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Our "Ideal" in the Conduct of Meetings

The ideal which we are considering in this article has to do with the order of worship, and the conduct of meetings in Assemblies of God.

Put briefly this is the restoration, by divine grace, of New Testament practice in such matters. The Assemblies of God believe that all worship and ministry should be based primarily upon the exercise of the varied gifts of the Spirit (1 Cor. 12:8-10) placed within the Church. Underlying the proper exercise of these gifts they recognize the fundamental place of the Holy Spirit as the only One who can direct both worship and ministry in paths acceptable to God and profitable to men.

That such an ideal is difficult to attain to in perfection goes without saying. It demands a constant flow of divine life and energy from the Spirit of God through the assembly as a whole. If the "revival spirit" wanes there is an immediate temptation to still produce an apparent abundance of "life" in the meetings by all sorts of artificial and carnal methods; such as novel programs, special music, spectacular sermons, etc. Some of these things may not be wrong under certain circumstances, and as the handmaid of the truly spiritual; but when they become the substitute for the true life and liberty of the operations of the Spirit of God, and when they even hinder and choke the manifestation of the Spirit,then the ideal is lost indeed.

Only those who have tasted the unique blessedness and glory of truly "Pentecostal" meetings, where all things have been "in the Spirit," can measure the depth of disappointment, and even nausea, resulting from the wretched substitutes of the flesh.

Yet if the revival spirit has left an assembly there is an alternative almost worse; and that is an attempt to maintain all the outward forms of spiritual liberty in worship, and exercise of spiritual gifts in ministry, without the anointing of the Spirit. Such meetings are left open presumably "for the Lord to have His way," but the result is simply a wearisome taking up of valuable time with long dry prayers, stale testimonics, and unprofitable and undigested preaching. Certain spiritual gifts of a low order may be exercised in such meetings, to keep up an outward semblance of "Pentecost," but if without the anointing they are truly "sounding brass and tinkling cymbal." Even the heavily programed meeting is probably preferable to the deadness of an assembly that boasts an outward form of liberty in its outward form of services, but lacks the power and life of the Spirit at its heart.

The achievement of the Assemblies of God ideal in worship and ministry absolutely demands a continuance of genuine Pentecostal power resting upon everything and everybody in the assembly. This is only maintained by ceaseless prayer and watchfulness, and full consecration to walk in the way of the Cross.

Given an assembly where the members are baptized in the Spirit, and continuing in the fullness of the Spirit, there should be no lack of spiritual life and manifestation of His gifts. Yet other problems may arise, though they will be the problems of life and not of death. Disorder can arise through the very abundance of desire to give expression to new emotions produced by spiritual blessings, for unless such desires are rightly directed and controlled and kept "in the Spirit" the ideal is again lost and the flesh becomes prominent, though now from a different angle.

Our ideal therefore demands not only the full and free exercise of all the gifts of the Spirit, but also the spiritual government of that exercise, according to the principles the Spirit Himself has given in the Word. Paul necessarily gets down to detail in dealing with particular local abuses in 1 Corinthians 14; but he also states the broad principle—"Let all things be done unto edifying" (v. 26).

Obviously there must be some governing body to determine whether certain things are edifying or not in matters of public worship and ministry, and such an authority is constantly inferred, and often definitely referred to, in such passages as "Them which have the rule over you" (Heb. 13:7, 17, 24), "Them which are over you in the Lord" (1 Thess. 5:17), "The elders that rule well" (1 Tim. 5:17) and several other such passages. One great mistake with those who rightly aim at open meetings, and liberty for the gifts of the Spirit in all, is to neglect the principle that order is never maintained without government, and the Holy Spirit does not, as a rule govern apart from men, but through men of His own gifting and appointment.

One of the most important steps towards the achievement of our ideal in assembly practice is the prayerful discovery and spiritual training of adequately gifted and experienced *leaders*.

Another truth easily forgotten in contending for liberty for all to exercise their spiritual gifts, is that the Lord has *specially* called and gifted certain ones for ministry in the Church, as apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers. Eph. 4:11. It is the height of folly to allow ministry from those particularly given by Christ to His Church for that very purpose to be crowded out, just because those who have lesser gifts, or enjoy their personal manifestations, want license to indulge themselves fully and freely at all times.

This abuse must be remedied by wise government, and may involve the proper use of a certain program in meetings, under the wisdom of the Spirit. The apparent teaching of an entirely "open" meeting, gleaned from 1 Cor. 14:26, or similar passages, needs wise interpreting in the balancing light of the entire New Testament. Hasty conclusions that the early Christians met together with absolutely no program for their gatherings, and that every item was entirely spontaneous, are probably quite incorrect. There was liberty, but there was also order.

At the opposite extreme, it must be confessed, is the average church service of today, where every detail is run to an exact time-table, often arranged weeks, and even months, beforehand; and most probably carried through by one man, except in a few items. The Assemblies of God ideal for public worship and ministry is far different. It is continued, as already stated, in the full and free operation of all the gifts of the Spirit, by the Spirit, through the various members of the body of Christ.

