MUST work the works of Him that sent Me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work. John 9:4.

My meat is to do the will of Him that sent Me, and to finish His work. John 4:34.

I have finished the work which Thou gavest Me to do. John 17:4.

Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel. Mark 16:15.

Man in all ages and under all conditions apart from God has been a failure. Whether in the age of innocence or in the age of conscience, under the law, under government, under grace, man apart from God has been a failure. This dispensation will close as all the others preceding it have closed man a failure, doomed to judgment because he has left God out of the program.

We find ourselves in a disturbed world. Nations are locked in deadly combat. The immediate future no man is able to predict. In the church the power and presence of the Holy Spirit is not felt as in other days, fufilling the prophetic words of Paul that in the last days there shall be a departure from the faith, days of declension and apostasy, when evil men and seducing spirits shall wax worse and worse. As we see this dark background in the Scriptures, we ask, "What is God's plan and program for the Church? Where do we fit into the picture at this time?"

Our country is in a great all-out effort to defeat the enemy. It was a solemn moment when the British Prime Minister stood before his Parliament and said, "I have nothing to offer but blood and sweat and tears and hard work." He called the people to face the future with an all-out effort to defeat the enemy. Our government also has asked for sacrifices, for more taxes and for a united effort on the part of our people. We are told that our freedom and our way of life are in danger. And so we see Capital and Labor forgetting their differences and uniting their efforts, and many of the walls of separation have crumbled as our people stand shoulder to shoulder to face a common enemy.

But not only is the world, and our nation in a crisis period. The Church of Jesus Christ is facing problems today which will mean greater sacrifice, and an all-out effort if we are to make Christ known to the unevangelized masses around us. The Church is facing problems that it never faced before, and if we are to meet these difficulties and move forward in victory, there must be additions to our prayer life. We must go deeper into a life of consecration. The fire and fervor of revival must begin to burn. As I look into the Bible I am made to understand that in order to be victorious we must make an all-out effort. Like Gideon's army we must stand shoulder to shoulder against the common enemy.

When we open the Bible to the book of Genesis we find God working. It is the work of Creation which He pronounced good. In the Gospels we find Christ the Son at work. In the divine program God had placed a great task upon the shoulders of Jesus. In the three short years He had a great work to accomplish. We read that God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost, and He went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil, for God was with Him. His work was a teaching work, a prayer work, a work that brought Him in constant conflict with the powers of the adversary. He was so devoted to His work that He said, "My meat is to do the will of Him that sent Me, and to finish His work." At the close of a victorious, fruitful ministry He could lift His eyes and His heart to the Father and say, "Father, I have finished the work which Thou gavest Me to do."

But we also see the Holy Spirit at work. When Jesus laid His task down the Holy Spirit took it up. He came to do a work of empowering, a work of convicting the hearts of sinners. He has come to take the things of Christ and reveal them unto us, to lead and guide us into all truth.

When Christ was in the world, He tabernacled in a body such as you and I live in, and His feet would carry Him up and down the shores of Galilee and over Palestine. He could lay His hands upon the sick and pray for their recovery, and with His lips He could unfold the mysteries of God. But the Holy Spirit is here without a natural body and so He calls upon believers to present their bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is their reasonable service. The Holy Spirit lives in people. He has come to dwell in your heart and in mine. He needs your body as a dwelling place, He needs your hands, He needs your tongue. He needs you, as a channel, an instrument, a pipe line through whom He can give the living water to the world.

The disciples who followed Jesus in the early days seemed to have a wrong conception of Christ's kingdom. They felt that He would set up His kingdom on earth and they would sit upon thrones and be dukes and judges and earls and rule over the people. But one day Christ disillusioned them. They were to be humble preachers of the gospel and to do the works that He did.

A Scientist Meets the God of Science

A TRUE STORY BY JAMES R. GRAHAM, JR.

I was preaching in Wuchang, one of the twin cities of central China. I noticed a welldressed man sitting in the rear of the church. He looked rather bored. Seated in a pew all by himself, he put his foot on the bench, braced his back in the corner of the pew, and tried to settle down for a comfortable nap.

Presently I began to read from the Mandarin Bible. The passage was Matthew 24. The man in the rear of the hall began to prick up his ears just a wee bit and to evince some interest that a foreigner could read the Mandarin with a rather unusual degree of facility. Having read a portion of the great Olivet discourse containing the signs of the age as given by the Saviour Himself, I proceeded to give a message on the signs of the second advent of Christ, citing recent world conditions and international relationships, the general breakdown of morals, the departure from revealed truth as fulfillments of the sign.

The man on the back seat was unable to go through with his nap. In spite of himself, he became deeply interested, straightened up his back, put both feet on the floor, and then leaned over on the seat in front with arms folded and chin in the back of his hands. His eyes burned into me as I set forth the truth of the near return in judgment of the Son of God.

After the service was over, he came down to the front to speak to me. Rarely have I seen such agitation. Sputtering in alternate English and Chinese, he began to shout, "It's true. It's true. Every word that you say is true. I never knew that these things were revealed in the Bible. May I go with you to your house and talk with you further concerning these matters?" I readily agreed.

As we walked along to the house, I learned that he was the dean of the Science Department of a great university there in Wuchang, a Doctor of Philosophy from one of our American universities. We had a long and earnest conversation, and my friend, Dr. Cheng, really met the Lord Jesus. A fire was kindled within him the like of which I have never encountered before in a spiritual babe.

At the next few meetings he was present, each time with his Bible open, listening with avid interest. On Saturday evening, he told me about a certain friend whom he had brought in as a professor of mathematics in his department. His friend was in Shanghai in a hospital and he felt he was going to die shortly from a serious kidney malady. As he told me about it, he showed the greatest agitation, and shouted, "He is going to hell."

The next morning I looked for the doctor in the morning service. I scanned the audience in vain for his shining countenance. He didn't appear but attended the afternoon service, seemingly more eager than ever. Following the afternoon service, he again came to have a conversation with me. "You may have noticed," he said, "that I was absent from the morning service."

I assured him that I had taken note of it. He said, "I had my Bible in hand and was going out the door of my house in Hankow (Hankow is across the Yangtze River from Wuchang), but as I started out of the door, it seemed as if some unseen force literally thrust me down upon the floor in a passion of prayer for the salvation of Dr. Chow (the mathematics professor of whom he had spoken the day before). I had hardly been able to sleep all of Saturday night, thinking of my friend's near approach to eternity without Christ. So when this overpowering burden of prayer came upon me, I knelt there on the floor of my own room and cried aloud to God, literally weeping a puddle of tears. The paroxysm of agony continued for about an hour. Then as suddenly as it came, it departed, and I rose from my knees with absolute peace of heart and mind. Looking at the clock, I saw it was 11:30 and realized it was too late for me now to arrive at the morning service. So I decided simply to stay at home until time to leave for the afternoon service.

"Now, Brother Graham, what I want to see you about is to exact a promise from you that as soon as you are able to return down the river, you will go to Shanghai and call on this friend of mine whose life hangs in the balance and minister Christ to him before he goes hence."

