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How the Lord Delivered Us from the Communists

E had a most remarkable case of deliverance from real danger when the Communists

attacked a certain town. I was on my way with two other young preachers, former Bible School students, to a fellowship meeting on the Pacific Coast. We stopped for two or three nights to preach in a little Indian town where we were pioneering a work. We had a pastor there who was holding the fort with his wife and two little

girls. There seemed to be a strange unrest among the Indians as we preached to them. Although a great number stood around the door, none would enter and sit down to hear the message. After three days we decided to continue our journey, but about two thirty in the morning we were disturbed by the sound of considerable rifle fire in the middle of the town. We slipped from our hammocks to ask the pastor what it could be. He cautioned us to be very quiet as it was election day and possibly one party was waging war on the other party in an effort to get their candidate in as mayor of the town.

However, things were much more serious than that, as it was proved a little later, when another brother came in stealthily about three thirty in the morning, telling us that the Communists had swept down over the hills bringing everybody with them on pain of death. They had attacked the town, killing the guard of twenty soldiers, the captain, three of five special police who were in town at that time, and quite a number of prominent citizens who were known as anticommunists. He said the Communists

came to their little grass huts, rudely awakened them, and offered them either death with a blow from a heavy knife, or life if they accompanied them in their revolution. Some of our believers were among those who had been forced in with the Communists, although they made their escape later and got back to their homes.

We kept as quiet as we could during the day. We heard distressing stories on every hand. The man of the house across the road had been killed. Columns of smoke were coming up from different houses that had been set on fire. A woman came to say she could not stay in her house any longer-there was a corpse lying across the doorstep with no one to move it. In the beginning some got a decent burial, but after a few days dogs and pigs and scavenger birds devoured the corpses. Our position was serious as the Communists were bent on ridding the town of anti-communists, or forcing them to join their ranks. By day and night they went around the town in bands, forcing open the doors and taking the men. Some had managed to get away, many were killed, others joined the Communists' ranks. By night time it was very terrible for they would go from house to house, smashing open the doors, and often screams, shots, and excited voices would give us to understand the bloody

scenes that were being enacted. As they drew near our door it would seem that nothing could prevent them from coming in, but although they were on our street five nights, not once did they come in, for which we truly gave

The Lord's Power

In the Word it is written concerning the Lord Jesus Christ that "He is able even to subdue all things unto Himself." When Daniel was cast into the den of hungry lions the Lord subdued the ferocity of those beasts, and they did not hurt the prophet. Desires that were natural to those beasts were subdued by the presence of God in that den. When the three Hebrew children were cast into the fiery furnace the very heat of the furnace was subdued to them. But the fire was not quenched in its heat to those unbelievers who cast the Hebrew children into the sevenfold heated furnace, for they were destroyed by its flames. But the intensity of the flame was subdued for the Hebrew children. There was One with them, none other than the Holy One of Israel, who made them safe, because those flames were subject to His subduing power. When there was a great tempest upon the Galilean lake the disciples were disturbed and distressed and they cried to their Master, "Carest Thou not that we perish?" He arose and spoke a word, and immediately the angry, boisterous waves were subdued.

The Blessedness of His Presence

As the Lord sent forth His disciples, He sent them as sheep among wolves but they were not hurt nor destroyed, because God subdued the ferocity of those among whom they labored. The time is coming, when the Lord returns, when all things that are evil shall be brought into subjection, and there shall nothing hurt nor destroy in all His holy mountain. But even now, for the saint who walks in faith, there can be a subjection of evil power. "Thou shalt tread upon the lion and the adder; the young lion and the dragon shalt thou trample under foot." The Lord has promised that nothing shall by any means hurt you as you go forth in His name. As He walks with thee He will bring about the subduing of the very powers that would destroy thee.

Changing Our Natures

There is an evil one, the one who deceived Eve, who put into her mind wrong desires, wrong longings. The apostle speaks of the imaginations, the reasoning faculties, as the stronghold of the enemy where he injects his thoughts, his desires, his longings. Even these can be subdued. These can all be subject to thy Lord as thou dost look to Him, for He will bring every thought, every unsubdued thought, into captivity, until thou

art obedient to Him in all things. Every desire of thy heart and every longing that is contrary to the will of God, injected by him who is the enemy of thy Lord and thy enemy, can be subdued. Thy Lord will bring thee into a place of quietness and restfulness, a place of absolute contentment. He will make thee a partaker of His own lowliness, His own meekness. As thou dost look to Him for help He will take from thee every desire that is displeasing to Him, so that thou shalt no longer desire that which is evil. He will let His own disposition be in thee-the humble, lowly disposition that desires naught but the will of the Father. Look in faith to Him to subdue all that is within thee, that is in any way contrary to the will of God.

The Lord's Plan

Peter, when he was young, delighted to gird himself and walk wherever he desired. He had strong impulses. He had a strong nature. But his Master put him to the test. If Peter really loved Him, then Peter would be willing to drop his own plans and do only that which his Master desired him to do. If he really loved the Lord he would be willing to give up his own way. His will would be brought into subjection, and he would be willing to go according to the way his Lord desired. Instead of Peter's going just where he would, he would be willing for Another to gird him and carry him where he would not naturally go. All his strong impulses, all his strong nature, must be brought into absolute subjection to the will of his Lord. Art thou willing that all thine own ways and thoughts, thine own desires shall be brought into absolute subjection? Dost thou love thy Lord? Thy Lord loveth thee and He hath a plan for thee. He hath a thought for thee better than thine own thought. He hath a way for thee better than thine own way.