Tradition makes the achievement of such an ideal difficult to some minds. They have come into genuine personal Pentecostal experience; but a long training in formality in church services sometimes makes them say, "The old is better." A sense of reverence, fostered by tradition, can sometimes provide a *natural* balance not without value for an opposite extreme of unrestrained enthusiasm; but there must be care not to confuse this with that true reverence which consists very simply of a deep sense of the presence of God. *This* is produced by the free working of the Spirit of God in an assembly. 1 Cor. 14:25.

Others have been tempted to give up the ideal altogether because they tried full liberty in their assemblies, but did not have the requisite background of spiritual experience and gifted government to keep it from degenerating into license. They have therefore decided that formality is safer; and do not even flinch from quenching the Spirit in order to keep their meetings on a plane where they feel personally able to control them. The apparent outward success of the smooth running of their machinery blinds them to the fact that they are not registering any real spiritual advance whatsoever. Many others have achieved, and are achieving, quite as much on the line of conduct of meetings. The New Testament ideal is lost. Ultimately the touch of Pentecostal revival that gave their machinery its first impetus spends itself, and they become as dead and lifeless as those they now criticize.

It will require tremendous earnestness, and an inflexibility of purpose, to successfully achieve the ideal of the Assemblies of God. The drift is all the while back again into the formal, the traditional, the popular, the "safe." Or else there is an urge into unbalanced excess that ends in barren fanaticism and speedy selfdestruction.

Nothing but a continuance upon a high, and ever higher, level of spiritual life and power will suffice. But this requires deep sanctification, and much prayer. The problem of our ideal in worship and ministry is thus actually one with the greater problem of maintained and increasing Pentecostal revival in the true sense of the word. It is this stubborn and challenging fact however that makes the ideal so magnificently worth while. And thank God that over all is the abiding presence of the brooding eternal Spirit, with the promise that by divine grace the ideal *shall* yet be realized.

Divine Healing J. N. Hoover

The Bible is very clear on the subject of healing. Healing in the Old Testament was a special manifestation of God's unlimited grace, but in the New Testament it is a part of the gospel message. Healing of the sick has always accompanied the preaching of the gospel of Christ and the full gospel is not preached where healing is omitted. Every need of man was taken into account in the blood atonement at Calvary, including sickness. Isa. 53:5; Matt. 8:17; 2 Peter 2:24.

We must remember that in divine healing, as in divine salvation, there is the God side and the man side. Do not expect God to do what He has told you to do. "To him that knoweth to do good and doeth it not, to him it is sin." Avoid the extreme, condemn not that

which is for your good and remember God sometimes uses men and things to answer your prayers. To the man at the pool Jesus said, "Take up thy bed and walk," and immediately he took up his bed and walked. This is instant healing. To the ten lepers Jesus said, "Go show yourself to the priest," and as they went they were healed. "This is progressive healing, but in either case it was divine healing, and God's program is the same today." Because the sick are not healed immediately is no evidence your prayer has not been granted. Remember 'all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are the called according to his purpose." As salvation is an evidence of faith, so is healing an evidence of faith. Where there is doubt there is no faith, and where there is no faith God is under no obligation to answer. If you are not able to get the victory when you pray, then call for the elders of the church, those who are able to lay hold on the promise of God and "the prayer of faith shall save the sick and the Lord shall raise him up.'

A report in Redemption Tidings (the official organ of the Assemblies of God in the British Isles) tells of a tent campaign held by Evangelist Fred Squire and party at Fleetwood. At the beginning of the campaign a man who has been completely dumb for nine years received perfect speech. The report states concerning this healed man: "Mr. Meyer is a well known Fleetwood resident and is a life pensioner owing to being dumb and given up as incurable by the doctors. Since then he can hardly cease from talking, and besides his testimony he also sang a verse of a solo to let people see what God has done."

A later report of this meeting tells of 1150 souls being saved, and that a sister totally blind from birth has received her sight.

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An All-Important Lesson

The writer attended a Pentecostal meeting some twenty-five years ago when a humble handmaid of the Lord who was newly baptized, gave forth in the power of the Spirit the simple words, "Blessed are all they that wait for Him." These words were spoken very slowly and repeated several times. A Pentecostal sister said to me a few days ago, "Do you know what it is for a scripture, which is seemingly a dead letter to you, to suddenly become spirit and life by the Holy Spirit?" I immediately thought back to that occasion twenty-five years ago when it seemed as if with burning power and indelible ink the Spirit of God wrote those eight words upon my heart, "Blessed are all they that wait for Him." I learned then that God has a blessedness easily available for all. There is but one condition for our attaining and maintaining this blessedness. The Spirit of God sets forth this condition in five simple words, "Wait on thy God continually." Hosea 12:6. Note that word continually -not spasmodically.

