This Is No Time for Sleep

"Blow ye the trumpet in Zion and sound an alarm in my holy mountain ... for the day of the Lord cometh, for it is nigh at hand." Joel 2:1-32.

The dark and lurid clouds of the Great Tribulation storm are gathering. Men's hearts fail for fear and for looking after the things which are happening in the world today. "The great crisis," asserts an authority, "is nearer than some suppose."

As the desperate spiritual need in the world unfolds itself, many are deeply humbled in spirit with the consciousness that the Church is contributing no vital answer to it. "Judgment is turned away backward, and justice standeth afar off; for truth is fallen in the street and equity cannot enter, . . . and the Lord saw it, and it displeased him that there was no judgment. And he saw that there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor." Isa. 59:14-16.

The same subversive influences that threaten America today threatened Russia before the Revolution. The Church was warned of the impending disaster. But it heeded not. Soon the land was flowing with the blood of the Church. The situation facing the Nation and

The situation tacing the Nation and the Church constitutes the most urgent call to simultaneous, nation-wide prayer ever sounded forth. The call *now*, to every man and woman of God in America irrespective of creed or color, to pray, is the Spirit's loudest and most pressing call. In the immediate urgency of the situation let all who love freedom in worship *pray*! Let no effort be spared to put God's people everywhere to praying. If the preachers and the churches of America can be put to praying, a spiritual revolution will change the whole aspect of things for the people of God.

"If my people which are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and will heal their land." This precious promise of a just and merciful God conditions America's salvation upon the willingness of *His people* to seek His face in prayer and earnest heart searching. Not the power of the Godless forces but the prayerlessness of a sleeping Church, is the crux of the whole situation. Anyone that can at this hour bring the preachers and the Church back to prayer will be a greater benefactor to the nation than was Washington or Lincoln.

"Gather the people, sanctify the con-

gregation, assemble the elders, . . . let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep . . . Spare thy people, O Lord, and give not thine heritage to reproach, that the heathen should rule over them." Joel 2:1-32. The need of the Church is to divest herself of her present day, pleasure-loving, ease-indulging membership and ministry.

Zion must travail to bring forth. The "solemn feast garments" of weeping, wailing, and fasting need to be put on. When Finney prayed he had no words to utter. He could only groan and weep when pleading with God for a world of lost sinners. Daniel, Nehemiah, Ezra, in times of Zion's peril, set themselves to seek the Lord by fasting, sackcloth and ashes. When disaster threatened the Early Church it was averted by the apostles assembling themselves together, and giving themselves continually to prayer. Prayer was put first in the apostolic ministry. They gave themselves to prayer. They made a business of it, putting time, perseverance and urgency into it.

The *unity* and continuity of the Apostolic Church in prayer was the secret of its amazing power. Union makes for strength. The concentration and aggregation of the spiritual forces of faith, desire, and prayer increase their volume until they become an irresistible power. "Units of prayer combined, like drops of water, make an ocean which defies resistance."

"We have exemplified in the Early Church the power of the gospel to triumph over all circumstances," declared Dr. Simpson. "It commenced in an age of universal corruption. Idolatry reigned supreme. Licentiousness prevailed. Murders and suicides were fre-quent. The power and wealth of the State were in a few hands. The mass of the people were without learning or protection. A large part were in slavery. Yet in the midst of all these vices, without a single Bible in the hands of the people, without a Sabbath, without church edifices, the gospel made wonderful conquests. Nor were these conquests secured by external aid. The disciples received no aid from governments. The literature and schools were against them. Yet the power of God made them conquerors. If the gospel had such power then, why not now?"

"The gospel," writes Bounds in "Preacher and Prayer," "moves with slow and timid pace when the saints are not at their prayers early and late and long. praying? Let them come to the front to do the work, and it will be the greatest work that can be done.

"More praying will not come as a matter of course. Nothing but a specific effort from a praying leadership will avail. The chief ones must lead in the apostolic effort to radiate the vital importance and necessity of prayer in the heart and life of the Church. We need somebody who can set the saints to this business of praying. Who will restore this breach? The greatest of reformers and apostles will they be who can set the Church to praying.

"Men who can *stir* things for God, whose spiritual revolutions change the whole aspect of things, are the universal need of the Church. What has been done in spiritual matters, can be done again and be better done. This was Christ's teaching. He said, 'The works that I do shall ye do also; and greater works then these shall ye do.' The past has not exhausted the possibilities or the demands for doing great things for God. The Church that is dependent upon its past history for its miracles of power and grace is a fallen Church."

