increases. Gold-filled teeth are dragged from the mouths even of those who are still regarded as citizens, and that not by doctors, but by herd boys with pincers. J. W. and K. were further tortured in Simseropol; their fingers are said to be absolutely crushed. Mrs. K. has also been turned out; she only had two small loaves with her. She was driven away from the dinner-table; the bandits sat down and ate the soup while one of their turned her out of doors. Imaging her state; no money, no clothes, the husband in prison; and no one may receive such as have been ejected, on pain of death. I cannot describe what life is like here."

From the Caucasus: "Several heavily laden trains have gone through filled with prisoners, surrounded by a strong guard. If anyone asks where they are going, the answer is, 'To the prisons as "kulaken" and outlaws, and then far off to the icefields of the north.' All forms of religious belief are to be absolutely stamped out. Brother H. has already been in prison three months. on a six years' sentence; Deacons H. S. and L. the same. All the brothers from here have fled; we do not know whither."

live in modern times. As we study how the message of the Revelation was born, we shall appreciate its living message for all time. When the book was written the fires of persecution were fiercely burning. The Roman empire with all its power was arrayed against God's little flock. Because Christians refused to worship idols they were accused of atheism; because they refused to bow before the image of the emperor they were branded as disloval.

Christianity was declared a menace

to the state and a determined effort was made to destroy it. Out of the sufferings of those days came the questions, "Shall the kingdoms of this world destroy the kingdom of Christ? Shall the emperor of Rome triumph over Christ?" The heavenly answer was granted in the book we are now studying, which teaches that the kingdom of Christ shall ultimately triumph over all opposition, and that in the time of the end, Antichrist, the arch persecutor (in whose spirit all persecutors of the Church have acted) shall be destroyed.

The keynote of the book, its central message, is: "Behold He cometh with clouds; and every eye shall see Him and they also which pierced Him: and all kindreds of the earth shall wail because of Him." Rev. 1:7. Thus the suffering saints then, and those of every age are encouraged with the hope of a triumphant future. As one has said, "The Christian's Hereafter has ever been the physician to his Now."

The Drama of the End Time

In this book we witness the mighty drama, to be enacted in the end time. The inspired seer draws aside the curtain that veils the future (the word "Revelation" in the Greek means We witness "unveiling"). scene after scene, representing the progress and fulfilment of prophecy. But the book of Revelation does more than draw aside the curtain; it takes us behind the scenes, where we watch the great Director Himself, ordering the movements of angels of power as they set in motion those tremendous forces that are to destroy all opposition to Christ and to His kingdom. We are given the assurance that all the powers of the invisible world are on the side of those who are enlisted under the banner of Christ.

Let us follow the movements of this great drama, scene by scene.

Scene I: The unveiling of the Son of Man. Ch. 1.

After a great statue has been completed, it is covered with drapes, awaiting the day of unveiling. The great day arrives; speeches are made and the band plays; then, a cord is drawn, the drapes fall and reveal the beauties of the statue to the admiring specta-John has heard Jesus speak tors. about His glory in the days when that glory was hidden from men. Now, lifted up in the Spirit, He beholds the glorified Christ, transfigured with the light of heaven, wearing the dazzling insignia of His kingly and priestly offices. John is a representative of that great company of the redeemed,

who, one day shall be present at the great unveiling of the Son of Man—who shall see Him as He is, and sing:

"All hail the power of Jesus' name; Let angels prostrate fall. Bring forth the royal diadem, And crown Him Lord of all!"

Scene II: Christ, the Church, and Coming Crisis. Chs. 2, 3.

In describing the work of the general superintendent of our movement, in his visitation and oversight of the churches, we may use the language of Rev. 2:1 and say that he walks among the golden candlesticks. In this scene we watch Christ, the great Overseer of the churches, making a tour of inspection. He is examining the lights of those whom He has appointed as the "light of the world." He is especially anxious for them at this particular time, for the black clouds of tribulation are gathering and the church must be ready. The time of the judgment of nations is approaching; but judgment must first begin at the house of God.

Scene III: Behind the Scenes in the Heavenlies, Chs. 4, 5.

With John our representative we are caught up and given a place on the heavenly observation platform, where we watch the powers behind the scenes and observe the events that must take place, on earth before Jesus descends. We see:-

The Throne. Who rules? Caesar? Imitators of Caesar in all ages? No. The heavens do rule, and God is still on His throne, in spite of appearances, in spite of the apparent triumph of the wicked.

The Book. Who possess the title deed to the earth? Not the rulers of this world, but the Almighty. When that book is opened, then the kingdoms of this world shall be possessed by the Lord and by His Christ.