Girded by the Lord

In due time He who commissioned Peter girded him. On the day of Pentecost he was girded with power from on high, and he spoke out words which his Lord gave him. His natural powers were brought into subjection, and the Spirit gave him words that brought three thousand to the feet of his Lord. Peter went not his own way when he went to the house of Cornelius. A Jew would not go to the house of a Gentile—but his Lord, who loved him, girded him and led him, and as he spoke to those Gentiles he saw a repetition of Pentecost. As thou dost go the way of thy loving Lord, thine own will brought into absolute subjection, thine own thoughts subdued, thine own ways subdued, thou shalt see that His way, His thought, His desire is the best. He will lead thee as thou dost look to Him into an absolute subjection of all thy strong desires, all that the enemy would inject into thee, and thou shalt have thy Lord working in thee to will and to do that which is His good pleasure.

The Lamb Nature

If thou dost desire the nature of the Lord thou must learn to know Him. John saw Him in the heavens. What was He like? He was as a lamb slain. And John tells us, "As He is, so are we in this world." Art thou willing to be as one slain, thine own life crucified, thine own being destroyed, that henceforth it might not be thyself but Himself, the Lamb, coming forth in thee? He would have thee know the power of the cross, the cross on which He was crucified, and on which thou shalt be crucified, so that thou canst say with one of old, "I am crucified with Christ, and I live no longer. I have been slain. The Lamb, the Crucified One, my Jesus, liveth in me." He will speak and work and manifest Himself through those thus yielded to Him.

A Worthwhile Testimony

Come to Him with this longing and desire, that all that is in thee may be subdued, may be crucified; and then, then, the disposition, the mind, the nature of the Lamb shall be thy portion, and thou shalt emanate the life of the Lamb of God. It shall be said of thee, "For him— for her—to live is Christ." Self subdued —Christ exalted. Wilt thou come this way? Dost thou love thy Lord? Art thou willing for Him to gird thee and lead thee whithersoever He would? If He would take thee to Calvary, thou shalt say, Amen. If He would take thee into a fiery trial, He will teach thee to rejoice that thou art counted worthy to share His sufferings. Though He would lead thee to a Jerusalem, to mockings, scourgings, and death, be willing to set thy face steadfastly thitherward. But know this, that beyond the crucifixion, beyond the grave, there is a glorious resurrection where He, thy Lord, shall be fully manifested in thee. Be willing to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive with His life: crucified with Him, all things brought into subjection to His cross, that henceforth He shall live in thee, the exalted Christ, doing through thee all His good pleasure. Amen.

Turning Back

We are witnessing today in many quarters a reaction from the wave of materialism and skepticism that has been sweeping the land. *The Living Church* reports that intellectuals in England are turning to religion in large numbers.

Syrian Communists

Current History reports the rapid growth of Communist activity in Syria. Early this year the French authorities banned five "Red" newspapers published in Europe and closed a number of Communist meeting places.

Paganism in Germany

General Ludendorff of Germany recently stated, "I am not merely an opponent of Christianity, but literally am anti-Christian and heathen—and proud of it... At the moment we Germans are the people which has freed itself furthest from the teachings of Christianity." Thank God that there are many devout souls in the land of Luther who repudiate such statements.

Our Nervous World

In an address to the Institute of Medical Psychology in London, Lord Allen pointed out that one person out of every thirteen was suffering from nervous maladjustment, and one third of the amount expended in Health Insurance benefits was necessitated by troubles due to nerve strain or mistakes in the early training of our population.

Our troubled world needs the peace of God.

Hebrew Language

The popularizing of Hebrew is a constant testimony to the national revival of the Hebrew people. Recently there was published the first volume of the new Hebrew Encyclopedia. Of the 5,000 copies printed 2,000 were sold in the first few days.

Significant Figures

According to statistics of the Religion and Welfare Recovery Committee, during the depression contributions to the Church have decreased by nearly \$300,-000,000, while expenditures for armaments during that same period have increased \$100,000,000. For the hundred years preceding the World War contributions to the Church were almost equal to expenditures for war, and equaled about one half of federal government expenses.

Girls Sold for Taxes

The following item is one illustration of the curse of militarism. The Japanese government spends annually 46 per cent of the national revenue for maintaining army and navy. Result: Japanese farmers must pay 60 per cent of their earnings in taxes. Further result: no less than 30,000 Japanese girls have been sold to help meet these taxes.

The National Christian Council of Japan is taking steps to prevent such sales.

The Inescapable Christ

When H. G. Wells was asked which single individual has left the most permanent impression on the world his answer was "Jesus of Nazareth." He declares, "The old Roman historians ignored Jesus entirely; He left no impress on the historical records of His time. Yet, more than 1900 years later, a historian like myself, who does not even call himself a Christian, finds the picture centering irresistibly around the life and character of this most significant man."

A Ministry in Prison

Dr. Kalley, who was long imprisoned at Madeira for distributing Scriptures, and speaking to the people of salvation, sold more Scripture copies weekly during his imprisonment than he had been able previously to do monthly; and, besides, in a few months, he had distributed 30,000 tracts, and received regular visits from between two and three hundred native enquirers. All were in varying degree moved by grace, and some were soundly converted. The Christian's strength and beauty often increase in proportion to the weight of oppression leid upon him.

