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How Pentecost Came to Madagascar



AVELO, a woman about sixty years of age, was one day carried into the church as dead for a simple burial service-not in a coffin, but wrapped in a cloth, as is customary in Madagascar.

During the singing of a hymn, to the amazement of the congregation, she suddenly sat up, alive and well. From that day until now she has been known as "the resurrected one." She has been going about, in a quiet, simple way, preaching the gospel and healing the sick. The Lord graciously baptized her in the Spirit and bid her "Go." At first she demurred, saying, "I cannot speak, I am not clever"—but again He spoke, "Go! Preach in My Name and heal the sick."

She has been mightily used both in the salvation of souls and in the healing of bodies. Before praying for the sick, she asks, "Have you repented? Have you given up your idols?" Even cases of insanity have yielded to the simple prayer of faith.

On one occasion, a man, bound with ropes, was brought by two friends to be prayed for. "Have you repented of your sins? Do you promise to give up your idols?" asked Ravelo, and when answered in the affirmative, she prayed for him and told the two men to loose him and let him go. And, lo! once again, as with the Christ-healed maniac of old, this man, hitherto bent upon works of destruction, was suddenly made whole, and though two years have passed away, he is still "clothed, and in his right mind."

Having received a promise from the Lord that she should have helpers in A True Story of a Great Revival

the work, Ravelo met with a young man, whose name is Rajaofera, and recognizing him to be one of these chosen ones, she said to him, "God has showed me that you will help in His work. Go,"-and, she continued, putting her hand on his head, "Go in the name of the Lord. Pray, and wait for the Lord.'

A day or two later, as he sat in his little sitting room, the Holy Spirit fell upon him, and for days he was under His power and lost in God.

When he intimated to his wife that he had received a clear call to preach the gospel throughout the island, such was the grace of the Lord upon her also, that she readily consented to his leaving her and their large family of children, cost what it might.

Soon after receiving his commission Rajaofera was met by a blind man who asked him to pray for him. "If you do pray," whispered the enemy, "and he is not healed you will be laughed at." "Go in the strength of the Lord," came another voice. He prayed. The blind man received his sight. From this time many marvellous healing have accompanied his faithful ministry. In over thirty cases blind people have regained their sight, and in one family seven members, all born blind, were healed.

One man had completely lost his eyes as the result of gas poisoning in France during the war, fourteen years ago. He used to be led by the hand to the Government Office to receive his pension. He was known to the Governor General and by everyone else in the place.

The Lord met his need in one of Rajaofera's meetings, and he received

new, God-given eyes. Going to the Government Office he made known to the officer-in-charge that he no longer needed a pension, as he could now work. The matter was referred to the Minister of Colonies, in Paris, who sent his congratulation on his having received his sight, and expressing his hope that many others would obtain a similar benefit, but adding that he was to be allowed to continue with his pension. He now works in a bank, near the Residency, and is well known as "the miracle man."

The following is another striking case of healing. A man with a para-lyzed leg, who had been in the hospital for a year and could hardly walk with the aid of a stick, came to Rajaofera asking for prayer.

"Have you given up your idols"-"Yes."

"But you have two more wrapped up. Bring them here tomorrow. Do you really want to give yourself to Jesus and worship Him only?"

Rajaofera came down from the pulpit and, after praying with him, told him to walk up and down without his stick. With the greatest difficulty and suffering the man obeyed. Rajaofera put out his hand and very gently helped him. The audience were singing a hymn. Very soon the stiffness was gone and the man was walking alone. His very countenance was altered, and even his features seemed changed, as if a divine breath had been wafted over him. The congregation was moved to tears, and praised God aloud. Turning to an onlooker, Ra-jaofera said *in French*, "You can take his stick home," and then, to the man, "You will lean on Jesus now."

on war, the Acts and the Epistles carry on the same teaching and the same example as that recorded Jesus. Acts 7:60; Rom.


12:20: 1 Thess. 5:15; Eph. 4:32; etc. Forgiveness and the suffering of injury even

(1 Cor. 6:7) is the keynote right through. There is plenty of conflict, it is true, and military metaphors are freely used, but the warfare is strictly spiritual, and the weapons are "not carnal." 2 Cor. 10:4. The foes which the Christian has to meet and overcome are those very spiritual forces of evil, and those very sins and passions which are most of all let loose in times of warfare, and which the active participant can hardly avoid sharing in.

Certain questions may be raised, however, which demand a fair inquiry. For instance, it may be argued that if the military profession is so opposed to Christian principles, then why did our Lord heal the soldier's servant? Why did the Holy Spirit fall upon Cornelius? Why has God blessed Christian soldiers, such as General Gordon and many others, right through the centuries?