The Lamb. Because of His atoning death, to Him is granted the honor of loosing the seals of the book; that is, of setting in motion those forces of judgment that will usher in His triumphant advent. The rulers of the world have rejected the tenderness of the Lamb. But soon the seals will be loosed, the trumpets will sound, the vials of wrath will be outpoured—and woe unto those who face the wrath of the Lion of the tribe of Judah!

Scene IV: The Unveiling of Satan. Chs. 6-19.

The period covered by the seals, trumpets, and vials is known as the Great Tribulation. The book of Revelation emphasizes this period as the time of Satan's unveiling—the time of the consummation of the mystery of iniquity. Reading chapter 13 and 16:13, 14, 16 we may imagine Satan writing his apocalypse, as follows:

"Great is the mystery of iniquity! Satan will become incarnate in Antichrist. He will be wounded unto death, but will rise from the dead. He will be given the kingdoms of this world, and his coming and rule will be proclaimed by his advocate and representative, the false prophet. These signs will follow his prophesying: he will bring down fire from heaven and cause the image of Antichrist to speak. It will come to pass afterwards, saith Satan, that he will pour out of his spirit upon all flesh (16:13, 14, 16) and his prophet will prophesy, and will seal and gather his church, For it will come to pass that he will lead his hosts against Christ and His people, to destroy His kingdom and challenge them that dwell in heaven. Who is like unto the beast, and who is able to make war with him?"

It is the time of Satan's Pentecost! But this diabolic spirit does not pollute earth's spiritual and moral atmosphere long. Christ and His hosts descend, good and evil meet, righteousness and unrighteousness, purity and impurity; these forces clash, there is a terrific storm in the heavenlies, a mighty upheavel in the spiritual and physical realms—and then a great calm, the Millennium. Christ has conquered.

Scene V: the Millennium and after. Ch. 20.


The Sun of Righteousness rises over the horizon of the millennial day. God's kingdom comes on earth as predicted by the prophets. David's great Son reigns, excuting perfect judgment. The overcomers reign with Christ. The meek inherit the earth.

After the thousand years Satan is loosed, the powers of evil make their final onslaught, which is defeated. The great white throne is set up and all who come before it are judged according to their works. Evil is swept from the earth and every man goes to his own place. We see a new heaven and a new earth.

Concluding Scene: Home! Chs. 21, 22.

After wandering for many millenniums, mankind (speaking in a general way) is at home in Father's house, enjoying perfect fellowship there. Heaven and earth form one real family, and the Father is all and in all. There we see manifested His great motherlove, for He taketh His great hankerchief and wipes away every tear caused by earth's sorrows. There is a happy wedding scene, too, for Christ and His bride take up their abode in the New Jerusalem, which is to be the light of the world forever. As we contemplate the happy scene, we may say with the old story writers, "AND THEY LIVED HAPPILY EVER AFTERWARDS!"

Dedication of New Church Building

Ponce, Porto Rico.

God certainly has done wonders in raising up this fine building. From the day that the construction work began it was just three months until we held the dedication service, the 15th day of this month. On this beautiful building we only owe something like \$250.00. In the photo Brother Lugo is in the front center row with the little boys and I am at the end with the trombone. Brother Louis Otero is just in front of me and just back of me is the present pastor of the Ponce Church, Brother Lorenzo Lucena. Then sitting beside Brother Otero is Brother Jose Martinez, the pastor of the Church in Arecibo. While we are nearly free from debt on the building yet we are quite heavily indebted on the lot. When we bought the lot all that we had to pay down on it was \$400.00 and that is all that we have payed on it up to the present date. When this lot was purchased it had on it two old houses that were sold and removed as soon as we could have it done, once sold we felt that inasmuch as we were paying such heavy interest we should begin building as soon as we could. Out of the two houses sold we took in some \$230.00 and we had a lot in Ponce City which we also sold and which brought in about \$450.00, and with this we began to build. Some of the other assemblies lent their little bit of construction funds and so the work went on. The walls were up and the work going on nicely but the money was practically all gone. What were we to do? Pray, of course! In that week's mail enough money came in to keep the work going on for another week and so the dear Lord has answered prayer until we see the building finished as you see it in the photo. The natives have sacrificed and have worked for about one-half the regular price and Brother Lugo himself superintended the job.

While we still owe practically all on the lot, yet we look at this church as a monument of faith. It is located on one of the more prominent streets (Mayor Cantera) of the city and is neither down in the real business and financial section, nor is it located out in the outskirts, or a purely residential section, but right where it is easily reached by either class.

