ND the Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." Rev. 22:17.

I am quoting from the *last* chapter of the *last* book of the Bible, and it is the *last* call. The Book of Revelation reveals the events that take place at the end of this present dispensation, as well as the events at the end of the Millennium. In Genesis we have the book of "beginnings" and in Revelation the consummation of what was begun in Genesis.

In Genesis is the beginning of sin, in Revelation its final disposition; in Genesis the devil defeats man, in Revelation the devil is forever defeated; in Genesis we see the old earth cursed, in Revelation the new earth is forever blessed; in Genesis it is "Paradise lost," in Revelation it is "Paradise regained."

This verse is the last call for this generation before the storm breaks and tribulation sweeps the world.

The Call of the Wild.

There are many calls in this world. Some hear the call of the sea, some feel the lure of the wide open spaces. There is the call of the wild. I have listened to the honking of the wild geese as they flew over the icy waters of Snake River, flying in "V" formation, the call of the Northland in their breasts. I have heard the plaintive call of the female gull at twilight to her fast-winging mate as they flew over the waters of Dublin Bay. I have heard the warning note of the loon to his mate and her young of approaching danger on Shawnigan Lake, Vancouver Island, and the cry of heron to heron, and crane to crane, on the shores of Puget Sound.

I have heard the hoot of an owl, or the cry of a beast, to its mate, as another prisoner-of-war and I lay in the German

woods. I have heard the howl of the coyote to his mate as they foraged by moonlight on the prairies of Alberta; and the bawl of the bull moose inviting to battle in the Northern Cariboo. It is the call of the wild!

Call of the World.

Then there is the call of that world cosmos over which the prince of the power of the air, Satan, rules. He rules in the heart of the children of disobedience. Its calls beat continuously on the souls of the children of men, calling, calling, calling.


Another call that ensuares is the call of sex. Lives are wrecked, homes broken, souls blighted continually, because of the transgression of God's law along this line.

Enforcing Christ's Victory Over Satan

"What is the exceeding greatness of His power to usward who believe, . . . which He wrought in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion, . . . and hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be head over all things to the Church, which is His body, the fullness of Him that filleth all in all." Ephesians 1:19-23.

The Lord is head over all principality, power, might, and dominion and every name that is named in this world and in the world to come. His position and power are supreme.

God the Father "hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places" with our risen and enthroned Lord. Eph. 2:5-7. Thus, through the abundant grace of God, every believer is elevated with Him to the right hand of God and occupies potentially the throne of the Lord. In the purpose of God this elevation took place at the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ.

For the Church of Christ to stand victoriously in this hour when Satanic forces are united against her, every believer must understand the necessity of now accepting with Christ the place of spiritual authority, and fearlessly triumphing over these forces of darkness. In order to make the necessary advances it is absolutely essential that believers, in humility, giving honor to God, take their seat in the heavenly places in Christ at His right hand, far above all powers of the air, and from that seat hold those powers in subjection, through faith in the name and authority of the Lord Jesus.

Every Believer's Place of Privilege and Authority

Christ "spoiled principalities and powers" and triumphed over them. Every believer shares this mighty conquest of Calvary to the full, and to each He says, "Behold I give you authority . . . over all the power of the enemy." Luke 10:19.

The believer whose eyes have been opened to the comprehension of his throne rights in Christ soon learns, in the exercise of this authority, that the power he pos-sesses is infinitely greater than that which backs his enemies. The powers of evil are compelled to obey the believer as he boldly and in faith exercises his authority in Jesus' name. Every demon is subject to the sanctified believer in Christ through His name. Luke 10:17. They may not yield instant obedience but the believer must speak the word of authority and rule and overrule against the evil forces of Satan wherever he sees them at work. The powers of darkness will bitterly oppose and resist their own overthrow. They will attack with malignant hatred the believer enforcing Calvary's victory over them. The believer's refuge is under the blood of Jesus where no force or power of the enemy can penetrate. The Cross has robbed Satan of his power. To overcome him, present the

blood of Christ in the face of every attack from the pit, whether the attack is upon your church, family, mind, soul, body or circumstances. Satan is overcome by the Blood. Rev. 12:11.

Christ overcame the devil on the Cross. We have now but to *enter* into His victory *by faith*. We do not need to fight Satan but to hold over him the accomplished triumph of the Cross. The blood of Jesus is God's provision for overcoming the enemy.

Challenge the Enemy

This ruling and overruling authority of the Lord is available for us, if we are under the Blood and full of the Holy Spirit. The enemy's strategy is to entice the believer from his position of authority

Ephesians 6:12.

"Ours is not a conflict with mere flesh and blood; but with the despotisms; the empires, the forces that control and govern this dark world; the spiritual hosts of evil arrayed against us in heavenly warfare."—Weymouth.

"The adversaries with whom we wrestle are not flesh and blood, but they are the principalities, the powers, and the sovereigns of this present darkness, the spirits of evil in the heavens."—Conybeare.

"We have to struggle, not with blood and flesh, but with the Angelic rulers; the Angelic authorities; the Potentates of the dark present; the spirit-forces of evil in the heavenly sphere; so take God's armour; praying . . . with all manner of prayer."—Moffatt.

and get him vexed, burdened, confused, depressed, or self-occupied. By faith ask God to cover every part of your conscious and subconscious being with the blood of Jesus. Then say aloud, "Jesus' blood does now protect every part of me and does now destroy the power of the devil."

Give No Place to the Devil

Whenever the powers of darkness come anywhere near the borders of your home or church or personal life, in the name and authority of Jesus Christ they must be challenged. Say out loud, "This is the devil, and I now resist him in the name and power of the Lord who conquered him on Calvary." Behind all strife, perplexity and confusion is Satan. To break his power use the Word of God, the sword of the Spirit. Tell him, "It is written 'Christ at His cross has brought your power to nought.'" Heb. 2:14.

"Neither give place to the devil," is a commandment of God. Are we daily displacing the devil? Do we overcome his attacks on mind and soul and body? Do we in the name of the Lord and by His authority say, "The prince of this world

is now cast down"? Do we live in Ephesians six and obey God's commands to "be strong," "put on God's armour," "wrestle," "stand," "withstand," "overcome," "take the sword," "pray with all perseverance"?

Boldly Claim the Victory of Calvary

God has given us power to tread down the power of the enemy. Matt. 18:18-20. The devil is a usurper. He has no right to any place in any life or any church. Christ through His death rendered the devil powerless to withstand the believer who will, by faith and obedience, take the authority over the devil conferred by Christ, and use it. The devil now has no power except what we allow him.

We need to ask the Lord to teach us how to fulfill the sacred ministry of resisting the devil. We need daily to pray that in humble faith in Christ's finished work we may take our seat in the heavenly places at His right hand and exercise the authority which He has entrusted to us in fearlessly overcoming the powers of darkness.

In a certain revival center, outside opposition became so strong that it seemed the work would suffer ruin. Finally the pastor-evangelist gathered together a group of praying people and asked them to stand with him, under the blood of Christ, and bind the power of the enemy. After a time of prayer, praise and song they definitely prayed aloud, "In the name of the Lord Jesus and by His authority we bind the strong man from stirring up these people, and from attacking God's work." See Matt. 12:29. No further trouble was encountered. The opposition began to quarrel among themselves and their power to oppose the church was broken.

Enforcing Our Redemptive Rights

Instances may be multiplied to show that in every situation where in faith the obedient child of God claims his throne rights in Christ and boldly exerts his authority, that none are able to stand before him. A mother was grieved with the lying disposition of her child. Learning of the authority of Christ's name, quietly but firmly in the name of Jesus she rebuked the lying spirits and saw her child delivered.

In personal work difficulty is often encountered in dealing with souls. The mind of the seeker after salvation seems bound and blinded. A quiet attitude of victory over the opposing spirits often brings quick deliverance to the captive.