"The World's Crisis"

The following appeared in *Public* Opinion, in a full page advertisement:

"The World's Crisis and its tragedies. The question was recently put, 'How do you make God to be a God of love?' It is those who do not abide by the laws of God that are responsible for the world's woes, NOT GOD!" A note was attached which said, "This advertisement is paid for by a Friend who has a concern to publish this message."

Man and Insects

"Man lost dominion over the lower forms of creation when he tell in Eden,' says Christ Life. "Today he does not even have dominion over the insect world. An employe of the Department of Agriculture was eating an orange in a Florida orange grove this spring when he discovered that an insect had laid eggs that produced larvæ and rotted the fruit. It was the first appearance in America of the dreaded Mediterranean fruit fly. Telegrams and letters to Washington induced Congress quickly to appropriate a large sum with which to fight the pest, but there is little hope that it can be exterminated. Not long ago the Japanese beetle was discovered at work in the leaves of trees and plants in the White House grounds in Washington City. A newspaper item says that moths, cockroaches, mosquitoes and such insects cost the United States annually more than \$1,000,000."

MIRACLE IN CONGO Missionaries' Child Being Healed of Deformity

Alva I. Walker, one of our missionaries in Africa relates as follows the miraculous healing of their baby: "Our little son, Ira William, was born with one club foot. For the first few months the missionary doctors at Aba put plaster casts on his foot. These were to be continued until the twisted foot was over-corrected so that when the casts were finally discontinued the foot in dropping back would come to a normal position for walking. In order to have the casts changed we had to make trips to Aba. The cost of transportation made it very expensive and, after a few trips, we found that we could not afford any more.

"As the months went by Ira got to the age where he wanted to stand up, but always when he stood that poor little club foot was twisted away under and he was standing on the edge of it. This eventually caused a sore on the side of his foot which, you may well imagine, was a source of much heartache for us. We wrote to some of our faithful coworkers in Christ in the homeland, requesting prayer, and Mrs. Walker also became desperate in her prayer for victory for the little foot. God heard and answered! Ira ceased at once to walk on the side of his foot; he placed his foot flat on the ground and has walked so ever since. He seems to not only walk but also to run even more than our other children at that age.

"Just recently the doctor, who put the cast on, came through here with his wife and stayed over night at our house. When they drove into the yard the first one to run out to meet them was Ira. When they later examined the foot they were simply amazed. The doctor exclaimed, 'Why, that foot was bent away over.' They also remarked about how nicely the heel was taking form on this foot.

"To say we praise the Lord for His mercy and goodness does not seem to express fully our feelings and gratitude to the Lord. How wonderful are His works to the children of men! The foot is still a little shorter and wider across the toes than the other foot, but he walks on it squarely and flat on the ground. Praise Jesus!"

CHILDREN HELP AT ASSIOUT ORPHANAGE

Miss Lillian Trasher, "mother" of the large and well known Assiout Orphanage in Egypt, tells a little of the practical work which is being done each day by the children to help the home. Sister Trasher writes: "You cannot imagine what a lot of work it is to make enough clothes for a family of seven hundred, especially now when all of their old clothes are old indeed!

"We have sixty girls who are trained to sew on machines. Each one of them must make one piece a day, pin her name on it and bring it down to my office where there is a large chart with their names, and make a check after her name, showing that she has completed that day's work. In looking over the work, if I find one that is poorly done, I send for the girl who made it and ask her to do it over.

"Besides these older girls, we have four classes of little girls with older girls over them. These little girls sew by hand and are learning to do some very good work.

"I do the cutting with the help of some of the older girls. Someone gave us a nice gramaphone and some good records of hymns, so we have someone to keep the music going while we work and we all enjoy it greatly. These girls will remember

PERSECUTION IN MOSSI LAND

Arnold Weston writes from French West Africa: "A little over two months ago we had a public baptismal service at which time we baptized fifty-four worthy candidates. This event seems to have been the trigger which fired the cannon of persecution, for from that time severe persecution has been directed against the Tenkodogo Christians. Their own kinsfolk and townsfolk, who are still pagans, exceeded in the acts of extreme cruelty and arson. The Mohammedans and the Catholics followed, causing such intimidation that many were forced to leave the Way. The fire of persecution has revealed much fine gold as it has also consumed some wood, hay and stubble. True, some have left the Way of Life, but many have come out of the ordeal strengthened and with a determination to press on regardless of the cost. We are happy, for not one of the baptized Christians gave way under pressure, and not one in the group which is awaiting baptism fell away.

"Even during the time of fire twenty boldly confessed their faith in Christ Jesus, some well knowing that persecution and suffering awaited them because of their stand. How our hearts rejoice as we see these dear people transferred from the realm of darkness into the kingdom of His dear Son. And, too, how blessed and encouraging it is to see these "black diamonds" shine and grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

"From now on we shall have a threefold task: The care and instruction of the Christians, the task of bringing back those who could not stand in the testing time, and the ever present task of evangelism."

Under regular missionary appointment there are: Congo 11, Egypt 5, Liberia 16, Gold Coast 10, Ivory Coast 13, Sierra Leone 2, Transvaal 1, China (including Manchuria and Mongolia) 67, India 70, Ceylon 2, Japan 11, Mexican Border 2, Venezuela 1, Cuba 2, Peru 9, Argentina 3, El Salvador 2, Porto Rico 2, Palestine 7, Straits Settlements 4, Syria 1, Persia 4, British West Indies 2, Russia 1, Canary Islands 1, Fiji Islands 4, Hawaiian Islands 2. In addition to these there are 32 ministers of the General Council working in the following additional countries: San Domingo, Nicaragua, Philippine Islands, Bulgaria, Jugoslavia, Greece, Pøland and Danzig.

