Do we not see the same still in Europe What a and Asia? sight we have seen in this age of education and culture, millions at war! Others would take part in the violence, only they fear the consequences. Their

hearts are in it. So our day is "filled with violence" more than before the flood. Both so-called Christian nations and heathen are fighting each other.

There is a premium on violence today and the man who can invent the most deadly gun and the most terrible explosive is looked up to. Men give their names to guns. The earth is filled with violence! God must arise soon in judgment. Knowing the exact state of Noah's times Christ said, "As it was in the days of Noah, so shall it be also in the days of the Son of man." When is He coming? ### Christian Character a Qualification

We have been considering the subject of Christian character from several viewpoints. Let us think of it as a qualification in the scheme of Christian living, and trace its importance as suggested by some scriptures I shall read. Let us consider the two pictures together—one from a positive, the other from a negative point of view.

"Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honor to Him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and His wife hath made herself ready. And to her was granted that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white: for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints." Rev. 19:7, 8.

"And when the king came in to see the guests, he saw there a man which had not on a wedding garment: and he saith unto him, Friend, how camest thou in hither not having a wedding garment? And he was speechless. Then said the king to his servants, Bind him hand and foot, and take him away, and cast him into outer darkness; there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. For many are called, but few are chosen," Matt. 22:11-14.

By way of suggestion, remember that the called are always referred to as saved people. The very word translated "church" means the called-out ones. Look up the references concerning called, calling, call, etc., and you will find they refer to saved people. Food for thought.

When we consider this subject we must at once remember the difference between the divine nature and Christian character. If we do not, there is confusion and much of the process of building life and the necessary discipline loses its significance. Only as we keep the difference in mind and see the *need* of building character are we able to interpret many of the disciplinary measures God permits to come our way.

The divine nature of which we are partakers (2 Peter 1:4), the new creation, salvation, or new life (there are several terms to express it), that experience of salvation, is a *free* gift. "God so loved the world, that He gave . . . ." We become recipients of the new life and nature by faith in the finished work of Christ for us. We become babes in Christ by a new birth (a gift of God). We neither merit it nor can we earn, buy, or work for it. We receive it as a token of His love, grace and mercy. Praise His name! This new life of course is not fully developed in the individual, that is why we are called babes in Christ, and must grow. There are untold potential possibilities latent in the new creation and it is the desire of the Holy Spirit to develop them in the personality and life of the individual. For this reason He has baptized us in the Spirit and introduced us more fully into the life of the Spirit, and by His ministry and our co-operation He can lead the vielded heart into fuller and fuller revelation of Christ and His purpose.

The desire of God and the purpose of salvation are not merely to get a man saved and land him in heaven. The man's salvation is not unto heaven. (That is given to him as a place after death). Salvation is unto a conformity to God, His image and likeness. Remember, heaven is a condition before it is a location. Even if you consider heaven in purely material terms, as golden streets, etc., your power to enjoy, understand, and correctly fellowship there is first determined by condition. The disciples were very concerned about a material kingdom (which was right and will eventually come) but Christ corrected them and placed the emphasis where it belonged then and now. "The kingdom of God is within you." Luke 17:21. Heaven is never spoken of as the goal of Christian living, but perfection of Christian character is, and is clearly taught by Christ. "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." Matt. 5:48. Note the position of this statement in the teaching and discourse of Christ.

The work of the Spirit today is the conforming, molding and shaping of the individual into the likeness and image of God. He is after Christian character. "For whom He did foreknow, He also did predestinate to be comformed to the image of His Son." Rom. 8:29. "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord." 2 Cor. 3:18. "Beloved, now are we the sons of God (new birth, salvation), and it doth not yet appear what we shall be (the fuller development and growth of character)." I John 3:2. "Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." Eph. 4:13.

Here is where many Christians fail and lose sight of their objective in the technique, mechanism and method of trying to attain it. They become absorbed in the process and seemingly rest there and are defeated, not because they did not po but they did not relate the po with the objective. Do not be deceived, Christian character is never given as a gift. Righteousness is imputed to us on the basis of His redemption but never Christian character—this is the product of training, overcoming, discipline, trial, hardship, and intensive spiritual living. I can apply myself to intelligent and spiritual liv-

If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Col. 311

ing and build a character. He keeps the goal in mind (even when we fail to do so) and leads us through a thousand experiences to make *in* us a manifestation of His *life*. I cannot earn salvation, but by His grace I can *overcome* and thus become Christlike in life and character.

So let us keep this distinction in mind and not deceive ourselves by thinking because we have had certain genuine experiences, such as salvation, the Baptism in the Spirit, healing, or consecration, that any one or all can in themselves *give* us character. They are like a series of crises through which the Holy Spirit leads the hungry heart in its quest for truth. These experiences are open doors through which we pass (no one is finality). We must surrender to the *purpose* of the crisis—yield to the Holy Spirit and be *taught* and walk in the Spirit and possess our inheritance.

When we keep in mind the objective for the building of character and conforming to the likeness of God, we are able to understand more fully the movements of God in this dispensation. What He is doing in the life of the individual He is doing in the body during this dispensation. If I hold any other goal or objective in mind, such as the establishment of His kingdom on earth, the redemption of the political chaos, "making the world safe for de-mocracy!" or any other fine, good, religioussounding scheme, I am at once confused and end in defeat. I cannot trace God in any of these schemes. They sound noble, mighty, uplifting, and very religious, but they are not what God is doing just now. "Simeon hath declared how God at the first did visit the Gentiles, to take out of them a people for His name." Acts 15:14. This is the work of the Spirit in this dispensation.

Some will at once get jittery now thinking I do not believe in the salvation of souls and evangelism. Do not fear. There is a place absolutely for salvation and evangelism in the plan of this age, but He is not planning in this dispensation to redeem the world and usher in the kingdom. "Let both (wheat and tares) grow together until the harvest." However, He does want the note of the evangel to sound, clear and strong, to the ends of the earth (as a witness). That is why I am a lover of all missionary work. It is so genuinely Scriptural. The evangelist is needed to bring in fresh material, new-born babes for the body—all for building. The world is so needy—let us be thankful for any and every agency He can bless today in bringing broken humanity to God.

God is making a man. He is building a race. Look at Eph. 4:11-13. "And He gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a per-

fect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." Note the teaching here. The purpose is quite evident trom verse 12, "for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ," etc. Here we find all the gifts to the church as named are unto the perfecting of the body. All move unto a new man." It is clearly shown that it is the perfecting and maturing of the body He is after. Perfection here, or the word perfect, does not mean sinless perfection but rather being full-grown and mature.

I know people at times are annoyed at me for bringing this phase of truth to our attention. I have noticed so many times in meetings where they were all saved and nearly all baptized, the service moves nearly always along evangelistic lines. Even when they are all saved. This is no doubt due to tradition, custom, and religious habit. The dear saints have been told that beautiful story from so many angles they wonder if there can be anything MORE in the Bible for them now that they are saved. practice I am sure is not balanced. Count up the number of meetings during the past year devoted to evangelism and the first stages of truth, and over against it count up the meetings for the children of God, the saints-meetings of instruction, illumination, correction, building and feeding. I am very sure you do *not* strike a balance. Now be honest! Do not ask me to maintain a balance when there is none, please. Surely the sinner needs salvation—but O the body of Christ-weak, torn, undernourished, and so feeble!

"Is there no message for us?" so many ask me. I wish some of you could hear the confessions of need and the cry for food some saints (saved and baptized for years and fine workers too) pour into my ears. God placed a basket on my arm and also put something into that basket. Then He said, "Go out now and feed My sheep." So that is all I hope to do—share with you truths which have taken hold of me and revolutionized my life. My burden is for the sheep. In my heart I can hear them cry and bleat. Why do we find really dozens of evangelists to one teacher who can feed?