In another instance a Christian worker was conscious of a stupefying power coming over his mind and paralyzing his will. He was often pressed down and perplexed. He did not know of the oppression of evil spirits in the atmosphere and did not resist the attacks but stood passive and helpless before them. One day it came to him from God to say out loud, "This is the devil. I resist him in the name and power of the Lord who conquered him at the Cross." He felt instant relief from the oppression on mind and body. His mind

cleared. His will became strong to resist. His faith in Calvary's victory quickly extricated him from a mass of perplexing circumstances that had for years hindered

his testimony and prayer life.

God's Word is clear, "Our adversary ... whom resist, steadfast in the faith." 1 Peter 5:9; James 4:7. A devout Christian with a real experience was hounded through life by trouble and misfortune. He submitted to this life-long misfortune, believing it was in the chastening providences of God until one day, hearing a talk which clearly unveiled the sinister working of the powers of darkness, he realized the deception. He was encouraged to take a position of authority over these powers of darkness and to challenge them in the name of Christ. He was told to assert his right to obtain employment and other material blessings and to forbid these powers from obstructing his prosperity and progress. It took three days of challenging the powers of satanic opposition to his prosperity. But in that time the stream of satanic misfortune was broken. By faith in Christ's victory, he wrestled his life out of the hand of the adversary and obtained shortly a profitable position.

Ruling Out Evil Forces

We cry out to God to rebuke the enemy and to alter things. But God has invested us with this power on the grounds of Calvary's victory. A teacher was often distressed over a pupil's violent temper in trivial matters. Coming into a knowledge of the need of refusing the workings of evil spirits, he took the authority of the Lord over these demons of rage and commanded them to leave the place. The child became quiet in a few moments. same authority is available in its exercise of releasing funds for the advancement of Christian work. Satan is hindering Christian enterprise by tying up funds. Believers have the power to unite and agree that these barriers to Christian benevolence give way. Men and women of faith, courage and determiation need to arise in our churches and bind these hostile forces, garrisoned against the financial and spiritual prosperity of the world-wide advance

of the gospel.

A Christian worker whose ministry was suffering for funds, finding her prayers for God's provision unanswered, rebuked the "poverty" demons and bound the satanic hindrance to prayer. Each time her funds were held up she exercised this authority in union with Christ and released funds for her work for the Master. In these perilous days the powers of darkness, conscious of their impending overthrow, are fiercely resisting on all fronts so much so that every prayer Godward needs a re-

sistance Satanward to prevail.

The way to have the authority of Christ is to make Him Lord, and only to the extent that we make Him Lord are we able by faith to enter into a continual experimental knowledge of this crowning victory which He has procured for us.

"Not to Doubtful Disputations" By Donald Gee

The approach of another General Council makes this an opportune moment to appreciate the unique value of gatherings of experienced and qualified elders and ministers for the consideration of matters that the average church-member often has neither the qualification nor the desire to discuss. A recognition of this principle seems to be contained in the sentence that "The apostles and elders came together for to consider the matter." Acts 15:6. The gathering referred to was large, for the issue involved was fundamental and far-reaching, and it is described as a "multitude" (ver. 12); but it seems equally clear that it did not embrace all the believers in the church at Jerusalem.

In the discussion of those problems, whether of faith or of practice, that must inevitably arise in the affairs of the Church, there will frequently occur among the leaders an initial clash of viewpoint. In the scriptural example before us we read that there was "much disputing" (ver. 7) in the earlier stages of the conference. Actually this generally is of real value if all keep

in the right spirit.

It is a mistaken dream that because believers have received the Holy Spirit they will automatically see eye to eye without any process of sifting and comparison and surrender of heart and mind and will. But to one "weak in the faith" it can be very disturbing and distressing. They have no place in such discussions, for they are not yet able to contribute anything of value, and may receive definite injury to their own spiritual life by hearing difficulties ventilated. As, in every well-ordered household, wise parents never discuss certain matters before the younger children, so should it be in the household of God. There is an established place in the economy of the Church for occasional gatherings that are open only to those who possess spiritual maturity, or have a definite and legitimate interest in the business on hand.

In some minds there persists a foolish and unreasonable prejudice against any "close" meetings whatsoever. It seems to arise from a confusion between the universal application of the gospel message, and therefore of the gospel meeting, and the internal life of the assembly as a recognized company of believers. Such a confusion arises from a very imperfect and inadequate understanding of truth concerning the Church. The weekly "assembly-meetings" of the great Pentecostal churches of Scandinavia are a concrete testimony to the power and usefulness of private gatherings for members only. In matters relating to the government of the church the New Testament makes a clear distinction between "them that are without" and "them that are within." 1 Cor. 5:12. An occasional closed door may sometimes preach the most eloquent sermon of all to the sinner, and give to him a forcible reminder of a great "door" that may soon be closed to him for ever unless he repents and enters the eternal sheepfold of Christ.

It would seem to be a wise and accepted scriptural principle that the more delicate the matter to be considered by the Church,

the more select and mature should be those who gather to consider it. For instance in Acts 21:18 we read how Paul had a private interview with James and the elders at Jerusalem; and such passages as Gal. 1:18-19, and 2:6-9 seem to indicate the same line of procedure. The principle runs through all sound methods of government. Even in gatherings of ministers there will be many younger brethren if the Conference is large, and it would therefore appear to be wise to remit any matters of special delicacy or difficulty to smaller selected companies of those who are truly elders in every sense of the word. Plain issues of general interest and fundamental importance only should be presented to the "multitude," whether in Conference or Church Meeting. Much waste of time, and danger of harm, could then be avoided.

There is also a private sphere in which an exhortation to wisdom concerning those who are "weak in the faith" may be in season. I refer to controversial conversation. Much harm can be done to the faith of young believers by unwise discussion of doubtful questions when they are present. I do not refer to those truly valuable occasions when sincere problems can be frankly expressed and helpfully dealt with by those who have a gifted ministry for this very thing. The objection is to sheer gossip and heated argument about doubtful matters before babes in Christ. There is a time to guard our lips in conversation where some aspects of even religious matters are concerned, lest we stumble one of Christ's little ones

Christ's little ones.

The depth of reprehensible conversation before those who are "weak in the faith" occurs when gossip turns upon the weaknesses and shortcomings, either real or supposed, of those who are "chief men among the brethren." This should be avoided like the plague. It is essential that children be able to respect their parents, and the younger the elder. To unnecessarily weaken such respect is to strike a cruel blow at the tender young growth which we should be most forward to cherish. It is true that sooner or later we all have to be weaned from human hero-worship, and find ourselves compelled to recognize that the best of men, like the dearest of parents, are not without some share in our common infirmities; but it is important that the realization should only come with a growing maturity that finds its love and sympathy deepened rather than lessened through the discovery. Then true love will cover faults —not parade them.

One final aspect is worth considering. That is the foolish and mischievous use by some preachers of the public platform for talking about the weaknesses of Christians and the Church. In skilled hands, and on wisely chosen occasions, such things as are necessary can be referred to by those qualified to speak and able to show forth that sanctifying truth that supplies the remedy. A purely negative ministry is never helpful. Some years ago I heard a preacher who probably had never travelled more than thirty-five miles from his little

HIGHWAY OF HOLINESS

Wholly the Lord's

Upon the forehead of the high priest was a plate on which were inscribed the words, "Holiness unto the Lord." What did this mean? That the priest's life was wholly dedicated to the Lord.

In Zechariah 14 we have a beautiful picture of things to come. Upon the bells of the horses, and even on the pots and the pans, are the words, "Holiness unto the Lord." What does this signify? That all that the saints own is wholly consecrated to the Lord and to His service.

Coming to the New Testament we read in 1 Peter 2:9: "Ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people (literally, a people for God's own possession)." Upon each one of our minds must be engraven, "Holiness unto the Lord," even as it is written on the forehead of our High Priest in glory. For, as John tells us, "as He is, so are we in this world." Wholly consecrated to God and to His service!

This is a description of the early church: "And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own; but they had all things in common." Upon all they possessed were the words, "Holiness unto the Lord." All for Him and His!

Look for a moment at the familiar story of Luke 15. The younger son asked the Father for the portion of goods coming to him. It was given. For what purpose did he want it? To be used for the furtherance of the interests of his Father? No. Alas, it was for his own lusts.