In order to carry on our work WE NEED approximately ONE CENT FOR EACH SECOND of the day. If EACH MEMBER of our asemblies would GIVE ONE CENT PER DAY, we would be able to OPEN NEW FIELDS. Thousands of souls who have already entered the Kingdom in these different lands rejoice because of the help of those who have been faithful stewards.

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Christian Stewardship

Lesson 11, June 16: Deut. 8:11-20; Mal. 3:7-12; Matt. 25:14-30; 1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:1 to 9:15.

It is solemn to think that one day the Lord will say to us, "Give an account of thy stewardship." We are inclined to envy Mr. Five-Talents and to say, "If I only had had five talents to begin with, I know that I would have made good, but you see I only had one talent, and what could I do with that?" And we begin to make excuses for our laziness and our unfaithfulness.

Unfaithfulness with funds will meet with the special rebuke of the Master. "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much: and he that is unjust in the least is unjust also in much. If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches?" A preacher friend happened to notice a penny that one of his congregation, a man earning good money, dropped into the offering. It was the only penny in the plate. My friend picked it up, held it out for every one to see, and remarked, "I wonder how much heaven folks expect to get for this!" It is admitted that we do not "buy" heaven; but God does condemn those who rob Him (Mal. 3:8), and the Word clearly shows that no covetous man shall inherit the kingdom of God. 1 Cor. 6:10; Eph. 5:5. "But I cannot give to all," I heard one man say. So he gave to none. You need not envy him his reward.

I. THE DANGER OF PROSPERITY

A call to remembrance. Moses called on the children of Israel to remember, now that they were entering a land of abundance, all the goodness of the Lord to them in the wilderness, their daily provision of manna, their raiment not waxing old, and their feet not swelling. There is blessing in being poor and dependent on God. It is the poor who are usually rich in faith. There is great danger in being rich and independent. Paul warns Timothy: "They that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. But thou, O man of God, flee these things." "Would you like to be a millionaire?" someone asked a colored man who had worked for some millionaires. "No, sah," he said, "they nevah smiles."

II. THE DOOM OF PRIDE

The lifted up heart. v. 14. With prosperity generally comes boastfulness. When men have abundance they get filled with the same haughty spirit that Nebuchadnezzar manifested when he said, "Is not this great Babylon, that I have built?" Moses showed the people that when wealth came to them in the land they were to remember that it was the Lord who gave them power to get wealth, and he warns them that if they forget Him and go after other gods they shall

"surely perish." Note the outstanding warnings of this chapter: Remember, verses 2, 18; Beware, verse 11; Forget not, verse 11.

III. THE DELIGHTS OF PROVING

Bountiful giving. 2 Cor. 8 and 9. Paul devotes two whole chapters to the subject of the grace of giving. He urges the saints to give, and tells them of the good example set by the saints in Macedonia. These people were in deep poverty. It seems as if the apostle was reluctant to take anything from them, but there was no stopping these cheerfull givers. According to their power and beyond their power, of their own accord, this people urged with much entreaty to be allowed to have part in this ministry of giving to the saints. At a certain meeting I attended the evangelist was greatly touched with a child, who had no coin to put in the offering, who wrote on a slip of paper, "I give myself to Jesus," signed it and put it in the plate. "That," he said, "was the best offering of all." The Macedonians had first put themselves in the plate; they first "gave their own selves to the Lord."

Giving that counts. Miss Carmichael tells of a precious child in South India who began to seek after "the God who can change dispositions." She heard just a wee bit of the Gospel and began to pray to the living God. Having an opportunity to go to a gospel tent, she remembered that when she went to a heathen shrine she always had an offering, and so she lifted up her heart to the living God and asked to be enabled to take an offering. She opened her eyes and there on the ground was a copper coin. She took it and gave it as an offering to Him, but, best of all, she gave herself. Today she is a devoted worker of His.

The way of blessing. Said a friend who has given thousands into the treasury of the Lord, "The gospel tithe to me is this: all that I have, and myself thrown in." And that man not only says that, he has lived it. Those who give thus, live under open heavens. The Lord invites us, "Prove Me now." Someone has paraphrased Mal. 3:10 thus: "Give all He asks and take all He promises." One old man who has proved God testified, "He who gives, gits."

IV. THE DUTY OF PERFORMING

A right purpose. "Now therefore perform the doing of it," says the apostle, and he gives us an example in the Lord Jesus Christ who, though He was rich, yet for our sakes became poor, that we through His poverty might be rich. Christ did not stint Himself to mere tithe-giving-He gave all. In the early church the saints brought their all to the feet of the apostles. That was grace. You do not hear a man who lives in the fullness of grace boast like that proud Pharisee, "I give tithes of all that I possess." To him it would be the supreme of stinginess to only give a tithe. When General Gordon left China a special gold medal was struck for his services. He was poor and wanted to give to some who were poorer than he, so he took his gold medal, erased the super-

scription from it and put it in the Lord's treasury. Maybe we will see him with a glorified edition of that medal on his breast when we meet him in heaven.