I promised him that I would do this at my own earliest convenience, and that if I were delayed, I would communicate with some other Christian in Shanghai to go and perform this ministry. That night at the conclusion of the meetings, I took a ship down the river to my home near Nanking, and after a few days of Bible conference in my own town of Chinkiang, I boarded a train and went to Shanghai. I knew a wonderful Christian missionary doctor who



worked there, the beloved Dr. Stearns. Upon my arrival in Shanghai, I called Dr. Stearns over the phone and made a date with him to go to the bedside of the mathematics professor. Promptly at 9 o'clock the following morning, my friend met me on the steps of the hospital. We went into the hospital office of the registrar to seek information as to the room in which Dr. Chow would be located. (The Red Cross Hospital of Shanghai has about four hundred beds). As the registrar began to thumb through his records for the name, another young clerk came in and courteously asked me whom I sought. I told him Dr. Chow Shia-Su. He replied with a very solemn face and a shake of the head,

"Dr. Chow Chia-Su has left the earth."

About this time the registrar came across the record and nodded agreement with what his colleague had told me, producing a yellow hospital record sheet, at which I directed an amateur and Dr. Stearns a professional glance. There was a signed statement by the attending physician that Dr. Chow had left this life, but the thing that attracted my attention was the date and the time. It was on February 9 at 11:30 a.m. When I first heard that our mathematics professor had passed away, I wondered for just a moment why the Lord had brought me there after the death had already occurred. But as soon as I saw the date and the time, I told Dr. Stearns, "I know now that though you and I have missed seeing him, we shall meet the mathematics professor one day in the glory.'

My friend asked me how I arrived at that conclusion. I told him that the Lord never lays a burden of prayer such as was described to me by Dr. Chang of Hankow, without intending to answer such prayer. The fact that the passing of Dr. Chow exactly coincided with the time that Dr. Cheng had arisen from his knees and was relieved of his burden, gave double assurance that the prayer was in the Holy Spirit.

I bade my friend, Dr. Stearns, good-bye and got on the train and returned to my home, content to let the divine principle illustrated in this connection wait for eternity for its vindication. In the counsel of God, I was not required to wait that long. Only a few days afterwards, I was asked to speak at a mission high school for girls in my own city. The text that morning was from the ninetieth Psalm, "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." I completed the message with the story of the Chinese educator in Wuchang whose heart had become aflame with the love of Christ and who had called upon God with strong crying and tears to save his friend. At the end of the story, I told them I felt certain, due to the prayer of this friend, we should all have the pleasure of seeing Dr. Chow Chia-Su in the glory one day. As the name of the mathematics professor slipped from my mouth, I noticed that there were signs of recognition in the audience of girls. I thought that was not surprising since he was a very eminent scholar and well known in Nanking and all through the Yangtze Valley.

After the prayer of dismissal, the Chinese lady principal of the high school asked me if I would wait for her a moment in her office. She had a word to speak to me. This I agreed to do, and when she came in, she sat down on the other side of the desk from me and said, "Mr. Graham, that is a very interesting story that you told at the last of your message this morning. The most interesting part of it is that I know the other half of it. The gentleman to whom you referred, who has now passed away, is a son-in-law of this school. His wife is an alumna and incidentally a former principal, a graduate of Columbia University of New York. We call her Ai Loa (Love-Joy). Just a few days ago she came into this very office to see me. I had not seen her for some time and I had heard the report that her husband was dead. I found it difficult, therefore, to explain the fact of her peace and joy of countenance when she came in, coupled with the fact that she had on no widow's weeds or anything of that nature. I thought I must have been mistaken about her husband's death else she could not have appeared so calm and natural.

"After we had exchanged greetings, I said, 'And how is your husband? I heard that he was sick.' 'Oh, yes,' she replied; 'he is gone to be with Jesus, and I shall meet him in His presence one day.'

"I was very much amazed at this statement," went on the lady principal, "because this couple were rather notoriously irreligious in our set, and how she could speak so confidently that her husband had gone to be with Jesus and that she would meet him there one day amazed me beyond words. So I asked her for the basis of her assurance.

"She replied, 'It is all very wonderful. I can't even explain it myself. My husband was at the point of death; we all knew the end was near. He had been unconscious or in a coma all of that Sunday morning. At about 10:30, as several of us stood around the room, he raised his head up off his pillow and with a very clear eye and voice, declared to us all that he had seen Jesus Christ nailed to the cross for his sins. "I don't know why," he said; "the conviction has become so plain to me, but I know that He died for me. I know that I believe in Him. I know that I have eternal life and that I shall enter shortly into His presence. My dear wife," he said, addressing me, "we have wasted our lives. We have known of this gospel. We have neglected it. I urge you here and now, before I go hence, to trust Jesus Christ for salvation and to give your life to make Him known. In the school that we own and operate in Nanking, see to it that you have true Christian ministers to come there and preach the gospel to our students from now on." After so charging us, he put his head back on the pillow and his lips began to move and we could hear presently the tones of a gospel song that he had learned long ago but which I had never heard him sing. We were amazed at the strength and clarity of his voice, and when the song was over, in clear, audible tones, drawing it from somewhere

in the long-hidden archives of his memory, there came forth from beginning to end the love chapter (1 Corinthians 13). He ended up, "And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." And as he spoke these words, his spirit fled from his body and he was drawn into the presence of the Saviour whom he had so recently trusted.'

"So, Mr. Graham," went on the lady principal, "your judgment is correct. We shall see Dr. Chow one day in the glory."

It is strange how astonished we can be at that which we even claim to expect. My heart was filled with a song. I did not reach the bedside of Dr. Chow in time, but the Holy Spirit, the Teacher, the Regenerator, the One who leads men to Christ, preceded me and did a much better work than I could have done. It happened that a few days later it was my pleasure to see the lovely wife of the deceased mathematics professor and to hear from her lips the testimony of God's grace to her husband and to herself and to her husband's brother, all because of the effectual fervent prayer of a friend whose heart was aflame with the love of Christ.

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Greater Things Ahead

There is no limit to what God will do for those who will not limit Him.

When Philip was willing to go down to the desert, even if it was only to meet one soul, God gave him a touch of the supernatural he had never had before. This was a reward for his obedience, and is only an earnest of what God can do for those who render unwavering yieldedness to His perfect will.

Paul and Silas prayed when they were put into the lower dungeon, and God opened up the lower parts of the earth, and the heart of the jailer was broken at the same time. God can cause an earthquake when it is needed.

Peter was put into prison, but prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him, and God sent a special angel, before whom the iron bolts melted like wax. Just one touch and the chains fell off his wrists and Peter walked out free.

"And what shall I say more? for the time would fail me to tell." This is written of the Old Testament record, and the New Testament has a bigger list. These individual cases in the Acts are just finger posts, and there is a whole host between each finger post of unrecorded workings of the Spirit in the supernatural. If so many wonderful things took place in the Old Testament with a partial manifestation of the Spirit, are we not to expect an increased, a mightier outpouring of the Spirit in these last days as we cry to God for rain in the time of the latter rain?

Compare Hebrews 11 and the Acts of the Apostles. The latter is the supplement of the former. Compare the present-day results with the Acts of the Apostles and see where we stand. God wants these times to be Hebrews 11, plus the days of the



latter rain. There is a great need in the world today as there was on the day of Pentecost, and if He can get a people free in the Spirit and filled with His power, God is willing to work through them.

Look for the physical, the supernatural; be yielded, be pliable to Him, and He can repeat the signs and wonders of Pentecostal days, and greater works.

The arm of Him we serve has not shortened, neither is His ear heavy that He cannot hear us, nor has His power diminished that He cannot do these things.

The Fact of Sin

While preaching to the bluejackets on a British man-of-war, a missionary was ac-costed at the close of his address by a sailor saying, "I will not believe what you have told us till you inform me why God allowed sin to come into the world." The missionary' answered: "Suppose a man was in the top floor of an eleven-story building and a fire broke out in the first floor. The man heard the cries of 'fire' but he kept on reading a novel. Finally, when the flames burst right into his room, he rushed to the window, and instead of climbing down the fire escape to safety, he shouted down to the firemen below: 'I won't come down till you tell me how the fire started in the building.' What would you think of that man?" The sailor said, "I would say he was a fool"; and by his statement he condemned himself.

