THE AUTHORITY OF GOD'S WRITTEN WORD

I N THE Gospel of Luke we read of a certain rich man who died and went to perdition. Realizing his doom, he became interested in his brothers who still lived on the earth. Then he was reminded, "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead." Thus God affirmed that His Word through His prophets was the word of supreme authority.

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable." The law, given at Sinai, reveals God's demand of righteousness. Grace, given through Calvary, reveals salvation for those who have broken the law if they will accept the atoning work of Christ.

Jesus said, "If any man hear My words, and believe not, I judge him not... the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." He did not argue. He simply spoke, leaving His word with them, whether they would accept or reject. Responsibility for their decision would rest with them.

When Jesus rose from the dead, "Beginning at Moses and all the prophets, He expounded unto them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself." Thus Jesus accepted and approved all the Scriptures as being the Word of God. Who then are we that we should deny them? Said He, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of Me." "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him."

The Bible tells us about ourselves, showing us we are sinners; about God, revealing that He is ready to save; about Christ, and how He brought redemption. It guides as to proper relation of man with man, and it warns of hell and invites us to prepare for heaven.

He who lives by the Bible lives honorably and happily. He who dies trusting the promises in the Bible passes in peace knowing he is going to his home in heaven. Believe, my brother; believe God's Word and accept God's Christ. Earthly hopes

may perish, earthly gain take flight, but Jesus never faileth. Read your Bible and trust its promises; abide by its guidance and all will be well.

Scripture reading: 1 Thessalonians 2:8-13.

T is easy for us to find ourselves moving in a cycle of spiritual monotony.We

become so familiar with the terminology we use in praising the Lord, and with the order of our Pentecostal services, that we carry on our general worship without that rich sincerity of soul that God desires, and soon we find ourselves on the treadmill of monotonous religiosity. In other words, we just go through a form.

This is something that my heart and soul long has abhorred, and I have cried to God that He might deliver us from it. I have prayed that in all things, whether it be private prayer around the family altar or ministry to the multitudes, whether it be a secret little service rendered in His name or some greater task, the Lord might enable us to be genuine so that it comes from the heart.

The apostle Paul felt this need, and said: "I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air: but I keep my body under, and bring it into subjection : lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." 1 Cor. 9:26, 27. And he longed that the same sincerity of purpose, that same genuineness of determination, might be imparted to the Thessalonians, as we find in our Scripture reading. He reminded them of the faithful concern he had exercised, and the fervent sincerity he had shown in all that he did, as much as to say, "I did this, in preaching the Word to you, in the hope that it would accomplish the same thing in you."

He voiced a sincere appreciation of them, saying: "For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when ye received the Word of God, which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the Word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." Oh, that the same thing might be said about us! It is very easy for us to become, as it were, connoisseurs of the ministry. We say: "I like Brother So-and-So; he has such nice mannerisms in the pulpit." Or, "I enjoy Brother So-and-So's ministry because of the modulation of his voice." I would not belittle human personality, for it is something God can use if yielded to Him; but too often we listen to the sermons as though they are merely the words of men, rather than the Word of God.

Paul said this Word of God works effectually in each one who believes. It will do something for you. I pray God that as we hear the preaching of the Word, as we read the Word, as we listen to the gospel songs, whether in a gospel meeting or on the radio, it may reach the vital sources of our being and really accomplish something. I have a conviction in my heart that God is ready to do mighty things through our services, through the radio, through the printed page, if we will only let Him. We do not need to wait for the altar service for men to be saved. They can receive the Word, believe it, and be saved right in their seats as the sermon is being preached. The sick do not need to wait until the elders anoint them with oil, lay hands on them, and pray. If they will receive the Word, and believe it, they can be healed right where they sit in the meeting. Neither is it necessary for folk to have a number of people gathered around them praying in order to receive the Baptism.

I was preaching at a camp meeting in Wisconsin, and a precious sister was tarrying for the Baptism there. She was the wife of one of the home missionary workers, and she was very hungry. Night after night we had tarried with her. Seemingly she was baffled. Like others, she would seemingly come to the very brink of receiving the Spirit, but each time something would bar her. I had become concerned for this sister, for both her

husband and her daughter had said to me: "You know, Mother has been taught way back. . . I don't know whether she is going to dare to believe that Pentecost is real if God does not meet her now." But God is more concerned than we are, and He was working in this sister's heart.

