Peace Alone Through Christ

An interview with the cartoonist who won last year's Pulitzer prize.

A few weeks ago the editor of the Evangel sat in the small studio of Vaughan R. Shoemaker, the cartoonist of the Chicago Daily News, and had a chat with him. In the previous week the world had been endangered with war, and so it was quite natural that the uppermost topic should be the recent conference of the four great powers where the counsels of peace prevailed.

Brother Shoemaker, who spent the summer in Europe, is by no means sanguine of continued peace. "Herr Hitler," said he, "says he wants no extra territory, but I personally question whether that word is true." He believes that while for the moment Herr Hitler is satisfied with the territory he received at the late conference, he is much like a beast whose hunger for the moment is appeased with the chunk of meat thrown to it, but after a while there will be a more ravenous appetite than ever for extra territory-and then trouble and tribulation will grip Europe and the whole world. Even though the four great powers get together and sign up a pact of peace, the Word gives warning to the saints: "When they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail cometh upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape." 1 Thess. 5:3.

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an absence of the presence of God. If there is any spiritual atmosphere there it is not obvious." He found the Germans reveling in everything of a military nature. "They love guns, uniforms, and pomp." He witnessed a Nazi torchlight procession in Danzig that was especially revolting to him. He saw crowds of young people with their faces full of hatred, and heard them singing of spilling the blood of Jews!

In a frame on the wall of Brother Shoemaker's studio is the Pulitzer Award that he received last year, when this young artist was presented with \$500.00 for what is considered the best cartoon of the year. He remarked, "This is the first time a Christian ever secured that award-to say nothing of a Pentecostal Christian. The Lord has given me many openings because of that Pulitzer prize, and so I am enabled to testify of my faith in Christ in a good many places." Only that night Brother Shoemaker, who is a trustee of the Russian and Eastern European Mission and the treasurer of that body, had to ask leave to run away for an hour during which he gave a word of testimony to a conference of ministers who had asked him to address them.

The editor asked Brother Shoemaker for a copy of the prize winning cartoon —one that was prepared for last Armistice Day—and asked him to write underneath it a word for the readers of the Pentecostal Evangel. We have reproduced this cartoon on the front page of this Evangel with his short message to us—that we can expect no lasting peace until Christ returns.

The world is given up to wickedness and God has declared, "There is no peace . . . to the wicked." Isa. 57:21. Only with the coming of the Prince of peace and the establishment of His righteous kingdom will come that glory the prophets foretell: "And he shall judge among many people, and rebuke strong nations afar off; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up a sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. But they shall sit every man under his vine and under his fig tree; and none shall make them afraid: for the mouth of the Lord of hosts hath spoken it . . . and the Lord shall reign over them in mount Zion from henceforth, even for ever." Micah 4:3, 4, 7. The prophet Micah further tells us, "This Man—our lovely Christ—shall be the peace." Micah 5:5. (The word trans-lated "peace" here is "Shiloh," reminding us of Jacob's prophecy of the coming of our Shiloh-our Peace-"and unto him shall the gathering of the people

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be." Gen. 49:10.) Man would scatter and destroy with his lust-created wars, but Christ will gather and deliver at the ushering in of His glorious reign of millennial blessing.

Vaughan Shoemaker has an interesting testimony. Away back in 1926 an older brother of his lay dying of erysipelas in a hospital at Evanston, Illinois. Vaughan knelt by his brother's bedside and said, "Del, are you ready to meet Jesus?" He was not ready himself—but then he was not dying. You may say, "That was strange." The secret back of it all was a mother who knew how to pray. Dad, Mother, keep the family altar going. In every number of the Evangel this year we have had a word about the family altar—we want to see one in every home.

The dying young man hesitated for

a moment, and then evidently being reminded of the efficacy of the precious blood of Jesus, of whom he had heard his mother speak, he said "Yes."

Vaughan had often heard the gospel himself from the lips of his saintly mother. But he would kiss her cheek and wipe away her tears and say, "It's all right for you, Mother, but not for me." But now as he saw his brother's life going out into eternity and he knew himself that he was unready, he began to do some hard thinking. "A short while after this," says he, "while on my knees, with tears streaming down my face, I received an old-fashioned conversion."

And now Vaughan Shoemaker is not only a Christian, but one of the Pentecostal variety, and so it is no wonder the Chicago Daily News often contains a cartoon that has real gospel in it. One Christmas time he prepared a cartoon and put John 3:16 in full on it. The editors were dubious, but Vaughan took it in to the "big boss"—Colonel Knox (the Republican nominee for Vice President at the last presidential election), who commented: "Of course you cannot separate John 3:16 from Christmas. Without it there would be no Christmas." And so the cartoon went out with its gospel message.

Vaughan Shoemaker's word of counsel to all Christian workers is this: "Equip yourself with a fervent prayer life, a conscientious study of the Word, and continuous obedience to the Spirit. If you are really alert, God will provide opportunities for witnessing, and supply you with the necessary courage." -S. H. F.

Each month the number of those being helped is increasing, and it will continue to increase as age overtakes more of our faithful ones. B Purpose of Christianity B

A great conversation one time took place. It was between perhaps the greatest missionary of all time and an enlightened king. So convincing was the missionary's story that the king was made to exclaim "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Christianity had not then become the cold system of religion it has now become in many places. It was a dynamic force pulsating with the life of Christ. Christians were followers of the Saviour rather than mere members of a religious system. They were actuated not by theory, but by the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven.