The realm of grace. I knew one who was naturally stingy; stinginess she told us had been her cardinal sin. But she moved into the realm of grace and then how she gave! I never saw one who beat her at giving. That is what grace will do. The Gospel is a gospel of grace. Spurgeon preached a gospel of grace. He declared, "I believe in the colossal; a need as deep as hell and grace as high as heaven; in a pit that is bottomless and in a mercy above the heavens. I believe in an infinite God, an infinite atonement, infinite love, and infinite mercy." But of certain "pigmy preachers" who limit the grace of God he said, "They make the Gospel so small that there is not enough to make soup for a sick grasshopper." Paul here in 2 Cor. 9:14 speaks of the "exceeding grace of God" in them, and finishes up with the words, "Thanks be unto God for his unspeakable gift." God gave His best, yea, His all, in His Son. How much should we withhold from Him?-S. H. F.

thanks to the Lord. In the semi-darkness of the hall, the only Scripture we were able to read was Psalm 91 which was printed in extra large letters on some literature. This we read and re-read much to our hearts' satisfaction.

The second day we tried to escape, but we fell into the hands of a large number of Communists who, after searching us and our belongings, no doubt planning to have us in the ranks with them, finally were moved upon to let us go back to the building we were using as hall. We believe it was the Lord who undertook for us then.

The next morning the wife of one of the Communists rushed around to tell us we had better open all the doors as they were making a last effort to get every man in town. She had heard the gospel and was favorably inclined toward us. We immediately opened the doors. I made out my diary, wrote a letter to my wife, and two children, trusting that in some way or other it might reach her hands, expecting the end to come very soon. I got so far as to imagine what it would be like after the first blow. We were all taken out into the street, armed men all around us. At the slightest provocation they would have fired. Some pencils I had in my shirt pocket with little metal caps they took to be ammunition, so they were very particular about keeping me under observation. After a while I saw the general of the uprising in that section and warned him against anything he might do to a foreigner or citizen of another country. He seemed to understand that he would probably get into trouble and wrote an order for our release from the Communists' ranks. Together with the three other young men who were with me, we got back into the church, praising the Lord for granting us this second deliverance.

That same afternoon about three o'clock we heard a lot of rifle and machine gun fire coming down the mountain passes, and very soon a loud cry, "Here come the troops," spread over the town. Women with their children and some of the men began to run for the hills. We thought we had better remain right there in the building as that was where the Lord had so wonderfully taken care of us, but the pastor thought it best to flee to the hills, fearing we would all be shot down as Communists by the soldiers. Finally we consented and went with him. As we were on our way a voice came rolling up the street in Spanish, saying, "You will die if you go out there. You are going to your death." We looked to see who was warning us, but though the voice came louder than ever we could see no one making any apparent effort to shout to us. The rest of the party also heard the voice, and taking it to be a warning from the Lord, we turned around and went back to the church. By now the battle was drawing near and the bullets were flying all around. The troops were coming down our street and the next. I took a piece of chalk and wrote on the outside of the building, "Gospel Hall," and then we barricaded the doors. We remained on the floor from about four until eight that evening when the troops had possession of the town and had driven the Communists out.

The next morning we were perturbed as to how we would be able to make the officer of the troops believe the legitimacy of our business in that town. I was the only foreigner there. I had just got there three days before the uprising began, and had not been killed as most anti-communists were. Furthermore I had in my possession a note from the Communist general ordering my protection, and what was worse, those who opposed our efforts to preach the gospel had taken pains to spread the story that the gospel missionaries were the originators of Communism in the country. Along in the morning news came to us that those who wished to register themselves as supporters of the government should take their hat in their hand and, accompanied by a lady on each side, make their way down to the middle of the town, presenting themselves to the officers Two Indian women came with me. At there. each block there was a soldier covering us with his rifle. That you may understand how precarious was our position, when we reached the middle of the town we heard some of the soldiers saying "Here come the Communists," "There goes the Communists' money," referring to a little brief case I carried. I felt my story was very weak in the face of evidence around me. My attention was suddenly attracted by a young soldier who rushed towards me, grabbed my hand and shook it vigorously, exclaiming, "You are the missionary, aren't you? Aren't you Mr. Williams? Don't you remember me? Don't you remember when they robbed you of all your effects in that little grass hut two years ago and I was sent out to investigate the case? Let me take you to the major.

Just then the major emerged from the mayor's office and my identity was established. That soldier was the only one who knew me. He had been fighting for several days and could have been among the slain. He could nave been among those left guarding other towns through which they had fought, or other parts of this town. But we believe the Lord caused him to be right there in the middle of the town ready to identify me.

A couple of months later we were back in the same town preaching, and now have one of our best little assemblies there. Some of the young converts have already been to Bible school and are now back preaching to their own people. We were also pointed out a number of graves of people who had tried to escape to the hills. So we saw the hand of the Lord in all our deliverances.

In one of the towns where we have an assembly a druggist was about to die. The doctors had given him up, saying he could not live longer than twenty-four hours. His wife was very distressed when she greeted the servant from the farm who was a Pentecostal brother. The servant inquired the source of her distress, and when he learned how sick her husband was he spoke to her of the Divine Healer who could immediately heal her husband if she would trust Him. She grasped the story and said he could pray for her husband, but the man did not want him to pray in his room. So he prayed outside, and the druggist received a touch from the Lord to the extent that he could sit up in bed. He was so happy that he told the Pentecostal brother to go out and get the rest of his brethren to continue to pray. Special prayer was held for him with the result that in a very few days he was completely healed and going about his work. He was so grateful that he put a testimony in the local papers.