Watch your asking. Simon asked for the same power entrusted to Peter and John. He was willing to pay hard cash for it. For what motive? An entirely selfish one. This Peter discerned, and a stern rebuke came to this man with the wrong heart and the wrong motive. Watch your heart with all diligence lest it be filled with motives of covetousness, for out of the heart are all the issues of life.

In Luke 19 we read of a nobleman who went into a far country to receive a kingdom, and then to return. He called ten of his servants and gave to each of them a trust. He bade them, "Occupy till I come."

Having received his kingdom, the nobleman returned. His servants had now to give an account of their stewardship. The first came, saying, "Lord, thy pound hath gained ten pounds." The nobleman said, "Well done, thou good servant: because thou hast been faithful in a very little, have thou authority over ten cities." The one whose pound had gained five received a similar word of approval.

Then came a servant who had a very evil opinion of his Lord who had given him so sacred a trust. This servant had been lazy and negligent, and he received a severe rebuke. Even that which had been given to this "wicked" servant was taken from him and given to the one who had

rendered the most diligent and faithful service.

A still more solemn word is given in Matthew 24, a contrast between two types of servants, the faithful and the slothful. The faithful one who does not fail to give meat in due season to the children, the Lord will make ruler over all His goods. But the lazy and negligent one will be cut asunder, appointed a portion with the hypocrites, and "there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." The Master says to us, "Behold, I come quickly; and My reward is with Me." His reward and also His judgments.

Let us go back to the prodigal who had wasted what was given him in riotous living. The day came when he realized his misery and loss. Thank God for His loving discipline and the ways He has of putting conviction of sin upon us when we have gotten into a wrong pathway. He always sees to it that we find out that the way of the transgressor is hard.

The son began to think of that loving Father again. He would go back and make confession. Unworthy of the position of son he would ask to be placed upon the footing of the hired servants. In full repentance he made his way back, only to find the loving Father running to meet him. What a restoration! What gifts of love!

If you have failed, if your life has been selfish and unholy, do not be afraid to come back in real repentance, with a full and frank confession of sin to our all-soloving Father. He will abundantly pardon, restore the joy of your salvation, and once more reinstate you. Once more He will give you opportunity of being about your Father's business, ever finding His will a delight.

What about the other son? He was very upset about all this fuss being made concerning the return of the renegade. And he murmured against his Father: "Thou never gavest me a kid!" Had he asked for one? Would his father have refused had he asked? Listen to that loving Father

It is only unbelief that smites Jesus again; it is unbelief that makes you feel for one moment that it is difficult to obtain from God the living water which He promises you in and through Jesus Christ. Even to Moses, the man of God, the word came, "Because ye believed Me not, to sanctify Me, therefore ve shall not bring this congregation into the land which I have given them." God help us to see what a terrible sin unbelief is, the most awful of sins from which all

other sins spring.

"Because ye believed Me not." There is ample provision for every unclean soul to be saved and to be sanctified. Are you cast down because of the burden of sin which is resting upon you or, having become a child of God, having been brought out of cruel Egyptian bondage, are you still suffering because you have not been cleansed from all your sins, and you know that daily your walk grieves and dishonors your blessed Christ by whose name you are called? Oh, there is deliverance for you through the blood-shedding, through the cleft of the Rock. You may enter at once into that cleft and abide there with the flowing blood and the water of life flowing

You remember that God said, "I will hide you in the eleft of the Rock while My glory passeth by." Do you know that you could not see the glory of God, you could not endure to see it if you were not hidden away in the cleft of the Rock? Not only may you have the streams of life that flow from that riven Rock, but you may abide within its very cleft! Oh, that God might show to all of us what it means to abide there, speaking in faith to the Rock and never more wounding Him afresh

by unbelief!

There was self coming up, self-effort, when Moses and Aaron said, "Must we fetch you water out of this Rock?" Are you saying "Must we do it?" Are you trying by self-effort to bring water out of the Rock? Do you feel it is a difficult thing to get hold of God and to get the streams of His mercy to flow upon your longing, thirsty soul? Beloved, it is not a difficult thing because it has all been done, has been finished. Hear the words of the

dying Redeemer, as He hung upon the cross in agony, "It is finished," finished for every child, no matter how weak, no matter how vile, who will say, "It is finished for me."

And then as you count the work all done, you may rest in the finished work of Christ, you may enter into His sabbath of rest, and cease from your own works as God did from His. I find it so hard to teach people this wonderful lesson of ceasing from self-effort. When they have ceased from all other effort, they will still make so much effort to have faith and to keep up their faith, but He is the Author and Finisher of our faith.

Somebody said to me while trying to question and cross-question me right on this point of ceasing from my own works, with a little playful sarcasm in the tones, "You have a very comfortable time in your religion if you stop doing everything and let God do it all, if you do not even stop



to think or plan what you are to say or do? "Yes," I said, "did not the Lord say He would hide us away in the secret place of His tabernacle? Did He not say a Man should be as a hiding place from the wind and a covert from the storm and from the tempest? Am not I hid away from all the storm, resting in the secret place of His love? He has borne it all; it all came upon His blessed head. All our sins and all our sorrows have come upon Jesus. He drank the bitter cup to the last drop that we might not have to drink it, and I do have a wonderfully free and happy time, a comfortable time, and you shall not make me think that I have got to worry about anything." Well, before we finished talking, that soul got down and took Jesus as his Sabbath Rest forevermore. you not enter into the Sabbath of Christ's Rest? The word was, "Thou shalt bear no burden on the Sabbath." No one shall make me do it! When the Sabbath day has come to my soul, when His blessed foretaste of the Millennium has dawned upon me, I am not going to bear any burden.

I do not mean what is called "the burden of souls." That is not a real burden in the sense of burden-bearing. If the Lord puts the burden of a soul upon us, the burden of prayer for some wounded, worried, feeble heart, that is full of sweetness because the Lord in us carries it all and prays it through us, and it is delightful to enter into the secret of God's prayers and get His faith and the intercession of the

Spirit, and we are just the channel for its flow, and we get blessed as it flows through

If you will speak to the Rock today, ever so feebly, just in the tiniest whisper of faith, the streams of living water will leap all bounds and flow over you, bathe and saturate you with the love and life of God. You will have life more abundantly, and out of your inner soul shall flow those rivers of living water till they flow out and reach perishing masses around you, and they too shall be revived and blessed because of the overflow. Will you not only speak to the Rock but will you enter the cleft of the Rock? He has made the cleft for you? The great earthquake of God's judgment against sin that we would have felt in all its terrible power had it not been for Jesus standing between and meeting the blow,-that great earthquake of God's judgment against sin opened the cleft, and Love gave Himself to have the cleft opened in His side. Love divine! Will you just now enter into the cleft? How safe you will be there! I will hide you in the cleft of the rock while My glory passeth by." You will see God's glory, and you will be able to bear the manifestations of glory which God gives to the eyes of faith! Oh, He gives us such foretastes of the heavenly glory, and bye and bye we shall see the fullness of glory revealed.

He says, "O my dove, that art in the clefts of the Rock, in the secret places of the stairs, let me see thy countenance, let me hear thy voice; for sweet is thy voice and thy countenance is comely." How He loves His dove that is hid away in the clefts of the Rock. That verse is in the Song of Solomon, typical of the song of Jesus over His bride. "Let me see thy countenance." How can He see it unless it is always lifted up to Him in supplication and praise? How can He see it if it is turned earthward? How can He hear our voice which is sweet to Him, the voice of His redeemed ones, unless we are speaking to Him in prayer and praise?

Oh, how sweet our prayers and praises are to Him! He gathers them up like the sweetest perfume and keeps them up in Heaven in golden vials. That is what John saw, and that is what He gives us to see as we enter more and more into the life of prayer. We see that the prayer which does our own soul good by its blessed returns always fills the heart of Jesus with joy. Shall we not live more in the attitude of prayer and praise that He may hear our voice and see our countenance? He calls us His dove.

"The dove hath neither claw nor sting, Nor weapons for the fight; It owes its safety to the wing, Its victory to flight. The Bridegroom opes His arms of love, And in them folds His panting dove."