Dependence on God

Do you remember the occasion when these words-Blessed are all they that wait for him-were given? The Assyrians were invading the land of Israel; and instead of looking to the Lord for counsel and help, the people were looking in another direction-towards Egypt. The Lord said to them, "Therefore shall the strength of Pharaoh be your shame, and the trust in the shadow of Egypt your confusion." But our gracious Lord was calling the people back to Himself, and the prophet Isaiah brought them this word from Him, "Thus saith the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel; In returning and rest shall ye be saved, in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength." But the prophet had to add the words to these "rebellious children," as God called them, "And ye would not. But ye said, No; for we will flee upon horses." Flesh, be it that of horse or man, is a vain thing for safety. When the peo-ple declared, "We will ride upon the swift," the Lord declared, "Therefore shall they that pursue be swift." But though the rebellious people turned from the Lord and sought Him not for His aid, yet that did not change His tender heart of grace and compassion toward them; and His prophet declared, "Therefore will the Lord wait, that he may be grac-ious unto you, and therefore will he be exalted, that he may have mercy upon you; for the Lord is a God of judgment; blessed are all they that wait for him."

Plentiful Provision

Do you get the picture? It is as though you were a pauper in deepest penury and poverty, and a multi-millionaire said to you, "My heart is filled with tenderness and love toward you and so I will prepare the best I have for you, that which will satisfy your every need. I know you have hard thoughts toward me, but I have nothing but love toward you. It may be that later you will change your attitude; until then I shall wait patiently for you day by day, week by week, and month after month. But the moment you come to my home to wait on me, all the blessedness I have prepared for you will be vours." That is God's attitude toward us spiritual paupers of earth. The prophet Isaiah later declares, "For since the beginning of the world men have not heard nor perceived by the ear, neither hath the eye seen, O God, beside thee, what He hath prepared for him that waiteth for Him." The apostle Paul speaks of these prepared things as "the unspeakable riches of Christ." For whom are they available? For him that waiteth for Him.

Degenerating

A person said to me, "What is the matter with some folks anyhow? You see them earnestly seeking the Lord and waiting on Him for the gift of His Spirit. At last they receive. Then they seem to settle down, sit back, and say to themselves, 'I have attained,' as though they had reached the top notch of Christian experience and there was no further ground for them to possess. Some who were once filled with the Spirit seem to degenerate into lethargic, lukewarm listeners-to-sermons, and seem to have lost all fire and fervor." What is the trouble? Do these souls not know that constant renewings of the blessed Spirit are just as necessary as the first filling? The Psalmist said, "I shall be anointed with fresh oil." Psalm 92:10. Ah, that is it; every day fresh manna from heaven, every day fresh oil of the Spirit from the same heavenly source. How can these be received? By constantly obeying that simple word, "Wait on the Lord . . . wait, I say, on the Lord." Psalm 27:14.

A Sermon from Nature

The whole creation teaches us a lesson on this line. The Psalmist declares concerning all the denizens of land and sea, "These wait all upon thee; that thou mayest give them their meat in due season." Thus every creature of earth sets an example to man on this line. Andrew Murray once wrote, "All the difficulties that keep us back from full salvation have

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their cause in one thing, the defective knowledge and practice of waiting on God. It is the nature of God to be unceasingly the supplier of every want in the creature, so the very place and nature of the creature is nothing but this to wait on God and receive from Him what He alone can give, what He delights to give. Waiting on God is the very necessity of our being. Man's glory and blessedness is not to be independent, or dependent upon himself, but dependent on a God of infinite riches and love."

Leaking Out

The other day I had a talk with an elderly brother, who said, "I used to be a Methodist and belonged to that church when they had the power. But there seemed to be a gradual, a very gradual leaking out. Outwardly there was apparent prosperity but I could discern decadence everywhere. The shout had died out of the camp. And since I have come into Pentecost I regret that I am beginning to discern the same thing working in the assembly I attend. Many are not walking in the Spirit, and that is causing the power to wane. There seems to be outward progress, but I am troubled as I recognize an absence of the real presence of God. It seems as if we are running on natural rather than supernatural lines. An assembly can surely only serve its purpose fully when every member is on fire for God, and every meeting is charged with the power of God."

Renewing the Power

My reply was, "It looks to me as if the battery needs recharging. When the battery in your car runs down, what do you do?" He answered, "I take it to the garage to have it renewed, and the garage man won't let me have it back the same day either. It has to remain all night be-ing recharged with electricity." "And that," I said, "is the remedy for a run-down assembly. The need is to wait on God to be recharged." An all night of prayer might be a wonderful pick-me-up for some assemblies that need more power. This applies also to run-down individuals. A better illustration than that of the battery can be found in the street car that has no power in itself to run. With arm uplifted to the wire that is connected with the powerhouse, it receives transmitted power, and thus performs the purpose for which its maker built it. Uplifted holy arms should be the insignia of Pentecost. Power belongeth unto God, and it will only be transmitted to those who live in vital connection with Him.

Natural and Supernatural

I remember reading an account of the early days of the Great War. The story stated that the young German soldiers

were drilled and trained to a state of absolute perfection from a physical standpoint. When the war started, these young men, encouraged by their officers, were bent on capturing Paris during the first three weeks. They met the French army and gained a marvelous victory over them, then they pressed on to Paris. Day and night, without sleep and with very little food, they pressed on. The tremendous strain, however, told upon them and they became so absolutely weary that they were an easy prey to those whom they had formerly called "the contemptibles." It was a fulfillment of Isa. 40:30, "Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall." Those strongest of the strong young men utterly failed. Natural strength reached its limit. But thank God, there is no failure of the supernatural strength which God will give to those who wait on Him. "He giveth pow-er to the faint, and to them that have no might he increaseth strength." How is this power and strength made available? The Lord says, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." The strong in natural strength utterly fail; but the weaklings receiving divine strength, yea, even the lame, take the prev. The secret of constantly receiving this divine strength is continuous waiting on God.

