HEN I was seeking the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, I did not have any special desire to speak with tongues. What I

wanted was *power*; but speaking with tongues was remote from my thoughts and expectancy. However, one day someone placed in my hands a paper printed in Los Angeles

per printed in Los Angeles, California, and I was attracted by an account, given on the first page, of a meeting held in that city in which quite a number received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. It went on to say that they all spoke with tongues.

I had noticed before in my reading of the Word that on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2) they all spoke with tongues, and also at the Gentile outpouring in the house of Cornelius (Acts 10), and again at Ephesus (Acts 19).

But I had somehow imbibed the thought that their cases had a local application, but had no application to the present day. But when I read of this meeting in Los Angeles, and that all who received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit spoken with tongues, my attention was arrested. Closing my eyes, I prayed to the Lord and asked Him if it were His will, that I also should speak with tongues when I received the Baptism. The Lord knew I was honest in this inquiry, and at once the Spirit whispered to me, "Read Acts 10:46."

I opened my Bible and read, "For they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God." Knowing that the word "for" was a conjunction connecting this verse with the one preceding, I proceeded to read verse 45. "And they of the circumcision which believed were astonished, as many as came with Peter, because that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost." And now the question arose, how did these Jews who came with Peter know that the Gentiles had received the Holy Ghost? "For they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God."

It was not because they saw them praising God in their own language, or that they saw them working miracles, or saw them in a deep spirit of prayer and soul travail, but because they heard them *speak with tongues*.

I was convinced that moment that when I received the Baptism I would speak with other tongues. And this I did, for the moment I received the Baptism I spoke in tongues and continued to do so for over two hours. Moreover, I have spoken, prayed or sang in tongues almost every day since that time, and that is near to twenty-

four years ago. All the arguments I have since heard against the truth that all who are baptized in the Spirit will speak with tongues, have not been able to move me from the position that God gave me on that memorable day when I asked Him the question, "Will I speak in tongues when I receive the Baptism?"

Since the day I received the Holy Ghost I have seen hundreds, and probably thousands, of people baptized in the Holy Spirit and they have *all* spoken with other tongues.

I believe that speaking with other tongues accompanies the Baptism—

1. Because it always did in the Apostolic Age.

I am sure that every thoughtful Bible student will agree that on the Day of Pentecost they *all* spoke with tongues; for in Acts 2:4 we read, "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Then in connection with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Gentiles in the house of Cornelius, it is clearly stated (Acts 10:44-46) that when the Holy Ghost fell upon all who heard the word, they spoke with tongues and magnified God."

And again in Acts 19:6, we read that when Paul had laid his hands upon them—the twelve believers—the Holy Ghost came on them, and "they spoke with tongues and prophesied."

It is true that at the outpouring of the Spirit in the city of Samaria, as recorded in Acts 8, there is no mention made of the manifestation of speaking with tongues; but there is strong presumptive evidence that such was the case, for "when Simon (the sorcerer) saw that through the laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Ghost was given, he offered them money, saying, Give me also this power, that on whomsoever I lay hands, he may receive the Holy Ghost." Simon had seen miracles performed, and signs and wonders wrought, but what impressed him the most was that when the apostles laid their hands on the believers, they received the Holy Ghost. And there is strong reason to believe that the same sign-speaking in tongues—that was given on the day of Pentecost, and in the house of Cornelius, and in the case of the twelve disciples at Ephesus was in evidence also in Samaria, and that it was this sign that so deeply impressed Simon.

Moreover, it is a striking fact that practically all of the leading Commentators of the various churches agree that such was the case.

Paul, the great apostle to the Gentiles, did not hesitate to say (1 Cor. 14:18), "I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all." In the mouths of so many witnesses we have good reason to believe and teach that "speaking with tongues" is—universally—the initial physical sign that the Holy Ghost has come in to abide.

I believe that speaking with tongues accompanies the Baptism in the Holy Spirit—

2. Because the Early Fathers (Chrysostom and others) tell us that wherever the Holy Spirit fell, the people spoke in different languages. Read your Church History carefully and you will find this statement confirmed.

I believe that speaking with tongues accompanies the Baptism in the Holy Spirit—

3. Because wherever this truth is faithfully preached according to the pattern (Acts 2), those who receive come through speaking with tongues.

We can safely repeat the words of Paul before Agrippa (Acts 26:26) and say, "This thing was not done in a corner." All the world knows about this mighty outpouring of the Spirit. Is it mere chance work that the "speaking with tongues" has been a world-wide feature of the work? This great Latter Rain Outpouring has practically spanned the globe so that in almost every tribe and nation, people are found who have been filled with the Holy Ghost and have spoken with tongues just as the writer and a multitude of others have done in this land.