When Christianity was introduced into the world by the power of Pentecost it was a universal call from God for man to draw nigh to Him and accept His favors and those blessings which divine favors bring. The atmosphere in which Christianity was born was love. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." When the Christian church was begun its members were all rich in their enjoyment of this love. God loved and He gave. The Church loved and it gave. The spirit of true Christianity is the spirit of giving. A lady who constantly gave away the flowers of her garden once said, "The flowers I give away never wade." Those which she left to die on their stems faded and were gone. Those which she gave away lived on in the hearts of those whom they enriched. This is true of the love of God and it is true of the true Christian spirit. God's love never fades because it is always giving. Its spirit is that of tenderness, compassion, forgiveness, and good will.

God holds no grudge against mankind. Quite the opposite. He "was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them." Conscience causes our sins to haunt us and well it may for "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." But conscience needs also to be awakened to the love of God and when so awakened it leads to repentance and turning from all that the Holy Spirit reveals to be displeasing to the will of God. I visited the cemetery where lie the bodies of my father and mother. A little marker was at their head, beautifully chisled by skilful hands. A rough and ragged stone had been carved into a work of art. That is like the work of God in salvation. Christ can take the rough and ragged life, worth-

less as it may seem, and out of it make character of priceless value, unexcelled in beautiful godliness. This is the purpose of Christianity.

Without redemption in Christ man is lost. You may know your way about your home, perhaps about your town, but, were you called to go, should you know your way to heaven? We may be in health today and tomorrow be no more. Not long ago a letter was received from a friend in which he told of the end of life which had come to his godly father-in-law. Some of the letter read, "Wednesday he had a wonderful vision of the mansions in glory, of the angels, and of Jesus, and Jesus said to him, 'I have prepared a place for you and for all those who love Me.' Then he said good-bye to all and finished by saying 'Now I am going.' When his end came he knew he was not lost, for he knew his Saviour.

Christianity purposes preparing men to meet God. It offers salvation to all, "For God is no respecter of persons." Happy is that man whose God is the Lord. To him the gates of the Celestial City will open wide; for him the Father's house is prepared. And how simple are God's terms, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

No Need of a Label

"Now if you are a Christian, you need no label. You need not write the word "Christian" on your forehead. Every act will indicate the new life. Every word will throb with a new power, pulsate with a new meaning. You need not fuss about giving an impression that you are a Christian, when you have a Christian heart. Everybody who knows you will see it. If Jesus Christ comes to live in your house, everybody in it, including the maid in the kitchen, will know He is there. If the Divine nature grips you, masters you, changes you, everybody will know. How do we know when it is spring? The snowdrops have pushed up their heads, the daffodils have put out their sword-blades, the thrush is singing the song of an angel wrapped up in feathers! The gates of spring open without a creek on their hinges! The light breaks over the cliff-tops of eternity, and kisses the country-side into bloom and color and splendor, enough to make you think God has broken a rainbow up into a million atoms at your

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feet! Do I need to take a huge whitewash brush and paint the inscription, 'Spring is here'? And if God kisses you into a new splendor, everyone will know it."—Gipsy Smith.

What Is Faith?

A college student found out for himself the specific gravity of the human body, and the specific gravity of water, and drew the conclusion that the one ought to float in the other. He thoroughly believed his conclusion: was that faith? No. Next, he went down to the river where his fellow students were bathing, and he watched them; and he found that his conclusion was verified, for their bodies floated in the water. Was that faith? No. Lastly, though unable to swim himself, he went out with his companions, lay down on the boat, and said, "Push me gently off into the water." Then, without home or country or any earthly interest or object before me, my very world at an end, I re-devoted myself wholly and only to God, and to the work and life of His Kingdom, whatever and wherever that might be."

The Need of Meekness

There came a dream to king Nebuchadnezzar which none of the wise men could interpret. The Lord gave to Daniel an understanding of this dream. The king saw a great spreading tree which was cut down and abased. The prophet showed the king that this was a warning for him to break off his sins. The king walked softly for awhile but at the end of twelve months he walked into his palace and made a great boast, "Is not this great Babylon that I have built for the house of the kingdom by the might of my power, and for the honor of my majesty?" Dan. 4:30. While the word was in his mouth there fell a voice from heaven, saying, "O king Nebuchadnez-zar . . . The kingdom is departed from thee . . . thy dwelling shall be with the beasts of the field . . . seven times shall pass over thee, until thou know that the most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever he will." And the proud king became as a beast.

Contrast this king in his pride, his boasting, his vaunting, with the One who is meek and lowly of heart, the One who has made all things and without whom nothing was made; who spoke the word and the sun, the moon, and the stars came into being. What did He say? "I can of mine own self do nothing." John 5:30. His very words He attributed to His Father. He was meek and lowly of heart, and men despised Him. They all honored the proud king, flattering him and pampering his pride, but this lowly One who was none other than the Son of God, was despised and rejected of men.

They laid hands on Him and brought Him to Pilate as a rebel, one who would bring trouble to Rome, a false king; and even when they could choose between this lowly One and a thief, a robber and a murderer, they chose Barabbas the thief and murderer. Pilate asked, "What shall I do with your king?" They an-swered, "Crucify him." Men abased Him and nailed Him to a cross. He died and they buried Him. But as God took Daniel out of the pit, for innocence was in him, so He took His Son out from the grave, for He was innocent, He was pure, He was holy, He was just. God raised Him from the dead, and Him who had been abased God has highly exalted.

In the case of Nebuchadnezzar you see him who was exalted becoming

abased, but in the case of the Son of God you see Him who was abased being exalted. It is ever thus—the first becoming the last, and the last becoming the first. This abased One God has exalted, and it is decreed that all shall bow before Him and recognize that He is the King of kings and Lord of lords.

Man is proud and boastful and exalts himself. He points to all his modern inventions, to his great buildings, to his modern civilization. For everything that is worth while he takes all the credit to himself. But there are as of old watchers watching man. They see his haughty spirit. They see his proud mind. Man may point to the great Babylon he has built, but suddenly when men say "peace and safety," the safety man has established by his own wisdom, there comes sudden destruction; and man's heart is taken away from him and he is given the heart of a beast, and he acts like a beast. The one he will follow is termed in Scripture, "the beast," and the spirit of the beast will be the portion of man. There will be an abasement of man. God will deal in judgment, in tribulation, in testing and trial, to abase man. There will be many heavy judgments to bring down man's pride, to bring his vaunting and proud heart low. Those who walk in pride God is going to abase.