An Example

What an example the blessed Lord Jesus gave us of obedience to the divine command to wait on God continually. All nights of waiting on His Father! Arising a great while before day! In those hours of waiting, were there not renewals of divine grace and power to replace the tremendous expenditure of His ministry? What a life of constant dependence was His. And He says to us, "As the living Father hath sent me, and I live by the Father, so he that eateth me even he shall live by me." A life of constant partaking of Him! A life of continuous abiding in the living Vine! A life of waiting on Him continually! That is the life of victory. What is your attitude? Do you say as the Psalmist said, "My soul, wait thou only upon God," "As the eyes of servants look unto the hand of their masters, and as the eyes of a maiden to the hand of her mistress; so our eyes wait upon the Lord our God, until he have mercy upon us"?

The Creed of Lawlessness

According to the Alliance Weekly, "A primer of Communism says, 'The first lie is God. The second lie is the idea of right. When you have freed your minds from the fear of God and from the childish respect for right, then all the remaining charms that bind you (called civilization)—property, marriage, morality, justice—will snap asunder like threads. Let happiness be your own law. Take heed that no ark be allowed to rescue an atom of this old world which we consecrate to destruction.'" (The italics are ours.)

When this philosophy rules the world —and the Bible predicts that it will—then the forces of lawlessness will be in control of world affairs and Satan himself will come to earth and organize those forces for the great attack against the Almighty. Rev. 12:12; 16:13, 14.

Is War Inevitable?

Answers Sir Norman Angell, prominent British economist, "War is not the result of forces outside himself; budgets don't get voted, warships built, armies painfully drilled, poison gas invented, apart from the wills of men. Behind these efforts are definite but fallacious ideas of defence—defence of possessions, of opportunities for wealth, of political independence, of views of right, and what not."

In other words the writer corroborates the Scriptures in tracing the cause of selfish, murderous wars to human nature controlled by a perverted will. When *God's will* is done on earth as it is in heaven, then wars will cease.

A Nation Bowed Down

Writes Ernest Gordon in the Sunday School Times, "The last words in that section of Leviticus 26 which promised blessing to an obedient people are (v. 13), 'I have broken the bands of your yoke and made you go upright.' But during the centuries of rejection since the crucifixion of Christ the characterizing mark of exiled Israel has been the 'Jewish stoop.' In Luke 21:28, however, one reads, 'And when these things begin to come to pass *look up*,' (literally, *straighten up*). The daughter of Abraham whom Satan had bound eighteen years could in no wise lift herself up. Satan hath bound Israel, and mankind, too, lo, these eighteen hundred years. The distressing occurrences in Germany may be a sign that redemption is drawing nigh."

Hollow Optimism

Writes Paul Mallon, a Washington journalist, "Norman Davis does *not* believe all the optimistic things he is saying about prospects for disarmament. He exudes sweetness and light in public statements just as a matter of diplomacy.

"Underneath Davis is enough of a cool realist to know that his coming sub-rosa talks with the British and others are almost as useless as the resumption of the Geneva conference Oct. 16.

"The road toward disarmament is so thoroughly blocked that there is a movement afoot to call the Geneva meeting 'The Conference on the Futility of Disarmament.'"

This newspaper man is simply stating in another way what the inspired apostle predicted long ago: "For when they shall *say*, Peace and safety, then sudden destruction cometh."

Chinese Christians Standing True

A recent letter from Brother W. R. Williamson tells of a four weeks' trip through South China, and especially the Waitsap district, visiting old friends and those who were converted under his ministry in former years. He expresses great delight in finding them still true to the Lord and growing in Christian experience. Of a few of them he writes:

"It was like a tonic to see the dear Christians and their happy faces once again. Dear old Elder Ng who we thought many times would pass away was still there and never let an opportunity pass to say something for Jesus, whom he loves more dearly than life itself. His face just shines with the glory of the Lord and he was an inspiration to our own faith.

"Dear old Kwongning Mo, who thought she was dying with cancer, after we had prayed for her several times, was strong enough to come to the last Sunday service to have communion. She, too,

"Then there was Yan Oi and her sister-in-law who are the only Christians in the village of Ha Tung, a short distance from Waitsap City. It was wonderful to sit down with them for a moment and hear them recount the story of God's faithfulness since last we had met together. God is blessing old Yan Oi. After all these years she is beginning to see her prayers for her loved ones answered. Her nephew has come to stay at the mission and go to school. He went back home one day and his grandfather wanted him to worship idols but he hurried back to the mission, saying, 'I don't want to worship idols any more.'

"Another dear old Christian we were glad to see again was Brother Cheng, the Confucianist scholar, who was one of our first converts. He is one of the elders now in the Waitsap church and gives his tenth to the Lord, for which God is manifestly blessing him, and he is going on with God which blesses our own hearts and gives us cause to thank God continually that our fruit of other days still remains to praise and glorify Him.

