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## Jaking, Blessing, Breaking, and Giving

The miracle of feeding the five thousand is the only miracle in the forty that are recorded in the life of Jesus, which is recorded in all four of the Gospels. We read that He took the bread, He blessed, He brake, and then He gave.

When the Lord met His disciples in the upper room after going through the passover feast, He took bread, He blessed it, He brake it, and gave it to them.

When the Lord joined the disciples on the road to Emmaus He tarried at their dwelling place, and they ate together. Jesus took bread, blessed it, brake it, and gave it to them.

I think all of this is a parable of a profound lesson He would teach us. Jesus took a body and came as a babe to the manger. He was blessed in that body at the river Jordan when He was baptized by John and the Spirit descended on Him like a dove. That body of His was broken at Calvary. Then He gave, and that takes us to Pentecost when He gave the gift of the Holy Ghost. Those are the four high spots in the life of Jesus—Bethlehem, Jordan, Calvary, and Pentecost when He had reached the place of glory at the Father's right hand.

Now the same thing is true of us. We must be *born* in "the manger." It is very humiliating to be born again, isn't it? Jesus came and took a human body. When you and I go to "the manger," we become partakers of the life of Christ. Jesus took humanity, but we get divinity. Jesus blessed the bread, and that takes us into the experience of being baptized with the Holy Ghost where we are indeed *blessed*. Then after that, we have to go to Calvary. Much of the preaching is that the suffering comes when we are seeking to receive the Baptism in the Spirit. That may be

true in a measure. But the real "breaking"—our crucifixion—comes afterwards. So we have our "taking" the Bread of life, that is, receiving His life in the new birth; then the "blessing" as we receive the Baptism in the Spirit; then the "breaking" as we enter into "the dying of the Lord" described in 2 Cor. 4:10.

Then we come to the place of giving out. Remember this: there was no increase or multiplication of the bread until it was broken. The multitudes followed Him for the loaves and fishes and the miracles, but in the 6th chapter of John we see that when He began to preach the message of the cross the crowd thinned out. He said to the disciples, "Will ye also go away?" He told His disciples, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone : but if it die, it bringeth forth *much fruit.*" The fruitfulness of the five small loaves came after they had been broken. And the wonderful fruitfulness of the ministry of Jesus Christ started after His death at Calvary.

In our lives today there has to be a continuation of the breaking and giving. When did the miracles of the loaves and fishes cease? When there was a stopping of the breaking and giving. When will our lives cease to be a blessing? When we stop breaking and stop giving. That is the secret. We become a blessing when we can say with Paul, "I am crucified with Christ." There must be a brokenness in our lives. Today our ministry is largely unbroken.

Just before the war I went home to Scotland, and while there I went into a large hall in Glasgow, a Y. M. C. A. meeting, where the ministers and Christian workers from all around Glasgow were gathered in conference. One city



worker got up and gave a report of his work, then said, "Brethren, pray for me, that I will always keep a lump in my throat." Do you know what that means? When you get all broken up there is a lump in your throat. Or we could say, "Pray for me, that I will always keep a tear in my eye."

That is the secret. That bread could have satisfied not only five thousand, but all the human race, but those disciples would have had to keep giving it out. Now the Bread of life is in our hands, yea, within our lives, and God wants us to pass it on to others. He will take us and bless us and break us and our lives will be given out to others in blessing, or perhaps it would be better to say that His life in us will flow out in blessing to others. ## The Need of Vision in Our Pentecostal Fellowship

#### "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Prov. 29:18.

During the past twenty years revolutionary changes have taken place in this world. Particularly from the time of the World War has the world been in a chaotic condition. Great political, social, and religious changes have taken place in several of the leading nations. At the present time there exists a great clash between two great forces in the world, which are battling for supremacy— Fascism and Communism—and we realize that the danger point in the world's affairs lies in this fight.

Some years ago when the Italian nation seemed to be in a state of disintegration, and internal strife was rampant on every hand, there appeared a man who realized that this suicidal state of affairs called for outstanding action and leadership, and that man threw his whole weight into the situation and became a national character. Since then the entire national life and policy of Italy has changed. Today we must admit that Mussolini is one of the world's foremost leaders, whether we agree with his policy or not. A similar thing took place in Germany at a later date. I hold no brief for Mussolini or for Hitler, but I must acknowledge that these men accomplished drastic national changes, and in spite of the manner in which they brought about the realization of their plans and schemes they were men of vision who faced colossal evils which threatened to destroy the national life of their countries.

These two men, Mussolini and Hitler, who have become world characters and who today are playing a very important part in the affairs of this world, are "men of vision." They were of humble origin. Mussolini was born in 1883, the son of a blacksmith, and worked as a mason; and Hitler was a corporal in the army. But they were men who seeing the need of something being done, stepped into the breach and did it.

Times of darkness and depression, of distress, of chaos, corruption and danger, demand men of vision, men of strength, men of faith, in the church of God, as well as in the life of nations.

Martin Luther and other great leaders of the Reformation were men of vision! General Booth was a man of vision. He was moved to the very depths of his being as he saw the sin-cursed masses of humanity in London. He had "a vision," and that man accomplished more for the downtrodden people of Great Britain than any other man had ever done. John Wesley after him was another man of vision. He realized something had to be done to stem the tide of carnality, worldliness, and sin existing in the churches of his day, and he fearlessly proclaimed the truth of entire sanctification in spite of bitter opposition and persecution. Probably he saved the British nation from revolution by doing so. Hudson Taylor had "a vision," and so did many others who, because they had "a vision," accomplished great and mighty things for God.