The answer is, of course, that God meets us in grace during this dispensation, and demands of a soul only that it walk in all the light He has given it. There is no real question raised at all because Christ healed the centurion's servant, for He was "the friend of publicans and sinners," and He healed them all. In the case of the devout man Cornelius, it is plain that he was walking in all the light he possessed. One of the common fallacies among us is that divine blessing represents divine approval upon all that we are and all that we do. This does not follow, however, in this day of grace. The final explanation is that divine mercy is granted to us for Christ's sake, and not because of works of righteousness which we have done.

Moreover, the inspired teaching of the apostle was that conversion should disorganize as little as possible the social structure of the age in which they were living. "Let every man abide in the same calling wherein he was called." 1 Cor. 7:20, etc. The spiritual freedom which the slave found in Christ was of far more importance than his social liberty. This did not imply that the gospel endorsed slavery; its principles are diametrically opposed to it; and eventually the gospel triumphed, and wherever its light shone, THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL



slavery became gradually abolished. The same rule will apply to soldiering. Where the Christian soldier had honorable obligations to fulfill, entered into before his conversion, we cannot imagine the apostle giving any other counsel than that given to the slave, "Abide in your calling" meanwhile, until a legitimate opportunity is afforded for freedom. This does not endorse militarism any more than 1 Corinthians 7 endorses slavery. There have doubtless been many men in military service who have never seen, or only dimly realized, how opposed such an occupation with all it involves must ever be to the spirit and teaching of Jesus Christ. God will bless such up to the light they have, if they do not play traitor to their own consciences but are sincerely "walking in the light" as far as they have it.

Having referred to "honorable obligations." we are now brought face to face with the most delicate and crucial issue of the whole question. This is to determine what shall be the attitude of a Christian when the very State to which he is commanded in the word of God to be in subjection "for conscience' sake" (Rom. 13:5) demands that he shall take up arms. This was the exact dilemma which multitudes of believers in the belligerent nations on both sides of the last war had to meet; which many are meeting right now in the countries where conscription is in force; and which all of us, at any time, may be called upon to meet again.

The Practical Application

It cannot be stated too emphatically that it is the duty of the Christian to be in subjection to the powers that be. Rom. 13:1-8, etc. They are "ordained of God." That is to say, God is always on the side of order and government, and always opposed to anarchy and lawlessness. The Christian's submission to the powers that be must always rise above mere shades of political opinion; he must be equally loyal to whatever political party may be in office. Mere personal disagreement with certain laws can never justify a Christian in disobeying or evading them; he should "for conscience' sake"

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scrupulously obey the slightest police order or by-law of the local magistrates and all the law of the land in which he dwells. Absolute loyalty to the State must be the declared and actual policy of any section of the Christian church that aims at the approval of God. "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's."

This may seem to settle the question once and for all, and apparently to leave no alternative for the Christian when the State commands but to obey. It should be remembered, however, that although God is on the side of order and government as opposed to anarchy and lawlessness, yet the men who comprise the governments of this world may often be sinners who have "no fear of God be-fore their eyes"; or, at the best, are men compassed about by the infirmities shared by the whole human race. A situation may therefore arise at any time when a human government legislates along a line directly opposed to the revealed will of God contained in the Scriptures. This is a very different matter to a mere question of diversity of politics. When the clash is between the law of God and the law of man, then the only answer for the Christian is contained in the immortal words of Peter, "We ought to obey God rather than men." Acts 5:29. Conscientious objection then becomes the only possible course, however ser-ious the consequences. The Bible puts clear before us the magnificent example of Daniel and the three Hebrews. Daniel 3 and 6. He who said, "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's" also said, "But unto God the things that are God's.' The two are to be combined to the last possible limit, but when further combination of allegience becomes impossible -then God must come first.

The Christian's true citizenship is in heaven. Phil. 3:20, R. V. He obeys the laws of his earthly country in exactly the same way as an alien passing through. His ultimate allegiance is always to his heavenly King.

Patriotism is unfortunately allowed to run wild in so many believers. Even in times of peace narrow nationalistic prejudices are allowed to interfere with Christian fellowship. The writer remembers a convention in Scotland some years ago when objection was taken to speakers who on that occasion happened to be English! In the same way one sometimes finds prejudice of British against American preachers, and American against British preachers; and other such nationalistic feel-

ings, all over the world. We fear that a perverted patriotism is far more deeply rooted in most of our hearts than becometh citizens of the heavenly kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ; and if we are not careful it can make us very traitors to the true body of Christ. We are "all one" in Him.