It is a *soul silent unto God* that is the best preparation for knowing Jesus, and for holding fast the blessings He bestows. It is when the soul is hushed in silent awe and worship before the Holy Presence that reveals itself within, that the still small voice of the blessed Spirit will be heard. How slow many are to learn that quietness is blessedness, that quietness is strength, that quietness is the source of the highest activity—the secret of all true abiding in Christ!

Blessed is the man who learns the lesson of stillness, and fully accepts God's word, "In quietness and confidence shall be your strength." Each time he listens to the word of the Father, or asks the Father to listen to his words, he dares not begin his Bible-reading or prayer without first pausing and waiting, until the soul be hushed in the presence of the eternal Majesty. He is still, and waits in holy silence till all is calm and ready to receive the revelation of the divine will and presence. His reading and prayer then indeed become a waiting on God with ear and heart opened to receive fully only what He says.

Gentleness in Rebuke

"So when they had dined, Jesus saith to Simon Peter, Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me more than these?" John 21:15.

Not a word here, not an intimation of the erring disciple's past faithlessness; his guilty cowardice, his base denial, his oaths and curses, and treacherous desertion, all unmentioned! The memory of a threefold denial is suggested and no more, by the threefold question of unutterable tenderness, "Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me?" John 21:15, 16, 17.

When Jesus finds His disciples sleeping at the gate of Gethsemane, in the hour of His greatest trial when He was coveting their fellowship, He rebukes them; but what a tender rebuke, disarmed of all carnal sharpness or even intimation of disappointment, by the merciful apology which is added, "The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." Matt. 26:40, 41.

How different is this gentle rebuke from their unkind insinuation regarding Him, when in the vessel on stormy Tiberias, He was asked, "Master, carest thou not that we perish?" Mark 4:38. The woman of Samaria is full of

The woman of Samaria is full of earthliness, carnality, sectarianism, guilt; yet how gently the Saviour speaks to her, how forbearingly, yet faithfully, He directs the arrow of conviction to that seared and hardened conscience, till He lays it bleeding at His feet! Truly, He will not break the "bruised reed," He will not quench the "smoking flax." Matt. 12:20. By the "goodness of God" He would lead to repentance. Rom. 2:4. When others are speaking of merciless violence, He can dismiss the most guilty of profligates with the words, "Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more." John 8:11. How many have an unholy pleasure

and carnal joy in finding a brother or sister in the wrong-blazing abroad and publishing his failings; administering rebuke, not in gentle forbearance and kindly expostulation, but with harsh and impatient severity! How beautifully did Jesus unite intense sensibility to sin, along with tenderest compassion for the sinner, showing in this that "He knoweth our frame; he remembereth that we are dust." Psalm 103:14. Many a scholar needs gentleness in chastisement to avoid the crushing of a sensitive spirit or the driving of them to despair. Jesus tenderly "considers" the case of those He disciplines, "He stayeth his rough wind in the day of the east wind." In

the picture of the good shepherd bearing home the wandering sheep, He illustrated by parable what He had often taught by His own example. No word of needless harshness or upbraiding uttered to the erring wanderer!

Ingratitude is too deeply felt to need rebuke! In silent love, "He layeth it on His shoulders rejoicing." Luke 15:3-7.

Reader! Seek to mingle gentleness in all your rebukes; bear with the infirmities of others; make allowance for constitutional frailties; never say harsh things, if kind things will do as well; do not unnecessarily lacerate by recalling former delinquencies. In reproving another, let us rather feel how much we need reproof ourselves. Read and put into practice the teachings of Paul in 1 Cor. 13.

In dealing with the erring, let this be our motto, "Consider thyself." Remember our Lord's method of silencing fierce accusation, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone." John 8:7. Moreover, anger and severity are not the successful means of reclaiming the backslider, or of melting the obdurate. Like the smooth stones with which David smote Goliath, gentle rebukes are generally the most powerful. The old fable of the traveler and his cloak has a moral here as in other things. The genial sunshine will effect its removal sooner than the rough tempest. It was said of Leighton, that "he rebuked faults so mildly, that they were never repeated, not because the admonished were afraid, but ashamed to do so.'