Speaking with tongues is the reproach of Pentecost. Are we afraid of the reproach? We are not. Many would be glad to receive this mighty Baptism in the Holy Spirit, but they have a dislike, amounting in some cases to a horror of speaking in tongues.

If they only knew the glory, the power, and the edification that comes to us with the speaking in tongues, they would surely put aside their prejudice and seek God for this mighty Baptism.

While it may be true that many are honest in their opposition to this particular manifestation, I fear that with many others a deep-seated self-life is at the bottom of the opposition which

they feel towards it.

Let me in closing, beseech the reader to seek the *Holy Ghost*, and not the *manifestation*; and I can assure you that when you receive this mighty Baptism and it is evidenced to you and to others in the speaking with tongues, you will be glad that you allowed the Lord to have His way with you, and to baptize you according to the pattern—"and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." Acts 2:4.

How I Received My Baptism in the Spirit

I was reared by old-fashioned Methlist parents. Very early in life I odist parents. gave my heart to God and was saved. Later on I received a definite call to the ministry, but did not accept the call until the year 1914, when I cast in my lot with the Missionary Baptist Church and took out papers to preach, from that body. I had never as yet heard the Pentecostal message of the Holy Ghost Baptism. We were being taught that all these things were for the early church and stopped with the death of the apostles. But deep down in my heart I felt the need of something more, although I did not realize what it was until I was filled with the Holy Ghost.

In the year 1917, I contracted a cold which later led into tuberculosis of the lungs. The best medical aid that could be obtained in Kansas City gave me up to die. I went to the Ozark Mountains to live the few days which had been allotted me by my physicians. But thanks be to God, while there I found the great Physician. My brother at this time was attending a meeting, which was being conducted by Brother F. L. Doyle in Hoxie, Arkansas where the sick were being healed through prayer. Brother, knowing my condition, requested prayer for me which was offered and God healed me of that dread disease which was sapping the very vitals of my life away. This was my first exerience with Pen-

After receiving my healing I came West, desirous of meeting the Pentecostal people and hearing the message they preached. They were holding meetings in a country schoolhouse not far from where I was stopping, so I decided to go and hear them. As I came into the house they were praying, and oh, such power I had never witnessed before! Their faces shone with the glory of God and I thought, "O, my Lord! this is what has been lacking in my ministry all along." However, I did not seek for my Bap-

tism in this meeting because I discovered that these people were not very prominent among the world-loving church members who were my associates at this time. I not only turned a cold shoulder to these people but to the message of Pentecost as well. Not long after this I felt my grip loosening on God to such an extent that I had no desire to preach. Like Samson I could shake myself but no power was manifested.

In my powerless condition I again began to attend the Pentecostal meetings. It was at one of these meetings while singing in the choir that God again spoke to my heart. Turning to a brother standing near by I handed him my song book saying, "I am go-

ing."

I, a Baptist minister, had no intention of going to a Pentecostal altar to seek the Baptism in the Holy Ghost; but as I passed by the altar, I felt oh! such a desire to kneel there and worship God. I obeyed the still small voice and in less than ten minutes I had received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in other tongues as the Spirit gave the utterance.

To me this experience has done more to make my ministry a success and has meant more to me than anything that has come to me throughout my whole life.

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Victory Through Obedience

A True Story of the Personal Experience of W. J. Elliott, Sr., 943 N. W. North River Drive, Miami, Florida, as Told to Mrs. Arabelle Wilt



Y PARENTS lived on a small farm on Long Island, N. Y. They were very poor and had a large family. I was, at the time, the only boy and it fell to me to do all the chores

about the farm. Father's business was that of a plumber. His work being at Babylon, eight miles away, he spent week-ends only at home. Our sole means of conveyance in those days was an old gray horse and a buggy, and in the winter the same horse and a sleigh. It was my duty to drive father to his business Monday mornings, returning for him Saturdays.

My mother was a good Christian

woman. She taught us to read the Bible and pray. She always prayed for my safe return when I went on those errands. Father was unconverted. He was a hard master, discipline being his hobby. I would not for a moment think of disobeying him. It was a man's work on the farm which he assigned me to do and when he returned Saturday nights would beat me unmercifully if any detail was not carried out. My poor mother stood between us and suffered many blows in her efforts to shield me. I worked like a slave to escape those thrashings and lived in constant fear of my father. Reviewing those days, I can clearly see that my mother's prayers prevented my becoming crippled or some other permanent injury to my health. James 5:16.