He likens us to a dove because we are so utterly defenseless, only safe as we fly into the cleft Rock. How many of you are going to say today, "Lord Jesus, I will by faith enter the cleft Rock, and I will nevermore come out of my dwelling place. I will abide in that strong, impregnable fortress, and nothing can ever touch me there."

A Good Samaritan in China

The story is told in World Dominion of a consecrated Danish nurse who went out to labor for Christ in a large town on the Western frontier of China.

Soon many maternity cases came under her care, and she received an increasing number of calls to go out to cases in the city and surrounding district. She mothered the women patients. One day there came two girls, young girls from a brothel in the town. They stayed for some weeks, and, as health returned and the day approached when they must leave, they grew more and more miserable. At last one of them said: "I do wish we needn't go back; I wish we could always stay with you." "Do you?" said the missionary; "then indeed you shall not go back."

A law-suit followed, but Greatheart (as this nurse is called) triumphed, and the girls were taken to the safe shelter of her compound. Presently the story leaked out, and more girls fled to her, one of whom was a very pretty young woman for whom she had to pay a heavy fine. But even after the fine was paid, the girl had to be constantly guarded lest she should be kidnapped. She was not safe until she was married.

In these cases Greatheart had the help of the Chinese magistrate, who administered the law handsomely, heartily strengthened her hands and gave her wise advice about procedure.

The Gate of Benevolence had opened, but it was to be pushed open still wider. Unhappy women came to her maternity ward, and unwanted babies were brought forth in its quiet shelter. Sometimes a mother would steal away a few hours after the birth, leaving a wailing infant to its fate; if the baby were a boy, a home could easily be found for him, but nobody wanted a deserted baby girl. So Greatheart had to take charge of it. Again the story spread. Others deserted in the city were brought to her doors. They overflowed the room given up to them and spread into the large sunny south room in her own house.

One day I went into that room, and I shall never forget it. The floor was painted a deep rich crimson and polished to a smooth brightness, the great southern window let in floods of sunshine, and the atmosphere was warm and fresh, for above the windows were smaller windows always kept open and covered with wire mosquito netting. Baby cots were ranged along both sides of the room, babies' toys were scattered about. Kindly-faced nurses, rosycheeked and deep-bosomed, looked after the small inhabitants, and the babies themselves in their clean gowns made an unforgettable picture.

As their beloved came in, small toddlers staggered up to her holding out their arms to be lifted up. Then she told us the story of one and another; how that one over there was brought in by his brother, a lad of fourteen, who had carried him a long distance. He said his mother was dead and his father wanted to sell the child as he could not bring him up, but the boy had heard of this place and would pay for the little brother's food himself "if only

they would take him!" Another was the son of a minor official whose wife was dead and who found it hopeless to rear the child. He, of course, paid all its expenses.

The story of another sounded like the beginning of a novel. One night, said Greatheart, the bell rang and someone at the window saw a girl with bobbed hair and beautiful clothes running away. When they opened the door, they found a small baby laid there, wrapped up in dainty silk quilts. Beside it was a bottle of food, and a note asking them to receive the child, and saying that money would be sent regularly for its maintenance. At several stations on the road to Peking letters were posted and money sent.

We went to another room where older

children lived. They were all asleep, clean and fresh, and the pathos that somehow always surrounds a sleeping child was intensified as we looked at them and remembered that each one had been deserted and unwanted. One's mind was held back from exploring the answer as one thought, "and if there had not been this eye to pity"?

One day a ricksha drove up and a poor woman got down, a maternity case. When the nurse went to see her, the woman wept and told her that she had escaped from a brothel. Her husband had died and she had been sold to a brothel. She had heard of the refuge and every day she stood at the door hoping that "She" would come down the street and deliver her. ("Why did you never pass?") One day she saw a rickshaman going by, and suddenly she called him and jumped into his ricksha. "Run quickly to the nurse, and I will pay you well!" He ran and she escaped penniless, sure that she would pay her fare and take her in. Her great fear was that her child would be born in that house of evil, but the Lord who answers the prayers of some who have never heard of Him drew

her out of the pit. Her child was born blind and lived for only a brief time. She, too, passed away in peace.

One more out of the stories that are told about Greatheart in many a queer haunt: The mission school teacher was anxious about one of the pupils, a little girl, because of a rumor that she was to be sold. One day when the child was absent word was sent to Greatheart. She took a Bible woman and they went to the child's home and asked about her. The father said that she was out with her mother, but his manner was very suspicious. At once the two went to one of the evil houses and demanded the child. Never in all their history of evil had this happened, that a foreign woman should dare to storm their fastness. They met the father there and were sure they were on the right track. To all refusals she insisted on the child being produced, threatening to prosecute the father. "You may look for her, she is not here," was the reply, and a search produced no result.

While they talked the Bible woman had disappeared, so Greatheart kept up the argument until suddenly the Bible woman appeared with the child. The little girl ran to Greatheart and they wept in each other's arms.

Altogether there are nearly fifty dependent on Greatheart. For some years the city gave her a grant and she has many Chinese helpers and well-wishers who aid her to their utmost. Last year about \$250 were stolen from her funds, a desperate loss. Some of her women workers put their heads together and determined to find the thief. They went to the house of the suspect, and returned in triumph—with all the money!

So she goes on her way asking financial help from no one. If sometimes she lies awake at night, when the supply of millet is low in the bin and heavy milk bills have to be met, only those nearest her may guess it. Financial worries do not stir her inmost being. It is when sickness and death come to the little flock that she mourns as a mother over her own child.

Lately the Chinese Christians have decided to help her to a greater extent, and they are trying to get a piece of land in a beautiful part of the country, where a home may be built for the children, where goats may be kept and all the vegetables needed for the family may be grown.

Thus Greatheart is living out the parable of the Good Samaritan before the eyes of thousands of Chinese in that large frontier town. As they see her sacrificial labors and are told it is just the love of Christ that is constraining her, they are being attracted toward Him.

She is preaching a sermon to each of us to love our neighbors as ourselves. And surely the Master, in commending this love laborer, turns to each one of us and says, "Go, and do thou likewise." Luke 10:37.

A sheep never fights for itself when attacked by the enemy. In God's Word the Christian is compared to sheep. Are you true to the sheep nature, or do you fight for yourself when something comes into your life that does not please you? It is said of Jesus: "As a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so He openeth not His mouth." Take Christ as your example.

The Call of the Church.

Sweet as bells of evening pealing Come the melodies of God, Into Fearts that turn to Jesus Trusting in His sacred Blood.

When I was a youth in Ireland I would listen to the church bells on Sunday evening pealing over all the city of Dublin. We boys would gather in the gallery of St. Mark's and participate in a solemn and sacred service. The ministers were all good men. They must have done their best to lead us to God. I cannot remember that I saw an altar service in the church. except for communion; it was not their custom. I would sometimes look up at the sky from my window at home and wonder about God and the judgment I heard about. I would wonder if I had performed enough good deeds to overbalance the bad ones of my life. If some one had told me that salvation was a free gift from God, and that God would not only pardon my sins, but wash my heart with the blood of Jesus and give me a new spiritual heart, and that the Spirit of Jesus would come into my heart in a spiritual and miraculous manner, I might have turned to God and been saved earlier in my life. I should have been spared much regret and have led more souls to Christ. Perhaps some one did, and I was too busy with my own way to hear the message.

The Call of Christ.

When Jesus walked the length and breadth of Canaan in the long ago he was always calling men to follow him. He called the twelve disciples; he called other seventy also. He called men from fishing nets and customs seats. From physicians' profession or vineyard care; from humble walks of life they heard His call. He called women, too, from home cares to minister to His needs. Even the fallen woman of Samaria heard the call to eternal life, and straightway published abroad the good news of her salvation. Mary, the Magdalene, delivered from the bondage of demons, left all to walk in the concord of the Christian call at His command.