But God is merciful. The period will come when He will be merciful again to mankind, and men will know that the kingdom belongs to the most High. He will put over the kingdom on earth the One of His own choice to rule. The meek and lowly One who was abased



He will exalt to be King of kings and Lord of lords. All men shall honor and glorify Him. They will realize that the choice of a world ruler rests with the most High God. He will exalt His son to be King over all the earth. The Son will bring in a kingdom of peace, a kingdom of blessing, a kingdom of grace. All the inhabitants of the earth will realize that they are as nothing, that He doeth according to His will, and that none can stay His hand or say unto Him, "What doest Thou?"

There are two kingdom. There is the kingdom of him who is "chief amongst the sons of pride," and there is the kingdom of the lowly Son of God. There is the spirit of pride, abroad, disputing who shall be greatest. This was a spirit the Son of God had to rebuke. He said, "I came not to be ministered unto, but to minister." He took the lowest place, and was willing to wash the very feet of His disciples. He gave His disciples an example that they should be of like spirit, filled with the love that He had, the love that delighted to serve, delighted to do the lowest, meanest task, the love that was willing to lay down its life for the brethren.

He will bring judgment upon the proud and will abase all such. But those who are lowly and meek of heart, who have the Spirit of the Lamb, who are partakers of His nature, who suffer with Him in abasement and humiliation, in being despised and rejected of men, shall be exalted to reign with the Son of God. They shall be heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ. Let this mind, this disposition, this nature which was in Christ Jesus, the lowly One, who humbled Himself, be in you. Ever seek to humble yourself under the mighty hand of God and in due time He will exalt you. But those who are proud and haughty, disdainful and boastful, shall be abased; they shall be abased unto the very pit where he the chief

and Our Rewarder

He that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him. Heb. 11: 6. I am . . . thy exceeding great reward. Gen. 15:1.

GOD----!

GOD,——our REWARD! GOD,——our REWARDER!

Three scriptural facts are the hidden secret of sustaining strength to the believer. That He is. That He in Himself is our great reward. That He, being our great Rewarder, is also our sustainer, and with Himself, and in Himself, will care for the load of our lesser needs, freely giving us all things that pertain unto life

and godliness through His divine power. First of all, *He is!* That is His Name —the *I am*, the Alpha and Omega. The Scriptures reveal Him. The Holy Spirit presents and unfolds Him. Nature shows forth His order, and wisdom, and creative power. Rare souls of all ages have been vouchsafed glimpses of the eternal majesty. Moses, Isaiah, Paul, John on Patmos.

Secondly, He in Himself, is our great reward. Fear not, Abram; I am thy shield, and thy exceeding great reward. Gen. 15:1. To devout souls, this is the secret of what the world considers mysticism; the exquisite joy of Himself, causing our light afflictions, which are but for a moment (2 Cor. 4:17) to appear small in comparison.

Once, on a voyage crossing the Atlantic, Phillips Brooks had taken an interest in an obscure young minister. This young man went one day to seek him out. He knocked on his stateroom door. Receiving no answer, he opened the door. There he saw the great preacher lying prostrate on the floor. Thinking the bishop was ill, the young man stood motionless for a moment, when he heard him say; "O Lord Jesus, Thou hast filled my life with peace and gladness! To look into Thy face is earth's most exquisite joy.'

It is by inner sight that glimpses of Jesus are received. Fanny Crosby, the blind song writer, understood this. It was she who wrote, "Face to face with Christ my Saviour!" George Matheson, Scotland's great blind preacher understood this. He used to say that blindness was excessive light, and that the time of revelation for him was in the night; then he saw clearly. He said also, "It is by the light of the Celestial City—the City which has no need of the sun-that alone we

can tell what here is large and what here is small. THOU, LAMB, slain from the foundation of the world, THOU art the LIGHT thereof !"

One of the early poems of this great soul begins with the line, "Jesus, Rainbow of my Sorrow." The greatest of all his poems is the well known hymn.

O, Love that will not let me go, I rest my weary soul in Thee: I give Thee back the life I owe, That in Thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.

O Light that followest all the way, I yield my flickering torch to Thee: My heart restores its borrowed ray, That in Thy sunshine's blaze its day May brighter, fairer, be.

O joy that seekest me through pain,

I cannot close my heart to Thee:

I trace the rainbow through the rain

And know the promise is not vain,

That morn shall tearless be.

All the rich imagery of "the song of songs, which is Solomon's" is not excessive to the soul who has tasted what His delights can be. It was but a little that I passed from them, but I found him whom my soul loveth I held him, and would not *let him go.* S. of S. 3:4. What may He be to us? We read He is:

Rose of Sharon-lily of the valleys. A bundle of Myrrh. The Chiefest among ten thousand. Yea, He is altogether lovely!

And this does not begin to exhaust what our *exceeding great Reward* is made unto us. On and on we may go . . . who ... is made unto us wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption.

More!-He is: the Bread of life, and Living Water. He is the Bright and Morning Star, and the Sun of Righteousness. He is the Lamb of God, and He is the Lion of the Tribe of Judah. He is the Vine. He is the Good Shepherd. He is the Resurrection and the Life. He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. He is called Faithful and True; and His Name is called the Word of God.