In the first instance, the question is wrong. God did not allow sin to come into the world, man did. "By *one man* sin entered into the world, and death by sin." Man has no right to question God. Man's position is one of guilt before God. Man should rather concern himself with sin's *removal* out of his life. How can that be accomplished?... "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."—*Christian Victory*.

THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL

The Fig Tree

THE Lord sees against the sky line of the Temple, with its gold so dazzling that no one could look steadily at it when the sun shone on it, "a single"—a unique—"fig tree by the wayside." Matt. 21:19. It is a remarkable symbol of the Jew. Israel is a fig tree, wholly unique, on the wayside of the world, so charged with possibilities by God as to challenge search for marvellous fruit.

"Blessed," our Lord Himself said (Matt. 5:6), "are they which do hunger and thirst *after righteousness.*" Christ's advent was the arrival of the hungry Christ seeking fruit on God's fig tree of a thousand years. And Jesus was on His way for His last visit to the Temple, in fulfilment of His own word: "Behold, *these three years* I come seeking fruit on this fig tree" (Luke 13:7); and the final year He had given it, "Lord, let it alone this year also," is now up.

So the Lord approaches. "And seeing a fig tree afar off having leaves, He came, if haply He might find any thing thereon: and when He came to it, He found *nothing but leaves.*" Mark 11:13. Leaves, as distinct from fruit nestled within the leaves, are the outward evidences of a tree that *can* fruit; leaves are promises of fruit. The Scriptures were in Israel's hands. The Temple flowered with a full ritual. The expounders of the Law were in full authority. The leaves proved a fig tree absolutely unique.

Now what does God regard as fruit? "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance." Gal. 5:22, 23. What did the Lord find? "He found *nothing* thereon, BUT LEAVES ONLY." There was nothing more than that which met the eye. The tree professed to have fruit. The Lord took it at its word, and found that word a lie. It is remarkable that when Adam, sinner though he was, unpardoned and unreconciled to God, clothed himself, it was fig-leaves he chose, and they had no effect whatever in averting the judgment of God.

So, opportunity being over, the doom falls. "Let no fruit grow on thee henceforward for ever. And *presently* the fig tree withered away." It *did* not fruit. Now it cannot fruit. Another, a spiritual, nation was to take the fig tree's place. "The kingdom of God shall be taken from you, and given to a nation *bringing forth the fruits* thereof." Matt. 21:43.

Israel's age-long probation, reinforced by the personal presence and appeal of Messiah, is over; and from the destruction of Jerusalem onward Jehovah's word through Jeremiah became operative: "Behold, I will send upon them the sword, the famine, and the pestilence, and will make them like VILE FIGS, *that cannot be eaten*, they are so evil." Jer. 29:17. Yesterday the Lord wept over Jerusalem. Today He blights her.

Nearly two thousand years of history have proved how infallible, how accurate, are the words of Jesus. "And in the morning, as they passed by, they saw the fig tree dried up *from the roots*"—the tree was dead. "And Peter ... saith unto Him, Master, behold, the fig tree which Thou cursedst is withered away." Mark 11:20. The tree was withered. With the destruction of the Temple by Titus all the ritual and profession of a people of God faded out of the Holy Land. Sap ceased to quicken and make every twig sensitive, and Israel became an imperishable monument of unbelief and its punishment, a blasted and lifeless fig tree on the wayside of history. The fig tree is Israel as a whole; but praise God, there is still "a remnant according to the election of grace." Rom. 11:5.

The spiritual significance of this, one of the tragedies of the world, our Lord foreshadowed on His way to Calvary. "Daughters of Jerusalem," He said, "weep not for Me, but weep for yourselves, and for your children... For if they do these things" if their Messiah of boundless love they treat with crucifixion—"in a green tree" a land and Temple still recognized by Jehovah—"what shall be done in THE DRY?" Luke 23:28,31. The modern Jews who are apostate even from Judaism are unsurpassed in their bitterness against both Christ and God.

But it is of intense interest to observe that the fig tree is not for ever withered. Our Lord says, "When her branch is now become tender, and putteth forth its leaves, ye know that the summer is nigh." Matt. 24:32, R. V. The branches become tender again; but the Lord thus reveals merely a tree restored to what it was when He examined it: it is full of leaves only. "This generation," which consists of both Jews and Gentiles, will revive intensely in all forms of nationalism, while completely devoid of all spiritual life-a passion of leaves, but no fruit. For nearly two thousand years, denationalized and homeless Israel is leafless as well as fruitless; and at the end the blight passes, but not the barrenness. So His solemn word locks the door which Israel had shut in the face of God. "And He answered and said unto it, No man eat fruit



from thee henceforward for ever." Mark 11:14, R. V.

The day arrives for fruit at last, but it is fruit of another tree. Of the final scene Joel (2:18-22) says: "Then will the Lord be jealous for His land, and pity His people. ... I will no more make you a reproach among the nations: but I will remove far off from you the northern army"-therefore this is after Armageddon-"for the tree beareth her fruit, THE FIG TREE and the vines do yield their strength." When the summer is nigh, the fig tree has leaves: when the summer is come, the fig tree has fruit. Regenerate Israel will be like the regenerate man-the same yet radically another. "He is not a Jew, which is one outwardly... but he is a Jew" whose "circumcision is that of the heart." (Rom. 2:28, 29); and when Messiah appears, the heart-circumcision of an entire nation will be instantaneous, and "all Israel shall be saved" (Rom. 11:26); for "in days to come shall Jacob take root" as a new tree; "Israel shall blossom and bud; and THEY SHALL FILL THE FACE OF THE WORLD WITH FRUIT." Isa. 27:6, R. V.

Symptoms multiply of a returning sap. In the eighties of the last century, Mr. Rabinowitz, a Jewish lawyer in Southern Russia, was selected to go to Palestine to secure land for Jewish emigrants. Among his guide books he carried a New Testament. On the Mount of Olives he pondered the desolation of the fig tree. Then his eyes wandered to Calvary. "Is He our Messiah," he said to himself, "after all?" He opened the Book. It opened at the words, ' 'I am the vine, ye are the branches.... Without Me ye can do nothing." The truth smote him then and there. "I saw that our Jewish bankers with their millions can do nothing for us; our scholars and our statesmen, our colonization societies, are powerless. Our only hope as a nation is in Jesus." He went home to face bitter persecution for the Nazarene: the sap had begun to flow. In 1885 appeared the first copy of a Hebrew New Testament; and hundreds of thousands have been printed since.

In one of the most remarkable letters ever written a Jew addressed an Eastern Archbishop as follows: "I am a Jew, but by con-viction I am a Christian, and the more I study the Gospel the more loud does the voice of this inward conviction become. I am one of a nation considered hostile to Christ and to Christianity. Against that accusation I am ready to fight with all the powers of my soul. Sooner or later, the Tews will accept Christ with great joy, as a father meets an injured and cast off son. The moment of the reconciliation of the Jews with Christ will be the greatest in the history of mankind. It seems to me that this moment is approaching. I have no outward witness to prove it; but I believe it because it cries aloud in my soul."