On a cold Monday morning in January, as we were about to leave for the journey, it began snowing very hard. My father was something of a weather prophet. He realized the storm that was coming and said to me, "Hitch to the sleigh this morning, we are going to have a heavy snowstorm."

Mother attempted to dissuade father from making the venture in the face of the storm and such a distance. She was filled with fears and misgivings, but her pleadings were unavailing; he would go, once his mind was made up. I recall seeing the worried expression on mother's face, but years of bitter experience had taught her to suffer in silence.

We had not driven very far when the horse began to stagger. The snow was getting deep. Father began practicing discipline on the horse, but the poor creature through sheer exhaustion stopped altogether. However, he recovered after awhile and we resumed our journey. Between intermittent lashings and pauses, we finally reached our destination, arriving at nine o'clock that night.

We had been all day in the storm in an open sleigh, with nothing to eat, and suffering intensely from the cold. Father's employer met us as we drove into the yard. Surprised beyond measure he exclaimed, "Why, Mr. Elliott, what were you thinking about to venture out in this terrible storm?" Fortunately they had a well-spread table, and well I recall how wonderful the food tasted.

After feeding the horse father said: "Willie, you had better go right back home or your mother will be worrying about you." Father's employer, who was a kind gentleman, overhearing this demand protested at once at the idea. He exclaimed, "Mr. Elliott, you surely are not going to send that boy home at this hour of the night and in such a storm. He will never make it. Indeed he will die on the road." "No, no," father replied, "He can make it, he has had a good supper." The man protested bitterly and pleaded with father to let me remain, offering every able, he'll get through all right," he said, and so he ordered me to be off

Knowing his orders were final I hitched up the horse and started back home. It was then past ten o'clock. We got along very well for about a mile. Soon the horse got winded and

fell down exhausted. There I was, a boy of twelve, stranded in the deep snow, miles from home. It was a gloomy prospect. I tried my utmost to get the horse back on his feet again but didn't succeed. Knowing there was a house a short distance ahead I struck out for it and after a struggle through the snow managed to reach I aroused the sleeping occupants. When the man of the house heard my story he dressed himself and with the aid of his hired man got the horse to his feet, and to his barn where they put him up. The man vowed that the horse could not go any farther. They also insisted that I stay there until morning. I told them that I could not, that I had orders to go straight home and must obey. He finally yielded and I started out again in the storm.

This time I was afoot. The snow was so deep that I had to leap over the drifts. I rested now and then to recover my strength. I had covered about a mile in two hours. It was while in the heart of a dense woods far from my house that my strength gave out and I fell exhausted in the snow. The storm had ceased, but the temperature became intensely cold. I remember the moon shining full in my face, as I fainted away. Just how long I was in that state I cannot say. It seemed I was having a wonderful experience as is the case with persons overcome with the cold. Suddenly a loud screech broke the silence and roused me to a state of semi-consciousness. When I opened my eyes I saw about ten feet above my head, a great white bird describing a circle of about twenty-five feet in diameter. He kept this screeching up to a terrible degree for a long time. It was the largest bird I had ever seen, about like a great eagle. I did not at the time realize that this bird was a messenger from heaven sent to awaken me and save my life. I was convinced of this later.

That screeching and circling kept up until I fully comprehended that I had been slowly freezing to death. Surely the devil had almost succeeded in disposing of me, but the Lord won the victory. With divine help, combined with considerable effort I got to my feet and began digging in the snow

which indeed was the best thing to do to restore circulation. I had dug a circle of about four feet in diameter and by jumping around in it managed to get thawed out. Then singularly enough the bird disappeared and did not return.

Meditating on what next to do, I concluded I would continue moving about in the circle until daybreak, hoping that by that time someone would come along and rescue me. About two o'clock in the morning I heard in the distance the shrill sound of a train whistle. That was indeed sweet music to me as I hadn't heard a murmur the whole night through except the weird screeching of the bird. The sound came from the direction of the Deer Park railroad station which was midway between Babylon and my home and about two miles from the point where I was.

As I was quite well warmed by that time I decided to make another attempt to get home. I felt as if the Lord had renewed my strength for I leaped over the snow banks and made good time in reaching the station. A snow-bound train had just pulled in. It was the first from New York City since the day before. The ticket agent, Tom Conley by name, who also kept a country store, was busy supplying the train hands with hot coffee and sandwiches. He recognized me at once. My folks were customers of his and I had frequently traded at his store. Surprised to see me he exclaimed, "Why, Willie, what are you doing here at this time of the night and in a storm like this?" When I told him of my experience, he took me to the store and gave me plenty of hot coffee and ordered me to bed. I told him it was no use trying to persuade me to do that because my father had ordered me to go straight home. He objected, however, saying, "You cannot walk and there isn't a horse that could go through that deep snow. I have a good horse in the stable which I would gladly let you have to take you home, but I know it is impossible, so you stay here and I will endeavor to get you home in the morning."