Yet if patriotism can affect many so strongly in time of peace, is it any wonder that they are completely swept off their feet by its surging currents in time of war? Patriotism may have some legitimate and admirable means of outflow and expression—we do not suggest that we need be entirely without it—but it requires deep personal crucifixion, and especially when it destroys Christian fellowship between brethren. More than all else we must be delivered from that unthinking patriotism which says "My country, right or wrong."

The writer has observed as a solemn fact that those of our Pentecostal brethren who took a strongly patriotic attitude in the last war have mostly gone backward in spiritual power and influence ever since, while those who put Christ and His Word before all have advanced by divine grace to positions of spiritual leadership. It could hardly be otherwise.

The extent to which a believer feels called to maintain a conscientious objection to military service must always remain a personal matter. Many will feel that they have gone quite far enough in refusing to actually take life, and such will willingly take Red Cross work, or other non-combatant service. Others will feel that they cannot participate in definitely military service of any description; but are ready to undertake any work of national importance in a time of national crisis, such as farming or help in essential public services. Extremists may go even further, but it should be remembered that in the highly organized condition of modern society it is practically impossible to live in a State without participating in some way or other in its activities. Every individual must settle it between his own conscience and God.

The question of self-defense may arise in some minds. This was a favorite test-question in tribunals during the last war. The writer was asked, for instance, "What would you do if German soldiers were attacking your home, and on the point of killing your wife and children?" None of us dare state dogmatically what we would do under such circumstances; human instincts are very strong. But there is not much doubt as to what the Christian *ought* to do, even in such a position as that, to show forth the spirit

of his Master. Peter used a sword in defense of Christ, but our Lord instantly repudiated his action, and healed the slashed ear. Luke 22:51. Some wives would not ask for defense at such a time. One feels that there ought to be a trust in God to deliver, or else a suffering of whatever His will permitted. Calvary does not point at all in the direction of self-defense, and the appeal to the natural brute instincts which such a question entails can hardly have first place with a Spirit-filled child of God.

There is a justifiable fear on the part of the State and the public that "conscientious objection" may be used as a cloak for cowardice and mere shirking. This being so, the believer can hardly complain if his treatment is somewhat hard. Indeed, he will willingly submit to any fair test that can prove the genuineness of his conviction. And it was the writer's general experience that sincerity, once proved, won the respect even of those who could not agree altogether with the stand taken.

There can be no doubt whatever of the ultimate result, if Christians all over the world refused to participate in war and bloodshed. Even the New York Times, in referring to the Lambeth Conference Resolution quoted above, says, "If this were lived up to by all the members of that particular church around the globe, and they were joined by all the members of the other Christian churches, the end of war would be assured. The moral and economic sanctions against it would drive it at least beyond the borders of These are words well Christendom." worth pondering.

Much as love for poor war-weary humanity may make us long for such an issue, however, we believe that the true motive for the believer is not to be found even there; it is to be found in personal loyalty to our Saviour and King, and in a detestation of war and all it involves, because it is so absolutely opposed to His Spirit who has come to dwell in our hearts.

A Mock Prayer and Its Sequel A True Story by John S. Lull

The Millerite excitment was in the winter of 1841 and '42. My grandfater, Willian Lull, was at that time pastor at Windham, New York. Here, in a schoolhouse, he conducted a protracted meeting; but for the first six weeks there were only two converts, a woman and a boy. One evening a group of young men were gathered in a tailor's shop, and were talking about the meetings. One of them, Orrin P. Matthews, said, "Boys, would you

like to hear Miller's sermon on the Judgment?"

Several replied, "Yes, Orrin, let's have it !"

Matthews was guite an elocutionist, and had a remarkable memory. Also he had read the aforesaid sermon. So, mounting a chair, he began. He had not proceeded far, however, when he noticed that the tailor's helper, seated in a corner of the room doing some overtime work, had stopped and was sitting with bowed head. Matthews paused and said: "Say, Cowles, are you under conviction? If, so, I will pray for you. Someone said they believed I could pray as good as old Giles up there at the meetings." Thereupon he jumped from the chair, knelt down, and began to pray. But when he had spoken only two or three sentences, he stopped and began to tremble like a leaf. His companions, supposing that he had been suddenly taken ill, rushed to him and inquired what was the matter. He made no reply, but only continued to tremble. They got him to his feet and led him home.

The next morning several of Matthews' friends went to his home to inquire how he was. He said, "Boys, as I was making that mock prayer, suddenly conviction of my sins and lost condition came upon me. I was filled with fear and trembling, and could not speak. Boys, I am under conviction." The others confessed that they were in the same condition. "Well," said Matthews, "let's go up to the schoolhouse tonight and, when the invitation is given, go forward to the penitent form."