"Pastor Jacobs of Cambridgeport, could when necessary administer reproof very forcibly, though the gentleness of his character was always seen in the manner in which it was done. Some young ladies at his home were one day talking about one of their female friends. As he entered the room he heard the epithets 'odd' and 'singular' applied. He asked and was told the name of the young lady in question, and then said very gravely: 'Yes, she is an odd young lady. I consider her extremely singular. He then added very impressively: 'She was never heard to speak ill of an absent friend.' The rebuke was not forgotten by those who heard it." (Christ Life.—J. R. Mc.)

"Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." Phil. 2:5.

"See That Ye Be Not Troubled"

"And ye shall hear of wars, and rumors of wars; see that ye be not troubled...." Matt. 24;6.

Does this not look an impossible thing? "See that ye be not troubled: for these things must needs come to pass." We are apt to forget these words. The Lord is able to stop all the wars and rumors of wars, but He has said that they "must come to pass." To Abraham God said that the iniquity of the Amorites was "not yet full" so that he could deliver Israel. There is manifestly some "must" in God's dealings with the universe—He "must" let iniquity work out to a head, "these things must come to pass."

But the word of the Lord to His redeemed children is this: "See that ye be not troubled." What! even when there are wars? Who wants war? But the Bible is a book of war. It is generally accepted that the book of Joshua typically represents the "heavenly places" of Ephesians. It was war in Canaan -every inch of ground was taken by war, and if the conquest of Canaan is an earthly picture of the advance of the Church in the spiritual realm, called by Paul heavenly places, or the heavenlies, then it is war all the way. God's servants are so concerned to have things put right on earth; to win success, and see multitudes of converts, that they often forget that there is a vast realm in the spiritual sphere where we have to advance against spirit-foes. It is not only war against evil in the realm of men, but in the heavenlies.

The truth is, when a soul is really translated into the kingdom of Christ, and is actually living on the resurrection side of the Cross, he is landed, not into peace, but into war. "Raised" with Christ, and "seated together with Him" in the place "far above all principality and power, and might, and dominion" it is there alone that you will not be "troubled," and God wants us there.

In this spiritual war with the invisible hosts, God permits them to break out against His children, to drive them through to the place "far above." Therefore listen to the words: "See that ye be not troubled"! In your home life, "see that ye be not troubled." In the Lord's work, "see that ye be not troubled." Can the Lord find a company of His children today who, in the midst of the gathering storms, cannot be troubled? Who will go through the trials of the last days, when the powers of hell are raging on the earth, "shut in" with God, as Noah was shut in the ark? "Nation shall rise against nation," said the Lord, "kingdom against kingdom, and there shall be famines and earthquakes . . . but all these things are the *beginning* of travail." They are only the beginnings, and before the Church is caught away she may taste something of the travail that is coming upon the world, but only so much of the fiery trial as will purify her as pure gold, and prepare her for the Throne.

"Then shall they deliver you up to tribulation, and shall kill you, and ye shall be hated . . . for My Name's sake. And then shall many stumble, and shall deliver up one another and hate one another." What an awful time of sorrow, when hatred shall be reigning instead of love! Hatred penetrating even the family life, when the Lord's children will be by "parents, brethren, kinsfolk and friends" (Luke 21:10-19) delivered up to "synagogues" (religious authorities). How appalling to read of the effect on family life of the travail of the last days of the dispensation! Have we recognized as a "sign of the end" that brother will deliver up brother to death? Not to death of the body, perhaps, in America, but death through the slaying poison of the tongue-brother delivering up brother to the mocking of the multitude, without a cause.

The atmosphere of the "time of the end" will be an atmosphere of hatred, an era of lies unprecedented in the history of the world. And in the midst of all this, the Lord says, "see that ye be not troubled."

"Not troubled!" "Not troubled" when you are handed over to trial! "Not trou-



bled" when delivered up even by parents and friends! This is the heavenly spirit, when like Caleb and Joshua you say, "the giants will be bread for us," we shall grow strong in the Lord through the campaign. Christ was Victor on the cross, when He was a Victim in the eyes of the multitude. "He trod the winepress alone, and of all the people there were none with Him"—that was His *visible* experience, but *in the invisible* His spirit was "in the bosom of the Father."