I reminded him that when my father had ordered me to do a thing I had to obey or die in the attempt. Mr. Conley knew how relentless father was, so he reluctantly consented and I started again leaping through the snow toward home. The Lord helped me I know, for it seemed as if I had springs under my feet. It was between four and five in the morning when I reached home. My dear mother was waiting for me. All night long she had been praying for me. When she heard my story she broke out in praise to God for answered prayer.

Mother soon had me thawed out and put me to bed where I remained for six long weeks as a result of that night's experience. I had a succession of children's diseases. This was another of Satan's attempts on my life.

When my father returned home the following Saturday he found me in a very critical condition. Mother reprimanded him severely for his cruelty to me, but he endeavored to justify himself by saying that he was afraid she would be worried if I did not arrive that night. Mother spent most of her time day and night at my bedside earnestly entreating the Lord to spare my life. The doctors gave but little hope and when one night the fever was extremely high, I overheard one doctor say, "I can do nothing more. I believe you will need an undertaker in the morning. You can let me know." Father and mother then took turns watching.

Up to this time I had not experienced saving grace, I had been taught to pray, and mother had assured me that the time would come when the Lord would reveal Himself to me. True to her words, He whispered in the still small voice, "Child, give me thine heart." I responded quickly, "Yes, Lord," and the great work of redeeming grace was done in an instant. I was saved and I knew it even as it is written in the eternal Word, "The Spirit beareth witness with our spirit, etc." Rom. 8:16. I began to pray in a manner that I had never before prayed that God for Jesus' sake would raise me up. I promised my new-found Saviour that if He would do so I would serve Him faithfully all the remainder of my life.

Suddenly a strange sensation possessed me. My head cooled and I realized that the fever had gone. The Great Physician had done His work. I fell into a sweet sleep, not waking until morning. My parents could not believe their own eyes when they found me so much better and preparing to get up; though mother knew what the Lord had done for me. When the doctor examined me he found every trace of the disease gone. Mother forthwith committed me to the Lord and made me promise to be faithful.

A year later mother went to be with the Lord. Thereafter father's treatment became so severe that I could bear it no longer. Never before had I presumed to act contrary to his wishes. I now decided to arise before daybreak and quietly leave home. I carried out my plan and went to the city to learn the plumbing trade, and afterward engaged in this business in Brooklyn, N. Y. At the age of 23 the Lord revealed His purpose in saving my life and I realized I should trust

and obey Him because He had a work for me to do. Learning obedience in my youth, He entrusted me with an enterprise that has resulted in the salvation of many souls, among whom, praise the Lord, was my hard-hearted father. He went home to glory at the ripe old age of 82. The work I refer to is that of the Lighthouse Mission which afterwards became the Pentecostal Church in Brooklyn, N. Y.

I am now in my sixty-third year. It is not my purpose here to speak of the further use He has made of His humble servant, but again and again has He demonstrated to me the value of obedience even though the cost in suffering and hardship be great. I praise Him for this great lesson and for keeping me faithful to my promise which I made Him when he restored me to health and saved my soul.

And now, dear unsaved ones, will you not yield yourselves to the gracious Redeemer who has given Himself so freely for us? Will you not place yourself in His hands to be used for His glory and realize with us the joy of winning souls? Do not delay, do not linger longer, but be obedient to His call for "now is the accepted time, now is the day of salvation."

An Up-to-the-Minute Book

On January 1st Signor Benito Mussolini spoke from Rome a message which was transmitted on ether waves to this country and was broadcasted by the NBC, so that his message could be heard as distinctly in Los Angeles as in the room in which he talked. Of late, messages have been broadcasted from Moscow, Russia, in the English language, that could be clearly heard in British homes, messages that were of such a revolutionary character that the British government had to ask their ambassador in Moscow to file a severe protest. Man may use the air today for the promulgation of the Fascist and Bolshevist propaganda, but a day is coming, prophesied in Holy Writ, when "out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem." Isa. 2:3; Micah 4:2. This will be in that day when as God has declared, "Many nations shall be joined to the Lord and shall be My people," and "the Lord shall choose Jerusalem again," and when the word will go forth, "Be silent, O all flesh, before the Lord, for He is raised up out of His holy habitation." Zech. 2:11, 12. While books of science of ten years ago are out of date, the Bible will be up to date a billion years from today.