Let us turn to the text quoted from Rev. 19:7, 8. Here we find teaching about the Second Coming—but the picture is rather unusual. It is so different from the pictures usually given when one preaches on the Second Coming: As a rule the message revolves about the external aspect -dealing with the national and prophetic phases, the signs of the times, the return of the Jews, the restoration of the Roman kingdom, etc. But here we find a picture relating to His return and touching upon the most vital point as God sees it. are called upon to rejoice and be glad. Why? Is it because the Jews have at last all returned to Palestine? because the Roman empire has taken more definite form? because all the signs at last do focus properly? No, strange to say, although all these are accompanying features —the real feature is, "and His wife hath made herself ready."

From this text it looks as though He will come when He has something ready to come for. "Be ye also ready." It is a question of readiness, fitness. Look at the



next verse and find why she was ready. In what does this fitness consist? "And to her was granted that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white: for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints." The preparedness relates to a garment. I will read—it as it is given in the Greek and as rendered in the Revised Version. "And it was given unto her to array herself in fine linen, bright and pure, for the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints," or as some translations give it, "the righteous conduct of the saints."

Here is a beautiful and Scriptural illustration of the truth I am teaching. Salvation is always a gift, while character (a privilege granted) is a result of cooperation in building and arraying. We see at once this is not a garment of salvation—this is very evident. The garment of salvation was wrought out (or woven) on the loom of Calvary by Christ our Lord. He worked out the finished act of redemption; He made the garment of salvation. We never could. We had absolutely nothing to do with it—it was His work, noble, profound, and eternal. Amen!

In this text it says, "It was granted her"-a privilege-to array herself. It was something she could accept or reject -"to array herself"-something she could do. When we were saved it was Christ who put the garment of salvation upon us. It was Christ who made the garment and Christ who put it upon us. We stood still—poor helpless sinners. But here is a wedding garment which we weave. It says distinctly the linen is "the righteous acts of the saints." No righteous act of the saint ever made a garment of salvation. It says here it is the garment of a saint. (He is not talking about sinners, but the bride). It was her readiness, fitness, preparedness, qualifications which gave her this position. She has all the necessary training and equipment in character to move in this capacity and to hold this lofty place. She has passed all the tests and holds the qualifications necessary for this heavenly, spiritual, holy and sacred union. She is not a stranger to the atmosphere of this placeshe speaks the language of the Bridegroom. She has learned.

This garment speaks clearly of preparation. Is it a process, not a gift. How does one get it? He does not get it by going to the altar and saying, "I will now take a wedding garment," or "I will now take a

Christian character." That is quite impossible. But he may at the altar offer himself as a candidate for this lofty place and submit himself to the Spirit for the necessary discipline and training to thus qualify for it. Then will the Holy Spirit take him in hand and train him by way of the many experiences through which he is asked to go.

When we see this truth it helps us to RELATE (what a difficult thing) the many phases of service, the gifts, ministries, conduct, and LIFE as God sees them all—acting upon us. The whole scheme of life is reactionary. We are by creation reacting agents and God works from that point of understanding. All is unto the building, the arraying in fine linen (the "righteous conduct of the saints").

For a moment, keeping this line of truth in mind, review the story of the talents. Matt. 25:14-30. Did you ever notice what the man who gave the talents really was after? Be careful here and do not clutter your picture with all the pounds gainedyou will miss the point. It was the commendation, not the works. The works were there and necessary but wholly for the reaction found in the user of the talent. Look at verse 21. "His lord said unto him, Well done, thou good and faithful servant." Let us stop there now. Three commendable character-qualities had been wrought out in this man's life—Well done —not how much done. The quality, not Good servant—God-like. quality of God-likeness is found in him. Faithful servant-another qualification. No word as to the magnitude or extent of work. That was all a means unto an end. The end was the training of the man. Listen. "Thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord." You see it was qualification which made that possible. He was already a servant (not a sinner). The gifts and ministries are so alluring and captivating to some souls that they forget that all this, even tongues, shall pass away-but the likeness and character of Christ etched upon the mortal spirit abideth forever. Amen! The gift of salvation never qualifies a soul to reign and rule with Christ. Crowns are not given as souvenirsthey are won.

So in the picture of the Bride, she hath arrayed herself, made herself ready. Surely not for salvation-she is already saved and wears a garment of salvation. But she is now able to enter into the deeper reaches of fellowship with the Son. It is not a question of God's loving one soul more than another. He is not a respecter of persons-all may qualify if the soul so desire. "It was granted unto her"—a privilege. What could thrill a soul more or stimulate love and devotion to our adorable Lord than such a glorious experience? The new creation is made for the highest heaven may offer-then why not yield, and let life and all go under the leading yoke of the Spirit and He will conform us?

At once I know some are saying, "Ah! That is all too selfish, self-centered, and not as aggressive as we should be." I have heard that for years—but like Paul, "none of these things move me." Thirty some years ago, when God wonderfully baptized me in the Holy Spirit, He gave me under-

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# Cultivating Good Habits

Oswald Chambers

"And beside this, giving all diligence, add . . ." 2 Peter 1:5.

We are made partakers of the divine nature through the promises (see v. 4), now, says Peter, "giving all diligence, add . . screw your attention down and form habits. No one is born with habits, we have to form habits, and the habits we form most easily are those which we form by imitation. When we begin to form a habit we are conscious of it. There are times when we may be conscious of becoming virtuous and patient and godly, but that is only a stage; if we stop there we get the strut of the spiritual prig.

1. In the Domain of Menial Service "Jesus . . . took a towel . . . and began to wash the disciples' feet." John 13:3-5.

Are we refusing to enter the domain of enial service? Willingness to do such menial service? service is the touchstone of character. It is a menial service thing to be virtuous. Doing things of necessity, however, is not virtue. In such case there is no conflict, but virtue can be only the outcome of conflict. The virtuous man is the one who has gone through the fight and has added virtue, added it by the grace of the divine nature, not on the basis of mere human determination.

The greatest hindrance in our spiritual life lies in waiting while we look for big things to do. Jesus took a towel. We are not meant to be illuminated versions; we are meant to be the common stuff of ordinary human life exhibiting the marvel of the grace of God. The snare in the Christian life lies in our looking for the gilt-edged moments, the thrilling times. There are times when there is no illumination and no thrill, when God's angel is the routine of menial service on the level of towels and washing feet. Are we preparing to "move" Routine is God's way of keeping us saved between our times of inspiration. We are not to expect Him to give us His thrilling moments always.

2. In the Domain of Determination

"Abide in Me." John 15:4.

The secret of bringing forth fruit is to abide in Jesus. "Abide in Me," says Jesus, in spiritual matters, in intellectual matters, in money matters, in every one of the matters that make human life what it is. Beware of putting on religious blinkers, by saying, "I can live finely in this type of meeting, or with this particular set." The Christian life is not to be lived in a bandbox. We must live virtuously even when we are being tested by the whole of life. Are we preventing God from doing things in our circumstances because we imagine it will hinder our communion with Him? That is impertinence. No matter what our circumstances are, we can be as sure of abiding in Him in them as in a prayer meeting. We are not to be changing and arranging our circumstances. Our Lord and Master never chose His circumstances, but He was meek towards His Father's dispensation for Him. He was at home with His Father wherever His body was placed. Think of the amazing leisure of Our Lord's life!

For thirty years He did nothing particularly outstanding. We want to keep God at excitement point, there is none of the serenity of the life "hid with Christ in God"

"Abide in Me." Think of the things that might take you out of abiding in Christ-'Yes, Lord, I will abide when once I can get this finished; I will abide, but I must do this first; when this week is over, I shall be all right." Begin to abide now! In the initial stage abiding is a continual effort until it becomes so much the law of our lives that we abide in Him unconsciously. Watch it in your bodily life, in your social life-are you abiding there? are you bringing forth fruit there? That is where My Father is glorified.