Thus do various ones who loved Him picture forth His preciousness. Particulary, many of the choicest descriptive words and terms are given to us by John the beloved, who leaned upon His bosom; some of these, in his Gospel, written the

last of all the Gospels, and some of them in the Apocalypse, written later still, when He was in the lonely isle of Patmos for the testimony of Jesus. Of the love that others of Bible days bore to Him, how can we speak, but to let their devotion speak for itself, terminating as it did in martyrdom for the winged Isaiah, the imprisoned Baptist, the young fisherman James, the storm-tossed Peter . . . the missionary traveler, Paul. That His love suffices to be an exceeding great reward, we too may know, and add, each of us, our humble portion of testimony.

That He should be our reward, and our inheritance, is entirely fitting and adequate. We are called a royal priest-hood: made unto our God kings and priests; they shall be priests of God and of Christ and shall reign with him a thousand years. In Lev. 18:1,2 we read of the priests of that day, The Lord is their inheritance. He is our inheritance; our great reward.

Thirdly, now that so great a reward is ours, how about the lesser needs day by day for our earthly journey? This third thought is important. It is answer-ed by the Word. The answer is that the less is surely included with the greater. -Shall he not with him, also freely give us all things. Rom. 8:32. Again,-hath given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness. 2 Peter 1:3. And we are promised that in seeking first his kingdom, all things shall be added unto us. Phil. 4:19 is a familiar scripture to stand upon; "My God shall supply all your need.'

Our part is to diligently seek Him, and to seek His glory. William Stead, who went down with the Titanic, declared of George Muller, "His life was a true scientific experiment of the power of prayer." Each, in his own place, can test His faithfulness. When D. L. Moody took his first trip to England he had money enough to take him to New York, but no farther. On his way to the steamer he met a friend from Chicago, a Mr. Farwell, who asked him where he was going. "To London to see Spurgeon," was the reply. This friend then said if he were going there he would need some money, and gave him five hun-dred dollars. Neither one, we are told, knew that the other was in the city, but God knew all about it. This incident was related later in a service, causing many to turn to God.

A little congregation in Texas being about to lose their church building, called a day of fasting and prayer. It was a railroad junction town, and a train, passing through, was obliged to make a long stop for repairs. On this train was Mr. Gould, who decided to take a good walk while being detained. In his walk he heard the praying, made inquiries, and later mailed a check sufficient to save their building.

God does not forget those who have gone forth at His bidding, those who have not counted their lives dear unto themselves, but for His sake have watered the seed with their tears and some with their own blood. "Thou shalt not be forgotten of me."

"He that observeth the wind shall not sow, and he that watcheth the clouds shall not reap." During the past several years we have been sowing in the midst of great difficulties-Communist activities on many sides and Satan doing all he could to keep the seed from falling into good ground. Had we watched the clouds we should not have reaped. The past year has been one of many great and very dark clouds in this land of China and Tibet, but God gave us courage, and we continued sowing and reaping, not watching the clouds.

One day this summer we baptized ten precious people in the river just outside the city. We hope to baptize a few more in the near future.

The girl in the front row at the left in the picture was an orphan, taken into a Christian home some years ago. She is now fifteen years of age and is regular at Sunday School and very seldom fails in her memory verse from the Bible. The second one is a boy who is quite active in book selling at the Hwangyuan fair. He, too, is regular in Sunday School.

The third one is a little girl eight years old. She reads at least one chapter from the Bible each day and is earnestly seeking the Baptism with the Holy Spirit. We do not know of her failing at any time to

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have her verse from the Bible for Sunday School. Next is our own son David Victor-just past seven years old. He is much in earnest for the Lord, often talking to the people about the Saviour and exhorting them to leave their sins and come to Jesus.

Next to David is a Chinese boy who has gone with us to different fairs and usually sells more Bible portions than any other of our workers. He has taken Gospel portions to school and sold them. He has been persecuted but he still takes new courage and presses forward.

The first in the back row is a Tibetan woman who was among the first children fifteen years ago when we first came here. Next to this woman is her husband. This couple are very much in earnest and God is blessing them.

The third is the father of a large family which came to us as refugees some years ago. The boy next to him is his son-the fruit of our Sunday School, always faithful with his memory verse. He goes out to distant towns selling Gospels during fair season. This is a model Christian family, the wife having been baptized a few years ago and also filled with the Holy Spirit.

The man at the end is a Tibetan who once had great opportunities to become a rich trader but sin brought him low and he finally came to the Saviour. It was this man who risked his life a few years ago searching for us among the Tibetans with news concerning advancing Communists.

Surely God's Word never fails; it shall not return without accomplishing the thing whereunto it was sent. We are earnestly praving and laboring for a more abundant harvest of souls for His coming.

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WORK PROGRESSING IN FIJI

From Suva in the Fiji Islands A. M. Heetebry writes: "This has been a month of numerous opportunities and ceaseless activity in the Lord's service. Early in the month it was my privilege to visit other fields and more distant territory through the kindness of a friend who took me in his cutter.

"We first called at Makongai, the leper island. We marveled to see how bright and happy the afflicted little Indian and Fijian children were. From there we visited the Macuata Coast of another large island. In Lambasa we visited the bazaar, distributing our tracts and literature. Up one river we had a very good service in a native village with a good, interested congregation. Please pray with us that God's Word sown on this trip will indeed be fruitful and not return void.

"Our Sunday School here in Suva is encouraging. We now have three hundred on the roll and an average attendance of two hundred and twenty-three. Yesterday after Sunday School the altar was filled with boys and girls seeking God and desiring to be saved. Next Sunday we are to have our anniversary service celebrating the beginning of the Assembly of God movement in the Fiji Islands twelve years ago."

UNHARMED IN CHINA WAR ZONE

W. W. Simpson writes from Peking: "Our work in Honan Province is prospering exceedingly in spite of the horrible war which kept the assemblies there separated from the outside world for many months. I have been unable to send them financial help since March, yet the Lord has supplied their needs in wonderful ways.