"See that ye be not troubled," because all true life, and hope, and joy, come from heaven, and are independent of earth. The Lord Himself indicates the character of the souls who are prepared for His Coming at the time of the end they may be described as *the untroubled ones!* Children of God so lifted in spirit to the heavenlies, "far above all principality and power," that they already partake of the peace of heaven, and walk untroubled through the fiery furnace (Dan. 3:25); untroubled through the deep waters of suffering (Isa. 43:2); untroubled in the time of storm.—J. P. L.

JEWISH DESPAIR

Two thousand Jews were deprived of their lives through executions and suicides in Vienna since its nazification and incorporation into the German Reich.

IRELAND'S PROTESTANT PRESIDENT

The first President of Eire, under the new constitution of the Irish Free State, is Dr. Douglas Hyde. He is a poet and historian, a Protestant and the son of a country clergyman. He is 78 years of age.

A GREAT SIN

WAR IN THE AIR

Says Advent Witness, "The terrors that followed the last Great War, will, it appears, accompany the next one. Disease killed more than double the number of soldiers killed on the battlefields. But in the next war we are promised germs of typhus, of typhoid, cholera, bubonic plague and other disease. They will be fired in highly explosive bombs which, bursting in the air, will scatter the germs on crowded cities. They promise also to poison drinking water and milk. Another horror is the termite bomb of which some two thousand may be carried in an aeroplane. Russia has thousands of parachutists who, dropping from planes, will form an army behind the lines of the enemy.

Germany has more than one hundred thousand trained air pilots. Russia, Italy, France, Japan, Egypt and other nations are also preparing. The marvellous part of it all is that after eighteen centuries in which there was no evidence that such things could ever be, it it now coming about that the predictions of the Book of Revelation are seen to be not one whit too terrible or too impossible."

"THE TEN KINGS"

It does not follow that the head of all the ten kingdoms will be "kings." They may be dictators. On the other hand, it is interesting to notice that there are schemes afoot to place monarchs once again on the thrones of Austria (Emperor Karl), Spain (King Alfonso) and France (Duc de Guise), comments *The Prophetic News*.

THE FALLING AWAY

Why do some clergymen preach the "Social Gospel," that is, a mesage dealing with economics? Kenneth Scott Latourette, a writer on missions, suggests one answer. Having lost faith in spiritual regeneration, they seek to find a substitute for their lost faith in social revolution. Having lost faith in the supernatural they turn to the natural. Such fall an easy prey to communistic propaganda.

KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS

A popular painting in London last year (coronation year), reports *Dawn*, was C. E. Butler's "King of Kings." It depicted the thorn-crowned Saviour, overshadowed by angelic wings, standing before the cross. Gathered around are 157 monarchs of the world, all on their knees, paying homage to to the King of kings. The faces of the emperors and kings are exact portraits. The Queen gave a copy of this picture to little Princess Elizabeth, who doubtless one day will be Queen of the British Empire (should the Lord tarry), on the recent occasion of her tenth birthday.

THE NEW WORLD POWER

Comments America: "Mussolini brought the German Fuchrer to the Bay of Naples and there unveiled the might and efficiency of the new Italian navy, 190 ships participated in the demonstration, and clearly proved Italy's emergence into front-rank naval power. Most of the ships were built since Mussolini came to office."

A LAND OF MILK AND HONEY AGAIN

In Biblical days Palestine was called a land flowing with milk and honey, writes *Public Opinion*. It was famed for its main crops of wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates. Through the centuries wars, poverty, and neglect have resulted in the depletion of forests, soil erosion and loss of fertility. Malarial marshes developed, and farm land was buried with sand along the coast. In 1918 Palestine could barely support its reduced population, and farming methods were primitive. Fruit growing was insignificant.

But twenty years have seen great changes. Instead of an area of 7,500 acres under citrous fruit cultivation, today there are 75,000 acres. Eleven million cases of citrous fruit (including grapefruit, a new product) were exported last year. Whereas milch cows were scarce in 1918, today there are over 10,000 fine dairy cows and the average annual milk yield per cow is five times greater. Although five years ago beekeeping was very limited, last season's crop is estimated at 275 tons of excellent honey. Other industrial developments-poultry raising, tobacco growing, vegetable and fruit growing, canning-are likewise remarkable. The latter-day prophecy of Joel 2:21-27 is no longer in the remote future-pastures in the wilderness, fruit trees, fig trees, vines, wheat, wine, oil, and plenty. And note Joel 3:18, "The hills shall flow with milk"-certainly this is fulfilled today.