They agreed. But though all went to the meeting, Matthews failed to lead the way. So not one of them made a move. After the meeting, however, they all went to the tailor's shop, locked the door, got down on their knees, and began to pray earnestly, and so loudly that the neighbors could hear them.

In the shop that night three of those young men were converted. The next evening they all went to the schoolhouse and confessed Christ; and a great revival spread through all that region. Three of the young men, including Matthews, entered the ministry. The first of the group to come into the light was also the youngest. He was the son of the preacher at the schoolhouse, and was my own father, Delos Lull.

The best of men and the most earnest workers will make enough mistakes to make them humble. Thank God for mistakes and take courage. Don't give up on account of mistakes. —Dwight L. Moody.

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The Editor's Notebook

The Crisis in Palestine

In the November issue of Harpers Magazine there is an illuminating article on the Jewish World Crisis, written by an able Jew, Ludwig Lewisohn. In this article he endeavors to show that Zionism is more than a mere political move: "At every passover Israel has rejoiced over the liberation from Egypt and the conquest of Canaan; on each ninth day of the month of Ab it has fasted and wept over the destruction of the temple of God. Wherever during all these centuries two Jews have parted from each other in either grief or hope, they have said, 'Next year in Jerusalem!' The people have never relinquished Palestine-the land of Israel-either in thought or in practice." He points out that from the year 63 B. C. when Pompey conquered Palestine and sold thousands of Jews prisoners of war into slavery in Rome, there has been hatred and injustice shown to the Jews. But despite all attempts to exterminate them, the Jews are still with Mr. Lewisohn says, "Evidently 115. we have not the power of disappearing. We are not liked nor truly wanted where we are; we make an attempt to go back to our own land, and every true obstacle is exaggerated and every fancied obstacle emphasized, and the sympathy of the world goes, after lip regret, to the Arabs who murdered a number of our old men and women and defenseless school boys in the uprising of August 1929." This writer has absolute faith in Zionism, and says, "If England, supported by the faith and word of all the enlightened nations of the west, can, while protesting her good faith, whittle down her solemn obligations and undertakings toward us until nothing is left but a blunder and a shame-if that is conceived, what hope is there for us anywhere or at any time in any outside force or power of influence? That there is no such hope, that salvation for us and the solving of our

problem must come from within that is precisely the center of Zionist doctrine and Zionist experience."

Why Arabs Oppose

Mr. Lewisohn states, "The immi-gration of the Jews into Palestine, the \$225,000,000.00 they have spent there, the personal self-sacrifice and technical skill they have exercised, have raised the standard of living of the Arab peasantry, and raised their wage scale by one hundred per cent. The Arab feudal lords and priestly aristocracy-a group of interlocked families-cannot forgive us for our gradual liberation of their peasantry. The power of the aristocracy is threatened unless it im tates our methods and pays our scale of wages . . . Hence, in 1929 they raised the cry that the Jews wanted to destroy the holy places of the Mohammedan faith, that they were about to lay hands on the Dome of the Rock, that their ancient rite of praying at the Wailing Wall was an impiety against the horse of the prophet (there are marks of a horse's hoofs on the temple site, which the Mohammedans declare are the prints Mohammet's horse made when he ascended from the temple site into heaven). They invented a legend found in no ancient Arab document, to substantiate these matters for their wholly illiterate peasantry. And so they inflamed the peasantry into fanatical fury; and tall Arab warriors with naked swords broke into the Talmudic University of Hebron and slaughtered the defenseless young students. And then our liberal friends babble of selfdetermination for the Arabs.'

A Modern Pharaoh

Mr. Lewisohn's article was obviously written before October 20th, when Lord Passfield, the Br'tish Colonial Secretary, set forth Great Britain's future policy thus: "The temporary suspension and permanent restriction of land purchase by Jews in Palestine; November 15, 1930