A little boy about eight or nine years old was terribly afflicted with an eye disease. They were swollen shut. We didn't know how long he had been in that condition. He was prayed for one evening, and the next morning his eyes would open, the pus and inflammation all gone, and he was perfectly healed.

On his way to church one of our Christians was bitten by a rattlesnake just above the ankle. They killed the snake and just claimed that promise that nothing should by any means hurt them (Luke 10:19), and came on to church. The man felt no ill effects whatever from the snake bite. He didn't do a thing for it—just took God at His Word in simple faith. "I give you power to tread on serpents . . . and nothing shall by any means hurt you." Thus is the Lord making Himself very real to these people.

Put a tract in every letter you write. Scatter them everywhere. Half pound sample package—25 cents. AM the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep." John 10:11. Jesus here re-

fers to Himself as "the good shepherd." Down through the ages, God has referred to mankind as "sheep." When he refers to the unsaved, the Prophet Isaiah declares, "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way." When he speaks of the redeemed the Psalmist David declares, "We are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand." Not only was this true of Israel but it is true of mankind today. Members of the church are likened to sheep.

Not only has God likened His people to sheep but He has likened His ministers to shepherds. In Jeremiah 3 He gave the promise, "I will give you pastors according to mine heart, which shall feed you with knowledge and understanding." Again, "I will set up shepherds over them which shall feed them." Here the thought is the same, and yet we have two expressions used, pastors and shepherds, both of whom shall feed the flock of God. The same thought is brought to us in the New Testament. While we only find the word "pastor" used once, yet the same word in Greek translated "pastor" I believe is on at least seventeen other occasions translated "shepherds" or "leaders." A pastor I believe is in a strict sense a shepherd of God's sheep.

In the Old Testament God's shepherds were unfaithful and as a result of their unfaithfulness the sheep were scattered. They were driven out into the mountain sides with with no one to care for their souls. When Jesus appeared on the scene, as He looked down upon those people scattered as sheep without a shepherd, His heart was moved with compassion because they were indeed like sheep having no shepherd. He said to His disciples, "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost," and all through the ministry of Christ He mani-fested Himself as that good Shepherd who was seeking continually after those that were lost. He poured out His life to this end, finally laying down His life for the sheep. When Jesus moved from the scene as the good Shepherd, He passed this calling, this great ministry that He had had upon earth as a Shepherd on to those who were to follow afterwards.

As this graduating class goes forth, some no doubt will make their way to the foreign field, and in the foreign lands they will seek for lost sheep to bring them to God; and after they have been brought, to care for those sheep. Some will labor in the homeland, and in the home field they will be called upon to shepherd the sheep of God. No doubt many of the young ladies will eventually become wives of some faithful pastors. The responsibilities and demands made upon a pastor's wife usually are nearly as great as the demands and responsibilities of the pastor himself. I wish we might realize the great responsibility and the marvelousness of this call that comes to us, of being shepherds of God's sheep.

THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL

We find in the 21st chapter of John, a little revelation of the importance of this ministry.

One morning after Christ had been raised from the dead, He met the disciples on the seashore. After their whole night all fishing, in which they had taken nothing, they found that He had prepared a fire and food for them. The Word tells us, "When they had dined, Jesus saith to Simon Peter, Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me more than these? He saith unto him, Yea, Lord; thou knowest that I love thee. He saith unto him, Feed my lambs. . . . Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me? . . . Yea, Lord; thou knowest that I love thee. . . . Feed my sheep. . . . Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me? Peter was grieved because

Peter was grieved because he said unto him the third time, Lovest thou me? And he said unto him, Lord, thou knowest all things; thou knowest that I love thee. Jesus saith unto him, Feed my sheep."

Commentators suggest that Jesus was chiding Peter just a little for his three fold denial of Him. Peter had professed greater love and greater fidelity to Christ than perhaps the other disciples had done. Then after chiding him, Christ three times gave Peter the opportunity to confess his love for Him. They point out to us that the words "love" and "lov-est" are translated from two different Greek words, one of them denoting great affection and the other a lesser term-perhaps we would say today, esteem or "Lovest thou me?" He used the strong word for affection, and Peter answered Him in the lesser degree, "You know, Lord, that I am fond of you, I esteem you." They point out that Peter was humiliated. He had learned a lesson.

I believe there is a greater thought involved in this word than that of humility. There are two different Greek verbs used in connection with this word "feed." Jesus said, "Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me more than these?" Simon said, "You know,

Lord, I am fond of thee." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs." The second time Jesus said, "Simon, lovest thou me?" Simon said, "Lord, you know I am fond of you." Jesus said, "Tend my sheep." The third time He said, "Simon, lovest thou me?" This time He used the lesser term, the same term Peter had used, "Are you fond of me?" Then Peter was grieved and he said, Lord, you know all things, you know I am fond of you." He said, "Feed my sheep." I believe this reveals the burning compassion in the heart of Jesus, a real compassion for His sheep, a real desire for His people. I

spoke to Peter and revealed the great burden of His heart. He revealed also the burden of *his* heart. He said, "Take heed therefore unto your-

selves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." And then he went on to say, "Not only feed them, but guard them against grievous wolves."

Peter further enjoins us: "Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind; neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock." This is our high calling. As this class goes forth, I trust they will realize that God has not

methods that we find employed today by so-called ministers, spectacular programs and entertainment; neither has God called them to a superficial service that has in it nothing but just a "jump" and emotionalism; but God has called them to feed and tend the sheep of God.