The World Outlook

David Lloyd George, Britain's wartime Premier, has written in the London News Chronicle of the world outlook at the beginning of 1931. He states that the past year has been one of "growing misunderstanding and menace." He writes, "The diplomatic situation in Europe is not calculated to restore confidence. Since the signature of the Peace Treaties the position has not been so disquieting as it is now. During the disturbed condition that unavoidably followed the war there was no danger of any general conflagration. The war spirit had burned itself out. But it is welling up again, especially among the young men who saw nothing of the war. On the continent of Europe wherever you go 'the next war' is being freely discussed and the groupings in that impending war are canvassed."

A Dismal Picture

Mr. Lloyd George quotes from a friend who has a large circle of acquaintances in many lands, "The year

1930 has been throughout the world a year of fear, suspicion, hatred, depression, and despair. A French reserve officer wrote in a letter, 'I am now going on manœuvers. I shudder when I think that before long our mock warfare will be real, that Italy, Germany, and Russia are preparing to attack us.' A Pole told me, 'If I had my way I should hang thirty million Germans. Any moment they may hurl their troops against us. We shall be crushed between Russia and Germany!' A Russian said, 'We may be attacked 'at any time. The capitalists are preparing war on us. The Poles want the Ukraine and they are backed by the British and the French.' A German said to me, 'Every German would die willingly to get the Polish corridor back. We shall never stand being treated as we are."

Worthless Peace Treaties

Mr. Lloyd George further says, "Europe is a caldron of suspicions, hatreds, and fears. The Disarmament discussions have been an elaborate sham. No country contemplates a serious reduction in its armaments. When the Soviet Representative at the Disarmament Commission proposed a resolution in favor of reducing military forces and of destroying the great accumulated reserves of war material, the foolish chairman actually ruled him out of order and refused to allow the proposal to be recorded on the minutes. A worthy chairman for a fatuous Commission!

"Europe is already divided into two camps—those who stand for the revision of the Peace Treaties, and those who oppose its revision. Those who stand for revision are Italy, Germany, Austria, Hungary and Bulgaria, and the Anti-revisionists are France, Belgium, Poland, Czecho-Slovakia, Jugo-Slavia and Roumania." He believes that Russia will be on the side of the Revisionists, and that Great Britain will seek to be neutral.

As to the Future

In endeavoring to get the British people to be optimistic Mr. Lloyd George counsels them to put away all thought of war, and let confidence once more be restored. But the Word declares, "Unto the end wars and desolations are determined." It also declares what will be the result of the present world-wide hatred and suspi-

cion. Just as in the days of Jehoshaphat (2 Chron. 20) God used the Amorites, the Moabites, and the children of Seir to overthrow one another, so the Lord will let the nations overthrow each other at the time of the end. It is written, "I will overthrow the throne of kingdoms, and I will destroy the strength of the kingdoms of the nations... and the horses and the riders shall come down, everyone by the sword of his brother." Haggai 2:22.

Universal Unrest

Miss Christabel Pankhurst, known to many people as the great suffragette leader, recently gave an address in Los Angeles, which appeared in the Los Angeles Times. Miss Pankhurst boldly declared the gospel of the Lord's coming again in glory, and spoke of the present world-wide rest-lessness as "the prelude of horror, sin, murder and suicide before the dawn." She said, "Lawlessness abounds; fear is in the heart of many; even the millionaire, as the beggar on the street, is fearful for the next day; and in spite of the fact that we thought the last war was a war to end war, rumors of war abound. In China there is civil war. In Burma there is fighting today. The bright dreams of Armistice Day have vanished. In every country is unrest. We thought a League of Nations might stop the horrors of war, but the League of today has not the power of similar ones of hundreds of years ago, or the one of the Roman Empire. We lived in a fool's paradise after the war, with such sophistries prevalent as 'Every day we are growing better and better.' when all the time we were growing worse and worse.'

God's Solution

Miss Pankhurst continued, "Justice is breaking. Law courts are failing. Man loves to feed on the devil's food of sin and its manifestations, as witness the very names of pictures and plays in today's papers. Virtue is gamboled away. There is a vicious greed for knowledge of evil. The theater finds it pays to present evil. It is no more the theater owner's fault than the audience's. Never was the rate of suicides among intelligent, apparently right-thinking people so high. They have become discouraged. Hearts are failing for fear. Even peace parleys do not avail. Just the other day Austen Chamberlain said that these numerous peace conclaves are only making the nations suspicious of one another. Man has failed to solve the terrible problems of today in spite of his increased knowledge. God's solution is the coming of Jesus Christ in power to rule with justice and mercy.