The man "without a vision" in everyday life or as a servant of God and a minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, in my judgment, is like a ship at sea without a rudder, subject to the power of every ocean current and every wind. But I am sorry to say, you will find today in the ministry, many who have "no vision," men who simply "go on" and that is all, just go on, and on with a little job and are satisfied. I know people in South Africa who are quite content to go on from year to year provided they can just get a living for themselves. They are content with little or nothing because they are not "men of vision." They do not get anywhere. It is the man who has "a vision" who accomplishes something for God. Not only men but women. I am glad to see in America so many women in the Full Gospel or Pentecostal ministry, dear sisters in Christ, whose hearts have been stirred by the great need of others and have responded to that need.

One of the greatest needs of the Pentecostal movement just now is that of God-given leaders, large-hearted and tolerant, possessed of "a vision," a vision that will bring greater unity and cooperation in our ranks—an International Fellowship. I came not to America to teach, but to enjoy the Pentecostal fellowship, trusting and hoping I may return to South Africa a richer man spiritually than when I came. I remind you that the missionary is one of the most important ministers in the church, and your attitude towards the Missionary cause, towards your care for others less privileged than you are, will determine the amount of success which will follow your ministry! You cannot be selfcentered or selfish in the ministry; you may close your eyes to the needs of others who are sitting in darkness, bound by chains of heathen superstition and darkness, but you cannot fulfill the plan of God in your life if you close your heart and eyes to the need facing us in these solemn days—the closing days of this Dispensation.

I read in your report, that there are affiliated with the General Council of the Assemblies of God approximately 3,500 assemblies, out of which 2,300 during the past twelve months, have contributed *nothing* for Foreign Missions, and that many of that number have not had their names registered at headquarters as having done anything!

Is that a lack of co-operation, or is it a lack of vision? or both? If we have the love of God toward our fellow men, if we desire to see this glorious gospel message proclaimed throughout the world, can we remain quiet in our respective assemblies? Can we remain indifferent to the unspeakable and tremendous needs facing the church—the Pentecostal church, at this time? I say NO! I say emphatically, NO! A great responsibility rests upon *all* evangelists and pastors who claim to be called of God, to bring this message of the Full Gospel or Pentecostal movement to men and women *everywhere*.

God save us from the spirit of selfishness. God give us "a vision," for "where there is no vision, the people perish."

God, I believe, is now seeking to give Pentecostal leaders throughout the world a vision—a vision of worldwide Pentecostal fellowship. May we not fail Him! I have not come 13,000 miles to see Memphis or any other city of this great and wonderful country, but I am here today because I believe with all my heart that God wants us to have a worldwide Pentecostal fellowship. Perhaps, nay probably, out of this fellowship there may be born an International Missionary Council. Surely a great need is facing the movement at this time!

"Where there is no vision, the people perish." A greater degree of unity among the responsible leaders in the

Pentecostal movement would undoubtedly rekindle the fire of unity on the altars of the hearts of Spirit-filled people everywhere and lead to a better understanding between them. Such a vision of unity would not only help make international co-operation possible but also help to eliminate those "non-essentials" which tend to separate us. We need to get closer to each other and then we shall enjoy the warm-hearted fellowship of our brethren in the ministry. Further, it will lead to the conservation of our human and financial resources, both in the home and in the foreign fields.

One having "a vision" must have moral conviction, wisdom, and energy to accomplish. To that end let us pray that God will bless us. If He gives us "a vision" He will surely give us the power, strength, and wisdom to see it fulfilled.

I am sorry for the leader, the evangelist, or the pastor, whoever he may be, if he is a man who has no vision and no hope, who will allow circumstances and conditions to crush him. God help him! But even a man who has no vision and no hope can still arouse himself. A man who has no hope, has no inspiration; for how can a man have inspiration if he has no hope? No hope means no inspiration, and no inspiration means no determination; and no determination means no realization.

Now let us reverse the order. If a man or woman has a vision, they have hope. If they have hope they have inspiration; then if they have inspiration they should have determination, for inspiration without determination will not get us very far. We must have determination to carry out what God has revealed to us in our particular field of labor.

In closing I remind you that the Apostle Paul had many visions, but the one which stood out above all others was the one he had on the Damascus road. It transformed his life and made him a great apostle of Christ. Did it cost him anything? It did. It cost him persecution and imprisonment; it cost him hunger; it cost him thirst; it meant suffering. Five times he received forty stripes save one, thrice was he beaten with rods. Few men have suffered for the gospel's sake as he did. Yet he was able to say: "For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

If there are those here today, who in the past years had "a vision" but through discouragement or opposition have lost it. look up, my brother; look up, my sister. Do not give in. If God has given you a work to do, do not allow hard and difficult circumstances to stand in the way to the fulfillment of God's plan. Give your *best* to Him, and He will see you through.

#### THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL

Jesus had a vision when He went to Calvary—a vision of a sin-cursed world, doomed, perishing. A dying world utterly powerless to save itself. To save that world, He went to Calvary, drank the cup of God's righteous wrath against sin, and laid down His life as a ransom for us all. For the joy that was set before Him He "endured the cross." All the powers of Satan could not turn Him back. Thank God for such a Saviour!

And this Saviour has given us the vision of His will for us: that repentance and remission of sins shall be preached in His name *among all nations*. Let us get this vision, and then having received it, let us not be disobedient to the heavenly vision.

### "I Can' Versus "I Can't"

"It is too hard," whispered the adversary, as pressure and trial multiplied; and not recognizing the voice I said, "Yes, I cannot stand it." Then my spirit sank under a cloud of depression, and the vision of victory grew dim and distant.

"Your spirit has gone under in the conflict," said a servant of God. I replied, "Yes, I know it has." "Have you said, 'I can't stand it'?" Why, yes, I had! Then light flashed in, and I saw where ground had been given to Satan. I saw that by assenting to his suggestion I had virtually surrendered arms to him, and had stepped down from my position with Christ in victory.