The Sunday School Jesson

The Story of Samson

Lesson for July 3. Lesson Text: Judges 13 and 14.

Samson as a Type. The life of Samson might well serve, save for its disastrous climax, as an outline of the New Testament Christian's life. His birth was miraculous. Judges 13:2-5. So is ours. We are "born from above," the true meaning of "born again." See also John 1:12-13. He was predestined to do great works. 13:5. Even so, the Christian is said to be "His workmanship, created

in Christ Jesus unto good works which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Eph. 2:10. He was "led of the Spirit." Judges 13:25. So is the child of God, "born from above." Rom. 8:14. He slew the lion by the Spirit's power. Judges 14:5, 6. Even so, the Christian may overcome the "adversary, the devil who goeth about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour." 1 Peter 55:8-9.

A year later, the time for an Oriental betrothal, "after a time" (14:8), Samson eats honey out of the bones of the dead lion. Thus to the Christian, the chastening, the testing, seems not good but evil, "nevertheless afterward (later on) it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby." Heb. 12:11.

Samson's strength was that "the Spirit of the Lord came upon him." cf. 14:19, etc. Likewise, the Christian receives his strength. "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord." Read Zechariah 4 and Romans 8.

The God-Planned Life. Samson was ordained before his birth to do great exploits for God. Doubtless his mother told him the won-

drous story about the appearance of the angel announcing his miraculous birth. The knowledge of this fact must have given Samson much faith, and made him free from fear and timidity. When we remember that the same loving Lord has pre-planned and foreordained your life and mine, the life of every bornagain Christian, what inspiration this should bring to us for courageous living! Reader. think: The God who planned the universe, the mighty courses of the stars, the sun, the moon, and the other planets which sweep so majestically and with such punctuality on their divinely destined way-that same God has planned your life course and mine. Catastrophe and storm, summer or winter, the fall of empires and civilizations, none of these, nothing, can interfere with the movements of these heavenly bodies. And thus, neither famine nor nakedness, tribulation, distress, persecution, peril nor the sword-none of these thingsneed interfere with the triumphant course of living the Christian life. Rather, the Christian can cry with Paul, "Nay in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us. For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities nor powers, nor things present nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." Rom. 8:35-39.

God's Purposes. What dignity this imparts to Christian living. How sacred it makes the individual life. How it hallows even the



commonplace things which make up the life of most of us. We are not here by chance, by haphazard whim of unreckoning nature; we are here in the will of God, by the will of God, to do the will of God, "created in Christ Jesus unto good works which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." When this fact is thoroughly grasped and appreciated, then discouragement, defeat, despair, will find no place in the Christian's heart. Rather, he is able to cry, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." Rom. 8:28. Thus, the ruddy little shepherd boy, caring for his sheep is foreordained to become the mighty King David. The fearful stripling, threshing his wheat stealthily, is destined to become the valorous, conquering Gideon. The rustic country boy, plowing in yonder field, with the smell of stall and haystack on his clothing, is destined to be anointed with sweetJune 25, 1938

smelling, holy anointing oil, to have his strong young body clad in the garments of Elijah and to become the mighty prophet of Israel, Elisha, with a double portion of God's Spirit resting upon him.

The Godly Parents. Notice 13:8. The parents prayed for God-given wisdom in the rearing of the child. Notice when they prayed—before the child was born. The better time to pray that God will make our children good is not after they have grown to be naughty and sinful, but before they are born!

The Nasarite Separation. 13:7. The cable that spans three or ten thousand miles of ocean bed to carry a message from Missionary headquarters to Europe or India or Africa, must be insulated. It is in the water and yet the water must not get into the wire. Thus the Christian is in the world—he must

not allow the world to get into him. "I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but keep them from the evil that is in the world," prayed Christ for His church. The Christian who would bear a message from a holy God to lost men, must be "insulated" like the cable, insulated with holiness, with godliness. Insulation is just another way of spelling "separation" and this is the meaning of the Nazarite vow.