"The last Sunday we were in Waitsap we had the joy of baptizing five more from the hills. There were three young men and two women. One of the women was Taan Ching's mother. Taan Ching is one of our workers. Taan Ching has prayed for her ever since he was saved. Because of her superstition she was enraged when her son was baptized, in so much that she exclaimed to him as he came into the door while she was standing before the incense urn burning joss sticks as though he were already dead, 'I had rather that you had turned into a leper than to have followed the for-eign devil's doctrine and been baptized.' Now she, too, is following the despised Nazarene and, in the footsteps of her son, in the Christian path. How we praise God for the victory.

"We ask for earnest prayer for Lam Paak Foo, an old man who lives near the mission. He was a candidate for baptism but when the time came his faith weakened and he backed out. He desires with all his heart to believe in Jesus but fear of man holds him back. He has heard the message for fifteen years. Pray that he may have courage to surrender to God."

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Brother Mamalis expects to visit Macedonia next month in answer to a call for help. Pray that God may raise up native brethren who will be able to help in this work, that the hungry hearts may be reached with the gospel.

Young People of Malay Enjoy Bible Classes

Sister Katherine Clause writes of her contact with the young people of the Malay States:

"I am glad that they not only manifest interest in the meetings but are coming to know Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. There are about thirty young people who attend the Bible classes at my home each week. A short time ago a young man called on me just as I was getting ready for service and I felt that I could scarcely spare time to speak to him, but I was so glad that when I

explained to him the way of salvation he said he wanted to give his heart to God. Together we prayed and he accepted Christ as his Saviour. Now he is reading his Bible and attending services regularly.

"Such expressions as these are often heard: 'I am sorry that I cannot come to your meetings because I must work every night, but I would like to be a Christian.' 'Every time I come to your house I feel that I ought to get converted.' This boy goes around and invites many boys to come to the services. He is a born leader and I do covet him for God.

"I talked to one young woman about her soul and immediately her eyes filled with tears and she said, 'I have wanted to become a Christian but I did not know how.' God is working and I know that

is because of the many earnest prayers that are going up in my behalf."

Opportunities at Bettiah Girls' School

A splendid opportunity to help gather in souls for the Lord in India comes to us from our Sister Hilda Wagenknecht, who is faithfully laboring among the girls who have been placed in her care for education and Christian training. The tenth year of the school has just been opened with an enrollment of 108—the largest it has ever had and already the presence of the Lord has been made very real.

News from Brother and Sister Morrison

Two Years Away From White People It may be startling news to many of

> our readers to learn that our missionaries in the Salwin Valley, South West China, Brother and Sister Morrison, are so completely isolated from the rest of the world that they have not seen another white face outside of their own family for two years. They are in such a location that even communication with the outside world is very slow and difficult, it taking sometimes from three to four months to receive a letter from this country or to get a letter to this country. But they say, "Yet, in this secluded and hidden corner of the earth how happy we have been in the service of the Lord.

> "It is with joy in our hearts and thanksgiving to God that we can report the constant blessing and presence of God during the past winter months and a deepening in the Lord among our Christians as well as numbers being daily added to the church. We conducted a Bible school for a month and feel the month's

study was not in vain as fifteen young men, consecrated and on fire for God were taught the deeper truths of His Word. Now from time to time news reaches us that some of these students are preaching in their own and surrounding villages and thus the Word of the Lord is going forth and numbers from these villages are being added unto the church of Christ.

"We enjoyed a very precious three days' meeting at Easter time, and despite the cold rainy weather over 300 attended. God's presence was mightily manifested in every service and we believe many hearts were deepened in Him. One incident occurred which, considering the poverty and oppression of this poor people was very touching. Without its being mentioned by us or our native evangelist, the people began to bring in their offerings to the Lord. At the close of the meeting on figuring up we found there

was \$37.00 in cash given.

"God is also working in our midst in the line of healing, delivering people from demon oppression, and people are forsaking their old sinful customs to follow the Lord in the straight and narrow way according to His Word. The numbers for prayer for healing are increasing until between 50 and 60 every Sunday are being prayed for besides those who come daily to our house for prayer. Oh, how we realize our helplessness and dependence upon the miracle working God and it is our constant cry that these signs shall follow our ministry as He has promised.

"Over 300 attend our services on Sunday but due to these coming such a long distance we only have one large service Sunday morning. The dear Christians show great zeal in coming to this service,

some carrying babies on their backs, some old folks walking with canes, as well as small children walking five or six miles over these mountain paths. Others come swinging across the Salwin River on rope bridges, which takes so much time that despite the fact they leave at daylight they just reach the service at 10:30 a. m. Only one can cross at a time so when two or three villages have to cross at a time the morning soon passes. (A picture of one of these bridges was recently shown in the *Evangel.*)

"We could place fifty native workers in this territory and give them plenty of working space if we had them. The opportunities to the north have had to be laid aside because of the lack of workers to send into that field; but they are constantly appealing to us for the gospel. Besides this our hearts are aching and longing to cross the border line into the

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Then and Now

Crash! Bang! The window is in splinters, and stones are flying into the hall. A terribly offensive odor permeates the air. Someone has thrown a stink bomb into the midst of the congregation. Inside, are heard shouts, not of fear but of glory to God. Many are rushing to the altar. From the outside come shouts of hatred and defiance. This in a so-called Christian country. Christian representatives of a Christian church have smashed the windows and caused all this commotion, spreading this obnoxious odor around the place, but in the hall many souls are weeping their way to Calvary. Tears are flowing. Believers are prostrate under the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the birth of a marvelous movement which God has brought about in a backslidden age.