Christ Still Lives

"I have no fears for the future of Christ's church," declares Dr. Peder Stainsen. "The war clouds are dark. But the tide has never gone out without coming in again. That is the testimony of history. Always after a dark period, there is a bright opportunity for the church in a world ministry." June 6, 1942

age in which the Church will sit on thrones and rule. The days of rulership are yet in the future. These are days of sowing the seed—the Word. Today is also harvest time, when we must gather in the sheaves, the result of the faithful sowing of others.

The enemies of Britain and America have said that our people are soft; that radios and telephones and easy chairs and soft beds have made us a soft people. But the question on my heart is : Has the Church of Jesus Christ become soft? Have we as Christians and as a Pentecostal people drawn back from the life of sacrifice, of self-denial, and crossbearing? Do we spend as much time in the presence of the Lord today, crying to God for the salvation of souls, as we once did? Has our increase of knowledge made us feel a little independent, or that we do not need to pray as much, and do not need to be so self-sacrificing as we once were? Has the deepening apostasy made inroads into the Full Gospel assemblies? These are questions, fair questions, that we should ask our own hearts. We look out upon the religious life around us and we can see declension, a departure from the old standards. Have we become soft? Do we still have the old, rugged pioneer spirit of days gone by?

I heard a young man testify recently: "I had the call of God upon my heart to preach. And I stood at the crossroads—a crisis hour had come in my life. I noticed that some could draw crowds, and some seemed to be popular, and some were successful as workers. And I asked my own heart, what kind of preacher do I want to be?"

Do you want to be a popular preacher? Well, if you want to be popular, don't say anything or do anything that will hurt people's feelings. Be careful not to preach about judgment—it makes some people nervous.

Would you like to be a sensational preacher, draw crowds, make yourself a reputation? Tell the church who the Antichrist is, and advertise catchy headlines. That might draw the crowd.

Listen. May I suggest if you aspire to the ministry that you ask God to make you a *gospel* preacher.

Young people, the Lord never asked us to be successful, but He does require that the steward be found faithful. As people of our day reckon success, we should call Noah a complete failure, shouldn't we? He warned and labored a hundred and twenty years and we cannot find record of any that he brought into the kingdom outside his own family. After a long period of warning God said, "Come, Noah, thou and thy family, into the ark." The world today would have said he was a failure, but God was pleased to take the name of Noah and place it in the record of faith in Hebrews 11, and there he stands before us as one of the worthies of Old Testament days.

What kind of preacher should you like to be? I believe God would have us all be faithful, loyal preachers, of His Word.

And now let us consider the consecration of the preacher. Paul states in one of his letters that "Demas hath forsaken me, hav-

ing loved this present world." He also said of one of his coworkers, he "went not with them to the work." I wonder just why Paul's coworker John Mark turned back. He was no doubt a young man of ability; he had taken an active part in the work; but something had crossed his path. I wonder if the love of John Mark had grown cold, or was there some failure in his prayer life? You know, friends, defeat and backsliding begin within; before you see the manifestation without. Maybe John Mark thought, "Well, I have been a successful worker. I have many sermon notes, plenty of good material that I can preach whether I pray or not." And he may have thought, "Well, everybody knows I love the Lord Jesus Christ. They have heard me testify to that fact," and perhaps something crossed his path and his love for Christ grew cold. All of these things can happen to Christians and to preachers. Prayerlessness, coldness, indifference will bring defeat into any Christian's life or any worker's ministry.

Then I am thinking of the preacher's message. If we are called into the vineyard in this all-out effort to win souls for Christ in these closing days, what kind of message should we preach? A man came into our church sometime ago and after listening to the gospel said, "I cannot understand how you get people in here to listen to such a message, where you condemn sin and preach judgment and admonish people to turn from the broad way." But I told him, "Brother, there are people in this world who still love righteousness, and they love the gospel."

Sometime ago I read of a young man. He was in his first pastorate and things were going a little hard. One day his Christian father wrote to him and said, "Son, how are you getting along in your ministry?" The son wrote back to his dad and said: "Father, things are not going so well. I am finding it hard to minister. When I get up to preach, if I talk on politics there sits a politician ready to check what I say. If I talk about history there is a professor in history, ready to check on my message. If I speak about something in the scientific world there is a professor of science ready to check. Really, father, I am in a hard place. What should you advise me to do?" And his godly father wrote back and said, "Son, if I were you I should preach the gospel. Maybe they don't know so much about the Word of God.'

What shall we preach? Shall we preach a mixture to this compromising age in which we live? Pardon a crude illustration. I read of a man who was in a flourishing hamburger business. He had discovered that people were very fond of hamburgers made of rabbit meat. But the thought came to him one day, "Why cannot I just mix a little horse meat into this hamburger? The public will never find it out." And so he added a little horse meat. And then just a little more, and a little more, until finally somebody reported it, and he stood before the court. The judge said, "The charge against you is that you put horse meat in this hamburger. Is that true?" He said, "Yes, your honor." "Well, how much did you put in?" "Oh," he said, "I think about fifty-fifty." "Fifty-fifty?" "Yes, your honor; one rabbit to one horse."

I believe the gospel should be presented without a mixture, don't you? Not Christ and something else, but the gospel in its purity. Paul said that this gospel is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. But it is also important that we present the truth in the right spirit. Whether people receive the gospel depends largely on how we present it. This gospel comes to us in its purity, but before it reaches the world it must pass through human channels, and sometimes the water gets muddy before it reaches the people for whom it is intended.

In my early ministry, I attended a union revival service, addressed by a Methodist minister of the old school. In his message he said: "There are times when God seems to lead me to sound the warnings of the Bible and to preach upon its judgments. But when I feel that I should speak upon hell or judgment, I ask God for special heart preparation. I ask Him to take all the harshness and hardness out of my spirit, and fill me with compassion and with the tenderness of Jesus; for if I must talk about hell I want to speak of it with tears coursing down my face, for it is a terrible thing for a soul to be eternally lost, separated from God." It brought to my mind the words of Paul, "Speaking the truth in love."

God, I am sure, has an all-out program, and I believe that the eleventh-hour call has gone forth. The Lord is calling for workers to go into the vineyard to work. And He has said, "Whatever is right, that will I pay you." At this eleventh hour, respond to the call of the Master to go into the vineyard and engage in an all-out effort to bring men and women to Jesus Christ. In apostolic days, when Christ laid the great task of world evangelization upon the shoulders of fisher-men and tax gatherers, He said, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." This power would be transforming. It would change fishermen into bold preachers of the gospel. It would transform the lives of vacillating men into courageous witnesses of Resurrection and make them bold to stand in courts and before rulers, and say, "We ought to obey God rather than men." That same power that rested upon Jesus, and upon the Church in the early days has been promised to the Church of Christ in our days. It is a precious thought to know that all that the Holy Spirit was to Jesus when He ministered, He will be to us. We draw from the same source, we have an all-sufficient Christ.

The time came in the life of Moses when God called him up into the mountain and the mantle of leadership was transferred from Moses to Joshua, his successor and God took Moses home. We hear God telling Aaron that the mantle of priesthood must be passed on to his son Eleazar; and Aaron was gathered home to God. Down through the years God has been calling one after another. Many have served well in their day; but God has called, and the mantle of service must fall upon other shoulders.

Young people, you are about to take your place in the harvest field. The mantle of service will fall upon your shoulders, and may God help you to serve well.

Another Gospel Lighthouse

"Now thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savor of His knowledge by us in every place." -2 Cor. 2:14.