Are our minds stayed on Jesus? Do we brood and dwell on this line of abiding in Him? It takes the breathless panic out of us. Our Lord was never in a panic because with Him the abiding on the inside was unsullied. It is the "plague of flies," mental, moral and spiritual, that annoys us and takes us out of abiding in Jesus. There is something in human pride that can stand big troubles, but we need the supernatural grace and power of God to stand by us in the little things.

The tiniest detail in which we obey has all the omnipotent power of the grace of God behind it. When we do our duty, not for duty's sake, but because we believe that God is engineering our circumstances in that way, then at the very point of our obedience the whole superb grace of God is ours. It is the "adding" that is difficult. We say we do not expect God to carry us to heaven on "flowery beds of ease," but we act as if we did!

We have to live in the domain of menial service by the power of God, and to learn to abide in Him where we are placed. Remember that God gives us the Spirit of Jesus, but He does not give us the mind of Jesus; we have to "form the mind of Christ." The Spirit of Jesus is given to us by the marvel of the Atonement. Then we

have to construct with patience that way of thinking which is exactly in accordance with the mind of our Lord. God will not make us think as Jesus thought, we have to do that ourselves, to bring "into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ." Peter's counsel to "add," means to form habits on the basis of the new life which God has

3. In the Domain of Devotion



# The Present War and Prophecy

LARGE number of earnest Christians are frankly puzzled at the events happening since this war began, and are asking questions as to where we are in God's plan for the world. Is this war Armageddon? Or is it going to lead up to Armageddon? Is the coming of Christ very imminent?

It is easy to dogmatize, but in answer to these queries we want to make a reverent investigation.

First of all there is no doubt that we are fast approaching the greatest crisis in the history of the world; the period which Daniel calls in his twelfth chapter "the time of the end."

Daniel foretold that in the closing days of this era there are to arise two dif-

ferent Leagues of Nations, one with its center in the old Roman Empire, and at its head a president or king, holding sway over ten outstanding nations. These "ten-toe" kingdoms of Daniel 2, or the ten horns of "the little beast" of Daniel 7, have their center in the confines of the old Roman Empire, whilst there is to be another league of nations in the North under the Prince of Rosh, Meshech and Tubal, that is to say Russia, who has associated with him a number of nations, from the East and in Asia-Minor. It is generally thought that Germany will be one of these nations.

Ezekiel 38 and 39 give the details of the rising and development of this Northern league: suddenly and unexpectedly the Prince of Rosh with his allies will swoop down upon Palestine with a view to capturing the

Near East and setting up an Empire there which may dominate the world. The Southern league of Nations will give battle to the Northern league of Nations, and the name of that battle will be "Armageddon."

It is important to realize that these two leagues have yet to come into being; and without prognosticating it may be this present war is to prepare the way for such events to happen.

The third event, which is of the utmost importance, is the likelihood, after this war, that Great Britain may be induced to relinquish her mandate over Palestine in favor of Italy. Should this happen then we may expect that which is predicted in Daniel 9:26, 27 to come to pass, namely: a covenant to be entered into between a prince of Italy and the Jewish race, giving them facilities for worship, etc., in their own land. That covenant is predicted to last seven years; after three and a half years, Italy will break the covenant, and then will come the period of great tribulation, outlined in Daniel 11, and referred to by our Lord in Matthew 24:21.

The Jewish race is the "key" to the

solving of the modern situation. For twenty-five years now they have been going back in fairly large numbers to their own land, and not only to Palestine, but to Egypt and Mesopotamia. We must remember that they have never yet possessed their possessions given to them by Jehovah, the God of Israel, in Genesis 15:18: "The seed of Abraham shall possess the land from the river of Egypt unto the great river, the river Euphrates." The eyes of the Jews are Zionward, and this anti-Semitic rage all over the world is being overruled to unsettle them and to restore them to the land. They are God's chosen people; and in the Kingdom of God,

when it is established, they are to occupy a very prominent and central position.

I wonder whether the nations of the world, or even Christians, have dwelt upon the following passage in Zech. 8:20-23: "Thus saith the Lord of hosts: It shall yet come to pass, that there shall come peoples, and the inhabitants of many cities; and the inhabitants of one city shall go to another, saying, Let us go speedily to intreat the favor of the Lord, and to seek the Lord of Host's: I will go also. Yea many peoples and strong nations shall come to see the Lord of Hosts in Jerusalem, and to intreat the favor of the Lord. Thus saith the Lord of Hosts: In those days it shall come to pass that ten men shall take hold out of all the languages of the nations, shall even take hold of the skirt of him that is a Jew, saying, We will go with you, for we have heard that God is with you" (R.V.).

At present the Jew is the most despised man on the face of the earth, but a day is coming when they will be the most sought-out men, after they have "looked unto Him whom they have pierced" and have become "all righteous."

Lastly, in the light of the above, it does seem that the very next great event cannot but be the appearing of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, in the heavens for His Church. For the past twenty-five years we have seen a strange and rapid declension in the spiritual life and the morale of so-called Christian nations, and some of us wonder why, in spite of prayer and personal effort, there is so little evidence at present of revival. Is it possible that Revelation 12:7-17 is now taking place, namely: the war in the heavenlies between that archangel Michael and his angels against the forces of evil? Is it possible that the devil and his angels are being cast upon the

earth? Certainly there is something strange and satanic about the present world upheavals. No one wants war, and yet the nations seem to be driven to the destiny which they do not want.

Is it because the "prince of this world"—"the god of this age"—is overruling things and organizing his powers against the final conflict between God and His Christ? Before that conflict comes to a head on this earth, if we are studying prophecy aright, we are to expect the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ into the air for His Church as predicted in 1 Thess. 4:15.

In the little while that remains to us, let us pray for and expect a new manifestation of the power of Pentecost, for it will be just like our God to grant to us, at the end of this Church age, a glorious manifestation of His divine power, a kind of recurrence of Pentecost; and on the top of that wave of blessing, the Church will hear the

trumpet sound, and will go up to meet the Lord in the air.

We cannot but believe that this passionate prayer for revival that is breaking out all over the world is God-given, and that if God has given to us this passion for prayer for revival, He is going to answer that prayer, according to our faith and expectations.

#### Obedience

Our blind obedience can be the very life of other souls. An engineer of a freight train received the amazing order: "Switch your train into the river." Blindly he obeyed, leaping from the train as it crashed over the embankment. Three minutes later the mail train thundered by. His simple act of blind obedience had saved hundreds of lives. Souls not yet born again are depending on our obedience to the whole Book.—D. M. Panton.

standing as to His desire and purpose along this line. And had it not been for the faithfulness of the Spirit to keep me true to that vision I should have been swept off my feet or completely discouraged. He keeps me under the power of the truth He gave then -absolute surrender, death to the old creation, the overcoming life, the spiritual life in a new creation, qualification for the fellowship of Christ in a new age, etc. In the meantime all my service, teaching and ministry have been means unto an end. It has mattered very, very little to me the form, size, and general display of the service I undertake—but the growth in the knowledge and wisdom of Christ has kept to the foreground.

It seems that only as one swings wholeheartedly into the meaning of qualifying and training is he swung free of the binding that too often comes with too intense and feverish attitudes of service.

God is not so concerned with how much we may do for Him, as He is with the question, What has all the service done To us in its reaction upon our nature and spirit? Did it all react in developing the man or woman into the person of faith, strength, love, and yieldedness He so desired to find? Did all the man did really mellow. subdue and conform that man into the new creature God wanted? According to our creation we are reacting agents and God is wonderfully interested at this point. What is all my conduct and ministry doing to this strange personality? It is continually registering upon my immortal spirit and weaving a garment. Shall it be a wedding

Now let us turn to the story given in Matthew 22. Here is a man without a wedding garment. As a rule this story is used to represent a sinner trying to move in the realm of salvation without the garment of salvation. But let us look at it more carefully. Get the setting of the story correctly. This chapter is so important in its relation to what precedes and follows. The public ministry of Christ has covered a period of three years and in a few days He will offer His life in a sublime testimony by a vicarious death. As never before it seems He is anxious to present to His nation the offering of God's grace, mercy and truth. And never before has the Jewish hierarchy shown more malignant opposition. On His way to Jerusalem He speaks several parables, all of which were to show them the supreme folly of rejecting Him as their Messiah.