One morning they did not arrive until after the preaching had begun. They were staying in an auto camp a short distance from the camp ground, and had been delayed because other cars had blocked their way. As they slipped into the meeting and sat down at one side of the tent, I noticed them out of the corner of my eye, and a little prayer went up from my heart, "Lord, make the Word effective in this precious woman's heart this morning. Help her to believe." In a moment that dear sister's hands went up, and she began praising the Lord in a glorious heavenly language-right in the midst of the morning message. At the close of the service her husband came to me and apologized. "Brother Steelberg, I'm sorry my wife interrupted your message," he said. I replied, "Brother, it's never an interruption when the Lord meets a hungry heart. I'm ready to stop preaching any time the Lord can meet a hungry heart." He said, "You know, she was awful hungry last evening when we left. She was praying most of the night, and when she woke up this morning I seed the power was on her; and when we got to meeting I seed it was getting stronger." And he said, "The Lord just had ahold of her, and He wouldn't let her go."

I pray that the Lord will not let you go until you receive the Word as truly the Word of God, which effectually works in those that believe. Beware lest you listen to the message from God's Word as though it were the words of man—as simply another expression on the part of an individual. Receive it as it is in truth, the Word of God, and it will accomplish definite results.

Effectual Christian living is absolutely imperative in these days. Your own soul cannot be satisfied unless God makes these things effectual in you. God never displays His power simply for the sake of advertising. He always seeks to exercise Himself for the purpose of definite accomplishment. May I turn to a

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few illustrations in the Scriptures which bring this thought more fully.

In John 6:27 we read: "Labor not for the meat which perisheth, but for that meat which endureth unto everlasting life, which the Son of man shall give unto you: for Him hath God the Father sealed." I believe that God wants us to exercise a sense of appraisal so that we can distinguish between that which merely pleases and that which truly blesses and edifies. How often, as special songs have been sung, I have listened and wondered whether the people were being pleased simply because they were hearing a good voice, or if it was the spiritual message of the song that was moving their hearts. What we must strive for is the effectual working of God in all that we do. When we are hungry for that, God will give it to us.

In 1 Corinthians 3:14 there is another passage of Scripture on this line: "If any man's work abide which he hath built thereupon, he shall receive a reward. If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss." How much of our supposedly spiritual worship and service is going to stand the fire when the test comes? That is a question that should be of vital concern. Are we making every blow count for God in everything we do? Are we really accomplishing something for the Lord?

Again in Jeremiah 48:10 we read: "Cursed be he that doeth the work of the Lord deceitfully." Looking in the margin we find this word "deceitfully" rendered, "ineptly, or negligently."

Many of the garments I wore as a lad were home-made. When I first went to school I had home-made stockings and home-made blouses. Mother made some of the blouses from flour sacks, and as she did not want the flour sack markings to show she would dye the sacks a dark brown, or a dark blue. I remember how Mother would send me to the store for a package of Diamond Dyes. She would prepare the dye, then put the garment into it, stirring all the while, and it would not be long until the color was in the garment. Not only was the garment in the dye, but the dye was in the garment. And it was fast dye-you couldn't get it out. I thought of this homely illustration as I meditated on these words, "The Word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." The word "effectually" in the original means "inworked." I pray that the Word of God may be in-worked in all of our lives. I pray God that His truth, His faith, His power may work effectually in us until it penetrates our lives and becomes a very part of us, just as the dye became a very part of the garment.

TO EACH HIS GIFT

W HAT is in thine hand, Abel?" "Nothing but one wee lamb, O God, taken from the flock. I purpose offering it to Thee, a willing sacrifice." And so he did. And the sweet smell of the burning has been filling the air ever since, and, constantly going up to God as a perpetual sacrifice of praise, speaks of Calvary through all the ages.