This Evil Age

"Yes, I know you may think it is only the fanatical who think thus and believe in His coming," continued Miss Pankhurst. "So did I, once. I was vain and proud. I thought suffrage for women might solve the evils. I thought that last war would prevent further war. But the evils of peace today are more terrible than the horrors of war in 1918. Heroism may in a measure redeem war, but what is there to redeem the awful atrocities, right in your own city—banditry, assaults, embezzlement on a great scale, murders, life cheapened and virtue bartered, with only a few of the malefactors receiving punishment?"

Glad Tidings of the Kingdom

Miss Pankhurst recently wrote an article which appeared in the Sunday School Times, in which she stated she had been lecturing on the Lord's coming of late to large audiences in Paris and London. "These audiences included intellectuals, writers, men of affairs, lawyers, politicians and social reformers. English and French audiences alike were tense in their interest." At the close of one of her meetings in Paris a distinguished old Frenchman wearing the emblem of the Legion of Honor, said to her, "Mademoiselle, you have given us new hope; you have put a radiant cross in our sky." Miss Pankhurst writes: "Yes, it is good news, a gospel indeed, that the Lord Jesus is coming again. This poor sin-stricken modern world needs good news; the anxious, troubled people in it are hungry for good news. There is so much bad news in the world today! Our righteous and merciful God asks us to preach to all nations this good news—that His Son, His King, is coming again. To those who fear His coming we are to express that 'Blessed are all they who put their trust in Him.' Ambassadors that we are, our task is to herald our King's coming in person, and to urge the unprepared to be reconciled to God who hath made this coming Lord and King, who knew no sin, to be sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

An Eternal Kingdom

We believe that the message of the moment is that the Lord will come again and that there shall be given Him "dominion, and glory, and a kingdom, that all people. nations, and languages, should serve Him: His dominion is an everlasting dominion." Dan. 7:14. And

that He will want to share this kingdom with His own is clear from Daniel 7:27, "And the kingdom, and dominion, and the greatness of the kingdom under the whole heaven, shall be given to the people of the saints of the Most High."

Who Will Share His Reign?

The question may be asked, "Who are the saints?" The word saint means "holy or separated one." We heard Judge Rutherford, the successor of Pastor Russell, lecture one time on "Many now living will never die." He talked as if everyone living would come into all the blessings of the kingdom. This idea is absolutely and fundamentally wrong. Christ told Nicodemus, "Except a man be born again he cannot see the kingdom of God." Paul wrote to the church, "Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived; neither fornicators, nor idolators, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God." 1 Cor. 6:9, 10. See also Gal. 5:19-21. What shall we say of those who once had a blessed experience of salvation but who have now drifted away? The Word of God itself gives a solemn answer to this question, "The man that wandereth out of the way of understanding shall remain in the congregation of the dead." Prov. 21:16. To such the Lord is calling, "Return, ye children of men." Psa. 90:3. In writing to the seven churches of Asia, four times the Lord repeats that call, "Repent!"

God's Standard

Writing to the Ephesians Paul says, "He (God) hath chosen us in Him (our Lord Jesus Christ) before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame be-fore Him in love." W. D. Moffatt, commenting on this verse, says, "'That we should be holy!' Is that God's plan? If I am 'in Christ' at all I must be holy. If I am to abide in Him, I must be holy. If I am to reach my eternal destiny in Him I must be holy. This is God's plan for me. I must either vield to it or lose my destiny. Holiness, whatever it may mean, is not a spiritual luxury, it is an imperative necessity. The divine injunction 'Be ve holy for I am holy,' ought to suffice every reasonable mind. What is holiness? From Genesis to Revelation it has only one radical and primary meaning, and that is separation. Separate from sin, from the devil. from the world, from the flesh. This sep-

aration is a necessity of our spiritual life. Holiness, therefore, is not an adornment of the Christian character—a mere superadded ornament—but its very essence; that, without which, there is no such thing as Christian life at all. The Cross instantly separates us."

Without Blemish

Mr. Moffatt continues, "'Holy and without blame!' Are these two things not the same? No. It is not enough that the lamb of the offering should be separated from the flock and set apart to God; it must be 'without blemish' also. It must be fit for divine service. In the Christian life, holiness may therefore be regarded as the inward separateness of the soul to God; and blamelessness as the expression of that separateness in outward walk and service. And let us not miss the force of the words 'before Him.' What struggles, sacrifices, yea even strifes we tace to have our claim to holiness and blamelessness established before others! Never is a child of God in a more dangerous case than when he makes holiness a shibboleth, or a rod wherewith to smite his brother, or a screen to hid his real self from himself, or an advertisement of his superiority among his fellows."