We must remember that the parable has a double application: First, to the Jew as a body at His first advent; second, to the church at His second advent. So often preachers and teachers and evangelists are not careful or perhaps brave enough to make the application where it belongs. Sometimes tradition causes it too. How often the portions of Scripture containing teaching, admonition, correction, or warning for the Christian (because it is not pleasing) is turned over either to the sinner or the Jew. The poor Jew has his plate full now of scriptures some do not know just what to do with. It is convenient to have the sinner around to give certain bits of Scripture which might upset smug

theology or tradition. This picture does not relate to a sinner, as we shall see. He is giving truth for the saint—only it is not so pleasing.

Just as in the first application where we find the Jews (because of their own doings made themselves unworthy of the kingdom,) so at His second advent when the marriage supper is due, there are elements in the saved group who by their lack of preparation and qualification are unworthy of the fellowship and privilege offered in the picture of the marriage feast, etc. The There are analogy is here very clear. many Christians today who refuse the necessary discipline and training needed to qualify, while there are others who embrace the cross and suffer the loss of all things that they may satisfy the desire of God in getting a Bride worthy of the Son's fellowship. Note the words of the king, "Friend." He is not talking to a sinner about his sins. He says, "Friend." John 15:14. "Ye are My friends. . . " Sinners are never spoken of as friends, they are rebels. He does not rebuke or chide the man about his sins-it is rather a point of place or position. "How camest thou in hither?" Place, location!

The garment again speaks of character, and fitness. He had no fitness or adequate



degree of fellowship and understanding to move in the sphere of a wedding feast and all that this type suggests. He had no garment—no qualifying attributes to adapt himself to the order of life suggested.

And note too he is not cast into hell, sheol, gehenna, or the pit. "Outer darkness," is the word. The glory and light of the marriage feast is light. He is excluded from it or rejected. 1 Cor. 9:24. "Know ye not that they which run a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? run, that ye may obtain." (Note one does not run for salvation—it is not a prize. He runs because he is saved and is after a prize—the real goal.) If he is cast into the pit to be burned up, why bind him hand and foot? Here we find him in outer darkness and bound. The hands represent service. He is not qualified to serve in this realm. He may know service in the natural, religious life and service in the sphere of the flesh (natural and to some quite wonderful) but he does not know spiritual ministryso is bound. The feet represent the walk. He may have traveled thousands of miles in the energy and power of the natural life, and fairly exhausted himself. But he does not know the "walk in the Spirit." That was always too demanding and restricting for him. He may have walked all around the Lord but not with Him. So his feet are bound. He has no power to enter into such fellowship as is suggested by the picture. And alas! He might have

had. What a mercy he is cast out. God is yet kind to him not to subject him to the embarrassment and confusion of face to find himself TRYING to fit in where he has absolutely no qualifications. It would not be love for a principal of the High School to take a fourth or fifth grade child and place him in a class of university students. That would not be love. God does no such cruel thing. We are now qualifying, and God will place each soul in the realm for which he has fitted himself.

Can you imagine the disappointment and ache in the heart of Jesus to find in that day that so many have not valued His deepest fellowship enough to cultivate and build a life for it here and now? God does not arbitrarily say, "You go to heaven; you go to hell. You reign over ten cities; you are cast out. You may enjoy the king-dom; but you can't come in." That is silly and very un-Scriptural. Each soul determines his own destiny. The sinner goes to hell because he so chooses. The saint has or has not the rewards of fellowship and future association because he either does or does not desire it. The carnal Christian even though baptized in the Spirit may be saved, but miss the reward and glorious

privilege Christ holds out for him.
"He that is spiritual" suffers the loss of all things that he may know Christ in the deeper and fuller relations. The garment is the Christian character wrought in us by the Spirit as we surrender. "Thou hast a few names even in Sardis which have not defiled their garments; and they shall walk with Me in white: for they are worthy."

Rev. 3:4.

Do not confuse the gift of salvation with character. No one experience can change you so you are thus qualified. The prize is given to him that overcomethnot "to him that is saved, or baptized, or is a great worker." Look at Rev. 2:7, 17, 26, and Rev. 3:12, 21. All this relates to the saints overcoming and thus qualifying -not to a sinner's getting saved.

In the face of this message there comes a challenge to any Spirit-filled saint. Could God hold out to us a more lofty and glorious life? One encouraging feature I find among our Pentecostal folk is the hunger and desire on the part of so many for something more than the initial teaching of salvation and Acts 2:4 and the general line of truth given to the babes in Christ. God has given us Pentecostal people a wonderful and most responsible message. By His grace let us enter more fully into the power of its meaning. These are preparation days and He is AFTER US-His people.

We are looking to Him and long for His return but remember the scripture, "And His wife hath made herself ready. The days are trying and God is leading His own into trials and testings and is faithfully disciplining the souls who dare and love Him enough to die and let go the natural, thus to live in Him and discover the joy and wonder of a walk with the adorable Lord.

upon them, as travail upon a woman with child." There is a period of travail before birth, a warning of coming events. God is

putting intuition into the hearts of His people as to the coming of Christ. But they must have the attitude of Simeon and of Anna in order to get this revelation. The scribes knew the letter, but Simeon had the Spirit revealing.

Woe came to those who had only the letter, but the Spirit caused Simeon to say with joy, "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word; for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation." Seeing the salvation of the Lord will promote the cry, "Lord, now let Thy servant depart." Earth will lose its holding power. The thought of this same Jesus coming in like manner, will inspire the cry, "Let Thy servant depart." The holding power of earth is more than matched by the drawing power of heaven!

"Now let Thy servant depart." John supplemented it with "Even so, come, Lord Jesus!" The crying to depart, the cry for Him to come! Both are necessary. In the meantime, be faithful Noahs. He was a faithful preacher of righteousness. If you cannot preach, use the hammer; and if you can't use the hammer use the pencil. Keep under the shelter of the Blood, working and looking for Him!

Noah had to make the ark true to measurements. He used his pencil and every kind of necessary tool. So in the spiritual, God "gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ." Noah's tools never quarreled. They were in the hands of the master builder. This unity among Noah's tools is a lesson to us all. With God's saints today every tool is both necessary and important. Every man, every servant needs to be in his place.

The pitching time will soon come, when the final touches will be put to the ark. Fire is required to melt the pitch that it may be spread. Fire is required when you come to the final stage. See that the fire does not go out.

On the one hand violence is multiplied on the earth; on the other hand, the ark is growing and developing. By faith Noah prepared an ark. Faith is the main preparation. Hast thou faith? When the Son of man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?

### Thirty-Three Years Robert A. Brown, New York City

Thirty-three years ago, on May 5th, 1907, at 10:30 in the morning, we held our first service and, ever since, have continued day and night, summer and winter, in getting souls saved for Jesus. Needless to say, we have had some varied experiences and tests since the opening of the work. Our first opening was in a hall at 416 West 42nd Street. God gave us souls that very first day and, from them until now, in our normal meetings, we have had the same results, of souls coming to God. In a little while the hall became entirely too small and we moved to another location, at 454 West 42nd

Street, which was larger.