The hall in which this occurred could more appropriately be called a shack very unsightly; nothing that would appeal to the eye. But the glory of God filled the place, and the power of God was manifested.

I observed all this and was overwhelmed by the awful wickedness of men and the terrible deceit among so-called Christians, for they believed they were opposing something bordering on the insane. As I sat in that hall, I was more convinced than ever before, that this was the working of God. Sinners were crying out for salvation and repenting of their sin. That can only be effected by the Holy Spirit.

Fifteen years later I returned to the same spot, but the old shack had disappeared, and a stately church building had taken its place. I entered, sat down, and watched the people gather for the service. I noticed some of the same faces that I had seen fifteen years before, especially an elderly couple with their daughter, a girl about 20 years of age. She was clothed in the latest popular fashion of the day, her dress considerably short at both ends, and sleeveless. This girl walked right up to the platform and took a seat in the choir.

I was amazed at the contrast when I thought back 15 years. The pastor opened the meeting for testimonies, and a few persons hesitatingly responded. I watched that particular girl in the choir, and asked myself the question: "Is she saved? Is it possible that salvation would not have more effect upon her outward appearance and behavior?" But, to my surprise, she arose and gave a short testimony of salvation. There are no shouts in the meeting. The atmosphere is very cold and formal. . . . A young man came in-of course he was very late. He marched up to the choir and took a seat, but his whole manner was disturbing; so restless, turning his head right and left, and whispering to his neighbors. The testimonies continued. Finally he too, arose and said a few words, speaking of salvation and the Baptism with the Holy Spirit. "Can this be the fullness of the Spirit?" I asked myself. The situation was very distressing. A feeling of sadness crept into my heart as I observed these shallow people, most of them claiming salvation. Had it not been for the name on the front of the building, I should have thought I had entered a nominal church. The name is the same, but the attitude of the people has utterly changed. What has happened?

The pastor preached a stirring sermon, pointing out the wonderful blessings in a life of obedience to God, and the dangers of letting down in the spiritual life. Evidently deep in the pastor's heart there was the same concern that I felt, but no "Amen," no "Hallelujah" was heard. All quietly listened. Some had their heads down at a dangerous angle. It is not that they were nodding their approval of the sermon; they had been caught napping. At the close of the sermon, an altar call was given and a season of prayer announced. After persistent urging, some of the members arose and leisurely went forward. They seemed to be slightly bored. They knelt at the softly cushioned altar. '(The whole place was carpeted.) But while the spot where they knelt was softly cushioned, their hearts remained hard. They were no longer pliable under the hand of God.

After the meeting, I sought out one of the foremost deacons. I began a conversation with him. Carefully I pointed out the fact that I had been present in the old hall years ago, and I referred to some things that had taken place on that evening when I had been present. I asked whether there had been any change. He answered, "No,—I—don't think—so." Evidently he was not aware of what had happened during those 15 years. The decline had been so gradual, but at the same time so steady, that it had escaped the notice of even the most spiritual members of the assembly. They looked at me with perplexity as I voiced the fact that considerable indifference had crept into the place. They did not assent, and their manner grew more distant. They took it as an unkind criticism.

One of them reminded me that they had great blessing in their last revival campaign. Souls were saved and believers were baptized in the Holy Spirit. I asked who received the Baptism, and strange enough someone pointed out that very same young man who had come to the meeting so late and had gone into the choir, showing such ill manners by whispering and evident joking and laughing. This certainly is not the kind of Baptism that the folk received in that old, dilapidated shack years ago. It is a modern kind which does not grip the heart. It is a tragedy! It is sad! What must the Lord Jesus think when He sees this? The situation is the more deplorable because no one seems to be aware of the change. I hear them speak of the indifference of other churches. As I come into closer touch with them, I hear them criticize their neighbors; but they themselves do not realize that they have a form of godliness, but lack the power thereof. 2 Tim. 3:5. They know the doctrine of the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, but the power is lacking.

I am reminded of the church in Laodicea. They said: "I am rich and increased with goods. I have need of nothing." But God's verdict was: "Thou knowest not that thou art wretched and miserable and poor and blind and naked." This is indeed unwelcome criticism. But God, who is always practical, is never deceived by outward appearances. He looks into the heart. 2 Sam. 16:7. He sees the underlying motive prompting our actions. There will be a sad awakening for those who have received the Baptism with the Holy Ghost and then lost out through carelessness and indifference.