Multitudes pressed on the Christ as He spake as none other ever spake, either before or since. They marveled at His doings, and more particularly at His sayings; and the burden of His sayings was, "Come unto Me and I will give you rest." It is sadly recorded that when He told them some truths that showed suffering ahead, many of His disciples departed from Him, and walked no more with Him. They lost the Christ!

One of the most pathetic pictures in the history of the Christ is the one that portrays Him looking over the houses of Jerusalem from a near-by height. He was about to die for the nation. He was heart-broken. The leaders of the people had rejected the call of God! Nothing but judgment remained for them. If men will not serve God, He will break them in judgment! The multitudes were blindly following their leaders. Jesus wept convulsively! Then the cry: "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, thou that killest the prophets, and stonest them that are sent unto thee,

how often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not!" They had missed their call!

But the saddest picture of all is that of Judas and the Christ at the Last Supper. Jesus took a sop, dipped it in wine, and offered it to Iscariot as a last appeal for friendship, and fellowship. Judas took the sop, but his heart was like a stone. He quenched the call in his heart. It was his last call! Thirty pieces of silver seemed bigger and better than the Christ! It is sadly significant that after he had taken the sop Satan entered into him, and he went out into the night! It was his last call for ever!

In France, in the latter part of August, 1914, we lay in shallow trenches as shell after shell burst around us, scattering shrapnel everywhere. Sometimes the flying earth would shower on our packs and backs and for a moment we would wonder if we were hit.

As the long, warm suuny day drew to a close, we noticed a troop of German cavalry coming over the crest of the hill on the right flank of our front line. They must have broken through! They probably wanted to charge and silence a near-by battery of light artillery, or perhaps we were the object of their attention! Suddenly a squadron of Lancers came trotting out of a thicket to our right. They had been concealed there all day, waiting for such an emergency as this! We hadn't known they were there.

They increased their pace up the hill. Shells were bursting everywhere, but it didn't seem to make any impression on the discipline of the horsemen. Black horses

IHE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Asa's Victory Through Dependence Upon God

Lesson for August 20. Lesson Text: 2 Chronicles 14, 15

Rehoboam had come to the throne with a great opportunity offered him. He refused it and his folly led to the disruption of the Hebrew monarchy. Abijah, his son, succeeded him and "walked in all the sins of his father." And now Asa, son of Abijah, reigns. "In his days the land was quiet ten years." Would he take advantage of this time of peace to lift the country out of the political, moral, and spiritual decay, into which his predecessors had let it fall?

THE CHALLENGE OF ASA'S FAITH

A Test. 2 Chron. 14:9. "And there came against them Zerah the Ethiopian with an host

of a thousand thousand, and three hundred chariots." An army of a million men! Coming to destroy the newly organized and much smaller army of Asa! What a dismal outlook! It looked like the end of Judah was at hand! What a test of Asa's faith! How would he respond? And incidentally how do we meet the challenge of Faith presented to us by adverse circumstances?

The declaration of Asa's faith. 2 Chron. 14:10-11. Did Asa throw up his hands in despair, considering himself a helpless victim of circumstances? Not he! Let us listen to his prayer of faith and be instructed:

"Lord, it is nothing with thee to help." What God-honoring words! Asa had a faith that was based upon a right conception of God. Likewise we too must be fully convinced of God's unlimited power and willingness to help, if we would triumph over adversity. Jer. 32:27; Heb. 11:6.

"Help us, for we rest on thee." What? Rest at such a time? Impossible! Oh no! Not to the man who knows God! Hudson Taylor, the great missionary and founder of the China Inland Mission, was one day given some very bad news concerning the work. And to the astonishment of the excited missionary who had given the sad information, Hudson Taylor began to sing: "Jesus, I am resting, resting, in the joy of what

Thou art. I am finding out the fullness of Thy loving heart." Yes, Jesus does give rest even in the time of adversity. And "when He giveth quietness who then can make trouble?" Job 34:29.

"And in thy name we go against this multitude." Ah, Asa, you have learned a secret of spiritual conquest! It was not a question of the size of Asa's army, nor of his own strength or bravery. Asa was in the will of God, backed by the power and authority of God, and that was all that mattered! An officer sent to arrest an individual does not stop to consider his own strength, nor does he apologize for his action. Why not? Because he has authority given him by the government! Are we hesitating in the spiritual conquest? God has invested us with authority!-"In my name shall they cast out devils," etc. Mark 16:15-18. We complain about not having power; but does not our failure lie in the fact that we don't use our God-given authority?

THE FRUIT OF ASA'S FAITH

The routing of the enemy. 2 Chron. 14:12, 13. "So the Lord smote the Ethiopians." As Asa went forward in the name of the Lord the Lord

had gone on before him. The enemy was completely routed, great spoil was taken, and great fear came upon the surrounding cities which saw that God was with Israel! How reminiscent is this valiant army, of a much smaller New Testament army which in threatening days, sought the Lord, and was so endued with the power of the Holy Ghost, newly outpoured from heaven, that "of the rest durst no man join himself to them." Acts 4:29-31; 5:12-13. Have we great tests of faith? Let us trust Him! Victory is ours in any case! For "in all these things we are (not we shall be!) more than conquerors through Him that loved us!" Rom. 8:37.

The removal of iniquity. 2 Chron. 15:8, 16. Strengthened by the amazing victory, Asa's faith is expressed in further practical action. The high places, groves, abominable idols, and the idolatrous altars which had for years cursed the na-

tion, are now removed. Even what personal feelings and sympathies Asa might have had were put aside in his sweeping action in behalf of righteousness, for Asa removed his own mother from being queen because of her idolatry. Blessed is the man whose faith is strong and pure enough to uncompromisingly oppose evil even when it means laying aside personal interest and predudice!

The revival of the nation. 2 Chron. 15:9-15. See the result of one man's faith! The outward opposition of an army of a million men has been removed and the enemy put to flight. Inward opposition in the form of idolatry and its attendent evil practices has been destroyed. And now a nation is led into spiritual revival! Asa exhorts the people to seek God with all their hearts. His faith is catching! For "when they saw that the Lord God was with him," they responded to his impassioned pleas. And, as is always the case when people seek the Lord "with all their heart and with all their soul," He is "found of them." Great peace and rejoicing were the result.

O Asa, thou intrepid man of God, to each of us may grace be given to follow in the footsteps

of thy faith! But may the Lord preserve us from following in the failure of thy latter days.

REPETITIONS OF PENTECOST

Concerning the Pentecostal phenomena of speaking in other tongues as on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:4), W. F. P. Burton, a missionary of the British Assemblies of God to the Congo, writes of the following experiences.

Twice he has heard Kiluba spoken by Spiritfilled believers in England. This is a Central African language, but Sister Durham and Donald Gee, who spoke it, had had no opportunity of learning it. What they said was in joy and praise to the Lord Jesus.

At a Bible conference in the Congo a young man, named Saiba, was praying quietly with eyes shut, when Brother Burton noticed that his lips were moving rapidly. Going behind him he found that this Christian native was telling of the glories of Christ's coming kingdom in English, a language of which he did not understand a

word. His language was perfect. He uttered truths which he himself had never known before. With unspeakable tenderness he spoke of Jerusalem, the center of Christ's earthly reign, of the fruitfulness and peace that should flourish, of the nations bringing their glory and wealth to an earthly and to a heavenly city, and of there being no further necessity for guns or warships. Says Brother Burton: "Later I asked him if he knew what he had said. He answered that he had just been glorying in the wonders of the Lord Jesus. His spirit was praying, but his understanding was unfruitful.

In another meeting was Kanolotyi, an old native who had grown cold in his soul. When someone spoke in a strange tongue under the moving of the Holy Spirit, Kanolotyi gave a cry of anguish. When the tongues ceased he said, "Brethren, nobody here but I knows that language. It is the language of my early slave days far down the Congo. It is God's voice calling me to repent and to be wholeheartedly for Him." Then he poured out his soul to God, asking for forgiveness and reconsecrating himself to Christ.

One other incident was at Lytham in England. An open-air service was being held and a large crowd had gathered. Suddenly a Mrs. Whiteside began to speak in a strange language.