It is with the utmost joy that we send this little report concerning the completion of our new temple in Lavras, construction of which was begun last December. God helped us, so that in four and a half months the building was ready for dedication which took place April 19. This was indeed a great day in the history of our assembly. Besides a fine group of native brethren from surrounding fields, we had with us the following missionaries: J. P. Kolenda, Erma Miller, Lillian Flessing, Carol Jackson, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Johnson, Algot Swensson, Walter Goodband, and Samuel Nystrom (who drove his car all the way from Rio de Janeiro in order to attend).

A large crowd was present at the afternoon service to hear Brother Nystrom's dedicatory address. Reviewing our work here from the beginning, he compared our building to Solomon's temple, the site for which was divinely chosen by God at the time that Abraham was ready to offer his son. So our work began in a humble hall on the very spot where the new building now stands. But as it took many hundreds of years before the temple was finally built upon the site divinely chosen, so in our case the local assembly had waited a long time for its own building, meeting meanwhile in rented halls in various parts of the city, which Brother Nystrom compared to the journeys of the tabernacle in Israel's history. As we lifted our hearts with Brother Kolenda,

who offered the dedicatory prayer, God's presence was gloriously manifest.

An even larger crowd gathered for the evening service when we dedicated our new baptistry, immersing seven converts, which brings our active membership up to 108. At this service we had the joy also of praying with two souls for salvation.

In connection with the consecration services, J. P. Kolenda and Algot Swensson conducted a series of Bible studies for ten days on subjects which proved of inestimable value to our native brethren. The evening services were devoted largely to evangelistic effort in which all the workers took part. Thank God for several who were saved!

The "last great day of the feast" was a real victory day. At the afternoon communion service two brethren were set apart as deacons and a third placed on trial for the same office.

The following facts may be of interest. The building is of brick construction, 30x50 feet in size, seating about 300 (when crowded). A partial basement provides ample accommodation for Sunday School classrooms, etc. There is still space on the lot for building a parsonage or enlarging the building if necessary.

We feel grateful to those who have faithfully stood by us in prayer and sacrificial giving. Let us assure you that your sacrifice has not been in vain. If space would permit, we could continue to tell of God's blessing on the work, but suffice it to say that souls have been saved, several filled with the Spirit, sick bodies healed, people delivered from Satan's power, and believers built up in Christ.

THINKING CHINESE

On arrival in China we faced a complete revolution in our way of thinking. The change did not take place in a moment; but gradually, as we contacted the people and studied the language, we learned to adapt ourselves to "thinking Chinese."

People in that land do not shake hands, but according to Oriental custom merely bow.

At first it seemed strange to us that the polite custom in eating and drinking is to be as noisy as possible. In fact, the more noise one makes, the more it expresses appreciation to the host, demonstrating that the tea and food are being enjoyed.

Proceeding down the streets of China, a man must never walk with his wife; she follows a few feet behind. The missionaries, however, walk with their wives, wishing in this way to teach the Chinese that a woman is not an animal but is man's equal.

When I went to rent a home and chapel in Lo Ping, I asked the landlord how many children he had, explaining that we needed a quiet atmosphere for language study. The landlord said he had three children who would cause no trouble since they were all in school. Later when we moved in and counted five children, we challenged the landlord concerning his former statement. "Oh," he replied, "the two girls don't count." To this day in Yunnan Province the people are slow to educate the girls.

The main religion of Yunnan Province is Buddhism, though in some places the Mohammedans are quite strong. The people worship their ancestors. There is much superstition, and devils are greatly feared. Constantly the missionary meets this statement, "America has her religion; England has, hers, and so has China. We have no need of the religion you bring our way."

THE DAY OF MIRACLES IS NOT PAST Florence Byers, Returned Missionary from Japan

The little seven-year-old son of a woman who had been saved in one of our meetings was afflicted with a tumor on his back. His mother and grandmother wanted to trust the Lord to heal him, but the unsaved father insisted that he should go to the hospital for a minor operation which the doctors said was necessary.

The mother brought her boy to church, and I well remember his testimony. He said that he would have to go to the hospital and perhaps would die there, so before going he wanted to receive the Baptism. In answer to the child's faith, God filled him with the Holy Spirit that night.

Doctors Are Amazed

A few days later he was taken to the hospital. When they operated, instead of finding just a small tumor on his back they discovered it was a cancerous growth and the operation severed thirty-six blood vessels, causing him almost to bleed to death. They had administered only a local anaesthetic, the effect of which wore off in a short time, while the operation lasted from 10:30 in the morning until 3:00 in the afternoon. The lad, conscious of what he was going through, kept praying, "Jesus, don't let it hurt me; Jesus, don't let it hurt me."

After a few days we called on the boy again and on this occasion anointed him with oil, praying definitely for his healing. While we were there the nurse came in to dress a large red spot on his back. When we asked what this meant, the mother explained that the cancer had spread poison all through his system and they were going to operate again. The doctor said he could not live . . . BUT GOD ANSWERED PRAYER.

When I saw him again a few days later, he was no longer lying on his face unable to move but was sitting up in bed. As I entered he said happily, "How do you do, teacher?" How we praised the Lord for this wonderful answer to prayer!

His aunt, who was a heathen worshiper, wanted to give the boy something and pressed him to tell her what he would like to have. At last he asked for a large leather ball. Just before she went out, however, he said, "You don't need to get me that big leather ball. Jesus has done so much for me; I would rather you went to the church and put the money in the offering as a thanksgiving to Him for what He has done."

A Living Testimony

Four days after this time he was out of the hospital completely healed, and for five days in succession he attended our church where a convention was in progress.

His aunt came to one of these services. She had said, "I will go and see which is stronger, my god or your God." As that heathen woman listened for the first time to the gospel message, she was convicted of sin and came out to the altar where we gathered around her in prayer. God set her free, gave her everlasting life, and the following day filled her with the Holy Spirit.

One day while visiting in the hospital, I met a lady who said she had heard of this boy's experience and wanted to know about Christ. There, sitting on a mat in that hospital, we had the privilege of telling her the gospel story. With tears of repentance she confessed her sins and found peace with God.

Our hearts are indeed full of praise to God because He has enabled us to reopen the Latin American Bible Institute of California, this time in the city of Los Angeles with its large Spanish-speaking population. The institute is located in Belvedere, a thickly-populated Mexican suburb, at 161 North Carmelita Avenue on the very lot where the first Mexican church ever built in California was dedicated on May 20, 1923. The original building which had been condemned was torn down to make way for the new two-story structure that provides a church for the Mexican Assembly as well as accommodation for the Bible School with dormitories for men and women.

The school opened on November 2, 1941 and we were able to move into the new building before the end of that month. There were ten students at the opening, a number which later increased to seventeen but has been reduced again since our country's entry into war. However, we still have ten students, all of whom are studying with real earnestness and give promise of going forth as consecrated workers for the Lord.

Graduates At Work

Out of a total of seventy who graduated from this institute when it was in San Diego, we are still in definite touch with sixty who we believe are going on with God and working for Him. One of them after graduating went to Mexico where he at once began to work for the Lord amid conditions of most extreme poverty. With the help of the Lord he has established a new assembly there, gathering a little group of believers who are now starting to put up their own church building.

Another of our graduates helped to open the first Bible Institute of the Assemblies of God in Puerto Rico, while yet another has been engaged in pastoral work for years in that same island. One girl who came from Peru has now gone back to that country where she and her husband are doing a blessed work for God. Others are in active ministry as pastors, evangelists and teachers in various parts of the United States and Mexico, as well as in the Hawaiian Islands.

In addition to these seventy graduates, a large number (sometimes as many as two hundred at one time) have studied our Bible School courses by correspondence. Most of them are workers for the Lord in various parts of Mexico, Central and South America.