There is a desperate cry in my heart as I contrast the former spirituality of some churches with their present state of coldness and indifference. I join the prophet Joel as he says: "O Lord, to Thee will I cry." Joel 1:19. And my thoughts are directed to that wonderful promise which God gives through the same prophet. Joel 2:25. God will lead on to victory. If one people fail Him, He will raise up another to carry out His plan and purpose. His Word *shall not* return unto Him void. Isa. 55:11. In triumph He will gather those saints who have remained faithful to Him.

Behold, He Cometh!

Do you remember the parable of the ten virgins? Whom did they go to meet? They went out to meet the Bridegroom. Five were wise and five were foolish. While they slumbered and slept there came the midnight cry, "Behold, the bridegroom cometh; go ye out to meet him." Then all those virgins arose and trimmed their lamps. But behold! the foolish found their lamps were going out. They were without oil and while they went to buy, the door was shut. Friends, after a little while the last name will be written in the Lamb's book of life, the last sinner will feel the convicting presence and power of the Holy Ghost. Only God the Father knows when that last name will be recorded or the last gospel message will be preached. If we feel the moving of God's Spirit upon our hearts it behooves us to yield that we may be ready when Jesus comes.

Apostasy is hastening to its zenith, its blasphemous disregard for God ripening it for the judgments which will fall when Jesus comes again. "For that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first"-an apostasy-which will open the way for the revelation of the man of sin, the Antichrist, the political leader for whom the world is now preparing. Because they received not the love of the truth that they might be saved, "God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unright-eousness." One marvels at the ease with which people of today can deceive themselves.

The coming of Christ will be with lightning suddenness, "for as the light-ning cometh out of the east, and shineth even unto the west; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." When He leaves His mediatorial throne, when the Father says "it is enough," when the last name is enrolled in the church of the First Born which are written in heaven, when the last gospel invitation has been extended, and the Spirit has moved for the last time on the hearts of those who have rejected the call of sovereign mercy, Jesus is coming suddenly, "in like manner as he went away." When He went away "a cloud received him out of their sight," and when He returns, "Behold, he cometh with clouds." His coming will be in majesty and power. The glory of the celestial world will rest upon Him, the glory which He had with the Father before the world was.

Woe to the unprepared inhabiters of the earth when Jesus comes! To them His coming will be "in flaming fire, taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power; when he shall come to be glorified in his saints, and to be admired in all them that believe." When Jesus comes the great separation will take place. He will separate the righteous from the wicked as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats. There shall be two in one bed; the one shall be taken,

and the other left. Two men shall be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Remember the scripture, "When once the master of the house hath risen, and has shut to the door, and ye begin to say, Lord, Lord, open unto us. Then shall He say, Depart from me, I know you not." The door of mercy is still open and whosoever will may come, but that door is going to be closed.

Our only hope of escape from that time of tribulation judgments to which the world is hastening is the gospel of the grace of God. When I was a little boy in a Western State, one of those innocent looking river beds became a maddened torrent after a cloudburst on the near-by mountain side. A man jumped on his horse and rode as rapidly as he could down the river channel shouting warnings to the little hamlets and the farm houses peacefully resting along its shores until he was overtaken by the mad rush of waters giving his life for others. The church of Jesus Christ is telling men and women of coming judgment. The wrath of the Almighty is about to overtake us. Flee from the wrath to come.

May we now look at the blessed hope of those who are in Christ Jesus. To them He says, "Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man." Although sorrow, tribulation, and judgment are coming, the church of Jesus Christ has promise of escape. "Because thou hast kept the word of my patience, I also will keep thee from the hour of temptation, which shall come upon all the world, to try them that dwell upon the earth." Just before the judgments of the Great Tribulation "the Lord shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel and with the trump of God." The dead in Christ shall rise, the redeemed, still living, will be changed, and together they shall be caught up to meet the Lord in the air, and so shall we ever be with the Lord. The coming of Christ is the hope of His own in the midst of present darkness and unbelief.

Signs multiply which testify that we are living in the close of the age. The coming of the Lord is near. "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not, the Son of man cometh."

Solomon

Lesson for Sept. 17. 1 Kings 8:1-11.

The life of Solomon may be studied under the following three divisions: (1) Solomon the wise king. One of the most beautiful incidents recorded in Solomon's experience is his humble petition for wisdom at the begin-ning of his reign. 1 Kings 3. The gift was granted, so that he became the wisest man of his time. (2) Solomon the Temple-builder. The actual history of the temple began with king David, who wished to show gratitude to Jehovah by building Him a magnificent house. But it was revealed to him that this honor should belong to his son, Solomon. (3) Solomon, the apostate. Later he was moved with the ambition to become a great emperor like those of the Gentiles. He burdened the people with taxation and engaged in commercial enterprises that later introduced worldliness and idolatry into Israel. To strengthen himself politically he married foreign princesses who led him into idolatry. Thus Solomon the Wise become Solomon the Foolish.

Our lesson deals with Solomon the templebuilder. The work is completed and the time has come for the formal dedication of the shrine to Jehovah.