A Call to Humility

Andrew Murray has defined holiness as humility. In Proverbs we read, "Before honor is humility," and if we are to be honored to reign with Christ we must first have the spirit of meek-ness, lowliness, and humility that characterizes the Lord Himself. When the disciples were disputing among themselves who should be the greatest in the kingdom of heaven, the Lord said, "If any man desire to be first the same shall be last of all, and servant of all.' He took a little child and set him in the midst of them and said, "Verily I say unto you, except ye be converted and become as little children ye shall not enter the kingdom of heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same shall be greatest in the kingdom of heaven." Matt. 18:3, 4. On that day we shall find some whom we consider the least and the lowest and the last, taking the first positions in that eternal kingdom.

The residents of the city come out, some to buy and some to promenade the streets. The band

plays in the little park. It is "la ferria del domingo" or the Sunday fair.


One brother takes our little organ, another a chair and a a brief-case packed with Testaments, Portions and other gospel literature. We go to the large plaza, which is teeming with people, and start our Sunday open-air meeting. As we start singing two Indian women run up behind our backs and send a volley of stones at us. We keep on singing, hoping that they will miss their target. A stone hits our organ, some clods our heads, and another stone my back as I am sitting at the organ. We go on with our song. young man who has stopped to listen and .who evidently possess Christian tenets

similar to the famous Oliver Cromwell, who used to say "Trust in God and keep your powder dry," reproves the Indians, and then as they do not take heed, he starts stoning them, at which they retreat. I was glad they are women for men would have thrown straighter and harder. As it is we are not hurt. A crowd gathers and we continue our meeting. We preach from the Catholic Bible, showing them that it is only a different version and that the meaning is exactly the same as our Bible. We tell them that if they are Christians they should read the words of Christ and not merely trust in the word of man. Many buy

Testaments and portions and all receive tracts.

Five years ago we would not have been tolerated in the plaza or on the streets, but the gospel light is spreading and the wall of prejudice is broken down. The door is open. Our opportunity is now.

for one of our beloved sisters. Mrs. Ki-ku-chi testified: "Every one knows how dreadful it is when one is enslaved by the liquor habit. 
said, "Suffer little children and forbid them not to come unto me, for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

We are printing on this page a chart showing a comparison between the monthly offerings of 1929 and 1930. You will note last June there was a great falling off in funds which caused us to appeal to the *Evangel* family to help our missionaries in that crisis. The splendid response we received is revealed in the way the July offerings mounted up. The total offerings for 1929 equal \$265,757.15, while 1930 brought us \$265,106.00. We are in-

deed thankful to our contributors for the splendid help you have given, and it is a joy to us to be able to report that all money has been used exactly as instructed by the donors. All money designated for foreign missions has gone 100% to the field. The Busy Bee or World Missions offerings are the only ones that are divided, and these are divided by request of the donors.

In comparing our missionary list with that of 1929, we find that there are twenty names appearing on our 1929 list not recorded in 1930. These names represent mostly missionaries who for various reasons have been obliged to return from foreign service, many because of ill health and some because of home responsibilities. We regret to state that three of the names missing from our last report represent

those who have laid down their lives while on foreign service. Their bodies sleep under foreign soil awaiting the resurrection shout, but their spirits enjoy the fellowship of our Lord. Miss Laura Gardner of India, Mrs. Fred Baltau of China, and Mr. Fred Leader of the Belgian Congo are the ones who are missed by sorrowing relatives, friends, and fellow workers, but thank God we believe the day is not far distant when "God shall wipe away all tears," and in the meantime, let us accept the consecration of these lives as a challenge to us to press forward and fill the gaps.

We are happy to state that we have added to our list ten missionaries for Africa, three for China, seven for In-

dia, two for Persia, one for Syria, and one for Latin America. We thank God that we are not only holding our ground but pressing forward, while many other denominations, owing to the difficult times, are having to give up stations and withdraw literally hundreds of missionaries. However, to keep going forward and meet the increasing need of the work, requires continued co-operation and help.

Do not hesitate to send in your offerings because they seem small. A dollar a month from each individual would mean a tremendous forward step. It would enable us to double our mis-

sionary force and reach twice as many people with the gospel, and we also believe it would result in twice as much blessing in the home work. God's law is to give if we expect to be given unto. May we take the word of the Lord that was given to Israel as for ourselves today when He said, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward."