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continued restriction of Jewish immigration; and the establishment of a legislative council in Palestine, which has been the chief contention of the Arab population." To this there has been a tremendous uproar of protest, not only from the Jews but from leading British statesmen as well. One British paper states, "There was a day when we were on the edge of despair. We needed friends. We needed friends desperately. Call it what you will, but the Jewish community, far flung through all lands, threw in their lot with us in the day of our distress. We asked them in effect, to say what most of all on earth they would like, if it were something to which we could help them. They asked for a visible home in Palestine, a shrine for headquarters for their race. We are a Christian nation. But that is not Christianity which repudiates anything which was of the essence of the Jewish faith and of the Jewish conscience. And the Jewish conscienceand here even Christianity cannot go beyond it in depth and reach-announces itself once for all in its definition of a good man: 'Lord, who shall abide in Thy tabernacle? . . . He that sweareth to his own hurt and changeth not'." Some years ago when Alexander III of Russia was persecuting the Jews, a London paper, Punch, printed a cartoon showing the ghost of Pharaoh standing over the Czar with warning finger pointing to the Jews, and saying, "Beware! I have had experience of that." The same paper might repeat this cartoon today; but instead of a picture of Alexander it might well picture Lord Passfield seeking to keep the Jews from going back to the land God has promised them. Under the cartoon they might put Zech. 10:6, "And I will strenothen the house of Judah, and I will save the house of Joseph. and I will bring them again to place them: for I have mercy upon them: and they shall be as though I had not cast them off; for I am the Lord their God."

The Arab Viewpoint

A writer in the London Times recently gave this picture of things in

Palestine: "From the villages and their tents in the country, Moslems have watched the installation of the Jew with jealousy, envy, and suspicion. They have seen malarial plains become inhabited centers of colonization. They have watched enthusiasm and energy change arid regions into cultivated They have witnessed the digfields. ging of wells and the introduction of irrigation where water was not. The hillsides which they, their camels, and their goats deforested they have seen replanted. They have seen wealthwealth to them almost unimaginablesquandered, as it seemed to them, on the unwelcome alien. The petty townsman, as the Moslem always considered the Jew, was superseding them in their own manner of life as a tiller of soil. They saw, in fact, all the benefits of which they felt themselves deprivedand were they, too, promised nothing during the war?--showered upon a people whom they mistrusted and despised. They see today even more. They see a menace to their possession of the land, to their means of existence, to their freedom, to their race and to their religion. The Jew, after long years of servility to the conquering Moslem race, has become its master."

Ishmael's Envy

This writer's opinion is confirmed by an article in the New York Times, written by Mr. Emil Ludwig, who says, "The Arabs look on angrily at this spectacle of others excelling them upon their soil. The individual, even the whole community, loses all sense of logic when it feels itself outstripped, and even the well-to-do Arabian, who now travels over the hills on excellent motor roads, refuses to recognize that nearly all the money, which by fits and starts has transformed this country in a decade, has come from Jews who from far overseas look toward this coast and send here a part of their income or their inheritancefor purely moral reasons—because they are actuated by a feeling for an old, long-forgotten homeland which has somewhat suddenly reappeared. Nor does he take cognizance of the eucalyptus forests which have replaced swamps in the struggle against malaria: and when the fellah, his tenant, with the aid of two horses, realizes \$150 to the acre, it irritates him to hear that the Jewish farmer gets \$600 from the same amount of ground. So he expresses his feelings by denouncing the Jews."

God's Part

Mr. Lewisohn, in his article alluded to above, says, "The Jewish people is

redeeming itself. Shall that redemption be brought to naught?" Not once in his article does he make any mention of the Lord. Any attempt at redemption apart from Him will surely be vain. But the Jewish prophets are full of promises to encourage the children of Zion. Their prophet Zechariah declared, "And the Lord shall inherit Judah his portion in the Holy Land, and shall choose Jerusalem again." All the blessing of the promises to Israel is linked to the coming of the Messiah. It is written, "Behold the man whose name is THE BRANCH; ... He shall build the temple of the Lord, . . He shall bear the glory, and shall sit and rule upon His throne; and He shall be a priest upon His throne." Zech. 6:12, 13. Zechariah was given a vision of Joshua the high priest, a Tew who represented the whole nation. He saw that instructions were given to take the filthy garments from off Joshua and also to clothe him with a change of raiment. Joshua did not have to take off his own filthly garments and put on others, but it was all done for him by another. That vision is typical of the redemption which will be brought to Israel when the Lord returns. It is written concerning this redemption, of which the unclothing and clothing upon of Joshua was a type, "I will remove the iniquity of that land in one day.' Zech. 3:9.

God's Promises of Grace

Some may ask, "What is the practical value to us of all these things happening to the Jews?" There is much value; for great blessing comes to the Gentiles in the restoration of the Jews. Paul shows this very clearly in Rom. 11, and the Lord shows it also through the prophet Zechariah, through whom He said to the Jews, "And it shall come to pass that as ye were a curse among the nations, O house of Judah and house of Israel; so will I save you, and ye shall be a blessing." Just as the revelation of the Lord to the blaspheming Saul of Tarsus transformed him into Paul the great apostle who brought untold blessing to the nations, so will the restoration of Israel bring untold blessing to the whole world. The picture is given us in Zechariah 8: "The inhabitants of one city shall go to another saying, Let us go speedily to pray before the Lord and to seek to the Lord of hosts . Many people and strong nations shall come to seek the Lord of hosts in Jerusalem, and to pray before the Lord . . . In those days shall it come to pass that ten men shall take hold out of all the languages of the nations, even shall take hold of the skirts of

him that is a Jew, saying, We will go with you; for we have heard that God is with you."