At once I took my stand anew, putting on "the helmet of salvation," for it was through the mind Satan had gained an entrance; and grasping the sword of the Spirit I refused him any further hold, and proved the power of Christ's victory to throw off the cloud.

But that is not all. The lesson has been of great value to me during the months that have intervened. I have found when the old suggestion has come back, as I have persistently refused to listen, meeting the enemy with "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me," and looking to Him to "strengthen with might by His Spirit," to make me strong in Him to stand and to endure, Satan has been put to flight, and my spirit kept above with Christ in full liberty, free from any cloud from Satan settling on it to crush me down.

The need for this liberty of spirit is great, both for personal life and aggressive service, for we may be attacked with depression in any path, and it is one of the enemy's most fruitful methods of hindering the advance of God's children; and to yield here is certain defeat. But we can refuse to accept that cloud, and having done all "remain victors on the field."

Refuse the cloud of depression about

your circumstances, your personal state and experience, your work for Christ. Allow no burden between you and God, for burdens from God do not come between. The spirit must be free, for real service in the Spirit. How difficult, how impossible it is to pray always in the Spirit, with a cloud from Satan hanging over and crushing our spirit! So let us take the victory and throw off the cloud.

It is true the old "I" cannot, but we reckon it crucified, and the new man in Christ can. The R. V. rendering of Phil. 4:13 gives the ground. It is *in Him*, united to Him in His death and risen ascended life, that we may say with Paul, "I can do all things *in* Christ who strengtheneth me." "Be strong *in* the Lord, and in the power of His might."—F. W.

#### Rejoice

It is better to rejoice than to be "resigned." The word "resigned" is not found in the Bible, but "rejoice" runs through the Scriptures like a great carillon of music. There is danger of self-pity in resignation—and self-pity is a deadly poison. We shall not be pitying ourselves while we are rejoicing "with joy unspeakable and full of glory."

Resignation often means a certain mock piety—perhaps unconsciously so, but none the less real. Joy is "the fruit of the Spirit." The Lord Jesus Christ told His disciples that hard times were coming for them, and that the hard times meant blessing: "Blessed are ye when men shall hate you, and when they shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake."

How did the Lord say the disciples should take these experiences when they came? With "resignation"? God forbid! This is what He said: "Rejoice ye in that day and leap for joy." They were to look upon these experiences with thanksgiving and exultation, as an investor would look upon an investment that was going to bring him inordinately large returns, and returns absolutely guaranteed by resources that never could fail. "For," continued the Lord, "behold, your reward is great in heaven."

Remember, every time some fresh affliction comes, that we are making an investment with assured returns of 100 or 1,000 or even greater per cent in dividends. There is nothing to be "resigned" about in having investments that are making us rich beyond words. Therefore, "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice."

#### Separation and Revelation

God hid Elijah. Ahab counted him "a troubler of Israel" and there was no land where he sought him not. If he had found him and had brought him to Samaria, Jezebel would have soon destroyed him. But God preserved him and took care of him. He was not even given the task of cooking his own meals. His whole time could be given to prayer and the Word.

In those three and one-half years of close communion, of continuous standing before God, of hearing His voice, Elijah's faith grew. He knew it was but a little thing for the One who fed him day by day by means of ravens, who daily increased the supplies of the widow so that the barrel of meal never wasted and the cruse of oil failed not, who brought to life the dead child of the widow, to send fire from heaven—fire sufficient to consume not only the sacrifice, but the altar and all the water round about it, and in response to prayer to send abundance of rain.

But see Elijah later under the juniper tree, utterly discouraged. Paul had a similar experience—"pressed out of measure, above strength, insomuch that we despaired even our life." God will allow His saints to have such experiences at times to remind them of the frailty of the human. Did He forget Elijah? Did He forget Paul? No, He sent an angel to Elijah, and proved Himself a Deliverer to Paul. He still has plenty of angels. None of them are ever on a sitdown strike. He will still prove a Deliverer to all who put their trust in Him.


Elisha did not tremble at the coming of the Syrian host. He said to his servant, "Fear not, for they that be with us are more than they that be with them!" The apostle John has yet a more cheering word to us, "Greater is He that is *in* you than he that is *in* the world."

Elijah was given food and sleep, food so wonderful that he could go in the strength of it for forty days. He went to Horeb, to the Mount of Revelation, where he was assured that the Lord had yet reserved seven thousand in Israel who had not bowed the knee to Baal, that He would overthrow the wicked house of Ahab and Jezebel, that He would give to Israel a prophet like unto himself, and even in the affairs of the outside world He would control, setting down one and raising another in his stead.

The apostle John lived in terrible days like those of Elijah, when it seemed as though the forces of darkness were reigning supreme. He was taken to Patmos and there he too was given a wonderful revelation of things to come. He was made to know that the Lord had reserved to Himself a multitude which no man could number. He heard the redeemed and all creation giving to Him that sitteth upon the throne and to the Lamb the praise and glory due to them. He saw the judgment coming on the rulers of this present evil age, the overthrow of a worse than Jezebel, and the coming of that Prophet who was greater than Elijah.

He saw all the kingdoms of this world becoming the kingdoms of our God and of His Christ, and the glorious victory of that King who is to rule all nations with a rod of iron. He saw the judgment of Satan and his puppets, and the wicked going to their final destiny—the lake of fire prepared for the devil and his angels. And he saw the glorious marriage of the Lamb and His bride, and the bringing in of the new heavens and the new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness, wherein there shall be no more sorrow, nor pain, nor death, and where no evil shall ever dwell.

Who can dwell in this greater Eden, this heavenly Paradise? Come back to the cross of Calvary and hear a word from the One upon that middle cross to the dying thief, "This day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise." "But, Master, do you know the nature of this man?