If we are going to feed the flock of God, we ourselves must be fed. If we are going to lead the flock we will have to be led ourselves. We are to be ensamples to the flock. Our flock will be what we are. Our ability to lead will be just in the proportion as God is able to feed us and to lead us. Many times I have gone before congregations who were desiring a pastor. Individuals have stood up all over the build-ing and said with tears streaming down their faces, "Brother Lewis, give us a shepherd. We have had preachers, but we want a shepherd." Shepherds are what the people are look-ing for. The kind of men and women that are in demand today are those that can feed and take care of the flock of God.

The Responsibility of the Shepherd

It is a responsible position to tend sheep. Jacob gave us a little insight into the responsibility that is laid upon the shepherds when he said, "In the day the drought consumed me,

and the frost by night." Tending sheep. was not an eight-hour-a-day job, nor was it a ten-hour-a-day job, but a day-and-night one in the midst of drought and frost.

David was a shepherd. David knew the responsibilities of a true shepherd. When he spoke in a prophetic way of Jesus Christ he spoke of Him as the good shepherd. In the 23rd Psalm we have a wonderful description of the good shepherd that lays down his life for his sheep. He was speaking primar-ily, we know, of Jesus. And yet, as we study this Psalm I believe we have suggested here the characteristics of a shepherd, and the responsibility that rests upon us as under-shepherds of Jesus Christ. This Psalm starts out, "The Lord is my shepherd." What a picture it suggests to us of a shepherd leading forth the sheep, the docile flock following in his footsteps as he goes forth to the pasture. The Lord Jesus declares that when He put forth His sheep He went before them. It is very important that we as shepherds realize, first of all, that we are called to lead the sheep, not to drive them. It is impossible to drive sheep, or nearly so. We are called to lead them and to go before them.

"He maketh me to lie down in green pastures : he leadeth me beside the still waters." Again He leads them by going before them. Notice where He leads them. He does not lead them into the ditches of formality or through the chasm of fanaticism, as many have been led; but He leads them into a place of rest in God. Not into a place of fear and confusion, but into a place of real rest, in green pastures beside the still waters. Shepherds tell us that sheep never lie down when they are hungry. When sheep are on the move it is because they are seeking for food. When the flock lie down and rest it is because they are satisfied. I wonder sometimes if the flock is not restless because of the lack of food. If in our ministry we find it difficult to hold the sheep, to keep them in the fold where they belong, it is a good thing for us to hide ourselves away and say, "O God, what is the matter? Are they hungry? Am I not feeding them?"

"He restoreth my soul." Now, a good shepherd not only feeds, but when a sheep is faint, he uses means to bring about its restoration. He does not leave it by the wayside to die, but gives it very special care. How many sick sheep have got discouraged along the way. God has called us to a ministry of encouragement to strengthen the weak and confirm the feeble, lest those who are lame be turned out of the way. We are called to minister healing to such.

eousness for his name's sake." He leads them in the right way, in the way that they should go. A good pastor, a good shepherd, when he sees the sheep straying in the wrong path goes after them and directs them in the right way. Sometimes we have to say, "Brother, you are wrong," and we have to guide them back to the straight and narrow way.

When troubles come to the flock, the shadow of death, the pastor is right there with them. He does not forsake them in their hour of need, but he is with them, caring for them. "Thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." We see in the rod and staff protection, but we also see discipline. Discipline is necessary, it is true, but not a discipline that throws rocks and wounds and then leaves to die, but that discipline that brings comfort and yields the visible fruits of righteousness. David said, "Let the righteous smite me; it shall be a kindness: and let him reprove me; it shall be an excellent oil, which shall not break my head." That is the kind of discipline that we need today.

And then "goodness and mercy"—like two faithful watch dogs—shall follow the flock continually day and night. The table is spread before them, the oil is flowing, there is blessing, there is food; they are satisfied, they are kept safely in the care of God.

The Character of the Shepherd

The character of the Shepherd is unselfishness. "The good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep." Jesus said, "No man taketh my life from me, but I lay it down of myself." It is a characteristic of the true shepherd that he is willing to lay down his life for the sheep. The sheep do not lay down their lives for us; we lay down our lives for them. On one occasion sickness and death had entered our assembly, and we had been called upon to go day and night for days, praying for the sick here and there, until we were nearly exhausted ourselves. One night about two o'clock I received a telephone call and one of God's sheep said, "Brother Lewis, will you come right down soon and pray for one of the members of the family that has fallen sick?" It was in February, there was a terrible storm raging, snow was flying, we were weary and worn. We told them we would be there. I got into the automobile and started in the night-it was an open car we were driving at that time-it was a number of years ago. The wind was blowing, the snow was flying, we were tired, and as I drove through the night, suddenly this thought came to me and I spoke right out aloud: "Lord, what am I doing here, through the night, weary and worn, go-ing continually?" And as I questioned "Why am I here?" it seemed as if the Lord spoke so sweetly to my heart, and said, "Answering the call of God."

It is a sad thing when selfishness enters into the ministry. We are called to

a "poured out" life for Jesus and for the sheep. In speaking of the shepherds of old we find there are three charges laid against them. The first was that they preyed upon the flock of God without feeding them and without caring for them. In Isaiah 56 we read, "They are shepherds that cannot understand: they all look to their own way, every one for his gain, from his quarter." Again in Ezekiel, "Woe be to the shepherds of Israel that do feed themselves! Should not the shepherds feed the flocks? Ye eat the fat, and ye clothe you with the wool, ye kill them that are fed: but ye feed not the flock."