"What is it thou hast in thy hand, Moses?" "Nothing but a staff, O God, with which I tend my flocks." "Take it and use it for Me." And he did; and wrought miracles on the grandest scale the world has ever known; and in smiting the Red Sea created forever the picture of a people buried in the baptism of Christ.

"Mary, what is that in thine hand?" "Nothing but a pot of sweet smelling ointment, O God, wherewith I would anoint Thine only One called Jesus."

A promise has been given: "If ye abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ve shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." Too often His words only touch the surface, and do not find an abiding place in our lives. Too often the preaching of the gospel produces only a momentary sense of gratification and enjoyment which swiftly passes away. May God help us to partake of His Spirit so that the Word will drive deeply into the people's hearts and be clinched on the other side. When the apostle Paul stood in the presence of the great of his day, each time he gave his testimony something happened. One said, "When I have a more convenient season, I will call for thee." Another said, "Almost thou per-suadest me to be a Christian." And still another, "Thou art beside thyself; much learning doth make thee mad.'

What is the result of our testimony? Do we compel decision and confession? God help us! It may be that folk will become angry with us at times. It may be that they are upset. Never mind what the effect may be, as long as they are stirred. The Word will bear fruit which is wellpleasing unto God and will result in vital satisfaction to the soul of the individual at length.

As I have ministered in Pentecostal assemblies for almost thirty years there has been some concern in my heart lest we lose that vital something which attracts others to the Lord as they look upon us. And so she did; and not only did the perfume "fill all the house" where they were, but the Bible-reading world has been fragrant with the memory of this blessed act of love which has ever since been spoken of "for a memorial of her."

"Poor woman, what is it thou hast in thy hand?" "Only two mites, Lord. It is very little, but then it is all I have, and I would put it into Thy treasury." And so she did; and the Lord has already adjudged it one of the wealthiest gifts ever made to Him.

"What is it thou hast in thine hand, Dorcas?" "Only a needle, Lord." "Take it, and use it for Me." And so she did; and not only were the suffering of Joppa warmly clad, but, inspired by her loving life, "Dorcas Societies" even now continue their benign mission to the poor throughout the earth.

There is a danger of simply repeating things we have heard without experienceing them in our own souls. There is a danger of wanting some of the Pentecostal experiences, even, of this glorious latter-day outpouring, merely to be able to say that we have received them, and to be initiated into the sphere of those who are recognized as Pentecostal. Oh, that we might want God's best for His glory alone—not merely for our selfish interests, but that God may accomplish something through our lives for His glory.

Effectual living for Christ results in satisfaction. The apostle Paul could say, at the end of his journey: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." He could look back and remember that there was not one occasion when he was simply waving his arms, beating the air, and going through the motions of fighting but he had actually made every blow count for God. Every time he testified, every time he prayed, every time he served the Lord, there had been an effectual working of the Spirit of God.

A few years ago, when we were conducting radio broadcasts in the city of Philadelphia, I asked two young ladies if they would come to the broadcast and sing. These two sisters, Viola and Helen Johnson, were sincere spiritual young people whom the Lord had used to open

THE SECRET COUNCILS OF GOD

GOD spoke concerning our Lord Jesus Christ, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye Him." Matt. 17:5. The Lord Jesus was in the secret councils of God, and imparted that which He had heard from God. He said to His disciples, "All things that I have heard of My Father I have made known unto you." John 15:14, 15. He had come to earth to impart to them the words of God.

A great teacher imparts his own outlook, vision, inspiration, to those who listen to him. Christ came to impart His very nature, His very disposition. He says to us, "Learn of Me; for I am meek and lowly in heart," and He will impart, as we listen, His own meekness, His own lowliness. 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ATOMIC ENERGY

T HE Psalmist asks the question, "What is man, that Thou art mindful of him?" Psalm 8:4. In another psalm we read, "He remembereth that we are dust." Psalm 103:14. When judgment was given to the first Adam, the Lord said to him, "Dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return." Gen. 3:19.

How to Receive Healing

REAL faith will stand alone, anywhere, for any length of time, in the face of all contradictions, and in the teeth of any opposition, for it rests on the "for ever settled" Word of God.