"When the fighting drew near Sinsiang some of the saints wanted to flee to the country, but when they prayed the Spirit spoke to them, saying that they should remain where they were for the Lord would be with them. Remaining on in their humble home, they continued their prayers and supplications four times a day. Outsiders seeing that the Lord was with them joined in until there were more than a hundred people living in twelve small

rooms. Many country people had to flee from their homes so they came to the assembly bringing their few belongings. The workers welcomed them and preached to them twice a day and prayed with them twice a day.

"Some of the Japanese soldiers came and looked in, but seeing the people praying, they went their way. An officer investigated, and when he learned the circumstances he posted an order on the front door forbidding troops to enter or disturb the place. So the meetings continued four times a day till practically all were saved and many were baptized with the Holy Spirit. Finally after many weeks one of the workers was able to make his way through to Peking to bring us the report from the assemblies in Honan.

BEFRIENDING GOD'S PEOPLE

According to *Dawn*, in May 1935 thirty-one leading ministers of America drew up the following resolution:

"We are opposed to anti-Semitism in whatever form it may take, as inconsistent with our heritage of liberty and fair play as citizens of America, and as unworthy of those who bear the name of Christian. And we further declare that any attempt to use the Scriptures as an excuse for an anti-Semitic attitude is a perversion of God's Word and irreconcilable with the spirit and teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ.

"To the Jewish people we declare: We have for you a heart full of sympathy. The One we love most, and the One who has done most for us, was Himself a Jew in the flesh. To Him we owe all that we are and ever will be, and our hearts yearn that everyone of you might share with us the blessing of eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. We have no part in the stiring up of base passions against you. And we want you to know that those who are thus guilty do not express the love which the Lord Jesus Christ has commanded us to show you. We rejoice to learn that on May 14, 1935, the Cantonal Court of Berne, Switzerland, openly denounced the so-called Protocols of the Elders of Zion as 'forgeries, obvious plagiarism, immoral, and manifestly prepared for the purpose of inciting popular passion against the Jews.'"

WHISKEY BOTTLES CONVERTED

Michael Coscia is an ingenious Christian who operates a lunchroom in Baltimore, Md. He was not always thus, being raised in a saloon; but once saved he became filled with evangelistic fervor. First he bought thousands of tracts to hand out to his customers. Then, realizing that perhaps seven thousand people in the Candler Building across the street look out upon his lunchroom each day, he had painted on his roof the following words, upon which a spotlight shines till midnight: "Lest you forget-God says to you again: The wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord."

But "Mike" did not stop there. He and his family began gathering empty whiskey bottles. Labels were removed, the bottles carefully washed, then a tract or gospel portion placed within, after which the bottles were sealed and consigned to Chesapeake Bay. This practice has been continued for some time. Sometimes 2,500 bottles are

launched at one time. Many sailors have told of finding these bottles, and some are known to have been saved. Through these converted whiskey bottles Mike has found an outlet for his burning desire to spread the gospel.

BIBLE ACCURACY

Facts answer doubt, says Daron, as it passes on the following. The names of the kings given in Genesis 14 have all been found on monuments, correct in every detail. Mr. Christie Innes says: "In 143 cases of transliteration from Egyptian, Assyrian, Babylonian and Moabite into Hebrew, and in 40 cases of the opposite, or 183 in all, the evidence shows that for 2,300 to 3,900 years the text of the proper names in the Hebrew Bible has been transmitted with the most minute accuracy. Moreover, out of 56 kings of Egypt from Shishak to Darius, and out of numerous kings of Assyria, Babylon, Persia, Tyre, Damascus, Moab, Israel and Judah, that ruled from 2,000 to 400 B. C., the writers of the Old Testament have put the names of the 40 or more that are mentioned in records of two or more of the nations in their proper absolute and relative order of time and in their proper place."

THE LAST WORD

A German hospital patient (as quoted by Chief Engineer Hermes in the Sunday School Times) was about to be operated upon for cancer of the tongue at the University clinic at Bonn. Just before the operation which was to remove the tongue altogether, the professor said to him:—"You have now for the last time an opportunity to speak. Have you anything special to say?" The peasant turned to the whole assembly of professors and students who had come to see the operation and cried out, "Praise be to Jesus Christ throughout eternity. Amen!"

WALL STREET WANTS A REVIVAL What America needs more than railway extension, western irrigation, a low tariff, a bigger cotton crop or a larger wheat crop, is a revival of religion. The kind that father and mother used to have. A religion that counted it good business to take time for family worship each morning right in the middle of wheat harvest. A religion that prompted them to quit work a half hour earlier on Wednesday so that the whole family could get ready to go to prayer meeting.—Wall Street Journal.

NEITHER JEW NOR GREEK

World Dominion Press tells the incident of a Japanese soldier entering a Chinese Christian church in North China. His entrance created alarm until he stood up and said: "I am a conscript soldier, but I am a Christian. I must worship with you." They welcomed him; and when the service was over, the Japanese asked the minister to place his name in the Bible he had brought with him from Japan. The minister wrote in Chinese, "In Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek."

HE OUTLOOK AND THE UPLOOK

HEBREW

For the first time in the history of modern Palestine, in an adjudication between two Jewish litigants, a Jewish judge handed down a decision in Hebrew. . . A Jewish colony in Africa has decided to adopt Hebrew after a year's trial of that language.

THE ETERNAL JEW

A Jewish writer says: "A Jew is like a piece of marble which has had fifty coats of different colored paint, but if you scratch these coats of paint even after many years, you find the same piece of marble. So we accept everything; we learn everything; but we remain in everything and for everything, Jews."

MIGHTY MEN OF VALOR

In modern Palestine one may find Jews of the type of David and his mighty men. Ninety volunteers were asked to man the dangerous colony of Hanita in north Palestine and 6,000 responded. As was expected the colony was attacked. One of the young men who died in its defense wrote with his own blood, "It is good to die for one's country."