Do you know the terrible police record he has had? He is such a menace to society that he was sentenced to be crucified. The man is utterly vile and evil."

Yes, all that may be perfectly true, but do you know the power of the blood of Calvary's Lamb to cleanse? Do you know the power of His cross to transform? The apostle Paul got a revelation of the same and declared, "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross." But in that one offering—the offering of the Sinless One for the sinner, the Just One for the unjust, the Holy One for the unholy and vile—there is eternal perfection for all who put their trust in Him. They shall be like Him—holy, spotless, and undefiled.

The Lord looked down from heaven to see if there were any good, and found —how many? Not one. All needed salvation—the salvation He provided at Calvary. Only those who have been washed in the blood of Calvary's Lamb will be found in that heavenly city. It does not matter how vile the sinner, though his sins may be one hundred times greater than those of the dying thief, the blood of God's spotless Lamb avails to cleanse away all sin and all unrighteousness.

The blood of the cross, as the blood of old in Egypt, makes a separation today between God's true Israel and the Egyptians. His word to His own is, "Be ye separate"-as separate as Elijah, as separate as John. He calls His separate ones to pray, to pray for His Israel. Against them are invincible forces, the wicked spirits in heavenly places, more terrible than all the prophets of Baal and of the groves. But He provides an armor and heavenly weapons, and one of these weapons is "all prayer and suppli-cation in the Spirit." Pray for every regiment in the Lord's army, and especially for the "generals," the Pauls, who are a special target for the enemy's wrath. Pray for the fire, the Pentecostal fire; and pray persistently for the rain, the rain promised in the time of the latter rain to those who ask. Zech. 10:1.

To these who are separate He will give by His Spirit the revelation of things to come—the revelation of the sure and ultimate triumph of the Lamb. He it is who whispers, "Behold I come quickly and My reward is with Me." But a little while and He will translate His Elijahs and his Johns to be forever with the Lord.—S. H. F.

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#### THE CROSS IN A BRAHMAN'S LIFE

Mannargudi is a town in South India which is a stronghold of Brahmanism. In it is a great temple to which, at the many festivals each year, thousands of pilgrims come from all parts of the country. Right under the shadow of the great tower of that temple live the Vaishnavite Brahmans who have duties and honors in the services of the temple.

I was born in one such family. As is our custom, I was initiated into the life of religious study and discipline when I was nine, by a five days' ceremony of prayer. I was fascinated by the religious study and exercises of our faith, and with zest I began worshipping at home and in the temple. When I was twelve, I was married. I was educated in a Mission School, but I treated with prejudice, if not contempt, any attempt on the part of the teachers to teach me about their religion.

Later I joined Findlay College, and there I met a young missionary who lived so godly among the students that many of us were drawn to be his friends. When he assembled us boys one day and told us the meaning of the death of Christ, I was among those who were deeply touched. I then realized for the first time that God in great love sent His Son to take upon Himself our sins and to suffer death for us upon the cross. I had never before felt the reality of God as a great Saviour, or of myself as one so full of sins.

I saw my inward life as though my whole heart was turned before my eyes, and I became burdened with fear and condemnation. But in that redeeming love of God I realized His forgiveness and peace, so that I could say, "He died to save me." That day I gave myself for ever to the service of Christ, who at once became my Lord and Saviour.

A few days later I joined with other lads who had decided to follow Christ, to form a band. With the young missionary as leader, we pledged ourselves to win another for Christ. We studied the Bible and Christian books, and met together secretly each Sunday for fellowship and prayer. Within a year this band was increased to thirteen.

When the Hindus of our town heard about our secret meetings in the missionary's house, some of the members were expelled from school, severely beaten and isolated in lockups. After a few weeks of such suffering, borne gladly, two of us decided to confess Christ openly by baptism. However, when the people of the town heard about it they were roused afresh; they burned the Christian church to ashes, and set fire to several sheds in the college compound.

For eighteen months I was obliged to live in my Hindu home. However, at the end of that time I was baptized in our church at Karur, while my parents and other relations stood outside the church wailing. I pursued further studies but the loneliness of my life made it burdensome. After a time I heard the call to go to a distant countryside, so I left the next day. I became a wandering preacher among the villagers, preaching chiefly among the outcastes. Four years later, while in Mesopotamia, my wife was led to join me, and by her own choice she was baptized as a Christian. I have ministered in various places in the many years since my conversion, and I find true peace and lasting joy in seeing others come to know the Christ who loves each person so much that He died for them on the cross .- Paul Rangaramanujam.

They went aside and the former said: "Before you commence telling what you think wrong in me, will you please bow down with me and let us pray over it, that my eyes may be opened to see my faults as you will tell them? You lead in prayer."

It was done, and when the prayer was over, the man who had sought the interview said: "Now proceed to tell me what you have to complain of in me."

But the other replied: "After praying over it, it looks so little that it is not worth talking about. The truth is, I feel now that in going around and talking against you I have been serving the devil myself, and have need that you pray for me, and forgive me the wrong I have done you."

### Joshua's Last Meeting with Israel

Lesson for March 6. Lesson Text: Joshua Chapters 23, 24.

The Stewardship of Parents is the great theme of the lesson. "As for me and my house we will serve the Lord." 24:15. God always takes the "long view." He doesn't plan for today only, merely for the immediate necessity, but He looks down through the generations to come and acts accordingly. In our early studies in Joshua we talked about

the qualities which he possessed, which made him God's chosen leader; his soldierly obedience, his deep piety, his religious training, his patience, and his humble submissiveness. Now we discover one more quality in him which is as important as any of the foregoing, namely, he not only felt responsible to God for himself, but also for his house—*his family*. This is a quality that God always looks for when choosing the man for His plan.