Reading in Mark 10:46-52 of the healing of blind Bartimaeus his aloneness with God throughout the entire transaction was much emphasized to me by the Holy Spirit.

There he sat, alone in a crowd—the loneliest kind of loneliness—hopeless and helpless. No one volunteered a hand to assist him to get within range of the Great Physician.

But he could hear and he used what he had to secure what he lacked. The moment his ears told him that it was Jesus of Nazareth who was passing by he filled his lungs and emitted a cry so piercing that it brought down stern rebukes on his head. For Jesus of Nazareth was He who said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He hath anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor: He hath sent Me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised. To preach the acceptable year of the Lord." Luke 4:18, 19.

Poor blind beggar! How easily the crowd could have silenced him forcibly. But Bartimaeus had lost all consciousness of the crowd. By faith he wrenched himself clean out of his surroundings and stood alone with God incarnate, in the person of His Son, Jesus Christ the Lord. There were to him just two people present, Jesus of Nazareth and blind beggar Bartimaeus.

Alone, and unaided by any favoring circumstance, he undertook by his voice, the only thing he had, to bring the two into vital contact.

Opposition only made him cry the "more a great deal." That is its invariable effect on real faith, for real faith will stand alone.

"And Jesus stood still!" Amazing words!

His every step controlled and directed by the Spirit of God, He was on an errand to some definite objective, yet at the cry of Bartimaeus—no, at the cry of faith —He stood still.

Marvel of marvels, God incarnate, Creator and Sustainer of the universe, arrested in His course, brought to a full stop by a blind beggar's cry!

Yes; for "all things are possible to him that believeth."

And Bartimaeus received his sight and followed Jesus in the way.

Are you sick? Have you a special need. Then cry. David cried to the Lord, and I don't think his was a mumbled whisper for he said: My voice shalt Thou hear in the morning, O Lord; in the morning will I direct my prayer unto Thee, and will look up." Psalm 5:3.

"And what if he does?" retorted the lady. "He can't understand a single word."

"O John, you are so foolish. Can't you see who he is? He's one of those African Princes who came here on government business. He's as black as coal."

(Dr. Davis gave a slight shudder. He was unduly sensitive on the point of color.)

"You can't be sure, my dear, who he is," said John feebly.

"I tell you he's an African Prince," said his little wife with decision. "Isn't it awful, John, to think of that poor heathen leaving this country, when probably he doesn't even know he has a soul? I call it disgraceful."

"Well, you can't help it, my dear," said John soothingly.

"Can't I?" she replied indignantly. "I'd soon let him know, if I could speak his language." But John only grunted, so she resumed her knitting.

Just then the train passed a big school, which caused the gentleman behind *The Times* to remark, "Wonderful building, that. The schools of today are a far cry from those of my time. The kids of today have much to be thankful for."

"I'm not so sure of that," replied the little lady. "I don't see that children now are any better than we were. Indeed, in many respects they are worse. Boys and girls do pretty much as they like now; and as for morality, the less said the better."

Dr. Davis saw his opportunity. Slowly he opened his eyes and leaned forward, saying in the purest English—"Morality, ma'am?"

Dewey Lee Sexton (With the Navy at Saipan, Marianas Islands).—The Lord surely is blessing us C.A.'s here on Saipan. Our Tuesday and Saturday night services are progressing. Even though many are leaving we had ninety-four out last Saturday night. Three men came for salvation. One of our Nazarene boys was baptized in the Holy Ghost and fire last week. Since then, he has been growing in the Word by leaps and bounds.

Our nightly prayer service is also going strong and oh, how the Lord is blessing! The other night we held our Lord to one of His promises—the healing of bodies. Truly the Lord knew we had no oil, but we prayed for different ones. Some received their healing before the service was over, praise God!

I just wish you could sit in on one of our services for the Koreans on Sunday afternoon or Sunday night. We are there for two hours each Sunday afternoon. About 300 children attend our sing-song. Sunday evening is the Chaplain's Service. It is composed of a mixed congregation of adults and children, numbering 350 to 400.