A Glorious Day Coming

Mr. Emil Ludwig, writing to the New York Times from Palestine, says, "If this were a land flowing with milk and honey one could readily understand the Arab resistance. But nothing flows here, not even water.' But with the return of the Lord the whole land will be changed. It is written, "His feet shall stand in that day. upon the mount of Olives . . . and the mount of Olives shall cleave in the midst thereof toward the east and toward the west, and there shall be a very great valley . . . and it shall be in that day that living waters shall go out from Jerusalem; half of them toward the former sea, and half of them toward the hinder sea; in summer and in winter shall it be." Then will war cease, for it is written, "There shall be no more utter destruction." Zech. 14:11. Then will come a revival of holiness, for it is written, "In that day shall there be upon the bells of the horses, HOLINESS UNTO THE LORD." In the meantime Israel is being tested and we need to pray for them as they are going through the fires. But it is written, "I will bring the third part through the fire, and will refine them as silver is refined. and will try them as gold is tried." Zech. 13:9. Today the people of Israel are singing their dismal chants at the Wailing Wall of Jerusalem. One who has seen them of late, says, "Leaning against the wall, in all sorts of dejected attitudes, are a number of men, women, and children, some weeping piteously, others mumbling prayers, and yet others quietly fingering their Hebrew scriptures. It will be many a day before I can forget those sad and haunting faces that glimmered beneath the wall of Herod's temple, or free my ears from the mournful cadence of their cries." Mr. Emil Maxwell, the head of the Jerusalem Mission, writes from Jerusalem, "We cannot yet see anything in the nature of a national turning to Jesus Christ as their Messiah. But it may be significant that in many cases the Jews living in this city are painting up large crosses over their houses, in order to shelter under the sign of the Cross. It may be that some of them will come to seek refuge under the Blood of the Cross, which until quite recently they despised, and of which many of them have a superstitious dread."

No fear, when they kill you, you shall come to this place.'

So my heart know that this be God for true. I don't know how to read, and He teach me how to read. I don't know how to pray, and He teach me how to pray. He never forget me day and night. Before I always curse people, but now no. I like fight, but God take all the fight and curse and steal far away from my heart. I no like them any more at all. First time when I do all this wicked thing it bring plenty trouble for me, but this time when I no do it again, no trouble for me. I know He teach me plenty thing, and heaven be fine place too much. About seven moon now I hear plenty voice from my Lord. He told me to pull strong and work hard, and be ready when He comes, and worship Him good. So I beg you to worship my Lord too. If you hear any voice from heaven let me know. First time when I pray, my Lord catch my heart. The time He catch my heart all my fashion change. Then my Lord make me to have plenty word to say to people. He put three different language in my mouth. He make me have plenty song and prayer. Lord truly catch my heart. Today, I know I am poor, but I get all my help from God. "First time I think my body be for

myself, but today I know God get my body. This time when I want to wake up I ask my Lord. When I want to do anything I ask my Lord. When I want to see anything, speak anything, I ask my Lord, so I know every little thing belong to God. God go make our eye see good thing, our feet walk good way, and our hand do good thing. He am a great God for anything. I like to spend plenty time with my Lord, every day, and every night. I know we all be one brother now. Let us thank our Lord proper. Our Lord be so sweet, so let us follow Him good. Only John the Baptist way be humble way, proper God way. God no like proud man. All we like sheep have gone astray. First time I use tobacco, drink rum, fight, and do all wicked things, but God truly change my heart. I see the way of wicked man be too bad. This time my Lord tell me I must not let my heart be troubled. So let us bow down, and worship our great God. First time I think devil doctors be good people,

but this time I know their fashion be different. They no have God's spirit. I love my Lord plenty. He do many great thing for me. My heart be glad. I just glad; glad; glad. All my body. glad.

A Native's Testimony from India

Overcoming the Accuser

"There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus." Never listen to the accuser of the brethren, for he will ever endeavor to get you to limit the Holy One of Israel. Ever be looking to the limitless expanse of God's mercy and grace. Abundance of grace! Grace to swallow up all condemnation! Do not spend all your time examining yourself in analytic introspection. Keep looking unto Jesus. If God be for us, who can be against us? If you and your house are under the blood, the destroying angel cannot touch you.