SCIENCE AND GOD

A German writer (Dennert) published a book in Berlin a few years ago, in which he shows that of three hundred of the greatest scientists of the last three centuries, two hundred and forty-three were firm believers in God, and saw harmony between science and revelation. Herbert Spencer says: "The existence of this inscrutable Power (God) is the most certain of all truths."

IN DISTRESS

The International Hebrew Christian Alliance is soliciting funds to help German Hebrew Christians. One of its officials writes: "Never a day passes but refugees knock at my door pleading for help. On their long wanderings many have had to give up their clothing in exchange for food. The police will not allow them to stay long in one town, and so they have to move on from place to place without sufficient food or clothing, without work, without hope, almost on the verge of despair."

SATAN WORSHIP

Writes Dan Gilbert, in *Defender*: "I recently talked with a man active in the law enforcement agencies of a large western city. He told me, with much concern, of the problem, confronting the police in the form of organized cults of 'Lucifer Worshipers.' From the standpoint of the police, the sacrilege and blasphemy, involved in the rituals of these cults, is not a matter of official cognizance. It is the gross and wholesale orgiastic immorality, committed in connection with the worship of Satan, that primarily concerns officers sworn to enforce the laws of civilized society.

"The cults of Satan worshipers include many men and women of education, wealth and social position."

RECORD OF CRIME

The magazine "This Week" is quoted as stating that America's current annual crime bill is fifteen billion dollars. Stated simply, that amounts to \$120.00 a year, or \$10.00 a month, for every man, woman, and child in the United States. Every year our prison population increases by 25,000 inmates. Felonies now number 5,000 a day, or more than 1,500,000 annually. The federal government records 5,000,000 persons in its criminal files, and estimates that 500,000 professional criminals are at large. According to one authority, 135,000 murderers are at large, or more than all the policemen in the land.

WHEN HOPE IS DEAD

Writes a correspondent of the Jewish Chronicle: "Where, where to go?' 'If only we were outside!' How many times did I hear these two phrases during the few days I spent in a provincial town in Germany recently. There was a time when my friends in Germany would want to discuss politics with me, would want to know what we, who were 'outside,' thought of the future; but not so now. To be interested in world affairs a man needs to have hopes for the future; but the troubles of the Jew in Germany have become so great that not even hope for the future is left."

JACOB GOES FARMING

The Jewish Agricultural Society, Inc., which aids Jews in settling on farms and then helps them with an educational and extension program, has granted 12,313 farm loans totaling \$7,513,857 since its founding in 1900. During last year, according to the report of Dr. Gabriel Davidson, general manager, it made 316 loans amounting to \$121,362.

When the society was founded in 1900 there were only about 200 Jewish farm families in the United States. Today there is a Jewish farm population approximating 100,000, and there are Jewish farmers in practically all of the forty-eight States.

MAMMON

"What shall a man be profited if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" Once, in Fifth Avenue, New York, two financial magnates were sitting together, talking; one, Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt, worth, at that moment, nearly \$200,000,000. Suddenly Vanderbilt fell from his chair, a corpse. That was what he was worth.

A man once came to Dr. MacArthur, and said: "If I become a Christian, must I give up my money?" THE WAY OF SALVATION

DYING BY LAW, SAVED BY GRACE In a Pennsylvania prison last February were two persons under sentence of death for murder. One was 22-year-old Mrs. Irene Schroeder, formerly a waitress, mother of a five-year-old son. The other was Glenn Dague, formerly a salesman, whose wife and two children were still living.

Both had once been respected citizens, until illicit love sprang up between them. This woman's love had led Dague to desert his family and follow a career of crime which climaxed in the slaying of Corporal Bardy Paul of the state highway patrol. Together they had fled to Arizona, where a skirmish with officers ended in the death of an Arizona deputy sheriff and their own capture.

Now they both faced the electric chair. It was too late for regrets. Sin had run its course. Once more it had been demonstrated that "the wages of sin is death." Death to this earthly life, and death to eternal joy. Remorse in themselves and heartache for their families was their only reward, and an eternity of punishment lay ahead.

But their spiritual adviser, H. O. Teagarden of Piedmont, Ohio, brought a flood of light into their gloom. Lovingly he told them the full truth of that profound Bible verse—Rom. 6:23. "The wages of sin is death; BUT the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." He told them that Christ had died for their sin upon Calvary's cross, that their past could be forgiven, and that God's grace would cover their guilt!

What a message to burst upon a soul facing death! Gladly the condemned couple drank it in. In deep sincerity they sought forgiveness. God heard their cries. Before they both laid down their lives for their crime, Mrs. Schroeder spent her last minutes singing, "He walks with me and He talks with me." Later Mr. Teagarden read the following from a letter they both had written him: "We both know the blood of our Saviour, Jesus, has cleansed us of all sin. . . . We do not want life imprisonment now . we are both ready to leave this world of trouble and sin. Our hearts are full of joy. . . . We are waiting for these few hours to pass when we are going to eternal joy and happiness."

They were *murderers*. Is it possible for even murderers to be saved? Yes, for Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. The Bible declares, "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." Isa. 1:18. God does not ask us to become worthy of salvation; He simply asks for all men everywhere to repent. Every person that will confess he is a sinner, and repent, and ask God for Jesus' sake to forgive him, will be saved. No matter how moral you are, or how immoral; no matter how respectable, or how disreputable; you can be saved by so doing. And *only* thus can any person be saved.

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done so little for Jesus; my greatest joy that Jesus has done so much for me."