The children are a speedy class of singers. We have taught them "Into My Heart," in English; "Jesus Loves Me," in both their tongue and ours; "Jesus Boves the Little Children," in both tongues; "The B-I- B-L-E," in our tongue; and "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" and "Joy to the World," in their tongue. But their favorite is "Jesus Loves the Little Children." They sing with all their hearts and are so hungry to hear about Jesus.

Last Sunday we passed out small bags of candy to the children, and they were so happy. Next, we gave them small pictures of Jesus. You should have seen how they would lay the candy down to grasp the picture of Jesus! They would kiss the picture and then begin to cry. It was enough to stir anyone's heart!

Later, our boy interpreter—who sometimes finds it pretty hard to understand us—announced to the Sunday School teachers and children that I was leaving for home. Most of them cried. Then they sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," and also prayed for me. I could hardly break away from them and my heart was so heavy with the desire to talk to them. I believe the Lord has called me to the mission field of Korea. By the grace, mercy, and strength of my Savior I expect to heed His calling as soon as possible after I get back home.

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Heetebry (Suva, Fiji Islands).—We had our Christmas program early this year, as the schools close

earlier here for the summer holiday. (Yesterday, December 27, was the hottest day of this season. We felt so limp and lifeless.) The children usually scatter, and some go visiting relatives on other islands. So by having our program early most of them can be present, and how they do enjoy it!

Some of the parents although uninterested in spiritual things for themselves, send their children to Sunday School. However, they had to come along to the program, of course. So this was a good opportunity for them to hear the gospel message brought from the lips of their own little ones.

For some time our Children's Choir has been practicing Christmas Carols. When they sang so nicely at the program, we applied for them to sing over the air, and time was granted them during the Children's Hour. The children were thrilled with the opportunity. They sang the Carols very well, and one junior girl recited beautifully. Even some who do not attend our church commented on how well they did.

When our new Children's Tabernacle was dedicated almost four months ago, we could not obtain paint for the interior, neither could we get a permit to install electric lights. We also needed a piano very much. So we put these needs to the boys and girls, and asked them all to pray about them.

The first need answered was for the paint, which we were able to get in about a month's time. The building is being painted this week by one of the brethren.

The second answer was about electricity. After another month we were given permission to install three lights, for which we are very grateful. It is so much easier than filling and lighting gasoline lanterns.

About another month later—just before Christmas—the third prayer was answered, and we were able to get an old player piano quite reasonably. The piano needs repairs and tuning as this climate is severe on them. But pianos are very scarce, and therefore very expensive here. Nevertheless, the piano tuner said that many people are paying far more for pianos than we did.

Jessie Wengler (Japan). — During the three and a half war years that I was in Japan, I had so many evidences of God's loving care and protection. I proved His promises over and over again. He brought me

safely through days and nights of bombings and terrible destruction. He literally fulfilled the promise, "When thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee." Isa. 43:2. Through days of famine and lack of food His grace was sufficient and His strength was made perfect in weakness. Thanks to your prayers on my behalf, I am again in the U. S. A. after being away twelve years.

As far as I was able to find out before I left Japan, the Assembly of God churches were intact, with the exception of the Hachioji church which was totally destroyed. The city of Hachioji was leveled to the ground, but Miss Sakamoto and the Christians fled to the hills and were safe.

The Kofu church is safe. The city of Kofu was more than two thirds destroyed and the fire came within a few houses of the church, but miraculously the church was left intact. The Christians also escaped, but many of them lost all they had.

In Takinogawa, also, only a small district was saved from fire, but the church was preserved. I saw Mr. Yumiyama, the pastor, and he reported all his flock safe, although many had lost all by fire and bombing. The Yokohoma church and pastor is safe. That district was untouched.

God has wonderfully preserved His children in Japan. I believe He has a future work there for His called ones. Please pray much for them.

Virgil E. Griffis (Philippine Islands).— While in the Philippine Islands, about eight of my Christian brothers and I built Sunshine Mission for the Filipino people. I was the leader of it, but we took turns preaching God's Word. On Sunday afternoons we would go into a Filipino village and have street services. We also had Bible study for the Filipinos.