Why God Chose Abram. Read Gen. 18:18, 19. "Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him. For I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him and they shall keep the way of the Lord." The Lord emphasizes Abraham's sense of responsibility to God for his children and household, as the reason for choosing Abraham. Question, How many of us would God be able to choose today on the same basis? God said "Abraham will command his children." Nowadays, children command their parents. In Bible days, both in Old and New Testament times, the father was considered the priest of the household. The fa-

ther, not the Levites, or the priesthood, was accountable to God for the spiritual welfare of his children. This is still God's attitude. Modern parents are prone to try to shift this responsibility of theirs over on to the Sunday School teacher, the pastor, or the evangelist. But of them, God will one day hold the parents accountable for the unsaved, unholy condition of their children! If God looked for this quality of parental authority in His Old Testament saints, does He expect less of His New Testament people? All parents would do well to read prayerfully 1 Tim. 3:4, 5, 12. "One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity . . . ruling their children and their own houses well." God does not change. He does not change His standards. Notice how in Timothy's case God's "long view" is exemplified. "When I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee, which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice, and I am persuaded in thee also." Three generations! Someone in Timothy's family tree was accustomed to *command his children* and his household after him. For that reason God was able to use Timothy.

Jacob's Example (Gen. 35:1-3) is most helpful in this connection. Remember also that he is Abraham's grandson, thus fulfilling God's declaration that Abraham, would command his children after him. "Then Jacob said to



his household and to all that were with him. Put away the strange God's that are among you and be clean, and change your garments. And let us arise and go up unto Bethel and I will make there an altar unto God." Family worship, a family altar, the consecration of an entire family to God, led by the godly example of the head of the house! Dr. Massee tells of a Christian man of his acquaintance who lived with his family in the country. God had blessed him with wealth. He finally yielded to the entreaties of his wife and daughter and moved into a city, purchasing a mansion there. His wife and daughter, gave themselves to the social swirl, rounds of pleasure seeking, and worldliness. The old gentleman had to sorrowfully go to prayer meeting all alone, to divine worship on Sunday, without his family, whereas in the old days they always accompanied him and were glad to do so. Finally

he summoned the two backslidden members of his family into his presence, reminded them of their former piety and simplicity of living in God's countryside, and then pointed out how they had backslidden. "And now," said the old man, "I warn you, solemnly before God, if both of you do not cease your unholy manner of living, your constant fellowship with ungodly society, I shall dispose of all my wealth which God had entrusted me with, and as poor people we shall go back to the countryside and work for our living in the fear of the Lord." He commanded his household, and it worked! They toed the mark immediately. Wouldn't it be fine, if we modern parents tried it?

Oil in Our Homes is the crying need of the day. The oil that flowed in the widow's home (2 Kings 4:1-7) can well serve as an


inspiration to householders of today. She was threatened with the breaking up of her home. (Many homes are disrupted today by worldliness and sin.) Her children were about to be sold into bondage. (Children today are in bondage to the world, the flesh, and the devil-in high school and in college.) She appealed to the man of God, and he said, "What hast thou in the house?" What did she answer? A bridge table, waxed floors for dancing, a ballroom and billiard room? What should we have to answer if the Lord said to us, "What hast thou in the house?" She had "a little oil." Hallelujah! "Thou hast a little strength." What then. "When thou art come in, shut the door upon thee and thy sons (shut them on the inside not the outside, shut the door against all outside influences of the world) and pour out." You remember what happened? The oil flowed. Her home was saved, her sons were spared from bondage, and had enough left to live on. When God can cause the oil to flow in our homes, the same thing will happen. If, when we came to public meeting, we all came from homes where the oil had been flowing, what a revival would

break out! Why does evangelist after evangelist and preacher after preacher have to work and toil to pray down the "anointing" on the public meeting, again and again in the same place? Because somewhere between their public worship and their personal and home life, the people lose the anointing!

The Family Altar, is what Jacob called his family to! Notice the lesson cartoon. "Have you a family altar in your home?" Chaplain Hogg once declared, "When I was chaplain of a penitentiary in Arkansas, out of 1700 convicts I found only one that had been brought up in a home where they had an old fashioned 'family altar.' I have heard since that he was pardoned as he was found innocent of the crime with which he had been charged." What a record for "family altars"! One hundred per cent effective! Hogg continues, "There was an atmosphere in the old fashioned home

Present Day Events in the Light of Scripture

#### SPEAKING HEBREW

In the British House of Commons complaint was made that British civil servants in Palestine do not speak Hebrew. Out of 270, only 6 speak Hebrew, although 106 speak Arabic.

#### LEAGUE OF NATIONS

In a recent address in London Mr. Lloyd George uttered a scathing indictment of the League of Nations, stating that it "has been stricken with palsy, its right side paralyzed, its right arm withered, its voice feeble, indistinct, gibbering."

#### PRAY FOR THE JEWS!

The call to prayer on behalf of the Jews of America has been sent out over the signatures of a number of prominent Christian leaders. The date set is Sunday, March 27, 1938, just preceding the Passover season. It is suggested that pastors have a special prayer season for Israel at the services.

#### STILL REJECTING CHRIST

The Jews of Tel Aviv, the new all-Jewish city in Palestine, have appropriated five hundred dollars to combat Christian missionary activities among Jewish children, says *Jewish Missionary Magazine*. Centuries ago they spent thirty pieces of silver for like purpose, but many Jewish eyes have been opened to behold their Messiah nevertheless.

#### A NEW CHURCH?

Adolph Keller, of Switzerland, speaking in New York recently, expressed the opinion that the present Church in Europe was a dying Church. He prophesied the rising of a new Church based on faith, poverty, persecution and meekness. Mothers in Russia are meeting secretly in catacombs, streets and private houses to teach their children religion. In France and Germany there is a strong undercurrent of spiritual revival.