I realize that God has said in His Word that "they which preach the gospel should live by the gospel," but if we are going to live by the gospel we should feed and tend the sheep. It is our responsibility, and when we allow finances and material things to crowd in and become a predominating factor in our life, just the moment we allow that, we find that our calling becomes a profession and we become a hireling. We have a responsibility to feed the sheep and to tend them, not merely to look to our own wants, but to live a poured-out life for Him and for them.

The unfaithful shepherd is spoken of as leading the sheep astray. "My people hath been lost sheep: their shepherds have caused them to go astray, they have turned them away on the mountains: they have gone from mountain to hill, they have forgotten their resting place." They have gone astray because the shepherds led them astray. We not only are called upon to feed the sheep, but we are called upon to lead them in the right way. We are bound to lead them astray sooner or later, unless we are following the Lord very carefully ourselves. Paul commissioned us to study to show ourselves "approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." If we are going to lead them in the straight and narrow way we must know God's Word. Many have been led into error, many have been led into wrong paths because the leaders did not know the way themselves. God forbid that we should lead the sheep astray, but keep them true.

And then they are accused of scattering the flock. I would like to quote from Spurgeon's book on "Soul-Winning." "Some people go about preaching in a way to invite a scrap. They feel their special ministry is to tear down and root out. They feel the whole church is wrong and the first thing they must do is to get rid of the deacons and the official board and then others until there is no one left. They just keep tearing holes in the ship until it sinks, and then they crawl overboard and get on another boat and begin to bore holes again."

A certain individual said to me,

"Brother Lewis, it seems as if God has given me the ministry to tear down and root out." No one has a call from God to scatter the flock; He has called us to feed and tend the sheep.

In the 4th chapter of Ephesians we have a varied ministry given to us and Paul says it is for the edifying of the body of Christ. Now, sometimes we find that our particular type of ministry is not just the ministry that is needed in a particular place, and if we continue that ministry it is going to result in division and scattering of God's people, while if we would move out of the way and let some other type of ministry come in it might tend to edify and unite that flock and keep them one in God. Now to do this we must have unselfishness again. Sometimes it takes an unselfish decision. Many times a man says, "I have some rights." No, in this case you have not. The sheep are the first consideration and we may be called upon to lay down our rights and lay down our particular ministry in that place, to lay down everything else, just to preserve the flock of God. If you find that your ministry is not bringing the desired results, get out of the way and let somebody else do it. God has a place where your particular ministry will just fit in. That is the reason why it is so important to be led of God in our ministry. Let us not be unfaithful min-isters but faithful ones. If we are faithful to the call God has given us we are going to have the love of the sheep here on this earth, and when Jesus the good Shepherd appears we are going to receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away.

I want to say again to our 1935 graduating class, we commend you to God. We trust as you go forth that God will give you a shepherd's heart—for after all, God will have to give to you a shepherd's heart. We pray that the blessing of God will rest upon you and the grace of God will keep you clear to the end. Amen.

The Gospel in Spain

He believes the time ripe for this effort and that there is ground for hope that Spain will respond. Many ex-priests and ex-friars, he states, would like to leave the Roman Catholic Church, and some who have already left are eager to take part in an evangelical campaign."

Mr. Addison H. Chapin wrote, "While laboring in Angola, West Africa, I was accustomed to take a native with me when I went to the villages to preach. I enjoyed going to Ekovonogo more than to any other village. It was one of the largest, and was about ten miles from the mission station. In the early days of the mission this village was known as a very treacherous one. It was understood that the 'Word' was not to be preached there by either missionary or native, under penalty of death.

"One day another missionary and I went to see the noted village. As we approached, we sent our guide on, while we dismounted from our wheels and, there in the woods just outside the place, knelt and asked God to give us the people for Himself. We then entered the village and, after talking with the people in a general way, directed the conversation toward the things of God. That was the opening wedge, and at least once a month after that I went there to preach.

"On one beautiful Sunday morning I took with me a young Christian native named Seyanja. When we reached the village, the chief, with his elders and the men, women, and children, came out of the village and sat in the shade of some large trees for the morning service. The chief with his elders sat near me, the other men to one side, and the women by themselves. After the service, to which the natives gave excellent attention, I asked Seyanja if he would like to say a few words.

"With a boldness given him by the indwelling Christ, and with beauty of native speech, he spoke of the love of Jesus and His power to save. When he had spent himself for several minutes in earnest persuasion, he turned to the chief and the elders and said, 'Do you know that little spring of water over yonder in the forest?' They were all at-tention. 'You know,' he continued, 'that the lion, the leopard, the deer, the fox, the rabbit, the birds that fly in the heavens, and all the little animals that creep on the ground, even the mouse, come to that spring to drink.' They nodded. Then he went on: 'This Jesus whom we have been hearing about and whom the white man came to tell us about is that spring of water; and whether one is a chief, an elder, a woman, a child, or a slave, he must come to Him and drink in order to have life eternal, in order to have the heart-thirst satisfied.'

"It was not long before that same chief, with his retinue, came and asked for a native teacher to show them the way of life, and to teach them the Word."

"Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." Isa. 55:1. The Lord Jesus gives the living water to everyone that thirsteth.