The night of the dedication we had a beautiful baptismal service, Brother Lugo gave a talk on the financial problem, also a brief account of the history of the Pentecostal work in Ponce. Brother Rodrigues preached the dedication service. The "Embajadores de Cristo" (Christ's Ambassadors) of Aibonito sang the dedication hymn, also in the beginning a few minutes time was given for testimony and at the close several made confession. We are safe in saying that there were inside the building from 550 to 600 people

and many more were outside. Surely the glory of the Lord was both seen and felt. Bless His Name forever.—Frank Finkenbinder.

The New Work in Manchuria Martin Kvamme

We are happy to sound a note of praise from far off Manchuria with thanks to God for making it possible for us to open Full Gospel work in this field. We often wonder why Pentecostal missionaries have not established mission stations here long ago; but it must be that this is God's appointed time.

From the very first public meeting we held here we felt assured of being in God's will and that He was going to work in our midst. It is no easy mat-ter to enter a new field, and with a limited vocabulary begin from the bottom to build up a work. It generally takes some time for one to gain the confidence of the people and Mukden has been no exception to this rule. True enough, we found a few dear saints here that proved a great help and blessing to us; but we also found some unfavorable problems to grapple with. In looking back over the months we have labored here we see much to praise the Lord for. God has surely helped us to sail clear of both seen and unseen hindrances and for this we give glory to His precious name.

Our meetings have been well attended all along and the interest has been steadily increasing. We have not had what may be termed a revival; but God has been working upon the hearts of the people and some have been won for His kingdom. During the last few months we have held three Baptismal services and nineteen precious souls have been buried with the Lord. Twelve of these have received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire and some of them are already a great help to us in the meetings as their tender testimonies are of the nature that will lead others to the cross of Christ.

Manchuria affords an excellent opportunity for Full Gospel missionary work and we are praying for more missionaries to come and establish work in this great field. While the condition in China is very unsettled at the present time and missionary activities are greatly hindered in many places we are glad to state that the condition in Manchuria is peaceful. The people in general are very kind and nice to work among and nothing is hindering us from sowing the good

seed everywhere. We don't know how long this condition will last and may we therefore avail ourselves of the wonderful opportunity now granted us.

Pray that we may be enabled to open mission stations in needy places where there is no one to tell the people of Jesus and His love.

Work Among Women of India's Zenanas

Our hearts are melted before our God as we view His workings during the short time since returning from our furlough. There are large needs, indeed, which have not been supplied, but we do hear a "going in the tops of the mulberry trees," and we praise Him!

A phase of work, which seems to have developed of itself, is a ministry to Indian teachers and workers from other societies who come to a near-by Indian Holiday Home or who come to us for their vacation. Miss W. Booth (related to the Salvation Army Booths) requested that we allow one one of her teachers to take her vaca-tion with us. She became hungry for a deeper walk with God, spent some money on stamps, sending out her confessions, as the Spirit worked in her heart, and God met her in a real way, anointing and baptizing her in the Holy Spirit. Miss Booth writes that she has returned in deep blessing.

The Lord has just brought a village heathen convert into divine healing. When told of anointing for healing, she could not understand how oil applied to the head could heal her stomach; but when taught, she was blessedly healed. Hallelujah!

From a distant place, a heathen woman came to a near-by village where she could be attended at the hospital. She was low with T. B. and discouraged when our workers found her. God graciously healed her, and now the whole village has opened in a new way to the gospel. We hope soon to visit her distant village where she has returned rejoicing in divine healing.

The Lord has enabled us to open a library in the busy part of the city. At first picketing by Gandhi's political agitators hindered, but prayer has prevailed and hungry men come to hear and read the Word in their own language. I say "men" since, on account of the Purdah system, women do not attend public places. Indeed, if high caste women are permitted out at all, it is under cover. The zenana women must be reached, with the gospel, in their hiding.

Long the converts of those zenanas have been on my heart. Many are secret believers, remaining in their homes without taking water baptism which would, according to Hindu

mythology, make them a defilement in the home, and if permitted to remain after baptism, she must eat apart from the family never allow her shadow to fall upon the ghara of water or on any food or person!

In some cases it is impossible for them to remain as "secret believers," and in order to go all the way with Jesus, they must pay the full price, leave home, escape to the Mission House, and then be spirited away to a place of safety. Some have tried to remain at home and let their light shine and have suffered bitter persecution. Some have disappeared mysteriously. Some have been beaten, scalded, and even disfigured for life by the cutting off of the nose by an enraged husband.

She was saturated with superstition and heathen customs. God has saved her, baptized her with the Holy Spirit, and both women are being taught five hours daily in our school. 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
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