Resist the devil and he will flee from you, and resist him not only for yourself but for the church of God. The devil is the accuser of the brethren, and if he cannot accuse them of sin he will bring up imaginations. Your adversary, the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour; whom resist stedfast in the faith. And one of the subtleties of the enemy is to endeavor to make you believe that all your morbid introspections are from God. We have not such a petty God. Don't measure God by your own petty feelings. He is infinite in wisdom and strength and boundless grace.

Get a vision of God and His infiniteness. When the enemy reproaches you and says to you daily, "Where is thy God?" cry out like the Psalmist, "Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope thou in God, for I shall yet praise Him!" Praise defeats the foe. The living creatures in the Revelation cease not day nor night in their praise, and God would have a people ever doing the same.

The enemy seeks in every way to come in, but we are not ignorant of his devices, for we are not of the night but of the day. Never yield to the temptation to measure God by the devil's rule. He limits God all the time. "Can God do this or that? Can God furnish a table in the wilderness? Yea, hath God said this?" The children of Israel listened, and they complained of God's provision, "Our soul loatheth this light bread !" They wanted to go back to Egypt. They listened to the devil and they fell by the way.

Never listen to him. He is the accuser of the brethren. He is going to be cast out of the heavenly places, but before that, when he knows his time is short, he will multiply his accusations. Accusation upon accusation at the children of God! How? Through

When others, directly or indirectly. you hear an accusation against a child of God, remember who is the prompter. The accuser of the brethren will be cast out, and those who lend their lips to his accusations must mind lest they themselves are cast down with him. You have not so learned Christ.

"Where are thine accusers?" Jesus asked the woman. Then He told her, "Neither do I condemn thee." There is no condemnation to those that are in Christ Jesus. Why? Because He Himself has had all the condemnation the devil could give. He was condemned by the priests, by Pilate, and His own people denied Him. Both Ravelo and Rajaofera are readers of one book only-the precious Word of God. Their own language is Malagasy, but the reader will notice that the words in French are emphasized. Before the Lord baptized Rajaofera, he had no knowledge of that language, but the Holy Spirit apportioned to him this wonderful gift, and he not only carries about with him his Malagasy New Testament, but also a French copy-and many an opportunity is granted him of reading it, and explaining "the way of this life" to Europeans who visit him.

Let us take yet another peep into some of these scenes where souls are getting deliverance from Satan's thral-There is Rabelaza, once leader dom. of idol-worship in her village, and possessor of the great stone which had been worshipped and held in veneration by all the village for four generations. There is also the drum, with which she mustered the people, inciting them to rum-drinking, feasting, and devil-dancing until they were seized with frenzy.

But she was attracted by rumors of Rajaofera's meetings, and came from some inexplicable hunger in her soul.

God's Holy Spirit did His gracious work and she was convicted of sin. Weeping and confessing her guilt, she begged the servant of God to pray for her. She was asked the invariable questions, "Do you repent? Do you give yourself up to Jesus?"—"Yes." "Will you give up your idols?"

"Will he plead against me with his great power? No; but he would put strength in me . . . Behold, I go for-ward, but he is not there; and backward, but I cannot perceive him: on the left hand, where he doth work, but I cannot behold him : he hideth himself on the right hand, that I cannot see him: but he knoweth the way that 1 take: when he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold . . . But he is in one mind, and who can turn him? and what his soul desireth, even that he doeth. For he performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things are with him." Job 23:6-10, 13, 14.

Iob was in the midst of pain and suffering. He was as a besieged city. left as a cottage in a vineyard, as a lodge in a garden of cucumbers, desolate. He says, "I go forward but I cannot find the Lord, and backward, but He is not there. He works on my left hand, but I cannot behold Him; and He hides Himself on the right hand, that I cannot see Him." Then from the depths of his heart, he groans, "Oh, that I knew where I might find him! that I might come even to his seat! I would order my cause before him, and fill my mouth with arguments." But Job reasons: "Will he plead against me with his great power? I am only dust, and He, the great Omnipotent. Ah, no; He only designs to refine my gold. He is very pitiful and of tender. mercy, and would only put strength in me." And as he gropes and searches for the Lord, not being able to see Him on the right hand nor on the left, still, knowing that the Lord is at work for him, Job utters that profound, golden sentence that has been the comfort of saints of all ages: "But he knoweth the way that I take: when he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold." "God is of one mind," he says, "And who can turn him? what his soul desireth, even that he doeth; but he performeth the thing that is appointed for me: and many such things are with him.'