But the revival spirit grew and souls were added continually, according to the Scriptures, such as were saved. We then rented the entire building and enlarged the seating capacity by extending the building twenty-

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five feet in the rear and removing the second floor, having a balcony extended across the entire width of the front of the hall. The upper part of the building was used for a missionary home. Still the work of God advanced and soon the place became inadequate to hold the people at times of conventions, making it necessary to rent casinos and larger places to accommodate the people

Having the vision of a still greater work, we started a building fund and in 1921 bought our present Tabernacle at the cost of \$105,000.00. This step meant great faith, determination and launching out on God's promises to supply all the needs, for, in addition to the purchase price, repairs to the extent of several thousand dollars were necessary on the building because the auditorium had not been used for a number of years, which, when completed, left us to carry a mortgage of \$75,000.00, on which we paid six per cent annually. Through prayer, and because our people had a mind to work, God miraculously enabled us to liquidate the entire debt in four years, and today, to God be the glory, the property is free from debt.

Sister Brown and I promised the Lord, if He would help us to clear off the mortgage, that, as far as in us lay, God being our helper, we would make Glad Tidings Tabernacle a missionary church, from which the Light of the Gospel would radiate not only to all about it, but to the uttermost parts of the earth. Our missionary offerings have been nothing short of miraculous, because we do not have any rich contributors. From the congregation of Glad Tidings Tabernacle we have sent for the support of missionaries over \$14,000.00 yearly, and through the depression and everchanging conditions of the times God has enabled to meet our obligations to Him and the missionaries.

Another feature of our work which God has blessed is the broadcasting of the full Gospel each Sunday, from 3:30-4:30 p. m., over the 1000 Watt Station, WINS, 1180 kilocycles, thus enabling us to increase our ministry to the possibility of reaching over twenty-five million people, incurring an added expense of \$5,200.00 yearly. And yet the work is going on.

We have no words to express the gratitude of our hearts for the goodness of God to us. We want to give our testimony, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." The command of God seems to be the same to us as it was to Moses; namely, that we speak to the Pentecostal people, that they "Go forward!" That is just exactly what

we are doing, and will do as long as God gives us the needed strength.

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### North India Missionaries and Workers Convene

Progress through unity keynotes twentieth annual missionary convention of North India; Hindustani convention accents Pentecostal holiness and power

This year some of us came together for our annual convention fearing perhaps our services might "fall flat," inasmuch as we had no special speaker. Praise God, He is not limited to special speakers through whom to send blessings or to feed His flock! We believe this was the most outstanding convention we have enjoyed in years.

Although it was not so, it seemed that the speakers must have planned their messages together, so great was their harmony in thought and theme. Through the guidance of the Spirit, the keynote of almost every message was the necessity and possibility of progress through unity.

As the precious Word was given out each day, we were made to realize that we must die to self; that the way to power is the way of holiness; and that we ourselves must be in the place of victory and liberty if we are to set others free. Our faith was stirred to believe that He shall see of the travail of His soul, even here in India, and be satisfied. Praise the Lord, God's Word cannot fail!

We found ourselves silent before the Lord as God dealt with many of us in a new way, making us, as missionaries, realize the need of working together in absolute unity and singleness of spirit; and not only this, but also the need of pushing our Indian brothers and sisters to the front.

Some felt that even as John the Baptist had said of Christ, "He must increase and I must decrease," so our attitude toward our workers should be "They must increase but we must decrease." Our efforts must be directed toward the establishment of a strong, indigenous church in North India.

#### Practical Results

While the morning and evening services were devotional, the afternoon services were practical, in that both evangelistic and institutional work throughout North India were represented. Our hearts were lifted up as we heard Robert McClay's account of the

wonderful break in Ranchi District during the past year, and we drew encouragement from John Lewis' report of the work in Colonelganj. Notes of blessing and victory came from other districts as well.

One of the speakers at the convention said God did not appear to Moses in "scattered twigs" but in a "burning bush." So we feel that, with our hearts aflame in a united effort for God in this land, India will surely behold the Saviour. One effort which we made in this direction was the formation of an evangelistic band which is to put forth concentrated effort in both cities and villages of North India.

To make this plan workable, pledges for the support of this band were taken. Our hearts were deeply touched when the Girls' Industrial School of Siswa Bazar gave the first and largest individual amount toward the financial backing of the Evangelistic Band.

Since our convention was held in the winter, the missionaries' children were able to attend. Their joyous, youthful spirit was refreshing to all. We are now planning young people's meetings in conjunction with our missionary convention next year.

#### Hindustani Convention

For the second time our Indian workers had full control of their own convention, and how splendidly they managed! They organized themselves, elected their chairman, secretary, and treasurer. So well did they handle the financial end of their convention that they not only met their expenses but had a good offering to give their convention speaker. We consider these things all fine training for the future self-governing and self-supporting Indian church.

The spiritual tenor of the meetings was precious. Messages on holiness, the deeper life, and the need of Pentecostal power in lives and ministry gripped the hearts of all. Many tarried in the after meetings until the "wee hours" of the morning, and one dear little Indian sister received her Baptism.

The vision of the Evangelistic Band and its splendid possibilities reached their hearts also and, in spite of their small resources, they made up a pledge to help support it. This meant a real sacrifice on the part of many.

We are looking forward to this coming year as a time of advancement of His kingdom in India. We praise Him for the encouragement we have received, and should be very glad if all our friends would give us special backing in prayer as we undertake new ventures for Him that His power and glory may be revealed.

#### FEEDING THE SHEEP OF LIBERIA

"Why can you never come to preach to us? You stay so long now and you never come yet." This, Anna Stafsholt reports, has been the constant reproach of the Tuobo and Sabbo people of Liberia. Accordingly it was finally arranged to visit them during the holiday period between school sessions.

"Going on an evangelistic tour in Liberia," declares Miss Stafsholt, "is quite different from such a trip at home. We must carry cots, bedding, mosquito nets, pots, pans, dishes, kerosene stove, kerosene, gasoline for the lantern, food for the duration of our stay, empty tins for water, folding tables and chairs, clothing, books, and on and on ad infinitum. The wonder of the whole business is that we ever get packed, let alone actually arrive anywhere.

"But somehow we did manage, and not many days later we were settled in Tuobo where we remained four days. During this time God marvelously blessed. The meetings were well attended, and we had a communion service, the first ever partaken of there. During this service a backslider was gloriously reclaimed. After five years of heathenism, he boldly stood and declared, 'I want to be Jesus' friend.'

#### Among the Sabbo Christians

"From Tuobo to Sabbo is a five-hour trek. Two hundred and fifty miles? No, indeed! Only about twelve—but those twelve miles were real jungle trails overgrown with sword-grass, with vines hanging from trees, abounding with thorns and briars. Logs must be climbed over or crept under, swamps and streams must be crossed. Twelve miles in five hours is not bad time at all under those conditions.

"In due time we arrived, tired, dusty, and thirsty, but happy because of the splendid welcome the Sabbo Christians gave us. We settled in a house at the edge of the mission town, got supper, freshened up, spent a little time in prayer, and were ready for the evening service.

"A day was set for the communion service. The Kitteabo Christians came and, after a time of heart searching, we served forty-three besides the students with us. One woman was so blessed she could hardly control herself. A short time ago she knew nothing of God! Today she and many others have the knowledge of sins forgiven.

"Although it was the busy farm season, hardly a Christian missed morning or evening prayer during our two weeks there. Often they lingered long at the altar, reaching out after God. Many are seeking the infilling of the Holy Spirit. Will you not join with us in prayer for them and the countless others like them?"

#### NICARAGUA WORK SHOWS PROGRESS

in Nicaragua. "We rejoice to note a substantial growth during the past year. One hundred and one conversions were reported. At least thirty of these were baptized in water and added to the fellowship of the churches, while fifty-four are reported as preparing for baptism.

"Twenty-two believers received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit during the year. A growth in the work which cannot be reckoned by numbers is the deepening of spiritual life and stability in the churches.

"Immediately following the conference we conducted a course of Bible classes for the benefit of deacons and Sunday School teachers, seeking to give special instruction which would help them perform their duties and increase the knowledge of the Word of God among the believers. Thirteen people studied six hours daily for two weeks, and we were well satisfied with the results of this effort.