One of the recent graduates in San Diego is a teacher in the Los Angeles school, while the brother who was the first to complete the correspondence course is now pastor of the local assembly.

A Present Need

In these closing days of time we are feeling more than ever the need of inculcating the teachings of God's Word in the hearts and minds of our young people.

Our school year lasts for thirty weeks, and we charge the resident students only \$3.00 a week for room, board and tuition. Some who are really worthy and have a definite call to God's work are so poor that it is impossible for them to pay. If any of our assemblies or Women's Missionary Councils would be willing to undertake either the full or partial support of one of these students, your help would be greatly appreciated. One hundred dollars will keep a student for a whole year, including the cost of books. The smallest weekly or monthly offerings will be most gratefully received. Dying World And Living Word

SCHMIDTS AND TOBERS

We learn from *Redemption Tidings* that the Schmidts and the Tobers, missionaries in Eastern Europe, are still detained in Germany. Brother and Sister Schmidt are in Danzig. Swiss Pentecostal friends are in touch with them, and will send them help as possible.

FALSE CHRISTS

Infinitely significant of the end is the appearance of human gods. (1) The Italian broadcaster Mario Appelius said on Jan. 16, 1942: "I believe in the Duce as the Apostles believed in Christ, with the same faith which does not pause to reason overmuch but follows. Millions and millions of Italians have this same belief in the Duce." (2) The German book Gott und Volk, 260,000 copies of which are circulating throughout Germany, says: "We have one Fuehrer: the German is helped by one look at the Fuehrer: if anyone rejects this faith, he is a criminal and a traitor." (3) Baron Hiranuma, Home Minister of Japan, says: "Foreign kings, emperors, and presidents are all created by man, while Japan has a sacred throne inherited from the imperial ancestors. Japan's imperial rule is therefore an extension of heaven. The dynasties created by man may collapse, but the heaven-created throne is beyond man's power." Jesus said, speaking of the signs of the end-time, "There shall arise false Christs." Matt. 24:24.

"SPIRITS OF DEVILS"

The unclean spirits which gather the nations for the last conflict are described in Rev. 16:14 as "the spirits of devils, working miracles . . ." In this connection it is interesting to note what *Prophecy* magazine quotes from a certain Russian Jew, formerly editor of a Swiss Christian publication:

"For the first time since the days of antiquity a psychic medium has come to the highest political power. Hitler makes his politics in trance, 'with the certainty of a sleep-walker,' as he himself said, quite conscious that he is sent from Valhalla and is a reincarnation of a Teutonic god. . . . The method of warfare he leaves to his generals, but it is he himself and he alone, who decides the moment when to strike. Hitler, the spiritualist and the astrologer, decides that. . . To fix the hour of advance Hitler does not take counsel with 'flesh and blood' but with the 'rulers of the darkness,' powers whom Paul mentions in the sixth chapter of Ephesians. In Hitler we see the greatest satanic medium of our times."

ATHEISTIC PERSONAL WORKERS

The attempt to convert the masses to atheism in Russia having failed, personal work is being advocated, according to *Christian Century*. "Win the individual believer for atheism," was the conclusion of a Godless conference held in Moscow just before the outbreak of war. Mass propaganda is no sufficient substitute for personal approach, they decided. Christians must be convinced that personal salvation is an unworthy goal. They must be made conscious of their responsibility for the extension of the Soviet community. "Those who think only of their own soul's salvation are socially irresponsible people."

One confession of these "personal workers" is significant. "A rule which must be observed in all circumstances is to avoid all discussion of the Holy Scriptures of the believers." On this ground they know themselves foredoomed to defeat!

From this program of the atheists we can learn three things: (1) Personal evangelism is one of the most effective means of winning souls for Christ today. (2) The emphasis should be upon the salvation of the soul, and not on a socalled social gospel. (3) The chief weapon of our warfare must be the "sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God."

FOOD USED IN LIQUOR

"The liquor traffic uses three and three fourths billion pounds of grain, one hundred and fifty million pounds of sugar, one hundred and sixtythree million gallons of molasses each year in the manufacture of liquor in the United States. The above all contain high energy food value, valuable for defense."

The above quotation is from a petition which W. C. T. U, workers are circulating. In view of the amount of foodstuffs which the liquor traffic consumes, and in view of the fact that the nation has on hand five hundred million gallons of liquor (in storage), the petition calls for the discontinuing of the manufacture of beverage alcohol from these vital supplies, as a conservation measure.

CHINESE MARTYRS

"Today I have been getting acquainted with David, Samuel, and Moses Feng, three as fine little fellows as you want to see, aged from two to ten. Two days ago their father was bayoneted by Japanese soldiers in this little churchyard before their eyes and the eyes of their mother." So writes a Presbyterian missionary in Suchowfu, China. "Mr. Feng was one of our most faithful preachers, holding this lonely and dangerous outpost for nine years. He was poor, though his salary had been recently raised to four dollars a month. We offered to give him a different field but he refused to leave his little flock, though for the past three years this market town had been the center of guerrilla warfare.

"When I reached here I found our little group of Christians had bought coffins for Feng and his brother, who also had been killed, and we buried them. We held a service at the graves. I never saw Chinese men so brokenhearted and in tears. They gave me Mr. Feng's well-worn Bible. It had been drenched in his blood, for he held it under his arm as the soldiers stood him up against the wall."

A CALL TO REPENTANCE AND PRAYER

While the rulers of Great Britain and America have called for national days of prayer, the government of Switzerland called for a day of Repentance and Prayer. This special day was called at the end of last summer but it is only now that we have a translation of this unique call. This is a part of it:

"'Except the Lord keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain.' Let us remember this word of the Holy Scriptures on this day of Repentance and Prayer. The Lord watched with our army which stood sentry for our country, and its peace. In the peace of liberty and order we were able to sow our fields and the Lord blessed their fruitfulness. Therefore we appeal to you, people of Switzerland, to spend the National Day of Rcpentance and Prayer in quiet, reverent consecration and not to desecrate the quietness of this day by pleasure and noisy entertainments, but to give God the honor as a free and praying nation and give Him thanks for the protection which we enjoy as a gift from our Almighty Father's Hand; and let us ask Him to watch over our country in the future with His might and strength.

"If we keep the Prayer Day in this spirit and put into it deeds as well, then we can with quietness and courage and confidence go into the future. Let us carry this spirit of faith and the freeing power of this Prayer Day into every day's life, by fulfilling our duty thoroughly in small as well as in great things, by being content in our work and in sacrifice, by helping each other, by courage and steadfastness and ever-ready devotion to the common good of this country."

CATHOLICS IN GERMANY

In their efforts to suppress Christianity in Germany, the Nazis reportedly are not distinguishing between Protestantism and Catholicism. *Time* states that the Catholic leader of Germany, Cardinal von Faulhaber, recently sent the following report to the Pope:

The Nazis are waging systematic war against Christianity. Anti-Christian espionage is widespread. Priests are prevented from reading certain episcopal documents by the simple expedient of arrest. Churchgoers are being morally blackmailed by instructions that "less faithful attendance . . . means keeping your job." Party functionaries are quoted as asking Catholics to quit the church or quit the future of Greater Germany. Though Nazi Party meetings go on to small hours, young people are forbidden to attend evening church festivals because "they last too long and prevent their getting sufficient sleep."

A noticeable "armistice" exists at present between the Catholic and Protestant churches in the Reich—to their mutual benefit, according to this report that leaked through Italian censorship.