The Power of the Presence of the Ark. The first step in the dedication was the bringing of the ark out of the old tabernacle and depositing it into the Holy of Holies of the new sanctuary. This ark, which was a goldcovered chest, surmounted by the angelic cherubim, represented the throne of Israel's divine King, who dwelt there in visible presence between the cherubim. This divine manifestation was in the form of fire enwrapped with a cloud. What that resplendent presence meant to the people of the Old Testament, Christ's glorious, invisible presence means to the people of the New Testament. (1) The presence of the ark is the glory of Israel. When the ark was captured, the people exclaimed in dismay and helplessness, "The glory is departed from Israel, for the ark of God is taken." 1 Sam. 4:22. And how helpless is a Christian without the power of Christ! For such an one to testify of the presence of Christ would be like a man with parched lips and swollen tongue telling people of a fountain that will satisfy the thirsts of man. (2) The presence of the ark was the joy of God's people. 2 Sam. 6:15,16. One of the most compelling arguments for the reality of the gospel is the joy that it brings to people. A joyful Christian does not need to argue and debate about Christ and the Bible. The sun does not argue-it shines! Joyous Christians do not contend with the weapons of logic and philosophy for the truth of the faith-they just testify and shine! (3) The absence of the ark is the defeat of God's people. Why were the Israelites defeated when they marched against the Canaanites? Num. 14:40-45. The answer is, "The ark of the Lord departed not out of the camp." Num. 14:44. Said Christ, "Without me ye can do nothing." John 15:5. To present Christ without His power would be like playing the pipe organ with the power shut off. There would

be plenty of movement and exertion—but no music! Or, to change the illustration, the fact that we are moving does not necessarily mean that we are advancing. A merry-go-round does quite a little traveling—but it doesn't get anywhere!

Making Way for God. As soon as the ark was deposited in the Holy of Holies the glorycloud (referred to by the rabbis as the Shekinah) filled the temple. This constituted the real dedication and consecration of the temple. By this act Jehovah as much as said, "I am pleased with the house that you have built for Me, and accept the spirit of worksip and devotion that prompted its construction. The heaven and the heaven of heavens cannot contain Me, for I am the One who inhabits eternity, but for your sakes, I condescend to localize Myself and dwell in your midst." The Eternal One has not changed. Hundreds of years later, in the person of His Son, He stooped to dwell in a tabernacle of clay and live with us and for us. John 1:14. He is still the same today. To those who present their bodies as temples, He has promised to dwell in them by the New Testament Shekinah -the Holy Spirit.

But notice that the Lord's presence filled the temple when the priests were come out of the holy place. 8:10 Man must get out of the way when God comes in; self must stand back when the Holy Spirit fills. How often has the obtrusiveness of man's nature hindered the full manifestation of God's glory! One time Jehovah planned to reveal His glory by sending water from the rock in response to a word from Moses. But Moses let his temper get in the way. Num. 21:7-13; Psalm 106:33. The glory of God might have been revealed in the administration of Saul if he had not allowed stubbornness and self-will to get in the way. It was surely Jehovah's will that David's reign should continue in uninterrupted victory and prosperity; but David permitted impurity to get in the way. 2 Sam. 11. When Christ announced His intention of proceeding to Jerusalem, there to glorify God in His death, Peter permitted presumption to get in His way. Matt. 16:22, 23.

Instances and illustrations could be multiplied to show how the perversities of human nature become stumblingblocks in the path of God's glory. But sufficient have been mentioned, perhaps, to enable us to see the lesson: The glory of the Lord is coming towards us; the best thing that believers can do is, like John the Baptist, to prepare the way before Him, and then—get out of His way! Christ and Solomon. The Lord Jesus de-

Christ and Solomon. The Lord Jesus declared concerning Himself, "Behold, a greater than Solomon is here." Matt. 11:41. One of the many reasons why He was greater than Solomon is the fact that He built a larger and better temple than he. Solomon's temple was a glorious structure and institution. The old rabbis taught that Solomon's temple possessed the following glories that were absent from the second temple (that is, the one built after the captivity and enlarged some years before Christ's coming.) First, the holy ark wherein were the tablets of the covenant, the pot of manna, and Aaron's rod that budded; and where God was to dwell between the cherubim that covered it. Secondly, the Shekinah, or the divine glory. Thirdly, the miraculous Urim and Thummin, an object that enabled the priest to ascertain the divine will. Fourthly, the holy fire that came down from heaven. Fifthly, the gift of prophecy, or of the Holy Ghost.

Let us observe how all these glories were restored and increased a thousandfold at the dedication of the New Testament Temple. Eph. 2:20-22; Heb. 3:6; 1 Peter 2:5. For some time prior to His ascension the Lord Jesus had been gathering the materials for the temple -living stones represented by His disciples. Before the day of Pentecost the material was assembled in the upper room, and when the day of Pentecost was fully come, "they were all with one accord in one place." Then followed the divine consecration of this spiritual building, when "suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." The spiritual glories of Solomon's Temple were restored-and more than restored. For that temple was localized in one city; this new temple is everywhere and in all lands. That temple suffered destruction and the departure of the glory of Jehovah. But concerning this spiritual temple the Lord Jesus has said, "The gates of hell shall shall not prevail against it," and "Lo, I am with you alway, even to the end of the world."-Myer Pearlman.