Brother Burton gave the interpretation in English. At once a big man stepped into the ring and fell on his knees praying for God to save his soul. He declared that every word of that message in tongues and interpretation went straight to his heart.

A young Japanese had been listening to the service, and when he went home he asked who these people were. The landlady told him, "They are a lot of fanatical, religious enthusiasts. Some say they are religion-mad." The Japanese said, "Well, they may be mad, but I heard a most remarkable thing. One spoke in perfect Japanese, while another gave the exact equivalent in English."

METHODISTS IN ITALY

Reports Herald of Holiness: "Methodists are finding difficult restrictions placed upon them in Italy. Public propaganda and open air preaching are forbidden. Also a pastor can call on evangelicals only within a certain prescribed area which is covered by his license. The worst, however, is the intolerant opposition of the Roman Catholic priesthood."

A WARRING WORLD

In spite of our Lord's statement that wars and rumors of wars would continue (Mark 13:7), some would build hopes of a lasting universal peace. How disheartening to them is the following report of a Harvard University professor, given in Word and Work, who analyzed 902 wars and 1,615 internal disturbances in 2,500 years. He states that Spain has been at war 67 per cent of the years of her history, Greece 57 per cent, Great Britain 56 per cent, France 50 per cent, Russia 46 per cent, Italy 36 per cent, Germany 28 per cent, and United States 14 per cent.

THE LONG-SUFFERING OF GOD

A writer in the *Witness* (London) points out how remarkable it is that God in His great mercy has restrained the great Powers from war during the past few years. Crises have arisen over Austria, Ethiopia, China, Spain, Czechoslovakia, and Albania, which never would have passed over peacefully a generation ago. Must it not be that the coming conflict will be so awful that it will be Armageddon indeed, and that God is granting days of grace today as in those days "when the longsuffering of God waited in the days of Noah" (1 Peter 3:21), that men may have every opportunity to be saved before the breaking of the awful judgments foretold in Revelation 6 to 9?

LEARNING FROM A PARROT

Mrs. Lettie Cowman tells a remarkable story about a parrot in the Tokyo Bible School. It seems that some of the students had trained a young parrot to sing, "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so" in the Japanese language. Perched in its cage hanging in the open window, its singing attracted the attention of little Japanese children playing in the street. Soon they, too, were singing the song, and it was not long until their parents began to make inquiry as to where they learned it. They told them a bird had taught them. To show them, the children took their mothers and fathers to see the bird and to hear it sing. They thought it wonderful and asked the missionaries who this Jesus was that loved the parrot because the Bible told him so. Many families were led to the Lord through the singing of this bird, according to The Gospel Call.

SYSTEMATIC BIBLE READING

Great interest in systematic Bible reading is reported among the Congo Christians by the Congo Mission News. These native Christians followed the course of the International Bible Reading Association that has been translated into Kikongo, taking notes as they read and meeting together weekly to compare results. A missionary has told of contests in Scripture recitation at Mutoto. Kamyebi, the boy who won the first place, recited 677 verses. The one who took second rank recited for an hour and three minutes without stopping—564 verses in all. The third boy recited 392 verses. Things have changed since the days when Congo cannibals ran along the river bank where Stanley and his company were gliding down stream, and shouted, "Meat, meat!" in their cannibalist longing for the white man's flesh.

SOLOMON'S TEMPLE

The Temple which King Solomon built on Mount Moriah in Jerusalem nearly 3,000 years ago is to be seen in a complete model at the Jewish Palestine Pavilion at the New York World's Fair, says the Los Angeles Times. Jacob Jahuda, architect-designer of Jerusalem, devoted to it fourteen years of intensive research and six years of actual construction. The Temple model covers an area of 81 square feet and shows buildings of the Temple area which were constructed by 183,000 artisans during King Solomon's reign.

FASCISM IN SOUTH AMERICA

During the past seventy-five years 2,000,000 Italians have migrated to Uruguay and Argentina, states *World Dominion*. Today 56 per cent of all foreigners in Argentina are Italian, and next to New York, Buenos Aires is the largest Italian city in the world outside of Italy. At least 35 per cent of Brazil's 48,000,000 inhabitants have Italian blood, and Sao Paulo, the industrial center, is predominantly Italian. And by propaganda, pressure, discrimination, social and economic force or persuasion, Italy is succeeding in converting many of these Italian settlers to Fascism.

CHRISTIANS AND PEACE

Prophecy Monthly sounds a timely warning against the participation of Christians in modern peace movements to the neglect of soul-winning. As long as there is war in human nature there will be war between the nations. The reign of the Prince of Peace has not yet begun. Until He comes, our duty is to preach "peace through the Blood of His cross," bringing individuals to make peace with God and thus be at peace with one another. Let us pray for peace according to 1 Tim. 2:1, 2, but let us not waste time on vain man-made peace movements when the coming of the Prince of Peace is so near.

THE PALESTINE PAVILION

The Palestine Pavilion at the New York World's Fair was formally dedicated before 100,000 people, says Prophecy Monthly. Outside of Palestine itself no single mass gathering of Jews in such vast numbers has occurred anywhere in the world in our time. The dedication address emphasized the resolute will of the Jewish people to rebuild their homeland in spite of setbacks. The thousands of Jews lifted their voices in cheering the speakers who denounced the British White Paper which would make an Arab country out of Palestine. In the world of tomorrow the Iewish national homeland in Palestine will be a reality. God promised Palestine to the Jews, and the constant attitude of Jewry is, "If I forget thee, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning." Psalm 137:5.

JEWISH CONVERSIONS

A writer in World Dominion declares that more Jews have been converted in Germany during the last five years of persecution than in fifty years previously. This is not from a desire to escape persecution, for Christian Jews and orthodox Jews are oppressed alike. Indeed, we should be stirred to pray for German Jews by the fact that many who are suffering so pathetically are our fellow-Christians.

DOOMED TO CONFISCATION

The Reich Protector for Bohemia and Moravia issued an anti-Jewish decree which required that Ling Jews must report themselves by July 31 and register their property, states Jewish Missionary Magazine. They must report their possessions as or March 17, the date of the German occupation; no transfer of ownership among Jews since that time is recognized. So the sons of Israel in Bohemia and Moravia know their doom. "They are for a prey, and none delivereth." Isa. 42:22.

MORALITY IN GERMANY

The German Government Statistical Year Book, says Revelation, reports that "in 1903, 612 minors were condemned for sexual crimes," and "in 1937 the figure was 2,374." The latter figure represents conditions under the Nazi regime when all church groups of young people were forbidden and all youth were forced into the Hitler organizations. Does this mean merely that sexual crimes are being more strictly punished, or does it mean that Hitler's morality program is proving a poor substitute for Christian influence?

GOOD NEWS

An Amazing Bargain

Recently W. E. Harriott of Forsan, Texas, sold two 5-cent postage stamps for the tidy sum of \$4,000. Forty-seven years ago he accepted the stamps, from a lady in Nebraska, in part payment for having spaded her lawn for her. His were among the very few known specimens of an experimental issue of stamps bearing the likeness of James A. Garfield. They are dated 1882. Discovering that the stamps were more valuable than the ten cents they represented, Mr. Harriott opened correspondence about their sale. As a result he received a draft from a New York bank for \$4,000.

This showed a fine profit on the ten cents worth of labor given in them; but even so it was a trade incomparably less profitable than one I made fifty-five years ago in the State of Kansas. Mr. Harriott waited forty-seven years to realize on his investment; but when I delivered my dead and perfectly worthless life to the Lord, without having to wait a minute I received a cleansed and wonderful new heart, endowed with eternal life. In that exchange which was made without money and without price, I was miraculously transformed from a hell-bound child of the devil to a heaven-bound son of the living God. LEARNING TO WORK IN MOSSILAND

Indeed they have rather added to it as they have revealed not only difficulties but also joys beyond measure as the new workers find themselves enabled to speak to those who have never before heard of Jesus and His love.

So writes Paul Kitch after his first half year of service in Africa, rejoicing that at least he

and Mrs. Kitch have conquered enough of the language so that they can at least try to speak!