Thus resigned to the will of God, it is written, "So the Lord blessed the latter end of Job more than his beginning."

Afflicted, tested, tried one, take courage! Be of good comfort. God notes the sparrow's fall. "For he performeth the thing that is appointed for me." Such individual care! The Gospel in Foreign Lands

Our Responsibility and Our Privilege

In considering the missionary situation we are faced with two aspects. The first is our solemn *responsibility* to "Go . . . into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." This is a command from which we cannot get away nor consider ourselves obedient servants if we are ignoring it or not making it a matter of prayerful consideration in all of our activities. One has very aptly expressed it when he said. "No one has a right to hear the gospel twice before all have heard it once."

There are still vast fields awaiting the hand of the reaper for God. A native of the Philippines writes: "America has 480,000 Moslems under her flag in these islands. She has sent us educators, but we need Christianity." If these Moslems are converted, they may become missionaries to the Moslems of other lands.

The crying need of the world is for something that will satisfy, and when that is not supplied, men are led into all kinds of vice as they endeavor to ease the ache in their hearts. It is stated that 500,000 Egyptians have become drug addicts in the past ten years, and the use of this drug is becoming so common that even the babies are given a tea made of the poppy seed in order to make them sleep better.

In South America there is a great door of opportunity open, and vet that vast continent is, so far, hardly one fourth evangelized. There are two great classes of people one meets in South America today. One is the edu-cated class who are breaking away from Catholicism but who do not have the gospel to take its place and, therefore, are turning to Spiritism and other kindred cults which profess a real touch with the spirit realm. People are anxious for reality and in the absence of the gospel are ready to accept almost any substitute which seems to be real. The other class one meets in the millions of Indians, descendants of an ancient civilization, living in the interior of most of the South American Republics. Heretofore little work has been done among these needy people although our missionaries in Peru are making a special effort to reach the Indians in their territory.

In Japan it is stated that there are fifty times as many Buddhist priests as there are Christian missionaries and Japanese Christian workers combined.

There are calls coming for pioneer workers in neglected areas in China, Japan, Latin America, among the Mohammedans of the Philippines, among the young women of Syria, and, not least important, among the vast numbers of Orientals and foreign born who are now in the United States, the majority of whom are in just as great darkness concerning the vital truths of the gospel as they were in their native lands far removed from all Christian influences.

It is our responsibility to pray and work and give for the evangelizing of these great companies of people. But the other aspect I wish to touch is that in addition to just meeting the requirement of doing what we feel we must, it is our *privilege* to add a little for the comfort of those who have taken their position on the firing line, above their bare maintenance need.

If we had the time and space I should like to tell you something of what is being accomplished by our faithful missionaries in different lands. A letter comes to us from one of our missionaries working in a Mohammedan country. We are not giving the name of the missionary or the names of the towns mentioned in her letter because this report might get into the hands of opponents of Christianity located near the missionary who would use it to stir up great opposition against the workers who through their ministry are making inroads into the ranks of Mohammedanism. The missionary writes: "We had ten days of prayer and then suddenly the break - was deeply stirred with came. A---revival fire. For men and women to be broken down under conviction for sin and cry out mightily to God for forgiveness and a clean heart, and then to be filled with overpowering joy as Christ revealed Himself to them were things never before heard of in this place. But such is the way God is graciously revealing Himself in this important city."

A report comes to us from India concerning a native Christian young man who was called of God to the ministry. It was stated by an eye witness that a white form had stood beside this young man with its hands placed on the young man's head as in blessing. The young man afterwards stated that the Lord had anointed him to preach the gospel. He started out to preach, laying his hands on the sick, and they were healed. Among others was one who had formerly been a cripple and another was a woman in the

last stage of tuberculosis. The missionary who told of this young man stated that she had visited the home where he was and found him sitting on the veranda, Bible in hand, preaching to the sick who had gathered around him. She writes: "He seemed very quiet, as thought hushed by this holy power which had come upon him. He did not tell us the things which had happened, or the miracles which God had wrought through him, but sat quietly while his brother related the whole story to us. We watched him as he prayed for the sick after first instructing them to give up their idol worship and turn to God lest the disease should return upon them worse than before. He very humbly laid his hands on them and prayed for them. . . . As we watched him, truly our hearts leaped for joy, and not one of us doubted that this was a prophet called of God." It is not known who was responsible for the truth getting into this young man's heart, but one never knows the fruitage that will come from faithfully sowing the seed. There are many more incidents we might relate but space forbids. We do want, however, not only to remind ourselves of our responsibility but also of our privilege.

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