Some brothers from the 321st and 322nd Infantry heard of it and began to attend. So our number grew. The soldiers were from a lot of different denominations, but we did not preach denomination nor church membership. We preached the pure Word of God and the saving power of Jesus. Filipinos and soldiers alike found Christ in our mission. Sunshine Missior became so well known on Leyte that Rev. Placido Ortiga, the dean of Bandy Bible School, came to see us. We had him preach for us a few times. He said our meetings were just like being at a church convention.

We had lots of Filipino people come to the mission. It was a great joy to see them go to the altar and weep and pray. God was with us and we had some wonderful meetings. The people were so hungry for God's Word. We gave them all the Bibles we could get.

One little lady, Mrs. Juana Sorvilla, was surely on fire for God. When any

Filipino came to the mission who could not understand the American language, she would interpret for us. So we put her in as official interpreter. We also had her lead song service and preach a few times. All of the Filipino people are good singers. When I left Leyte I turned Sunshine Mission over to Mrs. Sorvilla, and she said that by the help of God she would try to carry on God's work there.

And I will set a sign among them, and I will send those that escape of them unto the nations... to the isles afar off, that have not heard my fame, neither have seen my glory; and they shall declare my glory among the Gentiles.—Isa. 66:19.

Mr. and Mrs. Peter W. Funk (Hilo, Hawaii, T.H.).—We have just dedicated our new church to the Lord. Built entirely by the pastor and church members, during the war, under the severest of difficulties, out of used materials, it stands today as a monument to our miracle-working God. It is the first Assembly of God church building in the territory of Hawaii. Think of it—1945 years after Christ's death, and only one such building for the Lord in Hawaii! True, buildings



are not what count most; but they do indicate that God is blessing people who are interested in His work.

We had wonderful services on Dedication Day, September 30, 1945. Sister M. Larsen, who pastored in Hilo before we came here last fall but is now at Laupahoehoe (our former pastorate), spoke at the dedication service for the church building. In the afternoon we had a fellowship meeting and baptismal service, which was held in the church as we have a baptistry now. Florence Byers, former missionary to Japan but now located in Honolulu, brought the message. The Lord's blessing rested mightily on the service. CHAPLAIN CASUALTIES

The Army Chaplain Corps suffered 387 casualties during the war, 149 of them fatal, out of a total of some nine thousand members, according to a report released by the Chief of Chaplains.

ARABS TO BUY LAND BACK

According to Jewish Missionary Magazine, two Arab companies with a joint capital of six million dollars are being formed by the Arab League for the purpose of buying back Arab lands from the Jews in Palestine.

ARAB ANTI-ZIONISTS

Frank Gervasi, writing in Collier's, points out that it is a comparatively small group of powerful Arabs that is keeping the Jews out of Palestine. He states that the "opposition to the Jews has never come from the masses of the Arabs." He contends, "These have worked side by side with the Jews peacefully enough for centuries." He points out that "less than two per cent of the Arab people own all of their countries' agricultural and industrial wealth," and it is this small group that objects. The rich Arabs don't like it because, under the progressive and democratic policies of the Jews in Palestine, Arab workers have received pay increases ranging from 100 to 800 per cent more than their brothers in other Arab states. Again we find that the love of money is the root of all evil.

"PROTESTANT NOVENA"

In advertising the beginning of "The Quiet Hour," a certain Protestant church has fairly gone the limit in copying the Roman Catholics. Underneath the caption of their church ad, in parenthesis, were the words, "Protestant Novena." They advertised nine liturgical prayer services and seven prayers for spiritual help, material help, physical healing, Christian society, happy death, quiet hour and prayer of thanksgiving.

The ad was published in the Washington Evening Star, Washington, D. C., by one of the leading churches of the largest Protestant denomination in this country. At one time this same church was one of the evangelistic fire centers of the world. Now it has nothing to offer but a formal, lifeless program of worship patterned after Rome! Lo! how the mighty are fallen.