Village Work

"One Sunday afternoon recently," says Mr. Kitch, "folding chairs, accordions, water jugs, black and white folks were all loaded into two cars and started on the way for a village twenty miles distant. Our hearts beat fast as we realized we were going to tell some people the gospel for the first time.

"Upon reaching a little village we found that we had taken a wrong turn and were in a village which had never heard the precious News. We were assured that they wanted to listen to our message, so we proceeded to set up camp. At the foot of a large spreading tree we lined ourselves up on chairs and auto seats. A lantern furnished our light, and before us were about forty men and boys.

"As the songs were sung and the three native preachers took turns speaking a few words, we noticed the interest growing. Before we left they learned a Bible verse and a song, and invited us to come back. Pray with us for this village which has just heard the gospel for the first time.

And Still Another Village

"The next Sunday afternoon we decided to split the party and go to two villages. Taking two native preachers in our car we started out, picking our way through weeds and bushes, dodging thorn bushes, following a narrow little footpath. At last we reached some native huts and located the chief's yard.

"The chief finally emerged from the shadows, sat down on the ground and began bending his body and going through the regular form of greeting. One by one our native preachers sat down in front of him and went through the same rigmarole of bending, grunting, and snapping their fingers. Being rather new at this business, I wondered if they expected me to follow in the ordeal! Just as I became really concerned they arose and came to shake hands with me, so the suspense was over.

"We were all invited into the enclosure called his 'yard.' There, standing in the light of our lantern which we perched on a log, we sang and preached. We were delighted with the interest the people showed during the entire service.

A Question of Etiquette

"When it came my time to give a short word the chief arose also. The boys told him to be seated but he insisted on standing and seemed confused and nervous. At last he asked one

of the boys to speak with him privately. Not having had a missionary in his village before, he did not know how to act and thought that he should get me a gift at once! The boys assured him we wanted no gifts, but only to tell them the 'Good News.' All was quiet again and the service was finished without too many interruptions.

"As we started back down the crooked path toward the road our hearts rejoiced that we had been privileged to go into another village which had never had the gospel before. They gave us a hearty invitation to return, and we pray that the light of the gospel may pierce into their darkened souls."

GOD'S GRACE IN FREETOWN

"We praise God," rejoice the Omans in Sierra Leone, "for continued outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our midst. In the past two months eight have received the precious Baptism in the Holy Spirit. There is real heart-searching going on among those who have not been filled. The older Christians are becoming more and more anxious as they see the recently saved ones being filled while they who have been saved for a longer time are not.

"The tarrying services have been so large that we have had to divide them, the women coming on Monday evenings and the men on Friday. Many times there have been as many as a hundred and fifty out at one service. Just now there seems to be some hindrance in the way of many being filled, and we hope all our friends will join with us in prayer that whatever this is it will be removed so that the Holy Spirit may come in His fullness to the waiting believers.

Salvation Full and Free

"Ever since the first of the new year, God has been saving souls in our midst, praise His wonderful Name! During the months of April and May one hundred and seven came forward to accept Christ as their personal Saviour, and eleven backsliders were reclaimed.

"Some of those who found Christ are natives who have been attending other churches. They are sometimes a little hesitant about leaving their churches and coming out fully for the

Lord. We leave them in the hands of the Lord and pray that He will give them courage to step forth for Him.

Prospective Workers

"Among our native Christians there are six young men who would be qualified to go out and tell the precious story to their fellow men if we had the means to support them. It costs five dollars a month to support a man and his wife while they devote their entire time to the Lord's work. These workers should be supported for about two years; then their own native churches should be able to assume the burden. Let us all pray together that God will somehow send in the required funds that these young men may be able to carry the blessed message of hope and salvation to those yet in darkness."

JOYOUS SERVICE

A song of testimony to the joy of serving our wonderful Lord rings through a letter recently received from Felipe Vasquez, native worker in Peru.

"I give thanks," he writes, "that our Lord keeps me in His love and mercy and has me working in His vineyard, meditating and experiencing every day a little more of the things of His kingdom.

daily to the throne of grace and mercy for me and for my family -which prayers, united with those of others who know me, maintain my spiritual life from falling even though trials, battles, and some difficulties are not lacking. In the midst of everything and above all these things, I remain with the Lord until now and I may add that, trusting in His promise of grace, love and mercy, I will remain-oh, glory to God!until the day He calls me or comes to take us to be with Himself forever.

"The first of November of this year will be seven years since I was born again. Of this time six years and one month have been spent in the work of the Lord, for which I give thanks to God for such a great mercy and privilege.

I praise Him for His gospel of peace and power and for His servants who came from afar bringing the blessed Word with sweetness in their lips and love in their hearts. Have I not reason and motive to praise this God whom, though I have not seen Him personally, yet shows such mercy for me?

"With this liberty and gratitude which there is in my heart toward our Redeemer, my desire is to continue proclaiming the good news of salvation to other souls and still more souls, and to other towns also, by means of the testimony of my life and the reading of the holy Word."

Sister Couchman adds this word to Brother Vasquez' testimony. "Brother Vasquez is invaluable in service to our Lord, and we surely do thank God for such a devoted worker. He is very busy these days with his motorcycle—which he calls his "little horse"—visiting the believers in the different haciendas to establish them in the Word."

GLORY IN SHANSI

"Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, praise the Lord!" So ring the shouts of rejoicing as Alice Stewart writes from far Shansi Province in North China. "How we do praise God for the revival He has started in Shansi where the blood of the maryrs flowed so freely during the Boxer Rebellion.

"But—to begin at the beginning! Brothers Bard and Hansen and Sister Daechert came up

to Ta Ch'ang for special meetings. To accommodate the crowds we had to have three-in-one services—that is, three services going on at the same time in three different places! And bless the Name of the Lord, over fifty followed Jesus in water baptism!

And the Glory of the Lord Came "After communion service on Sunday morn-

ing, many of the people went home, so the grown-ups met in one chapel and the children in another. The Lord saved His best wine for the last of the feast!

"Before speaking Mrs. Bard sang a chorus and told the people to raise their hands and praise the Lord. The glory of the Lord fell and filled the temple, and the whole chapel became an altar unto God. I never saw so many people slain under the power of God!

Among the Children Also

"The Spirit came in power in the children's service also. Five came through speaking in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. After their service was dismissed they came over to the other chapel where more of them were filled as on the day of Pentecost.

"We pray earnestly that we may be humble in the presence of the Lord that He may use us in the spreading of the revival He has started in Shansi. We are now erecting a large chapel to accommodate the crowds that come to hear the gospel."

SCATTERING THE WORD IN FIJI

The Lawrence Borsts, seeing the need of more extensive work among the Indian people in Fiji, recently secured a good supply of Scripture portions in the various languages of the Indian people. In each of more than one thousand homes visited, they left a portion of God's Word in the very language the people knew.

They also obtained Gospels in Mindi, Malayalam, Telegu, and Tamil, and have sold about three hundred and fifty Gospels and twenty-three New Testaments.

It is a matter for rejoicing that so many of these people who are poverty stricken, living in hovels on mud floors, many without furniture, yet will sacrifice to obtain a Gospel. Each portion of God's Word was prayed over in the trust that souls will be born into the kingdom through this campaign. Considering the twelve to fifteen thousand homes yet to be visited, the campaign has scarcely begun.

The Preacher Needed

The silent portion—or leaflet with Scriptures—is in many cases not sufficient. The preacher is needed as well. The Borsts have had many opportunities to preach, explain, reason, and plead with the people. Many asked them to come in. In this case, they would enter, sing an Indian song about Jesus, read from the Bible, and point the Indians to the cross where Jesus died. Often someone asks to be taught how to pray, in order that he may be able to pray to the right God in the right manner.

Blessed times have come as they have told the people of the love of Jesus, repeating the story over and over until it apparently sank in. Some would ask: "But have you really come away out here into the bush to tell us about

Jesus? You go to a lot of trouble doing this."

Then they are told of Jesus who went to far more trouble than any one else, for He was crucified and slain for our sins. Such love should reach their hearts. Let us pray that God will make it do so.