The Unequal Yoke. 14:1-5. "Be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers, for what fellowship hath light with darkness, and righteousness with unrighteousness?" Read carefully 2 Cor. 6:14-18. The Lord overruled in Samson's unequal union, but remember this was an exception to the rule. 13:4. When a Christian and an unconverted person are married, they are surely opening the way for Satan to wreck their future happiness. The devil has "no part" in them, but the unbelieving companion is still in his evil realm, and through him or her, Satan will enter the home. This does not apply to couples, where both the wife and husband have been unconverted at the time of marriage and then later one of them is saved. But when

a saved person deliberately marries an unconverted person, then they are compromising in their hearts and opening the door to disaster. In seventeen years of ministry the writer has never seen one such marriage, that proved to be an ideally happy one, nor even a comparatively happy one. He has seen a number that were most unhappy.

Samson and the Lion. 14:5-7. The classic interpretation of this experience in the life of Samson is that the lion is typical of temptation. When we slay the lion of temptation, the victory is "sweet" afterward. We eat the "honey" of victory. Further, it is easier to slay the lion of temptation while it is "a young lion." Therefore don't dally too long, or the outcome may favor the lion! David's life is an example of the progressive victories which God gives His children over increasingly stronger enemies. First, David slew the lion and the bear, later the giant Goliath. (Continued on Page Ten)

in which to kneel. We exhorted them to raise their hands and to listen while we explained the promises of salvation from the pulpit, then to pray and to call on God for forgiveness right where they were, while the congregation also prayed for them. It is impossible to say how many found the Lord in all the meetings, but a conservative estimate indicates about forty saved and thirty reclaimed and reconciled to their brethren. A number of new workers were licensed and a new district was formed in the eastern end of the Republic where we see signs of rapid growth. The interest in the Bible school is keen so that we are looking forward to receiving for training the students who will later go out to the many new places, where a handful of believers are holding on and calling for a worker to help them.

The past year has been a most trying one, but the Lord surely met with us in this of the year a number of souls have been saved. Our outstations are growing and just recently another has been opened, making seven in all. God is doing a marvel for us in raising up native workers. A few months ago we mentioned that new places could have the gospel if we had funds to send the native workers out. Many graciously responded, taking native workers on their hearts and sending in offerings for them. As a result many have heard the gospel, we have been able to hold our services in larger buildings, build more benches, buy gasoline lanterns, and paint signs and Scripture texts. The Lord has blessed, and revivals have broken out and services continued night after night with many hundreds hearing the gospel for the first time.

"Moreover, we have been able to furnish one of our native evangelists with a horse. He and his wife, who is also an evangelist, are full of fire and zeal to go out to the many towns that are calling them. plorable condition. Again the boys had wonderful liberty in prayer, rebuking the demon that was so obviously in control. The young man was immediately released and when the gospel was presented to them he and the whole household of sixteen people accepted the Lord and burned their idols. The boys had just returned from the second visit to the home, where they found the young man perfectly normal and rejoicing in the Lord.

"May this incident stir our hearts to pray more for those bound by the fetters of demon power, that they may be set free by the Lord Jesus and the power of the gospel. Also pray that those set free may truly glorify Him constantly and consistently. Then, for those who have been used of God to pray the prayer of faith we would also request effectual prayer that they may be kept faithful at their post, filled with meekness and humility and faith. We need your prayers!"

Together they have walked hundreds of miles preaching the gospel, and have suffered much for the work of the Lord; but they have won many souls. They would be able to sow thousands of gospel tracts if we were able to supply them. Our Lord can make it possible. Please pray for these native workers."

HOW THEY LOVE THE WORD!

There has come to us an account of a visit of a missionary to some of the interior towns of Nicaragua, South America, and with it there comes a strong challenge as we read of their earnestness and deep desire for the knowledge of Christ. Esther Crews writes:

"It was a great joy to minister in the churches in that section and to witness the blessings of God upon His people. God blessed the preaching of His Word in Nagarote, and the people had a marked desire to seek God. Unsaved people stood in every open door of the church the first night, and it brought joy to our hearts the following nights when we saw them back again and inside the church. One night after a lengthy service had ended some still wanted to remain to sing and to learn new songs. It was finally near the midnight hour when we retired. The next morning at four o'clock, when it seemed that our night's rest had only begun, I heard the pastor out calling the people for the early morning prayer meeting. It was wonderful how the Lord refreshed and guickened us in those early morning hours as we waited before Him. At this hour every morning for several weeks the saints gathered to tarry for the Baptism with the Holy Spirit and for special prayer. During the day I visited among the believers, and in practically every home I found them reading the Bible and memorizing Scripture. How they love the Word!