"We are much concerned about entering the unevangelized territory to the north. Little by little we have seen the gospel advance in that direction. This last year five were baptized in water in a town of that region, yet we have not been able to enter as we desire. We are planning a trip there later. Will you pray definitely with us that God will open the doors so we may be able to begin a work in one of the main towns of that section?"

#### LOOKING BACK IN CEYLON

"The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad." Thus begins our latest news from the Cliffords and Kathryn Long in Colombo, Ceylon.

"We surely praise the Lord," they continue, "for all His loving kindness and goodness to us during the past year. We remember the glorious revival that the Lord gave us in Colombo in the fall, when about forty-seven came to the altar for salvation, eleven received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit, and eight followed the Lord in waters of baptism. The whole church was revived at that time and some backsliders returned to the Lord.

"Since then we have seen a number more coming to God to be saved, among them three young Sinhalese. In November we held three days of special meetings at Ketetenna outstation among the tea and rubber plantation workers. These people have only two holidays a year, so we must never let slip an opportunity to speak to them.

"Over fifty gathered together during the three days of fellowship and waiting upon the Lord. Many sought the Baptism in the Spirit and some seemed very near. Five came to the altar for salvation, praise God!

"A tour of the up-country districts enabled us to have fellowship with many believers and to encourage them in the Lord. Then six days of special meetings in Colombo were blessed in that three souls came forward for salvation.

#### Joyous Holidays

"The Christmas and New Year's holidays were filled with many activities, especially among the children of course. The day school children gave an excellent program of Tamil action songs and a few English choruses. December 21 saw the church well filled for the English Sunday School program, and the day following found us in Bambalapitiya for the program of the Sinhalese and Tamil children.

"Program after program marked our days, and of course each one was made particularly joyous by the giving of little things—pieces of cloth, and small bags of cake and sweets.

"Christmas eve was spent in singing Christmas carols and hearing how we got these wonderful Christmas hymns. God blessed us in all our services of Christmas day, confirming His Word and making His presence known to our hearts.

"We had the joy of dedicating a new building to the Lord during these holidays. A few miles from Colombo, on the outskirts of a Buddhist village, a Christian lawyer bought a piece of land and erected a building called the Nazareth Gospel Tabernacle intended to be used as a day school during the week, and as Sunday School and church on Sundays.

"About one hundred and fifty people attended the simple dedication service. We gathered outside the doorway, sang a hymn, read the Scriptures, and prayed the dedicatorial prayer. Then the brother who gave the land and building cut through the paper streamers which held the gate closed, and opened it for the glory of God and the extention of His kingdom. We trust that in this building given to the Lord many may find the Lord Jesus as their own personal Saviour.

#### Beginning the New Year

"At ten o'clock on New Year's eve we gathered for the watch night service. A large crowd filled the floor of the tabernacle, extra chairs were soon occupied, and a number went up into the balcony.

"We had a blessed time of praising the Lord in song, followed by Scripture reading, prayers, and testimonies. Notes of sorrow, struggles, and trials were heard, but through it all rang a joyous refrain of praise to our faithful God who has led us safely on

who has led us safely on.

"A message from the Word was followed by the Lord's Supper, the majority of those present partaking of the Communion as the old year went out and the new one began. While all were on their knees an appeal was made for the unsaved to surrender to the Lord. Two responded, praise the Lord.

"We praise God for His wondrous kindness toward us. He has blessed our labors which the friends at home made possible. The work has grown and prospered, and we know that we shall reap greatly if we faint not, bless His holy Name!"

#### DAYS OF TESTING IN SOBRAL

O. S. Boyer, Sobral, Brazil, asks those in the homeland to remember them definitely in prayer at this time, that the Work of the Lord may continue to go forward and that the power of Satan shall not prevail.

"The past month," he writes, "has been full of testings and trials, and we thank the Lord for victory thus far. Persecution has come from all sides. While we were in Camocim the work was left in charge of a new Brazilian worker, Brother Joao Alves who, with his wife, is baptized in the Holy Spirit. Upon our return, we found that the priest, jealous of the large crowds, had come with a mob and the meetings had been completely closed.

"Now the authorities are saying that not only have they no orders to protect us, but rather to close all our services. They are also threatening to jail this worker. Nevertheless, we have had well-attended services since then, and we trust God to move on in victory against all opposition.

"We praise God for His care in keeping us safe. Brother Phinheiro recently knelt in prayer for some time before anyone realized that he was kneeling over a four-foot rattle-snake. As we regarded the sixteen rattles after the snake had been killed, we remembered the promise of God and praised Him for His wonderful faithfulness.

"One of our Brazilian brothers writes that his recent preaching trip was greatly blessed of the Lord, at least twelve having come to the Lord for salvation. Although he was suffering greatly with fever and lung trouble, he continued the journey and the Lord graciously healed him in answer to prayer."

#### GOD GIVES VICTORY IN EGYPT

Hugh Cadwalder, superintendent of the Egyptian District Council, reports victory in the work in that field. In his last trip into Upper Egypt he visited churches which had been almost at a standstill for some time, but found them now on fire for God, great crowds attending the services, sometimes as many as a thousand eagerly listening.

In one church which holds about eight hundred, the people filled every available space and many stood out on the street. There was no possible place for an altar call, so they were asked to raise their hands if they desired and meant to get right with God. Over four hundred responded at once.

Mr. Cadwalder and his interpreter arrived in one village about nine o'clock in the morning. Upon asking for the pastor, they were told he was still in the prayer room where he had been all night. Later they learned that several had received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit that night. Fifteen had received during that week, making sixty filled with the Spirit since the first of the year.

In one village where there is no church of any kind, where elderly men did not know Jesus from Mohammed, and where none of our missionaries or Egyptian workers had ever gone, God began to work in wonderful ways. Over fifty have received the Holy Spirit, praise the Lord! When one of the missionaries visited there, they had almost enough money to build their church, and over sixty took the Lord's Supper. In still another place, twenty-six received the Baptism in ten days. All these marvelous things have happened since the first of the year.

The great problem is lack of money, inasmuch as most of the work is among the Fellaheen class. These people are the poorest of the poor, working for ten to twenty cents a day. It is impossible for them to help much, so let us all pray that God will meet this need.

# \*\* SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Manasseh's Sin and Repentance

Lesson for June 2. Lesson Text: 2 Chronicles 33.

Oh, that twentieth century America might study the life of Manasseh, King of Judah! How it gives the lie to false and shallow conceptions of sin! How insistently it proclaims the inescapable truth that though man may be forgiven for sin, he cannot undo its awful consequences! How it confirms God's immutable law that "whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap!"

MANASSEH'S SIN 2 Chron. 33:1-10.

No sin was too great for Manasseh. He wiped out his father's good influence. He revived the worship of Baal. He embraced every conceivable form of idolatry and spiritual wickedness. He profaned the temple of God. But this was not all! His guilt was intensified because—

He sinned in spite of the fact that he had a godly father. Hezekiah had been one of the saintliest kings of Judah. How dreadful to despise one's God-given privileges! "For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall much be required." Luke 12:28. Privilege brings responsibility and those children who have spurned the opportunities of a godly home shall be far more guilty in the day of judgment than children born in heathendom!

He sinned in spite of repeated warning, 2 Chron. 33:10; 2 Kings 21:16. Though he had determinedly turned his back on God, though he recklessly abandoned himself to a career of flagrant evil, yet God was merciful in sending him messenger after messenger to woo him back to pardon and peace in Father's house. Did he appreciate it? Nay! "He . . filled Jerusalem from one end to another" with the "innocent blood" of those who would have turned him from his wicked ways! A young man was about to leave his home for a night of sinful revelry. "Don't go, Son!" cried his aged father. But the young man was determined. "Get out of the way, Dad," he said. "If you go, Son, you'll have to step over the body of your father." The old man lay down in the doorway. son heartlessly stepped over his body and went out into the night. God unjust? Ah, no! He has done everything necessary to keep men from eternal ruin. If men go to hell, they do so

over the body of God's own Son.