Praying for the Sick

There have been many opportunities to pray for the sick and God has wonderfully healed many sick Hindus. Every morning before going out, Mr. and Mrs. Borst and their visitation party read the portion of scripture in Matthew 10:8 where Jesus charged His disciples—"Heal the sick . . . freely you have received, freely give." And the Word of God brought great encouragement to their hearts. They request prayer that God will give them qualified full-time workers to help in the

needy field of Fiji's Indian people.

MIRACLES IN AFRICA

Mrs. Paul K. Derr, Mbeya, Tanganyika, Africa, writes in the Latter Rain Evangel: "As we look over the year we find much for which to thank the Lord. Well over a hundred souls have been saved and baptized, and many have received the Baptism in the Spirit.

"A baby rolled off the bed and struck her eye on a sharp stick which pierced the eye-ball and the fluid ran out. When the mother brought her to us, the eye had the appearance of a piece of crushed paper. We examined it carefully and then went to prayer. Shortly after the baby was anointed the mother had the assurance that the eye was healed, and she began to praise the Lord for the Blood of the Lamb which was shed for us. The next morning the eye was perfect.

TELORD'S HEALING

HEALED WHEN DYING

Tuesday, June 21st, 1938, my feet and ankles swelled and became very painful from inflammatory rheumatism. Wednesday, my knees became stiff, also, and by Thursday, my hips and right arm became useless. Two doctors urged that I be taken to the Hospital, although prayer had been offered. Friday evening, both hands were useless, and it was hard to swallow. There was so much pain that I could not bear even the weight of a sheet, but racks were placed to hold the bed clothes. I fainted from the pain twice, while being transferred to the hospital.

The pain and helplessness increased to such an extent that by four o'clock Sunday afternoon, speech had been stopped and I could not swallow.

About 5 p. m., Sunday, the sisters at the Catholic (Leila Montgomery Hospital) removed the other patient from the room and asked permission to read the prayers for the dying. This was permitted and they were read by Sister Ancita.

Two doctors, A. M. Giddings, M. D. and Stanley Lowe, M. D. called attention to the purple coloring of feet and fingers. My eyes were set, jaws were set, and tongue was protruding. No sign of life was evident *BUT!* Praise the Lord for praying friends!

The young people in one room and the adult congregation in another room were uniting in prayer for me in the Church of the Four Fold Gospel, (S. R. Fostekew, pastor.) Also, a group in Grand Rapids and another in Three Rivers, Mich. were at that time praying for me.

Sister Fostekew, wife of our pastor, my father, Elmer F. Knowles, my mother, Ina Knowles, three sisters, Esther and Gladys Knowles and Mrs. Mildred Morrison and her husband, A. Z. Morrison beside nurses were about my bedside.

At 6:30 p. m., my eyes came open. Sister Fostekew gave me a little water and then I said, "I thought I was going to die. Now I know I am going to get well."

Life came into my fingers and by nine o'clock all paralysis and all pain had left. I could move about freely, talk easily and drink water. Next morning at least ten doctors besides many nurses came in to see and talk with me. I left the hospital Wednesday, walked up the walk and steps of my home, and went to choir practice on Friday evening. I have had no recurrence of the malady since I was healed, and I am in perfect health.—Laura Knowles, 37 East Van Buren St., Battle Creek, Michigan.

FLASHES FROM THE FLOOD Fred J. Greve

Newspapers have given news of a novel flood in Kentucky. All through the evening of July Fourth there had been signs of a pending storm. A strange tension seemed to be in the air. Suddenly the fury of the storm broke. Was this an ordinary rain storm? Far from it! The rain fell not in drops but in columns. But the startling truth, verified by countless people, was that the water came not only from heaven but also gushed up from the earth, even as in the time of Noah, hidden streams in the earth itself broke forth to add their artesian streams to the water from heaven. A phenomenon like this could only be from the hand of a mighty God. The slumbering folks were awakened to find water rushing through their yards and gardens. Before an escape could be made, many were washed out into the flood-out into eternity.

God is a God of judgment. He is rejected by many people of His creation. One man was ap-

proached after the flood and asked what he thought of God after seeing this flood. Rolling up his sleeves, he replied, "I wisht He was here right now; I'd take Him on!" This, I think, typically portrays the awful condition of the hearts of many of the people.

But such a catastrophe also brings forth many glorious testimonies of God's wonderful grace. At Van Cleve, Kentucky, there was a large two-story holiness Bible school building. That night eighteen people were staying in it. When they perceived that the flood was upon them, they tried to escape. Nine succeeded. But the doomed people in the building did not forget their Saviour. Witnesses said that as the building tore its fatal way down stream, the occupants rang the bell and sang and shouted praises to God. What a glorious testimony!

I talked to one quaint mountain man who said that his wife bemoaned the loss of their beautiful garden. He said to her, "We should be glad. This here is from God. Maybe now folks'll realize how pow'rful He is. We ain't lost nothin' that God can't replace."

One girl had carefully tended her little garden that she might raise enough funds to return to Peniel Bible School next year. All her work was washed away. Yet she cheerfully accepted it all—Jesus' love gave her that smile.

family and everything. Nevertheless, he walked up and down the street proclaiming Jesus. These folks too would have defied God, even as the first man, had not God changed them. He is wonderful!

On Monday following the flood we took the Peniel Bible School pick-up to Wilhurst and Van Cleve, Kentucky, to help the stricken folks. In the broiling sun people stood for hours in long lines hoping to receive some aid from the Red Cross. I saw one woman carrying a poor sick child. In despair she said, "I'm just at the end. She is sick and there is no water, and I don't know what in the world to do." Although others did not speak these words, their strained faces silently conveyed the same truth.

What to do? Oh, that they could only realize that Jesus could be their Hope—that only in Him can they find their comfort. Only Jesus gave the man grace to stand up and preach after his all was washed away by the flood. The glimpse of those desparate people in that awful condition stirred in me a desire to bring them that Jesus.

I only hope that as your read this it may give you a glimpse of the universal need for Christ—not only in Kentucky but everywhere. "Floods" of souls are awaiting. "Floods" of glory are yours if you make a sacrifice and proclaim the gospel. Let us "Flash" the message abroad.

Brother O. E. Nash, Superintendent of the Kentucky District Council, writes: "As far as we have been able to learn, none of our mountain stations were seriously affected, although this flood visited various sections where we have been working for sometime, and some of our mission people were drowned. It is without doubt the greatest catastrophe that has ever visited this part of the country."

Brother H. L. Sammons, Assistant Superintendent of the Kentucky Mountain work, writes from Sampson, Kentucky: "The very center of the flood was here at Sampson and at Wilhurst. Thirty-seven people were drowned within four miles of our cabin, ten within fifteen rods of us. Many of the thirty-seven attended our services. Nearly a hundred have been drowned. It was a local cloudburst and reached only about eight miles. There was another one in a county sixty or seventy miles from here about that time. Whole families were drowned. Nine in one family were all drowned except a boy of fifteen. was a solid wall of water twenty-five to thirty feet high. It took everything before it. None of our workers were lost. The water came up in our yard about ten feet, but not to the house, which is on high ground. It will be a means of revival here, I believe. Pray for us."

Accommodations

The two large dormitory buildings of Central Bible Institute will accommodate about 500 guests. Each room is equipped with two single beds and all will be furnished with bedding, etc. ready for occupancy. The cost is only \$3.00 per week for one person, or \$6.00 per week for one room. If all the rooms are not engaged by the week, and they should be desired on ly by the day, there will be a charge of 75 cents per person each day. Many of the rooms are already reserved but a good number are still available.

Other dormitory space will be prepared in class-rooms. These will be equipped with cots, and washroom facilities of course will be available. A cot may be obtained in these large rooms for only \$1.00 per week, but guests will have to bring your own bedding. For less than a week, the charge will be 25 cents a day.

Hotel rooms, tourist cabins, and rooming houses are available in the city and near the school for those who do not insist on living on the camp grounds. Tents may also be rented. Space for tents and trailers, fireplaces, firewood, rest rooms and showers will be provided free.