#### SURVIVING RECHABITES

In Jer. 35:18, 19 the Lord gave promise to the Rechabites who refused to drink that "Because ye have obeyed the commandment of Jonadab your father, . . . Jonadab the son of Rechab shall not want a man to stand before me for ever." The fact that there are Rechabites still surviving is a remarkable fulfillment of God's Word.

In a record of a Jewish Council in Hungary in 1650, we are told that the Rechabites still observed their ancient customs. The Bible Cyclopedia says: "The Beni-Rechab (sons of Rechab) still exist, a distinct and equally distinguishable people. They boast of their descent from Rechab, profess pure Judaism, and they all know Hebrew. Yet they live in the neighborhood of Mecca, the chief seat of Mohammedanism, and their number is stated to be 60,000."

Many years ago Dr. Wolff, a missionary of the Church Missions to Jews, visited them twice. He had no doubt at all but that they were actually sons of Rechab, and that their manners and traditions demonstrate the fact.

#### BIBLE REVISION

The Committee of the International Council of Religious Education has ordered a revision of the Bible to "embody modern scholarship." It is going to be decidedly "modern," but a number of old-fashioned folks will still prefer the old-fashioned version that delighted their fathers and mothers.

The trouble is when men not Spirit-filled translate the Word they frequently seek not only to translate but to interpret the Word according to their own mental conceptions. We won't mind an American version of the Scriptures, but we object to an American *perversion* of them.

#### FRANCO AND PROTESTANTISM

Reports *Prophetic News:* Franco's slogan is: "One leader—one *faith.*" The Franco press throws fire and brimstone against democracy and Protestantism. The latter is regarded as an associate creed of Communism. Their campaign is a war of extermination against all non-Catholics. There is in operation a sordid persecution of all evangelicals in the territory gained by the Rebels. They spy on all non-Catholics and on any suspected of doing Protestant missionary work, and they are taken for a ride, never to return alive. In one province alone, over 7,000 have been disposed of in this way."

#### A PRAYING KING

An English newspaper states that one of the few remaining places in London where the custom of family prayers is maintained every morning is Buckingham Palace. This applies whether or not their Majesties are in residence.

The service takes place in the private chapel and is conducted by the King's domestic chaplain. It includes a short reading from the Bible.

The custom of daily prayers at the Palace is a direct link with the reign of Queen Victoria, and nothing is permitted to interfere with it.

#### REJECTING THE WORD

Paul wrote years ago, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God." A Commission of the Anglican Church of Great Britain challenges this. They reject many of the truths of Scripture as "unscientific." They state that the "literalistic belief in the physical resurrection of the dead body must be rejected quite frankly," thus removing an outstanding foundation of the faith, "for if the dead rise not, then is not Christ raised: and if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." 1 Cor. 15:16, 17.

This report is surely a last day sign of the "falling away" predicted before the coming of "the man of sin, the son of perdition." 2 Thess. 2:3.

#### A PORTABLE TABERNACLE FOR THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS

We received a very interesting letter from our Brother Robert McClay, laboring in the Ranchi District, North India, telling us of his evangelizing efforts. He states that in traveling over the district he has sold over forty thousand Gospels and a number of Bibles and New Testaments, besides distributing thousands of tracts free. The reason we charge a little for the Gospels and New Testaments and Bibles is that the people usually appreciate them more if they have to pay something for them, although the price asked is the very minimum possible and does not really cover their cost.

In order to follow up this work of literature distribution it is necessary to have meetings for the preaching, and Brother McClay thinks that by purchasing what is known as a "shamiana" which is a kind of a tent without the side wall, accommodating from eight hundred to a thousand people he will be able to hold meetings in one place for some time until some get saved or at least have been given a good opportunity, our last check was more than we need,

#### THE GRACE OF GIVING

This same missionary finishes up his letter to us by stating:

"Will you please do us the favor to take from our next remittance thirty dollars as possibly know how difficult it has been to carry on there without a church during these past years, with the large family of often a hundred girls in the school, teachers, workers, and other Inthe missionaries and dian Christians, those who attend from the city. For each service all the furniture has had to be carried out from the living room and dining room, rugs rolled up and put away, mats and benches brought in and arranged, then the rearranging of all this and getting settled down until the next meeting. Moreover notwithstanding all the confusion and work there has been the realization that there has not been room for the unsaved who would like to come to hear the gospel.

Prayer has been answered, and now Bethel Church stands on the front corner of the Bettiah compound, very beautiful though simple, with comfortable seats for two hundred. Already God has blessed and filled it with His presence and glory. No wonder there was joy in our hearts as we assembled to dedicate it to the Giver.

The dedication took place Sunday morn-



ing, December 12. We first met on the front veranda of the mission bungalow for a brief time of song and praver, after which we marched in a long procession to the new church singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." Leading the procession was the one who has been most kind, tireless, and faithful during this past year in building this church -Brother Harry Waggoner. The little children were especially thankful, for Brother Waggoner had arranged for low benches for the front of the church just for them. and the fact that not one small girl wriggled from her seat during the long three-hour dedication service was proof that the benches are comfortable for them.

The time went quickly with many participating in the service. Hilda Wagen-knecht, superintendent of the orphanage and school, spoke through tears of joy, so much did this hour mean to her and the other workers in Bettiah. Two babies were dedicated to the Lord, then special music followed by the message of the occasion brought by Harry Waggoner, after which we gathered about the Lord's table to remember together His death and His coming again.

Those of us who have enjoyed the gracious hospitality of the mission and the missionaries in Bettiah are never in a hurry to leave so we lingered to attend a pretty Christian wedding in the new church on Monday.