He did not sin alone. When Charles II was restored to the throne of England, the court life was changed into a brothel. Charles lived in open adultery, and the degeneracy of the throne led to the degeneracy of the kingdom. So it was in Judah. Manasseh not only fell but he led a nation into spiritual ruin. 2 Chron. 33:9; 2 Kings 21:9.

"None of us liveth to himself." Rom. 14:7. Regardless of our station in life each of us in our daily living exerts a never-dying influence on other lives. We cannot sin without involving others. The fact is inescapable! What did Jesus say about the matter? "It is impossible but that offences will come: but woe unto him through whom they come! It were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and he cast into the sea, than that he should offend one of these little ones." Luke 17:1, 2. Let us pray with the Psalmist "Teach me thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path because of those which observe me." Psalm 27:11 (margin).

### MANASSEH'S REPENTANCE 2 Chron. 33:11-19.

Its occasion. Why is it that men persist in sin? Solomon gave the answer (Eccl. 8:11)—"Because sentence against an evil work is not executed

speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men is set in them to do evil." So it was with Manasseh. But the time came when he began to reap for his sin. As one writer aptly puts it, "Retribution slipped in by the guards at the door one day, and took the king rudely by the shoulders. It shook him so roughly that his crown fell from his head. Then it dragged him from his throne, dressed him in chains, and sent him a captive into a foreign country." See verse 11.

Its evidence. When man will not yield to the gentle wooing of the Spirit, nor submit to the authority of God's Word, God often uses methods no less loving but more severe in order to bring man back to Himself. For that reason affliction came to Manasseh. What effect did it have? Suffering only makes some men more rebellious and wicked, but not so with Manasseh! In his case affliction turned to blessing. Deep had been

his guilt. Equally deep was his repentance. "He humbled himself greatly before the God of his fathers, and prayed unto him."

Its results. "And he was intreated of him, and heard his supplication." Not only did God save this man. He restored him to his throne as well! And no man ever strays so far from God, nor lives so long in sin, but that if he returns from the "far country" in true repentance, a loving Father will receive him and restore to him the peace and shelter of Home!

WHAT MANASSEH COULD NOT DO

Manasseh the sinner became Manasseh the saint. With fervent zeal he tried to undo and atone for the havoc his sins had wrought in the nation. He destroyed the altars he had erected to false gods. He repaired the altar of the Lord and attempted to lead his people back to the God he had come to know.

But did he succeed? Ah no! He discovered that it was easier far to lead people down to the pit of spiritual destruction than it was to bring them up again to the mount of God. He was blood-washed and pure. But he suffered hell on earth; for he had to stand by in utter help-lessness and watch the nation crumble and go to ruin because of his evil influence. "I will cause

them to be removed into all the kingdoms of the earth because of Manassch." Jer. 15:4. He could not even save his own household. He had led his own son into idolatry. But he could not lead him to God. 2 Chron. 33:21-25!

A young girl was converted and wanted to join the church. Her mother refused to allow her to do so, for she wanted her daughter to have a "Coming out" party and dance. And so the girl did not join. Three years later the minister attended the funeral of that same girl. She had gone back into sin because of her mother, and had died as a result of that sin. On the way home from the funeral the heart-broken mother repented and found Christ. She said to her other daughter, "Mary, I have found the salvation that I rejected three years ago." "No, Mother," answered Mary, "you have found salvation, it is true. But it is not the salvation you would have had three years ago. Your salvation then would have included the salvation of Nellie. Now it means only the salvation of yourself."

Manasseh, David (2 Sam. 12:9-14), Esau (Gen. 25:29-34; Heb. 12:16, 17), and multitudes of others testify to the solemn

fact—"Repentance will bring us salvation whenever we repent, but there is one thing that repentance cannot do. It cannot save us from the consequences of our sin!"—J. Bashford Bishop.

#### CONFESSION

A wealthy Bostonian, converted at one of Mr. Moody's meetings, resolved to keep his conversion secret. At an aristocratic dinner-party at which he was present, the conversation turned, with ridicule, on Mr. Moody; and then passed into sneers at our Lord and His cross: until, with the new life in him able to bear it no longer, the gentleman rose, trembling in every limb, and exclaimed: "I do not wish to seem rude, but I can be silent no longer. The old 'tabernacle,' at which you are sneering, is the spot where God showed me my sin, and where He led me to Christ, whom I believe to be the very Son of God, and in whose merits and blood I am resting for pardon and life. As I do not wish to disturb the freedom of your party, I beg my host's leave to retire from this table."

#### THE BIBLE

An English Earl was once talking with a native chieftain in the Fiji Islands. "You are a great chief," said the Earl; "but you are a fool to listen to an exploded Book, and the absurd story of the Crucified." The old

Chief's eyes flashed, and he answered: "Do you see that great stone yonder? On that stone we used to smash our victims' heads to death. Do you see that over beyond? In that oven we roasted our enemies for feasts. Sir," he concluded, "if it had not been for the great love of Christ, changing us from savages into children of God, you would never have left this spot alive."

#### PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY

From an Alexandria, La., newpaper comes the report that Governor O'Daniel, referring only incidentally to his candidacy for a second term, devoted his entire regular Sunday broadcast in Texas on April 7 to renewal of his "Go To Church" campaign. Urging listeners to attend Sunday services, the Governor read a letter he had received from a convict, since electrocuted, who said: "I am going to the electric chair because of my parents' failure to take me to Sunday School and church." The convict, J. W. Rickman, also said he hoped a State law would make teaching of Bible truths mandatory in public schools. What excuse will parents and educational authorities have to offer when the downfall of young lives is put to their charge in the great day of reckoning?

### THE DYING WORLD AND LIVING WORD

#### YOUTHFUL CRIMINALS

According to *Prophecy Monthly*, a report prepared by Dr. Thorsten Sellin, University of Pennsylvania criminologist, and recently issued by the American Law Institute, said that American youths from 16 to 21 years of age doubled their expected quota in robberies and thefts, trebled it in burglaries, and nearly quadrupled it in auto thefts during the past two years. The report said that the situation is "worthy of the deepest concern." But conditions will grow increasingly worse unless more is done to win our youth for Christ.

#### BRITISH AND GERMANS

The secretary of the London Missionary Society, A. M. Chirgwin, has received a letter from a German missionary who was a colleague in the Madras Conference in 1938: "Your letter was for me an unspeakable joy and encouragement. Take my heartfelt thanks for your great faithfulness. I assure you of the same from my side towards yourself and the other brethren. We meet every day in our prayers before the Throne of our common Lord, in the same faith and in the unity, which cannot be destroyed. The fellowship in Christ remains in spite of all darkness. The faithfulness of our churches towards missionary work is unparalleled."

#### ONE GOOD EFFECT OF WAR

Along with the many evil effects of war comes the solemnizing effect it has on some. According to the Christian Herald (England), the war is causing some British preachers to return to "the old paths" of the gospel. Writes one minister: "There was the time when the big thing to do was to convert people to modern ideas of the Bible; another time when the immediate task was to Christ's teaching to social and economic problems; another time when pacifism was the remedy for a war-threatened world. Now that Antichrist is rampant, one realizes that the really big thing to do it to preach the only full gospel, the gospel of redemption from sin and fear and death and hell through the grace of God in Jesus Christ."

#### THE WAR AGAINST CHRISTIANITY

The following letter appeared recently in the ondon Times: "We are face to face with new London Times: and vigorous faiths which walk the world naked and unashamed. There is the faith of Karl Marx, who taught years ago that economic values alone are real, and that the Christian religion is a fairy tale, just so much dope handed out by the possessing classes to the workers. Is it not the case Germany among the Nazis, in Italy among the Fascists, in Spain among the now dominant Falange, that those who believe that material values are alone real are as dominant and as unashamed as they are in Russia? The Roman Catholic Church may appear to hold a proud position in Italy and in Spain, but it is undermined. Those in power do not believe in truth, and they do not believe in goodness, and they do not believe in eternal life. They have utterly rejected Christ and Christianity, though as yet they may pretend otherwise.