THE POWER OF THE WORD

A lad of fifteen named Luke Short, a native of Dartmouth, heard a sermon by John Flavel, who ministered the Gospel at Dartmouth in England in the seventeenth century. The text was 1 Corinthians 16:22: "If any man love not the Lord Jesus Christ, let him be anathema. Maranatha." Flavel's sermon became usually solemn as he explained that anathema meant "let him be accursed." When he rose to pronounce the benediction he paused and asked, "How shall I bless this whole assembly, when every person in it who loveth not Jesus Christ is anathema?"

Luke Short heard this sermon and soon afterwards sailed to America. When he was a hundred years old he was still able to work on his farm, and his mental faculties were still vigorous. He had lived all his life in carelessness and sin. One day, however, as he sat in the field reflecting on his past life, he recalled Flavel's sermon of eightyfive years before. Divine grace accompanied his meditations. He felt that he had not loved the Lord Jesus Christ, and had consequently incurred that terrible anathema. Conviction was followed by the application of the blood of atonement to his conscience, issuing in Gospel repentance, and as by sovereign grace an aged sinner obtained mercy and was "found in the way of righteousness." He joined the Church at Middlebrough, and to the day of his death, which took place in his 116th year, gave evidences of genuine piety.

On that night Brother Cates became very much engaged as he prayed for his family. I glanced up and saw the tears streaming down his cheeks as he besought God's blessings upon them. "Bless Mildr.d," he cried. "O Lord, deliver her out of the snare of the fowler."

I know a wise and successful school-teacher who is much loved by her pupils. She never reproves one student in the presence of others, if she can possibly avoid it. She wants them to keep their self-respect, and she knows that if she would put one of them to shame before the others, that one would dislike her for it and be made rebellious.

So when I could be with Brother Cates alone I talked with him about his having singled out Mildred, to pray for her before others in a way that showed she was doing wrong. I told him about the school-teacher and urged him to go and humbly beg Mildred's pardon, tell her he had done her a grievous wrong, and promise her he would be very careful not to offend in that way again.

He saw the justice of my remarks and after he had humbly confessed to Mildred, it wasn't long before she came to the altar at the meeting and was sweetly converted.

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The Sunday School Lesson

Christian Living Lesson for November 13, 1938. Lesson Text:

Eph. 4:1 to 6:9. Put Off the Old Man. 4:22. Many years ago

an Indian out in the West was converted. He took the Christian name of John Sunday, and became a preacher. Soon his fame became national and then international. He was invited to England for meetings. At his second meeting in England, he said, "I understand some of you were greatly disappointed when you saw me this morning. You expected to see an American savage, dressed in colored feathers, painted in war

paint, clad in animal skins, and carrying tomahawk and scalping knife. I dressed that way before my conversion. Now, however, I wear an ordinary suit, not animal skins, I wear no feathers, I don't paint my face, and this Bible is my knife and tomahawk. For friends, this Bible says, 'If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new.'" Put off the old man! It's a good sign, sisters, when we leave off the "war paint," and the "war feathers," and when our finger nails do not look as though we had just killed something and dipped our finger tips in its crimson blood! It's a good sign, brothers, when we no longer carry the tomahawk and scalping knife, but have put off "the old man."

Put on the New Man. 4:24, 25. When He saves us, God gives us a new life, a new name, a new hope, a new faith, a new chance; in fact, "He makes all things new." Some years ago in New York City, a business man faced bankruptcy, ruin, and disgrace—the loss of business, good name, and comfort. Having a heavy life insurance policy, he yielded to temptation. He announced he had tuberculosis and moved to a moun-

tain bungalow in the Adirondack Mountains, where he lived all alone. By his regular visits he got the business people of the near-by mountain village accustomed to seeing him once a week, always the same day, the same hour, and he requested the postmaster to look him up, if he ever should fail to appear on schedule. One week when he failed to come the postmaster, the grocer and others, thinking he must be ill, loaded his mail and a week's supply of groceries into a car, and drove to his lonely cabin. They found it a pile of smoking embers. It had burned to the ground. Among the ashes they discovered vestiges of a human skeleton, the skull, and some of the larger bones. Evidently the poor fellow had burned to death while helplessly ill and bedridden! Months later, his widow sought to collect some hundreds of thousands of dollars in in-

surance money. But you can't fool God, or the insurance companies! The company had that charred skull taken to the "dead" man's dentist, and had the dental work in the teeth of the skull checked with the dentist's record of the "dead" man's teeth. Finding them entirely different, the insurance company was convinced the man still lived. Detectives finally followed the "widow" to California, and there, sure enough, she joined her "dead" husband. The poor fellow went to jail, of course. The charred bones burned in his cabin, had been those of a corpse he had disinterred from a neighboring little cemetery. What this poor



man tried to get so hazardously and dishonestly God gives us freely. A new start in life, "old things passed away," "forgetting the things that are behind," and "a new name"! "I will write upon him my new name," "new surroundings," "is passed from death unto life," the pardon of our old indebtedness, "blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us." Praise Gd! He makes all things new. "Put on the new man."

How to Put Him On. Notice, we must actively do our part in this. "Put," "put," "put," sounds like a motor boat, doesn't it? But you find it in chapter 4, verses 22, 24, 25. "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. For it is God which worketh in you." Phil. 2:12, 13.

Be Ye Angry and Sin Not. Do not let the sun go down upon your wrath. What does this mean? Be ye angry. It is a command.

We should get angry at sin, and at the devil, that's righteous indignation. Too many of us however call our displays of carnal temper, "righteous indignation." "Let not the sun go down upon your wrath." What does that mean? It may mean, If you do lose the victory; if you do quarrel with some one; if you do have a fit of unrighteous indignation, go and get reconciled to your brother, the same day. Don't let the matter stand, unhealed, the difficulty unreconciled. Make it up before sunset. The little cavity in a tooth, left unrepaired, means the loss of that tooth in time. Little quarrels, unreconciled soon mean the loss of a friend, of fellowship, of useful service. When you sink into bed at night, what a wonderful feling it is to be able to say, "There's nothing between me and the Lord, and in my heart there is no bitterness, no animosity, toward any man. I have a

conscience void of offence toward God and man."