"A remarkable work has been done in the little town of Chichigalpa within eight months. Together with a number of believers and ministers we went there one Sunday as the church was to be set in order. At this particular time sixteen names were added to the church. In the afternoon we had a beautiful baptismal service, while many unconverted stood on the banks listening to the Word. Many of these were present in the evening service and our hearts rejoiced to see thirteen hands raised signifying that they wanted to be saved and come into the church. Some of these we are having to ask to wait till certain encumbrances in their lives can be removed and straightened out before we can take them into the church.

"Another place of interest I visited was Guadalupe. This place shows good interest but is in need of prayer. Here we gathered under the mango trees for the service, and as the songs and music floated through the air, the people began to come. In a short time fifty or more unsaved people had gathered to hear the service. Every week from fifty to one hundred unsaved people come to the meetings, but there has never been a real break. Pray that God will give us a harvest of souls in this place."

SURVEYING THE WORK IN NICARAGUA

Two years have passed since we set sail from San Francisco, and as we look back we can see how the Lord has led us. We would now like to share with you a few of the most recent events so that you may

rejoice with us because of God's blessing and pray with us for the needs of the field. First to be mentioned is

The Conference

which was held in the little town of El Sauce the first of April. A little more than a year and a half ago the Pentecostal work in Nicaragua was organized into a National Conference and the first reunion was held. At that time four churches were represented and five workers received licenses to preach. Including workers, delegates and visitors, about a dozen people were present. This

year we were happy to see the growth of the work in numbers and interest as seven organized churches were represented, ten workers are now active in the ministry and about eighty visitors were cared for daily during the conference. Immediately after the convention one of the workers and I made an extended

Trip into New Territory

During the seventeen-day trip we traveled approximately three hundred miles horse-

back, visiting seven towns and villages along the Honduras frontier. We felt somewhat like comparing ourselves to the spies that went to spy out the land of Canaan, as we saw a great territory before us that needs to be possessed for the Lord. This region presents a great challenge to us as it is a populous although isolated section with a probable population of more than 50,000 people. There is not a church or gospel worker in the whole section and we found only four believers in the seven towns we visited. These had all been saved in other places before coming to this section. This great area lies much upon our hearts and we are prayerfully making plans to

with the gospel soon. We are arranging now for a worker to enter one of these towns and if God so leads we hope to move our family into one of the principal cities in the heart of this region, for a short time at least, in an effort to plant the gospel there. This involves a great deal as the place is located more than a hundred miles from where we are now, and traveling is difficult. Also in these new sections the opposition is often so strong that a believer cannot buy food or rent a house. Pray for us as we consider this important step.

WHAT \$75.00 WILL ACCOMPLISH

Lillian Trasher writes: "I am sure you will be interested to hear about our new building being erected for the widows who come to us with young children—a real widows' home. We have over seventy widows, but our buildings are not arranged to accommodate them. Our buildings have all been built for the children—long dormitories with dozens and dozens of beds. These are very nice for the children but not suitable for the widows.

"A widow in Egypt is a very helpless person-married when very young and uneducated, never having been out of the small village where she was born. Her husband makes just enough to pay for their black bread, onions, and a little cheese. She gets a dress once a year. Suddenly he dies. What is she to do? There is no work for her in the village and what about her seven or eight young children? She may sell one or two copper kettles to give the children food for a short time. She is indeed in need of help, sympathy and love.

"The headman of the village writes to the orphanage and we reply that we will be glad to take her and give her a home. Of course the older girls will be placed in the girls' building and the older boys in the boys' building and will be sent to school, but for her and the small children under school age we must provide a small room.

"We believe the Lord would have us erect a building of all small rooms—perhaps about eleven by fourteen feet—to be occupied by one or two women with their babies. Each room will cost about \$75.00 to build and furnish simply. We have a nice piece of land next to our church with a high wall around it and many large trees on all sides. This is where we intend to build, arranging the rooms around a large shady courtyard where these unfortunate widows may enjoy a little home life with their children.

"Some of our readers will no doubt want to have a part in this building—having either their own names or the name of a departed (Continued on Page Ten)

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Was it after the appointment of Matthias that Jesus appeared to the twelve apostles where it says, "That he was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve; afterward that he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once"? If it was not after the appointment of Matthias, how could it have been, seeing that Judas had taken his life?