"In the East we only see the same reign of violence and hideous cruelty—Japan advancing on its benevolent mission of civilizing by blasting the fragments of the limbs of women and children against their shattered homes. Do we truly realize to what a small area of the world at the present moment the once conquering religion of Christianity has been driven back? Do we truly realize that these new forces, with all their diverse origins, are alike in this, that they see in Christianity, and still more in the Gospel of Christ, their greatest and most dangerous enemy? By persecution, by murder, if need be, by the concentration camp, they will extirpate it if they can."

#### SCANDINAVIAN JEWRY

With the invasion of Scandinavia by Germany, a further 16,000 Jews are exposed to the ruthlessness of Nazi Jew-hate. The Jewish Chronicle states that there are about 6,000 Jews in Denmark alone. Norway has only about 2,000 Jews, of whom 850 are in Oslo and the remainder are in Bergen and Trondheim. With the German occupation of Denmark a haven for refugees has been lost, for the Danes allowed refugees to enter their land and a large Government grant was made in 1938 to help refugees. In the first week of Nazi rule, the Gestapo (Nazi secret police) were busy in Denmark, acting on the basis of lists of names compiled well in advance. Jews in peaceful Scandinavia were not as immune to the cruelties of anti-Semitism as they imagined. The day of Jacob's Trouble is surely drawing very near.

#### CHRISTIANS AND ANTI-SEMITISM

One of the last appeals of Dr. Mark Matthews, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Seattle who died Feb. 5, was: "America should never tolerate racial prejudice. Let me appeal to the Christian people to awake to their sense of duty and responsibility. The House of Israel is in danger! Awake! Answer the bugle call and march forth, guaranteeing liberty, freedom, rights, and protection to the House of Israel." he had raised the warning against anti-In gratitude for this, the Jewish Transcript of Seattle printed his picture and gave nearly two full columns to a warm tribute. "Such declarations have a profound impression on the Jews, for most of them think the average Christian is anti-Semitic," says one who has done gospel work among them.

#### JEWISH GRATITUDE

The London periodical, Trusting and Toiling, reports that some three hundred German-Jewish ex-service men, exiled in England, lately expressed their gratitude as follows: "People of Great Britain, we thank you for the hospitality, liberty and justice which we enjoy as your guests, for the right to live which you have given back after years of darkness. And when we say, 'People of Great Britain, God bless you!' these words are a promise which we shall translate into deeds. We promise you to live our lives modestly and honorably. We promise to bring up our children insuch a way that there will be no need for you ever to regret that you have opened the gates of your Motherland to us."

Such gratitude is a reward in itself. Yet a greater reward will come from God, for He has promised definite blessing to those who befriend the Jews, Gen. 12:3.

#### IN AN AMERICAN UNIVERSITY

About a year ago Dan Gilbert, youthful Christian author, was invited to speak at the chapel period of a "great" university in the Eastern States, reports King's Business. His subject was, "God in Our Generation," and as attendance was compulsory a large number of students listened to the Bible message. Afterward the university president said to him: "While it was interesting, your address was quite out of the ordinary; in fact, rather irregular. To my knowledge, it has been at least two years since any one dealt with the idea of God in such a way as to convey the impression that our thinking regarding Deity should be dictated by Biblical teachings. Generally, we regard religion as a private matter, and one man's concept of God is as good as another's. We do not think the students should be indoctrinated with 'authoritarian' principles of religion." With a university head holding such an attitude toward God's eternal Word, is it safe for American parents to allow their children to enter our "great" universities?

#### WHY BRITAIN WAS DEFEATED

The following report from the Christian Herald of England may be the explanation of Britain's defeat in Norway recently. In the middle of March the Christian Herald printed an open letter to the Prime Minister, begging him to institute a Day of National Prayer for forgiveness and righteous peace. But it was in vain. In the House of Commons a similar request was made twice by a minister, Dr. J. Little—and twice refused by the Prime Minister.

Writing to the Christian Herald, Dr. Little says: "I find all over the country perplexity at the attitude of Mr. Chamberlain. And I find also among the officials of the House of Commons a feeling that the matter should not be raised in the House again, but I will go on until they wholly rule me out."

During April the Christian Herald continued to publish letters from readers all over Great Britain pointing out the need of national humiliation and prayer for divine help. How can a nation hope to be victorious in "a fight for Christian principles," as this war is called, if its Government is too proud to ask for God's assistance?

#### BIBLES IN A WARRING WORLD

According to Church School Promoter, more than eighteen million copies of the Bible were distributed throughout the world last year by various American and British organizations. But most remarkable is the way in which the demand for God's Word is growing in war-torn countries. In Germany no fewer than 280,000 volumes were distributed in 1939 by the British and Foreign Bible Society alone, says The Christian (London). In Hungary, 169,000 copies were sold-more than twice the sales of 1938. Whereas Scripture circulation in Czechoslovakia during 1938 totalled 50,875 copies-an increase of fifty per cent over that recorded last year. Most remarkable of all is the fact that in Poland the sales have gone up from 54,000 copies to 135,000. In Latvia and Lithuania, likewise, there are notable advances. Everywhere Bible sales have increased, in spite of the fact that colportage has been suspended in most of these countries, and although the spending power of the people is much reduced. As God's Word finds its way into so many new homes where fear and perplexity reign, may it find entrance into many individual hearts bringing men and women to the knowledge of sins forgiven and a hope beyond this warring world.

#### THE COMING FEDERATIONS

These are days when national alliances are receiving great attention. Referring to the possibility of union between England, France, and other countries, the Archbishop of York said recently, "The whole scheme of federal union has made a staggeringly effective appeal to the British mind." The Times (London) has given assent to the idea. "All over the world it is gradually being realized that this way must be followed by the setting up of some international order capable, not of extinguishing nationalism -which would be absurd-but of transcending it with a larger loyalty," it says. Both in political circles and in religious circles the idea is gaining ground, even in America. A group of churchmen representing twenty-three denominations met in Philadelphia, reports Time, and came out for a World Government. Such alliances are a characteristic of the end of this age, the Bible has foretold. Before a World Government can come, however, it shows that first must come two great federations-the northern con-Russia and Germany on one hand, federacy of and the federation that will include the countries of the old Roman Empire on the other. Through the dissolving and re-shaping of the nations the inevitable boundaries that divide these two great territories are rapidly taking form, and the federations may soon come completely into existence. It will not be long after that time that Jesus shall return in power and glory to set up His world government of righteousness and peace.

#### The Lamp of Prophecy

"We seem to be at the converging of the ages; one era appears to be closing, and another already beginning. Apart from divine revelation, no man can tell what the next age holds in store for the human race. But any man or woman who has learned to accept the Holy Scriptures as divinely inspired finds here, in God's blessed book, a complete revelation concerning the times in which we live, and the period which is to follow. Quaint term, the word "recession." It is a sugarcoated term employed to designate the "furious
relapse" of a sick nation, which follows the
nostrum administered by her economic doctors.

"recession" or "depression," the Bible assigns
therefore a tremendous, contributory reason;
namely, mankind's repudiation of the demands
God makes for the support of His church.
Financial loyalty to God's will is a part of the

It is a singular circumstance that, as, far as thy servant has checked the matter, times of niggardly giving are closely followed by falling stocks and sour investments. Whensoever men set greedy eyes on selfish interests, and watch their mounting pile, *God blows upon it*. Why? Because He will not tolerate an age or individual which refuses to support in proper fashion the program of heaven. Generous interest in God's affairs and favorable seasons do not seem at all related in the minds of selfish men. But God affirms that when men are self-centered and forget Him, the heaven is stayed from dew, and the orchards report a crop failure.