JAPAN'S "DIVINE MISSION"

The following is a sample of what Japan instills into the minds of her school children: "What shall Japan contribute to the world? All Japanese must awaken to their duty to execute the divine punishment. By attacking or by punitive treatment, the powers of the world must be broken down in order to fulfill the divine mission of Japan. Some day, when, having swept away all rottenness and subjugated all arrogant and impolite countries of the world, Japan shall be the king of the world and lord over the whole universe." The quotation is from the Japanese New National Language Reader, Vol. 6, Lesson 28

They believe it is "their duty to execute the divine punishment." Perhaps God is using the Japanese to punish the nations for their sins, even as He used Nebuchadnezzar, the heathen king, to punish the people of Judah for their wickedness in the days of Zedekiah.

O America, "return unto the Lord thy God; for thou hast fallen by thine iniquity. Take with you words, and turn to the Lord: say unto him, Take away all iniquity, and receive us graciously." Hosea 14:1, 2. Our arms and our allies shall not save us, but only God. We have sinned against Him, but He waits to be merciful to those who humble themselves and seek His face in repentance.

MISSIONARIES IN JAVA

In the *Evangel* of March 21 a quotation from a missionary's letter was published, which read as follows: "I know of only one missionary organization doing any work in Java, and their work is very limited. It is an independent group of Pentecostal missionaries with a Bible school located at Soerabaya," etc.

The Missionary Monthly Reformed Review called us to task for this, stating that there were a dozen different missionary organizations at work in Java, besides several strong Dutch societies and the Reformed Churches of the Netherlands. The Reformed Churches, it is claimed, had sixty European workers in Middle Java alone. "A marvelous work has been carried on in recent decades," especially among the Mohammedans in Java. "The work among the Mohammedans has borne more fruit in Java than anywhere else in the world."

We are glad to be corrected. We might explain that the letter was not from a Pentecostal missionary. It was taken from an article in *World Conquest*, a paper published in Toronto, Canada, by the Worldwide Evangelization Crusade. The writer of the article was Norman Gamble, a prospective missionary to Java, who said he had received this letter from an unnamed missionary in the Dutch East Indies. Since we consider *World Conquest* a reliable paper, we quoted from it without conferring with our Missions Department. We are sorry we gave publicity to an erroneous report.

GRADUATION-TIME AT CENTRAL BIBLE INSTITUTE

The twentieth school year of Central Bible Institute came to a glorious conclusion on Monday evening, May 18. At that time a splendid class of eighty-one consecrated young people, having completed a three-year course of Bible training, stepped forward to receive their diplomas and then to set forth to do battle for the King of kings, as staunch "Defenders of the Faith."

Eleven of the young men plan to enter pastoral ministry; 9 plan to be evangelists; at least 8 of the young men and women are going into pioneer fields; 12 hope to be foreign missionaries (in spite of world conditions); 9 young ladies will engage in child evangelism; and the remainder are going into various branches of Christian work. Wherever God may lead them, they are determined to "Earnestly contend for the faith." That is their class motto, and "Defenders of the Faith" is their class name.

The graduation services were held in the large auditorium on the Institute campus. Many hundreds of visitors and friends attended. The platform was beautifully decorated in green and silver, the class colors. Across the front were great baskets of varicolored flowers, set off by a low green hedge. The presence of the Lord was wonderfully manifest throughout, both in the musical programs and in the messages from the Word.

Pastor Ben E. Mahan of Washington, D. C., brought the baccalaureate address on Sunday afternoon. Preceding his message were inspiring musical numbers. The last song, "A Robe of White," sung by the entire school body of 350, was rendered with such inspiration and blessing that the audience burst forth in great volumes of triumphant praise to God. The school was requested at once to repeat it. One repetition was not enough, however; many visitors asked for "A Robe of White" to be sung on Monday evening, for a third time!

On Monday many more visitors arrived, including former students of the Institute. Altogether there were upwards of 125 alumni present, including many who are now pastors, evangelists, and returned foreign missionaries. These all met for an informal time of fellowship on Monday morning and ate the noon meal together.

Many well-known brethren were in Springfield for the week end. Among these were four district superintendents-F. D. Davis of Texas, W. D. Burris of Arkansas, R. M. Riggs of Southern Missouri, and Roy Scott of West Central District. Telegrams of congratulation came from G. W. Hardcastle of Oklahoma and V. G. Greisen of Kansas, who could not be present. The heads of two other Bible Schools were on the platform -P. C. Nelson of Southwestern Bible School and C. E. McCarrell of Great Lakes Bible Institute. Congratulations to the graduating class were read also from Allan Swift of Eastern Bible Institute and F. J. Lindquist of North Central Bible Institute.

The climax of the week end came on Monday evening during the Commencement exercises. After a program of excellent music by the school orchestra, the processional began. Led by the American and Christian flags, members of the directorate, faculty, and graduating class marched down the aisles and took their places on the platform. The flags were then brought toward the center, and the entire congregation arose to sing the National Anthem. A wonderful musical program followed. The choir, the girls' chorus, the male chorus, and the entire school in turn raised their voices in anthem after anthem. It was a spiritual treat, a time of rare inspiration and blessing. The program included a Bible reading, prayer, and a congregational hymn. It ended with the presentation of diplomas, the singing of the class song, and the recessional.

Two stirring messages were given by members of the graduating class. Anna Graham of Tulsa, Okla., spoke on the subject, "Missionary Conquest." Joseph Lukowski of New York City represented the young men, bringing a message on, "Triumph Over Fear." Their timely words

The Lord gave Central Bible Institute another good year during 1941-42. A total of 380 young people, almost half of whom were young men, attended the school. The average enrollment throughout the year was 350. The students came from all corners of the land. In the graduating class alone 29 different States were represented, besides the District of Columbia and Canada. Kansas led all other States by sending 12 of the 81 members of the graduating class.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Jesus Denounces Hypocrisy

Lesson for June 14. Lesson Text: Matthew 23.

Most people bitterly condemn hypocrites. Let us be careful, however, lest in so doing we forget that hypocritical tendencies may arise in our own hearts unless we take heed to ourselves and stay close to the Lord. In studying this lesson, instead of thinking how well it fits *other* people, let us say, "Search me, O God, and know my heart, and see if there be any hypocritical tendencies therein." Owing to the nature of the text, instead of presenting an outline, we shall make brief verse-by-verse comment.

Verses 1, 2. "The scribes and Pharisees sit in Moses' seat." Christ does not condemn their office as expositors of the law, for it was necessary that there should be men to teach and instruct

the people. Many a *good office* is filled by a *bad man*. An *office* does not make a man *great*, but *greatness* qualifies a man for an *office*.

Verse 3. "Whatsoever they bid you observe, that observe and do." In other words, obey their teaching insofar as it adheres to the Scriptures. These men preached a lot that was truth, but did not live it. We must not ignore God's Word even if it does come through an unworthy vessel.

"But do not ye after their works. For they say and do not." Those sinners who allow sins in themselves which they condemn in others, are most guilty of all. Rom. 2:1-3, 17-24. (1) Here is a warning to those who tear down in practice what they build up in preaching, who in the pulpit preach so well that it is a pity for them to come out of it, who out of the pulpit live so carnally that it is a pity they should ever go into it. (2) We must distinguish between men's preaching and practice. We are not to swallow false teaching even though it comes from those whose lives and works seem commendable or miraculous; for remember that Antichrist will work miracles! Neither ought we to follow the bad example of those who preach good doctrine.