STARTLING SPEED

Sir Lawrence Bragg, the eminent physicist, has pointed out that all our graphs of man's accomplishments in the realms of travel, power and craftsmanship, after running almost flat for thousands of years, have suddenly, in the past century, taken a tremendous upward turn, and are still going up steeply. For example, the mode of travel was no speedier when Queen Victoria came to the throne of England, than it was in the days of the Pharaohs in Egypt. But what has happened since Victoria's day? Men are now hurtling through space with the speed of sound. Men have found a way to smash the atom and release power enough to destroy the whole earth. Men are contacting the moon by means of radar. Suddenly, within a lifetime, men have been ushered into an era when the events of the Revelation are projected as an imminent possibility rather than a far-off fantasy.

The Passing and the Permanent

THE TABLES ARE TURNED

Once it was considered a misfortune to be a Jew in Germany. Now the Jewish communities in Germany are being swamped with requests from the "half-Jews" and "quarter-Jews" to be registered as Jews, for the Jews of Germany are given priority over the Aryans in food, clothing and housing in the American-British zones.

STREICHER MEMORIAL

The rich estate of Julius Streicher, the notorious Nazi Jew-baiter, has been turned into a training farm for Jews. The well-equipped farm, comprising 350 acres of the best land in Bavaria, now has 150 young Jewish men and women from the concentration camps working on it, learning farming in preparation for their future life in Palestine.

RUSSIA SEEKS A SPOIL.

Russia seeks a spoil in Iran. The big power wants concessions which the little power does not want to yield, and so the dispute has been referred to the United Nations Organization. Russia is displaying great interest in the Middle East, which includes Iran, Iraq, Turkey, Syria, and Palestine. Will she seek a spoil in Palestine, too? She is looking in that direction. We are reminded of Ezekiel 38, where "Gog" is pictured going up against the mountains of Israel to take a spoil and to take a prey. The prophet said it shall be in the latter days. The time may not be far away.

FAITHFUL KOREAN CHRISTIANS

Writing in *The Presbyterian*, a missionary from Korea says the church there has stood loyal to Christ as few modern churches have. "The Presbyterian Church in Korea has some 10,000 congregations; and, of its two million nominal communicants, it might, with great effort, get a million to church on any given Sunday." We may be mistaken, but it would appear that the Korean Presbyterian Church has a larger attendance, on any given Sunday, than the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. through whose missionary work it came into being!

MOVING TO THE MOON?

It is reliably reported that, even before radar contact was made with the moon, the Department of the Interior was receiving many inquiries as to how one might file a claim to some particular part of the moon. Possibly some are wishing they might move to the moon to escape the terror of the atom bombs! From what we know about the moon, however, it would not be a very desirable place to live. Heaven is far better. Why not stake a claim in heaven, where nothing that hurts or destroys shall ever enter? The way to file a claim to heaven is simply to accept Jesus Christ as your personal Savior, and trust in His all-sufficient Atonement.

THE VERDICT IN CHAMPAIGN

After four months of study, the three judges at Champaign, Ill. have finally ruled that religion can rightfully be taught in the public schools. The case of Mrs. Vashti McCollum, an atheist who contested the practice, was thus defeated, and the right has triumphed. The decision has far-reaching effects inasmuch as religious teaching is being given on released school time in 46 states.

SUFFERING IN FINMARK

Ninety per cent of the houses of Finmark (in Norway) have been destroyed. Ninety-four of the 120 schools in this province no longer exist. The children are now huddled in temporary barracks, single rooms, any place where a few can be brought together. For the most part they lack school supplies. At least half of them have only paper shoes or wooden-soled sandals and only the thinnest ragged and patched clothing.

THE STRENGTH OF ZIONISM

As the coming of the Lord draws nigh and the time comes for His ancient people to return to their ancient homeland, God is putting into their hearts a desire to be back in Palestine. Over 80% of the Jews of America are in favor of the formation of a Jewish State in Palestine. About 10% are opposed, while 9% are undecided. These figures were compiled by Senators Wagner and Taft following a coast-to-coast survey of Jewish opinion, in city and in country.