Do Not Give Place to the Devil. 4:27. I knew a little boy who, when his daddy caught him playing with forbidden matches, said, "Daddy, the devil reached his hand right up through the sidewalk and handed them to me." He didn't have to take them, did he? "You can't keep the birds (of temptation) from flying above your head; but you can prevent their building a nest in your hair." A certain lad who was forbidden to go swimming on Sunday, sat down to Sunday evening supper, with tell tale dampness in his mop of hair. "Son, did you go swimming today?" "Yes, mother." "But you know it's Sunday. You had on your Sunday clothes, no swimming suit with you. How could you go swimming?" "Well, you see, mother, when I went out this afternoon, I took my swimming suit along with me, just in case I should be tempted to go swimming." Let's leave our "swimming suits (whatever they be) at home. "Neither give place to the devil."-Harry J. Steil.

HE PRAYER LIE

PRAYER OUR GREATEST WEAPON It has been well said that no church can go under which has an Aaron and a Hur among its members. As long as there is prayer, and in direct proportion thereto, there shall be power.

The Venerable Bede tells of an ancient chieftain who, as he faced his enemies in battle, saw a company of monks lifting up their hands in prayer for them on a distant hill. Directing the soldiers towards the monks, he commanded, "Kill those men first, for they are the most dangerous." Satan uses the same tactics today. In seeking to rob the saints of power he ever seeks, above all things, to destroy their prayer life.

But what spiritual revolutions are accomplished when men pray! Wilbur Chapman tells the secret of the power of Jonathan Edwards' sermon, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God," that brought salvation to so many hundreds of souls. It was written out word for word, and in delivering it he held it up so close to his face that the people could not see his countenance. But for three days Edwards had not eaten a mouthful of food; for three nights he had not closed his eyes in sleep. Over and over again he had said to God, "Give me New England! Give me New England!"

When he rose from his knees and made his way into the pulpit he looked as if he had been gazing straight into the face of God. Before he opened his lips conviction fell upon his audience. As he delivered the message, the people in the crowded church were tremendously moved. One man rushed down the aisle crying, "Mr. Edwards, have mercy!" Others caught hold of the backs of the pews lest they should slip into perdition. They threw their arms around the pillars fearing that the day of judgment had come.

The power of that sermon is still felt in America today. It was not any oratory or psychological methods that brought that revival. It was intercessory prayer. The same persistent prayer will bring the same spiritual power into our assemblies today. Let us wield this greatest of all spiritual weapons without ceasing.

CONVINCING

Naimbanna, a black prince from the neighborhood of Sierra Leone, arrived in England in 1791. The man to whose care he was entrusted took great pains to convince him that the Bible was the Word of God, and he received it as such, with great reverence and simplicity. Asked what it was that satisfied him on this subject, he replied: "When I found all good men minding the Bible, and calling it the Word of God, and all bad men disregarding it, I then was sure that the Bible must be what good men call it-the Word of God."

A SIKH NATIVE EVANGELIST

How he lives is a marvel to us all. He never asks for money and refuses it except for his railway fares, and he has no collections at his meetings. He tells simply how Christ brings into his life joy which he vainly sought as a Sikh. That joy has filled him with love for all men.-R. M. Paterson.

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The State of Arkansas Leads

Picture yourself stepping from a warm room into the pathway of a cold Northwesterner. Your first thought would be, "I wonder how cold it is?" and you would shudder as you glance at the thermometer and discover the mercury stood at 20 below zero.

Arkansas is an outstanding State in many ways, and especially in Sunday School work. Her workers were not satisfied with their 281 established Schools, so during the year just closed they pushed out into unreached sections and established 86 new Schools. These earnest workers also are interested in BIGGER and BET-TER Sunday Schools! They ask, "What kind of Sunday Schools do we actually have? Are they good, bad, or indifferent? Are they merely meeting places for those who chance to come our way, or are we by the leading of the Lord making our Schools all they should be? How can we measure them in order to ascertain the type of Schools we have?"

Standards of Measurement -- If the thermometer indicates the extent of the winter's cold or the summer's heat, the yardstick the length of a piece of cloth, the scales the baby's weight, by what standard can we measure our Sunday Schools? Is not that a fair question?

The answer is undoubtedly found in "Our Sunday School Goal"-a standard of measurement for the Sunday School, recommended by the General Council of the Assemblies of God. It is not a contest. It eliminates competition and may be used by any School, large or small. The adoption of this standard is optional and not compulsory.

The twelve Points of the Sunday School Goal are printed in attractive form on a two-color wall chart (free to Pastors or Supts.) 121/4 by 19 inches. During local Sunday School Workers' Conferences, the School by its records may be compared with the Points outlined on the chart. This comparison may reveal many weaknesses.

Pressing Forward-For instance, if the School is at a standstill as regards growth, or does not equal the membership of the church, or if the pastor, superintendent, or teachers are unfaithful in attendance, or if Teacher Training classes have not been provided, or if scholars are not attending Worship Services, or being won to Christ, or if offerings are insufficient, or the Cradle Roll and Home Departments are not functioning properly, these defects will be revealed to the workers and they will be moved to press forward to correct them. When workers make these corrections, they will find their School has at least 81% of the Points of the Goal, and so is a First Class Sunday School. The name of the School may then be placed on the Honor Roll and awarded a First Class Sunday School Banner. (See cut bottom right.)

Pictured at the upper left is a cut of the State of Arkansas which leads all others in First Class Sunday Schools. Oklahoma

takes second place; Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington tie for third place; Wisconsin is fourth; and Michigan and Missouri tie for fifth place in the number of First Class Sunday Schools.