Verses 4-10. Four charges are made against the Pharisees in these verses.

1. They expected others to bear burdens which they themselves would not bear. v. 4. They taught others to

live strict religious lives which they would not live. To safeguard against such an attitude, the Christian's maxim ought to be—"Expect a lot more of yourself than you do of other people." To reverse the order is hypocrisy.

2. They were guilty of showing off. "All their works they do to be seen of men." v. 5. We are taught to let our lights shine so that men may see our good works and glorify God; but we are not to parade our own virtues so that men may glorify us. The Pharisees made broad their phylacteries. These were little scrolls of parchment on which were written certain portions of the Law, sewn up in leather and worn upon their arms and foreheads. This practice resulted from a mistaken view of Ex. 13:9, which was not to be taken literally but meant that God's law was to be borne in mind and meditated upon. The Pharisees made these phylacteries broader than was necessary, that they might appear to be more zealous of the Law and more spiritual than others. It is right to desire to be truly more spiritual than others, but it is satanic hypocrisy to desire to appear more spiritual than one is! "Love makes no parade." 1 Cor. 13:4 (Moffatt).

3. They desired places of prominence. v. 6. It is a sign of pride and hypocrisy when people do not attend church unless they can look fine and have a prominent part !

4. They desired titles of honor. vv. 7-10. We are not to covet titles which will make us seem above others; nor are we to ascribe such titles to others. *Earthly* fathers have a right to be socalled and as such should be respected, but only God is to be acknowledged as the Father of our *spirits*.

Verses 11, 12. With the attitude of the Pharisees as a background, Jesus lays down two eternal spiritual principles (v. 11). True greatness consists in serving, not in being served, and (v. 12) "The way up is down." Compare Isa. 37:31; John 12:24.

Verses 13-33. "Woe! Woe! Woe!" Like so many claps of thunder, these woes are leveled by



Christ against the scribes and Pharisees. These accusations were as follows-

1. They were enemies of Christ's kingdom. They would neither go in themselves, nor suffer others to go in. v. 13. It is bad to keep away from Christ ourselves; it is worse to keep others from Him. Matt. 18:6. The Pharisees resented Christ's reception and treatment of certain notorious sinners. (See Matt. 11:19; Luke 5:27-32; John 8:1-11; Luke 19:7.) Some Christians feel the same way! They seem to resent God's graciousness to sinners! It is fortunate for us that our salvation is not in their hands; if it were so, some of us would be undone!

2. They used religion as a cloak to hide their evil deeds. v. 14. "Ye devour widows' houses." They were unmerciful in business relations and took advantage of defenseless people by overcharging them and demanding high rate of interest. Yet at the same time they made long prayers. We are told that some of the Pharisees spent as much as three hours a day in prayer and meditation. If that be so, it puts many of us to shame! Jesus did not condemn long prayers; for He Himself "continued all night in prayer" and taught that "men ought always to pray and not faint." He condemned prayer as a pretense, prayer made in order to secure reputation for being something one was not. All the prayer in the world will not atone for a crooked life.

3. They closed heaven against those who would follow Christ, but labored diligently to win converts to their own ranks. v. 15. "Ye compass land and sea to make one proselyte." Their zeal at least was commendable. Note: (1) It means putting forth great effort to win men; (2) the winning of men to Christ is worthy of utmost labor; (3) if ungodly people do not shrink from pain, trouble, sacrifice, and self-discipline in order to win men to ignoble causes, how much more ought Christians to endure hardness as good soldiers in order to win immortal souls for Christ!

4. They wrested God's Word to suit their own purposes. vv. 16-22. In seeking to advance their own interests and secure gain for themselves, they put false constructions upon the Scriptures, thus making loopholes for their own wrongdoings and misleading others as well. How often this happens today! We must remember that even the devil used Scripture when he tried to tempt Christ to step out of God's will!

5. They were very strict in smaller matters, but careless of more essential things. vv. 23, 24. They were very exact in paying tithes, and were right in so doing-"these ought ye to have done." They were wrong in omitting weightier matters-"judgment, mercy, and faith." All the things of God are important, but those which have to do with the holiness of the heart are more important. There are plenty of men in the world who give thousands to church and charity whose hearts are devoid of love for God and holiness. It is much easier to drop a dollar in the collection plate than to right a wrong or confess a sin. Giving that is not accompanied by proper inward attitude will profit the giver nothing! 1 Cor. 13:1-3.

> 6. They were greatly concerned about the outer life, but not at all about the inner life. vv. 25-28. The approval of man meant everything; the approval of God nothing. Jesus compared them to a man who would carefully wash the outside of a cup and platter but ignore the inside-a foolish thing to do! Jesus then prescribed the reasonable method -"Cleanse first that which is within Notice He said, "Cleanse the cup." first." Both are necessary. But salvation is from the inside out. External motives may keep the outside clean while the heart remains filthy. But if the Holy Spirit is in ascendency in the inner life, then both inner and outer

life will be right. Jesus also likened the Pharisees to whitened sepulchers, like some of the beautiful modern mausoleums—beautiful externally but full of rotted corpses. It is possible for those whose hearts are sinful to appear very good on the outside. But of what use is such deception? The day is coming when whited sepulchers shall be opened, secret things made plain and their contents examined.

7. They pretended respect for prophets who had been killed by their foreparents while they hated and persecuted those prophets who were still living. vv. 29-33. "Ye build the tombs of the prophets and garnish the sepulchers of the righteous." But carnal people can easily honor the memory of faithful ministers of the past, for dead men tell no tales and cannot reprove living men for their sins!

Verses 34-39. "Wherefore, behold, I send unto you prophets." What wonderful grace there is in these words! Though they were hypocrites, though their intentions were evil, yet Christ would give them further opportunity for repentance. He had called them serpents and vipers—rather strong language for Christ? Yes, it was. He had a right so to speak—but we haven't, for we are not sinless! Observe the tender concern of His closing words, lest it be thought Christ was not loving-"How often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not !" And here is the most solemn sentence of all-"I would . . . ye would not!" "Behold, your house is left unto you desolate." To reject Christ's love means desolation; to receive it means to pos-sess peace like a river that will last forever.--J. Bashford Bishop.

Many years ago I was peraching on the streets in Los Angeles, and paid my last dollar for a bed in the Bible Institute. I wondered how God would help me. I remember walking along the streets, looking down, hoping I might find a five-dollar bill, or some money-but all I saw was cigar bands, waste paper, and other things of no value.

I soon had a crowd, but some of them began to curse and heckle me.

One fellow of the baser sort yelled out to me, "You are hired by the capitalists !"-and here I had not eaten for three days! I stopped preaching and looked him in the eye for a few moments, and then said to him: "You say I am hired by the capitalists; the truth of the matter is, I haven't eaten in three days, for I haven't had so much as one cent in my pocket." I pulled out my empty pockets to show they were empty. The whole tenor of the meeting suddenly changed. A burly, hard-looking fellow jumped out from the crowd and said, "Listen, youse guys; this man is all right, and the first guy what says any thing against him will get a mouth full."

I cannot remember what else he said, that is, the exact words; but they were along that line, and he emphasized it by doubling up his fist, as he went around the crowd keeping order. Then a strange thing happened. All around that group of men, hands were thrust out holding silver dollars for me! And so my needs were supplied, and after the meeting ever so many of these hard men came to me, shook my hand, and said, "God bless you." Presently it dawned on me why God had allowed me to be penniless for those days-it was the only way I could get anywhere with them. God used my need to break down the barriers and to sound a responsive chord in them .-Christian Victory.