Some versions say Jesus was seen of the eleven. Adam Clarke shows this to be the rendering in the Slavonic, Armenian, Vulgate, and several others of the writings of the saints. He also comments, "Perhaps the term 'twelve' is used here merely to point out the society of the apostles, who, though at this time there were only eleven, were still called the twelve because this was their original number, and a number which was afterwards filled up." The appearance of Jesus to the twelve was undoubtedly before the appointment of Matthias for Matthias was not chosen until after Jesus had returned to heaven.

To what did Jesus refer when He said, "And other sheep I have which are not of this fold, them also I must bring."

He had reference to the Gentiles. The Gospel provides that "the Gentiles should be fellow heirs" with Israel. Eph. 3:6.

Read 1 Sam. 17:31-37. Thus each victory over temptation makes us stronger to defeat an even stronger foe. But always remember: it is not by our might, nor power, but by God's Spirit. We must also be careful not to deliberately court temptation in order to demonstrate our power. If we do, a dreadful beating awaits us. Make no provision for the lusts of the flesh. Don't be like the tittle boy whose mother discovered he had been swimming on Sunday. "But son," she asked, "how could you have been tempted to swim on the Lord's Day? You didn't have a bathing suit along." "Yes, I did, Mother," replied Sonny; "I took my bathing suit along, in case I should be tempted"! "Make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lust thereof."

"The Spirit of the Lord Came Upon Him." 14:19. In this connection compare Judges 6:34. The expression in the Hebrew for this phrasing is "The Spirit of the Lord clothed himself with Gideon." In other words, for the crisis at hand, Gideon and Samson were just the clothing which the Spirit of God "wore" to accomplish His ministry. This demonstrates the absolute necessity of the Nazarite's separation. The Holy Spirit wants to clothe Himself with us—wants to make us His "garments." With a heavy heart, we laid aside the paper, remembering the words of the Lord, 'And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars; see that ye be not troubled."

"See that ye be not troubled, See that ye be not troubled,"

clicked the train wheels, "for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom, and there shall be famines and pestilences and earthquakes in many places. All these are the begin-ning of sorrows."

But, Lord, if this be but the beginning, what shall the end be? And again He reminded us, "And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh!"

We clenched our hands, beat our knee as an expression of impotency and woe, and turning our face toward the window, wept. Frankly and unashamed the tears coursed down our cheeks. God pity the Christian whose heart is not touched with the sufferings of humanity today. He bears but a distant relationship to the Man of Sorrows, who was acquainted with grief, the One who when He saw the multitudes had compassion (to suffer with) on them, for they were as sheep without a shepherd.

A hundred miles of swift travel, and we alighted at our destination. The scene of our next evangelistic meeting, another time of fellowship with the people of God. There stood the pastor, with a smile of welcome on his face, ready to give us a firm warm hand clasp. "You're just too late," he cried, "the band has gone." "What band?" "Why a brass band, to play a welcome." "For me?" I asked, entering into the spirit of humor, which I saw twinkling in his eyes. "Well, not exactly for you, the Governor General of Canada is paying us a visit today." "What for?" "The consensus of opinion is, to inspect our largest factory to determine its fitness to be converted into an ammunitions manufactory." And there it was again!

The darkness deepens, Lord, with me abide"!

No place could better have exemplified "peace and tranquillity," than this lovely little Canadian City, nestled in the heart of a delightful agricultural section. No place seemed more secure, more safely remote from all the threat and activity of war, than this smiling Canadian countryside. And yet, the long arm of war was reaching out, preparing to tap the little city on its collective shoulder, and say, grimly, "Come on, you're drafted. Did you think you could escape?" Soon the little children of this placid town, would be thanking God for their morning porridge, their dinner, their supper, thanking Him because their daddy is back at work, and the pay envelope full once again. Their daddy would be busy making bombs and aerial torpedoes, to be dropped upon some foreign city to kill the fathers and the mothers of other little children, yes, the little ones themselves. What a vicious circle. What an inescapable mess.

"They shall not e-s-c-a-p-e" mocked the train whistle as it tooted a warning at the next cross roads.

Our friend, the pastor, conducted us to one of those happy oases in this worldly Sahara of Sorrow, a Christian home. A warm welcome, Christian hospitality, where the fellowship of kindred minds refreshed our spirit before we went to our room. In the quiet of our room we quickly took the blessed Book out of our brief case, in response to a still small voice which said, "Read the forty sixth Psalm." And so we laved our spirit in the refreshing, healing water of the Word of God.

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea;