Delivered From a Living Death

During the winter of 1925 I found myself growing more and more weak, loosing my appetite, and failing to sleep at night. Medicines failed to help me. The local doctors told me I was in a run down condition. I noticed my right wrist becoming weak, and by spring my whole right arm was useless. I could not move it except by using my left hand, and even then it was very painful. It seemed the bone in my wrist would give away, and the wrist became crooked.

Dr. Beckett, of Pitman, N. J., my family doctor, advised me to go to the hospital. In hopes to escape the hospital, I went to Dr. Chalfonts' office as I knew he had an X-ray machine. After taking a picture he bound my arm on a board but would not let me see the picture. He gave me electric treatments that I thought would blister my arm, and then sunshine treatments, and then sent me to Hahnemann Hospital, in Philadelphia. He said two bones were affected but wouldn't tell me the trouble.

In the bone department of the hospital they took eight X-ray pictures. When Dr. Shane was dressing my arm I finally got him to tell me what was my trouble. He said that I had a tubercular bone from the hand center up into the wrist. But, he added, "While there's life there's hope"!

I had been having spells that became more and more frequent and severe as time slipped by. I would lie in pain unable to move, hardly able to breath, and not able to talk. These spells would come without a minute's notice and when doctors were called, they couldn't do a thing for me. By September they advised a celluloid case for my arm. Different doctors would examine me, and I heard them say, "a very rare case."

One day they had a famous specialist examine me, while a number of other doctors looked on. He told them my right side and my right breast was tubercular, and that all that could be done was to keep the arm quiet as possible in the case. He snapped his fingers and told them that such cases as mine went that quickly. Death stared me in the face! But I was ready, for I knew that Jesus Christ had saved me, and death would almost have been welcome, as a release from the living death of torture and pain I was then in. Oh, the long nights and the dreary days of pain, pain, pain! But Jesus was ever so real and in some

wonderful way He helped me to bear it all.

When they started sending me to other doctors I began to see that they could not help me, but seemed rather to be experimenting on me. friends told me of Dr. Gulick, 2728 N. 13th Street, Philadelphia, saying that if he did not help me I had better stop doctoring. So in the winter, near the end of 1925 I went to Dr. Gulick. I asked him if he couldn't do something for my stomach, as I could eat almost nothing by this time. He told me it went with the disease. I was strapped to a table, and medicine was put in my veins by a hypodermic needle, many times. I grew weaker and weaker and by February, 1926, he told me the medicine took no hold, and that that was all he could do, and left the room, leaving me alone with my questions.

I lay many days in my weakness, and my mother would often come and feel me to see if I were still living, as I looked just like a corpse, after these months and months of racking, torturing pain. My wrist and two fingers by this time were black with mortification and as my bones did not break open, as is usual in such cases, the poison had gone through all my system.

I had always believed the Lord was able to heal me, but I never knew where I could get someone to help me pray through for it. My mother wanted me to start in with some more doctors, but I asked her to let me have ten days in which to give the Lord a chance to heal me. Some friends drove me the eighteen miles from Pitman, N. J., to Calvary Tabernacle, 2nd and Pearl Streets, Camden, N. J., although I was in most intense pain at the time.

When the altar call was given, I went up and told Brother Palmer, the pastor, that I wanted to be prayed for that I might be healed. The elders of the church gathered around me, and laid hands on me, and prayed while I was anointed with oil in the name of the Lord, as in James 5:14. After they had prayed, Brother Palmer told me to put my hands up and praise the Lord. Although I hadn't moved my right hand and arm for months and months, I obeyed, and the healing power of Jesus Christ flooded my body like an electric shock, overwhelming me in its surging power. I do not know how long I lay under the power of God, but I do know that when I

came to myself again all pain was gone, and when I looked, I was delighted to see that the blackness had gone from my finger-tips that showed out of the end of the case they were in. Also, I received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit as in Acts 2:4 at the same time. The Lord spoke to me, telling me to take the case off my hands. This I did with the aid of Mrs. Palmer, and praise the Lord, the disease was gone, and I was whole!

Isn't that just like Jesus! Praise the Lord, that night I laid my all on the altar, and I want to go all the way with Him! My mother, Calvary Tabernacle, a letter I have from one of the well-known doctors, and the case I used to wear, all stand ready to witness the truth of this marvelous, miraculous deliverance.

I want to give God all glory! "With His stripes we are healed." I have not had a spell since, nor any trouble with my arm. I work every day with both hands; I sleep well, eat well, and feel well, for which I give God all the glory!—Mrs. Carrie Owens, 716 Division Street, Camden, N. J.