#### NEWS FROM CHINA'S WAR ZONE Eva Louise Bloom

On November 12 five Japanese heavy bombers flew over the city of Ningpo and for three hours released incendiary bombs, causing the destruction of much property and the loss of many lives. The terrific explosions, followed by heavy clouds of smoke and flames leaping high, threw the people into a state of panic. Some of the bombs were dropped near our compound

and shook our buildings to the foundations. The horror of it was awful and it is inde-The vibration was so great that scribable! plaster fell from the ceiling in some of the rooms, pictures fell from the walls and some of the window glass was broken.

After the first explosion people began to stream through our gates seeking refuge. Our orphan children were huddled under the tables in the dining room along with some of the older ones. We missionaries were kept busy at the front gate comforting the people the best we could as they poured in from the otuside, and directing them into the chapel where the gospel was being preached between explosions. One little girl was brought to us who had been wounded by bomb fragments which cut her face and hands. Separated from her parents and her little face bleeding and swollen, she was a pathetic sight to behold. The following morning her father found her and he was very thankful to see her again for he thought she had been killed. The son of one of our devoted Christians was with us at the time of the bombing, and was so frightened that he began to cry out to the Lord for mercy, confessed his sins and re. ceived a born-again experience.

Immediately after the bombing, a great exodus took place. Thousands of people began leaving the city. All available buses, boats, and rikishas were loaded to capacity, and it was a pitiful sight to see the people with a few of their earthly belongings seeking places of safety. For several days we thought we would not have to leave Ningpo, but as more trouble was expected orders came for all foreign women to leave the city. It was not until then that we felt it necessary for us to move our children to a safer place. The moving of such a large group was not an easy matter at such a time, but as we looked to the Lord, He made it possible for us to send them to one of the outstations in a mountain village some distance from Ningpo, where they will remain until Ningpo is considered safe.

After making all arrangements for the Ningpo work my sister and I have obeyed Consular orders and have come to Shanghai. Up to the present time we have been able to keep in close touch with the work at Ningpo and those who are refugees in the mountains. Please remember us in prayer during these awful days of war and destruction.

Word has come from one of our South India missionaries that a little son has come to live with Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Burgess, born November 27.

#### BRIEF NOTES FROM FAR AND NEAR Missionaries Safe in China

Word has been received that our three missionaries in the Shansi Province (Alice Stewart, Henrietta Tieleman and Anna Ziese) are safe and continuing their work. Because of the unsettled conditions there and uncertain communication facilities, we believe it would be well to send their mail in care of Mr. B. T. Bard, who will be in close touch with them and will forward their mail. His address is 111 Hsi Ssu Tei Ta Chieh, Peiping, W. City, China.

In view of several inquiries as to the safety of Martha George a Pentecostal missionary working in North China, we are pleased to state that a friend of hers has received a letter dated in January, saying that she is safe and continuing her ministry. Miss George is not under appointment by the General Council, but she has many friends in our fellowship so that for their information we are glad to print this notice.

#### Arrive in China

A letter from Miss Lula Ashmore brings word that she and the McKinney family arrived safely in China late in November. The Mc-Kinneys, it is expected, will proceed on to Singapore, while Miss Ashmore will remain in South China for language study.



#### "PRESERVED IN CHRIST JESUS"

The following are extracts from a letter from a missionary in Shanghai, China.

"I went to a refugee camp where thousands are herded together just under straw matting. The gospel was preached and many were saved. I met an old woman with crutches and her story was that she had lived right where the fighting began, and she was in bed at night.

"The soldiers were fighting all around her house, and suddenly a Hand grasped her and pulled her out of bed and put her in a corner of the room. The next moment something fell through the bed. She then felt the Hand pull her from that corner to another; and so on through the night this Hand was pulling her from place to place until she was tired out. In the morning she found that her house was riddled with bullets and shrapnel, but she was untouched, but very tired. That woman could not have moved by herself because she could not get her crutches, yet she was moved round all night by a Divine Hand and she is just rejoicing, although forced to endure the discomforts of a refugee camp. Our God is able to deliver.

"Another man told me that he was on a train coming to Shanghai, when the Japanese appeared to bomb it. He thought it would be safer if he ran to a stationary locomotive to hide under it. This was two hundred yards away. Before he could move, however the Lord said to him, 'Why do you leave this train? Cannot you trust Me?' So he sat still and the next moment the bombs fell; but they fell on the stationary locomotive, killing all who were hiding under it, and they did not touch the train. The Lord cares for His own.

"A man was in that terrible carnage on August 14th. He was suddenly flung to the ground and many people fell on top of him. When the rescuers came they found that these were all dead bodies, but he was alive underneath. He was soaked in blood, and he thought himself that he must be badly hurt and would die soon. However, he got a ricksha and went home. When his family saw him they all began to weep thinking he must be mortally hurt; but after he had bathed and changed he found that he had not even a scratch. The dead bodies had protected him and God had thrown him down first that his life might be saved. Truly, our God is a God of wonders and miracles."—Mabel Broadbridge.

#### MAKING MENTION . . . IN OUR PRAYERS Grace Walther

You have prayed that souls might be saved, that the seed sown might bring forth fruit. You have rejoiced in the reports of heathen souls accepting the only true way of salvation, but as you read and rejoice do you take these new Christians on your heart to pray that God may keep them? The powers of darkness that sweep up against these new converts is as great, if not greater, than that which assails young Christians at home. Let us praise God together over those who are testimonies to God's grace. I mention a few of those I have known here in India.

More than ten years ago an old couple,

ignorant village Hindus, came for work on the mission station, and were given the care of the cows. They were very careful to abstain from all pollution in their contact with the despised Christians. Their hearts were touched, however, when they attended the services, but in their ignorance they continued calling upon their gods, "Ram, Ram, Sita Ram," in our prayer meetings. It seemed they could not learn to say the Name of Jesus. Finally the light of the gospel pierced through the darkness and they were preciously saved. After some years the old man died, telling just before passing on, of the visions of heaven and its glories he had seen, and died praising the Lord. The old woman still lives, and often goes back to her people to tell them the old story of Jesus' love, and through her testimony others have come in.