LIQUOR AT LONDON CONFERENCE

When the Methodists rented their Central Hall in London to the United Nations Conference, they stipulated, "No alcoholic beverages may be consumed on the premises." Good for the Methodists! But, according to *Pathfinder*, the Church of England felt the Methodists were too narrow, so they turned their Church House, only two hundred yards away, into one of the largest, best-stocked bars in England for the benefit (?) of UNO delegates and guests. Woe unto the Anglicans! "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink." Habakkuk 2:15.

BROKEN CISTERNS

An attractive ad in a popular magazine begins with these noble words: "In these bewildering times where can a man turn to replenish the walls of his courage, to repair the walls of his faith?" One would expect the answer to be the Lord, His Word, His Church, but instead it says: "an old friend, a faithful dog . . . these bring your hour of peace. So, too, does a glass of mellow beer or ale." What mockery! What a shame to substitute beer for prayer and ale for God! But that is the trouble with the world today. They have forsaken God, the fountain of living waters, and have hewn for themselves cisterns, broken cisterns, that can hold no water. Jer. 2:13.

"PREPARE OR PERISH"

Entering the atomic age, America must "prepare or perish," warned General George C. Marshall recently. He disclosed an arsenal of "terrifying" new weapons and warned that the next few years will produce jet-propelled bombers that can fly 500 to 600 miles an hour and bomb targets 1500 miles distant. An ultimate certainty are bombers faster than the speed of sound, which will be capable of carrying more than 100,000 pounds of explosives to any spot on earth and return to a friendly base.

Faced with such an alternative, America no doubt will prepare rather than perish. The general feeling is that this nation needs to remain strong in military power, and the only question seems to be the way in which America must prepare. Christ also warns the people of America and every nation to "prepare or perish," and He tells us exactly how we should prepare. "Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand," is His warning. "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish."

When General Marshall warned of perishing he was speaking of physical death, but Christ warns us of something infinitely greater. He warns us of that perishing which comes after physical death. Three times in the Book of Revelation it is called "the second death." It means to be cast into the lake of fire, in which those who are cast therein are tormented day and night for ever and ever. Rev. 20:10-15. We can well believe that over the gloomy portals

to that eternal abode it is written, "They who enter here leave hope behind."

With what force, therefore, the solemn words come to warn every man and woman, boy and girl—"Prepare or perish." Have you prepared? Have you repented of every sin and accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as your all-sufficient Savior?

PALESTINE POTENTIALITY

Dr. W. C. Lowdermilk, soil conservation expert of the U. S. Government, makes a striking statement regarding the possibilities of Palestine:

"If the forces of reclamation and progress which Jewish settlers have introduced are permitted to continue, Palestine may well be the leaven that will transform the other lands of the Near East. Once the great undeveloped resources of these countries are properly exploited, twenty to thirty million people may live decent and prosperous lives where a few million now struggle for a bare existence. Palestine can serve as the example, the demonstration, the lever, that will lift the entire Near East from its present desolate condition to a dignified place in a free world."

Truly the prophets of old, who wrote of that barren land becoming the glory of all the earth in the last days, must have received their inspiration from above.

SCATTERED, BUT NOT SUPPRESSED

The Hebrews are a people scattered among all the nations, as God said they would be (Ezek. 12:15), but never have they lost their identity. Pathfinder tells of a group of Jews numbering about 500 who fled from Monterey, Mexico, in the year 1589 because of persecution in this city which they had helped to found. During the succeeding centuries they married and intermarried with the native Indians, but the "faith of the fathers" was kept alive. "Now, numbering about the same as the orignal colony, these 'Indian' Jews are together again in one community on the outskirts of Mexico City. There they built a small brick synagogue and teach the Hebrew language." Rabbi Ramirez is their spiritual leader. What a people!

There exists in Ethiopia a colony of Falashis, who are genuinely Hebraic in language, religion, and bodily features. They number about 10,000. It is said that their worship and language are the purest Hebrew among all Jewish groups in the world. The Jews are found in every country of the world, more or less persecuted, but still faithful to the traditions of the fathers. When this faithfulness and loyalty is enlisted in God's missionary program in the Millennium, what a blessing this people will become to the inhabitants of the earth! May the Lord be gracious unto the people that are called by His name, and bring them back to Himself!