A young couple from the village, also Hindus, came in with their one daughter. They had had no opportunities of education in the village, but after becoming Christians the young man learned to read the Bible. Together they have gone on and they have a happy Christian home, and he is a faithful worker.

Then there is the young Hindu teacher who was so bitter against Christianity that he took Christian books his school boys had purchased and tore them and burned them, warning the boys never to read such books. Now he, by the power of the Spirit, has been changed and has become a preacher of the gospel and is winning souls for Christ from among his own people.

A well educated Mohammedan religious teacher heard the gospel, believed, and was baptized. He returned to his village and because of opposition he is now teaching in a city high school, and witnessing for the Lord amidst much opposition. He has brought in another Mohammedan lad who believed and was baptized.

And so one could go on. Does it pay to pray? Does it pay to give? Oh, there are still hundreds who need to hear and to be prayed into the faith! "Let us not be weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

#### SIN REVEALED

Pastor Gih of Bethel Mission, Shanghai, China, says the Sunday School Times, was evangelizing in bitter cold weather. He began preaching in a dead Christian church. He was told that he need not have come all the way from Shanghai to preach on sin, and as he was leaving the hall a giant of a man told him openly that he would beat him up if he preached on sin again. For three nights Pastor Gih preached on the same subject, to everincreasing crowds. He was still threatened. The next night Miss Grace Hwang preached. She says: "I went to my knees and asked that the Holy Spirit would give me the message. All I could think of was 'sin'." Many desperate men were in the crowded church. Suddenly a horrible cry of despair rang through the church, and the giant, known throughout the entire Province as "Tiger," the bandit leader, fell on his knees in the aisle, crying, "O God, my sin! my sin!" Pastor Gih led him to Christ. He confessed sins of the most terrible character. The day following was intensely cold, but the converted bandit started at daylight to talk with his old father whom he had at various times attempted to kill. The father forgave and at the evening meeting the giant was back to give his testimony. He still corresponds with Pastor Gih, and is rejoicing in his new life.

#### BOOKS NEEDED FOR JEWISH WORK

Mrs. Gregg, our Council missionary to the Jews in Chicago, writes as follows:

"Just now we have a real burden to reach more of the Jews and to somehow get them the Word in a closer way, and felt if we could have various groups meet here different afternoons and evenings we could accomplish this. The Lord willing, we are expecting to have a group of children in next Thursday and give them handwork and teach them about God. We have a bookcase with about four shelves and a few books have been donated for it but these are not particularly for the Jewish people. We are wondering if it is the mind of the Lord to mention that such a need is at hand and if any have books they would like to donate we might be able to pay transportation, but of course they would have to be usable. We thought it might also be possible that some would want to give to such a fund as The Jewish Library Work of Bethel Temple."

#### EVERY MEMBER A TITHER!

Hugh McKean writes in World Stewardship of the church of Chiengmai, Siam: "There are 400 members and every member tithes. They receive 40 stangs (less than twenty cents or ten pence) and their rice each week. Of this, each gives weekly one-tenth. Because of this they have more for Christian work than any other church in Siam. They pay their own pastor and have sent two missionary families to spread the gospel in a community cut off from the outside world. They are entirely responsible for this work and are very earnest about it. They are intensely interested in all forms of Christian work, especially work for unfortunates of every kind, and their gifts for this kind of work are large. They not only have accepted Christ but, having found Him good, are making Him known to others. And every member is a leper."







Did Jeremiah see our day when he prophesied in ch. 10:8 against being "dismayed at the signs of heaven," "decking a tree with silver and gold," and calling the people "brutish and foolish"?

Through Jeremiah's prophecy God was warning Israel against seeking guidance through astrology (v. 2) and against idolatry (vv. 3-5, 8, 9). Spiritual lessons may be drawn from this and applied to our times, but they should be qualified to show that times are morally similar now to then—running to other sources than God for light on the unknown and worshipping "the creature rather than the Creator."

Jer. 10:5 shows that in itself the tree mentioned in this chapter "cannot do either evil or good." What is rebuked is idolatry, as is shown in verse 14, "Every founder is confounded by the graven image; for his molten image is falsehood, and there is no breath in them." A further explanation is found in Isa. 40:18-20. It is an indictment of idolworship. We have not seen any one fall down and worship a Christmas tree. Paul however warns us of a grievous idolatry prevalent in our day. He tells us "covetousness is idolatry." He kept himself free, telling us that he coveted no man's gold.

#### Is it wrong for a Christian to take communion in his own home?

The communion service is an ordinance of the church, and there is no record in Scripture of any one ever taking it by oneself. The bread signifies not only that we are partakers of Christ, but that we are all one bread, or one loaf. Thus in the communion we show our union with the Saviour and our unity one with another.—E. S. W.

#### TRUTH MARCHES ON!

Senor Aldama, a converted Catholic priest and professor at Santander in Spain, spoke at the last Mildmay Conference in London. "I gave a week of messages at the Quito radio station. The reaction by the public was such that I felt it to be God's providence. The effect was apparent not only in Ecuador but in Peru and Colombia. Overnight, after I had spoken, the telephone was busy with people asking questions and wanting to see me. They were curious to know why I, a Roman Catholic priest of eight years' standing, had become an evangelical. The last night I had a call from a gentleman who said: 'Are you going to have these lectures published? My wife and my children have been listening, and we want to read the report.' He was manager of one of the largest banks, and had never heard anything of the gospel. I had been speaking another night on the Second Coming of Christ and a Jewish rabbi called up inviting me to speak at his synagogue."
